County and city to collaborate on one-way Scenic Road

THE COUNTY'S most notorious hairpin curve is about to become a lot safer as Monterey County moves ahead with plans to make Scenic Road one-way around Carmel Point.

The switch, from the city limits to Carmel River State Beach, should help relieve traffic jams, make walking and bicycling safer, and preserve the bluffs — not to mention reduce the likelihood somebody will drive off the edge.

This week, county planners asked city officials to make their small stretch of road from Santa Lucia to the Frank Lloyd Wright House one-way, too. At their meeting Tuesday, council members agreed that was a good idea and said they would work with the county to make it happen.

Council waives fees for Golden Bough rehab

PACIFIC REPERTORY Theatre received a nice little Christmas present Tuesday, when the city council voted to not make the theater group pay about \$14,000 in permit fees for the interior renovation of its Golden Bough Playhouse on Monte Verde Street.

In his report for the the council Dec. 6, retired building official Tim Meroney recommended not waiving the fees, because most of the work on the theater had to do with its interior and improving the audience's experience, and was not necessarily for the benefit of the community or for the preservation of an historic resource. He said none of the work included sound-proofing or historic preservation.

"The efforts and contributions to the community from the PacRep Theatre have been and continue to be valuable," he wrote. "The city council, however, must decide whether waiving required permit fees should be borne by the entire community since it is the community that demands the fees to offset city services."

Heavy winds wreak havoc down the coast

WINDS GUSTING to 50 MPH blew through Big Sur late last week, killing a condor researcher, sparking four small fires and causing extensive damage to homes and busi-

"I've never experienced anything like this," said Martha Karstens, chief of the Big Sur Volunteer Fire Brigade. "It's a mess down here. The wind was howling like a freight train." Mike Tyner, 35, was killed Wednesday, Nov. 30, at about

> 3 p.m. when high winds caused a branch to fall on him. Tyner, who served as a field supervisor for the Ventana Wildlife Society's condor recovery program, was traveling along the Coast Ridge Road near Marble Peak when part of a large oak tree snapped and landed on his vehicle. Shortly before he was killed, Tyner was monitoring the progress of a young con-

> Emergency workers in a helicopter tried to reach the scene but were forced to turn back because of high winds, Karstens reported. A forensic investigation later determined Tyner died immediately as the result of blunt force

> A graduate of California Polytechnic State University San Luis Obispo, Tyner was an avid birder and naturalist who joined the VWS in 2002. In addition to his role with the VWS, Tyner worked with the Bureau of Land Management studying rare and endangered plants in the Algodones Dunes and with the

■ Judge lets late hours continue indefinitely

m A}$ NEARBY resident of the Point Pinos Grill is raising heck over the number of seats in the restaurant at the Pacific Grove Golf Links, and he took a surreptitious photo of golfers eating in front of a TV Nov. 6 to bolster his complaint.

In a complaint filed Dec. 6 with the Monterey Peninsula Water Management District, Roger Pasquier contends the Point Pinos Grill — which is permitted by the water district to have 77 seats — has had more than 100 seats available for customers on at least two recent occasions.

Pasquier, in a declaration attached to the complaint filed by attorney David Sweigert, said that on Thanksgiving, he "observed more than 100 people being served in the clubhouse grill at once."

The next day Pasquier visited the grill and again counted more than 100 seats. He didn't say in the complaint how many customers were in the restaurant.

Because of the Monterey Peninsula's perpetual water shortage, the MPWMD limits the number of seats restaurants can have. The limits do not include outdoor seating or standees. The Point Pinos Grill is allowed to have 77 indoor seats where food is served.

But more than 77 seats constitutes "intensification of use," according to Sweigert, who has also waged a titanic battle against the grill's temporary extended hours on behalf

Defense lawyer files claim over alcohol 'disability'

A MONTEREY COUNTY deputy public defender has filed a claim with the county after being suspended from his job in July because of a DUI arrest.

In a claim filed Nov. 22, deputy public defender John Klopfenstein wants money damages and his job back. He claims the county illegally suspended him from the job with pay instead of offering to help him with his alcoholism defined as a disability under the Americans with Disabilities

On July 2, Klopfenstein, 58, "suffered a relapse of his disability during non-working, off-duty hours," and was arrested on suspicion of drunken driving in Monterey. Though he told his supervisor, county public defender, Jim Egar, about the incident, no immediate action against him was taken.

But on July 28, after Klopfenstein wrapped up a trial in which he was defending an accused triple murderer, he was placed on paid administrative leave.

'That was a surprise" to Klopfenstein, his attorney, Michelle Welsh, told The Pine Cone about the suspension.

Search continues for dog thrown from moving car

SPCA HUMANE officers and volunteers are continuing the search for Frosty the dog, the pooch that someone reported being thrown from a car in Monterey this week.

On Monday, a man reported he saw a dog tossed from a white Buick four-door near the Lighthouse Avenue tunnel in Monterey. The witness briefly caught the dog with a towel before it escaped.







