'Miracle' cat singed but safe

W HEN ONLY three of four cats who lived in a house on Acacia Way were found dead from smoke inhalation after a fire last weekend, one of the women who shared the house knew the fourth cat, Pansy, had to be alive.

'She always walked around like she was fearless, like she ran the place," said caregiver Eliyah Hovir, who helped her elderly client, Joan

phone, Hovir went in search of the sole feline survivor. "I called her for three or four minutes, and then I heard a little meow, and I looked again and saw her," she recalled. Being a cat, Pansy wouldn't walk directly to Hovir, instead wandering over to rub against a nearby tree, but she didn't protest when Hovir approached and picked her up.

After a minute of being hugged, Pansy wanted to get down, Hovir said. "But I couldn't let her, for obvious reasons."

Lacking a cat carrier, Hovir and the neighbors placed Pansy in a pillow case for the ride to Carmel Valley, where she and Horton, 85, are staying with family until they move into another house while the extensive interior damage is repaired, which could take almost a year.

Both women were uninjured in the fire, and Pansy escaped with little more than a burn behind her right ear. She seems to be quickly adjusting to her temporary home and has even befriended the chocolate Lab, Buddy, that lives there.

Hovir recalled the terror of the incident, beginning with the loud eruption of static from a clock radio that awakened her with a start just after midnight March 20.

"I've never heard anything like it — it was like bullhorn volume," she said. Startled and confused, she reached for her iPhone to see if it had produced the noise, and as she turned her head in an attempt to read the screen, she saw a flame shoot from an outlet near her bed.

"My mattress and box spring ignited, and I grabbed an extinguisher but couldn't do anything with it," she said. She turned and ran up the stairs, screaming Horton's name.

River threatens Scenic Road again

THE PICTURESQUE scene where the Carmel River spills into the ocean looked more like a construction zone this week after Monterey County Public Works used bulldozers to prevent the manmade channel in the Carmel River Lagoon sandbar from undermining Scenic Road.

The furious effort was launched last Friday after the channel — which was swollen by recent rains — migrated dangerously close to the road, washed away a large section of the parking lot at Carmel River State Beach and threatened the

The work began after Monterey County administrative officer Lew Bauman declared an emergency the same day.

The incident reignited a debate over the risks of cutting the channel in a northwesterly direction so

CITY COUNCILMAN Jason Burnett secured a compromise agreement with PG&E regarding the impending installation of wireless smart meters in town, and this week he said the offer will be extended to other Monterey Peninsula residents, too. While he is personally looking forward to having the new technology in place at his Carmel house and is unconcerned by the alleged health risks and other issues opponents

Two weeks after a 40-foot section of Highway 1 near Bixby Bridge collapsed and cut off vehicle access between Big Sur and Carmel, the first resident was permitted to walk past the crumbling stretch of pavement that caused the road closure. Bill Nye, who lives nearby, was there to witness the

"It's working really well," said Nye, who watched a group of locals escorted to the north side of the closure. "I saw more children and fewer adults than I anticipated."

Monterey Salinas Transit, meanwhile, announced late Thursday that it will offer a shuttle service — beginning April 1 — that will take people from the closed area to several destinations in Carmel and Monterey.

The opening of the walking route was welcome news for many residents and workers, who have been forced use Highway 101 and drive many hours to reach jobs or homes along the isolated coast. Nye, in fact, said his last trip home "from town" resulted in a 176-mile one-way drive.

Groups of residents and workers will be escorted past the closure at 7 a.m. and 4 p.m. each day. The time slots were chosen in part to accommodate Big Sur students who attend schools on the Monterey Peninsula. Pedestrians are required to leave their cars in designated areas on each side of the

Because construction is stopped during the escorts, no accommodations are being made for stragglers.

"You have to be there on time," Nye said. "They take a group across at 7 a.m. sharp. If you're not there, you don't go."

DORIS DAY has long been known for her youthful looks. Well, it turns out, she's more youthful than her fans realized.

To celebrate her 87th birthday, the Cypress Inn will host a birthday party, including performances of some of her biggest hits, Sunday, April 3. Last year's shows, at the Church of Wayfarer, celebrated her 88th birthday.

"Last year, we thought it was her 88th birthday," explained jazz pianist Jim Martinez, who helped organize the party. "Then her assistant told us she was actually 86."

According to Martinez, when Day was a teenager, she added two years to her age so she would be old enough to sing with big bands.

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MPD ARRESTS CARMEL HIGHLANDS RESIDENTS ON DRUG, WEAPONS CHARGES

MONTEREY POLICE arrested a Seaside woman and a brother and sister who said they live on Carmel Riviera Drive the afternoon of March 23 after serving a search warrant in the 2300 block of Del Monte in Monterey. Police discovered more than 100 bindles of brown powder heroin packaged for sale, according to Lt. Leslie Sonné.

Officers arrested 20-year-old Josiah Nohea Drummondo of Carmel after finding him in possession of 4.3 ounces of heroin worth an estimated \$10,000.

His sister, 18-year-old Alena Kimberly Drummondo, was located on North Fremont and found in possession of heroin and cocaine for sale, according to Sonné, who also said she was under the influence of a controlled substance.

Finally, police located Josiah Drummondo's 22-year-old girlfriend, Dora Renteria of Seaside, who had heroin police said was for sale and was illegally carrying a loaded firearm. She was also charged with child endangerment, since she was caring for Alena Drummondo's baby while she had the contraband. The baby was turned over to a family member.

Alena Drummondo was also charged with child endangerment, Sonné said, "because the baby was hers and she left it with a woman who was using and selling heroine and had a loaded gun. Also, our investigation revealed that Alena uses and sells narcotics, with the baby present."

Josiah Drummondo was charged with possessing narcotics for sale, transportation of narcotics, possession of a controlled substance, being under the influence of a controlled substance, driving under the influence of a controlled substance, conspiracy to distribute narcotics, child endangerment, felon in possession of a handgun, and possessing a controlled substance while armed with a loaded firearm.



"We've got four search dogs and their handlers coming to the event," Nero added. In the past, A Table Affair has raised



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Union protests inn's labor policies, but do they have employees' support?

INVOKING THE name of labor leader César Chávez on the state holiday named in his honor, Local 483 launched a rally outside the Carmel Mission Inn Thursday afternoon.

