P.B. WOMAN DIES IN MYSTERIOUS KITCHEN FIRE

A PEBBLE Beach woman found lying on her kitchen floor with second- and third-degree burns covering 90 percent of her body last Thursday evening later died at a Santa Clara County trauma center.

While the Santa Clara County Coroner's Office would not release the cause of death, an official confirmed the victim was 64-year-old Mary Wyatt, who was discovered by her caregiver at around 5:20 p.m. Jan. 26.

After the caregiver dialed 911, according to Cal Fire public information officer Jonathan Pangburn, firefighters arrived to find Wyatt lying on the floor, critically burned but conscious and breathing. Residual smoke drifted in the kitchen, but there were no immediate signs of fire.

Because she was in dire need of urgent medical care, the crew rushed to get her to the hospital and did not try to ask her what happened, according to Pangburn.

"Her clothing caught fire, but by the time our folks got there, it was pretty much gone. Any kind of material she may have been wearing was unrecognizable," he said. "They didn't spend a lot of time with her, because they wanted to get her out quickly."

Due to the severity of Wyatt's injuries, the paramedics requested an air ambulance to fly her to the nearest burn center. But fog prevented the helicopter from landing, so she was taken to Community Hospital of Monterey Peninsula, where an ER surgeon assessed Wyatt and made arrangements to transfer her to a burn center, according to Panghurn

Meanwhile, at the residence at Padre Lane and Laureles Lane, firefighters searched for further signs of fire but found none.

Showdown at Brinton's as owner tries to change locks

■ Store also sued for not repaying loan

THE ABRUPT closure of Brinton's — which was announced Jan. 22 to its employees and went into effect the following day — took an unexpected turn this week when a Monterey County Sheriff's deputy was called to enforce a court order requiring that the store be vacated by 3 p.m. on Jan. 31.

"The owners refused to leave," said attorney Tony Lombardo, who is representing the Prim Family Partnership in Nevada, which owns the Carmel Rancho shopping center. "We went to change the locks, and there was a big scene. They tried to block our entrance. We had to call the sheriff to carry out the court order."

Sgt. Mike Burns confirmed the sheriff's office responded to the dispute. He said the owners asked for more time to remove some property from the store. "An arrangement was made to give them a little more time," Burns said.

According to Lombardo, Brinton's owner, Richard Brinton, was on scene during the incident.

Prim Family Partnership, meanwhile, is in negotiations with a possible tenant for the now vacant space in its shopping center, Lombardo confirmed. He described the business as a "general store," but said it's too early to release any more details. "The deal isn't completed," he said.

Water district fights to restore 'user fee'

THE GENERAL manager of the Monterey Peninsula Water Management District will make a desperate plea to a judge in San Francisco next week to restore a "user fee" on customers' water bills the district argues is necessary to avoid layoffs and a drastic reduction in the environmental work it performs on the Carmel River.

The user fee, which accounts for 46 percent of the water district's \$10 million annual budget, had been collected from customers since 1983 in order to help pay for staff salaries,

Doctor who sued caregiver over financial abuse dies

LAWRENCE LOFTUS — the Carmel man who filed a lawsuit against his former caregiver nearly two years ago for taking millions of dollars from his estate — has died. He was 88.

Loftus, a retired physician who had a home on Scenic Road, passed away Jan. 21 less than two years after he filed suit against his former caregiver, Charles Harper.

"He was a sweet guy," Loftus' Carmel attorney, Frank Hespe, told The Pine Cone Tuesday.

Loftus made news in February 2010 when he filed suit against Harper in Monterey County Superior Court, alleging the caregiver looted his estate, includ-





WITH WINS over Soledad High and Pacific Grove High, the Carmel High School boys basketball team ran its win streak to nine games. The CHS girls basketball team, meanwhile, had its eight-game win streak snapped Jan. 31 by Monte Vista Christian School.

The boys won a see-saw battle 45-40 against Soledad High Jan. 27 on the road. **Matt Rudolph** led a balanced attack with 13 points, including 3 baskets from beyond the arc. **Mason Braun** also put 13 points on the scoreboard, while **Michael Alrole** added 10 points.

The Padres won their ninth straight game Feb. 1 when they topped the Breakers 40-29. Playing on its home court, Carmel High was paced **Devin Pearson** with 12 points. Rudolph added nine points.

The boys are now 9-0 in league play and 11-8 overall. They travel to Gonzales High Friday, Feb. 3, for a 7 p.m. game.

With its offense firing on all cylinders and its defense stepping up to contain the Monterey Bay's leading prep scorer, the girls coasted to their 8th straight win Jan. 27, downing Soledad High 66-36 win at home.

Sarah Anderson filled up the box score for the Padres with 21 points, 8 rebounds, five assists, four steals and a pair of blocks. **Emma Fuzie** scored 12 points and hauled down 7 rebounds, while **Mackenzie Dooner** put 16 points on the scoreboard, grabbed another 7 rebounds and blocked 5 shots.

Kaitlin Davis, meanwhile, had the challenging task of shutting down Soledad High's **Felicia Villarruel**, who leads all local prep players with an average of more than 23 points a game. Davis' aggressive defense held Villarruel to only 10 points, including just 2 field goals.

The girls' win streak ended Jan. 31 when they lost on the road to Monte Vista Christian School 44-40. A day later, they bounced back, topping rival Pacific Grove High 41-27. Anderson led the way with 18 points.

The girls are now 9-0 in league play and 12-5 overall. They play next Friday, Feb. 3 against Gonzales High at home. The game starts at 6:30 p.m.



Nonprofit for deputies, volunteers gets ambitious

SHERIFFS COME and go, but the deputies remain in need of our help," said Teddy Balestreri, the new president of the nonprofit Sheriff's Advisory Council that raises funds to buy equipment, resources and training for frontline forces. Started in 1984 by the late Ed Haber, SAC also supports related volunteer organizations like the posse, aero squadron and emergency assistance team.

Under the leadership of Balestreri, who took over as president of the SAC board after David Bernahl stepped down last year, the organization is undergoing a revamp in 2012 that began with the launch of a new website. He said he hopes to build the group's membership — which is open to the public — as well as its role in keeping deputies well equipped and keeping the vital volunteer groups intact.

"I want our members to be the most informed citizens in the county when it comes to countywide law enforcement issues," he said. "The stakes are too high for the men and women on the street — they need our help."

To work on the foundation, Balestreri, who has an extensive background in hospitality, first sought a review of the organization's procedures and membership. The board he

heads includes Sheriff Scott Miller as chairman, VP Sam McLeod, treasurer Francis Ingraham and secretary Steve Bloch, as well as publicist Ashley Huffman, builder Al Saroyan, hotelier Denny LeVett, Alan Richmond, Norbert Relecker, Tom Rowley and representatives of the volunteer groups.

Over the past several years, SAC and its accomplishments — such as raising funds to purchase night-vision binoculars, a SWAT vehicle, a phone for hostage negotiation and other necessary equipment — have not been highly publicized, and the events it has hosted have been intermittent, but Balestreri hopes to take SAC to a new level.

Part of that vision entails keeping members better informed via the website and regularly scheduled events.

"We have regular board meetings, and traditionally there have been sporadic fundraisers throughout the years, but I want to have regular fundraisers and more educational events — family events to find out not only what SAC is doing, but also the aero squadron, the posse, the mounted unit and other groups," he said.

SAC supports the search and rescue team and the Sheriff's Emergency

Assistance Team, which is also working to build its core group of volunteers.

LA PLAYA OWNERS REFINE UPGRADE PLAN, WILL APPLY FOR PERMITS SOON

■ Hope to recoup some cash with sale of Executive Suite

The Labor-intensive process of figuring out how to soundproof every room in La Playa Hotel — not to mention how to update the entire place to meet the expectations of modern-day travelers — is nearly

complete, according to Matt Crow, who runs the company that acquired the hotel last November.

"La Playa is a gorgeous historic property, so we're trying to preserve everything that's great about it but also figure out how to make it a modern operation with a whole new level of world-class service," Crow said

One part of the property, however, won't be undergoing any upgrades. The 3,360square-foot Executive Suite at the south end of the hotel is on the market as a single-family home.

"The acquisition was very expensive, and we knew the renovation was going to be expensive, so if there are small pieces of the property that could provide a return of some of our capital without affecting the business, that's our hope," said Crow, CEO of Classic Hotels & Resorts.

La Playa Hotel has plenty of conference space, but under the previous ownership, the Executive Suite was used for meetings. According to Tom Bruce of Coldwell Banker, it has cathedral ceilings, a kitchen, a master bedroom suite, a second bedroom, a wood-burning fireplace, two full baths, two half-baths and a den/study, but no formal dining area or parking. It has commanding ocean views and a terrace that overlooks the hotel's beautiful gardens and is being offered for \$1.9 million.

An 'obsession'

Crow said the team working on the renovation spent about six weeks figuring out the best ways to soundproof the hotel's guest rooms. "It was a painstaking approach, looking at every single wall," he said. "One of the reasons we think we're good in the hospitality business is that we pay a lot of attention to details."

Crow said the company also designed new furniture and bathrooms, and has "architectural drawings for every single room, with layouts of the furniture."

Soon, they will be getting rid of the existing furniture by donating it to local charities and having the remainder hauled away.

"And I hope that within the next few months, we'll have the building permits," he said. The team hasn't completed its operational plan or started the hiring process, yet.

Once they obtain permits, the construction will take several months. A sign outside anticipates a fall 2012 reopening.

When the hotel reopens, Crow said it will offer food service, but probably not a fullscale restaurant like the Terrace Grill that operated there for years. "One of the great benefits of Carmel is the incredible food," he said, adding that he doubts a hotel restaurant could do a better job than the town's restaurateurs. "What we want to do is be a portal to Carmel for guests from all over the world, and along those lines, when we do get our operating plan in place, it's our intent to form close relationships with all of the local restaurants, so we can help with arrangements before our guests even get to town."

But the hotel's historic bar will remain intact, Crow promised.

"The bar is such a gem and has so much history and has been so beloved by the citizens of Carmel that we're going to change it very little," he said. "There's nothing wrong with the bar — it's an exceptional place."

Although a man with reservations to stay at La Playa in August said he's been told the hotel would reopen by Aug. 1, Crow declined to name a date and simply said the company would make "extraordinary efforts" to find accommodations for anyone who has reservations if it's not yet reopened.

"The last thing we want to do is overpromise anything," he said.

Misdemeanor charge in fatal accident

■ D.A. won't comment on results of drug/alcohol tests

RYAN ARMSTRONG, the Carmel Valley teenager accused of crashing a Jeep in Cachagua last summer, killing 19-year-old Keenan Lucero and seriously injuring another passenger, has been charged with misdemeanor vehicular manslaughter, according to Monterey County Managing Deputy District Attorney Ed Hazel.

