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\$486 million pricetag as river projects move closer to reality

■ Conservancy plans removal of San Clemente Dam by 2015

AN 89-YEAR-OLD dam on the Carmel River will be torn down to improve earthquake safety and habitat, according to a detailed proposal unveiled at two public meetings this week.

In front of audiences that were sometimes skeptical but more often supportive, officials with the California Coastal Conservancy and the National Marine Fisheries Service painted the \$83 million San Clemente Dam Removal project in idyllic terms, and without any reference to the federal and state budget crises.

"We're very excited about this plan, and we're at the stage where it's not 'if,' but 'how and

■ PUC OKs Marina desal plant

A NEW water project for the Monterey Peninsula became a much more real possibility Thursday, when state public utilities commissioners approved the Regional Water Project — estimated by the California Public Utilities Commission to cost \$403 million, but which another estimate says could reach \$500

million.

CPUC commissioners in San Francisco voted 4-1 to approve a public/private partnership to construct and operate a regional desalination project in Marina that would solve one of the Peninsula's decades-old water problems: overpumping of the Carmel River, which has been the Monterey Peninsula's primary water source since at least the 1920s.

A local plan approved as is, but with big questions about costs

"Today's decision balances the need for adequate water with the need to provide water at a reasonable price," said CPUC Commissioner John A. Bohn, who drew up the water agreement his colleagues approved.

Fresno gang members in nasty Peninsula crime spree

■ Big Sur resident barely escapes with life

FIVE REPUTED members of the notorious Fresno Bulldogs street gang were arrested near San Simeon Sunday after fleeing police in Pacific Grove, escaping down Highway 1, robbing a Gorda gas station and trying to shoot a Big Sur resident who was watching a DVD in his car.

The spree ended in gunfire, leaving one of the suspects injured.

The three men and two women — Flora Encinia, 32; Joe


Hernandez, 28; Ramiro Vasquez, 22; Manual Del Real, 21; and Delia Pena, 21, all of Fresno — were each charged with three felony counts of attempted murder, one felony count of armed robbery and one felony count of attempted armed robbery, according to the San Luis Obispo Sheriff's Office. Hernandez was also charged with felony possession of a controlled substance.

The crime spree began in Pacific Grove near the intersection of Central and Eardley avenues at about 7:30 p.m. when a police officer attempted to pull over a black Lincoln

CFD's future hinges on retirement costs, ambulance

CARMEL'S FIRE department is a local institution, with its 73-year-old firehouse on Sixth Avenue and its quick response times in a city where most homes have names instead of numbers.

But with costs of maintaining it as a stand-alone department going through the roof, the city is studying options for its future — including contracting with Cal Fire or the City of Monterey to run it, or joining several other fire departments to form a single agency.

Because of the complexity of the options, they should be presented for extensive discussion at a city council workshop sometime this month or next, Carmel city administrator Rich Guillen said Wednesday. He hopes the council will set a date for the debate during its regular meeting Dec. 7.

"Because it has been such a long time trying to get to where we are, and it's such a complicated issue, we will probably have a town-hall meeting or a workshop," he said, instead of hashing it out at the council's monthly meeting.

The debate over how best to operate the department began shortly after CFD Chief Bill Hill retired in 2001. To save the expense of a full-time chief, the city hired thenCarmel Valley Fire Chief Sidney Reade to oversee the fire department. In 2004, the city contracted then-P.G. Fire Chief Andrew Miller to step in.

Questions need answers

Monterey Fire Department took over PGFD in late 2008, and Carmel has continued contracting with Monterey for the services of its chief and other administrators. Their agreement is set to expire at the end of the year, but Guillen said Monterey agreed to a one-month extension in hopes the workshop will yield action on a long-term solution after he lays out all the options and their estimated costs.

