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HERALD LAYS OFF WORKERS DAYS AFTER ANNOUNCING OUTSOURCING

LESS THAN a week after employees in the Monterey County Herald's advertising art department were told most of their duties would be outsourced to workers in India, management announced Tuesday several of them would soon be without a job.

Last week, Herald management told workers in its creative services department that in an effort to cut costs, it would be sending most of its work offshore within the next few months.

While employees expected reductions in the

Despite activist's objections, supes OK wildfire plan

Home's costly construction hampers fire fight

BIG SUR and upper Carmel Valley residents won a big victory Tuesday when the Monterey County Board of Supervisors voted 3-2 to support an agreement between fire agencies and the county that they say will make rural communities safer from wildfire.

"This was a major win, not just for people who in live Big Sur and Carmel Valley, but for the entire county," said Big Sur resident Frank Pinney, who serves as president of the Association of Monterey County Fire Districts and Volunteer Fire Brigades.

Moments earlier, the supervisors voted unanimously to appoint Cal Fire Chief Rick Hutchinson as the county's fire warden and fuel mitigation officer.

While there was nothing controversial about Hutchinson's appointment, the same could not be said of an agreement between 18 firefighting agencies and the county to work together to coordinate brush clearing projects in places like upper Carmel Valley and Big Sur. Guiding the brush clearing work will be the Monterey County Community Wildfire Protection Plan, which the supervisors approved in December after a lengthy and contentious debate. The plan emerged in response to the devastating wildfires of 2008, which burned more than 1.4 million acres throughout the state, including nearly 250,000 acres locally.

Saving plants vs. saving homes

At Tuesday's hearing, environmental activist Julie Engell

told supervisors it's not enough to have a fire warden oversee brush clearance, because the work might violate state and federal environmental laws. She also wants the public to be notified when brush clearing projects are being considered

Masked robbers hit Chase

THREE MEN wearing Halloween masks and carrying guns burst into the Chase Bank branch at Country Club Gate Wednesday morning, ordered everyone inside onto the floor, stole an undisclosed amount of cash and then herded everyone into the vault while they fled out the back door toward the parking lot, according to PGPD Cmdr. John Miller.

There were a total of six people in the bank," Miller said. No one was injured.

"It showed a degree of sophistication," he said. "They were clothed head to toe and wearing Halloween masks." Two of the men were carrying handguns, while one held what witnesses described as an "assault rifle."

But other than that, not much is known about what the men looked like, considering they were wearing hooded sweatshirts and gloves, too.

C.V. house where two were murdered is sold

Real Estate ad highlighted grim history

A CARMEL Valley home that was the site of the murder of a prominent defense attorney and his wife in 2007 sold last Monday for \$357,000.

Located at 82 Hitchcock Canyon Road, the residence was owned by Mel and Elizabeth Grimes, who were shot to death Jan. 29, 2007, by their next door neighbor, John Kenney. The three had been engaged in a lengthy dispute over a driveway easement.

The buyers of the house are Siddhartha Hamilton and Selene Ogdon. According to real estate agent Vince Catania of Salinas-based Steinbeck Real Estate, Hamilton and Ogdon who already live in Carmel Valley - are aware of the tragedy that occurred in their new home.

As the listing agent, Catania said he didn't shy away from telling prospective buyers about the double murder, even though he didn't have to. State law only requires a death ----

Byrne, Brower take water board seats

FORMER PACIFIC Grove Mayor Jeanne Byrne unseated incumbent water board director Regina Doyle by a large margin Tuesday, while board chair Bob Brower narrowly held on to his own seat.

Byrne attributed her 58 percent win over Doyle Tuesday for the Monterey Peninsula Water Management District seat to voter frustration.

"I think people finally have decided they want water for people," Byrne said. "The environment is important, but I don't think it has to take precedence over people, jobs and families.

Byrne, who supports water for lots of record, infill and small amounts of new development, said she wants to change public perception of the water district, which has long been criticized for favoring conservation and cutbacks over finding ways to keep the community supplied with water.

"One of my goals is to bring back the credibility of the

A FIRE hydrant that produced no water, an attic divided into compartments and a steep slate roof put fire crews to the

millions of dollars in damage to an expansive Carmel Valley home.

"This was a tough fire," said Monterey County Regional Fire Division Chief Miles Schuler, because of a lack of water, the size of the house, the many angles of roof and the numerous empty spaces in the attic and walls. The home had sprinklers in the rooms but not in the attic, and "the fire traveled in all those unprotected spaces."

Shortly before midnight, a fire engine was dispatched from the mid-valley station to investigate a report from the home's residents that there was smoke inside. They had a fire in the fireplace, but that didn't seem the be the source, so firefighters started checking the gabled and partitioned attic of the roughly 8,000-square-foot home.

When they got to the area near the chimney, they found the flames. But the home's expensive construction thwarted one of their usual strategies for fighting an attic fire.

