Jury: Agha cheated customer who bought 'antique' clock

ONE OF Monterey County's most prominent businessmen fraudulently sold a modern clock to a customer who thought he was buying an antique, according to the jury in a trial that ended Tuesday.

Nader Agha, who owns Holman Antique Plaza in downtown Pacific Grove and a coin shop in Monterey — and who has been involved in a host of other local real estate deals, business enterprises, political campaigns and public controversies — made a "false representation of an important fact" when he sold a 10-foot-tall grandfather clock to Oakland businessman Theodore Vinther in October 2007, the 12-member jury said.

Throughout the trial, Vinther's attorney, Yolanda Huang, maintained that Vinther bought what he believed was an elegantly carved, antique mahogany clock, and that Agha, who advertises his store as "the finest and largest antique purveyor in the county," went to great lengths to convince Vinther that's what it was. Also, Vinther believed that a "massive" sale under way at the store, with prices discounted "50 percent," according to ads, meant he would probably get a good deal, she said

But after Vinther bought the clock for \$36,000, an expert in antiques restoration determined it was actually a modern replica of a Victorian-era clock. So Vinther asked for his money back. "This is a simple story," Huang told the jury during closing arguments. "My client took the clock home and realized it wasn't a real antique."

But Agha refused to rescind the sale, maintaining that Vinther had been repeatedly notified he couldn't return the clock once he took it from the store.

C.V. MAN ACQUITTED OF RAPE CHARGES

A 30-year-old Carmel Valley man said he's gotten his "life back" after a jury acquitted him last week of charges he sexually assaulted a woman inside a Carmel apartment — charges that could have landed him behind bars for a decade.

On February 5, Trafton Chandler was arrested by Carmel police after a 28-year-old Cayucos woman visiting Carmel with her girlfriends told police Chandler had tried to rape her in an apartment at San Carlos and Sixth.

After his arrest, Chandler was booked into Monterey County Jail, where he spent two days before posting 10 percent of the \$100,000 bond. Prosecutors charged him with oral copulation and digital penetration with an unconscious person and sexual battery.

City tells artist to drop his suit against mayor

A LAW firm hired by the City of Carmel fired back this week at Los Altos painter Gilbert Marosi, who is suing Mayor Sue McCloud in small claims court because she hasn't closed down Canapo Gallery, which he charges is guilty of defrauding artists.

In a letter dated June 7, Jon Giffen of the Monterey law firm of Kennedy, Archer and Harray warned Marosi that if he doesn't drop his complaint by Tuesday, June 14, the city will seek monetary damages for injury to the mayor's reputation, emotional distress and the legal costs and fees incurred by the artist's lawsuit.

"We have reviewed the complaint and find it contains allegations that are completely meritless and in bad faith," wrote Giffen, who added that "the Superior Court has clearly determined that you are a 'vexatious litigant." The law firm also took issue with a press release Marosi sent out which accuses McCloud of being an accessory to the crimes the artist alleges Porras committed. "The press release you issued concerning an alleged illegal business relationship between the mayor and business owner Carlos Porras is defamatory on its face," Giffen continued.

While Marosi said he is suing McCloud as a private individual and believes she can't use taxpayers' funds for her defense, Giffen argued otherwise. "She clearly would not have been sued had she not been mayor of the city," he responded.

At a June 6 special meeting, the city council authorized Kennedy, Archer and Harray "to pursue all necessary legal action against [Marosi] to bring the complaint to the earliest conclusion possible and to avoid the unnecessary expenditure of taxpayers

JUST IN TIME FOR SUMMER, BIG SUR HIGHWAY REOPENS

A SECTION of Highway 1 in Big Sur that had been closed by a massive rock slide April 14 reopened Thursday afternoon.

That means the entire 90-mile span of Highway 1 between Carmel and San Simeon is open for the first time since March 16, when a section of pavement near the Rocky Creek Bridge collapsed.

For Big Sur businesses, the reopening of the road is a cause for celebration, as the number of visitors slowed to a trickle while the world-famous scenic highway was closed.

"The road closures this spring

clearly illustrate the importance of Highway 1 through Big Sur to the economies of both Monterey and San Luis Obispo counties," explained Stan Russell, executive director of the Big Sur Chamber of Commerce.

Officials at the California Department of Transportation are also thrilled to see the scenic route south of Big Sur reopened. Caltrans spokeswoman Susana Cruz praised the project's contractor, Winsor Construction, as well as Caltrans workers, for getting the road open ahead of the estimated June 15 completion date.

"They worked really hard," said

Teenager survives leap from bridge

A 16-YEAR-OLD Carmel High School student who jumped from the Rocky Creek Bridge last month lived through his suicide attempt and was flown to a San Jose area trauma center by CALSTAR helicopter for treatment of his injuries, according to medics and the Monterey County Sheriff's Office.

