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## Storm floods Mission, topples tree on campers

■ Redwood falls on cabin

TWO GUESTS at a private campground along the Big Sur River narrowly escaped death late Tuesday night when a redwood tree came crashing down on the cabin they were renting.

"The tree snapped at its base and crushed part of the cabin," explained Big Sur Volunteer Fire Brigade Chief Martha Karstens, who estimated the tree was about 4 feet in diameter. The night was rainy and windy as one of a series of Pacific

# State steps up collection of long-ignored tax

■ Businesses told they have to start filing annual 'use tax' returns

MILLIONS OF Californians this holiday season shopped at Amazon.com, eBay and countless other online out-of-state retailers to avoid paying sales tax. They also bought things in New York, Europe or Hawaii while they were on vacation.

But hardly any of them did what they were legally required to do next: Pay sales tax to California for the value of the goods brought into the state.

For 75 years, California has had a law requiring consumers pay a "use tax," equivalent to the in-state sales tax, on goods purchased out of state. Today, a Carmel resident who purchases a tax-free, \$1,000 necklace or camera online owes \$82.50 to the state as soon as the purchase is delivered. The

## Thieves find Peninsula residents are easy prey

CRIMINALS, OFTEN drug addicts seeking anything they can sell to get their next fix, are finding easy pickings in Carmel, Pacific Grove and other areas of the Peninsula, where people leave valuables lying about and sometimes neglect to lock their doors.

"They are taking everything: GPS's, iPods, anything that has

any kind of value," said Pacific Grove Police Cmdr. John Nyunt, whose department is investigating more than a dozen car burglaries and thefts that occurred during the past two weeks.

"We are mainly seeing residential burglaries to second homes," said Carmel P.D. detective Rachelle Lightfoot, who is trying to solve numerous break-ins of homes, businesses and cars perpetrated since August.

"Please urge everyone to keep their belongings in a safe

place and be aware of who is coming into their neighborhood," she said. "If they hear suspicious noises, please call us, and we will investigate."

In Carmel, burglars hit a half dozen cars between Dec. 11 and Dec. 20, according to Lightfoot, and several more vehicles just outside the city limits were broken into late last week — the same timeframe during which numerous cars were burglarized in Pacific Grove.

All of the Carmel cars were locked, Lightfoot said, but they contained valuables like cameras, wallets, bags and gift cards. She recovered evidence in some of those cases.

In the dozen residential burglaries that have occurred since August, Lightfoot said many of the homes are left vacant for much of the year, and the burglars forced their way

## Commission: Tiffany blue not such a bad thing

GUIDELINES FOR businesses in Carmel call for using neutral, subdued tones, rather than bright colors. But since a special shade of teal practically says, "Tiffany," the jewelry store at Mission and Ocean in Carmel Plaza can use its signature color in awnings over its windows, the city's planning commission decided Dec. 8.

Commissioners also approved two new wall signs to replace the sign hanging above the door. Although the signs are steel, and design guidelines generally favor wood and other natural materials, associate planner Marc Wiener said the new signs would match the stainless steel security doors and windows on the corner building, and commissioners agreed

However, Wiener advised the commission to require the business to select a color other than Tiffany & Co.'s signa-

ture teal for its nine awnings, because the design standards for Carmel Plaza call for colors that are "muted and blend in with their natural surroundings," and the city's guidelines recommend avoiding bright and primary colors.

"The proposed aqua-teal color does not appear muted and has a 'bright' appearance that will stand out on this storefront," he said in his report for the commission.

Representing Tiffany & Co., architect Brian Congleton asked the commission to OK the awnings and their color.

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
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# No trial yet for man accused of running over principal's son


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## Talk radio host sued for alleged fraud, Ponzi scheme

## ■ Barbra Alexander defends herself against lawsuits

THE FORMER host of a nationally syndicated radio program who faces federal charges of misappropriating funds in an alleged investment scam defended herself this week against lawsuits filed by two investors — including a Carmel woman — who claim they were bilked out of more than a million dollars.

In the most recent lawsuit, filed Dec. 15, Randy Schuyler claims that Barbra Alexander — the host of radio show "MoneyDots" and former president of APS Funding — and her three former business partners stole \$750,000 he gave them to invest.

Schuyler's suit, which claims fraud and breach of fiduciary duty, additionally alleges Alexander, of Monterey, and partners Beth Piña of Fairfield, Idaho; Michael E. Swanson of Seaside and David Shriner used his money for their own personal gain.

Though she hadn't been served with Schuyler's lawsuit, Alexander said in an interview with The Pine Cone this week that "filing [the lawsuit] and actually proving it are two different things."

Schuyler's suit follows a lawsuit filed in 2009 by Helga Pate of Carmel, who alleges she invested a half-million dollars in Alexander's investment company.

"This is essentially a fraud case," according to Pate's lawsuit, filed in May 2009. "Barbra Alexander and her codefendants took in excess of \$500,000 of plaintiff's money without any intent of repaying it."

Without commenting specifically about either lawsuit, Alexander — who said she hasn't been involved with APS Funding since March — further defended herself.

"There is more to it than meets the eye,"

she said. She also stated "nobody has proved yet that we have done anything wrong."

Alexander said she is no longer host of "MoneyDots."