"Usually, we would go on the roof and cut a hole to let the fire out, but it was a steep roof made of slate and was slip-

VOTERS IN the Carmel Unified School District on Tuesday selected a seasoned incumbent, an active school parent and a retired financial advisor to serve on the CUSD board of education, according to preliminary results provided by the Monterey County Elections department. Unless the write-in campaign of former Carmel High School principal Karl Pallastrini changes the results, Rita Patel and Annette Yee Steck were the decisive choices at the polls Nov. 8, receiving 29.8 percent and 24 percent of the vote, respectively, followed by Richard Kreitman, with 19.5 percent.

Patel is PTO president at Carmel Middle School, Steck has been on the school board for 18 years, and Kreitman is a retired financial advisor who also has a son at the middle school.

According to elections officials' semifinal report, 2,490 people cast their votes for Patel, 2,009 people voted for Steck, and 1,627 people voted for Kreitman.





Monarchs flocking to P.G. sanctuary

MONARCHS AT the Pacific Grove butterfly sanctuary this year are thriving.

According to the Cal Poly program Monarch Alert, there were more monarchs this year in P.G. than in the prior two years during their peak population. The insects overwinter in a small grove in the city every year.

"They [monarchs] are really high for this time," according to Lori Mannel, director of the P.G. Museum of Natural History, which provides more than two dozen docents at the sanctuary to assist visitors. "There were 7,409, which exceeds the peak number of monarchs in the sanctuary for the last two years."

Last year, there was a peak of about 7,000 monarchs in the sanctuary, compared with a mere 900 in 2009 and 6,227 in 2010.

Cal Poly professor Francis Villablanca, who heads Monarch Alert, told The Pine Cone researchers don't know for certain but say weather is probably the reason for the increase in monarchs this year.

"I think that it is likely the result of rainfall patterns in the western states and the effect that has on milkweed productivity the plant that monarchs lay their eggs on," Villablanca told The Pine Cone.

Mannel said the monarch numbers in the sanctuary usually peak at the end of November or early December "and we are aleready exceeding those numbers."

And apart from the sheer numbers, scientists, docents and others are noticing a change this year than in previous years.

"Monarchs are going to trees in the center of the sanctuary for the first time," Mannel said.

The pine trees in the middle were planted about 10 years ago as part of biologist Stuart Weiss' management plan for the butterfly sanctuary.

Mannel said there are about two dozen docents who, from noon to 3 p.m. every day

(weather permitting), happily help visitors at the sanctuary.

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"Our docents have viewing scopes and binoculars to help enhance their viewing experience," she said.

"The numbers this year are great compared to recent years," said Esther Trosow, who heads the nonprofit Pacific Grove Monarch Conservancy.

Trosow said there are reasons to be cautious about the high numbers of monarchs this early in the season.

"One of my concerns is whether the good number of monarchs we have now will stay and overwinter, or whether they will prove to be just an autumnal spike and will move to Pismo, Big Sur or some other overwintering spot," she said.

And if the monarchs stay, will the sanctuary provide enough protection from the stronger late-winter winds now that Brokaw Hall — a building that had been in the grove for decades — has been demolished.

"I really don't know what will happen, just that, despite the ill advised moves the city has made recently, the monarchs are thriving."

But the higher monarch numbers are certainly good news for fans of the butterfly who have been nervous since 2009, when so few arrived to Pacific Grove. Some blamed the decline that year on a bad pruning job in the sanctuary for turning away the insects, while others speculated it was a natural phenomenon since butterfly numbers throughout the state were also low that year.

In 2010, monarch enthusiast Bob Pacelli brought in more than 20 boxed eucalyptus trees to provide a wind break in the sanctuary and to attract more monarchs. There were thousands more monarchs in 2010 than the year before, leading some to believe the extra trees were the reason the monarchs stayed in the sanctuary. Despite the work, Pacelli was recently told by the city he


THE CARMEL Planning Commission on Wednesday approved candy maker Scott Lund's application to open a store in the Court of the Fountains in downtown Carmel. The 735-square-foot store on Mission Street between Ocean and Seventh avenues near Anton & Michel restaurant will feature the full line of Lula's Chocolates, which Lund and his employees create in their small factory in Ryan Ranch. The store will also sell hot chocolate to go.

Without discussion, commissioners approved Lund's permit Nov. 9, allowing him to also offer cookbooks, kitchenware like mugs and tools for working with chocolate, and greeting cards, as well as small home decor items and the antique shelving on which his wares will be displayed. The permit allows the store to be open from 9 a.m. to 8 p.m. daily.

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Bixby Bridge BASE jumper sentenced to county jail

 $\mathbf{S}_{\mathsf{TEVE}}$ JESTER, the man who was convicted by a jury for threatening a CHP officer and his family after BASE jumping from the Bixby Bridge, was sentenced by a judge last week to more than 120 days in jail.

