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Wall heater suspected in Monterey CO deaths

THE BODIES of a husband and wife were found in their Lottie Street home Monday morning after one of them failed to appear for work and the employer came searching, according to Monterey Fire Marshal Dave Brown. Raymond and Ruth Ann Carlson, ages 53 and 60, respectively, apparently died of carbon monoxide poisoning, and the Monterey County Coroner's Office reported a wall-mounted gas heater might be to blame.

The person who had come searching for his employee saw one of the residents unresponsive on the couch and entered the residence. Fearing she was dead, he retreated and dialed 911. On the scene, firefighters shut off the gas, donned protective gear and breathing apparatus, and entered the home, where they found Ruth Ann Carlson on the couch in the front room, along with her cat, which also died. They located Raymond Carlson on the bed in the back bedroom.

Carbon monoxide levels in the house were high, and firefighters forcefully ventilated the residence to flush out the gas.

They also summoned PG&E to investigate the cause of the leak and handed the investigation over to

Long forgotten wires spark Brinton's attic fire

■ Damage minor, store reopens quickly

AFTER GOING undetected for years, live wires that were cut when a neon sign was removed from the front of Brinton's finally shorted and ignited a fire in the attic Sunday afternoon. Fortunately, it occurred during business hours, and employees noticed smoke and called the fire department. By the time engines arrived, flames could be seen billowing out of a hole in the eaves at the front of the store, according to Cal Fire investigator Richard Lopez.

"The area damaged by fire was not more than the size of

P.G. WOMAN STABBED TO DEATH AT HOME

JUDITH SALAZAR, 46, was murdered in her Pacific Grove home late Sunday night, and her alleged killer was airlifted to a San Jose trauma center for treatment of his own knife wounds, according to police, who offered no explanation for how he was injured.

Seaside resident Sunny Nguyen, 26, underwent emergency surgery and remains hospitalized under 24-hour police custody, according to P.G. Police Chief Darius Engles. His two small children, who were in the home at the time, have since been reunited with their mother — Nguyen's ex-girlfriend and the daughter of the victim.

Police discovered the horrific scene after a cab driver reported Nguyen went into the house on 17 Mile Drive and did not

T HE ROAR of bulldozers competed with the crashing of waves at Carmel River State Beach this week as the Monterey County Public Works Department opened a channel in the sandbar that separates the Carmel River Lagoon from the ocean.

Unlike other years, the work was done before water in the lagoon rose to anywhere near flood stage.

"Our goal was to let out some of the water gradually and create an equilibrium between the lagoon and the ocean so that the water level in the lagoon doesn't drop off too quickly," public works director Yaz Emrani explained.

But this year, the work was done without an emergency permit. In past years, the county would simply declare an emergency, which would allow it sidestep the bureaucratic requirements of a more conventional permit.

While this week's project was done without a permit,

SPCA planning \$17M renovation

THE SPCA for Monterey County will kick off a fundraising campaign in January to finance the multimillion-dollar renovation of its facilities, a massive remodel the organization's executive director said is overdue.

When it's completed, the \$16.8 million project will include a complete redo of the nonprofit's facilities on Highway 68.

"Basically we are going to remodel the whole campus," SPCA executive director Gary Tiscornia told The Pine Cone Thursday. "The organization has

Major projects to create 'minor' delays on Highway 1

MOTORISTS TRAVELING south along the Big Sur coast during the next week can except minor delays at three locations as the California Department of Transportation continues its never-ending task of shoring up Highway 1.

The most visible — as well as the most ambitious — project on the coast is construction of a 620-footlong bridge at Pitkins Curve and a rock shed nearby at Rain Rocks. The project, which began last December and is expected to continue through the winter of 2012-2013, will cost taxpayers about \$29.5 million when completed.

At Rain Rocks, tons of debris cascade onto the pavement each winter, costing more than \$1 million for cleanups and leading to lengthy delays for frustrated motorists.

