Father sues son over Mucky Duck 'fraud'

■ Owner incurred \$55K in bank overdraft fees, suit says

THE CO-OWNER of The Mucky Duck — the Monterey pub where a gunman shot three people on New Year's Eve — has filed a lawsuit against his son for fraud and misappropriation of funds.

In a lawsuit filed Feb. 2, John Waddell alleges his son, Eric Waddell, mismanaged and misused The Mucky Duck's business account by spending more than \$10,000 on personal trips, giving thousands of dollars to family and friends, and incurring a staggering \$55,000 in bank overdraft fees.

P.G. WOMAN, VICTIM OF COIN THEFT, DIES AT 103

LILLIAN MARIE King, the colorful, longtime Pacific Grove woman who made headlines in 2005 after more than \$2 million in gold and silver coins was stolen from her home near Asilomar State Beach, has died. She was 103.

According to court documents, King died Jan. 28 in her P.G. home, where she had been receiving round-the-clock help from caregivers.

Her attorneys and the conservator of her estate, Nader Agha, a Pacific Grove businessman who owns the Holman Building, said King had a youthful spirit despite her age. Even into her 100s, she was impressing those who cared for her.

Al Nicora, a Carmel attorney who knew King for about six years and was appointed by a judge to oversee her estate, said he enjoyed chatting with King, who he called charming. He said she died in her sleep.

John Waddell, who alleges fraud and breach of fiduciary duty in the complaint, is asking a judge to dissolve the limited liability company under which the bar exists. Waddell is also seeking punitive and exemplary damages.

But the suit is also part of an effort to resolve disputes between the two about how the Mucky Ducky should be run. "We're working together. We both own the business, and that's what we're trying to do," John Waddell said Thursday.

The lawsuit is the latest drama to unfold at the

Lawsuit filed over gruesome hospital mixup

A YOUNG couple filed a lawsuit last week against a prominent Salinas hospital alleging its staff mixed up their stillborn baby's fetus with another dead fetus and notified them of the error five weeks after the couple had buried the wrong body.

Ahmed Musa, 24, and Hana Mohammed Dharhan, 23, newlyweds who live in Salinas, contend in a Feb. 2 lawsuit against Salinas Valley Memorial

Hospital that hospital workers gave them the wrong fetus after Dharhan delivered a stillborn baby — a girl identified in their lawsuit as "Baby Musa."

According to the lawsuit, Baby Musa's body had been unknowingly stored in the hospital's morgue for five weeks, "allowing it to decompose and mildew." The body was discovered after an employee noticed a fetus with Hana Dharhan's name on it.

"The Musas have sued the hospital because they want to make sure that this never happens again to another family," their attorney, Anne Marie Murphy of the

Burlingame law firm Cotchett, Pitre & McCarthy, told The Pine Cone.

The lawsuit, filed in Monterey County Superior Court, alleges negligence and infliction of emotional distress. Musa and Dharhan are seeking a jury trial. The suit doesn't specify the amount of money they say the hospital should pay for its error.

A pregnancy gone wrong

The couple's nightmare began last September, about 18 weeks into Dharhan's pregnancy, when doctors told them their baby was sick and probably wouldn't survive. Not long after that, a doctor told them the baby had no heartbeat, the complaint says.

Dharhan was given drugs to induce labor, and she delivered the stillborn

Council nixes beach rake in favor of manual labor

WHEN THE crowds in town for the Pebble Beach Pro-Am go home next week, any garbage they leave on Carmel Beach will have to be picked up by hand — because people are better at cleaning the beach than a machine is.

That's the conclusion of the forest and beach commission, which recommended the city end its trial use of a beach rake

towed by a tractor to clean charcoal and other debris from the famous white sands.

In December 2010, the commission reviewed the performance of the mechanized rake, which was only used for a week, and concluded it would make more sense to spend city funds on increased manpower than on the machine.

According to city forester Mike Branson's Feb. 1 report to the Carmel City Council, commissioners identified the lack of secure storage at the beach for the machinery as a concern and said the rake's effectiveness was often hampered by fresh

On Aug. 16, their free daylong show of some 175 collectible American and European cars and motorcycles from 1940 to 1989 will be held on more than a dozen downtown blocks.

THE CARMEL Planning Commission on Wednesday paid compliments to a pair of architects as it granted permits for the demolition of homes on Ninth Avenue south of Camino Real and on the corner of Monte Verde and 11th, and approved the houses that will replace them.

The first project, proposed by Greg and Valerie Quiring, was a long time coming. The Quirings and their architect, Warren Thompson, made major modifications to the plans for their proposed two-story home after a neighbor to the east complained about impacts to her views when commissioners first discussed the application last September.

In response, the owners decided to move the 363-squarefoot second story that would have blocked her view to a different section of the house, which will be 1,233 square feet on the first floor and contain a 100-square-foot basement. The plans call for board-and-batten siding downstairs, shingle siding upstairs and unclad wood windows. A 204-squarefoot detached garage will be built toward the front of the

Commission weighs two demolitions, paint tones and a tricky lot

"Given what the program was, I think Greg did a very good job, and I think I should at least say everything is OK with us, because we are the main neighbors who are concerned," Wayne Katsumata said on behalf of his mother, who lives east of the Quirings' property.

But also he asked that they keep their hedge trimmed low enough to not disrupt his mother's views, and planning commissioners agreed to impose that requirement on the Quirings. They unanimously approved the plans for the new house and also decided not to impose the city forester's requirement that the owners plant two new tall trees, considering their potential view impacts.

Commissioners Victoria Beach and Steve Dallas praised the applicants for their willingness and efforts to appease the neighbor.

A few blocks away on the southwest corner of Monte Verde and 11th Avenue, Steve Knox plans to knock down a house and replace it with a two-story home calling for 1,157 square feet on the first floor, 436 square feet on the second story and a 207-square-foot detached garage. Architect Craig Holdren designed the home with wood shingle siding, a wood shake roof, a stone wainscot and unclad windows.

Associate planner Marc Wiener commended Holdren for doing "a nice job of designing the residence around two significant oak trees on the south side of the property."

"I think your plan is absolutely phenomenal," Dallas told Holdren, praising his use of wood and a design that steps down the property's slope. "This is what I personally love, and you have my full support."

Chair Jan Reimers said she liked "the simplicity of the


Help with small lot

In February 2003, the planning commission approved a lot-line adjustment to create a 3,000-square-foot parcel and a 2,000-square-foot parcel on the north side of Eighth Avenue between Junipero and Mission, with homes to be built on each lot. While one residence was constructed, the building proposed for the smaller lot never was, and the permits lapsed.

On Wednesday — representing property owners Christine and Stephanie Simonian — designer John Mandurrago and Mid Coast Investments principal Kirk Probasco asked the planning commission for advice and feedback on their proposal to construct a home and a low-rent apartment on the small lot. The low-income unit would allow them a bonus in floor area — so they could have substantially more than the 900 square feet planning and building services manager Sean Conroy said would be allowed for a single-family home








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

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Liquor, music and extended hours violate CEQA, clubhouse neighbor says

An attorney representing a homeowner upset over the City of Pacific Grove's efforts to expand hours and serve liquor at the municipal golf course clubhouse is threatening the city with a CEQA lawsuit if it doesn't back down from its

Attorney John Bridges, representing John Troth, emailed a four-page letter to city planner Ashley Hefner Feb. 2 demanding the city's planning commission turn down the plan to "avoid the substantial costs of an environmental impact report and possible litigation" over "potentially significant adverse environmental impacts that have not been mitigated."

Troth, who lives on Del Monte Boulevard across from the clubhouse parking lot, objects to the city's plan to let the facility stay open later, serve liquor and offer amplified

Bridges contends the project violates the California Environmental Quality Act.

"The proposed project ... will result in the detriment to the health, safety, peace, morals, comfort and general welfare of persons residing in the neighborhood as well as depression of property values in the immediate neighborhood," he said.

Bridges contends the city has to complete an environmental impact report for the project before approving.

His determination challenges Hefner's Dec. 21 report, in which she recommended a much lower level of environmental review — a "mitigated negative declaration" — after weighing potential impacts on noise, community aesthetics, traffic and global warming.

Though the planning commission was slated to hear the issue Feb. 17, Hefner said the city will request it be placed on a March meeting instead.

Hefner told The Pine Cone. The city has received about 80 comment letters on the

"There are just too many items we need to follow up on,"

proposed project.

'They are varied and range in opposition, to people in favor and some in the middle," she explained.

The city wants to extend the clubhouse's hours from 6 a.m. to 9:30 p.m. and expand the facility to generate more revenue by accommodating weddings and receptions, live music and other events. The clubhouse is currently open from

However, Bridges contends the project is inconsistent with the city's general plan and zoning and that the city's report is "inadequate" because it doesn't provide "any substantive analysis" of the of land use and planning issues.

'The proposed project's extension of hours to accommodate late-night restaurant activities, hard liquor sales, outside amplified music and non-golf related special events is no way pertinent to golf or compatible with open land use issues," according to Bridges.

The city's study also fails to adequately address noise impacts, water use, property values and "the myriad unique impacts associated with the operation of a hard liquor bar in such a peaceful open space."

Troth is among a vocal group of Pacific Grove residents, including activists Jim and Lee Willoughby and Susan Goldbeck, Lorna Torkos and Roger Pasquier, who have publicly opposed the clubhouse expansion.

The city is also seeking an architectural permit for the installation of eight light fixtures in the clubhouse parking lot and low-wattage lighting along walkways.

The clubhouse project has also received criticism from the Ohlone Costanoan Esselen Nation. In a Jan. 19 letter to the city, a tribal chairperson contends the area where the clubhouse has been identified as a "culturally sensitive area."

"There are many areas including Point Pinos surrounded by registered cultural and sacred sites of our people," according to the letter written by Louise J. Miranda Ramirez.

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City may go for \$150K Caltrans grant

THE CARMEL City Council narrowly split last week in favor of applying for a \$150,000 taxpayer-funded grant from Caltrans to help make the city more friendly for pedestrians and bicyclists.

"This was a grant opportunity that came to my attention, and I wanted to bring it to the council's attention as soon as possible to get guidance if this is something we want to go after," explained councilman Jason Burnett. "I didn't think we wanted to spend staff's time and other groups' time preparing something the council didn't have interest in pursuing, and that is why it is not a fully fleshed out grant application at this point."

According to a report from city administrator Rich Guillen, the grant, which would require a 10 percent match from the City of Carmel in money and labor, would be used

"Study relevant issues, consult with experts and citizens, identify missing links, and plan and promote a more connected city where visitors as well as residents could forego cars and still easily access every attraction within the city, connect safely to local and regional hiking or biking trails, and use an expanded transit system to reach nearby attractions and transportation hubs."

Guillen said the money would be used to develop ideas for ways to connect schools, parks, neighborhoods and other attractions, making the city a better place to walk and bike. If the ideas became reality, Carmel would be a healthier place and could market itself as such, enabling it to "tap the growing market for active travel and events [and] elongate visitor hotel stays." The pedestrianand bike-friendly projects would also reduce vehicle traffic and cut greenhouse gases.

"If the council is interested in this, then staff and others would work over the next month and bring something to council in March with those details," Burnett said. The grant application is due at the end of next

"This is a planning grant, not a doing grant, just to be clear," he said, adding that the plan would help identify and solve "missing links" in the network of biking and walking trails throughout the Monterey Peninsula.

