

NOAA: Lights will protect fish facility from terrorist attack

ARE SCIENTISTS who study fish likely to be attacked by terrorists? Bureaucrats trying to defend the installation of a half-dozen 25-foot-tall light poles next to an oceanfront U.S. government building in Pacific Grove are claiming they

are.

But a planner at the California Coastal Commission said the light poles are inconsistent with state and local law, and may have to come down.

In February, the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration installed the towering lights in the parking lot of the NOAA fisheries laboratory at 1352 Lighthouse Ave. for "safety reasons" without informing the coastal commis-

sion or P.G. officials.

That prompted an investigation by the coastal commission — which has strict rules about artificial lighting in environmentally sensitive areas — to determine if the lights would impact habitat.

"I recommended to our federal consistency division that they find the light installations to be inconsistent with the

Police use Taser to nab fleeing parolee

A SUSPECTED counterfeit was arrested Saturday after being subdued with a Taser by a Carmel police officer. The dramatic arrest came after a sales clerk in an Ocean Avenue T-shirt shop gave Carmel P.D. a description of a man who passed a fake \$100 bill there Saturday evening.

Police officer Greg Johnson set out to search for the suspect and recognized the man, 41-year-old Gregory Sewell, walking in the area of San Carlos and Fifth, according to CPD Sgt. Mel Mukai.

But when he asked Sewell to stop, the man ran. As Johnson chased him on foot down San Carlos Street, Sewell stopped and turned to square off against the officer, "as if he were going to fight," Mukai said.

Fearing for his own safety, and for the safety of a bystander who had come to assist in the chase, Johnson used his Taser to subdue Sewell, according to Mukai.

He was then taken to the hospital to have the Taser darts removed and to undergo a check for injuries and adverse reactions to being shocked. While he was being loaded into an ambulance, Sewell reportedly took something out of his pocket and swallowed it.

Police said Sewell, who was on parole for passing counterfeit currency in Santa Cruz County, was in possession of four \$100 bills, only one of which was real, at the time of his arrest.

After being released from Community Hospital, he was booked into Monterey County Jail on felony charges of burglary, forgery, creation and use of counterfeit bills, and violation of parole. Sewell, described as a transient whose last known address was in Santa Cruz, also faces misdemeanor charges of resisting arrest and destroying evidence.

Competition fierce for spaces in U.S. Open

MORE THAN 9,000 professional and amateur golfers from all over the world are vying for roughly 80 spots in the U.S. Open golf championship to be played at the Pebble Beach Golf Links in June, Pete Kowalski of the United States Golf Association announced last week, and several local players are among them.

The first qualifying round takes place May 7-20 at 111 courses around the country, including Bayonet Golf Course in Seaside.

According to Kowalski, the USGA accepted 9,044 entries for the 110th championship — a number only topped by last year's total of 9,086 people seeking to compete at Bethpage, Long Island. This year's group includes 4,985 pros and 4,059 hopeful amateurs, who must have a posted handicap of 1.4 or lower in order to

'Birthing rock' or not, boulder wins the day

TO MEMBERS of a local Native American tribe, a "birthing rock" on Carmel Point is sacred. Poet Robinson Jeffers, who lived nearby, also believed the rock was a vital cultural artifact. Meanwhile, a Monterey County building official — whose department is monitoring a construction project on the site where it is located — says the rock is worth saving for aesthetic reasons. And the owners of the boulder simply want to build a home next to it.

In what may be a first in local land use politics, they are all getting exactly what they want.

The rock is located 26200 Ocean View Ave., where contractors for the landowners — Craig and Diane McAllister — are busy working on a three-story, 7,206-square-foot home.

Most of the site has been excavated, and the rock, no more than 5 feet tall, stands alone amid the chaos. It can just be glimpsed through a hole in the construction fence, surrounded with orange netting and topped with a traffic cone.

According to Monterey County planner Carl Holm, his agency goes to great lengths to prevent the disturbance of cultural and archaeological artifacts, particularly on Carmel Point.

"Carmel Point has a high level of archaeological significance," Holm observed. "Just about everything out there requires a full archaeological report."

Holm said the builder was required to pay an archaeologist to conduct a study, which determined the rock was not important from an archaeological perspective. He also said representatives of the Ohlone Costanoan Esselen Nation were forwarded a copy

COUNCIL OKS TAX BREAK FOR HISTORIC HOMES

PEOPLE WHO promise to fix up their historic homes should have their property taxes lowered, the Carmel City Council decided Tuesday, despite the loss of an estimated \$1,020 in tax revenues for the city per participating home per year.

Last month, the council considered revamping the program, called the Mills Act, to make it available to more property owners, but some council members worried the city would lose too much money.

The Mills Act provides tax breaks of 40 percent to 60 percent for people who make a minimum 10-year commitment to rehabilitate their old buildings, which must be on the historic register of the city or county where they are located.

"The jurisdiction benefits by having historic resources rehabilitated and maintained; the property owner benefits by having a reduced tax burden," planning and building services manager Sean Conroy explained in his May 4 report.

The city adopted the Mills Act in 2004, but its provisions have made it virtually impossible for the owners of historic residences to use. The historic resources board and the planning commission suggested loosening and eliminating some of the restrictions in order to make participation possible.

Too much revenue loss?

Conroy told council members they have the authority to determine how to implement the Mills Act, and said they would be in charge of approving the contracts. He also said the council could cap the number issued per year, in order to protect against losing too much of the property taxes that

are a significant portion of the city budget.

