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Sheriff asks court to throw out art heist lawsuit

THE DEFAMATION lawsuit filed in September by former Pebble Beach residents Ralph Kennaugh and Angelo Amadio against Monterey County Sheriff Mike Kanalakis and Cmdr. Mike Richards is really just an effort to intimidate the sheriff's office and should be thrown out of court right away, according to attorney Neil Shapiro, who has filed a motion to dismiss the suit.

In Sept. 2009, Amadio and Kennaugh announced they were victims of a massive art heist from their P.B. rental home.

But after investigating the alleged theft, the sheriff's department concluded it wasn't real, and in press conferences with reporters, Richards accused the two men — who claimed an estimated \$27 million to \$80 million in art had been stolen — of insurance fraud, and called the alleged heist a "scam" and part of a "criminal enterprise."

On Sept. 30, Kennaugh and Amadio filed a defamation lawsuit against Kanalakis, Richards and Monterey County, claiming the statements tarnished their reputations.

Supervisors okay September Ranch again

■ But developer not ready to celebrate

WILL THIS time be a charm for the September Ranch? For the third time since it was introduced in 1995, the Monterey County Board of Supervisors Tuesday approved Jim Morgens' Carmel Valley project, which aims to build 73 single-family market-rate homes and 22 affordable units, and preserve 891 acres of open space. The ranch's equestrian center, which has long provided a scenic backdrop for motorists traveling on Carmel Valley Road, will remain.

The project was approved by a 3 to 2 vote. Meeting in Salinas, supervisors Fernando Armenta, Lou Calcagno and Simon Salinas supported the development, while supervisors Dave Potter and Jane Parker opposed it.

Morgens was pleased with the vote, but he's in no hurry to

"I'm not drinking Champagne yet," Morgens told The

Pine Cone after the hearing. "I'm feeling pretty good right now, but I've been here twice before."

Morgens' project was last approved by the board of supervisors in 2006, but that permit was overturned by a lawsuit. Meanwhile, in 2008, Monterey County Superior Court Judge Susan Dauphine ruled that the project's EIR wasn't adequate.

The project has been the subject of so much contention in Carmel Valley that it became a focal point of last year's incorporation election debate. So it came as no surprise that passions flared during the public comment portion of Tuesday's hearing.

Rewarding bad behavior?

Activist Patricia Bernardi repeated her assertion that Morgens overwatered his property for years to create an inflated baseline for his water use. She called the lower portion of his property the "Carmel Valley car wash."

"I'm asking you not to reward bad behavior," Bernardi said to the supervisors. "The water issue has never been resolved."

P.G. police sue over pension cuts

PACIFIC GROVE police have made good on a threat to sue the city over a citizen-backed initiative the city council enacted in July that reduces the amount the city contributes to officers' pensions.

In a lawsuit filed Nov. 3, the Pacific Grove Police Officers' Association targets the ordinance, which caps the city's contribution to an employee's pension plan at 10 percent of workers' salaries.

Voters agreed with the council's decision and on Nov. 2 overwhelmingly voted in favor of a measure to amend the city's charter to allow for the ordinance.

The city currently contributes 9 percent for general employees and 19 percent for police officers.

Unconstitutional pension cuts?

The PGPOA's 26-page lawsuit, which names P.G. city manager Tom Frutchey and every city council member, alleges unfair labor practices and asks a judge to find that the council's ordinance is unconstitutional.

"The retirement contribution ordinance exceeds the initiative power of the people and violates the city's charter and is therefore invalid and unenforceable," according to the suit filed in Monterey County Superior Court.

The lawsuit — filed by Sacramento attorney Christopher

COASTAL COMMISSION TRIES HARDER TO SHUT DOWN MINI GOLF COURSE

■ New lawsuit tries to force homeowners to switch to native plants

I HE THREE-HOLE golf course in the front yard of a home on 17 Mile Drive is tiny, but the California Coastal Commission is waging a Titanic battle to have it removed, including a new lawsuit which seeks as much as \$20 million in fines and penalties because Robert and Maureen Feduniak have kept the golf course, including "watering and mowing the turf grass," even after losing an earlier court fight over it.

The mini golf course was built in 1985 and had been in place 15 years when the Feduniaks bought the home at 3145 17 Mile Drive for \$13 million in 2000. At the time, they had no knowledge there was a 1983 conservation easement on the property which required it to be landscaped with native species, court records show.

The buyers didn't know

But just a year after they moved in, a forester with the Del Monte Forest Foundation notified the Feduniaks their mini golf course violated the conservation easement. And a few months later, he also notified the coastal commission, which had limited the landscaping to native plants as a condition of a 1983 permit for the home.

In 2002, the coastal commission issued a "cease and

Judge finds enough evidence for Pollacci trial

THIS LOOKS like it will be an interesting trial."

That's what Monterey County Superior Court Judge Terrance Duncan said Friday after ordering former Pebble Beach resident Tom Pollacci to stand trial on three new felony rape charges.

