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Driver dies as car runs off Outlook Drive

A red minivan plunged 50 feet down an embankment in the Carmel Views neighborhood Thursday morning. Someone in the area heard a car crash and dialed 911, according to Cal Fire Battalion Chief Buddy Bloxham. When Cal Fire paramedics reached the vehicle, which had landed on its roof far below the road at Outlook and Pine Hills drives, they determined the sole occupant was dead. Firefighters later assisted the Monterey County Sheriff's Office with recovery of the body. No details on the driver or the cause of the accident were available. The CHP is investigating.

Budget anticipates Big 3 revenue increases

■ City manager questions odd expenses

WHILE ACKNOWLEDGING that Carmel is unique in many respects — including how it spends taxpayers' money - interim city administrator John Goss gently challenged some of the city's financial obligations last Thursday when he presented the proposed 2011-2012 budget, which estimates \$13,090,408 in revenues and \$13,074,249 in expenses.

"There are several service levels which are over and above that provided in other communities," he observed at the May 19 meeting. "While these services have been established by past city council action, and undoubtedly involved considerable thought and community input, current economic constraints could argue for revisiting these issues."

Specifically, he mentioned spending \$60,000 to deliver mail to homebound residents who can't make it to the post office and the \$44,000 annual cost of hand-watering recently planted trees.

"Any step to preserve the urban forest without the ineffi-

Supreme Court ruling may add to county jail crowding

THIS WEEK'S U.S. Supreme Court decision ordering the California prison system to reduce its inmate population by 32,000 within the next two years could mean as many as 400 more new prisoners in the Monterey County Jail, a rundown facility already bursting at the seams.

In a 5-4 decision, the Supreme Court ruled Monday that medical and mental health care in California prisons have fallen short of minimum constitutional requirements and have failed to meet the basic health needs of some prisoners.

"Needless suffering and death have been the well-documented result," wrote Justice Anthony Kennedy in the majority opinion.

The Supreme Court decision upheld an earlier ruling from the Ninth Circuit Court of Appeal that California had to release up to 46,000 prisoners. Since that decision, the state has transferred thousands of inmates to county jails, leaving the total prison Relieving congestion in one place, only to add to it in another?

population about 32,000 more than the court-imposed limit. Gov. Jerry Brown's administration has said the state could comply with the Supreme Court ruling — and avoid releasing dangerous criminals — by transferring thousands more convicts of less serious crimes and parole violators to county jail facilities.

But that would have a huge impact on Monterey County Jail, which has a capacity of 829 beds, according to Jeff Budd, the jail's interim chief deputy.

"I am approximately over 130 percent of my capacity today with 1,060 inmates," Budd said. "I foresee a rise in my inmate population to the tune of 200 to 400 more inmates from the 33,000 state prison inmates being released over the

Judge says Pollacci can get fair trial here

THE TRIAL of former liquor store worker Tom Pollacci — who was convicted last year of raping a woman before being charged with three more rapes will not be moved to Madera County as his public defender had sought.

Though Pollacci's attorney, Michelle Wouden, had argued the trial should be moved because it would be difficult to seat an impartial jury considering the extensive news coverage of Pollacci's criminal cases, Superior Court Judge Terrance Duncan ruled May 20 the trial will stay in Monterey County.

Duncan said the jury selection process would eliminate prospective jurors who are heavily biased against Pollacci, 51, who faces charges of forcibly raping two women in 2007 and 2008.

The decision came several days after Susan Geringer a university teacher and polling expert hired by Wouden to conduct a survey to determine if Pollacci could receive a fair trial — testified it would be necessary to move the trial.

Of the 100 eligible people Geringer surveyed in

Bulldozers demolish front yard golf course


■ Coastal commission order carried out






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Steelhead at San Clemente Dam highest in eight years

THE STEELHEAD population in the Carmel River is the highest it has been in years, according to fish counts conducted in May.

The counts, performed by volunteers and

staff with the Monterey Peninsula Water Management District, indicate that, as of May 18, 452 steelhead had passed over the San Clemente Dam and 204 over Los Padres Dam.

The steelhead run at the San Clemente Dam is the highest since 2003, and better

than the average count since the end of the 1987 to 1991 drought on the Monterey Peninsula, according to the MPWMD.

The run at Los Padres Dam — about seven miles upstream from San Clemente — is the seventh highest since officials began recording the fish counts in 1949. The number exceeds both the post-drought and historic average run sizes, and is the second highest percentage of fish at the San Clemente Dam to also pass over its upstream neighbor.

The steelhead season is likely over, since the last fish count at Los Padres Dam was April 24 and only one fish has passed over the fish ladder at San Clemente Dam since April 25.

The abundant steelhead population can be attributed to several factors, including a good run size in 2008, record rescues and rearing of juvenile steelhead, above normal rainfall and contiguous river flows, and possible improved ocean food chain conditions since 2007, according to Kevan Urquhart, senior fisheries biologist with the MPWMD.

State takes side of police officers in P.G. pension dispute

A STATE labor board has filed a complaint with the City of Pacific Grove alleging it violated state labor laws last year when it capped police officers' pension contributions and gave voters and the city council the power to regulate retirement benefits.

The four-page complaint filed May 13 by the Public Employment Relations Board takes issue with the city for limiting contributions to officers' retirement benefit plans without consulting the local police union—the Pacific Grove Police Officers Association.

In August 2010, the Pacific Grove City Council adopted an ordinance which caps the city's contribution to an employee's pension plan at 10 percent of workers' salaries. The city had contributed 19 percent for police officers into the CalPERS retirement plan.