Assuming an average market value of \$1.5 million per home, if two Mills Act contracts were approved each year, and each 10-year contract was renewed for the maximum possible additional 10 years, the city would lose \$1,020 per

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Burnett seeks more public dialog

AFTER VOTERS elected Jason Burnett to the Carmel City Council last month, the new councilman transformed his election website to a Q&A forum and said he plans to hold regular town hall meetings to hear people's concerns in a casual and open setting. He held his first gathering in a Sunset Center meeting room Monday in anticipation of the following day's council meeting and last week's release of the proposed 2010/2011 budget.

Many of the two dozen attendees were Carmel Residents Association members and Burnett supporters, including Monte and Roberta Miller, Carolyn Hardy, Richard Dalsemer and Jim Wright. The three former mayors who served as his honorary campaign chairmen — Ken White, Jean Grace and Charlotte Townsend — also participated, as did Carmel Chamber of Commerce CEO Monta Potter, realtor Suzanne Paboojian and Sunset Center executive director Peter Lesnik, who ducked in.

"We'll figure out how we want to have this discussion," Burnett told those gathered in the Babcock Room Monday morning. "I don't want it to be led by me. I want it to be led by whomever has thoughts, ideas or suggestions."

He also proposed his website, www.burnettforcarmel.com, be a conduit for ongoing dialog. Rather than being an anonymous blog, the site invites questions and comments from people who have registered their email addresses and names.

"I'm asking people to provide at least their first name, because it will promote civility in the discussion," he said. "There is a place for being anonymous, but in these discussion boards, they will sometimes not be as constructive as they otherwise could be."

On the site, Burnett responds to people's questions, and his answers invite additional comments from subscribers. People do not need to be registered with the site in order to read its content.

Town hall chat

At Monday's town hall, he raised the main items on the May 4 city council agenda — the Mills Act that provides tax breaks to people who fix up their historic homes, and a proposal to form a regional taxi authority to govern cab companies — and the draft 2010/2011 budget, which will next be discussed May 20. He also mentioned the options for running the fire department and how to face the increasing financial burden presented by the state public employees retirement system, but those last two topics went undiscussed due to lack of time.

Roberta Miller remarked that no one seems eager to sign up for a Mills Act contract, which would significantly cut property taxes for people who restore their buildings. Paboojian said many realtors don't understand the program and are more intent on trying to get homes off the list of struc-

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
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City joins group to regulate taxis

RATHER THAN each city in Monterey County licensing and monitoring the taxis that pick up and deliver people within its boundaries, a single entity should be in charge of permitting drivers and their cabs for all of the Peninsula, according to a May 4 vote by the Carmel City Council.

Local police chiefs and the Monterey County Hospitality Association were the main forces behind the drive to form a regional taxi authority, Carmel Police Cmdr. Mike Calhoun told the council Tuesday.

“Each municipality now is responsible for the regulation of taxicab operations within its respective boundaries; with each agency having adopted different requirements,” Calhoun reported. “Each taxi company or driver must possess permits for each individual jurisdiction in which they intend to operate a taxicab.”

The police chiefs and the MCHA subsequently asked the Transportation Agency for Monterey County to study the prospect of forming a regional taxi authority. The study concluded Monterey-Salinas Transit should administer it.

“MST has agreed to assume this role, given that it already performs many of the necessary functions, such as inspections and background checks, and is expanding its mission to implement taxi voucher programs and wheelchair accessible taxicabs across the county,” Calhoun reported.

According to the report, the Monterey Airport will continue to impose a surcharge on cabs that serve its clients, and each member jurisdiction will contribute \$2,600 in startup costs for the new organization.

“By making it a one-stop shop for drivers and vehicles, they will only need to be

inspected and get registered one time in order to operate in the Monterey Peninsula and the City of Salinas — and other jurisdictions, if they decide to join in later,” said TAMC executive director Debbie Hale.

At the council meeting, one cab driver spoke in favor of the regional taxi authority, as did Lawson Little, president of Quail Lodge and a member of the MCHA government affairs committee.

Janine Chicourrat, who runs the 400-room Portola Hotel & Spa, said she’s heard all sorts of complaints from guests, who have described filthy, unsafe, late cabs, and drivers who seem to charge totally different rates for the same ride.

“The one thing this authority is going to create for us, which is fantastic, is an opportunity to go and voice our concerns with the taxi companies,” she said.

“We’ve got safety issues, we’ve got cleanliness issues, and we’ve got pricing issues.”

She also recounted nearly being ripped off by a cab driver who thought she was a tourist. When she and her husband, 5th District Supervisor Dave Potter, caught a cab outside a Monte Verde Street hotel and asked to be taken to Spanish Bay in Pebble Beach, the driver headed up Ocean Avenue.

When she asked him where he was going and he told her, “Spanish Bay,” she responded, “No, you’re not.” After he figured out they were locals, the driver turned around took the shorter route through Del Monte Forest.

“I think this is long overdue,” councilwoman Paula Hazdovac commented. The rest of the council agreed, unanimously voting to participate in the regional taxi authority and change the city ordinance governing cab companies to reflect the power of the RTA in permitting and regulating taxis in town.

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New trial, reduced damages sought in Ospina dog attack case

THE ATTORNEY for a Southern California man ordered to pay KCBA and KION TV anchorwoman Olga Ospina \$87,000 for a vicious dog attack in Pacific Grove three years ago has filed a motion for a new trial and asked the judge to reduce the damages.

After a week-long trial in March as a result of a 2007 Labrador attack that fatally injured Ospina's Maltese the jury awarded her \$36,000 in punitive damages, \$7,500 for Ospina's future mental suffering, and other amounts.