Spokeswoman Beth Brookhouser said SPCA for Monterey County humane officers and volunteers searched for Frosty Wednesday afternoon and evening, but came up empty. There were plans to continue the search

"Frosty is still loose," she said.

The dog — a white poodle/terrier mix — was identified as Frosty after the man who saw the incident said it was wearing a Santa Cruz SPCA collar. When he called the

agency to report what happened, officials contacted the Marina family which had been fostering Frosty. They said he escaped Monday. "The foster family confirmed that Frosty is indeed missing, so it's likely the same dog," said Brookhouser.

Jumped or thrown?

According to Mandi Hart with the Santa Cruz SPCA, it's not known for sure whether

Slowly and silently, in ambled a pair of enormous dogs, leonine with their great paws, soft coats and tufts of fur framing their faces. Heads turned and whispers arose as the two elegant canines, Kafka and Artemisia, looked at their audience with earnest eyes.

Legend has it these majestic animals, known as



Leonbergers, were bred for companionship in the 1830s to resemble the lion in the town crest of Leonberg, Germany. A cross between a female Newfoundland and a male Saint Bernard, with the eventual addition of a Pyrenean mountain dog, the result is a large, robust animal, easily socialized, sensitive, composed and cautious.


Despite their genteel nature, their large, muscular frame led Leonbergers into military service to pull ammunition wagons during the early 1900s. Reportedly, just five Leonbergers survived World War I. Their numbers grew again until World War OII, when records indicate all but eight were lost.

In 1985, the Leonberger Club of America was established to "preserve the health and temperament of the breed," said their person, whose sweatshirt logo indicated her membership.





With free trolley kaput, council and MST mull transit options

TAX DOLLARS from the Monterey Bay Air Pollution Control District that helped pay for a free trolley in town for the past two years have dried up, with the district's denial of a funding request from the city for 2012, so the council and Monterey-Salinas Transit assistant general manager Hunter Harvath want to replace it.

According to numbers Harvath provided at the Dec. 6 city council meeting, 8,541 people rode the trolley — which is reminiscent of a cable car — between Memorial Day and Labor Day in 2010, and 9,936 people stepped aboard during the same timeframe this year. The MBAPCD had provided \$85,000 toward its costs.

"Those funds are now gone, so we're looking at some other options for adding and enhancing services in downtown Carmel," he told the council, such as adding downtown to MST's Line 24, the Grapevine Express.

When that route was created in 2005 to take people to wine-tasting venues, it bypassed downtown because there weren't many tasting rooms here, instead focusing on the Crossroads, the Barnyard and Carmel Valley Village. But now, with the proliferation of tasting rooms in the city, adding stops here makes sense.

In her report for the council, assistant city administrator Heidi Burch said MST planners developed a revised Grapevine Express route that would include Carmel and run between 9 a.m. and 7 p.m. daily, except on a few holidays. The bus would allow people staying in hotels elsewhere on the Peninsula to get to downtown in just 15 minutes, without having to drive and park. An all-day pass for the 17-seat minibus would cost \$8, while single trips would be \$2. To make up for the time added by stopping in town, MST would eliminate stops inside the Crossroads and Barnyard shopping centers, which would

still be served by MST's Line 4.

"With a little bit of tweaking, I believe we can bring the route into downtown Carmelby-the-Sea to serve our major transportation points at Sixth and Mission," Harvath said, which would "not have a lot of impact on current ridership."

Making those changes requires jumping through several government hoops, but he speculated there would be plenty of time.

Councilwoman Karen Sharp, a key proponent of the free service, wondered if the trolley could be used in place of the minibus, since people seem to be drawn to it, though former councilwoman Barbara Livingston, a regular MST rider, pointed out the trolley uses more gas than the little bus.

"I hope you appoint a committee of residents and business people, and I sure would like to be on that committee," she continued. "You're dealing with people, dealing with their pocket books, their schedules, the time they have to get to work. It's a really important decision."

Carmel Chamber of Commerce CEO Monta Potter said business owners frequently complain about parking congestion, and any means of getting more people on the bus would help, while innkeeper Carrie Theis said her guests often appreciated the trolley—especially when getting back up the hill from the beach.

Council members were generally supportive of the idea of having the Grapevine Express add downtown to its route and also wondered if they should subsidize some of the rides to make them free to visitors.

Rather than hash out the details at the meeting, Mayor Sue McCloud suggested asking city staff to develop a couple of proposals, including any involved costs, and bring them back to the council for consideration. Councilman Ken Talmage also wanted assurance that any changes would not negatively affect commuters.

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Bergstrom awaiting sodomy retrial

DESPITE HAVING the verdict against him reversed by an appellate court, Carl Bergstrom is still in state prison and is facing a new trial in Monterey County Superior Court on charges of raping a woman at his Carmel home in April 2009, according to prosecutor Cristina Johnson, who won a conviction in Bergstrom's first trial.

But in a decision issued Oct. 24, a threejustice panel said Superior Court Judge Russell Scott incorrectly instructed jurors regarding the victim's ability to consent to having anal sex with Bergstrom, overturning the jury's guilty verdict.

