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## Appeals court sets Salinas session to hear Flanders case

LAWYERS ON both sides of the fight over Flanders Mansion will argue their positions before a three-judge panel in Salinas Oct. 20, according to the California Appellate Court.

Attorneys representing the City of Carmel and the Flanders Foundation — which have been waging battle over the fate of the historic mansion for a dozen years — will make their case at 9:30 a.m. in the Monterey County Board of Supervisors Chambers.

The hearing will be the latest step in a convoluted process dating back to Carmel taxpayers' purchase of the old Tudor-style house and surrounding property, which became Mission Trail park, in 1972. Since then, elected officials have been debating how to use the home, without resolution, and in 2004, the city council embarked on an effort to sell it for use as a single-family home. Extensive deed restrictions were placed to maintain public access to the nearby land and views of the mansion, and to preserve the building itself.

But the foundation, comprising a small group of preservation activists led by Melanie Billig, sued in November 2005 to stop the sale, and in February 2006, the nonprofit won when Monterey County Superior Court Judge Robert O'Farrell decided the city's environmental impact report failed to meet the requirements of the California Environmental Quality Act, and that the proposed sale needed to be approved by a vote of the people.

Consultants extensively revised the EIR, finally completing it in 2009, and the city held an election that November that saw residents voting 757-439 in favor of the sale.

The next step would have been to offer the mansion to public agencies before it could be put on the market for private buyers, but the Flanders Foundation's attorney, Susan Brandt-Hawley, sued again, saying the EIR should have

# Collins claims county officials lied about his water role

Says they asked him to take consulting job, assured him there was no conflict

STEPHEN COLLINS, the former county water official accused of having an illegal conflict of interest when he also worked for a consultant on the proposed regional desalination project, has filed a claim against the county alleging that false statements by officials have severely damaged his reputation and made it difficult for him to work.

He also claims the county owes him almost \$50,000 in consulting fees in connection with his work on the water plan.

## Janitor, girlfriend arrested for library theft

A MAN who spent more than two decades cleaning city buildings was arrested for grand theft — and promptly fired — after he reportedly admitted stealing a backpack inadvertently left at Harrison Memorial Library last month.

William Ransome, 51, and his 40-year-old girlfriend, Paula Norman, were arrested Aug. 19 after police officers tracked the bag's contents — two iPads — to a car in Seaside, and Ransome turned himself in, according to Carmel Police Sgt. Mel Mukai. He was taken to Monterey County Jail.

The theft was probably a crime of opportunity. A woman called police Aug. 19 to report losing her backpack, which contained the iPads and other possessions, at the library.

## Man dies in undetected Big Sur house fire

PALO COLORADO resident Robert Coakley, a 1982 graduate of Carmel High School, died Sept. 15 after the mobile home he was living in caught fire, according to the Monterey County Sheriff's Office.

Coakley, who grew up in Carmel Valley and was the son of Carmel Valley Lodge owner Peter Coakley, was 47.

"He was great guy," recalled fellow CHS graduate John Franklin, who had known Coakley since they attended middle school together. "He has happy-go-lucky, and he always seemed to be having fun. He was a very gentle person. Everybody seemed to enjoy his company."

Coakley lived atop Green Ridge, a neighborhood located about three miles east of Highway 1.

According to several of Coakley's neighbors, nobody was aware

— at least at first — that his home was on fire, due to a thick

## Authors Fest draws broad talent, devoted fans

THE FIFTH annual Carmel Authors & Ideas Festival being held Sept. 23-25 at Sunset Center in downtown Carmel is sold out, founder Jim McGillen said Wednesday, and planning is already under way for next year's event.

The festival began Thursday with hundreds of school kids gathering in the theater to talk with former U.S. Supreme Court Justice Sandra Day O'Conner, who will also address students Friday, for a total of 3,000 young attendees from throughout the county, according to McGillen. Rather than interviewing O'Conner in front of the audience, as he has done in the past, McGillen said this year, he is handing the microphone over to the kids.

"We're going to have the students interview her," he said. "She'll walk out on stage and give an overview, and then go over and sit down, and the three or four students will start asking her questions," presumably about her experiences as a woman on a male-dominated court, the election of President George W. Bush, and whether a female-dominated Supreme Court would decide cases differently.

The festival features three dozen highly regarded authors and experts speaking in Sunset's large auditorium and to smaller groups throughout the weekend. The lineup includes Pulitzer Prize winning columnist Dave Barry, bestselling author Scott Turow, Sports Illustrated writer Rick Reilly, TV health expert Dr. Nancy Snyderman, and Wall Street Journal columnist and author Peggy Noonan, just to name a few.

And because the festival focuses not just on authors, but on ideas, a handful of the featured guests are not writers, McGillen pointed out, like Dr. W. Douglas Boyd, a pioneer in robotic cardiovascular surgery.

"He hasn't written a book, and he's a wonderful speaker," McGillen said. "Wouldn't it be a crime if I couldn't invite him?"

Organizers also put together a panel of speakers to address how technology is changing the world, and the lineup includes top executives from Google, Facebook and other Internet powerhouses.

McGillen attributed the festival's sold-out status in part to his keeping the ticket price at the \$550 it has

## Fire brigade to AT&T: Phone backup and Internet will help save lives

THE MID-COAST Volunteer Fire Brigade — which serves the north Big Sur Coast — has tried unsuccessfully for more than two years to strike a deal with AT&T for it to use fire brigade's generator to keep phone company's equipment functioning when the power goes out. The fire brigade has also sought, without success, to connect AT&T Internet service to its fire house.

MCVFB Chief Cheryl Goetz told The Pine Cone this week that despite countless phone calls to AT&T, the generator and Internet issues remain unresolved. "There's so much red tape," Goetz explained. "There is no clear person to talk to."

AT&T provides the only telephone service for residents of Palo Colorado, which is hemmed in by mountains and usually out of the reach of cell phones towers. And without Internet service for the fire

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## Sandy Claws

PELICANS, seagulls and other shorebirds are common sights at Carmel Beach — so common, they're often hardly noticed.

But when a royal blue hyacinth macaw swoops onto the sand, people and their pets pay attention.

Not yet 2 years old, Tulku is a rare and endangered Tibetan parrot who was born in Brazil, rescued in the San Francisco Bay Area and roosts in Carmel. His name means, "The one who gets to choose his own reincarnation," which some believe he already may have

A regular beachcomber, Tuk has been known to cause canine commotion while parading upon his person's shoulder along the beach. The vivid blue bird, whose eyes and beak are rimmed in bright yellow, turns green when wet. Although he loves his bird bath at home, Tuk steers clear of the water rushing to the shore.

But he does love to dig his claws into the soft sand, to land on a stranger's shoulder, to nibble on buttons, bread, bedposts and nuts. Considered gentle and loving, although his wings have been trimmed, Tuk is full flighted and tends to take off when startled.

When Tuk does take to the sky, like a kite without

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a string, he flies in circles and usually swoops back in for a soft landing on his person's shoulder. On occasion, he disappears, most often to be found atop a tree, stuck like a cat until the fire department, tree trimmer or anyone else who isn't afraid of heights climbs up to carry him back to the ground.

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
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


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## Coin laundry loses \$2,000 in coins

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
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## Man sues sheriff's office, alleging mistaken gang ID and severe beating

A MAN who says he was severely beaten following an arrest for drunken driving is suing Marina police and the Monterey County Sheriff's Office, alleging they're responsible for his injuries.