But the inn's owners, PVI Hotel group, say their workers no longer want to be represented by the union.

In a March 29 email to her supporters, Monterey County

Supervisor Jane Parker, encouraged them to "stand in solidarity with working people in Wisconsin, Ohio, Indiana and dozens of other states where right-wing corporate-funded politicians are trying to take away the rights Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. gave his life for and Cesar Chavez dedicated his life to."

According to the union, the inn has "attacked workers' rights" and demanded "deep and permanent contract concessions."

The union also claims the hotel has interrogated workers about their union activities, instructed them not to sign union petitions and fired a member of the union's negotiating team.

"This is outright union busting," insisted Mark Weller, an official with Local 483, which filed a complaint against the inn with the National Labor Relations Board.

Waller added that more than 350 people representing a variety of local groups have picketed "in support of the workers" at Carmel Mission Inn several times since January. According to community organizer Curtis Fitz, the picketers included "some current and former employees of the inn."

Another side to the story

PVI Hotel Group president Wayne Levenfeld, though, paints a very different picture of the dispute. Levenfeld conceded the recession has put the resort in a challenging posi-

tion where "our costs have escalated more rapidly than our income." As a result, after the union contract ended in August, the inn and the union engaged in what he described as "difficult" negotiations over a new contact.

"During negotiations, a group of employees decided they didn't want to be represented by the union and they circulated a petition that was signed by the majority of our employees," Levenfeld explained. "Based on the petition, we notified the union that the employees withdrew their recognition of the union. The union wasn't pleased and made a series of accusations against us that we believe are false."

Levenfeld said the inn has replaced the union's health care plan for its employees with one that is fully paid by the employer and replaced the union's retirement plan with a 401k option.

He added that a group of employees even staged a counter protest during union picketing in January.

Parker said got she involved with the Carmel Mission Inn dispute because a significant number of the resort's employees live in her district.

"Many of the workers live in Seaside, Marina and parts of Salinas that I represent," she explained. "I want to make sure they're getting a fair shake. I want to let the hotel's management know there are people in the community standing in support of the workers."

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SVMH contests 'emotional distress' claim in fetus mixup

A SALINAS hospital sued for giving the parents of a stillborn baby the wrong fetus has asked a judge to dismiss the couple's claims the mixup caused them emotional distress.

In a Feb. 2 lawsuit, Ahmed Musa, 24, and Hana Mohammed Dharhan, 23, sued Salinas Valley Memorial Hospital because workers gave them the wrong body after Dharhan delivered a stillborn baby girl on Sept. 10, 2010.

The couple — who buried the wrong fetus and weren't informed by the hospital of its wrongdoing until five weeks later — allege in their suit they suffered severe emotional distress because of the hospital's error.

But in a motion filed March 14 by SVMH attorney Karen A. Sparks, the hospital contends the couple's emotional distress claims should be stricken from the lawsuit because state law only allows "emotional distress" claims in cases of will-

ful or extreme negligence.

"The hospital does not question the distressing nature of these events," according to the motion, "but distressing events can result even when no one has done anything [intentionally] wrong."

Sparks said the couple has failed to show the hospital had engaged in "outrageous conduct" — a legal term used to determine whether a defendant can be sued for intentional infliction of emotional distress.

The SVMH attorney also contends that the couple's claim for punitive damages must also be dismissed because "punitive damages cannot be imposed on public entities" such as SVMH, which is a "public district hospital."

In their lawsuit, Musa and Dharhan also allege SVMH violated the California Health and Safety Code by "holding a body pending disposition for more than eight calendar days after a death without a permit."

But SVMH contends that claim should also be dismissed

because the parents aren't the intended beneficiaries of the


Musa and Dharhan's attorney, Anne Marie Murphy of the Burlingame firm, Cotchett Pitre & McCarthy, called the hospital's motions "procedural roadblocks."

"It is hard to imagine a stronger claim of emotional distress," Murphy told The Pine Cone Wednesday. "As stated in our opposition to the hospital's motion, Ahmed and Hana's claims are legally strong and the hospital should be required to answer them."

The next day after delivering the stillborn, the couple, who are Muslim, took what they thought was their baby's body to their mosque for religious rights, prayers and a washing of the body.

And on Sept. 3, 2010, The couple laid the baby's body to rest at Five Pillars Farm Cemetery in Alameda County,

World War I military building to be demolished before it falls apart

THE CITY of Pacific Grove announced this week it wants to tear down one of its historic buildings - a termite-infested, ramshackle structure taxpayers bought two decades ago but which has been left to rot.

Brokaw Hall, part of a World War I-era military academy in the city's butterfly sanctuary between Grove Acre and Ridge Road, was designated historic in 1996 after residents passed a bond measure to buy it and the property it sits on.

But the city didn't maintain the structure, and for years it's been a victim of the elements. It's now so rotted it needs to be torn down, according to the city's chief building official, John Kuehl.

Brokaw Hall "is in a dilapidated condition and is now considered unsafe and a danger to the public," Kuehl wrote in a letter to city manager Tom Frutchey.

Kuehl said officials have performed a number of site inspections over the last 60 days, the last on March 21. The building's overhang is collapsing, its wood foundation is deteriorating, and there is standing water inside, Kuehl noted.

"The structural supports for the ceiling, roof and walls appear to have been infested with termites, and, "along with the water intrusion, are showing signs of failure."

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Council narrows choices for interim city manager, search firm

■ Guillen has retired

CITY Council members announced at a special meeting Tuesday they will hear presentations from representatives of four firms proposing to help find the right person to become the new city administrator. The council also decided it will interview several candidates from among the 19 who want to work as the town's temporary city administrator for the three or four months it will take to find a permanent replacement for Rich Guillen, whose retirement took effect Thursday.

Of the seven headhunters that submitted proposals, four emerged as contenders after evaluations by the mayor and council members. According to the council's scoring system, the top two were Ralph Anderson & Associates (which also conducts the city's annual financial audits) and Bob Murray & Associates, with Peckham & McKenney ranked third and Avery & Associates in fourth place.

Councilman Ken Talmage suggested interviewing all four, but Mayor Sue McCloud said she hoped the council could further shorten the list at the March 29 meet-

"I was hoping to narrow it down to just two tonight," she said.

But the council couldn't agree on which firms to eliminate.