Councilwomen Karen Sharp and Paula Hazdovac wondered where the money would come from not just for the city's match, but for the project's construction, but Burnett and councilman Ken Talmage suspected that, despite the state's budget crisis, they could

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
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Gun stolen from P.G. man decades ago surfaces in San Jose arrest

A SMITH & Wesson .38-caliber Chief's Special discovered in the SUV of a convicted felon arrested in San Jose last month for a suspected DUI crash had been stolen from a Pacific Grove man almost a half-century ago, according to police.

"This guy, Stanley Kelley, called us and said he got a phone call from San Jose P.D. that they had recovered a gun," that was registered to him but which he had not seen for decades, according to PGPD Cmdr. John Nyunt.

"He purchased the handgun in Southern California in 1963 after he had just gotten out of the Marine Corps, and he was living in Pacific Grove, renting a house near the old trailer park on 17 Mile Drive, in 1964," he said. The gun was stolen, and he suspected the landlord.

The following year, Kelley moved to Mendocino and apparently didn't give it much further thought.

That is, until San Jose officers tracked him down to advise him they had found the old Smith & Wesson in the damaged maroon 2001 Chevy Tahoe being driven by 33-yearold San Jose resident Armando Arellano on Jan. 9, according to SJPD officer Jose

"He was contacted by an officer who observed him in a car with front-end damage, smoke coming out of the engine and a leaking radiator, and driving fast," he said. "It was apparent to the officer this person might have been involved in a collision and fled the scene."

After Arellano pulled over, the officer talked to him, smelled alcohol on his breath and arrested him on suspicion of drunken driving and being involved in a crash, though Garcia did not know the details of the collision. A second officer searching the Tahoe found the gun.

'This person also turned out to be a convicted felon," Garcia said of Arellano, making his possession of the firearm illegal.

Citing an active investigation, Garcia would not say how Arellano came to possess

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
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Sticker shock — supervisor blasts general plan price tag

AFTER LISTENING to the county's planning staff present details of implementing the 2010 Monterey County General Plan, 2nd District Supervisor Lou Calcagno expressed outrage over its cost to taxpayers, which is estimated to exceed \$8 million.

"Anybody in the public is going to look at \$8 million and think we're a bunch of nuts," Calcagno said at a supervisors' meeting Jan. 25. "There's no way we're going to spend \$8 million of taxpayers' money for this plan."

The Monterey County Board of Supervisors voted unanimously in October 2010 to adopt the general plan, ending a contentious process that lasted more than a decade. Several lawsuits have since been filed challenging its adequacy under state environmental laws.

But even if the general plan survives the legal challenges, the cost of its implementation is certain to be high.

Addressing the cost of bringing the general plan into action, Calcagno reminded county staff of the economic challenges the county — as well as many of its residents are facing. "People are hungry and need jobs," he continued. "Government isn't going to survive the way it is working.

The plan advocates spending about \$4.7 million on the salaries of consultants. "We could hire attorneys and do it cheaper than that," Calcagno suggested.

Staff costs, meanwhile, will total about \$3.7 million.

The supervisor said he would be keeping a close eye on how much the county spends to implement the plan.

"I'm going to be watching this with a fine-toothed comb," he said. "I'm going to be against this until I see every detail."

If the work program is implemented, the county will spend \$400,000 on it this fiscal vear, \$3.6 million in 2011/2012, \$3.2 million in 2012/2013 and \$1.2 million in 2013/2014.

While supervisors agreed to move forward with the implementation plan, they directed the county's staff to seek ways to reduce its costs. Assistant planning director Carl Holm told The Pine Cone his department is working on complying with the supervisors' request, although he said there currently is no time table for completing the

At a Dec. 14, 2010 meeting, county plan-

ners presented supervisors with a choice of three strategies for putting the new general plan into action. The supervisors voted unanimously to endorse the option that would complete the process in the shortest time

The 2010 general plan will guide growth in the county's unincorporated areas over the

"She was a unique character," Nicora said. "And enjoyable and opinionated on just about anything you wanted to talk about."

It is the events that unfolded in the past six years for which King is largely known to

In September 2005, King — whose husband was an heir to the family that owned the famed King Ranch in Texas — was removed from her oceanfront home on the 1600 block of Sunset Drive after Pacific Grove Police

found her living in squalid conditions, which included ceiling-high piles of clutter.

Police had raided King's property, where her grand niece, Cynthia Hurley, also lived, looking for drugs. Though officers found a small amount of marijuana, they also discovered King living in unsafe conditions.

The main house where King lived and a ramshackle unit Hurley resided in were condemned, and King was placed into the care of Monterey County Adult Protective Services before moving to one of the

five other P.G. houses she owned.

After the raid, King reported that many of the valuable coins she had stored in her house were missing. Hurley was charged with the theft.

About \$2 million in coins — as well as art and jewelry — missing from the house have never been recovered, although court records show that there was evidence people had tried to sell the stolen Krugerrands and other coins to local shops.

King was also hit with another theft when about \$500,000 of her coins were stolen from a storage unit in Monterey. King filed suit against the storage company in a case that was settled out of court in 2010.

King's quick wit and sense of humor drew

laughter during her June 2006 testimony at her grand niece's preliminary hearing on charges of financial elder abuse, fraud and embezzlement for taking the coins.

When Monterey County Superior Court Judge Russell Scott asked how old she was, King — adorned in gold bracelets and rings and bright red lipstick - stated she was "over 39," before whispering her true age into Scott's ear.

Though Hurley had told The Pine Cone she took care of her aunt, King refuted that at the court hearing.

"She never looked after me," King told the judge. "I paddled my own canoe, and I

was glad to do it.'

Hurley later pleaded no contest to taking tens of thousands of dollars worth of coins, which she claimed she had done with King's permission to pay off the hefty property tax bills she owed on King's real estate. Hurley spent less than a year in jail before being released.

Last year, Nicora launched an investigation into allegations of financial impropriety in the management of her estate. The query is ongoing, and no suspects have been named. But Nicora said King's death may complicate

the investigation.

"Obviously, it does change things," he said. "We are going to have to go to court and find out how we are going to proceed. It's unfortunate she passed, because I think we were fairly close" to completing the investigation.

King had an estate worth about \$6.5 million, including \$1 million in cash, according to a court document filed in November 2008.

Though it's not clear if she had any living heirs, court records show the Lillian M. King Trust was established at her request to "benefit her local community and its children through educational programs and opportunities that cement this country's foundational principles of freedom, liberty and justice."



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
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
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
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To open Point Lobos Ranch park, local nonprofit will spend big \$\$\$

 ${\operatorname{F}}$ IVE YEARS after the California Department of Parks and Recreation acquired the Point Lobos Ranch, it remains closed to the public. But that is likely to change, in large part because of the generosity of a local nonprofit group.

The Point Lobos Foundation has agreed to contribute up to \$250,000 to fund a general plan for state parkland located in the Monterey Ranger District. Also benefiting from the gift will be Point Lobos State Reserve, Carmel River State Beach and state-owned property in Hatton Canyon.

Due to the massive budget constraints it faces, state parks has been unable to pay for the general plan, which local officials say is necessary to open the park.

The 1,312-acre Point Lobos Ranch, which is densely forested with Monterey pines, is located across Highway 1 from Point Lobos State Reserve.

According to Point Lobos Foundation President Skip Flohr, the ranch is a local treasure worth opening "The Point Lobos Foundation believes this beautiful piece of property should be open to the public," said Flohr in a letter he sent to The Pine Cone this week.

Local state park officials asked the group for support, Flohr said. The pledge is likely to cover about half the expense of the general plan.

"A comprehensive and well written general plan is costly," he observed. "Because of the condition of the California budget and its effect on the state parks budget, the Monterey district has asked the foundation for assistance in funding it."

Flohr said he was unable to provide any specifics about the development of the ranch as a park — in partly because the public will be involved in the decision-making process. He encouraged the public to attend hearings on the plan. They have not yet been scheduled.

"The development of a general plan will include a number of public hearings to solicit input," he said. "This input will be extremely important in determining what is included in the plan, as well as what is excluded. We strongly recommend that you attend these hearings to let the developers of the new plan know your feelings and your recommendations."

Dana Jones, Monterey sector superintendent for state

parks, also urged the public to voice suggestions and concerns at the hearings.

"We're going to be very diligent about public comment," Jones said.

In addition to comments about the future park's access and trails, the hearings will likely include talk about creating a parking area off Highway 1. "There has been some discussion to have some parking added at Point Lobos Ranch or in San Jose Creek Canyon," Jones confirmed.

Currently, many visitors to the reserve park along Highway 1. While some consider the practice dangerous, the subject is unlikely to be discussed at the hearings, because the highway falls under the jurisdiction of the California Department of Transportation, not state parks.

The hearings are likely to include some discussion of a visitors center as well, Jones added. The Point Lobos Foundation has endorsed the idea.

Once the general plan is completed, Jones said the park could be opened to the public within a year or two.

Point Lobos Ranch was acquired by state parks in two separate transactions totaling \$13 million. That money came from state taxpayers via Proposition 117.

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
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Police track down rape suspects in Carmel, P.G.

CARMEL POLICE arrested a 29-year-old Carmel Valley man on suspicion of raping a woman in a San Carlos Street apartment Feb. 5, and last month, officers from Marina arrested a 57-year-old Pacific Grove man suspected of similar offenses in their city.

According to Carmel Police Sgt. Mel Mukai, the victim in his case and her alleged attacker, Trafton Chandler, had been invited to stay the night at a mutual friend's home and were sleeping in separate areas of the living room.

"The victim awoke and wasn't sure what was occurring," Mukai said. Trafton was near her, and when she asked what he was doing, he didn't answer.

"Eventually, the victim was frantic, and one of the other houseguests called 911," he said. "And, obviously, we got involved."

Mukai did not know the victim's state of mind at the time, including whether she was sober, but based on statements she made, officers arrested Trafton on suspicion of felony forced oral copulation, felony penetration by a foreign/unknown object and misdemeanor sexual battery.

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License pending

He and his alleged victim underwent testing and evaluation by the sexual assault response team at Community Hospital of the Monterey Peninsula, and Mukai said the results are pending.

FOR BOTH the boys and girls basketball teams at Carmel High School this season, it's been nothing but net.

The girls cruised to an easy 56-26 victory Tuesday at Pacific Grove High as they extended their winning streak to 16 games. The boys, meanwhile, captured their 10th straight win Friday after breezing past visiting Soledad High 77-35.

Playing against their arch rivals, the girls were led by **Jule Muegge**, who scored 22 points. She had help from **Sarah Anderson**, who added 13 points and five steals, and **Kaylee Vandenberg**, who scored 10 points and grabbed seven rebounds. **Emma Fuzie**, meanwhile, helped to keep the home team from finding an offensive groove by blocking four shots.

The girls also cruised to an easy 68-43 victory Friday at Soledad High for their 15th straight win.

The Padres were led by the one-two scoring punch of Muegge, who put up 24 points, and Anderson, who added 13 points and sank three shots from beyond the arc. **Mackenzie Dooner** controlled the boards by hauling down 10 rebounds.

Muegge continues to lead all players in the Monterey Bay region in scoring with an average of 20 points a game, more than two points better than any other player in the region. She also ranks fourth in steals with 77.

Anderson stands above all other three-point shooters with an average of more than three baskets a game. Only one other player in the region even averages two baskets a game from beyond the arc. She's also ninth in assists with 59. Dooner ranks 10th among Monterey Bay rebounders with more than eight a game. She also ranks 10th in blocks with 19. Fuzie is eighth with 21 rejections.

