Sanctuary: Caltrans can push landslide debris over the edge

■ Emergency permit will get highway open sooner

THE EFFORT to clear a massive slide from Highway 1 near Alder Creek in Big Sur received an unexpected boost this week when the California Coastal Commission issued an emergency permit April 26 allowing workers to push a large portion of the debris over the edge instead of trucking it to disposal sites as far as four miles away.

The California Department of Transportation, meanwhile, is taking an aggressive approach to dealing with the slide, which has blocked access south of Big Sur since April 14. Six pieces of heavy equipment were transported by helicopter Tuesday to the top of the slide, which according to Caltrans spokeswoman Susana Cruz is about 200 feet above the pavement. It is estimated that the highway could be cleared within four weeks.

Letting gravity do the work

For years, environmental regulations have required that slide debris in Big Sur not be pushed over the edge to the ocean below, even though that's where the debris would have gone if the road hadn't stopped it. But the permit granted this week recognizes that "an emergency exists that requires action more quickly than permitted by the procedures for administrative or ordinary coastal permits."

Before the permit was issued, debris was required to be trucked to nearby disposal sites, in large part because environmentalists worry it will harm life in the Monterey Bay marine sanctuary. But a Big Sur business

Water group won't give Cal Am appraisal to MPWMD

■ Stalemate in effort to meet with board

A GROUP calling for the takeover of California American Water has refused to give the Monterey Peninsula Water Management District an appraisal it claims shows Cal Am's worth, raising questions about the future of the group's efforts

Water Plus announced in January it wanted Cal Am to be acquired and turned into a public entity. The group — which launched a petition drive for the effort — also called for the

Since then, Water Plus has dropped its petition drive and now wants the MPWMD to stay in business and use eminent domain to acquire Cal Am, which it says is worth a little more than \$100 million.

Though MPWMD chair-

man Bob Brower told The Pine Cone the water board is open to setting up a workshop with Water Plus about its takeover bid, Brower said so far Weitzman hasn't provided him with the appraisal and has failed to answer other key questions about the group's efforts.

"I didn't get what I would call adequate responses," Brower said. "Nor did Weitzman supply the appraisal he claims to have."

Until Water Plus forks over the document showing Cal Am's worth and provides more information about the group's efforts, Brower said he won't arrange a meeting.

"As chair, it's my responsibility to the board members to be fully prepared before I call a special meeting," he said. "I would not expect anybody to do that to me as a board member."

Weitzman — whose increasingly embattled posture includes accusing The Pine Cone of misquoting him without being able to substantiate the claim — did not respond to questions submitted by the paper this week.

After Water Plus requested to meet with the MPWMD, Brower asked Weitzman to respond to 13 questions ranging from the group's estimation of Cal Am's worth and Water

COASTAL PERMIT FEE FOR DESAL PLANT: \$250,000

CALIFORNIA AMERICAN Water paid a staggering application fee of \$250,000 to the California Coastal Commission to try to get a permit to build a desalination plant and other facilities that make up the regional water project — money that, in the end, the commission may use to try to stop it.

In March, Cal Am sent the coastal commission a weighty 1,600-page application for the desal plant permit, along with

Bergstrom: I can't afford to defend civil suit

THE CARMEL doctor sentenced to prison in 2009 for raping a woman in his home can't afford an attorney to defend him against a \$5 million civil lawsuit filed by his victim, according to court documents.

In July 2009, Carl Bergstrom was convicted by a Monterey County jury of forcibly sodomizing a woman in his home on San Juan Road and was sentenced to seven years in prison. Shortly after his conviction, the victim, Jane Doe 1, filed a lawsuit against Bergstrom seeking compensatory and punitive damages.

But in court documents Bergstrom himself filed from

Town's brain trust benefits PG&E

As one Carmel man steps in to run PG&E while outgoing CEO Peter Darbee leaves with his \$35 million retirement package at the end of the week, a Carmel city councilmember is receiving accolades for developing a plan to assuage smart-meter opponents while the rollout of the new technology continues.

Lee Cox, a retired telecom executive who has served on the PG&E board since 1996 and became lead director in 2004, is taking over as interim CEO of the utility on Sunday. He will temporarily run the company — which has been pilloried

Police and fire top salary costs

A FIRE captain and a police sergeant were the highest paid employees in the City of Carmel last year, according to records listing the salaries, overtime and benefits of every city worker, including the mayor and council members. In 2009, the police chief and the city administrator topped the list.

In 2010, taxpayers paid \$7,352,162.36 in salaries and benefits for public employees, including \$4,839,459.10 in pay, \$501,049.97 in overtime, \$1,917,800.73 in benefits and \$93,852.56 in payouts to public-safety employees who had to work on holidays.

Benefits include medical, dental, uniform pay, retirement contributions from the city and other income, according to city clerk Heidi Burch, who furnished the

Science Buddies honored for producing lots of good ideas

SCIENCE MAGAZINE this week bestowed a coveted award upon a local nonprofit for its ability to excite kids about science and engineering by helping them find projects that tap into their interests, and Science Buddies' founder, Carmel resident Ken Hess, is thrilled at the prospect of 2 million readers learning about the website inspired by his daughter's own science-fair projects.

As an engineer who launched two successful software companies (Banner Blue Software, which was purchased by Broderbund, and Pocket Express, bought by Handmark) and "enjoys building almost anything," Hess was happy to coach his daughter as she developed ideas and carried them



"I was sitting in an awards ceremony when she was in eighth grade, and I thought, 'Wouldn't it be neat to do something where I could level the playing field for kids who don't have a parent who's a scientist or an engineer?" he recalled.

So, in 2001, with the help of a former colleague, he launched Best Buddies, a website designed to help kids find science projects they might be interested in undertaking.

We started on a very small scale," he said. "We weren't quite sure how it would do and exactly what the focus should be, but we quickly found there was a very strong need for quality information on the web for kids doing science projects.'

During the past decade, Hess and his cohorts have built more than 1,500 pages of subject matter developed by scientists, including studies incorporating the latest research, and how to undertake science and engineering

"The biggest problem a student has is how to select a project," Hess said, so he developed an "intelligent selector process" that works similarly to software used by Netflix, which

recommends movies based on customers' ratings of past rentals. The Topic Selection Wizard asks kids basic questions about everyday life.

"By comparing their responses to those of tens of thousands of kids who have used our site, we can direct them," he said, adding that users are anonymous. "When the kids answer those 26 questions, we know a lot about them, so the project ideas tend to be exactly what they're looking for."

Students who simply browse the site for projects are half as likely to hit on one they want to pursue, according to Hess.

> "And the wizard introduces them to areas they might have never thought to look," he added.

> As a nonprofit, Science Buddies is also free of advertising.

> "We get our funding from individuals, corporations and foundations, so that makes it a really good learning environment," he said. "Kids aren't bombarded."

> Science Buddies' broader mission is to spark interests that will lead students to become future scientists. Hess mentioned that his daughter, for instance, graduated from MIT two years ago with a degree in engineering.



