Blaze destroys Esalen staff housing, displaces 50

THE ROOMS of about 20 staff members burned to the ground Sunday, Oct. 9, when a fire swept through a former motel used for employee housing by the Esalen Institute. Nobody was injured in the blaze, but nearly 50 people were left homeless.

According to Chief Martha Karstens, the Big Sur Volunteer Fire Brigade was notified about the fire just before 9 p.m.

One member of the fire brigade lives nearby, and when he arrived, "several of the units were already fully engulfed with fire," Karstens reported. "We responded with three engines, two water tenders, a patrol and 18 members."

Also responding to the blaze were firefighters from the United States Forest Service, Carmel Fire Department, Carmel Highlands Fire and Fort Hunter Liggett Fire Department.

Study: Should Carmel, P.G. share police forces?

WITH THE city's fire department set to merge with Monterey's, the Carmel City Council decided last week to also look for ways to save money by having its police department share a chief, officers and various duties with Pacific Grove's.

The council decided to take the first step by asking the state Commission on Peace Officer Standards and Training evaluate each department and make recommendations regarding how they can be more efficient and save money by helping each other out.

What to combine?

At the Oct. 4 council meeting, interim Carmel Police Chief Mike Calhoun said he and PGPD Chief Darius Engles met and agreed that POST consultants should evaluate the possibilities of combining dispatch, records, animal control, investigations, police chief, command staff and frontline patrol officers.

But he said the council should define the parameters of the study, based on what sort of arrangement they'd probably

"They'll be putting time and effort into this, and they don't want to spend time in an area we're not going to pursue," Calhoun said.

Carmel and Pacific Grove have been sharing some police services since 2004, according to Calhoun's report, including animal control officer, clerical office assistant, general law enforcement and investigations. But he admitted that before 2010, "these services were utilized on a limited basis and for the most part not at all."

1,500 tickets

In 2009, the cities agreed to share CPD Cpl. Steve Rana for traffic enforcement, and P.G. taxpayers paid Carmel \$57,188 last year to have him work 20 hours per week in their city. Calhoun said Rana has written 1,500 citations in P.G. since he started working there part-time.

In 2010, the agencies OK'd an agreement to house prisoners in the Pacific Grove jail instead of transporting them to the county facility, to cut down on transportation costs and

Condo plan rejected by supervisors

AFTER HEARING from a steady stream of residents who blasted a plan to build 46 condominiums at the former Carmel Convalescent Hospital site, the Monterey County Board of Supervisors voted unanimously Oct. 11 to deny the project.

The supervisors were scheduled to consider a proposal by the developer — Widewaters Development Group of Svracuse, N.Y. — for a zoning change from two units per acre to 12.5 units per acre so the condos could be built. But not only did the supervisors say, "No," to the zoning change, they also denied the entire plan.

Supervisor Dave Potter — whose district includes the proposed condo site — took aim at how much traffic the condos would create and how much water they would need.

He also criticized the EIR's designation of Highway 1 as an "urban street," which would permit an increase in traffic

"Highway 1 looks about as much like an urban street as I look like a professional basketball player," he said. "When I look at Highway 1, I still see a highway."

'Gargantuan leap'

Potter also called the increase from two units per acre to 12.5 units per acre a "gargantuan leap" and reminded his colleagues that, whether the condo project had water rights or not, letting it go forward would violate the state's order to cut back on pumping from the Carmel River.

"I'm not interested in slapping a state agency in the face," he told his colleagues.

Even if the supervisors voted to upzone the property, Potter predicted it would never get past the California Coastal Commission, which is famously stingy about allowing development in the coastal zone. "As a member of the coastal commission for 12 years, I don't think this project is going to get approved," he added.

Before the vote, Widewaters' development manager, Kevin Kane, urged supervisors to send the condo plan forward to the coastal commission, insisting its EIR addressed

ONE INCUMBENT — who has been in office for the past 18 years and four challengers are seeking three spots on the Carmel Unified School District board of education in the Nov. 8 election that is already under way with the mailing of absentee ballots this week. Longtime board member Annette Yee Steck wants to retain her seat, while Amy Funt and Marcy Rustad decided not to seek reelection, opening the door for a couple of newcomers to serve on a board in one of the most financially healthy school districts in the state. Corporate attorney Bill Leatherberry, paralegal Mary Peitso, small business owner Rita Patel and retired financial advisor Richard Kreitman are vying for those positions.

Steck, who has been on the board for almost two decades, said she is running again in order to help CUSD continue to be one of the best-performing districts in the state, academically and financially.

"I am also aware of the challenges we face and bring a knowledge of the obstacles we have had to overcome to achieve our current successes." she said. "I believe I can help our students and the district continue to improve and remain at the top.'

Despite its strong position, the district faces several challenges,

Tempest over Monarchs in Butterfly Town

As THOUSANDS of migrating monarchs begin their annual stop in Pacific Grove, there is a row heating up within local butterfly camps.

The issue is whether to ban the release of farmraised monarchs — not the wild, migrating version of the insect that overwinter in P.G. each year — at weddings, celebrations and other events.

While some believe releasing bred monarchs would disrupt the habitat of the butterflies that arrive in the city from October to February, others say releasing a small number of the insects is a positive way to educate the public about the city's favorite

Two local monarch devotees couldn't disagree more.

"Butterfly farming is a big industry, and it's time to stop [releases of monarchs] here in P.G.," Pacific Grove Monarch Conservancy co-founder Esther Trosow told The Pine Cone.

