Every painting tells a story — but this one's better than most

A PORTRAIT of a young boy with a fascinating connection to President Abraham Lincoln hung on the wall of the Pine Inn for more than four

decades before it was stolen in 2004. Seven years later, the inn's owner, Richard Gunner, wants it back, and he's offering a \$1,000 reward for it — with no questions asked.

According to the inn's general manager, John Lloyd, the discovery of paperwork detailing the history of the boy and the painting inspired the search for it

"All this information was kept in a file until it was recently found," Lloyd explained.

As a result, the Pine Inn is putting out a bounty on the painting. "Somebody's got it hanging somewhere," Lloyd speculated.

While nobody is sure who painted the portrait, the story of its subject, David L. Montgomery, is well documented, thanks to his great-grandson, the late David Claghorn of Watkinsville, Ga. Claghorn's research is included in a lengthy article published in the Monterey Peninsula Herald's Weekly Magazine Dec. 20, 1987.

Written by Elena Lagorio, the article reported Claghorn contacted the Pine Inn shortly after Gunner purchased the hotel in 1985. Perhaps because of the change of ownership, Claghorn wanted

to make sure he had a good color photograph of the portrait in case it was lost, stolen or sold.

Claghorn commissioned a Monterey Peninsula photographer, Richard Shelby, to capture the image so he could frame and hang it in his Georgia home. He also left the Pine Inn with several documents detailing the boy's interesting history.

Born in 1836 to a wealthy landowner, Montgomery presumably posed for the portrait in the early 1840s. Later, he studied law before the Civil War broke out in 1861.

Less than a month after shots were fired on Ft. Sumter, he was serving as a lieutenant in the Union Army.

Over the next several years, Montgomery was in the thick of the fighting. His military record indicates that he was severely wounded and captured by

Corn gets seven years for high school DUI crash

■ Victim's plea for probation rebuffed

THE PACIFIC Grove teenager who drove drunk and crashed an SUV into a Skyline Forest tree last year was sentenced Thursday to a lengthy prison term for the accident, which paralyzed one of his passengers.

Though he had the option of giving Aaron Corn, 19, felony probation, Monterey County Superior Court Judge Russell Scott sentenced Corn to seven years and four months in a California Department of Corrections prison. In January, Corn entered a no-contest plea to charges of causing multiple injuries in an alcohol-fueled crash Feb. 21, 2010, that left his friend Chelsie Hill paralyzed. He also pleaded guilty to stealing the SUV he crashed.

At Corn's sentencing Thursday morning in a Salinas courtroom, Hill and others urged Scott to put Corn on probation. He faced a maximum of nine years in prison.

From her wheelchair, Hill, who arrived in court with her parents, said not a day goes by that she doesn't think about the night when Corn plowed the SUV he was driving with four passengers into a tree.

Bomb squad blows up beach 'pipe bomb'

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m A}$ FTER AN "unidentified beachcomber" discovered a possible pipe bomb at the north end of Carmel Beach Sunday morning, the Monterey County Sheriff's Bomb Squad arrived and unable to determine whether the pair of black pipes bound together at each end and in the center with duct tape was a homemade explosive or a harmless prank — blew it up. The beach walker called 911 shortly before 8 a.m. March 6 after finding the suspicious device near the 9th Hole of the Pebble Beach Golf Links in the rocks at the base of a 40-foot cliff, according to Monterey County Sheriff's Cmdr. Tracy Brown. The bomb squad arrived around 10 a.m., and made its way down to the beach to examine the possible explosive.

2010 Census: Town's population down 8.8% in decade


THE CONVERSION of Carmel-by-the-Sea from a place where families and retired people from numerous income groups lived to a place where wealthy people have second homes accelerated in the last 10 years, according to figures released by the U.S. Census Bureau Tuesday, with the population of the one-square-mile city falling 8.8 percent, to 3,722. But nobody said the decline indicated people have stopped wanting to live here.

"I haven't heard anyone say Carmel isn't still heaven on earth," noted Mayor Sue McCloud.

Two of the town's leading real estate agents said that while about half of the people who buy homes in the Carmel area intend to use them only occasionally, and thus are not counted by the census, the downward population trend could reverse in the near future as wealthy baby boomers start to retire, give up their lives in the big cities and move full-time into their homes in places such as Carmel and Pebble Beach.

"Whether they're from the San Joaquin Valley or Silicon Valley, successful people from the baby boom generation are continuing to buy second homes on the Monterey Peninsula, and they're displacing, if you will, some primary residents," said Mike Canning of Sotheby's International Realty. "But it's only a matter of time before they become

Appeal: Pollacci's rape conviction 'must be reversed'

"It was wedged in some rocks, and the tide was coming in," Brown explained. "Because of the way it was wedged in the rocks, they couldn't get their X-ray equipment down there to scan it."

Deciding it would be too risky to try to remove it, or even to separate the two pipes, members of the bomb squad opted for blowing it up where it **P**EBBLE BEACH resident Tom Pollacci, sentenced to eight years in prison last June for raping a woman in the loft of his family's Pacific Grove liquor store, claims in an appeal filed Tuesday that jurors wrongly convicted him because the judge allowed evidence he shouldn't have, banned testimony he should have permitted and improperly instructed the jury how to decide the case.

In particular, Pollacci's attorney, Mark Greenberg of the nonprofit Sixth District Appellate Program, said the jury should not have heard testimony from four other women who said Pollacci raped them. He called Pollacci's case a "quintupled prosecution."

Pollacci was convicted of the April 2008 rape of Jane Doe 5, who also suffered a serious head injury the same night as the rape occurred. The conviction came after four other women described being raped or otherwise molested by Pollacci in the past.