The judge made the ruling based on testimony from two investigators for the Monterey County District Attorney's Office who summarized what is a very different case than the one that ended in Pollacci being convicted in April and sentenced to eight years in prison for raping an acquaintance inside his family's Pacific Grove liquor store in the spring of 2008

In the earlier case, Pollacci was found guilty of raping Jane Doe 5 after befriending her. But testimony in that trial showed that Jane Doe 5 had nothing more than a neighborly relationship with Pollacci, who lived near her on Treasure Road in Pebble Beach. When she suffered a serious

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
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Supes to P.B. applicant: That's not a caretaker's unit

A HOMEOWNER on 17 Mile Drive won't be able to build a caretaker's unit overlooking the Pebble Beach Golf links because the Monterey County Board of Supervisors didn't believe the building would actually be occupied by a caretaker. The applicant said he needed the unit there to help protect his property.

But supervisors believed he had a different use in mind for the building, and decided it should be located elsewhere.

"I simply don't think this is a caretaker's unit," 5th district supervisor Dave Potter said. "I think this is a guest house in the backyard."

The supervisors voted 5 to 0 to uphold an appeal of the project's approval by the Monterey County Planning Commission. The appeal was filed by William McKiernan, who lives next door to the applicants, Leslie and Idamarie Pelio. The Pelios live at 3346 17 Mile Drive — a home they bought in Sept. 2007 for \$9.2 million.

McKiernan's primary objection to the structure was that it would diminish his view of the golf course. But the Pelios' attorney, John Bridges, insisted he didn't have a case.

"The McKiernan property has a quite spectacular panoramic view," Bridges explained. "If you divert your eyes from the panorama and look through a slot of trees, [the location of] the caretaker's unit becomes visible."

Bridges said the view didn't even exist until last spring. "A 20-foot-high acacia was removed because of storm damage," he continued. "It's a very recent view opportunity and very small in the scheme of the panorama.'

The unit was sited between the Pelios' main house and the golf course for security reasons, Bridges said. "Burglaries more often than not come from the rear of properties," he suggested. "[The Pelios] are entitled to have security at the rear of their property."

Bridges also said the Pelios tried to appease McKiernan by "offering to plant screening trees, but their overture was rejected, so here we are."

In response, McKiernan's attorney Tony Lombardo claimed the unit was never intended to house a caretaker.

Don Gasperson, 80 — fire chief, councilmember, and a gentleman

IN the contentious and sometimes crazy City of Pacific Grove, there was a voice of calmness and reason during the past halfcentury. His name was Donald Thomas Gasperson, and he died Monday morning at the age of 80. The cause of death was cancer, according to his wife of 61 years, Jayne.

Some of Pacific Grove's most venerable citizens agreed that Gasperson — who was Pacific Grove's fire chief from 1962 to 1984, on the city council for 12 years and gave his time to innumerable boards, commissions and charities — was one of their city's finest.

"He was always an absolute gentleman and I was very honored to serve with him," said long-time councilman and mayor Morrie Fisher.

"Don was a great guy and respected by everybody," said Charlie Higuera, owner of Grove Market and a former volunteer fire-

"He was neither anti or pro on almost any issue," said long-time former city manager Gary Bales. "Instead, he would listen and vote on what he thought was best for the citizen-

"I always found Don to be very fair and evenhanded," said businessman Sam Teel. "Maybe that came from his training in dealing with panicky situations as fire chief."

Gasperson was born in 1929 in Lindsay (Tulare County) but moved to Pacific Grove at the age of two months. He attended Robert Down School and Pacific Grove High School and then took classes at Monterey

Peninsula College for two years before joining the P.G. fire department in 1949 — one of just two paid firefighters.

"They'd have 24 hours on and 24 hours off and about 40 volunteers," Jayne Gasperson recalled. "When there was a call, Don would have to wait with the engine on the apron until at least two volunteers showed up."

Gasperson developed a reputation for

meticulous professionalism and was named chief in 1962, emphasizing the latest equipment, increasing the number of paid firefighters, and launching such as Ocean Rescue and mutual aid with neighboring cities. "It seemed like somebody was always trying

to burn down Cannery Row, and it always seemed to be on Thanksgiving," Jayne Gasperson said. As chief, he could be


demanding of his crews. But most of them didn't mind, because he knew

"You could be gentle and run a good ship, too, if you got a lot of respect, like everybody had for him," Higuera said.

"He emphasized fire prevention, and he always wanted to make sure the city had the best fire rating possible," Bales recalled.

After retiring from the fire department in

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

P.G. golf commission: Golfers can still light up on the course

WHILE THE Pacific Grove City Council recently voted to limit the number of areas in the city where people can smoke — including its beaches and parks — the city's golf commission wants to continue to allow golfers to light up when they're on the

On Oct. 27, the Golf Links Advisory Commission voted unanimously to continue to allow golfers the opportunity to smoke at the Pacific Grove Golf Links despite the city council's ban.

The city council voted Oct. 20 to amend the city's municipal code to designate all city parks, open space, and the oceanfront from Sunset to the Monterey border as nonsmoking. But the golf course wasn't included in the ban, and council members Alan Cohen, Bill Kampe and Lisa Bennett voted to allow the golf commission to review the ordinance and come up with its own decision.

Cohen told The Pine Cone this week that if Pacific Grove banned smoking on the golf course, it would be the only course on the Peninsula to do so.

He also said preventing golfers from lighting up on the P.G. course would cause them to play at other Peninsula courses.