"If you were to drop one, it would be Avery," councilman Jason Burnett said, since McCloud had said she found that company's proposal the thinnest of the four. But Burnett liked Avery.

'If I were to drop one, it would be Bob Murray," he said.

"I would drop Ralph Anderson off the

list," Talmage chimed in.

"So would I," McCloud said.

"I would drop Avery," added councilwoman Paula Hazdovac. "So, we're all over the place."

Since they could not agree, council members decided to hold meetings with representatives of the four companies.

Finding a temp

The council also spent some time in closed session discussing the 19 candidates seeking to work as interim city administrator while the city finds a permanent replacement for Guillen, who retired amid criticism for his alleged involvement in sexual harassment outlined in a lawsuit filed by former human resources manager Jane Miller. She received a \$600,000 settlement in the case last sum-

McCloud said the council would be interviewing the top candidates and would keep members of the public posted regarding the hiring of a temp.

But a day earlier, Burnett accused McCloud of acting illegally by deciding on her own how to solicit applications for interim city manager. State law requires decisions like that to be made by the council, according to Burnett.

During a special meeting March 22 on the same topic, McCloud said several people had submitted unsolicited applications and the city had also asked the League of California Cities to search its database for qualified candidates. But Burnett said no member of the council, including the mayor, is allowed to direct city staff to do anything unless everyone is together at a public meeting. He said McCloud unlawfully developed the process in secret, without any other decision

Nonnative no longer a no-no where monarchs are concerned

VOLUNTEERS PLANTED a batch of eucalyptus trees in Pacific Grove's monarch

Last fall, monarch enthusiast Bob Pacelli coordinated the placement of about 20 boxed

eucalyptus trees in the sanctuary, hoping it would draw more monarchs than the 2009/2010 season.

The trees apparently worked. This year, there were nearly 7,000 monarchs, compared to last year's number of about 900, when a bad pruning job on 19 eucalyptus trees in the grove was blamed for turning away the insects.

On Thursday, a Cal Poly San Luis Obispo scientist and five undergraduate and graduate students from the university's Monarch Alert program removed the trees from their boxes and planted them alongside other trees in the grove.

The team included city budget director Jim Becklenberg, Dr. Francis Villablanca and Monarch Alert coordinator Jessica Griffiths.

nonnative plants or trees in Pacific Grove and elsewhere in California - was considered an environmental taboo.

But there's a new respect in Pacific Grove for eucalyptus, a towering nonnative tree that often gets a bad rap in the state for shedding bark, competing with native plants and not supporting native animal species.

Large stands of the native Australian tree that had been planted near residential homes in the Oakland Hills were blamed for helping fuel the devastating 1991 blaze there.

In Pacific Grove, however, the monarch butterflies that overwinter in the city every year are the eucalyptus' biggest fan. For the last century or so, the insects have preferred clustering in eucalyptus beginning in the fall until late February, when they leave.

The dense, nonnative trees provide wind shelter for the insect.

HOLLYWOOD HAS long portrayed the uncertainty and fears teenagers face as they are about to graduate from high school and transition into adulthood. The scenario lends itself to colorful characters and animated dialogue. Now, Pacific Grove is the setting for a coming of age film.

Last month, local filmmakers Cristiana DiPietro and husband Matthew Kalamane used P.G. as the setting for their 50-minute short movie "Where Monarchs Die."

The dialogue-driven film centers around four high school seniors.

"Two boys are on their way to a party, but the party ends up getting canceled," explained DiPietro. Two girls who were on their way to the same party have nothing else to do for the evening, and they end up meeting the boys at a bonfire.

There, they discover how different they are. "Heather, is withdrawn and can't wait to get out of high school," Kalamane said. "But Sarah is a social butterfly who loves high school."

Nick is a quick-talking teen who comes from a dysfunctional home while his buddy Kyle is well adjusted and comes from an upper-middle class family.

And as they huddle around a fire on the beach, "they discover two musicians have written their stories into a song," she said.

The movie also touches on the disconnect that can occur between young people and those who come to Pacific Grove to live out their golden years.

"They have a difficult time trying to find their place in a town where most people go to retire," DiPietro said.

The film was shot in three locations in Pacific Grove - including DiPietro's parents' home — with the help of a small crew, and features actors Hannah Lozier (Sarah), Sarah Leight (Heather), Tyler Vocelka (Kyle) and Chris Naasko (Nick).

The Monterey County Film Commission helped DiPietro and Kalamane find cast members and other resources.

DiPietro and Kalamane, both 29, are no strangers to life in a small town. Both graduated from Pacific Grove High School, then left the area for school and work. Like many others who grew up on the Monterey Peninsula, though, they returned. They got married and now have a young son.

DiPietro said they'll eventually submit "Where Monarchs Die" to numerous film festivals. And they also hope locals will have have a chance to see it.







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Planning commission rejects C.V. cell tower that looks like a tree

AFTER LISTENING to more than a dozen Carmel Valley residents who said a 40-foot cell-phone tower proposed by AT&T on a ridge on the Holman Ranch property would be an eyesore, county planning commissioners voted 5-4 to reject the tower, which the phone company said is needed to provide better reception for its customers.

The Monterey County Planning Commission struck down a permit for a temporary cell-phone tower on wheels and a permanent 40-foot tower that would resemble a tree, but also directed AT&T to explore alternative sites in the valley for later consideration. County planning staff recommended the permit be approved.

Thirteen residents told the commission the cell tower was a bad idea, mostly because it would impact the view from their homes, while one resident lauded the tower, which was proposed for the southeast part of Holman Ranch above Carmel Valley Road.

"We very much support the cell phone tower," said Richard Rosen, who with his wife has lived in his Valley Vista home for 25 years, "because we have had very bad cell phone reception for a very long time."

Not in my backyard

Most of the comments, however, were from those who opposed the cell tower because they said it would impact their view.

"I'm not opposed to the cell tower being installed somewhere in Carmel Valley," said Donna Lawson, who lives on Upper Circle. "But I am opposed to it here."

Resident Frank Hennessy said he isn't against having a tower erected in the valley but doesn't think it should be located on a "prominent knoll."

"We understand the need to improve cell service," he said. "We just want the site to be selected sensitively."

Daniel Loving, who lives on Merrill Way, said the renderings provided by AT&T showing what the cell tower would look like are not truly representative of how it would appear.

