Burnett, Moniz were their own biggest contributors

I HE TWO men who challenged the three incumbents in last April's Carmel municipal election — Jason Burnett, who took a city council seat away from Gerard Rose, and Adam Moniz, who failed to defeat Mayor Sue McCloud — raised more campaign cash than anyone else, according to their final campaign finance statements filed Monday afternoon. But much of the money was theirs, with Burnett loaning his campaign \$13,000 and contributing \$8,000, and Moniz giving his own campaign \$11,736.77.

As he did during the months between announcing his candidacy and the April 13 election, Burnett far outraised and outspent the rest of the field, bringing in \$47,740.50, including \$7,011 in nonmonetary contributions of a campaign party and wine, and paying out \$47,706.72, according to his statement, which covered the period of Jan. 1 to June 30.

Many contributions arrived after the April 13 election,

including \$750 from his aunt, Julie Packard, who runs the Monterey Bay Aquarium; \$250 from Margaret Downs Baskin; \$200 from the Democratic Club of the Monterey Peninsula; and \$250 from attorney Carol Hilburn. Money donated before the election included \$100 from Assemblyman Bill Monning and \$100 from former Assemblyman Fred Keeley, who is now treasurer of Santa Cruz County. Other contributors were attorney Skip Lloyd (\$250), former county supervisor Karin Strasser Kauffman (\$200), Carmel Valley activist Glenn Robinson (\$200), NextFuels Inc. cofounder Wade Randlett (\$999) and Pebble Beach resident Mike Morgan, CEO of Triangle Peak Partners (\$500).

The race's other challenger, Moniz, raised \$23,115.97 — including the \$11,736.77 he gave his own campaign — and spent \$23,115.97. He also accrued several donations after the

City grapples with Miller suit aftermath

Councilman calls for closed session to 'discuss Guillen's performance'

As SOME residents pleaded with the Carmel City Council to publicly defend itself in the sexual-harassment case filed by former human resources manager Jane Miller — which was settled for \$600,000 last month — and others called for the firing of city administrator Rich Guillen, city attorney Don Freeman said the city has already hired a consultant to examine its policies on sexual harassment and other issues. The topic arose during the public comment period at Tuesday's council meeting.

"City hall, please defend yourself to your citizens," said resident Kathy Fredrickson. "Help us to understand why any former employee has received a settlement and how to solve the problem.... For the first time in my life, I'm embarrassed to tell people where I live."

Barbara Livingston asked the council whether it wants the status quo or change when it comes to Guillen's place as a manager.

"The people of Carmel have spoken loud and clear they want change," she said, adding praise for councilman Jason Burnett's call for a closed session to discuss Guillen's possibly firing. "I urge Mayor [Sue] McCloud to set a date certain for this meeting, so that this issue will not continue to fester."

"Our small town has experienced enough shame over this — it is time to make a change at city hall," resident Carolyn Hardy said. "It is time for Rich Guillen to leave, either by departure or removal. Without a clean start, this community and city hall cannot forget and cannot heal."

Allison Schilling said Guillen should be held responsible for the situations in city hall that led to the lawsuit and settlement. "The person in power is always the person incumbent upon to do the right thing," she said. "It doesn't matter

Cheers, tears and hugs all around

THE CALIFORNIA Coastal Commission will decide next week whether to let the Pebble Beach Co. build a new 480-foot-long seawall at Stillwater Cove. The commission's staff is recommending that any approval come with a requirement for a new public overlook adjacent to the 18th Green.

The P.B. Co. wants the permit to remove a 340-footlong seawall along the bluffs near the Beach & Tennis Club and replace it with a longer wall that blends in better with the natural environment.

The project involves removing about 3,355 square feet of grouted rip-rap, concrete blocks and debris from the bluff and beach, and replacing it with a more attractive seawall designed to mimic the coastal bluffs, according to the 63-page report by coastal commission staff.

onto northbound Highway 1 that's been in place during construction of a Hatton Canyon trail will soon be no more, according to Caltrans.

Established four months ago while an underpass for the trail was being built, highway officials considered making the lane with a continuous green light permanent.

But Carmel Highlands and Big Sur residents complained the turn would increase traffic on Highway 1 from their end. And the California Department of Transportation insisted the free turn required an encroachment permit.

In response, the Transportation Agency of Monterey County will eliminate the free turn, which is tentatively scheduled to be removed Aug. 19, said Todd Muck, project manager for the agency.

"We decided to go back to the way it was," Muck explained.

And even if TAMC wanted to leave the free right turn in place, Caltrans said it would first have to "return the intersection back to its original condition and then apply for a per-

THEIR NEIGHBORS may hate it, but Zane Blackmer and Greg Schultz can build a driveway on public land off Lopez Avenue down to their house on Second Avenue. They proposed the driveway because the existing dirt drive onto their property has been unusable since a 200-foot stretch of Second Avenue along Pescadero Canyon was closed in 1998. The Carmel City Council voted 4-1 Tuesday to approve a new driveway across public property at the end of Lopez.

The council last considered their driveway proposal in September 2009 but didn't make a decision, instead asking for a study to see if Second Avenue could be reopened.

But the geotechnical study commissioned in October and released this year concluded it would cost \$300,000 to \$500,000 just to construct a retaining wall to make the 200-

> foot stretch passable. Further, the road would have ongoing stability issues requiring more money and

El Niño damage leaves few options

work down the line.

Several residents in the area have objected to the reopening of the narrow street, which was closed due to erosion and instability following El Niño storms.

At the Aug. 3 council meeting, associate planner Marc Wiener outlined four alternatives: building one of the two driveway configurations from Lopez that Blackmer and Schultz designed, redesigning and paving the driveway from Second Avenue, or reopening Second Avenue and paving the existing driveway. The first three options called for the removal of trees.