Alexander is also being sued by her former attorney, Hugo Gerstl of Monterey, for failure to pay him \$42,000 in fees and interest. Gerstl had worked for Alexander in the Pate lawsuit.

However, Alexander said Gerstl — whom she said had also been representing her former business partners in the case — erred by sending all the legal bills to her.

"I have asked him to break it out," she told The Pine Cone, "but he hasn't done it. I can't afford to pay for the legal fees of the other defendants as well."

Schuyler's attorney, John Coniglio, declined to discuss details of the case but said he is "proceeding through the litigation process."

#### Federal charges

Prior to Schuyler's lawsuit, Alexander, Piña and Swanson were already in trouble with the feds for alleged fraud.

In October, the U.S. Securities and Exchange Commission charged the trio with misappropriating \$2.5 million of about \$7 million they raised through the sale of interests in two real estate investment funds.

Instead, according to the SEC, the trio "stole investor money to pay themselves \$1.2 million and finance "MoneyDots" and other unrelated businesses unbeknownst to investors. Alexander even used \$200,000 of investor funds to remodel her kitchen."

Alexander, Piña and Swanson raised the money from nearly 50 investors for two investment funds managed by APS Funding. They claimed the funds would make short-term secured loans to homeowners and yield 12 percent annual returns to investors, according to the SEC's complaint filed in federal district court in San Jose.

In his lawsuit, Schuyler alleges he invest-

ed about \$753,000 but never saw a return on his investment.

"Plaintiff ... believes that this was all part of a premeditated, intentional scheme to defraud investors," according to Schuyler's lawsuit

The SEC further alleges that Alexander, Piña and Swanson furthered their scheme by sending monthly account statements to

investors reflecting fictitious profits and, "in classic Ponzi scheme fashion," paying out purported returns that actually came from new investors.

According to the "MoneyDots" website — which aired on 34 stations — Alexander's show covered a range of topics including, "how to hide your money around the globe," and "how to fight the IRS."

## Yard fires OK in Carmel Valley


THE CARMEL Valley Fire District announced that, thanks to the start of rainy season, backyard burns are permitted now through April 30, 2011.

Anyone wanting to let yard waste go up in smoke needs to acquire a free permit from the department and receive authorization the day of the fire.

On the day a permit holder actually wants to set a match to his yard debris, he must contact the fire department, which will notify him whether that day has been declared a "permissive burn day" by the Monterey Bay Unified Air Pollution Control District.

C.V. Fire officials will grant authorization to the first 20 permit holders who register their burns by calling the mid-valley station. No backyard fires are allowed on Sundays.

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
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# P.G. brokers charged with fraudulent mortgage practices

TWO PACIFIC Grove sisters faced civil prosecution this week by the Monterey County District Attorney's Office for alleged fraudulent mortgage loan practices.

Susana Silva and Deanna Gobert, who own Estates on the Bay, misled the public and clients about Silva's real estate license status by failing to disclose that the state revoked her broker's license six years ago because she falsified loan documents, according to the DA's office.

"Rather than comply with the revocation order," according to deputy district attorney John Hubanks, "Silva and Gobert continued to broker real estate loans and falsify loan applications."

"Based on what I read and what I know, we are pretty confident the case has no merit," said the sisters' Monterey attorney Bill Daniels. "We are going to defend these young women and will take it to trial if necessary."

The district attorney's office said it began investigating the pair in 2009 after it received complaints of loan fraud and illegal advertising.

Before she lost her real estate license in 2004, Silva had been the broker for Estates on the Bay, on 14th Street in Pacific Grove. After her license was revoked, Gobert took over the company.

"Although Gobert advised the Department of Real Estate that her sister had resigned her corporate position and sold her shares in their company," according to Hubanks, "the complaint alleges that Gobert not only permitted Silva to continue brokering loans, but their company continued to engage in the same illegal business practices."

Daniels refuted the claims.

"I don't think there is any violation," he said. "And it is our belief that some of the significant violations are false."

According to Estates on the Bay's website, "the real estate slowdown has made even the Monterey Peninsula a buyer's market. We cannot think of anything more rewarding then helping someone find their dream home."

The civil complaint seeks permanent injunctive relief directing Silva and Gobert to comply with the law and consumer restitution, including compensating clients who were charged commissions from fraudulent real estate loans or loans performed by Silva.

Daniels said his clients were in contact with the DA's office for six months before Hubanks issued a press release about the case. "What puzzles and disappoints me is rather than respond to my letter, [Hubanks] went to you guys, the press."

The sisters also face civil penalties of as much as \$2,500 per day for alleged illegal business practices.

## Speeding stop yields bags of pot

A TRAFFIC stop on a driver going 40 mph in a 25 mph zone on Ocean Avenue at 11 p.m. Dec. 9 yielded what Carmel Police Sgt. Paul Tomasi called "the most marijuana I've ever seen come out of a car."

After seeing 23-year-old Phillip Rohlik speeding eastbound on Ocean Avenue in his gray Mercedes, the officer pulled him over near Highway 1 and noted "a strong odor of marijuana coming from the car," Tomasi said. Due to that and the fact Rohlik is on five years' probation for a past conviction for being under the influence of a controlled substance, he had to let police search his car.