"I do appreciate the presentation from AT&T showing those pictures," he said. "What you can't see is the prominence of that tower."

Linda and Richard Cope, who live in a home below the proposed site of the cell tower, said development on the ridge above could exacerbate the possibility of a landslide.

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"Nobody can guarantee this earth is not going to slide," Richard Cope said.

Rosemary Madsen, 94, who lives near the Copes, said she regularly used to have to clean up rocks that fell from the ridge onto her property.

'It's beautiful," Madsen told commissioners about her property. "But it's a challenge because of the unstable ground."

Fresno engineer Bruce Meyers, hired to study the area, said a slope stability analysis showed the site was safe for the project. He noted the cell tower weighs about four to five tons, compared to a 50,000-gallon, 200-ton water tank that is already on the site.

County planners concluded the cell tower is consistent with the county's general plan and zoning regulations, and, although the tower would be visible, it would not create an adverse visual impact, according to associate planner Paula

In addition to the tower, AT&T would also build a 12-footby-20-foot equipment shed, a 4-foot-high retaining wall and a 6-foot-tall wood fence.

Improved service

Tyler Potter with the planning and environmental consulting firm, Denise Duffy & Associates, Inc., said the tower is necessary to improve cell reception, and broadband and Internet service.

"Currently, AT&T service within Carmel Valley Village is essentially limited to outdoor service only," Potter said.

The tower would also allow for improved 911 service for emergency responders, Potter said.

On Jan. 3, the Carmel Valley Land Use Advisory Committee endorsed the cell tower but urged that other sites with less viewshed impact be considered. After hearing from opposition to the towers from residents at a March 21 meeting, however, the LUAC reversed its recommendation.

AT&T is operating a temporary cell phone tower on wheels at Carmel Valley Fire District Village Fire Station.

AT&T spokeswoman Bettye Saxon told commissioners the company has received 20 letters of support for the tower, mostly from businesses, including Bernardus Lodge and Coastal Luxury Management.

"Our rural business community depends on continuous wireless coverage to operate their businesses daily," said Saxon, reading a support letter from the Carmel Valley Chamber of Commerce.

Commissioners were split on the issue.

While Nye welcomed the pedestrian access through the closed area, he suggested a third time slot be added in the middle of the day. "Right now, it's impossible to go into town to get groceries without waiting around for eight hours."

Despite the inconvenience, Nye praised the contractor of the project — Condon

Johnson & Associates of Oakland — and Caltrans for permitting the pedestrian escorts. "They've done everything possible to accommodate the community."

The opening of Highway 1 to foot traffic spelled the end of a short-lived helicopter service from Rocky Point Restaurant to Big Sur. According to Stan Russell, executive director of the Big Sur Chamber of Commerce, Specialized Helicopters provided rides Monday to 14 people, who paid \$60 each for one-way tickets.

Like Nye, Russell is thrilled the public is

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now being permitted to walk through the closed area. An avid bicyclist, he suggested that fellow bicyclists consider making a trip down the coast while the highway is closed.

"You can drive down to Rocky Creek Bridge, park your car, walk your bike across the slide area and ride south to Big Sur Valley," he said. "There's hardly any cars on the road, so it's a great time to ride a bike in Big Sur. You can come down to Big Sur for lunch and easily be back on the Monterey Peninsula by 5 p.m.'

MST launches shuttle service

To make it easier for pedestrians to get from the north side of the road closure to Carmel and the Monterey Peninsula, Monterey-Salinas Transit will launch a shuttle service Friday, MST CEO Carl Sedoryk confirmed.

A bus will pick up passengers at the road closure at 7:30 a.m. and transport them to the Crossroads Shopping Center, Community Hospital, Del Monte Center, medical offices on Cass Street and the Transit Plaza in downtown Monterey. The return trip will feature a stop at Point Lobos State Reserve as well. From each of the shuttle stops, riders will be able to access bus routes throughout the county. The shuttle will pick up its first return passengers at the Transit Plaza at 2:42 p.m. and arrive at the north side of the road closure by 3:35 p.m. so passengers will have ample time to join the 4 p.m. escort back across the closed area.

"We built extra time in our schedule so people could get back in time for the escort," Sedoryk explained.

Passengers will be charged \$2 for a oneway ticket. For more information, call (888) 678-2871 or visit www.mst.org.

Road work marches on

The opening of foot traffic through the closed area comes just a week after a slide near Limekiln State Park temporarily blocked highway access from Big Sur to the south, effectively turning the stranded coastal community into an island.

The highway near the park was reopened Sunday, but the reprieve was short lived. The same day, another slide of rock, mud and debris came crashing down upon the pavement and blocked access to the south, this time about three miles south of Gorda and 65 miles south of Carmel. Fortunately, the new slide is located south of Nacimiento-Fergusson Road, enabling residents and workers to reach Big Sur by driving the narrow and winding mountain road, which is accessed from Highway 101 near King City.

Caltrans announced Wednesday that the slide will close the highway to the south "for at least a week."

The effort to repair the highway near

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Bixby Bridge is moving forward according to plan. The first phase of the project which calls for the installation of between 75 and 100 vertical soil nails — is nearly complete. Highway officials say the nails will stabilize the hillside and reduce erosion.

The second phase of the project requires the installation of an equal number of hori-

zontal soil nails to create a solid bench to support a single-lane temporary road.

April 1, 2011

According to highway officials, the road could ready for one-way traffic by late April. When the highway does open, traffic will likely be restricted to vehicles weighing less than five tons. The weight limit could preclude recreational vehicles, passenger buses and delivery trucks from using the highway between Big Sur and Carmel.

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A kiss from Elizabeth Taylor

AMID ALL the nostalgia about the career of Elizabeth Taylor, who died March 23 at the age of 79, one local's story stands out because it involves a kiss.

It was mid-afternoon one day in September 1964, and 25-year-old Bert Cutino, who has since become one of the Monterey Peninsula's most famous chefs and restaurateurs, was just wrapping up a bartender's shift at Cerrito's, a landmark restaurant at the entrance of Fisherman's Wharf. Suddenly, there was a commotion at the front

"Who comes running in but Elizabeth Taylor and Richard Burton," Cutino told The Pine Cone. "I was shocked to see them, and she said, 'Can you put us in a section where nobody will bother us?"

I said, "I'll even lock the door."