But William Gavin, the attorney for dog owner Donna Bazan and her father, Donald

Armstrong — whom a jury found negligent because he didn't do enough to stop the attack — filed a motion for a new trial and contends part of the jury's award was unconstitutional.

"He asked Judge [Lydia] Villarreal to throw out parts of the jury verdict," Ken Gorman, Ospina's attorney, told The Pine Cone. "Specifically, the punitive damage award against Armstrong and the \$7,500 for [Ospina's] future pain and suffering."

In the motion, Gavin claims there was insufficient evidence to warrant punitive damages.

Gavin did not return a phone message from The Pine Cone seeking comment.

The trial, presided over by Monterey

County Superior Court Judge Lydia Villarreal, was the result of an October 2008 civil lawsuit Ospina filed against Bazan and Armstrong for the dog attack.

Ospina was walking her dog in front of the P.G. post office on July 25, 2007, when Bazan's dogs, a Labrador named Samson and a German Shepherd named Kodiak, escaped from the partially open window of Bazan's parked Ford Explorer and attacked Ospina's dog, Lulu. Bazan was across the street at a coffee shop while Armstrong was in the passenger seat engaged in a cell phone conference call.

Lulu died several days later at a Santa Cruz veterinary hospital. Olga received a minor wound in the melee.

Armstrong, 82, testified at the trial that the incident was "momentary," while Ospina and other witnesses said the attack lasted several minutes.

Gorman, who has filed an opposition to Gavin's motion in Monterey County Superior Court, called the motion for a new trial a "waste of judicial resources" and said, "It does nothing but delay justice."

During the trial, Gorman employed an 1872 statute that allows for punitive damages when an animal is killed or injured because of gross negligence.

But in his motion seeking a new trial, Gavin contends there was insufficient evidence to warrant the punitive award, arguing

a jury must find malice, fraud or oppression — not merely gross negligence — in order for such damages to be awarded.

Though Gavin also takes issue with the damages the jury awarded to Ospina for future pain and suffering, a psychiatrist testified during the trial that Ospina, who told the jury she still has flashbacks of the attack, could experience them for years to come.

Ospina was also awarded \$15,000 for past pain and suffering and about \$29,000 for her expenses, which include vet bills, medical expenses, wage loss and more than \$2,000 Ospina spent on another Maltese to replace Lulu.

Villarreal has 60 days to decide whether to grant the motion for a new trial.

Food drive Saturday

THE FOOD Bank for Monterey County is asking people to leave non-perishable food next to their mailboxes Sat., May 8 so letter carriers can pick it up and donate it to the food bank.

The economic downturn has meant increased demand for the food bank's programs, according to the nonprofit.

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Budget anticipates higher tax revenues but still taps reserves

NO JOBS will be cut in the City of Carmel's 2010/2011 budget, city administrator Rich Guillen told the city council April 27, but the \$13,962,194 spending plan includes drawing \$810,818 from the city's \$9.8 million in reserves to keep it balanced.

The budget, which was presented to the council last Tuesday but won't be discussed until a May 20 special meeting, anticipates an average increase of 4 percent in the city's major income sources.

"Revenue projections were prepared by consulting the city's sales tax consultant, reviewing historical data and trends of the transient occupancy tax, and checking with the Monterey County Tax Assessor's office regarding property sales activity," Guillen told the council.

He estimated property taxes will increase to \$4,147,055 for the year, hotel tax will be \$4,004,000, and sales tax will bring in \$1,750,000.

The anticipated upticks in sales and hotel taxes are partially due to the June 14-20 U.S. Open golf tournament in Pebble Beach. Although it will be held before the current fiscal year ends June 30, the money it brings in won't be recorded in the city's books until the 2010/2011 fiscal year, which starts July 1.

"We're somewhat optimistic," Guillen admitted. "We're hoping the economy will turn around ... We might be somewhat bullish."

Newly elected councilman Jason Burnett asked Guillen if he had run alternative budget scenarios that were more bearish.

"You said your forecasts were reasonably optimistic," he said. "Does it describe what the scenario would look like if in fact the reality is not as rosy? I think that would be helpful in terms of all of us, the council and the public, providing comments."

Guillen encouraged Burnett to include that thought in his budget questions, which will be reviewed and answered by staff before the May 20 budget meeting.

"There are probably a lot of scenarios and a lot of models we could run out, but we try to keep the model we have in the budget as simple as possible," Guillen said. If the projections are incorrect, he added, the budget can be adjusted throughout the year.

Expenses

As is typical, the police and fire departments account for a large share of the spending, coming in at an estimated \$3,191,134 and \$2,033,185, respectively. Public works is the third most expensive, at \$1,945,946.

Across all departments, salaries and benefits consume \$8,268,777 of the \$13,962,194 budget.

The total also includes a July 1 8.75 percent raise for police officers, who put off their raise this year to help keep the budget sound. Firefighters, who also delayed their raise, will be due an 8.75 percent increase Dec. 31. General city employees and managers did likewise and will receive 3 percent raises July 1.

In preparing the budget, Guillen asked each department to cut expenses by 10 percent. Since the city only pays for staff and maintenance at the library (all programs and materials are funded by donations through the Carmel Public Library Foundation and the Friends of Harrison Memorial Library), a 10 percent cut in its annual spending would mean layoffs and reduced operating hours.

To avoid that, last year, the library's board of trustees and the CPLF each agreed to provide one-third of that 10 percent balance if the city would supply the remaining one-third. Guillen requested the groups contribute in the same manner for the 2010/2011 fiscal year, "but it's questionable whether this arrangement can continue into the future years," he said in his report to the council.

