LAST WEEK, Cal Am asked the government for permission to spend \$49 million of ratepayer money to remove San Clemente Dam.

A week before that, the Sierra Club filed a lawsuit to stop a \$300 million hotel project in Sand

A desal plant in Marina will cost at least \$250 million. And millions of dollars more have been spent on various habitat projects in Carmel Valley.

All those Herculean efforts and impressive outlays of public funds are to protect the steelhead trout.

At Carmel restaurant La Bicyclette, however, steelhead is the menu. Price: \$17.

'It's a great fish," La Bicyclette chef John Cox told The Cone. "It has everything I like about salmon, but it has a more delicate flavor."

For lunch this week, Cox pan-seared the steelhead and served it with garden vegetables and green salad. For dinner, the steelhead was prepared with an avocado purée and a chilled salad of heirloom tomatoes and trail of tears beans.

We try to keep the flavors very mild, so it complements the fish," he explained.



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Art & Film Fest add venues, events

AFTER MAKING a splash in its debut last year, the Carmel Art & Film Festival is taking an even bigger plunge this year.

"Last year, we held just about all our events at Sunset Center," observed Tom Burns, director of the festival. "We've added a number of different venues this year. We've got some phenomenal films, and there will be tons of things to do. If you are an art buff or a film buff, you're going to be in heaven."

The list of venues hosting festival events includes the Golden Bough Theater, the Carmel Youth Center and Carmel Plaza. But the award for the festival's most interesting venue goes to the City of Carmel, which is permitting Burns and Co. to screen films in its city council chambers.

"I said to [city administrator] Rich Guillen, 'I'd love to use the city council chambers for the festi-val,"" Burns recalled. "In response, Rich said, 'That's a great idea. We're going to make that work."

The centerpiece of the festival is the screening of about 70 films. While most are domestic productions, the festival will also feature movies from Australia, New Zealand, Canada, France and Austria. Festival volunteers screened hundreds of submissions before settling on a a final lineup.

THE CASE of two men accused of driving drunk and killing a Big Sur teenager on Highway 1 more than two years ago has been delayed, again - until next year. The compli-

cated matter had been put off several times, as attorneys prepared for trial and contended with busy schedules, but all three lawyers were finally ready to go when they met with Monterey County Superior Court Judge Terrance Duncan Sept. 23, according to deputy district attorney Doug Matheson.

Unfortunately, a busy court schedule, an impending move from temporary buildings back to permanent courtrooms, the judge's vacation, the holiday season and other factors necessitated rescheduling the trial - which was supposed to have begun Monday — to February of next year.

By then, it will have been two-and-a-half years since 17year-old Rachel Wiesjahn died on Aug. 28, 2008, around 2 a.m. She had been riding in the SUV driven by an allegedly intoxicated Christopher Tindall, who lost control of it on southbound Highway 1 after leaving a Big Sur bar, causing the vehicle to turn on its side in the middle of the road.

After the accident, according to authorities, Tindall fled, leaving behind his Chevy and his two passengers, a 26-yearold man and Wiesjahn. Moments later, Mark Hudson, also allegedly drunk behind the wheel of a Ford pickup, crashed into the Chevy. Hudson also reportedly fled the scene, with the help of another man.

Tindall turned himself in later that morning, and Hudson was arrested at the hospital, where he had gone for treatment many hours after the wreck. They are accused of vehicular

New solutions sought for crowding at River School

A FLOOD of new kids enrolled at Carmel River School this year, and administrators are wondering how to handle the influx. While principal Jay Marden continues to have confidence in the first-rate education his students are receiving despite enrollment reaching an all-time high of 506 kids, he said the Carmel Unified School District must develop a long-term strategy for contending with the growing population at the popular elementary school. The CUSD Board of Education is tentatively set to discuss solutions Oct. 6.

"I feel strongly that our district has to act," said Marden, who saw enrollment rise to 460 students in the 2008/2009 school year and then to 480 kids last year. When the issue first arose in February 2009, the rising number threatened

A SAN Francisco lawyer who stayed at a Carmel hotel in August is suing the business after bumping his head on a door frame, according to documents.

In a lawsuit filed Sept. 21 in Monterey County Superior Court by attorney Jacob P. Alpren — who is representing himself — Alpren targets the historic Lamp Lighter Inn & Sunset Suites on Ocean Avenue and Camino Real.

According to the suit, Alpren and his family checked into the Lamp Lighter Aug. 1. That night, Alpren went to the inn's office to "order breakfast for the following morning."

However, Alpren apparently had a mishap before entering the office.

'The door height to the office was no more than 5 feet 8 inches," according to the lawsuit. Alpren "did not notice the unusually low clearance and cracked his head against the top

Marine scientist takes students to an undersea dormitory

AFTER A while, swimming seems natural while walking is foreign, it's difficult to conceive of a meal that doesn't involve reconstituting freeze-dried food in hot water, and the personalities of individual fish begin to emerge.

That's just part of life in the Aquarius Undersea Laboratory, the world's only underwater research station located on the ocean floor in the Florida Keys, according to Carmel resident James Lindholm, Ph.D, a professor of marine science and policy who will leave next week for his fifth mission in the lab.

Lindholm, who is also the director of the Institute for Applied Marine Ecology at California State University Monterey Bay, is working with the National Marine Sanctuary Program and will take three CSUMB students to help study the "social foraging of coral reef fishes and its role in maintaining biological diversity." He dubbed his mission, "If Reefs Could Talk."

They will train Oct. 4-9, mostly on how to deal with emergencies while living underwater, since a person's body becomes saturated with nitrogen at such depths and requires 12 hours to surface safely. Then he and graduate student Jessica Watson will head to the station 60 feet below for their Oct. 12-21 undersea mission, while grad student Chelsea Parrish-Kuhn and undergraduate student Alexandra Davis will remain on the surface to collect data during dives in other areas.