After dispatching the Aztecs, the Padres are 11-0 in league play and 18-2 overall.

As The Pine Cone went to press Thursday, the girls were at Gonzales High, taking on the Spartans. Next up for Carmel High is a home game Tuesday against Santa Catalina School and a road game Thursday against Greenfield High.

Boys streak now at 10

Against Soledad High Friday, the boys were led by a well balanced attack that featured four scorers in double figures. **Kyle Peerless** paced the Padres with 15 points, followed by **Garret Woodward** with 12 points, and **Jason Weilenmann** and **Devin Pearson** with 11 points each. All four players are averaging more than 10 points a game.

"We came out fast," coach Ryan Sanchez explained. "It was probably the best start we've had all year. We scored 28 points in the first quarter and opened up a huge lead."

Two days earlier, against Stevenson School, the Padres outlasted Stevenson School 40-33.

"They made it close," Sanchez said of the pesky Stevenson team. "We didn't shoot particularly well, but we were able to stop them down the stretch with our defense."

A high-risk, high-reward defensive approach is showing results for Carmel High. "The team is buying into our system and it's paying off," he added.

The Padres were getting ready for their tip-off against visiting Gonzales High when The Pine Cone went to press Thursday. Next up for the boys is a game Monday against Marina High at Monterey Peninsula College and another at home against Greenfield High Wednesday.

The boys are now 10-0 in league play and 16-4 overall.

The Carmel High wrestling team fell to Pacific Grove High Wednesday, in large part because the school doesn't have enough wrestlers.



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Sunset Center hires managing director

WITH THE appointment of Christine Sandin as the new managing director of Sunset Center this week, the nonprofit that runs the city-owned venue hopes to take it in a different direction, according to Sunset Cultural Center Inc. board chairman Jim Price. While the theater will continue hosting performances, the center should draw more multi-day festivals, weddings, conferences and other activities that will generate more money for the center and the city.

"She seemed exceptionally qualified for our objectives," Price told The Pine Cone Wednesday. "She has a very positive attitude and a lot of experience with both venue management and event presentation."

Sandin was selected from among seven candidates who interviewed for the top Sunset Center job previously held by Peter Lesnik, who stepped down from full-time work to become a consultant a few months ago.

But she is not new to Sunset.

"Christine has been a consultant to SCC for the last two years on marketing and development and was part-time, in that she had other clients," Price said. "So she, among others, expressed interest in the permanent position, and it worked

According to Price, while working part-time for the center, Sandin implemented new marketing strategies that generated a 10 percent increase in tickets sales. He said she was also instrumental in researching and identifying new ways to raise money and expand use of the facility, including as a site for weddings, which it began hosting a year ago.

"Our prior directors had their primary strength in present-

ing performances at Sunset Center, which obviously is an important element of our role," Price said. "However, SCC is charged with a much broader responsibility by the city which would include conferences, seminars, special events, weddings activities that are not only a benefit to the people of Carmel but bring business to Carmel."

Those options have not received much attention in the past, according to Price, leaving that market largely untapped. He said Sandin "does have a strong interest

and qualifications in presenting events," which he differentiated from performances. "Event' means multi-day, like the Carmel Art and Film

Festival and the Authors and Ideas Festival," he said. "We want to do more of that. We will not be decreasing show presentations but will be putting much more effort into those kinds of events."

A programming committee that began meeting weekly as of Jan. 1 is in charge of fielding proposals for onstage entertainment, and Price expects to release the center's upcoming

John Tesh: A man of many careers

COUNTLESS PEOPLE have given up a well-paying job to do what they love. It's doubtful, though, that very many of them were making as much money as composer and performer John Tesh.


"I'm the poster boy for quitting your job and following your dream," explained Tesh, who performs Saturday, Feb. 12, at Sunset Center.

When Tesh decided to become a professional musician in 1996, he left his "day job" as host of "Entertainment Tonight." He had grown so tired of the job that "I wasn't even paying attention. I wanted to play music."

"When I quit, people said to me, 'Are you out of your mind?"" Tesh told The Pine Cone this week. "I was making seven figures and I was working four hours a day."

Tesh had long desired to pursue his musical aspirations. Growing up on Long Island in the late 1960s, he gravitated toward music despite the expectation by his family that he was destined to study chemistry and physics in college. "We had jocks and greasers and geeks, and I ended up being a geek," he remembered. "I was in the marching band."

Despite his affection for music — and the fact that he was named to the New York State

Bountiful breakfasts, recipes for love, and Cienega Valley

 ${}^{\mbox{\scriptsize \textbf{4}}}W_{\mbox{\scriptsize \textbf{E}}}$ WANT to do really good food that locals will appreciate," said John Cox, chef of La Bicyclette and Casanova restaurants in Carmel. "We want to be that neighborhood restaurant where people come in and say it's honest and is the best value."

He also wants the recently expanded Bicyclette at Dolores and Seventh to be the first place people think of when they want a cup of good coffee, a superlative croissant and a place to relax and read the morning

Capitalizing on the talents of pastry chef Sara Spudowski and owners Gaston and Walter Georis' love and support for topnotch ingredients and local sources, Cox began serving a French-style breakfast at the casual venue less than two weeks ago and is now offering a morning menu from 8 to 11

The centerpiece is the pastries crafted from 100 percent high-quality butter croissant dough and puff pastry, both made by hand daily under Spudowski's guidance. Three flavors of croissants - plain, chocolate (utilizing a custom blend of Valrhona), and ham and Gruyere — are sold every day. A fourth pastry changes daily, based on what Spudowski feels like making and what fruits are in season. On Tuesday, it was apple frangipane, delightfully tender and not too sweet. Monday calls for blackberry-lavender scones, while Saturday features decadent brioche cinnamon rolls with pecans and brown sugar, and Sunday stars strawberryrhubarb Danish. The quality and care that go into the pastries are unmissable in the flavor and texture they impart.

"We try not to skimp on any ingredients and roll it all by hand," Cox said of the croissant dough. "And it takes a lot of work, but we feel it's worthwhile."

"The main goal is to keep everything fresh — something everyone looks forward to," Spudowski said.

The restaurant also serves a daily quiche, which was smoked bacon and Bloomsdale spinach this week, as well as steel-cut oats and fresh fruit.

"We're taking classic dishes and really doing the best we can," Cox said. "If we have salmon on the menu, we want to source the salmon, cure the salmon and slice the

soup to nuts

salmon. We don't want to buy it from Sysco."

Cox cures salmon filets for two days in Sicilian sea salt and a paste of brown sugar, guajillo and ancho chiles, fresh garlic, parsley, chives and whatever citrus rinds the kitchen needs to use up, such as bergamot, Meyer lemon and man-

"You don't have a super cured texture; it's more of a raw salmon texture," he said. "You should be able to eat it raw. If you can't, you shouldn't be serving it."

The granola — chunky, flavorful and full of treats like dried cherries and apricots, almonds, pistachio nuts and a variety of spices — also contains a bare hint of orange blossom water and is served with a dollop of rich yogurt.

Since the new wood-fired oven is used to bake all of the sourdough, ciabatta, ficelle, baguettes and other breads for both restaurants, bread is a breakfast showpiece, too, served with homemade preserves and Camembert or butter churned in house. Buttered ciabatta appears alongside smoked salmon and herbed mascarpone with capers and pickled onions, as well as in a terra cotta dish of woodfired eggs, housemade bacon or sausage and tiny roasted potatoes with kale from the Hilton Bialek Habitat at Carmel Middle School. Loaves can also be purchased whole and taken home.

Bread making begins the night prior, so the doughs can proof in the warmth of the kitchen, and bakers start shaping and baking at around 4 a.m., according to Spudowski. The oven holds two dozen loaves, and all the baking has to be completed by 7:30 a.m., since the roaring oven becomes too hot for bread not long after that.

Even though they've been at it for less than two weeks, Spudowski and Cox declared the Bicyclette breakfast a success, as it has already drawn regulars who have developed habits of stopping in every morning to read the paper over the daily pastry and a cup of coffee.



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

Any visit to the area demands a stop at DeRose Vineyards, run by winemakers Pat and Al DeRose, who create never-boring wines from fruit grown in their vineyards or purchased from reliable growers.

The Cabernet Pfeffer, for instance, is a rarity, with just a few hundred acres growing in the world. Cab Pfeffer was a hybrid of several different Cabernet clones cultivated by William Pfeffer in 1897 to resist the deadly bug phylloxera, which devastated French vines. The 2008 vintage is peppery, slightly acidic and soft, making it tasty with pork, chicken and lean beef. The Negrette — another obscure varietal — is the perfect Valentine's wine, screaming for a chocolate accompaniment.

The DeRoses also import wines from South America and are often pouring several of them alongside their DeRose wines. 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

Sports store, Mex food chain to open in Sand City

A SPORTING goods retailer that operates more than 450 stores and a fast-food Mexican restaurant with more than 1,000 locations will occupy two long-vacant storefronts in Sand City, according to a planning official with the city.

Sports Authority is scheduled as early as this spring to move into the spot at 905 Playa Ave., across from SaveMart, where Circuit City left about two years ago.

obtain state tax dollars for the work, too.

Several members of the public expressed the need for safer walking and biking, especially on Rio Road near Carmel Mission and Junipero Serra School, which is busy with kids and automobile traffic.

Planning commissioner Victoria Beach said lack of safe places to cycle "is a pervasive problem throughout the city."

"This is a matter of potentially staying at a hotel in downtown Carmel and not being able to go to the Mission on a nice day without having to rent a car, drive a car, park a car," she continued. "I'm a big fan of this idea, and it seems like it's a bargain. And we're not paying it now, by the way. We're paying it if we win."

Carmel Chamber of Commerce CEO Monta Potter also favored the idea of going for the grant and said sustainability is mar-

But Mayor Sue McCloud worried the effort would require too much time and resources. She advocated putting it off a

"The \$150,000 grant, with what's involved, will be a very large drain on our planners to put this into being," she said, adding that if it's not delayed until next year, some other project should be removed from this year's to-do list.

"To have staff drop everything to get that done between now and [the March 31 deadline] really bothers me," she said.

McCloud also said council members needed to know more before they could

"Council is being asked to make a decision without half the information they should see," she said.

Talmage proposed approving the concept and getting a few people, including the city's grant writer, Jan Roehl, to look into it. And "if it turns out to be too time consuming, shelve it," he said.

The council voted 3-2, with McCloud and Hazdovac dissenting, to research what it will take to apply for the grant.

(including 200 square feet of parking.) They could also ask for some of the city's tiny supply of unallocated water credits earmarked for affordable housing.

Conroy asked commissioners to discuss whether a two-unit residence on the property would be acceptable, if they would consider giving some of the city's water to the project, if they liked the design concept and if they might grant a variance so the property owners would only have to include one parking space instead of the two required.

Commissioners wondered if a looming water moratorium would stymie the project, and therefore whether they should discuss it, but Conroy said the owners are aware of the issues might affect them. Commissioners then asked Probasco and Mandurrago to work on their design so it would require fewer credits from the city's small water surplus.

They were divided regarding the design. While some complimented Mandurrago for the Mediterranean-style look, others, like Dallas, wanted wood used on the building instead of all stucco.

Commissioners also considered charging the owners \$60,000 in in-lieu parking fees for not putting two parking spaces on the lot, but Conroy pointed out variances are designed to help people deal with physical constraints of their land. Due to the lot's small size and steep slope in spots, he said, the variance would be warranted.