Lunch was over, and there were no other customers in the restaurant, and just a single waitress. Outside, a crowd, which had gathered as the Hollywood superstars emerged from their limousine and walked toward the wharf, began to peer through the windows. But they could not get in. Burton and Taylor had the restaurant to themselves.

"I told my boss they were here, and he said, 'That's terrific,' but when I told them I locked the door, he said, 'What???"


The lone waitress served them, and Burton ordered a Scotch, Cutino recalled. "And then he ordered another one. They were engaged in heavy conversation."

Burton and Taylor, a few months into their first marriage, were the most soughtafter celebrities in the world. Their visit to Monterey was for filming of "The Sandpiper," a turgid drama about marital infidelity that was set in Big Sur and Monterey. The film also includes a scene at Cerrito's, which could explain why they sought refuge there — and a good meal.

"They each ordered clams Bordelaise," said Cutino, who was struck by Taylor's beauty. "Her eyes were like violet," he said. "She looked better in person than she did on

After their meal and a bottle of wine, the Burtons got up to leave. "I want to thank you for taking care of us," Taylor said to Cutino.

"And then she kissed me on the cheek," he said. "I didn't wash my face for three days."

that young steelhead are not swept out into Carmel Bay before they are mature enough to survive the conditions.

Residents oppose the strategy of cutting the channel in a northwesterly direction an action supported by environmentalists and a "technical advisory committee" of agency representatives — because it jeopardizes Scenic Road and the adjacent residential neighborhoods. They say the current emergency bears a striking resemblance to what happened after the channel was cut in a northwesterly direction six years ago.

"The total mismanagement of the Carmel River breech has now, once again, caused irreparable damage to the infrastructure at Carmel River State Beach," insisted Fred Brown, a Carmel resident. "As you may recall, this was done in 2005 with devastating results, which now have been replicated. The parking lot has been eroded, the bank protecting Scenic Road and the homes above has been washed out to sea and, as of Sunday, the sewer lines [were] close to being exposed and damaged."

County swings into action

Residents have long poked fun at the county's habit of declaring "emergencies" to bypass the permit process when work needs to be done on the sandbar. But nobody was joking this week.

Last Thursday, the river showed no signs of posing an immediate threat to the road. But that changed when heavy rains swelled the river and pushed it north the following

"By Friday, things had changed tremendously," recalled Yasdan Emrani, Monterey County public works director. "It was a raging river out there."

Over the next four days, county workers used bulldozers to cut a southwesterly channel in the sandbar. They also constructed a "sand dam" to close off the northwesterly channel.

"Our crews did a phenomenal job," Emrani said. "For the time being, we've saved Scenic Road and the state park facili-

But Emrani cautioned that there's considerably more work to do. "It's going to take a few years before everything is stabilized," he explained. "It's turned into a full-time engineering project."

Can steelhead and road be saved?

Brown blamed the current predicament on the Carmel River Steelhead Association and the National Marine Fisheries Service, which lobbied for cutting the channel in a northwesterly direction.

"The federal government's mandate to protect the steelhead habitat to the detriment of all other species and interests has to be stopped," he continued. "A dozen meetings were held after the 2005 catastrophe where promises were made to not breech to the north. All these promises were once again ignored, and starting in October of 2010, the northerly breech was promoted and implemented by the federal agencies."

But Brian Leneve, president of the CRSA, said he believes the steelhead population and the road can coexist. "There is a solution, and that's armoring the bluffs," he suggested.

Despite the threat to the road, Leneve said it's essential for the well being of the steelhead that the channel continues to flow in a northwesterly direction.

"There's no doubt in my mind that breaching to the north provides a better habitat for steelhead," he said. "We don't want to see property destroyed, but we want to protect steelhead."

According to Leneve, the population of steelhead in the river has dropped from an estimated 28,000 adult fish in the 1920s to a low of about 190 two years ago. "When you get down to that level, every fish is precious," he added.

Leneve added that his group hasn't been consulted about the management of the sandbar since November and the work that occurred this week came as a surprise.

Any effort to armor the bluffs or build a sea wall would require the backing of the California Coastal Commission. While CCC planner Mike Watson said he is unaware of a specific proposal to armor the bluffs supporting Scenic Road, he said the agency he works for has permitted such coastal defens-

"There have been many instances where the [coastal commission] has approved coastal armoring or sea walls," he observed.

But Watson said the state watchdog agency likely would require extensive studies before endorsing such a project.

"Maybe [armoring] is the best solution for one user group, but it remains to be seen that it's the right solution," he said. "We want to see all the alternatives."




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

Pollacci trial delayed

THE CASE against convicted rapist Tom Pollacci that was set to go to trial April 11 has been delayed by two more months so his attorney can request a change of venue and conduct further investigation to prepare for his defense, according to Monterey County Deputy District Attorney Mike Breeden.

Pollacci, convicted by a jury last April of raping a woman in the loft of his family's Pacific Grove liquor store in 2008 and sentenced to eight years in state prison, faces three more rape counts alleged by two women who came forward during his first trial.

If Monterey County public defender Michelle Wouden is not successful in her effort to get the trial moved outside of Monterey County, jury selection is set to begin June 13.

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
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Painter trades in watercolors for acrylics

AFTER THEY'VE seen her latest exhibit, no one will ever accuse Pacific Grove artist Cheryl Kampe of fearing change.

Among those spearheading the effort are photographer Tom O'Neal and his wife, Mollie, as well as Cachagua Store/A Moveable Feast chef-owner Michael Jones. For all of them, it's personal. Mollie O'Neal recalled first meeting Short as a child, when the girl played T-ball with the O'Neals' sons, and then encountering her years later, when she was senior class president at Carmel High School in 2000.

'In high school, she was already expressing her interest in photography," Mollie O'Neal recalled in a letter she sent to potential supporters. "Rachael is one of those determined, talented and go-to-it people."

Short put herself through Brooks Institute and then went to work with the O'Neals at TGO Photography and for Sotheby's photographing properties. She started her own business and is also co-owner of Exposed, the San Carlos Street gallery that opened in the tiny storefront occupied for a short time by the late Pine Cone cartoonist, Bill Bates.

Last November, Short was a passenger in a car wreck that left her quadriplegic.