In a personal injury suit filed against the the City of Marina, Monterey County and the sheriff's office, Thomas Dewey alleges that sometime after being arrested in the early morning hours of Aug. 2, 2010, and booked into the Monterey County Jail, he was beaten so badly he had to be transported to a San Jose hospital for medical treatment.

"He went into custody, and the next thing he knows, he wakes up in the hospital," Dewey's Walnut Creek attorney, Barry Morris, told The Pine Cone this week.

In the lawsuit filed Sept. 13 in Monterey County Superior Court, Dewey alleges negligence and battery on the part of Marina police and the sheriff's office.

According to the suit, after Dewey was arrested and processed by Marina police, he was transported to the county jail, where he was booked and placed into a cell. At about 7:30 p.m. the same day, Dewey was rushed to a San Jose hospital for treatment of multiple facial fractures.

While Morris said it isn't clear who beat Dewey — whether it was deputies at the county jail or other inmates — Morris

alleges it was ultimately the responsibility of the sheriff's office to keep him safe while he was in custody.

"We don't know exactly what happened," Morris said. "Clearly the police department and sheriff's [office] had a responsibility to take care of him."

However, in a claim Morris submitted to the county in November 2010 about the incident, he alleged Marina police officers slammed his head into the hood of a car after arresting him on suspicion of DUI.

The claim also alleged Dewey "was beaten by officers of the Marina Police Department and/or Monterey County Sheriff's Department while in the custody of those two agencies on or about Aug. 2, 2010."

Furthermore, the claim alleged, as a result of the alleged mistreatment by officers, Dewey suffered severe head and back injuries "which caused him to go into a coma." Neither Marina police or the sheriff's office provided Dewey "prompt medical treatment, further aggravating" his injuries. The county denied the claim.

The lawsuit alleges that when the 5-foot-8-inch tall, 130-pound Dewey was booked into the jail, deputies classified him as a Norteño gang member. But his attorney said he doesn't believe Dewey was beaten by gang members in jail. And his client does not belong to a gang, according to Morris.

Monterey County Counsel Charles McKee wouldn't comment specifically on the lawsuit because he hadn't seen it. But he spoke to the professionalism of the sheriff's office

"The sheriff's office take seriously their

duties when they are handling law enforcement matters, and also in investigating situations like these," McKee said.

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
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## Pilot promises daredevil performance like no other at Salinas airshow

AEROBATIC PILOT Sean Tucker is a veteran flyer: He has undertaken more than 1,000 performances worldwide for some 80 million fans since the 1970s, won numerous competitions and spent tens of thousands of hours in the sky. But when he talks about his job, he sounds like an eager kid.

Tucker, a San Benancio Canyon resident whose career as an aerobatic pilot began in Salinas, will return to his home airport for the California International Airshow Sept. 23-25.

The airshow is one of Tucker's favorites, not just for its nostalgia, but for its sterling reputation for being well run.

"I travel across North America, have flown in Japan and traveled to so many airshows over the last two-and-a-half decades, and Salinas clearly has one of the most passionate volunteer bases I've been around," he said. "And the love of their community really sets the tone of their event. They get



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the best in the world there and expect the best in the world to be their very best."

Tucker, who flies a custom-built biplane for Oracle, can count himself among the world's best. This year, he'll be performing alongside the Canadian Snowbirds, Robosaurus, the F-22 Raptor, the Red Bull Aviation Team, Dan Buchanan and other highly regarded talent.

#### To beat fear, try a barrel roll

Tucker said he became an aerobatic pilot to conquer a paralyzing fear he developed while learning to fly. "An instructor's task is to have you understand and face challenges by using your skills and understanding, but all my instructors did was instill a huge fear in me, and I was a dangerous pilot because I was fearful," he explained. "Panic will overcome everything, and then it becomes a self-fulfilling prophecy."

In 1973, the same year he moved to the Monterey Peninsula, Tucker approached an aerobatics instructor and described his fright and worries. After extensive training, he flew his first aerobatic performance in Salinas.

"Salinas is a very high-profile show, and the last thing they can afford is someone to get hurt. They trusted me to do it right," he said. It proved a launching point for Tucker, who went on to win the national championships in 1988. "My career took off after that," he said.

Tucker had been flying a Pitts Special for three decades, updating it annually, until it gave up the ghost a couple of years ago. The Pitts' demise provided added impetus to get a new plane, which had been in the design phase, under construction, and he flew a backup plane for two years until his new, one-of-a-kind aircraft was ready.

The Challenger II biplane is "the most high-performance aerobatic aircraft in the world," according to Tucker. It weighs slightly more than 1,200 pounds but boasts 400 hp, and "does things that only model airplanes can do," like twirls, twists and tumbles. "Last year, it was just learning the machine, and now I understand her. I'm very excited."

While not everyone likes riding in airplanes, everyone dreams about flying, and Tucker enjoys sharing his passion and helping people find their own. "I'm a guy that wants to use every ounce of energy that he can to entertain them -I'm a 21st century barnstormer," he said. "I want the audience to look inside their souls and find their passion, and I use flying as a metaphor."

Beyond its significance to him as an airshow performer,

being in Salinas is a homecoming for Tucker, who lives locally, and whose kids attended Carmel High and Stevenson. "It's an honor to be at Salinas," he said. "It's a privilege,

and I'm going to give them my level best."

The airshow includes Friday-night fireworks accompanied live by the Monterey Bay Symphony, an impressive lineup of performers, displays and vendors. Tickets range in price and accommodation, and kids 12 and under can attend for free on Friday night. The airshow has raised more than \$7 million for charity since its inception. #### Thinking of Reno

Following last week's

tragic crash and multiple fatalities during the National Championship Air Races in Reno, Nev., board members of the Salinas airshow issued a statement voicing their sympathy and concern for everyone affected, and defining the differences between airshows and air races.

Principally, airshows follow a set of federal safety regulations set by the FAA and are governed by the International Council of Airshows. Every airshow pilot undergoes annual evaluation to ensure competency, and significant distance is placed between the performers and spectators, "so that if an accident occurs, any plane wreckage will not get into the crowd," according to ICA President John Cudahy.

Furthermore, airshow pilots cannot direct their aircrafts toward the crowd. Instead, all maneuvers take place within an "aerobatic box" that can be as large as 12,000 feet long, 3,000 feet wide and 12,000 feet high. The ICA reported no spectator has been killed at an airshow by an aircraft in North

"A fatality at the Salinas airshow occurred in 2002 when a man lying in a grassy area near the airport was run over during the night by a truck," said Julie Ann Lozano, marketing coordinator for the event.

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## ■ Chief promises to preserve we've

Carmel's 'uniqueness'

THE MONTEREY City Council voted Tuesday to take control of Carmel's fire department. The action came one week after the Carmel City Council voted to merge CFD with MFD, just as Pacific Grove did in 2008.

Unlike last week's Carmel council meeting, in which numerous people spoke for and against the takeover, and two council members abstained from voting in order to show their reluctance to move ahead it, no one from the Monterey council or the audience wished to debate the issue before the Sept. 20 vote, according to Monterey Fire Chief Andrew Miller.

"Carmel was different, because they are the ones looking at transitioning into a contract," Miller said.

He understands people's concerns they might lose the traditions and relationships involved in having an independent department, especially in a small town with a strong identity, but Miller said Monterey can do the job.