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Student arrested for threatening asst. principal

■ Pebble Beach teen found with 3.5-inch knife

A JUDGE ordered a Pacific Grove High School junior Monday to stay away from the school's assistant principal after he threatened to kill her and her family.

The unidentified 17-year-old student, who lives on Strawberry Hill in Pebble Beach, told assistant principal Barbara Martinez last week he would kill her after she confiscated a knife he was carrying, according to court documents.

The boy said, "I'll come back in 10 years and kill you and your family," according to a March 4 declaration by Martinez in support of the temporary stay-away order issued March 7 by Monterey County Superior Court Judge Lydia M. Villarreal.

The threats were made after Martinez instructed campus supervisor Bobby Howell to check the boy's pants pockets, based in part on a tip the school received that he often carried a knife.

"In the right front pocket of John Doe's pants, Mr. Howell found a 3.5-inch kitchen knife wrapped in a homemade cardboard sheath," according to Martinez' declaration.

"John Doe took on a sarcastic tone when we asked him why he was bringing a knife to school, and he said things like 'I like to cut things,'" Martinez said. "When I asked what he liked to cut, John Doe said to me, 'I cut many things."

The teen then told Howell and another campus supervisor that he "holds grudges for a very long time."

When Martinez asked the teen what he meant by the statement, he made the death threat and also bizarre statements about her son, a seventh-grader.

"I've met your son and offered him crack cocaine," Martinez said the student told her.

The threats rattled the assistant principal, who has more than a decade of experience as a public school administrator.

"During those years, high school students have said a lot of things to me, but this is the first time I have felt afraid of what a student might do to my family and me," she said.

Pacific Grove Unified School District superintendent Ralph Porras has recommended to the district's governing board that the junior be expelled.


"Safety is of the utmost importance for the district," Porras told The Pine Cone Tuesday afternoon. "So we responded immediately to the threat to not only protect the employee and her family, but the students."

The district is doing what it can to prevent the student — who was arrested by Pacific Grove police after the knife was discovered — from returning to school.

The teen, who is unidentified in court documents because he is a minor, is described in the restraining order as white, 5 feet 10 inches tall, 180 pounds with light brown hair and green/hazel eyes.







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School warned of boy

The teen's unidentified ex-girlfriend told Martinez a day before the incident that her ex-boyfriend usually had marijuana in his backpack and that he "regularly" brought a knife to school. Martinez didn't act on the information that day, though.

But she questioned the boy the next day, after his mother unexpectedly showed up before school.

"She said she ... was upset because she caught [her son] smoking marijuana before he got on the school bus that morning," Martinez said.

After that, the assistant principal told a campus supervisor to escort the teenager from his first-period class to the office. The boy denied carrying any prohibited school items.

"While I was searching through his backpack, [he] became very nervous," according to Martinez, who didn't find anything illegal in the backpack.

However, after Howell discovered the knife, the boy said "he usually kept the knife in his backpack, but he was late this morning so he put it in his pants pocket."

After Martinez questioned the 17-year-old, she said he made death threats and the comments about her son.

When asked asked the teenager how he knew her son, she got a chilling response.

Knee-high Phoebe weighs just 30 pounds and is most likely a Labrador/Basset Hound mix. Her short little legs go lickety-split and she can keep up with the briskest of walkers.

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When Martinez told the boy's mom Pacific Grove police had handcuffed her son and taken him into custody, the woman "seemed relieved that he had been arrested ..." Martinez said.

"She said that he threatens to kill her all the time," said Martinez, who suspended the boy and recommended he be expelled.

The student's "attitude and demeanor have

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STEALTHY BURGLARS MAKE OFF WITH CASH


HIDDEN BY darkness and working in concealed locations, burglars smashed side windows to force their way into two downtown Carmel businesses sometime Tuesday night or early Wednesday morning, stealing cash and fleeing without detection. The break-ins at a restaurant and a florist were discovered by employees just after 7 a.m. Wednesday, according to Carmel Police Sgt. Mel Mukai.

At the Little Swiss Café on Sixth Avenue near Lincoln Street, the culprits broke the small window in the door located along the side of the restaurant off the street and reached in to unlock the door, according to Mukai. After finding a deposit bag and the cash for opening the till the next morning, they grabbed the \$460 and left through the front door.

Employees arrived the morning of March 8 and noticed the broken window.

"They entered and saw the damaged glass on the kitchen floor, and later discovered the cash was missing," Mukai said.

Not long after, a representative of the Twigery floral shop,

Here's Your Tax Season "Checklist"

It's tax season. You've got until April 18, 2011, to file your taxes, so it is a good time to think about some moves to help improve your situation.

Here are some "tax-smart" moves to consider:

First, boost your 401(k) contribution. The greater your pretax contributions, the lower your adjusted gross income.

Next, try to "max out" on your traditional or Roth IRA, both of which offer tax advantages. You've got until the tax-filing deadline to contribute to your IRA for the 2010 tax year, for which the contribution limit is 5,000, or 6,000 if you are 50 or older.

Also, consider a 529 plan for your children or grandchildren. Your earnings have the opportunity to grow free of federal taxes and withdrawals are also tax-free, provided they are used for qualified higher education expenses. located on the north side of Seventh Avenue between Dolores and Lincoln streets, reported a similar break-in.

"There's an adjacent patio area, and it looks like the suspects climbed over the wrought-iron gate there and walked to the side window, which faces west," he said. "It's off the street front, so they could work in the darkness and be concealed."

The burglars broke the glass so they could unlock the window and get into the shop, from which they stole an "unknown amount of cash" and a digital camera before leaving through the front door.

Given the similarities between the two crimes, it seems obvious they were the work of the same thieves, but investigators have so far been unable to collect much evidence or identify any leads.

"There were no prints," he said. "The supposition is they used gloves."