"Inside the trunk, they found a backpack filled with a ton of marijuana," Tomasi said. A total of 358 grams — more than three-fourths of a pound — was packed in a cou-

ple of gallon-size ziplocks and glass jars.

Officers also reportedly found \$529 in cash on him and a "Rambo knife" concealed between the driver's seat and the center console, which constitutes a felony.

After arresting Rohlik, police went to the Oak Place house where he lives with his parents and awakened them in order to conduct their search. By then, it was 2:30 a.m., according to Tomasi, and in the garage, they found two more glass jars containing a total of 240 grams of marijuana, bringing the grand total to more than 21 ounces.

Tomasi said Rohlik possesses a card allowing him to use pot for medicinal purposes, but the amount he had far exceeded the limit of 8 ounces, which also requires a letter from a doctor. "The guy claimed he transports the marijuana to dispensaries throughout the area," he said.

in in most cases.

"The main things taken are electronics, flat screens, laptops and Blu Rays, and jewelry," she said. "Other expensive stuff is left."

They are also targeting businesses. On Dec. 15, someone stole the cash register from a restaurant on Lincoln Street after a door was left unlocked, and during the night of Dec. 18 or early morning Dec. 19, a thief took the 55-pound bronze bust of sculptor Richard MacDonald that had been left outside Dawson Cole Fine Art at Lincoln and Sixth — the same gallery that had another

valuable sculpture stolen in October. The bust was valued at close to \$16,000, according to Lightfoot.

"Officers did a business check around 2 a.m. and noticed it was missing," she said. A gallery employee also reported the theft to police later that morning.

Almost a dozen victims reported thefts and burglaries to P.G. police between Dec. 14 and 20, with the bulk of them — nine — occurring the night of Dec. 15 or the morning of Dec. 16. Eight of those vehicles were unlocked, according to police, and the ninth had its convertible cover cut

In addition, thieves stole computers, a phone system and keys from the Anton Inn on Dec. 3, someone took a television from a rental property on Dec. 18, and a suspect tried to break into a Lighthouse Avenue business Dec. 19 or 20 but failed to get through the window or the back door.

Nyunt said parolees, drug addicts and

gang members are hitting his city and other Peninsula locations, because they know the prey is easy.

"Hey, everybody knows to come to Carmel and P.G., because people don't lock things up," he said. "A lot of times, what they do is come to visit the oceanfront and so forth, but also they come to do nefarious things."

On Dec. 12, police chased down and arrested 31-year-old Seaside resident Francois Williams after he ditched his car in the area of Asilomar and Arena during a traffic stop, according to P.G. Cmdr. John Miller. They discovered he was a parolee and arrested him for DUI, an outstanding warrant for violation of parole, possession of black tar heroin and resisting arrest. Officers also arrested his 40-year-old female passen-

ger, Shauna Wimp of Marina, for being drunk in public.

An increased gang presence in P.G., although still minor, may be due to greater pressure on gang members in Salinas. "It's like squeezing the balloon," Nyunt said. "They're squeezing them in Salinas, so they have to go somewhere."

And criminals' drug addictions drive them to steal, too.

"People lose that whole moral compass," he said. "They feel good, and they'll do anything to get that fix.

They'll steal anything, as long as they can get their next score."

Nyunt urged people to take all valuables out of their cars, lock their doors, use alarms and alert police to any problems or suspicious circumstances.

"We only can do so much," Nyunt said. "And we rely on our citizens to care for their property."

## County registrar dinged for DUI

MONTEREY COUNTY Registrar of Voters Linda Tulett, 43, was arrested on suspicion of drunken driving shortly before 1 a.m. Sunday, Dec. 19, after a Pacific Grove police officer pulled her over on David Avenue for speeding, according to PGPD Cmdr. John Nyunt.

"She showed objective symptoms of intoxication and was right at the [DUI] limit," he said.

Tulett, who lives on Funston Avenue in P.G., was taken to the police station and held there until sober. She was released just after 4 a.m. with a citation to appear in court on the charge.

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A recent series of serious injury and fatal

accidents involving drunken drivers has shocked the community, and Tulett's arrest serves as a reminder that police are out in force patrolling the streets for DUIs during the holidays.

In a ramped-up effort that began last Friday and runs through the New Year's weekend, every available officer is on the road hunting for drunken and drugged drivers throughout the county. Last year's Avoid the 18 campaign brought in 117 DUI suspects, and one person died in a crash that involved alcohol.

The statewide taxpayer-funded crack-down is paid for by the California Office of Traffic Safety through the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration and is the largest such effort in the country.

## New laws: License plates, video cameras and moving billboards

As DRIVERS celebrate the New Year, they are also required to find out about the latest laws their state legislators and Gov. Arnold Schwarzenegger put on the books during the past 12 months, many of which take effect Jan. 1, 2011. To give people a fighting chance at knowing the rules so they can avoid being stopped and ticketed for violating them, the CHP highlighted several of the new laws "designed to make California roadways safer for travelers, regardless of their mode of transportation," according to CHP Commissioner Joe Farrow.