Business facelift

In order to draw more customers to their tiny shop, which they said is frequently missed because of the larger gallery next door and a tree growing right in front of the business, Pilgrim's Way bookstore owner Cynthia Fernandes and her husband decided to give it a paint job. They spent last

Thanksgiving applying a tan-orange base coat and intended to top it with a lighter tone to give it a textured look but were stopped by the planning department a few weeks later, before they could apply the topcoat, because they did not ask permission first.

According to commercial design guidelines, paint on storefronts should be uniformly applied, without texturing, mottling or faux finish, and the colors should be "muted," and "blend with the natural surroundings." Bright and primary colors are to be avoided.

Since the bookstore shares a building with the neighboring art gallery, Wiener said the guidelines call for only subtle color variations between the two businesses. He recommended the commission deny the paint color and require Fernandes to restore the building to its original hue.

At the Feb. 9 meeting, Fernandes asked commissioners for help in improving the look of the store, which has been operating since 1969. "We wanted to clean up the place," she said. "The paint's peeling off the walls and chipping off the trim."

Furthermore, the art gallery's awning blocks the hanging Pilgrim's Way store sign from the view of drivers passing by, and a tree is growing in front, "so without having any kind of distinguishing mark, our regular customers, believe it or not, sometimes miss

She asked the commission to approve the lighter color she had planned to use over the darker tone.

"We had no idea that this was going to be an embarrassment or problem of any kind," she said. "Our hope was to clean up our act and do a better job of marketing our business.'

Commissioners were sympathetic, and Beach made several suggestions for other means by which Fernandes could attract customers, including replacing the hanging sign with a more visible wall sign and incorporating other sorts of decorative or architectural

features. She said the guidelines don't allow different paint colors on the same building. The commission voted 4-1, with Beach

dissenting, to let Fernandes paint the building and work with the planning staff to ensure it is acceptable.


Red Cross course on the Geneva Conventions

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


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Editorial

Money for nothing

IS THERE one state government for the Monterey Peninsula and a different one for everybody else?

We ask the question because, according to a deluge of coverage from California's biggest newspapers and TV stations, the budget crisis in Sacramento is going to cause mass suffering among the needy, deprive children of a decent education, cost thousands of people their jobs, ruin the chances for rundown neighborhoods to be redeveloped, and kill some of the chronically ill who depend on the state for free medical care.

Truly, to hear the San Francisco Chronicle or KCBS all-news radio tell it, the cutbacks proposed by Gov. Jerry Brown to reduce the deficit will spell disaster for millions of his constituents by curtailing or eliminating benefits and programs they desperately need.

But here in paradise, the state miraculously has plenty of money to spend on things you might not exactly consider urgent.

Recently, for example, we reported that the City of Pacific Grove had been granted \$220,000 by the California Department of Parks and Recreation to improve wheelchair access at Lovers Point. And today we note that the City of Carmel is thinking of applying for a \$150,000 grant that's available from Caltrans to develop a plan — not to do any actual work, mind you — for making Carmel more pedestrian- and bicycle-friendly.


Now, we're sure things could be a bit more convenient for wheelchair users at Lovers Point. But one also has to admit that, on the whole, it is already a wonderful place for anyone in a wheelchair to visit — with lots of gently rolling, wide paths leading to fantastic views of the ocean. Indeed, the entire stretch of coast from Lovers Point to the Monterey Bay Aquarium has to be considered an ideal place for people who can't walk to enjoy the shoreline. And even if there are deficiencies, improving handicapped access to this part of California's coast can't exactly be considered an emergency that requires the attention of state officials and an allocation of its taxpayers' money.

Likewise, while Carmel obviously could be somewhat more friendly to pedestrians and people on bicycles, it is already a wonderful place for them to be. Sure, some of the streets are narrow, and trees seem to always be getting in the way. But aren't these very attributes among the things that draw visitors and make life enjoyable for residents in the first place? And, to cite the obvious once again, even if there are ways the city could be made more accessible to walkers and bicyclists, is finding them a state emergency? Hardly.

Meanwhile, Brown proposes to limit Medi-Cal clients to six free prescriptions a month and 10 free doctor visit a year — Draconian cutbacks (according to the Chronicle) that will cost many people their lives. And he wants to eliminate the state redevelopment agency, a measure that will spell doom for cities such as Oakland and Bakersfield. Etc., etc.

We can't really blame public officials in Pacific Grove and Carmel for wanting to get the money from the state, since it's available. But isn't there anybody at the giving end who has the sense to ask, "Why are we doing this?"

The cost of parking meters Dear Editor,

I am living in Carmel for a few months while consulting with a local nonprofit. I feel like this is the place I am meant to be. I will be heartbroken when my contract is up and I have to leave. I mention this because I want my comments about parking meters to be framed within the context of how much I love this place.

I have a background in business senior management and also city government experience. I know that budgets are increasingly constrained, but I think the offsets for new revenue sources are not always fully thought through in the decision-making process. For parking meters, those offsets involve more than the purchase, installation and maintenance of the meters and the cost of processing the monies collected. As others have said, it is also important to bracket the risk associated with the impact of lower revenues for village merchants. However, I think the most significant concern related to parking meters should be the negative impact on the Carmel "brand."

As someone with quite a bit of branding and marketing experience, I can assure you that the Carmel brand/culture has an enormous influence on real estate values as well as on the number and nature of visitors and how much they spend. The Carmel brand image is a major reason the median price for houses here is so much higher than any other part of the area except Pebble Beach. Will the revenue from parking meters be worth a drop in those housing values?

kelp, which got entangled in the tines and had to be removed. In addition, the used rake had maintenance and repair issues, and operators "had to be constantly aware of off-leash dogs approaching the machine." Furthermore, the exposed bedrock, the tractor's turning radius and the rock fire rings meant manual cleaning was still required.

While some members of the public liked the clean, groomed look of the beach after it had been raked, others found that "resort-like" appearance objectionable. Others

disliked the noise and worried about dogs getting too close.

In addition, the mechanized rake was ineffective in cleaning charcoal out of fire pits on slopes and close to the bluffs, even though it did a good job of picking up litter and seaweed on the beach. The commission also received comments that cleaning up kelp and other natural debris "is unnecessary and a waste of the fuel and time," according to Branson's report.

Commissioners weighed the costs vs. the value of using the tractor-pulled rake and concluded the city should ditch the rake and use the money to pay more workers. (While trial use of the rake was free, the experiment cost \$14,497.60 in tractor rental and driver training, according to city clerk

"They thought the city's efforts should be specifically

refocused back on fire cleanup," Branson told the council last Tuesday.

Resident Barbara Livingston said the council should follow their recommendation and pay more people to clean the beach. She also suggested seeing if high-school and college students might be able to do the work.

"The beach rake was an interesting idea, but for the reasons Mike told you, it just isn't working," she said. "I hope you'll consider investing more heavily in manual labor."

Councilwoman Karen Sharp pointed out the rake did a good job of picking up small debris, like cigarette butts, and said the city will have to figure out how to accomplish that if the machine is no longer used.

Councilman Jason Burnett, who encouraged the city to secure the rake for the trial, conceded its failure.

"The feedback from both Mike and the forest and beach commission is this hasn't worked the way we had hoped," he said. "I certainly give a lot of weight to the recommendation of the forest and beach commission and to Mike's recom-



Mucky Duck at 479 Alvarado St. On New Year's Eve, a gunman shot three people outside the club. The man officers say fired the shots later turned himself in to police.

In 2003, the Waddells formed Mucky Duck LLC to operate the pub. Until 2006 when John Waddell moved to Placerville they jointly managed the day-to-day operations of the Mucky Duck. However, shortly after moving, John Waddell alleges his son - "without permission" — moved into the apartment above the pub.

"In nearly four years of living there," the suit alleges, "Waddell has never paid rent, utilities or cable TV; instead, [those expenses] have been incorporated into the pub's overhead."

Messages left for Eric Waddell at the Mucky Duck were not returned.

Since 2009, John Waddell alleges his son has used the business checking account to finance some of his personal living expenses, and more than \$61,000 has not been properly accounted for.

He also alleges Eric improperly used The Mucky Duck LLC's funds, spending:

- \$10,000 or more to fund "personal vacations to Las Vegas, San Francisco and Big Bear;"
 - more than \$2,500 to pay his personal

defense attorney for "litigation filed by his in-laws:'

- more than \$5,000 to his father-in-law;
- more than \$1,000 in car payments to his estranged wife.

John Waddell also accuses his son of persistently mismanaging the Mucky Duck's checking account by writing checks and making cash withdrawals when there wasn't enough money in the Comerica Bank

"In 24 months of mismanagement between January 2009 and December 2010," according to the suit. "Eric has overdrawn the account on 1,500 different occasions for ... assessed overdraft fees of \$55,442.

In January, the pub took in \$17,056 in cash through its registers, and an additional \$5,300 in cover charges came in on New Year's Eve, the lawsuit indicates.

"Of that amount," John Waddell alleges, "Eric deposited only \$255" into the business checking account in January.

John Waddell also accuses his son of not paying taxes to the State Board of Equalization in January, and in the same month, loaning the business' debit card to an employee who was on vacation in Hawaii.

The Waddells in 2003 each invested \$125,000 in the pub and agreed to have equal interest in the business, the lawsuit indicates. They decided to each draw a \$5,000-permonth salary and would be entitled to one vehicle for which the LLC would make paybaby's body to rest at Five Pillars Farm Cemetery in Alameda County, according to the lawsuit.

But on Oct. 8, 2010, five weeks after the burial, an SVMH administrator contacted Ahmed Musa, a Salinas warehouse worker, telling him it was possible they had given him and his wife the wrong body.

The caller told Musa a hospital employee found a stillborn baby in the morgue with his wife's name attached to it. He also requested the Musas come to the hospital so genetic testing could be done to confirm the body was theirs.

In a matter of moments, the healing the couple had sought over the prior several weeks unraveled, according to the suit.

"Instead of moving on with their lives following the sadness of losing their first child," the lawsuit says, "the Musas faced the grim prospects of dealing with the mishandling of their baby's remains by the hospital."

When the couple arrived at SVMH for genetic testing the same day, they were 'shuffled into a conference room filled with officials from SVMH," the lawsuit alleges.

"Instead of a lab test, SVMH told them that there had been two stillbirths the same day and that the hospital was pretty sure that the bodies of the two babies had been mixed up," the suit says.

Several days later, the hospital performed the tests, and the Musas "hoped that the tests would show that there had been no mixup."

However, when the results came in 10 days later on Oct. 22, 2010, they confirmed the couple's worst fears — the little girl they had buried was not theirs.

"The baby at the hospital, which had been sitting in the morgue for six weeks, did in fact belong to Ahmed and Hana," according to the suit.

The Musas knew they would have to make new funeral arrangements.

'The pain and suffering that was inflicted by the hospital's negligence is hard to imagine," Murphy said. "They had to go through the anguish of burying their baby twice.'

But according to the lawsuit, there was worse to come. The hospital had not placed Baby Musa's body in a "protective solution" such as an embalming agent to preserve it when it was in the morgue.

"The condition of the body of Baby Musa was beyond horrifying," the suit says. "It contained mold and had undergone decomposition.'

The hospital wrapped the baby girl's body in a blanket and gave it to Ahmed Musa so the couple could bury the fetus.

"The second burial was made even more painful by the condition of Baby Musa's body," their lawsuit says.

