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COUNCIL TO TAP HEADHUNTER TO FIND NEW CITY MANAGER

WITH THE impending departure of city administrator Rich Guillen — who was embroiled in the sexual-harassment lawsuit that resulted in a \$600,000 settlement paid to former human resources manager Jane Miller last summer — the Carmel City Council unanimously voted Tuesday to issue a "request for proposals" to executive search firms that might find the right candidate for the job.

"The City of Carmel-by-the-Sea is looking for a highly qualified consulting firm to conduct recruitment and to develop a selection process that will be a solid predictor of employment success in appointing the best candidate for the position of city administrator," reads the RFP approved by the council Feb. 22.

The request also describes the basics of the city and some of the issues it faces, such as consideration of paid parking to raise money and the possible merger of its fire department with another agency. It also outlines the job of the city administrator as the head of management and finances, reportable to the council and the mayor.

'Healing process in mind'

According to the council, any headhunting firm interested in taking on the task of finding Guillen's replacement should outline how it will recruit candidates and screen their applications and resumes, conduct reference and background checks, assess their qualifications and meet with the council to identify six to eight finalists.

Former Mayor Ken White said the council should have the community in mind as it embarks on the review and hiring process.

"It has been a very difficult time for the council, for the community, and I would encourage you to take this project on with a healing process in mind," White said. He suggested appointing a group of employees and several citizens to participate in the interviewing and provide their feedback to the

■ Erosion 'emergency,' auto safety debated

THE ROAD around Carmel Point is famously scenic, but also infamously dangerous, especially at the hairpin curve overlooking Carmel River State Beach. Now, a proposal by Monterey County to make a short section of Scenic Road between Valley View Avenue and Carmelo Street one-way is drawing fire because residents say it doesn't go far prough

Despite opposition from residents, who would like to see the entire stretch of Scenic Road made one-way from the Carmel city limits to Carmelo Street, county zoning administrator Laura Lawrence approved the mini-one-way project at a Feb. 10 hearing. In response, residents are planning to appeal the decision to the board of supervi-

sors.

According to public works director Yazdan Emrani, the smaller project is necessary to reduce pressure on the edge of road, which he said is "severely undermined" by erosion.

"On one occasion, the roadway literally broke off in front of our eyes," Emrani told The Pine Cone this week.

The roads sits atop a sandy bluff and is "vulnerable to failure," Emrani insisted. "It's a major issue."

When the eroding stretch of road is one-way, cars will travel only on the inland side, where the pavement is more stable, he said. The change will also give pedestrians more room to walk

According to Garth Beaman, though, who lives on Scenic Road, the project fails to address the biggest

■ End to floods sought

AFTER DECADES of improvised flood management at the Carmel River Lagoon — and several major floods that hit an adjacent neighborhood — an advisory committee has come up with what it thinks could be a long-term solution: A vinyl floodwall along the north side of the lagoon.

And the committee has received a \$145,000 state taxpayer-funded grant to study the proposed barrier, which it says can be built with little harm to the view.

Larry Hampson, a senior water resources engineer for the Monterey Peninsula Water Management District, told The Pine Cone this week that the study will likely begin this summer. Hampson is a staff member of the Lagoon Sandbar Management Technical Advisory Committee, which is endorsing the study. The committee is made up of representatives from federal, state and local agencies, as well as technical experts.

According to Hampson, construction of the wall will cost about \$1.3 million. He said it's too early to tell precisely where the wall will be placed and how long it will be.

"The alignment is part of the feasibility analysis, and the length may be subject to several considerations," Hampson explained. "If the barrier is placed along Carmelo Street and the properties bordering the north side of the lagoon, it could be 2,500 to 3,000 feet long."

Loren Letendre, president of the Carmel River Watershed Conservancy, is a big supporter of the project.

"I think it's a good idea," said Letendre, who lives near Carmel Point. "It solves several problems with one solution."

In addition to protecting homes from flooding, Letendre said the floodwall will benefit the local environment.

"For some time, there hasn't been enough water in the lagoon," he explained. "From May or June through October, the level of water in the lagoon drops precipitously. The rearing habitat for steel-

Bixby Bridge jumper ordered to stand trial on felony charges

THE MAN who leapt off the Bixby Bridge — right in front of a patrolman who warned him not to — also threatened a police officer and his family after being arrested for the stunt, according to testimony at a court hearing last week.

Steve Jester, 46, who base jumped off the bridge Dec. 8, 2010, was ordered by Monterey County Superior Court Judge Mark Hood to stand trial on three misdemeanors and two felonies.

"After he was arrested, and it became apparent to him he was going to be taken to jail, he made threats," Monterey County Deputy District Attorney Joe Buckalew told The Pine Cone Thursday.

Jester's jump was posted on YouTube Dec. 13 and since then has received 1.6 million views. In the video, Jester defies orders by a CHP officer warning him not to jump or he'll be arrested.

"Don't even think about it," the officer warned, to which Jester responded, "I'm going to do it anyways."

Wearing a special parachute, Jester, who appeared very drunk, leapt from the iconic bridge to the beach below. He

Father accused of choking teenage son because of his 'attitude'

m A}$ 40-YEAR-OLD Pacific Grove man was arrested Feb. 19 for allegedly choking his son into unconsciousness during a fight over the 16-year-old's unwillingness to obey him, according to PGPD Cmdr. John Nyunt.

Pacific Grove Lane resident James Long and his son have a lengthy history of fighting, Nyunt said, and officers have been called to their home on multiple occasions. The altercation leading to the arrest began Feb. 17, when the two started arguing and threatening each other.