- Would-be motorcycle riders under the age of 21 must complete a safety course administered by the CHP before they can be licensed.
- License plates must be "mounted parallel to the ground so the characters are upright and display from left to right."
- The yellow "clean air access" stickers, issued to the owners of hybrid vehicles so they can drive in carpool lanes, were supposed to expire Jan. 1 but received a six-month extension, while the white clean-air stickers, for "super lowemission vehicles" will be valid until Jan. 1, 2015.
- Apparently a lot of people are installing video cameras inside vehicles to keep an eye on drivers' performance,

because the law now permits them to be mounted on the inside of the windshield ("in a 7-inch square in the lower corner of a vehicle windshield on the passenger side, or a 5-inch square in the lower corner of the vehicle windshield on the driver's side, outside of an airbag deployment zone, or in a 5inch square in the center uppermost portion of the interior of the windshield"). But video-equipped vehicles that record sound must also contain visible notices advising occupants they might be recorded.

■ Law enforcement officers will have their own version of the Amber Alert, which heretofore has alerted the public about missing children via highway billboards and the emergency broadcast system. A Blue Alert will be issued if a suspect at large has killed, seriously injured or assaulted a police officer. "It's important to catch a cop-killer immediately," said State Sen. George Runner of Antelope Valley, who authored the new law, as well as the 2003 Amber Alert

■ Cities and counties will now have the authority to regulate mobile billboards — defined by a new state law as "advertising displays that are attached to wheeled, mobile, non-motorized vehicles that carry, pull or transport a sign or billboard and is for the primary purpose of advertising." They can also be towed if left in an unauthorized area.



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# 103-year-old may be victim of elder financial abuse

## ■ Attorney investigates possible impropriety

AN INVESTIGATION is under way into possible financial abuse of a 103-year-old Pacific Grove woman who made news in 2005, when she was removed from her rundown oceanfront home amid allegations a relative stole a mint in precious coins from her estate.

Not long after Lillian King was found to be living in squalid conditions in her multimillion Sunset Drive house five years ago, police investigated the theft of scores of valuable gold and silver coins from her \$6.5 million estate. King's grand niece later admitted taking some of them.

Since then, King has led a more stable life. She receives 24-hour care at another Pacific Grove home, and longtime friend Nader Agha is conservator of her estate.

But according to documents filed in Monterey County Superior Court in October by Carmel attorney Al Nicora — who was appointed by a judge in 2006 to be King's guardian ad litem — King may have been the victim of financial abuse again.

"As this court is aware," Nicora wrote in a court document, "I am undertaking an investigation concerning certain allegations of financial impropriety which have arisen in this case."

Nicora, who declined to discuss details of the case, did not disclose possible suspects but wrote that his investigation is near completion and that he would file his report "in camera" — privately with the judge which prohibits the public from reviewing it.

Making the allegations public, he said, "may compromise the proposed civil litigation and may have a negative impact on the ongoing criminal investigation."

It's unclear how long the investigation has been under way, although Nicora indicated in March that he had information that "Mrs. King's legal rights have been compromised." In 2009, a Monterey private investigator, Karen Villars, hired by Agha, told The Pine Cone she had new information — including a suspect in the case — that could lead to the recovery of some of King's coins. Villars said she would forward the results of her investigation to police.

Based on Villars' information, Pacific Grove Police Cmdr. John Nyunt said detectives looked into possible impropriety, though it's not known if Nicora's investigation is related to the PGPD inquiry. But police didn't find much, Nyunt said.

"It's more of a civil issue than anything ... concerning people who were in charge of the trust," he explained. "The district attorney's office looked at it and said there's nothing criminal here."

Monterey County chief assistant district attorney Terry Spitz confirmed the DA's office looked into the case but didn't find enough evidence to charge anybody.

Court records indicate King's immediate family as a niece and a nephew. In July 2007, her nephew resigned as the conservator of her estate and Agha — who owns the Holman Building in Pacific Grove — was appointed the estate's general conservator.

In 2005, after police found King was living in terrible conditions at her oceanfront home, the building was condemned and she was placed into into the care of the county's adult protective services. She eventually moved into the other P.G. house.

It costs King about \$200,000 per year for 24-hour home care, and she pays tens of thousands of dollars per year in legal fees.

More than \$2 million in coins were stolen from King. Her grand niece, Cynthia Hurley — who lived on King's P.G. property at the time — pleaded no contest to taking some of them. Hurley served some time in jail and was released.

About \$500,000 in precious coins were also stolen from a storage unit in Monterey. An attorney working for King filed suit against the storage company, which settled the case out of court this year.

The coins have never been recovered.



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## New sandbar plan generates little opposition, shows early promise

WHEN THE Carmel River Lagoon began rising during last weekend's storms, it only took Monterey County Public Works a few minutes to start the river flowing to the sea, thanks to a new strategy that didn't leave most of the work until the last minute.

County workers used bulldozers Monday to help remove a "plug" from a channel in the sandbar that separates Carmel River Lagoon from the ocean. The channel, which was carved out four weeks ago by public works, is typically cut in December or January to relieve pressure from the lagoon, which swells with water during and after winter rains.

In previous years, the annual "breaching" of the sandbar has generated much controversy as environmentalists and residents have argued over the best strategy for managing the water level in the lagoon.