"We want to make sure we can meet their expectations," he said. "There's a wonderful uniqueness to P.G. and Carmel, and we feel

we've preserved it in P.G., and we want to do the same thing in Carmel."

Monterey firefighters have been working at CFD for several years, he pointed out. In 2004, the Pacific Grove Fire Department began overseeing CFD, which lacked its own chief, and when Monterey took over PGFD in late 2008, it assumed the supervisory role in Carmel. Miller, who was chief of the Pacific Grove Fire Department and now runs Monterey Fire Department, speculated no one has really noticed his department's presence in Carmel. At least, not in a negative way.

"We've been there physically in that building for almost six years, and for the last two years have had a real presence there, and I don't think anybody would have known," he observed.

At Tuesday's meeting, the council authorized assistant city manager Fred Cohn to begin working on a contract with Carmel's interim city administrator, John Goss, and subsequently with its new city administrator, Jason Stilwell, who starts work Sept. 28. According to Miller's report to the council, the contract will cover all aspects of fire service, including Monterey's hiring of CFD's full-time firefighters, engineers and captains, a total of nine employees. Carmel taxpayers will continue to own the Sixth Avenue station and the equipment it contains.

"The proposed contract will be very sim-

ilar to our jointly successful contract to provide fire services to the City of Pacific Grove," he said in his report.

"It's a very comprehensive and somewhat complex process," Miller told The Pine Cone Wednesday.

In order to develop the agreement, administrators will have to draft the document, negotiate with firefighters' unions and address issues like workers compensation.

"Every little detail has to be called out," he said, and any concerns articulated by the Carmel City Council, including how the ambulance service will be operated and how much power Carmel decision makers will continue to have over fire services in their city, will have to be addressed. "I want every council member and every community member to feel good about a contract I hope they will sign."

## Council OKs retirement, medical cuts

THE CITY council last week approved a new one-year labor agreement for city employees that reduces retirement and medical costs, according to interim city administrator John Goss.

The new contract OK'd by the general employees' union and the city states all new hires will receive retirement benefits that cost less than the benefits for current employees.

Existing employees can retire at age 55 and collect 2 percent of the highest salary they received for each year they worked with the city. For example, someone who spent 30 years working for Carmel, and whose highest salary for one year was \$100,000, would receive \$60,000 per year after retiring at the

age of 55, with adjustments for inflation. New workers, however, will receive 2 percent per year of employment at age 60, and the payout amount will be based on the highest salary paid for three consecutive years, not just for one year.

In his Sept. 13 report, Goss said the new contract "moves the city in a significant direction in taking steps to control its retirement costs."

The agreement also allows some city staff to opt out of Carmel's medical plan. Each worker foregoing coverage would receive \$291 per month, potentially saving the city thousands of dollars per year per employee.

"As newly hired employees decide to opt out from the city's medical plan, the city's

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
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
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## P.G. City Council, public angry over big golf course losses

NOT ONLY was the Pacific Grove City Council Wednesday night upset by the announcement the municipal golf course lost more than \$400,000 last year, council members and golfers were maddened that city staff hadn't told them sooner.

Last week, the city released a report saying the struggling golf course is in a deep financial hole, a fact city council members said they were never made aware of until seeing the report. Their frustration was clear at the Wednesday night council meeting.

"I'm as irritated by this as I ever have been in the 21 years I have been coming to council meetings," councilman Dan Miller said. "Whoever is responsible, changes need to be

Senior accountant Tony McFarlane, who was joined by head golf pro Joe Riekena, told the council the city had an unaudited operating loss of 16.8 percent of revenues, or \$413,230, during the 2010/2011 year. The shortfall, which was covered with revenues from the city's golf course reserve fund, is being blamed, in part, on a 20 percent reduction in rounds played by golfers who pay full price compared to last year. At the end of the year, the reserve fund had a balance of

While direct expenditures at the golf course finished the year on budget, revenues did not keep pace with the cost of new "program needs," such as operating the Point Pinos Grill, the restaurant at the golf course, the report said.

'Golfers either no longer can afford to justify the expense for golf, or they no longer have the time to play 18 holes," according to the city report.

Council members weren't the only ones who said they were left in the dark dark about the golf course budget. Members of city's golf links advisory commission — created to make recommendations to the council and the city manager in matters pertaining to the overall operation of the golf course — said they too were unaware of the problems.

Darian Houde, commission chairman, who called the city's report "ugly," criticized city staff for not contacting him about the budget woes.

## Specialist helps the vision impaired get around

CROSSING OCEAN Avenue or Lighthouse Avenue on a busy weekend can be a practice in courage. For someone who is blind or has limited vision, the streets can be terrify-

Rena Weaver Wyant is trying to change that. An orientation and mobility specialist with the Blind & Visually Impaired Center of Monterey County, she helps those with vision problems safely and confidently navigate city streets.

"One purpose of orientation and mobility instruction is to teach skills that will free the blind or visually impaired individual from dependence on others," Wyant said.

The center, at 225 Laurel Ave. in Pacific Grove, offers a host of services for those who are blind or have "low vision," a term that refers to someone with a vision impairment that interferes with the ability to perform everyday activities. Wyant teaches students throughout the county.

Most of Wyant's students are seniors, who are at greater risk of falling and suffering more serious injuries, which makes the training that much more important.

"About 90 to 95 percent of those we see at the center have macular degeneration," she said.

Before instruction, students are assessed to determine the extent of their vision problems. Those with "high functioning" vision may just need to be assessed to determine if they are traveling safely. Others may need much more instruction.

Though most of those who were born blind or have been blind for many years have learned to live independently, Wyant said they also seek instruction sometimes.

are new to a city, for example," she said. "Familiarization very often involves getting reacquainted with a new bus system and getting familiar with the ins and outs of an area."

Wyant teaches students the most efficient and safest areas to navigate on foot, taking in consideration curbs, steps, uneven sidewalks — minor obstacles to most, but among the things feared most by those with vision problems in an urban

To help overcome those fears, she teaches students how to use a cane to navigate in a city, including slowly going up stairs with a cane to feel each step.


"Most students will overcome the fear of falling down steps or tripping and falling over uneven sidewalks once they have learned to use the long cane correctly to warn them of these unexpected things," she said.

Students also learn how to cross streets by listening to auditory clues, and in some cases, using whatever remaining vision they have. Those who are blind are taught to listen to determine if an intersection is manned by stop signs or traffic lights.

"They can listen and figure out if there are turn cycles in addition to regular parallel and perpendicular cycles," Wyant said. "They can learn to use the sounds of frequent parallel traffic to walk in a straight line within or near the crosswalk to get to the other side efficiently and safely.'

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
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



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department, or landline phone service to anyone during a power outage, Goetz said public safety is compromised in the rugged, fire-prone community.

"The fire station is considered a critical facility, and AT&T is unable to work with us to resolve an issue of such importance," she said.

When the electricity goes out in the Palo Colorado area which is home to several hundred residents — a battery backup once kept the phones operating for 12 to 16 hours, according to Goetz. But that was before the Internet.

"Unfortunately, the battery time has diminished significantly since Internet came to the community [because when the power goes out] everyone jumps on the Internet to find out what is going on, which drains the batteries in several hours now," she explained.

In 2008, a resident donated a 35-kilowatt generator to power the firehouse and residential phone service during an electricity outage. Goetz assumed it would be a simple task for AT&T to tap power from the generator so residents would be able to call 911 in the event of an emergency.