On Nov. 2, Monterey County Superior Court Judge Pamela L. Butler sentenced Jester to jail after he was convicted in September of threatening a peace officer, a felony, and several lesser crimes.

For threatening the CHP officer, Butler ordered Jester to serve 120 days in jail and three year's probation, with terms that include that he "not jump or parachute" from Bixby Bridge and have no contact with the officer or his family.

The jury also found Jester guilty of driving under the influence, refusal to obey a peace officer's order and possession of marijuana. For those crimes, Butler sentenced Jester to five days in jail and five year's probation with the terms he pay a \$1,846 fine. Jester is also required to not drive with any alcohol in his system, and he must be insured and licensed.

Jester - who testified during his weeklong trial that he is an alcoholic — was also ordered to attend an alcohol information class.

Jester, of Aptos, has to surrender to jail officials within 30 days to serve his time or apply with the county probation department to serve his sentence at home.

"He has to report to jail or make arrangements for home confinement," Deputy District Attorney Joe Buckalew told The Pine Cone this week. "If he doesn't apply or [isn't eligible] for home confinement, he has to serve 120 days in jail. Probation has total discretion on that.'

On Dec. 8, 2010, an obviously drunk Jester wearing a parachute was set to leap from the Bixby Bridge to the beach below when CHP officer Ben Grasmuck, who was driving north on Highway 1, happened upon him. Grasmuck ordered Jester not to jump, but Jester jumped anyway after telling the officer, "I have to do this."

The leap, and the exchange with Grasmuck beforehand, was videotaped by Jester's friend and later posted on YouTube. It became a hit and has had more than 1.8 million views.

After Grasmuck arrested Jester, Jester threatened to find the officer and his family and "f**k them up," Grasmuck testified. The officer also testified Jester said he would sodomize his wife, the jury found.

While Jester admitted calling Grasmuck names, he denied threatening to harm the

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officer and his family.

Grasmuck testified Jester had mood swings on their drive to a police substation in Salinas and that Jester at one point had offered to give him free skydiving lessons if Grasmuck let him go.

Jester testified that while he was being held at the substation, Grasmuck and another officer assaulted him. The alleged incident, Jester asserted, left him with a detached tendon in his left bicep and a large bruise on his back.

Denied drinking and driving

Before he was sentenced last week, Jester briefly addressed the court, denying he had

Weekly publisher admits DUI

MONTEREY COUNTY Weekly publisher Erik Cushman pleaded guilty Oct. 5 to driving with a blood alcohol content in excess of .08 percent, according to the district attorney's office. Cushman, who had a prior DUI conviction in June 2009, was pulled over July 28 for swerving over the center line while driving on Highway 68 into Pacific Grove. Cushman was sentenced to five years' probation - including a ban on consuming any alcohol — 30 days in jail or enrollment in a work program, participation in a county program for second offenders, installation of an ignition interlock device on his car and payment of more than \$3,600 in fees and fines.

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Sand 'driveway' offers bulldozers route to sandbar

New lagoon policy could be tested soon

A RAMP made from about 1,000 cubic yards of sand was constructed this week along the edge of Scenic Road so county workers — and their bulldozers — can cut a channel in the Carmel River Lagoon sandbar this winter to prevent flooding of nearby homes.

"It looks terrific," said Loren Letendre, who lives nearby. With wet weather predicted this weekend and the lagoon swollen with water, Monterey County Public Works could end up using the ramp within days. But it is unclear if the agency will be granted a permit to do the work. As a result, officials could be forced to declare an emergency before cutting the channel.

Transported from Marina by a fleet of trucks, the sand was unloaded Monday and Tuesday at the site of the ramp, which is located between Valley View and the Carmel River State Beach parking lot. From there, the sand was pushed over the edge of the pavement by a bulldozer.

The ramp is necessary because heavy-vehicle access to the sandbar from the south has been closed because it might disturb Native American archeological sites. Access from the north through a state beach parking lot, meanwhile, is not possible due to flooding.

The Monterey County Public Works Department cuts a channel in the sandbar each winter to prevent the flooding of homes on the north side of the lagoon. But the annual breaching of the sandbar has long been criticized by environmentalists, who worry immature steelhead are being swept from the lagoon and into the sea.

Residents, meanwhile, say if the channel is cut in a way that protects the fish, it can migrate dangerously close to Scenic Road.

Monterey County senior planner Carl Holm told the Pine Cone two weeks ago that public works plans to cut the channel this year in a way that protects the road.

County officials also announced two weeks ago that the planning process — which could take three to five years to complete — has begun for the installation of a protective flood barrier around the northern perimeter of the lagoon and the armoring of the bluffs under Scenic Road. If successful, the barrier and the armoring would end the yearly need to use bulldozers to breach the sandbar.