Science magazine, which is published by the American Association for the Advancement of Science — "the world's

largest general scientific society" — developed the Science Prize for Online Resources in Education "to promote the best online materials in science education."


"It's an endorsement by a peer journal that we're doing good science," Hess said.

The April 29 issue of Science includes an article written

by Hess and Science Buddies V.P.s Courtney Corda and Tina Lanese explaining their nonprofit.

"By getting some publicity, we're hoping to get more people involved in the academic-science partnership," he said. "Researchers can reach out to k-12 students and develop projects a kid might do based on their

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Man defends himself against charges after fight with girlfriend

THE CARMEL Valley man arrested earlier this month for what police called a "drunken" altercation with his girl-friend defended himself this week, telling The Pine Cone he hadn't been drinking and the entire incident was blown out of proportion.

Pacific Grove police arrested Jay Ballard, 39, on suspicion of felony second-degree robbery and making terrorist threats, and misdemeanor spousal battery, willful cruelty to a child and probation violation. But Ballard, who was living in Carmel Valley before his arrest, told The Pine Cone Wednesday that his girlfriend — whom he now refers to as his ex — made up most of what she told police, including the charge that he grabbed her and demanded she give him \$40.

"That is completely fabricated," said Ballard, who also indicated he never touched his girlfriend during the night in question. "I'm not violent with women, and I never have been"

Though Ballard said they did have a heated argument outside the home, Ballard denied allegations he threatened to kill her and that he asked her for money. He said the incident didn't happen in the presence of their 4-year-old son, which police alleged. "I cussed at her, I threw some stuff in my truck, and I left," he said.

The incident started, Ballard said, after he went to his girl-friend's house after work. He said she became irate after finding an empty liquor bottle in her garage and accused of him of drinking. Ballard, who said he has had previous problems with alcohol, said he hadn't had a drop to drink that day.

"She flipped out on me," he said. "It escalated after that." Ballard said the 40-year-old woman — whose identity is protected because she's considered a victim of domestic violence — has a history of mental illness, which he said was the driving force behind her story to police.

"She is diagnosed bipolar and with borderline personality disorder," he said. "She has been hospitalized several times for her illness. Every now and then, her personality would flip to where she was someone else and would attack me."

The woman didn't report the incident to police until about six days later. Ballard voluntarily went to the P.G. police station after officers requested he talk to them about the argument. He was stunned when they took him into custody.

"They said I robbed her," Ballard said, recalling the police interview with the female officer. "I was so blown away I fell apart, crying."

He was booked into Monterey County Jail on \$66,000 bail, which Ballard said was reduced to \$7,500 bail, which allowed him to post bond. The felony charges were also reduced to misdemeanors days after he was arrested, he said.

Meanwhile, Ballard, who lost his job as a meat cutter at a local market after his arrest, is in talks with a couple of businesses in hopes of getting another job.

"I have couple of options on my horizon," he said.

King gets 15 years to life for fatal DUI

DESPITE HER public defender's efforts to get her declared incompetent and institutionalized instead of being sent to prison, Deborah King — found guilty by a jury in February of gross vehicular manslaughter while intoxicated in the 2008 death of Pacific Grove resident Joel Woods — received a prison sentence of 15 years to life from Monterey County Superior Court Judge Russell Scott last week.

A sentence in such a conviction usually maxes out at 10 years in state prison, according to prosecutor Steve Somers, but "due to the defendant's having five prior convictions [for DUI], her sentence was enhanced to 15 years to life." As a result, King, 54, will not be eligible for parole until 2023.

Her sentencing came more than two years after King hit and killed Woods with her BMW SUV as he prepared to climb into his truck in front of Pacific Grove Middle School on Sept. 2, 2008. He had just picked up his 12-year-old son from school when King, who had consumed several different

prescription medications for pain, depression and sleep problems, drifted into him and crushed him between her vehicle and the truck. The impact threw him 30 feet, and the 35-year-old man died of head injuries later that day after being airlifted to a



trauma center. His son was sitting in the passenger seat of the truck at the time.

Following her arrest, King was declared incompetent to stand trial due to her mental condition, and she was hospitalized. But she was later deemed fit, and the case went before a jury in late January. Somers had sought a murder conviction, given her record of driving under the influence and the fact she had spent two years in prison in the 1990s as a result, but jurors opted for the lesser charge of gross vehicular manslaughter while intoxicated, rendering their verdict in mid-February.

Defense attorney Heather Rogers had argued King was not intoxicated by the medications, which had all been prescribed to her, instead blaming driver error and a narrow roadway for the accident. Following the guilty verdict, she requested another hearing on King's competency, which delayed the sentencing but was ultimately unsuccessful, and on April 22, Scott ordered her to serve 15 years to life in prison for killing Woods.









Cottages of Carmel: Neighbors lose appeal but get tougher monitoring

m A}$ BID by a Carmel Valley group to require the developer of the Cottages of Carmel senior complex to adhere to his original permit by either installing a graywater system or reducing the number of units he is building failed Tuesday when the Monterey County Board of Supervisors unanimously sided with the developer.

The supervisors did, however, impose strict water monitoring requirements on the facility, which is currently under construction on a 4.5-acre property located at Carmel Valley Road and Val Verde Drive.

But the changes were a small consolation for the nonprofit Carmel Valley Association, which had to pay a \$5,000 fee to appeal the project.

Tuesday's showdown followed a 5-3 decision by the Monterey County Planning Commission in March to eliminate the requirement for a graywater system despite the fact that the supervisors mandated the installation of such a system when they approved the project in 2004. But the developer, Don Houpt, claims he was told by representatives of he Monterey Peninsula Water Management District that he wasn't required to install the graywater system. And now, according to attorney Tony Lombardo, it's too late to make him install the system without driving him into bankruptcy.

A graywater system, which would use filtered water from washing machines, showers and the like for landscaping, would reduce use of potable water at the senior housing pro-

Rippling River man for toting loaded gun

A RIPPLING River resident was arrested after a sergeant found him drunk and carrying a loaded gun in the parking lot of the Carmel Valley Village public housing complex April 13. Monterey County Sheriff's Sgt. Mike Burns encountered Kenneth Pelton, 68, after someone called around 11 p.m. to report hearing glass breaking and seeing "a male in the parking lot throw something at a car window," Cmdr. Tracy

He reportedly found Pelton, who was drunk, standing next to a car, but the car had no broken window.

"Sgt. Burns contacted the male and immediately saw because the male was walking toward him — a handgun sticking out of his pants," Brown said. Burns grabbed Pelton, threw him against the car, cuffed him and grabbed the gun, a loaded .32-caliber Colt revolver.

Burns also discovered the breaking glass the caller had reported involved a table in a Rippling River apartment, not a car windshield. "He had gone over to visit one of his neigh-



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


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P.G. visitor center sign drawing wrong kind of attention

■ Sign vandalized twice, replacement coming soon

THE NEW P.G. Chamber of Commerce & Visitor Center at Forest and Central avenues that opened softly a few weeks ago is already a success, with dozens of tourists walking through the doors every day. The sign pointing people to the center, however, isn't so well liked.