During the holidays, work at Pitkins Curve and Rain Rocks will continue unabated. A traffic light controls one-way traffic, and drivers can expect five-

"Having seen the unfinished movie, I can tell you that it is definitely going to be something that the town can once again be proud of," he said.



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
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He was drunk, but denied drinking

Pair sentenced in elder-abuse, theft, fraud case

 Γ HE MAN and woman accused of pilfering more than \$12,000 from an elderly woman suffering from Alzheimer's last summer were sentenced to jail and felony probation Friday after pleading guilty to that and other crimes, according to Monterey County Deputy District Attorney Jeannine

On Nov. 19, Monterey County Superior Court Judge Robert Burlison sentenced 22-year-old Amanda Spears of Pacific Grove to felony probation and 340 days in Monterey County jail, while Pebble Beach resident Theodore Alexander Lopez, also 22, received felony probation and 24 days in jail.

The two were caught after Lopez' parents received suspicious bank statements and credit-card bills at their home in Pebble Beach and reported the fraud to the Monterey County Sheriff's Office Sept. 13. Spears and Lopez had used the personal information of his step-grandmother, 85-year-old Nita Fallis, who owns the P.B. home but lives in a care home in Texas, to obtain credit cards and withdraw money from her accounts, the sheriff's office reported at the time.

"Lopez and Spears then, over 13 separate incidents,

removed money from the victim's checking and savings accounts," deputy Ivan Rodriguez wrote in his report in September. "Each time they removed money, it was for \$400 or more."

They used some of the cash to make a down payment on a black 1999 Volkswagen Jetta, which the sheriff's office

In addition to using Fallis' information to obtain credit cards and money, she forged and cashed checks from the Robert H. Down Parent Association, according to Pacioni. When contacted by Rodriguez, "Spears was in possession of numerous electronic and entertainment items purchased with the stolen funds," she said. "Additionally, she possessed property stolen from two other victims. In a second case, Spears stole a credit card from a fourth victim then used the stolen credit card to purchase items at Target."

In court last week, Spears pleaded guilty to felony charges of elder abuse, possession of stolen property and burglary, and to misdemeanor theft charges.

Lopez, who conspired with Spears to use Fallis' stolen information to open the credit accounts with which they bought video-game consoles, games, DVDs and other items, pleaded guilty to felony elder abuse, Pacioni reported.

The anticipated start date of road closure is December 6, 2010 (subject to change) and could last for six months during construction.

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
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been here since 1967."

The facility consists of a hodgepodge of buildings constructed from the 1960s to the 1980s which Tiscornia said "have kind of reached the end of their service life."

The SPCA completed the construction of a new wildlife center in August 2009 and a new veterinary clinic in June of this year. The renovation project will include new kennels. Crews have already begun moving dirt in preparation for the

"The existing kennels ... will be renovated from the inside, but the walls stay the same," Tiscornia said. "The adoption area will be the biggest change."

At the Monterey County Board of Supervisors meeting next Tuesday, supervisors will consider adopting a resolution approving up to \$5 million in federal revenue bonds for the project. Though the bonds will be issued by the California Enterprise Development Authority, the county has to approve

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the bonds, per a federal requirement. There will also be a public hearing on the bond issue.

"The feds made some stimulus money available," Tiscornia said. "One of the ways ... was to [allow] nonprofit organizations to borrow from banks on a tax-exempt basis."

The deadline for the SPCA to apply for the bonds is Dec.

"The timing is critical, because we wanted to secure [the bonds] in advance of their expiration," he said.

Until now, the SPCA has sought donations for the project only from its biggest donors. After the first part of 2011, however, the SPCA will publicly announce a capital campaign help finance the redo.

"The \$5 million won't pay for everything," Tiscornia said. "And we obviously need to continue to raise money for the debt service."

The bonds, donations and reserves will go toward the project. Assuming the SPCA receives the loan from the federal government and obtains the usual county permits for the project, Tiscornia said the new SPCA facility will be completed in a relatively short period of time.

"We should have this project done within 24 months from now," he said.