Also frustrating for Goetz is the absence of Internet service at the firehouse. At one point, the fire chief said she was on the phone with an AT&T representative and was told the firehouse is located too far from AT&T's connection box. In response, Goetz said she was standing "within spitting distance" of the box. Meanwhile, residents living more than a mile from the box have Internet service, she observed. But Goetz's plea was unsuccessful. "No amount of explaining

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would change their mind," she reported.

The phone dilemma was underscored last week when a Palo Colorado area resident, Robert Coakley, burned to death in his home. As the result of a downed eucalyptus tree at Highway 1 and Palo Colorado Road, electricity — and phone service — were down when the incident occurred.

fog that blanketed the ridge. According to detective Diana Schumacher of the MCSO, the fire likely started sometime after midnight. She said her agency received a call regarding the fire at about 6 a.m. It is not clear how the call was made since phone service was out in the Palo Colorado area because a large eucalyptus tree crashed down on Highway 1 the day before and took out a power pole.

Later the same day, Schumacher surveyed what remained of the dwelling. "It looked like a plane that had crashed," she said. "It was obliterated. The fire burned very, very hot."

While Schumacher said the origin of the fire is under investigation, she dispelled rumors that it was caused by an exploding propane tank or a drug lab. She said two propane tanks located nearby did show cracks from the blaze.

Remarkably — and likely due to the fog — the fire didn't spread far beyond Coakley's residence, despite the fact that Green Ridge is covered with dense, fire-prone vegetation. Mid-Coast Volunteer Fire Brigade Chief Cheryl Goetz reported that the blaze scorched just less than an acre. "Everybody in this community was very lucky," Goetz

"He's going to be able to talk about the election when it's only five weeks away," he said. "That was quite a coup. We're very proud of that."



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

included an analysis of the possibility that a government agency might purchase the estate and turn it into a halfway house or affordable housing.

Carmel's attorney, Jon Giffen, said the foundation's argument is speculative and that CEQA doesn't require the city to analyze the potential environmental impacts of an unknown government agency's unknown use of the mansion.

In January 2010, Monterey County Superior Court Judge Kay Kingsley ruled in the foundation's favor, deciding the EIR had to be revised again to evaluate what might happen if the government agency that purchased the house could ignore zoning or other environmental restrictions on the lot.

Rather than draft another EIR, the city appealed Kingsley's ruling, and each side has since laid out its arguments in extensive legal documents filed with the 6th District Court of Appeal in San Jose.

In addition to extensive briefs filed with the appellate court, arguments in the case have been scheduled to be heard in Salinas, Giffen confirmed. to express orally their positions and to get a read from the justices as to where they are and what kind of questions they have," he said


The three-judge panel will then proceed with taking the case under submission and making a decision, or it will ask for more information. There is no timeline for a ruling, according to Giffen.

"We're feeling confident in our position," he said. "We're looking forward to the argument and to advocating on behalf of the city. It certainly has been a long process."

Meanwhile, last week, the state Legislature voted to give a huge stadium complex in Los Angeles an expedited review of its EIR and is considering limiting the scope of CEQA for other major development projects.

In July, the state Supreme Court also limited CEQA, ruling that a ban on plastic shopping bags in the City of Manhattan Beach didn't require an EIR.

"CEQA does not demand an exhaustive comparative analysis of relative environmental detriments for every alternative course of action," wrote Supreme Court Justice Carol Corrigan in the unanimous decision. "It requires an EIR only for those aspects of a project likely to have significant environmental effects."

"They were able to pinpoint the location of the iPads through the victim's iPhone, which had a GPS tracking app," Mukai said.

The tracker led them to the area of Palm Avenue in Seaside, where Norman lives, according to Mukai. The tablet computers were in a gray Hyundai registered to Ransome that she had been driving.

While CPD officer Greg Johnson and police from Seaside P.D. were there, Ransome arrived at Carmel P.D. and admitted taking the backpack and its contents.

"He gave consent to search the Hyundai," Mukai said, and Johnson, accompanied by the SPD officers, went through the car and found the two iPads.

"The girlfriend was using the vehicle and was still in the area," he said. "And she showed up and was detained."

Police charged Ransome with grand theft and Norman with possession of stolen property.


According to city records, Ransome was hired in October 1988 as a building maintenance worker.

He was laid off in July 2004 as part of numerous job cuts made in response to budget reductions but was then hired as an hourly contract maintenance worker in April 2005. He was terminated Aug. 19 — the day he was arrested for the theft.

A YOUNG mother who became paralyzed from the waist down during a shooting in Salinas a year ago is undergoing extensive physical therapy in hope of regaining her mobility, and her physical therapist, Will Kramer, decided to hold a fundraiser for her at the Monterey Sports Center Sunday, Sept. 25, from 1 to 3 p.m.

Iris Cueto had attended a baptism for a family member and was walking to her car when a man walked up and began shooting, according to Valerie Stack, who is also helping with the fundraiser. "In this random tragedy, Iris, pregnant at the time, was hit multiple times," she reported. "Her position shielded the children."

But she suffered multiple gunshot wounds and was airlifted to a trauma center in San Jose for treatment. She's now undertaking rigorous physical therapy, courtesy of Kramer, whom Stack said is donating his time.

"I met Iris when I was doing my own physical therapy at Ryan Ranch Physical Therapy," Stack said. "I was greatly touched by the circumstances Iris faces and Will Kramer's generosity. The heart and care expressed by the staff at Ryan Ranch Physical Therapy are exceptional, in my mind."

She hopes others will attend the Zumba class — or just enjoy the catered lunch and donate some cash — for Cueto.

"Especially in challenging times, I find that there is nothing like kindness and generosity to uplift," she said.







#### "BOOKS DON'T MISBEHAVE"

A WOMAN'S life can be one of diverse accomplishments. When Marge Miller died September 2 in Annapolis after a brief illness, she left behind a legacy of scholarly and literary achievements, including two master's degrees, a published book, and a 14-year career as a librarian and archivist. But she was also a wonderful mother who raised five children during the tumultuous 1950s and 1960s without even breaking a sweat, and while she was never much interested in housework or cooking, she perfected the recipe for bringing up happy children by using equal parts intelligence, humor and love. The example she set is one her progeny cherish to this day.

Born May 28, 1922, in LaPorte, Ind., Marjorie Helen Mithoff was blessed with gifted parents. While they came from humble backgrounds, Helen Modrall and Warren Mithoff raised their daughter and her older brother, Richard, in a stimulating environment filled with travel, music, photography and art. At a very

young age, the children were recruited by their father to help out with his job as an advertising man in Detroit: On Aug. 22, 1924, Marge and her brother appeared as models in a full-page Cadillac ad in The Saturday Evening Post.

She later recalled being sick a lot as a child — especially ear infections, which were a much more serious problem in those days before antibiotics. To promote her health, in 1929 the family moved to sunny El Paso, Texas, where Helen and Warren had met during World War I. Marge excelled in school and soon demonstrated a remarkable aptitude for the English language. While working on Stephen F. Austin High School's literary magazine, the "Amateur Scribe," she met a classmate, William Miller. They fell in love, and after one year at Cottey College in Nevada, Mo., Marge joined Bill at the University of Texas at Austin. They graduated together with honors in 1943; for the rest of her life, she proudly wore the Phi Beta Kappa key she earned for academic excellence. Bill and Marge married in January 1943. A daughter, Peggy, was born in September.