She believes releasing bred monarchs in P.G. could cause a host of problems, including fouling the insect's natural gene pool and exposing them to a parasite that occurs on farmed and migratory monarchs that can cripple or kill butterfly pupae and adults.

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Feds to get more say before lagoon sandbar can be breached

NEXT TIME the water level in the Carmel River Lagoon threatens nearby homes — which happens nearly every year — Monterey County Public Works will no longer be able to simply declare an emergency and cut a channel in the sandbar blocking the lagoon's outlet to the sea, a federal official told The Pine Cone this week.

Instead, public works will need to confer with the Army Corps of Engineers before its bulldozers can do any work.

"We want to bring the county in compliance with state and federal environmental laws," explained Paula Gill, a regulatory project manager for the ACE who will oversee flood control measures in the area where the Carmel River spills into the ocean.

While the extra step seemingly could waste valuable time - and make homeowners nervous — Gill said she's confident that such a collaboration between the county and the

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federal agency can protect both the lagoon's steelhead population and local homes.

"We completely recognize the flood hazard of the lagoon and we have no interest in that happening," she insisted.

Gill said the Army Corps of Engineers has considerable experience dealing with challenges similar to what public works faces in managing the Carmel River Lagoon.

"We have procedures in place to deal with situations like this," she explained. "This isn't the only lagoon with infrastructure around it."

The annual breeching of the lagoon sandbar has drawn fire from environmentalists, who worry immature steelhead are swept from the lagoon and into the sea before they are old enough to survive there. To reduce the impact on young steelhead, they've urged public works officials to cut the channel in a northerly direction.

Residents, meanwhile, have been critical of previous attempts to cut the channel in a northerly direction, which they blame for eroding away a state beach parking lot and undermining the sandy bluffs that support Scenic Road.

What she chose was a blend of canine and feline. It started with the movie, "As Good As It Gets," with Jack Nicholson, in which his obsessive-compulsive character



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


comes to care for Verdell, a Brussels griffon played by six different dogs. She liked the movie but fell in love with Verdell, an Ewok of an animal with a curious little face.

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Family files lawsuit against nursing home for death of elderly relative

THE FAMILY of a woman who died at Carmel Hills Care Center early this year has filed an elder abuse and wrongful death lawsuit against the Monterey nursing home.

In a suit filed Sept. 22, Linda Ciandro alleges staff at Carmel Hills Care Center neglected to turn her bedridden grandmother, Pearl Perry, while she was in the facility for more than two months in late 2010. As a result, Perry developed a serious skin ulcer and infection that contributed to her death, according to the suit.

"The ulcer on Pearl Perry's hip area became so deep through neglect of [Carmel Hills] and its employees," according to the suit filed in Monterey County Superior Court, "that a person looking at her back could visualize her spinal column."

"As far as anybody can tell," Ciandro's attorney, Chuck Warner said, "it doesn't look like anybody turned her."

Carmel Hill's administrators, Kim and Bob Bowersox, said in a prepared statement, "our hearts go out to the family as they cope with the loss of their loved one." They added, "Carmel Hills is committed to providing quality care to our patients and [we] point to the many hundreds of families who have experienced positive outcomes and benefited from the compassionate care provided by our staff."

The lawsuit alleges Perry, 96, developed ulcers on her back, which became infected with Methicillin-resistant Staphylococcus Aureus [MRSA]. The infection, caused by staph bacteria and usually on the skin, is resistant to certain antibiotics, such as penicillin.

Though the infection may not have been the leading cause of Perry's death — which is not outlined in the suit — Warner said it was significant. "It was a substantial factor in causing death," he explained.

The lawsuit doesn't identify individual Carmel Hills employees by name but says the nursing home was "guilty of physical abuse of Pearl Perry by willfully failing to provide care for, attend, comfort and or examine Perry ... ultimately resulting in her demise."

Perry had been at Carmel Hills from Sept. 29, 2010, until

Oct. 22, 2010, until she was transferred to Community Hospital of the Monterey Peninsula for medical treatment. She returned to Carmel Hills on Nov. 2, 2010, and died Jan. 5, according to the lawsuit.

"She had a lot of life coming," Warner said. "She was still pretty feisty."

Carmel Hills is a 99-bed skilled nursing facility at 23795 Holman Highway.

The lawsuit, which also lists Perry's children, Donald Perry, Linda Kojima and Ernestine Warren, as plaintiffs, seeks medical expenses, punitive damages, attorneys' fees and other expenses.

In February of this year, the family of Joseph Cerchi, 84, filed a wrongful death suit against Carmel Hills alleging it was negligent when the "unattended" elderly man fell in a bathroom, hitting his head and later died.

This year the federal government gave Carmel Hills an overall rating of one star, which it considers "much below average." The government only ranks facilities that accept Medicare and Medicaid."

Foundation pays off loan for Trevvett Court housing

THANKS TO an outpouring of generosity from the community, The Carmel Foundation now owns Trevvett Court the 14-unit housing complex it recently built on Dolores Street — free and clear. The nonprofit made its final payment of \$422,000 on its line of credit Oct. 6, president and CEO Jill Sheffield said this week.

"We're extremely excited about that — it really makes us happy," she said. "Our biggest goal was to complete the campaign and not have a mortgage. We had a line of credit for less than a year, and to be able to pay it off is wonderful."