'The son got kicked out of the house. They had an argument over his attitude and discipline, and the father said he didn't want him living with him any longer," he said. "The dad told him he had one minute to pack his bags, or he would throw his belongings out of the house. The son got mouthy with him, and they got into a fight," because the boy had nowhere to stay and wanted to get back in the house.

On Feb. 18, as the two were grappling, they fell over a couch, and Long reportedly wrapped his legs around the teenager's neck in a triangle choke hold, a wrestling move.

"The son remembered increasing pressure and then losing consciousness," Nyunt said.

When police officers arrived the following day to interview the boy and his father after Long reported having ongoing trouble with his son, they noted red marks on the teen's

neck, but he did not complain of pain, according to Nyunt. "The father admitted to it," he said. "The kid admitted it."

As a result, officers arrested Long and booked him at the P.G. police station on a felony charge of child cruelty causing possible injury or death. He posted the \$25,000 bail and was released. Monterey County child protective services took custody of the teenager.

Nyunt pointed out parents who have trouble with their kids should take advantage of resources, such as counseling, rather than acting out against them.

"Even though your kid is unruly, you can't just say, 'Get out of here — I'm not going to take care of you," he said. "You can't just abandon your kid."

Breast Care Center receives accolades

COMMUNITY HOSPITAL'S Breast Care Center which provides services ranging from routine mammograms, to diagnosing and providing treatment options for women with cancer — serves 19,000 patients per year.

Last week, the 9-year-old center on Cass Street in Monterey was recognized with an award it considers the gold standard in the breast care industry.

The American College of Radiology, the largest and oldest imaging accrediting body in the United States, gave the facility a Center of Excellence designation.

"Having qualified for this accreditation, we have received the pat on the back that we are doing a great job, as judged by outside experts ...," Dr. Susan Roux, the center's medical director, told The Pine Cone.

To receive the designation, breast centers must earn accreditation in mammography, stereotactic breast biopsy and breast ultrasound, including ultrasound-guided breast biopsy, according to CHOMP.

Roux said the center applied for accreditation because it wanted independent reviewers to evaluate the program, which helps patients who live as far away as Santa Cruz and

Evaluations are conducted by board-certified radiologists and medical physicists. The specialists found the center has achieved high practice standards in image quality, staff qualifications, equipment, quality control procedures, and quality assurance programs.


According to CHOMP president and CEO Steven Packer, the accreditation shows that the hospital is at the leading edge in providing "the best and safest imaging and interventional procedures available."

"Only 41 centers in California have passed the tests required for the Center of Excellence designation, considered the gold standard for demonstrated safety and quality imaging," said Packer in a news release.

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Floor furnace burns in house being remodeled

SOMETHING FLAMMABLE left on or near a floor furnace started a fire in a house at Santa Fe and Second Feb. 3, according to Carmel Fire Capt. Mitch Kastros. Workers remodeling the home discovered the blaze at 8 a.m.

The fire apparently started after the furnace kicked on during a cold spell, according to Kastros. The home was unfurnished and unoccupied.

"The door was open, and we were able to see the fire on the floor," Kastros said. "It burned a hole in the floor, so we had to watch our footing, and there was quite a bit of smoke."

Cypress and Monterey fire crews assisted Carmel firefighters with extinguishing the blaze, which was quickly accomplished, and in ventilating the home and cleaning up the debris.

Kastros said floor furnaces don't have off switches, so even when their thermostats are set to the lowest possible temperature, cold weather can trigger them to heat. He warned against placing anything combustible anywhere on or near a floor heater.

He did not know what type of material had caught fire. "We couldn't identify it, because it was pretty burned up,"

he said.

The total damage to the structure was estimated at \$10,800



The Discovery Shop accepts gently used items for men, women, children, and the home.



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
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P.G. council turns down ordinance to limit sex offenders

THE BACKERS of a rejected ordinance that would have prevented convicted sex offenders in Pacific Grove from holding certain jobs — including those that require them to check identification or work with unaccompanied children are planning to introduce a revamped version of the law to the city council.

On Feb. 16, the Pacific Grove City Council voted 5-2 to strike down a proposed ordinance that would have prevented sex offenders from working in jobs where children are present and where they could check identification.

The ordinance — written by councilman Dan Miller and Mayor Carmelita Garcia — would have also made it a crime for employers to hire sex offenders for those types of jobs.

Five of seven council members, though, said the ordinance had too many bugs, including that it placed too much burden on employers and was not easily enforceable.

"I see that we want to protect individuals ... it's our obligation," councilman Ken Cuneo said at the meeting. "I don't know if by adding another layer of law it will make anybody safer in doing so.'

However, Miller told The Pine Cone this week that he and Garcia, both of whom voted for the ordinance last week, haven't given up on it yet.

"In talking with the mayor," Miller told The Pine Cone Wednesday, "we will be putting a revised ordinance on the agenda very soon."

Though there are laws that apply to convicted sex offenders, such as preventing those released from prison from living within 2,000 feet of parks and schools, there are no broad laws prohibiting them from being employed in specific jobs in municipalities.

"It's a shame it's left up to communities to enact something like this," said councilman Rudy Fischer

The law could have applied to sex offenders who are

home service workers, business owners and those who use a motor vehicle to sell "frozen desserts," like an ice cream man.

"This is an added protection, if enacted," city attorney David Laredo told the council. "I would assert that if there is

one victim protected by this measure, that would be enough." But the council seemed to have more questions than there were answers.