He listed several budget requests that were included in the spending plan, including Sunset Cultural Center Inc.'s desire to receive a city subsidy of \$680,000, rather than the previously slated \$577,530. The Carmel Chamber of Commerce asked for \$15,000 to reopen its visitor center on Sundays, and the city is obligated to pay \$47,194 for its share of operating a free trolley through town. Finally, the Monterey County Convention and Visitors Bureau bill is \$103,078 — the same as last year.

Guillen also warned the council of other impending challenges, including the necessary funding of the huge retirement benefits accrued by public employees. The amount the state-run CalPERS program requires the city to contribute

will remain fairly stable during the coming year but is expected to climb substantially in 2011/2012 and beyond.

"In order to meet the challenges of trying to keep CalPERS retirement costs down, that means two things: You either have to cut staff and in turn cut services, or you have to develop some kind of revenue program," he said.

Many cities are cutting costs by sharing services, and Carmel already contracts with other cities or shares workers when it comes to fleet maintenance, management of the fire department and traffic enforcement. But Guillen said other jobs could be shared as well, such as animal control, information technology, building inspection, risk management and dispatching.

Sharing services is a new way of dealing with "a new world of trying to save costs but at the same time provide the high level of service we're all accustomed to," he said. "I'm not saying we have to do it tomorrow or even next year, but I think it's in our world in the future."

Guillen encouraged the public to read through the budget, which is available on the city's website, ci.carmel.ca.us.

The next budget hearing is set for Thursday, May 20, at 4:30 p.m., in city hall, and another will be held at the same time the following Thursday.

Additional meetings will be scheduled, as needed, until the council votes to adopt the budget, which it must do by June 30.

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Michelle Gipson STROKE SURVIVOR



For nearly five hours, 2-year-old Christalyn Johnson sat on the floor next to her mother, patting her head, trying to feed her animal crackers, comforting her. Michelle Gipson, at just 28, had had a stroke. Christalyn sat beside her mother throughout the long afternoon until Gipson's cousins and her aunt happened to come by. She was taken to a hospital for emergency treatment, then transferred to a long-term care facility for six weeks, followed by outpatient physical, occupational, and speech therapy for six months. "I could speak again," says Gipson, "but I still couldn't use my right side. I called around and learned that Community Hospital is a certified stroke center, so I knew I wanted to go there. And now — oh, gosh — I can lift my arm above my head, and I've started to walk!"

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Abandoned dog adopted by Seaside couple

SHE HAS a new name, but the 6-year-old poodle mix left to fend for herself on the streets of Seaside also has a new home.

The severely matted mutt was rescued by the SPCA for Monterey County April 16 and given a shave and bath, and treated for a few medical issues. SPCA workers named her Lily and placed her up for adoption.

But after a visit to the SPCA facility last weekend, it didn't take Christina Riley and Tyler Johnston of Seaside very long to realize Lily was the dog they wanted.

"We went in there, and there are obviously a bunch of cute dogs looking at you," Riley told The Pine Cone. "Then we saw little Lily. She was kind of shriveled in a little ball. We took her out and she was super sweet. She was really lovable."

The married couple, both 26, renamed her Tilly, and since last weekend, the dog has

made herself quite at home, according to Riley.

"She is really happy here," she said. Tilly also has a playmate named Abner-Crumb, a 3-year-old Shih Tzu mix Riley and Johnston already owned. The two get along well, although Tilly has already shown slight signs of jealousy.

"When I'm giving Abner attention, she will jump up and try to get some, too," Riley said.

When she was picked up from the streets, then-Lily was a mess of matted cream-colored fur, which had to be shaved. An SPCA veterinarian removed a tumor on the dog. The pooch was also thin.

Riley said they will let Tilly's fur grow out a bit and look forward to her putting on a few more pounds.

"We are kind of looking forward to seeing her gain a bit of weight," Riley said. "She is going to be a scruffy little monkey."

than 3 feet down a tiny crack in the earth caused by recent heavy rains. A neighbor dialed 911 and was told an animal control officer would be dispatched to their home.

"At that point, Mrs. Wyly, in an attempt to receive quicker help, walked to the Pebble Beach Fire Station," and led a willing crew back to the scene, Hamelin said, where firefighters could see the pooch standing in several inches of running water.

"Access to her was made difficult due to the narrow opening and tree roots growing across the drainage above her," he reported.

Firefighters Bruce Cusack and Valerie Watts calmed Rain while cutting through the tree roots with a cordless saw. After clearing access to the dog, they used a shirt to hoist

her out and reunited with her relieved owners. She had been gone just 45 minutes.


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Community Hospital plans 'wellness center' in Marina

GROUND HAS been broken for an \$8 million facility in Marina that Community Hospital of the Monterey Peninsula said will promote healthier living — especially among older adults — and help prevent illness.

CHOMP announced last week that, along with a primary care center slated to open in the summer of 2011 in Marina, it's also building a 34,000-square-foot "wellness center," which CHOMP defined as a "place where health, fitness and

medical expertise join forces."

The idea is that the wellness center will offer health and exercise programs to help those recovering from surgery or illness, as well as for those who just want to stay in shape and avoid getting sick.

"Community Hospital wants to be not only a resource for treating people's illnesses," CHOMP President and CEO Steven Packer told The Pine Cone last week, "but for helping them proactively address prevention and wellness."

The facility will feature physical, speech and occupational therapy, a cardiovascular fitness and rehabilitation area, indoor lap pool and therapy pools, and areas for strength training.

Customers of the wellness center will pay a membership fee to work with medical and fitness experts on customized health and wellness programs, according to CHOMP.