Environmental activists have urged the county to cut the channel in a northwesterly direction so that young steelhead are not swept out into Carmel Bay before they are

Nearby residents, though, have encouraged the county agency to cut the channel in a southwesterly direction, because they're worried the channel will shift dangerously close to the sandy bluffs that support Scenic Road — which it did in 2005.

This year, though, despite the fact that no permits exist for the work, there has been remarkably little contention. After consulting for the past year with the National Marine Fisheries Service and the Carmel River Steelhead Association, public works did much of the construction of the channel nearly a month ago, cutting a 500-foot long, 20-foot wide path in a direction slightly north of west.

Once the initial effort was complete, all that separated the lagoon and the ocean was a 9-foot-high sand barrier — also known as a "plug" — that could easily be removed.

According to public works director Yazden Emrani, the strategy attempts "to maintain the contour and shape of the channel," thereby decreasing the possibly it might push dangerously to the north.

The incident occurred at Riverside Campground and Cabins, which is located on Highway 1 about 24 miles south of Carmel. The man and woman — whose names were not released — were taken by ambulance to Community Hospital.

#### Lots of rain, little damage

Aside from the redwood falling on the cabin — and a few brief road closures and power outages — Big Sur residents came out of last week's storm in pretty good shape.

"It was amazing," reported Kate Novoa, who lives high atop a ridge on Big Sur's south coast. "The storm hardly did anything. We really dodged it."

Novoa, who keeps the world informed about many Big Sur topics through her blog (bigsurkate.wordpress.com), recorded about nine inches of rain over the past week. She said another resident nearby recorded about 11 inches

After laying out a path and carving a channel, public works waited until the lagoon hit its flood stage of 9.5 feet above mean sea level, which it did Monday. In response, a notch was cut in the middle of the plug, which provided nature with all the encouragement it needed.

Water from the lagoon soon pushed through the sand barrier and connected the lagoon to the sea.

Bulldozers, meanwhile, will periodically be used to push sand north toward the channel to maintain its slight northwesterly direction, Emrani explained. Emrani is encouraged by what's been seen so far. "It's looking good," he said before adding, "Knock on wood."

While the work by the county agency has attracted little attention from environmental activists or residents, the local seagull population seemed quite fascinated by the project. Countless numbers of the birds descended upon the area Monday, and hundreds of them lined up along the channel's sandy bluffs. According to a county employee who was surveying the scene, "I've never seen this many seagulls here before."

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# Pet-friendly inn stages calming concert for dogs

HUMANS have long used music to help them relax, so it should come as no surprise that dogs are getting in on the action — particularly in canine-friendly Carmel.

To help raise awareness for Doris Day's latest pet project, classical pianist Lisa Spector will perform a free concert at the Cypress Inn Sunday, Dec. 26.

The Cypress Inn, which is co-owned by Day, is famous for its welcoming attitude toward dogs.

A graduate of the prestigious Julliard School, Spector will play classical music specifically designed to relax dogs.

"Seven years ago, I was raising puppies to be guide dogs," Spector explained." I had a very rambunctious puppy, and I was looking for ways to keep him calm. I realized that certain kinds of music worked."

Later, Spector met sound researcher and music producer Joshua Leeds, and the two began a collaborative project to create a series of musical CDs for dogs. Under the banner of their business — "Through A Dog's Ear" — the duo has recorded and produced five CDs.

According to Spector, dogs find it difficult to relax for many of the same reasons as humans. "For the most part, dogs need to adapt to our world, which overloads our senses," she said.

But unlike people, a dog can't distinguish between a safeguard — like a group of children playing — and a potentially unsafe sound — like a gunshot. Confused, dogs begin to bark.

"They can't associate what a sound means," Spector observed.

Spector's recordings — which are influenced by classical music but are slower and more simplified — capture a dog's attention

in such a benevolent way that the dog physically relaxes.

"The music slows down a dog's heart rate," Spector said. "It calms the nervous system, and it gives them an escape from sensory overload."

After donating several of her CDs to a dog shelter, Spector received the ultimate testimonial. Typically nervous and agitated, the dogs in the pound became remarkably calm. As a result, people who visit the shelter stay

longer, and more dogs are getting adopted.
"People actually complained because the

"People actually complained, because the dogs were sleeping too much," she laughed.

Sunday's event — which will likely be attended by many local dogs stressed out by the holidays — should present a good test for Spector's dog-calming abilities. Spector, though, brushed off any worry that the dogs will be unruly.

"I've performed for dogs many times, and it's always worked," she added.

The event will also showcase Day's latest philanthropic venture, The Duffy-Day Life Saving Program. A collaboration between the Doris Day Animal Foundation and the SPCA for Monterey County, the program seeks to reduce pet euthanasia by raising money to rehabilitate animals with injuries or behavioral shortcomings. "Many dogs that were once euthanized can now be treated," added Nicole Massey-Pratt, a spokeswoman for the inn.



## Big Sur pianist brings together jazz and Christmas at the Cypress Inn

ONCE UPON a time — when jazz was the most popular music in America — a new Christmas song was as hip as anything on the

Big Sur jazz pianist Dick Whittington will recreate the golden era of Holiday music when he performs Saturday, Dec. 25, at the Cypress Inn.

