## Monarch law: Protecting them from Doc Ricketts?

FAMOUS FOR his pioneering work as a marine biologist and his friendship with literary icon John Steinbeck, Edward "Doc" Ricketts has been romanticized by many as a groundbreaking environmentalist. But he was also a voracious collector who ran a successful business supplying biological specimens to laboratories and schools around the world.

In fact, according to Esther Trosow, one of the founders of a new advocacy group for monarchs, the city's renowned ordinance protecting them was probably enacted by the City of Pacific Grove to put a stop to Ricketts' ambitious collecting of the colorful insects, which he would kill and preserve for sale.

According to an article published in the

Pacific Grove Tribune in 1934, Ricketts — the owner of Pacific Biological Laboratories — captured a staggering number of butterflies.

"Pacific Biological Laboratories sold during this past summer 15,000 monarch butterflies and [they] have on hand about 17,000," the article reported. One local collector gathered about 3,800 butterflies "before breakfast one morning."

The article even offers a clever trick for easily catching the butterflies.

Collectors "have learned that the blossoms of the acacia secrete a substance on which the butterfly gets drunk," the article's anonymous author explained. "In this state, it is easily caught."

Founded by Ricketts in 1923, Pacific Biological Laboratories sold preserved animals — many of which were maritime aquatic species — to schools, museums, and research institutions. In its heyday, the lab was located at 740 Ocean View Ave. in Monterey (now 800 Cannery Row).

After Ricketts collected at least 32,000 butterflies in 1934, the city banned such activities the following year.

"I'm not sure exactly why the ordinance was enacted, but Ricketts must have had some influence on it," said Trosow, a board member for the new Pacific Grove Monarch Conservancy.

It is unknown if Steinbeck was involved in the collecting efforts. But the future Nobel Prize winner certainly admired the butterflies.

"Pacific Grove benefits by one of those happy accidents of nature that gladden the heart, excite the imagina-

## SIERRA CLUB LOSES ANOTHER LAWSUIT OVER SAND CITY RESORT

A JUDGE has ruled against the Sierra Club in the latest attempt to halt development of an oceanfront hotel in Sand City.

The Sierra Club filed suit last fall seeking to overturn a water permit issued to the \$300 million Monterey Bay Shores Ecoresort, which has been the subject of a two-decade permit battle.

In a decision issued April 29, Superior Court Judge Roger Randall rejected the Sierra Club's arguments that the Monterey Peninsula Water Management District had failed to take into account potential damage to the Carmel River and its steelhead trout population when it approved a permit that would allow the Ecoresort to use up to 90 acre-feet of water per year.

Randall also ruled that the environmental organization must pay the developer's costs of defending the suit. Ed Ghandour, president of Security National Guaranty, says he also intends to seek reimbursement of his attorney fees.

"The costs and attorney fees of defendants [SNG, the water district and Cal Am] in this case are around \$125,000," Ghandour told The Pine Cone Wednesday. "And we expect to recover all."

Ghandour said SNG attorney Sheri Damon will file a motion with the court requesting reimbursement of the legal fees from the Sierra Club.

The win is the latest for Ghandour, who at almost every turn has been victorious over litigation to stop him from building the resort, which he's sought for about 18 years.

The 39-acre Monterey Bay Shores Ecoresort, proposed on

## Council may put ambulance crews on city payroll

TO MAINTAIN quick response times for an aging population, the paramedics who staff Carmel's ambulance should become city employees, according to a report from former city council member Gerard Rose.

And because the ambulance service generates significant revenue, the cost of hiring the six full-time and 10 part-time personnel would only be about \$300,000 per year, Rose, president of the ambulance board, told the council May 3.

## Language teacher hit with three felonies

A DEFENSE Language Institute Arabic teacher — who was tased after he allegedly fought with officers in a DLI conference room — has been charged with attempted rape, assault with a deadly weapon, cruelty to a child, domestic violence and other charges.

Atef Samir Gergawy, 38, was taken into custody by Pacific Grove police officers April 29 on allegations he tried to rape his wife — whom police refer to as Jane Doe — and injured his son earlier in April.

But Gergawy, who has worked at DLI for 13 years, staunchly denied the charges Wednesday, telling The Pine Cone he never hurt his wife or his son.

"I never did that," he said. "They are false accusations against me."

His recommendation came in light of the fact the partnership between Carmel and the Carmel Valley Fire Protection District that created the Carmel Regional Fire Ambulance authority in 1990 will end on Dec. 31.

"If you cut through all the legal verbiage, what it means is the best way to assure we can retain our rights to deliver ambulance service to Carmel-by-the-Sea ... is to hire CRFA employees and make them Carmel employees," he said.

In his report, Rose pointed out CRFA workers are also trained as firefighters, making them "a crucial component of the Carmel Fire Department."

"On a daily basis, they will respond with the fire truck, depending on if the call is fire or medical in nature," he said.

The drive to dissolve the partnership between the city and Carmel Valley Fire began when the fire district's poor financial condition came to light following the retirement of C.V.