After a lengthy delay largely blamed on the backlog at the state's crime lab, where toxicology tests were being performed, the district attorney's office decided on the accusation last week. While the less severe charge could suggest the results were insufficient to convict Armstrong of being under the influence of alcohol and marijuana — as the California Highway Patrol initially believed he was — Hazel said he could not comment on the specifics of the case.

"Just because an individual is not charged a certain way does not mean certain factors didn't happen," he said. "I can't comment on that directly."

The misdemeanor vehicular manslaughter charge means Armstrong is suspected of "negligent operation of a motor vehicle that led to a death," or "a criminal offense not amounting to a felony that resulted in a death," he said. (Accidents resulting in injury or death in which the driver was drunk or on drugs are usually charged as felonies.)

The fatal crash occurred the night of Aug. 13, 2011, when Armstrong was behind the

wheel of the borrowed Jeep Wrangler he drove off of Tassajara Road. Then 18, he was arrested and taken to Monterey County Jail by the California Highway Patrol but later released.

After the CHP filed its report with the county, attorneys waited for results from the Department of Justice lab that would indicate whether Armstrong had been drinking or taking drugs before the wreck. Due to a huge backlog, the process took several months. But in mid-January, Hazel said the results were in and attorneys on both sides had to meet with the lab technician to discuss their contents and implications.

"There are all kinds of options, depending on what the results are," Hazel said at the time. "Hypothetically, if the results were zero, for example, that would lead to a different set of charges, and if the blood alcohol were really high, that would lead to a different set of charges, up to vehicular homicide and murder. We want to look at it as completely as possible."

Ultimately, the district attorney's office decided on misdemeanor vehicular manslaughter, and Armstrong is set to be arraigned in a Salinas courtroom Feb. 8.

Tiffany Lucero, Keenan's mother, said she has been in regular contact with the district attorney's office and did not want to discuss the case.

"Keenan's family and I are relieved that a charge has been filed, and some accountability may result in Keenan's sudden and tragic death," she said last week. "We hope that there will be the possibility of moving forward in our grief. Keenan is deeply missed, well loved, and we will fight for him."

Appeals court denies Mandurrago's demand for fees

THE SIXTH District Court of Appeal last week denied building designer John Mandurrago's demand for fees in his lawsuit against the City of Carmel over his years-long effort to demolish the old bank building at Dolores and Seventh and replace it with underground parking, retail and living

After the city finally denied Mandurrago's application in late 2009, he sued for a multitude of offenses, including violation of his constitutional rights and laws governing lowcost housing. The city countered by arguing its actions were protected from what are known as Strategic Lawsuits Against Public Participation, or SLAPPs, because the decisions were made after public hearings and based on comments made and approved by council members.

While the Monterey County Superior Court judge agreed with the city, the state appellate court reversed that decision in June 2010, finding that interpreting the anti-SLAPP law to protect government officials would be "squarely contrary to the underlying legislative intent" behind the law and would make it too difficult for citizens to challenge illegal or unfair government actions.

"Many public entity decisions are arrived at after discussion and a vote at a public meeting," one of the justices noted. If lawsuits challenging such decisions were subject to being thrown out as SLAPPs, "it would chill the resort to legitimate judicial oversight over potential abuses of legislative and administrative power [and] ironically impose an undue burden upon the very right of petition for those seeking [judicial] review.'

As a result, Mandurrago sued taxpayers to recover his attorney's fees, contending that "the city's motion had been frivolous and intended to delay and harass him," but Monterey County Superior Court Judge Lydia Villareal denied his motion.

"This court finds that the motion to strike filed by the City of Carmel-by-the-Sea was not frivolous, nor was it filed with the intent to cause unnecessary delay or to harass the petitioners," she wrote. "The city relied on appropriate legal authority in filing the motion, and nothing contained in the decision of the appellate court supports petitioners' claims."

Mandurrago appealed that decision, too, but this time, the appellate court justices agreed with Villareal. Mandurrago argued that since the city failed to meet the threshold for an anti-SLAPP suit, its action against him "must be found frivolous." But the appellate justices responded, "Not so. The fact that the city's motion ultimately failed does not mean that it was frivolous as a matter of law."

After the decision and ruling were released Jan. 23, attorney Jon Giffen notified Mayor Sue McCloud of the result.

"The appellate court would have reversed Judge Villareal's ruling if it found that her decision to deny fees was a prejudicial abuse of discretion which resulted in a manifest miscarriage of justice," he wrote. "Fortunately, that was not the case, and we are extremely pleased with the court's rul-

Meanwhile, the former bank building is empty, and there have been no new permits filed to do anything with it.

Large water allotment given back to P.G. for projects

OWNERS OF a big parcel in Pacific Grove who for more than a decade had planned to build an office building on several lots on Forest Avenue have abandoned the project and relinquished the water entitlement back to the city so other businesses can use it.

Sometime in the 1990s, the Yonan and Munir families, which own the property where Little Chicken House and other businesses (1169 to 1193 Forest Avenue) are located, had planned to replace them with an office building. The proposed building had more than two acre feet of water allocated for it, but very little was done to move it toward construc-

In December 2011, Pacific Grove city officials told the owners they had to move ahead with the project.

"We put them on notice that they needed to achieve a certain level [of permit and construction work] to keep the building permit active," Sarah Hardgrave, the city's environmental programs manager told The Pine Cone.

But the owners — who have a Pebble Beach address, according to the Monterey County Planning Department told the city they weren't prepared to go forward with the project and gave the city the water entitlement, which amounts to more than 650,000 gallons a year. The owners were reimbursed thousands of dollars for the water permit that they originally purchased for the project.

On Wednesday, the Pacific Grove City Council — which is responsible for deciding how the water should be distributed — voted unanimously that one acre feet of the water should be used for commercial projects and the remaining 1.5 acre feet should be placed in the city's community reserve. The city's planning staff had also recommended some of the water be set aside for government use, but the council rejected that idea.

The council's decision will mean that hotels and inns within the city will be able to expand and some storefronts and businesses that don't have water, will now have some

Until a few years ago, P.G. had a lengthy list of residents who were waiting for water to be available for projects. But in 2008, the city distributed five acre feet of water to those

"We were able to serve everybody on the list," Hardgrave said. "More than 40 projects went forward."

The city began a new waiting list, and so far, there are nine residential projects in P.G. that are line for water, including four residential vacant lots that don't have water credits.

CPUC approves Smart Meter opt-out plan

 $\operatorname{\mathsf{A}FTER}$ MONTHS of deliberations and study, the public utilities commission gave final approval this week to a plan that will let customers opt-out of having Smart Meters at their home — but it will cost them \$75 upfront and \$10 a

PG&E customers enrolled in the CPUC's low income program who want to opt out will be charged a one-time fee of \$10 and a monthly charge of \$5.

A relatively small number of those with Smart Meters, which transmit energy use data by radio waves, claim the devices emit harmful radiation levels and have made them ill.

PG&E contends the meters are not only safe — more than 9 million gas and electric Smart Meters have already been installed in Central and Northern California — but will help lower customers' bills giving them more control over their energy use.

CPUC commissioner Timothy Alan Simon called the

commission's decision "a great example of how public initiative and participation can result in better regulatory policy."

CPUC President Michael Peevey said the standard for metering is transitioning globally around the world from analog meters to newer Smart Meter technology.

"We are not reversing that by allowing for an analog optout," Peevey said, "but we are recognizing that certain customers prefer an analog meter."

Those who wish to abandon their Smart Meters or keep their old ones should do it soon. The costs the CPUC approved Wednesday are "interim to allow residential customers to begin selecting the opt-out option immediately," according to the CPUC. And the costs, the commission said, are subject to adjustment upon conclusion of a second CPUC proceeding where issues concerning actual costs associated with offering an analog opt-out option will be addressed.

The plan approved by the CPUC Wednesday will help PG&E recover some costs associated with visiting houses and manually reading meters.

Highway 1 reopens after slide cleared, motorists to pause for photo shoot

m T}$ HANKS TO a gravity-defying highwire act by road workers, Highway 1 reopened just south of Pitkins Curve in Big Sur Jan. 31, nine days after it was closed by

But motorists could face delays Friday, Jan. 3 to accommodate a photo shoot at Bixby Bridge.

Safety comes first

A rock slide located about 56 miles south of Carmel closed Highway 1 Jan. 22. The incident occurred just south of an ambitious \$30 million project to construct a 620-footlong bridge and rock shed along one of Highway 1's most troubled sections of pave-

Caltrans spokeswoman Susana Cruz told The Pine Cone this week that her agency's biggest challenge was not removing rock and debris from the highway, but ensuring the steep hillside above the road is stable enough so motorists won't be hit by falling rocks. To accomplish that task, highway workers used ropes to scale a nearly vertical cliff and install safety netting.

While the job looks dangerous, Cruz said the workers — who are independent contractors and state employees — are well prepared to safely maneuver more than 100 feet above the scenic route.

"They have many hours of training and considerable experience working on other slides," Cruz said.

With the safety netting installed, the highway reopened last Tuesday to motorists, who can expect delays at Pitkins Curve of up to five minutes. That section of Highway 1 has long been one way because of the unstable conditions. Traffic is controlled by a signal light.

Photogenic bridge makes \$\$

If you're traveling south on Highway 1 Friday, you can expect delays of up to 10 minutes at Bixby Bridge, where a marketing company, Caspar and Co. of London, England, is overseeing a photo shoot.

While some drivers might grow impatient over such delays, Karen Nordstrand — the director of marketing for the Monterey County Film Commission — said film projects bolster the local economy and boost tourism. She said on-location film projects generated more than \$4 million last year that directly benefited local communities.

Caspar Davies, the founder of Caspar and Co., echoed Nordstrand's sentiments. "While in the area, our crew will occupy 30 or so rooms in local hotels, and use local businesses for services such as catering, traffic control and transport," Davies said.

It comes as no surprise that the photo shoot, which began Feb. 1, aims to capture the thrill of driving a car across the famous

'We are producing still photography for a company that provides financial services for automobiles," Davies explained. "The pictures will be used for overseas markets. The unique natural beauty of the Big Sur area and dramatic setting of Bixby Bridge provide an epic backdrop to the shots that any prospective car owner would aspire to drive through.'

Davies said his company is working hard to reduce any delays motorists might face.

"We understand that productions such as ours can cause potential inconvenience for local residents, and we try to minimize this," he added. "We appreciate their goodwill because it allows us to carry out our work smoothly."

Also, taxpayers don't need to worry about footing any portion of the bill for the photo shoot. Nordstrand said Caspar and Co. will pay off-duty highway patrol officers to monitor traffic Friday.