Layne donates \$5K for beach betterment

THE COL. Dorothea Terry Layne Fund gave \$5,000 to the city "for the beautification and maintenance of Carmel Beach," and the council voted last week to accept the money. The grant is the sixth, and the largest, to the city from Layne's fund, which dispersed \$1,000 last year, \$2,500 in late 2008, \$2,000 in early 2008, \$2,000 in spring of 2007 and \$3,000 in fall of 2007.

As part of its consent agenda March 1, the city council unanimously voted to "accept with gratitude the grant of \$5,000 from Col. Dorothea Terry Layne through the Fidelity Charitable Gift Fund," authorize city staff to use the money "to support and expand existing programs" that benefit the beach, and direct Mayor Sue McCloud to send a letter of thanks to Layne "for her ongoing and generous support."



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Parker reaches out to supporters, blasts critics

COUNTY SUPERVISOR Jane Parker has begun her reelection campaign early. And she's pulling no punches, accusing her colleagues of having a pro-development bias.

In a spirited letter sent to her constituents Monday, Parker, the 4th District supervisor, extols her accomplishments and chides her adversaries, including the other supervisors

Parker, who is up for reelection in 2012, takes credit for the board's decision to vote down a subdivision in North Monterey County and for increasing "transparency and accountability of government."

"This past year has been full of successes," wrote Parker, who narrowly defeated Ila Mettee-McCutchon in 2008.

But the letter isn't all rosy. Parker blasts what she calls a 'pro-development bias" on the board and proclaims the "deck is still stacked on the board of supervisors for bad land use decisions!"

Parker mentions in the letter her recommendation in January to appoint Janet Brennan - a Carmel Valley water and land-use activist - to the planning commission for her area, the 4th District.

"That my recommendation was challenged is a strong signal that the political forces in this county are pushing back against me," Parker wrote.

But current and former Seaside City Council members criticized the recommendation since Brennan doesn't live in the 4th District, an area that includes Seaside, Sand City and Marina. Supervisors voted 3-2 to deny the confirmation.

Parker contends there are people "lining up" to challenge her and that there is "no deterrent to challengers quite as powerful as having a full financial war chest."

"It's no secret," Parker wrote, "that land use issues continue to be contentious and the 'good old boys' want me out of office so that they can continue to get their way in the arena of land use and water politics."

Parker said there is more work to be done concerning land use, water, violence prevention efforts, economic development and other issues. "People are hungry, out of work, homeless and lacking healthcare," Parker said.

Toward the end of the two-page letter, Parker asked her supporters to stay involved, approach her with concerns and make "generous contributions" of "\$500, \$250 or whatever you can."

"It will not be easy; there will be opposition to overcome on the board and from those who sought to prevent my election in the first place," she wrote.

Parker holds weekly supervisors' agenda review sessions to discuss "hot topics" on Mondays from 5:30 p.m. to 6:30 at Me-n-Ed's Pizza at 880 Broadway in Seaside.

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Park board changes tone as critic keeps up heat

AT RECENT board meetings of the Monterey Peninsula Regional Park District, local real estate broker Peter Baird has pointedly criticized the agency's leadership.

At Monday's meeting in Seaside, however, board president Dr. Jennifer Lagier Fellguth beat him to the punch.

Before launching into the public commentary portion of the meeting, Dr. Fellguth read a statement that addressed the charges Baird and others have levied at the park district's board since former general manager Joe Donofrio's generous salary and retirement package sparked outrage two months ago.

"We are mindful of the important public trust we hold," Felguth said. "We ask for your patience and support as we work together in rebuilding that public trust. We are committed to diligently working toward practices that reinstill the public's trust and confidence in our work and leadership."

In an effort to "increase organizational transparency," "effectively engage the public" and address other concerns about the agency, the park district will present a public workshop, she announced. A date has not yet

been set.

Despite the conciliatory tone of Felguth's words, Baird held little back from his public comments, which followed a few minutes later.

"Too many issues continue to be raised about decisions which have been made during this board's tenure that have not been in the public's best interest," Baird suggested. "The board's refusal to respond to these revelations has brought about grave doubt as to your leadership abilities," Baird suggested.

In his blog (http://fleecingparktaxpayers.wordpress.com), Baird is calling for board members - aside from newly elected director Kathleen Lee - to step down and a new election to be set.

Baird also asked for a public meeting, which he termed a "forum" instead of a "workshop." He urged the board to not delay setting a date for the meeting.

"I am formally requesting that the [park district] offer to its taxpayers an emergency public forum which will take place within 30 days and prior to the next board meeting," he insisted.

Two other speakers at Monday's meeting

Pair suspected of prescription fraud

POLICE ARRESTED a couple of roommates Saturday for allegedly faking a prescription in an attempt to obtain hydrocodone from the Safeway pharmacy on Forest Avenue, Pacific Grove Police Cmdr. John Nyunt said Wednesday. Michael Dodd, 27, and 25-year-old Patricia Brown were charged with using fraud to obtain a controlled substance, burglary and conspiracy after officers found them at the Forest Avenue grocery store and took them into custody.

Posing as someone named Ann from Doctors on Duty, Brown reportedly called in a prescription for 60 Norco pills in the name of Michael Dodd around 1:45 p.m. March 5,

according to Nyunt. About 15 minutes later, Dodd telephoned Safeway to inquire if the pharmacist had received the prescription.

"The pharmacist was smart and called Doctors on Duty to check, and learned no prescription had been issued by the office," he said. "They learned it was a fake prescription."

Instead of returning Dodd's phone call, the pharmacist alerted Pacific Grove police and then waited for him to come attempt to pick up the narcotic painkillers. When the Arkwright Court resident appeared at the store around 4 p.m., pharmacy staff called the police.

primary."

"There are fewer families in town and more second-home owners," said Tim Allen of Coldwell Banker Del Monte Realty and a lifelong resident of Carmel. "But many of these second-home owners will eventually live here."