In past years, public works has sidestepped the lengthy permit process by simply waiting until the level of water in the lagoon reaches a flood stage and declaring an emergency. While senior planner Carl Holm said a non-emergency permit won't be until required until next year, he said the coun-

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Robbery investigation results in bust | Berries & Branches for women's health

AS PACIFIC Grove police searched for the trio of masked men who robbed Chase Bank Wednesday morning, they contacted the area's usual suspects — people on parole and probation for various offenses - to see if they might have been involved or knew who was. One of those contacts led to the arrest of 29-year-old Kyle Parham after a probation search of his pickup truck yielded 23 grams of methamphetamine, illegal prescription drugs and evidence of drug sales, according to PGPD Cmdr. John Nyunt.

"We were checking our people on parole and probation, because you never now what's going to pop up," he explained.

They came across Kyle Parham, 29, who was staying with another parolee in town. Parham has an extensive criminal history and was most recently put on probation following a reckless-driving charge, according to Nyunt. One of his probation terms required him to submit to search and seizure by police, and officers reportedly found the drugs and paraphernalia in a backpack in the truck. As a result, they arrested Parham and took him to Monterey County Jail.

State lab backup delays felony DUI case

A WORSENING backlog at the state Department of Justice laboratory - which will only intensify if further layoffs come to fruition — is responsible for holding up the criminal case against Carmel Valley resident Ryan Armstrong, who is accused of driving drunk and killing a friend in a crash in Cachagua last summer. Monterey County chief assistant district attorney Terry Spitz said his office is waiting to file formal charges against Armstrong, 19, until it receives toxicology results indicating whether the teen was also under the influence of drugs at the time.

The California Highway Patrol investigated the Aug. 13 wreck in which Armstrong allegedly ran a borrowed Jeep off Tassajara Road, killing former Carmel High School football star Keenan Lucero, 19, and seriously injuring 20-year-old Yancey Cabrera.

CHP public information officer Bob Lehman said the agency submitted its final report to the district attorney's office about a month ago. Based on evidence and observations collected at the scene, the investigating officer concluded Armstrong was under the influence of alcohol and marijuana, so the CHP recommended the teen be charged with felony DUI and felony vehicular manslaughter, according to Lehman.

But Spitz said his office needs complete lab results from the DOJ before it can proceed with the case.

"This is typically something we do just to make sure whether there were any drugs involved," he said, adding that the long delay is due to understaffing at the state lab that will only be exacerbated by job cuts set to take place next month.

"It's just getting really bad," he said. "It's just that the state's budget is not funding them."

But he said prosecutor Chris Harter is on top of the case and "has been asking them almost daily whether or not anything has come in."

Meanwhile, Armstrong remains free on bail.

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

A CEREMONY honoring veterans will be held at American Legion Post 512, not in Devendorf Park, Friday, Nov. 11, at 11 a.m. Wreaths will still be lain at the city's war memorials, and the bell at San Carlos and Ocean will be rung 11 times at 11 a.m., but the speeches and reception will take place at the American Legion hall due to the threat of rain, according to Carmel Police Cpl. Steve Rana.

"In this style of robbery, they go in and, by force and threats, control the actions of the folks," as opposed to walking up to a single teller and quietly demanding the contents of a cash drawer, he observed.

Officers are working with the bank and other nearby business to obtain surveillance images that could be useful in tracking down the robbers.

Police suspect they fled in a silver VW bug stolen out of Salinas that was later found outside a condo complex on Forest Lodge Road in P.G. about a half-mile from the bank. No other cars were reported stolen from the area, so "how they made their getaway is up in the air, as far as if they fled on foot or in another vehicle.'

Nearby schools, including P.G. High School and Forest Grove, were locked down for about 30 minutes while police combed the area for the men.

"It was for their safety," he said. "Once we were somewhat confident they were not in the area on foot, we released it."

Police agencies from around the Peninsula also set up surveillance points on major roads, and the Monterey County Sheriff's Office assisted with the crime-scene investigation. Miller said PGPD is also working with the FBI, the Department of Justice and the county crime lab.

Detectives have potential leads, but Miller wouldn't divulge any details.

"I can't discuss any of the evidence collected," he said.




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

coming months, Tuesday's announcement caught some off guard.

Three of the department's five workers were told they would be laid off but were encouraged to stay with the newspaper until the transition is complete. Otherwise, they would risk any severance package that may be offered to them. It's not known if the two other employees would be retained or also let go after the transition is complete.

Jeannie Evers, a Herald copy editor and unit chair for the Pacific Media Workers Guild, which represents the Herald's workers, told The Pine Cone workers in creative services feel a "mix of disappointment and resignation" over the outsourcing plan.

"After furloughs and other changes we've endured over the years," Evers said before Tuesday's staff reduction announcement, "there's a general sense of, 'It is what it is.""

The Herald has undergone several rounds of layoffs and employee furloughs in the past several years as circulation at the daily paper has declined by almost one-third and advertising revenue waned - a trend many newspapers have suffered.

Evers said the feeling from employees seems to be true in other departments and that there is "a dose of anger and frustration that this is the direction our paper is being taken."