Lindholm, who embarked on his first Aquarius mission in 2001 — and was underwater when terrorists struck on Sept. 11 — undertook subsequent research trips there in 2002, 2005 and 2008. He described the lab as a tube roughly the size of the International Space Station, 49 feet long and 19 feet in diameter, with six people inside at a time.





Battle between gallery and artist heads to court

IN THE latest round of a legal dispute between a Carmel Gallery owner and a Los Altos artist, Carlos Porras of Canapo Art Gallery sued Gilbert Marosi Sept. 24 in Monterey County Superior Court.

The suit alleges that statements made by Marosi to Carmel Police Department, Carmel Mayor Sue McCloud and the Monterey County District Attorney's Office were "false and defamatory" and harmed the Carmel gallery owner's reputation. In particular, the lawsuit singles out Marosi's repeated usage of the word, "scam," when describing Porras' business activities.

The complaint also charges that Marosi made "false and defamatory" comments that were posted on the City Search website, further damaging Porras's reputation. He is seeking \$78,000 in damages

Porras claims in the lawsuit that Marosi owes him two portraits the artist created of the Carmel gallery owner. In the suit, he said the portraits are worth \$8,000.

Marosi, meanwhile, sued Porras in February for \$2,500, the amount he claims he is owned for two paintings sold by Canapo Gallery.

Porras does not deny that he owes the artist \$2,500. Instead, he is refusing to pay the commission until the artist gives him the two portraits. Marosi admitted painting the portraits, but he insisted he created them as gifts.

Marosi has repeatedly complained about Porras to police and the district attorney's office. Despite his efforts, the district attorney's office has never filed any charges against Porras.

Two other artists — Angela Gomez-Rubio of Clear Lake and Hugo Lecaros of Sunnyvale — have taken Porras to court over what they say was his failure to pay commissions on their work. Also, former Carmel gallery owner Don Becker of Las Vegas — who alleged fraud and won a judgment against Porras 11 years ago — is still waiting to get paid.

Hikers rescued from Arroyo Seco gorge

FOUR LOST hikers were rescued from the Arroyo Seco River gorge Monday, Sept. 27, more than 24 hours after embarking on a day trip up the canyon.

A California Highway Patrol helicopter spotted the hikers just before darkness set in. They were found about three miles up the river.

"They were sore, tired and hungry," said Sgt. Joe Moses of the sheriff's search and rescue team. "They hadn't planned on staying out all night, and they had all their supplies back in the parking lot."

Glow-in-the-dark creatures, new leadership brighten up museum

TO HELP illuminate its recent reorganization and makeover, the Pacific Grove Museum of Natural History is turning to a little known but dazzling source of light.

On Saturday, Oct. 2, the museum unveils "Glow: Living Lights," an exhibit that may be its most ambitious to date. The display focuses attention on some of the earth's most remarkable creatures — animals that create their own light.

The multimedia exhibit — presented in a darkened gallery - will offer visitors an opportunity to learn about "bioluminescence," a chemical reaction that occurs in a variety of organisms, including deep-sea fish, insects and even fungi.

The display is curated by two of the world's leading authorities on the subject, Dr. Edith W. Widder and Dr. James F. Case. The exhibit debuted in 2003 and has since been presented in more than 30 cities.

"You walk in, and it will be a total sensory experience," explained Lori Mannel, executive director of the museum. "The exhibit is layered so a child can enjoy it, yet an adult can explore another level of information. It engages the public on a very rich level."

While few terrestrial animals - like lightning bugs - can produce light, the ability is surprisingly common among sea creatures, particularly those that live at greater depths. Some, like the viper fish, use light to attract their prey. Others, like deep-sea shrimp, use light to confuse their predators. Bioluminescent creatures exist in the Monterey Submarine Canyon, and this exhibit brings these mysterious animals to life.

"This exhibit meets our vision of turning the museum into a field guide for the Central

Coast," Mannel said. "I am so excited about it."

In addition to presenting a fascinating subject, the exhibit aims to showcase the museum's reorganization and makeover, which began when the City of Pacific Grove turned over management of the facility in April 2009 to the Museum Foundation of Pacific Grove.

Since Mannel took over as executive director last year, the museum staff and its board of directors have focused their efforts on increasing the museum's visibility among students, visitors and potential benefactors.


"I want to put this museum back on the map," explained Jason

Burnett, a Carmel City Councilman who serves as president of the museum's board of directors. "I want to give people a reason to come back more often than once a generation or even once a year. This exhibit does that. It makes the museum a destination."

According to Mannel, attendance at the library is up 49 percent since the new leadership took over, and the museum's budget has grown from \$150,000 a year to more than \$500,000 annually.

And, while presenting ambitious exhibits like "Glow: Living Lights" is expensive, Burnett said the museum is in better shape financially than it was a year ago.

"Previously, the museum was funded almost entirely by the city," he noted. "But

A deep sea shrimp creates a bioluminescent cloud to confuse a predator. Other deep sea creatures create light to lure prey.


> the economic downturn forced the city to cut back."

By ramping up its fundraising efforts, the library is now depending less on the city's backing and more on an expanding array of revenue sources like grants, private donations, a membership program and the generosity of its board of directors.

"As any financial advisor will tell you,

you want to have a diversified portfolio," Burnett added. "That's what we set out to achieve."

The museum, which is located at 165 Forest Ave., will host a reception at 5 p.m. The exhibit continues through Jan. 2, 2011. Admission is free, although a donation is suggested. For more information, call (831) 648-5716 or visit www.pgmuseum.org.



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GARDEN CLUB STARTS OVER WITH RENOVATED LIBRARY GARDEN

AFTER COMPLAINTS that the landscaped area in front of Harrison Memorial Library didn't look like much of a garden — especially when pine needles covered the lowgrowing plants that made up a lot of it — the Carmel-by-the-Sea Garden Club is giving it a makeover. Using money raised for its community garden projects, the club redesigned the garden it renovated just three years ago and hired a contractor to do the work, which started in mid-September.