Sheriff's Cmdr. Lisa Nash reported a passerby dialed 911 after seeing the teenager jump from the bridge the morning of May 27.

The first deputy to arrive "looked over the east side of bridge and saw a male 200 feet below, not moving,"

He summoned the sheriff's search and rescue team and went to talk to the crew of an ambulance at the scene, and together they saw the injured boy lift his

"They had to get special equipment to get down the

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
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

up into a frenzy of excitement or shift down into a peaceful calm.





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

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Brower denies allegation in letter-to-the-editor from water activist

THE CHAIRMAN of the Monterey Peninsula Water Management District board of directors — who also sits on a county hospitality board — denied allegations this week that a hidden agenda is the reason he won't meet with a group promoting a buyout of California American Water.

In a letter published in the Monterey County Herald June 5, Water Plus President Ron Weitzman suggested water district chair Bob Brower wants to "curry favor" with Cal Am so it will offer special water rates for businesses.

That's the reason, Weitzman contended, Brower won't arrange a meeting between the MPWMD and Water Plus, which has proposed the water district purchase Cal Am.

"Chairman Brower has repeatedly refused to schedule a public workshop on that proposal in order to do what?" according to the

letter. "Curry favor with Cal Am so that it will promote special rate treatment favoring the hospitality industry?"

Brower, a businessman who also sits on Monterey County Hospitality Association executive committee, flatly denied Weitzman's contentions.

"If I could curry favor, it would be for the residents of Carmel and Carmel Valley," said Brower, who is running for reelection in November. "Those are the folks who put me in office, and the folks I owe my biggest debt

Brower pointed out that the California Public Utilities Commission, not Cal Am, sets water rates for Cal Am customers.

"It's a foolish statement to make," he said about Weitzman's comment, "And he fails to understand the process. Rates aren't set by anybody but the state."

Water Plus, which says it supports the regional water project, proposed early this year that the MPWMD be dissolved and replaced by another agency. It has since abandoned that idea and is now pushing for the MPWMD to purchase Cal Am. Weitzman has requested Brower set up a meeting with the board to discuss the proposal.

However, Brower, who owns Chateau Julien Wine Estate, said he's repeatedly told Weitzman that he would arrange a meeting with Water Plus if it first handed over an appraisal of Cal Am it claims to have and the group has so far refused to do.

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Judge rejects Corn's appeal to be let out of prison now

THE JUDGE who sentenced Pacific Grove man Aaron Corn to more than seven years in prison for a 2010 drunken driving crash that injured several of his friends denied Corn's request last week to reduce the sentence, instead recommending he make videos from prison about the perils of drinking and driving as a warning to teens.

At a court hearing in Salinas June 3, Corn's attorney, Frank Dice, told Monterey County Superior Court Judge Russell Scott that Corn, 19, should not serve any more time in prison and should be placed on probation and allowed to enter a drug treatment

"Judge Scott gave us a fair hearing," Dice

told The Pine Cone, "but denied [the

Corn, who was not at the hearing, and Chelsie Hill, a passenger who was paralyzed in the Feb. 21, 2010, crash, recently wrote letters to the court advocating for probation for Corn. Hill has proposed she and Corn visit schools and tell teens about their experience.

But Scott — who sentenced Corn in March — suggested Corn tell his story via video from prison so it could show highschool students the dangers of drinking and

Monterey County Deputy District Attorney Todd Hornik agreed, saying a video of Corn in prison talking about his experience would leave an indelible impression on

teens, much more than if he made presentations on a stage in front of them.

'It would have much more of an impact," Hornik told The Pine Cone.

Hornik said he's also offered to join Hill in discussions with teens and provide his own perspective as a prosecutor.

Corn was drunk when he stole an SUV from a friend and transported four teenagers before losing control of the vehicle in Skyline Forest and crashing into a tree. The accident seriously injured several of his friends, including Hill, who was paralyzed and is in a wheelchair.

In January, Corn entered a no-contest plea to charges of causing multiple injuries in the crash and stealing the SUV.

During sentencing, Corn told Scott he felt

remorse for the crash and said since being in jail he feels like he has "matured into a man."

Dice had urged Scott to take into consideration that Corn was barely 18 when the accident occurred.

But Scott weighed Corn's previous behavior, which included a substance-abuse problem, when he handed Corn the sentence.

Corn was "described as someone who is always in trouble, someone who always caused troubled," Scott said in March. "And that is from his friends.'

Since the accident, Hill has told hundreds of high school students about her story. She also filmed an emotional public service announcement that airs on KION-TV.

Corn is serving his sentence at California State Prison, Solano.