The court did not agree with Bergstrom's arguments that Scott incorrectly admitted evidence of two prior sex offenses, unlawfully allowed use of a video of Bergstrom engaging in consensual anal sex, and should not have permitted evidence of his prior drug-related misconduct.

Johnson said she anticipates retrying Bergstrom on the forcible sodomy charge within a couple of months after the appeals court sends the case back to Monterey County Superior Court, which she said should happen by Christmas.

But Johnson said she does not expect much will differ from the first trial, other than how jurors instructed.

"The appeals courts didn't exclude any evidence, so we would just change the jury instructions," she said.

She also said Bergstrom's primary accuser, who ran out of his Carmel Woods home, hid in a drainage ditch and dialed 911 to report she'd been anally raped there after an evening of drinking and partying downtown, is prepared to testify again, as are other women who testified during the first trial about their encounters with Bergstrom.

"I don't anticipate any witness issues,"

Bergstrom, meanwhile, remains in state prison, according to Johnson. Four days after the court issued its judgment overturning his conviction and sending the case back to the county, Bergstrom filed a motion asking to be released on bail, but the state court denied his request Nov. 2.




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Pacific Grove's deputy city manager departs

 ${\displaystyle P_{\mbox{ACIFIC}}}$ GROVE deputy city manager Jim Becklenberg announced this week he is leaving the job and moving to Colorado to take a position there.

Becklenberg, who was hired in August 2006 as the city's budget director and later promoted to deputy city manager, told The Pine Cone Wednesday he and his family are moving to Broomfield, Colo. His last day on the job in P.G. will be Jan. 20.

"I will be the assistant city and county manager for Broomfield," Becklenberg said.

Broomfield, a Denver suburb with a population of about 60,000, is a city and county, meaning it provides services typically assigned to counties, such as court services, and sewer and water utilities and other municipal services, Becklenberg explained,

"My role will be to manage several departments with an emphasis on financial leadership and strategic planning," he said.

Broomfield is a center for technology development and other corporate headquarters in the Denver area, Becklenberg said.

The move, which Becklenberg said is "bittersweet," will allow him, his kids and his wife, Heidi, to be near her family.

"We have had our eyes on the Denver area for about 15 years," he said, adding that he applied for the job in July.

In a press release he issued Wednesday night, Becklenberg said he was grateful to the city council, city manager Tom Frutchey, his work colleagues "and the terrific community for which I have been fortunate to work for the last five years."

"I have done my best to serve you and the residents of Pacific Grove and have learned a great deal about the community my profession and myself" he said

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
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Monterey woman to be tried for murder in Pt. Lobos DUI crash

HER DEFENSE attorney admitted Calista Garcia killed a man Jan. 19 on Highway 1 near Pt. Lobos, but he said she shouldn't be charged with murder because there's not enough proof her drug use caused the crash, or that she knew her drugged state made it unsafe for her to drive.

On Wednesday, Frank Dice presented those arguments in court but failed to get the murder charge against Garcia dismissed. Monterey County Superior Court Judge Sam Lavorato Jr. said the prosecutor had presented sufficient cause to try Garcia for homicide in the death of 49-year-old Sacramento resident James Steinmetz.

Dice maintained deputy district attorney Doug Matheson had not made a strong enough case at Garcia's preliminary hearings in September and October to justify the murder charge, because although the California Highway Patrol officer investigating the crash, which happened around 8:30 a.m. Jan. 19, believed her meth use had caused her unsafe driving, there wasn't enough proof.

"We know Ms. Garcia's vehicle was over the center line for some time, but we don't know if impairment caused that," Dice told the judge Dec. 7. "We really don't have solid evidence of how egregious the accident was," he said, though he admitted that "the result was a death, and no one's trying to minimize that."

And, while Dice didn't dispute Garcia's bad driving record, he said, "a bad traffic record, even as a factor, is not the only factor."

(According to Monterey County Superior Court records, Garcia, now 24, has been cited for multiple traffic violations dating back to 2006. She was also arrested by Carmel P.D. on June 25, 2010, for having expired registration, being under the influence of a controlled substance and possessing methamphetamine and marijuana, and on July 30, 2010, Carmel P.D. arrested her for being under the influence of narcotics and possessing methamphetamine after officers stopped a car in which she was a passenger. On Feb. 24, 2007, CPD officers cited and released Garcia for possession of marijuana.)

Dice also claimed a murder charge wasn't appropriate because Garcia was only 23 years old at the time

But Matheson said her youth has nothing to do with it.

"Whether she's 22 or 62, a person driving under the influence, with her driving record, the considerations should be the same," he said, and later observed that she has received more traffic tickets than most people in their 60s have.

He accused her of having "total disregard for the safety of other drivers," when she got behind the wheel of her boyfriend's Jeep that morning, knowing full well her impairment could lead to the death of someone else.

He also said Garcia had been charged with reckless driving after drinking as a

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
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Padre footballers praised by council

Carmel High visits North Salinas High Friday for another non-conference game, which starts at 7 p.m.