Richmond said 54 girls and boys partici-

PACIFIC GROVE mayor and Monterey County supervisor candidate Carmelita Garcia said she has repaid all \$40,000 loaned to her by a local developer for her state assembly bid, which she abandoned in

On Dec. 28, 2011, Moss Landing Commercial Park, LLC, a company owned by Nader Agha, loaned Garcia the money for her assembly campaign, which she dropped in January in favor of running for county supervisor against incumbent, Dave Potter.

Garcia said she wanted to clear up rumors

that the money Agha loaned her had been a contribution.

"It was a \$40,000 loan," Garcia told The Pine Cone Tuesday. "It's been paid back 100 percent. None of that money has ever been used. It was a loan, which is very different than a contribution."

Apart from Agha's loan, Garcia loaned herself \$500 on Nov. 30, 2011, for her assembly run.

According to the state Secretary of State's website, Garcia for Assembly from July 1, 2011 to Dec. 31, 2011 raised \$51,300.98 through loans and contributions — and spent

IF YOU'RE dreading the notion of listening to hours of pre-game football chatter on television in advance of Sunday's Super Bowl, an art reception for a father-daughter painting duo offers a refreshing alternative.

While the elder Pickford preferred to paint landscapes with watercolors, his daughter takes a more abstract approach. "Our work is so different that I


almost called this exhibit, 'Apples and Oranges.'"

BETTY BUCKLEY COVERS BROADWAY, UKELELES UNITE IN C.V.

TURNING GENDER roles in popular music upside down, singer Betty Buckley pays tribute to "The Boys of Broadway" at Sunset Center Saturday, Feb. 4.

Although Buckley has sung her share of Broadway classics, she has long admired many songs written specifically for male actors. In response, she's put together a show around

that theme. "I've wanted to sing these songs for quite a few years," Buckley told The Pine Cone this week.

Among Buckley's favorites are a pair of songs from "West Side Story" — "Jet Song" and "Maria."

"I had a huge crush on Russ Tamblyn," said Buckley, referring to the actor who played "Riff" in the 1961 film version of "West Side Story."

By singing songs intended for male actors, Buckley is carrying on a lengthy stage tradition that dates back to the 17th century in England.

"My voice is not operatic," Buckley explained. "There were no parts in the opera for girls with voices like mine."


As a result, if Buckley had lived a century or two ago, I would have been limited to playing the roles of boys. "Women often played young men in the British Music Hall," she said

Still, they were hardly accepted by everybody. "At the time, it was quite scandalous for women to put on trousers," she noted.

Buckley herself put on a pair of pants when she dressed as a young man for Rupert Holmes' stage version of "The Mystery of Edwin Drood" in 1985.

An actress and a singer with with an extensive stage, film and television resume, Buckley is perhaps best known for

Burger place takes shape, Scheid celebrates, and everyone gets romantic

THE BONES of restaurateur David Fink's upscale burger bar are emerging as construction crews finish demolishing the interior of the former bank and architect's office at the southwest corner of Carmel Plaza.

"I never announce an opening day, but it will probably be mid-to-late spring — which gives us until June 21," he said this week. "But it will probably be before then."

Fink reported the construction at the restaurant, which will be called David's Gourmet Burgers & Fries, is on schedule, and discussions about the details of the menu are ongoing. A concept menu presented to the city last year as Fink worked to get his permits included several gourmet burgers and a few other sandwiches, sides, beer and wine, and milkshakes and desserts.

"We haven't started cooking the menu

and testing the items, so there's always the chance things will change," he said. "But our menus always change. It's going to be delicious."

Chef Jason Balestrieri, who runs the kitchen at Fink's Cantinetta Luca on Dolores Street, is a partner in David's, and he and pastry chef Ron Mendoza, who works at Fink's other downtown restaurant, Aubergine, have been collaborating.

"It's a simple menu at David's, so he'll be overseeing the cooks there, but he won't be turning burgers," Fink said of Balestrieri.

The beef will be freshly ground, and vendors from Monterey County and the San Francisco Bay Area will provide most of the ingredients.

"We have a pretty good network of suppliers and are going to make as much as we can in house," he said.

The restaurant will be "really light and airy," with a clean, colorful, modern design

created by Fink's ex-wife, Kathleen. "It certainly won't feel like a diner," he said.

And the kitchen will contain Hayward-based Montague's first-ever cast-iron griddle, which provides a better charred crust on burgers. The company, which started in 1857, has built all of Fink's restaurant kitchens.

"It will be the only one in America. It's a big deal for Montague and a really big deal for us," he said. "I'm just excited for all our friends and fans of our other places to check us out soon."

flight. The tasting room is open from 11 a.m. to 7 p.m. Scheid will also offer discounts of 15 percent off all bottles and 20 percent off a case or more throughout the weekend.

And at Casanova Restaurant at Mission and Fifth, starting at 6 p.m. Feb. 3, Scheid's wines will be sipped alongside a special menu created be executive chef John Cox.

"We were able to taste a number of the wines from Scheid and have come up with a menu that I think will really complement the bottles they selected," Cox said.

The dishes he created include local Dungeness crab with mango and avocado — "just a simple bite to get things started" — to be served with Isabelle sparkling wine; natural marrow bone with sautéed escargot and Big Sur chanterelles, paired with Reserve Chardonnay; roasted squab breast with chestnut purée, crispy Brussels sprouts and squab leg confit, served with Reserve Pinot Noir Clone 777; and braised bison short rib with wild huckleberries and Nantes carrots paired with Reserve Claret. Rogue Creamery's Caveman Blue Cheese and house-made fruit bread will be enjoyed with Closing Bell Port, and the meal will conclude with Casanova dark chocolate truffles.

Winemaker Dave Nagengast and Scott Scheid will be on hand to talk about the wines during the dinner, which costs \$150 per person (\$130 for wine club members), all inclusive. Reservations may be made by calling (831) 455-9990 or emailing sara@scheidvineyards.com.

■ Breakfast in the sky

At the California Market in the Hyatt Carmel Highlands, they think of everything. Where else, after all, can you request a soft, heavy blanket to drape over your knees while eating breakfast on the heated deck, taking in a panoramic view of the Pacific Coast on a clear but chilly winter morning? Each table also contains a set of binoculars for whale watching, a popular pastime during the annual migration. Those touches, combined with attentive service (your coffee cup is never empty — which is always important, but especially so in the morning) and a diverse menu, make it a tempting breakfast destination.

Under the guidance of executive chef Matt Bolton, the kitchen turns out Signature Specialties like a zucchini and cheese frittata served in a metal skillet with ciabatta toast (\$14), and a ham and cheese panini with a fried egg and Dijon spread (\$13). Several iterations of Eggs Benedict, from the classic (\$16), to the Point Lobos (turkey, avocado and cilantro) and the vegetarian California Benedict (both \$17), are available. The classic Benedict with local Dungeness crab and spinach added (\$18), is definitely worth the indulgence.

For those endowed with a sweet tooth, the menu includes Sticky Bun French Toast and Cinnamon French Toast (both \$13), while fans of hash can choose from corned beef or chicken (both \$15).

■ Monterey has an airport?

As the head of several inns in Carmel, including the Forest Lodge and the Lamp Lighter, Bobby Richards has a lot of opportunity to talk to visitors and always makes note of their comments.

"I keep an ear out for things that I can make better," he explained. A particular revelation that continues to surprise him — and which can be easily remedied — is that out-of-towners are unaware Monterey has a commercial airport.

"I'm constantly asking people if they want to stay an extra night, and I always hear the same thing: 'We have an early flight out of S.F., so we have to go stay in some crummy hotel near the airport so we don't have to drive,'" he said. When he asks why they didn't fly out of Monterey, "it's because they don't realize Monterey has an airport."

But that might change if restaurants, hotels and stores in Carmel and the Peninsula put the little Fly Monterey logo on their websites and include the link to the airport (which recently announced Alaska Airlines will begin offering non-stop Monterey-San Diego flights in June).

Richards is encouraging his fellow business owners to include the airport link on their websites, since more people knowing about and using the airport would mean longer stays, more eating, more drinking, more shopping and more spending on the Peninsula.

"It would be a more popular airport, which would create more flights, which would encourage more people to come here and to stay here longer," he said.

ing taking out big loans in his name. Loftus was left with virtually nothing.

"Because all the financial abuse, he died a pauper," Hespe said.

On Aug. 12, 2011, Harper agreed to settle the lawsuit by paying Loftus \$1 million. Superior Court Judge Kay Kingsley approved the terms of the agreement, which required Harper to pay the money to Loftus within 60 days.

Less than a month later, though, Harper filed for bankruptcy in U.S. District Court claiming he was broke and unable to pay Loftus. But because the settlement was made when Loftus was alive, Hespe said the agreement is still binding and will transfer to his surviving heirs, which include two adult children.

The \$1 million "is an asset like any other asset, and it will go to his children," Hespe said. "They have a right to collect on that against Charles Harper. We believe justice will continue to be done."

After the suit was filed, professional caregivers took care of Loftus at his Carmel home. Months later, Loftus was at Carmel Hills Care Center, the Monterey nursing where he lived until his death.

Before his retirement, Loftus, an internist, had a long and distinguished medical career, which included treating President Lyndon Johnson when he was a senator and being a personal physician for the head of NATO in the 1950s.

'Someone to protect his rights'

A few months after Loftus hired Hespe to file suit against Harper in February 2010, Hespe said it was clear Loftus had no more cash to pay for legal representation. Hespe and his law partner, Albert Nicora, decided to work for Loftus for nothing. The attorneys and staff in their office staff spent hundreds of hours on the case.

"I did it on a pro bono basis because Dr. Loftus clearly needed someone to protect him and stand up for this rights, and he simply could not afford to pay an attorney," Hespe said.

"What Harper did was such a horrible and sad injustice in my opinion, that I simply could not let him get away with it. I was afraid that Harper would continue to commit this type of elder abuse on future victims if someone did not stand up to him."

When a Pine Cone reporter called Harper

late last year for comment, he said he no longer wanted to be contacted by the newspaper.

Meanwhile, Loftus made specific plans for his death, according to Hespe.

"The instructions were to cremate him and mix his ashes with his deceased wife's - who was the love of his life — and scatter them in the ocean in front of his house on Scenic Road," Hespe said.

"There was light smoke in the kitchen — you could tell that something had been burning, but that was it," Pangburn said. A steel backsplash behind her electric stove was warm to the touch, firefighters discovered, and cabinets below the sink and close to where the woman had been lying showed scorch marks.

At a Santa Clara County trauma center, Wyatt later died, and the coroner there took over the case.

