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# Pawn shop's tip leads to major jewelry stash, arrest

■ Police: Ocean Ave. home was 'cleaned out'

BURGLARS cleaned out a home on Ocean Avenue while the owners were out of town, and a parollee has been arrested for fencing the goods after some of the loot turned up at a San Bernardino pawn shop, according to police.

Louis and Sandra Lum, who live at Ocean and Santa Rita, discovered the burglary after returning from vacation and reported it to police March 9. Carmel Police detective Rachelle Lightfoot said it appeared the their home had been ransacked during multiple visits by the burglars. Homeowners across the street also had a few items stolen. Fraudulent ATM charges indicated the break-ins occurred in February.

"There were a lot of different things taken," Lightfoot said, including jewelry, clothing, furs and expensive belts. Figuring some of the items must have been fenced, she started calling pawn shops.

An itemized list sent by a San Bernardino County pawn shop March 16 rang a bell with Lightfoot, because it indicated there were "oodles of jewelry pawned," she said.

"I called the pawn shop, and they said a guy and girl had been in there," she said. "They were going to Las Vegas and supposedly needed some money."

She learned the man was Joseph Indorato, a 40-year-old Carmel Valley resident, and the woman was his girlfriend, Leanne Eastman. 38.

Lightfoot asked a San Bernardino deputy to photograph the jewelry in the shop, and when she forwarded the images to Sandra Lum, "She said, 'That's my jewelry!'"

# Highway 1 through Big Sur could reopen April 25

JUST A month after a stretch of Highway 1 near Rocky Creek Bridge fell into the ocean, highway officials announced this week it could reopen to one-lane traffic between Big Sur and Carmel as early as April 25. "The installation of soil nails is 75 percent complete," said Big Sur Chamber of Commerce President Kirk Gafill.

Unfortunately, despite good weather, a slide at Alder Creek cut off Big Sur from the south again Thursday.

The Rocky Creek project includes hammering more than 200 soil nails (similar to rebar) into the steep hillside where the highway collapsed. The installation of vertical nails is complete, and the focus now is on the more difficult task, which involves sinking nails horizontally into the earth just below the collapsed section of road.

The contractor of the \$2.5 million project is Condon Johnson & Associates of Oakland. Construction is under way

24 hours a day.

When the highway is reopened, traffic will be relegated to the inside lane and controlled by a traffic light.

"The goal is to keep the distance between the lights and

the timing of the lights as short as possible to minimize delays for through traffic," Gafill reported.

For the past two

For the past two weeks, highway officials have warned that a 5-ton restriction for vehicles would likely be imposed, prohibiting many motor homes,

# PIT BULL TO BE KILLED AFTER ATTACK

A DACHSHUND seriously injured last Sunday after a pit bull under the care of the SPCA bit him on the head at a park in Pacific Grove has been released from the UC Davis vet hospital, while the larger dog will be euthanized.

The pit-bull mix, named Heidi, was up for adoption at an SPCA for Monterey County booth at Jewell Park April 10 during the Good Old Days event suddenly attacked the dachshund, named Harry. Both the dogs were on leashes at the time.

"The pit bull grabbed onto his head and muzzle and just bit," SPCA executive director Gary Tiscornia told The Pine Cone. "Large dogs are very strong, and Heidi did a lot of damage."

An SPCA volunteer rushed the dachshund and his owner, Ianna Ennis, to Ocean

View Veterinary Hospital in P.G. where the dog was given a morphine injection for pain. But the dog's injuries were so severe the clinic couldn't treat them. The dachshund was then taken to a Santa Cruz veterinary clinic, which also was unable to treat him.

"Then they went to Davis," Tiscornia said.

Vets at Davis treated Harry for extensive injuries to his jaw, and the dog is expected to be OK.

"His muzzle was pretty heavily damaged," Tiscornia said. "He was discharged from UC Davis with a prognosis for a full recovery."

The SPCA is awaiting the veterinary report from the university's animal hospital, Tiscornia said.

# Former deputy sues new sheriff, claims illegal firing

A VETERAN Monterey County Sheriff's deputy has filed a lawsuit against Sheriff Scott Miller and the county, alleging he was wrongly terminated from his job when Miller took over from former Sheriff Mike Kanalakis.

In a lawsuit filed April 1, Ed Lorenzana alleges Miller who took the top cop post in January — fired him without cause, violating his rights as a member of the Monterey County Deputy Sheriff's Association.

"As a permanent employee holding the position of sheriff's commander ... [Lorenzana's] employment could not be diminished or terminated but for cause," according to the

Lorenzana wants the county to reinstate his job, according to the lawsuit filed in Monterey County Superior Court.

In 2005, Lorenzana was promoted to commander and was in the position until September 2008, when he says Kanalakis promoted him to chief deputy sheriff — a position that put Lorenzana in an "at will" employment status, meaning he no longer had the union protection afforded to him in his lesser

On Dec. 18, 2010, with a new sheriff about to take over, Kanalakis removed Lorenzana from the deputy chief post and put him back in his previous sheriff's commander position, according to the lawsuit, which would have restored his

However, on Jan. 13, soon after taking office, Miller notified Lorenzana he was being "released" from his post.

A week later, Lorenzana and his attorney met with Miller and asserted "he could not be terminated but for cause." Despite that, Miller fired the veteran deputy, the suit says.

In February, Lorenzana appealed his termination with the county but was notified on Feb. 16 the appeal was denied.