He continued in the Navy Reserve and retired as a Lieutenant Commander. He attended UC Davis where he graduated with a B.S. in Agriculture and a PhD in Genetics in 1961. Carroll lived most recently in San Juan Bautista after moving there in 1973 to relocate a farm for Asgrow Seed Company. In 1980, he left Asgrow to go to Shamrock Seed in Salinas and later IPB Seed. Carroll was world-renowned vegetable seed breeder. He served as a Trustee on the Board of Gavilan College in Gilroy, CA and was a perennial student at the College taking Art, Theater and Video/TV classes so he could stay in Theater performances. His last performance was in April 2011 in Something Funny Happened on the Way to the Forum. Late in life, he developed an interest in videography and filmed for GavTV, theater performances, and commercial footage up through 2010. Carroll's favorite place in the world, other than his home itself, was the Carmel Beach. In years past, he could be found frequently running out into waves, to body surf back to shore with a slide he would tell stories about later. He died peacefully in his sleep at Salinas Valley Memorial Hospital on May 29, 2011.

Carroll will be remembered and missed always by his family for whom he provided in many loving ways until his untimely death. He was married to Ardith Morriseau Briggs whom



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Council takes steps to put ambulance workers on payroll

THE CITY council moved ahead Tuesday with a plan to make ambulance workers municipal employees by asking interim city administrator John Goss to help figure out how to do it.

For decades, Carmel has had its own ambulance, and it's a service residents have valued, considering the town's aging population and lack of house numbers.

"Historically, the city thought it was important to provide its residents with ambulance service," said former councilman Gerard Rose, who has long been involved with the ambulance's governing board, which is a joint venture between the city and Carmel Valley fire district. But that partnership will dissolve at the end of the year.

After it ends, the city will have to operate its own ambulance or contract with the county's provider, which "has standards that are much looser than the City of Carmel's self-imposed standards," Rose said. In particular, the Carmel ambulance arrives at the scene of an emergency in two or three minutes, while the county's standard is eight to 12 minutes.

"We know it saves lives," he told the city

council. "Help us help you by providing the best ambulance service available in this county."

And the way to do that, Rose argued, is to put those who work on the ambulance on the city payroll.

Longtime paramedic David Jedinak, who oversees the ambulance company, agreed. Since the current ambulance arrangement is "on its sunset tour," city officials need to act quickly to "to keep it and not farm it out" to anyone else.

Rose also said making ambulance workers city employees would reduce operating costs, though the extent could not be determined until after labor negotiations.

"It makes sound fiscal policy and common sense for the city to preserve and maintain" its ambulance service, he said. "This can best be done by bringing [ambulance] employees into the city."

Councilman Ken Talmage proposed a motion asking Goss to work with Rose and Jedinak on the process of putting ambulance workers on the payroll, first by developing an agreement with the labor groups.

He also hoped they could secure the ambulance's ability to transport patients in

the mouth of the valley area, which is technically county jurisdiction, as the ambulance company makes money from those calls and has been caring for patients there without a formal agreement in place.


The group will also have to wrestle with issues of retirement pay and insurance.

Councilman Jason Burnett wanted only Goss to work on the matter, without naming Rose and Jedinak, but councilwoman Paula Hazdovac said Goss will probably only serve as interim city administrator for a couple of months, while the other two have been involved with the city and ambulance service for decades, and will continue to be.

"I think if there's a difference of opinion, we'll hear it from both sides," Talmage said. "I don't expect it will be whitewashed. I'm comfortable with [the motion] the way it is."

"I think it's inappropriate to ask the three," Burnett countered. "I think we should be giving direction to the city administrator."

Mayor Sue McCloud said there was no reason to think an adversarial relationship would develop, and the council voted 4-1 to proceed, with Burnett dissenting.

Woman gets trapped in Greyhound bus bathroom, sues for \$\$\$

A WOMAN is suing Greyhound Lines, claiming she was injured after being trapped in a bus restroom during a trip from Southern California to Monterey County.

In a lawsuit filed May 27 in Monterey County Superior Court, Xiao Cheng alleges bus from Los Angeles to Salinas when she got locked inside the small bathroom. "The restroom door, restroom door latch

and restroom door lock were defective ... and as a result, plaintiff became trapped in the restroom and suffered injuries," according to Cheng's suit, filed by Monterey attorney David S. Mullally.

While trapped in the latrine, Cheng was "subjected to fumes," and had "fear of the enclosed space." She fainted, fell and suffered injuries to her "health and emotions," according to the lawsuit.

A Greyhound spokeswoman told The Pine Cone the company does not comment on pending litigation.

Cheng, who is alleging Greyhound was negligent and is claiming fraud, is seeking an unspecified amount of money more than \$25,000 in the personal injury suit.

Wind and rain can't stop Big Sur trail volunteers

TWENTY-SIX volunteers ranging in age from 4 to nearly 70 braved Big Sur's worst June weather in memory Saturday as they worked to repair Pfeiffer Big Sur State Park's Oak Grove Trail, which has been closed since the 2008 Basin Complex Fire.

The moderately graded 1.5-mile-long route takes visitors from Pfeiffer Falls to the Big Sur River Gorge. For families camping in the park, the path offers a less strenuous alternative to most of the surrounding trails, which are considerably steeper.