"I believe tournament play would drop off as a result, as other courses would be more accommodating," Cohen said.

The city already prohibits smoking in public buildings, such as schools and other public facilities, Lovers Point and El Marie Dyke, an open space area between Sixteenth and Seventeenth streets. The smoking ban does not apply to the few outdoor dining areas in Pacific Grove.

At the Oct. 20 council meeting, mostly those in support of the smoking ban — residents and antismoking advocacy groups addressed the council, citing health concerns and the impact to the marine environment from discarded cigarette butts.

At the council meeting, there were also concerns over whether the police would be able to enforce the law. "Are are we really helping the quality of the air?" asked councilman Ken Cuneo. "Or are we just adding a law that is not enforceable?"

Training clinics and tax breaks

The applicant is also seeking permission to host up to 12 horse training clinics each year. Trainers would stay on the ranch for one to three days, usually on a weekend, to lead horse training exercises for a maximum of 25 participants, who would camp on the

The property is subject to a Williamson Act contract, which enables owners to receive tax breaks if they use their land for agricultural purposes.

A neighbor, Ben Barrera, told The Pine Cone he doesn't believe the applicant should receive those tax breaks because the Williamson Act is intended to provide tax relief for ranchers whose primary occupation is raising cattle — not boarding and training

Barrera said he is also concerned about the amount of manure and urine that would be generated as a result of the new business, which he said would be located close to Canajo Creek.

head injury in a fall at the liquor store on April 21, 2008, and subsequent tests showed she had Pollacci's semen inside her, the jury convicted him based on Jane Doe 5's testimony that she never would have consented to sex with Pollacci, supported by testimony from several other women who said Pollacci had raped them over the last 30 years. In the most notorious case, a prim woman in her mid-40s told a rapt courtroom of being kidnapped from her home near Carmel High School and then raped by Pollacci on the banks of the Carmel River. The crime happened when she was 16, she said. Her story seemed beyond reproach, but the assault happened too long ago to be prosecuted.

However, during the trial of Pollacci for raping Jane Doe 5, two additional women came forward with stories of being raped by him recently.

■ Jane Doe 1 met Pollacci at Ron's Liquors in April 2007, according to testimony last week by an investigator for the Monterey County District Attorney's Office, Adam Sepagan, under questioning by Deputy District Attorney Michael Breeden.

While walking her dog, Jane Doe 1 went into the liquor store where Pollacci was working and was "immediately attracted" to him, Sepagan said. In fact, she had sex with him in the restroom at the liquor store that very morning, and then made plans to see him for "drinks and dinner" the same evening, Sepagan said, recounting an interview with Jane Doe 1 in 2009.

But things went awry during the date, Sepagan said. Pollacci picked up Jane Doe 1 at her home, and after three hours driving around the Peninsula in a pouring rain and listening to music in Pollacci's car, he took her to a parking lot on the far side of Monterey Peninsula airport, where Pollaci's father, Ron, had stored an RV.

"They sat at a dining area in the RV, and she described them kissing, which was consensual," Sepagan said. After removing her shirt and bra, he walked her to the RV's bedroom area.

"At that point, Pollacci got undressed except for his hat, and he took off Jane Doe's jeans and underwear," Sepagan said. She lay on the bed, and Pollacci tried to penetrate her anally, but she told him she didn't want that, the investigator continued.

"Also at some point she performed oral sex on the defendant, and it was consensual," Sepagan said. But then Pollacci "climbed on top of her and inserted his penis into her vagina, and when she told him to pull out, he grabbed her by both wrists and held he down and continued to insert his penis into her vagina," Sepagan said. "She resisted by trying to roll away, but he was mocking her and told her to stop being a baby."

After he was through, Jane Doe 1 asked Pollacci for a ride home, but he refused. According to prosecutors, he raped her again before they spent the night in the RV. In the morning, he took her home. In the following months, Pollacci tried to contact her, but she never responded, Sepagan said. And she kept the incidents to herself until learning through media reports of Pollacci's trial for assaulting Jane Doe 5.

After eliciting testimony from Sepagan about the consensual sex Jane Doe 1 had with Pollacci in the liquor store the morning they met, public defender Michelle Wouden said there are questions of "credibility" in the woman's story, and "whether the sex [in the RV] was consensual."

■ Jane Doe 2 also met Pollacci at Ron's Liquors. When she walked in soon after moving to the Monterey Peninsula in mid-2008, Pollacci gave her a free bottle of water, and followed her to her car outside, where they talked for "probably an hour," including discussing highly personal matters, such as the "rules" for having an affair, according to another DA investigator, Ryan McGuirk. Jane Doe 2 gave Pollacci her phone number, he added.

About a week after their first meeting, and exchanging numerous messages and phone calls, Jane Doe 2, who was married and had a child, agreed to meet Pollacci for lunch. She didn't tell her husband; nor did

she think he'd be suspicious, because she "often had business lunches with clients," McGuirk testified.

Their first lunch, at the Highlands Inn, in October 2008, was uneventful, he said. They drove in Pollacci's red Corvette convertible, and a photograph introduced into evidence by Wouden showed Jane Doe 2 and Pollacci smiling at their table.

