# Bulldogs poisoned on beach outing

■ One dies, another gravely ill

A STROLL along Asilomar Beach by a Carmel Valley couple turned tragic Tuesday afternoon when Lulu — one of their two French bulldogs — died shortly after ingesting something in the sand. Their other dog, Hula, also fell gravely ill but survived.

Brenton Sanders decided to share his story so others are aware of the risks that could exist for dogs on Asilomar Beach — or on any other stretch of local sand.

"I don't want anybody else to go through what we had to deal with," said Sanders, whose wife, Sarah, owns and operates the Om Oasis yoga studio in Monterey. "If this brings any awareness, that's enough."

Sanders described Lulu as a dog "who would put anything in her mouth."

"She was playing on the beach and had a mouthful of sand" he

"She was playing on the beach and had a mouthful of sand," he recalled. "Two hours later, she was dead."

### Man arrested for running over CHS student

## ■ DUI alleged; victim is son of River School principal

PACIFIC GROVE resident Timothy Petrick, 25, was jailed for felony drunken driving early last Sunday morning after allegedly driving over Carmel High School student Ryan Marden with his pickup truck while trying to get up a hill. The teen, who is the son of Carmel River School principal Jay Marden, and a friend had been sleeping under the stars at a Corral de Tierra property when the accident occurred, according to California Highway Patrol public information officer Bob Lehman.

"He was literally run over across his chest by a truck," Jay Marden confirmed Wednesday. "There are discrepancies in the stories about whether it was one tire or two, but it ended up with his being airlifted to a trauma center in Santa Clara, and the young man who ran him over was arrested for drunk driving." The friend sleeping next to Ryan was unharmed.

The incident occurred shortly after 2:30 a.m. May 2, when Petrick decided to see if he could drive his 2007 Toyota Tundra up a hill on the property, according to Lehman.

"He had some passengers with him and ran over this kid, who was in his sleeping bag," he said. "He was unaware he had run over the victim until the passengers in his vehicle started yelling at him."

Lehman did not know what connection Petrick and his friends had with the camping boys or with the owners of the property, which is

property, which is located on Corral de Tierra Road several miles from Highway 68 in Salinas. A CHP officer arrested Petrick for felony drunken driving causing injury and lodged him at Monterey County Jail.

A rescue helicopter took Ryan to Santa Clara Valley Medical Center, where Lehman said the teen was treated for a broken collar bone and pain to his neck and shoulder.

# Police crack down on rule-breaking dog owners

CARMEL-BY-THE-SEA MAY market itself as being dog friendly—"but that doesn't mean no rules," animal control officer Cindi Mitchell said Monday, as the Carmel Police Department embarked on a renewed effort to convince residents and visitors to keep their canines out of trouble. An increasing number of complaints involving out-of-control dogs prompted the decision to crack down—albeit gently, at first—on people violating the rules.

"From a public safety view, we are trying to reach out and educate the public, so we don't have to take other drastic means," said Cmdr. Mike Calhoun.

Last year, police fielded 37 reports of aggressive dog attacks, 15 of which occurred at the beach, according to Calhoun. The department has received five complaints since Jan. 1, and people have reported being bitten, knocked down or otherwise injured by people's unleashed dogs. Reports of fights between pets are also common.

"We feel they are occurring more frequently," Calhoun said, particularly because some owners are in denial about their dogs' behavior or are not paying attention to what their animals are doing.

The Carmel Municipal Code requires dogs to be on leashes in the business district and along Scenic Road, and they are prohibited in Devendorf Park. Dogs can be off leash on Carmel Beach, in Mission Trail Park and in

"We have to follow through, or we are not doing our job," Monterey County Treasurer-Tax Collector Louis Solton told The Pine Cone about the tax effort.

As a result of its sleuthing, the county has so far identified and contacted about 100 homeowners in unincorporated areas who have advertised their homes for rent.

"We sent out a form letter," Solton said. "It requires that they register with us and remit the appropriate fees."

The ordinance requires homeowners with short-term rentals — those from seven to 30



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# Deputies still looking for Big Sur slasher

A BIG Sur man who officials said tried to stab a neighbor with a large kitchen knife last month is still being sought by deputies with the Monterey County Sheriff's Office.

On April 20 at about 4:30 p.m. near the Big Sur post office, the suspect, Marcos Serrano, 38, tried several times to stab his intended victim, according to sheriff's Cmdr. Tracy Brown.

"These people knew each other, and they had an argument," Brown told The Pine Cone. "And one of them attacked the other with a knife."

The victim was able to avoid serious injury in the fight, only receiving a defensive wound. "He got a slashing wound across the arm," Brown said. "It did not require stitches."

The two men have been in a long-standing feud.

"They have had an ongoing dispute, and it just escalated into this," according to Brown.

The attack occurred outside, and alcohol isn't suspected of playing a role.

If Serrano is caught, he could be charged with assault with a deadly weapon.

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
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

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# TREE WORKER KILLED IN PEBBLE BEACH FALL

A PEBBLE Beach Co. tree worker died May 3 while performing work in Del Monte Forest, according to the company.

Pebble Beach Co. forestry department employee Miguel Vasquez, 52, of Salinas, was killed after falling at about 8:45 a.m., not long after the start of the work day.

Vasquez, a nine-year employee of the PBC, had been sitting in the seat of a crane just before the accident. He was working with a crew near Collins Field.

"He was simply attaching a metal loop to a tree about 25 feet in the air, and was lowering himself down at that point" when he fell, said Mark Stilwell, general counsel for the PBC.

"No rope broke and there wasn't anything wrong physically with the equipment," Stilwell said. "That's what is so hard to explain."

It's possible, Stilwell said, that Vasquez suffered a medical problem, such as a heart attack, before the fall.

Though alcohol and drugs are not suspected as contributing to Vasquez' death, the Monterey County Coroner's Division will leave the case open until it gets results from toxicology tests, said Cmdr. Scott Ragan.

"We don't expect there is anything going on other than he fell," Ragan said.

Cal/OSHA, which enforces safety standards in the workplace, is investigating the accident and has intervieed employees who were working with Vasquez at the time he fell, Stilwell said.