"There is no great solution to providing vehicle access to this property," he said. "All these options come with drawbacks, basically."

Schultz told the council redesigning and paving the existing driveway wouldn't work, because it would damage or kill two large trees and result in a driveway with an average slope of nearly 30 percent. He and Blackmer submitted petitions signed by more than 100 residents supporting their driveway proposal.

But several people who live on Lopez reiterated their complaints that the new driveway would worsen traffic congestion and parking on their street, and would endanger the kids who play in the area on occasion. Some said it would be ugly, as well. Wiener told the council the police department reviewed the proposed driveways and identified no safety issues. Council members Ken Talmage and Jason Burnett said that using Second Avenue did not seem feasible, due to liability and cost issues for the city, and Burnett moved for approval of the proposed driveway off of Lopez, as recommended by the planning commission. The council voted 4-1, with Mayor Sue McCloud dissenting, to OK that plan.



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Man admits trying to rape stepdaughter

THE NEW Zealand man accused of attacking his 15-yearold stepdaughter during a family vacation to Carmel in April pleaded guilty to assault with attempt to commit rape, the Monterey County District Attorney's Office announced July 30. Michael Brady, 41, faces a maximum of six years in prison and will be required to register as a sex offender — if New Zealand has such a law, according to managing deputy district attorney Ed Hazel. He is scheduled to be sentenced Sept. 10.

Carmel police arrested Brady at a San Carlos Street hotel shortly after his stepdaughter arrived at the back door of the station, naked and screaming, at 4 a.m. April 14. At the time, she told officers Brady had awakened her upon returning from a night out drinking and had taken off her clothes. When she resisted him, she said, he punched her, knocking her unconscious. She was able to get out of the room and flee, but he had taken her clothes. She told officers she ran toward the only building with lights on inside, and it happened to be the police station.

After identifying her attacker, the girl was taken to Community Hospital of the Monterey Peninsula for treatment and examination, and officers went to the hotel and

arrested Brady.

His family returned to New Zealand shortly after his arrest, while Brady remained face multiple felony to charges. His case had been set to go to trial before a jury, but Brady ultimately decided to plead guilty to one count of assault with the intent to commit rape.

After his sentence ends, Brady will be forced to register as a sex offender, but he will also have to leave the country, according to Hazel. If New Zealand requires convicts of sex crimes to register their whereabouts, Brady will

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have to do so. While Monterey County authorities are not likely to go to the work of ensuring he registers overseas, if they learned he had not, they would probably issue a warrant for his arrest if he tried to return to California, according to Hazel.

Big effort in Big Sur keeps wildfire small

MORE THAN 200 firefighting personnel put out a blaze this week in Big Sur that burned about 35 acres.

A downed power line on El Sur Ranch ignited the fire Tuesday at about 4 p.m. The incident was located along the Old Coast Road, not far from where it crosses the Little Sur River.

Cal Fire, the U.S. Forest Service and the Mid-Coast Volunteer Fire Brigade responded to the fire, explained Cal Fire spokesman Jonathan Pangburn. Ten fire engines, six hand crews, two bulldozers, four air tankers and three helicopters participated in the effort to subdue the blaze.

By midnight — about eight hours after it started — the fire was contained.

Firefighters were aided by the weather. "The fog certainly helped us," Pangburn said.

While much of Big Sur burned in the 2008 Basin Complex Fire, the Palo Colorado area — and its neighborhoods where several hundred residents live - remained untouched. Had firefighters been unable to contain Tuesday's blaze, those neighborhoods would have been at risk.

P.B. chef killed in head-on crash

TED CONSOLI, who worked as a chef at Sticks restaurant at the Inn at Spanish Bay at Pebble Beach, was killed on

Highway 68 near Skyline Forest Drive Friday afternoon when a man in an SUV crossed over the center line into the path of the Consoli's sports car. A 58-year-old resident of Seaside, Consoli had cooked for several Monterey Peninsula restaurants over the years and was very highly regarded by his fellow Pebble Beach Co. employees. He became chef de cuisine at Sticks in 2002.

According to California Highway Patrol officer Bob Lehman, 61-year-old Seaside resident Thomas Littlefield caused the accident at 5:20 p.m. July 30 as he headed

down Highway 68 toward Pacific Grove when he let his Ford Explorer cross into the uphill lane at 40 mph, striking the left front of Consoli's 2004 BMW Z4. The SUV then continued down the highway in the wrong lane, colliding with a 2009 Chevy Silverado driven by 32-year-old Andrew Kennedy of Pacific Grove.

Littlefield and Kennedy, as well as Kennedy's passenger, 33-year-old P.G. resident Heather Lauren, went to Community Hospital of the Monterey Peninsula for treatment of minor to moderate injuries, according to Lehman.

Consoli was also taken to CHOMP, where doctors pronounced him dead. The coroner's office announced Wednesday he had died from multiple blunt force injuries he sustained in the crash

Littlefield told officers at the scene of the accident that he might have fallen asleep at the wheel, according to Lehman, who also said that alcohol did not appear to be a factor.

Consoli hailed from Waltham, Mass., and had cooked for several notable Monterey Peninsula restaurateurs, including Ted Balestreri and Bert Cutino, Sabu Shake and his family,




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and Bill Lee — over the years. He had also run his own company, Simple Elegance Catering, with his wife, Tammy.

In his obituary, Consoli was said to have "loved camping, fishing, fireworks and throwing great parties," as well as cooking for his friends and family. "He will always be remembered for his kind, generous and loving spirit."

Consoli, who is survived by his wife and two children, Kristy and Nicholas, as well as his sister, Amy Puliafico, will be honored at a celebration of his life slated for Monday, Aug. 9, at 1 p.m. in the Elks Lodge, 150 Mar Vista Drive in Monterey.