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
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Beach parking lot construction to begin

ground storage tanks in the Del Mar parking lot near the beach at the foot of Ocean Avenue is slated to begin Dec. 12 and should wrap up before crowds flock to town for the AT&T Pebble Beach National Pro-Am next February, city administrator Jason Stilwell told the city council Tuesday.

After being discussed for years, the project finally received approval, and Monterey Peninsula Engineering won the \$526,010 contract for the job. The major aspect of the

project is the excavation of two 10,000-gallon tanks and installation of a new 25,000gallon tank that will capture an underground spring, making its water available for irrigation, street sweeping and emergency fire

The parking lot will also be reconfigured to improve traffic flow and then resurfaced, and cosmetic improvements will be made.

construction of two duplexes

Digging under way for

DOWNTOWN PROPERTY owner Don Mackey's long-sought plans for building two duplexes on back-to-back lots that face San Carlos and Mission streets south of Seventh Avenue are finally becoming reality.

Working with Pacific Grove architect Eric Miller, Mackey tried for more than a year to obtain approval for his projects, both of which finally received the city's OK after multiple hearings — including a failed appeal to the city council — and revisions. Excavation began a couple of weeks ago on the Mission Street house, the first to receive approval and a subsequent building permit.

Both homes will contain two units and

will have parking located off the street.

"It will take a while to get out of the ground, but as we proceed, it will take probably a year to build it," Miller said Wednesday of the Mission Street house.

Digging and foundation work will take two to three months, after which the home will be framed and eventually finished.

"People will find the building is perfectly scaled for that site, and the parking is consistent with the way you should build on that site," he said. "And I think in the end, it will be a good neighbor for everyone."

Construction on the San Carlos Street project is still a few weeks away, as Mackey has yet to receive the building permit, which Miller said is in the works.

Excavation has begun for the first of two duplexes being built by property owner Don Mackey down-

The remainder of the quilts were donated to Salinas Valley Memorial Hospital and Natividad Medical Center, also in Salinas.

Olney cut the fabric and each student selected the two prints they wanted to use and pinned them together wrongside-out. Olney then sewed the edges with a machine before the kids turned them right-side-out and tied a series of square knots on a grid pattern to hold the front and back of the

Each quilt bears a label with the maker's signature and message that the quilt is a gift from the class.

"They were so excited about being able to bring the quilt to the hospital," Olney said.

The students, their parents and Johnson delivered the quilts to community hospital's Family Birth Center. The children got to look through a window at the nursery to see a newborn who was to be given one of the quilts.

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
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
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Work on C.V. Road



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

The Wine Index, gingerbread mania, a cliffside Christmas and BYOB

IF SALES of expensive wines are any indication, the economy isn't quite as bad as it was a year ago — unless the continuing economic downturn is driving people to throw caution to the wind and order that bottle they've been wanting since 2008.

Regardless of the reason, Carmel restaurateur Kurt Grasing said this week that customers have been purchasing more wines in the \$100-plus-per-bottle price range than they did last year, and that's good news.

Grasing remodeled his namesake restaurant at Mission and Sixth and expanded into the adjacent corner space to launch a new bar that opened the night of the city's Christmas tree lighting a year ago. Since then, he's seen his regular customers more often and drawn new clients, too.

"Because of the bar, the corner location, the remodel and the economy being up in general, I think that we've had a great year," he said. "We've surpassed the last few years' sales, and our wine sales are up. People are enjoying their favorite bottles — the bottles that maybe they'd decided not to enjoy the last few years."

The bar's opening also means spirits are more on people's minds. While Grasing's has had a full liquor license for years, customers generally didn't order cocktails, perhaps because the bar was out of sight. Now, it's a warm and welcoming destination all its own, and guests are more inclined to sample the special spiced bourbon, a top-shelf Scotch or a craft beer, like the seasonal Delirium Noël (which Grasing said is better shared, since the large bottle can be a bit much for one person to handle). Anderson Valley's Winter Solstice ale and Samuel Smith's cider beer are also available now.

"We're just adding a few things, with this crispiness in the air," he said.

The bar also serves as a good testing ground for dishes that are more bistro-ori-

ented, such as the meatloaf sandwich and the highly addictive truffle popcorn, and the venue makes it easy for people to drop in without a reservation or to casually enjoy a grilled cheese sandwich and a beer before heading down the street to a show at the Sunset Center. "There's much more spontaneity," he said.

New seasonal dishes at Grasing's include cider-beer-braised pork shank osso bucco served on mashed Yukon Gold and sweet potatoes with apples, pears and pearl onions, and a few dishes capitalizing on the abundance of wild chanterelles and porcini mushrooms growing throughout the Peninsula.

"And dungeness crab is coming back into season," he added. "In the bar, the crab gratin is nice, with a little bit of reduced cream and a little Gruyere."

"Things are going well, and we're excited about getting new things in and trying them

out and adding new dishes all the time," he continued.

Finally, the restaurant will offer to-go Christmas dinners again this year, with main courses of prime rib or turkey, and all the accouterments a person could want.