"The ordinance violates the city's contractual obligation to pay its share of the police employees' retirement benefits and strips them of vested retirement benefits," according to a press release this week by a Sacramento law firm that represents the PGPOA

Voters agreed with the council and on Nov. 2, 2010, overwhelmingly voted in favor

of a measure to amend the city's charter to allow for the ordinance, which the PERB complaint also contends violated police officers' rights.

The PGPOA has a contract with the city until Dec. 31, 2012, in which officers also pay 9 percent of their salary into the CalPERS system.

In the press release, PGPOA President Sylvia Newton said the PERB complaint is a "vindication of our efforts to see the city keeps its promises to hardworking public safety employees."


Newton said the union will "continue to work with the city to ensure current and future public safety employees receive adequate retirement benefits."

CalPERS allows a police officer to retire at 50 with a substantial pension.

Police argue that it will be difficult to recruit and retain officers if their pension plan is capped.

The PERB complaint follows a lawsuit the PGPOA filed on Nov. 3, 2010, against the city over the pension issue.

"The retirement contribution ordinance exceeds the initiative power of the people and violates the city's charter and is therefore invalid and unenforceable," according to the suit filed in Monterey County Superior Court.

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

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

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Loving — but leaving — a lifetime in law enforcement

MEMBERS OF Cmdr. Tracy Brown's family seem genetically predisposed toward working for the Monterey County Sheriff's Office: His dad was there for 30 years, his son hired on in 2006, a cousin served for three decades, and another cousin and a nephew are on the payroll, too. Brown, whose last assignment was running the Monterey Peninsula station on Aguajito Road, retired this month after 27 years on

His retirement plans include running 20 head of beef cattle on a Northern California ranch he and his wife bought in

"I don't know much about cattle," he admitted. "I'll learn as I go, which is what I do with most things."

That was the case in his law-enforcement career, which he more happened upon than aimed for.

"When I was young, it just never crossed my mind, even though my dad was an lieutenant with the sheriff's office," he

Born and raised in Salinas, Brown attended Hartnell College, had held various jobs and was married with a daughter — and had a son on the way — when his dad pointed out he needed steady employment and suggested becom-

'I decided to give the sheriff's office a try and was very fortunate, because it was perfect for me," he said.

Brown joined the sheriff's office just nine days after his father retired and was instantly smitten.

"You never know what's going to happen, so when you show up, each day is different," he said.

It's also not the sort of work that directly translates from a classroom and textbooks.

"You have to do it," he said. "You have to make mistakes, and hopefully those mistakes don't get you hurt or killed."

Brown spent his first two years working in the jail and then applied to become a patrol deputy. At the bottom of the ladder, he worked nights — which at least freed him up to attend his kids' school field trips - and ended up being on duty seven Christmases in a row.

He was based at the Monterey station but was craving more action, so he transferred to the Salinas headquarters, and he spent seven years as a training officer.

"That was one of the most rewarding things I did," he said. "I developed lifelong friendships and learned a lot."


Brown was promoted to sergeant in 1995, worked at the King City station for a year and then successfully competed for an appointment to an administrative job conducting background checks and internal affairs investigations in Salinas. After two years there, he went back to King City for three, then returned to Salinas and was the supervising field training officer there.

After being promoted to commander in 2003, Brown oversaw the professional standards division, investigating complaints against fellow employees. He characterized that time as the toughest of his career.

"When you start with that unit, you think it's going to be fun to know the secrets of everyone in the office, but it quickly becomes a burden, and you don't want to know the issues with the employees," he said.

Brown's favorite work was patrol, and he oversaw that division in Salinas for three years before wrapping up his tenure at the Monterey station over the past couple of years.

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
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Hope Center celebrates feeding 1,473 people, 283 cats and 148 dogs

SITTING AROUND a kitchen table a year ago, five Monterey Peninsula mothers contemplated with concern a statistic indicating that 1 in 4 local children is "food insecure," so they decided to do something about it — and they knew their kids would want to help, too.

Together, they formed the Hope Center in Monterey, and on Sunday, the grass-roots group celebrated its first birthday with a fundraising party at a hilltop Monterra home

"We had no idea of the community support we would receive," commented executive director Kim Lemaire, one of the five founding moms. "We've had Brownie troops, Girl Scout troops, churches, private and public schools, Boy Scout troops, businesses and private donors fill up our center with food for people, for cats and for dogs."

The Hope Center is the only food pantry that also aims to help pets stay with their families, according to Lemaire, and with the assistance of Parent's Place in Pacific Grove, the center distributes diapers, wipes and baby formula, too. It also provides toiletries and food to a safe house for women in Monterey.

Solely run by volunteers, the Hope Center turns every donated dollar into food and other products Monterey Peninsula families need, and twice a month, the center invites people to come pick up the items they lack. Many who visit have never before asked for help, according to Lemaire. During its first year of operation, the Hope Center has fed 1,473 people, 283 cats and 148 dogs.

At the party, a half-dozen kids helped serve hors d'oeuvres and dessert, while the five women who make up the Hope Center board chatted with dozens of supporters. Lemaire welcomed everyone and thanked the group, mostly women, for being there and supporting the center throughout the past year. She then showed a DVD the kids made to explain the Hope Center's mission and spread its message.

Afterward, guests were invited to participate in a drawing for art donated by painters Simon Bull and Patricia Qualls, as well as a necklace contributed by Tiffany and Co. in Carmel. The raffle raised more than \$3,000, according to Lemaire.

"We are so blessed," she said.

Expert: Defoliated oaks are no cause for alarm

CALIFORNIA OAK moths and their ravenous appetites are making their periodic tour of Carmel Valley, which could alarm anybody who sees a grove of suddenly defoliated oak trees.