He wouldn't reveal the dollar amounts, which haven't been finalized, but said operating CFD as a stand-alone agency is likely cost prohibitive, and forming a regional department isn't feasible at this point, because Seaside fire-fighters aren't willing to participate. Contracting with another agency, such as Cal Fire or the City of Monterey, or even a merger, seems the most likely option.

But councilmen Jason Burnett and Ken Talmage want some critical questions answered before they vote on any

FOUR LAWSUITS TAKE AIM AT COUNTY GENERAL PLAN

THE LEGAL floodgates opened last week as four lawsuits were filed against Monterey County for its new general plan. The suits were filed Nov. 24 — the last day legal action could be taken against the plan.

Lawsuits filed independently by The Carmel Valley Association, LandWatch Monterey County and The Open Monterey Project each argue that the new general plan permits too much development accompanied by too much damage to the environment.

The fourth lawsuit, filed in tandem by the Monterey County Farm Bureau and the Salinas Valley Water Coalition, objects to conditions in the new general plan that could restrict access to water farmers say they've already paid for.

The general plan was unanimously approved Oct. 26 by the Monterey County Board of Supervisors.

When she wants Mom to get up in the morning, sweet Asia shows she means business by uncharacteristically growling at her.












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He'll harass her until she stops stalking him



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Cat survives BB gun shooting

SOMEONE SHOT a Pacific Grove cat in the stomach with a BB gun last week, according to Pacific Grove animal control officer Elizabeth Conti-Yeo. The feline survived, but the pellet remains lodged in his abdomen, since the cat's owner "elected not to do radical surgery to remove it," she said.

The incident occurred sometime during the night of Nov. 23, and when the orange, long-haired cat came home the following day, the Stuart Avenue resident discovered the wound and took him to the vet. The owner then reported the crime to PGPD.

"Usually what happens is the cat is going into somebody's yard or pooping in their flower bed, and the neighbors get angry," Conti-Yeo said. So they shoot the animal with a BB gun, thinking "it's not going to really hurt it or will just scare it"

Conti-Yeo spoke with the resident while her cat was at the vet during the afternoon of Nov. 24 and learned the pet had not come home the previous night. When he finally did return, she noticed her cat was injured.

"She was very angry, because not only is it costly, it's not necessary," the officer said, since upset neighbors can usually track down a cat's owner and request efforts to better control the animal.

"She didn't know why anyone would shoot her cat," she added.

Such violence toward animals is uncommon in Pacific Grove, according to Conti-Yeo, but she recalled an incident in a neighborhood near the beach about a year-and-a-half ago in which a man's cat was hit by BBs on three separate occasions. The first pellet wasn't discovered until the cat was X-rayed after being shot the second time. After that, it occurred once more.

"He still lets his cat out," she added.

And in a horribly tragic incident last year, another Pacific Grove cat was poisoned to death after someone intentionally left antifreeze out for pets in the area of a Grove Acre apartment complex. Even a tiny bit of antifreeze can cause kidney failure.

Conti-Yeo urged anyone who is concerned about feline intruders to contact her for humane solutions.

"If people don't like cats in their yards, I can give them deterrent methods to keep the cats from coming, and if you're persistent, the cats won't go to that yard anymore," she said. "If the cat is truly a nuisance, then we can let the owners know this is causing a problem, and we can help resolve it."

when," said Laura Engeman of the state coastal conservan-

"It's one of our top priorities for the Central Coast and will do a great deal to help bring back the steelhead trout, which are diminishing every year," said Joyce Ambrosius of

An official with the Bureau of Land Management echoed their sentiments. "This is a great project which will create a large area of public open space," said George Hill.

San Clemente Dam, built in 1921 8.5 miles up the Carmel River to supply the Monterey Peninsula with water, is a graceful, concrete arch. But in the early 1990s, the California Department of Dam Safety declared it to be seismically unsafe and ordered its owner, California American Water, to make it safe. Furthermore, over the decades, the reservoir behind the dam became silted up, making it useless as a water source.