The foundation owns 50 units for low-income men and women 65 years of age and older, making it the largest provider of such housing in town and satisfying 90 percent of the city's mandate under state law to provide low-income senior residences. Every apartment is occupied, and the nonprofit — which receives no tax dollars for any of its programs — keeps a waiting list of people who want to move in. In addition to Trevvett Court, the foundation owns Norton Court, which contains two dozen units, and nearby Haseltine Court, which has 12. It launched its housing program in 1962 with four apartments.

The Trevvett Court project was designed by architect Eric

Miller to replace an old, nine-unit complex the foundation also owned. It contains 14 modern, one-bedroom, 500square-foot apartments and was constructed by SBI Builders. The entire project cost \$3.2 million.

Foundation officials noted that raising the money was a particularly significant accomplishment, considering the state of the economy since the recession began in 2008.

"We're very, very thankful to the community and all the people who supported us, because without them, it wouldn't have happened," Sheffield said. "It's really not about us it's about all those people. Those are the heroes."

Major contributors included the Barnet Segal Charitable Trust, the estate of Ralph and Mary Jane Drummond, the Robert O. and Dorian Lee Koch Trust, the Monterey Peninsula Foundation, the Federal Home Loan Bank of San Francisco Affordable Housing Program, the California Association of Realtors Housing Affordability Fund, the estate of Rebekah Gisnet and Maurice Mandell, the Wells Fargo and Wachovia Wells Fargo foundations, the Robert S. and Grayce B. Kerr Foundation, the estate of Claudia Pollock, Santa Barbara Bank & Trust, Post Ranch Inn, SBI Builders, the City of Carmel-by-the-Sea, the Concours on the Avenue, the Chapman Charitable Foundation, the Carmel Foundation Needlecraft Group, "and numerous generous

individuals in our community," according to the foundation. The Doolittle Fund, the Farrell/Allen Fund and the Robert and Virginia Stanton Endowment Fund also made donations.

What's next

Sheffield said the foundation has no plans to launch another capital campaign anytime soon, but it's working on new ways to serve its members, who are age 55 and older and reside throughout the Monterey Peninsula. In addition to housing, the nonprofit provides low-cost meals (some of which are delivered to shut-ins), classes, lectures and social gatherings, medical equipment loans, shopping trips, rides to and from medical appointments and other services.

"The next thing we're working on is a program that's a 'village' concept" to let people stay in their homes, she said. To help older people remain independent, the foundation will keep a list of recommended vendors and will facilitate members helping each other with daily chores, from shopping, to programming electronics. Sheffield said she will be hiring a director to run the program, which should launch next spring.

She also said the nonprofit plans to open a little cafe on its property at Lincoln and Eighth by the end of the year so seniors can meet and chat over a latte or a cappuccino even when the main dining room is closed.

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Man's quick bite gets ear bitten off

■ Lawsuit filed against restaurant and attacker

A MAN who suffered a severe beating in the parking lot of a Jack in the Box restaurant in Monterey in which part of his ear was bitten off is suing the fast food chain alleging workers watched the 10-minute attack and did nothing to stop it.

In a lawsuit filed Oct. 7, Joshua Harvey alleges that he suffered a beating outside Jack in the Box at 889 Abrego Street in Monterey and that he received no help from the restaurant's employees. In fact, according to the suit, they apparently thought the assault was funny.

"The Jack in the Box employees were seen laughing and did absolutely nothing to aid [Harvey] and/or stop the altercation," according to the lawsuit filed by Harvey's attorney, Larry Biegel.

As a result of the July 4, 2010, attack — which the lawsuit contends occurred on property owned by Jack in the Box — Harvey said he received a broken nose and that part of his left ear was bitten off by his attacker, Christian Daniels, whom Harvey is also suing for battery.

Jack in the Box workers — including the restaurant's manager — watched the eight-to 10-minute attack on Harvey from inside the large plate glass windows of the eatery, the suit alleges.

The workers "failed to even try to call 911 to obtain help from the Monterey Police Department, whose station is less than a mile away from the Jack in the Box premises," the suit says.

A spokesman at the Jack in the Box headquarters in San Diego declined to comment on the suit.

According to his claim, at about 11:25 p.m., Harvey and some friends went to Jack in the Box and ordered food. Because the inside dining room was about to close, they

took their food outside to eat.

While eating and talking, Daniels, "who was carrying a case of beer and smelled of alcohol, began to harass" Harvey, who turned away from Daniels and walked to his car.

As Harvey had his back to Daniels, Daniels "began hitting and kicking" Harvey. When Harvey's friends tried to stop the melee, they were also attacked by Daniels, the suit alleges.

Harvey alleges negligence on the part of Jack in the Box, which he maintains should have protected patrons and "taken reasonable steps to secure common areas against foreseeable criminal acts." According to the lawsuit, "there have been a number of fights" on Jack in the Box's Monterey property.

Jack and the Box and Central Coast Restaurants, Inc., which owns and operates the Monterey restaurant and is also a defendant in the lawsuit, failed to "protect plaintiff from injury from criminal acts of third persons," the suit contends.

At the very least, "employees had a duty to call 911," according to the lawsuit filed in Monterey County Superior Court. Harvey alleges Daniels hit, kicked and punched him over a "prolonged period of time."

Because of the attack, Harvey is prevented from working in his usual occupation and will continue to lose income, he alleges.

After the beating, Daniels was arrested by Monterey police, charged and convicted of felony assault with force likely to produce great bodily injury, according to the lawsuit.