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



to 10-minute delays.

Two miles north of the Pitkins Curve-Rain Rocks project is the Dani Creek project, which will construct a retaining wall to reduce the impact of erosion along a particularly vulnerable stretch of highway just south of Lucia. The crew working on the project will take a break this week. Traffic is controlled by a one-way traffic light and motorists can anticipate five- to 10-minute delay. The project, which is expected to be completed by the end of summer next year, will cost about \$7.7 million. It's located about 56 miles south of Carmel.

For those few hardy souls bicycling up the coast, be aware that because you're traveling uphill, you'll need to press a button at the south end of the Dani Creek project to activate a longer traffic light cycle.

Caltrans is also planning to place a hot mix asphalt overlay next week on 3.5 miles of highway between the Burns Creek Bridge and Partington Ridge Road. Five-minute delays can be expected. The project will cost about \$450,000.

South Coast residents — long accustomed to road troubles — are taking the latest delays in stride.

"Down here, we're used to the highway closing," resident Kate Novoa said. "It's just a matter of when and where."

Meanwhile, Caltrans spokeswoman Susana Cruz reminded motorists to be careful while traveling along the scenic, but treacherous, highway, especially during wet weather. "It's better to get there slow than not get there at all," Cruz suggested.

a phone book, but it filled the entire store with smoke," he said.

After the store was evacuated, firefighters cut a hole in the roof to get at the flames. Overall damage was minimal, though Lopez reported the large building still smelled faintly of smoke the following day.

A Monterey County building inspector determined it was safe for Brinton's to reopen the next morning, while Lopez, an electrician and a plumber worked to restore services to the building and determine exactly what had happened.

"Some time ago, they removed a neon sign," Lopez explained. "And when they did that, they left most of the wiring intact in the walls, still energized." He has been trying to find out when the sign was removed, "so we could determine how long these wires have been cooking in the walls," but so far, he hasn't been able to contact anyone who remembers the neon sign on the front of the housewares store.

During the dirty job of searching the attic space for the exact origin and cause of the fire, Lopez said, "I found six spots where the wires had been burning the wood."

He was unsure what caused the fire to finally ignite but speculated the wood could have charred enough over time and then been sparked by a power spike. He also said moisture from the recent rain might have caused the live wires to short and burn the wood.

Lopez estimated the structural damage at about \$10,000.



Monterey P.D. and the power company, Brown said.

On Tuesday afternoon, detective Diana Schumacher of the coroner's office released the identities of the residents and reported their cause of death is pending but said "a wall-mounted gas heater appears to have played a significant role in their deaths."

Brown said the Nov. 21 tragedy serves as a reminder that residents should be mindful of gas appliances. He reported CO is known as the "silent killer," because it is invisible, odorless and tasteless, and it's responsible for 500 deaths annually in the United States, including 200 fatalities caused by stoves and heaters.

He advised requesting PG&E or an electrician to check appliances such as wall heaters annually, as well as installing and maintaining CO monitors at home.



the agency worked closely with the National Marine Fisheries Service and the Carmel River Steelhead Association in determining the route of the channel. The federal agency and the local nonprofit have previously objected to public works' reliance on emergency permits.

In an effort to relieve pressure from the lagoon, county workers created a channel that takes a slight northwesterly route to sea — one that could route the river channel in the direction of Scenic Road. While Emrani made it clear that neither the NMFS or the CRSA officially endorsed the project, he called this year's plan, "a great compromise,"

and said the agency hopes to have a permit in place to do the same work next year.

"We were caught between a rock and a hard place," said Emrani of the need to come up with a new strategy for managing the sandbar. "We had exhausted all our other options."

Public works often cuts the channel in a southwesterly direction, in part because other options generate greater controversy. Steelhead activists object to cutting a straight channel because they say young steelhead are swept out into Carmel Bay before they are mature enough to survive the conditions.

Some residents, meanwhile, are opposed to cutting the channel in a northwesterly direction because they're worried it will erode a sandy bluff and undermine Scenic Road.