At first, Cal Am proposed to strengthen San Clemente Dam at a cost of \$49 million. But under pressure from environmentalists, the water company agreed to remove it if somebody else would pick up the extra cost and take liability for the property after the dam was no more.

That's where the coastal conservancy and BLM got involved, developing a project that would remove the old dam but leave the sediment accumulated behind the dam in place. It calls for rerouting the Carmel River along the path of an adjacent creek and using most of the dam pieces for rerouting the river.

"The more material we keep on site, the less the project costs," said Engeman, responding to residents' concerns that a lot of construction traffic would end up on Carmel Valley

Of the \$83 million overall cost, \$49 million will come from Cal Am's ratepayers, and the rest from federal and state taxpayers. While Engeman acknowledged some of the funding is not confirmed, she did not mention any anticipated difficulties getting it because of massive shortfalls in federal and state budgets.

According to Engeman, if permits for the project are approved by the end of 2011, construction will take place from 2012 to 2015.



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
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WITH DEFEAT IMMINENT, PADRES' FURIOUS COMEBACK PUTS THEM IN TITLE GAME

JUST 16 minutes away from an unceremonious end to their season, the Carmel High School football team battled back from a 21-point deficit to shock Half Moon Bay High School 42-35 Friday and advance to the Central Coast Section Division IV championship game.

The Padres (11-1) play Sacred Heart Prep School (10-2) of Atherton for the title Saturday, Dec. 4, at Westmont High in Campbell.

Carmel High's championship aspirations, though, were in serious doubt late in the third quarter after Half Moon Bay High cruised to a 35-14 lead.

"We were running out of time," Padres head coach Golden Anderson conceded. "It was by far the largest deficit we've faced in the last two years."

But Carmel High — the defending champion in it's division — wasn't ready to surrender.

"We stopped worrying about the score, and we started playing," Anderson explained. "We went down and scored, and then the defense got a stop. Then we went down and scored again, and the defense made another stop. That really charged up our defense."

The defensive effort was buoyed by senior linebacker Jesse Reimer. "He made a couple key plays," Anderson noted.

While the defense made its stand, the offense, led by junior quarterback Devin Pearson, did what it does best — score points fast. For the game, Pearson rushed 23 times for

176 yards and three touchdowns. He also completed 20 of 28 tosses for 163 yards and another score.

Senior running back Jimmy Osornio cut Half Moon Bay High's lead to just 1 point when he scored a touchdown with just 22 seconds left on the clock. Carmel High could have played it safe and kicked the extra point to send the game into overtime, but Anderson gambled on a 2-point play, which Pearson converted with a throw to sophomore wide receiver Mason Braun to seal the win. "It was a risk, but we had confidence it would work," Anderson explained.

Osornio scored another touchdown in the final seconds on a fumble recovery.

After the game, Anderson said he was proud of the


Padres' resiliency. "It was great to see they didn't give up," he said


With the victory over Half Moon Bay High, just one task remains for Carmel High — defeating Sacred Heart Prep for the championship. But it won't be easy.

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CPD tests plug-in Toyota Prius

FOR THE past several weeks, Carmel Police Cmdr. Mike Calhoun and a few others in the police department cruised around town and the Monterey Peninsula in a plugin Prius - for free. Toyota plans to produce the car in 2012 and has been letting government agencies and private companies use its prototypes, in exchange for feedback the manufacturer can use to improve the vehicle before it hits the mass market, according to

"It's a cool little car," he said.

Planning and building services Sean Conroy discovered the Prius testing program, according to Calhoun, and the city's application to participate was accepted. CPD

received two plug-in cars during the course of the testing period, which ended last week, and anyone who drove the Prius had to fill out a log indicating mileage, temperatures, comfort level, speeds, use of electric mode vs. gas, and other information.

"It has a lot of power, drives well and is comfortable," he said. But it won't replace a patrol car anytime soon, due to power, electrical load and space requirements.