But there's nothing to worry about when the moth larvae eat nearly every leaf on a tree, according to Mark Stromberg, the director of the Hastings Natural History Reservation in Upper Carmel Valley. The trees are rarely harmed.

Stromberg said the outbreaks are just part

of a natural cycle — and the leaves will soon return

"There is good evidence from genetic studies that the moth and oak have been in coexistence for thousands of years," Stromberg continued. "Once the cycle passes, the oaks will grow new leaves."

The greatest threat to oak trees is not the



next two years."

Current recidivism rate for the county is 74 percent, which means most of the state prison inmates who serve their time in Monterey County Jail will likely commit more crimes and end up back there.

"I can reasonably assure you that twothirds of this population will return to my facility very quickly," Budd said.

In the meantime, the county is waiting for a portion of \$600 million in taxpayer money the state is supposed to hand out to add more jail and prison beds. But there's no timeline on when the money will arrive, and it's unclear how much Monterey County will receive.

Budd said the sheriff's office will do what it can to support the influx of inmates the jail expects over the next two years.

"We just met with a jail building vendor today and for the next few weeks will talk to others to see what is available out there for immediate construction to add on to our current facility," Budd said.

He called for more to be done to help released inmates so they don't return to jail.

"I think the County of Monterey needs to ramp up its job-building resources and find programs for housing and medical/drug programs," he said.

The possibility of getting hundreds more inmates at the jail comes at a time when staff at the sheriff's office could be reduced. The sheriff's office is facing budget cuts of about \$8.4 million for the next fiscal year.

"We have had to notify 28 people that they may be laid off or demoted." Budd said.

Sharp dissent

The Supreme Court justices were sharply divided in Monday's decision.

In his decision, Justice Kennedy said, "The medical and mental health care provided by California's prisons falls below the standard of decency that inheres in the Eighth Amendment," which bans cruel and unusual punishment.

Kennedy's opinion was backed by justices Ruth Bader Ginsburg, Sonia Sotomayor, Elena Kagan and Stephen Breyer.

In his dissenting opinion, Justice Antonin

Scalia wrote "terrible things" are "sure to happen as a consequence of this outrageous order." He also objected that courts should not substitute their judgment for the expertise of prison officials. And he said many of the prisoners to be released from state prisons will have suffered no ill effects from overcrowding, but will simply be "happy-golucky felons fortunate enough to be selected."

Also dissenting were Chief Justice John Roberts and justices Samuel Alito and Clarence Thomas.

The American Civil Liberties Union National Prison Project lauded the ruling.

"The Supreme Court has done the right thing by acknowledging what even the state itself has not disputed — that the egregious and extreme overcrowding in California's prisons contribute to a failure by the state to keep its prisoners safe by providing the basic levels of medical and mental health care mandated by the U.S. Constitution," according to the ACLU's prison project director, David Fathi, in a prepared statement.



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
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Chart-topping twins remember their famous dad

FROM HIS role in one of America's most beloved television shows, "The Adventures of Ozzie and Harriet," to his later incarnations as a pop idol and a country-rock pioneer, Ricky Nelson left a legacy worth remembering when he died in a helicopter accident in 1985.

This week, two of his sons — twins Matthew and Gunnar Nelson — will present a tribute concert, "Ricky Nelson Remembered," Saturday, May 28, at Sunset Center.

Throughout the early 1950s, an adolescent Nelson was a familiar face on television screens across America. When he was just 16 in 1956, he released his first single, "I'm Walkin'," which peaked at No. 4 on the pop charts. The flip side of the single, "A Teenager's Romance," did even better, reaching No. 2 on the charts.

More hits followed, including No. 1 hits "Travelin' Band" and "Poor Little Fool." From 1957 to 1962, Nelson had 30 Top-40 hits, and in 1958 and 1959 he recorded more hits than

By the mid-1960s — with "Ozzie and Harriet" winding down and the rockabilly-tinged pop that made him famous out of style - Nelson shifted his focus to country-rock and helped set the stage for the "California sound" of recording artists like Jackson Browne, the Eagles and Linda Ronstadt. Although his hits were few in the latter part of his career, he released one last Top 10 song, "Garden Party," in 1972.

Matthew and Gunnar, meanwhile, under the band name of Nelson, scored a No. 1 hit in 1990 with "(Can't Live Without Your) Love and Affection." Since Ozzie had a number one hit in 1934 ("And Then Some"), the Nelsons became the only family in pop music history to have No. 1 hits recorded by

Matthew Nelson told The Pine Cone that Saturday's performance at Sunset Center will be no ordinary tribute con-

"We miss our dad," he explained. "This performance is a celebration of his life. We wanted to put together a show that did him justice.'

The brothers hope the tribute to their dad is no mere trip down Memory Lane. Instead, they want to use the experience as the foundation for the next phase of their recording career.

"My brother and I are busy creating a new country rock sound," he explained. "We're not done yet. We're always writing and we're always creating."

New film shines light on nearly forgotten hit-makers

WHO HAD more hits in the 1960s than the Beatles? The answer is a group of of musicians you've probably never heard of.

The Henry Miller Library will screen a new documentary about the band, the Wrecking Crew, Friday, May 27.

'The Wrecking Crew" tells the story of a group of studio musicians who played on a staggering number of hits during one of pop music's greatest eras. The film is reminiscent of the 2002 documentary, "Standing in the Shadows of Motown," which explored the history of the Funk Brothers, who played on nearly every Motown hit during the same decade.