"It's estimated that 50 percent of conditions treated in hospitals are either preventable or avoidable based on lifestyle," Packer said.

Though the center is open to all ages, it's designed for older adults. "Our target audience is not the 25-year-old who wants to pump iron," Packer said. "It's targeted for people who are more mature, maybe midlife or older, who are interested in the health effects, as opposed to the aesthetic effects

of exercise."

Those who have had a heart attack or are recovering from a hip replacement surgery, for instance, would enter into a regimented program at the wellness center, he said.

"We will have outpatient rehab and physical therapy, and cardiac and pulmonary wellness departments," Packer said.

Packer said CHOMP is still assessing what the cost will be to use the wellness center's services.

The center will eventually be able to accommodate about 3,000 clients and will be staffed, at least in part, by existing CHOMP employees, he said.

For its design, CHOMP is consulting Healthplex Associates, a Pennsylvania firm that specializes in wellness and fitness centers.

CHOMP, like other hospitals, views wellness centers as being especially important in light of rising health care costs. Prevention of illness and disease is a way to save money — for patients and taxpayers.

"We think, long-term as a country, we will simply collapse under the burden for caring for chronic conditions unless we do more to promote wellness and prevention," Packer said.

A BUSY burglar embarked on a smash-and-grab spree late April 27 or early April 28, breaking the windows in four SUVs parked within a few blocks of each other to steal valuables from inside.

The owner of a Jeep Wrangler parked on 11th Avenue near Torres Street told police the passenger-side window was smashed sometime overnight April 27. Missing were a Sony laptop, a Sony camera, an iPod Touch, a U.S. Passport, medication and paper

money that included Mexican pesos.

Shortly after, a woman whose Subaru Outback was parked on Torres near Ninth reported someone had shattered the right rear window and taken a beige handbag containing toiletries, Mukai said. The crime occurred between 5 p.m. April 27 and 7:30 a.m. April 28.

Fifteen minutes after that report, a woman living at Torres and 10th said her Mercedes SUV had also been burglarized Tuesday evening or Wednesday morning. The thief broke a rear passenger-side window to steal what appeared to be a wallet but which only

contained cosmetics.

Finally, at 3:15 p.m. April 28, another woman who had parked her Toyota 4Runner on Junipero near 10th the prior evening told police a burglar had smashed the rear passenger-side window and taken her purse, a Fuji digital camera, a 9 West wallet containing her driver's license and credit cards, and a Leatherman multi-tool.

Mukai said police have no leads in the break-ins. He advised residents to be sure to not leave anything of value, or anything that could appear to be valuable, in plain sight inside their cars.

One hundred percent of the proceeds of the fundraiser will go to Hill to pay for medical expenses not covered by insurance.


Hill is also in need of a special car and other items, according to HobnobMonterey.com, which issued the press release about her fundraiser.

Carl Livingston, Jr.

1921 - 2010

Carl Livingston, Jr., a fourth generation Californian and third generation San Franciscan, died after a long illness on May 2nd in Carmel, CA. Carl was born September 12, 1921 and married his beloved wife of 60 years, Jean Anne Smith, on April 3, 1948. Carl and Jean raised their children, Carl Livingston III (Chip) and Sally Ann in San Francisco.



Carl was a graduate of Lowell High School class of 1939 and Stanford University of 1943. Retiring in 1990, Carl and Jean moved to Carmel, CA, where he served as Chairman of the Carmel Planning Commission and a board member of All Saints Episcopal Day School. He joined the Old Capital Club, the Pebble Beach and Tennis Club, and the John Gardiner Tennis Club.

be admitted to a qualifying round. But once the amateurs tee off, they have to compete against the pros without the benefit of a handicap. Kowalski reported the youngest competitor is a 10-year-old who lives in Maurice, La., while the oldest is an 81-year-old from Los Angeles.

The USGA received entries from all 50 states, Washington, D.C., and 68 foreign countries, with the last player submitting his online application just 13 seconds before the deadline.

Peninsula residents scheduled to play the first qualifying round at Bayonet Monday, May 10, include Jerry Ledzinski, Chris Wagenseller, Erik Pilegaard and Jason Melvin of Carmel; Neil Kirsch of Carmel Valley; Kraig McLeod, Casey Reamer and Jeff Gray of Pebble Beach; David Brownfield of Seaside; and Laird Small, Andrew Nottenkamper, Adam Petrocelli, Jin Park and Casey Boyns of Pacific Grove.

After the initial qualifying rounds between May 7 and May 20, a 36-hole sectional qualifying at 13 courses throughout the United States will be played June 7. One course in Japan and another in England will host sectional qualifying for international competitors.

The players with the lowest scores in the sectional rounds will be admitted to the field at the U.S. Open in June, where they will join more than 60 of golf's top players who are exempt from having to qualify.


Included among them are nine past U.S. Open champions — Angel Cabrera (2007), Michael Campbell (2005), Ernie Els (1994, 1997), Jim Furyk (2003), Lucas Glover (2009), Retief Goosen (2001, 2004), Geoff Ogilvy (2006), Tom Watson (1982) and Tiger Woods (2000, 2002, 2008). The list

of exempted players will grow with the inclusion of the top 50 players from the World Golf Ranking, the top 10 money leaders on the 2010 PGA Tour and the top five money leaders on the 2010 European PGA Tour. The winner of the May 6-9 Players Championship will also secure a place, along

with anyone who has multiple wins at PGA Tour cosponsored events between June 21 of last year and June 13 of this year.

of the study but offered no comment. Nevertheless, Holm said his agency determined it was an important natural feature worthy of preservation.