"I could see it being a city-type vehicle an administrator's car - for the fuel economy," Calhoun said. "I don't know what the pricing is, but you save so much in gas: 70 gallons per year vs. 750 gallons per year,

"I think it's a really good move, and I was impressed with Toyota and the program."

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

Mellon said the move "enables the foundation to fulfill better its sole objective, the preservation and protection of California's existing 21 missions," since the Monterey Diocese contains seven missions, and a

dozen missions are within driving distance from the nonprofit's new offices on Carmel Rancho Boulevard.

And Carmel Mission is the burial place of Father Junipero Serra, who established the missions along the California coast, from San Diego to Sonoma, in the 1700s.

According to Mellon, the California Missions Foundation is the only statewide nonprofit dedicated to the long-term preservation of the historic buildings, and it raises money through private donations. Since its founding a dozen years ago, the foundation has raised \$4 million for seismic retrofits, art conservation and other preservation measures, including obtaining \$650,000 in federal tax dollars from the Save America's Treasures program for the work at Carmel




- Mission San Antonio \$23,100 for art conservation;

After the fliers went up, Baptie received a few calls from people who thought they had seen his dog, but the tips led

"My fear is a wild animal got her," Baptie said. "It's pretty devastating. She's a member of our family."

But he still has some hope. "She's a burrowing-type dog and will hide," he offered. But even if someone spots her, it won't be easy to get her home. "She's skittish, too, so she would be pretty tough to catch."

He and his wife had been in Carmel for Thanksgiving, visiting his mother and stepfather, who have lived in town for 22 years. Baptie said they delayed their return to Fullerton by a day to keep searching for Roxy but had to leave to go back

"It was absolutely horrible to drive away without her," he

However, he's holding out hope someone will see Roxy and is offering a reward of at least \$500 for her safe return.

"If she's still alive and in the area, she's probably timid and scared, and more apt to approach women than men," he





Navigator SUV because its driver wasn't wearing a seat belt. The vehicle was later determined to be stolen from Fresno.

When the officer approached the car, he observed "potentially hostile and threatening movements" inside of it, according to the Pacific Grove Police Department. At this point, the driver turned off his lights and sped away. After unsuccessfully pursuing the vehicle, the officer issued a BOL [be on the lookout] alert to local law enforcement agencies.

Once the suspects reached Highway 1, they headed south toward Big Sur, with police all over the county trying to locate them. At about 10:30 p.m., the Monterey County Sheriff's Office received a report of an attempted robbery of a motorist parked near Grimes Point, which is located about 30 miles south of Carmel.

The motorist — a Big Sur resident named John — was reportedly watching a DVD in his car when he was surprised by the suspects.

"John asked me to tell the story, so he didn't have to repeat it to everyone in Big Sur," explained Kate Novoa, a longtime resident. "He had parked on the side of Highway 1 when this Lincoln Navigator pulled up behind him. He thought it was the California Highway Patrol, so he went to get his license and registration. A man with a gun confronted him. John put his car into gear and started to pull away when the guy unloaded his .32. There is a bullet hole in his windshield and several more in his dash. John ducked, and drove away using his hands on the pedals.'

Amazingly, John was not hit by any bullets, and he called 911 from the pay phone at the Big Sur Deli.

Apparently the suspects' vehicle was running low on fuel, because their next stop was the gas station in Gorda, where they forced two employees at gunpoint to lie face down and not move while they filled up their tank. One victim reportedly moved and warning shots were fired into the ground between the pair.

From Gorda, the suspects crossed over the county line and continued south along the highway.

After receiving a report of the incident at the gas station, "San Luis Obispo deputies began to take up a position southbound on Highway 1 near Ragged Point to intercept the fleeing suspects," a statement by the San Luis Obispo County Sheriff's Department explained. "The vehicle was spotted approximately 20 minutes after the reported incident in Gorda. Two patrol units and a supervisor attempted to stop the suspects on Highway 1 south of downtown San Simeon. The suspects initially yielded as the deputies began a high risk vehicle stop."