"Over a period of two years, we got a lot of negative comments, so we decided we really needed to tackle it, and not just piecemeal, but do the whole thing," said Clay McGuire, chair of the committee overseeing the redesign. "We are



keeping, reusing and repeating the stuff that did well, but we want to make it have more of a wow factor."

The club asked landscape designers Marion Weaver and Tom Deverle to take on the task of updating the library grounds, which are at Ocean and Lincoln.

"We felt it wasn't as gardenny as we'd like. We're going to have a little grassy area, a dry creek bed with iris, the ceanothus with bright blue that does so well, and more flowers," McGuire said. "It will be more colorful and more lush — although within the bounds of what does well in a very water-conscious area. We're hoping for interest all year round."

The old sprinkler system caused problems, so a new irrigation system is being installed. It will include a rain sensor to prevent the garden from being watered when rainfall is sufficient.

"The spot is so prominent in the city, it should be state-of-the-art in water conservation," she explained.

Doris Mitchell of Better Gardens is doing the work and is trying to procure as many plants as possible from local sources, according to McGuire.

The club is also installing display boards showing the plans, so passersby will know what's growing there and can use that information when selecting plants for their own gardens. The front desks at the main library and the Park Branch up the street at Mission and Sixth will have copies as well.

McGuire said Mitchell will care for the garden during the

first few months, to make sure the plants don't die.

"And then the garden club will take over, like we do at Piccadilly Park," she said.

All the design work, materials and maintenance are being paid for with money the Carmel-by-the-Sea Garden Club has raised during the past several years for the very purpose of taking care of public gardens in the city.

New recreation trail unveiled at ceremony

THE CARMEL Hill and River Bicycle Trail - which travels from the Carmel River to just north of Carmel Valley Road and includes a underpass - was dedicated Thursday, Sept. 23, in a ceremony along the path.

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"It's open for business," said Todd Muck, who serves as project manager for the Transportation Agency Monterey County.

TAMC recently completed the stretch of the trail that travels from Carmel Valley Road to Rio Road. The project, which was started in March and cost federal taxpayers \$1.2 million, was paid for with Department of Transportation funds designated for transportation "enhancements."

The Big Sur Land Trust, meanwhile, finished construction several months ago on a section of the path that runs from Rio Road to the river.

The trail aims to provide a safe route between schools, residential areas, parks and local shopping facilities. The path is part of a larger Carmel River Parkway project, which the BSLT has designed to in an extensive network of trails in Carmel and Carmel Valley.

The ceremony featured a variety of speakers, including 5th District Supervisor Dave Potter, Big Sur Land Trust executive director Bill Leahy, state parks sector superintendent Dana Jones, Monterey Peninsula Regional Park District board member Ben Post and Cynthia Buhl, general manager of the Crossroads shopping center.

m M}$ IKE GOULIAN is so at home in his airplane, he can claim flying death-defying stunts is second nature.

But he doesn't necessarily want it to look that way. When he pilots his Extra 300 SC through a 12-minute routine above the crowd at Salinas Municipal Airport during this weekend's California International Airshow, he wants to captivate his audience.

"We make no bones about it: We want to make a rock show in the sky, and we want everybody to stand up and cheer when it's over," he told

followed, and he was a threetime member of the U.S. Aerobatic Team at the Unlimited Level. In 2006, he joined the Red Bull Air Race as Team No. 99 and won the Budapest race last year. He also took highly regarded showmanship awards in 2006 and 2009.

"I don't know if you choose aviation as much as aviation chooses you," he said. "It's like any endeavor that has a lot of passion, not a lot of money and a lot of danger: Do you really want to jump off of this cliff? I'm not sure I really had a choice of doing anything else."

Intensely competitive, Goulian was playing hockey with his brother as soon as they could walk and took up golf which remains another passion of his - at 9. When the brothers were around 14 years old, they went to work for their father at the flight school, handling tasks like washing airplanes, so they would learn the value of a buck.

There, Goulian turned his competitive eye toward being a pilot.

"Anything in life that I've tried to do, I've tried to do it absolutely well," he said. "I either want to be a scratch golfer, or I don't want to do it at all. It's the same with flying."



He learned quickly and studied hard in Florida at one of the nation's half-dozen specialized flight training schools.

"Competition aerobatic flying is similar to ice skating, where you have a specific set of maneuvers being watched by judges from the ground," he said. Over the course of a dozen years, "that makes you an incredible aviator."

He worked with a coach who critiqued every move, communicating with Goulian via radio as he flew.

"What you see from the airplane looks very different to someone on the ground," he explained. "You always think you're a rockstar when you're in the plane."

After thousands of flights and 5,000 hours in the air and practicing every day, flying has become natural for Goulian. He and his crew plan his routines, drawing from a catalog of skillful maneuvers he has honed during his years as a pilot, and he practices — a lot.

"A lot of it is mental, and that will go away in a week, so you have to do it every day," he said.

That allows him to make sure his flying is exhilarating to watch and spot-on accurate. Among Goulian's favorite maneuvers are those that involve tumbling nose over tail, then stopping in midair.

'The airplane will hang there," he said, until he turns on the smoke, the music starts again and he heads into a dive.

Why Salinas is tops

Goulian arrived in town last weekend and spent a few days golfing with fellow aerobatic star Sean Tucker at Spanish Bay, Tehama and Spyglass Hill, which he called an "airshow pilot's golf course," because "you can stand up there and hit it like a big boy."

He's also been practicing and surveying the airport grounds. "Salinas is not a very easy place to fly," he said.

But he loves the show and said it's a favorite among aerobatic pilots for its well organized implementation, friendly staff and volunteers, eager spectators and welcoming community. This year is the California International Airshow's 30th, and it's celebrating giving more than \$7 million to local nonprofits since its inception.

"If you have it on your calendar as an airshow performer, it will be one of the highlights of the season, not because of the size or the number of people who attend, but because of who the people are," he said, mentioning media coordinator

Julie Ann Lozano and executive director Harry Wardwell.