Miller and the county contend that in January, Lorenzana was still deputy chief, not commander, and therefore was an "at will" worker when Miller fired him, the lawsuit says.


Miller declined to comment on specifics of the suit but told The Pine Cone that Lorenzana and his attorney have "a perspective on what they think his job status was, and we have a different perspective."

Lorenzana contends Miller and the county failed to "state any charges upon which the disciplinary action was based" and did not provide him with the reason he was terminated, according to his suit.

The defendants also "stripped Lorenzana of a protected property interest in continued employment" without affording him pre-removal due process and a right to an administrative appeal.

The job loss has "severely undercut" Lorenzana's ability to support himself and he will "suffer irreparable injury to his credit rating, his ability to assist in his children's education and otherwise has suffered a loss of standing in the community," according to the lawsuit.


Speakers will share information on various topics, and the fair will include demonstrations, live music, food and children's activities

Food vendors, including Me and the Hound and Fluff Cupcakery, will be on hand to ensure no one goes hungry.



# Commission irked by renovation work differing from the permit

THE OWNERS of an aging house at San Antonio and Fourth avenues came under fire from the planning commission Wednesday night for making changes to their renovation plans without city approval.

The modifications they made — such as installing different windows and doors — could cost tens of thousands of

Associate planner Marc Wiener told commissioners April 13 that Steve and Barbara Walker had deviated from the plans drawn by architect John Matthams and approved by the planning commission a year ago. Those drawings called for new siding and roofing, doors and windows, stucco columns, wrought iron and a spiral staircase to give the home on the triangular lot a Mediterranean look.

But with renovations complete, a recent examination revealed the Walkers had made several changes without permission, according to Wiener. Instead of a single rectangular garage door, they installed a single door but decided to construct a double-arch opening and with a column painted down the middle to make it look like two doors. They also installed nine exterior lights, used different windows and doors than those on the plans and placed two small statues on the entry stairs. In addition, they planned to erect a lamppost at the edge of the property.

After Wiener noted the discrepancies, the Walkers applied for retroactive approval. Wiener recommended denying the faux double garage door, removing three of the outdoor lights and replacing those that "look like bells for decorative pur-

poses" with a "more standard (less decorative) light fixture." He said the lamppost should be denied, and the two small statues "are an ostentatious design treatment and create the appearance of a grand entry." In addition, they were located in the front setback, which is against the rules. Finally, he advised commissioners to consider whether the doors and windows appear overly decora-

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Commission members had other complaints, including faux columns on a pair of upstairs windows that were not constructed according to the drawings and more questionable

Steve Walker defended his home and pointed out the remodel vastly improved it. The bell-shaped lights were inspired by the Carmel Mission and are designed to direct light downward so as to avoid glare, he argued.

And he would have liked to have double garage doors. "I wanted two doors, but that gives my wife 2 inches to get through," he said. "She's not comfortable with that."

Walker also said he didn't realize he couldn't choose windows with different mullion patterns and a different front door simply because he liked them better than those in the

As for the statues, he said, "The kids gave me those for my birthday, so I'll put them somewhere else, I guess."

Those "statues" are nothing more than 12-inch-tall garden ornaments, Barbara Walker pointed out. Filled with emotion and saying they had put their heart and soul into the renovations, she decried the commissioners' picking on her home and said no one had wanted to buy the old house and fix it up to the tune of a \$1 million remodel. She also said passersby stop to tell her how much they like it.

"This is a very difficult situation, and I think we are all feeling that way," responded chair Jan Reimers. "What we're trying to deal with is a plan that was approved and a plan that was built, and there are some discrepancies, so I think we have to move on this in some way."

Commissioner Victoria Beach said she could accept the

other modifications if the Walkers installed the windows as designed — an expensive prospect — while commissioner Keith Paterson focused on the principle of the matter.

"It's the fact it has deviated from the approved plans; that cannot be," he said. "People make their own changes without coming back to the commission."

Commissioner Steve Dallas proposed requesting a full set of architectural drawings depicting the house as it has been constructed, so commissioners could better compare the approved plans with the as-built plans, and other commissioners agreed they wanted to review those drawings before deciding on the Walkers' requests.





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# Buyer of \$8.7 million Carmel inn wants his money back

THE OWNER of an \$8.7 million Carmel hotel is suing the previous owners for fraud and breach of contract, alleging

they failed to disclose the hotel had dry rot, mold, termites and other problems when it was purchased three years ago.

In 2008, Intrapec Investments, which state records say is headed by Iftikhar

Ahmed, bought the Carmel Resort Inn on Carpenter Street from Tong Pyong Kim and the Kim Family Charitable Trust for \$8.7 million, according to a lawsuit filed by Intrapec against the family April 8.

But Intrapec claims the Kims failed to disclose — as required by California law — that the 20-unit inn's water pipes, sewer, electrical and room key systems and fireplaces were "defective." The lawsuit also alleges the inn had dry rot, a termite infestation, mold, roof leaks and defective spas and tubs.

During escrow, the Kims said "they were unaware of any known material facts or defects affecting the value of the property," according to the suit.

"When [the Kims] made these representations ... they knew them to be false and they made such with the intent to deceive and defraud ..." according to the lawsuit filed in Monterey County Superior Court.

Last month, Intrapec notified the Kims it wanted to rescind the contract, give the inn back to the family and receive a refund of \$2,077,000 Intrapec paid toward the purchase, plus the value of the improvements and repair it has made to the hotel.

But the Kim family refused the offer, prompting Intrapec to file the suit, which

alleges the Kims breached the sales contract by failing to disclose the alleged problems.