Councilman Alan Cohen and other councilmen said the law would have placed too much responsibility on employ-

"Why is the employer the one who has to be the enforcer of this particular law?" he said. "Why is he the gatekeeper?"

And councilman Bill Kampe questioned how an employer would determine if the person being hired is a convicted sex offender.

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Lawsuit challenges 10 years of Monterey County permits

AN ENVIRONMENTAL activist operating under the name, "Save Our Peninsula Committee," is suing Monterey County planning officials and the board of supervisors alleging that for at least a decade, they've failed to enforce permit conditions imposed on development projects to protect the environment.

In a lawsuit filed Feb. 14, activist Ed Leeper asks a judge to order the county to review all permits issued since October 2001 to determine whether developers have done everything their permits required them to do. It also demands that Monterey County stop issuing permits until it has procedures in place to make sure permit conditions are strictly adhered to.

'Fully enforceable'

According to Leeper's lawsuit, state law requires cities and counties approving development projects to make sure the projects don't damage the environment in any significant way, and mandates that any changes to a project or conditions imposed on a project to protect the environment be "fully enforceable" and monitored to "ensure compliance during project implementation."

In October 2001, responding to an earlier lawsuit from Leeper over the approval of September Ranch, Monterey County adopted procedures to comply with that law.

But since then, "the county has routinely failed to continues to fail to comply" with

the requirements, Leeper claims.

In particular, he cites the senior housing project, Cottages of Carmel, which is now under construction at the mouth of Carmel Valley

That project, known as "Gamboa/Keene" as it made its way through the permit process, was approved by the Monterey County Board of Supervisors in July 2004. To save water, the project included a "graywater and cistern system," according to Leeper. Concerned about possible health hazards from the use of graywater, the county required the developer to submit "detailed plans of the proposed graywater system" along with an "operation and maintenance training plan" before any permits would be issued. But, according to Leeper, permits for the project were finalized without any of those documents.

The lawsuit cites other examples from the last 10 years and claims that the county has "deprived the public of the environmental review and protection" mandated by state law.

Leeper's lawsuit, filed by Carmel attorney Richard H. Rosenthal and Mammoth Lakesbased lawyer Greg James, asks the court to order the county to pay them for filing the suit, which also lists county administrator Lew Bauman, county counsel Charles McKee and county planning director Mike Novo as defendants.

Neither Rosenthal and McKee responded to messages left by The Pine Cone. Novo and Bauman declined to comment on the lawsuit.

MAN ARRESTED ON SUSPICION OF BEATING GIRLFRIEND

POLICE ARRIVED at a residence on 19th Street in Pacific Grove late Feb. 20 to find a woman "outside crying hysterically," with blood on her chin and shirt, P.G. Police Cmdr. John Nyunt said Tuesday. The woman had called police, telling them her 29-year-old boyfriend, Andrew Scheiber, who is also the father of her child, had beaten her.

They had been drinking, and the fight stemmed from an argument they had about a family member while preparing for dinner, according to Nyunt. In addition, "he allegedly tried to force her to drink some beer," he said. "She didn't want to drink it, so he was forcing it down her throat."

Then Scheiber reportedly yelled at the woman and pushed her, prompting her to retreat the rear bedroom of the 19th Street home.

He followed, and "started using his

elbows to punch her in the face, which caused her nose to bleed," Nyunt said.

And as she tried to reach police via her cell phone, Scheiber reportedly managed to somehow shut off the wireless service.

"The victim was calling from her Verizon Wireless," he said. "However, it got turned off while she was calling the police. He turned off the service."

While assessing the woman outside the home shortly before midnight, officers also noted reddening on her upper left cheek.

They arrested Scheiber on a felony charge of inflicting corporal injury on a spouse or cohabitant and a misdemeanor charge related to his allegedly shutting off her cell phone. They booked him at PGPD but later took him to Monterey County Jail, "due to threats of suicide." His bail was set at \$20,000.

Firefighters help Serra School kids learn not to fear them

CHILDREN MAY want to grow up to be firefighters, but when there's an emergency, it can be scary to suddenly be confronted with someone in full firefighting gear.

That's why firefighters from Carmel Fire Department visited some of the youngest students at Junipero Serra School last week: To dispel any fears they might have of men and women in oversized yellow suits and oxygen masks.

"We were invited to come down to the school to basically show the kids the engine," CFD Capt. Mitch Kastros explained. "We do this a few times a year."

The private school, located at the Carmel Mission, is the only one within the town boundaries, so the city's police officers and firefighters make routine appearances there in order to teach safety lessons and reach out to the kids

During the Feb. 15 appearance, which included the engine and ambulance crews, firefighter Brian Harrington dressed in full

gear — complete with helmet, mask and SCBA tank, "and crawled around the group, doing high-fives and shaking hands," Kastros said. The idea was to show the kids they shouldn't be afraid of firefighters, when they look a little unusual.

The group of 20 young kids also had the chance to squirt water from one of the engine's fire hoses, with the help of adult firefighters, and the teachers got into the act as well, according to Kastros. "It was basically an awareness thing," he said.

Crew members distributed plastic fire hats, coloring books and crayons to the students, who were invited to climb inside and explore the fire engine and ambulance.

"The Mission school is the only one in the city limits, so that's the one we deal with all the time," Kastros said. "In some of the older classes, we show videos and go through stop, drop and roll, and smoke detector awareness, and what to do if you're in a burning building."