Harvey, who said he continues to seek medical and incidental expenses as a result of the attack, contends he has suffered "great mental, physical and nervous pain and suffering" that will result in permanent injury.

He is seeking reimbursement for medical expenses, lost earnings, attorneys' fees and other costs. And because the suit alleges Daniels was "willful and malicious and intended to oppress and cause injury" to Harvey, he is seeking punitive damages from Daniels.

UNPRECEDENTED GATHERINGS of Porsches old, new, rare, historic and high-tech will take place at Mazda Raceway Laguna Seca and in Carmel Valley this weekend, when the Rennsport Reunion IV makes its Monterey County debut at the track and the Porsche Race Car Classic has its inaugural event at Quail Lodge.

During the Rennsport Reunion IV Oct. 14-16, more than 350 Porsche race cars will compete, and the track will welcome highly accomplished drivers, including Indianapolis 500 Champion Danny Sullivan, Le Mans winner Derek Bell, former Formula 1 driver Stefan Johansson, and Steve McQueen's son, Chad. The reunion will bring together many of the marque's most historic racing models - from mid-1950s Spyders, to the 917 and 956/962 that turned heads at the track during the decades that followed. A special tribute will be paid to the numerous racing versions of the iconic Porsche 911, a brand-new version of which will make its North American debut at the event on Friday.

Meanwhile, nearly four dozen cars — including rare specimens from the Porsche Museum in Stuttgart-Zuffenhausen, Germany, and The Revs Institute for Automotive Research at the Collier Collection in Naples, Fla. — will be exhibited in the paddock. Museum cars include the only 1971 Porsche 16cylinder race car constructed for the Can-Am series, the 1973 Porsche 911 RSR that won the last Targa Florio, the 1977 935/2.0 "Baby," the original "Moby Dick" considered by many to be the ultimate 935, the unique Porsche 961 racer and the revered 911 GT-1 98 LM.

Retired Porsche engineer Norbert Singer — whose influence can be seen in many of the manufacturer's race cars and collector and comedian Jerry Seinfeld will share duties as grand marshals at the races, and Seinfeld is bringing "a number of his most prized cars to Rennsport," according to organizers. His collection of street and race cars includes the first 911 that entered production in 1964, the 917K that Steve McQueen drove in "Le Mans," and a 1955 Spyder 550 identical to that owned by actor James Dean.

Also at the track Saturday, collectible and historic Porsches will compete in a Concours on Pit Lane. That evening, as the sun sets, the Porsche Fan Party in the Biergarten will go all out with live music, authentic German food and a screening of "LeMans."

And in Carmel Valley ...

The Porsche Race Car Classic is gearing up for its debut at Quail Lodge Sunday, Oct. 16. The upscale gathering will benefit lung cancer research and will also feature an historic gathering of rarely seen specimens.

"The whole thing has been a pursuit in the name of cars it's very hard to pull all these together in one place," said organizer Steve Heinrichs, a lung cancer survivor and Porsche aficionado. The PRCC is being described as a "oncein-a-lifetime gathering of race cars from Porsche's break-out era, 1950 to 1965 — the cars that made Porsche the most revered name in racing."

Set to appear on the grassy field at Quail will be 175 rare beauties from the Porsche AG Museum, Ingram Collection, Collier Collection and Seinfeld's collection, along with unique and production race cars.

"All of that pulled through," he said. "It's going to be a pretty exciting time. We are going to have a very special unveiling: All the cars are going to be under wraps and then, at 10:15 a.m., we will pull the drapes off the cars.'

Similar to the Quail Motorsports Gathering held each August, food and wine are major components of the PRCC, and Heinrichs said restaurateur Tony Tollner — owner of the Rio Grill, Tarpy's Roadhouse and Montrio Bistro — is handling the catering, while Ventana Vineyards is bringing "all their higher-end, more important wines."

"We're delighted that Tony Tollner is doing the food," he

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

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complex features two rows of units. While the top row was devastated by the fire, the lower row escaped damage. The residents of both rows were evacuated during the fire, which is under investigation.

The displaced employees are temporarily staying at Esalen, reported Tricia McEntee, Esalen CEO.

"I am grateful that we are all safe," McEntee posted this week on Esalen's website. "My heart is heavy for those who lost valuable parts of their lives. Esalen is providing accommodations for everyone who is affected and we are in the process of planning for longer-term housing needs."

McEntee observed that, in spite of the crisis, their entire staff was back at work the next day - and as a result, the fire should have no effect on the nonprofit resort's busy workshop schedule. "We have a wonderful staff who will pull together and take care of each," she added.

The Monterey Bay chapter of the

American Red Cross reported this week that 30 people displaced by the fire have received support from the nonprofit group, which has an office in Carmel. Esalen spokesperson Elizabeth Stacey-Marien said management is hopeful the lower row residents will be able to return to their rooms this weekend.

While Esalen does carry fire insurance on the housing complex, it is unclear how much of the loss will be covered, Stacey-Marien added. As a result, Esalen has launched a fire relief fund. For more information, call (831) 667-3032 or visit www.esalen.org and click the "donate" link. Contributions can be earmarked for the fire relief fund.

The fire comes 13 years after a mudslide wiped out Esalen's bathhouse. Its many benefactors help fund the construction of a new \$5 million bath complex, which opened four years later. More recently, the 2008 Basin Complex Fire burned up Esalen's water system.

according to Steck, including threats to its funding structure. Compared with most other districts, CUSD spends twice as much on its students, and "each year, legislation is submitted to eliminate our method of funding statewide," she said. "So far, we have been successful in staving off that threat, but the wealth of our district is an appealing target."