In California, property owners are required to disclose to buyers any known defects or hazards of a structure.

"Had [Intrapec] known the actual facts concerning the defective conditions of the property ... it would have not closed its \$8.7 million purchase of the property," the suit says.

The California Secretary of State's website indicates Intrapec Investments LLC was established in 2005 and is based in Campbell.

The Kim family could not be reached for comment, and an attorney for Intrapec didn't respond to questions by The Pine Cone.

The purchase included \$4 million for the inn's buildings and land, \$4.6 million for business and \$100,000 for its furniture, fixtures, accessories and other property, according to the lawsuit.

The LLC paid the Kims \$1.5 million at the close of escrow with a \$7.2 million remaining balance. With interest, Intrapec has paid \$2,077,000 toward the purchase, the suit indicates.

Besides rescinding the contract, return of the \$2 million and other damages, Intrapec is seeking attorneys fees and costs.



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weight bags are easily caught in the wind, and that even bags which are properly discarded can "find their way into the marine environment," where they "photodegrade into small pieces which can make their way into the food chain." The city also claimed that "there are many instances of marine animals being injured or dying from ingesting or choking on plastic debris in the ocean."

Paper bags, on the other hand, "biodegrade and are less likely to be blown out to sea," the city said.

However, the Manhattan Beach City Council acknowledged that paper bags are heavier than plastic and require more electricty to produce, and that increased use of paper bags could also hurt the environment. But overall, Manhattan Beach concluded, these negative effects would not be significant, and it enacted the ban.

But manufacturers of plastic bags, calling themselves the "Save the Plastic Bag Coalition," vehemently disagreed, claiming there was no evidence plastic bags were a "continuing significant problem for marine animals." Furthermore, the manufacturers argued, increased paper bag production would also increase "consumption of nonrenewable energy," not to mention "emission of climate-changing greenhouse gases and acid rain."

An EIR was needed, they said, to make sure "the public would know the true facts about the ways in which paper bags are worse for the environment."

In siding with the plastic bag manufacturers, the appeals court said it was not taking a position on whether the plastic bag ban should be implemented. But the California Environmental Quality Act sets a "very low threshold" for the requirement of an EIR and reflects "a preference for resolving doubts in favor of environmental review," the judges noted. All the plastic bag association had to do, they said, was make a "fair argument" that an EIR was required. Since they did, it must be prepared, the appeals court ruled.


But one of the judges, Richard Mosk, dissented and called for a more limited interpretation of CEQA.

Under the majority's ruling, Mosk said, an EIR might be required for "the kind and amount of supplies ordered by a public agency," for a decision whether to publish books and periodicals on paper, and even a decision whether to shift to 'from cloth towels or hand blowers in restrooms to paper."

None of those impacts would be substantial enough to require an EIR, Mosk said, and neither would banning plastic shopping bags.

Requiring an EIR in this case would be "unreasonable," he said, and would require the "expenditure of public monies for no corresponding benefit."

The California Supreme Court will have the last word.



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
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# Big Sur runners stage 'Relay for Rachael'

INDING THE right wines for a wedding — wines with broad appeal, good quality and an affordable price — can be daunting. Fortunately, Monterey County is home to numerous wineries that produce a wide range of varietals and blends, including entry-level offerings that are as wallet-friendly as they are palatefriendly.

With so many tasting rooms open to the public, shopping is fun, too.

"Getting out to one of the tasting rooms is a great way to sample selections and do it in a cost-effective manner, instead of buying six bottles of Chardonnay," from a store to take home and taste, commented Rhonda Motil, executive director of the Monterey County Vintners & Growers Association that represents dozens of local wineries and grape growers. "They can visit tasting rooms for a nominal fee, if any fee at all."

It's advisable to call ahead and make an appointment, in order to ensure you receive the attention and information you need. Some wineries will waive the tasting fee for customers who purchase wines, and most offer a 10 percent discount if wine is bought by the case.

Motil suggested soon-to-be brides and grooms consider stopping in the tasting room at Hahn Family Wines, located in South Monterey County on Foothill Road. More important than the fact it's in a beautiful location overlooking the Salinas Valley, many of the wines are affordably priced, and the selection is diverse, as Hahn sells several different labels. Such a wide range provides the opportunity to select more than just one white wine and one red wine, Motil pointed out.

The tasting room, located at the winery at 37700 Foothill Road, is open 11 a.m. to 4 p.m. weekdays and 11 a.m. to 5 p.m. on weekends. Call (866) 925-7994 or visit www.hahnestates.com.

Motil also recommended Ventana Vineyards, another Monterey County producer with a wide variety of wines and prices. Ventana is also convenient, since it operates a seven-day-a-week tast-




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# Men's trend in wedding attire for 2011: casual, with big bow-ties

Whatever you decide, take a casual approach to selecting what you'll wear to your wedding. As long as you have the consent of your soon-to-be-bride, anything is possible.



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

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

ing room at 2999 Monterey-Salinas Highway above Tarpy's Roadhouse near Canyon del Rey in Monterey. Of course, anyone who wants to visit the vineyards and winery can make the drive down to South County to taste wines there on the weekends.

Ventana's signature Gold Stripe Chardonnay, for example, combines steel- and oak-barrel-fermented juice in a crisp, accessible wine that is often available by the case at a deep discount. The winery also pro-

duces a popular dry rosé, as well as a couple of lush reds that sell for \$19 per bottle.