Older children are able to absorb that sort of information, he said. "But these little guys were just there to get closer to firefighters."



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Wrongful death suit filed against Monterey nursing home

'Unattended' elderly man fell in bathroom, later died, suit claims

 Γ HE FAMILY of an elderly man who fell at a Monterey nursing home and allegedly died from complications related to the mishap is suing the facility, claiming its administrators and staff were negligent.

The family of Joseph Cerchi claim in court documents filed last week that on Feb. 23, 2009, the 84-year-old was left unattended in a closed bathroom at Carmel Hills Care Center when he tried to stand.

"Cerchi attempted to stand, and fell, violently striking his head and lacerating his head, forearm and finger," according to the complaint.

The injuries Cerchi received from the fall were the cause of a rapid decline in health, which led to his death about two weeks later, according to Steven J. Brady, the San Rafael attorney who filed the lawsuit on behalf of the Cerchis.

"He died of complications ... from the head injury," Brady told The Pine Cone Wednesday.

Brady said Cerchi fell after an employee at Carmel Hills Care Center had assisted him to the bathroom then went on

"She apparently asked another staff member to cover for her," Brady explained. "And in the confusion, he was not attended to.

About 20 minutes after falling, "Cerchi was found by staff members on the bathroom floor over a large pool of blood," according to the suit, filed Feb. 17 in Monterey County Superior Court.

Staff at the nursing home lifted Cerchi into his bed before he was taken to Community Hospital of the Monterey Peninsula for treatment of his injuries.

However, on March 11, 2009, Cerchi died as a result of the injuries he sustained in the fall, according to court documents. The accident occurred the same day Cerchi arrived at the Monterey facility for a one-week stay, the suit alleges.

The complaint alleges negligence, negligent hiring and training, and elder neglect. Cerchi's family is seeking an unspecified amount in general and punitive damages, medical and burial expenses, attorneys fees and other costs.

Robert J. Bowersox, who is listed as the administrator on facility's website, did not return a voicemail message left by The Pine Cone

In addition to Cerchi's wife, Jacquelyn, the lawsuit was filed by family members Marie Della Maggiore, Joseph

Cerchi and Patricia Lucido. Jacquelyn Cerchi, who had been caring for her husband, left him at the facility for one week while she had a "respite

vacation," according to the lawsuit. Before leaving her husband at Carmel Hills, Cerchi asked administrators what types of precautions were in place to ensure people assigned to care for her husband were qualified and trained, the suit says.

She also advised an admissions worker that her husband could not be left alone. Staff also assured her that employees were properly screened and trained, and "that her husband would be safe in their care," she alleges in the lawsuit.

"In direct violation of their duties, Cerchi was left unattended in a closed bathroom, and no action whatsoever was provided to assist him, even after [he] made numerous attempts to call for assistance," the lawsuit contends.

Cerchi's death certificate lists his cause of death as hypoxia. Brady said he developed pneumonia after the fall.

Carmel Hills Care Center has 30 days to respond to the allegations in the lawsuit.

According to federal rankings of nursing homes, the 99bed facility Carmel Hills Care Center received an overall rating of one star, which the government qualifies as "much below average."

Brady is partner of the Brady Law Group, a personal injury firm that boasts it has recovered more than \$100 million for its clients.

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Police accuse caregiver of stealing from 90-year-old

PACIFIC GROVE officers arrested a 26-year-old Canterbury Woods caregiver Feb. 12 on suspicion of stealing jewelry, cash and credit cards from a 90-year-old resident, according to Cmdr. John Nyunt. The late-night arrest of

Jonalyn Doniego at her Sonoma Street home in Seaside followed a lengthy investigation that included help from a private detective.

"We were working with a private investigator, because it was an allegation of theft at Canterbury Woods," he said. "A lot of the times with these types of cases, we don't know necessarily who to trust, so we kept it very ecret and kept it objective.

Nyunt said the thefts began last October or November, when the victim reported items were missing from her apartment.

Investigators identified

Jonalyn Doniego

Doniego, a Certified Nursing Assistant employed by the senior community, as the prime suspect.

"She was stealing jewelry, money, things like that," Nyunt said. Most recently, she reportedly took diamond jewelry, which prompted police to quickly arrest her so the valuable stones could be recovered.

Nyunt said the diamonds were worth an estimated \$5,000, and officers managed to retrieve most of the jewelry. He could not provide a total value for the items Doniego is accused of taking during the past several months. In addition to jewelry and money, the suspect reportedly used the victim's credit card information to purchase purses online.

Doniego was charged with two counts of burglary and theft from a dependent adult and could face additional charges, depending on the outcome of the investigation. Officers took her to Monterey County Jail.

City of Carmel-by-the-Sea's Low Impact Development Guidance Manual

Discharges from the City's storm drainage system are regulated under a National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) permit issued by the Central Coast Regional Water Quality Control Board (RWQCB) of the State of California. Recently, the RWQCB has directed all cities to develop and implement a set of Best Management Practices (BMPs) to reduce storm water runoff and storm water pollution emanating from development projects. This is to be accomplished by using "Low Impact Development" (LID) concepts during the design and construction of those projects.

LID is a development approach that (1) reduces the amount of storm water runoff by retaining a portion of the storm water on the project site where it can infiltrate into the ground, and (2) in some instances reduces the amount of pollutants in storm water through natural or manmade treatment processes.