# Man faces attempted rape, assault charges for attack on stepdaughter

MICHAEL BRADY, a New Zealand man arrested in Carmel last month for allegedly trying to rape his teenage stepdaughter, was ordered to stand trial all charges after a preliminary hearing in Monterey County Superior Court Judge Russell Scott's courtroom April 30, according to deputy district attorney Rolando Mazariegos. He is scheduled to appear in court again Friday to enter a plea.

Officers took Brady into custody at a San Carlos Street hotel April 14 after his naked and terrified 15-year-old step-daughter showed up at the back door of the police station shortly before 4 a.m. She reportedly told police she had been punched and sexually assaulted by Brady but managed to escape, unclothed, and ran toward the one building with lights on at that early hour. It happened to be the police station.

Three Carmel police officers testified at the preliminary hearing, according to Mazariegos.

"At the prelim, the judge found sufficient evidence to hold him to answer on all the charges," he said. Brady is suspected of assault with the intent to commit rape, attempted rape, a lewd act committed upon a child and child endangerment.

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## Woman dies in Big Sur rollover

A 25-YEAR-OLD Salinas woman who moved home from Los Angeles to study fire science at Monterey Peninsula College died Friday evening, when she was thrown from the car she crashed on Highway 1 just north of Point Sur, according to California Highway Patrol public information officer Bob Lehman

Jennifer Denmark was heading south on the highway in her 1995 Volvo station wagon at an undetermined speed when the accident occurred shortly before 9 p.m. May 7.

"For reasons yet to be determined, she lost control of her

vehicle, which traveled off the west side of the roadway and rolled over," Lehman said. "And she was ejected."

Another driver who witnessed the crash or came upon the wreckage shortly after the wreck called 911, but police and medics could not get to the area in time to save her.

"She succumbed to her injuries at the scene," he said. "It does not appear she was wearing her seat belt."

Toxicology results will determine whether drugs or alcohol had a role in the accident. The report did not indicate Denmark's destination.



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
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### Pacific Grove pushes for regional fire department

THE BEST way to protect the Monterey Peninsula is to form a fire department that represents several cities, the Pacific Grove City Council decided Wednesday night. Opting against accepting a proposal from state-run Cal Fire to take over PGFD, council members directed the city's staff to work on an agreement for a joint powers authority that would also include Carmel, Monterey and Seaside, and bring it back for approval in

City manager Tom Frutchey recommended the council go with a JPA, which would be overseen by a board of representatives from the member cities. The new department would take shape over three years, beginning with the formation of the board and hiring of a single chief on July 1. Each jurisdiction would remain responsible for its own stations and equipment.

Cal Fire, which already operates stations in the Carmel Highlands, Cypress and

Pebble Beach fire districts, proposed taking over P.G. Fire and said it could deliver the services residents expect at a reasonable

But Frutchey worried that would subject the financially strapped City of Pacific Grove to the economic vagaries of a state struggling with a \$20 billion deficit and a huge retirement liability. He also suggested the council would lose control over the fire department and would have no ability to mandate salaries and benefits. The only upsides he cited were the proven Cal Fire contractual model and the ability to pull out of the deal with 12 months' notice at minimal financial cost.

The union representing Cal Fire forces submitted a letter opposing contracting with P.G.

"Staff very strongly recommends that you direct us to work with neighboring jurisdictions to pursue a JPA, not only because of advantages we believe that holds, but because, looking forward, we feel we have a good understanding of what the Cal Fire contract would mean to us," Frutchey said. Specifically, he thought the city would be unable to negotiate with the state to lower

According to his report, the jointly run department would cost P.G. taxpayers an average \$3.2 million per year for the next five years. The current contract with Monterey (provided in the report just as a baseline) would average \$3.7 million annually for the same period, and the Cal Fire options would average \$3.1 million at stateset salaries and \$3.4 million at Monterey salaries.

Frutchey said the state's financial uncertainty brings those estimates into question. He also pointed out that if any of the other core cities choose not to participate in the regional fire department, Pacific Grove's costs will increase. Conversely, if more jurisdictions, such as Sand City, Del Rey Oaks


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## CHS freshmen help feed the poor

MORE THAN three dozen Carmel High students sorted and organized donated food at the Hope Center at the McGowan House in Monterey April 29, according to organizer Kim Lemaire. The center's mission is to provide neighbors in need with groceries and information about community services, and "to empower kids to feel that they are important in their community and that their volunteer efforts can make a big difference in someone's life."

"Almost 40 kids from Carmel High showed up, and they formed a fire line and took all the donated food out of the room, and then checked dates for expired food," Lemaire recounted. They ended up discarding two huge barrels' worth, and then sorted the remaining items into categories for stocking the pantry shelves in a way everything could be

"They also took the bins that were given to us by the Food Bank for Monterey County in Salinas and decorated them for the Hope Center, and wrote what they hoped for in our community," she said. At the end of the day, the freshmen took two bins back to school with them to collect food donations from their classmates.

Lemaire said their efforts, as well as the support of other school kids and friends throughout the Peninsula, are helping the fledgling Hope Center toward its goal of serving the

"Our first distribution is May 20 from 4 to 6 p.m., and our worry was we wouldn't have enough food for the need we are hearing about through the counselors at the public schools in Carmel and Monterey," Lemaire said last week. "But we found out yesterday that the students of All Saints' Day School voted for us for a grant with the Rotary club."

As a result, the Hope Center is receiving a check for \$1,000 from the Carmel Valley Rotary Club that will help it accomplish its mission.

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




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### STUDIES COSTS, BENEFITS OF REGIONAL WATER SUPPLY

An administrative law judge ordered Monterey County water agencies and residents to come to terms over cost details of a regional project that would solve the Monterey Peninsula's decades-old water

On Tuesday, during the second of three workshops held this week in San Francisco to hash out the price of the regional water project, Judge Angela Minkin told backers of the plan and those critical of its estimated costs to agree on a cost model for the project.

Minkin said it would be difficult for the California Public Utilities Commission to decide on the project if both parties were comparing "apples and oranges" over cost variables.

The price tag of the regional water project the PUC seems to be backing has drawn ire from the Division of Ratepayer Advocates, a division of the PUC which thinks the cost is

unfair to Peninsula water customers.