High winds and heavy rain hampered Saturday's effort — residents reported recording as much as three inches of rainfall during the storm. Dressed in warm clothes and rain gear, the volunteers cleared the trail of brush, downed wood and debris. They also removed a variety of invasive plants, including Italian thistle, milk thistle and genista.


Some of the volunteers traveled from as far away as Santa Cruz and Soledad. Eight of the workers, meanwhile, were employees of


While the volunteers made great progress, more work still needs to be done on the trail, according to Ventana Wilderness Alliance executive director Paul McFarland. In particular, a new bridge needs to be installed across a creek. But McFarland was encouraged by Saturday's effort. "I hope we'll see the trail reopened soon," he said.

Despite the foul weather, the volunteers seemed to enjoy themselves. "It was beautiful watching the sheets of rain move across the ridges," McFarland added.

After the day's work, the volunteers met at Big Sur Station for a reception marking the unveiling of the Ventana Trails Forever Fund, which aims to raise money for trail work in Big Sur.

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Council decides where electric vehicles should be plugged in

DRIVERS OF electric vehicles should be able to charge them up in town, come late summer. The city council unanimously voted Tuesday to install a charging station in the north parking lot at Sunset Center as part of a pilot program that won't cost the city anything until 2016.

After receiving a \$25,000 taxpayer-funded grant last year, the Association of Monterey Bay Area Governments, which represents three counties and 18 cities, analyzed potential locations for installation of four Blink charging stations. The machines are black and white, 40 to 60 inches tall, and similar in size to a multi-space parking meter.

A vehicle pulls up to the device, pays for a recharging session and plugs in for two to four hours, so the organization

Council denies appeal in dispute over driveway

A WOMAN who was upset over the Carmel Planning Commission's approval of a new house she said would interfere with her parents' driveway lost her appeal to the city council Tuesday.

Judy O'Day challenged the commission's April 13 approval of Kendon and Jillian Dressel's demolition and new home at the southeast corner of Casanova and Fourth, arguing that her parents have an informal easement over the Dressels' property and that their "proposed residence should be set back further from the easement," associate planner Marc Wiener told the city council June 7.

He recommended denying the appeal, because O'Day failed to provide "any legal documentation validating the existence of an easement." And even if it existed, Wiener said, setbacks for the Dressels would be measured from the property line anyway.

Moving the two-story house, which includes a garage that is partially underground, would encroach on the roots of "several significant oak trees" on a lot that includes 15 trees altogether, 11 of which are large and therefore protected, Wiener told the council.

A five-foot encroachment

A property survey conducted last November indicates the driveway encroaches onto the Dressels' property by five feet, and while the proposed residence will leave the driveway intact, the contractor will need to use two to three feet of it during construction, according to Wiener. He said the remaining driveway would still provide adequate space for the neighbors to access their carport.

But O'Day said the construction would, in fact, prevent her elderly parents from getting down the driveway. Her father is ill, and her mother struggles to care for him, so "it would be a significant burden to them if they could not get to the driveway," she said.

In addition, her surveyor said his study of the property conflicts with other boundary records, and he asked the city to help resolve the issue, but city attorney Don Freeman said arguments over easements and property lines are resolved by the landowners or the courts, not by the city council.

The lot is difficult to work with, according to Kendon Dressel. The plans call for a new two-story home with a 1,192-square-foot main floor, a 363-square-foot upper floor and a 232-square-foot lower floor that includes the garage, which is partially below grade.

'We put a lot of effort into this design and the plan, and one of our big concerns was finding a usable house that we could actually live in, given all the constraints on the property," he said. "There aren't a lot of options."

But he said he'd like to find "a reasonable solution" to the driveway problem, including sharing the costs of realigning

"I don't really know the O'Days very well," he said. "They seem like nice people, and we're going to be neighbors with them for a while ... I think we can work together and find a solution, and I think the solution that fits both parties is finding a driveway that provides enough clearance."

O'Day's surveyor said he doubted they would be able to solve the problem.

"We're certainly not close-minded to come up with a solution, but that might not be as workable as one might think,"

Councilman Jason Burnett moved denial of the appeal and asked the neighbors to work together to find a solution, and councilman Ken Talmage agreed, but Mayor Sue McCloud took issue with the matter's being heard by the council.

"I will not be going along with my colleagues, just because I don't think we should be dealing with this at the council level at all," she said. "Both sides have legitimate concerns. There are problems with both pieces of property."

Council members Karen Sharp and Paula Hazdovac had to step down, since they live nearby, and the vote to deny the appeal passed 2-1.

was seeking high-traffic destinations where people are inclined to spend a few hours, according to Linda Meckel of AMBAG. Carmel scored highly.