Judge: Mom, ex-wife can be sued for 'looting' man's estate

A JUDGE has decided the ex-wife and mother of a man accused in a lawsuit earlier this year of swindling an elderly Carmel physician out of millions of dollars can also be sued for allegedly defrauding the senior.

Monterey County Superior Court Judge Kay Kingsley July 30 granted a motion by the attorney for 87-year-old Lawrence Loftus to amend a lawsuit Loftus filed against his former caregiver, Charles Harper, to include Harper's mother and ex-wife as defendants in the suit.

In the amended lawsuit, attorney Frank Hespe alleges the Harpers took out a \$2.7 million loan in Loftus' name for their own use and "systematically looted" Loftus' Scenic Road estate, "stealing and converting" most of his assets, including antiques, artwork, automobiles and other items.

In the roughly 15-minute hearing in a Monterey courtroom, Harper, who represented himself, argued against naming his mother, Helen Harper, and ex-wife, Amanda Harper, in the lawsuit. "The allegations in the complaint is that [Helen and Amanda Harper] were complicit in this scam and they have some liability," Loftus' attorney Frank Hespe told The Pine Cone Monday.

Harper, who listed a Marina address and phone number in court documents, also told Kingsley he hadn't been properly notified of the court hearing. Helen and Amanda Harper were not present.

A phone message left with Charles Harper by a Pine Cone reporter was not returned.

The Harpers are accused of financial elder abuse, breach of fiduciary duty, conversion, constructive trust and undue influence. Charles Harper is individually accused of physically abusing and isolating Loftus.

Within one year, the Harpers drained Loftus Bank of America account of \$960,000 in cash, the suit alleges.

"Helen Harper and Amanda Harper assisted and conspired with Charles Harper to convert Plaintiff's funds and to loot his estate," the amended suit says.

The suit also accuses the Harpers of exerting undue influence over Loftus, who suffers from a variety of medical problems. "Defendants exercised a controlling influence over the mind and actions of Loftus," according to the suit.

Hespe told The Pine Cone this week that Loftus is in a Peninsula nursing home. His desirable Scenic Road house was foreclosed because he couldn't keep up with the mortgage, Hespe said.

In her July 30 ruling, Kingsley determined that the San Jose-based Pacific Northwest Mortgage Corporation could also be named in the amended suit, which alleges Charles Harper three years ago "conspired" with the broker and Washington Mutual Bank for the \$2,750,000 loan.

Harper, 48, filled out a loan application stating that Loftus — then 85 years old and long since retired as an internist — was making \$38,000 per month as the "vice president of an investment company," according to the suit.

"These facts are false," the amended lawsuit states. And "and all defendants knew them to be untrue."

The lawsuit also says Charles Harper "convinced" Loftus to change his will, living trust and other estate planning documents and "to disinherit his children" and name Harper as the beneficiary of much of his estate.

Harper is individually charged in the lawsuit with intimidating and physically and emotionally abusing the 5-foot-2inch, 110-pound Loftus, who has a restraining order against Harper.

Harper threatened to dump Loftus' wife's ashes into the ocean, kill Loftus' dog and stuff the animal into his wife's urn, according to lawsuit.

Harper "immersed himself" in Loftus' life and financial affairs and, through "fraud and deceit," convinced Loftus they register with the state as "domestic partners" although their relationship was strictly platonic.

The status allowed Harper "a mechanism to perpetuate the fraud and conversion of [Loftus'] estate and as a further

means to isolate, control and commit elder abuse" against him, according to the lawsuit.

Hespe said he's in the process of trying to serve the amended lawsuit on Helen and Amanda Harper.

The Rio Run, which boasts a dedicated following of more than 1,000 people who come out to participate in the 6.8-mile run or 3-mile fun run/walk Jan. 1, rain or shine, has raised more than \$500,000 for local nonprofits since its inception. The event includes full pancake brunch prepared by Kiwanis Club of Monterey volunteers with support from Rio Grill executive chef Cy Yontz and his staff. 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Female priests? It's time for a change, says C.V. filmmaker

W HILE IT is unlikely the Roman Catholic Church will ever endorse Carmel Valley filmmaker Jules Hart's new film, "Pink Smoke Over the Vatican," an international film festival is giving it two big thumbs up.

The documentary — which chronicles the struggles of women seeking to become ordained priests — was honored last week at the Action On Film Festival in Pasadena, where Hart took home prizes for Best Female Filmmaker and Best Faith-Based Film.

As Hart's documentary illustrates, the stakes are high for women attempting to join the priesthood. In May 2008, the Vatican declared that any woman who tries to become a priest or any bishop who attempts to ordain a woman as a priest will be excommunicated from the church.

The fear of excommunication, though, had no effect on Hart.

"I'm not Catholic," explained Hart, who has also produced films about storefront churches, Latina healers, art as a vehicle for healing, and drumming as a spiritual practice. "And I'm not even that interested in organized religion."

But after Hart met a woman who urged her to make a movie about the obstacles facing women seeking to become priests, she began to examine the subject. "I started reading about the church and its stance against these women, and I said, 'This is for me."

Hart quickly discovered that there were many people — including even some Catholic priests — who believed in her

"I received a \$5,000 check from a priest in Germany," Hart recalled. "He had a cousin who was a woman, and she wanted to be a priest."

In 2002, German bishops secretly ordained seven women as priests and another three women as bishops. Three years later, the three female bishops traveled to Ottawa, Canada, where they ordained nine women.

Joined by a cameraman, Chris Angelos, and a sound technician, Rick Chelew, Hart traveled to Canada for the ceremony. Upon arrival in Ottawa, Hart and her crew were confronted with a surprisingly chaotic scene.