Meanwhile, student enrollment is rising, considering it's such a desirable district, so Steck said spending money wisely is increasingly important.

On the education front, extensive efforts are being made to narrow the "achievement gap" between native English speakers and the district's English language learners, disabled students, Hispanic students, and those who are poor, but Steck said she believes the schools can do more to close that gap. "We need to devote more resources to those students who struggle the most," she said.

Drug and alcohol abuse continue to plague students, despite CUSD's efforts to curb them, but curriculum started in the elementary schools that continues through the middle school and high school, and involves parents, is effective and should be pursued.

Steck said she hopes to help the district continue to attract and retain highly qualified teachers and staff, increase the number of students eligible to attend four-year universities, and see the district's capital projects completed on time and on budget.

"Our schools are looking better than ever," she said. "We are completing projects at every school, now, and should be done with everything in the next four years or so."

She highlighted her experience on the board, as well as her expertise in school district budgets and finance. Steck runs an independent financial advisory firm that specializes in school district finance.

"I will work extremely hard to ensure that budget cuts remain as far away from the classroom as possible," she said, adding that she is also an instructor for the California School Boards Association Masters in Governance program, which helps teach school board members how to become more effective in their roles.

"I am a good listener and am open minded," she said. "I am a practical, thoughtful problem-solver who cares for all of the students in each of our schools."

■ Bill Leatherberry

A corporate attorney for Century Aluminum Co. in Monterey, Leatherberry and his wife, who is a radiologist at Community Hospital's breast care center, moved to the Monterey Peninsula from Dallas, Texas, seven years ago. They live in Carmel Woods and have three kids between the ages of 4 and 8. His daughters attend Santa Catalina, while his son attends Serendipity preschool in Monterey.

Leatherberry said he decided to run for CUSD board because he's passionate about education and wants to "volunteer my time for something I feel very strongly about."

"I think education is the greatest thing that you can give to your children, and not much is more important than that," he said.

Although his children are not enrolled in Carmel's public schools, because private education was a better choice for

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them, Leatherberry said he's well aware of the issues facing the district and is well positioned to contribute to their resolution.

"I would say the issues facing it are maintaining the facilities, the technology and the infrastructure in place to allow for the ever increasing convergence of education and technology," he said. "Schools have to continue to adapt to the changing environment."

Only then can students remain at the top when it comes to standardized testing, according to Leatherberry. CUSD students consistently perform strongly on statewide testing, placing the schools high in academic rankings.

In addition, the board must work to oversee "what has been a very effective leadership structure in the district," and he would like to build on the success of prior boards in providing resources and infrastructure for the students, especially as academic standards and requirements change.

"Maintaining those standards is going to be an interesting opportunity and challenge for the district," he said.

Leatherberry said his commitment toward education and care for the community — as well as his professional background and skills — make him a good candidate for the job.

"It's volunteering your time toward a cause that you're engaged with and trying to add your background and skills to accomplishing the goals of the community for its students. "I'm excited about the opportunity, am looking forward to the election and think I can add value if given the chance."

■ Mary Peitso

As a parent of two children who have been attending Carmel's public schools for seven years, Peitso, a paralegal, said she and her kids are benefiting "from the foundation that was laid by parents before me." Serving on the CUSD board of education would allow her to continue the work others have started, and she said she believes "fiscal responsibility and accountability are crucial in continuation of this."

Peitso worried the potential reauthorization of the federal No Child Left Behind Act could cost the district money, "due to the scores of the special education students and the English language learners not increasing over the past two years."


"We need to look at ways of increasing the learning of these two demographics and making the general education curriculum more accessible to them," she said. "This will not only stop the possible loss of funding but will enable these students to eventually be ready to proceed with their posthigh-school goals."

She also said drugs, alcohol and bullying are continuing problems in the schools, and "anti-drug, anti-alcohol and anti-bullying messages need to be built into the students' curriculum to be effective." The county's behavioral health department is trained to implement such programs school wide, according to Peitso.

Peitso said she "would like to see all Carmel High School graduates be prepared for a job, college or a career upon

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graduation or receipt of a certificate of completion," which could be accomplished by expanding ROP offerings and better preparing students to complete AP courses.

She said she's an ideal candidate because, as a parent representative for CUSD on the county's special education committee, she understands the special-education system, which gives her "knowledge of how to work with the resources available to make progress and solve problems."

She also served on the board of directors of Special Kids

Peitso works for Heisinger, Buck & Morris in Carmel and has experience in construction defect law, workers' compensation law, civil litigation, real estate law, elder law and special education law.

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From Airborne to filmmaking — McDowell makes debut as director

THE CO-FOUNDER of the company that launched the successful but controversial supplement Airborne, Rider McDowell will debut his latest creation Saturday, Oct. 15 a gritty full-length feature film — at the third annual Carmel Art and Film Festival.

McDowell is the writer and director of "The Mercy Man," which is based on a novel with the same title he wrote in 1987. Set in New York City, the movie follows the adventures of an undercover police officer, Willy Diaz, who is played by actor J.C. Hernandez. In the movie, Diaz and a beautiful investigative reporter, Esme Pinyero, try to solve the murder of a mutual friend. Their efforts lead to the discovery that the crime was the work of a serial killer.

Guenia Lemos portrays Pinyero, while Andre Royo plays a key supporting role. Hernandez and Lemos have appeared in the television series, "Law and Order," while Royo played "Bubbles" in the television series, "The Wire."