## For the love of Arnold

ARNOLD IS a Bichon Frise, known for his crop of white curls that only get brushed by the barber, and those dark, watery eyes that have seen much more than most. The elderly gent is better known about town than his parents, who feed him a substantial breakfast of raw, organic dog food and then button up his bright red coat and head to Ocean Avenue to supplement his meal with dog treats from bakeries and other businesses that have come to count on his visits.

Some people feel familiar enough to call him Arnie, but it seems to offend his sensibilities; he responds better to Arnold. Which is actually hard to tell, since he hears less than he sees. Yet somehow, like all the long-timers in town, he finds his way around, moving from one welcoming doorway to another.

Arnold reminds me of other



characters who have made their way through the hamlet by the sea, much like my grandmother, who lived by herself in a Murphy-built cottage but never felt alone in Carmel. Every morning she took a constitutional from her home on Lincoln uptown to the post office, greeting passersby and occasionally the headrests in parked cars (until she finally submitted to cataract surgery).

Just like Arnold, her leisurely stroll usually lasted past lunch, as she tucked into bistros and boutiques along the way, never meaning to linger much past, "Hello."

On the days that pass without Arnold, shopkeepers understand the old man is probably under the weather. Like a cat, Arnold has escaped death more than once. Yet every time he's down for the count, he rallies. And the townspeople know he'll be back to brighten their doorstep with his crimson coat and winsome wag for yet another day.

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# SMOOTH SAILING FOR P.B. HOTEL, HOMES EIR

A LENGTHY report to identify potential environmental impacts of a plan by the Pebble Beach Company to build a 100-room hotel near Spyglass golf course, create 90 single-family home lots in various parts of Del Monte Forest and add dozens of rooms at The Lodge and the Inn at Spanish Bay will be completed within a few months, according to county planners.

Consultants hired to work on the environmental impact report for the P.B. Co. plan are in full swing and should have a draft completed as early as August, according to Joe Sidor, the county's lead planner for the project.

In 2008, the company abandoned plans for an 18-hole golf course, equestrian center and driving range to appease the California Coastal Commission, which rejected the plan the year before for its impact on "environmentally sensitive habitat."

The latest plan has so far drawn little opposition. "It was important to come up with a project that we knew the coastal commission staff would support," said Mark Stilwell, the company's executive vice president and general counsel.

The consultants hired to write the EIR — ICF International — began work in January and are expected to have a draft ready for public review as early as Aug. 10.

The document will analyze potential environmental effects of the project, including its impact on aesthetics, air quality, biological resources, climate change and many other issues.

The PBC is paying for the the EIR, which is expected to

cost about \$517,000, according to Sidor.

"That doesn't include that county staff time or any technical reports the Pebble Beach Company has paid for," he added.

On April 27, the Monterey County Planning Department held a scoping meeting at the Pebble Beach Community Services District office to hear input from locals about what

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# Wayward French tourists rescued from back country

THANKS TO one wrong turn, a motorist from France managed see a part of Big Sur few locals have ever visited. Unfortunately for Fabien Desanti, the misguided detour turned into a vacation nightmare.

Desanti's odyssey began May 8 when she and her adult daughter — who were traveling in a rented 2011 Mazda — took a drive south of Carmel down Highway 1. Somehow she missed, or couldn't read, signs along the scenic route that warn motorists the highway is closed about 64 miles to the south at Alder Creek due to a massive slide.

After reaching the slide, Desanti turned around and headed back toward Carmel. At Nacimiento-Fergusson Road, she turned right and headed east along the winding route, which

offers access to Highway 101. But when she reached the crest of the road's summit seven miles later, she turned south along the South Coast Ridge Road.

For about 21 miles, Desanti traveled along the dirt route, which offers stunning views of the coastline and backcountry. But then the Mazda broke down. Despite being so far off the beaten path, she was able to get a cell signal and called for help.

The California Highway Patrol's Monterey office received her call about 7 p.m. With the help of an interpreter, it was determined she was stuck somewhere in the backcountry of Big Sur's South Coast.

CHP units from Monterey and King City launched a search for Desanti and her daughter. Meanwhile, a CHP helicopter from Paso Robles conducted a search of the area as well. About 2:40 a.m. Monday, the helicopter crew spotted the Mazda's hazard lights and passed on its GPS coordinates. But it wasn't until about 8 a.m. that a ground crew reached the two women, who were well fed and reported no medical issues.

"They were very, very thankful," CHP spokeswoman Leann Gamble reported. "We took them to the airport. They were ready to go home."

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# Winery versus winery over Gloria Fire

## ■ Second lawsuit in month

A SOLEDAD winery is suing another nearby winery alleging one of its employees set off a bird bomb that caused a 2009 fire that burned about 6,400 acres of land.

Diageo, Inc., which owns Chalone Vineyard, alleges in a lawsuit filed May 11 in Monterey County Superior Court that an employee of Constellation Wines — a giant wine producer — set off the pyrotechnic device, which Chalone contends caused a fire that resulted in \$274,307.92 in damage to its property.

Though Cal Fire investigators soon figured out a bird bomb was responsible for the blaze — known as the Gloria Fire — they never determined who set off the device.

But Chalone's lawsuit contends a Constellation Vineyard worker launched the

bird bomb from Constellation's property.