But the suspects made one last attempt to escape.

"As the deputies had the suspects at gun point, the driver put the vehicle back in gear and made a turn back toward one of the deputies," the statement continued. "Other deputies opened fire on the car in an attempt to protect the deputy who took cover behind a patrol unit. The vehicle fled several hundred feet south on Highway 1, where it came to rest, and the five suspects were taken into custody without further inci-

One of them was treated at Sierra Vista Regional Medical Center for a bullet wound. All five suspects are in Monterey County Jail. The bail for Hernandez was set at \$525,000, while the bail for the other suspects was set a \$500,000 each.

Novoa, meanwhile, was unimpressed with the suspects' strategy for avoiding arrest.

"What idiot would choose an 'escape route' that is 90 miles long and only one way in or out?" she asked. "If this is any example of the intelligence of the Bulldog gang, this gene pool is going to die out early, as it should.'



According to the agreement, the desal plant would be owned and operated by the Marina Coast Water District and would treat a combination of seawater and brackish water that would be drawn from wells owned by the Monterey County Water Resources Agency.

Cal Am would purchase the desalinated water and build a storage facility and 10-mile pipeline to deliver it from Marina to its Peninsula customers while the Monterey Regional Water Pollution Control Authority would run the outfall that returns brine to the ocean.

Commissioner Nancy Ryan, who also voted to issue the permit, said it meets the Peninsula's needs "while protecting the environment and controlling ratepayer costs.

We must must be honest with ourselves and the ratepayers," Ryan said during the hearing at CPUC headquarters in San Francisco. "Rates will go up. A lot. But the alternative to this project, doing nothing, is even worse and will have dev-





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astating impact on the people of the Monterey area."

That's because in October 2009, the State Water Resources Control Board ordered Cal Am to steadily reduce pumping of the Carmel River until December 16, 2016, when the water company must stop illegal diversions by 70 percent.

But while the Regional Water Project will eliminate overpumping from the river, it will not provide any new water for infill development, remodels or building on lots of record.

And the regional project still needs approval from the California Coastal Commission, whose powerful executive director, Peter Douglas, has long opposed desalination projects along the coast.

Still, Thursday's decision was seen as a major milestone. "With the decision today," Cal Am spokeswoman Catherine Bowie told The Pine Cone after CPUC meeting,

A change of course

Before Thursday's vote, Bohn reversed course on an earlier recommendation that the CPUC make significant changes

proposal.

"It is by no means a foregone conclusion the way we are going," Burnett said.

Monterey's firefighters can take labor disputes to binding arbitration and have generous retirements coming due in the near future — which, in the event of a P.G.-style merger, could put Carmel on the hook for bills it may not want to pay.

"It would be irresponsible for Carmel's city council to sign up for an undisclosed but potentially multimillion-dollar liability," Burnett said.

In addition, the city could outline exactly what it wants from Cal Fire, including contracting only for chief and administrative services, while leaving the Carmel firehouse intact, Burnett offered.

Talmage focused on the importance of ambulance service. Carmel is the only city on the Monterey Peninsula with its own ambulance, and the majority of the calls to which the fire department responds are medical in nature. In 2009, for instance, the fire department fielded about 1,200 calls. Of those, only 22 involved fires, while 779 were medical in nature.

"Do we want to continue to have our own ambulance service? And if so, how is it going to interconnect with the various

options for fire?" Talmage asked. "What are the needs of this community, and what is the best way to meet the needs of this community? You have to find an option that weaves in the ambulance service."

Monterey Fire's last proposal made no mention of ambulance service, according to Talmage.

Guillen said another concern is that the city's firefighters not be moved out of Carmel. "We would want a commitment from Monterey or Cal Fire that existing firefighters stay where they are," he said. "Unless they want to leave on their own."