Like practically all Americans their age, the young family's immediate future was determined by the needs of their country in World War II. Having enlisted in an officer candidate program while still in college, Bill was shipped off to Harvard, MIT, and Fort Monmouth, N.J., for training with a newfangled invention called radar. Marge and Peggy dutifully travelled with him as they could, but when he was made a 2nd Lt. and sent to Japan at the end of the war, they returned to family in El Paso. While the young parents were kept apart by the conflict's aftermath, a son, Warren, was born.

Reunited after the war, the family moved to upstate New York, where Bill took a job with General Electric. But the postwar housing shortage meant the only place they could find to live was a summer cottage with no indoor plumbing. During a brutal winter, with a frozen well, several feet of snow between the back door and the outhouse, no place to dry clothes, bugs in the bed and rats taking refuge in the living room, Marge discovered she wasn't really cut out for the life of a housewife. Her diaries and letters show that she handled most of the crises with good humor. But she dreamed of having a career, and of being a published author, and wished she could spend a good part of each day devouring the New Yorker and losing herself in novels by P.G. Wodehouse and C.S. Lewis. She also enjoyed the witty poems of Ogden Nash, who thoughtfully advised her, in a letter responding to samples of her poetry, that life itself, however mundane, was all the inspiration one needed to be a great author.

In that case, Marge Miller was to become one of the most inspired people in the world, especially after three more children arrived (David in 1952, Paul in 1954 and Stephen in 1957). In fact, whether she liked it or not, she was destined to spend 25-plus years being "stuck" (her word) dutifully supporting her husband's career and raising five kids. She loved the various animals the children brought home (especially turtles, but not eels), and enjoyed the sandlot baseball her sons played. It thrilled her when Warren and David became proficient on the guitar and the piano, and she was never happier than when her home was filled with singing and music. But she hated keeping house, and it's remarkable that she managed to do it at all — in the 1950s in El Paso, while Bill worked in missile instrumentation at nearby White Sands, N.M., and, beginning in 1962, in Bowie, Md., after he got a job with NASA in Washington, D.C.

In 1965, as the mob of kids got older, Marge fulfilled her lifelong wish and took her first job, editing copy for an aerospace magazine. Next, she had the brilliant idea of teaching junior high school English. But she wasn't tough enough to keep the rambunctious kids in line and soon looked upon the job as some kind of awful punishment.

Returning to school, she earned an M.A. in American studies from the University of Maryland and another M.A. in library science from Catholic University. And in 1970, she took a job as a librarian with the Prince George's County Memorial Library. At last, she was in her element. Books!

Marge and her husband were devoted all their lives to the Presbyterian Church, serving as elders and on countless boards and commissions. When Bill retired in 1975, they made the first of many trips to Europe, where they pursued a shared interest in genealogy. And while they were doing that, their children were making lots of descendants — eventually numbering 20 grandchildren and five great-grandchildren. For decades, she tracked everyone's accomplishments and activities in a wry newsletter called The Fitful Family News. She retired from her last job as documents librarian for Prince George's County, Md., in 1984.

For 48 years, a rambling house on Brewster Lane in Bowie was the family home. As the decades went by, the old place became filled with the books, letters and mementoes Bill and Marge loved. Her collection of stone, ceramic and jeweled turtles, amassed in many countries and on many birthdays and anniversaries, eventually numbered more than 700. And when the couple reached their 80s, their house was stuffed to the gills with remnants of an inquisitive and intellectual life. To outsiders, it seemed chaotic. But as long as National Geographic and the Washington Post were on the coffee table, they didn't care. Their lifetime of accomplishments, and their marriage of 68 years, gave them the right not to.

William Miller died in April at the age of 89. Marjorie Miller, who was also 89 when she passed, is survived by their five children: Peggy Benedict of Laurel, Md.; Warren of Prescott, Ariz.; David of Brussels, Belgium; Paul of Pacific Grove, and Stephen of Rockville, Md.; 20 grandchildren and five great-grandchildren. A memorial service will be held Oct. 15 at 11 a.m. at Christian Community Presbyterian Church in Bowie, Md., followed by a reception in the church fellowship hall. The family requests that donations be made to the CCPC Mission Fund.



Collins was a board member of the Monterey County Water Resources Agency and gave official advice to the board of supervisors on the proposed \$400 million regional water project even while he was a paid consultant for a company which was seeking a contract to manage it — dual roles which may have violated state law. Prosecutors and the state's Fair Political Practices Commission are in the midst of investigations into the matter to determine if Collins, or other officials, will be charged.

But Collins, whose attorneys have staunchly denied the allegations, alleged Monday that county supervisors Lou Calcagno and Dave Potter and county counsel Charles McKee "engaged in a campaign of obfuscation, feigned forgetfulness and falsehoods" that made him a target of public hatred, ridicule and contempt.

Collins' claim states that Calcagno, Potter, McKee, deputy county counsel Irv Grant and county water agency general manager Curtis Weeks all knew of his dual role, encouraged him to take the lead in securing state approval of the water project, and arranged for him to be paid by the consulting firm, RMC Water and Environment.

"I have told the truth to a polygraph operator and now in a sworn declaration made under penalty of perjury," Collins told a Pine Cone reporter Wednesday. "The declaration speaks for itself and shows I was drafted by Monterey County government officials to work as a paid consultant and assured by them there was no conflict of interest."

Collins added that he worked "his tail off" on behalf of the regional project, which he still believes is the water project that would best serve Peninsula residents.

"I was instrumental in obtaining approval of it by the [Public Utilities Commission]," Collins said.

In the claim, Collins, who said he had been earning about \$285,000 per year before the conflict of interest surfaced, said since the first article about it was published in June in The Monterey County Herald, he has not earned anything. He estimates he's lost about \$23,750 per month, or about \$86,290 to date.

"The willfully false defamatory statements and omissions of government officials have destroyed my ability to earn a living and support my family," Collins said.

Collins' claim cites articles in The Pine Cone, Monterey County Herald and Monterey County Weekly, and refutes many of the statements made by Calcagno and Potter to reporters.

For instance, Collins says statements by Potter quoted in a July 15 Pine Cone article, in which Potter denied suggesting Collins work for the regional water project, were

"Supervisor Potter knew that I was working as a paid consultant to obtain approval of the regional project by the PUC and approved and supported my efforts as a paid consultant," according to Collins.

Potter declined to respond to Collins' accusation. And McKee told The Pine Cone he disagreed with the allegations in Collins'

"In the end, there is something in defamation law that truth is a defense against a libel or slander claim," McKee said. "And I think that is how this will play out."

Collins said so far he has spent \$50,000 on legal fees after hiring attorneys Michael Lawrence and Juliet Peck to defend him against the conflict-of-interest allegations.

According to Collins, Potter and Calcagno recruited him to spearhead the water project, and it was Calcagno's idea that he become a paid consultant. Collins eventually earned about \$160,000 for his work with RMC Water and Environment, which eventually won a \$28 million contract to manage the regional water project.

In early 2010, Collins said he met with Calcagno weekly at his Castroville office. Potter was also usually at the meetings, he

"I am informed and believe that it was well known and openly discussed that I was to be a paid consultant to obtain approval of the regional project by the PUC," Collins

And he alleges that Calcagno, Potter and other county officials knew, or should have known, that he would not have agreed to take a lead role with the water project "that would require hundreds of hours of my time and effort" for nothing.