In response, the City has developed a LID Guidance Manual. Because the City has been progressive over the years in implementing requirements to help safeguard the environment, nearly all of the RWQCB's requirements have already been adopted by the City. The newly developed Guidance Manual presents all of these existing requirements in a single document, which design professionals can use to refer to when they are designing their projects.

The chamber has been awarding "Good Eggs" since 1953. The winners are chosen by a vote of previous winners.



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

ing another one," Raggett said this week. "So, we had a total of eight projects going last year, mostly in Mali."

The group also helped Carmel and Monterey Rotary clubs construct a school in Honduras and completed the third phase of a girls' school being built in India that will accommodate 160 students. Schools3 raised about \$100,000 last year.

And while the completion of several

dozen schools is certainly a significant accomplishment, Raggett said the demand is overwhelming in many parts of the world.

"They still need about 3,000 more schools in Mali alone, so every 6-year-old has a school to go to," he said.

The March 4 fundraising art exhibit and sale will include original paintings by Raggett's wife, Tory, an accomplished artist and instructor, as well as pieces contributed several other local notables, among them David Ligare, Kipp Stewart, Belinda Vidor, Susan Manchester, Jan Wagstaff and a number of photographers. 
"They're from a wonderful little shop we found right in Mali," Jon Raggett said.

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

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
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Canadian pianist, chamber group pay tribute to Mozart at Sunset Center

■ Demystifying the 'ghost cat'

Most folks would prefer to avoid coming in contact with a mountain lion. But local photographer Ivan Eberle — whose striking images of the majestic wild cats are part of a new exhibit, "Living With Mountain Lions," opening Saturday, Feb. 26, at the Pacific Grove Museum of Natural History — has spent much of his life trying to get close to them.

"So much attention is focused on when someone is killed by a mountain lion, but statistics show that there are so many other things that are worth worrying more about," Eberle explained. "They're around us all the time. If they were really man-eaters, we'd be toast."

Eberle and the staff at the P.G. museum are staging the exhibit in an effort to demystify an animal that is famously shy of people

"You try to see them, but you can't," observed Annie Holdren, exhibits curator for the museum. "One of their names is the 'ghost cat."

Because mountain lions keep such a low profile, Eberle had to get very creative to even stand a chance of capturing an image of one.

In his quest for a photo of a mountain lion, Eberle has spend two decades hiking along steep and brushy trails of the Big Sur Coast and adjacent Ventana Wilderness. All he has to show for his efforts are images of just three mountain lions. But for the Pacific Grove photographer, each successful shot was like winning the lottery.

One particular image that Eberle captured qualifies as his masterpiece. To shoot it, the Pacific Grove resident set up an \$8,000 remote camera system in the early spring of 2006 in the Church Creek drainage off Tassajara Road. The camera — which used 35mm film because digital cameras weren't quite good enough yet — was designed to take a photo if something moved into its infrared light beam.

After observing their tracks, scat and claw marks, Eberle knew mountain lions frequented the area, which is located about four miles from the nearest road. In fact, as he was setting up the camera, he even caught a glimpse of one.

For three cold and wet days, Eberle mon-

Back in his darkroom, Eberle discovered the camera had captured a series of images of a young mountain lion, including one unforgettable photo of the cat turning its head to the left and looking intently down at something. An enlarged print of the photo will greet visitors when they enter the exhib-

"It was like Christmas morning," recalled Eberle when asked about his reaction to seeing the image of the cat printed for the first time. "I couldn't have gotten luckier with the light. I was stoked."

The exhibit, meanwhile, aims to satisfy the public's endless curiosity about mountain lions by offering a mix of photographs, lifesized mounts, artifacts and research tools, as well as informative and interactive displays, for visitors of all ages.

Zara McDonald, founder and executive director of Felidae Conservation Fund, will present a talk, "Co-Existing with Mountain Lions," at 3 p.m. The lecture will be followed by a reception, which starts at 4 p.m. and features a performance by the bluegrass ensemble Microtonic Harmonic. The talk and reception are free for museum members and \$5 for nonmembers.

Over the next month, the museum has scheduled two other talks related to the exhibit. Eberle presents "Stories and Techniques of Wildlife Photography," Saturday, March 5, at 3 p.m. And Mark Stromberg offers "Lion Encounters at Hastings and Big Creek Reserves: 25 years and 20,000 nights," Thursday, March 24, at 7

Both lectures are free for museum members and \$5 for nonmembers.

A new chapter of Madeleine, St. Patrick's parties and new additions

HIS FULL-TIME job is as winemaker for Georis Winery, but Carmel Valley's Damien Georis is also excited about the "fourth chapter" of his own label, Madeleine.

"Starting with this vintage, the fruit is coming from Paicines in San Benito County," he reported last week. "It has the perfect terroir and climate to ripen Cabernet Franc grapes to the ideal balance between fruit and earth."

Born in Belgium, Georis honed his skills at chateaux in France before Walter Georis — whose family is from the same village — discovered him and wooed him stateside to make wines in 2004.

Damien Georis is particularly fond of Cabernet Franc and said the fruit from Paicines has yielded "a taste reminiscent of the great wines from the Loire Valley in France."

He also announced his wines are now being sold outside the United States and said a partnership with J&L Wines has enabled more Central Coast restaurants to carry them.

Because he only produced 200 cases of the "Chapitre IV—Au Rendez-Vous de la Marquise," Georis is limiting purchases of the wine, which goes for \$20 per bottle. He also has 20 cases of another of his wines, the 2009 Madeleine Pinot Blanc (\$15), which he described as a medium-bodied, balanced wine with aromas of "pear, apricot, peach and green

apple with wet stones, jasmine and lemon verbena," and a "lingering crisp finish."