"As the fire department was en route to the fire location," according to Chalone's suit, "an individual on a quadrunner was fleeing the fire scene at a high rate of speed on a dirt road on Constellation Vineyard's property."

Chalone's lawsuit was filed less than a month after homeowner Mary Malolepsy filed a similar suit against Constellation, also alleging the large wine producer set off the bird bomb that caused the blaze that destroyed her Fabry Road home.

Chalone, which alleges negligence and liability, claims the fire "ensued" on its property, causing damage to vineyard, smoke damage to harvesting grapes and damage to seven power poles supplying electricity and telephone lines to the Chalone property.

Constellation "should have known of the ultra hazardous characteristics of bird bombs," according to smaller winery's suit.

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


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# Major flower show takes over Sunset

AFTER TWO years of planning, careful cultivation of plants and development of displays, meticulous floral arranging and organization of compelling speakers, the Carmel-by-

the-Sea Garden Club is hosting its first ever major flower show at Sunset Center May 13-14. Working with the members of four San Francisco Bay Area garden clubs, "Visions 2011 — California on the Cutting Edge," is a major show due to the number of exhibits and participants.

Carmel Valley resident Judy Harrold and Kristin Harris of the Hillsborough Garden Club are co-chairing the event. Headquartered in New York, the Garden Club of America boasts 200 clubs with a total of some 18,000 members who "dedicate their energies and expertise to projects in their communities and across the nation," and flower shows educate people about horticulture, conservation, environmental concerns, techniques and design.

The Carmel club is working with its counterparts in Hillsborough, Orinda, Piedmont and Woodside-Atherton to present Visions 2011, which will feature 300 individual entries in flower arrangement, horticulture and photography, as well as educational and conservation exhibits.

The show is free to attend, but it's also a fundraiser for the garden club — which uses the money to work on community projects throughout the city, like Piccadilly Park and the Harrison Memorial Library garden — so admission will be charged for programs presented by three highly regarded speakers Friday and Saturday in the theater.

a degraded site formerly used for sand mining, includes a 161-room hotel, 138 condominiums, conference and spa facilities, and a dunes restoration habitat project. It would be located across Highway 1 from Seaside High School. The land has long been zoned by Sand City and the California Coastal Commission for a hotel.

Though the water for the project would come from an aquifer beneath the City of Seaside, the Sierra Club claimed Cal Am would need to increase pumping from the Carmel River to make up for the water going to the ecoresort.

Sierra Club attorney Larry Silver last September told The Pine Cone "there shouldn't be any increased production from the Carmel River that is associated, attributed to or a cumulative impact of what they are providing" to the ecoresort.

But Randall ruled that Cal Am would "have no basis for increasing its drawdown from the Carmel River" because of the permit for the hotel.

Ghandour has a long-established legal right to 149 acre-feet of water for the project but would use about 90 acre-feet, which is about 29 million gallons per year.

The water district's Aug. 16, 2010, approval of the water permit for the ecoresort

came after it denied the permit two previous times.

After the board first turned down the permit request in March 2009, Ghandour filed suit. Randall sided with Ghandour and ordered the MPWMD board to reconsider the permit. The water board appealed, but the Sixth District Court of Appeal also supported Ghandour's water right.

Despite those rulings, in July 2010, the board voted once again not to grant Ghandour's permit, which led him to ask the court to find the water board in contempt.

Randall put that question off, but in a ruling issued Aug. 11, 2010, he ordered the water board to approve Ghandour's permit.

Ghandour will likely next square off with the California Coastal Commission, which in December 2009 rejected the ecoresort proposal, saying it was inconsistent with state environmental laws.

That decision also came after the commission lost in court against Ghandour. In 2000, the state agency tried to declare the ecoresort site "environmentally sensitive habitat," despite having specifically decided the land didn't qualify for that designation when it approved the Sand City Local Coastal Program in 1986. That LCP zoned the ecoresort site for a hotel.

In 2008, a judge overturned the commission's ESHA designation, because he said the commission was bound by its earlier decision about the property.

After that court victory, when Ghandour took his permit back to coastal commissioners, they rejected it again, citing erosion, noise, viewshed and other concerns.

Ghandour has two pending lawsuits

against the coastal commission, including a "takings" claim for more than \$200 million and another suit challenging the commission's 2009 denial of a coastal development permit for the project.

two small great horned owls.

"They were nested in a cavity [of the branch] so they were very difficult to see," said SPCA for Monterey County spokeswoman Beth Brookhouser.

The tree workers found the babies inside the pine tree branch after they had cut it down.

SPCA workers responded to the scene to find two healthy baby owls. Because the branch the baby owls called home had been cut, the SPCA decided to make a new home for the baby owls from a common household item.

A "makeshift nest was created by filling a green laundry basket with natural foliage," Brookhouser explained. "We then secured

the basket to a nearby tree."

The new nest was a success, and later that night, the owls' parents returned to their relocated babies, Brookhouser said. They might have even been happy about getting a reprieve from their demanding babies.

"It's likely that the parents were out getting some much-needed rest," Brookhouser said.

Every year, the SPCA gets baby squirrels and birds that have been injured or orphaned because of tree pruning.

Federal law requires that nests of threatened and migratory species — including great horned owls — not be disturbed until eggs hatch and the babies leave the nest.