"She appears to be happy in that photograph?" Wouden asked McGuirk.

"Sure," he said.

Photographs also played a role in their second lunch, according to testimony.

After picking meeting Jane Doe 2 in Pacific Grove, Pollacci drove her to a turnout on 17 Mile Drive — an area Jane Doe 2 wasn't familiar with.

"She wasn't sure where she was," McGuirk said.

At the beach, she posed for several provocative photographs, including sitting on a rock with her legs spread, and leaning forward on the hood of Pollacci's car with her dress pulled up, according to testimony during cross examination by Wouden.

'Picked her up and took her'

Nevertheless, Jane Doe 2 had no intention of having sex with Pollacci, she told prosecutors. And when she saw an RV parked at the turnout, she became very concerned about what Pollacci had in mind besides lunch, McGuirk said Jane Doe 2 told him.

"She tried to insist that they eat outside," McGuirk said. "But she was convinced by Mr. Pollacci that he had gone to all this work, and he insisted they go inside."

At the dining table, she could see a bedroom in another part of the RV, and "she said she had no intention of sleeping with Mr. Pollacci or going back to the bed."

But after lunch, he picked her up, took her to the bedroom and raped her, McGuirk said. While he was penetrating her he made "scary noises," and "was aggressive and fixated ... a very different person than whom she was having lunch with," the investigator added.

Feigning severe back pain, she convinced Pollacci to stop, and he drove her back to work, where she "tried to pretend nothing happened."

For weeks afterward, Pollacci stalked her by driving slowly past her house and parking outside her office window with music booming from his car, according to testimony. Fearing he would tell her husband about what happened at the beach, and that he wouldn't believe it was rape, Jane Doe 2 tried her best not to antagonize Pollacci,

McGuirk testified.

Finally, she went to Ron's Liquors in November 2008 to tell Pollacci in person he had to stop

"She felt that a public, busy liquor store would be a place she wouldn't be raped," McGuirk said.

But he ushered her to the back of the store, up some narrow stairs to a loft over-looking the sales area, and raped her again.

"Was she doing anything to resist?" Breeden asked.

"She said she was frightened, she said your scaring me, and she said stop," McGuirk testified. "But within seconds he was penetrating her."

The alleged rapes in late 2008 happened even as Pollacci was being investigated for raping Jane Doe 5 earlier that year. In March 2009 he was arrested and charged, amid a flurry of media coverage. And that's when Jane Doe 1 and Jane Doe 2 came forward.

"I don't want to disclose too much now" about how she will defend Pollacci, Wouden said at the end of the hearing Friday. But it was significant, Wouden said, that "both Jane Does waited until they saw media reports" to come forward.

Currying favor?

Breeden suggested that defenses to be offered by Pollacci during the trial might include attributing ulterior motives to both Jane Does — such as "currying favor" with law enforcement because of other legal problems, or trying to get money through civil suits — or simply that the sex was consensual. But he argued that "if you're a woman, you know what's going to happen. If you say you were raped, you know it's going to be in the news media, and that intimate details will be broadcast to everyone."

He said the two latest Jane Does didn't know each other, and that they separately reported rapes in the same RV added credibility to their stories. After the hearing, he added that the prosecution "would welcome" a defense that, once a woman had consensual sex with a man, he had "carte blanche" to have sex with her again.

Nobody made that argument. But Pollacci's defense seems likely to be that all the sex was consensual, which was the same defense he unsuccessfully used in his trial for raping Jane Doe 5.

After Duncan ruled that there was sufficient evidence to hold Pollacci for another trial, he set arraignment for Dec. 8. If convicted on all counts, Pollacci could be sentenced to life in prison.



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

Carmel Valley needs.

"This project is a ray of light in the midst of a depression," said Sinotte, one of the most outspoken opponents of incorporation. "This development will provide jobs, housing and some revenue for dying and struggling businesses."

Several opponents of the project claimed it would destroy Carmel Valley's "rural character." The phrase was repeatedly tossed around by both sides in the incorporation debate.

"This project does nothing to keep Carmel Valley rural," charged Amy White, the executive director of LandWatch Monterey County.

Leading incorporation supporter Glenn Robinson, meanwhile, accused Sinotte and others of hypocrisy. "Is supporting discretionary subdivisions in Carmel Valley honoring their campaign pledge to keep Carmel Valley rural?" he asked The Pine Cone after the hearing.

Calcagno, though, wasn't buying into the idea that Morgens' project would jeopardize Carmel Valley's rural character.

"We're talking about 10 acres for one house," Calcagno countered. "You can't tell me we're ruining the valley's rural character."

Calcagno told the public he was supporting the project in part because of Morgens' decision to preserve an extensive Monterey pine forest on the upper portion of his property — an effort Calcagno encouraged Morgens to pursue.

"It's the prettiest pine forest in Monterey County," he observed. "I negotiated in good faith with the landowner [to preserve the forest] and I owe it to him today to support the

project."

While Calcagno said he felt an obligation to back the project, Potter took a different view

"Ownership is a right, but development is a calculated risk," Potter insisted. "There are no guarantees."

While Potter complimented Morgens for scaling back the project over the years, he said it wasn't enough to sway his view of it. He still has issues with its location, its density and its ability to provide enough water. "The project has improved, but my vote hasn't changed."