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Sunday's Big Night at Belle, featuring chef Brad Briske and Fog Line Farm, served as a compelling example of how a delicious dinner can be prepared using produce and meat all grown in a single small place. Located in Soquel, Fog Line produces vegetables, fruits, pigs and chickens, as well as preserves and other condiments, for sale at local farmers markets, and Briske used a whole hog to feed several dozen guests at the

Dec. 4 dinner at Carmel Belle in the Doud Arcade.

"It came out great," said organizer Colleen Logan, whose business, Savor, seeks to help small farmers maximize their business. "For me, that was a really great occasion to be able to source everything from one place, to showcase the diversity of Fog Line Farm and the fact they're growing really great produce. They provided all the vegetables we ate, as well as the pig."

In fact, the evening was hog-themed, with pork showing up in every course, from the thinly sliced salami, copa, lomo and chorizo that greeted diners as they walked through the door, to the dessert, in which smoky bits of pork adorned ice cream accompanied by a cookie. The cold-smoked braised pork shoulder with broccoli, puréed celtuce (a type of

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
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
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

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lettuce originally from China) and peanut mint gremolata was a standout.

He also said passing the fees for the remodel on to taxpayers would set "a serious precedent that would then seem to apply to all nonprofit organizations throughout the city. Churches, the Red Cross, any organization that meets that status could then request an exemption when they intend to do construction work."

But Pac Rep executive director Stephen Moorer argued the report was inaccurate. "When the facts are wrong, then the conclu-

sion can also be wrong," he said.

Specifically, the work described does not encompass what's being done at the Golden Bough: ADA access, structural work, sound proofing and improvements for health and safety - all of which he said are "community-wide benefits."

"By its very nature, this is a redesign," he said. "This is a strengthening of an historic building.'

He also called for fairness in considering the request. The Golden Bough is the only privately owned theater in town, while Sunset Center and the Forest Theater are owned by the city. "We have three historic theaters, but only the Golden Bough gets hit by these fees," he said.

Moorer further questioned the assumption that waiving the fees, which happens very rarely, would set a precedent. (The council last voted to forego fees in 2008 for The Carmel Foundation's Trevvett Court project, since it would provide more low-cost housing for seniors in town.)

PacRep board President Bob Mulford said the group has already spent \$2 million improving the theater and said its board members and staff want nothing more than to be treated equitably by the city.

Their arguments resonated with some members of the public as well as the council.

Carmel Residents Association board President Barbara Livingston urged the city to forgive the fees.

"I'm sold," she said. "I think they made a

very, very good pitch to you."

Councilman Ken Talmage asked city administrator Jason Stilwell to develop a list of criteria the council could use when deciding on such requests in the future, but in their absence, he moved to let PacRep off the

Some council members, including Jason Burnett, said they had walked into the meeting believing they were on the side of denying the waiver but were convinced by Moorer and Mulford to vote the other way. Mayor Sue McCloud pointed out the theater productions help draw people to town which benefits the local economy and the city budget.

Fees for the project total \$15,752, of which PacRep has paid \$1,500 for its plan check. That will not be refunded, but according to the council's unanimous decision, the theater group will not have to cut a check for the rest, which includes permit and roadimpact fees.


Frosty was thrown or jumped from the car, but said the witness reported seeing Frosty exit the car like a "projectile."

"The guy really, really seemed to think he was thrown," Hart told a KION 46 TV reporter, noting that the driver of the vehicle in which Frosty was traveling didn't stop or turn around.

The dog, which apparently was bleeding from its mouth, was last seen near the Monterey Coast Guard pier. It's unknown what other injuries the dog has.

"Be very cautious about approaching him," Brookhouser said, "as he is fearful of people and your approach may scare him into traffic and cause serious injury."

"He made full disclosure to everyone [about his arrest], including the judge, and they all decided he should proceed with the trial and that he was doing a fine job."

Welsh called his suspension an "extreme overreaction," and said alcohol never affected Klopfenstein's work performance. She said her client hasn't consumed alcohol since his arrest.

"Mr. Klopfenstein is, and has been, ready, willing and able to resume work," according to his seven-page claim, "but he has not been permitted to do so because of his disability."

As a result, the county has discriminated against Klopfenstein by failing to comply with its obligations under the Americans with Disabilities Act and the California Fair Employment and Housing Act, Klopfenstein claims.

"What they should have done," Welsh said, "is to sit down and say, 'What do you need from us, if anything, to continue your work?""

Klopfenstein, Welsh said, began working full time for the public defender's office in 2008 and had received promotions, step increases and was a team leader in the office.

Egar, who hadn't seen the complaint, deferred questions to deputy county counsel,

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Bill Litt. Litt said Klopfenstein's case was a confidential personnel matter.

Klopfenstein — who was prosecuted by the California Attorney General's Office because of the potential of conflict by the Monterey County District Attorney's Office — ended up pleading no contest to reckless driving after drinking and agreed to do community service in lieu of jail time.

Triple homicide trial

Klopfenstein's arrest came in the midst of a trial in which he was defending Ramon Esparza Rios, who was charged with killing three of his family members in 1990: his wife, his 12-year-old son, and his wife's cousin.