Firefighters still favor Monterey

Carmel firefighters have been vocal in their support of a merger with Monterey Fire and their opposition to a contract with Cal

In an email addressed to "Friends, Citizens, Workers and Visitors of Carmel bythe-Sea," veteran CFD Capt. Mitch Kastros contract with Monterey so they would not have to rely on assistance from neighboring agencies during a major fire and would be assured the Carmel station would remain open 24/7.

Furthermore, according to Kastros, Monterey Fire is working to cut administrative costs, and he reported CFD firefighters would forego the 8.75 percent pay raise they are supposed to receive Jan. 1, 2011, if the council approves a contract with Monterey.

"I am asking you to please help me to help you insure you will continue to receive the best levels of service from your fire department," he concluded.

But what's best for Carmel firefighters

might not be best for Carmel taxpayers, Burnett countered.

"My primary concern is what's best for Carmel," he said. "And it may very well be that there are certain situations that are in the firefighters' interest that are not in Carmel's interest."

"The structure of the contract with whomever is critical," Talmage commented, because it can deal with such issues.

"I hope the debate doesn't get into who's a better fire department, because I think Monterey Fire Department is excellent, and I think Cal Fire is excellent," Burnett added. "It's not who's better, but more a question of financial issues and ongoing control."

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

"It's a perfect fit," he added. "I'm a longtime fan of



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
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
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P.G. stabbing suspect moved to jail

PACIFIC GROVE police took Sunny Nguyen, the 26-year-old Seaside resident accused of stabbing his ex-girlfriend's mother to death in her 17 Mile Drive home late the night of Nov. 21, to Monterey County Jail Wednesday night after he was released from the San Jose trauma center where he underwent surgery for stab wounds of his own.

PGPD Chief Darius Engles said forensics experts will determine whether Nguyen's injuries — including a deep laceration to his neck — were self-inflicted or resulted from a fight with the victim, 46-year-old Judith Salazar. Police broke into the house and found Nguyen lying on the floor next to her body after they came to investigate a taxi driver's report that Nguyen had gone into the

residence and had not paid his fare.

Nguyen, who is being held on \$1 million bail, appeared in Monterey County Superior Court with defense attorney Richard Rosen Tuesday but did not enter a plea.

He's scheduled to appear again Dec. 7, according to Rosen, when he could "possibly" enter a plea.

Meanwhile, P.G. police served a search warrant on the Seaside house where Nguyen had been staying before his arrest, according to Engles. He said officers retrieved items from the home but would not say whether the evidence was useful for the case against Nguyen. The suspect's two young children, who were in the Pacific Grove home when Salazar died, are staying with their mother.

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

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tracking and tracing of high-risk foods; and

She added those provisions with the intention that conservation measures undertaken by farmers will not be undermined by the new rules.

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


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

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

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The lawsuits, each of which was filed Nov. 24, come as no surprise. When the general plan was approved, county counsel Les Gerard said the county faced "potential litigation from both sides."

"Pick your poison," he suggested.

Supervisor Lou Calcagno, meanwhile, warned activists that a legal challenge to the general plan would be a waste of taxpayers'

"[You are] just going to cost the county money that could go to more valuable projects," he said.

Counting cars

The Carmel Valley Association has long argued that the county - and now the general plan — uses an "extremely lax" method of measuring traffic in Carmel Valley that allows for more congestion than a method used in other areas of the county.

"Everyone in the county who lives with congested roads should be concerned," said Carmel Valley activist Glenn Robinson. "If the supervisors can get away with these shenanigans in Carmel Valley, they will use the same technique elsewhere in the county in an attempt to remove traffic congestion as a development-limiting environmental impact."

The CVA's lawsuit demands an "adequate" EIR or a return to the previous method of measuring traffic, according to its attorney, Ron DeHoff.