In the early 1960s, Los Angeles emerged as the epicenter of pop music. As musical talent flooded into Southern California, the burgeoning recording studios employed a core group of talented musicians to create a sound that would soon capture the attention of a genera-

The Wrecking Crew's recording output reads like the playlist on an old jukebox. Among the many hits the band

In eight languages, singers pay tribute to the music of the world

THE VOCAL talents of the Monterey Peninsula Choral Society will be on display Friday and Saturday, May 27-28, when the group performs at the Golden State Theatre in Monterev.

"We're a community choir and we've been around for 49 years," explained Ingrid Tower, who sings with the Carmel-based ensemble. "We have 112 voices. It's amazing when you get them all together."

Veggies straight from the farm, blending wine, and BBQing in Big Sur

A NEW co-op to get fresh produce from a small Hollister farm to Monterey Peninsula customers as quickly as possible is just getting off the ground, and Colleen Logan, one of the five who founded it, has set out to recruit sub-

By signing up, members make it possible for the farmer, Maria Catalan of Catalan Family Farms, to estimate demand for her organic produce, and since the customers pay in advance, they also help cover the costs of seeds and other essentials to bring the crops to life.

Like other groups that are part of the Community Supported Agriculture movement, the new WE Cooperative



connects people directly with the person growing their food, as well as those who produce other goods, such as jams, eggs, bread and honey, included in the weekly boxes. Deliveries from WE Cooperative began in February, and the number of subscribers is increasing as spring progresses to summer.

"Winter's a tough time, because not everyone's thinking about vegetables," observed Logan, who provides homemade jam and fresh eggs for the CSA deliveries.

Catalan's parents immigrated from Mexico as field workers in the 1960s under the federal Bracero program, and in 1994, she learned organic farming from the Rural Development Center in Salinas. She was the first Latina business woman to receive USDA recognition "for her journey from field worker to organic farmer," according to Logan.

A couple of other CSA groups already serve the Peninsula, but Logan said the WE Cooperative is different, because its boxes feature so much more than fruits and vegetables. It offers three types of subscriptions: a half box of vegetables plus items like eggs, olive, oil and honey; a full box of vegetables only; and a full box of vegetables plus goods. They cost \$20 to \$36 per week, and the longer the subscription, the greater the savings.

Workers harvest the vegetables every Wednesday morning and deliver the boxes to six locations for customer pickup: CSUMB, Monterey Institute of International Studies, Parent's Place in Pacific Grove, Congregation Beth Israel, the Wild Goose in Carmel Valley Village and Jamesburg.

"We have about 70 subscribers right now," Logan said. "But we'd like to have 200."

She acknowledged it can be difficult to recruit clients, especially when people are busy and have set shopping

"A CSA is definitely not for everybody, because some people want control over what they get," she said. But other people seem to thrive on the creative process of figuring out what to do with the contents of the box each week. To help, the cooperative sends recipe ideas and cooking advice to subscribers, too, and offers a lot of information on its website.

weeks.

The Feduniaks have also listed the 6,931-square-foot, 15-room house — which they bought for \$13 million in 2000 — for sale for \$19.5 million.

A realty sign marks an end to the couple's long court struggle to retain the tiny course, which had been in place 15 years before they bought the house. A weather-worn "Fan Shell Greens" sign still stands at the gate to the oceanfront estate. The new buyer will have an oceanfront view in a prime location but will have no mini golf course.

In October 2010 — the most major recent legal action concerning the golf course — the coastal commission sued the Feduniaks in Monterey County Superior Court, seeking as much as \$20 million for keeping the course after a 2007 appeals court ruled in the commission's favor.

During a hearing March 18, attorneys for both sides said they were in discussions to resolve the case, according to court documents.

The Feduniaks couldn't be reached for comment and their attorney didn't return a phone message. A deputy attorney general, Joel Jacobs, who's representing the coastal commission, said the commission "is always open to a fair settlement as an alternative to litigation."

The seemingly innocuous golf course — which looked like little more than a well groomed lawn to passersby — first drew the ire of the coastal commission in 2001 when the state agency was notified by a Del Monte Forest Foundation forester the novelty course violated a conservation easement limiting landscaping on the property to native plants — a

condition of a 1983 permit for the home.

In 2002, the coastal commission issued a "cease and desist and restoration" order that the golf course be removed and replaced with native plants, and threatened to fine the Feduniaks \$4,000 per day if they didn't comply.

The Feduniaks, who didn't know about the easement when they purchased the home, sued the coastal commission.

After a trial in 2004, a Monterey County Superior Court judge ruled the couple could keep the course because the commission had not raised objection to it for 18 years, leading the Feduniaks to believe the golf course was legal. In April 2007, however, an appeals court reversed the judge's decision, finding that "presumed knowledge" of the course wasn't enough, and that there was no evidence coastal commission staff knew about the course's existence until the forester notified them in 2001.

The Feduniaks appealed to the California Supreme Court, which declined to hear the case. Then, in October last year, the coastal commission sued the Feduniaks because they had kept the golf course even after the appeals court ruling.

In the lawsuit, the coastal commission said the Feduniaks' failure to remove the tiny golf course "damages natural resources, interferes with the coastal commission's attempts to uniformly and fairly enforce and administer the Coastal Act" and encourages other people to skirt the commission's rules.

Set on 1.5 acres, the estate features six bedrooms, four bathrooms, in-ground pool, hot tub, fitness room, five fire-places, library, wine cellar, a guest house and caretaker's cottage, according to Sotheby's International Realty.

FUN IN THE SUN

Be a tourist once in a while — rent a kayak or a surrey bike

LET'S FACE it — residents of the Monterey Peninsula live in one of the most beautiful areas on the planet. And all that scenery also provides lots of outdoor recreational opportunities. While tourists can be counted on to hit the recreation trail or rent a kayak, locals can easily overlook outdoor activities that are right under their noses.