Carmel's population boomed from its incorporation in 1916 until the 1950s, with dozens of homes built every year. In 1920, the population was just 638, but it had increased more than seven-fold to 4,580 in 1960. The peak was 4,707 in 1980.


Carmel had long been known as a haven for the wealthy by the time a second-home trend took off during the tech boom of the 1990s, when seemingly every Silicon Valley mogul decided he wanted a south-of-OceanAvenue bungalow. And the trend has continued despite the current economic downturn.

"The young buyers aren't necessarily thinking about where they'll hang their hats forever, but the older ones are," Canning said. "One of my clients is an in investment banker from Woodside in his mid-60s, and he and his wife are thinking they'll be spending more and more time in Carmel.'

"People absolutely still love Carmel and think it's one of the most beautiful places in the world," Allen said. "The town feels very much the same as it has since I was born."

Several other Monterey Peninsula communities also had declines since 2000, including Monterey (minus 6 percent), Pacific Grove (minus 3 percent) and Carmel Valley Village (minus 9 percent). Del Monte Forest was flat.


But in the rest of the county, some towns had dramatic population increases, including Greenfield (29 percent), King City (15 percent) and Soledad (12 percent).

Junipero repaying set for end of month

THE OVERHAUL of a well traveled twoblock stretch of Junipero Street should begin March 28, public works superintendent Stu Ross said this week.

A community meeting will be held at city hall on St. Patrick's Day to advise interested members of the public about the project and its short-term impacts.

Last week, the Carmel City Council voted to sign a \$363,662 construction contract with Monterey Peninsula Engineering. A taxpayer-funded grant from the Transportation Agency for Monterey County is paying for the work, which includes ripping up and repaving the block of Junipero between Ocean and Seventh avenues and reconfiguring the Seventh Avenue intersection to make the northbound turn onto Junipero safer. The pavement on the block between Seventh and Eighth avenues will also be resurfaced, along with miscellaneous other improvements.

According to Ross, construction will begin March 28. Traffic disruptions should be minimal during the first two weeks, but street closures and detours will follow until the expected finish date of April 22.

During that time, since tour-bus parking by Carmel Plaza will be unavailable, buses will park on Junipero and Ocean alongside Devendorf Park and will be detoured out of town via San Carlos Street.

The city's engineer, representatives from MPE and Carmel officials will hold a public information meeting about the project at 3 p.m. Thursday, March 17, in city hall at Monte Verde and Ocean. For more information, call (831) 620-2010.

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
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American duo, Irish quintet offer different takes on folk music

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Exotic eastern instrument, three pianos share stage

EAST MEETS west Friday, March 11, at Sunset Center when the Amelia Piano Trio shares the stage with Chinese erhu master Wang Guowei.

Formed in 1999, the Amelia Piano Trio showcases the talents of pianist Andrew Armstrong, violinist Anthea Kreston and cellist Jason Duckles.

"They're a wonderful young trio," offered Any Anderson, the president of Chamber Music Monterey Bay, the group presenting the concert. "Isaac Stern took them under his wing about 10 years ago. He became their mentor and introduced them at Carnegie Hall."

Born in Shanghai, Guowei is one of the world's finest erhu soloists. The erhu is a two-string bowed instrument that has been played in China for more than a thousand years.

"It's a very interesting instrument," Anderson explained. "It doesn't sound like our violin. The sound box is made out of snakeskin and it gives off a different tone than you would get from wood. It's pretty exotic."

While the erhu was created to perform Chinese folk music, Guowei is equally adept

Canadian acoustic trio brings rock energy to Sunset

RAISED ON a steady diet of mournful shanties performed in raucous pubs amid harsh Canadian winters, Great Big Sea serves up a hearty and muscular brand of folk music that offers a sharp contrast to the soft and sensitive acoustic fare that's typically played in U.S. coffee houses.

The Canadian folk group, whose members hail from the northeasterly provinces of Newfoundland and Labrador, performs Thursday, March 17, at Sunset Center.

Led by a trio of vocalists — Alan Doyle, Séan McCann and Bob Hallett — Great Big Sea pays tribute to the various folk traditions that took root in their homeland. "The music of Newfoundland is a mix of Irish, English, Scottish and French influences," explained McCann in an interview with The Pine Cone. "It all came together and steeped like a good cup of tea."

Perhaps because the musicians in Great Big Sea honed their chops in pubs instead of coffee houses, they sounds more like a rock band than a folk ensemble, despite their affection for acoustic guitars. When it performs live, the group unleashes a footstomping burst of energy.

"It's like someone tossed a hand grenade on stage," said McCann.

While the members of Great Big Sea have a great love for their icy home, McCann conceded that it was a good time of year to take a trip to California.

"This is an easy place to leave in February for California," offered McCann, who said he was doing interviews "between shovels of snow" in Newfoundland.

"The Vikings were here 1,500 years ago, but they left because it was too cold," he said. "We're about as far away from California as you can get."

The music starts at 8 p.m. Tickets range from \$37 to \$53.

Practically required eating in MoCo

While many people in the United States have never eaten an artichoke — and might

never dare to — the vegetable grows abundantly on the Central Coast and is a staple in restaurants all over the Peninsula, appearing fried, in rice and pasta dishes, on salads and standing alone, baked, grilled or steamed and garnished with all sorts of delectable sauces, salsas and other accompaniments.

Peninsula restaurants co-owned by Tony Tollner — Montrio Bistro, Rio Grill and Tarpy's Roadhouse — all have signature artichoke appetizers, and Montrio chef Tony Baker decided to share a recipe with Pine Cone readers in honor of National Artichoke Heart Day March 16.