The project's backers — Marina Coast Water District, California American Water and the Monterey County Water Resources Agency — have outlined costs considerably less than estimates by the DRA.

Though backers said the project would cost no more than \$372 million, the DRA said the price tag could reach \$500 million.

This week's workshops were held a week after a Carmel audience of more than 100 listened to DRA supervisor Diana Brooks outline its estimated cost of the project.

While proponents say the water project will cost Peninsula water customers \$3,600 to \$3,900 per acre-foot, a DRA analysis said the cost for Peninsula users could be much higher. The DRA also contends Peninsula water customers would bear the risk and responsibility for the entire project and that Marina residents would pay significantly less per acre-foot for the same desalinated water. According to the agreement, MCWD

will pay only \$148 per acre-foot of water.

"We think Marina Coast should pay its fair share," Brooks said at the Carmel meeting. "And we think having \$2,200 an acrefoot as a cost cap [for the Monterey Peninsula] is a succinct solution," Brooks told the audience at the Unitarian Universalist Church of the Monterey Peninsula.

The regional water project would not allow water for lots of record or new development, but it would satisfy state-mandated cutbacks of the Carmel River and help restore the habitat for steelhead fish that inhabit the river — the Peninsula's primary water source.

A water project would also help avoid heavy fines from the State Water Resources Control Board, which in October 2009 issued a cease and desist order against Cal Am to drastically reduce pumping from the Carmel River.

The agreement among the project's backers would allow the Marina desal plant to be owned and operated by Marina Coast. The desal plant would treat a combination of seawater and brackish water that would be drawn from wells owned and operated by the MCWRA. Cal Am would purchase the desalinated water and build a 10-mile pipeline and storage facility to deliver it from Marina to Peninsula customers.

Low and sleek Le Mans prototypes are built to run the distance, often competing in 24-hour races with teams of drivers, and look even more fierce and fast as daylight fades. The ALMS event May 21-23 marks the start of the racing season at Laguna, which will also host grand prix motorcycles in July and historic cars in the new Rolex Monterey Motorsports Reunion in August.

The weekend is set to be action-packed, with practice, qualifying and nine races, as well as a lot of off-track activities, but the fun begins midweek. On Wednesday, fans can show up at Montrio Bistro in Monterey, where some of the series drivers will try their hands at cooking in chef Tony Baker's kitchen. In the afternoon, people can pay \$10 to bicycle around the 2.238-mile Laguna Seca track alongside their favorite racing stars, who often bike the tracks they are visiting in order to get to know each corner, bump, camber and nuance while getting a workout. The bike ride is open to all and will run from 5:30 to 7:30 p.m. May 19.

On Thursday, while the drivers are practicing, MRLS and the Monterey Peninsula Chamber of Commerce will host a mixer from 5:30 to 7:30 p.m. in the Red Bull Energy Center for \$10 per person. Hors d'oeuvres, drinks and door prizes will be on offer. (For more information, call Francine Sullivan at (831) 242-8205.)

The race weekend begins in earnest on Friday, with drivers getting on the track to practice beginning at 8 a.m. Qualifying will take place in the afternoon, ensuring spectators will have plenty of time to get to the American Le Mans Series Fan Party at the C Restaurant + Bar on Cannery Row in Monterey from 6 to 8 p.m.

Saturday morning kicks off with qualifying sessions at 8 a.m., and the first race, the GT3 Challenge, will start at 11. The 12:45 p.m. Prototype Lites Championship race will serve as the run-up to the main event, the sixhour ALMS race, which will start at 2:30. Fans should be sure not to miss the pre-race grid walk, when the public is allowed onto the race track to check out cars and meet the drivers before the green flag drops.

But having the main event on Saturday doesn't mean people shouldn't also head to the track on Sunday, when six different classes of cars will race, starting with Star Mazda at 9:15 a.m. and ending with the Mazda MX-5 Cup at 3:15 p.m.

Kelly's number was retired in a ceremony that preceded Thursday's varsity baseball game between CHS and Pacific Grove High School.

"Mike was one of the best coaches in the history of our school," former CHS principal Karl Pallastrini said. "Not only did he win, but he won with class."

The most successful baseball coach in the school's history, Kelly won 12 straight league titles. His teams racked up a staggering 342-88 record and took home seven Central Coast Section titles. Seven times he was named league Coach of the Year, and in 1996, he was recognized as Coach of the Year for the CCS. And just a month ago, the Salinas Californian chose Kelly as the coach of its Monterey County all-decade high school baseball team.

Kelly played for CHS from 1981 to 1984. He was an all-league pitcher in his junior and senior seasons, and he was named league MVP in his junior year. He later played baseball at UC Berkeley, where he also served as a kicker for the Golden Bears football team.

Kelly left Carmel High in 2007 after 14 years as a coach to spend more time with his family and on his business, MBK Insurance Services. This past summer he coached his 4-year-old daughter's t-ball team.

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
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### Rotarians collect books for children

Carmel Highlands in 1989 and comfortably enjoying their retirement from writing and reporting careers when someone suggested they buy The Carmel Valley Sun, a bi-weekly newspaper owned by Dick Heuer, who once served as director of the Monterey Peninsula Water Management District.

"We were very impulsive," recalled Isabelle Hall about the decision to buy the newspaper. "We didn't even look at what the competition was. It seemed like a fun thing to do."

The Halls took over the newspaper in September 1989. Within a year, they began publishing it on a weekly basis and extended its news coverage and distribution into Carmel and Big Sur. They also shortened its name from The Carmel Valley Sun to The Carmel Sun, although they kept its office in Carmel Valley Village.

At its peak, the Halls distributed 11,000 copies of The Carmel Sun at 150 drop points. Their efforts earned the

newspaper a devoted local following. "People would be standing there waiting for the paper to be delivered," Isabelle said.

"The Sun stood out in the community because of the quality of its news coverage and reporting," said Paul Miller, publisher and owner of The Carmel Pine Cone since 1997. "I really admired the work Stan and Isabelle did. They were pros, and when you read their paper, you could really tell."

But despite their best efforts — and the addition of a partner, Stanley Stillman — the couple had trouble keeping the The Carmel Sun afloat. Meanwhile, Hall was suffering from phlebitis, a potentially fatal inflammation of the veins. He also suffered a heart attack in 1991.