Monterey County Superior Court Judge Pamela Butler took into consideration Klopfenstein's arrest, but allowed him to remain Rios' attorney.

However, at the conclusion of Rios' trial — which resulted in a jury convicting Rios of the triple homicide — Egar placed Klopfenstein on paid leave, and then claimed Klopfenstein had provided Rios with "ineffective representation." He filed a motion for a new trial, which Butler rejected.

On Dec. 2, Butler sentenced Rios to life in prison without the possibility of parole.

Defamation alleged

Klopfenstein also alleges in his claim that

the public defender's office defamed him "by publicly making derogatory comments" to the news media and "falsely asserting in statements and innuendo his ineffectiveness in his profession, all with no reasonable grounds to believe it to be true."

Welsh said the defamation allegations stem from comments Egar made to the Monterey County Herald after Klopfenstein was suspended.

Klopfenstein maintains he has sustained damages to his reputation, professional career and personal integrity and health because of his employer's actions. He's seeking an unspecified amount in damages.

Welsh said Klopfenstein will consider filing a lawsuit in civil court against the coun-

ty if the Monterey County Board of Supervisors denies the claim, which it will likely do.

Meanwhile, for the nearly five months he hasn't been on the job, Klopfenstein has been working toward a master's degree in forensic psychology in an online course, Welsh said.

She said his claim highlights the stigma often associated with alcoholism and the inability by many employers to view the problem as a disability, Welsh said.

It's not treated like "multiple sclerosis or

diabetes," she explained.

"It's treated with disrespect, misunderstanding and hostility. And that is not the appropriate response, she said."

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

Scenic Road is already one-way from Eighth Avenue to Santa Lucia. With the county planning to make its portion of the road one-way, Carmel planning and building services manager Sean Conroy said county officials want all of Scenic to be one-way to "create a consistent flow for vehicles traveling from Eighth Avenue south to Carmel River State Beach. "Leaving a single block open to two-way traffic would create confusion for motorists," he said.

Conroy also pointed out that, under the current configuration, drivers unfamiliar with the area often turn up the oneway portion of Scenic Road in the wrong direction, despite the signs warning against it. If the entire road were one-way, he said, that would be less likely to occur. Since 80 percent of the drivers on Scenic are already

heading southbound, the county proposed making the road one-way in that direction — an idea Mayor Sue McCloud

County officials also asked the city to cosponsor a public workshop for residents regarding the proposal, which could be approved administratively but would be appealable to the California Coastal Commission. The city's actions would follow a similar process.

Assistant county planning director Carl Holm attended the Dec. 6 council meeting and said the county would construct a turnaround for northbound traffic at Carmelo Street and is working with California State Parks on areas that would affect the beach parking lot. A broader plan to address the lagoon and beach, with hopes of rebuilding the parking lot and restrooms there, is in the works, as well.

In a letter to the city, acting county public works director Paul Greenway requested for feedback from the council regarding concerns about northbound traffic routes, signs and any other issues.

In a draft letter presented at Tuesday's meeting, city administrator Jason Stilwell wrote that the council agreed with turning Scenic Road into a one-way street from Santa Lucia southward and suggested a four-way stop be installed at Martin Way and Bay View, where a yield sign controls traf-

"That is a blind intersection with an inn on the southeast corner," he wrote. "You will have increased traffic on Martin Way, as that will be the first road for those parked at the south end of the beach to return to Santa Lucia without driving further south on Scenic." A handful of residents spoke in favor of making Scenic one-way; no one spoke against it.

We strongly support it and hope you will also support it and join in the workshop," said Carmel Point resident Lorin Letendre, and Carmel Residents Association President Barbara Livingston said her group also wants Scenic Road to be one-way, including the block between Eighth and Ocean

"That funny little stretch from Eighth to Ocean is really ridiculous," she said, adding that making it one-way would also improve safety for pedestrians and cyclists.

McCloud said the council couldn't discuss the Ocean-to-Eighth stretch, since it wasn't on the agenda. She thought the city should participate in the county workshop.

Councilwoman Paula Hazdovac said the city should send the letter in support of the effort and was also fine with participating in the workshop with the county.

Councilman Jason Burnett commented, "It covers two blocks of Carmel-by-the-Sea and is a nice demonstration of working with our county neighbor."

The rest of the council agreed.

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

Eliminate the corporate income tax

IF YOU ask someone which tax he thinks is the most regressive, he'll probably say the sales tax, since rich and poor alike pay the same rate.

But there's no federal sales tax, and some states have no sales tax, either.

Also, most states which have a sales tax exempt essential commodities — in California, for example, there's no sales tax on groceries.

So, while sales taxes have a regressive nature, it is very irregularly applied.

Others might say that Social Security and Medicare taxes are the most regressive, since they also have the same basic rate for everybody, and since Social Security taxes are only applied to the first \$100,000 or so of a person's annual income. Also, they're not imposed at all (not yet, anyway) on investment or other unearned income.