"This is a show that's as organized as any in the country, and they're just amazingly good at what they do," said Goulian, who flies in 18 shows per year. "No. 1, it's an honor, and No. 2, it's a joy to come here."

He also praised organizers' ability to mix up the show every year to keep people interested, and their efforts to get the community involved.

"You come here, and there are Salinas Airshow signs on

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Reggie Jackson sues employee over misappropriated funds

In a Sept. 16 lawsuit, Jackson accuses Frank Perry, whom he hired to help run his businesses - 44 Dotcom LLC and www.reggiejackson.com - of breach of fiduciary duty, breach of contract and conversion. Jackson also alleges Perry refused to return a \$5,000 Rolex watch and didn't repay a \$20,000 cash loan.

The baseball legend hired Perry as an

independent contractor to negotiate business deals, keep financial records, operate Jackson's memorabilia business and book personal appearances and engagements, including autograph signings.

Jackson contends Perry kept him in the dark about elements of the business "thereby ensuring [Perry] would be able to maintain total control of the business operations, to the exclusion of [Jackson], his business office personnel and accountants.'

Perry "refused" to properly maintain business records, and instead provided them on an "incomplete and haphazard basis ...," according to the lawsuit filed in Monterey County Superior Court. Jackson lives in Monterey, where his principal business office is based. He also operates an office in

Costa Mesa.

Jackson maintains Perry decided he was entitled to "a percentage off the top" of the company's revenue.

Perry "placed such cash in a separate bank account(s) that he only controlled, and thereafter accounted for, and paid, only such sums to [Jackson] as Perry determined to be appropriate ...," Jackson alleges.

Perry's actions were "willfully, maliciously, despicably and with the intent to disrupt, control and usurp the business operations ... in wanton disregard of [Jackson's] property rights," the lawsuit says.

Frank Perry could not be reached for comment.

Jackson's lawsuit seeks tens of thousands of dollars in general and punitive damages.

After Jackson fired Perry in May 2009, Jackson alleges Perry took the company's phone system and a computer, "which contained on its hard drive all of the company's written records."

When Jackson requested Perry return the computer, Perry refused, saying the hard drive contained Perry's personal information and "certain photographs to which he believed would violate his privacy if seen by others," the lawsuit says.

"The reasonable value of the hard drive containing information that is vital to [Jackson's] business cannot be calculated," Jackson says in his lawsuit, "and the value far exceeds the cost of a hard drive."

Perry, upon being terminated, had all the phone numbers that had been linked to www.reggiejackson.com transferred to his residence, the lawsuit indicates.

"When demand was made for the release of the phone numbers," Jackson's contends, Perry "refused, claiming that he was the owner" of the numbers.



THE TEENAGER who hosted a party where alcohol was served to high-school students later involved in a serious car crash entered a plea this week to avoid jail.

Christopher "CJ" Veloz pleaded no contest Tuesday in a Salinas courtroom to one misdemeanor count of violating Pacific Grove's municipal code when he hosted a party where alcohol was consumed by minors last February.

Veloz was sentenced by Monterey County Superior Court Judge Efren N. Iglesia to a suspended six-month jail term on

City seeks state \$\$ to fix up beach

THE CITY of Carmel is requesting money from the taxpayer funded California Habitat Conservation Fund to undertake improvements at the beach, according to a city council decision last month.

The work, all of which was outlined in the Del Mar Master Plan approved by the city and the coastal commission earlier this year, includes a 1,300-foot ADA-compliant pedestrian pathway along San Antonio Avenue from Fourth Avenue to Ocean Avenue, a 600-foot boardwalk and staircase for beach access at Fourth Avenue to the sand at the north end of the beach, a 200-foot boardwalk and viewing platform at the foot of Ocean Avenue, and plant restoration and protection of the dunes north of Ocean.

The report prepared by city administrator Rich Guillen for the city council Sept. 14 did not indicate how much money would be requested but said a 50 percent match of city funds will be required.

"Updated cost estimates are needed for each of the projects remaining in the Del Mar plan, and discussions are under way with the Coastal Conservancy for funding portions of the plan," he wrote. "As these proceed, a decision will be made regarding the specific projects to be included in the HCF application."

Without discussion, the council OK'd the grant request as part of the consent agenda at its September meeting.



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the condition he perform 40 hours of community service by Jan. 7, 2011. If Veloz violates the terms, he could be sent to jail.

Veloz, then 19, is alleged to have hosted a party at his Syida Drive home Feb. 21 where former P.G. High School student Aaron Corn and other P.G. High students drank after a high-school basketball game.

After leaving the party, police say a drunken Corn and numerous other teens piled into Veloz's Toyota 4Runner before Corn crashed the SUV in Skyline Forest at about 3:30 a.m.

Teenager Chelsie Hill was paralyzed in the accident. Corn also received serious injuries. Two other teens were also hurt.

'Lapse of judgment'

Pacific Grove city attorney David Laredo brought the charges against Veloz.

"The judge's sentence offers a just end to this part of an unfortunate and continuing tragedy," Laredo told The Pine Cone Tuesday. "We hope this result may dissuade others from taking similar risks."

Corn, who is still in Monterey County Jail, is charged with felony counts of drunken driving, infliction of great bodily injury and auto theft. After a preliminary hearing Aug. 20, Monterey County Superior Court Judge Russell Scott ruled there was enough evidence to try Corn on the charges. Corn faces more than 10 years in prison if convicted of all the charges.

In September 2011, Veloz has the opportunity to request the misdemeanor violation be converted to an infraction as long as he abides by the law during until then.

"We all must recognize that any lapse of judgment, however momentary, can cause good people to contribute to bad consequences," Laredo said.

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

of the door frame, injuring his neck."

Denny LeVett, owner of the Lamp Lighter Inn & Suites, declined to discuss details of Alpren's lawsuit but told The Pine Cone what he thought of it.