If you ever find yourself bored on a weekend, try renting a wetsuit and snorkel and mask and braving the local water to take a peek at the world sea otters call home. If you're more dedicated, try a SCUBA diving certification course.

Here are a few other inexpensive and easily arranged summer boredom-breakers:

■ Paddle away

A popular sport in Hawaii, paddleboarding — in which the participant stands on a surfboard-like board and uses a paddle to propel himself — can also be done in local waters

Adventures by the Sea, a company owned by Frank and Michelle Knight, provides everything one needs to try out the sport or do it regularly.

"The paddle board rents for \$30 for two hours," explained Dustin Knight with Adventures by the Sea. "That includes a wetsuit, the paddle and the board. You can pick it up at one of our rental shops, either at Cannery Row, Lovers Point or our new one at Breakwater Cove at the Coast Guard Pier."

First-timers start on their knees, eventually standing up as they feel more comfortable. They use the paddle sort of like one would in a canoe.

"It's going to require a little bit of strength and a little bit of balance," he said. "You don't know until you try."

Like any new sport or activity, paddleboarding gets easier with practice. Lovers Point, one of Adventures by the Sea's locations, is a great spot to try paddleboarding.

"You won't be the greatest paddleboarder the first time," Knight said. "But two or three times, and you'll see improvement and will be more comfortable and be able to paddle farther."

Adventures by the Sea also has a paddleboard club, which meets Wednesday evenings and Saturday mornings.

"It's \$100 if you have your own wet suit, or \$120 if you need to use one of ours," Knight said. The fee covers six one-hour sessions with an instructor.

■ Kayaking

If your balance isn't great, or you'd rather sit down while enjoying the sights the local coastline has to offer, kayaking is the obvious alternative to paddleboarding. Kayaking also offers a great way to see Cannery Row or Fisherman's Wharf — from the ocean.

Adventures by the Sea offers one- and two-person kayak rentals, which allow users to safely get close to sea birds, sea otters, harbor seals or whatever else may be in the ocean at the time.

"It's \$30 per person and that includes all



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Conquering the sky in a 'taildragger'

PACIFIC GROVE resident Erik Fleming can fly upsidedown. And if you want to, you can, too.

Fleming, a full-time air-traffic controller at Monterey Peninsula Airport, also owns Adventure Wings Aviation, offering aerobatic instruction, thrill rides, sightseeing and pretty much everything that's possible in a single-engine airplane. His company motto? "Live at idle. Fly at full throttle."

In March, he acquired an American Champion Super Decathlon, a top-of-the-line aircraft with a sturdy frame and 190-horsepower engine. Because one of its landing gear is at the tail, it's known as a "taildragger." He bought the yellow and blue aircraft in St. Louis, Mo., and flew it home to Monterey, where his students have since named it "Blondie."

Fleming said the nimble, powerful plane can perform numerous aerobatic maneuvers, including those that reach high levels of g-force (up to -5 and +6).

Fleming began flying while he was in college in Houston, Texas. While he was taking flying lessons, U.S. aerobatics champion Debby Rihn-Harvey took him on an aerobatic flight in 1995. He was hooked.

"I'd been watching her practice, and I just wanted to go up

there and do that, and finally she had some free time and took me up," he said. "I didn't know what to expect, and I was worried I was going to get sick, just like all the people I have here worry about."

But after the first loop, Fleming said he was fine, no matter what maneuver she executed, including the jarring, topsy-turvy Lumcevak maneuver, in which a plane is purposely stalled and then falls in a spin.

After that, he embarked on aerobatics lessons and then moved to North Dakota and elsewhere as he worked for various airlines, ultimate-

ly landing the air-traffic-controller job with the FAA in Monterey in 2002.

Here, Fleming flew for the Navy club and took an instructor's job with Monterey Bay Aviation, which had a Citabria — a lightweight airplane used in aerobatics — in the hangar. (Read the plane's name backward, and it's main purpose becomes evident.) Being the only man in town to teach aerobatics and emergency maneuvers, like recovering from a spin, he amassed a healthy client base.

But then another pilot crashed the Citabria during takeoff, and it took Fleming a few years to find the right replacement.

Finally, the Super Decathlon appeared after its owner had to stop flying for health reasons. Fleming took a student with him to St. Louis, and the pair flew his new plane back to California on a two-day trip that had them flying no higher than 1,000 feet above the ground the entire time.

"I wish I'd had a camera mounted on the bottom of the plane, because we flew right over herds of pronghorn and antelope," he said. At one point, "there was a golden eagle flying, and he was only 10 meters off our wing and looked right at us as we passed by."

Near the restricted air space around Edwards Air Force Base, a pair of military P-38s cut in front of him.

"They had seen us and were just messing with us," Fleming said. "I wish I'd had that on camera."

Now, he wants to get the word out there's a taildragger back in Monterey. He recently performed an airshow for orphans in New Mexico and hopes to plan more charity shows for children closer to home, to entertain them and

show off what Blondie can do.

A couple of his students are working toward getting their special rating for flying a taildragger, while other customers have just wanted to go up for thrill rides and aerobatic tricks and even to overcome their fear of airplanes.

"I took this woman out who was totally afraid of flying, and we went over the bay and she wanted to see what a roll looked like, so I did a roll," he recalled. "And I ended up doing every maneuver the plane could do. She was one of the best passengers I've had." Still others want to learn skills that

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New trails offer convenient hikes to breathtaking views

WHILE A budget crisis in Sacramento threatens to close as many as 70 of California's state parks, the Monterey Peninsula Regional Park District - seemingly unfazed by funding woes — is preparing to unveil two impressive new hiking

And not only is the park district adding trails at a time when other park agencies can't afford to maintain existing hiking routes, but the agency is creating trails that are better graded and will require less maintenance than the paths most hikers are accustomed to walking on.