According to the complaint, it's not clear when SVMH mixed up the bodies. Though his wife was too distraught to look at the fetus after she delivered it, Ahmed Musa viewed the body in a separate room just after that. Except for the word of the hospital's staff, he would have had no way to be sure the baby was his.

The identity of the mother who delivered the stillborn baby the Musas inadvertently buried in place of their own is also not clear.

"We understand that the body has been exhumed but have not confirmed that through discovery," according to Murphy. "We do not know if the hospital informed the

The hospital was negligent because it did not keep track of the couple's baby, failed to properly handle the remains and didn't discover the fetus had been switched with the remains of another baby for more than a month, according to the lawsuit.

'The fact the wrong body was given speaks for itself in demonstrating negligence," the complaint alleges.

SVMH spokeswoman Adrienne Laurent told The Pine Cone she couldn't comment on pending litigation.

The lawsuit also claims the hospital violated the California Health and Safety Code by "holding a body pending disposition for more than eight calendar days after a death without a permit."

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day, and everyone's going to have a lot of fun," Doug Freedman said from his Atlanta, Ga., office this week.

Last year, due to lack of funds, the Freedmans announced they were canceling the 2010 event. As in previous years, the winners will cross a stage at San Carlos and Ocean presided over by emcees Michael Lynch and Ed Justice. Featured classes include American, Italian and British sports cars, luxury cars and family favorites, as well as hot rods, muscle and micro cars, historic racecars and motorcycles, and several classes of Porsches and Ferraris.

They still need cash to pull off the show but are intent on bringing it back to the streets of Carmel. "We're excited. We're going to be there," Freedman said. "We are working hard, and we're doing all the things we've done before."

He issued the call for entries in mid-January and has so far received about 25 but hopes to eventually get two applications for every spot available.

"The majority of the applications that have come in to date are entrants that made application last year and/or who were with us in previous years," he observed. "Our core group has stuck with us. They are supporting Carmel, and they want the event to continue. We're feeling really good about that, as well."

Each entry costs \$250, and entrants are encouraged to write bigger checks so The Carmel Foundation — the nonprofit that offers low-cost food, affordable housing, classes and other services to seniors — will receive the balance. Freedman said money is already coming in for the foundation, including \$750 from one of the first few entrants.

He encouraged anyone who is interested in participating, whether as a volunteer, an entrant, a judge or a sponsor, to contact him. "Our biggest need is sponsorship," he said. "Give us a chance to talk to you about our event — Carmel's event. No matter what, we still need that support.'

The amount of sponsorships will dictate whether the show has any of the frills of the past, such as the detailed car cards chronicling the history and ownership information of each entry.

Freedman touted the draw of the town, not just for participants and car fans, but for their families who might rather shop, eat and browse than look at beautiful and interesting automobiles. "Carmel is just a fantastic backdrop and a fantastic venue, not just for the enthusiast, but for the rest of the family," he said.

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DID YOU KNOW?

Golf and the UN - Pebble Beach is famous for world-class golf but back in the 1940s Samuel Morse had other global aspirations as well. The founder of Pebble Beach campaigned to have the United Nations located here, and offered 500 acres of land in Del Monte Forest "without restrictions". He discussed the idea it with the U.S. Secretary of State and supplied complete data on the Peninsula climate, geographic and scenic advantages. The Peninsula was one of about 20 locations considered before the U.N. in 1946 decided to settle in New York. Morse's decision was slightly ironic given the racial covenant restrictions in Pebble that prevailed until the Civil Right Act of 1964.

Senior citizen of tournaments is still the place to be

HE AT&T Pebble Beach National Pro-Am is well into its seventh decade, but it's still spry. The mystique and history of golf on the Monterey Peninsula help attract not only an impressive list of celebrities, but among the PGA Tour's most diverse fields.

Fresh with fully exempt playing status, rookies are simultaneously anxious and eager to experience Pebble Beach.

Golf's rising stars are ready to return with confidence and respect for the often fickle weather.

Veteran players, some with major titles and lofty status on the career earnings list, never miss the tradition of the PGA Tour's 10th-oldest event.

No three players better represent the diverse groups than Alexandre Rocha, Dustin Johnson and Phil Mickelson. They'll all be in the 156player field competing Feb. 10-13 in the \$6.3 million event at Pebble Beach Golf Links, Spyglass Hill Golf Course and Monterey Peninsula Country Club's Shore Course.

■ Rocha, 33, is likely the world's most experienced golfer with virtually no PGA Tour experience. Although he's played in 80 countries, Rocha has competed in only four PGA Tour events since his debut in 2003 and has never played in the AT&T.

Despite his fledgling PGA Tour career, Rocha, a native of Sao Paolo, Brazil, has won 10 career pro events from Canada to Chile. But he's among 35 rookies this year on the PGA Tour from seven different countries.

"I was petrified; I was just horrified," said Rocha, about his very first experience at a PGA tournament at the Southern Farm Bureau Classic almost a decade ago. "I wanted to get off the course as soon as I could, because I felt so uncomfortable."


■ Although the AT&T and its precursor, the Crosby Clambake, have had their share of bad weather, Johnson wasn't fazed in the first of his two consecutive wins in the tournament in 2009.

After his seventh-place AT&T debut in 2008, Johnson returned in 2009 after claiming his first PGA Tour win late in the 2008 season. On what turned out to be its last day as part of the three-course rotation, Johnson had a third-round 67 at Poppy Hills and emerged with a four-shot lead over Mike Weir.

But horrid weather, including fallen trees and flooded fairways, prompted the cancellation of the fourth round and Johnson became one of the tournament's rare 54-hole winners.

Last year, with the Monterey

AT&T SECURITY REQUIRES A LOT OF COLLABORATION


■ Officials rely on hundreds of volunteers

ENSURING THE safety of the PGA Tour players and amateurs competing in this week's AT&T Pebble Beach National Pro-Am — and the tens of thousands of fans who flock to the three Del Monte Forest golf courses to watch them — requires the combined effort of hundreds of paid and volunteer security personnel.

Monterey Peninsula Foundation, the nonprofit that organizes the tournament, relies on them for everything related to public safety, from directing traffic and checking spectators' bags for contraband, to enforcing camera rules, keeping unruly attendees from disrupting play and sweeping the courses and buildings for anything suspicious, according to president Steve Worthy.

At the top of the hierarchy are eight

law-enforcement officials from the California Highway Patrol, the Monterey County Sheriff's Office and the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms. Each has a particular job to fill, though some of their duties overlap, according to Worthy.

On multiple occasions daily, security teams, including officers with bombsniffing dogs, sweep the Pebble Beach Golf Links, Spyglass Hill Golf Course and Monterey Peninsula Country Club Shore Course, keeping an eye out for anything suspicious. They also thoroughly search all the buildings.

"We have a lot of area to sweep," said Worthy, though he did not want to divulge too much detail, lest someone use that information to do harm.

"From a security standpoint, the more we release to the public, the more people might find their way around it,"


Much of the security effort is undertaken miles from the golf courses, in the parking areas at California State University Monterey Bay. There, spectators park for free and board buses to ride into Pebble Beach, but before they embark, they are advised of the rules and undergo screening.

The list of banned items is comprehensive: distracting devices, cameras, bags larger than 8 inches by 8 inches, backpacks, food containers, coolers, signs, banners, posters, televisions and radios, outside alcohol, non-service pets, bicycles, ladders, metal spiked golf shoes, weapons and "any other item deemed potentially injurious, unlawful or dangerous."

"We have a lot of ground to cover," he said. "We try to do as much as we can at the parking lots, so we catch everyone there. We do all that we can from an education standpoint."

People who don't park at CSUMB and bus in undergo security screening in Pebble Beach.

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
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
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












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
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
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








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
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Pro-Am grant helps preserve Carmel Valley's rich history

"It's important that the people of today and the future have a place where they can examine our history,' observed Reggie Jones, chairman of the Carmel Valley Historical Society's building committee. "Carmel Valley's history is disappearing rapidly. We need to document it before it is lost."

The museum is located on Carmel Valley Road between Ford and Pilot roads. The building occupies a portion of a property owned by the Carmel Valley Park and Recreation District.

Food banks, homeless services and women's shelters

HILE GOLF fans are watching some of the sport's best players and celebrity amateurs at the AT&T Pebble Beach National Pro-Am this week, dozens of nonprofits are putting proceeds from the tournament to good

For instance, there are numerous organizations that benefit a segment of the local population who may never attend the AT&T or any other golf tournament - low-income and home-

Here are a few of the charitable groups that receive funds every year from the Monterey Peninsula Foundation — the fundraising wing of the AT&T Pebble Beach National Pro-Am — which has raised more than \$85 million.

Farmers market for free

The largest provider of emergency supplemental food in Monterey County, the Food Bank for Monterey County offers services for low-income and homeless families. And last year, the Monterey Peninsula Foundation provided \$100,000 to the food bank.

One of its most interesting programs is the food bank's Family Market, which provides those in need fresh produce and dairy products - much like a farmers market does, except it's free.

The program is the food bank's answer to health concerns - specifically diabetes and obesity — among its low-income clients. Each market serves from 200 to 400 people each week, with each household receiving from 50 to 100 pounds of food.

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
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

Prohibited items: This year's 2011 tournament will feature a test of mobile phone devices on course. Fans will be able to make cell phone calls in special calling areas on all three courses andy follow the action online as long as they have their device on silent mode and do not use the camera func-

The following items are specifically prohibited inside the entrance gate of the AT&T Thursday through Sunday of tournament week:


- Distracting Devices or noise producing, electronic/compressed air, or any other such device.
- Cameras: video or still capabilities, except media as credentialed or authorized by Tournament staff (cameras only allowed during practice round days Mon-Wed)
- Bags, backpacks, food container or cooler or any other carrying device larger than 8-inch-by-8-inch-by-8-inch in its filled capacity
- Signs, banners or posters (except autograph), of any size
 - Televisions and radios
- Alcohol of any form or container, except on site sales or businesses
- Pets (except service animals), bicycles and ladders
 - Metal spiked golf shoes
- Weapons of any sort, whether licensed or permitted
- Any item deemed potentially injurious, unlawful or dangerous to staff, volunteers or participants as determined in the sole discretion of the PGA Tour, tournament security personnel or law enforcement officials

Exceptions: Plastic water bottles and food capable of fitting into the 8inch-by-8-inch-by-8-inch container or pockets are acceptable for entry.



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
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
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
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




Six decades of cover art tell tournament tales

NEWLY released book chronicles the stories — Land artwork — of the AT&T Pebble Beach National Pro-Am since Bing Crosby brought the charity tournament, which quickly became known as the Crosby, to the Monterey Peninsula in 1947.

'We are one of the only, if not the only, tournament that still uses original artwork on each program cover, which really speaks to the special and singular nature of our event - heavily steeped in tradition," commented Amanda Evans, who is in charge of business development for the Monterey Peninsula Foundation. "Cover Stories," is debuting at this year's tournament, and the proceeds will benefit charity, just as the pro-am itself does.

Since tournament staff members have kept a copy of every program since 1947, compiling the images for the book presented no challenge, according to Evans. Among the noted artists who contributed art for the Pro-Am over the years are LeRoy Neiman, Eldon Dedini, Hank Ketcham, Charles Schulz, Bernie Fuchs and Donald Teague. Ketcham and Schulz uniquely collaborated on the cover of the 1990 program.

Begging by airplane

The book also contains anecdotes and a history of the tournament, beginning with its first year as the National Pro-Amateur Golf Championship, when Crosby put up the entire \$3,000 purse himself. The format was best ball, 18 holes per day, for two days.