Grilled Artichoke Bruschetta with Pesto Aioli

■ Bring 1 gallon of water to a boil with 12 oz. red wine vinegar, one bulb of garlic (split), a pinch of dried oregano, 1.4 C. olive oil and salt to taste.

■ Using a sharp serrated knife, remove the top inch from the choke, and use scissors to trim the thorns from the leaves.

Boil four large artichokes, covered, for

about 35 minutes.

■ Remove from the cooking liquid and drain upside down to cool.

Use a spoon to remove the center leaves and the inedible choke.

■ For the bruschetta topping, combine four large tomatoes, seeded and diced; 1/4 red onion, finely chopped; 1/8 C. red wine vinegar; 1/4 C. extra virgin olive oil; six leaves of basil, finely shredded; and salt and pepper to taste.

■ Prepare a basic pesto with 2 C. or 4 oz. basil leaves, washed and dried; 1/2 C. grated Parmesan; 1/2 C. extra virgin olive oil; one lemon, juiced; 1/3 C. toasted pine nuts; three cloves of garlic, chopped; and salt and pepper. Lightly pulse nuts and garlic in food processor, add the basil and pulse, add the cheese and pulse, and then gradually add the

oil and lemon juice while processing until incorporated. Adjust seasonings. Makes 1 cup.

For the aioli, pulse two egg yolks with one juiced lemon and one clove of garlic, taking care not to over

mix. With the machine running, gradually add 1 C. olive oil (not extra virgin) and then gently pulse in the pesto. Season with salt and pepper to taste.

■ To serve, split the artichoke in half, drizzle with olive oil and season with salt and pepper, and place on a hot grill for approximately three to five minutes, until hot. Serve topped with the tomato mixture and a small dish of the pesto aioli.

■ Wine tax update

The California Board of Equalization is set to consider a new regulation at its May meeting that will reportedly define when a wine-based product should be classified as a distilled spirit for tax purposes. If approved, the regulation would take effect Jan. 1, 2012, and would specify that "any winebased product that contains substantial amounts of distilled alcohol from sources other than the agricultural product of which the wine is made will be taxed as a distilled spirit, not as a wine."

Wine and beer products are taxed at 20 cents per gallon, while distilled spirits (100 proof or lower) are taxed at \$3.30 per gallon, and distilled spirits over 100 proof are taxed at \$6.60 per gallon. The excise tax on beer and wine is generally paid by manufacturers, wine growers and importers. If they don't cover it, then the sellers foot the bill. Wholesalers of distilled spirits usually collect the excise tax from retailers, according to the BOE.

However, despite the devastating accident, Hill said Corn shouldn't go to prison.

"Prison would only change him for the worse," she said. "It's already been one year, and prison would only do bad. He needs to make good."

If he stayed out of prison, Corn could benefit from assisting in her efforts over the past year to educate kids about making the right decisions, she said.

A tearful Hill also recalled her recent meeting with Corn in jail. "It was so hard to see one of my friends behind glass," she said. "He could barely look at me. I know he is sorry from the bottom of his heart."

Hill's father, John Hill, said Corn apologized to him for the accident during a meeting at the jail, the first time they had met.

"There has been a lot of pain on both sides of the family, not just ours," Hill said. "I spoke to Aaron for five minutes a couple of weeks ago ... I see a lot of remorse from Aaron.'

The other teenage passengers in the 1996 Toyota 4Runner Corn was driving were Ahmad Mahmoud and Matthew Wheeler, both of whom were injured. Another passenger, Eric Miller, was also in the vehicle.

According to statements by witnesses, several teens met at the home of student CJ Veloz on Syida Drive in Pacific Grove after a basketball game the night of the crash. Chelsie Hill told an officer that Corn invited her to the party via text message.

At about 3:30 a.m., with Corn at the wheel of the 4Runner, Corn and six other students crammed into the Toyota, which only had five seats. Corn dropped off two teens not long before losing control of the vehicle and colliding with a tree off Skyline Drive in Monterey.

Corn, wearing a red and white striped jail jumpsuit Thursday, addressed Scott and requested the judge to give him probation instead of a prison sentence.

"Not a day goes by I'm not sick to my stomach and feel terrible for what I did," Corn said in a monotone voice. "I hope Chelsie can find it in her heart to forgive me."

In the 12 months he's been incarcerated in Monterey County Jail, Corn said he feels he has "matured into a man."

"My life and future are in the power of your hands," Corn told Scott.

His attorney, Frank Dice, said Scott should take into consideration Corn was barely 18 when the accident occurred.

"I think we need to recognize this is a very immature human being," Dice said. "This is a person that is not fully formed."

Dice also said Corn, whom he said is an alcoholic, has repeatedly taken responsibility for what happened and should undergo a treatment program and receive probation.

"His friends, the people who are most

harmed by this, really believe he actually can be a positive role model," Dice said.

But Monterey County Deputy District Attorney Todd Hornik, who became emotional while addressing Scott at the sentencing, urged Corn to receive the maximum punishment, which had amounted to more than nine years in prison.

"No matter what this court does, it will mean a time will come when Aaron Corn will walk out of custody," Hornik said. "He will walk out, but [Hill] never will."

Hornik revealed that Corn and Eric Miller, son of the Monterey Fire Chief Andrew Miller, had been passengers in a 2009 accident in which an 18-year-old crashed his car on the rocks off Pt. Joe in Pebble Beach.

During sentencing, Scott said he took the crash and other examples of Corn's delinquent behavior into account, which he said included a substance-abuse problem at 15.

"Despite the many letters on behalf of the defendant," Scott said. "None of them address that he had been a daily drinker since 16."

At the time of the crash that paralyzed Hill, Corn had been recently discharged from an alcohol rehab program and was on probation for an "alcohol-related criminal offense," according to court records.

Corn was "described as someone who is always in trouble, someone who always caused troubled," Scott said. "And that is from his friends.'