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

head is really endangered during the dry months. The floodwall will allow the lagoon to hold more water during that time."

Also, one of the project's goals is to eliminate the need to breech the lagoon's sandbar with bulldozers every winter — a task which is not only dangerous and expensive, but an activity that Letendre said flushes young steelhead out to sea before they are ready to adapt to the new environment.

It's conceivable, though, that public works might have to use heavy equipment at some point to redirect the river if its channel to the sea drifts too close to the Scenic Road.

"The river has meandered across that beach for thousands of years," Hampson observed.

While the floodwall looks good on paper, Hampson said the feasibility study will examine its potential flaws as well. For example, if the barrier can hold back water to the south, how will it affect water coming from the north? And how will water drain from adjacent streets?

The study will also determine whether the ground along the edge of the lagoon is solid enough to support the floodwall.

Hampson said the committee considered a wide variety of alternatives before settling on studying the floodwall. The rejected alternatives included buying up the threatened homes, raising the threatened homes and

seeking a permit to breech the sandbar without declaring an emergency.

The money for the study comes from

Proposition 84 funds, passed by voters in 2006, which provides tax money for waterrelated projects, including flood control.

was arrested after climbing back up to the top of Highway 1.

The stunt could mean prison time for Jester, whose MySpace page listed him as a Marina resident.

He is charged with disobedience to an officer, possession of marijuana while driving a vehicle, driving under the influence of alcohol and an enhancement of refusing to submit to a chemical test, all misdemeanors.

However, Jester is also charged with resisting and obstructing a peace officer and threats of violence, both felonies. If convicted, he could land three years and eight months in prison, Buckalew said.

The felonies are "based on Jester threatening the officer and his family with physical violence because he was being arrested," Buckalew explained.

During a hearing Feb. 18, Hood also found Jester, who was on probation for a separate drunk-in-public charge, was in violation of his probation. He'll be sentenced on that charge on March 22. His trial on the latest charges hasn't been scheduled.

problem along the coastal route.

"The acute problem, where danger happens on a daily basis, is the hairpin bend on Scenic," Beaman insisted in a letter to the planning department. "Every weekend we must witness at least 20 cars getting into trouble trying to get around the hairpin bend. With walkers and dogs and children, someone someday is going to get killed."

Another resident urged action on the hair-

"While I usually believe 'small steps' are a good thing in problem-solving, this time I feel your solution is too small a step," wrote Mrs. Andrew Spare in a letter to the planning department. "Why not 'bite the bullet' and make all of Scenic one way? I cannot count the times, while driving around the curve, that I have prayed no one else was coming in the opposite direction. It is so dangerous."

Carmel resident Fred Brown, meanwhile, said the "fix" will send traffic into residential neighborhoods. "The proposed change would have a deleterious effect on the neighborhood by redirecting traffic from Scenic Road to otherwise quiet residential streets that are not designed for through traffic,"

Brown wrote in a letter in a letter to the planning department.

In response to Brown's concern, Emrani said traffic would still be rerouted onto 17th Avenue if the entire stretch of Scenic Road between San Lucia Avenue to Carmelo Street was made one-way. He also said the amount of traffic that will be rerouted through the residential neighborhood won't likely be as much as residents anticipate because about 70 percent of traffic along Scenic Road is traveling southbound.

Emrani also predicted the residents will ultimately get what they want.

"We're still pursuing the idea of making the whole thing one-way," he reminded resi-

But the larger project will have to wait until the road is stabilized. "If you know a dam isn't safe, do you wait until it fails to sound an alarm, or do you go in there and fix?" he asked.

After the Feb. 10, a group of residents decided to appeal the decision. But they were angered when they discovered they would have to pay about \$5,000 to appeal the project to the supervisors. Fifth District supervisor Dave Potter, though, stepped in and worked out a deal to waive the fee, residents said. "The appeal is not going to cost them anything," Emrani confirmed.

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
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


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Editorial

Why employees shouldn't pick their own boss

IF YOU'RE a regular reader of this space, you're well aware that one of the most vociferous opponents of illegal immigration was revered farmworker advocate Cesar Chavez, who understood full well (and very accurately) that a flood of unskilled labor from south of the border would dramatically undercut bluecollar wages in this country. Lately, Chavez, who died in 1993, has become a symbol of activism for illegal immigrants — a role he surely would not have agreed to play.

There's an eerie parallel in the battle over public sector unions in Wisconsin and other states because President Franklin D. Roosevelt, a hero of the working man and an advocate of union rights during his 12 years in office, was an outspoken opponent of unionization of government employees.

Mainly, Roosevelt was against letting government workers unionize because he feared the impact a strike of public employees would have on vital government functions, such as public safety and schools.

But he also recognized the basic incongruity of pitting public employees against the public itself.

In private businesses, and especially in the factory-type situations that most readily lend themselves to unionization, the boss can be understood to want to pay his employees as little as he has to, while pressing them to work as hard as he can get away with. Meanwhile, his employees simultaneously pursue their own, opposite goal: Making as much money as they can for as little work as is necessary to justify their wages.


But in the public sector, unions often play key roles in electing their bosses, who then have a selfish interest in giving employees what they want at the negotiating table and on pay day. Literally, elected officials and candidates for elected office can frequently be seen campaigning at union rallies, where they then promise to give the unions whatever they want, thereby turning the boss-employee relationship on its head. No wonder public employees have such wonderful wages and benefits!