The circumstances under which she died remain a mystery. "There's not a lot to go on," Pangburn said. "The caregiver had been gone for about an hour, so it's unknown what time this actually happened. We just know there was this one-hour window, and that's it."

Brinton's was a mainstay of the local retail scene for a half-century. But according to a former employee, the store was in trouble financially. The Prim Family Partnership sued Brinton's in 2009 for unpaid rent. Meanwhile, Santa Barbara Bank & Trust filed a lawsuit Jan. 27, alleging Brinton's owes \$479,305.68 from an unpaid 2009 loan. Lombardo, meanwhile, said the store was more than \$100,000 behind in its rent.

After employees were informed Jan. 22 of the store's closure, eight filed claims for back wages and vacation pay with the state labor board.

As for the store's inventory, Lombardo said it is gone.

"The inventory was moved out in the dead of the night last weekend," he explained. "I don't know if [Brinton] is planning to open another store."

Former customers, meanwhile, wonder if they'll be able to redeem gift certificates issued by Brinton's as recently as December.

Calls to the Brinton's residence have gone unanswered, and a message was not returned.



"Whereas the first truck arrived on the scene relatively quickly, when they attempted to hook up their lines to the hydrant, it only trickled water. Since there was no water, safety rules forbade Cal Fire from attacking the blaze with only the water contained on the engines, and the owners and neighbors were forced to watch the fire grow for a reported 10 to 15 minutes before being able to begin to quell the blaze," reported property owner Peter Baird. "The neighbors are incensed this could happen, particularly given the assurances all Carmel residences expect in such an instance.'

Aysha Taff said, "The county water main(s) on our street had no water pressure during the fire. The firefighters were forced to wait for at least 15 minutes while a water truck from Pebble Beach was dispatched to come to their aid. Many of us witnessed the firefighters bracing for the water to come out of the hoses, and then a minuscule trickle (less than a garden hose) actually emerging." She also said firefighters complained about water mains producing inadequate water pressure.

A man who did not want to be identified said he witnessed firefighters apparently scrambling for another hose after not getting water from one of the lines, and he believed the hydrant did not have enough flow. He said a sheriff's deputy standing nearby also seemed concerned about the apparent lack of water.

Fire officials answer

Following the rush of questions and concerns from

Mission Fields residents, chief officials with Monterey Fire Department and Cal Fire — both of which responded to the blaze — sought to set the record straight.

"I have spoken with all Monterey Fire personnel that responded, and no one said anything about the hydrants not working or water mains having troubles," said MFD Assistant Chief Stew Roth.

He further explained that onlookers probably misunderstood what was occurring. "While the garage was very involved with fire, the Cypress crew went inside to protect the unburned structure by spraying water on the fire from inside the house to protect the residence and reduce property damage," he explained. "When those efforts take place, we do not spray water from the outside on the fire, as this could severely injure or kill firefighters by pushing fire on them or steaming them to injury or death."

As a result, firefighters outside the home were waiting for their turn to attack.

"The neighbors' concern are very common in these types of incidents, because they can't see the fire attack from within and are watching crews outside not spraying water standing around," he said. "What they really saw was a very well coordinated attack by two very well trained departments working together collectively for the best outcome of the resident."

Roth, who oversees training for the department, added that operating guidelines "allow (and encourage) the captain of the first arriving engine company to go in and begin fire attack without a hydrant water supply."

In fact, he said, tests conducted after the state imposed new firefighter safety rules indicated that going straight to the hydrant, rather than using water stored on the engine,

"cost more time and allowed the fire to grow bigger."

Consequently, requires the first engine at the scene to "begin immediate and aggressive fire attack using the 500 gallons of water on [the] engine," and the second arriving engine to assist the first crew, while the third will connect to the hydrant. A ladder truck enables firefighters to attack the blaze from above.

"We have had great success with this model," Roth said. "Additionally, being the training guy that I am, we encourage what I like to call 'catastrophic failure drills,' which encourage and facilitate quick recognition of problems (such as a failing hydrant) and find a fast and effective solution without interrupting your operations."

Cal Fire Assistant Chief Dennis Carreiro said his agency follows similar policies and procedures. He further reported there were no problems getting water from the hydrant during the Mission Fields fire, which started when sparks landed in sawdust accumulated below machinery in Travaille's garage workshop, where kindling kept in containers also ignited. Cal Fire investigators concluded the sparks resulted from Travaille sharpening chisels the night before.

"Our fire captains are encouraged to attack the fire with tank water and have the next arriving engine provide for the continuous water supply from the closest hydrant," Carreiro explained. "There were no issues with the hydrant."

During the incident, which Travaille reported at 8:42 a.m., Monterey Fire's engine from the City of Carmel was the first to arrive at 8:48 a.m., followed 10 seconds later by Cal Fire's engine, and they both made initial attacks, while the third engine, also from Cal Fire, hooked up to the hydrant. A total of four engines with 21 firefighters worked to put out the fire, which was contained just after 9:15 a.m.

Cal Fire spokesman Jonathan Pangburn suggested any delays onlookers perceived had to do with getting the utilities to the house shut off after firefighters reported sparking wires. The home had no exterior circuit box for the electrical service, and the gas shutoff was in a cupboard in the garage that had sheets of plywood stacked in front of it.

We had to wait for PG&E to come turn it off at the line," he said. "That was a delay, but that's a safety consideration:

> You don't want to get a bunch of people electrocuted, so you have to wait. Securing the utilities was definitely awkward in this case."

Carreiro said the Cypress Fire Protection District, which is responsible for fighting fires in Mission Fields, and the nearby Carmel Highlands and Pebble Beach fire districts, "have an aggressive fire hydrant maintenance and testing program," which calls for working with local water companies to test the flows from 20 percent of the districts' hydrants every year. Pangburn said the

was checked just last year. The Monterey Fire Department, which recently acquired the Carmel Fire Department, has a similar program. While 29 of the 201 fire hydrants in Carmelby-the-Sea were found to have insufficient flows in 2006, those have since been repaired or removed.

If there's a Costco card in your wallet, do your community a favor and burn it. And then go spend some money at the store around the corner.


Pat yourself on the back

Today, given the global economy's intertwined dependence on pencils, regular government intervention is necessary to control the pernicious nature of unfettered capitalism and protect the interests of writers everywhere.

For example, in recent years, No. 2 pencils have developed a virtual monopoly in this corner of the writing instrument market. Therefore, unless regulators provide protection to No. 3 pencils going forward, they face a clear and present danger of becoming extinct, much like what happened to No. 1 pencils in years past. Also, it is obvious to anyone who has ever filled in the "bubbles" on a standardized test that proper pencil safety is not being taught in many homes these days. If parents aren't going to do their job in this area, it is incumbent upon our public education system to intervene, lest someone's eye gets poked out.

Further, as we've come to understand, mechanical pencils are much better for the environment than traditional wood pencils. However, unless government incentives are

fish rescues, aquifer storage and recovery and other mitigation work to reduce adverse impacts to the Carmel River — the Peninsula's primary water source.

But in July 2009, the 8.325 percent charge that had been tacked onto Peninsula customers' California American Water bills was removed after Public Utilities Commission administrative law judge Maribeth Bushey ordered Cal Am to find another way to fund the Carmel River mitigation measures.

At a hearing in San Francisco Feb. 8, water district general manager Dave Stoldt and attorneys for the district will appeal to Bushey to reinstate the fee. If Bushey rejects the request, it could be crippling to the district and the work it does on the river, Stoldt

"It's hurting the water district quite a bit," according to Stoldt, who said the agency has a legal right to collect the fee.

Since 2009, however, the CPUC has issued several decisions against the water district, which, along with Cal Am and the Department of Ratepayer Advocates, have made failed attempts to get the fee reinstated. The CPUC most recently denied the request in March 2011.

To make up for the lost revenue, Cal Am had been reimbursing the water district for the river mitigation work until May 2011, when the CPUC said Cal Am could no longer reimburse the district.

'We are now paying them for the mitigation work [in a contract agreement], but it's much less than they were paid under the reimbursements," Cal Am spokeswoman Catherine Bowie told The Pine Cone.

The roughly \$1.5 million Cal Am will pay the district for the Carmel River work this year isn't enough to cover the district's expenses, according to Stoldt. In 2011, the amount the water district budgeted for the work was \$3.7 million and 16 workers.

"If [the fee] is not reinstated, some of the

things that would be at risk are fish rescues - and it looks like we may be headed into a drier year" when fish rescues in the Carmel River are most needed, Stoldt said.

Other conservation projects for the river that could be reduced or cut if the fee isn't reinstated include erosion control work, hydrology and plant life studies and habitat restoration in the Carmel lagoon.

It could also mean "a real threat" to the jobs of the district's 28 employees, who could face work furloughs or worse, Stoldt

"We would first look to things like furloughs," he explained. "But we have done the math and furloughs don't solve the problem. [Layoffs] would be on the order of five to eight positions."

The user fee has generated support by some, including the Carmel Valley Association, which contends the work is necessary for the health and vitality of the river. But the CPUC in a 2010 analysis expressed concern that "Cal Am's customers may be paying user fees to the management district for projects that may not be necessary or cost-effectively performed" by the district.

Stoldt said the user fee is more essential than ever because of the district's plans to fund future water supply projects, which could include expanded aquifer storage and recovery and groundwater replenishment projects.

"We are heading in the mode where there are a lot of potential capital expenditures," he

If Bushey rejects the water district's fee request, Stoldt said it will explore alternatives including a plan where the Monterey County Assessor could collect the fee on tax rolls, which Stoldt said is the "most secure" method of obtaining the money from Cal Am's customers. Dozens of wastewater agencies in the state, including the Carmel Area Wastewater District, use the mechanism to bill and collect their revenues, he

It's also possible, though unlikely, the water district could square off in court against the CPUC.

"I don't think any of us is thinking that is

an appropriate way to go," Stoldt said. "If we are successful in coming up with an alternative funding mechanism, that is probably in everybody's best interest."

Apart from the user fee, the water district generates revenue from property tax allocations, connection charges, permit fees and state grants.

In early 2011, the water district launched a public relations effort that included a \$1,500 advertisement in the Monterey County Herald urging Cal Am's customers to support the user fee, which they would pay every month. The ad asked ratepayers to sign an attached "support letter" and send it to CPUC President Michael Peevey.

But Peninsula residents have expressed dissatisfaction with the water district in recent years, going so far as to approve by a two-thirds margin a 2002 ballot measure calling for the district to be disbanded because of its reputation for curtailing water instead of supplying it.

Stoldt said the water district wants customers to understand that the user fee is necessary to protect the Carmel River and to come up with alternative water supply pro-

"The ratepayers of the Peninsula have said, 'We want a water supply," he said. "You can't have the resources without the

Bowie said Cal Am believes the water district has "expertise and experience to continue the work" on the Carmel River.