"Supervisor Calcagno said he realized that I didn't 'work for free,'" Collins said the supervisor told him in a January 2010 phone

Calcagno also called Jim Heitzman, the general manager of the Marina Coastal Water District, one of the water project's partners, and told Heitzman he needed to get Collins on board, according to the claim.

During a Jan. 11, 2010, meeting between Heitzman, Collins and Weeks, Heitzman said the Marina water district would pay Collins \$220 per hour to help secure approval of the regional desal project, and,

because of his contacts with Salinas Valley ag firms, to "deal with" opposition from the Ag Land Trust, which filed suit against the county over water rights.

But as Collins' fees grew beyond the \$25,000 Marina Coast had agreed to pay, Heitzman "subsequently decided to have my contract issued and administered by RMC."

During the Jan. 11, 2010, meeting, Collins said Heitzman "raised the question" of whether hiring him for the water project might be a conflict of interest because of Collins' position as director of the county water agency. But he said deputy county counsel Irv Grant approved the dual role.

He also claims he was told in January 2010 by Weeks that "the county counsel said there was no conflict," and that Weeks said Collins was "entitled to earn a living," as long as he didn't try to collect consulting fees for attending meetings of the water agency or the board of supervisors.

In the lengthy document, which was filed Monday, Collins said he assumed this assessment by Weeks was based on an official, written opinion by the county counsel's

office, but he acknowledged he has never seen it.

Collins also takes issue with a report the county commissioned, dubbed the "Remcho report," "which the county released Wednesday night. The 63-page report blames Collins for the conflict-of-interest mess, which has brought progress on the regional water project to a halt.

"When these government officials falsely told the Remcho investigators they could not remember any discussions about my paid consultancy to them," Collins said, "they were not telling the truth."

According to state law, a claim for damages against a government agency must be presented to the agency first. A lawsuit can be filed if it is denied.

#### Marina Coast proposes public desal committee

ADVOCATES FOR more public participation in the regional desalination project may get their way if the Marina Coast Water District board of directors approves a recommendation to transfer budget authority from the water agency to a group composed of elected officials, citizens and others.

General manager Jim Heitzman is expected to recommend to directors next week they approve a plan that provides for representatives from various groups to oversee the daily budget operations of the desal plant as soon as construction begins.

"There has always been a complaint there is no oversight for the desal plant," he told The Pine Cone. "I'm going to ask the board to put together a committee with representatives from the Peninsula." Though it will be up to directors of the

Marina Coast agency to decide who is appointed to the group, it would be responsible for making finance and operational decisions about the desal project.

"In essence, they will have control about how much the water costs from the desal plant," Heitzman said.

He said the group could have representatives from the hospitality and agricultural industries, city councils, the Monterey Peninsula Water Management District and the public.

'Marina Coast Water District Board has always promoted public transparency and public participation," Heitzman said.

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

post he's held for more than a decade, the county announced Tuesday.

Monterey County Water Resources Agency head Curtis Weeks will be gone Oct. 7, according to an agreement approved by the board of supervisors Tuesday afternoon. The decision was made after the supervisors met in closed session.

"The agreement includes six months' severance [pay], which is six months less than his current agreement," Charles McKee said at the meeting. In 2009, Weeks was paid a total of \$201,711, according to a database for public employees' salaries.

Though none of the supervisors commented on the issue, water activist and former supervisor candidate Ed Mitchell from Prunedale took issue with the severance pay awarded to Weeks.

"As you move up with seniority, you get greater responsibility," Mitchell said. "And if you don't honor those responsibilities, you should be held accountable."

Weeks is one of the people under investigation by the Monterey County District Attorney's Office over conflict of interest allegations involving former county water board director Steve Collins and the development of an alternate water supply project for the Monterey Peninsula.

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Weeks, it has been alleged, helped arrange employment for Collins by an engineering consultant hoping to win a management contract for the water project, even as he was advising the board of supervisors whether to approve it.

In addition, one of the agencies developing the water project, the Marina Coast Water District, released a report indicating that in January 2010 Weeks and Collins formed a consulting company outside their responsibilities as public officials

The county had originally wanted to retain Weeks for another few months so he could represent the county in mediation for the regional desalination with project partners California American Water and Marina Coast Water District. However, Weeks' employment agreement was modified this week to allow for the October exit.

Weeks, who was present for Tuesday's board of supervisors meeting, didn't make a statement to supervisors before the announcement.



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
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## **Editorial**

## Stop it

ONE OF the sorry things about American politics today, and which constantly spills over into the news media, is that people question the integrity and honesty, if not the morals, of anyone who happens to disagree with them.

For example, when President Barack Obama calls for "fair" taxation of the wealthy, he implies that anyone who doesn't support the idea is against fairness.

Similarly, when the Republicans describe Obama's proposed tax hikes as amounting to "class warfare," they're painting the president as a person with evil intentions.

The country would be far better off, absent direct evidence of malfeasance, if politicians on both sides of the aisle assumed the guys on the other side were doing what they thought was best for the country, instead of constantly accusing each other of being villains.

The name-calling problem is also acute right here in Monterey County, and one of the worst examples was a commentary printed last weekend in the Monterey County Herald — a newspaper which regularly publishes news stories and editorials intended to impede progress toward a new water supply, and which is always quick to print opinion pieces from people who share their view that discouraging growth is more important than making sure water comes out when you turn on the tap.

One of The Herald's imaginary villains in the water-supply story is California American Water, and thus the paper is always willing to give voice to the views of water gadfly Ron Weitzman and his campaign to turn Cal Am into a public utility. No matter how many times the public says it's not interested, Weitzman won't give up. And when he lost a key vote at the Monterey Peninsula Water Management District a few weeks ago, Weitzman had a ready explanation: The board members who voted against him did so because they're corrupt. In Weitzman's nutty view, there can be no rational basis for doubting the merits of his takeover plan; therefore, the MPWMD directors who opposed him must have done so because they were protecting their own wallets, not the public good. And the Herald was all too willing to give him a platform for his completely unsupported allegations of corruption on the part of Dave Pendergrass, Bob Brower, Dave Potter, Kristi Markey and Regina Doyle.

We won't bother to print the specifics of his imaginary charges, but what they come down to is this: All those water board members would achieve some indirect financial benefit if Cal Am were permitted to carry on as a private water company. Nonsense.

The actual reason the water board voted not to pursue Weitzman's takeover plan is that a majority of its members do not think doing so would benefit the public. Weitzman should gracefully accept defeat (again) and go away. And the Herald should stop encouraging him to make ridiculous accusations against well intentioned public officials.

As a longtime resident and property owner in Carmel, I have concerns about the city council's recent action regarding fire and medical service delivery for our town. I do commend council members Ken Talmage and Jason Burnett for their symbolic abstentions, although they changed nothing.

The council has authorized the drafting of an agreement with the City of Monterey obligating the city for millions of dollars without specifically defining any service levels other than three personnel on the engine. I have serious misgivings that a Request for Proposal was never issued, by design, and we, as citizens, were never shown the entirety of the estimates from various agencies so that we might have a clearer idea of the options available. In my opinion, the council's fiduciary responsibility

was not given the consideration demanded by the scope of such a momentous monetary decision.

I request that the entire council discuss, in a public meeting, the following points to demand of Monterey as minimum service levels for our town when Monterey takes control of our fire department.