But while sales, Social Security and Medicare taxes are somewhat regressive, there's another tax which is highly regressive. Because this tax is imposed behind the scenes, consumers usually aren't aware of it. But it's there — a lot of it — on nearly everything you buy. And that tax is the corporate income tax.

While the news media these days are full of indignant reports about companies paying taxes at rates below the maximum, or not paying them at all, what's not mentioned is that many corporations pay very large tax bills. And the inevitability of those taxes influences their decision making on all sorts of corporate issues — especially on the prices they'll charge.

Thus, when you buy a new car, diapers for your baby or a carton of milk, a portion of the sales price goes to corporate taxes imposed on the company that produced it, the company that processed it, the company that wholesaled it, and the company that sold it to you. And that portion can be very large.

In California, corporations are subject to a 35 percent federal income tax rate, plus an 8.84 percent state tax rate.

Who pays all that money? The consumer, of course.

So when President Barack Obama and Democrats in Congress call for "rich corporations" to pay their "fair share" of taxes, it's helpful to keep in mind who will really pay them.

Also, while there's a certain populist appeal to the idea of making corporations bear their "fair" share, it's also important to keep in mind that a corporation is not something that can indulge itself in the way a rich man can spoil himself with luxuries. If a company makes a lot of money, that money should not produce envy until it's handed out to employees and stockholders. And those people all have to pay taxes on the money when it's given to them. "Fair" taxation for companies actually means double taxation on the money it earns.

A third factor to consider is the stultifying effect high corporate taxes have on business investment, innovation and expansion.

Eliminate the corporate income tax, and prices for all manner of goods will substantially decline, even as the economy gets a big boost, thereby increasing overall government revenues.

And that would be fair for everybody.

"Here We Go Again" was the title of your Dec. 2 editorial. Well, back at you: "Here You Go Again," using the one-sided safety of your editorial pulpit to heap unsupportable insults on Melanie Billig, who has had the courage to try to save the central heart of Carmel's largest park, the Mission Trail Nature Preserve, by opposing the sale of Flanders Mansion.

The city could have (among many other solutions) amicably settled this problem years ago by leasing the mansion to a single-family which was, at one time, agreeable to both the Flanders Foundation and nearby neighbors. That would have saved the city about \$1 million in legal fees which could have been spent completing repairs to the

mansion.

The actions and re-actions of your paper in reinforcing the intractable city position have greatly contributed to the present negative stalemate. Firefighters keep busy in Big Sur

Four fires in Big Sur over a 24-hour period, meanwhile, kept firefighters on their toes. A downed power line near the Maiden Pub Nov. 30 ignited the first blaze, which was quickly extinguished by the fire brigade.

The following afternoon, a downed power line at Rancho Rico also touched off a brush fire, but again, the fire brigade — with assis-

tance from U.S. Forest Service workers was able to put it out before it could spread.

A third fire ignited Dec. 2 on state park property near the Big Sur Post Office. This time, forest service workers were nearby and doused the flames.

The fourth blaze ignited the same day when a Ford truck caught fire on Highway 1 just south of Ventana Inn and its flames spread to brush uphill from the scenic route. But the fire brigade and forest service were able to stop it from reaching the resort, where guests were told to start packing as a precaution.

"Thankfully, this did not take place 24 hours earlier, when winds were gusting up to 50 miles per hour," resident Wally Barnick

As a result of quick responses by fire-

fighters, none of the four fires burned more than an acre of vegetation.

Across Highway 1 from Ventana, at Post Ranch, the wind was so strong that it blew out a window in a guest's room, Karstens reported.

"Many people had cars squashed by trees," added Karstens, whose own house lost a glass skylight and a back door during the wind storm. As a result of the high winds, numerous Big Sur residents also temporarily lost power.

Tune, meanwhile, reminded residents and visitors that the fire danger in Big Sur remains high.

"These fires serve as a vivid reminder that we're still in fire season along the Big Sur coast, and we need to keep our guard up," she added.

of a different resident, John Troth. Sweigert asked the water district to "immediately investigate" the matter and issue a citation if the restaurant is found to be in violation.

However, water district water demand manager Stephanie Pintar told The Pine Cone that an inspection Tuesday determined the Point Pinos Grill was in compliance. "They actually had fewer seats than they were permitted," Pintar said.

The website for the Point Pinos Grill, Pasquier points out, indicates the restaurant can accommodate more than 150 guests for special events. "How can they go about having big parties and advertising they are a 150-seat place when only 77 seats are allowed?" Pasquier told The Pine Cone.

The water district is preparing to send a letter to Ford and the city letting it know it investigated the matter and reiterating the maximum number of seats allowed at the club house grill, Pintar said.

Pasquier said he made the complaint mostly because he wants the city to abide by the same rules as private citizens do. Recently, Pasquier said the water district required him to install two sinks in his house just so he could retain his extra water credits — an annoyance he said cost him thousands of dollars. "The individual guy always seems to get stuck having to fight the water district and can never win," Pasquier

The grill's operator, Dory Ford with Aqua Terra Culinary, said Pasquier's complaint is "another attempt to be destructive."