"In this case, since the babies were inside the tree, they were difficult if not impossible to spot," Brookhouser said. "Because of issues like this, the SPCA recommends not pruning or cutting down trees during baby season."

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## Retired Big Sur realtor returns to his first love — writing

AS A longtime Big Sur resident, not only did Robert Cross hear more than his fair share of colorful tales about life down the coast, but he actually lived through several of them as well.

In his new book, “Big Sur Tales,” Cross has assembled a collection of his favorite stories about the remote coastal community, where he lived for three decades. With a fading memory and an easy-going sense of humor, Cross cautioned readers against taking the precise details in his book too seriously.

“If I don’t recall the stories correctly, remember that history is in the hands of the teller,” Cross laughed. “And if I offend anybody, it’s probably intentional.”

Like many aspiring writers, Cross was drawn to Big Sur, at least in part, because that’s where literary icon Henry Miller lived. But when he arrived from Kansas in 1961 to interview Miller, he neglected to notice a sprinkler in Miller’s Partington Ridge yard that soon turned him into a “drowned duck.” Seconds later, the famous writer opened the door.

“You must be Cross from Kansas,” Miller chuckled. “C’mon in and dry out.”

For the next two days, Cross sat spellbound as Miller played the role of the storyteller. And when Cross informed Miller that he’d spent the last of his money getting to Big Sur, the author of “Tropic of Cancer” paid for his two-night stay at Deetjen’s Big Sur Inn.

“He was one of the most generous men I ever met,” Cross recalled.

While Miller’s days in Big Sur were drawing to a close, Cross’ time down the coast was just getting started.

“Those were the days,” he recalled. “The 1960s were the best time to be in Big Sur.”

After visiting the area for more than a decade, Cross moved here in 1972. To make a living, he started selling real estate. Meanwhile, he bought an old cabin next to Nepenthe restaurant, fixed it up and settled into his new home.

It comes as no surprise that Big Sur is a storyteller’s paradise. Given its steep topography and twisting roads, even a trip to the post office can turn into a serious misadventure. In Big Sur, it seems, even the most mundane task or intention can become a comedy or a tragedy. And the tales of such misadventures only seem to get better with every retelling, especially if a strong drink is served.

As Cross explains in his book, he “spent an enormous amount” of time “hanging out” in most of Big Sur’s watering holes.

“Keep in mind, of course, that camaraderie can often be exaggerated under the influences of libation, late hours, heated debate and a general aversion to taking notes,” he explains in the book’s introduction. He also reminds the reader that “30 years is enough to blur anybody’s memory.” But the stories, he contends, “were all worth sharing then ... and now.”

Cross and his wife, Carolee, now live in New Mexico. As a result, there are no plans for a local book signing. But “Big Sur Tales” is available at [www.amazon.com](http://www.amazon.com) (\$12.95), and the book will likely soon be available in local bookstores as well.

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### Fact or fiction? C.V. play explores the art of making history

NEVER ONE to let the facts interfere with a good story, Lettice Duffet is Britain's most interesting tour guide. But in the stodgy circles of historical scholarship, Duffet's flair for embellishment is cause for grave concern.

Duffet's revisionist rants are at the heart of Peter Shaffer's Tony Award-winning play, "Lettice and Lovage," which opens Friday, May 13, at the Magic Circle Theatre in Carmel

Valley Village.

In "Lettice and Lovage," Duffet's creative interpretations of history get her in hot water with her no-nonsense supervisor, Lotte Schoen, who is appalled by the notion that someone would alter history to make it more entertaining. She fires Duffet, but the two women strike up a friendship anyway.

Playing the role of Duffet is Maryann Rousseau. "The character she plays is very eccentric and dramatic," explained

Elsa Con, founder and artistic director of the nonprofit theater group. "Maryann has a big sense of theater. The way she moves, she really brings her characters alive."

And playing opposite of Rousseau is Suzanne Sturn, who plays the more serious Schoen.

"She's a seasoned actor who really gives her character a grounded stage presence," Con said of Sturn. "Initially she's very critical of Duffet, but her character really lightens up."

Filling out the cast is Kalyn Shubnell, Philip Pearce, Brandon Burns and Hugh Leddy.

"They all bring a real British flavor to the stage," Con observed, noting that none of the actors are from England. "They all have enough training to pull it off."

Meanwhile, Con and her theater group have created an unforgettable backdrop for the play.

"The set is the most complex we've ever done," she added. "The set alone is worth the price of admission."

Written for English actress Maggie Smith, "Lettice and Lovage" premiered in London in 1987 with Smith playing Duffet. Its two-year string of 768 performances at the Gielgud Theatre ranks as one of the longest runs in London theatrical history.

The play debuted in New York in 1990 and won Tony Awards that year for Best Play and Best Actress (Smith).

The play continues Fridays, Saturdays and Sundays through June 12. Friday and Saturday performances start at 7:30 p.m., while Sunday matinees begin at 2 p.m.

painters descended on scenic vistas along the coast. There, they were greeted by a serene backdrop of cool fog, gentle waves and the occasional call of a seagull.