The CPUC is expected to consider the water district's request at the Feb. 8 meeting and issue a decision sometime after that.

"The importance of the emergency assistance team is when big things are going on, citizens would have to take the place of deputies on the street," said Balestreri, whose father, Ted, is co-owner of the Cannery Row Company. SEAT volunteers often conduct traffic and crowd control at events like the Monterey County Fair and parades, as well as during natural disasters, emergencies and searches for missing people. They can serve as security for the sheriff's command posts and aid other lawenforcement agencies as needed.

"We're always looking for good people to help," he said.

According to volunteer Cmdr. Phil Nash, who heads SEAT, candidates must be at least


18 years old and able bodied, possess a valid driver's license, have no felony convictions and be able to pass a background check by the sheriff's office. They must have the ability to respond on short notice and must be certified in first aid and CPR. In addition, they have to have training in federal law enforcement, military police work or corrections, or complete the police officers' arrest and firearms course. SEAT is therefore an good volunteer outlet for retired cops, as well as those who attended police academies but ended up in other career fields. (Anyone interested in volunteering for SEAT should contact Nash directly at (831) 901-9796.)

Balestreri is eager to see what the revamped SAC and its members, who number around 140 and will hopefully grow, can accomplish. Membership in SAC is open to anyone who hasn't been convicted of a felony or other serious crime, and Balestreri said the dues structure is under review, too, but should be solidified soon. With very little overhead, the money provided by members goes straight to benefit law enforcement efforts in the county.

"I'm excited," he said. "I came at an exciting time."

Murray is in for some competition for the crowd's love

■ 'Caddyshack' star is always a favorite, but now there's Tiger, too

OR 20 years, comedian Bill Murray has drawn big crowds at the AT&T Pebble Beach National Pro-Am, with his unscripted antics, silly hats and mismatched golfing attire.

But he's also a good golfer, and Murray's four-day comedy routine along the Pacific Ocean turned serious last year when he and his pro partner, D.A. Points, took the pro-am championship. Points also won the professional title, shooting 15 under par (271) and winning \$1,134,000.


So when Murray and Points are paired again beginning Feb. 9 at Pebble Beach, Spyglass Hill and the Shore Course at Monterey Peninsula Country Club, they're sure to have a strong following of celebrity seekers and serious golf fans.

But with Tiger Woods returning to the tournament after an 10-year absence, Murray will have some serious competition when it comes to drawing a gallery. Still the most famous golfer in the world and winner of 71 PGA Tour events, Woods is two years into a rehabilitated career after scandalous revelations about his personal life forced him to take a hiatus

Although Woods' participation in the AT&T was rumored last November, the world's former No. 1 player and winner of 14 majors, confirmed his entry via a Jan. 9 post on his website. He commented, "Pebble Beach might be the prettiest place on earth."

Yet, the superlatives don't erase the facts. Woods







THE HISTORY

When the Good Old Days really were

■ Romantic origins of the AT&T Pebble Beach National Pro-Am

By MIKE HALE

HOSE WITH youth on their side cringe when someone of advancing years waxes poetic about "the good old days." Yet in the case of the AT&T Pebble Beach National Pro-Am, it's not difficult to appreciate the romance, nostalgia and simplicity of the event's infancy.

It began in 1937, with Americans ready to put the Great Depression behind them. The era's most popular entertainer (and 3-handicapper) Bing Crosby came up with the idea of pairing pro golfers with his amateur buddies and Hollywood cronies for a tournament at Rancho Santa Fe Golf Club near San

It was a smashing success, until World War II put the tournament on hiatus. In 1947, Monterey civic leaders — in an effort to boost tourism — convinced Crosby to move the tournament to Pebble Beach. They called it the Bing Crosby Pro-Amateur Golf Championship, but it quickly became known as the Crosby Clambake — part golf tournament, part roving cocktail party, part dawdling walk.

This was before Tiger mania, and before AT&T tossed in its corporate chips. Before million-dollar purses and the pressures of competition sent most of the pros to their rooms before 8 p.m. Before privileged celebrities, CEOs and corporate-sponsored amateurs replaced the merry band of singers, actors, tipplers, raconteurs and club pros that dotted the field during Bing's era.

Looking back

It's 1947, and the wounds of World War II are still fresh in the minds of Americans. Soviet dictator Josef Stalin has taken over most of Eastern Europe and threatens to expand his murderous hegemony world wide. And with his spies penetrating high levels of the U.S. government, the House Committee on Un-American Activities collects a file with more than 1 million names of known or suspected

last played at Pebble Beach in the 2010 U.S. Open, finishing tied for fourth.

A decade earlier, Woods rallied from a sevenstroke deficit to win the AT&T and returned four months later to win the U.S. Open at Pebble Beach by a record 15 strokes. Woods tied for 13th at the AT&T in 2001 and tied for 12th in 2002, his last participation.

Woods' entry this year will mark his U.S. season debut in what the golfer hopes will begin his return to his former perch at the top of the sport. Although Woods was victorious last December at the Chevron World Golf Challenge, a small field invitational, he hasn't won on the PGA Tour since Sept. 13, 2009, with his victory in the BMW Championship. Last weekend, he finished Third at the Abu Dhabi Championship after starting the final round tied for the lead.

Woods' lone pro competitive appearance on the Monterey Peninsula since 2002 underscores a notso-subtle reminder of his ambivalence toward the AT&T and at least two of the tournament's former

Woods wasn't fond of Poppy Hills Golf Course, the NCGA layout formerly in the tournament's rotation. Likewise, Woods didn't like the tournament's slow rounds caused by its 180-player pro field, not to mention celebrities who sometimes had trouble reaching the greens or slowed things down by mugging for the crowd.

Known for its smooth and fair greens, MPCC will return for the third straight year as the replacement for Poppy Hills. And two years ago, AT&T pro-am field was cut to 156 pros. Its choice of celebrity players in recent years has also featured more skilled

"I'm excited to start my PGA Tour season at the AT&T Pebble Beach National Pro-Am," Woods said on his website. "AT&T is a great partner to my foundation, and I'm looking forward to playing in this event. I haven't been to this tournament lately, but I have a lot of good memories at Pebble. It will be fun going back."


Woods will play in the pro-am with Tony Romo, the near scratch golfer and quarterback for the Dallas Cowboys. They played together in the 2009 AT&T National in Washington D.C. Romo played in the AT&T at Pebble Beach last year.

Tournament officials at the AT&T Pebble Beach Pro-Am, like any stop on the PGA Tour, welcomed Woods' announcement he would participate, which immediately boosted ticket sales.

Ollie Nutt, the longtime Monterey Peninsula Foundation CEO who's now a foundation advisor, noted at the pre-tournament media day in mid-January that ticket sales were up 35 percent from the same time in 2011. Likewise, Nutt added, "If Woods is in the mix [for the lead] on the weekend, we'll get a bump in the TV ratings, too.'

In recent years, Woods discarded the AT&T for the Dubai Desert Classic Pro-Am. Its dates not only overlap the AT&T, the tournament pays massive appearance fees and has a more lucrative purse. The HSBC Golf Championship in the United Arab Emirates reportedly paid the golfer as much as \$3 million to play.

In addition to Woods and Points, the AT&T field will include former three-time titlist Phil Mickelson as well as former winners Dustin Johnson, Vijay Singh and Arron Oberholser. The \$6.4 million event will also feature nine of the top-10 finishers from last

Avid golfer with talent for business tapped to run Monterey Peninsula Foundation

7HEN AN acquaintance on the Monterey Peninsula Foundation's board of directors asked Steve John if he could recommend any good candidates for the position of CEO of the nonprofit — which organizes the AT&T Pebble

Beach National Pro-Am every winter and The First Tee Open each summer — John said he knew just the right guy for the job: him.

Turns out he was right. John, a longtime golfer and First Tee Open vice chairman who owned and operated a successful car dealership in Santa Cruz for more than two decades, took over the leadership position of the MPF on Dec. 12, 2011. He's being advised by former CEO Ollie Nutt, while tourna-

ment director and MPF President Steve Worthy is leaving the organization to become CEO for another golfrelated nonprofit.

"Steve Worthy was moving back to New Orleans, and they had an opening, and I was called by one of the

board members who asked if I knew anyone who would be a good fit for the job," recalled John. "And I said, 'I am.'

He thought he would be a contender because he had successfully built the Ocean Honda dealership and loves

with a philanthropic approach: We supported the community and the youth and all the environmental things in a way that was genuine, and we were consistent," he said. "I think people recognized that. If you support your community, they're going to support you, and it really worked."


John also noted his 'real passion for golf," a sport he's played his whole life.





From high above, photographer captures golf's big picture

HE FINE art of golf course design is illuminated in the photographs of Joann Dost of Pebble Beach, who uses a camera — and at times, a helicopter — to capture large, striking images of the game's most beautiful courses and the landscapes that complement them.

"The coastal golf courses look fantastic on the ground," explained Dost, whose work is on display at Gallery Sur on Sixth Avenue in Carmel. "But they look even more gorgeous and revealing from the air. They really take shape when you see them from a helicopter."

Recognized today as one of the world's most accomplished golf course photographers, Dost had a very different goal in mind when she first set foot on a golf course as a youngster.

"I was the top athlete in whatever I did," said Dost, whose father was an Olympic-caliber speed skater and brother played baseball in the New York Mets organization. "My goal as a kid was to play a pro sport. But they didn't have pro basketball or softball for women back then. So I asked my dad to take me

to a golf course to see if it was something I wanted to

When she was 15, Dost's father took her to a women's professional golf tournament. "I can do that," she decided.

While Dost never became a star, she golfed professionally off and on for eight years and enjoyed a career most players can only dream of. She took golf lessons from Lee Trevino, had several Top 10 finishes during her five years on the Ladies Professional Golf Association tour, shot a low round of 66, and earned a living doing something she loved.

"I was a very good player, but I wasn't a great player," she said. "I fulfilled my dream."

In 1975, Dost first came to the Monterey Peninsula for a tournament. She fell in love with the area and moved here in 1977.

Dost had dabbled in photography for some time. Meeting Ansel Adams and several members of the Weston family only piqued her interest in the medium. "I took some workshops and started to photograph golf for the fun of it," she recalled.

One day in 1981, Clint Eastwood asked Adams if he would be interested in photographing the U.S. Open for a coffee table book. He said he was flattered by the offer, but he didn't know anything about golf. Meanwhile, Adams' personal assistant recommended Dost as a candidate for the job. The legendary photographer spent two hours with Dost looking over her portfolio before recommending her to Eastwood.

"That was the springboard that catapulted me to what I'm doing today," Dost recalled.