"I don't know a better way to explain it," he said.

Ford said he will continue to comply the restaurant's water permit, which doesn't necessarily regulate the number of people who can be served.

For instance, the restaurant could serve 150 people at one time as long as there are no more than the allowed number of seats. They could also have an unlimited number of seats on

juvenile and had been required to attend classes on the dangers of driving under the influence.

Also, Monterey County Superior Court Judge Stephen Sillman, now retired, had written Garcia a letter six months before the crash reminding her she could be charged with murder if she "continues drinking and driving, and kills someone."

"The normal person would stop what she's doing," Matheson said, but continuing to drive under the influence after being repeatedly told of its dangers constituted malice and therefore justified the murder charge.

Dice countered that most of the DUI education focused on the perils of drinking and driving, not on methamphetamine use.

But Lavorato said Garcia should face trial on the murder charge, as well as gross vehicular manslaughter, and he denied Dice's motion for its dismissal.

Dice then asked to make a request regarding bail for Garcia, who remains in custody and appeared in court Wednesday afternoon in the county jail's customary orangeand-white-striped jumpsuit, but Lavorato said the original judge presiding over the case, Julie Culver, should hear that argument and any other motions relating to it. He scheduled Garcia's next court appearance for 10 a.m. Dec. 15.

the grill's outdoor deck.

"I have assured the water district there will never be more than 77 seats [inside]," Ford said.

Attached to Pasquier's complaint is a photograph he said he took Nov. 6 showing several people sitting and eating in a reception area at the grill, a space off to the side of the dining room that is not supposed to be used for eating. He submitted the photo with the complaint.

"This constitutes food service not accounted for in the current water permit," according to his complaint.

Ford said when Pasquier took the photo, the people in the photograph happened to be the only diners in the restaurant.

The row at the club house heated up after the Pacific Grove City Council voted 5-2 Nov. 16 to extend the nighttime hours at the clubhouse for a 120-day trial period. The extra hours, the city says, will allow it chance to determine the impacts of keeping the grill open at night.

Following the council's decision, Troth hired Sweigert to sue the city over the extended hours, contending the ordinance allowing it violates the city's use permit for the eatery and that the later hours would cause noise and traffic problems that could hurt property values.

But a judge ruled against Troth, saying the temporarily later hours wouldn't constitute "irreparable harm" to the neighborhood.

Pasquier is one of several nearby property owners, along with Troth and Fenton & Keller attorney, John Bridges, who have been critical of the extended hours.

Since he began operating the grill, Ford has said the restaurant needs to be open for dinner and special events so it can be successful in the long term.

For the first time in a long time, according to Ford, the city is receiving a check from the restaurant, transforming it into an "income property, as opposed to a loss."

For the most part, he said, P.G. residents enjoy the restaurant. "They are appreciative and supportive of our efforts," he said. "And they demonstrate that by dining with us."

In an ironic twist, the water district had been considering hosting its annual holiday luncheon at the Point Pinos Grill next week. But in light of Pasquier's complaint and the district's investigation, those plans that are now off the table.

"It seems under the circumstances," Pintar said, "it's not an appropriate venue at this time."

Judge rejects another attempt to curtail hours

Meanwhile, in a Monterey courtroom Friday, Troth continued his campaign to prevent the clubhouse from staying open beyond sundown — and he pulled out all the stops to get his way.

Sweigert spent an hour making a detailed and impassioned case why letting the grill serve patrons until 10 p.m. three days a week, even on a temporary basis, would violate state law, the Pacific Grove charter, general plan and zoning code, and the existing permit for the clubhouse to operate. And he even alleged Constitutional violations of Troth's rights if it were allowed.

He also continued to claim that Troth would suffer "irreparable harm" if Monterey County Superior Court Judge Kay Kingsley didn't order the clubhouse to revert to its earlier closing time.

But Pacific Grove city attorney David Laredo, speaking more briefly and to the point, compared temporary hours at the clubhouse to other temporary actions routinely approved on city streets, in parks and on private property — including special events such as the Good Old Days, the triathlon, and story poles erected to show what development projects might look like. He urged the judge to recognize approval of the extended clubhouse hours as an exercise of the city's routine "police power."

Kingsley agreed with Laredo and once again declined to grant the injunction requested by Troth.

Another hearing on the overall merits of the dispute could be held in late January or early February.

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
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
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Think small, think local and think fabulous

Whether you're wrapping up something for a neighbor next door, or assembling a gift basket to send away, here are some ideas to help point you in the right direction:

■ Sea Salt

Robert Kirkland pulled off his wetsuit one day and had a revelation. The local carpenter, home cook and avid surfer had spent years washing the salt from his gear. Then the proverbial light bulb went off and he realized his brainchild: Monterey Bay Salt Company.

After extensive research and testing to ensure quality and purity, Kirkland began the process of harvesting natural salt from the cool, mineral-rich waters of the bay. Using solar greenhouses and shallow pools, Kirkland uses an entirely natural method embraced by local chefs and gourmands.