Right now, Evers said the union is in a holding pattern until it gets more details about the transition.

"In the meantime, we're just backing up creative services as best we can," she said.

In an article in Wednesday's edition, the Herald conceded that during the next few months it will "begin using a U.S.based company headquartered in Pennsylvania to do our advertising production work."

'That firm uses an India-based operation to do some of the work the newspaper will be outsourcing," the Herald said, not mentioning the name of the company.

The changes, according to Omernick, will result in a better experience for the paper's customers.

"Outsourcing ad production will provide faster ad turnaround and web-based ad management tools for our clients," Omernick said. "It is commonly used in the print industry."

He boasted that the Herald, which has its own printing press, is the only newspaper still printed in Monterey County and that its "combined print and online audience is the largest of any newspaper in Monterey County."

Omernick also said the paper is now printing the Santa Cruz Sentinel and that the Herald's press production staff is "growing."

The San Jose Mercury News, also owned by the Herald's Denver-based parent company, MediaNews Group, outsources some of its production work.

Also on Wednesday, computer IT specialists from the San Jose paper Wednesday began installing a new computer system and software that will allow its advertising art and production work to be done out of house.

BURGLARS STEAL FOUR DOZEN LAPTOPS FROM KIDS

THIEVES BROKE into several classrooms in Stevenson's lower school on Dolores Street in Carmel last weekend, making off with 48 Apple laptops, according to Monterey County Sheriff's Cmdr. Lisa Nash.

The break-ins occurred late Nov. 4 or early Nov. 5. School officials who were preparing for an open house over the weekend had left the campus around 9 p.m. Friday, and the sheriff's office was alerted the next morning at 9:15.

The burglars shoved some of the windows in to make entry to the classrooms, and in other cases, "the door handles appeared to have been pried open with some sort of large tool," she said.

In one room, the crooks apparently used a coat rack in order to access a high window to climb back out.

While the initial report indicated 72 laptops had been taken, school officials inventoried the contents of the rooms and concluded the culprits had in fact stolen 48. Staff at the school have yet to provide the details, including models, serial numbers and a total dollar value of the loss, according to Nash.

Sheriff's office detectives were able to get a palm print off one of the windows and have collected other evidence that could prove useful as well. "They got some pretty good prints, so maybe it will pan out," she said.

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
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
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FORMER COUNCILMAN PENS HISTORICAL NOVEL

ATTORNEY GERARD Rose, who served on the Carmel City Council for a decade, has published his first novel and is already at work on a second.

"The Early Troubles," focuses on a man in his 70s who returns to his native Ireland, where he falls in love with a woman "about his same vintage," Rose told The Pine Cone this week. The book draws upon Rose's knowledge of history here and abroad, and he based many of the characters on people in his life — including all of his children.

"I came up with this character, Connelly, whom the story is based on, when I was a kid in grammar school," he continued. "I used to draw pictures of him."

Rose decided his character should have been born in 1846 and died in 1946, providing a life that afforded him firsthand experiences of the travails in Ireland and Australia during that time, as well as the first and second World Wars.

"I put together something that might get people's interest and give me an outlet for my knowledge of Irish, American and Australian history," he said. Rose has made multiple trips to Ireland and lived in Australia.

The novel took about two years to write, and Rose said he undertook a lot of research to ensure it paints as accurate a picture of different accounts as possible. "There's tons of biographical and autographical stuff in there," he said.

"The Early Troubles" is available in e-book and hardcopy through amazon.com.

And he's already working on another book. This one, he said, will tell the story of Joshua Barney, the only Naval hero to fight in the Revolutionary War and the War of 1812.

"He was captured six or seven times by the British, depending on how you count," Rose said, and a relative of Rose's was his 1st Mate. "So I've begun putting together an historical novel based on him, and of course I'll throw in my forebear, as well. I'm having a little fun."

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Taser used to subdue teen suspected of arson, battery and burglary

 $\mathbf{P}_{\mathrm{ACIFIC}}$ GROVE police officers had to use a stun gun and force a 17-year-old suspect to the ground in order to arrest him for battery, arson and a litany of other charges early the morning of Oct. 26, according to Cmdr. John Nyunt. The teenager, who lives in P.G. and is already on probation for making terrorist threats, reportedly broke into a car and tried to set it on fire before getting into a fight with its owner and fleeing.

An Evans Avenue resident called police shortly before 1 a.m. to report the owner of the vehicle and the suspect were fighting in the parking lot of an apartment complex, and as officer Brian Gorman was headed there, a man standing in the middle of Lighthouse Avenue waved him down.

'The male victim was visibly shaken and out of breath," Nyunt said. "He had blood coming out of his left ear and was holding his hand to his ear to stop the blood flow."

The victim told Gorman they had fought, and the suspect had fled up Lighthouse. He described him as having black hair and wearing a green shirt and jacket, and dark jeans.