James N. Smith, the architect for the project, agreed with Holm that much has been done to protect the rock. "Regardless of finding nothing to support the idea that it is indeed a 'birthing rock,' we offered to save it and protect it during construction," he said.

Smith also said the construction crew on the site is planning further protection by building a wooden structure around the rock. "Every effort is being taken to preserve it," he added.

Just a few doors down, displayed in Tor House is a photograph of Jeffers' children standing near the rock. According to Vince Huth, president of the Robinson Jeffers Tor House Foundation, the poet believed the rock had cultural significance. Huth, though, said he personally is skeptical of the story.

To the contrary, Pacific Grove resident Cari Herthel believes the rock has cultural significance. Herthel, who identifies herself as a member of the Esselen Rumsen tribe, agreed with Holm that the Carmel Point area is rich with important Native American artifacts. While the rock is being protected, she would like to see an even greater emphasis placed on preserving local Native American culture.

"We are always being asked to 'prove this' or 'prove that,'" she added. "That has caused a struggle among our tribe members, and it keeps us fragmented. We've been disconnected from our culture. So much of our culture has been lost."

As construction proceeds, the driveway will pass within a few feet of the rock. But it will not be moved.

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


resource protection provisions of the city's [land use plan] and Coastal Act," Coastal Commission program analyst Mike Watson wrote in an April 30 email to a resident who complained about the lamps.

The Coastal Act regulates development along the coast. Federal agencies don't have to get permits from the coastal commission

or local government, but their actions have to be consistent with the Coastal Act.

NOAA has said the lights — which cost taxpayers \$36,000 — were installed to keep away intruders and wild animals. An employee broke her toe after tripping in the parking lot, an official said, despite the fact it has long been illuminated by a bright light mounted on the side of the building.

There's another reason NOAA wants the facility illuminated, according to Watson.

"The feds claim that the lighting is need-

ed to protect the station from potential terrorist attack/vandalism," Watson wrote.

The NOAA facility, a fisheries research lab, is an unlikely target for terrorists.

"I really can't speak too much to homeland security issues," Watson wrote. "But in terms of resource impacts, I believe that there are alternatives that are much less intrusive to the neighborhood with less impacts on the environment."

Marty Nelson, the safety environmental compliance officer for NOAA's southwest fisheries science center, has said the lights are "dark sky certified" and don't have as much effect on the night sky as other lights.

NOAA also did not inform the City of Pacific Grove, which later sent a letter to the agency requesting it adhere to the city's strict architectural guidelines. The city is concerned about the lights' impact on the highly scenic neighborhood, including their potential for light pollution.

In his email message, Watson wrote that he provided NOAA with potential alterna-

tives to the existing light poles: however, Watson did not list the alternatives and did not respond to messages left by The Pine Cone.

But he has said it's possible NOAA could be forced to remove the light poles. Watson also has said NOAA and the coastal commission could reach a mitigation deal.

"The ball is rolling and in the right direction," Watson wrote. "But it could be an upward slope."

NOAA spokesman Jim Milbury told The Pine Cone Thursday the agency is waiting for the commission to decide what to do with the lights.

"I believe the outcome will be whatever the coastal commission decides," Milbury said. "That's what we are all waiting for, I think."

In 2008, NOAA spent \$120,000 in taxpayer money to paint a colorful sea life mural around the top of the building without informing the coastal commission or the City of Pacific Grove.

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

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



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Poets mark 60th anniversary of Dylan Thomas' visit

MUCH LIKE "On the Road" author Jack Kerouac, poet Dylan Thomas was a gifted writer with a restless, troubled spirit. Both literary giants made memorable trips to Carmel and Big Sur, and this week, a group of locals will mark the 60th anniversary of Thomas's 1950 visit with two performances of "Finding Dylan Thomas," a program featuring poetry, stage performances and music.

"Finding Dylan Thomas" will be presented Friday, May 7, at the Henry Miller Library in Big Sur and Sunday, May 9, at the Cherry Center for the Arts in Carmel.

Peter Thabit Jones, Stanley Barkan, Carolyn Mary Kleefeld and John Dotson will present a mix of original work and poetry by Thomas and his daughter, Aeronwy. Jones and Dotson will be joined by Deanna Edwards and Carol Daly for a performance of "Under The Milk Wood," a short play by Thomas. Martin Sheers, meanwhile, will sing Leonard Cohen's "Hallelujah."

It's appropriate that the Miller Library will host "Finding Dylan Thomas," since the great Welsh poet was not only an admirer of Miller, but he also made a surprise visit to Miller's

home on Partington Ridge.

"He went right up to Miller's front door and knocked," explained Dotson, who is also a writer and a historian.

In Carmel, Thomas visited poet Robinson Jeffers. After the meeting, he was asked how it went.

"It was perfect," Thomas replied. "Neither one of us said a thing."

According to Dotson — who will soon publish a book about Thomas, "Love For Ever Meridian: Finding Dylan Thomas in the 21st century" — Thomas actually came to the Monterey Peninsula to visit Noel Sullivan, a patron of the arts who owned an estate where Carmel Valley Manor is now located. He visited Carmel in 1950 and 1952. The following year, Thomas died while touring the East Coast. He was only 39. Today, Thomas is widely recognized as being one of the 20th century's greatest poets.

Admission is free for both events. The Big Sur performance starts at 7:30 p.m., while the Carmel show begins at 5:30 p.m. The Henry Miller Library is located on Highway 1 about 28 miles south of Carmel. After his cousin offered a few lessons, he began teaching himself how to play and quickly absorbed a wide variety of musical influences — including Irish, Brazilian, folk, pop and rock. By the time he was 23, music was so important to him that he went AWOL one night from the Italian army so he could catch an acoustic guitar performance.