The breaching of the sandbar is an annu-

al event that typically occurs in the late December or early January, when winter rains swell the lagoon and threaten nearby homes with flooding. But this year, public works decided to get an early start on the task. Also, because there was no imminent threat of flooding nearby homes, public works was able to cut the channel without rushing to complete the job.

"We decided to be proactive," Emrani explained. "We wanted to do the work under controlled conditions."

The project — which was expected to be completed late Thursday — aims to create a 500-foot-long channel that is 20 feet wide. Emrani said the channel was designed so it could be easily closed if too much water was leaving the lagoon. He added that his staff will be monitoring the work closely over the weekend





Paradise in prose and pictures — A holiday book buyer's guide

-HILE IT'S been said that words can't begin to describe the extraordinary Big Sur coast, that hasn't stopped countless writers from trying.

Home to a rich and varied literary culture, Big Sur has long been a magnet for writers and poets.

From Robinson Jeffers' stark verses, to Henry Miller's philosophical musings, the rugged coastline south of Carmel has inspired an interesting and diverse collection of books that celebrate

its beauty, its culture and its evolving way of life.

With the arrival of the holiday season, many gift buyers understandably turn their attention to books. And while none of the books listed here has ever made the New York Times Bestsellers list, each offers readers a fascinating perspective of Big Sur and its hardy and unconventional population of residents.

If you're buying a gift for someone who has an affection for books and the Big Sur coast, here's a short list of favorites, most of which were written by residents:


■ "Big Sur and the Oranges of Heironymous Bosch" by Henry Miller — Famous abroad and infamous in the United States for writing the banned "Tropic of Cancer," Miller was living on Partington Ridge in Big Sur when "Oranges" was published in 1957. Compared to "Tropic of Cancer," "Oranges" is quite tame, but nevertheless, it paints an engaging and sentimental portrait of life on the ridge at a time when Big Sur was just beginning to become a countercultural mecca.

■ "Hiking the Big Sur Country" by Jeffrey Schaffer — When this book came out in 1988, it immediately became the definitive hiking guide to the many trails of the Big Sur coast and the adjacent Ventana Wilderness. Schaffer, who prepared for the task by publishing an excellent series of books mapping the trails of the Sierra, offers accurate and easy-to-follow directions to dozens of day-hiking and backpacking destinations. A series of miniature topographic maps at the back of the book is an added bonus.


■ "The Natural History of Big Sur" by Paul Henson and Don Usner — Biologists Henson and Usner published the definitive book on Big Sur's flora, fauna and geology in 1993, offering a well researched and beautifully illustrated (by Valerie Kells) book on one of the world's most interesting natural places.

■ "Big Sur" by Jeff Norman — When Norman passed away in 2007, a tremendous reservoir of information about Big Sur's human history was lost. From the region's prehistoric inhabitants to its first homesteaders, Norman's knowledge about the region's earliest residents was unsurpassed. While Norman never published the definitive Big Sur book of history he planned to create, he did provide the commentary for this installment of Arcadia Publishing's "Images of







IF YOU owe money to Harrison Memorial Library for overdue books or DVDs — or even if you don't — it's a good place to stop and drop off donations for the Food Bank for Monterey County. For the third year, the library is offering amnesty to card holders with outstanding fines.

From Dec. 1 to Jan. 5, 2011, patrons can take advantage of the Food for Fines program. One food item counts for \$1 or less in money owed to the library for overdue materials. For example, a fine of \$4 could be waived with the donation of four cans, while a \$4.25 fine would require a donation of five items in order to be wiped from the record.

According to circulation manager Amy Rector, only unopened, prepackaged food will be accepted, and the packaging can not be damaged or dented, nor can it be made of glass. The food can not be perishable or expired.

such as ketchup or mayonnaise, she said, and if they want to contribute inexpensive dried ramen noodles, four packages equal \$1 in fines. Finally, food will be accepted only for overdue fines, not for money owed due to lost or damaged items.