Scott described the "terror" Corn's passengers felt while he was behind the wheel, despite not having a driver's license.

They "were screaming for him to stop," he said, "and he continued even after hitting a guard rail ... if she died, it would probably have amounted to a murder, frankly."

The judge also said Hill shouldn't feel responsible in any way for Corn's sentence.

"This is a young man who consciously disregarded the fact he knows he blacks out when he drinks," Scott said. "He knows that, and still he drinks."

After Scott told Corn he'd have to spend more than seven years behind bars, he also ordered him to pay fines and restitution to his victims. Corn has been held in Monterey County Jail since the crash and has credit for about a year of time already served. But he will have to serve at least at five more years.

Toward the end of the sentencing, Scott acknowledged Hill's remarkable accomplishments since the accident — which have included speaking to a number of students about her experience.

"A lot of people would have just floundered after that," he said. "But you have made some decisions that really do define your future already, which is one that has hope and great expectations."

He then addressed Corn.


"I hope, Mr. Corn, you can take today and get past it," Scott said. "And when you have done your prison sentence, [you] can do the same."

at playing classical and jazz with it.

But without the testimony of those other witnesses, the case against Pollacci was weak and would not have resulted in his conviction, Greenberg argued in the opening brief. While the state law allows purported victims to testify in sex-offense trials about a suspect's behavior, even if the alleged actions were never reported or did not lead to conviction, Monterey County Superior Court Judge Russell Scott erred in letting all four be heard in Pollacci's case.

Greenberg particularly focused on Jane Doe 1, who told the court that in 1980, when she was 16, Pollacci and another man kidnapped her from her house, drove her to midvalley and raped her on the bank of the Carmel River, after which she fled. She said her boyfriend and another friend dissuaded her from reporting the rape at the time.

But Scott should have excluded her testimony, because it was "the most inflammatory, involving allegations not only of rape, but rape-in-concert of an underage girl, who was also kidnapped," and was too dissimilar to the loft-rape case and the other Jane Does, who had been acquainted with Pollacci and had even been romantically involved with him.

Greenberg said state law requires trial courts to consider the relevance, the degree of certainty the crimes actually occurred and the likelihood such testimony will confuse, mislead or distract the jurors from the case at hand. Judges must also examine the testimony's "similarity to the charged offense, its likely prejudicial impact on the jurors, the burden on the defendant in defending against the uncharged offense, and the availability of less prejudicial alternatives."

According to Pollacci's appeal, Scott acted improperly by allowing Jane Doe 1 to testify in the case, which constituted "a gross unfairness," and violation of due process, so the conviction must be reversed.

"Even when the trial court has screened the evidence, there is still a danger that the presumption of innocence will melt under the heat of emotions aroused by the defendant's prior offenses," wrote Greenberg, quoting another case.

Without the testimony of the other women, he continued, "one might well pronounce the the prosecution case weak and barely sufficient to sustain a conviction."

He said the other women's stories were decisive in the trial. "All the Jane Does taken together added so much inflammatory and provocative material to the prosecution's case as to tip the scale over," he continued.

'Gap in the defense case'

Greenberg also argued Scott erroneously prevented one of the defense witnesses, Chris Paquin, a nephew of Pollacci, from explaining why neither he nor Pollacci called 911 the night of the incident in the liquor store. The loft there was accessed by narrow, steep stairs that lacked a railing on one side, and while prosecutors suggested Pollacci had injured the woman himself, the defense argued her wounds were more consistent with a fall down the stairs.

That night, Pollacci called Paquin to help him deal with the injured woman, whom Paquin reported finding lying on the floor at the bottom of the stairs, and when Paquin said he should call an ambulance, Pollacci reportedly told him he wouldn't, because, "Grandpa will be sued." When Paquin recounted that conversation during the trial, prosecutor Mike Breeden argued it was hearsay, and Scott agreed, striking it as irrelevant.

But it was relevant and should have been allowed, according to the appeal.

"The question was why Paquin did not call 911. The statement explained why he did not call 911. Why Paquin did not call 911 was relevant to appellant's consciousness of guilt," the lawyer contended. "Without the statement, the jury was invited to infer that Paquin did not call 911 because appellant, worried that the authorities would discover his crime, stopped him. The statement, however, circumstantially established the possibility that appellant had another reason: consciousness of tort liability for negligence."



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Scotts' excluding that testimony "left the most serious gap in the defense case," Greenberg wrote.

Jury instructions questioned

Greenberg also said Scott erroneously instructed jurors in their consideration of the evidence and whether it meant Pollacci was guilty beyond a reasonable doubt by deciding they didn't have to agree on how the rape occurred, as long as they agreed it had occurred.

Originally, Pollacci was charged with three different felonies: forcible rape, rape of a person unable to give consent and rape of an unconscious victim.

But at the trial, the charges were combined into a single rape charge, and Scott told the jury, "You may not find the defendant guilty unless all of you agree that the People have proved that the defendant committed rape. But all of you do not need to agree on the same theory."

Confederate forces at the Battle of Gaines Mill in 1862, a decisive conflict that saved the South from an ambitious Northern advance.

Montgomery recovered from his injuries and returned to the North as part of a prisoner exchange. Recognized for gallant and meritorious service at Gaines Mill, he was elevated to the rank of captain.

The following summer, Montgomery took part in the Battle of Gettysburg, and again he was wounded. For his efforts, he was again recognized for gallant and meritorious service and raised to the rank of major.

It is at this junction that Montgomery's story leaves the brutality of battle and enters the realm of romance. A year after Gettysburg, the major met a pretty young woman named Emily Condell, won her affections and set a wedding date.