'When I was a kid, pop and jazz were blended into one," recalled Whittington, who grew up in the early 1950s. "At the time, the biggest selling record of all time was 'White Christmas' by Bing Crosby and Irving

"Jazz musicians like to take a standard and rearrange it and reharmonize it," explained Whittington, a longtime resident of Big Sur's Partington Ridge. In addition to Crosby, Parker and Coltrane, jazz greats such as Ella Fitzgerald, Louie Armstrong, Bill Evans, Duke Ellington, Nat King Cole, Count Basie, Dinah Washington, Oscar Peterson created memorable Christmas music. Contemporary jazz artists like Diana Krall and Chris Botti have continued the tradition.

When he performs at the Cypress Inn, Whittington will be accompanied by bassist Dan Robbins of Santa Cruz.

"Dan is a really great bass player," he

said. "He was in the Monterey County All-Star Band when he was in high school, and he's played with everyone who's come through here over the last 10 years."

Together, Whittington and Robbins play some of the best-loved Christmas music of the 1930s, the 1940s and the 1950s. Included in their repertoire will be favorites like "Sleigh Ride," "Winter Wonderland," "Mistletoe and Holly," "I'll be Home for Christmas," "Santa Claus is Coming to Town" and, of course, "White Christmas."





#### ■ Recipe for your stocking

All in the holiday spirit of sharing, Rio Grill chef Cy Yontz decided to release his recipe for Christmas Tamales:

35 corn husks

1 1/2 C. golden raisins

4 1/2 C. masa harina

2 t. kosher salt

1 3/4 t. baking powder

1 1/2 t. anise seeds

1 1/2 t. ground cinnamon

3 3/4 C. water

3 sticks unsalted butter at room tempera-

1 1/2 C. packed light brown sugar

1 C. toasted pine nuts

Place corn husks in a large bowl or baking dish, cover completely with hot water, and weigh down with a plate or bowl to fully submerge until husks are very pliable, at least two hours at room temperature or overnight in the refrigerator. Drain, squeeze out excess water, and wipe dry.

Place raisins in a small bowl, cover with hot water, and soak until plumped, at least 15 minutes. Drain and set aside.

Place masa harina, salt, baking powder, anise seeds and cinnamon in a large bowl and whisk to combine. Pour in water and mix until the dough is wet throughout.

Place butter and brown sugar in the bowl of a stand mixer fitted with a paddle and beat on medium high until light in color and fluffy, three to four minutes. While running, add dough in handfuls, letting it blend before adding more, until all the dough has been added, about two minutes. Continue beating until ingredients are well combined and a smooth, soft dough has formed, about one minute more. Stir in reserved raisins and nuts, then cover and refrigerate for at least one hour or up to 24 hours.

Bring a pot of water with a steamer basket to a simmer over low heat.

Lay a corn husk on a clean work surface with the wide edge toward you. Measure 1/3 C. dough and shape into a cylinder about 3 inches long and 1 inch in diameter. Lay dough lengthwise in the center of the husk, leaving about a 1/2-inch border at the bot-

Tightly close the left side of the husk over the filling and roll to the right. Fold the top of the husk (the empty, tapered edge) back over the filled husk to close, and tie with butcher's twine, if needed. Repeat to roll 35 tamales.

Arrange tamales upright in the steamer with the open ends facing up. If your steamer is too big to hold all of the tamales snugly together, place a small heatproof bowl upside down in the center to stabilize them. Cover and steam until the dough is set, no longer raw-tasting, and pulls away easily from the husks when unwrapped, about 90 minutes to two hours. Let rest for 15 minutes before serving.





"If you haven't stopped into this shop yet, then you are


truly missing out on a great place to regain your center while shopping for cards, unique jewelry, art, cards, jade, wood carved pieces, scarves and so much more," the reviewer

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
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

## Hooray for fewer lawsuits

IF AN ordinary citizen stood on a street corner holding a sign that said, "The high school principal is a child molester," or "The pharmacist is a heroin pusher," and those statements weren't true, the citizen would surely — and probably successfully — be sued for defamation.

Likewise, if a reporter heard the statements and put them in a newspaper or broadcast them on TV, the reporter and his bosses could be sued.

But if a police officer made identical statements in the course of doing his job, he could not be sued — even if he knew the statements were lies and purposely made them to damage the reputations of the principal and the pharmacist.

That was the fascinating lesson about the intersection of libel, free speech and crime fighting that came out of the quick dismissal two weeks ago of a defamation suit brought against the county sheriff by Angelo Amadio and Ralph Kennaugh, who reported the theft of a multimillion-dollar art collection from their Pebble Beach home in 2009.

Soon after they made their report, a deputy sheriff told the media he believed the alleged theft was a "scam" — something Amadio and Kennaugh vehemently denied. The deputy's statement severely damaged their reputations and made it difficult for them to do business, they said. And since they also claimed that the deputy sheriff's statement was false, Amadio and Kennaugh sued him, the sheriff's office and the County of Monterey in superior court, demanding compensation for the damage they claimed they suffered from having a deputy sheriff tell the whole world they were scam artists.

Normally, a suit like this would follow a long path through the legal system, including months of discovery and depositions, and probably wouldn't come to trial for years.