"Ugly," said P.G. city manager Tom Frutchey. "That's probably the most common word" used by people.

The sign, which cost \$4,700, was installed about a month ago where China Garden, the previous business' sign, was. But the plain "Tourist Information" visitor sign, especially at night when lit, sticks out like a sore thumb.

Even though it's only been installed one month, it's been vandalized twice.

"People have thrown rocks through it," said chamber president Moe Ammar, who still has one of the stones on his desk.

The damage to the side panels cost several hundred dollars more to replace.

Frutchey, Ammar and P.G. City Council members have heard lots of complaints from residents via emails, phone calls and letters. Not only is the marker unattractive, it's "not representative of P.G.," they say.

"While the sign is ugly," Ammar concedes, "it does attract people."

The sign isn't too far off the shape of the old China Garden sign, except it's not arched like the old one. And it isn't the marker the city originally OK'd.

"It is not the sign that was approved through the zoning process," Frutchey said.

But the chamber's choice of lettering and color was intentional. Ammar said they looked at studies that show plain blue and white signs are most noticeable.

"While the sign was designed to attract a lot of visitors," he explained, "I realize it's offensive and not attractive to some of our residents."

Ammar pointed to other nearby business signs, namely Nob Hill, Coco's and Carl's Jr.

However, in response to the public outcry, the chamber has come up with a new design — a green and white sign with an arched top that features the city's hallmark — a monarch butterfly. "We are going to make it look really pretty," Ammar said.

The new visitor center officially opens in May.

salary information in response to a public

records act request from The Pine Cone. At the top was Carmel Fire Capt. Mitch Kastros, who took home \$99,660 in salary, another \$58,738.03 in overtime, \$45,129.31 in benefits and \$4,584.36 in holiday pay, bringing his total compensation \$208,111,70.

Second in line was Carmel Police Sgt. Ken Shen, who received \$148,200 in pay, \$7,202.08 in overtime, \$4,397.92 in in-lieu pay for holidays, and \$45,586.97 in benefits, for a total of \$205,386.97.

Police Chief George Rawson, who retired late last year, and city administrator Rich Guillen, who retired at the end of March of this year, followed. Rawson received \$199,057.05 — comprising \$140,000 in salary and \$59,057.05 in benefits — while Guillen was paid \$150,000 in salary and \$47,923.28 in benefits, for a total of \$197,923.28. Fifth was CFD Capt. Ian Watts, whose total compensation was \$193,472.04 last year: \$99,660 in pay, \$40,517.38 in overtime, \$48,710.30 in benefits and \$4,584.36 in holiday pay.

As would be expected, since the city's police and fire departments consume a large share of the budget, public safety employees dominated the top half of the income earners, intermingled with department heads and Burch, who received a total of \$145,307.94, consisting of \$111,899.40 in salary and \$33,408.54 in benefits.

Public works superintendent Stu Ross immediately followed Burch, receiving \$144,758.87 in total compensation: \$107,741.50 in pay, \$2,605.19 in overtime and \$34,412.18 in benefits. City forester Mike Branson was 19th on the list, with a total of \$133,947.17, immediately followed by information services/network manager Steve McInchak, who received \$132,292.65.

Among other upper-management positions were Sean Conroy, planning and building services manager, who received \$118,048.84 in total compensation, which included \$79,569.59 in salary and \$38,479.25 in benefits; library director Janet Cubbage, who got \$89,480.40 in salary and \$22,916.90 in benefits, for a total of \$112,397,30; and facilities maintenance manager Bernard Martino, who received total of \$108,607.28: \$90,466.27 in pay and \$18,141.01 in benefits.

Toward the bottom of the list were treecare specialist Kelley Green, who was paid \$59,757.17, including \$45,990.62 in pay, \$153.29 in overtime and \$13,613.26 in benefits; building official John Hanson (who spent much of 2010 on National Guard duty in Afghanistan), who took home \$42,831.73, which included \$22,634.50 in pay and \$20,197.23 in benefits; and finance specialist Deanna Allen, who received \$42,452.21: \$32,761.15 in pay and \$9,691.06 in benefits.

The lowest paid person on the payroll was Mayor Sue McCloud, who received a \$2,400 stipend for her service and \$453.60 in benefits. City council members Paula Hazdovac, Karen Sharp and Ken Talmage took home stipends of \$1,800 each, as well as benefits of \$12,642.24 for Hazdovac and Sharp, and \$10,537.32 for Talmage. Councilman Jason Burnett, who was elected last April, was not included in the salary list.

In 2009, city salaries and benefits totaled \$7,139,401.41: \$4,593,381.10 in pay, \$329,092.03 in overtime, \$1,828,326.38 in benefits and \$82,992.93 in holiday pay to public-safety workers.

Revamped Big Sur Marathon Sunday

THE BIG Sur International Marathon and its accompanying races will draw thousands of athletes and their supporters to Carmel Sunday, May 1, and the action in the area will be even more intense, considering the races will start and end and the same

Due to the collapse in March of a stretch of Highway 1 near Garrapata State Park, marathon organizers had to create the outand-back course that will have 4,500 marathoners and 300 relay runners starting on Highway 1 at the Carmel River Bridge at 6:45 a.m., followed by participants in the 21and nine-mile races. Marathon runners will hit the turnaround point north of Bixby Bridge, reverse course and loop through Point Lobos State Reserve on their way back to the finish line near Rio Road. Participants in the 10.6-miler will start near Rocky Point

dent, several defended the developer and were critical of county policies they said discouraged business.

In response to comments from the public, supervisor Dave Potter suggested establishing a monitoring program to ensure that water usage does not exceed the 4.8 acrefoot annual limit. The monitoring would begin when water usage reaches 60 percent of its capacity. If the water usage reaches 90 percent of its capacity, mitigation measures, such as moving its laundry facilities offsite, would be triggered.

"This is all about the 4.8 acre-foot limit," Potter said of the hearing. "I don't want to get anywhere near going over it."

Potter also defended imposing the \$5,000 appeal fee for projects located outside the Coastal Zone.

"If these were better economic times, I would consider waiving the fees," added Potter. But the county needs to recoup its staff costs after devoting so much time to this

project, he said.

Supervisor Jane Parker was the lone supporter of waiving the appeal fee.

While the CVA didn't get what it asked for, its president, Christine Williams, said it was worth appealing the case. "Without Carmel Valley Association's appeal, stricter water monitoring would not have been put in place," Williams said.

But Williams wasn't happy about the appeal fee. "The \$5,000 appeal fee, to get the governing body to think smarter, was rather steep, considering the problems were the result of developer and county failures," she

Now that the monitoring program has been required, will it work? "It must be recognized that stricter water monitoring only works if the county tracks the water reports and demands compliance and if Mr. Houpt complies," Williams added. "On both counts, the track record isn't stellar."