According to Isabelle, the closure of Los Laureles Lodge was the final blow. "They were one of our largest advertisers," she explained. (It has since reopened.)

In a front-page article published Feb. 10, 1994, Hall announced The Carmel Sun was shutting down as a result of financial losses and his health issues. According to Isabelle, Stillman offered to buy the newspaper, but an agreement was never reached.

Another local publisher immediately began printing a newspaper under the banner of The Carmel Sun, but it quickly faded.

A native of Elk City, Okla., Hall was a longtime wire service editor for United Press International. He worked at the company's offices in San Francisco, Los Angeles, Reno, New York and Washington, D.C. In Washington, he met Isabelle, who was working for the U.S. Justice Department. The couple left their home in the Carmel Highlands

for Scottsdale in 1998.

Besides his wife, Hall is survived by a stepdaughter, Catherine.







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

#### **Ambassadors**

To help ensure beach visitors are aware of the rules, uniformed CPD volunteers are handing out brochures. When one of them sees a violation, he will intervene, but only to a point.

"We don't want them involved in confrontation," Calhoun said. "They are being ambassadors."

If asking nicely is not effective, police, who will be nearby and easily contacted via radio, will issue citations. While the city fine is \$30, fees added by the courts can push the cost of a ticket past \$100, according to Calhoun.

"We're hoping with the educational initiative, we'll get a reduction in the number of incidents," Calhoun

"I give a lot of warnings," Mitchell added. "I could give more citations."

And if stronger enforcement doesn't do the trick, the city could close part of the beach to dogs or impose a leash law, as has been suggested by some members of the public. Such restrictions were the subject of a recent letter sent to city hall by a man who was bitten.





## Creativity on display: Festival, exhibit and sale make for dream art week

THE PAST, present and future of Carmel's artistic culture come together this weekend as three events pay tribute to the town's creative spirit.

The Carmel Art Festival returns for its 17th year, presenting a showcase for more than 60 artists who are competing in its plein aire competition.

Meanwhile, an exhibit opening Saturday, May 15, provides the first-ever public glimpse of a remarkable series of abstract color images captured — but never printed — by the late Wynn Bullock in the early 1960s.

And the next generation of local artists — more than 100 high school students — will display their creations Monday and Tuesday, May 17-18, at the annual Carmel High School Arts and Crafts Show and Sale.

#### ■ Painters vie for plein aire prize

The centerpiece of the Carmel Art Festival is its plein aire competition. All day Friday, you'll see artists setting up their easels in front of scenic vistas around the Monterey Peninsula. The works will be judged Saturday morning by a panel of experts, and Devendorf Park will be the site of an awards ceremony at 5 p.m. After the artists are honored, the paintings will be auctioned off at 6 p.m.

Among the artists participating in this year's contest are Mark Farina, Erin Gafill, Cornelia Emery, Rolf Lygren, Roianne Hart, Robin Purcell and Robert Lewis.

"Plein aire painting is a real tradition in this town," said Lewis, who has previously won several honorable mentions in the competition. "So many of Carmel's original artists were plein aire painters."

Devendorf Park will also host a sculpture exhibit Friday, Saturday and Sunday, an interactive children's art event Saturday from 1 to 4 p.m., and a Quick Draw Painting Competition Sunday at 9 a.m. And, for the fifth year in a row, Steven Whyte will create a sculpture of a historical figure in the park.

In past years, Whyte has selected the subject for his sculpture. But this year, he left that task to a group of Chartwell School eighth graders, who came up with three finalists before voting.

In keeping with his tradition, Whyte won't say who the students selected.

"I never let anybody know," he explained. "You have to guess.'

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### Singers pay tribute to English composer at Carmel Mission


MORE THAN local 70 singers will come together Sunday, May 16, at Carmel Mission Basilica to pay tribute to English composer John Rutter.

of the finest black and white photographers of his time.

But it's Bullock's color work that will be the subject of a exhibit, "Color Light Abstractions," which opens Saturday at the Center for Photographic Art.

From 1960 to 1964, Bullock conducted a series of experiments with color film involving photographing light as it passed through shards of glass. Unfortunately, the printing of color photography was quite limited four decades ago, and Bullock, who died in 1975, was never able to print the brilliant colors his camera captured.

Modern technology, though, has now made it possible to print Bullock's abstract color work.

"The images have a magical quality about them," said Michael Spencer, who is curating the show. "This work is primarily unknown to the world. It's literally coming out of the darkness, which is only possible because of the digital revolution."

The gallery will host a reception for the exhibit at 4 p.m. The exhibit will continue through June 26.

Preceding the reception will be a panel discussion, "A Visionary Photographer Revisited," about Bullock and his legacy. Moderated by Spencer, the panel includes A. D. 





### It's The Quality of Life at Forest Hill Manor That Counts!

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AFTER A brief hiatus, the Wings of Freedom Tour of three World War II aircraft will fly into Monterey and take up residence on the tarmac May 19-21.

Restored and exercised by the Collings Foundation, the historic warbirds are a moving museum intending to help Americans connect with their past.

This year's tour — the foundation's 21st annual — will feature the Boeing B-17 Flying Fortress heavy bomber called "Nine O Nine," the Consolidated B-24 Liberator heavy bomber named "Witchcraft," and the P-51 Mustang fighter, "Betty Jane." The B-17 is one of only nine in the country that can be flown, and the B-24J and dual control P-51C Mustang "are the sole remaining examples of their type flying in the world," according to Hunter Chaney, director of marketing for the Collings Foundation. The tour averages 110 stops in 35 states each year. It last visited Monterey in 2007.

Fearsome flyers of World War II come to Monterey airport

Wings of Freedom serves as a "flying tribute" to all who worked on, flew, supported and otherwise helped in the country's air efforts during the war, as well as to those they protected, according to Chaney.

"The B-17 and B-24 were the backbone of the American effort during the war from 1942 to 1945 and were famous for their ability to sustain damage and still accomplish the mission. Despite the risks of antiaircraft fire, attacking enemy fighters and the harrowing environment of subzero temperatures, many B-17s and B-24s safely brought their crews home.'

And the P-51 Mustang was "affectionately known as the bombers' 'Little Friend' saving countless crews from attacking axis fighters."