The program would cover the costs of installing the station, a year of network support and a five-year, prepaid warranty, while the city would at least recoup the power costs and could even charge a bit more to make a few hundred dollars per year. planners evaluated several potential locations in town for visibility, ease of access and proximity to a power source. Councilwoman Paula Hazdovac, a member of the city's traffic committee, favored a location on Ocean Avenue because it would be highly visible.

"It gives the impression that Carmel is a little more progressive than probably the way we seem to most people," she

Others favored the Sunset Center lot, in part because it has enough room for electric charging operations to be expanded

Councilman Ken Talmage said he didn't much care about

"I just want to get one," he said.

Resident Carl Iverson suggested the Carmel-by-the-Sea Concours on the Avenue, held during the Peninsula's Concours Week in August, would be a great time to showcase the high-tech machine if it could be installed in time.

Talmage moved to accept AMBAG's offer of the charging station and install it in the Sunset Center lot, and the rest of the council unanimously agreed.



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But after a week-long trial in a Salinas courtroom that pitted his word against his accuser's, it took a jury only 45 minutes May 31 to acquit Chandler of the charges. Chandler, a general contractor who graduated from Carmel High School in 2000, said he feels vindicated.

"It feels like I got my life back," Chandler told The Pine Cone Tuesday. "If I had been [convicted] of these crimes, it would have put an end to everything I have worked for."

It started at a bar

On Feb. 4 at around midnight, Chandler and three of his friends met three women including the alleged victim, Jane Doe, and her friend who lives in the apartment — at a Carmel bar. After visiting three other bars with the women, Chandler and his friends went to Doe's friend's apartment, where Chandler, who was intoxicated, decided to crash on the floor in a sleeping bag.

Sometime after 3 a.m., Chandler said he and Doe became intimate on a couch.

"They engaged in some sexual, consensual acts, but not sexual intercourse," Chandler's attorney, Tom Worthington, said.

At 6:15 a.m., when Chandler's phone alarm went off, the tenant of the apartment Doe's friend — noticed Chandler on the sectional with Doe and said, "What are you doing on the couch with her? She's engaged," according to Worthington.

Doe then said "Yeah, I'm engaged. Did you rape me?" Chandler told The Pine Cone. "That was when I was like, 'Oh no, what are you talking about?""

The woman, who immediately became hysterical, grabbed a knife from the kitchen and tried to stab Chandler but was held back by one of his friends. She then called 911 and told a dispatcher Chandler "tried" to rape her.

Police interviewed Chandler, who was arrested. But Doe's story — which included her contention she was unconscious when Chandler allegedly assaulted her — didn't add up, according to Worthington.

Inconsistent statements

During her testimony in the courtroom, the woman said she woke up to feel "this pressure in the vaginal area," Worthington said. "She essentially alleged attempted rape," he said.

And Doe also claimed to be drunk, though a test the next morning showed she had no alcohol in her system, Worthington said. "Her testimony was inconsistent with the forensic evidence," he said.

Friends of Chandler's and Doe's who were at the Carmel apartment the night of the alleged sexual assault also testified.

'Two girlfriends tried to support [Doe's] version of things," Worthington said. "But they were inconsistent with statements she made to police and the district attorney."

For instance, Chandler testified that before he and Doe engaged in foreplay, Doe performed a striptease for him and his friends, taking her clothes off down to her bra and panties, — something Doe denied.

It was also revealed at the trial that Doe offered the men much more than a peep show. "She propositioned every one of the men there to engage in sexual activity," according to Worthington, who added that one of Chandler's four friends left the apartment shortly after Doe's offer of sex, which the woman also refuted.

Chandler's accuser also denied that panties taken from her that were tested for bodily fluids to help determine if she had been sexually assaulted were hers, according to Worthington.

The woman's motive for claiming Chandler assaulted her was simple, Worthington said: She needed an alibi to prevent her fiancé from finding out she cheated on him. "She had had to have a story for her boyfriend," he said.

Chandler came up with his own tale during his initial interview with police officers about the incident, something he soon regretted. "At first I told them nothing happened," he said. "This is where I think I went real wrong with everything — not being honest with them right off the bat and telling them what happened."

But Chandler also blames the Monterey County District Attorney's Office for not hearing his side of the story. "I don't feel like my side of the story ever got out to the prosecution until trial," he said.

Monterey County Deputy District Attorney Mike Breeden declined to comment on the specifics of the case, saying "We respect the jury's decision."

Chandler said news of his arrest, which was published in The Pine Cone, stunned his friends and clients. But they stood by him during the past few months, which Chandler described as being "emotional, stressful and

"All my friends stuck with me, and my customers as well," he said. "They knew it wasn't true."

Though Worthington said he's represented numerous clients in which a jury found there was reasonable doubt they committed a crime, he said Chandler wasn't one of them.

"This is not a case of reasonable doubt," he said. "This is a case of an innocent man falsely accused. Every single one of the jurors looked him in the eye and shook his hand" after the verdict.