The Cottages of Carmel project dates back to 1993. In 2006, the property's owner, Elvira Gamboa, sold it to a group of local investors for \$2.1 million. The group was who were later bought out by Houpt.

Avenal State Prison where he's serving his sentence, the doctor — who's medical license has been suspended — says he no longer has the money to hire an attorney to represent him in the civil case.

"Due to his incarceration, Bergstrom is unable to afford legal counsel and does not have the ability to adequately defend him," according to the documents filed in February in Monterey County Superior Court.

Bergstrom — using first person in his court filings also maintains his innocence and said he has "faith" his conviction in the criminal case will be reversed. "I desire the opportunity to defend myself in this civil case," he wrote, "and not to have a judgment entered against me based on the criminal conviction which I believe will be overturned."

Bergstrom's statements were part of a motion he filed requesting a judge to allow him a six more months to prepare for his trial — which had been scheduled for March 14.

In opposition to Bergstrom's request to delay the trial, Doe's attorney, Hugo Gerstl, raised doubts about Bergstrom's claims and indicates Bergstrom was making a minimum of \$900,000 per year from his practice, including charging 300 clients \$3,000 per year for his concierge medical service.

"Whether he spent all his money or has somehow secreted it away has not been answered," Gerstl wrote. "Regardless, while [Bergstrom] is entitled to free representation if he cannot otherwise afford it in the criminal phase of his trial, he is not so entitled in the civil trial."

Gerstl also noted that Bergstrom's court filings seem to indicate he's had some legal help with his case despite his contention he has no money for an attorney.

"The wording of his motion demonstrates that it was clearly written by a law-trained person," Gerstl wrote.

In a footnote in his motion, Bergstrom notes "through the assistance of friends," he has been able to obtain limited "guidance from counsel."

Bergstrom's 2008 federal income tax statement showed an adjusted gross income of more than \$500,000, according to

Though court records do not indicate whether a judge issued a continuance based on Bergstrom's motion, the trial is now set for July.

Hoping for reversal

In October 2009, Bergstrom filed an appeal of his criminal conviction with the 6th District Court of Appeal. A hearing in May will consider the appeal. In arguing for a continuance of his trial, Bergstrom contends his civil case could be decided as a result of his criminal conviction.

"As the criminal conviction is the subject of a pending appeal, there exists the very real possibility that a civil judgment will be rendered on a conviction which will be overturned," according to Bergstrom.

Gerstl said there is no indication Bergstrom has tried to prepare for the lawsuit and hasn't even applied to the California Department of Corrections to allow him to participate in the trial. "It strains credibility that in the 1.5 years since this case was filed and served, [Bergstrom] has had no time to prepare his defense," Gerstl wrote.

Victim's life a 'mess'

In other court documents filed in February, Gerstl said Bergstrom "led a not so secret Jekyll and Hyde existence" at the time he attacked his client. "By day, he was a well known respected physician on the Monterey Peninsula," according to Gerstl. "By night, he trolled the bars looking for sexual pickups."

Doe's lawsuit alleges Bergstrom slipped her a drug before forcing her to have anal sex. She eventually escaped his home and called 911. During his criminal trial, Bergstrom's attorney, Tom Worthington, denied that the physician used date rape drugs on Doe. A jury found Bergstrom guilty of forceable sodomy.

Because of the attack, the suit contends, Doe has suffered physical, mental and emotional trauma as well as shame and humiliation. (Her name has not been disclosed by law enforcement or in the news media.)

Doe — who had been a successful physical therapist earning \$8,000 per month — is a shadow of her former self.

She deteriorated mentally, became a "hard alcoholic" and

lost custody of her 12-year-old daughter. She also lost her professional license and underwent several alcohol rehabilitation programs, according to Gerstl.

As her money dwindled, "flashbacks of the event of the night in question came flooding back into her head," and she "fell off the wagon," he wrote.

Though Doe completed in-house rehab programs in Maryland and Santa Cruz, her life isn't the same as it was before the attack, Gerstl said.

"Her life today is a total mess, largely attributable to the predation by the felon who attacked and sodomized her," he



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

Kids kept logs of their reading time between March 14 and March 28 and also received free books purchased with funds from Carmel Valley Rotary.


But Pereles was most impressed with the number of books River School students collected for Allendale, one of the poorer schools in Oakland.

Kids at Allendale Elementary School in Oakland display a banner they made to thank River School students for their unexpected, generous donation of more than 3,000 books.

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
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Jeffers' legacy honored at annual Tor House celebration

IT'S BEEN a half-century since he passed away, but the memory of Carmel's greatest literary figure, Robinson Jeffers, lives on — in part because of the Tor House, the distinctive home he built on Carmel

The Tor House will host its annual Spring Garden Party Sunday, May 1, from 2 to 5 p.m. The event will pay tribute to Jeffers and showcase the poet's onetime residence, which is a local landmark.

The yearly event is presented by the nonprofit Tor House Foundation, which works to not only maintain and preserve the historic home, but to promote Jeffers' legacy as a

poet and a philosopher.

According to the foundation's president, Vince Huth, Jeffers' work is as relevant as

"Jeffers was a great poet of the American West," Huth explained. "He was also an environmental poet who saw early on the squandering of our natural resources."

And while Jeffers and his family were the original developers of Carmel Point, "he felt very strongly about protecting the coast," Huth said.

While the foundation offers tours of Jeffers' home, cameras are only allowed inside the building once a year — during the May Day celebration. During the party, the public can climb to the top of the 40-foot

Hawk Tower, which offers a bird's-eye view of Carmel Point as well as nearby Point Lobos State Reserve.


LIKE SO many pop stars of the 1960s and 1970s, Leon Russell's star faded as musical trends moved to disco, punk, new wave and beyond. But the career of Russell forms Thursday, May 5, at Sunset Center — is again on the rise, thanks to an old friend.

"When Elton John was just starting out, Leon was one of his idols," Sunset Center spokeswoman Natalie Hall

John, it turns out, was deeply influenced as a musician by Russell. And Russell, by chance, just happened to be in the audience at the Troubadour nightclub in Hollywood in 1970 when a then-unknown John performed there. The two met and hit it off - and before long, John was touring as Russell's opening act.

During the 1960s, Russell established himself as a suc-


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Carb loading on a grand scale, going to school and celebrating Mom

WITH SUNDAY'S Big Sur International Marathon beginning and ending in Carmel this year, avid runner and downtown businessman Thompson Lange decided it was the optimal time to highlight the city as the place to be for athletes and their friends, fans and families.

Scheid Vineyards and Peter B's brewery are providing libation, and "we'll have a variety of carb-centric food from Bistro Beaujolais, the Cheese Shop, Il Fornaio, Gianni's and Peter B's," he said.