She discovered that capturing a good image of a golf course is no small challenge. Not only is camera-friendly light a notoriously fickle commodity on a shady course, but landscaping crews or golfers are a constant presence that only detracts from a perfect image. "When people look at a photograph of a golf course, they want to envision themselves out there—not someone else," suggested Dost, who lists the Pebble Beach and Cypress Point courses as two of her favorites.

Once just another player on the LPGA Tour, Dost has reached the top of her new game, golf photography. She's been showered with awards and praise, her photos grace the walls of the USGA museum and the World Golf Hall of Fame, and at least two past U.S. presidents own copies of her work.

Through photography, she has shared intimate moments with some of the game's greatest players. She celebrated her 50th birthday by playing a round of golf with Arnold Palmer, and she was commissioned to photograph Jack Nicklaus' final Open

Championship at St. Andrews in Scotland.

"You meet amazing people, and you go to great places with incredible landscapes," she said. "It's exciting every day I go out there. And I'll enjoy the shots I've taken until the day I die."

While Dost is proud of her accomplishments, she's still aiming for new horizons. In particular, she's hoping to pursue a couple of book projects and photograph the courses of Europe.

"I'm glad I quit playing golf professionally when I did, and went into photography and created a niche of my own," she added. "But if you try and stay where you are, you aren't going to learn or grow. I'm trying to grow my skills every time I go out there as a photographer — just like when I play golf."

Marc Rolnic, or perhaps an angora sweater for a "more feminine look," says manager Chris Kleinsorge.

The store, which has been open for eight years and is owned by Jeff and Napisa Pollock, boasts everything from collars made from African beads, to every girl's favorite: Chew toys from "Chewy Vuiton" and "Sniffany and Company."

For the traditionalist pooch, plaid attire is also available. Bigger dogs might be happier sporting a lightweight bow tie.

And what if the infamous "Crosby weather" sets in? Kleinsorge says, they carry "ponchos, including a few packable ones," along with "real cute slickers for the little dogs."

Bob Hope, a regular at the tournament from its early years as the Crosby Pro-Am, once said, "If I'm on the course and lightning starts, I get inside fast. If God wants to play through, let him."

Lee Trevino, the 1972 tournament champion, took a different approach: "If you're caught on a golf course during a storm and are afraid of lightning, hold up a 1-iron. Not even God can hit a 1-iron."

That advice seems suspect, particularly since Trevino was struck by lightning on a golf course in 1975.

If it does start to rain, shoppers can dash into Travel Bag Luggage (219

Crossroads Blvd.) where owners Jill and Steve McAlpine have umbrellas, raincoats, hats — and even a portable seat that also is an umbrella.

If it gets chilly, Jill has a new kind of gloves that allow the wearer to operate a smart phone without removing them, thanks to technology-friendly finger and thumb tips.

"Aren't these great?" she exclaims as she models them.

She also is excited about the line of Scottevest Travel Vests — "Look at all these pockets!"

Indeed, the vest seems to have a pocket for everything, from an iPad, to a wallet and a digital camera.

It seems that people from all walks of life have commented on the game at one time or another — author Harper Lee ("To Kill a Mockingbird") said, "Well, they're Southern people, and if they know you are working at home, they think nothing of walking right in for coffee. But they wouldn't dream of interrupting you at golf."

The comment, "Golf is a good walk spoiled," has been attributed to Mark Twain.

Either author would likely approve of a book-shopping expedition to River House Books (208 Crossroads Blvd.). In addition to, "Pebble Beach: The Official Golf History," the store has a variety of books about golf — including one called "The 19th Hole: Architecture of the Golf Clubhouse" by Richard Diedrich and Jack Nicklaus.

Two other books popular with golfers are, "The Match: The Day the

Game of Golf Changed Forever," and, Grand Slam: Bobby Jones, America, and the Story of Golf," both by Mark Frost.

Golfers are driven by the desire to improve. The late President Gerald Ford (a pro-am favorite) said, "I know I am getting better at golf because I am hitting fewer spectators."

Arnold Palmer gave this piece of advice: "I have a tip that can take 5 strokes off anyone's game. It's called an eraser."

If you're thinking of taking his

advice, Spencer's Stationery (233 Crossroads Blvd.) can supply anyone's eraser needs — along with golf-themed items, from cocktail napkins to gift bags and local postcards.

Finally, a stop for a cocktail — whether at Sticks at Spanish Bay or Stillwater Bar and Grill at Pebble Beach — is always a nice way to round out a day of shopping, celebrity-spotting, or watching the pros work their magic. Just remember Dean Martin's advice: "If you drink, don't drive. Don't even putt."

The Monterey Peninsula is a golfer's heaven-on-earth

T'S THE greatest meeting of land and sea, and that makes the Monterey Peninsula a natural venue for scenic, challenging and compelling golf courses — and indeed, the area is home to many. So many, there's a course for every level of ability and budget, from bargain rounds at hidden

gems, to over-the-top splurges on pristine fairways and greens, accompanied by a fabulous lunch in a fancy restaurant.

The world famous Pebble Beach Golf Links, which is hosting the AT&T Pebble Beach National Pro-Am Feb. 6-12, may be off limits during the tournament, along with fellow host courses Spyglass Hill and Monterey Peninsula Country Club, but myriad

other destinations await the golfer who wants to get out and test his own skills instead of spending the whole week watching others have all the fun.

Add some splendid winter weather, and you have a recipe for golf nirvana.

■ Bayonet and Black Horse, Seaside

Created in Fort Ord's heyday for military use, these two courses now belong to Seaside Resort Development and underwent \$13 million renovation, reopening last year following a comprehensive redesign by Gene Bates. The courses were named to Golf Digest's list of Best Remodels for 2009 and placed 15th on the magazine's list of Best Public Courses in California in 2010. Gen. Robert McClure, original designer of Bayonet in 1954, was known for his left-handed slice and designed the holes accordingly, with severe doglegs running right to left. The 7,104-yard par-72 course was named for the 7th Infantry Light Fighter Division, nicknamed the Bayonet Division, and was infamous for its grueling Holes 11 though 13, known as Combat Corner. Gen. Edwin Carns designed Black Horse, which is now 7,024 yards and also has a par of 72, in 1963, and it was bestowed with the nickname of the 11th Calvary Regiment, which had been stationed on the other side of the bay at the Presidio of Monterey from 1919 to 1940. The courses have hosted the PGA's Qualifying School and the AT&T Pebble Beach National Pro-Am's companion event, the First Tee Open. Bayonet and Black Horse are located at 1 McClure Way in Seaside and include a full-service clubhouse, restaurant, pro shop, custom club fitting and driving range. Club rentals and professional instruction also available. Green fees run \$35 (for juniors) to \$120. Call (831) 899-PAR1 (7271) or visit www.bayonetblackhorse.com.

■ Carmel Valley Ranch, Carmel Valley

Closed in 2007 while undergoing a multimilliondollar makeover overseen by Gene Bates, the 6,117yard, par-70 golf course created by Pete Dye and built in 1981 reopened in 2008 to great fanfare and much anticipation on the part of its members and guests. The stunning 500-acre Carmel Valley Ranch - which was purchased a couple of years ago and underwent an overhaul not long ago — sits just east of mid-valley, with the course running along the Carmel River and up the base of nearby hills. C.V. Ranch seeks to offer the quintessential private country club experience to players, and the course was named among the best in the country by readers of Conde Nast's Travel + Leisure magazine. The course has "earned a reputation for its stunning views, friendly wildlife, tactical challenges and playability," according to the owners, and "the location just a few miles from the coast means that temperatures are comfortable, offering ideal playing conditions year-round." Its two signature holes, 11 and 13, offer breathtaking drops into the valley, while other holes wind through vineyards, lavender fields and ponds. Rates range from \$85 to \$195. Nine-hole rates are also available, as are club and shoe rentals — and don't miss the great Happy Hour at the clubhouse. Carmel Valley Ranch is located at One Old Ranch Road off of Carmel Valley Road just east of Mid Valley Shopping Center. For more information. call (831) 626-2510 or visit www.carmelvalleyranch.com.

■ Corral de Tierra Country Club, Salinas

The private 6,683-yard par-72 course, situated off the Monterey-Salinas Highway and graced with some of the best weather on the Peninsula, was designed by Bob Baldock in 1960. It was redesigned in 1999 and 2000 by J. Michael Poellot to offer the

added challenges of a multitude of bunkers. Its gentle elevation changes and tree-lined fairways also make it a great walking course. Corral de Tierra has served as a site for U.S. Open qualifying rounds and hosted the 2010 sectional qualifier for the Women's U.S. Open Championship. Corral de Tierra is located a few miles east of Los Laureles Grade on Highway 68 (Monterey-Salinas Highway), and is open only to members and guests. Inquire about reciprocal agreements with other private clubs. For information, call (831) 484-1112 or visit www.corraldetierracc.com.

■ Cypress Point Club, Pebble Beach


Designed in 1928 by renowned course architect Alister MacKenzie, the 6,509-yard, par-72 Cypress Point

course is known all over the world, in part for its breathtaking par-3 16th Hole that entices braver players to fire their tee-shots over the frothing sea. Golfer Marion Hollins first conceived of the idea in 1924 and pursued the development of a first-class golf course and a clubhouse containing a handful of sleeping rooms. Membership would be limited to 200 people who would pay about \$2,500 (in 1924 dollars) to subscribe. The club, which in the past hosted the Walker Cup, is open only to members and their guests. sometimes merely called "Old D," by locals, the Del Monte Golf Course was designed by golf and polo enthusiast Charles Maud and built in 1897, making it the oldest continuously operated course west of the Mississippi River. (The course at the Presidio in San Francisco was built a year earlier but was temporarily converted to a drill field during the Spanish-American War.) Owned and operated by the Pebble Beach Company, Del Monte G.C. — 6,365 yards from the blue tees, par 72 — is open to the public and is home to the Monterey Bay Golf Club, founded in 1932. Del Monte was the original site of the California State Amateur and still hosts the annual Callaway Golf Pebble Beach Invitational and The First Tee Open each fall. "Del Monte Golf Course features wide fairways lined with oak, pine and cypress trees and the back nine includes a treacherous par-5, 512-yard 13th hole," according to the resort. Greens fees are \$110. Carts, pull carts and Callaway rental clubs available. Old D is located at 1300 Sylvan Road adjacent to the Hyatt Regency Monterey, with its full-service restaurant, TusCA, a lounge and Knuckles sports bar for post-round revivification. For more information, call (831) 373-2700 or visit www.pebblebeach.com.