"That was huge," Chandler said.

While his personal and work life is back in full swing, Chandler said he's walked away from the experience with a couple of lessons. "I've learned, No. 1, that nothing good happens past 12," he said. "I shouldn't have been staying over at that girl's house. I didn't know anything about her or her friends. I should have left when I had the chance.'

"You can have buyer's remorse all you want, but you can't come in and say you were cheated," Agha's attorney, Christopher Cayce said during the trial.

Cayce also maintained that Vinther had "immense, deep knowledge of grandfather clocks," and had to know the Italian Renaissance-style clock he bought was a modern replica. Agha's theory was that Vinther wanted the clock for its mechanism and may have asked for his money back after removing it. Therefore, it was Vinther who was acting in bad faith, Agha maintained.

Vinther had some strong documentary evidence to back his story, however — documents which apparently convinced the jury Agha was lying:

- At the time of the sale, Vinther was given a handwritten receipt made out by Agha's wife, Nadia, who works for her husband. "10-22-07 Received \$36,000 for Nader clock, Italian Renesons," the misspelled receipt said.
- More than a year later, when he was about to be deposed in the case, Agha produced a different receipt, this one from a preprinted receipt book. The new receipt was also dated Oct. 22, 2007, and bore a serial number of 592631. "Carved Mahogany Grandfather Clock, \$36,000 cash," it said. In his April 2009 deposition, Agha testified he had prepared this receipt at the time of the sale and left it for Nadia to give to Vinther when he paid, but that she couldn't find it, and that's why she made out the first receipt.
- But when Vinther's attorney asked to see the receipts from the preprinted book immediately before and after the new one, Agha's attorney, Christopher Cayce, vehemently opposed the request. Only after Monterey County Superior Court Judge Kay Kingsley ordered Agha to produce them did Agha give Huang receipts 592630, which was dated Nov. 14, 2007, and 592632, dated Nov. 16, 2007. Vinther had asked for his money back on Nov. 15, 2007.

Cayce explained the long delay in producing the receipts and the discrepancy about when the second one was prepared by telling the jury, "We were just trying to sort out the evidence." He also said Agha made out the new receipt in November not because of Vinther's demand for his money back, but because "it was time to pay the taxes on the sale."

But Huang argued that Agha "created" the second receipt that said "Mahogany grandfather clock" in an attempt to "defeat" the first receipt. And she said any reasonable person would look at Agha's constantly shifting story as evidence he wasn't telling the truth.

The jury agreed with Huang.

"We're very grateful they recognized that my client was defrauded," she said after the verdict.

The jury award Vinther no damages, however, apparently believing he should have known better than to pay \$36,000 for a clock without doing more checking into its provenance.

The next step, Huang told The Pine Cone, is to ask Kingsley to order "rescission" of the sale of the clock — in other words, for Vinther to give the clock back, and for Agha to return the \$36,000, which is exactly what Vinther asked for shortly after he bought the clock more than three years ago.

'Attacks me for everything I do'

An unusual aspect of the trial was an effort by Agha and Cayce to discredit The Carmel Pine Cone and reporter Kelly

Nix over a story he wrote soon after Vinther sued Agha, and to have reporter Chris Counts barred from covering the trial. Cayce told the judge he was afraid Counts would discuss the case with his coworker. Kingsley denied the request to have Counts removed from the courtroom but ordered him and Nix not to discuss the case before Nix took the stand.

In a story published Oct. 31, 2008, and headlined, "Lawsuit claims \$36,000 Italian Renaissance clock was a fake," Nix quoted Agha as saying he told Vinther that the clock he was buying was "probably about 20 to 30 years old."

But in his deposition six months later, Agha testified he "had no opinion" about the clock's age.

Nix was subpoenaed by Huang to testify that Agha, in fact, made the statement about the clock's being 20 to 30 years old. On cross examination, Cayce questioned Nix's professionalism and motives for writing the story, picking apart certain quotes,

even paraphrases, and questioning their origins. But Nix showed Cayce his original notes, which matched Agha's quotes in the October 2008 story.


During earlier testimony, it became obvious Agha was upset The Pine Cone covered the story at all, calling it "yellow journalism" and "not worthy of news," adding that the owner of The Pine Cone, "attacks me for everything I do."


In front of the jury and the judge, Cayce attributed The Pine Cone's supposed antipathy toward Agha to the fact that he was "trying to buy The Pine Cone," which Cayce said upset the owner.

However, that statement was not true. Agha has never contacted anyone at The Pine Cone about buying it.

And if he had, Pine Cone publisher Paul Miller said in an email to Cayce after the trial, "I would not be upset at all. It has happened many times, from strangers and from friends. I always just tell them, 'No,' and go about my business."

dollars to defend the complaint."