Part of the proceeds will support Just Run, the BSIM's national school-based program aimed at fighting childhood

■ In the Aubergine kitchen

There might not be a more personable teacher than Justin Cogley, the chef de cuisine who took over the kitchen at Aubergine restaurant in L'Auberge Carmel after Christophe Grosjean returned to France last year. Cogley and executive pastry chef Ron Mendoza are offering hands-on cooking classes on back-to-back days once a month with the intent of providing "a delicious opportunity to learn professional culinary techniques, make new friends and have a great time cooking."

The classes are intimate, limited to 10 people who line up at work stations in the kitchen to observe Cogley and practice the techniques he describes as they prepare the day's recipe which they then have the pleasure of consuming right

— which they then have the pleasure of consuming, right

there in the kitchen, while sipping something selected by wine director Thomas Perez for the occasion.

Last week, Cogley led the small group in preparing a springtime dish of halibut poached in apple broth, topped with a salad of julienned fennel and apple. Cogley said he is enjoying creating dishes capitalizing on the lighter flavors of the season, and, having worked in Chicago, is repeatedly impressed by the freshness and abundance of produce available at local farmers markets.

The April 20 class began with Cogley's filleting a whole halibut, explaining how the knife should just skim the bones to ensure no flesh is wasted, and that cold fish should be rested at room temperature a short while before cooking, which helps prevent sticking. Participants chopped shallots, ginger, fennel and apple for the foundation of the poaching broth, adding wine and then water, along with a blend of spices toasted in a skillet and ground. He showed how to cook and cut a geoduck clam, which was then warmed in the poaching liquid, strained and added to the finished dish.

All the while, he shared secrets and knowledge about everything, from spices like Grains of Paradise and the use of Japanese tools in his kitchen, to proper cooking techniques and the telltale signs of error. Warm, approachable and engaging, Cogley ensured everyone was comfortable in his kitchen and even sent them home with his cell-phone number, in case they had any questions later.

for last September's gas pipeline explosion in San Bruno and its smart-meter program — until a permanent replacement is hired.

"I knew for a couple of days that it could happen," Cox told The Pine Cone Tuesday. "People sounded me out, and I talked to my wife about it, because we have several other things going on." But he didn't hesitate to say "yes" when the request finally came.

And Carmel City Councilman Jason Burnett, who worked with PG&E officials to develop a plan allowing residents opposed to smart meters to put off installation at their homes until the state public utilities commission approves the company's opt-out program, said he was gratified by PG&E's decision to make that option available to all its customers. He had pushed the utility to extend it to the county and was pleasantly surprised when officials told him everyone in its service area, which extends northward from south of San Luis Obispo to the Oregon border, and east to the Central Valley, would be allowed to make such requests.

Opponents to smart meters — which use wireless technology to communicate energy usage to the company and are the foundation of a "smart grid" that will allow consumers to track their energy use and adjust it to be more efficient — cite health and privacy concerns. While Burnett does not share their worries, he developed the compromise to help mollify them.

"I don't want to cut PG&E any slack," he said. "I think they botched this rollout, and I think if they had done an opt-out program from the beginning, they would have avoided a lot of controversy, but I think they've finally gotten it right."

Cox, who moved to Carmel in 1997 after retiring as CEO of AirTouch — which was sold to Vodafone — thanked Burnett for his strategizing.

"It's a great idea, and it allows people to delay a decision until they know the opt-out program," he said.

That program, pending refinement and approval from the PUC, is on target to take effect in August or September. As proposed, it would permit customers to continue having people read their meters, but they would have to pay for that service, since the majority of residents will change to smart meters.

"We can implement whatever we're ordered to do, but there's a cost for it, and it seems fair that the people who are causing it to be implemented should pay for it," Cox said

The councilman's compromise was also much more practical than the direction taken by other Peninsula officials who voted to ban the installation of smart meters in their cities. Such bans are symbolic, since "local jurisdictions don't have any ability to make rules regarding regulated public utilities," Cox pointed out. "The PUC does that."

Burnett said he has received email from people thanking him for collaborating with

thing on small scale that provides the solution on the larger scale," he observed.

Cox' job

Cox said he expects to serve as interim CEO for at least a month. While company strategy is to have viable candidates waiting in the wings should an upper-level job open — and consultants from Korn/Ferry International helped identify several capable people who could replace Darbee — no one has yet been offered the position.

In the meantime, Cox sees his primary task as helping to smooth relations and improve the image of a company that's had "a difficult year."

"What can the company do to restore confidence and fix any problems we have, and restore its reputation?" he asked.

In response to the San Bruno explosion, the company is running lower gas pressure in 190 miles of its 5,700 miles of transmission pipe and is testing the integrity of 152 miles of the 190 with pressurized water, which requires shutting off the gas, isolating the segment to be tested and pumping in water under high pressure to locate any leaks or flaws. "It's difficult, but we do it all the time," Cox said.

He also reported the National Transportation Safety Board identified the cause of last fall's explosion as an incomplete weld in a line installed in 1956.

"It had a seam that was welded on the outside, so it looked fine when we inspected it, but it was not completed on the inside," he said. So far, metallurgists have not been able to determine what caused it to fail.

They have not arrived at an answer," he said. "Why would this half-weld last 54 years?"

As for smart meters, Cox said no science indicates they are hazardous to anyone's health.

"A smart meter is no different than a tiny cell phone, and you're not holding it next to your ear, it's in a box outside your house," he said. It transmits 40 seconds per day.

Furthermore, reports of inaccuracy stemmed from a rollout in the Central Valley that unfortunately coincided with a prolonged heat wave that led to unprecedented spikes in energy use. Since PG&E bills in tiers based on consumption, customers who had never used so much power before suddenly saw their costs rise dramatically, and they blamed the meters rather than the weather, according to Cox.

An outside auditor "found smart meters are much more accurate than the old analog meters," he pointed out.

Finally, people cite privacy concerns, but Cox noted that the company already knows how much power they are using.

Smart meters and smart grid technology could lead to as much as a 30 percent drop in energy use, which would benefit the environment and the bottom line, according to Cox. The company plans to give price cuts for off-peak users and said people will be able to make changes at home and then go online to gauge their effectiveness.

"If you don't have a smart meter, you can't have a smart grid," he said.

Chef Johnny Devivo can barely contain his excitement when it comes to creating new dishes for the revamped lunch and dinner menus at TusCA Ristorante in the Hyatt Regency Monterey. Sheriff's office collects prescription meds


TO ENSURE prescription narcotics don't end up in the hands of people who shouldn't have them, the Monterey County Sheriff's Office and the federal Drug Enforcement Administration are holding Prescription Drug Take-Back

Day Saturday, April 30, from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. in front of Bank of America at the Crossroads shopping center.

Law enforcement is hoping the public will take advantage of the opportunity "to prevent pill abuse and theft by ridding their homes of potentially dangerous and unwanted prescription drugs." Unwanted medications are disposed of safely, and the people who deliver them are assured anonymity, with no questions asked.

According to the sheriff's office, last September, Americans turned 242,000 pounds of prescription drugs at some 4,100 sites operated by the DEA in tandem with more than 3,000 state and local law enforcement agencies.