Parker said she was worried the project would take water from the Carmel River aquifer, a charge often repeated by opponents.

"We can't take a chance on impacting that aquifer," Parker explained. "Even a small amount of impact is significant."

Salinas, though, supported the project — in part because of the affordable housing it would offer. "People should be able to live where they work," he suggested.

The hearing presented yet another opportunity for two of Monterey County's highest profile attorneys — Tony Lombardo and Michael Stamp — to debate the merits of a project.

Lombardo, representing Morgens, took opponents to task for claiming the project doesn't have enough water.

"Three engineering companies and the board of supervisors concluded there is a viable long-term water supply," Lombardo noted. "Extensive analysis has been done beyond anything I've ever seen."

In contrast to previous hearings on the subject, the majority of residents who spoke at the hearing supported the project, a fact that Lombardo observed.

"There is definitely not overwhelming public sentiment against this project," Lombardo added, countering charges made by opponents that the majority of the public opposes the development.

Stamp, meanwhile, had some unflattering words for what Morgens hopes to build on his ranch.

"It's a bad project and it's a bad location," said Stamp, who represented opponents at the hearing. "The project is so bad that it has an all-time record of 190 conditions. And the project still has an unreliable water supply."

The project's 190 conditions inspired several charges from opponents that the development would be impossible to monitor, particularly considering Monterey County's shorthanded enforcement staff. They also claimed that taxpayers would end up footing the bill for the effort.

But Monterey County planning director Mike Novo insisted his staff could handle the workload — and taxpayers wouldn't have to pay for it.

"Between 80 and 90 of the conditions are tied to either the project's final map or building permits," Novo explained. "As we go through time, the number of conditions will be reduced. Also, this project is distinguished by the fact that the applicant is paying for our monitoring."

Curiously, Novo credited Stamp with helping to make the planning department's enforcement efforts more efficient — a fact that he believes will make it easier to monitor the September Ranch.

"Mr. Stamp helped us draft a new code enforcement ordinance," Novo told supervisors. "With less staff we are closing more cases. The new ordinance is helping us improve our system, and I think you'll be happy with the results."

Opponents of the project have 30 days to file a lawsuit challenging the supervisors' decision.

"Healing Chant," earned the Neville Brothers a Grammy Award for Best Pop Instrumental Performance.





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From sex symbol to Jewish mom, entertainer keeps reinventing herself

FROM BROADWAY star to Playboy centerfold to the quintessential Jewish mother, singer and actress Lainie Kazan turned an evening of fame into fascinating entertainment career that has spanned five decades.

Kazan's many personas — and her larger-than-life personality — take the stage Saturday, Nov. 13, at Sunset Center.

An understudy to Barbra Streisand in the Broadway production of "Funny Girl," Kazan's career took off one night when Streisand fell ill with a sore throat.

"I waited a year-and-a-half for her to get sick," joked Kazan in an interview this week with The Pine Cone.

Performing Streisand's part in "Funny Girl," Kazan became a star that fateful night in 1965 at the Winter Garden Theater. "It was one of the most thrilling experiences of life," said Kazan, 70. "My career skyrocketed. It was amazing."

While Kazan became much sought after as both a singer and an actress, she had trouble avoiding comparisons with Streisand, who was an international superstar. Not only were both women part of the original "Funny Girl" cast, but they were both Jewish. They even attended the same high school

"I couldn't get out from under the cloak of Barbra," explained Kazan, who splits most of her time living in New York City and Los Angeles. "It was driving me crazy."

When photographer Lawrence Schiller urged her to pose nude in Playboy in 1970, she accepted the offer — here was something that would distinguish her from Streisand, she thought.

"He said [the photos] would change the perception of Jewish women," she remembered.

The photo shoot resulted in an 8-page display. When the magazine came out October 1970, there was quite an uproar. Some women even took to the streets to protest against the

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

Chef Figuero believes in strong work ethic and camouflaged cargo pants

HE'S STAYED on board through three changes of ownership and is now executive chef at Bahama Island Steakhouse at The Barnyard in Carmel.

Chef Joaquin Figueroa said there are two items on the menu that he particularly enjoys preparing, probably because he invented

them. The Island Prawn Cocktail is composed of sautéed prawns enhanced with blackened seasonings, mango, avocado and tostada with a "crisp" salsa.

Another favorite of the chef is the Teriyaki Kebob made with marinated cubes of Angus beef skewered with peppers, pineapple and tomatoes and served with a Bahama salad on the side.

One of the all-time patron favorites on the menu isn't a dish at all: it's Calypso garlic bread, which appears under the appetizer list. It's made with ciabatta bread and Calypso spread that features garlic butter and whole kernels of sweet corn. You have to try it to believe it. Warning: It's addictive.

The new proprietors, Sylvia Sharp and Tony Loeffler, changed the name of the restaurant from Bahama Billy's to Bahama Island Steakhouse and added filet mignon, rib-eye, top sirloin and lobster tail in addition to the menu's regular teriyaki skirt steak, New York steak, seafood, poultry and pork.