■ Laguna Seca Golf Ranch, Monterey

Robert Trent Jones Sr. and Robert Trent Jones Jr. designed this public course together in 1970 in their first joint venture, which yielded "18 beautiful holes that follow the natural terrain of the oak-studded

coastal hills along the Monterey-Salinas corridor." The 6,157-yard, par-71 course is located off of Highway 68 east of the Monterey Airport and can be reached by turning north on York Road and following it to the end. Green fees range from \$20 to \$70. A 13-acre natural grass practice facility and Cobra golf club rentals also available. For information, call (831) 373-3701 or visit www.lagunasecagolf.com, which also features online specials.

■ The Links at Spanish Bay, Pebble Beach

"Spanish Bay recalls the original Scottish concept of the game golf established over five hundred years ago ... Here, the golf course provides you with the choice of using your regular shot or a low, running shot to play the firm turf while keeping the ball under the steady ocean breezes," according to P.B. Resorts. Open for public play, the 6,821-yard par-72 Spanish Bay links were jointly designed by Robert Trent Jones, Jr., former USGA president Sandy Tatum and Tom Watson, who once remarked, "Spanish Bay is so much like Scotland, you can almost hear the bagpipes." "Links" refers to the old Scottish term for a sandy seaside wasteland with bristly grasses and stiff prevailing winds, and the Monterey coastline is reminiscent of the rugged beauty of that country. The course overlays land once occupied by a sand mine and included extensive rehabilitation of the dunes and native plants in the area. Remember to listen for the bagpiper who notifies golfers that the day's play is coming to an end, and then head inside for some food and libation at Roy's, Pèppoli or Sticks. The rate is \$260 (which includes cart for resort guests). Carts and caddies available. The course is located at 2700 17 Mile Drive in Pebble Beach. For reservations, call (800) 654-9300 or visit www.pebblebeach.com.

■ Monterey Peninsula Country Club, Pebble Beach

Monterey Peninsula Country Club was founded in January 1925 when Sam Morse, James Habbord and Thorwell Mullally decided to combine a golf club with housing, and Morse served as the first president of the MPCC board of directors. Two courses make up MPCC: the Dunes Course, which was designed by Seth Raynor in 1926 and redesigned by Rees Jones, and the Shore Course, which was designed by Bob Baldock and Pebble Beach Golf Links architect Jack Neville in 1961, and then remodeled in 2003 and 2004 by architect Michael Strantz. Open only to members and their guests, the Dunes course runs a 6,762-yard par 72 from the gold tees. The Shore Course reopened with a par-72 yardage of 6,806, also from the golds. While the Dunes Course first hosted what was then called the Crosby Pro-Am after the star brought his clambake to Pebble Beach in 1947, and did so for 18 years before being replaced by Spyglass Hill, the Shore Course was selected to replace Poppy Hills as a new venue three years ago in what is now called the AT&T Pebble Beach National Pro-Am. ■ Monterey Pines Golf Course, Monterey

Communists, "dupes" and "bleeding-heart liberals."

The whole country needs to blow off steam. Golf, celebrity and an endless round of martinis help provide the remedy.

Meanwhile, Carmel has becomes a busy city, despite the sway of artists and bohemians who follow a different drummer. City leaders are busy collecting bids to build a new police station, while the citizens choose sides in a \$450,000 school bond special election that would help build two primary schools.

A two-bedroom house in Carmel Woods lists for \$12,500. A gallon of gas is 15 cents, mailing a letter costs three pennies, and a man's suit at Holman's in Pacific Grove can be had for \$14.95. Carmel's Golden Bough Playhouse plays "Getting Gertie's Garter" starring Dennis O'Keefe and Marie McDonald.

Bing Crosby's arrival is front-page news. He is the biggest entertainer of his time — a leader in record sales, radio ratings and motion picture grosses. It's estimated that during the era following the war, half of all radio airtime is dedicated to Crosby's music. He is routinely listed in polls as the man most admired.

And he's someone other big-time stars like to brush up against, making the Clambake a star-studded event.

Golf is perceived by most to be a game for the country club elite. Suddenly, Crosby and his animated crew show the world that it's cool to play golf.

The event sells out, and the Monterey Peninsula Herald reports that every hotel room in the area is booked. Crosby is named honorary police chief for the event. A tournament day pass costs \$1, available at all three courses (Pebble Beach Golf Links, Cypress Point Club and Monterey Peninsula Country Club), the State Theater in Monterey or at three local sporting goods stores. Proceeds benefit the charities Sister Kenny Foundation for Infantile Paralysis and the Monterey Peninsula Community Chest. Parking is free.

As a gesture of thanks and goodwill to civic leaders and volunteers, Crosby digs into his pocket to stage a huge party on the eve of the tournament, complete with dinner, open bar and entertainment provided by his Tinseltown mates.

On Day 1, the crowd — a mix of celebrities and star-struck locals — shows up early, overwhelming

ticket-takers. There are no bleachers, so they stand — gentlemen in proper gallery attire, complete with tie and hat, women wearing dresses and carrying parasols.

Crosby's pal, entertainer Phil Harris, sets the tone by arriving at the 1st Tee with a glass of his favorite whiskey, announcing he's a pro from the "Jack Daniels Country Club."

The purse in 1947 is \$10,000 (in 2012 it will be an astounding \$6.4 million). Ed Furgol of Detroit, Mich., finishes tied for first with George Fazio of Los Angeles, and each takes home a check for \$1,625. Club pro Newt Bassler of Carmel finishes tied for third and earns \$733. (The 2011 AT&T winner, D.A. Points, earned \$1,134,000).

Following a presentation of winners (each top amateur receives a new Philco radio), Crosby launches into a solo, followed by a duet with progolfer Jimmy Demaret.

The stars shine at night, showing up at The Pine Inn's rooftop garden dining room or its popular Red Parlor pub (there are no restaurants yet inside Pebble Beach). Other action takes place at two bistros, the Blue Ox and Biff's El Estero, or Mark Thomas' The Outrigger on Cannery Row.

Cadematori's in Monterey offers cocktails at its El Toro Cantina beginning at 2 p.m., with Italian dinners priced at \$3.

When the dust clears, Crosby tells civic leaders he wants to return the following year. He does so for three decades until his death (on a golf course) in 1977.

Back to the future

For many, today's tournament, while hugely popular and charitable (nearly \$100 million has been distributed through Monterey Peninsula Foundation), can't match Bing's era in terms of charm.

"It was more fun back then," says the tournament's longest running active volunteer, Ed Magner, 78, who coordinates the shuttle car fleet. "It's more complicated now, more pressure. The whole thing gets a little tense."

Magner started as a ticket seller in 1962, the year it snowed at Pebble Beach, cementing "Crosby Weather" into the local lexicon. The following year, Crosby invited two priests to play (and pray), and 1963 miraculously produced excellent weather — and another priceless anecdote from the good old days.

offers one of the best deals in town. "Those who have played are unanimous in their assessment of the course: challenging for all, well conditioned, great pace of play and friendly staff. The new course offers our servicemen and women an outstanding venue for golf at affordable rates. Monterey Pines is well on the way to being recognized as one of the best of all Navy Golf Courses," according to the Naval Postgraduate School, which operates Monterey Pines. Golfers who get a rush from being directly under the flight path of a regional airport should definitely put in a round at the U.S. Navy's golf course, which is also open to the public for very low rates. But the course is not without its darker stories, including the crash-landing of a Cessna on the 6th Fairway in September 2003 (no golfers were involved), and the crash of a Carmel Valley attorney's small plane in the driveway more recently. Robert Muir Graves designed the course in 1963, and it has been redesigned by Marc Messier. The remodel work that had the course closed in 2009 also included renovating the Monterey Pines Grill & Bar that now offers a private banquet room for meetings and special events, a bar, multiple televisions and new furnishings. The 5,409-yard, par-69 course is located at Garden and Fairgrounds roads in Monterey, near the Monterey Airport. A pro shop and professional instruction are available as well. ■ Pacific Grove Golf Links, Pacific Grove

Affectionately known as the "Poor Man's Pebble Beach," and ranked among Golf Magazine's Top 50

Golf Courses Under \$50, P.G. features a truly links-style back nine. Designed by Jack Neville — who also designed Pebble Beach Golf Links and Monterey Peninsula Country Club's Shore Course — and H. Chandler Egan in 1932 partly on land the city bought from Pebble Beach Company founder Sam Morse, this 5,732-yard par-70 public course is situated on prime real estate near Asilomar State Beach and surrounds the historic Point Pinos Lighthouse. The ocean scenery is unsurpassed, and the highly regarded Zagat Survey selected it as one of the best courses in the country in 2003. "The holes are unpretentious, reminiscent of an era when the 'par fours' were sometimes less than 300 yards and the 'par threes' could be contemplated by the com-

mon folk. There are not many bunkers, and the greens are small," according to the City of Pacific Grove, which also boasts of the course's scenery and ocean views. The new clubhouse, located at 77 Asilomar Blvd. in Pacific Grove, was completed in February 2006, and chef Dory Ford runs the Pt. Pinos Grill — a culinary gem. Fees for 18 holes range from \$20 to \$48. Discounts are offered for 9-hole play, twilight rounds and junior players 17 and under. Club rentals and lessons also available. Call the golf shop at (831) 648-5775 or visit www.pggolflinks.com for more information.



■ Pasadera Country Club, Monterey

Designed by Jack Nicklaus, Pasadera opened in spring 2000, just a few months before the U.S. Open was played at the Pebble Beach Golf Links. "The original landscape at Pasadera provided a unique opportunity to create a dramatic layout that incorporates selected design features reminiscent of the world's most revered layouts. The course evokes similarities to The Old Course at Saint Andrews, Augusta National, Pine Valley and Pebble Beach. It is my hope that golfers will enjoy the subtleties that Pasadera has to offer, from the opening tee shot, to the final putt," says Nicklaus, who designed the 6,743-yard par-71 course open only to members and their guests. Capitalizing on the existing hills, canyons and old oak groves, Nicklaus used natural-style bunkering and took advantage of splendid hazards, such as the awe-inspiring par 3 over a deep chasm. Located at 100 Pasadera Drive off Highway 68, Pasadera lies near Laguna Seca. The pro shop can be reached by calling (831) 647-2421.

■ Pebble Beach Golf Links, Pebble Beach


Situated on scenic coastal land originally slated for houses, Pebble Beach opened to the public in 1919 and is con-

sidered one of the greatest courses in the world. Its oceanfront holes, including the dramatic par-3 7th and the spectacular 18th, are particularly captivating. The course was designed by Jack Neville and Douglas Grant, but Jack Nicklaus designed the par-3 5th Hole dedicated in November 1998. Pebble Beach has been the site of five U.S. Open Championships — 1972, 1982, 1992, 2000 and 2010 — and was ranked the No. 1 Public Course in America by Golf Digest in 2005, 2007, 2008/2009 and 2009/2010. It is slated to host the U.S. Open again in 2019, in celebration of the course's centennial. "Since 1919, the exquisite beauty and unique challenge of Pebble Beach Golf Links have thrilled golfers and spectators alike," according to the resort. When not closed for tournaments, the course is open to the public, with priority given to resort guests. Green fees (\$495) include a cart for resort guests. Carts for non-resort guests are extra, and caddies are also available for a fee. For more information, call golf reservations at (800) 645-9300 or visit www.pebblebeach.com.