Moments later, Gorman spotted the suspect walking on Lighthouse Avenue toward Monterey and ordered him to stop and sit on the curb, according to Nyunt. The teenager asked why he should, cussed at Gorman and "got in an aggressive fighting stance.'

In response, Gorman drew his Taser, aimed it at the suspect's chest and again ordered him to sit down, which he did.

But while Gorman waited for a backup unit, he noticed the teenager looking around as though he planned to flee, and then he started reaching for his right front pants pocket, according to Nyunt. The officer repeatedly ordered him to keep his hands in plain sight away from his waist, and the teen allegedly responded with more profanity and defiance, doubting Gorman would do anything to stop him.

As the suspect reached into his pocket, Gorman deployed the Taser, but one of the darts didn't penetrate his skin.

"It had little effect on subject but momentarily disabled him," he said. "The subject removed his right hand from his pocket and dropped a knife.'

By then, a backup officer had arrived and the two grabbed the suspect and forced him to the ground, stunned him with the Taser again, and handcuffed him, according to Nyunt.

At that point, they noticed "a white powdery substance around his nose and upper lip," and when they asked what it was, the teenager allegedly admitted he had crushed Xanax and snorted it. He had also been drinking.

Paramedics treated the teen for the Taser wounds, minor cuts and bruises. The victim identified the suspect as his attacker and the person who had broken into his car and tried to set it on fire. He was charged with arson, battery, public intoxication, resisting arrest, probation violation, minor in possession of alcohol, tampering with a vehicle and malicious mischief to a vehicle.





Premier Cruz

Like the cooler parts of Monterey County, many of Santa Cruz's wine-growing areas are known for their Chardonnay and Pinot Noir grapes, but the region's wide range of elevations, soil types and microclimates also make it a great place to grow Cabernet Sauvignon. On Sunday, Nov. 13, from 3 to 7 p.m., the Opera House in Los Gatos will host Premier Cruz, a special tasting of Cabernetbased wines all grown and produced in the Santa Cruz Mountains.

Cabernets from this area tend to be more



European style, with lower alcohol content and more subtle fruit, due to the cooler growing conditions. Bordeaux varietals were first planted in the region in the 1870s.



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

district," she said.

Brower, the District 5 director and current water board chair, defeated challenger Scott Dick — but barely. Brower scraped by with a mere 52 more votes.

"It was a little closer than I might have wanted," Brower said, "but apparently there was a strong incumbent backlash on the water board."

Brower, who is "water supply driven," said he will continue to support the district's five water augmentation projects, which include groundwater replenishment, aquifer storage and recovery and expanding capacity of the Los Padres Dam, while also seeking a permanent water solution.

"The most important thing is an affordable water supply that we need to right now," he said. "We don't have time to waste."

pery, so we never could make access from the roof," Schuler said.

River Meadows Road is a private road off of Robinson Canyon at mid-valley, and each property has its own hydrant, but Schuler said the fireplug there wasn't working, so several tanker trucks from Monterey County Regional and other fire departments took turns filling up at a hydrant farther down the hill and shuttling water to the site.

Crews carried fire hose inside and tried to get at the fire by cutting holes in the ceiling to reach the flames, "which would work with a conventional attic, but it was so compartmentalized that that wouldn't work," he continued.

The heat, smoke and flames drove them outside, and they had to use their last resort: "surround and drown."

"We eventually had to exit the building because it had gotten such a stronghold that part of the roof collapsed," Schuler explained.

After about five hours, they finally got the fire out, but not before it caused considerable damage to the house, as did all of the water they used.

"It just kept going," he said. "It went from one side of the house and kept going toward the other side of the house, and without us being able to get inside, it was hard for us to be able to cut it off."

The 45 firefighters who battled the blaze managed to save the garage and the western portion of the house, which contained three bedrooms, and Schuler said Monterey Fire Department's ladder truck significantly helped because it could get a lot of water on the fire up high. The cities of Monterey and Carmel, as well as Cypress Fire Protection District and North Monterey County fire district, sent help.

The fire was declared contained shortly after 5 a.m. Monday, by which time it had

burned through the roof and spread through much of the second floor and part of the first floor, according to fire officials. It also resulted in extensive heat, water and smoke damage in the unburned areas of the mansion.

Schuler said the extensive destruction makes it difficult to specifically identify the origin and cause of the fire, but he believes it started in the chimney.

"But luckily, nobody got hurt, and I'm not suspicious of anything," he said. Although insurance investigators will hone the number as they sift through debris and assess the situation, Schuler estimated the home suffered \$3 million in structural damage and \$750,000 in damage to its contents.

"They had some nice stuff in there," he lamented.

The six-bedroom, 5.5-bathroom home, described as "traditional country English" in style, has been for sale and was most recently listed with Doug Steiny of Carmel Realty Company for \$4,850,000. According to county records, it is owned by Thomas and Judy De Regt.





ered so they can speak up if they have concerns. "The public is especially sensitive to fuel mitigation work," Engell told the supervisors.