Lewis, who travels all over the country to participate in art festivals and contests, has three times received an honorable mention for efforts in the Carmel plein aire contest. Understandably, he's aiming for the top prize this weekend. "Maybe this will be the year," he suggested.

This year's event will be judged by Jean Stern, the executive director of the Irvine Museum.

# Bubble tea to go, outdoor cooking with kids, grapes and olives

**BUBBLE TEA** — a drink made popular in the United States by Asian restaurants and college kids — is seeing growing demand on the Monterey Peninsula, too, thanks to a pair of Harvard graduates who recently launched their business, “tea.zing,” in Carmel Valley.

Michael Joshi and Jessica Hightower (daughter of former Carmel Unified School District board member Dan Hightower) peddle teas and other treats in The Bubble Tea Truck, parking it at local high schools and farmers markets.

Joshi said shops selling the tea, which is also known as boba, tapioca pearl tea and tapioca, are more prevalent than Starbucks in many college towns. The drink is basically sweetened black or green tea combined with soy or creamer and one of several available flavors. Chewy, slightly sweet tapioca pearls fill the bottom of the cup and are sucked through a wide straw. The tea is then shaken to produce the bubbles that give it its name. Flavors include chai, chocolate, honeydew, mango, peach and strawberry.

After graduating, Hightower was surprised to discover bubble tea had hardly any presence on the Monterey Peninsula, “because in San Francisco or Los Angeles, it’s everywhere.”

The duo decided to try to fill that niche and initially considered brick and mortar.

“But we ended up deciding the mobile idea would give us a lot more flexibility and help us introduce the product to people, since we would take the product to them,” Joshi said.

On the road with their Bubble Tea Truck, Joshi and Hightower often encounter folks familiar with bubble tea, but they don’t find many diehard fans — yet.

They often field questions when parked at the Tuesday-afternoon farmers market on Alvarado Street in downtown Monterey.

“Especially at the farmers market, we get a lot of people and we have to explain what the drink is,” he said.

The truck also visits Santa Catalina School and York School in Monterey and Stevenson School in Pebble Beach each week, and makes appearances at festivals and other events, as well.

“Chopstix [a Vietnamese restaurant in Seaside] has bubble tea on its menu, but we feel we’ve played a bigger role in introducing it to students,” Joshi said. The venture also has a philanthropic angle, with part of the sales being donated back to the schools on a yearly basis.

Preparation of the tea is done in a commercial kitchen, and Joshi and Hightower spend 10 to 20 hours per week selling it.

“It’s allowed us to be really flexible,” he said, which is good for the clients of the tutoring business the pair also launched.

Michelle Estigoy, the students headed out with the chefs and instructors to harvest the produce they needed. Roos also reminded her students of an acronym to help them remember how to make food choices: FLOSS. (If a food is Fresh, Local, Organic and Seasonal, then it’s Sustainable.)

The partnership between Walter and Gaston Georis’ Carmel restaurants and the habitat project has been in place for years, with the restaurants using surplus produce from the student garden and making donations in return. The menus credit the habitat with providing produce, and when students dine there with their parents, they point that fact out with pride, Roos said.

She also said the interaction with chefs helps get kids thinking about their future goals.

“We hope that will inspire them or turn them on in a way they hadn’t thought about before, especially in a community like this where there are so many cool restaurants,” she said.

At the Wednesday session, Cox reported a few students raised their hands and said they wanted to be chefs. Their pizzas were successful, except for the one made by the two girls who went overboard on the cheese.

He said he’s led a dozen such cooking classes at the middle school and feels it’s important to bring other members of his kitchen staff so they can see how the Georises’ restaurants support their community. He said such outreach is more “marketing with heart than marketing with dollars,” and he’s eager to contribute further.

“We really like showing kids about local foods and the joy of eating food where it’s sourced,” he said. “I heard a couple of little boys waiting in line to get their pizza cooked, and they were saying this was definitely worth giving up their

lunch break for.”

## ■ Also at the habitat

The Hilton Bialek habitat project is seeking volunteers to help in exchange for gaining “some hands-on experience and knowledge for your home garden.”

On May 19, participants will learn how to handle cuttings from the habitat’s nursery, and on May 26, Roos will gather volunteers to plant vegetables and flowers in the garden. Their hard work will also earn them a snack in the outdoor kitchen.

Helpers are asked to park in the dirt lot adjacent to the property, dress in layers and wear proper shoes. Bad weather may cancel. Call (831) 624-1032 to confirm.

## ■ Cooking in the garden

A couple dozen Carmel Middle School sixth graders spent their lunch hour Wednesday harvesting organic produce from their garden at the Hilton Bialek habitat to make salad and pizzas in an outdoor wood-burning oven under the guidance of Casanova/La Bicyclette executive chef John Cox and his team. The foraging, cooking and feasting were part of an “ecoliteracy” class intended to help students learn about a wide range of environmental issues, including food choices, according to teacher and organic garden program director Tanja Roos.

**■ Carmel Bay Co. to pour wine, too**

Carmel Bay Company, an eclectic store that has inhabited the corner of Lincoln and Ocean downtown for decades, received permission from the planning commission Wednesday night to pour and sell wine in a tiny area of the shop — as long as the wine is local.