But Monterey County and the sheriff's office had an ace up their sleeves: They hired attorney Neil Shapiro, who's become the local expert in fighting Strategic Lawsuits Against Public Participation, or SLAPPs, which California's anti-SLAPP law treats as nuisance suits intended to stifle the target's free speech rights and provides for quick dismissal.

Shapiro asked a judge to throw out Amadio and Kennaugh's defamation suit as a SLAPP because the deputy sheriff who called them scam artists was just exercising his right to speak his mind on a topic of public interest, and because state law provides immunity for police officers and sheriff's deputies from being sued for anything they say while they're investigating crimes.

Amadio and Kennaugh's attorney argued the sheriff's deputy who called his clients scam artists and the government agencies he worked for weren't entitled to that immunity because his statements were, in his view, egregiously untrue.

But the judge sided with the sheriff and the county, noting that immunity from defamation suits extends to law enforcement officials, even for statements which are "malicious and without probable cause."

In other words, a police officer can say anything he wants while on the job—even things that would quickly cause a private citizen who made such statements to owe his victim a lot of money.


And why do police officers deserve such power? Because the Legislature has long recognized that if they had to watch what they say while trying to solve crimes, their effectiveness would be greatly reduced. In fact, some courts have held that they probably wouldn't be able to function at all.

In other words, society values crime fighting more than the ability of private citizens to sue police officers for the bad things they might say — even untrue things.

When you think about it, it's amazing that this protection for police officers exists. The state Legislature and Congress usually seem hell-bent on passing laws that will create more lawsuits, not forestall them.

Three cheers for the anti-SLAPP law. We need more laws just like it.

## 'No rational basis' Dear Editor,

Your Dec. 17 article regarding a proposal to stop all new water hook-ups on the Monterey Peninsula got me to thinking.

During the drought of the 1970s, I lived in San Francisco. The city's department of water stated that each home was limited to an average of X gallons per person per day. If a home exceeded that limit, it was assessed a large fine. This made sense. It directly limited the amount of water consumed, was applied equally to each resident, and there was a consequence for non-compliance.

The Monterey Peninsula Water Management District's current method of water usage regulation does not directly limit the amount of water consumed. Instead, it restricts the number of water hook-ups (or credits) a property has. A five-bedroom home might have 10 hook-ups but only two residents. A two-bedroom home might have five hook-ups but six residents. The smaller home would have half as many hook-ups as the larger home but would likely have three times the water usage. Clearly, the connection to water usage is with the number of residents and not the number of hook-ups.

In legal parlance, it would seem that the district's current method of water usage regulation has no "rational basis." Anyone adversely affected by it might reasonably challenge the validity of this regulation. I would recommend that you contact your attorney and discuss the matter.

Mission Trail Lions club members spent two full weekends removing the shrubbery, making repairs and painting the house. To replace the ivy that Silvana Harris had grown accustomed to looking at through her window every day, they installed a trellis with new plants.

'The family is very appreciative," he said. "It was neat and very rewarding for us, and the neighbors were so surprised. Here's a neighborhood that had a house sitting in it that was old and dilapidated, and now it looks a little fresh-



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## Commission puts kibosh on synthetic turf

A FAKE lawn didn't pass muster with the Carmel Planning Commission, which voted 4-1 Dec. 8 to deny a permit for the small patch of artificial turf Edna Young wanted to install in the front yard of her home on the southeast corner of San Carlos

Young sought to replace a 12-by-24-foot patch of real, gopher-hole-ridden grass with a lawn manufactured by Heavenly Greens in a yard surrounded by a 6-foot-high fence and numerous trees. She said the synthetic turf would solve her rodent problem, cut down on maintenance and reduce water use.

"I have had a serious problem with gophers for several years, and it has come to the point where it is seriously affecting the quality of my life and the aesthetic look of my property," she wrote to the commission. "My front yard has become an unsightly haz-

She worried the gopher holes would be dangerous and create liability, and she said repeated efforts to get rid of them have failed. A fake lawn, meanwhile, would look and feel like natural grass and eliminate the use of fertilizers and pesticides, water, mowers and weed-eaters, she said.

"With our changing environment, we need to find other options for lawn maintenance emissions, polluted runoff, durability and aesthetic appeal in our yard while considering the overall benefit to our lives by continuing to safeguard limited natural resources so that we sustain and protect for the next generation," she argued in her letter.

City guidelines on landscaping don't specifically address fake turf, but they discourage lawns and encourage native plants

"Under most circumstances, staff would only support the use of synthetic grass for small areas in a rear or interior side yard," planning and building services manager Sean Conroy said in his report for the commission. "However, in this case, the proposed product will be replacing an existing grass lawn, and due to the fencing, will not be visible from the street." Therefore, approval would not negatively affect Carmel's "forest character."

But most of the commissioners disagreed. "They felt basically it was inconsistent with the natural character that we're trying to encourage," Conroy said after the meeting. "Part of the argument was if somebody new came and purchased the house and tore down the fence, it would be visible."

The commission voted 4-1, with Keith Paterson dissenting, to deny Young's application for artificial turf in her yard.

The issue has arisen a few times before and is bound to resurface. The since-disbanded design review board denied one request for a fake lawn, and the planning commission was poised to do the same to an application that ended up being continued and was then never resubmitted, Conroy recalled.