"The Mercy Man" was filmed last year in New York City, on a farm in New Jersey and at the former Carmel Hospital

"It's a gritty film with a gritty look," McDowell told The Pine Cone this week.

As a filmmaker, McDowell turns to the genre of 1970s police thrillers for inspiration. "My favorite films come from the 1970s," McDowell observed. His "best of" list includes "Taxi Driver," "The French Connection" and "Dirty Harry."

McDowell said the budget for making "The Mercy Man" was "less than \$4 million." In addition to the expense of being a filmmaker, he discovered it's hard work as well. "It's exciting and invigorating, but it's very taxing," he observed. 'You're out in the elements all the time.'

While he's had several offers to distribute the film, McDowell said he is in no rush sign a deal. "I'm gun shy, so I'm taking my time," he added.

any concerns. "The impacts have been thoroughly vetted,"

But about two dozen members of the public spoke out against the condo project at Tuesday's hearing, including Carmel's building and services manager Sean Conroy

"Good planning is forward-looking and not reactionary," Conroy suggested. He said zoning changes should be a part of an overall plan to benefit the public and not "a reaction to an applicant's proposal."

Conroy's presence was noted by supervisor Lou Calcagno, who said he was contacted by a Carmel city official as well. "I got an an email from the city asking me to deny the project," Calcagno said.

Defending his vote against the plan, Calcagno said there was overwhelming public opposition to it. "I've never received so many emails opposing a project," he noted.

If the supervisors had approved the condos, Calcagno suggested they would just end up in court. "It would open a Pandora's Box of legal issues," he added.

Opponents of the condo plan were elated by the supervisors' vote.

The next day, Mark Bayne who lives in the neighborhood where the condos would have been built, said he was "very pleased with the outcome," and that he "slept better last night than I've slept in a long time."

He also praised local attorney Molly Erickson, "who we are deeply indebted to — literally and figuratively."

Bayne wouldn't say how much opponents owe Erickson for helping them stop the condo development, but he said they're talking about staging a fundraising "block party" to help pay the bill. "We couldn't have navigated this morass of bureaucracy without her," he added.

Located at 24945 Valley Way on 3.68 acres, the Villas de Carmelo project included 37 market-rate units and nine "affordable" units.

Widewaters pushed the plan as a "rare and unique" opportunity to restore the property's 80-year-old building, which was Community Hospital before it moved to Highway 68 in 1962, and then became a convalescent hospital before closing in 2005. Kane called the building a "prime example of Monterey-Spanish architecture."

AFTER YEARS of hosting the multiday Great Wine Escape each November, the Monterey County Vintners & Growers Association has replaced that event with its new Best of the Blue, which will launch Saturday, Nov. 12, in a private hangar at the Monterey Peninsula Airport.

Named for the undersea canyon that draws divers from around the world to Monterey Bay that the group has dubbed the Blue Grand Canyon, the one-day affair seeks to highlight the wines of the area and talented chefs, some of whom will drive their food trucks from around the state to gather at Monterey Bay Aviation's fancy terminal.

Best of the Blue is strikingly different from the GWE's wine dinners, seminars, food-and-wine tastings and winery tours. Sometimes, there's nothing like cannelloni. It doesn't have to be fancy — it just has to be good.

Chef Alberto Bonatelli turns out a fine specimen in the tiny restaurant on the hill in Pacific Grove he's owned for a decade. Holding just a handful of tables, the out-of-the-way spot is cozy and green-hued inside, where the walls are painted with flowers Bonatelli did himself. He has a single server on the floor and handles everything in the kitchen himself, aided only by a dishwasher who quietly and efficiently takes on other

tasks in the cooking area, too.

Bonatelli, who spent years cooking for the stars in Malibu before moving to the Monterey Peninsula, makes everything to order. His menu is accessible and familiar, including dishes like classic linguine and meatballs, Chicken Marsala, Puttanesca and a tasty eggplant parmesan. Priced at \$23, the most expensive item is the linguine pescatore of clams, mussels, calamari and other fish, while most of the entrées fall in the \$16 to \$20 range.

His delicious Cannelloni alla Romana is filled with tender chicken, mushrooms and pecorino cheese, then topped with pesto, Bechamel and marinara sauce. It sells for \$17.95. He also carries a nice selection of reasonably priced wines — and the tiramisu, \$6, is fantastic (in spite of a dusting of rainbow sprinkles).

The restaurant is located at 1219 Forest Ave. in Pacific Grove, a parking lot away from Patisserie Bechler, and is open



overtime. They also trained together in firearms, hand-to-

hand combat, use of force and other perishable skills. "This working and training arrangement proved crucial in building solid relationships and mutual trust between personnel of the two cities," said Calhoun, who described the past few years of sharing duties as "smooth and uneventful."

He told the council both police departments "agree that sharing services and resources has been beneficial and that more can be accomplished if this concept is further studied and expanded." But without the support of the council, residents and law enforcement, "the concept is premature and of little value."

Pacific Grove City Councilman Rudy Fischer attended the Carmel City Council meeting and said he was in favor of expanding "the cooperative relationship that goes back for many years," due to the money it would save and the convenience it would offer to residents. Stray dogs, for example, can be picked up from P.G.'s kennel instead of at Monterey County Animal Services in Salinas.

"I look forward to more cooperation between both cities,"

But former Carmel City Councilwoman Barbara Livingston condemned the idea.