For \$12 for adults and \$6 for kids under 12, the public can tour the aircraft, inside and out, while they are parked on the tarmac at the Monterey Jet Center. The aircraft are set to arrive at Monterey Peninsula Airport at 2 p.m. May 19 and depart at noon May 21. They will be available for ground tours from 2 to 5 p.m. Wednesday, from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. Thursday, and from 9 a.m. to noon Friday.

"At each location, we encourage local veterans and their families to visit and share their experiences and stories with the public," Chaney said.

And anyone who truly wants to get an idea of what it might have been like to ride in a World War II airplane can write a significantly larger check and take to the sky. A 30minute flight in the B-17 or the B-24 is a taxdeductible \$425 per person, while the oncein-a-lifetime chance to get on the stick in the P-51 will run \$2,200 for a half-hour and \$3,200 for a full hour.

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## OPEN LETTER TO THE CITIZENS OF MONTEREY COUNTY:

On 8/28/09, I received a call from the Monterey County Sheriff's Office informing me I would be medically retired as a Deputy Sheriff on 8/29/09, due to injuries I received while on duty as a Deputy Sheriff.

On 11/28/08, I stopped a suspected DUI driver on Carmel Valley Road. I had stopped my patrol car about 10 feet behind the suspected driver's vehicle. As I was getting out of the patrol car and had my left foot on the pavement. I saw the backup lights of the stopped vehicle come on and, in a fraction of a second; the SUV accelerated in reverse with high velocity and rammed the front of my patrol car, pushing it back several feet.

The impact was so severe; I was knocked about, resulting in a spinal injury to my neck and back. These injuries and other past job related injuries put me out on a disability retirement. I have had job-related corrective surgery to my neck, knee and both wrists, and am now pending surgery again to my neck plus back.

Over the years I have had human feces and urine thrown at me. I have been spat upon and have been called about every curse word that is known to man. I have been threatened with lawsuits many times by people for just doing my job. I have disarmed felons, suicidal subjects, arrested drug dealers and addicts, some of whom have gone to prison. I have had a loaded sawed-off shotgun pointed at me among other things. My life has been threatened many times by felons and general law breakers alike.

I have had the privilege to help the sick, injured, and dying. I have had a 2 1/2 year old baby, who was the victim of an auto accident, die in my arms. The thought of the little baby's death still haunts me to this day.

Despite all that I have said, if I could do it all over again, I would. During the nine months that I was off on medical disability with a spinal injury, as a result of the ramming of my patrol car, I never once received a call from Sheriff Mike Kanalakis, his undersheriff, chief of operations or the captain of patrol inquiring about my injuries, welfare or health status.

On 8/21/09, nine months after the accident, I received a letter from the chief of operations informing me that it came to his attention the I had been off work for over two months and, as per a general order section; I had to turn in my duty weapon, magazines and ammunition. Again, there was no inquiry as to my injury or health status.

One would ask, who would be that insensitive or allow his staff to be so to one of their deputies who was injured in the line of duty and not call and inquire as to their welfare. Definitely not a Sheriff I would vote for in a re-election bid for a third term as sheriff

I am now ending my 28 years of service to Monterey County and its citizens. Many things have happened over the years since I first took the oak of office as a Reserve Deputy from Sheriff Bud Cook in 1982 and fulfilled my boy-hood dream to be a policeman. I performed my duties as best I could

I support no one for sheriff and paid for this ad out of my own pocket.

HE WAS born in Southern Italy in Reggio Calabria,

Executive Chef Roberto "Bobby" Bonica is fun to be around. His kitchen staff at Bistro Beaujolais in Carmel Plaza can attest to that. Along with his good humor, he has an abundance of energy that serves him in good stead when the kitchen is slammed.

As executive chef, Bonica does all the the paperwork required for a well run kitchen, does the ordering, oversees all the kitchen details and even gets on the line to cook alongside his main men, Chef Gabriel Cruz and Chef Fernando Fernandez. "They're phe-

nomenal cooks and bakers," he said. "They're so meticulous, they make my life a lot easier. I love to work with them."

Chef Bonica has been with Firok Shield's Bistro Beaujolais since January, following an eight-month stint as sous chef at Andre's Bouchee just across the street from the

He had never heard of Carmel-by-the-Sea before coming here, but when he got here, he was taken with it right away. He's always liked the ocean and beaches, and used to work out on Muscle Beach in Santa Monica. Now he works out at a gym four times a week."

He thought the Monterey Peninsula a good environment

for his two sons, Vincent, 18, a student at Monterey High, and Dominic, 14, who studies in Seaside. Vincent lives with him in Monterey, and Dominic with his mother near Santa

Married for 30 years, Bobby and his wife Laurie divorced amicably and are dedicated parents to their sons. "Laurie and I are good friends," he said. "My children and Laurie come first with me. We do things together as a family."

When they were married, they frequently worked together in restaurants and at their own catering company. Now Laurie Bonica is executive chef for the Salinas school district, overseeing the entire food operation.

As for his formal training, Chef Bonica graduated from the Culinary Institute of America in Hyde Park, N.Y. The year after graduation, he worked as sous chef at New York City's renowned German restaurant, Luchow's. "I didn't know much about

German cooking, just what I was taught at the CIA, but I learned to make sauerbraten and how to thicken sauces with crumbled ginger snaps."

After Luchow's, he gained more professional experience in New York City restaurants owned by a group: Hector's Meat Market Restaurant on the Lower West Side, Uzie's at South Seaport, Vanessa's in Greenwich Village and Gianni's Restaurant, where he and Laurie worked together.

After five years with this group, Bobby and Laurie opened their own restaurant, Dante's, named after an uncle.

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### Given hands-off treatment, Aiena wines stand on their own

HE RUNS a successful ad agency, but Carmel resident Lou Sena also knows the secret of making fine wine.

"I learned from my communications business to just leave them alone," Sena said of his winemaker and grape grower.

His winery is called Aiena, and Sena may be the ideal boss for an operation that is based on art as much as science.

Steve McIntyre supervises the growing of the Chardonnay and Pinot Noir grapes used in Aiena's wines, and Byron Kosuge crafts them. And Sena lets them do their thing.