The new trails were constructed at 4,300acre Palo Corona Regional Park — which is located just east of Highway 1 and south of the Crossroads shopping center. The park was once part of the Palo Corona Ranch, which was privately owned until a consortium of agencies acquired it in 2002 for \$37 million. The park is open to the public — at least for now — on a reservation-only basis, in part because the park presently lacks adequate parking.

Prior to this year, the only trail in the park that was open to the public was the 1.5-mile Palo Corona Trail, a former ranch road that leads hikers to the aptly named Inspiration Point. The overlook offers stunning views of Point Lobos, Carmel and Carmel Valley.

In January, a new loop was opened through the park's East Field. Three new trails form the loop, which meanders for a little less than a mile through shady oak groves and gently sloping meadows. The loop provides a far less strenuous alternative to the Inspiration Point walk and features a variety of idyllic picnic spots.

Soon, the park district plans to open to two new trails that are certain to entice hikers — a two-mile trek to Gregg's Hill and a 1.7-mile walk along the newly christened Vista Lobos Trail to an overlook that offers dazzling views of Point Lobos, Carmel Point and Carmel River State Beach. (Neither hike is a loop, so the total mileage of each hike is double.)

"District rangers Chris Reed and Ray Trabucco spent countless weeks developing the new trails with a focus on accessibility," said Al Miyamoto, the park district's operations manager.

The trails have minimal grades and are surfaced with decomposed granite to make them user-friendly.


Reed, who camped on steep hillsides in Big Sur for three weeks while he worked on an ADA-accessible trail at the park district's Mill Creek Redwood Preserve, offered a glimpse of the science — and art — of trailbuilding.

"In addition to being accessible and barrier-free, the trails have been hidden from the viewshed to lessen the visual impact," Reed explained. "And they flow with the topography to minimize future maintenance requirements."

Trabucco, meanwhile, is thrilled the trails are ready for the public to enjoy. "The project has been extremely satisfying for everyone involved," Trabucco added. "I've looked at these hillsides for years and now to be part of making [these trails] available for the public is a career highlight."

The trail to Gregg's Hill extends the hike to Inspiration Point and offers sweeping views of the back country. The walk along the Vista Lobos Trail passes by a small pond and through a grove of Monterey pines before reaching the overlook, which no doubt will be a magnet for photographers.

For now, both trails are open to the public only by docent-led hikes. You can call the

park district office at (831) 372-3196.

The new trails are all part of the Big Sur Land Trust's Carmel River Parkway Vision Plan, which aims to create an extensive network of trails in Carmel and Carmel Valley. The work was paid for with Proposition 50 funds secured by the BSLT. The total cost of the recent work, which also included a realignment and resurfacing of the Palo Corona Trail and the retiring of several old ranch roads, came to about \$1 million.

could save their lives, like how to recover from a spin.

He starts the lessons on the ground, having students practice the various applications of rudder, throttle and aileron so they develop muscle memory before they are in the air.

"Then we go up in the air and practice,

and practice and practice," he said. "In this plane, you learn about finesse and being smooth and the things that aerobatics teach you about being calm. And plus, it's fun."

Thrill rides, sightseeing and whale watching tours are \$150; non-aerobatic flights are \$125 per hour plus \$50 per hour for instruction; and aerobatic flights are \$140 per hour plus \$60 per hour for instruction. Monterey County, 96 percent believed Pollacci was guilty "in one way or another, either probably or definitely," she said.

The results of the survey showed people thought of Pollacci as "vicious, despicable, guilty," "evil," a "slime ball" and a "scuzz bag," indicating "extreme bias," according to Geringer, who has performed surveys in other defense cases.

On Friday, Breeden said there was no question Pollacci could receive a fair trial in Monterey County.

has similar demographics to Monterey County, would have been a logistical challenge and would have cost taxpayers tens of thousands of dollars on top of what has already been spent — including at least \$7,500 for Geringer's study and \$4,000 for a prosecution study to challenge it.

The two women Pollacci is charged with raping came forward after hearing about his arrest in 2009 and subsequent trial in which he was convicted of raping an acquaintance in the loft of Ron's Liquors, the store his family owns and where he used to work.

He was sentenced to eight years in prison for the crime but remains in Monterey County Jail pending his new trial.

If you're traveling south of Carmel on Highway 1, take the last right before you reach the Carmel Highlands General Store and follow the signs and balloons.



hungry larvae that devour its leaves, but the human responses to such an infestation, he noted.

"It is an unnecessary and ill advised to cut down an oak tree because it has oak moths in it," he explained.


Stromberg also discouraged the use of insecticides to combat the moths. "It's not good for wildlife or people," he

Instead, Stromberg urged patience. "They could make new leaves by July," he suggested. "Just pretend fall came in June.'

Also, oaks have developed a defense mechanism against repeated attacks by oak moths, Stromberg pointed out. After a tree has been defoliated, its new leaves emit a substance that temporarily deters oak moths.

In 2007, Carmel, Monterey and Del Rey Oaks suffered a large-scale infestation of oak moths. The following year, many of Carmel Valley's oaks were defoliated as a result of the same phenomenon.

Oak moth infestations are often mistaken by the public as signs of Sudden Oak Death, which is caused by a fungus and has destroyed millions of trees — particularly tanbark oaks - in California over the past decade.

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




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The bill, H.R. 4040 or the Big Sur Management Unit Act, would expand the Ventana Wilderness by 2,287 acres. But some Big Sur residents argue that expansions of wilderness areas, where heavy equipment is prohibited, make it harder to maintain firebreaks, and that previous wilderness designations have put communities at risk.