- 1. Annual maintenance of every fire hydrant.
- 2. Defensible space inspections of some minimum number of homes each year to lessen the probability of a catastrophic fire.
- 3. Set minimum staffing on our engine at one fire captain, one engineer and one fire-fighter.
- 4. CPR, Automatic Electronic Defibrillator and Community Emergency Response Team training for citizens as requested, at no cost
- 5. Maintain or initiate fire inspections of all commercial properties in Carmel each year, at no cost.
- 6. Maintain or initiate life safety fire inspections of all hotels and inns, at no cost.7. Maintain or initiate a "persons needing
- assistance" database.

  8. Provide our firefighters a "no layoff"
- clause for X number of years.
- Offer a residential Knox Box program to homeowners.
   Define whether the ambulance staff,
- 10. Define whether the ambulance staff, as Carmel city employees, will be allowed by Monterey city and their firefighters' union to drive and operate fire equipment. Will they be allowed to cover engines?
- 11. Determine if the Monterey firefighters' union will work side by side with ambu-

## Water district's purpose Dear Editor:

In contradiction to Janice O'Brien's Sept. 22 letter in the Monterey County Herald, the water district's purpose is not to "preserve and protect the integrity of the Carmel River." Here are the legislated functions of the Monterey Peninsula Water Management District as stated in West's California Water Code, Appendix Chapters 118-1 to 118-901, found under "Basics" on MPWMD's web-

- 1. Augment the water supply through integrated management of ground and surface water resources.
  - 2. Promote water conservation.
- 3. Promote water reuse and reclamation of storm and wastewater.
- 4. Foster the scenic values, environmental quality, native vegetation, fish and wildlife, and recreation on the Monterey Peninsula and in the Carmel River basin.

Pompously, the current no-growth MPWMD board has also perverted its mission statement to read "manage, augment and protect water resources for the benefit of

the community and the environment." It makes no mention of the Carmel River.

Ms. O'Brien has the privilege of living in one of the world's most beautiful and expensive real estate developments. In the name of the environment, she prefers to limit that option for the rest of us by restricting our access to clean, fresh water. Shame on those who lie

## Why say no to cisterns? Dear Editor,

I found it ironic the current issue of the Pine Cone has a front page article on water rationing possibly as soon as two years away, yet at last week's Carmel Planning Commission meeting, two citizens were denied their applications for harvesting rainwater and storing it in above ground cisterns.

The applicants' purpose for collection and storage of rainwater was to irrigate their landscape and avoid additional use of precious Carmel River or Seaside Aquifer water from Cal Am. Planning department staff presented both applications and recommended approval with conditions. However, planning commission members decided that aboveground cisterns ("garbage cans") located in someone's backyard were not acceptable.

Carmel-by-the-Sea's own Low Impact Development Guidance manual on the city's website lists using a cistern for "maximizing rainfall interception" as a best management practice.

Cisterns, by any definition today, are water storage devices used above or below ground. A state bill, AB 275, The Rainwater Capture Act of 2011, has been sent to the governor for signature. This bill recognizes

the seriousness of water conservation and encourages the use of rain capture systems. We read about our local water problems daily and should encourage citizens to conserve water every way possible.

Every other city on the Peninsula allows the use of aboveground cisterns for water conservation, and I hope the planning commission reconsiders these applications after they educate themselves on rainwater harvesting.

As I currently understand from the MPWMD, a moratorium on new water meter applications is currently in place (and has

been for many years), and rationing is a high probability. Folks who want to install rainwater harvesting systems, above or below ground, should be encouraged and supported!

Garcia said the city has alienated local golfers, in part, by charging too much for rounds. As a result, some golfers now choose to regularly play at other courses.

"I agree 100 percent we need to get our local folks back," Garcia said.

Toward the end of the meeting, Garcia reprimanded city staff — whose attendance included McFarlane, Riekena and city manager Tom Frutchey — for not reporting the information to the council much earlier.

"You have a duty to provide us with correct, accurate information," Garcia said. "There is no debate about that at all. We are all elected officials, and we report to the voters out there. You have to be very truthful and forthcoming with us, and I hope you understand that."

While the council was asked to approve a revenue increase for the golf course and expenditure reduction strategies for the rest of the fiscal year, council members in the end opted to wait until a consultant, who was hired by the city to tell it how to best operate the course, had completed the analysis.

The consultant, which cost the city about \$25,000, is expected to begin the analysis next week and be finished in about eight to 10 weeks.

savings from implementing this provision will increase," he reported.

According to the agreement, general employees will begin receiving \$25 per month toward their deferred compensation plan, in line with other city employees. Goss estimated that provision will cost taxpayers \$9,300.

Finally, the contract calls for continuing to research and identify more affordable vision and dental plans, and stipulates that employees be allowed to review any changes to the city's harassment policy before they are presented to the council for discussion and approval.

He concluded the change in retirement benefits will save \$12,000, and the medical opt-out provision will save another \$10,928, yielding net savings of an estimated \$13,628.

The contract replaces the most recent multi-year agreement between the city and the union that expired June 30.

Before the vote, city councilman Ken Talmage commended the general employees for being sensitive to economic issues and agreeing to help cut costs, especially where retirement benefits are concerned. The council unanimously approved the new agreement, which expires June 30, 2012.

## Russell Gifford

Longtime San Francisco and Carmel architect Russell Gifford passed away at his Carmel home on Monday September 12, 2011. Russ lived in Leicester, Massachusetts from the time he was born until he went to South Kent School in Connecticut followed by Amherst College and Columbia University. Along the way, he served in

the US Navy in various roles including command of an anti-submarine ship in both the Pacific and Atlantic theaters.

As president of his architecture class at Columbia University, Russ invited Frank Lloyd Wright to speak to the students. Wright not only gave an outstanding talk, but remained with Russ and several students sharing his theories and views of design until sunrise. Russell's architecture was greatly influenced by Wright's discussion that evening.

Russ worked in the firms of McKim, Mead, and White in New York. In San Francisco he worked first with Mario Ciampi followed by the firm of Anshen and Allen. From 1963 to 1966, Russ was in charge of the joint venture of Stone, Marraccini & Patterson with Maher & Martens. The signature project of the venture during this time was the planning and design for Harrah's in Lake Tahoe. An avid tennis player, Russ also enjoyed his role as the architect for the San Francisco Racquet Club.

Shortly before his move to Carmel in 1982, Russell's large group of friends threw him a "roast" commenting that he wouldn't last in Carmel. Although most of his friends wondered if he would survive the quiet life, he enjoyed working on residential projects while sitting next to a roaring fire on foggy days with his three Siamese cats nearby. His contractors always enjoyed the daily visits Russ would pay to the construction site, to ensure things were being built to his specifications. While living in Carmel-by-the-Sea, Russ was active on many committees refining building regulations and preserving history, including Flanders Mansion. Russ was speaking to the Town Council when the 1989 earthquake struck

Russ continued his architectural influence when he moved to Del Mesa Carmel in 1997. He soon proved valuable to Del Mesa by designing various projects including the entrance signage, the guard house and new fitness center. In August, Russ was named "Member Laureate of Del Mesa Carmel Building and Grounds Committee." He was greatly honored by this recognition.

Although 89 years old, Russ still had a daily glass of red wine, did his New York Times crossword puzzles in ink and made jokes with those assisting him in his final days. He will be greatly missed.

Russell is survived by Jane, his loving wife of more than 30 years. His family also includes children Megan Foulis (Bill) of San Rafael, Eugenie Baumann, Los Angeles, Sam Gifford (Teri) San Francisco, Jill Hosmer, Carmel, and John Hayhoe (Sharon) Newport Beach. He had ten grandchildren from this blended family.