Former city council member Barbara Livingston wasn't so hot on the idea, however. She asked, "What business in Carmel will not apply for a wine-tasting license? When is it going to stop?"

In a letter to the city, store owner Barney Scollan said a 115-square-foot area adjacent to the sales counter on the ground floor would be used for tasting and selling locally produced wines.

"We feel quality local wine would complement our existing merchandise mix of home furnishings, dish ware, cookbooks, picnic baskets and select gourmet foods. We carried wine several years ago under our own label, and it was very popular both with visitors to our area and local customers," he wrote. If approved, the store would "carry a limited selection of high-quality local wines that reflect well upon both our area and our business."

After deciding to restrict the shop to carrying the wine of a single Monterey County producer, commissioners unanimously voted to approve its permit for wine tasting.

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

Fire Chief Sidney Reade in 2008. The district contracted with Monterey County Regional fire district to run its stations after she left and eventually consolidated with the larger agency last year.

Since 2009, the City of Carmel has managed CRFA employees, “so the CRFA board believes it is in the city’s best interest for CRFA employees to become city employees,” Rose said.

“If you can pick up six paramedics and the services of perhaps another 10 part timers, and you can do it for \$300,000, that’s just an unbelievable benefit to the city,” he argued. “The cost of a firefighter alone, not being a paramedic, is well in excess of \$100,000 a head, so we’re talking about a terrific benefit to the city.”

Taking any other route could cost the city its rights to operate an ambulance in the city — rights it won in a court battle against the county, which contracts with AMR to operate ambulances everywhere other than the city and Carmel Valley. The possibility of losing those rights, he said, “is just not worth the risk.”

But councilman Jason Burnett said that appeared to be a matter of legal opinion, and he asked whether putting paramedics and EMTs on the city payroll “is the only option, or is it the best option?”

“Our counsel has told us that in his opinion, you’re taking a risk,” by taking any other route, Rose said.

Representing the CFD union, engineer Ken Hutchinson said firefighters support the city’s hiring ambulance workers.

“It’s an excellent opportunity for the city to move forward and acquire local control of their ambulance and enhance the current operation of their ambulance and Carmel Fire Department,” he said. “There will be issues of transition, as with any any merger. We feel these issues can be overcome.”

Burnett worried the council would take an “irreversible step” without having all the facts and said he wanted clarification regarding differing legal opinions on what the city has to do to preserve its rights to offer ambulance service. He asked for a combined discussion of fire and ambulance services, since the council is also in the throes of determining how to operate its fire department.

“We need to do the research on the ambulance,” Talmage countered, since the timeline is short.

“If it’s simply information gathering and there’s no decision that’s going to be pointed to and we’re going to bring this back, then I can go ahead with it,” Burnett said. “I would like it combined.”

But McCloud interrupted him and called for the council’s vote. Members unanimously decided to ask Rose to return with further information and research so they might decide how to proceed.

the EIR should contain.

While several of the 40 people at the meeting asked questions about the plan, there was little criticism of it, and nobody said it should be stopped, Sidor said.

“We weren’t surprised by the lack of opposition, because the major obstacles were removed,” he said.

The plan includes 80 new guest rooms at The Lodge, 60 guest rooms and a 290-space parking lot at the Inn at Spanish Bay and a new 100-room hotel across from Spyglass Hill Golf Course.

The Spyglass project includes a 17,000-square-foot spa with underground parking for 40 vehicles, another parking facility for 160 cars and a new restaurant.

The project also preserves 635 acres as open space and

Gergawy’s arrest followed what police say was a violent encounter between him and his wife at their home April 16 on the 500 block of Gibson Avenue. The couple’s young son that day told police officers — who happened to be on Gibson Avenue on another call — about the row.

“He said, ‘My daddy hit my mom,’” Pacific Grove police Cmdr. John Nyunt told The Pine Cone.

After briefly speaking to police, the child ran back inside the house. Officers went to the home and spoke to Gergawy’s wife. Gergawy was gone by the time they arrived.

“She ends up disclosing that [Gergawy] grabbed her so that she had difficulty breathing” in what she described as a “bear hug,” Nyunt said.

“That never happened,” said Gergawy.

The incident happened after Gergawy told his wife, from an arranged marriage in their home country of Egypt, that he wanted a separation, according to Nyunt.

Gergawy acknowledged he and his wife have been having marital problems, but he said he never hurt her physically.

“I told my wife, ‘Please, I want to be separated,’” Gergawy said. “‘I am not attracted to you.’”

At some point during the argument, Gergawy tried to force himself on Doe, and “saying she had a duty to submit to him,” according to Nyunt.

“I never did that,” Gergawy said. “I’m not attracted sexually to my wife, so why would I do that?”

It was some time after Doe denied his advances that Nyunt said Gergawy squeezed his wife to the point she had difficulty breathing, which the teacher also refuted.

After the April 16 incident, officers went to Gergawy’s home several times to speak to him, but he wasn’t there, Nyunt said.

On a visit April 28 to the home, however, a police officer spoke to a neighbor who said he noticed a “raised bump” near Gergawy’s son’s right eye that was “reddish-purple.”

“The kid said his daddy smacked him and he hit his head on the door,” Nyunt said.