"Isn't this exactly how the acquisition of Carmel's fire department by Monterey started?" she asked. Livingston said combining PGPD and CPD could threaten the city's independence, individuality and historicity.

"Do you see us giving up everything?" she asked the

Mayor Sue McCloud expressed concern the cities are too different to overlap in patrol, since Pacific Grove has more



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serious crimes, while Carmel caters mostly to tourists. "Particularly at the patrol officer level, that's something

that concerns me," she said, and Calhoun responded that POST could take those differences into account.

"I mean, you all know who a lot of us crazy curmudgeons are," she continued.

"True," Calhoun said, eliciting laughter from the council and the audience. "We're happy to help everybody." Councilman Ken Talmage wondered if the city was losing

ticket revenues by sharing Rana with P.G., since income from citations this year is down from last year by \$96,000.

He wondered, "If we're sharing a police officer, how much of that \$96,000" is attributable to Rana's writing tickets in P.G. rather than in Carmel?

"Sometimes I think these are false economies," he said,


between the two cities and the fiscal implications of having their officers working in each other's jurisdictions, including traffic enforcement.

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





"I can't see how releasing farm-raised monarchs in or near P.G. has any scientific value," Trosow said. "It's bad idea because it could possibly introduce an insidious monarch-specific infection, skew the genetic pool for scientific investigations, interfere with the overwintering phenomenon and mask wild population numbers. Why take those chances with the town's beloved

But resident Helen Johnson — who loves butterflies and likes to release them in her garden — defended the hobby of buying and releasing the insects.

"I cannot understand how it has become a horrendous crime," said Johnson, who is also the primary benefactor of a Cal Poly San Luis Obispo monarch program that researches wild monarchs. Since 2001, she's donated about \$20,000 a year to the Cal Poly pro-

Generous funding

For her own releases, Johnson spends about \$10 for each monarch, which she purchases from an Encinitas butterfly dealer. In September and October she released 13 monarchs plus two adult wild ones she found on a potted milkweed plant in her garden. She plans to release more in November.

Unlike monarch releases performed by others at weddings and events, though, Johnson tags the monarchs she releases so they can be tracked by Cal Poly researchers. Tagging involves placing a small sticker on a butterfly's wing so it can be tracked when found.

Johnson doesn't understand what all the hullaballoo is about in freeing a few farmed monarchs and thinks people like Trosow should mind their own business.

"They can just butt out of my life, as far as I'm concerned," she said.

Johnson said she isn't the first person to release bred monarchs in the city. Several years ago, she said tagged monarchs were let go in the backyard of the Pacific Grove Museum of Natural History.

"Everyone loved the release ... kids and adults," she said.

Cal Poly professor Francis Villablanca – who heads the Cal Poly Monarch Alert pro-- said it's possible that farmed monarchs infected with the parasite could have an adverse effect on migratory monarchs.

"My position is that there may be a risk associated with the releases," he said.

There's a potential of crossbreeding between migratory monarchs and raised ones, according to Villablanca, who wants the funding to study the population genetics of Western monarchs.

'We plan to ask if populations are genetically subdivided, or if any Western monarch is genetically equivalent to any other," he said. "Until that research is done, we have no clue what the potential genetic effects are."

However, Villablanca also praised Johnson's generous funding of the butterfly program, which has provided for helpful research of the insects, he contends.

"In terms of the releases done by Helen Johnson, I think it is important to note that because of her contributions to Cal Poly's Monarch Alert program ... we have been able to maintain an active research program on Western monarchs," he said. "Much of what we do know about Western monarchs is because of Cal Poly's collaboration with Helen."

No law against it

While the City of Pacific Grove doesn't have an ordinance against releasing farmed monarchs in the city, officials discourage the practice. And the municipal code makes it unlawful for anyone to interfere with the city's monarchs.

Deputy city manager Jim Becklenberg said if the city hears someone is planning a release, officials will emphasize the fragility of the butterfly sanctuary.

We are aware of the unsettled scientific questions regarding the risk to migratory monarchs posed by farmed monarchs," Becklenberg told The Pine Cone. "Due to the heightened sensitivities ... the city is especially vigilant about potential interference."

Even though Johnson said she doesn't release butterflies in the monarch sanctuary or George Washington Park, Trosow said that doesn't matter, because the crafty insects will find their way there.

"It's where they'll head, no matter where in town they are released," she said.

Besides, Trosow said the practice should stop because it sets a bad precedent.

"If we can't set an example not to release them, she asked, "how can we possibly ask [visitors] passing through casually not to release them" at weddings and other events?

Johnson maintains the benefits of releasing butterflies outweigh the risks. At a museum event Nov. 26 dubbed Monarch Magic, Johnson said she will have at least two dozen raised monarchs for children and adults to see close up.

After the event, Johnson said she will likely free the tagged butterflies somewhere in Pacific Grove.

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
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
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

Patel, who owns a chain of independent pharmacies with her husband, has been a board member of parent-teacher associations at River School and the middle school. She said participating on PTA and PTO boards, including on their executive committees, has helped her gain a lot of insight and

"I feel I am ready, capable and have the understanding of how our schools operate to make an even greater impact and a difference," she said. "Being a board member for such a long time and having four children in the school district, I feel am in a unique position and have an understanding of being on the inside looking out."

She described herself as a hard worker who is willing to enter the fray when necessary.

"As CMS PTO president, I understand the children, parent and staff needs and concerns, and I feel that I have my finger on the pulse," she said.