"She has turned her intensity and zeal for life to overcoming her paralyzing spinal cord injury," O'Neal reported in her letter. "Her new quadriplegic status requires round-theclock-care, including physical therapy, acupuncture, massage and the loving support of her generous community."

O'Neal said she can't recall such a strong showing of support as she has experienced in planning Short's benefit, describing it as "a very touching experience."

"The eucalyptus' nonnative status has not proven to be an impediment like it was in 1998 following Dr. Stuart Weiss' first sanctuary management plan," monarch enthusiast and archivist Esther Trosow told The Pine Cone. "And this may be due to the wake-up call we had after the existing eucalyptus trees were overly trimmed by the city in 2009 and the monarchs didn't stay."

Though no new trees

were planted in the sanctuary Thursday, there are plans to bring in new ones.



ing to contribute are beyond impressive, not to mention the high-quality art, beautiful trips, etc., that have been donated to raise funds for Rachael's recovery and rehabilitation," she said in her letter. "Since the first year of post-recovery can lay the foundation for improvement, it is imperative that Rachael receives aggressive treatment."

Because her insurance won't pay for it, organizers hope to raise enough money to fund her 24-hour care, physical therapy and a \$15,000 FES bike that applies electrical impulses to paralyzed muscles in an effort to restore, or at least improve, their function.

"There is hope for her," O'Neal said.

With Jones leading the charge, eight other chefs signed on to cook for the fundraiser. Monterey Abalone Co. has been generous in offering their support, and I'm hoping to get a small local halibut from Jerry in Moss Landing. We may also incorporate steelhead trout — but not the endangered ones...."

Miller said he is leaning toward triple pork paella: confit, slow roasted and cracklin'. "As usual, idea still forming!" he said. "Depends on what else walks in the back door." ■ Ed Fawcett (1922-2011)

Onetime Carmel artist and gallery owner Ed Fawcett passed away March 8 in Capitola. He was 88.

With his wife, Marge, by his side, the painter operated the Fawcett Gallery, which was located for many years on the east side of Dolores between Fifth and Sixth.

Before becoming an artist, Fawcett owned a car dealership in San Jose, where he sold Volvos, Porsches, Ferraris and Triumphs. Not content to simply sells cars, he was a regular participant at Pebble Beach sports car races from 1952 to 1956.

A self-trained artist, Fawcett staged a one-man show at the Lahaina Art Society on Maui in 1970. The exhibit went over so well that Fawcett decided to sell his dealership. For the next decade, the Fawcetts operated a gallery in Lahaina. The Fawcetts moved to Carmel in 1980 and later opened their gallery across the street from the Carmel Art Association. After closing the gallery in 2007, the couple retired to Aptos.


When Fawcett retired, California Gov. Arnold Schwarzenegger wished him well.


For many years, the late Ed Fawcett operated an art gallery on the east side of Dolores between 5th and 6th.



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

Foolish humans

IN THE 1996 movie, "Independence Day," as enormous flying saucers darken the sky over dozens of cities around the world, a group of hopeful idealists assembles on the top of a Los Angeles skyscraper to greet whoever (or whatever) is manning the alien spaceship above.

"Welcome friends," and, "We love you," their hopeful signs say, as they gaze up at the monstrous hovering apparatus.

And then they are blown to bits by some kind of death ray.

The 1953 adaptation of Orson Wells' "War of the Worlds" has a similar scene. With a menacing meteorite smoking in its impact crater, and with serpentine, seemingly living probes emerging from the mist to survey the crowd that has gathered to see what on Earth has crashed in their backyard, a preacher remonstrates the military commander on the scene for being sure the intruders are hostile.

"No real attempt has been made to communicate with them," the preacher says, as he begins walking toward the aliens, reciting Psalm 23. And then the aliens burn him to cin-

And who can forget the 1998 spoof, "Mars Attacks"? In that wonderful movie, aliens with super brains roam the streets of Washington, D.C., murdering anybody who pauses to listen to their wicked promise: "Don't run! We are your friends!"

While humans may not, in real life, have yet had the chance to foolishly expose themselves to instant death at the hands of beings from another world, there are quite similar ways that some people show how silly they can be in believing they are always in con-

When we say this, we're not referring to the tragedy in Japan, wherein entire towns were wiped off the map and a four-unit nuclear power plant was seriously damaged by the tsunami that struck March 11. The Japanese knew they were living at the end of a tectonic gun, and while they took many precautions, they also knew a catastrophe was

Similarly, while people who live near the San Andreas Fault may be considered foolish for exposing themselves to the Big One, at least they do so voluntarily and with full


Where humans today show simple-minded foolishness is in their attempt to control nature's colossal forces with tiny machines. As in: The effort every winter to fine-tune the path of the Carmel River as it nears the sea. The idea is to minutely balance the habitat requirements of the river's steelhead trout with the need to protect nearby Scenic Road from erosion and the neighborhood just north of the lagoon from flooding.

Not long ago, the balancing act involved lowering the sandbar to a level mandated by federal wildlife officials, at which point the river was supposed to raise the lagoon to a height at which it would peacefully and harmlessly break through to the sea. But Mother Nature didn't cooperate, and homes were flooded.

Last week, county bulldozers naively directed the river to the northwest, based on a belief it would go where officials wanted it to. But Friday night, after heavy rains, the river blasted its own channel, taking away a large section of the Carmel River State Beach parking lot and threatening to do the same thing to Scenic Road.

If heavily armed, hostile aliens actually came to earth, surely some people would run to greet them, only to meet nasty deaths. And when people driving bulldozers whimsically try to tell a river what to do, the river just laughs.

Theater of the absurd Dear Editor,

The total mismanagement of the Carmel River breach has now, once again, caused irreparable damage to the infrastructure at Carmel River State Beach. The steelhead association, along with NOAA, have completely ignored the sound judgment of other organizations and caused the Carmel River to flow toward the northerly section of the beach. As you may recall, this was done in 2005 with devastating results, which now have been replicated. The state beach parking lot has been eroded, the bank protecting Scenic Road and the homes above has been washed out to sea and, as of Sunday, the sewer lines are close to being exposed and damaged.

In a frantic, futile attempt to save the parking lot, the Monterey County Public Works Department was bulldozing a southerly channel to divert the river - working past midnight on Friday night. However, it was way too late, as the river had formed a deep channel in a northerly direction and the southern channel was at too high an elevation. They were also hampered by the bedrock at that part of the beach, and the dangerous undertaking was doomed from the start. What a waste of taxpayer dollars!