"I was expecting it to be a very quiet and spiritual ceremony," she said. "But it was an absolute zoo. There weren't many protesters, but there were dozens of news crews."

Because no Catholic diocese would allow the ceremony to happen in its jurisdiction, the priests were ordained on a ship as it navigated the St. Lawrence Seaway.

Surrounded by competing reporters and their camera crews, Hart struggled to capture the day's events. "It was like being in a mosh pit," she observed.

A year later, Hart and her crew traveled to Pittsburgh to film the ordination of eight female priests — a first in the United States.

Prior to the ceremony in Pittsburgh, Hart had been unable to find even one Catholic Church official who was willing to be interviewed on camera. But the Pittsburgh event attracted so much media attention that the church — which Hart said has avoided the subject of female priests whenever possible — finally decided to publicly comment on the topic. Hart was now able to add the voices of church officials to her story — with or without their cooperation. "They had to respond in Pittsburgh," she said.

Off to a promising start

About five years after starting the project, "Pink Smoke Over the Vatican" was completed. The entire production cost about \$100,000, which by industry standards definitely qualifies as a shoestring budget.

With limited financial backing and controversial subject matter, the documentary faces an uphill battle in its search for an audience. But its success in Pasadena has given Hart confidence that "Pink Smoke" will make an impact in the film world.

In Pasadena, Hart also discovered there are more female priests than she originally thought. "After the screening of the film, two women came forward and said they are ordained priests," recalled Hart, who now estimates there are about 50 female priests active throughout the world.

Once ambivalent about the subject of organized religion, Hart has become an advocate for change within the Catholic Church.

"I believe religion should empower all people," added Hart, who is hoping the documentary will be screened at this year's Carmel Art and Film Festival, which is scheduled for Oct. 6-10. "People should all be considered equal in the eyes of God. The Catholic Church has been guided by a patriarchal system. It's time for that to change. Whether things will change, well, that's another question."

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

Coastal commission will weigh NOAA's parking lot lights

A FEDERAL agency will have to go through a hearing before the California Coastal Commission for installing six 25foot-tall light poles on land in Pacific Grove the state considers to be environmentally sensitive habitat.

In February, the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration installed lights — for "safety reasons" — in the parking lot of its Southwest Fisheries Science Center at 1352 Lighthouse Ave.

That prompted an investigation by a planner with the coastal commission who decided the lights violated Pacific Grove's land use plan and the Coastal Act. The commission has strict rules about artificial lighting in sensitive habitat areas.

NOAA officials did not inform the coastal commission or the City of Pacific Grove prior to installing the light poles.

NOAA — and other federal agencies don't need to obtain a coastal development permit like homeowners are required to if they want to build on their coastal property.

However, "any development they undertake has to undergo a somewhat parallel process whereby the applicant has to demonstrate that their development is consistent with the [the Coastal Act]," said Sarah Christie, legislative director for the coastal commission.

NOAA will undergo a "federal consistency determination" in which coastal commissioners will analyze the lights and determine their impact on the environment. The public hearing will allow anybody to comment on the issue, Christie told The Pine Cone.

Though a coastal staff planner has said it's possible the commission could require the light poles to be removed, the commission could also require NOAA to perform mitigation to offset any impact from the lights.

NOAA will have some recourse if it doesn't agree with the coastal commission's rul-

"If the commission finds the lights inconsistent, there is a route of appeal to the Secretary of Commerce [Gary Locke], who can overturn the commission if specific findings are made," according to Christie, who said a hearing date hasn't been set.

In response to the light poles, Pacific Grove's city manager sent a letter to NOAA requesting it adhere to the city's architectural guidelines. The city is concerned about the lights' impact on the scenic neighborhood, including their potential for light pollution.

NOAA officials have given several reasons why the \$36,000 lights were necessary, including deterring intruders and wild animals, and to protect the facility from vandalism and terrorist attacks.

The lights, originally investigated by staff at the coastal commission's Santa Cruz office, have been referred to its San Francisco office. NOAA has said the lights which are solar powered — are "dark sky certified" and don't have as much effect on the night sky as other lights.



County collects big hotel taxes because of U.S. Open

TOT more than \$500,000

By KELLY NIX

THE JUNE U.S. Open golf tournament in Pebble Beach wasn't only a resounding success for fans, organizers, local businesses and champion Graeme McDowell, the county tax collector also came out on top.

According to fourth quarter figures for 2009/2010, the Monterey County Tax Collector's Office raked in about 21 percent more in transient occupancy tax — the 10.5 percent tax collected from hotels, inns and rental homes — over last year.

While about 4 percent of the 21 percent boost is being attributed to "modest economic recovery," about 17 percent of it — or \$550,000 — is a result of the Pebble Beach golf tournament, which drew tens of thousands of visitors to the Monterey Peninsula.

"Certainly the increase in the fourth quarter was attributable to the U.S. Open," Monterey County Treasurer-Tax Collector Lou Solton told The Pine Cone.

The major golf event — which will next be at Pebble Beach in 2019 — helped an otherwise lackluster year for county TOT collection, which for the first three quarters showed a decline from last year.

In total, the county took in an estimated

\$3,925,000 in TOT in the fourth quarter of the 2009/2010 fiscal year compared to \$3,239,000 in the fourth quarter of the 2008/2009 fiscal year.

The amount of hotel tax generated because of the U.S. Open, which ran June 14 to June 20, exceeded the county's expectations.

"It's probably \$200,000 more than we first anticipated," Solton said.

About 70 hotels and inns in this year's fourth quarter the TOT to the county.

"The vast majority [of hotels and inns] are located in the unincorporated portions of the Monterey Peninsula," Solton said.