Examples of acceptable and desired foods include canned fruits and vegetables, soup, canned meat and fish, pork and beans, cereal, peanut butter, boxed macaroni and cheese, and rice.

When the library launched Food for Fines in 2008, that year's food donations led to the waiving of \$250 in money owed, according to Rector. And last year, the library forgave \$195 in outstanding fines.

"The program seems to be anticipated by our patrons, and it's so nice to send all of that food to the needy," she


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
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
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Luxury olive oil, Spain and Cuba, and a bucket-list dinner

THE 400 Spanish olive trees on Jan de Luz' Carmel Valley property are doing so well, he wants to share their fruit — and the process of pressing it — with customers at his antiques shop in the Village. After years of hearing from people wishing to witness the turning of olives into oil, de Luz decided to invite everyone to watch.

"We press every year, and I have had beautiful olive oil for five years, now," he said. This year's harvest was especially abundant, "so we have the big press and are going to press in my shop here so people can see it."

From 10 a.m. to 3 p.m., Saturday, Dec. 4, people can stop in at Jan de Luz Antiques to witness the pressing, taste the oil, and buy some for themselves and their friends. An artist and designer, de Luz promised the oil's packaging is beautiful. He didn't know the price per bottle, yet.

"I'm expensive," he warned.

His olive oil has been described as "very elegant," with notes of grapefruit and orange leaves, and he said it's especially good for drizzling on salads and making desserts. The chefs at Bernardus Lodge just down the road use his oil in some of their culinary creations, including ice cream.

■ Brunch, Iberian style

Not long ago, chef Brandon Miller at Mundaka restaurant in Carmel began offering lunch. Now, he's serving up brunch on Saturdays and Sundays, too. It seems his creativity can't be stopped, and people on the Monterey Peninsula are all the better for it.

The short menu includes first and second courses, sweets and drinks, and the offerings will probably change regularly, just as the lunch and dinner menus do. The dishes exhibit Miller's hallmark talent for combining traditional Spanish ingredients and spices with local products and produce to devise something unique.

Right now, he is offering two *primeros*: fried white asparagus with Serrano ham and smoked paprika hollandaise, and a salad of golden beets, baby green beans, little gem romaine and verjus vinaigrette, for \$7 and \$6, respectively.

In addition to the thin lamb chops that also appear at lunch and dinner, Miller's *segundos* feature duck confit with roasted winter vegetables and organic poached eggs, Catalan flatbread with figs and ricotta in crème fraïche and a balsamic reduction, cinnamon-seasoned Spanish French toast with citrus syrup and fruit, and a Croque Madame of pork belly, Gruyere, crispy egg and tarragon aioli. Prices for those dishes range from \$9 to \$16.

Finally, *postres*, \$7 each, include pear and walnut upsidedown cake with saffron-black pepper ice cream, lemon verbena ice cream with chocolate sauce and watermelon,

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orange-cardamom flan with winter fruit compote, and Miller's signature pan chocolate of rich dark chocolate, sea salt, olive oil and toast.

In addition to juices, coffee and tea, guests can order homemade sangria, homemade lemonade, beer on tap and in the bottle, and Mexican Coke, made with sugar instead of the much maligned high fructose corn syrup.

Mundaka hosts brunch from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. Saturday and Sunday and is located on the east side of San Carlos Street north of Seventh Avenue. For more information, call (831) 624-7400. The website, www.mundakacarmel.com, is almost a year out of date but still contains useful information about the philosophy of the restaurant and the types of tapas and other dishes Miller has created since it opened in March 2009.

■ Babaloo near you

Cuban cuisine in the form of tender, flavorful pulled pork, sandwiches pressed on the grill, tropical island slaw and nonalcoholic mojitos has arrived at the Pacific Grove farmers market via the Babaloo food truck. Proclaimed as "the Monterey Peninsula's first authentic food truck," Babaloo hits several farmers markets and can also be summoned to businesses and private parties. Its mission is "to be as green as we can, support our community by using locally grown produce and natural meats and poultry, and to lend a helping hand whenever possible."