In Wisconsin, Gov. Scott Walker was elected despite the opposition of public employee unions and has carried into office a determination to curtail their power. But many of his predecessors could not have been elected without the unions' backing, and therefore made it a priority to do their bidding.

This is not to say that public workers in Wisconsin shouldn't rally and protest to get what they want. As long as they do so peacefully, it's perfectly fine for them to picket and demonstrate from now until the cows come home.

But it's equally important for them to realize that their interests are not the same as the interests of the public at large. Every dollar paid to a teacher or a cop is one that has to be taken from a taxpayer. And while government employees are perfectly entitled to ask for more of those dollars to be put in their pockets, the taxpayers are equally entitled to try to keep them in theirs. And since there are far more taxpayers than government workers, it's obvious which side should win.

Dr. Reeb will address desalination's impact on the marine environment, discuss possible alternatives and speculate about new technologies that one day could provide a solution to our water woes.



Peter F. 'Pete' Girard

Former Carmel Valley resident and notable San Diego aviator Peter F. Girard passed away February 12, 2011, in San Diego after a long illness, he

Peter Frank 'Pete' Girard was born on May 5, 1918, in Monterey to Pierre

Etienne and Emelie Leppert Girard. He grew up on the family cattle ranch first in Cachagua and then in Tularcitos in Carmel Valley. Girard graduated from Monterey High School and attended U.C. Berkeley where he graduated with a degree in Mechanical Engineering in 1940. Following graduation he worked at Curtiss-Wright Aircraft in St. Louis. During WWII Girard enlisted in what was then the United States Army Air Corps, and advanced through flight training to becoming a multi-engine heavy bomber pilot flying B-24s. After his military service Girard found employment at Ryan Aeronautical in San Diego. While at Ryan



Girard attended the Naval Test Pilot School at NAS Patuxant River, Maryland, graduating second in his class of 36 as a civilian among military pilots.

Girard became Chief Engineering Test Pilot at Ryan where he tested a variety of new-concept designs involving vertical and short-take off aircraft (V/STOL), and he performed test flights at various airfields including Edwards Air Force Base in the Mojave Desert. He was the chief test pilot for the Ryan/USAF X-13 Vertijet, and on July 29, 1957, demonstrated the capabilities of the X-13 in Washington D.C., landing vertically before a large audience of military officers and journalists at the steps of the Pentagon. The X-13 with Girard in the pilot seat was featured on the cover of LIFE magazine in the May 20, 1957, issue. One of the two X-13 aircraft constructed is located in the San Diego Air and Space Museum, the other is at the Air Force museum at Wright-Patterson Air Force Museum in Dayton, Ohio. Girard continued his activities in vertical flight and other areas, and was awarded more than 30



patents both at Ryan Aeronautical and after retirement, his last patent was obtained just a few years before his death.

Girard was the author of at least seven published technical papers, and in 1963 he was awarded the I.B. Laskowitz Gold Medal by the New York Academy of Sciences for a technical paper on VTOL flight. He was an

Associate Fellow of the Institute of Aeronautical Sciences, a member of the American Helicopter Society, the Soaring Society of America, the Associated Glider Club of Southern California, and was a Registered Professional Engineer in the State of California.

In addition to his love of flying, Girard was an avid outdoorsman. During his life he enjoyed hunting, fishing and camping. His favorite summer activity would often be backpacking in the Sierra Nevada, or returning to Monterey County to backpack in the Los Padres National Forest above the Carmel River.

Girard is survived by his wife of 57 years, Leslie, sons Peter G. Girard of San Diego and Leslie J. Girard of Carmel Valley, daughter Maria A. Girard-Smith of San Jose, five grandchildren, and his sister, Adrienne Zekos of Salinas. A private memorial service is planned.

MONTEREY - Born May 30, 1917 to Ivy Murphy and Walter Matheson Basham in a wee house in Monterey (the area's only hospital) to one of the pioneering worker-bee families of Carmel-by-the-Sea, Jean grew up embraced by



Carmel's early settlers - the village her home, its boardwalks, dirt streets, and beach her playground. Throughout her life she shared memories of her childhood. She lived Carmel's history played with the Jeffers twins, watched writer Jimmy Hopper's daily swim – a rope around his waist as protection against the undertow. Carmel's constable, Gus Englund, and his horse carried her home when wanderings took her afar. Never one to seek the limelight, her appearance in 1920 at age three as a mosquito in the Forest Theatre production "Inchling" began and ended her stage career. For a brief while she played and lived on the hill above Wildcat Cove that was author Harry Leon Wilson's


home – gypsies her neighbors. In her early years, her parents managed the bathhouse at the end of Ocean Avenue – home was on the beach. When a bit older, home was a candy store and tea room, Basham's, further up Ocean Ave. She learned to read and write at Sunset School - named by her cousin, Frank Murphy, when a young boy. Throughout her long, joyful life Jean loved sharing these memories and more. Her greatest story, though, was the story of the little home of her earliest childhood – the home built by her Uncle Mike for his mother and sisters in 1902 – the house Jean lived in following her birth. The house saved by toil and community donations in 1990 known as The First Murphy.

Jean's favorite job was the 20 years she spent as secretary of Walter Colton Junior High. True to her nature, she gathered all into one big happy family, collecting friendships that lasted throughout her life; it was there that she learned her children were perfectly normal.