But with increasing restrictions on water use, ever-rising water bills and improving technology in fake turf, the issue is not dead, and Conroy said a couple of the commissioners expressed interest in addressing the topic at a future meeting. "I think there are some commissioners who might like to see it in some limited settings," he said.

The possibility of replacing Devendorf Park's expansive lawn with synthetic turf has even been raised by the mayor.

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## Christmas seagull rescue planned

MEMBERS of WildRescue in Moss Landing will take their wildlife ambulance from Monterey to San Francisco Christmas Day to find a gull whose legs are bound by fishing line, according to Rebecca Dmytryk, cofounder of WildRescue. The distressed gull was last seen at the same spot near San Francisco State University where the nonprofit found and caught the second of two seagulls that had a beer can wrapped around its neck. If the gull with the fishing line around its legs isn't rescued, "eventually its feet will fall off from the line cutting into its skin and cause infection," Dmytryk said.

same thing is true of anything brought home from overseas (after subtracting an \$800 exemption).

Though the law has been ignored for decades, the revenue-hungry state Board of Equalization is now telling California businesses they have to start paying up. Last week, it mailed notices to thousands of business owners telling them to pay their use tax — and to begin filing annual returns to prove their compliance.

"We've sent out about 500,000 letters, including about 350,000 in the last six months, informing people of their obligation," said Anita Gore, a spokesman for the Franchise Tax Board. "The reaction has been mixed."

The state — facing a roughly \$20 billion budget deficit — also sent out a press release reminding individuals of the use tax law.

"The dollars lost to California in unpaid use tax significantly impact the state's publicly funded programs and affect all Californians," according to BOE Chairwoman Betty T. Yee.

According to the BOE, the state loses more than \$1 billion in unpaid sales and use tax associated with electronic commerce and mail-order sales every year.

Online or catalog retailers are not required to collect tax unless they have a physical business presence in California. Consumers are required to pay use tax — ranging from 8.25 percent to 10.75 percent — when the out-of-state retailer does not collect it.

Monterey CPA Eugene Ganeles told The Pine Cone he recently mailed his individual and business clients notices about use tax,

enclosing the appropriate BOE form to report it, which like income tax, must be paid by April 15.

"The state of California is getting aggressive about collecting all the taxes the law allows, no matter how small," Ganeles wrote to individual clients.

Assemblyman Bill Monning told The Pine Cone the \$1.1 billion the state estimates it loses every year in unpaid use tax is revenue that could benefit the financially ailing state.

"You could apply [lost tax revenue] to support public education or health care or whatever we are falling short of," Monning said. "When the state is in such dire straits ... to be losing that much revenue from a required tax represents a huge amount."

Monning, who said he and his wife Dana report use tax on their tax forms every year, reminded his constituents of their own responsibility.


"People should pay this tax," he said. "It's self-enforcing, and it requires people to keep track of those transactions. My wife and I have been doing this for years, partly because of my position. I want to be compliant with the law."

However, Monning said he would support legislation that requires businesses such as Amazon.com to include use tax in their prices.

"The best way to protect our mom and pop businesses is to assess that sales tax at the point of sale," he said.

Several states have sought Amazon.com to pay sales tax, but the company has resisted their efforts.

In April, Amazon.com filed a lawsuit against the North Carolina Department of Revenue to block its demand that the company disclose the names and addresses of North Carolina residents who purchased items on Amazon.com, whose attorneys contend the disclosure would invade the privacy of its customers.

"That color is iconic; that is their trademark color, so my guess would be they will want that color, or they may not want the awnings," he said. "Yes, the Plaza and the city both look for muted colors to avoid a garish presentation, but these awnings are so small as to be just an accent."

Plaza operations manger Jim Griffith said his company was OK with the departure from the center's design rules.

"We support the color, even though it's a bit of an exception," he said. "It is their marquis color, so it's hard to consider any other options."

But Carmel planning and building services manager Sean Conroy sided with Wiener, reminding commissioners that the town often contends with businesses that have signature looks they want to include on their storefronts.

"The city has tried to avoid these kinds of notice-attracting features," he said.

Commissioner Steve Hillyard agreed the teal would be too eye-catching, and commissioner Steve Dallas, who said he appreciated the store's presence in town, suggested OKing just a couple of the awnings.

Chair Janet Reimers liked the color.

"I think the color is fine," she said. "I like looking at it, especially on little boxes. I don't see them very often.' Reimers noted the teal would clash with the cobalt

awnings on the second floor and suggested the teal could perhaps be used as an accent color on the Tiffany awnings. "There are a number of colorful awnings throughout

Carmel," she added. "Whether they had approval, or not, I don't know.'

"It's not Burger King. Not to insult Burger King, but I think it's very good for the city for people to see we have a Tiffany's as they come into Carmel," commented commissioner Victoria Beach. "I feel it's a very reputable company. They're not advertising with their sign, they're advertising with their color. Even if you don't think the color is subtle, it's a subtle way of getting their message across."

Beach made a motion to OK the new signs, lighting for the signs and the awnings, as long as the cobalt awnings upstairs are replaced with a color matching the wall. The commission voted 4-1 in favor, with Hillyard dissenting.