To illustrate the point, Sena said that recently Kosuge asked him if he wanted to taste the 2009 wine, which is still in barrels, "and I said, 'No, just tell me when it's ready."

Sena's day job is president of SenaReider, a three-decade-old firm with offices in Monterey and San Francisco that has represented some of the wine industry's biggest players — Constellation, Penfolds, Mondavi and the like. The years he spent working with the people behind those operations led him to dream of having a winery of his own.

Sena realized he didn't have to go big in order to succeed.

"As successful as these wineries are, they can't make really small production wines, because it's not profitable, and it's not in their DNA," he said. "But if I want to introduce a new wine and go up against Constellation, I can do that, even with only

His debut had a somewhat rocky start. In 2005, a produce-growing SenaReider client proposed buying some Monterey County

vineyards and making Sena managing partner. Sena teamed up with McIntyre, who owned and tended several vineyards in the Santa Lucia Highlands and elsewhere in the Salinas Valley, and Kosuge, who made wines for McIntyre, Miura and his own B Kosuge label. But the market was competitive, and a neighboring vineyard owner outbid them after hearing a sale was imminent.

"So we spent the next three years looking," Sena said. When they finally found land, Sena and his produce partner decided to share production costs 50/50, but complications over licensing necessitated Sena's buying out the other guy.

"And that's how my wife and I ended up in the wine business," he said.

Naming the wine also presented an unexpected challenge. The first name, Foghorn, came from Sena's lifelong love of the ocean. He released the 2005 and 2006 wines under the label — but then Old Foghorn beer protested.

Rather than fight about the trademark, Sena decided to rename his wines after his Italian grandmother, Mary Aiena Sena. On each bottle, a line of text below the name reads, "The hands are the tools of the heart," which was one of her grandmother's inspirational lessons, even as she grew blind near the end of her life.

"I feel so blessed to be able to honor her," Sena said.

#### Let it be

Aiena recently released its 2007 vintage: 325 cases of McIntyre Vineyard Chardonnay, 340 cases of McIntyre Vineyard Pinot Noir and 520 cases of Monterey County Pinot

The well balanced Chardonnay exhibits bright fruit, rich notes of toast and butter, and a fair bit of acidity.

Kosuge, who made his first Chardonnays for Napa's Saintsbury in the late 1980s, said his wines "always seem to be livelier, more fruit driven, and, to use a cliché, more elegant than powerful."

The Pinot from McIntyre Vineyard is voluptuous and rich with fruit, but not jammy, with distinctive floral notes, while the Monterey County Pinot, which combines fruit harvested from the Mission and Silacci vineyards at different ends of the valley, is more rustic and ripe, with black cherry ele-

And soon, an estate wine will be added to the lineup, as Sena's eight acres will be ready for their first harvest this year.

Sena is proud to see Aiena on lists at prominent venues, including the private golf clubs at Cypress Point, Tehama and Santa Lucia Preserve; Mundaka, Casanova and Christopher's in Carmel; Bistro Moulin in Monterey; Ventana, Deetjen's and Sierra Mar in Big Sur; La Mar and Waterbar in San Francisco; and the Ritz Carlton in Half

"We're honored to be in the best restaurants," he said.

By day it was an Italian restaurant; by night it became international.

Two years later, they moved to Richmond, Va., where Bobby chefed at the Holiday Inn, then later, he worked at Cavalaro's Italian restaurant. Following a good run there, they moved to New Orleans. They lived three years in The Big Easy, where Bobby was chef at the famed Vieux Carre restaurant, the Fairmont Hotel, and Ormond and Stonebridge country clubs.

Then it was off to Los Angeles, where for several years he was executive chef at the upscale Mirabelle Restaurant on Sunset Boulevard in West Hollywood where movie stars dined nightly. Later, he held the same position at Ciro's in Los Angeles.

Then they were drawn back to Long Island, where Bobby was the chef at Grif's Restaurant, which served continental cui-

They started their own catering company, which they named Crazy Ravioli. "I love to cook for people; once you find out what they like, it's exciting to prepare dishes for them. We also started cooking classes in clients' homes." He waxed enthusiastic about that enterprise because he could relate to people directly. He found that clients liked his personality, and the cooking classes became fun for him and Laurie.

His basic philosophy in his chosen profession is integrity — integrity of ethics and integrity of product. He will not compromise on either.

"I love to cook at home, too," he said. "I have 1,500 cookbooks." He makes his spectacular version of mac and cheese for Vincent and his friends who come over for dinner.

Asked what dishes he would recommend for a first-time diner at the bistro, he said, "I would start with the Bistro Beaujolais salad with its great raspberry dressing topped with blue cheese. Then I would order either the braised lamb shank or short rib with a demiglace, or even a seafood pasta. If the diner prefers a fish dish, I would suggest the tilapia sautéed with spices ground and mixed by Firok and his wife. Then, for dessert, I would order either Fernando's chocolate mousse or Gabriel's tiramisu."

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


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## FRANK FULLER ROSS

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
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

days — to obtain an administrative permit from the county's planning and building inspection department and pay the tax.

This is the first year the county tax collector has sought Transient Occupancy Tax from homeowners in advance of a major local event, Solton said.

To track down landlords offering their homes during the U.S. Open, workers at the county auditor-controller's office have been looking on rental websites, such as vrbo.com, and through newspapers, including The Pine Cone.

"There are any number of ways on the Internet and other means the auditor's office has to determine what properties are being rented out," Solton said.

Pebble Beach homeowner Lania Bryant was surprised to hear from the county after listing on vrbo.com her \$400-per-night two-bedroom, two-bathroom cottage on Patio Drive in Pebble Beach.

"We received a very nice letter from the Monterey County tax collector about how we are going to need to register as a lodging business and will owe transient occupancy tax," she told The Pine Cone.

A portion of the county's letter reads, "It has recently come to our attention that you have been operating a lodging business in the unincorporated area of Monterey County."

#### 'Follow the rules'

Though Bryant said she had already agreed on the rental price with her tenant before learning she would have to pay a 10.5 percent tax, she said she has no problem paying the TOT.

She called the county's method of checking websites and newspapers for short-term rentals, "clever."