# Tasting in town

Couples who would prefer to taste and buy wine in Carmel and Carmel Valley have plenty of options, too.

Unlike many other local wineries, Cima Collina has a program that caters to the betrothed, according to winemaker Annette Hoff, including free tasting for the bride and groom to select their wines, free delivery of wine to the event site and discounts of 20 percent to 30 percent off retail price for purchases of full cases.

The winery produces "a variety of wines to suit any taste, menu or time of year," she said, including several different Pinot Noirs, a few Chardonnays, a Riesling, a Sauvignon Blanc, a meritage and a red blend called Howlin' Good Red that benefits the SPCA for Monterey County.

tasting rooms offer viable wedding wines, as well. Among them is Bernardus, and its Monterey County Sauvignon Blanc and Monterey County Pinot Noir are popular for large parties due to their accessibility and affordability, according to Christina Gray, who handles sales and marketing.

Made with fruit from Ventana Vineyards and Griva Vineyards, with a little Napa Valley Semillon thrown in for good measure, the 2009 Bernardus Monterey County Sauvignon Blanc is bright and citrusy, with bare hints of grassiness and minerality. The wine sells for \$16 per bottle, with a 10 percent discount on purchases by the case. (Wine club members receive 20 percent off.)

The 2008 Bernardus Monterey County Pinot Noir, featuring grapes grown in the Arroyo Seco and Santa

Lucia Highlands areas of the Salinas Valley, is full bodied but not overbearing, with soft fruit and a bit of spice. It sells for \$19 per bottle and is also offered by the case at a 10 percent discount (20 percent for club members).

Gray recommended wedding-wine shoppers call tasting room manager Stan Rogalsky to arrange a tasting, which will be complimentary.

"They would want to set aside a time that they could really have a one-on-one type interaction," she said, as opposed to just showing up on a busy Saturday afternoon.

The Bernadus tasting room is located at 5 West Carmel Valley Road in the Village and is open seven days a week from 11 a.m. to 5 p.m. Call (831) 659-1900. www.bernardus.com

# Ooey gooey cheese (with wine), 'peanut butter and belly,' and dirt

A WOMAN who knows more about cheese than most people know about anything — and can wax so poetically about a grilled cheese sandwich that those within earshot are prone to swoon — will lead two seminars during this month's Pebble Beach Food & Wine that are certain to be as tasty as they are interesting.

"I got into cheese, really, because cheese got into me,' explained the charismatic Laura Werlin, a San Francisco Bay Area resident and the author of five books, all on the subject of cheese. Werlin will lead "Seduction: A Love Affair Between Cheese & Wine" starring the wines of Domaine Serene on Friday, April 29, from 3:30 to 4:45 p.m., and "MELT: Grilled Cheese & Great Wines" on Saturday, April 30, from 10 to 11:15 a.m.

Werlin is highly qualified to speak on the subject. She worked behind the scenes in

television before making the transition to food writer, when she was struck by the desire and need to write about American cheeses.

"I was just possessed by this idea, so I did it — and that led to the next four books on cheese," she told The Pine Cone last week. "I found a passion. It sort of found me, and I sort of found it."

Werlin said she enjoys writing to enhance people's appreciation and comfort level.

"Walking into the Carmel Cheese Shop, on one hand it's a welcoming thing, because they're all so good there and they're all so helpful," she said. "But it can be intimidating at the same time, because for many people, it's like walking into a store where you don't speak the language."

Last month, she released her latest book, "Grilled Cheese, Please!" — which is also the inspiration for one of her Pebble Beach seminars.

"It's amazing how busy grilled cheese can keep you," she commented.

Despite the fact most people choose beer, "I've discovered it's really fun to pair with wine," Werlin observed. During the demo, she will have guests try the unmelted cheeses alongside the wines, and then taste them again in grilled-cheese-and-wine pairings.

"It's tasty and educational and fun, all in one bite," she said. "I encourage people to come down and see what grilled cheese and

wine are like together."

She'll be making the double-Cheddar-and-tomatojam sandwich featured on the cover of her new book.

"These are not your mother's grilled cheese," Werlin said.

For her talk featuring "fantabulous Domaine Serene," Werlin selected cheeses mostly from the Pacific Northwest — except the unusual triple cream goat's-milk brie from New York — to complement the Oregon wines.

Verlin

"Goats aren't known for having super high fat content, so it takes a lot of milk to get enough cream," she explained. "But

the texture and flavor of that cheese pair well with the Cote Sud Vineyard Chardonnay." Werlin said she enjoyed working out the

Werlin said she enjoyed working out the pairings, tasting the wines alone so she could avoid any distractions.

"There's nothing like opening a bottle of wine you know is really special when it's just you," she said. "If you didn't feel special before you opened that bottle, you really feel special afterward."

Last year's PBF&W was her first, and she's eager to return.

"I was just blown away by the enthusiasm," she said. "And the ability to just wander by the world's most famous chefs and say a casual, 'Hello.""

She spoke of the incomparable setting that is Pebble Beach, "and the spirit, the feeling, the joie de vivre that people bring to the event. It's 72 hours of good moods, and it's the ultimate getaway."

## ■ Rio revelations

Cy Yontz, the self-trained leader of the kitchen at the Rio Grill, exhibits his skillful creativity and unconventional style in the remarkable dishes joining the menu as restaurateur Tony Tollner updates the Crossroads institution that has been in business for nearly three decades. The new offerings — along with subtle and not-so-subtle changes to the interior of the restaurant and bar — will be unveiled at an April 20 celebration benefiting Court-Appointed Special Advocates of Monterey County.