Also according to the book, an invitation to play was so coveted that one hopeful began skywriting to plead his case.


In the 1950s, the field grew to 96 teams competing over 72 holes with a purse of \$50,000, and the tournament made its television debut. AT&T became the title sponsor in 1986.


Clint Eastwood wrote the forward for the book, which also includes an introduction by members of the Crosby family.



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

Peninsula Country Club's Shore Course replacing Poppy Hills, Johnson began his title defense as the tournament leader after an 8-underpar 64 at Pebble Beach. He completed his second win with a birdie on the final hole at Pebble Beach and became only the sixth player in tournament history to win back-to-back titles.

AT&T Week

"I really enjoy playing the Shore Course," said a confident Johnson, 26, at a recent pre-tournament press conference, also at MPCC. "But I like Poppy Hills, too. So I don't care which one we play, really. I've won playing both rotations, so either one works for me."

Johnson's 7th, 1st and 1st in his three AT&T appearances have earned

him a combined \$2.4 million, and his quick ascension now has him ranked 14th in the world.

"My career turning point came when I won at Turning Stone (his first PGA Tour win in 2008). But it's hard to say one win is better than the other," said Johnson. "This tournament is weather dependent. I've had a few mud balls. Sometimes they've gone straight and sometimes they go off the world."

Johnson returned to Pebble Beach last June as a favorite at the U.S. Open and should have won. He held a threestroke lead after 54 holes but stumbled early and late in the final round, shot and 82 and finished tied for 8th.

Two months later, Johnson's woes continued. On the final hole of the PGA Championship, he was assessed

a two-stroke penalty for grounding his club in a fairway bunker he didn't realize was a bunker. The penalty catapulted Johnson out of the playoff and he eventually finished tied for 5th.

Johnson's two 2010 debacles attracted almost as much attention to the PGA Tour as French pro Jean Vande de Velde's infamous final-hole triple bogey and loss at the 1999 British Open.

But unlike Van de Velde, who never won again or even came close to winning on the PGA Tour, Johnson emerged well from his two odd losses at major championships.

Three weeks after the PGA Championship, Johnson claimed the BMW Championships, his fourth PGA Tour win. By season's end, he was also fourth on the money list with nearly \$4.5 million.

Now age 40 and a pro for 20 years, Mickelson will be playing in the AT&T for the 17th straight year. He's won the event three times, including what's known as the longest golf tournament in history, and has six top-10 finishes.

In addition to his titles in 2007 and 2005, Mickelson had to wait six months and 20 days for his first AT&T title in 1998. With the forces of El Niño pulverizing the Monterey Peninsula, championship rounds were limited to 36 holes — nine holes on Thursday and Friday and 18 Saturday.

Heavy rain and strong winds forced the cancellation of play Sunday and the Monday make-up day. The concluding 18 holes were scheduled in


August for the players' convenience. A field of 168 were in the tournament, and 125 returned in August. Most arrived on flights Sunday or early Monday following the conclusion of the PGA Championship in Redmond, Wash.

Mickelson began the rescheduled third round one shot off the lead but posted a 5-under 67 and defeated Tom Pernice, Jr., by one stroke for this 13th PGA Tour win. Twenty-five titles (including four majors) later, Mickelson began the 2011 season with plans to compete for six straight weeks, including the Pebble Beach event.

Although he won the Masters last year, Mickelson again did not achieve the No. 1 world ranking he's never had in his career. He had five other top-10 tournament efforts and finished sixth on the money list with more than \$3.8 million. But he wasn't satisfied. Mickelson's 2011 season began at Abu Dhabi HSBC Golf Championship, and the AT&T will be his fourth of five straight PGA Tour events.

Mickelson took off eight weeks from tournament golf beginning last November. While concentrating on practice, his health improved despite continuing struggles with arthritis. Although he's no longer practicing, Mickelson also experimented with a vegetarian diet for five months.

"My goal this year is 2011 to have the year I expected 2010 to be," said Mickelson, with of 38 career PGA Tour titles. "With the exception of the Masters, it wasn't the year I had hoped for. And so I've been working hard in the off-season to make 2011 the year I believe I can have and the one I had hoped for last year."



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
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

in certain locations and under certain rules, and a number of security people are tasked with educating the public and enforcing those requirements.

In addition, law enforcement officers screen every package that comes in for a player or anyone else involved in the tournament.

"All the packages that come in go through X-rays and screening before they go to the addressees," Worthy said.

The California Highway Patrol oversees traffic throughout Del Monte Forest during tournament week, with the help of nearly 200 Explorers school kids who are in police training programs and bus in to the Peninsula from all over California and other Western states.

Overall, the tournament pays for about 240 people to provide security, including staff from a private firm, CSC.

Another 140 or so are volunteers who staff five teams: one for each of the three golf courses, hospitality and escort for players and officials inside the ropes. The volunteers are overseen by Rick Moore, who replaced Bobby Phillips in the position this year.

"There's a pretty good group that's been around for a long time," Worthy said. "A lot of them come from areas outside the Peninsula."

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
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


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Take a shuttle to the AT&T!

O WOO visitors to eat, drink and shop in their towns when they're not taking in the golf at the AT&T Pebble Beach National Pro-Am, and to provide easy ways in and out of the tournament, chambers of commerce are offering shuttle services between their towns and Pebble Beach. The buses eliminate the need for golf fans to take shuttles to the tournament from parking lots at California State University Monterey Bay on the former Fort Ord.

■ Carmel-by-the-Sea

The Carmel Chamber of Commerce and the Carmel Innkeepers Association will run shuttle buses from Carmel to the pro-am from 6:30 a.m. to 5:30 p.m., Friday and Saturday, Feb. 11-12; and from 7 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. on Sunday, Feb. 13.

Buses depart from Carmel Plaza and drop spectators off in Pebble Beach, and passes, which allow unlimited rides, are \$20 per person per day. An all-days pass is available for \$75.

Fans can also purchase any-day golf tournament tickets for \$55 (as opposed to \$60 at the gate) at the bus stop or at the Carmel Chamber of Commerce Visitor Center, located on the west side of San Carlos Street between Fifth and Sixth avenues.

Paid parking is available at the Sunset Center lot on Eighth at Mission Street and in the Carmel Plaza lot on Mission between Ocean and Seventh avenues.

Free parking is available in the Vista Lobos lot at Third and Junipero, as well as on the street, though people

should be aware of parking time limits in certain areas of town. If fans want to take a break from golf and come into Carmel for lunch or shopping, they can catch the shuttle by the P.B. Equestrian Center.

Shuttle tickets and tournament any-day tickets may be purchased ahead of time by calling the Carmel Chamber of Commerce at (831) 624-2522 or visiting www.carmelcalifornia.org. During the tournament, tickets can be purchased at the Carmel Plaza bus stop.

■ Monterey

The Cannery Row Co. and the Old Monterey Business Association are operating the Monterey Express Shuttle. Fans can park their cars at two Monterey locations, get their fill of golf and return for an evening of food and fun on Cannery Row or in downtown Monterey.

The shuttle stop is located at the corner of Prescott Street adjacent to Steinbeck Plaza, with parking in the Cannery Row Garage. In downtown Monterey, the stop is at the Monterey Conference Center in Portola Plaza, with parking in the downtown garages on Tyler and Franklin streets.

Buses leave approximately every 20 minutes on Feb. 11 and 12 between 6 a.m. and 5:30 p.m., and on Feb. 13 from 6 a.m. to 4:30 p.m.

The cost is \$15 per person for a oneday round-trip shuttle ticket, and parking is \$5 per vehicle at the municipal garages near the shuttle stops. Shuttle tickets and AT&T Pro-Am tickets may be purchased at the stops.

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HISTORY OF THE PRO-AM

A glorious time on the links, fair weather or foul

N 1937, Bing Crosby invited a group of friends to get together for a round of golf and a "clambake" at Rancho Santa Fe in Southern California. That gathering of Hollywood celebrities and golf greats gave birth to the first National Pro-Amateur Golf Championship, sponsored by Bing Crosby, with Sam Snead taking the top prize of \$500.

For five years, the tournament was played at Rancho Santa Fe before being discontinued during the war years. Meanwhile, 1946 was shaping up to be a bleak year for the Monterey Peninsula. Postwar Monterey was frantically scraping for income, the chief source having been packed into sardine tins for just about the last time. Cannery Row was heading into a long decline, Carmel wasn't a worldwide tourist attraction, Pebble Beach had yet to classified the finest course in the world, and nobody had heard of a young, would-be actor named Clint Eastwood.

At this time, a young newspaper reporter, Ted Durein, came up with the idea of attracting more tourists by bringing a major special event to the area. A good sporting event, once a year, perhaps garnished with celebrities, could anchor a drifting economy. Slowly an idea began to take shape, along with a worldwide household name: Crosby.

Durein solicited local merchants to see if they would pool money for a tournament purse — they would. Bravely, Durein wrote to Bing Crosby himself with the idea. That was in January of 1946. February and March passed. Nothing. April, May, still nothing. Then, in June, a letter from Bing's brother, Larry, arrived. Yes, Bing was interested. What's the offer? Durein didn't have one.

The deal is struck

He quickly rushed to see if Samuel F.B. Morse (president of Del Monte Properties, now known as Pebble Beach Company) would let the Pebble Beach golf course host the Crosby. Morse agreed. Ted met with Larry Crosby and the deal was struck.

Bing then decided he wanted the tournament spread out over three courses: Pebble Beach, Cypress Point and the Monterey Peninsula Country Club's Dunes Course. The PGA Tour, the controlling body of the professional golfers' tournament, said this was unprecedented. Bing asked, "Why not? It's done in England." The PGA Tour consented and the Crosby Pro-Am broke new ground in American golf and was played for the first time on the Monterey Peninsula in January 1947.

Since then, the annual tournament at Pebble Beach has been a staple of the PGA Tour calendar. The tournament purse has increased from \$500 for first prize in 1937 to a first prize of \$900,000 in 2004. The monies for charity each year have continued to set new records as well, with total contributions hitting \$46 million.

Bing Crosby died in 1977. His wife and children continued to host the Crosby Pro-Am until 1986, when AT&T took over sponsorship of the event. Since 1991, the event has been played at Pebble Beach, Poppy Hills and Spyglass. Over the last 20 years, the event has provided some of the most dramatic moments in golf, including Hale Irwin's fantastically lucky tee shot in 1984, and Tiger Woods' amazing comeback in 2000.

It has also endured some of the worst weather ever for a major sporting event. Twice, after particularly cold and rainy spells, tournament organizers have talked about moving the Pro-Am. But most years there have been glorious, only-in-California conditions for the Pebble Beach Pro-Am. And the memories have been golden, too.

1993 Winner: Brett Ogle 68-68-69-71 (276)

Gregarious Australian Brett Ogle captured his first PGA Tour victory at Pebble Beach with a three-shot triumph in the AT&T Pro-Am, despite four bogeys in six holes during the final round. With a steady rain falling through much of the day, Ogle birdied three of the last six holes to fend off challengers Billy Ray Brown and Greg Twigs. Ogle's first-place finish was worth \$225,000. Tom Watson had the low round on the final day, with birdies on 10, 11, 18, 6, 7 and 9. Payne Stewart and Jim Morris won the Pro-Am title, after Mark McGwire knocked his team out of contention with a bogey on 18.