Remarkably, about half the \$550,000 in TOT for the fourth quarter was collected from the Pebble Beach Co., which operates the Inn at Spanish Bay, the Lodge at Pebble Beach and Casa Palmero.

In addition to the hotels, the county collected TOT from about 50 to 60 homeowners

Big Brother, Country Joe offer Sunset Summer of Love tribute

FORTY-THREE years after the Summer of Love changed the face of pop music forever, two of its most memorable recording acts kick off Sunset Center's 2010-2011 season.

Big Brother and the Holding Company — the group that launched legendary singer Janis Joplin's short but unforgettable career — team up Saturday, Aug. 7, with County Joe McDonald.

Like the Grateful Dead and the Jefferson Airplane, Big Brother played a key role in the evolution of Haight-Ashbury's emergence as the epicenter of America's counterculture in the late 1960s. In 1965, guitarists Peter Albin, Sam Andrew and the late James Gurley joined forces to create the band, which quickly became a local favorite. Famous for its particularly "heavy" take on electrified blues rock, Big Brother was one of the earliest "jam bands."



Here is Janis Joplin with Big Brother and the Holding Company at the height of their fame in the late 1960s. Joplin died in 1970, but the band is still performing four decades later.

"We played a lot of instrumentals," explained Andrew in an interview this week with The Pine Cone. "Today, they would call it progressive rock. We would blow your brains out for 40 minutes."

By 1966, it was clear that something special was underway in the Haight. Young people with long hair were arriving daily and the neighborhood's thriving music scene was starting to take off.

"About a year before we met Janis, it felt like something extraordinary was happening," he said.

With regular gigs and legions of fans, Andrew and his bandmates were flying high. But after auditioning Joplin, they realized the group was just scratching the surface of its potential.

"Our manager, Chet Helms, went to school with Janis in Texas," he recalled. "She came from a small town, she looked really funky and she had a real tough attitude. But she sang really well. She was an experienced coffee house singer."

With Joplin in the lineup, Big Brother soon earned a reputation as one of the most dynamic groups on the scene. The band's trademark acid rock sound provided the perfect backdrop for Joplin's screeching and gut-wrenching vocals.

For the next year, Big Brother earned raves in the Haight for its memorable live performances. Yet the band was virtually unknown outside San Francisco. But that would change dramatically after the group performed at the Monterey Pop Festival in 1967.

"Monterey was really the first worldwide countercultural

event," Andrew explained. Andrew has vivid memories of rock 'n' roll's first big festival.

"I remember Otis Redding more than anything, although Jimi Hendrix and Ravi Shankar also stood out," he recalled. "Being backstage with Jimi and Otis was great," he recalled. "It was a big thrill to talk with each of them. Both were quiet and mild-mannered. But they would get on stage and make all this noise."

After the Monterey Pop Festival, Big Brother's career took off like an Apollo moon mission. Within a year, the band's second album, "Cheap Thrills," was one of the best selling records in the country, and Joplin had transformed into a major pop star.

The success of Big Brother was short-lived, though. Joplin, lured by the prospects of a solo career performing soul and country music with session musicians, left the band. Two years later she died of a drug overdose.

Fast forward to the 21st century

In 2001, Kacee Clanton played Joplin in an off-Broadway production about the life and

THIS AIRPORT restaurant's clientele is made up of 20 percent travelers, 80 percent locals — a remarkable ratio that screams loyal following.

The Golden Tee Restaurant & Bar at Monterey Airport has been a popular eatery for some 44 years and is owned by Michael Reta,

who sometimes fills in as bartender, and Melinda Scardina, who serves as hostess. The menu was so right for their patrons when Executive Chef Hugo Barragan signed on, he didn't want to mess with perfection.

Following the old adage, "If it's ain't



Wine event. He worked and learned under Highlands Chef Brian Whitman for five years, then Chef Cal Stamenov for another five as an all-around cook. Barragan got to know such well known chefs as Julia Child, Jacques Pepin and Charlie Trotter during the Masters. "I was so fortunate to have worked with them," he said.

But all this came to pass after he moved from Oaxaca, Mexico, when he was 14 to live with his mother in Seaside. She was working as a prep cook at Collage (a former Georis family restaurant) and Piatti Ristorante and Bar. He didn't speak English at the time, but he got a job at Collage, then at Piatti, through his mother's introduction.

He attended Monterey High School and graduated after three-and-a-half years; by that time he was speaking good English.

Today, Chef Barragan, his wife, Juana, and their three children live in Hollister. Alex, 14, will be starting high school soon; Yoseline, 17, is a high-school student; and Cynthia, 18, will commence studies at Monterey Peninsula College in the fall.

He left Piatti after seven years to serve as executive chef for the opening of Monterey Cook House, then went on to Tehama for seven years. Then it was on to Gardiner's Resort, where he served as executive chef for three years.

Barragan learned most of his Mexican cooking from his mother and has for a long time cooked Mexican and American dishes; he learned French cooking at Highlands Inn. Occasionally he does a fusion of all three. At Tehama and Gardiner's, he made Mexican tacos with local seafood.



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

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

Editorial

Guillen should resign

THERE ARE a lot of people in this entire Rich Guillen-Jane Miller situation who have behaved shamefully, and Guillen probably isn't the worst of them. But for the good of the city, he should resign.

First of all, it should be obvious to any disinterested person (and those have proved to be rare) that Miller's allegations are shot through and through with so many inconsistencies, improbabilities and inanities that it's hard to take them seriously. Here we have a human resources manager who claims she was too "intimidated" to do anything about sexual harassment and discrimination that was, according to her, almost a daily occurrence in city hall. If she was that incompetent, maybe the city should sue her to get her salary back.