D'Agostino came to the United States in 1985, and soon he was playing on the streets of San Francisco. Thankfully, his busking days didn't last long — in 1987, Shanachie Records released his first U.S. recording, "Acoustic Spirit." Since then, he has issued 10 recordings, including his most recent, "Made in Italy," which came out in 2008.

He also took to the road, performing at small venues up and down the West Coast. In fact, local music fans might recall several performances he staged at the old Portofino Cafe in Pacific Grove, which was once a regular stop on the acoustic music circuit.

THE CIRCUMSTANCES of playwright Joe Orton's "What the Butler Saw" would be tragic if they weren't so funny.

A Pacific Repertory Theater production of "What the Butler Saw" opens Saturday, May 8, at the Golden Bough Playhouse.

"It's the most perfect farce written in 20th century," director Ken Kelleher said. "It is an extremely funny, sexy and outrageous play. Anyone who comes to see it will have a great time."

First staged in 1969, "What the Butler Saw" opens with a psychiatrist, Dr. Prentice, interviewing a prospective secretary. It's clear from the start he is trying to seduce her, and the tension rises when he asks her to undress as part of the interview. Unfortunately for Dr. Prentice, his wife — no angel herself — then enters his office, setting off an uproarious chain of events.


"He's really turned the whole world of pairing upside down," said Will, adding that Hanni learned about the ISM through his wife, who is friends with one of the board members.







Artichoke Sourdough Bisque

- 4 extra large artichokes
- Olive oil
- 1 medium yellow onion
- 1 leek
- 1 celery stalk
- 5 cloves garlic
- 3.5 oz. sourdough bread
- 4 fresh sage leaves
- 1 sprig fresh thyme
- 6 C. chicken or vegetable stock
- salt and pepper to taste

Using a sharp serrated knife, trim the artichoke all the way down to the heart. Discard the fuzzy choke and roughly slice the heart and peeled stem. Roughly chop the other vegetables.

Heat oil in a large, thick-bottomed pan; sweat the artichokes, onion, leek, garlic, celery and thyme until tender but not browned; add the stock and gently simmer 20 minutes.

Add roughly chopped sourdough bread and sage, and simmer another three to five minutes.

Purée in small batches, return to a clean pot, reheat, adjust seasonings and serve.

If you don't feel like doing any cooking, however, head to Montrio Bistro, 414 Calle Principal in Monterey, and have Baker and his staff do all the work for you. The league features a unusual set of rules to accommodate the unconventional field. Players pitch to their own teammates, and everybody is required to use a wood bat.

tures that must be preserved.

“It’s become a pariah,” she said, adding that people should be encouraged to look at the city’s historic housing stock as an asset.

Regarding a regional taxi authority, Burnett said the goal is greater efficiency and quality control, which would be achieved by having Monterey-Salinas

Transit, rather than individual jurisdictions, handle licensing of all cabs.

Hardy pointed out taxi companies tend to be territorial, Potter said a major motive is to improve quality for the customers, and White asked if the Monterey Airport would continue to charge a fee for cabs that pick up passengers there. The airport rakes in a significant amount of cash via its taxi surcharge, Burnett agreed.

On the budget, much of the discussion that followed revolved around the library,

which faces job cuts every year.

“When the city budget contains a 10 percent drop in each department budget, the library is the one and only department that must lose staff,” Grace pointed out, because the city doesn’t pay for its materials or equipment — areas in which other departments can cut their spending.

Last year, and possibly this year, the Harrison Memorial Library board of trustees and the Carmel Public Library Foundation each contributed one-third of the total that would have been cut, with the city providing the remaining one-third, to avoid job losses.

“That should work for one year, but I understand it won’t work for another year,” Burnett said, adding that he is hoping to develop a funding strategy for the future.

Care and maintenance of the beach, which was frequently described by the group as the city’s greatest asset, was a major concern. White and Dalsemer worried the \$100,000 budgeted for beach infrastructure would fall short, and that seawalls, walkways, bluffs and other issues require more attention.

Hardy wondered about the proposal to fix up the Forest Theater and decried the time and expense of studies that never seem to see the light of day. Burnett said the Forest Theater project warrants a lot of discussion, and he encouraged people to submit their questions.

Hardy also worried that sharing services with other jurisdictions and agencies — which city administrator Rich Guillen has said will help save money — would have negative effects, and Burnett said it raises the question of responsibility.

“If you are not happy with services, you can hold your city council accountable, but if it’s controlled outside the city, how does the accountability work?” Burnett asked.

Participants voiced some common complaints about city hall.

“We have a real problem where the city council does many things without any public input at all,” Dalsemer said. “Or there’s a study, and two years later, another study for the same thing is done, which is wasting our

tax dollars.”

“I think you know I agree, and that’s one of the things I will be working on,” Burnett said.

Participants said they want the city’s trees taken care of and the issue of whether to reopen Second Avenue settled. (A study of Second Avenue, which has been closed below Monte Verde Street for several years, is due to be released.) “This is one of those things they like to sit on and control very, very tightly,” Hardy commented. “The public won’t see it until the city council sees it.”

home per year of the contract.

“By year 10, the city could experience a \$20,400 reduction in property tax revenue in that year and have lost approximately \$112,200 over a 10-year span,” Conroy said.