Studies indicate the majority of abused prescription drugs are obtained from family and friends, including from medicine cabinets at home, and the common methods of disposing of unused medicine — flushing down the toilet or throwing in the trash — pose safety and health hazards.

During the 1960s, Russell established himself as a successful session pianist and vocalist as he performed with many stars of that era. He also wrote many songs, and his original composition, "Delta Lady," became a hit for Joe Cocker in 1969. More songwriting success followed ("Superstar," "A Song for You"), and soon Russell's solo career was launched.

Over the next three years, Russell collaborated on a variety of projects with the royalty of rock 'n' roll, including George Harrison, Bob Dylan and Eric Clapton. He was also prominently featured on the "Concert for Bangladesh" record, arguably the most ambitious of all fundraising LPs. Despite the absence of a chart-topping single, Russell was so popular in 1972 that he was able to release a three-record live album.

Yet like those of so many talented musicians, Russell's career faded into oblivion — or so it seemed. As Russell likes to remind people, he was "lying in bed and not doing anything" when John surprised him with a phone call two years

"Where have you been all these years?" he asked Russell. "Elton brought him out of retirement, they recorded an album and now there is a huge resurgence of Leon's music," added Hall, who said Russell is planning to play a mix of new and old music, "including covers by Bob Dylan and Ray

Charles."

Only a month ago — and just weeks before performing a duo with John on "Saturday Night Live" - Russell received what may be his greatest honor when he was inducted into Rock 'n' Roll Hall of Fame. At the ceremony, Elton John paid him a emotional tribute.



owner last week pointed out the irony of using large amounts of diesel fuel to transport the material elsewhere, a task that obviously harms the environment.

By pushing a large portion of the debris below the highway, safety conditions for workers are enhanced as well, confirmed Steve Price, director of maintenance and operations for Caltrans' District 5 office.

In a letter he sent to the coastal commission and Caltrans, sanctuary superintendent Paul Michel describes the amount of rock and debris that will need to be moved.

"It is expected that approximately 25,000 cubic yards of landslide material will come to reside on the adjacent beach, resulting in a total of approximately 50,000 cubic yards of material seaward of the highway," Michel explained.

Before signing off on the plan, sanctuary divers surveyed the ocean below the slide to ensure the project wouldn't harm black abalone, which are listed by the federal government as an endangered species. None of the elusive mollusks were located.

While the plan permits pushing a considerable amount of material below the highway, a portion of the debris will still be relocated to nearby disposal sites.

Carmel City Councilman Jason Burnett praised the coastal commission and the sanctuary for quickly responding to the needs of local residents and businesses.

"It is my understanding that Caltrans finalized the details of their plan on Monday," Burnett reported. "The next day, the coastal commission issued its emergency permit, and because the sanctuary had done its work in advance it was able to issue its authorization and approval within 45 minutes."

The Big Sur business community, meanwhile, applauded the plan.

"We're extremely pleased all the agencies are working so closely together to balance the needs of the business community,

address environmental concerns and expedite the repair of Highway 1," said Stan Russell, executive director of the Big Sur Chamber of Commerce. "Repairing Highway 1 is immensely important to the recovery of the business community of Big Sur and has a far reaching impact into adjacent economic centers ranging deeply into Monterey and San Luis Obispo counties. This beautiful stretch of highway creates a very important bond that ties these three economic centers together."

In his letter to the coastal commission and Caltrans, Michel also described the strategy of airlifting heavy equipment to the top of the slide.


"Once the equipment is in place, material will then be pushed downslope," he explained. "This earth-moving technique will avoid the need for a large-equipment access road on the adjacent undamaged slope."

While operating heavy equipment on top of a massive slide might seem like a dangerous activity, Cruz said the agency is confident the work can be done safely. Meanwhile, traffic was moving with only brief delays through the one-lane section of Highway 1 near Rocky Point that reopened last week.

Editorial

Temporocentrism

HALF THE time, environmentalists will tell anybody within earshot that mankind is helpless when confronted with the forces of Mother Nature, and that it's foolishly arrogant for anybody to think he can stand in their way. And the other half of the time, they'll lecture you that even the smallest manmade change to the environment can have disastrous consequences.

Both things can't be true, of course, and anybody who has even briefly studied the geologic history of Earth realizes the former argument is the one that holds water

Consider the tsunami that hit Japan March 11. While the wave that rushed onshore was "huge" and the earthquake that spawned it was "colossal" compared to the small towns filled with fragile wooden buildings that stood in their way, the events were practically nothing compared to the forces, for example, that created the Japanese archipelago to begin with.

Hurricane Katrina was a disaster for the people of New Orleans. But it was a trivial event compared to, say, the last ice age.

And the 1906 earthquake was awful for the City of San Francisco and the people who lived in it 100 years ago, of course. But a slightly larger series of earthquakes was required, for instance, to separate South America from Africa.

Humans could have done nothing to influence the course of the titanic geologic events that created the planet we live on today. But a lot of supposedly educated people act like the past never happened.

The phenomenon of believing the present is more important than the past, or that the way the world seems while you are in it is the way it's supposed to be, is called "temporocentrism."

Thus, someone who's lived in Big Sur will be likely accept as "normal" that Highway 1 is going to be closed from time to time by landslides, but he'll also think that a slide the size of the one that closed the highway at Alder Creek was "massive." And so it was, compared to the size of a car that might have been in the way or a bulldozer trying to clear the slide now.

However, Big Sur is a dynamic place that is changing all the time. Over a period of many millions of years, the mountains rose, and they may still be growing today. But, simultaneously, their surface is constantly being broken down by microbes and plants, even as it is relentlessly under assault by wind, rain and the ocean. Far beyond our own imaginations, but in the blink of an eye as far as the Earth is concerned, those mountains will be rounded smooth and then disappear.


Over the last few millennia, that process has included frequent landslides in which the side of the mountains collapsed into the ocean below. Truly, this process is a natural, inevitable and necessary part of Big Sur's mountain/ocean environment. And it is continuing today.

Which brings us to this week's decision by the Monterey Bay National Marine Sanctuary and the California Coastal Commission that, in clearing the Alder Creek slide, Caltrans can push a large portion of the slide debris over the edge of Highway 1 and into the ocean below.

Longstanding environmental regulations would have prevented this step, requiring instead that the debris be hauled (in a procession of hundreds of dumptruck round trips) to a "storage site" somewhere else. This week, because the closure of Highway 1 is an "emergency," the agencies decided to short-cut the usual process, making it possible to clear the road much more quickly.

But instead of declaring an emergency, they could have simply decreed a State of Normalcy, because the ocean is where the debris, and the entire mountain range, is headed anyway.

a \$250,000 check, which the commission's required before it would start looking at the application. The commission's is one of at least 25 government permits required before the water company can begin construction on regional desalination plant.

"The pre-construction and permitting phases of any project can be very lengthy and expensive," Cal Am community relations manager Catherine Bowie told The Pine Cone.