By her own admission, instead of fulfilling the basic obligations of her job description, she didn't say a word before contacting an attorney (the same one who got her husband, Scott, a nifty settlement by suing Pacific Grove). At which point, the city hired an outside investigator, Karen Kramer, to look into Miller's complaints. And then Miller refused to talk to her!

Almost as ridiculous is the trick Miller pulled last week. Having just signed a legal agreement stating that all her complaints against the city had been satisified, and picked up a check for \$600,000 for her trouble, Miller launched a onesided media campaign to show how wronged she was. Unbelievable.

Speaking of the media, Monterey County Weekly reached a new low in its coverage of the Miller-Guillen scandal, and not merely by slanting its coverage heavily in Miller's favor and gullibly reporting her accusations as though they were God-given truth. In this case, they actually got the story utterly wrong several times. First, by claiming, in perhaps the most infamously incorrect headline in the paper's history, that Guillen had been "suspended" and the city "fined" when Miller's lawsuit was settled, and then, this week, by reporting that Tuesday's council meeting was gripped with "recall fever" — whatever that is. The Herald wasn't much better. Bulletin to both papers: Sexual harrassment is common. So are office romances. And so are fake or exaggerated lawsuits. It has never been clear, and still isn't, which category this case belongs to. It could even be a combination of all three.

Which brings us to the people who this week ludicrously proclaimed Guillen guilty on the basis of flirtatious emails he sent Miller. According to these critics' impossible world view, a boss breaks the law as soon as he compliments or flirts with a subordinate, regardless of whether she welcomes or encourages the compliments, because of something called the "power imbalance." Not only is this analysis bizarrely condescending to women everywhere, who are thereby presumed to be helpless, it defies common sense and ignores the law. According to EEOC guidelines, any behavior "must be unwelcome" to constitute sexual harassment. Duh.

But what about Guillen? While he has performed long and ably in many respects, there are also very troubling questions about how he has selected people to hire and promote, and about raises he granted to certain employees. It would take a lot more investigating to determine if those cases would justify his firing.

It isn't necessary to undertake that investigation, however, because it is now certain that if he remains as city administrator, Guillen's effectiveness will be greatly diminished, and so will the functioning of the entire city government, because of the distraction he presents. This will hurt everyone.



"The existing coastal protection structure has an artificial look of imported rock and rubble that is distinctly out of place with the adjacent natural bluff forms," according to the report. "The upcoast portion ... of the structure has been undermined and exposed by erosion."

The coastal commission's famously picky staff has recommended the commission approve a permit for the seawall.

The upper level of the new wall will be a traditional stone-faced retaining wall, and the lower tier would be sculpted, colored and textured to make it blend in and "minimize potential visual impacts" - similar to the seawall next to the 18th Green.

A plan for a new seawall in front of the Beach of Tennis Club may be okayed by the California Coastal Commission this week, but the permit may come with a requirement that the P.B. Co. establish a public over-



To "mitigate these impacts," the coastal commission's staff wants the P.B. Co. to be required to construct a new public accessway and overlook area between the Pebble Beach Lodge and the ocean in an area that currently has "limited public shoreline access points

The beach at Stillwater Cove, the Pebble Beach golf course and The Lodge are aleady open to the public, but "the proposed project should improve public beach access and the public viewshed along this area of coast," according to the commission's report, which



also noted the overlook would provide the public with "sweeping views" of Stillwater Cove and allow for a "water's edge experience."

Other permit conditions proposed by coastal staff include requiring that the "entire wall resemble a faux bluff with concrete texturing, surfacing, undulation and articulation," a landscaping plan to include low-growing native plants and a 20-year authorization of the seawall.

The original seawall was constructed in the 1930s when the Beach & Tennis Club's swimming pool was built.

Coastal commissioners are scheduled to review the Pebble Beach seawall proposal at its Aug. 11 meeting in San Luis Obispo.

And because Caltrans has plans to extend the climbing lane on the highway south to Rio Road, the free turn would have ultimately needed to be removed, Muck noted.

To construct an underpass beneath Carmel Valley Road for the trail, TAMC reduced four lanes of traffic along Carmel Valley Road between Highway 1 and Carmel Rancho Boulevard to two lanes. To minimize delays, motorists turning right on Highway 1 had a continous green light.

TAMC reopened the second eastbound lane along Carmel Valley Road in early June but left the free turn in place on a trial basis after receiving positive feedback about it from Carmel Valley residents.

if the person who works for the person in power walks into the office naked."

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Barbara Brooks asked, "Please, would this council do something — do something to repair the terrible damage that has happened to our city?"

Attorney Skip Lloyd urged the council not to ignore the allegations. "Insurance companies do not pay that kind of money if there is no merit to a claim," he said of the \$600,000 paid Miller by the city's insurance carrier as part of the settlement.

Their comments reflected the information vacuum that has existed since Miller first complained to the council via a letter from her attorney, Michael Stamp, in May 2008.

Since then, Guillen and the city have remained silent, allowing Miller and her supporters to dominate the public debate. While the details of Miller's allegations are well known, the evidence supporting the city's conclusion that her charges were baseless has remained secret.

Employee privacy rights

City attorney Don Freeman told those gathered at the standing-room-only meeting that the city can not violate employee privacy rights by discussing the details of Miller's allegations and Guillen's job in public.

But he said the city has already hired someone to review sexual harassment polices, as well as those relating to email communications by city employees. (Some of Miller's allegations of inappropriate conduct involve after-hours emails Guillen sent her, and last week she released a few excerpts from those emails.) Freeman also said all city employees undergo sexual-harassment training every year, and that training could be expanded.

After the meeting, Burnett reiterated his desire for a closed council meeting to "discuss Guillen's performance" on the job and an open session to review general employment policies. But he has not called for Guillen's resignation.