The federal government's mandate to protect the steelhead habitat to the detriment of all other species and interests has to be stopped. A dozen meetings were held after the 2005 catastrophe where promises were made to NOT breach to the north. All these promises were once again ignored, and starting in October 2010 the northerly breach was promoted and implemented by the federal agencies. By breaching to the north, they caused the river drainage to slowly but surely eliminate the sand barrier between the ocean and the slope that protects the parking lot and Scenic road from surf erosion. The protestations were dismissed and ignored.

The crazy thing is, it seems as though they want it that way, and none of this is significantly helping the steelhead.

The magnificent sand dunes that extended from the CRSB parking lot to the lagoon, that had survived for more than 75 years, and that were sanctuary to the coastal buckwheat plant have been washed away, taking with them the federally protected habitat of the Smith's blue butterfly. The sand dunes also provided habitat for the federally protected Western snowy plover, which is specifically protected at the mouth of the Carmel River. All gone. Which is where the heads of these agencies should be as well. Enough is enough!

But first, make them pay for the substantial damage.

have raised, Burnett said he understands people's wariness and has arranged with PG&E to delay installing the new meters until after the utility and the California Public Utilities Commission finalize an opt-out program.

Collaborating with the company, Burnett facilitated a process allowing customers to call PG&E and request placement at the back of the line for smart-meter installation. He also said the utility agreed to delay placing the new meters at those customers' homes until after the opt-out process is formalized.

"This provides a bridge between now and whenever the PUC adopts an opt-out program," he explained Wednesday.

PG&E submitted its opt-out proposal to the PUC last week and estimated it would not be adopted until August or

September, at the earliest. According to the plan, the company would install the new meters at every customer's home and business, but the wireless technology would not be activated in cases where the customer objects. But customers who don't want the wireless transmitter activated would pay an up-front fee of \$135 to \$270, as well as a monthly fee of \$14 to \$20, though low-income customers would pay less. If a customer later terminates service or requests the company to activate the transmitter, the company will also levy "a cost-based 'exit' charge at that time."

In addition, PG&E proposed offering customers the opportunity to relocate their meters at estimated costs ranging from \$2,500 to \$4,500 for those who get their power from overhead wires and \$6,000 to \$11,000 for those whose power lines are under ground.

"I think it's an understandable starting place for them," Burnett said of the proposal. "The main question I have is whether they need to charge as much up front to disable a meter, particularly for people who want it disabled from day

one. It seems like it shouldn't be that expensive to disable the meter right when it's installed." He said the up-front tab could "be a significant impediment" for some customers who don't want the wifi meters activated.

The monthly fees make sense, he said, because customers who agree to the installation of smart meters should not be subsidizing those who don't.

According to Burnett, customers who want to opt out should call PG&E at (866) 743-0263 and ask to have their homes put at the end of the queue. After the opt-out program is in place, PG&E will contact those customers to determine whether they still want to opt out.

"It's actually a pretty small commitment that PG&E has made, but I hope it calms people down, so we can focus on other things," he said, adding that he had spoken with elected officials in other Peninsula cities this week and that PG&E agreed to extend the same offer to people living throughout the area. "I'll see whether we can get it county-wide."

single other road segment in Monterey County was evaluated in the General Plan EIR using the method (called "PTSF") that was used on Carmel Valley Road. All roadways, except Carmel Valley Road, were assessed by comparing average daily traffic with road capacities. Thus, it is simply false to claim that "almost no other community" uses the ADT measure that CVA favors. The ADT measure certainly is not a "nonstandard method."

In addition to being applied to every other road in the county, ADT has been used for the past quarter century in the twice-annual county evaluation of traffic on Carmel Valley Road itself. CVA seeks to have the county continue using those same ADT standards, rather than change to the much more lenient and less reliable PTSF approach.

Traffic levels on Carmel Valley Road still are within normal statistical fluctuations of their 10-year averages in spite of serious economic declines, including the closure of two well known resorts in the valley. There is no significant declining trend.

During six of the past 10 years, the vehicle count on at least one segment of Carmel Valley Road has exceeded the county's standard for acceptable traffic; in three of those years a second segment also exceeded the standard. In response to excessive traffic, the board of supervisors in 2002 established a moratorium on new applications for subdivision development in the Valley.

Currently Highway 1 just north of Carmel Valley Road, according to the 2009 county study of that segment, significantly exceeds its traffic capacity. About 78 percent of that traffic arises from Carmel Valley Road, and more than half of it arises from the narrow two lane segments.

The intent of CVA's efforts concerning traffic policy, as expressed by its president and its board, is to prevent traffic from becoming a worse bane to local residents than it already is during rush hours, and to preserve Carmel Valley's rural character.

according to the lawsuit. But on Oct. 8, 2010, five weeks after the burial, an SVMH administrator contacted Ahmed Musa, a Salinas warehouse worker, telling him it was possible they had given him and his wife the wrong body.

According to the lawsuit, the baby girl's body had been unknowingly stored in the hospital's morgue for five weeks "allowing it to decompose and mildew." The body was discovered after an employee noticed a fetus with Hana

The employee told Musa hospital staff found a stillborn baby in the morgue with his wife's name. He also requested the Musas come to the hospital so genetic testing could be done to confirm the body was theirs. The test confirmed it was their baby's body.

A judge will consider the SVMH motions on April 15 in a Monterey courtroom.

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

The decaying building's structural integrity has been compromised and restoration isn't possible. The only option is to demolish Brokaw Hall, Kuehl said.

Though the building is considered historic and would normally be subject to certain protections, the city has determined the building must be demolished under an "emergency measure," allowing the city to bypass the red tape regarding historic structures.

"Because the current situation is what the building code considers to be an emergency, the normal steps delineated in the city and state codes to demolish a historic structure do not have to be followed," according to city manager Tom Frutchey in a Tuesday email to council members.

In a February Pine Cone article about Brokaw Hall, Pacific Grove resident and historian Esther Trosow said the building should be remodeled and used as a science or interpretive center.

This week, Trosow questioned whether the building's removal might affect the monarch's sensitive habitat. A 1998 report by Stuart Weiss indicated that Brokaw Hall played a part in wind and temperature within the butterfly sanctuary.