Patel said budget issues top her list of concerns, and while the board has done a good job of preserving the schools' programs and services during increasingly leaner financial times, "the parents have to be willing to pick up the slack if they want certain programs to continue.'

She also wants more resources for students who do not plan to attend college after they graduate. "We have lots of

services and support for kids going to college, like career and college day, and SAT prep," she pointed out. "What about the kids who are not college bound?"

She suggested additional emphasis on service/vocational tracks would help those students feel more supported. "All the kids should be treated equally and supported whether they go to Harvard, Berkeley, MPC or decide to work in the hotel industry right out of high school," she said.

Patel said communication between the CUSD board and parents needs to be more transparent, so parents have "a greater sense of connection and working together with the school district."

As a trustee, she pledged to listen to all issues brought before her by children, parents and administrators, and she described herself as "an approachable parent leader with excellent listening skills and patience."

Richard Kreitman

Kreitman, a familiar face at school board meetings and previously unsuccessful candidate for CUSD board, saw his older son graduate last summer from Carmel High School -"one of the very best high schools in California" — while his younger son attends CMS — "one of the very best middle schools in California."

While CHS and CMS are academically excellent now, "seven or eight years ago, you couldn't honestly say that about either school," he said. "This extraordinary achievement in improving academic performance took a lot of hard work and dedication on the part of the entire Carmel Unified school community — the teachers foremost. I personally dedicated a great deal of time and effort over the past 10 years working as a volunteer for this improvement."

He said he is running for a seat on the school board in order to help protect and maintain such academic excellence.

To do that, Kreitman said the district must "hire the best teachers and give them all the support they need," and expand programs focused on fine arts and performing arts.

In addition, class sizes must be maintained by hiring more faculty and building more classrooms, while the board must watch its finances and budget wisely. The schools' rising enrollment has made CUSD a victim of its own success, according to Kreitman.

And he said he would also work to continue employing the best anti-abuse programs possible, rigorously enforce district policies and ensure parents are getting the message.

During the next four years, Kreitman said he would seek to find a suitable superintendent to lead the district to "even greater success" after Marvin Biasotti retires, hire a top arts administrator and expand the arts offerings, develop an ROP/electives program to help high-school seniors be ready for the workforce as well as prepared for college, and "develop stronger ties between the Carmel schools community and the broader Carmel community, including the business community and Carmel-by-the-Sea."


Kreitman, who worked for the U.S. State Department as an economist and later had a career in the financial industry, touted his experience as a parent and volunteer, as well as his participation on the executive boards of the Carmel Middle School PTO, the Carmel River School PTA, the FOCUS board, the Carmel High School Foundation board, the River School and High School site councils, and several committees. He has helped promote events, raise funds, tutor students and teach after-school classes.

"I am an excellent budget analyst and auditor — skills that will serve us well on the Carmel school board," he said. "With my recent retirement, I can devote sufficient time to the responsibilities of a school board member. I'm a numbers guy and a policy wonk."

Finally, he professed his love for and dedication to Carmel schools, describing them as "exceptional places for our children to get an exemplary, well rounded education.'

"I've worked hard to help achieve this, and I want to continue contributing to it as a member of our school board," Kreitman said.





Merging fire and police

In A perfect world, Carmel would be able to keep its own police and fire departments. The city's police and fire stations are familiar, comforting presences downtown — and the fact they've been there so long, and are filled with so many well known faces — is one of the things that makes the town special.

But considering the layoffs and cutbacks being experienced in many other cities, we have to be grateful the worst-case scenario being considered by the city council is to merge the Carmel Fire Department with Monterey's (as Pacific Grove has already done), while sharing some law enforcement personnel and services with PGPD.

During the council's hearings on these subjects, a few of the local naysayers have likened the arrangements to Armageddon.

"Do you want Carmel-by-the-Sea to become Monterey-by-the-Bay?" former councilwoman Barbara Livingston asked the council as it debated the fire merger with Monterey. And last week, she said the possibility of sharing police services with Pacific Grove threatened Carmel's "independence, individuality and historicity."

Of course, she was being hyperbolic, but her point is well taken, especially if it's considered strictly on its merits. And Livingston would certainly be correct if the council's plan were to shut the Carmel police and fire departments and let the town's emergency services be delivered from the other side of the hill.

But we think the council is doing a good job of preserving the services that really matter while saving money.

For example, does Carmel need its own fire chief? It hasn't had one since 2001, yet the town's fire services have been just as good as they were when the last chief retired. So the answer must be, "No." Carmel can share a chief with Monterey without losing its identity or burning down. Likewise, fire engine maintenance and training, and a host of other things. As long as the fire station on Sixth Avenue is staffed with an engine and adequate personnel to respond to a fire 24/7, Carmel's citizens can sleep at night and still be proud of their city.

Similarly, there are many police services that could be shared with an adjacent city without Carmel falling prey to a crime wave or not having an officer available when an elderly resident needs help getting back into a chair or unlocking a door. Preservation of essential services is what matters; window dressing for the sake of "historicity" does not matter.

And by saving a bit of money on duplicative police and fire services, the city can then spend some on things that will really help maintain Carmel's reputation as a charming, scenic and friendly respite from the rest of the world — such as getting rid of the horrible porta-potties at the south end of the beach. The plan for new restrooms there looks really good!

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
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"He's been working on these images for more than 20 years," gallery owner Chris Winfield explained. "His photographs remind me of jellyfish. They have a really ethereal quality to them."