"Would I like to be able to say more? Yes. But do I ultimately believe I should play by the rules? Yes," he said. "I think action needs to be taken. We owe it to ourselves, we owe it to the employees, and we owe it to the community to take action in such a way that we can say we looked at what happened, we have learned from that, and we have put in place improved policies to the extent they need to be improved."

Hundreds of pages

Burnett also posted on his website, www.burnettforcarmel.com, more than 500 pages of documents filed with Monterey County Superior Court in connection with Miller's suit. Many of the documents had not previously been widely available.

In one of the documents, dated May 20, 2008, Stamp advised the mayor and city council of Miller's complaints. He demanded Miller be placed on paid administrative leave with full benefits and that Guillen be "removed from his role as supervisor of city employees." He also told the mayor and council Guillen favored certain employees, had turned against Miller and was trying to eliminate her job, was a profligate spender of city funds, and had "unchecked power over the lives, salaries and personal lives of city employees." He said Guillen's actions constituted retaliation, genderbased discrimination and harassment, as well as age-based discrimination.

Three days later, in response, Guillen sent a letter to Miller's Pacific Grove residence saying he would not place her on paid leave. She had taken sick leave for what Stamp said was "work-related stress and depression," on May 21, but he demanded she return to work. Two months later, Stamp sent a letter reiterating the allegations and the noting the city's apparent lack of response. He included a statement from Miller describing Guillen's alleged behavior, including his hugging her when she was on the phone in her office and tousling her hair, as well as calling her "Beautiful" or "Hottie," and sending after-hours emails deriding the council and mayor, and soliciting personal information.

launched into her complaints in 2008. Danville-based investigator Karen Kramer was hired by the Liebert, Cassidy, Whitmore law firm on behalf of the city, and after Stamp asked a litany of questions about the goals, mission, planned handling and confidentiality of the investigation, and did not receive the responses he wanted, Miller decided not to consent to Kramer's interview.

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In February 2009, Kramer concluded her investigation, which involved interviewing a dozen city workers. While most of the five-page letter on Burnett's website is redacted, because it deals with private employee matters, it stated, "Based on Ms. Kramer's findings and conclusions, the city has determined that Ms. Miller's allegations are not substantiated. Accordingly, this investigation is now closed and deemed complete.'

Four months later, she filed her lawsuit.



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An 'intimidated' HR manager

"I regret not directly confronting him about his inappropriate behavior, but I did not because I was intimidated, afraid to lose my job, and well aware of the absolute power in the work place and in city government," Miller wrote in her October 2008 statement. While the alleged discriminatory and abusive behavior was under way, she did not contact any other city officials about them, according to sources familiar with the case. Miller was human resources manager at the time

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



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'Poet Laureate of Cars' turns classic Alfa Romeo into Concours poster

RTIST HAROLD Cleworth had painted many commissions before, but never one without a subject.

Cleworth, who designed the official poster for this year's Pebble Beach Concours d'Elegance, was asked by the event's organizers to create a striking image of a 1934 Alfa Romeo 8c Monza. But painting the Alfa Romeo presented an unusual challenge for Cleworth because when he was ready to get started on the piece, the rare car was nothing but a pile of parts.

"The car was dismantled in England and waiting to be restored," explained Cleworth, a native of Great Britain who now lives in Venice, California. "The restoration was just beginning when I started the painting."

Unfortunately, Cleworth had difficulty finding another example of the same car to use as his model. "Very few of them were made and each one is different," he noted.

So Cleworth turned his attention to old photographs.

"It was a big challenge," said the painter, who's been called The Poet Laureate of Cars. "I had to piece it together." Now that the poster has been printed, Cleworth is curious what the Alfa Romeo that inspired it looks like.

"I finished the painting two months ago," observed the artist, whose work is part of the collections of many celebrities, including Jay Leno and Nicolas Cage. "The first time I will actually see the car will be next month."

Cleworth's painting features a red version of the Alfa Romeo parked along the Pebble Beach Golf Links. Behind the car are two other Alfa Romeos and a sweeping view of the coastline south to the Carmel Highlands.

The commission wasn't easy, but Cleworth said it was worth the effort and he's happy with the result.

"The painting went through many changes and revisions," explained the artist, whose original

works have sold for as much as \$100,000. "It was a tough job, but I'm very honored to have been chosen to paint it."

Despite all the hard work, Cleworth can't think of anything he'd rather being doing than paintings vintage cars.

"I found my muse and I haven't

stopped painting yet," he added. "I'm a fortunate man — I love what I do."


Classic Ferrari comes to life on tour poster

This year's tour poster was designed by another Englishman, Barry Rowe, who showcases one of



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






his all-time favorites cars, a 1961 Ferrari 250 GT SWB.

"For me, it's the perfect Ferrari," explained Rowe, who has designed 10 of the past 11 tour posters. "It's so functional and it looks really great. There's nothing superfluous about it."

Rowe is satisfied with his latest creation.

"I've got Bixby Bridge in the background, along with the ocean and lots of pine trees," he added. "It has all the elements of the tour. It's quite a dramatic picture."

Not just pretty pictures

One of the most distinctive pieces of art that will be presented at this year's Automotive Fine Arts Society exhibit during the Pebble Beach Concours d'Elegance will be a sculpture of a black 1957 Ferrari 250TR by Richard Pietruska.

Mounted against five 7-foot high curved steel tubes, the Ferrari — which is made out of fiberglass and painted black — appears to be floating in space.