As executive chef, Figueroa is in charge of the kitchen, where he has "three guys and a dishwasher." Skilled in all stations in the kitchen himself, he said he started in restaurant work as a dishwasher. He came to the Monterey Peninsula in 2001 direct from Mazatlan, Sinaloa, to live with his uncle in Seaside. Not speaking English or having experience in restaurant work, dishwashing was his only option for gainful

The driver in the crash that injured Rachael Short has been identified as Myles Goldman Lerner. According to authorities he fled the scene and is being sought. See the story on page 1A.





employment. But he did it with a right good will and established a work ethic that he passes on to this day to his kitchen crew. "You have to enjoy what you do, otherwise, it's stressful," he said. "Even when you're washing dishes, you should do it the best you can."

He attended Cabrillo Adult School in Seaside and learned English. "I knew I would have to communicate in order to get better jobs and earn more money," he said.

He met his wife at Bahama Billy's. Veronica was a busser at the front of the house, while he worked in the kitchen. She had come to the U.S. from Mexico City in 1998, learning to speak English after she arrived.

Now married, they have four children — two by Veronica's former marriage — Brittany, 12, Cathy 8, Joaquin Jr., 3, and America, six months. "I love my kids," Chef Joaquin said, "and like to spend as much time as possible with them." On Sundays, his day off, he cooks a pancake breakfast for the family before they go to local parks and play football and basketball.

"You have to talk with them," he said of his children. "We don't want them to go into gangs, and they're not too young to learn what to say if someone offers them drugs."

They speak English and Spanish at home. "I want them to continue with Spanish so they can talk to their grandparents,"

Figueroa worked for Billy Quon at Bahama Billy's for six years, and then at Bixby's, Quon's new restaurant in The Barnyard. He also went to work for Anthony Momo, new owner of Bahama Billy's, who gave Figueroa a chance to be in charge of the whole kitchen.

"I wanted to learn how to manage and take full responsibility," he said. "It wasn't about the extra money, I wanted to do it for myself. I wanted to grow. I learned all the steps," he



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said. "We're a family here."

Kazan couldn't believe what the fuss was about. "I was such a hippie then," she conceded. "We ran around naked all the time."

The furor over the photos died down and, before long, Kazan was best known for showcasing her talents on some of America's most popular television programs. She appeared on the Dean Martin Show 26 times and the Johnny Carson Show 22 times. "It was a privilege to be on stage with Ethel Merman, Frank Sinatra, the Andrews Sisters and so many others," she said.

Yet looking back on those days, Kazan admitted she now has a greater appreciation today for what she experienced.

"I was constantly overwhelmed by who I was singing with," she explained.

If Kazan's career had simply faded by the 1980s, she accomplished much to be remembered by. But the unlikely success of "My Big Fat Greek Wedding" changed all that.

"Before 'My Big Fat Greek Wedding,' I always played a sex symbol or some sort of vixen," she observed.

But the success of "Greek Wedding," as well as her appearance in Richard Benjamin's "My Favorite Year," changed all that. "That started my career as an ethnic mother," she explained.

Kazan offered a little insight into why "Greek Wedding" was such a success — the cast it turned out, very much resembled a

"It was a really warm, funny and endearing group of people," Kazan said of the cast. "We all loved each other. We cared about each other like we were a family."

And she said the cast members remain

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such good friends today that they still get together for reunions every few months.

The success of "Greek Wedding" led to a resurgence in Kazan's career. She made a cameo in the popular television series, "Ugly Betty," and more recently, she joined the cast of "Desperate Housewives."

So how is it, in a business that offers most of its stars only fleeting moments of fame, that Kazan has endured for nearly half a cen-

"I consider myself a warrior," she explained. "I put my bra on every morning and go to war. You can't get defeated. Every day is a new day. I'm a very positive person and that's had a lot to do with my ability to sustain my career."

Finally, Kazan is looking forward to visiting Carmel. She said she was encouraged to perform here by "my childhood sweetheart," local resident Mark Seitman.

"Years ago, when I was a fledging artist, my husband and I would drive up the coast to Carmel and Big Sur, two of the most beautiful places on earth" she added. "We would stay in town for a few days and then travel down to Big Sur. I'm very excited to be going back.'



Philip Mark Coniglio Sr., 85, a retired businessman and owner of the Mediterranean Market of Carmel passed away peacefully at his home at 7:00 PM on November 6, 2010, after a prolonged and challenging battle with cancer.

He was born to Horace Coniglio and Mary Ferrante Coniglio in Monterey, the eldest of 3 sons and is the grandson of Pietro Ferrante, one of the founders of the sardine fishing industry in Monterey.

He attended Monterey High School and Hartnell College. He served in the United States Army from 1943 through 1945 in the South Pacific. On his

Editorial

We told you so

IN 1997, our brilliant state legislature passed a law requiring weekly testing of public beaches for bacterial contamination, and as soon as the testing started, it looked as if the legislature had done something truly significant for public health. Even here on the pristine Monterey Peninsula, potentially dangerous contamination started turning up on a regular basis, prompting county officials to post warning signs at even the most idyllic places — Lovers Point, Del Monte Beach, Stillwater Cove and even Carmel.