With so many longtime fans, the Rio must stay true to its roots, so favorites like the Chinese chicken salad and the turkey-bacon-avocado sandwich with chutney will remain, as will the overall look and feel of the restaurant. "We've been around a long time and want to be respectful of what our customers have helped create," Tollner said. "But I also have a responsibility to keep them interested and on the edge of their seats."

Contributing to the edge-of-their-seats factor, Yontz developed a number of new dishes — a task he found neither dif-

ficult nor daunting. A man who eschews the title, "chef," in favor of "cook," Yontz said he rarely has to actively think about a new concoction, because "I'm sleeping and dreaming about it." He's been at it long enough that he simply knows what flavors and ingredients work well together, and he's a fan of pushing boundaries, too.

A sneak preview this week afforded an indulgent sampling of some of the fruits of his labor. Among the small bites, don't miss the chile-cured pork belly topped with the Rio's signature chutney — tender, slightly smoky, caramelized meat offset by the cool, tangy, slightly spicy relish.

Ceviche fans will be delighted to find a new trio: shrimp marinated in a tomato-habañero broth in the Ecuadoran style, traditional Peruvian style with melt-in-your-mouth tender scallops in a light lime marinade, and ahi in coconut milk and ginger.

The entrée of Dr. Pepperbraised short ribs over corn and queso fresco whipped potatoes is to die for. (And Yontz swears he only uses the name-brand soda in his kitchen.)

Then there was dessert "... of sorts." Looking a little more like lunch, "Peanut Butter and Belly" arrived: a sandwich of lightly toasted bread, peanut butter (he likes Jiffy), homemade olallieberry jam and pork belly served with a little basket of cornmeal-encrusted fennel fries and guajillo ketchup. Not your typical flourless choco-

late cake or trio of sorbets — and decadent and satisfying in a really fun way.

Beyond the kitchen, Tollner is making subtle changes in plates and glassware, replacing the plastic-encased menu with a leather-and-paper version, and using iPads for the wine list

The one area seeing a total overhaul is the bar, which Tollner wants to return to a "temple of intoxication," from a "beverage dispensation station." The espresso machine will lose its place of prominence and be moved to the kitchen, while the glassware and register will be relocated so the bartender can face the customer while mixing a drink or ringing up a tab. Tollner said he's bringing in some 50 new spirits and is hoping people will feel compelled to indulge their curiosity by trying out new cocktails.

# ■ Rallying for Rachael

Hundreds of supporters turned out at Hidden Valley Sunday night for Be the Light, a fundraiser for photographer Rachael Short, who was paralyzed in a car accident last November. Chefs prepared sumptuous bites, donating more than needed to feed the masses. Not one thing disappointed,

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but Brandon Miller's three-pork paella, Christopher Caul's cassoulet (which even included foie gras), Ted Walter's smoky ceviche and Michael Jones' whole pig stood out. More than a half-dozen wineries — such as Caraccioli, which offered its delicious sparkling rosé and brut alongside its still wines — poured generously, often with the winemaker or owner doing the work. Live and silent auctions of dozens of items, ranging from rare rock photographs, to weeklong vacations, generated competitive bidding and lots of cash.

Mollie O'Neal, who helped stage the event, said it raised more than \$100,000 but said Short needs far more.

Her co-organizer, Jones, found the evening inspiring on multiple levels.

"The photographers, the chefs and the food workers rallied for this girl in the depths of the worst dining recession in memory — and happily! There was too much food!" he said. "And the wineries! Same deal: Many of them have, 'Go away,' right on their voicemail because they get hit so much

Also, an all-star collection of local musicians — including past and present members of his band — will pay tribute to Tucker Saturday, April 23, at the Marina Lounge on Fisherman's Wharf in Monterey. The party will celebrate the Broadway Blues Band's 30th anniversary and the release of Tucker's fifth recording, "Something New."

## Crossing paths with fame and fortune

Tucker came to the Monterey Peninsula in 1967 when, as a soldier in the U.S. Army, he was transferred from Germany to Fort Ord. After joining a local band called The Invaders, Tucker became a fixture at Jimbo's Show Lounge, which was located at Fremont and Broadway in Seaside. It was there that "Broadway" became synonymous with Tucker's name, and the young singer crossed with paths with a guitarist who was about to turn rock 'n' roll upside down.

In 1967, the Monterey Fairgrounds hosted the Monterey Pop Festival. Among its many memorable moments, the festival went down in rock 'n' roll history as the time and place where the world discovered Jimi Hendrix, who capped an unforgettable performance by setting his guitar on fire.

On the last day of the festival, Hendrix left the hippies back at the fairgrounds and headed over to Jimbo's so he could play some blues. The Invaders and Tucker, meanwhile, were on stage at Jimbo's. Late in the afternoon, Tucker was introduced to Hendrix.

"I had never heard of Jimi until the festival, and I didn't even know what he looked like [until they met]," Tucker, 67, told The Pine Cone this week. "I asked him if he wanted to play a song."

Since Hendrix had destroyed his own guitar by pouring lighter fluid on it and striking a match, he had to borrow another. He got up on stage by himself and started playing a slow bluesy version of his own composition, "Red House."

"This lady said to me, 'Go up on stage and sing with him," Tucker remembered. "I asked him if I could sing with him and he said 'ok'. I didn't know the lyrics to the song, so I made up my own. He played solo behind me and I looked back at him. We had some fun that day."