Ironically, while more than two dozen agencies will have to approve the desal project, yet another government agency, the State Water Resources Control Board, is requiring it to be built. In 1995, the SWRCB ordered Cal Am stop pumping most of its supply from the Carmel River.

The coastal permit application submitted by Cal Am is a major hurdle for the regional project, which includes a desalination plant, pipeline and other facilities, with costs estimated by Cal Am to total \$328 million.

The application fee — and other expenses for the regional project — will eventually be paid for by the Peninsula's 40,000 ratepayers. Hundreds of hours went into completing the coastal permit application, Bowie said.

The coastal commission's staff will also spend hundreds of hours analyzing all aspects of the project and determining whether it's consistent with the Coastal Act, which regulates land use planning along the California coast.

The development project's effect on public access to the beach, recreation, the marine environment and land resources, for instance, will be weighed by the coastal commission

Tom Luster with the coastal commission's San Francisco office said step is reviewing the application. The first staff will probably be to ask for more studies and data.

"We have up to 30 days to determine whether the application is complete or if we need additional information," Luster said.

After that, coastal commission workers will prepare a report for commissioners recommending they approve, deny or approve the project with conditions. It will then be set for a public hearing, Luster said.

Bowie said Cal Am expects a hearing to be held later this year.

The coastal commission charges \$250,000 to review coastal permit applications for projects that cost \$100 million or more. The application was jointly filed by Cal Am, the MCWD and the MCWRA.

Though the regional project permit application is a big undertaking, Luster said "it's not unusual for us to review projects of this scale or larger."

In addition to the permit for the overall project, the MCWRA applied for a separate coastal permit to construct and operate test wells in Marina that will provide data for the operation for the eventual operation of the desal plant.

The desal plant is planned to provide about 10,500 acrefeet of water per year to Monterey Peninsula residents, who are expected to pay at least double on their monthly water bills to pay for the project.

Apart from a desalination plant in north Marina, the project includes aquifer storage and recovery facilities, intake pipes and wells and a recycled water component.

The expensive application is one of a litany of costs ratepayers are responsible for even before ground is broken for the regional project.

"We expect the fees and engineering work required to obtain the necessary permits for the regional desalination project will run in the millions of dollars," Bowie said.

William E. Miller, Jr.

March 9, 1922 - April 9, 2011

NASA SCIENTIST, GENEALOGIST, CIVIL RIGHTS ACTIVIST

TO UNDERSTAND the remarkable life of William E. Miller, Jr. — who died April 9 at the age of 89 in Annapolis, Md., of complications from a stroke — it helps to go back 40 years or so, to the busy house on Brewster Lane in Bowie, Md., where he and his wife, Marjorie, raised their five children. They had some memorable visitors in those days.

There was the moon rock Miller brought home from work at NASA one afternoon. A product of the Apollo 15 mission and carefully protected in a glass case, the small, dark gray stone had a lot of gravity attached to it. The family was amazed.

Leon Panetta, who would become CIA Director many years later, visited the Millers in 1970 after President Nixon fired him as head of the Justice Department's Office of Civil Rights. Miller was president of the Presbyterian Interracial Council, which honored Panetta for having the audacity to actually try to enforce them.

And then there was Amelia Boynton, who played a key role in the famed Selma,

Ala., voting rights marches of 1965. Miller had been to Selma, too, helping to register blacks to vote — a dangerous thing to do in those days. When Boynton came to Washington, D.C., in the mid-1960s to gather support for her protests, the Miller family hosted her.

Considering his roots in rural Oklahoma, if Miller's career as a space engineer was a surprise, his passion for civil rights was even more so.

William Eldridge Miller was born March 9, 1922, in hardscrabble Stillwater, Okla., the son of an appliance salesman and a homemaker.

In the 1930s, they moved to El Paso, Texas, where young Billy excelled in high school science classes, earning himself a place in the engineering department of the University of Texas. When he graduated in 1943, two scientific honor societies, Tau Beta Pi and and Eta Kappa Nu, made him a member.

Back in El Paso, he had met a brilliant young lady, Marjorie Mithoff, a neighbor on Lebanon Street. A Phi Beta Kappa, she also graduated from the University of Texas in 1943. They were married January 2 of that year. A daughter, Peggy, was born in September.

Like millions of other Americans during those years, whatever plans they made for their young family were disrupted by World War II. In May 1944, Miller became a 2nd Lt. in the U.S. Army and was sent to Harvard, MIT and Fort Monmouth, N.J., for training in advanced military electronics and radar. The extended program meant he wasn't shipped overseas until just after V-J Day. Attached to the Signal Corps and stationed in Yokohama and Tokyo, Miller played a key role in the live radio broadcasts of Japanese war crimes trials in late 1945 and early 1946. While he was in Japan, a son, Warren, was born.

Returning to the United States, Miller took a job designing radar for General Electric in Syracuse, N.Y. But the brutal winters took their toll, and the Millers returned to El Paso as soon as they could. In 1948, he began his career in space exploration, becoming chief of the telemetry section at White Sands Proving Ground in New Mexico, where this country's rocket program was just getting off the ground. Later, he became technical director of the Range Instrumentation Development Division — which meant he was responsible for tracking missiles after they were launched.

While Miller worked at White Sands, three more children joined the family: David in 1952, Paul in 1954 and Stephen in 1957

In 1962, Miller's growing reputation in missile electronics earned him a job at NASA headquarters in Washington, D.C. After a hectic cross-country journey with five kids in the family station wagon, the Millers took up residence in one of those pioneering suburban developments built by Levitt and Sons. The home would be theirs for nearly 50 years.

At work — where he developed telemetry and instrumentation throughout the Mercury, Gemini and Apollo programs, eventually becoming Chief of Information Systems for the space agency and earning a NASA Exceptional Service Medal — Miller was helping his country get to the moon, which required not just a host of new technology, but some completely new ways of thinking.

The same was required in the mid-1960s for the nation to break the bonds of its racist past. Miller's interest in civil rights began at his home church in an all-white Maryland suburb, but it soon took him to First Baptist Church of Selma, Ala., which was ground zero of the national effort to gain voting rights for blacks. In January 1965, Selma was 58 percent black, but only 3 percent of its registered voters were.

"Selma was chosen to break the system in Alabama because the sheriff there [the infamous Jim Clark] is such an obstinate segregationist that it presents a target which could very well provide a victory for the whole state," Miller wrote just before making a trip there to support Dr. Martin Luther King's peaceful protests.

Strategizing, marching and singing with Dr. King, Miller and five other Presbyterian activists from Washington, D.C., not only helped sign up dozens of new Alabama voters, they personally integrated a previously all-white restaurant.

"God was calling us to be participants in history, and we could not be spectators," Miller wrote.

The experience inspired the rest of his life, in which he remained fervently interested in politics, travel and history.