Also, Trosow said the city council must approve work done on trees in the sanctuary during October and April and wondered if the demolition could wait until May to be consistent with the city's regulations.

"I realize it's not a tree," Trosow said, "but surely the demo would have as big an impact as a tree."

Though Brokaw Hall was slated to be fenced off this week, Frutchey said the city will need to allow for "an exten-

Long history

In 1990, 69 percent of P.G. residents passed a measure to purchase 2.2 acres between Grove Acre and Ridge Road for \$1.4 million from its private owner as part of the Butterfly Habitat Bonds restoration effort. The sale included Brokaw Hall, which was part of the Del Monte Military Academy in the early 1900s.

After the purchase, the city decided to tear down the duplex, a plan that was halted after residents Pat Herrgott and her sister, Sally, told the city the building was historic and should be saved.

About the same time, however, the city council rejected a plan to turn the hall into a community center and instructed crews to pull out the electrical and plumbing systems in the building and boarded it up, later placing faux windows on the structure.

Since then, the city has ignored the building.

Crews will save two of the building's historic fireplaces and chimneys, according to Frutchey.

Though there was a drive by some in the early- and mid-1990s to use the building as a community or education center, the idea never came to fruition.

City budget director Jim Becklenberg said he didn't have figures on how much it would cost to demolish the building, a stone's throw from the eucalyptus trees where thousands of monarchs cluster every fall and winter.

1040 tip: Don't overlook home ownership's many tax benefits

SO YOU'VE taken the plunge and bought a new home, capitalizing on today's low interest rates and attractive home prices.

Your new home will undoubtedly bring you and your family much happiness in the years ahead - especially when it comes time to pay your taxes.

As the April 15 federal and state tax deadline rapidly approaches, homeowners shouldn't forget the many tax benefits that are available to them. The good news is that you can deduct many home-related expenses, and the savings on your taxes can easily add up to thousands or even tens of thousands of dollars.

Filing your tax return

may become a little more complicated. Instead of filling out the simple IRS form 1040EZ you'll need to file the 1040 long form and Schedule A, on which you will list all your deductable homeownership expenses. But the extra time will pay off in valuable

savings.

Because the tax rules for homeowners are more complicated, I recommend you consult with a tax professional before deciding what you can and cannot deduct. But in general, you can figure on a number of significant tax

breaks associated with homeownership, including:

■ Mortgage interest. The biggest tax break is reflected in the house payment you make each month since, for most homeowners, the bulk of that check goes toward interest. In most cases, the interest homeowners pay is deductible. This may mean a reduced tax bill overall and a bigger refund.

■ Property taxes. As a homeowner, you are entitled to deduct payments of real estate tax on your property if you claimed itemized deductions on your tax return. The

IRS allows you to deduct real estate taxes on your primary residence and any other homes you own. There are no limits on the dollar amount of real estate taxes you can deduct (unless you are subject to the Alternate Minimum Tax).

■ Loan deductions. When homeowners borrow against the equity of their home to finance other investments, the interest they pay on the new loan is also tax deductible, within IRS guidelines. Generally, equity debts of \$100,000 or less are fully deductible.

■ Vacation homes. Tax breaks aren't just limited to your primary residence. If you're fortunate enough to have a vacation home, you can the mortgage interest on that property is fully deductible, too, within IRS guidelines. You can even rent out your second property for a short period of time and still take advantage of the deduction. But be careful - renting it out too much could turn it into a rental property with different tax rules.

n Homeowner exemptions. Depending on

where you live, certain real estate property tax exemptions apply. In California, there's a \$7,000 exemption from property tax assessed value for owner-occupied homes, for example. Homeowners should check with local tax consultants to see if they, or their home, are eligible for any additional exemptions.

■ Improvements on your residence: While you generally cannot deduct improvements to your home on your taxes, such items can lower your tax bite down the road. Improvements such as a family room addition, a kitchen makeover, or a pool increase the "basis" of your home – i.e., the purchase price plus improvements. When you go to



"She was up and awake and walking toward me," Hovir said. Her elderly client is nearly deaf but somehow had heard her yelling downstairs. "I screamed into her ear, 'We've got a fire! Get out! Get out!""

Hovir then dialed 911 and said her conversation with the dispatcher felt interminable.

"I didn't think I'd ever get off the phone with that guy," she said. "The smoke was pouring in," and so thick she could barely see.

The women escaped and sought refuge with neighbors as fire crews quickly extinguished the blaze. The contents of Hovir's room, where the electrical fire started, were destroyed, and the rest of the interior suffered smoke and water damage, but the house is structurally sound.

At the time of the fire, Hovir believed "there was a hairline chance that Pansy would have gotten out of there," and after the bodies of the other three cats — two older females named Thelma and Louise, and a younger littermate of Pansy's named Billy — were found, she held out hope.

"Pansy and Billy had both been asleep on the bed with me," Hovir said, while the older cats spent most of their time upstairs with Horton. In the chaos of the fire, they lost track of the cats and feared the worst.

"But if ever cat ever could make it, Pansy would be the one to do it, because she was a little miracle cat, from the moment I met her," Hovir said.

When she and Horton took Pansy and Billy in as rescue kittens a couple of years ago, the little female was a malnourished runt. "She was so tiny, and her head was misshapen," she remembered. "She didn't even look like a cat. She looked like a sci-fi creature you'd see in a movie."

But a high-calorie kitten diet quickly took effect, "and she just came into her own," Hovir said. "I got a lot of inspiration from her"

sell, the higher your basis is, the less you will have to pay in capital gains taxes, if you pay at all.

■ Tax-free profits. The government allows homeowners to keep tax-free profits from the sale of a home that has been their primary residence for at least two years. Single taxpayers don't owe taxes on the first \$250,000 of profit from the sale of a principal residence, while married homeowners get \$500,000 when filing jointly.

These tax savings can add up quickly. On a \$500,000, 30year mortgage loan at 5 percent, for example, a homeowner would end up paying nearly \$25,000 in the first year in interest alone. At a 33 percent federal and state income tax rate, the mortgage interest deduction alone would save more than \$8,200 in that tax year! But again, tax laws are complicated, and everyone's tax situation is different. Consult your tax professional to see how the rules apply to your situation.

vehicle accident. Two patients transported Code 2 to CHOMP.