Not backing down

In response to the city's legal threat, Marosi showed no sign of backing down. He said he would be "happy to dismiss" his lawsuit if the city pays him \$25,000 — \$14,000 for the value of the paintings "Mr. Porras stole from me" and \$11,000 for legal expenses. He also wants the city to revoke Porras' business license and pay for the legal defense of a slander suit Porras filed against him Sept. 24, 2010. The gallery owner claims statements made by Marosi to McCloud, Carmel police and the Monterey County District Attorney's Office harmed his reputation.

Over the past two years, Marosi has been embroiled in a series of lawsuits with Porras. Marosi is accusing Porras of failing to pay him \$2,500 in commission. Porras does not deny that he owes the artist the money. Instead, he is refusing to pay the commission until the artist gives him two portraits that he created of Porras. The gallery owner said he and Marosi verbally agreed that the portraits would be part of the

Marosi admitted painting the portraits, but he insisted he created them as gifts. And when Porras failed to pay him his commission on the two paintings that sold, he decided to keep the portraits.

Two other artists — Angela Gomez-Rubio of Clear Lake and Hugo Lecaros of Sunnyvale — have previously filed lawsuits claiming they weren't paid commissions. Gomez-Rubio later dropped her case, saying she lives too far away to pursue it. Lecaros later received a settlement from Porras.

Don Becker of Las Vegas, Nev., meanwhile, said Porras convinced him in 1995 to invest \$10,000 in a business deal. A short time later, Becker learned Porras had declared bankruptcy, so he took him to court. Four years later, he finally received a judgment against Porras. Becker said he received \$4,400 through a Chapter 13 trustee but claimed the balance of the judgment remains unpaid.

The Carmel Police Department has forwarded complaints about Porras to the Monterey County District Attorney's Office, which so far has declined to file any charges against the Carmel art dealer, whose business is located on the east side of Dolores between Fifth and Sixth.

Marosi's case against McCloud is scheduled to go to court Thursday, July 14.

"People are appreciating the idea of running in the name of someone they love," she said. "It gives them the chance to sit back and reflect on someone special in their life."

Although the run was started by University of Virginia students to honor their fallen classmate, Love pointed out people can celebrate anyone, not just those they have lost. Participants will be able to pay \$3 for a special bib bearing the name of the hon-

An avid runner, Love oversees the Big Sur Marathon's Just Run youth athletics program and has been working hard for more than a year to launch Carmel's new run. In organizing it, Love said she has been overwhelmed by the support and offers of time, money and assistance from members of the community. The city has backed the effort as

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
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
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GLOBETROTTING ARTIST MOVES TO BIG SUR, UNVEILS SHOW AT SUNSET CENTER

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

A LOOK AT **CARPET PILE**

Close inspection of carpeting reveals that the fiber can either be cut, looped, or both. Sixty percent of carpets sold feature cut pile which has exposed yarn tips that have the most luxurious feel and look. Cut-pile carpets include popular saxonies and velvets which have level surfaces. The cut-pile family also includes frieze which is a rugged, nubby style. Some cut-pile carpet also features twisted yarn which enhances durability. Loop-pile carpets have less of a soft feel but more durability because the yarn wears on both sides, not the ends, which helps loop piles maintain their twist longer. Finally, cut-and-looppile carpets combine both styles. Sometimes referred to as "sculptured," this style offers bold patterns and col-

dirt road, because the ambulance couldn't get down there," she continued, so the medical crew and deputies used a sheriff's office patrol truck to make their way to the victim.

"When they got down there, they saw the guy was standing," she said.

Paramedics tended to the teenager and brought him back up the hillside, where a Salinas-based California Shock Trauma Air Rescue helicopter landed in the highway to carry him to a trauma center because of the severity of the accident and his injuries.

The deputy also located the boy's car near the bridge, according to Nash. Music was blaring from the unoccupied vehicle, and he found some handwritten documents inside that alluded to the boy's struggles.

"Obviously it's an attempted suicide," she said. "But he survived."

Cruz of the effort. "They worked on weekends, and they worked in the rain. It's been a couple months of really hard and dangerous work. The workers deserve a lot of credit."

In the end, the project will have cost taxpayers an estimated \$4 million. Over the past two months, workers moved about 130,000 cubic yards of rock and debris — or 286,000 tons. To help accomplish it, helicopters transported heavy equipment as much as 500 feet above the highway, where workers pushed the rock and debris downhill.

The dangerous nature of the work was highlighted May 12, when two Caltrans workers were injured by falling rocks. One worker, who suffered a broken arm, was briefly hospitalized, while another received stitches.

The effort to clear the slide received an unexpected assist April 26 when the California Coastal Commission issued an emergency permit allowing workers to push a large portion of the debris directly over the ledge instead of trucking it to disposal sites as far as four miles away.

The troublesome section of highway near Rocky Creek Bridge, meanwhile, was reopened to one-way traffic April 20 and is now controlled by a traffic signal. Motorists traveling between Carmel and Big Sur can expect very brief delays. A long-term solution is likely years — and tens of millions of dollars -— away.