Over the course of his lengthy musical career, Tucker rubbed elbows with many of the greatest blues and soul singers of his generation. Before he was old enough to drink, Sam Cooke took him to see B.B. King perform live in Memphis. A short time later, he watched Otis Redding rehearse in a Memphis club. Later, he jokingly introduced Marvin Gaye as his cousin, "Ray Tucker," when the Motown legend showed up unexpectedly at Jimbo's Show Lounge and wanted to sing.

## The long road back to the blues

Tucker's own musical dreams, however, were interrupted by the Vietnam War. Just as he was making a name for himself as a singer on the Monterey Peninsula, he was shipped off to Southeast Asia. When he returned in 1969, "the music had changed," he recalled. "Nobody was playing the blues anymore."

Tucker eventually returned to the Monterey Peninsula, where he worked during the 1970s at series of jobs, including cooking at the Asilomar Conference Center. There, he met a porter, the late harmonica player David Holehouse, who invited him to join his group, the Holehouse Blues Band. That group evolved into the Broadway Blues Band, which played its first gig April 23, 1981, at the Carmel Mission Inn.

Over the next 30 years — supported by ever-changing roster of musicians — the band became one of the Monterey Peninsula's most enduring and best-loved acts. According to onetime bass player Gary Souza, the band has featured at least 44 members. He estimated that "18 or 20" will show up

# Museum showcases wildflower bloom, hosts 50th annual exhibit

FROM THE lush coastal bluffs of Big Sur, to the soonto-be-golden rolling hills of Steinbeck Country, Monterey County is ablaze in color as spring wildflowers light up the landscape.

For three days — Friday, Saturday and Sunday, April 15the display of wildflowers will bloom brightest in downtown Pacific Grove as the P.G. Museum of Natural History hosts the Monterey Bay Chapter of the Native Plant Society's 50th annual Wildflower Show.

The show will be the culmination of a remarkable effort by a group of volunteers to gather as many different wildflowers as possible in the days before the exhibit.

"My wife and I have driven 442 miles over the past two days," reported Brian Leneve, an NPS member who is helping to organize the event.

Like many of the volunteers, Leneve and his wife drive the back roads of Monterey County in search of wildflowers.

"They scour the Central Coast collecting samples," explained Lori Mannel, museum director. "This part of California has a huge biodiversity, so it's not surprising they're able to find such a rich assortment of flowers.

Typically, the volunteers collect about 600 different wildflowers. The record is 735, which is unlikely to be broken this year, in large part because it just hasn't been warm enough. "It's been a cold, wet spring," conceded Leneve.

This year's show has also been hampered by the lack of access to Big Sur due to road construction.

Still, the volunteers' haul is likely going to be quite impressive. "This is the largest wildflower show in the Northern and Western hemispheres," Mannel said. "Only Australia has a bigger show."

Even in a down year, the display promises to be dazzling. "We usually have something new to show every year," Leneve noted.

The day before the show, the wildflowers are assembled, identified, labeled and prepared for display. Doing much of this work is local native plant icon and event co-founder Vern Yadon. "He identifies about 550 plants in eight hours," said Leneve of the 81-year Yadon, who wasn't part of the collecting effort for the first time since he and Beatrice Howitt started the show in 1961. "Vern has been the man for 50 years."

In addition to the wildflower exhibit, the event will feature Ohlone basket-weaving demonstrations by Linda Yaman (Friday at 11 a.m. and Saturday at noon); wildflower sketch classes with John (Jack) Muir Laws (Saturday, at 11 a.m. and Sunday at 11 a.m.); a workshop by Rebecca Burgess about using plants to dye fabrics (Sunday at 11 a.m.); and workshops by Susan Hubbard about native plant families (Sunday at 11 a.m. and 1 p.m.).

Artist Rome Brumfield will talk Saturday at 11 a.m. about his sculpture show in the museum's native plant garden. Artist Jayson Fann, meanwhile, will talk Saturday at noon about his "Spirit Nest," which is also displayed in the garden.

The event will also feature daily tours of the garden, a sale of plants by the Native Revival Nursery, and arts and crafts for children. "There's something for everyone here," Mannel added. "Our mission is to inspire discovery, wonder and stewardship of our natural world and this event ties into that."

Admission is free for members of the museum and \$5 for non-members. The museum is located at 165 Forest Ave. For more information, call (831) 648-5716 or visit www.pgmuseum.org.

Pacific Grove Animal Control officer Liz Conti-Yeo wasn't on duty at the time of the attack but said a P.G. police officer responded to the call. According to the officer, the pitmix broke the dachshund's jaw and the dog needed reconstructive surgery.

"Its upper jaw was very disfigured," said Conti-Yeo, reading the police report.

It's not known if the dachshund did something to provoke the pit-bull mix, but Tiscornia said regardless, the larger dog will be euthanized.

During the attack, Heidi bit Harry once and did not release until she was pulled off by three SPCA volunteers, who received minor wounds during the struggle.

"Three individuals had

skin broken when they tried to pry Heidi off of Harry," Tiscornia said.

Last weekend's incident is the first time in 26 years an SPCA dog at an offsite adoption event has bitten another dog, according to Tiscornia.

Furthermore, the pit bull never showed any previous signs of aggression, and Tiscornia said she passed her initial temperament test with "flying colors."

"Anytime you have an incident like this," he said, "we do an after-incident investigation."

The SPCA will continue its offsite adoption events, which Tiscornia said are popular and are a great way to showcase dogs who need homes.