The couple faced a dilemma, though, because Montgomery's mother was ill and couldn't come to the wedding. As a result, the soldier sought to bring his fiancee to Pennsylvania to meet his mother before the wedding. But unfortunately, his commanding officer wouldn't give him an extended leave to make the trip.

In response to the stalemate, Montgomery's father, Robert, traveled to Washington D.C., to see an old friend, Simon Cameron, who had served in President Lincoln's cabinet. The elder Montgomery pleaded his case before Cameron, who decided to let the president himself settle the issue.

According to Lagorio's article, the account of the conversation that allegedly took place between Montgomery's father and one of America's greatest historical figures comes from the Muncy, Penn., Historical Society:

"And what may I do for you?" the president asked.

The elder Montgomery responded by telling the president that his son was engaged to be married to a woman from Springfield, Ill., but his beloved mother was unable to attend due to poor health. The younger Montgomery simply wanted to visit his mother and introduce her to his bride. Greenberg argued the jury also had to unanimously agree Pollacci committed the same criminal act, and that the theories posed by prosecutors were all different crimes. He said the judge's instructions violated the California and United States constitutions.

"The trial court erred giving in this case a non-unanimity instruction that allowed the jury to amalgamate separate crimes in order to reach a verdict in this case," he wrote.

Ultimately, the jury found Pollacci not guilty of forcible rape, but of "undifferentiated rape," and Scott last June sentenced him to eight years in prison.

The California Attorney General has until April 7 to respond to Pollacci's demand for reversal of his conviction. Meanwhile, Pollacci faces additional rape charges in Monterey County Superior Court.

He and his family have also been sued in state and federal courts by some of Pollacci's alleged victims.

Lincoln handed the elder Montgomery a letter authorizing the soldier to take a leave that was twice as long as he had expected. The young couple was soon married.

A year after his encounter with Montgomery's father, President Lincoln was assassinated. As a result, the younger Montgomery was one of several officers who stood guard over the late president's coffin while his body laid in state in Springfield before his burial there.

After the Civil War ended, Montgomery stayed in the Army and was transferred to Texas. It was there in 1868 that he was killed when a pistol accidentally discharged.

The painting arrives in Carmel

So how did a painting of a young boy who became a Civil War hero end up on the wall above the fireplace at the Pine Inn? Claghorn's mother, Alice, inherited the painting. In 1940, her second husband, Harrison Godwin, purchased The Pine Inn and moved his family there. Claghorn would have been about 5 when he moved into the landmark hotel, and he spent much of his childhood there.

It is unclear exactly when the painting was placed above the fireplace at the inn. A letter, though, confirms it was there in 1962.

When Gunner purchased the Pine Inn in 1985, word of the sale reached Claghorn, and that's when he contacted the inn and asked if he could photograph the painting. The image presumably hung on the wall of his Georgia home until he died in 1995.

Back to the present

According to Lloyd, the painting was stolen in December 2004. Because the painter of the portrait is unknown, it's doubtful the canvas is worth very much. Still, Gunner would like to recover the painting.

Gunner would like to recover the painting. "The piece has a lot of sentimental value," Lloyd added. "Richard would like to see it returned to its rightful place above the fireplace in our lobby."

After the explosion, "no remnants of the device were found for examination," Brown said. "It's not known what it was or how it ended up in the base of the cliff."



No-growthing yourself out of existence

MORE THAN 10 years ago, we used this space to point out that the Monterey Peninsula's no-growth movement would invariably be self-defeating because communities with stagnant or shrinking populations would quickly be overtaken (in number of voters and, hence, representation in government) by areas that grew.

The phenomenon started to take off locally in the mid-1990s, when the Peninsula lost one of its two supervisors (remember Sam Karas and Karin Strasser Kauffman?), even as the Salinas Valley gained.

With California results of the 2010 Census released this week, we see that the same thing is happening statewide. And it's a trend that could spell big changes for California's environmental movement, which has had its way in Sacramento for most of the last 40 years, but which is beginning to suffer some significant defeats. Will the ascendancy of Hispanic political leaders spell an end to the hegemony of CEQA and the coastal commission?

This is not an idle question.

Carmel Valley activists held a town meeting two weeks ago ostensibly to decry Monterey County's latest method for measuring traffic densities. But the subtext was that Salinas Valley politicians have it in for the valley's anti-development advocates. This week, Supervisor Jane Parker asked her supporters to start contributing to her 2012 re-election campaign. She's going to need a big war chest, she said, to keep the "good old boys" who run things in Salinas from railroading her out of office. And who can forget that the move to incorporate Carmel Valley in 2009 also had a strong us-vs.-them theme?


But with almost all parts of the Monterey Peninsula losing population in the latest census, while the entire Salinas Valley surged, the bad news for Carmel Valley activists, Parker, the local Sierra Club, the League of Women Voters, LandWatch and other similar groups is that they're going to have less and less political influence at the county building. And there's nothing they can do about it.

Meanwhile, the state's population is also shifting away from cities along the coast, where all the Sacramento power brokers have come from in recent decades but where population growth has slowed or stopped, to inland cities, which are booming.

Thus, it isn't difficult to imagine a day in the near future when California's Hispanic political leaders will no longer need to ally themselves with environmentalists to attain a majority in the Legislature. And with economic empowerment the No. 1 goal of the state's Hispanic politicians, it seems inevitable that no-growth and conservation policies will not be at the top of their political agenda.

In fact, that is already happening. At the end of 2009, a last-minute deal in the state Senate and Assembly created an exemption from the California Environmental Quality Act for the proposed NFL stadium in the City of Industry. The exemption was hotly opposed by dozens of environmental groups. But it passed anyway, with the support of almost every Hispanic legislator. Why? Because the stadium would create jobs. More CEQA exemptions are con-

current gas and electric meters.