Retiring from NASA in 1975, those interests became the basis for a second career, as Miller taught himself (with the help of graduate-level studies at the University of Maryland) to be an expert in genealogical research. Delving into the Miller and Mithoff family roots and working for paying clients, Miller, along with his wife, traveled extensively in Europe, where they spent as much time digging through dusty old files in libraries and churches as they did touring national monuments and art museums. In 1987, Miller was elected president of the Maryland Genealogical Society.


Until almost the very end, he was a faithful member of his church, serving as a Presbyterian elder for more than 50 years. Miller also took great pride in his far-flung, extended family and their diverse interests. Nothing made him happier than getting involved in fighting a new injustice, but his heart practically burst whenever he heard about the latest achievement of one of his many descendants.

"We never led dull lives," Marge Miller said soon after her husband of seven decades passed away.

William E. Miller, Jr., is survived by his wife, who still lives in Bowie, and five children: Peggy Benedict, of Laurel, Md.; Warren, of Prescott, Ariz.; David, of Brussels, Belgium; Paul, of Pacific Grove, Calif. (publisher of The Pine Cone); and Stephen, of Rockville, Md.; as well as 20 grandchildren and five great-grandchildren.

A memorial service will be held at Christian Community Presbyterian Church in Bowie, Md., May 28, at noon. A reception will follow in the church's fellowship hall.

research."

For example, a postdoctoral researcher at MIT is working with a couple of teenagers on an efficient means of splitting water into hydrogen and oxygen, and using the elements to generate electricity in a fuel cell.

"We have this cutting edge research that

was just reported and they're still working on, and now we have the project idea on our website, where kids can do the same research using materials they can find in their kitchens," Hess said.

"So we're hoping to get a lot more people like that from the science community involved," he added. "That's one of the big benefits of the award: to get in front of those people."





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
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

Plus' contention that water rates would be lower with MPWMD in control of the Peninsula's water supply.

"If you are fully informed before you go into a meeting, you can ask intelligent questions and have a fair exchange," Brower said,

Brower also asked that Water Plus to give him a copy of the appraisal the group said it has that purportedly shows Cal Am is worth a meager \$102 million.

"The appraisal will be made available at the first workshop meeting," Weitzman wrote in an email response to Brower.

Water Plus says customers' current bills under public ownership could decrease by nearly 60 percent, taking into account the purchase and "possible condemnation costs."

Considering the cost of the regional water project and other expenses, including the removal of the San Clemente Dam, a \$38 monthly bill by Cal Am could skyrocket to \$141.74, "whereas under public ownership the increase could be as little as \$11," according to the group.

Water Plus contends Cal Am's purchase price, which it says is "arguably at most equal to Cal Am's 2009 rate base of \$102.5 million including debt and shareholder equity" is "more than affordable to ratepayers."

However, according to Richard Rauschmeier, a financial examiner with the CPUC's Department of Ratepayer Advocates, Water Plus' figures are a "gross oversimplification" of Cal Am's value.

In an interview in February with The Pine Cone, Rauschmeier called the connection between the rate base and the worth of the company "tenuous at best."

Half of the board skeptical

Meanwhile, MPWMD directors Dave Potter and David Pendergrass told The Pine Cone they have questions about the Water Plus proposal.

Potter said the Water Plus plan is "lacking in specifics."

"I'm not opposed to public ownership, but I'm very skeptical of actual costs," he said. "I think it has the potential to be quite pricey, and if the end goal is to save money for the local consumers, I don't know if we can get across that goal

Pendergrass said a buyout of Cal Am at this stage — when the water company is trying to close the deal on the regional desalination project, which will allow Cal Am to stop illegal pumping of the overdrafted Carmel River — is not a good

That's because if the MPWMD took over Cal Am, Pendergrass said, it would wreak havoc on the sensitive water purchase agreement Cal Am has forged with the Marina Coast Water District and the Monterey County Water Resources Agency for the project.


"There is an agreement with three parties as stated," Pendergrass said. "Cal Am is a signatory to that. If Cal Am is gone, it would destroy the current agreement."

MPWMD directors Judi Lehman, Regina Doyle and Kristi Markey did not respond to questions submitted by The Pine Cone about Water Plus' efforts.

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


Anne Gochrane McFarlane

Peninsula rebound bucks national trends

ON CAPITOL Hill, they say "all politics is local." But if you change "politics" to "real estate," you have an important insight into analyzing housing markets. To make smart decisions about buying or selling real estate, we recommend you ignore national or even statewide data and focus your attention on the neighborhoods that interest you. No city or town is immune from what is going on in the larger society, but there can be interesting and, at times, surprising differences.

The national news has been grim so far this year. There was an uptick in sales in March, but 40 percent of those were short sales and foreclosures. First quarter Monterey Peninsula results, on the other

hand, were significantly better for the entire quarter than last year. Not all of our local communities shared in the rebound, but those that did rang up substantial gains.

■ Dollar volume

Our favorite indicator is dollar volume, the actual number of greenbacks that change hands. The dollar volume in the quarter was \$246,472,877, a full 37 percent better than last year's \$180,537,668.

The big winners were Carmel with a 48 percent increase and Pebble Beach with a 55 percent gain. The only market that did not register a dollar volume gain was Marina which was down 14 percent. Check out that accompanying chart. It makes sweet reading after the misery of last few years.

■ Number of transactions

The number of transactions also had a nice gain in the quarter, up 23 percent overall, from 233 closed sales last year, to 286 this year. The big gainers were Monterey, up 61 percent; Carmel, plus 57 percent, and Pacific Grove and Seaside, up 45 percent and 43 percent, respectively. Curiously, Pebble Beach had two fewer sales this year but a

55 percent gain in dollar volume. The universe of properties sold this year was at a much higher price range. The median sales price in Del Monte Forest this year was \$1,990,000, as opposed to \$1,066,975 last year, which accounts for the large dollar volume gain on fewer sales.

■ Median sales prices

The price picture was mixed. Four markets had higher median sales prices in the first quarter of 2011, as opposed to last year, and six markets had declines. The gains were in the high-end markets of Carmel, Carmel Highlands, Carmel Valley and Pebble Beach.

The combined gain of dollar volume and price in the tonier markets suggests that high-income folks are getting back into the market, whereas the lower end, where buyers are more dependent on financing, is still under heavy financial stress.

■ Looking ahead

We look at our Market Barometer, a measure of the percentage of active listings in escrow, for guidance going forward. Our judgment is that a Barometer of 20 percent or higher indicates a reasonable amount of activity. When the readings get above 40 percent or 50 percent, one enters into red-hot territory.

with 64 percent of the listings in escrow on April 1, as investors continue to gobble up foreclosed properties. Marina is hot, too, with a reading of 44 percent. All of the markets exceeded 20 percent on April 1, except for Carmel Highlands, which registered 13 percent. In total, 286 properties were in escrow on April 1, which augurs a good performance in the second quarter.

Numbers can be ornery critters, refusing to fit into expected conclusions. With what we have pointed out above, a strong first quarter performance overall, one would think the number of escrows on April 1 would exceed those of April 1, 2010. Alas, it is not true. 