1994 Winner: Johnny Miller 68-72-67-74 (281)

Defying the calendar, 46-year-old Johnny Miller captured the AT&T Pro-Am, and even he had trouble believing it. "I play two tournaments a year . . . this is magic," he said. The win was Miller's third title in three different decades at the Pebble Beach charity event — he had previously won in 1974 and 1987. Jeff Maggert, Corey Pavin, Kirk Triplett and Tom Watson all finished just one stroke behind Miller, who sank a one-foot putt for par on 18 to avoid a possible five-way playoff. It rained nearly all day during the final round and, with a gale blowing from the south, Miller got to the green in two on 17 to preserve his lead while Watson was bogeying 14, 16 and 17. Miller's first-place finish was worth \$225,000. Pro-Am winners were Dudley Hart and 18-year-old amateur Robert Floyd.

1995 Winner: Peter Jacobsen 67-73-66-65 (271)

With the best final round by a winner, Peter Jacobsen captured the \$252,000 winner's purse despite starting play at Pebble Beach on Sunday at three under. His total score, 271, was the lowest since Mark O'Meara's 273 in 1985, but with clean-and-place rules in effect because of a wet course, Jacobsen said his record score deserved "an asterisk." With a bit of sun finally showing through the clouds, Jacobsen birdied 18 to seal his victory. David Duval, in his first full year on the PGA Tour, finished in second place, two strokes back. Pro-Am winners were Bruce Vaughn and amateur Masahi Yamada.

1996 Winner: nobody Tournament canceled due to unplayable conditions

The weather on Sunday was pleasant: low clouds, some sun, no rain. But heavy rains earlier in the week, including a torrential downpour on Saturday, left the courses — especially Spyglass — in unplayable condition, forcing outright cancellation of the AT&T Pro-Am due to weather for the first, and only, time in its history. (Play was suspended from 1942 to 1946 because of WWII.) In particular, one flooded spot on 16 at Spyglass was cited by PGA officials as requiring cancellation of the event. Jeff Maggert was the leader at 136 after 54 holes; he got \$5,000 in consolation money, just like all the other pros in the field.

1997 Winner: Mark O'Meara 67-67-67 (268)

Fighting off an amazing comeback by Tiger Woods — who was in 67th place on Friday and trailed by seven shots Sunday morning - Mark O'Meara won his fifth AT&T Pebble Beach Pro-Am by a single shot over Woods and David Duval. Woods, playing in a foursome one hole ahead of O'Meara, had six birdies in the first 12 holes but bogeyed 13. Two shots down on 18, Woods made a dramatic bid for an eagle on 18. His second shot, from 267 yards out, landed on the front of the green. But he missed a 35-foot putt and had to settle for a birdie. O'Meara's all-time low score at the event was worth \$342,000. Pro-Am champs were Paul Stankowski and Andy Garcia.

1998 Winner: Phil Mickelson 67-68-67 (202)

A torrential downpour on Sunday brought back memories of 1996, when the AT&T Pro-Am was canceled after 54 holes. But in 1998, with California again experiencing record-breaking rains, PGA officials looked for a way to squeeze in a third round at Pebble Beach sometime later in the year. First, they set the final round for March 2. Later, it was rescheduled again to Aug. 17. The winner's check was \$450,000. The Pro-Am portion of the tournament was canceled.

1999 Winner: Payne Stewart 69-64-73 (206)

With weather getting seriously in the way for the fourth time in five years, the 1999 tournament was shortened to just 54 holes, just like it had been the year before. Saturday leader Payne Stewart was declared the winner of the \$504,000 first prize after heavy rains Saturday night and Sunday forced cancellation of the final round. Stewart's final shot on Saturday, a tap-in birdie on 18 at Spyglass, turned out to be the winner over Frank Lickliter, just one shot back. Pro-Am winners were Lickliter and Robert MacDonnell. Later that year, Stewart won the U.S. Open at Pinehurst, S.C. He died in a plane crash Oct. 25 when carbon monoxide rendered everyone on board his chartered airplane unconscious soon after takeoff from Orlando, Fla. The plane flew on autopilot until it ran out of fuel and crashed in South Dakota, depriving Stewart of the chance to defend his U.S. Open and AT&T Pro-Am titles — both at Pebble Beach — in 2000.

2000 Winner: Tiger Woods 68-73-68-64 (273)

Leaving the crowd and the sportswriters practically speechless, Tiger Woods gave the AT&T Pro-Am a finish unlike any other. Down five shots when play began on Sunday, and even further behind — seven shots — with just seven holes to play, Woods took complete control of his game and the tournament, capping his comeback with a 97-foot wedge shot on 15 that hit just to the right of the hole, took two bounces, and landed in the cup. He nearly did the same on 16 and finished two strokes ahead of Vijay Singh and Matt Gogel to take the first prize of \$720,000. The win was Woods' sixth in a row on the PGA Tour. Pro-Am champs were Skip Kendall and King City businessman David Gill. The tournament was the last Pebble Beach Pro-Am event for golf legend Jack Nicklaus.

2001 Winner: Davis Love III 71-69-69-63 (272)

Despite a seven-shot deficit when play started under sparkling, clear skies Sunday morning, Davis Love III put together an amazing round of 63, including five birdies and an eagle on the first six holes. On the front nine, he was an amazing eight under. Another birdie on 15 sealed his victory and the first-place money of \$720,000. Vijay Singh finished just one stroke back; Tiger Woods was eight strokes off the lead. Pro-Am champs were Phil Mickelson and saxophonist Kenny G.

2002 Winner: Matt Gogel 66-72-67-69 (274)

With his first PGA Tour victory,

As with many of the people who help make the tournament run smoothly, security volunteers pay their own way to come to Pebble Beach for a week of 10-hour days, and many return year after year.

Ed Smith, who retired from Monterey Police Department in 2006, is among them. He first learned of the volunteer security detail 15 years ago from another law-enforcement officer, and he helped out for a couple of years. Then a long hiatus followed until six years ago, when he returned.

This year, he's captain of the team responsible for security at Spyglass Hill. The team has about 20 members, including CEOs of companies, a retired federal prosecutor, a retired bailiff, retired CHP officers, a sergeant from Monterey P.D. and a police officer from Gilroy.

"So the whole team is not just law enforcement," he said. "It's a combination of professionals who are willing to come in and do this and help a great tournament raise a lot of money for the foundation."

As captain, Smith maintains contact with his team members through-

out the year to secure their commitments to work during the tournament. Once here for the week, he makes sure they have their uniforms, equipment and radios, attend briefings and get fed. They all work closely with Monterey County Sheriff's Office personnel to ensure the course is safe and the players are protected.

"We put them out in different locations on the course. Their assignment is to make sure players don't get harassed and people are staying behind the ropes and to make sure they are not using cameras and recorders and cell phones," he said. "There's a lot of watching the group and the crowd, making sure they keep a distance from the players and the play is uninterrupted."

They typically end up helping fans who have been hit by wayward golf balls, aiding people who have fallen and correcting spectators who are taking photos when and where they're not supposed to.

"We deal with a lot of lost children—you find them sitting in the middle of the green," he said, as well as the "stressful moments where you have to convince the surgeon who thinks he's very important that he can not be talking on his cell phone to the hospital next to the green while the player is trying to make his putt."

Gogel picked up a check for \$720,000 after shooting two under on the back nine during the final round. Two years earlier, Gogel had watched Tiger Woods stage an incredible comeback to take the tournament from him. This year, third-round leader Pat Perez, who was up by four strokes when play started Sunday, withered on the final day, shooting a triple-bogey on the 18th Hole, opening the door for Gogel who showed none of the nervousness of 2000. Tiger Woods shot 282, eight strokes off the lead (for the second vear in a row). Pro-Am winners were Brian Claar and Randall Mays.

2003 Winner: Davis Love III 72-67-67-68 (274)

With nothing but blue skies and mild temperatures throughout the tournament, talk of "Crosby Weather" and of moving the AT&T later in the year a common topic in the storm-tossed 1990s — was completely forgotten. And with Tiger Woods sitting out the Pro-Am after consecutive years finishing eight strokes off the lead, all the attention was on less well known, but equally formidable, PGA stars. Davis Love III salvaged a victory with a birdie on 18 on the final day — holding off Tom Lehman by a single stroke. Love's win — his second in three years — came despite a bogey on 16 on the final round. In the group just ahead, Tom Lehman bogeyed two holes in the front nine but then shot five birdies on the back nine and seemed poised to force a playoff. A missed birdie putt from less than six feet on 18 left him in second place. Love's win, worth \$900,000, came with some extraordinary luck: His tee shot on 12 hit a photographer (not from The Pine Cone) and rolled to within easy putting distance of the pin. The Pro-Am ended in a tie, with pros Phil Tataurangi and Brad Faxon and their amateur partners Chris Heatley and Thomas Ryan ending up with 31-under scores of 257. Both pairings finished with final rounds of 64. Two Pro-Am teams were disqualified during the tournament for signing incorrect scorecards.

2004 Winner: Vijay Singh 67-68-68-69

With four rounds in the 60s, Vijay Singh had little serious competition in the 2004 AT&T Pebble Beach National Pro-Am. His dominating, three-stroke victory came with 25 birdies and earned him \$954,000. After 54 sun-drenched holes, it appeared that San Jose State graduate Arron Oberholser (who would win the tournament in 2006) had a chance to beat Singh. In the same group for the final round, they were tied at 13 under when play began Sunday. On the first three holes, Singh's tee shots were errant: one going into the rough, one missing the fairway and another missing the green by 60 yards. But Singh managed to turn all three into birdies. Another birdie for Singh on 8, coupled with a double-bogey for Oberholser on the same hole, gave Singh an unbeatable six stroke lead. The winning proam team was Jerry Kelly and Robert Halmi, Jr.

2005 Winner: Phil Mickelson 62-67-67-73 (269)

Phil Mickelson started his week on the Monterey Peninsula being inducted into the California Golf Hall of Fame and finished it breaking records on his way to a four-stroke victory in the 2005 Pebble Beach Pro-Am. Fellow lefty Mike Weir was the run-

In the process, Mickelson became the first wire-to-wire winner since the tournament was lengthened from 54 holes to 72 holes in 1958. He matched the tournament record with a 10-under-par 62 in his opening round at Spyglass Hill Golf Course. The amazing performance also set a record for Spyglass. And then, Mickelson set the tournament 36-hole record at 129 with his second-round 67 at Poppy Hills. And he set the tournament 54-hole record at 196 with his third-round 67 at Pebble Beach.

Although a final-round 73, 1-overpar at Pebble Beach, left him one shot off the tournament record of 268 set by Mark O'Meara in 1997, it nonetheless

The markets, held outdoors, offer food based mainly on self-selection. In other words, instead of receiving pre-packed bags, families can take the food they want — choosing from produce such as broccoli, Brussels sprouts, celery, leeks, lettuce, Portobello mushrooms, scallions and strawberries.

The market is succeeding in providing healthier food to families. According to the food bank, a survey indicates that 98 percent of the Family Markets' customers eat more fruits and vegetables because of the program.

The market offers donated produce, some locally grown, but some from out of the county. Food from distant sources comes with trucking costs and other fees, making the grant from the AT&T Pebble Beach National Pro-Am essential.

Two years ago, the food bank added two more Family Market sites — one in Pajaro and the other in King City — bringing the total number to 10, including Soledad, Seaside, Greenfield, Castroville, Marina and three locations in Salinas.

The markets also have information avail-

able on nutrition, food stamps, and other health and human services programs for low-income families. In 2009, the Family Markets benefited about 20,000 families in Monterey County.