"I'm going to follow the rules," said Bryant, who with her husband, Don, splits her time between Colorado Springs and the Peninsula. "I don't want the taxman after me"

Vrbo.com has dozens of homes listed in Carmel, Pebble Beach, Carmel Highlands, Big Sur and other unincorporated areas during the June 14-20 U.S. Open. Some of listings advertise U.S. Open specials.

The listings range from \$315 per night for a one-bedroom, one-bathroom apartment in Carmel, to \$50,000 per week for an "exclusive" ocean-view estate on 17 Mile Drive that accommodates six people.

Although there are currently several homes in Carmel listed on vrbo.com advertising vacancies specifically during the U.S. Open, the city has a ban on short-term rentals.

"Unless somebody tells us or we see them, it's hard to [enforce the law]," Carmel City Administrator Rich Guillen said.

If Carmel homeowners are caught renting their homes for less than 30 days, they're subject to fines and could be charged with a misdemeanor violation of the city ordinance, Guillen said.

Peninsula cities are responsible for collecting their own TOT. In preparation for the AT&T Pebble Beach National Pro-Am in February and the U.S. Open, Pacific Grove passed an ordinance legalizing short-term rentals hoping landlords would voluntarily register the units and be subject to 10 percent flat tax. About 50 homeowners have so far registered their units with the city.

#### A lot of \$\$

Solton said he couldn't estimate how much TOT could be collected from rentals during the U.S. Open.

But given the thousands of people attending the golf tournament who need a place to stay, it could be significant for the county, which has seen a sharp decline in TOT collection in the past couple of years.

In 2008/2009, the county took in \$14.5 million in TOT, nearly \$2 million less than it collected in the 2007/2008 fiscal year.

For landlords who don't register their homes with the county, Solton conceded it's difficult to prove they have violated the ordinance. A rental advertisement doesn't mean a homeowner was able to land a tenant.

"It is very difficult to enforce," he said. "It is very difficult to know who is renting their property out."


Besides searching online and in newspapers, the county also finds out about short-term rentals in a more direct way: From those who snitch on their neighbors.

"We have been advised by residents when they see homes with visible [rental] signs," Solton said.

Although this is the first time the county has gone after TOT from homeowners during a major event, the county has had an ordinance for 60-plus years requiring homeowners pay TOT if they rent out their homes short term.

So far, homeowners have called the tax collector's office with questions about the short-term rental ordinance, but nobody has complained about it, Solton said.

"I don't think anyone is upset about the fact we have a TOT ordinance," he said.

and the Monterey Peninsula Airport, join, everyone's cost shares will drop.

Monterey Mayor Chuck Della Sala and city manager Fred Meurer, and Seaside Mayor Ralph Rubio and city manager Ray Corpuz, all spoke in favor of the regional JPA, pointing out that the concept has been studied for decades. They also said the model could work for other city services, such as public works.

Carmel Fire Capt. Ian Watts, president of the CFD union, said his department has been managed by other agencies since 2001 and told the council the contract with Monterey for chief and administrative services has been the best of the bunch, resulting in improved training and assistance.

"I'm here to speak for my group to show we are in support of this JPA," he said.

A few people expressed doubts about its costs and the ability to respond to emergencies in a timely manner, and councilwoman Lisa Bennett sought clarification of several points, but the majority of the comments were in favor of a regional plan.

"We need to take that first step, and I believe tonight is that first step," said councilman Ken Cuneo. "And the sooner we get going on this, the sooner we can begin collaborating with our neighbors and begin providing topnotch service to our agencies at the most reasonable price possible."

Mayor Carmelita Garcia wanted to assuage residents' concerns. She encouraged them to call Frutchey with any questions and said the JPA board would be responsive.

"You don't have to go around being worried, and if there is an issue, I'm convinced the parties will come to the table and openly discuss those issues," she said. "So tonight, we're going outside the box — way outside the box — and for some people, it's not warm and fuzzy, it's scary. But I support this step. It's the right thing to do, and I'm comfortable with the other elected officials that we will do the right thing."



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## Editorial

### What our readers want

WE ARE used to some people objecting to our editorials. After all, not everybody agrees with the principles — often espoused on this page — that there's such a thing as too much government regulation, that homeowners deserve the benefit of the doubt when it comes to deciding what color or shape their houses should be, that environmental laws are too often used by disgruntled activists and busybodies to thwart the majority will, or even that individual liberty and free markets lead to greater prosperity for everyone.

Most of our readers seem to appreciate these points of view, especially considering how rarely they're even hinted at in other news outlets. But some people see the world differently, and of course they let us know. Not only do we not mind thoughtful criticism and welcome the opportunity to print it, we also don't mind taking shots from the "how dare you" and "you're such a bad newspaper" crowd. Once, we even printed a Letter to the Editor that called the publisher of this newspaper a "bitter, mean-spirited, old man."

But there's one school of how-dare-you-print-that thought that leaves us totally flummoxed, and which was exemplified by an email received last week from one reader who didn't like our editorial about news coverage of the Arizona immigration law and the attempted car bombing of Times Square.

In the editorial, we took no position on the Arizona law or this nation's policies for dealing with international terrorism. But we pointed out that news coverage of both stories by almost every news outlet had been highly slanted, and that supposedly objective reporters and news anchors had let the nation know in no uncertain terms that the Arizona law was bad and that protesters against it were acting the way any reasonable person would, and that the attempted car bombing of Times' Square was nothing to get excited about and didn't mean the nation had to take strong steps against international terrorism. These stories pretended not to contain opinion. But, blatantly, they did.

The editorial on these subjects really got under one reader's skin. He didn't offer any facts or even opinions to counter it, however. All he did was claim that Pine Cone readers don't want to read such things.

"Your editorial on immigration seemed like Glenn Beck/Rush Limbaugh. Local subscribers want local news," said the email he sent. "Fox News gives enough coverage to the tea bag movement. Please stick to Carmel issues."

A quick survey of our staff shows that nobody in The Pine Cone newsroom or in the newspaper's management watches Fox News except once in a blue moon. Nobody has ever seen Glenn Beck's show or listens to Rush Limbaugh. So, we don't really know how Fox News and these other characters have been covering these hot-button issues.