A joyful person who knew no stranger or enemy, she put a smile on the sourest of faces. Jean lived simply, happily welcoming all with loving attentive interest. She delighted in gifting all, listening to their stories... decorating Easter eggs with the grandchildren (the first named her "Gomi"), delivering homemade cookies to new neighbors.

Gomi left gracefully on February 16, 2011 to be with her husband, Frank, who died in 2004. He placed her on a pedestal when they met at the local skating rink (then in Pacific Grove) and kept her there for their 69 years – most of those years spent in the house behind Monterey High. Jean is survived by her sister, Vere Basham Benbow, who will be 100 this

year, formerly of Benbow, California, now Boca Raton, Florida; her sisters-in-law, Josephine Rodriguez Linden of Meeker, Colorado and Cheryl Rodriguez of Castroville; children, Robin Aeschliman (Greg) of Pacific Grove, Kim Hadden of Riverside, and Hugh "Rick" Rodriguez (Christa) of Castle Rock, Colorado. Her six grandchildren, nine great grandchildren, and one great great grandchild, will remember their "Gomi" with love and awe - as will several beloved nieces, nephews, and generations of cousins.

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Scenic Road to get another bench

THE POPULAR walkway above Carmel Beach along Scenic Road will soon have another bench. On Feb. 9, the Carmel Planning Commission unanimously voted to allow resident Pat Collelo to donate funds for a new bench to be located south of Eighth Avenue just north of the stairs to the beach. The bench would also have an engraved plaque commemorating something of Collelo's choosing.

Planning and building services manager Sean Conroy recommended the commission approve the bench, which would have a stone base with a wooden seat and back.

"The beach bluff pathway experiences a high amount of foot traffic, and the benches are an important pathway amenity," he said in his report. "There does not appear to be an excessive number of benches in the area, and the bench will serve a public need." He also called its design "modest" and noted it would be similar to other benches situated along

After chairman Jan Reimers raised the question of whether the city might end up in the position of fielding so many requests for donated benches that it would have to begin turning people down, Conroy said he would ask the forest and beach commission to consider the question, including potential locations for others.

Collelo told the commission he has walked along Scenic hundreds of times and frequently appreciates the benches people have donated.

"I thought I'd like to give something back to the city, and we picked a location with the help of someone from city

Commissioners unanimously approved Collelo's bench. The wording of the plaque to be placed upon it will be approved by the city administrator, according to Conroy.

council on the candidates.

'You're the choosing body and that's what you're paid to do," he said. "It's been a very difficult couple of years, and I



think it's time we all pull together and help you do a good

Resident Carolyn Hardy said the search firm should look for someone with small-town values and experience running a coastal city in California.

A few people in the audience offered to help, including Dave Berger, who was general manager of the Monterey Peninsula Water Management District and then worked as a California American Water executive. Berger said he could save the city \$25,000 by serving as interim city administrator while facilitating the search for a permanent replacement. He said he has held such positions before and could work for Carmel for up to six months.

Councilman Jason Burnett suggested a couple of minor changes to the request for proposals, including changing the target hiring date of the new city administrator from July to sometime this summer. He also suggested the public be invited to provide input during the selection process, and he wanted to give the firms two weeks, rather than 10 days, to submit their proposals.

The rest of the council unanimously agreed with the changes and approved the RFP.

After the vote, Burnett requested the council hold a similar conversation regarding the recruitment and hiring of an interim to serve after Guillen leaves at the end of March until a new city administrator is hired.

He suggested the discussion could take place at the March 1 council meeting, but Mayor Sue McCloud said it would have to be held in closed session, because it concerns a specific person on staff.

"We have an acting interim," agreed councilwoman Paula Hazdovac, presumably referring to city clerk/assistant city administrator Heidi Burch.

Burnett, however, reiterated he intended the discussion to be general in nature, more about the process than a particular candidate.

Kampe also said the ordinance was far-reaching and could apply to many segments of small businesses and their employees. "I think we have to recognize how pervasive the impact could be," he said.

Though the ordinance was not drawn up to be punitive, Cohen didn't see it that way.

Sex offenders "already paid to the state for a crime they had done at the time, and now we are going another step," he said. "I see that as some sort of a punishment."

"If somebody has paid for their crime ... do we then kick them when they are down again?" he said. "I have some reservations with that."

Miller told the council why he and Garcia drew up the ordinance, which he said would help officials "protect people who can't protect themselves."

"The reason this came up is for years there was somebody in town," Miller explained, "who I knew factually would ask for identification for purchase of alcohol ... and show up at their houses after taking their addresses from their driver's license."

Miller didn't say how the new ordinance would differ from the first one, nor did he say when the revised ordinance would appear on a city council agenda.


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Transient suspected of threatening storekeeper with knife, dropping pants

"The manager was scared this guy was going to hurt him," he said. "There was another employee there too, at the time, and they backed off and called 911."


Because of the time it took the two Monterey County deputies to drive the 60-plus miles south to the scene from their station in Monterey, San Luis Obispo deputies had already driven back up to Gorda and had Kamke in handcuffs by the time they arrived, according to Brown.

The SLO deputies told the Monterey County officers the homeless man hadn't been drunk when they delivered him to Gorda earlier. "They said ... he was by Hearst Castle and was traveling north, so they gave him a ride just to help him out," Brown said.

The MCSO deputies took custody of Kamke and booked him in to Monterey County Jail on a felony charge of making terrorist threats — for his allegedly threatening to kill Levy with the knife — as well as misdemeanor charges of indecent exposure, trespassing, brandishing and public drunkenness.