DeHoff said the CVA also is objecting to the omission in the new plan of "specific standards" that prohibit development on steep slopes and protect endangered species. He said the old plan offered those protec-

LandWatch wants studies updated

The lawsuit by LandWatch, meanwhile,

was filed in part because the group believes environmental studies for the 2001 Salinas Valley Water Project — which the general plan relied upon — are based on outdated information. "There have been numerous and substantial changes in the assumptions made ... regarding agricultural land use, population, and water demand," reads a passage from a letter LandWatch delivered to supervisors Oct. 26.

As a result, LandWatch believes the water section of the general plan must be recirculated. "You can't put out new information and not give the public an opportunity to comment on it," explained Amy White, executive director of LandWatch.

As an example of new information that was inserted into the general plan, White cites a 17,000-acre-foot increase in agricultural demand for water. She said the public was told in 2008 that there would be no increase in demand for water from the agricultural sector. She also accused the county of justifying the increase by saying that urban water demand would decrease by 17.000-acre-feet — a claim White said can't be backed up with any evidence.

The LandWatch lawsuit also raises concern that the general plan will permit development in the county's "wine corridor" without adequate environmental review.

"The same environmental review should be required in the wine corridor that is required everywhere else in the county," White added.

Group seeks another EIR

The lawsuit filed by The Open Monterey Project challenges the general plan's EIR, which the group says doesn't fully address the impacts on the environment that its policies would permit.

"The [general plan] would have significant unmitigated impacts on Monterey County and would change the physical environment of Monterey County forever," the lawsuit reads. "These impacts were not ade-

quately identified, investigated or analyzed in the environmental impact report"

And even though the plan took more than a decade to finalize, the group claims the general plan's vetting process was accelerated as it moved closer to being adopted.

"The county's rush to complete the approval of the General Plan resulted in prejudicial errors and omissions, and reflected a desire for expediency over public participation and good faith, reasoned analysis," its authors, attorneys Michael Stamp and Molly Erickson, insist.

Farmers say no to proving water

The lawsuit filed by the Monterey County Farm Bureau and the Salinas Valley Water Coalition asks the county to rescind policies in the general plan that require users of the Salinas Valley Water Project to prove they have a "long-term and sustainable" water supply. "We believe we made a contract with the county when voters agreed to fund the project," said Nancy Isakson, the president of the SVWC. "The taxpayers have held up their end of the bargain."

What happens next?

Gerard said the lawsuits "will muddy the waters" for people coming in now and applying for permits.

"They won't know if they're subject to the 1982 General Plan or the 2010 General Plan," he explained.

But Gerard also said, "The county feels very confident that we can defend against these lawsuits and put behind us the decadelong process of updating the general plan."



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Editorial

An end to 12-0

IN THE 1957 movie, "Twelve Angry Men," a jury is about to vote 11-1 to convict a young boy of murdering his father until the enlightened and persuasive holdout (played by Henry Fonda) convinces his fellow jurors to give up their prejudices about the accused and let him go free.

When it came out, the movie was intended as a parable about the perils of innocent people — especially minorities — being railroaded through the criminal justice system of the mid-20th century. And the most important protection a criminal defendant had against being wrongly convicted, the movie purported to show, was the requirement for a unanimous verdict.

But while the danger of an unjust verdict was surely real at the time, it is much less so today. In the 1960s, a Supreme Court that was much more concerned about the rights of the accused than with protecting society from crime bestowed on defendants vast new privileges, including being advised they didn't have to say anything to police until they'd talked to an attorney, and that topnotch counsel had to be provided to them free of charge. The high court also made it much easier to exclude evidence that was improperly gathered, and created a host of other "rights" for people charged with serious crimes.

While that was going on, a movement was afoot in the nation to expand the pool of citizens from which juries were selected. In the old days, the sole source of potential jurors was the list of registered voters — a group which was more educated and politically and socially aware than the public at large. Now, in California at least, jury summonses also go to people whose names drawn from DMV rolls. And practically everybody has a driver's license.