## Mason Case

February 7, 1917 – September 11, 2011

Carmel - On September 11, 2011, Mason Case, at 94 years of age, passed away at Community Hospital of the Monterey Peninsula following a brief illness. Born on February 7, 1917 in San Francisco, he is survived by his loving wife, Maggie, and daughter Suzanne Case and her husband Mark Akin of Orinda, California.

Mason's educational background was extensive: Pacific Military Academy (Cadet Commander), the Academy's Junior College, California Maritime Academy, Oregon State University and Stanford University. During the depression and World War II shortly thereafter, Mason's business career began its early formation: assistant to his father in real estate development, then entry junior positions in a number of companies. In 1943, he embarked on



what eventually became his life's main pursuit - creating and providing quality and sufficient basic human sustenance - food. Over the remaining sixty- eight years of his life, Mason delivered that promise.

At age 26 Mason managed 8,000 acres in the San Joaquin Valley for the U. S. Government for growing a variety of fresh fruits and vegetables. This was a substantial undertaking for such a young man requiring not only planting and harvesting, but also the supervision of some 4,000 prisoners of war. All in all, a most challenging operation. Later, he owned 3,000 acres in Barstow where he developed and operated Cool Water Cattle Ranch which required constructing a massive watering system.

Mason continued on his mission for healthy and safe human sustenance when in 1948 he established Mason Case & Company specifically for fish processing and handling. He became the largest handler and processor of fresh and mild-cure salmon in California and the largest handler and shipper of albacore tuna on the Pacific Coast. His reputation also for respect and preservation of this seemingly bountiful resource in the bosom of the ocean was very well known and admired. In 1967 he turned his talent to raising almonds; Mason Case Ranches set a state record and became the first grower to produce 3,000 meat pounds per acre. He served as President of the Almond Board of California for many years.

Mason's renowned reputation in both agricultural and fishing fields resulted in his advice being frequently sought. In addition to his thriving business life, which benefited so many others in so many ways, he found time from his enormous responsibilities to give of himself and his resources to other organizations serving the human good. He was a valued member of numerous federal, state and local boards and commissions in the agricultural and fishing fields. Also, locally he served on the boards of United Way of Monterey County, Natividad Hospital, Monterey Institute of International Studies, Development Committee of Hospice of the Central Coast, Jim Tunney Youth Foundation, and others. He was a member of the Bohemian Club in San Francisco, Old Capital Club, Quail Golf Club, Monterey Peninsula Country Club, Carmel Valley Ranch Golf Club, The Scottish Rite, Sigma Nu Fraternity and others.

He has been a generous donor to worthy causes. Of particular importance to Mason over many years has been his providing of scholarships for worthy students entering Stanford University's School of Medicine. And, considering the substantial depth and breadth of his business and public service life, it is difficult to comprehend how he could have the time to also serve as the President of the National Football Foundation and Hall of Fame. But he did and admirably so.

There is another side of Mason Case -- as described by his devoted Maggie -- "his love of music, tremendous sense of humor, twinkle in his eye, spryness in his step alike to a soft shoe dancer. Mason was a humanitarian, valued integrity and honesty, an accomplished polo player in his youth and an excellent golfer in his later years, eloquent speaker, story teller and a well-mannered gentleman".

A Memorial Service in tribute and remembrance of Mason Case will be held for family and friends on September 25 at 11:30 A.M. at Quail Golf Club. ## Woman admits killing mother

JEAN DANVERS, the woman arrested two years ago after her elderly mother was found unconscious and bleeding in the Pacific Grove home they shared, pleaded guilty Sept. 15 to voluntary manslaughter, elder abuse and two counts of felony assault in connection with the death of Charlotte Danvers.

Jean Danvers, then 63, was the sole caretaker of her 96-year-old mother in their Forest Hill Boulevard home, and it was she who dialed 911 the night of Sept. 24, 2009, saying she had struck her mother and was seeking medical help.

"The victim was on the ground and had injuries all over her body," PGPD Cmdr. John Nyunt told The Pine Cone at the time. "Her face had significant injuries, too." He described the elderly woman, who reportedly suffered from dementia, as semiconscious and said she could shake her head in response to questions but was unable to speak.

She died at Community Hospital of the Monterey Peninsula around 2:30 the following morning, and police searched the Danvers' home and a car for evidence, including proof the daughter had tried to clean up blood, her journal and "a note about battering her mother," Nyunt said shortly after her arrest.

According to deputy district attorney Doug Matheson, the autopsy concluded Danvers died from sepsis, a toxic condition resulting from her numerous open wounds. She also suffered from broken ribs, a broken nose and dehydration.

In pleading guilty to the charges last week, Danvers agreed to a sentence of 14 years in prison. Monterey County Superior Court Judge Adrienne M. Grover is set to sentence her on Oct. 11.

Showcasing its current roster of about 120 artists, the gallery presents monthly solo and group exhibits. The CAA also hosts films, lectures, concerts, plays and art demonstrations.

The heart of Carmel's bustling performing arts scene, Sunset Center brings to Carmel an impressive array of talent. This season's offerings, for instance, include appearances by jazz trumpeter Chris Botti, the Temptations, the St. Petersburg String Quartet, Smuin Ballet, the Kingston Trio, Joan Rivers, Bela Fleck, Taj Mahal and more. The center underwent an extensive renovation in 2003, which improved the building's acoustics and transformed the center into a world class facility.

Historic Mission Ranch, owned by former Carmel Mayor Clint Eastwood, is one of the most spectacular spots on the Monterey Peninsula. Offering unique rooms, an historic 1850s farmhouse, complimentary continental breakfast and use of the tennis courts, Mission Ranch includes several different types of rooms with names such as the Farmhouse Room, the Hay Loft and Meadow View Room. The exquisite views are unrivaled: meadows stretch to the south, joining the wetlands and Carmel River Beach. Point Lobos can be seen in the distance across Carmel Bay. The Ranch consisted originally of 160 acres and was owned by Juan Romero, a Native American who is believed to have lived in the village next to the Carmel Mission. Needless to say, the Mission Ranch restaurant has outstanding casual cuisine, a welcoming fireplace and a great patio for Happy Hour drinks. And in the piano bar, jazz is the preferred genre (for obvious reasons). Don't be surprised if you spot a celebrity or two there.

#### ■ Best Hiking Trail

While Point Lobos actually has many trails, the popular park wins Best Hiking Trail for the third straight year. Called "the greatest meeting of land and sea," Point Lobos is famous for its dramatic coastline, its ancient groves of pines and cypress and spectacular vistas. If you're looking for a hike that showcases the best of the park, try exploring the North Shore Trail, which travels about 1.4 miles from Whalers Cove to the Sea Lion Point parking area.


#### ■ Best Place to Take Visitors

From its massive deep-ocean tank, to its sea otters, jelly fish and stingrays, the Monterey Bay Aquarium is one of the best in the world. Garland Ranch Regional Park encompasses more than 4,400 acres and features dozens of miles of hiking trails. A vast network of paths climbs more than 2,000 feet, exploring shady creeks and leading to dazzling, sundrenched vistas. The park is managed by the local Monterey Peninsula Regional Park District, which doesn't charge visitors a fee for entering the park, but somehow manages to keep the park's trails in top condition no small challenge in these challenging economic times.