"The Testa Rossa is one of my favorite Ferraris,

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

Celebrating their event's 60th anniversary this year, and the more than \$13 million it has given to charity since its inception, Concours organizers say, "Only the most beautiful and rare cars are invited ... and connoisseurs of art and style flock to see these masterpieces." As with many longtime Monterey Peninsula car events, the P.B. Concours d'Elegance has grown from a casual show by car buffs for car buffs into what is arguably the world's best Concours in the most gorgeous setting. 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How to win 'Best of Show' at the Pebble Beach Concours

By THE PEBBLE BEACH CONCOURS d'ELEGANCE

HE JUDGING process at the Pebble Beach Concours d'Elegance seeks to recognize and properly preserve the great automobiles of the world. This process is two-fold: Class Judges focus primarily on originality and authenticity, while Honorary Judges direct their attention to design, styling and elegance.

To be eligible to win Best of Show at Pebble Beach — the event's top award — a car must first win its class.

"By placing this emphasis on originality and authenticity in class competition, the Pebble Beach Concours strives to make a significant contribution to the proper preservation of automotive history," says Ed Gilbertson, Pebble Beach Concours Chief Judge since 1999.

Teams of Honorary Judges, overseen by Chief Honorary Judge Glenn Mounger, undertake the more subjective task of rating cars for their design, styling and elegance, and determine the winners of many additional special awards apart from the class competition and Best of Show.

Best of Show ballots are provided to the Chairman, the Chief Judge, the Chief Honorary Judge, each Chief Class Judge, each Honorary Judge team leader, and select Class Judges. These individuals observe the First in Class cars as they cross the winner's ramp to receive their class awards, and they also examine these cars in the winner's circle. Each of these individuals independently selects his or her choice for Best of Show and then discretely marks the ballot and drops it in the slotted Best of Show voting box on the presentation ramp. The car with the most votes is named Best of Show. Since 2006, the final Best of Show Nominees have also been announced.

First, Second and Third in Class winners are selected by our Class Judges based on originality, authenticity, and proper and excellent preservation or restoration. Special Awards are generally selected by special committees of Honorary Judges.

Four Elegance Awards are made for styling, design and presentation:

■ J.B. & Dorothy Nethercutt Most Elegant Closed Car is awarded to the most elegant closed car present. The Nethercutts won the top award, Best of Show, a record-setting six times, establishing the standards of authenticity and quality to which all Concours entrants now aspire.

■ Gwenn Graham Most Elegant Convertible is awarded to the most elegant convertible present. Graham was involved in founding the Pebble Beach Concours d'Elegance.

■ Most Elegant Open Car is awarded to the most elegant open car present. An open car has no windows, though it may have side curtains, as compared to a convertible car, which generally has roll-up windows.

■ Strother MacMinn Most Elegant Sports Car is awarded to the most elegant sports car present. MacMinn was a respected automotive designer, instructor, and historian who served for years as Chief Honorary Judge of this Concours.

Additional Special Awards are as follows: ■ Alec Ulmann Trophy is awarded to the most exciting Hispano-Suiza present. Ulmann founded the Sebring races and was an important contributor to the hobby and to the P.B. Concours. Ansel Adams Award goes to the most desirable touring car of its era. The well known photographer served often as an Honorary Judge at this Concours. Art Center College of Design Award goes to the car that showed the best use of new technology in its era, has groundbreaking style engineering, and is considered to have had the greatest impact on car design today. **Briggs Cunningham Trophy** is awarded to the most exciting open car present. Cunningham was a great American sportsman and automobile constructor and collector. Chairman's Trophy is awarded to the most deserving car present as selected by the Chairman. Charles A. Chayne Trophy is awarded to the car with the most advanced engineering of its era. Chayne, a former General Motors Vice President of Engineering, was a great supporter of the P.B. Concours.

■ Classic Car Club of America Trophy is awarded to the most significant classic car present.

■ Dean Batchelor Trophy is awarded to the most significant hot rod present. Batchelor was a noted auto writer and historian who served for years as an Honorary Judges.

■ Elegance in Motion Trophy is awarded to the car deemed to be most elegant in motion. To qualify for this award, a car must have successfully completed the Pebble Beach Tour d'Elegance.

Enzo Ferrari Trophy is awarded to the best Ferrari present. The Trophy is named for the Maestro himself.


■ FIVA Awards go to the best preserved and regularly driven prewar and postwar cars as determined by a special committee guided by FIVA regulations.

■ The French Cup is awarded to the most significant car of French origin.

Gran Turismo Trophy is awarded to the car that most deserves to be recreated for the Gran Turismo series.



■ Lorin Tryon Trophy recognizes an automotive enthusiast who has contributed significantly to the Pebble Beach Concours d'Elegance. Tryon served as the P.B. event's Co-Chairman for nearly three decades; his passion and expertise drew the most elegant cars to Pebble Beach year after year.

■ Lucius Beebe Trophy is awarded to the Rolls-Royce considered most in the tradition of Lucius Beebe, a bon vivant who served among our early judges.

■ Mercedes-Benz Star of Excellence Award goes to the most significant Mercedes-Benz present.

■ Mille Miglia Trophy is awarded to the most significant car eligible to participate in the Mille Miglia.

■ Montagu of Beaulieu Trophy is awarded to the most significant car present of British origin.

■ People's Choice Award Presented by MSN Autos goes to an automobile chosen by a tally of votes cast online by individuals prior to the Concours.

■ The Phil Hill Cup is awarded to a significant race car. Hill, a World Drivers Champion and a respected restorer, won the Pebble Beach Concours d'Elegance and the Pebble Beach Road Races on multiple occasions.

Road & Track Trophy is awarded to the car that the editors of that magazine would most like to drive.

■ Tony Hulman Trophy is awarded to the most significant open wheel race car present. Hulman owned the Indianapolis Motor Speedway for decades, and the Indianapolis 500 often started with his command, "Gentlemen, Start Your Engines."



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
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


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
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