At the P.G. market, customers line up for take-home or eat-on-the-spot sandwiches like the Ricky Ricardo, a classic Cuban sandwich of pulled pork, ham and Swiss on Cuban bread pressed on the grill (\$6), and Fred & Ethel Sliders — two fish mini burgers with tropical slaw and lemon mayo on toasted brioche buns (\$5). El Cubano Plate (\$7) is the classic combination of slow-roasted pulled pork, organic rice and black beans, tropical island slaw and a couple of slices of fried plantain, and non-meat-eaters can turn to the Vita-NoMeata-Vegamin (\$5), a selection of grilled fresh local vegetables accompanied by rice, beans and slaw. The Duchess Special, named for the 1986 Chevy truck, changes





Not only does the book provided an interesting account of Partington Ridge during Henry Miller's heyday, but it also features a collection of rare color photographs depicting life on the ridge in a simpler time.

■ "Big Sur: A Complete History and Guide" by Tomi Kay Lussier. Published in 1979, Lussier's ode to Big Sur is now in its ninth printing. Flashier guides have come and gone, but Lussier's introduction to the coast endures. "It has a very nice history, it's beautifully concise and it's written in a thoughtful manner," Magnus Toren of the Henry Miller Library offered. "It's infinitely better than some of the more contemporary guides."





In recent years, there's been a plethora of cookbooks inspired by the rugged


coastline, including "The Big Sur Bakery Cookbook: A Year in the Life of a Restaurant" by Big Sur Bakery owner Michael Gilson and chefs Michelle and phillip Wajtowicz; "The Homesteader's Kitchen,: Recipes from Farm to Table" by Robin Burnside; "My Nepenthe: Bohemian Tales of Food, Family, and Big Sur" by Romney Steele; "Esalen Cookbook" by Charlie Cascio; and "Sierra Mar Cookbook: Post Ranch Inn" by Craig Von Foerster and Patrick Tregenza. The books not only offer a

bounty of culinary advice and suggestions, but each offers an intimate portrait of the people and places that make Big Sur a dining destination.

Gone but not forgotten



The oversized book presents an exquisite series of images captured by the some the greatest of all fine art photographers, including Adams, Edward Weston, Wynn Bullock, Morley Baer and Philip Hyde. For many people around the world, this 1965 book was their introduction to

Big Sur. Jeffers' words bring this extraordinary collection of images alive.

Another omission

Toren calls Kerouac's "Big Sur" one of "the most bought and least read of all Big Sur books." Kerouac, who inspired a generation of hipsters with his classic, "On the Road," took a trip to Big Sur in 1960, but the writer never made it farther south than Bixby Canyon, where he stayed at his friend Lawrence Ferlinghetti's cabin. Kerouac wrote a book about the trip, which consisted mostly of getting completely drunk. The book offers an interesting account of a great writers succumbing to alcoholism, but it contains little about Big Sur.

While you likely can find any of the previously mentioned books at www.amazon.com, there is no substitute for driving down Highway 1 to Big Sur. Just 30 minutes south of Carmel, you'll find an excellent selection of Big Sur books and other holiday gifts at the Heartbeat Gift Gallery, the Phoenix Shop, Local Color, the Big Sur Garden Gallery and the Esalen Institute.





In a famously black and white world, photographer adds color

m S}$ URROUNDED AT the family dinner table by some of the world's most famous photographers, Kim Weston needed a paint brush to discover his own creative path.

While much of his work is made up of fine art black and white photographs, he is also fascinated by the process of adding paint to his images. An exhibit opening Thursday, Dec. 2, at Sunset Center's Marjorie Evans Gallery takes a look at Weston's painted photographs.

Rad radicchio


How oil spill wildlife were rescued

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

Editorial

Certainly not the chief's fault

LAST WEEK'S front-page story about the retirement of Police Chief George Rawson was 95 percent laudatory about his nine-year tenure. All that praise certainly seems to be warranted: Rawson leaves with the respect of his police officers, the town's political leaders and its citizens.