"It is so dumb," LeVett said Wednesday. Before Alpren's accident, The Lamp Lighter had a sign posted outside the office warning people of the low clearance, LeVett said


Alpren, who doesn't mention his height in the court documents, is seeking tens of thousands of dollars in damages from the Lamp Lighter. Alpren works for the Pine Street law

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firm, Collette, Erickson, Farmer & O'Neill LLP.

Alpren claims that the day after he hit his head, the office staff told him they were aware of the low clearance and "that guests sometimes hit their heads on the door frame," his suit indicates.

"However, despite its knowledge of this dangerous condition" the Lamp Lighter "deliberately and recklessly chose not to correct it," according to Alpren.

What makes the appearance of steelhead on a Carmel menu unusual is that catching one in the Carmel River could land a renegade angler in prison.

That's because Steelhead in the Carmel River — and other areas in California, Oregon and Washington - are considered "threatened" under the Endangered Species Act.

But La Bicyclette isn't any breaking laws. Steelhead

trout are plentiful in many parts of the world, and the restaurant at Dolores and Seventh gets its steelhead (via FedEx overnight) from a Columbia River supplier. The restaurant received another batch of the fish Wednesday. The Columbia River steelhead are, on average, about twice the size of the local version.

"The Columbia River is especially well monitored," Cox explained. "They have a

Because of the bump, the attorney said he sustained injuries to his neck and "surrounding areas" and has incurred medical and other expenses.

"The injury, which was directly and proximately caused by the low clearance, has significantly restricted [Alpren's] well being and caused him significant physical and mental suffering," according to his suit.

The case is set for a Jan. 21, 2011, hearing in a Monterey courtroom.

few environmental impact plans. And if it looks like the [steelhead] levels are low, they cut the season short."



the in Carmel River, and may pan-seared Steelhead trout -swenteen soon spend hundreds of millions more.

Meanwhile, Cox said La Bicyclette will continue to offer the fish until the season is over. Steelhead has been a very popular dish, and patrons haven't once questioned him about the origin of the fish it offers.

We have [offered steelhead] three times, and we haven't had any resistance to it," he said. "It always sells really well when it's on the menu."



Ninety-nine years after its local debut, 'Twelfth Night' returns to theater

NO PLAY has been staged more often at the Forest Theater than William Shakespeare's "Twelfth Night," so it only seems appropriate that the timeless play will be performed there during the facility's centennial year.

A romantic comedy for the ages, "Twelfth Night" opens Saturday, Oct. 2. The play is the second installment in PacRep Theater's 21st annual Shakespeare Festival. In 1911, it became the first play by Shakespeare to ever be presented at the Forest Theater.

"It's the perfect romantic comedy," explained Stephen Moorer, executive director of PacRep Theater. "It's good for families and audiences of all ages. It's just a whole lot of

Carmel reads The Pine Cone

Chef Shir Chan Huang's superb cuisine attracting full house

NOT MANY successful chef/restaurateurs would sell their businesses to have more time to spend with their children, but that's just what Shir Chan Huang did in 2002.

Justin, now 19, and Crystal, 21, were youngsters then, just entering their teens; their father knew they would benefit from his presence at home, something he had not been able to give

them when they were younger.

Chef Shir Chan, known by his American name, Joe, had worked from early morning until

late at night when he and his wife Kwan owned China Gourmet in Carmel-by-the-Sea. He worked long hours in his secondfloor kitchen at China Gourmet, sending down plate after plate of steaming Chinese food on the dumbwaiter to the ground floor restaurant.

It wasn't only his children who rarely saw him; his customers seldom caught sight of Joe, who was always upstairs in his kitchen domain.

His wife and partner, Kwan Lau, worked as cashier and bookkeeper at the restaurant. Her younger sister, Ling Lau, took care of the two children while both parents worked at the restaurant. Long-ago patrons of China Gourmet, when the Huangs owned it, remember the children visiting the restaurant with their auntie, whom many mistook for their mother.

"I guess they thought I was the children's grandmother," Kwan said, "because they were always with Ling."

In 2002, when the Huangs sold China

Gourmet, they took a four-year hiatus from the restaurant business. Father Joe stayed home and was there for the children, sending them off to school in the morning, being there for them when they returned in the afternoon, cooking dinner for them all. He tended the garden at their Carmel home while the children were at school.

Mom Kwan took advantage of this time to attend classes at Monterey Peninsula College and to work as a bookkeeper at

Benihana in Monterey. Sister Ling, who had previously taken courses at MPC when she was not baby-sitting her niece and nephew, was now

attending the Monterey Institute of International Studies, where she earned two degrees.

Everything went according to plan, and then, with the children being older, an opportunity arose in 2005 they just couldn't pass by.

The commercial space at 429 Alvarado — a few doors down from the State Theater — became available. It had housed other Chinese restaurants over the years. The first Chinese restaurant in Monterey, Fortune Cookie, was at this location for many years. Then it changed hands and was known as Tsingtao, which eventually became Wing's fast food, complete with steam tables.

Then followed months of renovation as they remodeled the restaurant from scratch, getting rid of the steam tables altogether. Four layers of wall paper had to be removed before the dining room could be painted a pleasant shade of yellow. Huang, their family name, means yellow in Chinese. They painted the high ceiling a silvery blue to

Kwan saved a substantial piece of the Fortune Cookie wall paper, which depicted classical scenes of Chinese life. She had it framed to preserve the history of Monterey Chinese restaurants.

- a blend of Grenache, Cinsault, Rolle, Syrah and Mourvedre — to more pricey vineyard-designated bottlings like Garrus, a surprisingly complex and balanced blend of Grenache and Rolle that, in the words of one local Frenchwine aficionado, "drinks like a white Burgundy."

■ Mrs. Delish's Cupcake Boutique (400 Lighthouse Ave., Monterey; www.mrsdelishs.com) served up diminutive cakes topped with candied bacon, among other flavors, and is hoping to make it onto "Cupcake Wars" on the Food Network. Mrs. Delish's also sells at the Monday-afternoon farmers market on Central Avenue in Pacific Grove.