The anonymous web site creator agrees: "During the 2008 Basin Complex Fire there were delays obtaining authorization to use heavy equipment in wilderness areas, including in some of the new 2002 wilderness additions," the website says. "Congressman Farr denies that this happened. However, it has now been confirmed by fire officials that substantial delays occurred."

The website solicits comments by email, but whoever is running it did not respond to a request by The Pine Cone to show evidence of that confirmation.

Like many Big Sur residents, the web author also argues that the federal government should not be buying land in Big Sur outside of existing forest boundaries. But he says Farr's bill will create more land deals outside those boundaries.

"The effect of the bill would be to enable appropriations bills to continue funding Forest Service acquisitions of private land outside the boundaries of the Los Padres National Forest," the website says.

The author would also like to see the bill amended to help provide a remedy to one of Big Sur's most pressing issues — workforce housing.

"Provide in the bill that the Forest Service is authorized to donate, sell and lease land for use as affordable workforce housing sites in the Big Sur area," the author suggests. "This would not require the Forest Service to provide land, or to build affordable housing. It would however enable the Forest Service to readily provide land for affordable workforce housing wherever that would be desirable."

These comments represent only a small fraction of the criticisms, insights and suggestions offered by the anonymous author on the website. Also included is an extensive history of the land use debate in Big Sur.

The author is clearly someone who has great familiarity with both the interworkings government and the politics of land use in Big Sur, and is likely a familiar face at local government meetings. But he wants to keep his name a secret.

"In the tradition of anonymous political commentary, the web master chooses to remain anonymous," the site says.

Congressman Farr's office did not offer a comment on the web site. While expansion of the wilderness is one of his

bill's most important provisions, it would also divide Los Padres National Forest in two, giving the portion that's in Monterey County its own funding source and management.


And it would designate portions of five local rivers (Arroyo Seco River, Big Creek, Carmel River, San Antonio River and San Carpoforo Creek) as National Wild and Scenic Rivers.

cient use of staff resources such as hand watering should be encouraged," he said in

Finally, Goss observed, "It is unusual to find a city of this size with a full-time street-sweeping operation." It costs \$82,000 annually to clean the streets of the one-square-mile city, and the 2011-2012 capital outlay budget also proposes to replace the 12-year-old street sweeper with a new machine that will cost \$29,000 per year in a five-year lease-purchase agreement.

He acknowledged those issues might be "sensitive to those in the community," but he encouraged the council and the public to examine them alongside all other costs and revenues in hope of creating a "fiscally sustainable budget."

Optimistic outlook

Despite the fact that developing the spending plan was "not an easy task, given the current uncertain economy," Goss predicted upticks in all three major income sources — property, sales and hotel taxes. He made "a very conservative projection" of property taxes' increasing from \$4,147,055

this year to \$4.2 million in 2011-2012. He predicted transient occupancy tax would rise from \$4,084,000 this year to \$4,210,000 in the next fiscal year and said sales taxes should improve from \$1,750,000 in the current budget to \$1,870,000 in next year's.

He also estimated business license tax would increase by \$10,000 to \$500,000, fees and permits would go from \$380,500 to \$405,000, and franchise fees would rise from \$495,579 to \$504,608.

The budget foresees declines in other revenue streams, such as income from interest and parking lots going from \$353,300 to \$253,300, cash from other government agencies declining from \$432,540 to \$382,800, and grant money dropping from \$600,760 to \$158,350.

Goss mentioned several options for upping the city's income, including phased paid parking, which could generate as much as \$2 million annually, and increases in property tax or hotel tax, each of which would require a popular vote. He also said the council should review and consider increasing parking-citation fines, the charge for parking in the Norton Court lot, fees for using the beach and parks, charges for putting up banners, and other fees — including charging for the fire engine's response to medical emergencies. He also recommended examin-

ing the fines levied for illegal activity.

"There likely is a need for a comprehensive review of the city's fees. Staff has provided examples of fees which appear low and probably do not cover the city's costs to perform services received by those paying the fees," he wrote in his report. "Making certain that the general taxpayer does not subsidize special services provided by the city to groups and/or individuals would be an important objective in developing a new fee schedule."

Public safety tops expenses

Regarding expenses, Carmel P.D. will top the list and is the only department to pass the \$3 million mark, at \$3,085,987 — an increase from the \$2,876,415 budgeted in 2010-2011. Included in that figure are a 5 percent pay raise for police officers and a 4 percent increase for non-sworn CPD employees set to take effect when the fiscal year starts July 1.

"While it is unusual during the current economic conditions to see salary increases provided to employees in any city, the purported effort of this adjustment is to bring Carmel police officers in line with what's paid officers in other Monterey County jurisdictions," Goss wrote in his report.

The fire department comes in second with estimated costs of \$2,079,181, compared with \$2,013,685 this year. Because CFD's future is up in the air, with the council's pending decision on whether to merge it with the City of Monterey's department, contract with Cal Fire to run it or find some

other option, Goss said the spending plan "reflects current department operations projected at next year's costs." It does not include the 8.75 percent pay raise firefighters were supposed to receive Jan. 1, according to their contract, because it is "apparently contingent upon the city's decision on whether or not to outsource fire service."

Public works, the third most expensive city department, will consume an estimated \$1,153,189, compared with \$1,081,837 in 2010-2011.

Many other departments, however — including administrative services, community planning and building, facilities maintenance and the forestry department — are expected to cost less than they are this year.

Goss estimated bills for outside legal services would drop from \$300,000 this year to \$100,000 in 2011-2012, assuming the city is not the subject of so many lawsuits. The city paid extensive legal fees stemming from the sexual-harassment case that targeted former city administrator Rich Guillen and a small group's efforts to stop the city from selling Flanders Mansion, among other matters.