But we do know one thing: A lot of Pine Cone readers really liked our editorial last week. We received at least 15 emails thanking us for writing it. One correspondent even said, "It's almost like you've been listening in on the conversations in our kitchen."

So while we hate to offend any of our readers' sensibilities, it's unavoidable sometimes. And if we take a stab once in a while at a national issue or two on our editorial page, you can always avoid that by sticking to our news pages. Because there, we're proud to say, we are 100 percent local.

And if you don't agree with our editorials on national subjects, please don't hesitate to tell us where we're wrong. But please don't say we're giving our readers something they don't want. Because, plainly, they do.

## Khaki's gets OK to add more windows, new entrance

IN ORDER to break up the expanse of a long wall and make his store more inviting to pedestrians on Junipero Street as well as on Ocean Avenue, Khaki's Men's Clothier of Carmel owner Jim Ockert wants to install larger windows in his new Carmel Plaza location and replace one window with a new entrance. The planning commission voted last month to allow the changes.

"This is an excellent project for Junipero Street," planning and building services manager Sean Conroy said. "Right now, that building turns its back on Junipero Street, and this will provide some interest."

Citing an uninviting, enclosed space as a reason tenant former Wilkes Bashford failed to do well in the 10.000-square-foot store. Carmel architect Brian Congleton said the improvements will draw people in.

"This is just about the most important corner in town," he said. "It's very visible to everyone entering Carmel and a very strong facade — one that needed to be treated with respect."

In a letter to the commission, he explained that Wilkes Bashford walled off the display windows to make the store seem more exclusive. "Mr. Ockert's intent is to be inclusive, opening his business to Carmel residents and visitors by creating transparency of his fine establishment," he said. "The windows are designed to do this, inviting passersby to look at the displays and into the store."


After some discussion regarding the size and depth of the windows, and how tall they should be, the commission unanimously approved the project during its April 14 meeting.

Commissioners determined that, "All proposed window projections shall be used as window display areas only and shall not be used to display merchandise accessible by the public from the interior of the store."

They also decided the windows could not exceed 9 feet in height, nor could they extend below the floor of the interior of the store, which is higher than the sidewalk. Finally, no part of the new staircase and entrance could encroach on the public right of way.

Khaki's celebrated its grand opening Wednesday night.

### Paperwork, not act of Congress, needed to use chainsaws in wilderness

WHENEVER THE seemingly incompatible subjects of chainsaws and wilderness areas come up at a public meeting in Big Sur, a common refrain is heard: "It takes an act of Congress to use a chainsaw in the wilder-

But is it true?

"Not really," explained Barry Peckham, a recreation officer with the Monterey Ranger District of Los Padres National Forest. "But it does take a lot of review.'

Peckham told The Pine Cone last week that his agency has received permission to use chainsaws at five different locations in the Ventana Wilderness. In each case, either a particularly large tree or a group of smaller trees has fallen, making a hiking trail

impassable.

Remarkably, it only took about two weeks for the Monterey Ranger District to receive permission to use chainsaws in the wilderness. A proposal was submitted April 14, and the district received permission April 29 from forest supervisor Peggy Hernandez to

The work is expected to begin later this month.

"We hope to have all the trees removed by the end of the summer," Peckham said.

The tree removal projects will occur along the following hiking routes — the Pine Ridge Trail, the Terrace Creek Trail, the Stone Ridge Trail, the Kirk Creek Trail and the Arroyo Seco Trail. Before receiving permission to use chainsaws, the local ranger district considered using explosives at one

While Peckham conceded it is possible to remove fallen trees from a trail without a chainsaw, he said it is often impractical, especially considering the size of some trees, which are up to 8-feet in diameter. The steep terrain in Big Sur also provides challenges for trail workers.

'You can take a tree out with a teaspoon if you had 100 years," Peckham added.

This redwood along Big Sur's Pine Ridge Trail is one of several trees located in the Ventana Wilderness that the U.S. Forest Service hopes to remove with the aid of chainsaws.

After receiving a call from someone at the scene, Marden drove to Santa Clara to be with his son, who was released the following

day and had been at home recuperating until May 12, his first attempt at returning to class at Carmel High.

"I have no idea, yet, what the long-term prognosis is, and I don't know the extent of the injuries yet, either," Marden said. "But we feel very blessed, and frankly, I think it's a miracle that he survived it."

The family is focusing on helping Ryan heal.

"My heart is broken for him - not just because of the physical trauma, but because of the emotional

trauma he's experienced as well," he said. "He's been in a lot of pain, but his spirits are better ... I believe there have got to be emotional scars, but he's a strong fellow, and very athletic."

Indeed, Marden reported one of his son's

greatest disappointments is not being able to finish the season with his championshipcontending CHS swimming team. In a blog, head coach Conrad Kohrs described Ryan as a standout, potential event winner and team leader, and attributed his survival of the accident in part to his "exceptional physical

condition."

"We rejoice that our teammate survived and carry his indomitable spirit with us as we encourage his recovery and seek to attain the higher reaches of our athletic potential in the weeks to come," Kohrs concluded.

Marden said he is grateful for the care and concern expressed by members of the community.

"The outpouring of support and affection for Ryan, primarily, and our family has been overwhelming," he said. "It has been so positive

and supportive, with people wanting to reach out in any way, shape or form they could. You would hope a community like this would come together, but it has exceeded any expectation we would ever have and it affirms why we live in a small town."

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### **POISON**

While the staff at Carmel Holistic Veterinary couldn't help Lulu, they were able to save Hula. "She's home now and she's doing better," explained Teresa Wright, head technician at Carmel Holistic Veterinary. "That's good news."

Sanders speculated that Hula's size — 37 pounds - is what saved her. Lulu weighed just 21 pounds.

Nobody is sure exactly what sickened the two dogs. Sanders said he was told by a veterinarian that the dogs' symptoms tremors, dilated pupils and irregular behav-- were symptomatic of a neurotoxin, which could have been ingested from some natural source. But Wright suggested the culprit could also have been discarded fruit

"The pits of certain fruits are poisonous," observed Wright, who identified the pits of plums, cherries and nectarines as possible sources of the toxin. "It's really unclear what

happened."

Wright urged dog owners to be conscious of what their pets are putting in their mouths. "They're like children," she "Everything goes in their mouths."