■ Poppy Hills Golf Course, Pebble Beach


Commissioned by the Northern California Golf Association, the 6,857-yard par-72 Poppy Hills was designed by Robert Trent Jones Jr. in 1986 and is open to the public. In 1991, Poppy Hills became one of the three courses

hosting each year's AT&T Pebble Beach National Pro-Am. That continued until it was replaced by the Monterey Peninsula Country Club's Shore Course three years ago. PGA Tour statistics in 2006 affirmed its 5th Hole as "the toughest on tour," and Poppy is known for its undulating fairways, challenging elevation changes and other characteristics designed to force golfers to carefully calculate their shots. Players enjoy Poppy Hills so much they named it No. 12 among the most popular golf courses in the United States, according to the 2007 Zagat Survey. Joining the NCGA can get you nearly 75 percent off green fees, and twilight rates are available. Rates range from \$25 to \$200. Carts are GPS equipped. The course, the first in the United States to be owned and operated by an amateur golf association, is located at 3200 Lopez Road in Pebble Beach. ■ The Preserve Golf Club, Carmel Valley


Tom Fazio designed this private, 7,004-yard par-72 course located among the "stands of massive ancient oaks, beautiful rolling meadows, ponds and streams" deep within the Santa Lucia Preserve and highlighted by the spectacular Santa Lucia Mountains. Fazio commented, "It's as if you are going on a grand hike and happen to have a golf club in your hand," and said the course has no signature hole, as the entire place is a signature property. Dave Nelson holds the course record 65. When the course opened in 1999, membership was limited to 300, all of whom had to be owners of property within the preserve's gates. But the club recently began accepting membership applications from non-property owners, making Fazio's gorgeous work and the course's stunning natural setting accessible to more people who will truly appreciate the opportunity to play it. Prospective members tour the club, meet with members and, if the fit seems good, are invited to apply and undergo an interview with the club's membership committee. ■ Quail Lodge Resort and Golf Club, Carmel Valley

The hotel shut its doors in November 2009, but the golf club continues to operate strongly, thanks to devoted members and capable employees who want everyone to know Quail remains viable. "A round of golf on our scenic Carmel Valley golf course is so relaxing, the wildlife may ask to play through. Go ahead and let them — when you're surrounded by hills and lakes this beautiful, it seems a shame to rush," crows Quail's website. lush, colorful landscaping — was designed in 1963 by Robert Muir Graves. It was honored by "Golf for Women" as one of America's most friendly facilities and hosted the Women's California Amateur Championship in 2009. The course is open to members and their guests. Green fees include carts and range balls. Reduced rates available for 9 holes and twilight play, as well as for juniors (17 and under). Practice facilities include a seven-acre driving range, a bunker, chipping areas and a 6,500-square-foot bent grass putting green. Located at 8000 Valley Greens Way, the course features a nicely appointed clubhouse and a restaurant, Edgar's, named for Quail's late founder, Ed Haber. ■ Rancho Cañada Golf Club, Carmel Valley


Situated along the Carmel River, Rancho Cañada features two 18-hole courses: the 6,357-yard par-71 West Course, with fairways described as "deceptively broad to needle narrow," and the 6,125-yard par-71 East Course, where the Carmel River comes into play on the front 9. Famed pro golfer Sam Snead once said the 15th Hole on Rancho Cañada's West Course was the narrowest hole he had ever played. Both designed by Robert Dean Putnam in 1970, the East and West courses are open to the public and are located at 4860 Carmel Valley Road in Carmel Valley, just a few miles from the coast. Rancho Cañada also offers grass practice facilities, tournament services, club rentals, a pro shop and a full bar. 
■ Spyglass Hill Golf Course, Pebble Beach


Designed by Robert Trent Jones Sr. in 1966 as part of the master plan for the Pebble Beach oceanfront, this resort/semiprivate course measures 6,953 yards at par 72 and takes its name from Robert Louis Stevenson's "Treasure Island." Local legend has it he spent time walking in the area while brainstorming, and many of its holes bear notable names, such as Black Dog and Billy Bones. The year after the course was completed, Spyglass replaced the Monterey Peninsula Country Club in the Bing Crosby Golf Tournament in 1967 and has been part of that contest - now the AT&T Pebble Beach National Pro-Am — ever since. In 2007/2008 and 2009/2010, Golf Digest ranked it No. 11 on its list of America's 100 Greatest Public Courses. According to the resort, "the first five holes roll through sandy seaside dunes challenging the golfer to carefully pick the safest path. The following 13 holes are cut through majestic pines with elevated greens and strategically placed bunkers and lakes to grab the errant shot." The rate to play is \$360. Carts and/or caddies available. The course is located at Stevenson Drive and Spyglass Hill Road in Pebble Beach. For reservations, call (800) 654-9300 or visit www.pebblebeach.com

■ Tehama Golf Club, Carmel Valley

Jay Moorish, who also designed Shadow Glen in Kansas City, Troon and Troon North in Scottsdale, and Loch Lomond in Scotland, created this 6,506yard par-71 course high in the hills above Carmel Valley. The hilltop course is described as being, "where the golf is legendary, the service is impeccable, and the memories last a lifetime." According to Tehama, "the tranquility and natural beauty of the land, combined with this time-honored game, provides the golfer a surreal hideaway." Owned by former Carmel Mayor Clint Eastwood, the course opened for private play in 1999 and climbs 200 feet in elevation during its 18 holes, six of which are uphill. Members and guests only. Carmel, Pacific Grove, Monterey chambers offer shuttles

O SAVE golf fans the trouble of parking almost a dozen miles out of town and then riding buses to the AT&T Pebble Beach National Pro-Am each day — and to give the crowds a chance to dine and shop in their cities — chambers of commerce in Carmel, Pacific Grove and Monterey offer shuttles to and from the tournament Wednesday through Sunday.

The Carmel Chamber of Commerce and the Carmel Innkeepers Association collaborate on a shuttle service that runs from 9 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. Wednesday, Feb. 8; from 6:30 a.m. to 5:30 p.m., Thursday through Saturday, Feb. 9-11; and from 7

a.m. to 5:30 p.m. Sunday, Feb. 12.

The buses leave from Carmel Plaza at Ocean Avenue and Junipero Street and drop riders off in Pebble Beach. Passes are \$20 per person per day or \$75 for a five-day pass. Ticket holders are allowed unlimited rides for the day, and they can leave their cars at the Sunset Center lot on Eighth between Mission and San Carlos, the Carmel Plaza garage on Mission between Ocean and Seventh, and the free Vista Lobos lot at third and Torres, as well as on the street. (Visitors should be aware of time limits on parking downtown, but most streets south of Eighth Avenue and north of Fourth Avenue offer all-day parking.)

The Carmel Chamber of Commerce Visitor

Center is located on San Carlos between Fifth and Sixth. Shuttle tickets and tournament any-day tickets may be purchased in advance at the visitor center, by calling (831) 624-2522 or by visiting www.carmelcalifornia.org. During the tournament, spectators can buy passes at the Carmel Plaza bus

In P.G., the shuttles depart every 30 minutes from the Pacific Grove Natural History Museum at 165 Forest Ave. at Central Avenue, and parking is available on the street and in city lots. The buses operate from 8 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. Wednesday, 6:30 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. Thursday and Friday, 6:30 a.m. to 6 p.m. Saturday, and 6:30 a.m. to 5 p.m. Sunday.

Tickets are \$20 per day or \$60 for a five-day pass, and must be purchased in advance at www.pacificgrove.org/2012-att-pro-am.html. For more information, call (831) 373-3304 or email chamber@pacific-

In Monterey, fans can park their cars in the Cannery Row Garage on Foam or the downtown West Garage at Tyler and Franklin and take the Monterey Express Shuttle. Shuttles pick up spectators on Cannery Row at Prescott next to Steinbeck Plaza, and in downtown Monterey in front of the Monterey Conference Center at Calle Principal and Del Monte.

Round-trip tickets cost \$15 per person, and the shuttle runs every 30 minutes from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. Wednesday, 6 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. Thursday through Saturday, and 6 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Sunday. For more information, visit www.canneryrow.com/att-shuttle-2012.php or www.oldmonterey.org.

understand charity work, and I understand golf."

It's not like he had to rescue the organization, either. John said the core group of nine full-time workers is a model of efficiency and effectiveness aided by the very capable Nutt.

"The foundation is so stable and so organized, and everyone has a role that's an important factor in the end result," he said. "It's a really strong group, they get along so well, and they've been here awhile. It's a passion.

One of the benefits of hosting a tournament annually is the ever present opportunity to make it better,

"Every year, they try to improve the experience for players, fans and sponsors," he said. "I think they've accomplished that."

Since John arrived at his new job almost two months ago, he has "been like a sponge," learning the ins and outs of the organization and the roles of everyone involved, from the staffers in charge of sponsorships and marketing, to the operations group dealing with "the three t's" - toilets, trailers and

"It's neat to see how organized it is," he said. "I knew it was, but every day confirms it."

John credits Nutt, who joined the MPF a dozen years ago, with using his business acumen to ensure the nonprofit is well run.

"Nothing falls through the cracks," he said. "No one says, 'Uh-oh' around here, and I've never been in a business where you didn't hear, 'Uh-oh,' once or twice an hour.'

Considering he was often on the sponsor's end of the equation as a business owner and philanthropist in Santa Cruz, John said one of his strengths is meeting with the people and businesses whose dollars make the tournament happen. The AT&T is a massive undertaking that involves thousands of volunteers at all three courses and has generated tens of millions of dollars for charity since Bing Crosby brought his Clambake to the Monterey Peninsula in 1947, and the foundation has launched its Drive to \$100 Million to push its fundraising over that significant threshold.

"I'm pretty good at relationships," he said. "I know what sponsors want, because I've been on the other end of it. I can talk their language.'

John said the support of title sponsor AT&T and the host golf courses — the Pebble Beach Golf Links, Spyglass Hill Golf Course and Monterey Peninsula Country Club — are crucial for the tournament's ongoing success.

"We're really lucky to have the courses and the partnerships," he said.


John anticipates great success for the MPF and its tournaments, given its dedicated workers, strong structure and extensive legacy.

"I could not be happier," he said. "I love everything about this job. I hope I never have to stop.