Gergawy told The Pine Cone he loves his kids dearly and would never harm them.

“My children are my life,” he said. “They are my kids. How can I hit my kids?”

His wife and children have since moved out of their Gibson Avenue house.

### Arrested at DLI

Having what Nyunt called “probable cause” to believe Gergawy had committed a crime, officers Rachael Beuttler and Terry Baggett went to DLI April 29 to arrest him. Two officers from the Presidio of Monterey Police were also there.

Police contend Gergawy fought back when they tried to

places a cap on building in Del Monte Forest.

“There is no development in that area in the current project,” Sidor told The Pine Cone. “All that area is in conservation easement under the current project.”

arrest him at the dean’s office.

Gergawy told officers “nobody was going to touch him and he did not want to be handcuffed,” Nyunt said.

Gergawy said he told officers he didn’t want to be cuffed and escorted outside in front of students and staff. He requested that officers walk him uncuffed to their patrol car.

“I told them. ‘Please don’t come to my work and don’t cuff me. I have been working here 13 years. You are going to make me humiliated,’” he said.

A struggle between Gergawy and the two P.G. officers ensued after that, Nyunt said. Though police said Gergawy punched Baggett, the teacher said he never intentionally hit anyone, and said he became agitated after the officer “jumped on” his back.

Gergawy also said he is bipolar.

“It’s a medical condition,” he said. “You can’t jump on someone who is bipolar and beat the crap out of him and expect him to act cool.”

Police said they had to deploy a taser to control Gergawy. Officers had to use it more than once because the device’s barbs initially didn’t make contact properly, Nyunt said.

“They tased me four times,” Gergawy said. “They almost gave me a heart attack.”

The officers were eventually able to cuff Gergawy, who was taken to the P.G. Police Department before being booked into Monterey County Jail. He posted bail not long after being arrested.

The Monterey County District Attorney’s Office charged Gergawy with domestic violence with injury, assault with a deadly weapon and attempted rape of a spouse, all felonies. He was also charged with causing injury to a child, cruelty to a child, domestic violence battery, damaging a telephone and interfering with a cellular communication device, all misdemeanors. He has pleaded not guilty.

Gergawy said he has been placed on administrative leave at DLI, but is desperately hoping to get his job back. He’s also having financial problems.

“This is America,” he said. “America was one of my biggest dreams ... to have my own freedom, to have justice and have fairness. Please don’t let this dream go away.”

tion, and instruct the young," he writes in 'Sweet Thursday.' "On a certain day in the shouting springtime, great clouds of orangy monarch butterflies, like twinkling aery fields of flowers, sail high in the air on a majestic pilgrimage across Monterey Bay and land in the outskirts of Pacific Grove in the pine woods."

### Following in Ro's footsteps

In recent years, Pacific Grove resident Ro Vaccaro — who was widely known as the Butterfly Lady — led local efforts to protect the butterflies, and in particular, the city's Monarch Grove Sanctuary. But she died three years ago, leaving a void of leadership among butterfly advocates.

Meanwhile, the population of monarchs plunged as residents blamed a tree-trimming project for the drop.

Concerned about the plight of the local monarchs, Trosow teamed up with Sharon Blaziek to form the Pacific Grove Monarch Conservancy. Blaziek is a former president of another local butterfly advocacy group that no longer exists, Friends of the Monarchs.

The group's intention is to advocate for the local monarchs and their habitat, educate the public about the butterflies and encourage research projects.

"We've been up and running for a couple months, and we're working toward our nonprofit status," Trosow explained. "We're looking for board members, so if you're interested, let us know."

# Edgar M. Ross

1919 - 2011

Edgar M. Ross, Ph.D., an exceptional, modest, loving man, a man of passionate progressive political views (as his nephew, Allen has said: "The last time anyone in our family voted Republican, it was for Abraham Lincoln"), superior intellect and humanity, committed to social justice, personal growth, and gifted with an overabundance of empathy and compassion who touched many lives profoundly, died peacefully at Marin General Hospital just past midnight on May 6, 2011, after several years of declining health.

He was born to Mathilda and Arthur Ross in New York City on April 9, 1919, and was the younger brother of Ralph Ross, Ph.D., professor of philosophy, who predeceased him by 11 years. He got his Bachelor's Degree from NYU in 1940, and his Master's Degree in psychology from Columbia in 1941. Ed's academic career was interrupted by WW II from which he emerged a decorated veteran, serving in the Navy in the Pacific where he survived three torpedo attacks. He returned from war to acquire his Ph.D. in psychology at NYU, continuing his training at the Postgraduate Center for Mental Health, becoming certified in psychoanalysis and psychotherapy in 1959 and subsequently joining the faculty at the PGC. He moved with his then-wife Els and their two children, Michael and Enid (later known as Rochel), to Carmel, California in 1971 where he established a private practice. After his divorce from Els shortly after their move to California, Edgar remained single until he married Patricia Friedman in 1986. Together, they moved to the San Francisco Bay Area in 1991, first living in San Francisco and, in 1996, moving to Marin County.