Engell's attorney, John Farrow, suggested in a letter to the supervisors that without a public notice requirement, the county could find itself inundated by public records requests. And Engell issued a similar warning. "I intend on finding out what's going on, and I'll use the tools I need to use," she said.

Engell was the only member of the public at the hearing who criticized the agreement, which is officially called a Memorandum of Understanding.

Among the speakers who supported it was attorney Pam Silkwood, who represents El Sur Ranch owner Jim Hill.

"I'm amazed that a good deed such as this is being challenged and scrutinized," said Silkwood, who added that brush clearing "should be encouraged, not burdened."

And she said there was no need to involve the public in the nitty-gritty of brush clearance operations. "Let the fire warden and fuel mitigation officer follow the existing

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laws and regulations," Silkwood said. "There's more than sufficient opportunity for public participation. If you want to change the law, do it right through the legislative process."

Several fire officials spoke in favor of the agreement, including Chris Orman, chief of the North County Fire District. Orman described a scenario where firefighters used up all their water trying to reach a home threatened by a wildfire because there was too much brush surrounding it. He said brush clearing is essential for people in rural areas — and good environmental policy.

"We're all environmentalists," he insisted. "A home burning up isn't real good for the air."

Upper Carmel Valley resident Kelly O'Brien, president of the Monterey Fire Safe Council and co-author of the community wildfire plan, echoed Orman's sentiments.

"I would not lend my name to any action that threatens our natural resources," O'Brien told the supervisors. "The environmental community is not the only interest group concerned about the environment."

Palo Colorado Canyon resident Mike Caplin — who lives in a community that arguably faces the greatest wildfire threat in the county - urged supervisors to support brush clearing projects.

"The last fire [in the Canyon] happened in 1954," said Caplin, describing how overgrown the chaparral in his neighborhood is. "If a fire comes through, the protected species will burn with everything else."

How much oversight is enough?

In an effort to address the concerns of environmentalists, county staff recommended "revisiting" the noticing issue in 18 months to see if it's working. In response, supervisor Jane Parker - Engell's biggest supporter on the board - suggested supervisors take another look at the issue in three months. Supervisor Dave Potter, whose district will see the most controversial brush clearing work, suggested they reexamine the issue in six months.

But supervisor Lou Calcagno said six months isn't long enough, in part because the bulk of brush clearing work will occur next summer.

"We've been on this for too long," Calcagno said. "I'll support staff's recommendation. Sooner or later, you have to trust somebody.'

Nearly lost in the debate was the appointment of Hutchinson. In his dual role as fire warden, he will coordinate the grant-writing process and review brush clearing projects.

According to county staff, Hutchinson will not be paid by the county - any compensation he receives will come from the fees charged for permitting the work.

While Hutchinson will no doubt scrutinize large-scale brush removal projects, Pinney told The Pine Cone it's doubtful any regulatory burden will be placed on rural homeowners simply trying to make their homes same safe from wildfires and comply with a state law requiring 100-feet of "defensible space" surrounding their homes.




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Editorial

A new water board

WE HAVE long criticized the Monterey Peninsula Water Management District for its habit of working against its own mission. While it is supposed to make sure this community has an adequate water supply, over the last 20 years, the water board's efforts have largely been aimed in the other direction. Which explains why our legal supply has been reduced from more than 20,000 acre-feet a year when the water board was founded in the mid-1970s, to less than 4,000 acre-feet a year today — a disaster for the owners of vacant lots, homeowners who would like to add a bathroom or a sink and business owners hoping to expand, and a catastrophe for everybody if a drought hits.

But the results of Tuesday's election gave us a bit of hope for the future. The re-election of Bob Brower and the election of pro-water Jeanne Byrne over no-water Regina Doyle signal that the public is really getting fed up with the water impasse that is the Monterey Peninsula's Sword of Damocles.

We hope that Byrne's election heralds an era when water board members worry about fish in the Carmel River, but also about the people who live in Carmel, Pebble Beach and the other communities that make up the water district.

Byrne says, "The environment is important, but I don't think it has to take precedence over people, jobs and families." And how right she is.

Go for it, Jeanne!

Come again?

BLATANT HYPOCRISY among the news media is one of its defining characteristics and happens every day. In fact, it's so common that there's probably no hope of getting this country's mainstream newspapers, TV stations and Internet sites to stop their disingenuousness. But that doesn't mean news consumers shouldn't be aware of it.

Readers of this newspaper should be familiar by now with the examples we've cited from time to time of newspaper owners, editors and reporters pretending be tree huggers, even while their incomes depend on massive tree cutting to produce newsprint. Similarly, they constantly rail against the evils of big business, while they do everything they can to make a profit; their news coverage and editorials are heavily pro-labor, while they break unions in their own shops whenever it suits them, and they campaign against tax breaks for businesses even as they take advantage of every tax break available to them and lobby for new ones.