However, the SPCA may change the way it screens dogs by pairing larger dogs with smaller dogs when they first arrive to the SPCA to see how well they interact. Currently, dogs of the same size are introduced during the safety tests.

The SPCA for Monterey County is paying for Harry's veterinary costs and the price to house and feed Ennis, who stayed in a hotel while her dog was being treated, he said.

The bill hasn't arrived, but Tiscornia estimated it would be "numerous thousands of dollars."


He said last week's incident was "a real setback" for pit bulls, which have a bad reputation but can often be gentle dogs and make good pets.

"We have successfully adopted several pit bulls," Tiscornia said.

One of those was Red, a pit bull who had been one of NFL football player Michael Vick's fighting dogs that the SPCA for Monterey County cared for until the dog was adopted by one of its staff members. Red died of cancer in 2010.

"Red changed a lot of people's minds about pit bulls," Tiscornia said.





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

# The benefits of suing yourself

IF THE city's public works director hits a pothole that's been in the street for a couple of months, should he be able to sue the city for not fixing it?

What about the police chief? If he takes a late-night walk through a highcrime part of town and gets mugged, should he be able to recover damages from the city because it failed to protect him?

Or, if the planning director wants to remodel his own house and suffers a lengthy delay in the processing of his permit, should he be able to file a lawsuit against his own department?

And what about the maintenance man? If there's light bulb at city hall that's been burned out for weeks and he trips going down the stairs in the dark, should the city's taxpayers be liable?

These questions may seem silly, but in lawsuit-happy California, it turns out they're not. As we learned in the Jane Miller case, government employees who sue over their own failure to do their jobs properly have rights beyond those of private citizens and elected officials.

■ In a famous 1985 appellate case, Shasta County resident Oreste Lodi was pretty much laughed out of court for suing himself to resolve a dispute about the deed to a piece of property he inherited.

In dismissing the case, the the Court of Appeal for the 3rd Circuit noted that, "Although it is true that, as plaintiff and appellant, Mr. Lodi loses, it is equally true that, as defendant and respondent, he wins. It is hard to imagine a more evenhanded application of justice." And then the court ordered each side to bear its own costs.

■ Similarly, the California Supreme Court has barred elected and appointed officials from suing the boards and commissions on which they serve.

In 1975, the court said a member of the psychology examining committee of the Board of Medical Quality Assurance could not sue her own board for failing to vote the way she wanted it to, calling the attempt "ominous" and "narcissistic."

And five years ago, two members of the Santa Monica City Council sued the council for scheduling its public comment period at the end of council meetings, claiming it was an attempt to discourage public participation and violated the state and federal constitutions and the Brown Act.

But an appeals court declined to let what it called "disgruntled governmental agency members" try to overrule a vote of their colleagues by going to court.

Those limits didn't apply, however, when Jane Miller sued the City of Carmel-by-the-Sea, claiming she was the victim of long-term sexual harassment and employment discrimination at work.

Miller, you see, was the city's human resources manager, and therefore was the very person responsible for preventing sexual harassment and illegal discrimination at city hall. So if her allegations against city administrator Rich Guillen were true, it was also true that she bore responsibility for not stopping him in his tracks. But instead of asking him to stop, taking administrative action against him, or turning to other city officials for help, she kept quiet until she sprung her lawsuit, which amounted to this: "I didn't do my job; therefore the city owes me money for being victimized by my own failure."

The courts never had a chance to consider her remarkable claim, because, rather than go through a protracted court battle, the city decided to settle the suit for \$600,000. And that wasn't the only cost. City administrator Rich Guillen lost his job, and the city is now at the beginning of an expensive process to find his

Amid all the handwringing about government employees being overpaid and having overly generous pensions and benefits, it turns out there's another benefit that should be curtailed: The ability of government employees to file a suit over their own incompetence.

As a graduate of the University of California (Berkeley) I also resent your characterization of the world's greatest public university: "Maybe at Berkeley they are teaching kids that the profit motive is a sin." A monopoly on the supply of water, without careful ratepayer/citizen oversight, does not represent free market forces at work. Where is the logic or fairness of forcing Cal Am ratepayers to pay all the costs of a half a billion capital improvement program for the ownership benefit of a neighboring PUBLIC utility whose customers will continue to enjoy water at a fraction of the unit cost paid by those served by Cal Am?

The reason that 85 percent of Americans receive their water from publicly owed water companies is no accident; it is because, in most instances, they do it better and cheaper than the private sector.

Finally, it should be apparent that fair market value of an asset can be above or below what is represented on a corporation's balance sheet. In the case of a Cal Am buyout, the value remains to be determined

through due process, but it is clear that without constantly rising water rates to assure a guaranteed rate of return paid by other people, Cal Am would have little value.

The question to be answered remains, is public ownership a viable alternative to the status quo which we know will result in increases which are projected to culminate in multiples of current unit costs? There are many, including myself, that believe that answer is YES!



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# Edward Humbert Wedlake, M.D.