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

More city records headed to shredder

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Pollacci trial put off until July

THE NEXT trial of convicted rapist Tom Pollacci set to begin Monday was put off until July 11 at the request of his public defender, according to Monterey County prosecutor Mike Breeden. Pollacci was found guilty last year of raping a woman in the loft of his parents' Pacific Grove liquor store and sentenced to eight years in state prison but has remained in county jail pending a jury trial on three new rape charges levied by two more women.

Meanwhile, a hearing before Monterey County Superior Court Judge Adrienne Grover regarding prosecution witnesses has been set for June 15 at 3:30 p.m. Breeden and public defender Michelle Wouden will argue for and against the deputy district attorney's right to call as witnesses other women who allege sexual misconduct by Pollacci, even if those allegations were never reported or adjudicated.

Breeden said he's looking forward to moving ahead with the trial, considering the new charges were filed a year ago.

"It would be nice to get the case tried," he

THE MONTEREY Peninsula has a grossly inadequate water supply — a situation which does continuous harm to the local economy, prevents even minimal new housing, frustrates homeowners who need to make additions to their houses, renders it impossible for most businesses to grow, thwarts essential public projects, discourages firefighters from practicing their skills and forces owners of vacant land to leave it unused or sell it at a big loss. And those things happen in years with plentiful rainfall.

If a serious drought strikes, you'll have to stop flushing your toilet, yards, gardens and golf courses will go unwatered, hotels rooms will have to be shuttered, restaurants will be pressured to reduce capacity and thousands will lose their jobs.

Meanwhile, the Carmel River is pumped dry for months every summer, suffocating fish, killing riparian vegetation, and leaving the riverbed looking like an off-road 4WD track.


This situation has gone on for more than 20 years and has only gotten worse. We have written about it over and over again, and we're going to keep doing it until our local, county, regional and state officials get off their butts and do something. They created this water shortage, and they can fix it in very short order. All they have to do is decide to.

- Mayor and city councils may not be able to create new water projects on their own, but they must be unified and vociferous in their demands that something be done.
- The board of supervisors, while it mostly represents parts of the county with no water shortage, also has a duty to protect the health, safety and prosperity of the residents of the Monterey Peninsula. Because the situation is so desperate, it should be one of the board's top priorities.
- The Monterey Peninsula Water Management District is one of the sorry agencies that is directly responsible for our water mess. As an adjacent letter to the editor makes clear, some members of the water district board, including chairman Bob Brower, are trying to do something to protect their constituents. Other members, however, are still bent on choking off the Peninsula's water supply in zealous pursuit of their unyielding and seriously misguided no-growth agenda.
- But the real fault lies with the California Legislature, which has created all the bizarre laws that resulted in a cut-off of our water, alongside the contradictory ones that mandate we have an adequate supply, which are also right there on the same books with the laws that make it impossible to have one.

While all this goes on, our water bills keep going up. Meanwhile, the media
— in particular Monterey County Weekly and the Monterey County Herald —
do their best to undermine any progress toward a new water supply.

Some people say global warming will result in droughts. Others maintain it will increase rainfall. If it's the latter, we are in serious trouble, because we are barred from using most of the water that flows down the Carmel River anyway. And if it's the former, then you might want to start thinking about moving elsewhere.

Water problems, water solutions Dear Editor,

Water challenges continue to be significant in our area. Previous efforts have improved some water availability; however, those efforts, while significant, cannot solve the severe water shortage we face. We have until 2016 to solve our illegal water diversions from the Carmel River and overdraft of the Seaside basin until state regulatory action will force us to reduce water consumption to 35 gallons per person per day. As chair of the water supply committee of the Monterey Peninsula Water Management District, I support and we are currently working on the following supply projects for our

- 1. ASR project No. 1 is 90 percent complete and fully functioning. ASR project no. 2 is 50 percent complete and should be finished in 2011. Both of these projects, which will store water in aquifers, could supply up to 5,326 acre-feet of excess water flow from the Carmel River.
- 2. A new smaller desal project that will supplement the area's water supply and may be used by each municipality as they see fit.

The size of this plant would be a reasonable 2,000 acre-feet of water annually.

- 3. Groundwater replenishment using treated wastewater from the Marina MRWP-CA plant. This will help eliminate potential saltwater intrusion and provide a future supply of reusable water. This could provide 2,700 acre-feet annually.
- 4. Work with Cal Am Water for improvements on Los Padres Dam for improved fish passage and increased storage.
- 5. Additional water storage projects in the Seaside basin (such as ASR projects 1 and 2) could be added to the list in the near future. We are now investigating water transportation issues to these storage projects.

The current water board has made great efforts in working together to achieve solutions. While the above solutions are in the forefront of our efforts, every alternative will continue to be looked at for its feasibility and affordability.