Caraccioli Cellars (www.caracciolicellars.com) pours great local bubbly, including the Brut served during Harvest, and will soon open a tasting room and shop on Dolores Street




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in Carmel. Its wines were made with grapes harvested in 2006 from highly regarded Sleepy Hollow Vineyard, which is owned by Robert Talbott.

■ To adeptly combat the heat, affable Mark Chesebro (www.chesebrowines.com) put the Pinot Noir under the table and poured a lot of his refreshing dry rosé, fruity Sauvignon

Blanc and remarkable Roussanne, all made with grapes grown on vineyards he and his family own. Anyone looking for a good alternative to Chardonnay should definitely consider the Roussanne.

■ Tim Mosblech of the to-beopened-someday Restaurant 1833 in the former Stokes Restaurant in Monterey showed his creative flair with tomato and watermelon gazpacho containing the surprising crunch of Marcona almonds, and rabbit ballotine with pickled fennel radish. You can't help but wonder what his menu will look like when the doors finally open at 500 Hartnell St., the location of CLM's latest venture.


soup to nuts

They completely redid the kitchen and recarpeted the floor of the dining area. Award-winning nature photographs by Joe's brother, Shir, and some by Joe, decorate the walls. There are no lanterns or the usual embellishments found in most Chinese restaurants — with the exception of a bamboo plant near the entrance and an enlarged reproduction of a 1076 poem by Su Tung Po entitled "Thinking of You" which is hung over the door. The last line of the poem reads, "Though far apart, we are still able to share the beauty of the moon together."

From this poem they derived the name of the restaurant -Full Moon — which also signifies peace, family time and prosperity.

The restaurant seats 65 at tables (none of them the traditional round table of most Chinese restaurants) and there are no condiments on the tables, not even soy sauce. When the food comes from the kitchen, it is healthfully seasoned: Very little salt and oil, and no MSG. And brown rice can be substituted for white rice.

Chef Joe's personal favorite of all the dishes on his menu is his spicy Kung Pao chicken, "because it tastes so good."



Few people know how to cook meat better than Monterey's Rob Baker (Me and the Hound, www.meandthehound.com), who is always a sight to behold, with his gigantic portable BBQ rig. He turned out tasty 24-hour apricotwood-smoked Memphis-style pulled pork with "family recipe vinegar sauce" and peppered cole slaw, just one example of what makes him so popular.

The talented and personable chef Matt Bolton (Pacific's Edge, Highlands Inn, www.pacificsedge.com) didn't fail to impress with his delicious pan-seared California white sea bass, roasted Swank Farms white corn, heirloom tomatoes, chanterelle mushrooms and Chardonnay sauce. It's worth the trip to Carmel Highlands to see what else he's up to these days.


Customer all-time favorites include Mandarin chicken, sesame chicken and mu shu pork, according to the chef.

Chef Joe's mastery of Chinese cooking has attracted a loyal following of locals ("some come in three or four times a week," Kwan said), including students from the Defense Language Institute and visitors who discover Full Moon while out for a stroll on Alvarado. They also keep hospitable Nobi Reed busy, taking orders and serving. She has been with the Huangs since their China Gourmet days and was immortalized in Carmelite Roy Gilligan's mystery novel, "Chinese Restaurants Never Serve Breakfast."

Chef Joe, who started out as an electrician in Vietnam, came to the United States with the boat people who fled Communist Vietnam. Not speaking English, he took a job as dishwasher at Chong's in Monterey. But wanting to learn English and become a chef, he went to Hong Kong for some time where he worked in many kitchens, learning the intricacies of cooking dishes from all the regions of China.

Joe and Kwan were married in Hong Kong in 1984 and came to Monterey the following year. They purchased China Gourmet in Carmel in 1989 and ran it successfully until they sold it 13 years later.

"Your main goal is to be out diving as much as possible," he said. Aquarius-based researchers can dive for up to eight hours per day, while divers from the surface only have about four hours in the water.

"And when you're inside, it's kind of tight, so you try to stay out of everybody's way," he said.

Owned and operated by the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Association and the University of North Carolina Wilmington, Aquarius costs \$1.3 million to \$1.5 million annually. NASA frequently uses it, and the fees it pays subsidize other missions, according to Lindholm. Private donations also help, and Lindholm said some of his missions have been partially funded by Walmart and AT&T.

Aquarius has a fivefold mission: scientific research, coral reef and ocean observation, undersea technology development, training, and ocean education and outreach. Since 1994, it has hosted 90 missions that yielded some 300 peerreviewed scientific publications, as well as articles, educational programs and TV spots. It's also home to one of the world's longest running and most detailed coral-reef-monitoring programs.

I'd like to be, under the sea

The days are always very structured, according to Lindholm. They generally include a quick breakfast around 7 a.m., a three-to-four-hour dive, lunch and the transfer of data from divers' tablets, communications with the surface, a nap, another three-hour dive, dinner, more data transfer and the planning of the next day's activities.

"And then we go to sleep and do the whole thing all over again," he said. "It's very regimented, with the goal of being in the water as much as possible. It's invaluable for the scientists to be in that environment continuously for 10 days."

The food is mostly "freeze-dried hiker foods" reconstituted with instant hot water, since the research station contains no refrigerator, microwave or stove.

"NASA uses the Aquarius a lot, so there's always a lot of freeze-dried astronaut food," he added.

After a short while, researchers begin to feel more marine-like, according to Lindholm, since when they are not out in the water, they are peering at sea life through portholes in the walls. "You begin to forget you're a biped," he said. "We start to learn the personalities of individual fishes."

While it's all about collecting scientific data, the undersea journey will also afford a unique opportunity for researchers to tell people, including school kids, what they're doing, as they do it. For the first time, they will broadcast from Aquarius, including live Q&A sessions with the kids in places like Carmel River School, where Lindholm's daughter attends first grade.

The research team will be tweeting, updating Facebook pages, writing blogs and preparing three broadcasts per day which cuts down on research hours but is well worth it, according to Lindholm.