■ Homeless coalition

Based on the former Fort Ord, the Coalition of Homeless Services Providers is just that — several organizations that provide services to low-income and homeless people throughout Monterey County. Last year, the organization received \$60,000 from the Monterey Peninsula Foundation.

"We bring together agencies and service providers under one roof, so those who are homeless can access all their needs in one stop," said Glorietta Rowland, the organization's executive officer.

Some of the agencies that make up the coalition include Franciscan Workers, Central Coast HIV-AIDS Services, Salvation Army, Monterey Peninsula Corps, Sun Street Centers and YWCA of Monterey County.

One of the agencies, The Salvation Army, operates the Good Samaritan Center on Contra Costa Street in Sand City, providing valuable day services for many homeless and low-income individuals and families on the Monterey Peninsula.

The center provides its clients a place to get a bite to eat at breakfast and lunch, take a shower, wash clothing, make phone calls, access the Internet and receive mail — all at no charge.

It also offers food boxes on certain days of the week for seniors who have a home and a place to cook but need food assistance.

For those looking for work, the The Good Samaritan Center has day-labor services, which links homeless people with short-term, temporary or onetime jobs. Typical jobs include gardening, house-cleaning, construction and delivery.

Depending on eligibility, the Salvation Army will even help pay PG&E bills and emergency or move-in assistance.

■ Churches offer shelter

Marina-based nonprofit Shelter Outreach Plus offers housing and other services for homeless and low-income individuals and families, including legal advocacy and counseling to help those trying to escape domestic violence and emergency shelter.

One of Shelter Outreach Plus' programs, I-HELP
— an acronym for Interfaith Homeless Emergency
Lodging Program — offers single men shelter, food
and support with help from more than 60 Monterey
County churches, synagogues, temples and religious

organizations. I-HELP operates two separate programs, one in Salinas and one on the Peninsula.

The churches, synagogues and temples, in cooperation with Shelter Outreach Plus, provide homeless men with hope by offering nightly shelter, a hot meal and support.

Each evening, I-HELP vans transport the men from central pickup points in Salinas and Monterey (on Del Monte Avenue across the street from the Naval Postgraduate School) to a host church, where they spend the night.

In the day, I-HELP's case managers aid the men in job placement and housing assistance, clothing, support and referrals.

I-HELP has never missed a night of offering services for the homeless in its 17 years of operation.

■ Help for women and children

Shelter Outreach Plus also offers help to women

and children with two 30- to 60-day emergency shelters in Monterey County — one in Salinas and another in Seaside.

The shelters offer women and children safety and assistance as they try to break the cycle of domestic violence and/or homelessness.

A 16-bed home in Seaside and a 24-bed facility in Salinas provide 24-hour, year-round help and hope, according to the group.

A woman entering one of the shelters will find a clean room for herself and her children with ongoing support such as food, clothing and sundries. Counseling and case management services are

Counseling and case management services are available to help women obtain a job and long-term housing, so they can "begin the process of rehabilitation necessary to become self-sufficient," the group says.

was a solid finish, given that Weir's 67 was the only sub-70 round posted in a light rain, with some gusty wind. When the final round began, Mickelson held a seven-shot lead through 54 holes, making Sunday's play little more than a formality. His winnings were \$954,000.

Bill Murray and longtime pro partner Scott Simpson were in the running for the pro-am title, but their closing 67 gave them a 258 total, good for fourth. The victory went to Barry McCollam and pro partner Joel Kribel.

2006 **Winner: Arron Oberholser** 65-68-66-72 (271)

Two years after failing to catch Vijay Singh, Arron Oberholser closed the deal on his first PGA Tour victory to the delight of his family and friends from San Jose.

"Growing up, I always watched guys win the golf tournament and just the walk up 18 at Pebble Beach is unlike anything else," said Oberholser, a former San Jose State standout who played numerous amateur events on the Monterey Peninsula. "Even when you're playing here by yourself or with a foursome, it's still an incredible walk. But to walk up knowing that you are the champion ... I wish everybody could feel that way. It's incredible."

Oberholser shot a final-round 72, even par, on the Pebble Beach Golf Links for a 271, 17-under-par enough for a tournament record-tving five-shot cushion over runner-up Rory Sabbatini, whose 70 gave him a 276. Mike Weir, who came into Sunday tied with Oberholser at 199, crashed early

- with a double-bogey at the second hole and bogey on the third - and shot 78 to tie for third at 277 with Jonathan Byrd.

The victory, which Oberholser locked up with a dramatic birdie out of the trees on the par-4 15th, was a distinctly different sequel to his final round in 2004, when he went into the final round tied for the lead with Vijay Singh, but then seemed to succumb to the pressure of facing one of the top players in the game.

There was a lot of smiling and good times in 2006, as record crowds enjoyed a sixth straight year with no rain problems. Sunshine pushed temperatures into the high 70s as more than 155,000 fans overall attended the four rounds of competition.

Oberholser, whose first place finish was worth \$972,000, became only the fifth player to earn his first PGA Tour victory at Pebble Beach, joining John Cook (1981), Steve Jones (1988), Brett Ogle (1993) and Matt Gogel (2002).

Oberholser was also the fifth pro to sweep both the individual and team titles, as he and amateur partner Michael McCallister, the president and CEO of Humana Inc., tied for first in the pro-am, at 255, 33-under-par. They shared the championship with pro Hunter Mahan and Alan Heuer, the COO of Mastercard International, who shot 66 in the final round, while Oberholser and McCallister shot 68.

2007

Winner: Phil Mickelson 65-67-70-66 (268)

Taking the tournament by storm, Phil Mickelson won his third Pebble Beach pro-am (and \$990,000), finishing the tournament ten under par and tying the record for victory margin with a five-stroke win over runner-up Kevin Sutherland. His final round 66 at Pebble Beach Sunday included six

And speaking of storms, while Bill

Murray's group was on the 17th Green at Spyglass on Thursday, a huge Monterey pine toppled on a nearby hillside, barely missing a spectator.

Mickelson and his amateur partner, Harry You, CEO of BearingPoint Consulting, also won the pro-am tournament, at 39 under par.

2008 Winner: Steve Lowery 69-71-70-68 (278)

Having played 198 PGA tournaments since 2000 without a victory, Steve Lowery probably wasn't expecting to defeat the legendary Vijay Singh in a sudden death playoff at the end of the 2008 Pebble Beach Pro-Am. Still, he neatly dispatched Singh on the very first playoff hole with a seven-foot birdie putt.

Through most of the opening three rounds, Lowery's name wasn't exactly at the top of the leaderboard. But 10 birdies in 15 holes on Saturday and Sunday propelled him to the top. Singh needed a birdie on the final hole of regulation to force the playoff. "Winning on this course against Vijay is something really special," Lowery said, who picked up a first-place check for \$1,080,000.

The pro-am champions were amateur Bill Walters, owner of Walters Golf in Las Vegas, and pro Frederick Jacobsen, who shot 250 (38 under par) to win by a tournament-record 10

Clear, sunny weather prevailed on the Monterey Peninsula during the tournament, and there were no delays due to weather.

2009 **Winner: Dustin Johnson** 65-69-67 (201)

In a rain-shortened event of 54 holes, 24-years-and-seven-months-old Dustin Johnson became the secondyoungest winner of the AT&T Pebble Beach Pro-Am (Tiger Woods was six months younger when he won the event in 2000).

Johnson opened at Pebble Beach on Thursday with a crisp, 7-under 65, followed with a 69 at Spyglass on Friday, and then birdied all the par-fives at Poppy Hills on Saturday to build a big lead going into what should have been a final round at Pebble Beach on Sunday. The victory was worth \$1,098,000 for Johnson. Mike Weir was the runner-up, winning \$658,800. Retief Goosen finished third.

Johnson, along with his amateur partner, Joe Rice (an attorney from Charleston, S.C.), also took the proam title.

2010 **Winner: Dustin Johnson** 64-68-64-74 (270)

After his four-shot victory in 2009's rain-shortened tournament, Dustin Johnson had to work a lot harder to capture the 2010 event, especially in the face of a strong challenge from PGA Tour veteran David Duval, who capped one of his best tournaments in years with a final round 69. Instead of propelling him to victory, the round left Duval tied with J.B. Holmes for runner up, with each taking home \$545,000. Pro-Am winners were Paul Goydos and Hertz executive Robert Stuart. (Goydos was the pro leader with just five holes to play on Sunday, but quadruple-bogeyed 9).

It was Dustin's tremendous power with his driver that made the difference and brought him his secondstraight Pebble Beach Pro-Am win ... the first player in 20 years to do it. His showing in the 2010 Pro-Am made Johnson a favorite to win the U.S. Open at the same course a few months later, but he finished the Open in 8th place.

"There's a fair amount of work that needs to be done," Jones said. "The plumbing is done, but we need to put the fixtures in. The window sills and the baseboards need to be put in. The door need to be installed. And we need to finish the stairwell leading to a storage area in the attic."

Before the museum opens it doors to the public, a display area will need to be set up with appropriate lighting, and appliances and cabinets installed in the building's kitchen and office.

Currently, the historical society has about \$43,000 in the bank. But Jones estimates that his group will need to spend about \$140,000 to finish the project, leaving a shortfall of nearly \$100,000.

If the money came in today, the historical society could open its doors "in about six months," Jones added.

Stone Age to 21st century

For those who are unfamiliar with its past, the region is beautifully illustrated in a pictorial history book, "Carmel Valley." Part of Arcadia Publishing's impressive "Images of America" series, the book was compiled by local writer Elizabeth Barratt. All proceeds from the sale of the book benefit the historical society.

In "Carmel Valley," Barratt describes how two Native American groups, the Esselen and the Rumsen,

inhabited the area more than 2,000 years ago. The region's first human inhabitants were hunters and gatherers who, according to the writer, "dressed in grass fibers and animal skins, and lived by hunting, fishing and gathering acorns, nuts and berries.'

While Spanish explorer Sebastian de Vizcaino explored the mouth of Carmel Valley in 1602, the region wasn't settled by Spain until 1770.

The Carmel Mission was established the following year, and a decade later, the padres began tapping the Carmel River to irrigate their crops. Soon, mission indians were farming in the valley.

awarded land grants in **Spain** Carmel Valley to several individuals. When Mexico took possession of Alta California in 1824, it continued the practice, and the land grants were legally recognized even after California gained independence from Mexico in 1848. It was during this time that Mrs. Juana Boronda, a Carmel Valley resident, allegedly introduced the world to Monterey Jack cheese.

In 1850 — just a year after the Gold Rush began — California became part the United States. Dairies, orchards, farms and cattle ranches sprung up in Carmel Valley during this era.

Author Robert Louis Stevenson, meanwhile, camped in Carmel Valley in 1879. He also visited nearby Point Lobos, which reportedly provided the geographical inspiration for his "Treasure Island."

While Ranchos los Laureles remained largely intact until the 1920s, other ranchos were broken up and residential neighborhoods began to emerge. By the 1940s, a thriving residential community began to take shape.

In recent years, maintaining Carmel's Valley's "rural character" has become a rallying cry for both environmentalists and residents.

For Barratt, a big part of retaining Carmel Valley's "rural character" is preserving the community's past.

"Public awareness must be kept at the forefront of the need to preserve Carmel Valley's past, from old homes and barns, to the row of 130 year-old Boronda eucalyptus trees, now on the National Register, but still threatened with the county axe," she added. "Those who do not understand historic preservation, fail to realize that when these sites are gone, they're gone for-



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
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


















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