But 5 percent of the story was about the extremely generous pension he will receive. At the age of 54, Rawson will be paid \$126,000 a year for life, plus guaranteed cost of living raises ... and that's not to mention the medical care, life insurance and other bennies that 30-year police officers, firefighters and other public safety officials can look forward to.

Despite the fact that the cost of Rawson's retirement will be borne by taxpayers and fits neatly into an important national debate about excessive compensation for many government employees, some people don't think details about Rawson's pension belonged in the story about his retirement. We're used to people telling us that obituaries are supposed to be off-limits to even the slightest bit of negative information, but this is the first time we've been told that retirement news stories are supposed to be done like friendly eulogies.

Of course, we disagree. Nevertheless, it is worth explaining that our story was not meant to imply, nor did it say, that Rawson did anything improper. As we've explained before, all employees, whether in government or private business, should try to get the highest wages and benefits they can. As long as they do so honestly — without bribery, kickbacks or undue influence — there's nothing wrong with them taking it all to the bank.

But on the other side of this equation there must be a boss who tries to pay his employees no more than necessary. It's easy for private employers to be diligent about this, since every dollar paid to staff is one that can't be used for capital investment or stockholder distributions, or to reduce debt. In other words, money paid to employees of private companies comes out of the owners' pock-

But when government decides to give its employees a raise or a generous pension, the money comes from an absent third party: the taxpayers. Politicians just don't care as much about spending other people's money as they would about spending their own. And since public employees are represented by powerful unions, which make colossal campaign contributions to political candidates who do their bidding, elected officials actually have a strong incentive to give away the public purse — the future and the taxpayers be damned. (This phenomenon gets worse the higher up in government you go. The Carmel City Council, for example, is far more responsible than Congress.)

We wish George Rawson the best in his retirement — which will actually be his second career, as head of security for a local shopping mall. But we wish the state government had decided that he, and all the other similarly situated retirees, would only get a public pension of \$60,000 or \$70,000 a year, instead of \$126,000.

'Was that, too, a lie?' Dear Editor,

Christine Williams of the Carmel Valley Association laments that due process has taken place regarding September Ranch. Williams must believe it's okay to deny property rights to non-CVA members

I heard the pro-town candidates declare during a debate that not all developments were bad and they would support "smart" developments. I guess it's all in Williams' definition of smart.

The election was also about common

sense. Attempting to incorporate during the worst economic period since the Great Depression and declaring that Carmel Valley was immune to prevailing economic forces was irresponsible and arrogant.

The Carmel-Carmel Valley Coalition asked Monterey County officials for current revenue figures as if incorporation had succeeded. The discrepancy between the numbers projected by LAFCO and the revenues received or currently receivable is stagger-

According to property assessments, hotel and sales tax receipts, the town's first year revenue would not have been \$10.63 million as projected, but \$8.34 million: a \$2.29 million shortfall. The budget projections worsen each subsequent fiscal year.

Using the same techniques as LAFCO, a budget expert calculated that future revenues would be significantly reduced resulting in yearly deficits in the millions, ending in FY 2020 with \$4.34 million in the hole. Turns out we were right all along.

So take heed of Williams' advice, next time don't believe the rhetoric of the protown proponents when they say trust us; there is plenty of money to incorporate. City supporters also promised there wouldn't be a next time. Was that, too, a lie?

return to pay his fare.

"Thank God he called us and didn't just drive off," commented Engles, who would not say how much time had lapsed between Nguyen's entering the house and the driver's reporting the fare skip to police.

Cops arrived and knocked on the front door, but no one answered, according to Engles. They noticed movement he characterized as "odd" and heard sounds coming from inside the house, so they went to a side window and peered in, finding "what appeared to be blood splattered on the wall."