He was predeceased by his daughter from a brief first marriage, Stacey, and is survived by his beloved wife of 25 years, Patricia (whom Ed adoringly referred to as Tashi), his son Michael (wife Tina), professor of Political Science at UCLA, and daughter Rochel Rifkind of Tzfat, Israel (husband Shlaymeh), grandchildren Adam, Motti, Dina, Chaya, Shterna, Esti and Yossi as well as 6 great-grandchildren, nephew Allen Ross and family and niece Penny Warga and family. His son Michael, step daughters Leslie Friedman Johnson and Michele Friedman and Patricia and Ed's ever-attentive and much-loved canine companion, Millie, along with the incredible nurses on the 5th floor of Marin General Hospital, were instrumental in helping him through the last days of his life. Special thanks also to Jeri Marlowe, Sarah Johnson, Steve Johnson and Griffin Kamm. Ed leaves numerous patients and friends whose lives have been forever changed by being touched by this extraordinary man. 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# Editorial

## How to react when somebody makes \$4 million

WHEN THE Los Angeles Times asked former Salinas Valley Memorial Hospital executive Sam Downing why he deserved a \$4 million retirement bonus on top of his annual salary of \$650,000 and a lifetime pension of \$150,000 a year (plus COLA increases), Downing's answer was telling:

"I worked for this institution and gave them my heart and soul," Downing told reporter Sam Allen.

The idea that a lifetime commitment and plenty of hard work might be enough to justify such a gold-plated retirement deal must have been quite a shock to the legions of other people who devote their productive lives to a company or a cause and then end up getting by on \$50,000 or \$60,000 a year when they retire.

Which is not to say that no employee could ever be worth as much as Downing got. Indeed, it's entirely possible that the CEO of a big hospital — with its thousands of employees and annual budgets in the hundreds of millions of dollars — could deserve to be very well compensated. One way to measure this would be to ascertain whether his ability, education and experience made him so good at his job that nobody else could do it as well — at least, not for a lower salary.

But measuring such things is highly subjective. How, then, to decide what a hospital CEO is worth?

The answer is not as hard as it seems: Everybody is worth what another person is willing to pay him — but only if the payer is voluntarily parting with his own money.

Thus, a rock star can easily be worth millions, because when people buy tickets to his concerts or download his songs from iTunes, they are voluntarily giving up something that belongs to them and that they will only part with if they believe they are getting something of at least equal value in return.

A baseball player can easily be worth \$10 million a year if large numbers of people will buy tickets to watch him play in person or sit through commercials for the privilege of seeing him play on TV.

And a corporate CEO can certainly be worth a huge salary, stock options, access to a private jet and whatever else the company's directors shower on him, as long as the board of directors is answerable to stockholders whose money is diverted to pay the CEO.

Even the head of a charity can justifiably be paid a large salary as long as the people who contribute to it are fully informed about how their donations are being used and continue to make them anyway.

But the equation breaks down at institutions such as the government-supported SVMH, where the people who make the decisions about how much money an employee gets aren't the ones paying him, and the taxpayers who are forced to supply that money have no ready way to control what is done with it, especially if they have no idea what's going on.

Compensation for some government employees has gotten so out of hand that a shocked public is demanding more control. And their elected representatives are taking steps to give it to them. A good first step has been the decision to start making public disclosure of exactly who's making what in government. But vigilance is required.

So next time you hear about somebody making a huge salary, first ask yourself whether the money he's getting is being given up voluntarily by the people who pay it. If it is, you have no reason to be shocked or upset. But if it's not — and especially if you are one of the unwilling contributors to a fat-cat's government salary or pension — then you have every reason to start raising holy hell.

*What is 'sexual harassment'?*

Dear Editor,

I read with interest the article regarding the city council's decision to not adopt the proposed sexual harassment policy developed by outside counsel because it was "overlawyered." Reference was made in the article as to whether "whistling, winking, and staring" are against the law? I am assuming that "the law" being referenced has something to do with sexual harassment such as Title VII of the 1964 Civil Rights Act, the EEOC Guidelines on Sexual Harassment, or the several United States Supreme Court sexual harassment decisions addressing Title VII. As an FYI, whistling, winking, and staring, in addition to invading a person's space, looking a person up and down (elevator eyes), blocking a person's path, giving personal gifts, using inappropriate language by referring to women as "babe, sweetheart" or "dear," or a man as a "hunk," an off-color joke, and other actions, are (if unwanted), in fact, examples of sexual harassment and may create a sexually hostile environment. Identification of the many situations in which sexual harassment may occur and training employees accordingly with respect to the law is critical to have a workforce where respect for the individual is recognized throughout the workplace.

Sexual harassment is unwelcomed behav-

ior of a sexual nature. There are two basic types of sexual harassment. The first is referred to as "quid pro quo" and results in some type of tangible employment action such as a raise, promotion, demotion, etc., and involves a person in a position of authority (example: the situation involving the former city administrator). The second type of unlawful sexual harassment is referred to as "hostile environment" and generally results from the gender-based unwelcome conduct of other employees or others who may not be in a position of authority.

Considering the trauma that the city council has put the locals through with respect to addressing the sexual harassment "enigma," it is surprising that the council has now decided that the revised sexual harassment policy has been "overlawyered" and is willing to keep the existing policy.