"With that many broadcasts, there will be thematic broadcasts that highlight the sanctuary program, the marine climate in general, fishing, pollution, climate change and other marine themes," he said. They will be sent to primary and

secondary schools all over the country in English and Spanish. Aquarius also has live webcams inside and out that people can access online, and Lindholm said he and his research team welcome interest in underwater life and their mission.

"There are lots of avenues to communicate, and we're always interested in fielding questions from the public," he said. (Visit http://aquarius.uncw.edu.)

No shortage of excitement

His past experiences as an "aquanaut" aboard the Aquarius have taught Lindholm to anticipate the unexpected and rely on good training.

In 2001, he and his research team submerged just 15 minutes before the first plane hit the World Trade Center, and they remained underwater for 10 days as the nation 60 feet above their heads panicked and mourned.

"We had Internet and cell phone down there, but no TV, so it was quite an experience," he said, adding that they obtained much of their information from a tiny MSN popup window on the computer screen.

During a mission the following year, he and his diving buddy refilled their tanks at an underwater way station and discovered they were breathing bad air.

"We started swimming back, and we started feeling really terrible. The air tasted like shoe polish," he said. They swam back to the way station, which was completely contaminated, and sounded the alarm.

"I'm certain that had we tried to swim back to the Aquarius, we never would have made it," he said. Crew members at the Aquarius called the other team of scientists in from their dive, refilled their tanks and sent them out to res-



them the whole way, as the darkness of night fell. "Nobody panicked, and we did exactly what we were trained to do, and it worked

perfectly.' They never discovered the source of the foul air.


On another occasion, Lindholm and the team were left in the station to weather a tropical storm, since it would take too much time to bring them up from the deep.

"We couldn't leave the

habitat, and the waves were big enough that every time one passed over, our ears popped - every two seconds," he said, because the troughs in the waves changed the depth of the water dramatically, affecting the pressure in the research station.

But tolerating such discomfort had its reward. During the next day's dive, Lindholm observed fish behaving in ways he hadn't seen before and hasn't witnessed since.

"I saw species that normally swim alone or in pairs swimming in thousands," he said. "Something about the storm changed their behavior, and I never would have known that."

America's decline

IF HAPPINESS is determined by the gap between expectations and reality, the people of China must be a lot happier these days than the people of the USA.

That's because, while the average Chinese is much poorer than the average American, millions of people on this side of the Pacific Ocean have seen their personal prospects — net worth, income or even the ability to find a job — decline far below what they expected just a couple of years ago, while many of the people of China are seeing their lifestyles improve in ways that were unimaginable in the recent past.

This is true despite the fact that America's economy is largely market based, while China's is strictly managed by the government. Based on 10,000 other examples of economies in world history, we should be prospering while China stagnates. How to explain the fact that the opposite is true?

In our case, the present, long-lasting economic decline was caused in major part by the hubris and overconfidence of earlier success. Because our national wealth grew so much in the post-World War II era, entire generations of Americans grew up thinking they had it made and wouldn't even have to work very hard to have bestowed upon them a generous, middle-class lifestyle. By the mid-1970s, even workers with high-school educations and blue-collar jobs expected to live in impressive houses on big suburban lots with plenty of luxuries to fill them and two cars (at least) in the driveways. Oh, and the house always had to increase in value. And you could take the family on a nice vacation every year. And you were practically entitled to live a long, healthy life and die a painless, peaceful death after a lifetime of topnotch medical care you did not pay for.

Meanwhile, our political leaders, with oceans of tax dollars constantly pouring into Washington and the state capitals, invented all sorts of government programs to spend them on.

But as wealth grew, productivity in many parts of the economy declined. Furthermore, the continued growth in the overall economy was fueled with borrowed money — a phenomenon that has a natural limit, as we have now seen in the collapse of real estate values.

On the other side of the world, the Chinese Communist leader Mao Tse Tung, who died in 1976 after 27 years as dictator of China, was so fanatical, so murderous and so callous that when he died, he left behind a country that was desperately poor, with life expectancies far below those in the West and where workers toiled long hours for minuscule wages. In the early 1970s, the average Chinese lived in a cramped dwelling with several generations under one roof, had very little education, few material possessions, zero chance of seeing Paris or San Francisco, and didn't expect things to improve.

But, like Americans of a few generations before, the Chinese people were also intelligent, hardworking and ambitious. And in China, these latter two traits were enhanced because the people were so poor. So when the bizarre strictures of Communist ideology began to be lifted, and the people's ambitions were unleashed, the nation of China experienced an explosion of productivity that has turned that nation into the world's factory, not only for trinkets and knockoffs, but for products that require highly refined engineering and manufacturing (such as iPads, made in Shenzhen), and others that require industrialization on a large scale. The new Bay Bridge connecting San Francisco and Oakland, for example, is largely being fabricated in Shanghai. If California gets high-speed rail, it will also probably be built by a Chinese company. Today, many Chinese people expect to have cell phones, nice places to live and the opportunity to see the world, and their wealth is increasing every year.

These trends — one nation's prospects going up, while another's decline — may narrow or even be reversed in the decades to come. As Chinese wages increase, some of their manufacturing will move to other cheap labor countries, such as Cambodia and India. And, more importantly, American workers are learning that wealth requires productivity and doesn't magically come from entitlements or borrowing. The government, too, is realizing that tax revenues don't appear out of nowhere, and that a successful private economy is essential to fulfilling the ambitions of even the most ardent tax-and-spend Democrat. With the slowdown dragging on and on, those lessons can't be learned too soon.