However, a cursory look at the testing methods and the way decisions were made to post warning signs showed that the entire setup was totally flawed and worse than useless. In 2000 and 2002, we printed editorials warning that there were "too many warnings," and that trying to alarm beachgoers about things which were, in fact, probably utterly harmless, would inure the public to government warnings, leaving them unable to protect themselves in truly dangerous situations. (Which also explains why, when a beach is posted, almost everybody ignores it and goes surfing or swimming anyway.)

This week, a former official with the Monterey County Health Department confirmed everything in our editorials — and, in fact, showed that the situation was much worse than even we thought.

In a commentary in the Nov. 10 Monterey County Herald, Jim Finney, who administered Monterey County's state-mandated beach monitoring program for five years, said that the original water testing bill, AB 411, wasn't based on science, but on something akin to superstition, and to "pad resumes with environmental accomplishments to shore up reelection bids."

First of all, "no comprehensive public health study" had shown a relationship between ocean water contamination and public health in California, Finney

Furthermore, there was (and is) a 24-hour lag between picking up a sample at a local beach and testing it for bacteria. And when bacteria was found, Finney continued, it was usually an example of something that was "transitory" and would be gone in a few hours. Which meant that the bacteria found on Monday would be gone by the time the beach was posted on Tuesday. And that bacteria that popped up for a few hours on another day of the week wouldn't be noticed at all. And that it probably wouldn't be dangerous to anybody anyway.


"Warning signs and press releases [which the Herald often prints, but our newspaper ignores], though they satisfy the requirements of the law, aren't accurate indicators of the current conditions at any particular beach," Finney con-

Last month, a SCUBA diver who got a serious ear infection off Lovers Point sued Monterey County for failing to warn her about bacterial contamination of the water she went swimming in. The county owes her lots of money, the SCUBA diver argued, because AB 411 required her to be warned, and she was-

So let's see ... the state imposes a useless testing and warning requirement, and then the taxpayers of Monterey County may owe a lot of money to a woman who claims she wasn't given a warning that would have been usless anyway.

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desist and restoration" order that the golf course be removed and replaced with native plants, and threatened the Feduniaks with a \$4,000-a-day fine if they failed to comply.

Instead, they responded by suing the coastal commission. After a colorful trial in late 2004, which included a visit by Judge Michael Fields to the Feduniaks' front yard, Fields ruled they could keep the course because of "estoppel" - basically, that because the coastal commission had raised no objection to the golf course for 18 years, and had to have known about it because of its highly visible location, the Feduniaks had every reason to assume the golf course was legal and shouldn't be penalized for maintaining it or compelled to remove it.

But in April 2007, an appeals court reversed that decision, finding that "presumed knowledge" by the coastal commission wasn't enough. For estoppel to apply, the coastal commission or its staff had to have "actual knowledge" of the golf course's existence, and there was no evidence they did it until they got the letter from the forester in 2001.

The Feduniaks and their lawyer, Doc Etienne, then appealed to the California Supreme Court, which declined to hear the case.

That made the coastal commission's order final, according to the new lawsuit, which was filed Oct. 25. But the lawsuit alleges the Feduniaks have ignored it.

"At all times since the finality of the order, the Feduniaks have continued to maintain the unpermitted golf course on the property, including watering and mowing the grass in violation of the orders," the lawsuit says. And their noncompliance has been "knowing and intentional," it alleges.

Failure to remove the tiny golf course harms the public because it "damages natural resources ... interferes with the coastal commission's attempts to uniformly and fair-

ly enforce and administer the Coastal Act" and encourages other people to flout the coastal commission's rules, the lawsuit says.

It asks the court to issue a permanent injunction requiring the Feduniaks to remove the golf course and replace it with approved plants and; to impose civil penalties of \$6,000 a day, presumably dating from when the cease and desist order was issued in

2002, and "exemplary damages to deter future violations of the Coastal Act," and require the Feduniaks to pay "all costs of investigating and pursuing this action, including "expert fees and attorney's fees and costs."

Doc Etienne no longer represents the Feduniaks and The Pine Cone was unable to reach them for comment.

1984, he threw himself into all sorts of civic causes.

"Until his death he was in charge of sight preservation for the Monterey Host Lions Club," Jayne Gasperson said. "That was his passion — to help people who needed eye surgery or

He also volunteered at the AT&T Pebble Beach Pro-Am for 25 years, and for almost as long at the Monterey Bay Aquarium. He received almost every civic recognition you could think of. And he was often Santa Claus at the city's tree lighting ceremony.

But his life in politics — which began when he was elected to the council in 1986 — had its setbacks. In 1990, he ran for mayor against Flo Schaefer, who had moved to town only a few years before and set about telling the old timers what they were doing wrong. Somehow, Schaefer won, and launched Pacific Grove's most divisive era.

"Don was just devastated that he lost," Jayne said. "So many of our friends said they didn't vote because they were sure he would win."

As far as most people could tell, he kept the defeat to him-

"Even with a wacko like Flo Schaefer, Don never said a bad word about her," Fisher recalled.

But others said Gasperson managed to get a small measure of payback.

"He always wore the strongest aftershave he could find, because he knew it bugged her," Teel said.

A memorial and a BBQ

Staying active until almost the very end, Gasperson triumphed over a diagnosis of esophageal cancer three years ago. But in late September, severe pain and a CAT Scan showed the cancer had returned with a vengeance. He died Nov. 8 and was cremated shortly after.