Pebble Beach ~ Edward Humbert Wedlake, known as "Ned", was a respected and beloved physician on the Monterey Peninsula and a resident of Pebble Beach since 1962. Born in Muncie, Indiana on Feb 1, 1928, Dr. Wedlake attended Culver Military Academy, then DePauw University in Greencastle, Indiana. He received his medical degree from Stritch School of Medicine, Loyola University in Chicago in 1955. Subsequently he interned at Presbyterian-St. Luke's Medical Center in Chicago and conducted his residency at Northwestern in Evanston, Ill. Dr. Wedlake served as a Captain in the U.S. Army Medical

Dr. Wedlake practiced Internal Medicine in Carmel and Monterey and was affiliated with Community Hospital, serving as a Senior Attending Physician from 1962-1998. He was an active volunteer in his community for many years, serving on the Board of Trustees of the Leukemia Society, the American Cancer Society, All Saints Day School and Robert Louis Stevenson School. He was Chairman of the Campaign for the United Fund in Monterey in 1970-71.

Dr. Wedlake was a member of the Old Capital Club in Monterey, John Gardiner's Tennis Ranch in Carmel Valley, and Cypress Point Club in Pebble Beach. An avid and excellent golfer, Dr. Wedlake also belonged to Birnam Wood Golf Club in Santa Barbara and the Royal & Ancient Golf Club of Fife, St.

Dr. Wedlake is survived by his devoted wife, Patricia (Tish) Cox Wedlake, and daughters, Pamela and Page. He was predeceased by his son, Edward (Ted)

Ned Wedlake was tall and handsome, athletic, warm, outgoing and utterly charming, always sporting that great smile. He was a true gentleman, a caring and compassionate man. He will be sorely missed by many.

Checking into Indorato's background, Lightfoot discovered he was on parole for burglary, including terms requiring him to submit to search and seizure by police, so officers went to his house in Carmel Valley March 30.

He wasn't there, but they found him at a storage unit on Highway 68 near the airport. The door to the storage area was open, and Lightfoot reported noticing several expensive Pat Areias belts, among other valuables.

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But the hour was late and officers did not have time to

search through the jewelry, electronics, tools, clothing and other items, so they locked it up and arrested Indorato for possession of stolen property.

Officers also discovered Indorato was carrying methamphetamine and a large amount of cash, according to Lightfoot.

"He really didn't want to talk," she said. "He admitted he pawned property but wouldn't speak about any other things."

Witness accounts tie Indorato to the Lums' neighborhood, as he was reportedly hired to work on a jobsite next door, but so far, she hasn't been able to prove he burglarized the couple's home. And Eastman owns the storage space, according to Lightfoot, so a warrant has been issued for her arrest, too. She is still at large.

### 'That's mine'

The following morning, Lightfoot returned with the Lums to the storage unit and had them sift through its contents. In addition to the eight belts, they found jewelry, furs, shirts with Louis Lum's name written inside the collars and other items. "He was missing 10 pairs of pants and several shirts," Lightfoot said. "He kept saying, 'That's mine. And that's mine."

Lightfoot estimated the couple recovered about 75 percent of the many possessions that had been stolen from their house. She also confiscated other goods that appeared to have been pilfered, mostly watches and jewelry, along with a laptop computer that belonged to a Chula Vista resident.

"He's going to make arrangements to pick it up," she said. "It was for his son's schooling, so he was glad to get it back."

She didn't find the television and boating equipment taken from the Lums' neighbors, but "where there's smoke, there's fire," she added.

Indorato remains in jail on felony charges of possession of stolen property, parole violation and multiple drug charges, and Lightfoot is continuing her investigation in the case, her search for Eastman and the effort to locate other victims. She urged residents who are missing valuables and suspect they are victims to contact her at (831) 624-6403.

passenger buses and delivery trucks from using the scenic route. But this week, such a restriction appeared less likely.

"At this time, if all continues to go well, there is an excellent chance that there will not be either a weight load limit or length limitation," Gafill said.

While the opening of the inside lane to signal-controlled traffic appears imminent, it could be years before the outside lane is fixed.

"This is now being characterized as a major repair project, and a viaduct is the leading candidate for a solution, though a bridge solution is still under consideration," Gafill added. "It is too early to estimate when the project will begin, but environmental impact analysis alone could take at least 18 months, and it could well take two to three years for completion of the south bound lane repair," he said.

Pedestrians continue to be escorted past the road closure at 7 a.m. and 4 p.m. each day. A Monterey-Salinas Transit bus, meanwhile, picks up pedestrians at 7:30 a.m. each day and transports them to the Crossroads shopping center, Community Hospital, Del Monte Center, medical offices on Cass Street and the Transit Plaza in downtown Monterey.

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

the drill, but the scenarios were real enough, according to Cal Fire Battalion Chief Buddy Bloxham.

Firefighters used chainsaws and axes to break through the roof and walls to practice letting heat escape.

"And then we did search and rescue," Bloxham said, which involved blindfolding firefighters and having them use their search techniques to find and save hypothetical victims.

They also practiced carrying water-filled fire hoses into the house. "We don't get a lot of opportunity to do that unless a house is actually burning," he said.

And they cut through walls and floors, because those skills are vitally important in rescuing a trapped firefighter. "If they were in the basement, we would go through the floor above them to access them."

The curricula were set by Cal Fire's training bureau and then modified based on local crews' particular strengths and weaknesses, according to Bloxham.

They hacked and sawed on the house starting around 9 a.m. and finishing around 3 or 4 p.m. late last week and into the weekend, taking care not to disrupt the neighbors on Calle la Cruz and Ribera Road too much. A handful even stopped by to watch for a while, according to Bloxham.

### Getting there before teardown

Because they review proposed building projects to make sure they comply with fire codes, fire officials also know which houses are proposed for demolition.

"We've been aggressively contacting contractors and property owners," Bloxham said. "There are demolitions all the time, but the opportunity for us is to be there just before they tear them down."