Recently our beautiful neighborhoods were littered by thousands of garbage/recycle/vard waste bins as a result of a policy imposed on rural Carmel and Big Sur residents by the Monterey County Environmental Health Department. Dozens of rented U-Haul trucks, staffed with 3 to 4 workers each, taking days to complete rounds, delivered three bins each to residents in these areas. The bins were left everywhere ... at properties whose owners are deceased, to residents who cannot use these bins because they are too big to transport in their cars some 15 miles to designated pick-up locations, to properties that are not developed or vacant, and to residents who are extremely proactive in composting, recy-

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cling in town and burning their own yard waste, thereby never needing this service. This mandatory garbage policy will also mean that there will now be oversized vehicles driving through our dangerous, delicate canyons that can be impassable due to landslides, fallen trees and eroded road conditions. Their plans to have Waste Management drive these newly created routes are not only hazardous to these environmentally sensitive habitats (the very thing that this agency was created to protect) but a noise and air pollution issue, and a real danger to the lives of those driving waste vehicles. There are no safe turn-arounds for trucks of this size if they encounter one of these natural unsafe road conditions.

If you were negatively affected by this mandatory garbage policy, contact Monterey County Environmental Health (831) 755-4579 and ask for an exemption application. They have graciously opted to waive the \$44 submittal fee, but you will have to resubmit this application each year and pay a \$15 fee. Wow!

manslaughter, felony hit-and-run causing great bodily injury, and other charges, and are set to be tried jointly. Matheson estimated the trial would take two weeks.

He said he and attorneys Frank Dice (who is defending Tindall) and Larry Biegel (who is defending Hudson) expense, were prepared to begin jury selection this week, but during the Sept. 23 meeting with Duncan, they learned another trial was tying up his courtroom for longer than expected.

Meanwhile, all court business — except for urgent matters like criminal arraignments — is being canceled while the courtrooms are being moved back into permanent buildings, starting next week, Matheson said. After that, Duncan is set to go on vacation until Oct. 25, and the lawyers speculated they would have a hard time selecting a jury this week and then telling its members they had to come back for the trial at the end of October.

He said no one is to blame for the delay, "but it's frustrating, most of all for the family."

The hikers parked at Arroyo Seco National Forest Campground, which is located about 20 miles west of Greenfield. From there, they likely followed a gated dirt road that parallels the Arroyo Seco River as it winds its way up the gorge just upstream from the campground. The road — once open to the public but now simply a National Forest hiking trail — provides numerous access points to reach the river, which is a popular summertime destination due to its abundance of swimming holes.

But as the hikers soon discovered, boulder-hopping and swimming down the river — while no doubt fun — is a time-consuming task.

Didn't return home

A search was launched Monday after deputies received a call about a group of hikers that didn't return home. One of the hikers missed a flight, triggering the emergency response.

"He was supposed to fly to Georgia," Sgt. Moses said. "His wife reported him missing."

In addition to the CHP helicopter crew, a CHP ground crew, rescue workers from the sheriff's office and a U.S. Forest Service ranger participated in the effort to find the hikers.

Perry, Jackson said, also recorded a fictitious business name for www.reggiejackson.com in his own name rather than Jackson's name.

Jackson is also seeking \$20,000 in a personal loan he says he gave Perry in four \$5,000 installments from December 2008 to March 2009.

"Perry failed and refused to repay the sum, despite repeated demands," Jackson's suit says.

In 2008, Jackson said he let Perry "borrow" a Rolex watch. After Jackson fired Perry, Jackson said the former worker refused to part with it, telling Jackson he had "given" the watch to him.

A's, Orioles and Yankees

Jackson's website currently has links to dozens of eBay auctions including autographed A's, Orioles and Yankees' jerseys for \$350 a piece, Mr. October-signed baseballs and various black-and-white and color autographed photos.

Jackson also operates the philanthropic nonprofit Mr. October Foundation for Kids, which was founded in 1997 to provide access to computers for kids. According to Jackson's website, the foundation has given more than \$600,000 to schools and other organizations.

the loss of state class-size reduction funds that required a ratio of just over 20 students per teacher. Those tax dollars have since evaporated due to the recession, but if the program returns in 2012/2013 as predicted, River School would have too many kids in each class to qualify.

"Despite that high number — and this isn't a company line — I still feel that class size is healthy," Marden said, with rooms ranging from 21 to 25 students per teacher. "When you look statewide at what other school districts are contending with, we are hearing horror stories of 40 kids in a classroom."

Marden sees the greatest impact on the playground.

"With that many kids in one space, there are going to be issues," he said.

What to do?

One possible solution would be redrawing boundaries in the district to send more children to Tularcitos Elementary School in Carmel Valley Village, a proposal that worried some parents when it was discussed early last year.

"The Tularcitos population has declined — there are empty classrooms there," Marden pointed out.

River could also close its classes to newcomers and bus new students to Tularcitos, or it could send all its transfer students to the Carmel Valley Village school, or it could relocate an entire program, such as kindergarten, according to Marden.

Building more facilities on the River School campus, however, is not a viable option, he said.

Some of its neighbors tend to decry any change at the school, the California Coastal Commission is known more for being obstructionist than for being cooperative, and the campus is too small. "We would have to build up in order to accommodate more kids," he said.

As for why the population at River School spiked so dramatically, Marden speculated the rise in the number of new student is due to a favorable home rental market within the district's boundaries, along with increasingly poor conditions in cash-strapped school districts elsewhere on the Monterey Peninsula.

"People are recognizing the benefits of their kids' attending CUSD and are moving accordingly," he said.

Marden also said he wants the district to devise a long-term solution to the problem, because even more children might come after homes at September Ranch and Rancho Cañada are built, if they are built.

"In the future, we don't know how many kids we may gain through new housing developments," he said. "We know we're going to have to create a plan to address this as a school district."

fireproof, and all would be well. They claimed there is no need to reduce any significant portion of the county's hazardously overgrown vegetation, and no need to maintain existing firebreaks. They urged the board of supervisors to not sign the MCCW-PP.

The board was asked to sign the plan by fire professionals who provide fire prevention and suppression services for almost all of Monterey County, including Cal Fire and the U.S. Forest Service, and by numerous citizens concerned about safety in the event of wildfire. The board chose to defer its decision for 45 days, based on a motion from Dave Potter.