These devices are a key component of a comprehensive new "SmartGrid" designed to cut energy use, thereby avoiding the need to increase capacity. An ultimate goal of the technology, which is being rolled out nationally, is to dictate our thermostat settings and switch our appliances off and on as a rationing mechanism. Such intrusion into our intimate daily lives and personal sovereignty is incompatible with a free society.

That won't happen, you say? It's already being discussed. In 2008, the California Energy Commission proposed requiring thermostats in new homes and remodels to be capable of remote adjustment by the utility. Adjustments would be involuntary in "emergencies."

Policy makers are openly talking about remotely controlling our appliances to curb energy waste and manage blackouts. Smart Meters, designed to eventually collect data about the energy consumption of each of your appliances and report it to the utility, are part of the technology to make this possible. Participation may be voluntary at first. But incrementalism is powerful. Once the equipment is in place, how long until we have no choice?

unnerved me, and I am concerned for my and my family's personal safety," according to Martinez' declaration. "I am afraid that [the boy] will carry out his threat."

A chance encounter

The March 2 incident took a strange turn when Martinez went to Community Hospital of the Monterey Peninsula the next day to attend an unrelated training session.

"While I was there, I happened to walk by a hospital room and saw John Doe lying on the bed," she said.

"He lifted his head and looked at me with the same unnerving facial expression that he had shown toward me the day before."

The restraining order, which expires March 21 but can be extended by a judge, prohibits the teenager from being within 100 yards of Martinez and her home, workplace and vehicle. The teenager must also stay away from Martinez' son.

"We are really concerned when issues like this come up," Porras said. "Nothing is left to chance."

The P.G. High case happened a day before two Monterey High School students were arrested after allegedly making threats against staff at the school.

The boys had a bullet in their possession, according to Monterey police.

They were booked on various charges, including making terrorist threats, and were booked into juvenile hall in Salinas.

regional hiking or biking trails, and use an expanded transit system to reach nearby attractions and transportation hubs." The positive consequences would include healthier residents and visitors, another way to market the city and environmental benefits.

Burnett first raised the issue last month, and a committee comprising McCloud, Burnett, planning and building services manager Sean Conroy and city grant writer Jan Roehl studied how much work the application itself would require.

At the March 1 meeting, Burnett, who was participating via phone, told the council Roehl had already spent 27 hours working on the grant application and would need another 10 to 15 hours to complete it.

If and when it receives the grant, the city could receive help with the project from a nonprofit called the Local Government Commission, which would serve as a "subrecipient," and Burnett said other outside agencies, such as the Big Sur Land Trust, would also participate.

Councilwoman Paula Hazdovac worried that LGC had not provided any documentation indicating its commitment to work with the city, though Burnett responded that he had received an email from the director, as well as an oral commitment. McCloud said LGC would charge \$20,000 to \$30,000

Several parents whose kids walk and bicycle along busy Rio Road expressed their support for applying for the grant, saying it would lead to improvements that would make traveling by foot and bicycle safer.

"If you've ever walked on Rio Road, sometimes you feel lucky to escape with your life and limbs," said Alexandra Fallon.

More than a dozen parents who reportedly had planned to address the council in support of the proposal had to leave the meeting before the council began discussing it, because they had young kids in tow and the hour was getting late, according to one woman who spoke in favor of applying for coast live oak, Japanese maple and Tristania laurina seedlings will be available for adoption. Finally, participants are invited to drop off their plastic pots for recycling.

"In terms of budgeting process, budgeting staff resources, I think it's something we need to keep our eye on," Burnett responded. "But it's not a large amount of staff time."

Hazdovac observed that much of the discussion had focused on the Rio Road area, much of which is outside the city limits. The

grant would also be used to pay for planning in other non-city-owned lands.

"One of my concerns is, almost everything I've heard tonight, almost everything I've read in the packet is about what this does for areas outside Carmel-by-the-Sea," she said. "I'm a bit curious why Carmel-by-the-Sea is applying for this."

She suggested some other agency should undertake the task.

Councilwoman Karen Sharp wondered where the city would find the money to do the work envisioned by the grant-funded plan, and Burnett replied that more taxpayer dollars could be culled via a number of "shovel-ready" grants that require applicants to already have plans in place.

Councilman Ken Talmage suggested the council vote to proceed, and if the city receives the grant, then council members will review the list of city projects and postpone other work to accommodate the grantfunded planning, if necessary.

"Would you consider postponing this for a year?" McCloud ask.

"I'd prefer to go for it," Talmage responded, and the council voted 4-1, with McCloud dissenting, to apply for the Caltrans money. The paperwork is due by the end of March.

Council decides to go for \$150K Caltrans grant

THE CITY will vie for a state taxpayerfunded grant from the California Department of Transportation to develop

A

plans for improving the network of walking paths, bike trails and public transportation connecting Carmel with the Peninsula, the council decided last week.

Although Mayor Sue McCloud said the

planning project would overburden city workers, the rest of the council decided to go after the money and tackle the logistics later, if the state awards the grant to the city.

'Carmel-by-the-Sea is a walkable, pedestrian-friendly town with gaps in the network of trails in and around town and limited public transit connections to destinations within and outside the city limits," according to the report written by councilman Jason Burnett, who proposed the council apply for the \$150,000, which would have to be matched with 10 percent of the city's own money and resources.

Despite the state's dire budget situation and threatened cutbacks to schools, MediCal and other vital public programs, the money remains available.

Caltrans' Community-Based Transportation Planning grant would pay for studying, consulting and planning ways to get residents and visitors out of their cars "and still easily access every attraction within the town, connect safely to local and

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

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



firefighters attempted to gather information from him regarding his wife's health and history. The patient was experiencing dangerously low vital signs (BP 57/31 at 1913 hours and 88/55 at 1927 hours.) The patient was packaged into the ambulance but was ultimately released at her request.



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