Firefighters who had been summoned to the house helped officers in through an open window, and in the bedroom, they found Salazar stabbed to death, lying on the floor in a pool of blood. Nguyen was lying nearby, also suffering from knife wounds. He was reportedly combative as medics bandaged his injuries and loaded him onto a gurney so he could be

was receiving all the calls from the people who were owed money," Fletchall said. "And he found a solution," in bringing Experience Media Studios on board. "He's a very knowledgeable producer, and I'm more than happy to have him involved."

Fletchall's own resume is impressive. He started in television and proceeded to work on major films such as "Perfect Storm," "Castaway," "Mission Impossible 3" and "Seabiscuit." His credits also include television programs and commercials, music videos and other media. With his company based in Abu Dhabi, Fletchall is also producing programs in the United Arab Emirates for regional and inter-

He said he hadn't spent much time in Carmel before acquiring the film, but he immediately appreciated the area's natural beauty and has growing affection for the town.

"I just couldn't believe how many different kinds of things there were, all the different landscapes in just this little tiny area," he said, from the pine forests, to the rocky seaside cliffs. "And the people are just great, and of course the little Comstock cottages are cool, and it has its own unique flavor that translates well to the film."

'Carmel-by-the-Sea" is now in post-production, with a target completion date in February, but it needs a little more footage, so camera crews will be capturing some final shots in and around town during the next couple of weeks.

Some of the footage will include wide shots to give viewers a glimpse of Carmel's beauty and character, so they might develop a better feel for it as the setting for the story. Fletchall said the rough film lacks those images.

He also wanted to warn residents and visitors that a helicopter will be flying low above Carmel Dec. 3 and 4 to obtain scenic shots for the film. With the helicopter hovering 100 feet above the ground, the camera can capture "a much more dynamic point of view," than the usual aerials.

"That's why we're doing that — to make it look much more spectacular for our film," he said, adding that he hopes people won't be alarmed when they see or hear the helicopter. "I just don't want people to freak out."

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taken to the airport by ambulance for airlifting to a trauma center in San Jose

Engles said only forensic analysis will be able to determine whether Nguyen's wounds were self-inflicted, or if Salazar stabbed him during the altercation, or both.

"He has lacerations and also what may be a couple of puncture wounds," he said. "We are going to depend on some forensic analysis to determine how those occurred."

Engles reported officers collected "a number of knives" from the residence.

"We're not sure if he brought something with him, or if he just used what was available at the residence," he said.

Police also found Nguyen's children — an 8-month-old boy and a 2-year-old girl — in another room, uninjured, and they were taken to PGPD and cared for until Monterey County Child Protective Services could retrieve them.

"Fortunately, I have staff here who have kids and were comfortable taking care of them," Engles said. "We got formula for the baby and grapes for the 2-year-old, and diapers."

CPS retrieved the children, but before they arrived in Salinas, their mother returned to the home on 17 Mile Drive where they all had lived and learned her mother had been stabbed to death and her ex-boyfriend was the prime suspect.

As soon as officers decided the woman and her children should be reunited, the CPS worker turned around and drove back to Pacific Grove P.D. Engles said the woman and her children are staying with family.

"Of course, this is a very traumatic time, and we've

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respected their space," he said. "We clearly have some followup to do with friends and family, but you want to step back and let them catch their breath."

Meanwhile, detectives and forensic technicians, with the help of Monterey County District Attorney's investigator Adam Sepagan (a former PGPD officer), and others, are continuing their investigation. Engles said they have spoken with Nguyen and anticipate he will be well enough to be moved to the infirmary at the Monterey County Jail.

"His state of mind is part of the investigation," Engles pointed out, and that could be determined by what he said to the cab driver during the drive over, among other things.

"Was it premeditated, or the heat of passion, or something that occurred once he got there? Those are all part of the investigation that we hope we'll be able to determine," he

"Obviously, he's in custody for the homicide because we have probable cause to believe he did it. The fine points of when exactly did it occur to him to commit the crime are still under investigation."

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



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
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Donna Searls Gilson


The Gibson's lived in Sioux Falls until 1983, when they purchased the Horizon Inn in Carmel, California.