But what can possibly be said about a newspaper publisher, who, when asked about one of his newspaper's policies, says, "We're not in a position to discuss that with the media"?

That was Monterey County Herald publisher Gary Omernick's response last week when asked by Pine Cone reporter Kelly Nix about the Herald's decision to outsource ad design and production to India.

Meanwhile, Herald reporters regularly badger government agencies for their lack of "transparency," vehemently criticize any private business that seems to be hiding something and are generally nosy when it comes to any subject that suits their journalistic purposes — which is how it should be, except that, given all that, the newspaper's management should likewise be willing to speak to reporters from other responsible news outlets.



and its circumstances - to be disclosed if it happened within three years of the sale of a property.

In an advertisement that appeared in the Monterey County Weekly newspaper in May, Catania called the property, "the site of one of the most famous double homicides in Monterey County history." At the time, the house was listed at \$425,000.

While Hamilton and Ogdon didn't shy away from the property's morbid legacy, others did. "Some would pick up and run when I told them," Catania recalled.

The 1,584-square-foot single-family home was built in 1978.

Kenney was convicted of second degree murder and sentenced to life in prison without parole for killing the couple. He admitted shooting them but claimed it was in selfdefense.

On the day of the shooting, Kenney had a large boulder placed on the disputed driveway easement. When Mel Grimes tried to smash the boulder with a sledgehammer, Kenney shot him. And when his wife, Elizabeth, came to his aid, Kenney shot her.

been drinking alcohol before driving to the bridge the day of the jump.

"Although he maintained he did not drive while under the influence," Buckalew said, "he still asserted he quickly consumed five shots of vodka — but only after he arrived at the Bixby Bridge."

But a man who was driving on Highway 1 near Moss Landing about an hour before Jester jumped from Bixby testified he called 911 to report the driver of a black Isuzu was driving erratically and nearly caused an accident.

The driver was later determined to be Jester.

Another CHP officer who searched Jester's Isuzu at the bridge not long after he was arrested found two bags of marijuana in the vehicle.

BASE jumpers use parachutes to jump from fixed objects such as buildings and bridges. BASE is an acronym for buildings, antennas, spans and earth.

couldn't plant more trees without its permission.

Drawing on the same idea that more trees may draw more butterflies, in April of this year, Villablanca and Cal Poly graduate students planted 15 eucalyptus (which are native to Australia and are not the monarch's native habitat).

Meanwhile Villablanca said he's also hoping to do more research about the monarchs' most appealing food.

"The volunteers at the sanctuary are interested in trying to retain more of the butterflies that come through the sanctuary by providing them with a nectar source," he said. "I am interested in seeing which plants are preferred nectar sources out of what is available at the sanctuary — and if nectar sources provided in the overwintering habitat have any negative, or only positive, side effects."

To become a monarch docent, which requires one threehour shift per month, volunteers are asked to call the P.G. museum at (831) 648-5718.

Traffic delays Friday in Carmel Highlands

Delays of up to 15 minutes can be expected. The contractor for the \$89,000 project is MGE Underground Utilities of Paso Robles.



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
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Mrs. Vivien Irene Dike

ty is trying to obtain one nevertheless — in part because of the threat of legal action. Holm conceded the county has been warned by a steelhead group of a possible lawsuit.

If the county doesn't get a permit by this weekend — and enough rain falls to push the water level in the lagoon to a critical level — public works will open a channel to the sea by declaring an emergency. The Army Corps of Engineers, the California of Fish and Game and the California Coastal Commission need to sign off on the permit, Holm added.

Ramp to benefit plant project

In addition to providing access for bulldozers, the ramp is inadvertently aiding an ambitious native landscaping project. Steve Gally, a mason who lives in Pacific Grove, is leading a volunteer effort that aims to install 60,000 plants in the bluffs below Scenic Road. Over the past year, about 4,500 plants were installed. Unfortunately, some plants have been trampled by people seeking a quick or easy route to the beach,

which can no longer be accessed from the state beach parking lot because it is closed.

"The ramp is going to enhance our project because it gives people access to the beach without stepping on our plants," Gally explained.

Gally estimates it will take 10 years for the volunteers to reach their goal. In addition to their aesthetic qualities, the plants will help stabilize the eroding bluffs. The plants which include lupine, seaside daisies, lizard's tail, buckwheat and many others - were propagated less than 100-feet away at the home of resident Richard Peery.

The project also aims to remove ice plant from the bluffs but not until the native plants are established. Ironically, the ice plant will help protect the new plants until they are hardy enough to survive on their own, Gally added.

The planting project has been funded by donations, including \$5,000 from the Carmel Point and Lagoon Preservation Association and \$1,500 from resident John Reynolds.

Providing the labor for the plantings have been volunteers from the Carmel Beach Garden Project. Gally also praised the contributions of seed collector Joey Dorrell Canepa and plant designer Daniel Casella.