Councilman Ken Talmage said the owners of historic hotels should also be able to take advantage of the savings to fix up their properties, which would generate more business and bring in more hotel taxes for the city. Conroy studied the matter and said

some of the eight historic inns might benefit from the program.

He pointed out his analysis did not consider “the potential increase in property values for surrounding properties due to rehabilitation and improvements of the properties under contract, or the potential increase in the transient occupancy tax for motel properties that participate in the program.”

After a handful of people spoke in favor of making the Mills Act contracts available and commended the council for its careful consideration of the costs, Talmage proposed adopting the changes, reviewing the law in five years and capping the number of con-

tracts at three per year.

Councilman Jason Burnett said he was comfortable with the proposal, because the loss in city revenues might not be as high as Conroy anticipated, property values increase when historic homes are rehabilitated, and people visiting Carmel appreciate its older architecture and character, which the Mills Act would help preserve. “Those three observations make me even more comfortable this is a reasonable program,” he said.

The council unanimously agreed. If the California Coastal Commission also OKs it, the council will consider limiting the number of contracts that can be issued each year.

The news media: They're not as smart as you

WATCHING THE national news and reading the big-city papers the last two weeks has left us wondering why national reporters think they're so much smarter than everybody else.

■ Immigration

WITH ALMOST no exceptions, news reports about Arizona's crackdown on illegal immigration have assumed no right-thinking person could see even the slightest merit in the new law. The nicest thing most reporters can think of to say about the law is that it's "controversial" — a word which, in news code, means "bad."

Meanwhile, protesters against the law are lavished with favorable coverage and glowingly described as being in favor of immigration "reform."

Almost nobody has been shown on the news who has anything positive to say about actually enforcing this country's immigration laws, or who sees the slightest downside to having so many people illegally cross our borders every year.

Thus, if you've watched or read any of the news coverage of the Arizona law during the last two weeks, you've been told in no uncertain terms how you're supposed to feel about it. An editorial in last Sunday's Monterey County Herald even let you know that, if you see some merit in enforcing this country's immigration laws, you're probably just an angry bigot.

But, despite the 100 percent negative attitude toward the Arizona law taken by virtually all the news media, the American people have had the courage to make up their own minds about it, with public opinion polls this week showing about 60 percent of people nationwide believe the Arizona crackdown is a good idea or doesn't go far enough.

Obviously, the reporters think they're much smarter than those 60 percent. Wrong.

■ Terrorism

Meanwhile, the instant reports started to emerge last Saturday evening about a smoking car possibly filled with explosives found in Times Square, the media assumed it probably wasn't a bomb. Upon confirmation that the car was, in fact, a bomb, the news reports said it probably wasn't terrorism. When it was shown to be terrorism, they said it was probably perpetrated by a "lone wolf." And when it was proved the suspect had ties to Pakistan, it was still reported that he probably acted on his own. Only on Thursday did the New York Times admit the possibility that the car bomb planted in Times Square was an act of organized terrorism committed, as so many others have been, by Muslim extremists. But even then the reporters equivocated, claiming Saturday's terrorist was partly motivated by financial distress.

Meanwhile, despite the media's overt attempts to lure the people into a sense of complacency about terrorism, Americans haven't been fooled. Time and time again, polls show that most people favor strict measures to prevent terrorists from attacking again the way they did on 9/11 — or worse.

Which also proves that news consumers are actually smarter than the people who deliver the news to them.

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
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
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
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Maldonado sworn in as Lieutenant Governor

Contracting with Cal Fire will remove local control of the cost of salaries and benefits for our fire services and indirectly place P.G. in a potentially greater budget crisis. In addition to the current \$20 billion state budget deficit, the state also has an unfunded liability of approximately \$52 billion for future retirement liabilities with no funding plan. Can we count on Sacramento to solve these funding issues without adversely impacting our local budgets and services? Isn't it almost certain that these costs will be passed on to cities contracting with the state in the future? Will we have a voice in that decision? Historically, local government has had to shoulder the burden of state-level decisions.

If P.G. continues to share fire and other services with local cities and districts, we will have a greater opportunity to tailor those services and associated costs to fit the local needs of our communities. I encourage the P.G. council to maintain control of our local services.

What an opportunity! Al Gore is coming to the Panetta Institute in mid-May to present a discussion about the global environment, and there will be a Q&A period following. I've got my ticket, and I'm going armed with two specific questions that

I am hoping Gore is brave enough to take probing questions in the spirit of an unfiltered and uncensored free exchange of ideas.

We have lately (and temporarily) come into possession of a copy of the TELEPHONE DIRECTORY for Monterey and San Benito Counties dated February, 1930. It's a little larger than a Reader's Digest, a bit tattered, stained in places by wine and tomato sauce, and runs to about 100 pages. The Carmel section is 7 pages and lists numbers like 352-W, 44 and 2-J-5. Fairy Lee Byrd, for example, is 841, the Fire Department is 100, and Miss Eliza Clevenger is 1-J-3. Robinson Jeffers is not listed because he didn't believe in telephones. Edward Weston (782) and Hazel Watrous (361) did. The yellow pages are not yellow at all, run to 51 indexed pages and are called "Buyer's Guide." 94 restaurants are listed (9 in Carmel), and only one of the restaurants survives today. There were 42 physicians in 1930, more like 242 today. Real estate offices (may their tribe decrease) add up to 77, of which 3 are still extant in some form; but remember, this covers two counties. There were 82 hotels (some duplications), no motels. Ice business was big: 9 outlets. Traveling through this list of 57 years ago is fascinating... and more than slightly disconcerting. Do you suppose that somebody in the year 2044 will be equally enchanted with our telephone book?