Goss also pointed out he did not include money in the budget for hiring a new police officer, senior planner, human resources director and tree care specialist, nor did he fund requests from the planning commission for another planner or the forest and beach commission's \$100,000 for beach work, \$30,000 for parks and \$75,000 for "forest activities." Furthermore, he did not include

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Editorial

Encouraging people to break the law

IN 2003, Democrats in the state Legislature and Gov. Gray Davis put together a last-minute bill to let illegal immigrants have driver's licenses. But the people of California were so outraged, the measure was quickly repealed. And so powerful is public sentiment against letting illegals have driver's licenses, no serious effort has been made to revive the 2003 bill.

But that doesn't mean the open-borders crowd in the Legislature has given up. Their latest strategy, in fact, is to make it essentially legal to drive the highways of the state without one.

As strange as it may seem, that's the obvious intent behind AB 1389, which was authored by Sonoma County Assemblyman Michael Allen and is attracting considerable support from groups such as the ACLU and the Mexican American Legal Defense and Education Fund. The bill targets DUI checkpoints, which apparently have been netting a lot more unlicensed drivers than drunk ones.

"In many cities throughout California, as many as 20 vehicles of unlicensed drivers are towed for each DUI arrest made," according to Allen's office.

But instead of seeing that statistic as worrying proof of the huge number of unlicensed (and uninsured) drivers on the road, Allen and his supporters see it as evidence of unfair targeting of illegal immigrants by law enforcement. Their solution? Make it illegal for cops at DUI checkpoints to ask anybody for his driver's license unless he appears to be intoxicated, and for a vehicle to be impounded because the driver doesn't have a California driver's license if he has never had one.

Come again?

You read that right. According to the brilliant thinking of Allen, cops should be prohibited from asking to see the driver's license of somebody at a DUI checkpoint unless he appears to be drunk. And not having a California license should be considered a big problem if the driver is a citizen or legal resident, but not if he's an illegal.

And those aren't the only bizarre aspects of the law.

One section requires law enforcement to give 48 hours' notice of where a DUI checkpoint will be.

Another specifies that only drivers who choose to pass through the checkpoint will be scrutinized.

And another doozy mandates that an unlicensed illegal immigrant driver be permitted to move his vehicle to a nearby parking space to wait for a licensed driver to arrive to take it away. And if he can't do it, the cops have to move it for him.

If this bill passes, the only possible conclusion will be that our legislators have lost their minds. How else to explain their desire to encourage people to break the law?

It's not bias if it's true

According to an "expert" hired by the attorney for Tom Pollacci, Monterey Peninsula residents are biased against Pollacci because they use words such as "despicable," "scuzz bag," and "evil" to describe him.


However, Pollacci is a convicted rapist. Testimony at his trial last year made it clear he's also committed horrible deeds for which he's never been prosecut-



the \$2,600 the community activities and cultural commission wanted for making improvements at Vista Lobos.

The Carmel Chamber of Commerce's desired \$15,000 for marketing materials was not included, because Goss said the city made a onetime payout of that amount in 2010-2011. He also recommended keeping the payment to the Monterey County Convention & Visitors Bureau at \$106,000, rather than the \$114,000 the MCCVB wants. The nonprofit that runs Sunset Center asked for \$650,000, as opposed to the \$577,000 originally projected for 2011-2012, and Goss proposed a compromise of \$620,000.

"This proposed budget strives to continue the city's frugal approach in providing service, using all available tools to achieve a balanced budget," he said. "Every department account was reviewed and revised, if appropriate, so that a realistic statement of operating expenditures could be projected."

He estimated capital outlay, which focuses on replacing worn-out equipment, at \$313,860 in 2011-2012, while the capital improvement budget, which involves long-term infrastructure work, totals \$831,868 — \$344,308 of which would be covered by tax dollars from the Transportation Agency for Monterey County and the state.

In addition to contemplating whether the city should continue to fund home mail delivery, hand watering of trees and full-time street sweeping, the council should consider cost-cutting measures like combining police forces with Pacific Grove and joining other agencies for dispatching, and hiring outside contractors for human resources, street sweeping and IT.

Council members received the documents and fielded a few questions from the public, but they took no action. Questions about the budget can be emailed to jgoss@ci.carmel.ca.us, until close of business May 27, which will give him and other city hall staff enough time to compile and distribute answers to the council before its next budget meeting Tuesday, June 14, at 4:30 p.m.



"It was quite an adjustment for me when I came to Monterey," he said. "It's a smaller workforce, and a very different 'clientele' and lower activity level."

Among the scarier moments during his three decades with the sheriff's office was getting trapped in the Huckleberry Hill fire in Pebble Beach in 1987.

"I was doing evacuations by myself, and as I was driving along, I thought I was far ahead of the fire, but the fire caught up with me really fast," he recalled. "I was completely surrounded with smoke, and I couldn't see. I ended up backing up the car and didn't care if I hit anything." Ultimately, the only thing he wrecked was somebody's lawn.

He's never had to shoot anyone but has come close on more than one occasion, and he said the rewarding experiences on the job included receiving calls from people whose family members had been shot or killed by officers. They could have been enraged but were instead inquiring how the deputies were doing. "That was nice, because I field so may calls from people who are angry and not understanding what

empathy in his son, as well — one of the characteristics that led to his encouraging him to join the sheriff's office.


"You have to treat people in a humane fashion and have that sense of caring," he said. "If you have that built into your DNA, you'll be better at the job."

Now that he's retired, Brown said, he'll still ride with his son on patrol, but he won't be taking the wheel.