"When I pick up his ashes I'm going to take him for a drive along the ocean," Jayne Gasperson said.

Don Gasperson is survived by his wife, sons Gary and Brent, both of the Monterey Peninsula, four grandchildren and two great-grandchildren.

A memorial service is planned for 9:30 Saturday morning at the Methodist Church on Sunset Drive, followed by a BBQ to celebrate his life at the Sally Griffin Center.

Miller on behalf of the officers — lists more than two dozen police officers and other police employees who are members of the PGPOA, the police department's bargaining unit. The P.G. Police Management Association, also a plaintiff, represents Chief Darius Engles and police two commanders.

The PGPOA on Sept. 22 voted to file a lawsuit against the city over the ordinance. The union's decision came two weeks before it filed a complaint with the state's Public Employment Relations Board alleging the city violated the Meyers-Milias-Brown Act because it did not consult the union before enacting the ordinance, an allegation also listed in the lawsuit.

Frutchey couldn't be reached Thursday because city offices were closed for Veterans Day.

Before the council voted to enact the ordinance in July, a employees' union representative warned the council it would face a legal action if it was passed.

The initiative was crafted by a group of citizens led by former city councilman Dan Davis as a way of reducing the city's retirement costs.

The \$900,000 Pacific Grove pays to CalPERS every year is one of its biggest expenses.

The CalPERS system allows a police officer to retire at 50 with a substantial pension. However, police argue that it will be difficult to recruit and retain officers if the pension

But Shapiro filed a motion in Monterey Superior Court Nov. 1 asking a judge to dismiss the lawsuit under California's anti-SLAPP statute, which provides for early dismissal of lawsuits arising from an "act in furtherance of a person's right of petition or free speech" unless a court determines there is a probability the plaintiff will prevail on the

To help show that Amadio and Kennaugh probably won't win their defamation suit, Shapiro argued that Kanalakis and Richards "were acting within the scope of their employment when they issued press releases or held press conferences ... and therefore both are immune from any claim arising from

In regards to Monterey County's liability in the lawsuit filed by Kennaugh and Amadio, Shapiro said a public entity is not liable for conduct by an employee who is immune.

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FOR THE

Therefore, Shapiro said Kennaugh and Amadio "cannot establish a possibility, much less a probability, of prevailing on either of their claims."

During a press conference on the steps of the Monterey County courthouse last month to discuss the lawsuit, Kennaugh and Amadio's attorney Christopher Cayce said about 24 paintings were stolen, including two Rembrandt sketches and works by Renoir, Matisse, Jackson Pollock, Miro and van Gogh.

Kennaugh, a retired Harvard Medical School oncologist, and Amadio, a law student, contend the stolen art was part of a collection of about 300 pieces collected by Kennaugh over the course of 30 years.

According to court declarations by Kanalakis and Richards in October in support of Shapiro's motion to dismiss the case, the sheriff's office received a "constant string of inquires from the press, both local and from other parts of

In his declaration, Richards said interest in the case grew when Kennaugh and Amadio issued a press release alleging the value of the stolen art had increased to \$80 million, which Richards determined would have represented the second largest art theft in the United States.

'Sheriff Mike Kanalakis and I consulted with each other regarding when to hold press conferences, how to respond to news media inquiries and what information to release to the public, and reached agreement on those issues," according to Richards' declaration.

Besides being defamed, Kennaugh and Amadio say comments made by the sheriff's office have also hurt the resale value of the rest of the pieces in their art collection. Their lawsuit seeks an unspecified amount of money from the county.

During the October press conference, Cayce defended his clients against statements made by Richards.


"This is not a criminal enterprise," Cayce told reporters. "These are two very compassionate, honest people whose reputations have now been sullied. They have been humiliat-

Richards has told The Pine Cone that Kennaugh and Amadio never provided the sheriff's office with proof the artwork alleged to be stolen ever existed, saying they were uncooperative with investigators.

The sheriff's office said there is still an active investigation into the art heist.

"This is not a caretaker's unit," he insisted.

Lombardo said the easiest access to the unit would be directly through the Pelios' main residence, which casts further doubt on its use as a caretaker's dwelling. "It's 200 feet from the nearest parking space."

And Lombardo suggested the project "was not compatible with the neighborhood" because "there's not a single home [in the neighborhood] with a caretaker's unit between the main house and the golf course."

Also, Lombardo accused the Pelios of deceiving the Land Use Advisory Committee by claiming Monterey County planning staff told them they couldn't use an existing secondary unit to house a caretaker.

"They misrepresented facts to the LUAC," he added.

Potter and Parker expressed dismay about the alleged deception.

"I'm a little concerned about the misrepresentation to the LUAC," Potter said. Parker, meanwhile, said she takes "a dim view of applicants misrepresenting themselves."

After the hearing, planning services manager Laura Lawrence told The Pine Cone that the Pelios could, in fact, house their caretaker in the secondary unit, which currently is considered "legal but nonconforming."

Lawrence said the Pelios could also appeal the supervisors' decision to the California Coastal Commission.




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Panetta dinner brings chefs, media bigshots to Spanish Bay