Furthermore, this nation has increasingly become a place where loudmouths are enabled by the media and political culture, and where narcissists are encouraged to turn to the political domain to satisfy their need for attention. Try getting any 12 people to agree about anything, and you'll see what we mean. Or you can sit in on the public comment period at practically any public hearing. Nutjobs are everywhere; Henry Fondas are rare.

The result of all this is that it's far harder to get a conviction now than it was in the past, and far less likely that someone will be railroaded.

Even local crime statistics bear this out: According to the FBI, in the 1980s, 65 percent of murders in Monterey County resulted in arrests, and only about half of these ended in guilty verdicts at trial. From 2000 to 2008, those numbers declined to 37 percent of murders ending in arrest, with even fewer convictions. Literally, most murderers get away with it.


And while nationwide crime rates are falling, all it takes is a few days sitting in on the arraignment or preliminary hearing calendars at the Salinas courthouse to be shocked at the number and kinds of crimes that are being committed every day.

We realize we're swimming upstream against a national belief — driven by the ACLU and the big-city media that fall for every pronouncement the group makes — that the problem with the American criminal justice system is that too many people are being locked up, not too few. So adamant are the media about this conclusion that troublesome facts, such as the statistics about murder arrests we just cited, are never mentioned in the New York Times or on CBS News.

Taking into account all the changes in the criminal justice system and the rights accorded to defendants in the past 50 years, we think the threshold for a jury verdicts in criminal cases in California should be lowered to 11-1 or 10-2. And if that means more bad guys go to prison for their deeds, good.

to plans for the water project. Instead, it opted to approve the regional project just the way Cal Am, the Monterey County Water Resources Agency and Marina Coast proposed it.

Capital costs for the project, which will for the most part be passed to Peninsula water customers, were capped at \$403.5 million. Costs exceeding the cap will be passed on to ratepayers only upon showing "exceptional circumstances" and after a "rigorous reasonableness review," according to the CPUC.

Bohn said the "detailed framework of the agreements, governance structure and other safeguards "provide reasonable assurance in

our judgment that the project will be built at reasonable cost to the ratepayers," according to the CPUC's decision.

Commissioner Dian Grueneich was critical of Bohn's decision because it does not include the more stringent cost oversight measures that had earlier been recommended.

And Diana Brooks, a supervisor with DRA, argued that regional project costs were way too high and that the CPUC's decision "inappropriately delegates oversight responsibilities to Cal Am to ensure the reasonableness of project costs."

She said her office was "very disappointed that the commission did not support the proposed decision of Administrative Law Judge Angela Minkin, which would have also approved the regional project, but with important safeguards to keep costs down and

ensure water rates are just and reasonable," Brooks said.

She said the decision was a "win for Cal Am shareholders and development interests at the former Ft. Ord and a setback for ratepayers."

After the CPUC approval of the project, the DRA issued a press release contending the project could cost a half-billion dollars, resulting in water costing an astounding \$11,000 per acre-foot, whereas the "most expensive desalinated water in the world" costs about \$3,000 per acre foot.

But the CPUC determined that there are sufficient procedural, contractual and other safeguards in the water agreement "to be reasonably certain to produce the lowest cost, viable and timely solution" to the Peninsula's water needs.

Water rates associated with the project will be determined in a separate proceeding. However, customers are expected to see an increase of more than 60 percent than their current water bill, according to the CPUC.

He had come from London to New York to conduct The Mikado, to fight against piracy of Gilbert and Sullivan operas in the States, and principally to visit the children of his deceased brother in Los Angeles! His train journev from New York to San Francisco took 9 days, including stops in Chicago, Iowa, Denver, Salt Lake City and Sacramento. Of Iowa he wrote; No liquors to be sold in this state. Shall not dine in Iowa."" He hated the food in Lincoln, Nebraska; he played the organ in Denver's opera house; repeated that impromptu recital at the Mormon Tabernacle; visited Chinatown and Alcatraz in San Francisco; and took the overnight train 428 miles to L.A.
