Clint Eastwood's inspirational moment

■ Super Bowl spot: 'The people who are supposed to be smart didn't get it'

FOR TWO minutes during the Super Bowl half time Sunday, tens of millions of Americans were transfixed by a familiar voice uttering some unfamiliar and inspirational words about how the country could recover from its economic doldrums.

"This country can't be knocked out with one punch," said former Carmel Mayor Clint Eastwood, filmed in stark contrast against a gritty, industrial backdrop. "We get right back up again, and when we do, the world's gonna hear the roar of our engines."

The two-minute spot, aired at a cost of more than \$10 million, was sponsored by Chrysler, though it didn't feature any of the company's cars, and its logo didn't appear until the very end — an unusual approach a Chrysler spokesman said was appropriate for the "special occasion" when the commercial appeared, and for the stature of its star.

"We wanted to present a message of resilience and hard work, and we asked Mr. Eastwood to do it, because when he talks, people listen," said Chrysler's Chief Marketing Officer

Olivier François in a series of interviews Thursday at the Chicago auto show.

"I haven't done a commercial in 60 years," Eastwood told The Pine Cone. "But they came to me and said they wanted to do an inspirational deal, and I said I liked it."

The entire project came together in a few days, with Chrysler CEO Sergio Marchionne heavily involved in developing the script and picking the music, and Eastwood asking for changes to stick to the original concept.

"They sent me some copy, and I changed it a little bit, and

Judge declines to rescue water district

P.G. Mayor apologizes for town's 'racist' past

THE MAYOR of Pacific Grove last weekend extended an apology for decades of discriminatory housing practices that existed in the city — and most parts of the United States — until the 1940s.

Carmelita Garcia read a one-page apology letter to a group of about 400 people who attended an NAACP banquet Feb. 4 at the Hyatt Regency Hotel in Monterey.

"The City of Pacific Grove recognizes the wrongs of the past and the discrimination that occurred," Garcia said.

C.V. club has remarkable comeback

OVER THE last 15 years, flood, fire and a ruthless recession have landed hard shots to the chin of the 44-year-old Carmel Valley Athletic Club. It's still standing, though, celebrating a reinvention of the modern health and fitness club.

And with the opening in December of an elaborate new spa, called Refuge, the club has moved to a whole new level.

"We've turned misfortune into opportunity," said CVAC general manager Axel Binneboese, walking through the new members' clubhouse and lounge inside a ski-lodge-style building made from reclaimed barn wood and situated on 13 acres of oak-studded, rolling hills near the Carmel River and the Santa Lucia Preserve.

"Every surface of the club has been replaced or refurbished," he added.

In February 1998, a flood devastated CVAC, covering the tennis courts and pools with mud, muck and debris. Former owners Dennis and Jan Shepherd took out a FEMA loan just to keep the club above water financially.

Scot McKay purchased the club in 2003. Seven years later, in July 2010, in the midst of the worst economic downturn since the Great Depression, an early morning fire caused by a faulty sauna

heater destroyed the original two-story clubhouse. Initial damages exceeded \$500,000, but code improvements and the construction of temporary facilities put that figure well above \$1 million.

McKay admits to feeling challenged, but he's immensely proud of what rose from the ashes. In his words, a fitness club became a community, and the focus expanded to help appeal to the more diversified health and wellness needs of that community.

CVAC now offers a wide variety of activities, including an aquatics program, fitness center, mind and body classes and a Kids Club. Each quarter, CVAC also hosts a themed celebration for members, with food prepared by new cafe partner Aqua Terra Culinary.

Perhaps the most exciting news came in December with the opening of Refuge, a multimillion-dollar, hydrothermal "relaxation spa" that McKay calls the most important business venture he's ever been involved in. "I'm not talking financially, but in terms of benefiting people," he said.

McKay invented the "Refuge Thermal Cycle" where visitors: (1) heat up their body core in a UV-cleansed mineral pool, a 60-seat co-ed sauna or a co-ed eucalyptus steam bath; (2) cool down

Pine Inn workers strike over health care

UNION WORKERS went on strike at the Pine Inn and Tally-Ho Inn in downtown Carmel Wednesday morning after voting two weeks ago to authorize a two-day strike. The protests were planned for a traditionally busy time of year for local hotels, with this week's AT&T Pebble Beach National Pro-Am golf tournament.

"As corporate profits soar and the economy rebounds for the rich, workers are striking in protest of management's demand to eliminate

longtime employer coverage of family health insurance," reported Union representative Mark Weller in a statement announcing the work stoppage set to continue through Thursday.

More than two dozen workers have objected to inn owner Richard Gunner's plans to require employees to pay some of the costs of providing health insurance to their children and spouses — one of the issues that has kept the group without a contract for more than a

At the end of the day, Spencer's spot by the fire starts looking pretty good. He snuggles up at the feet of his family, slips off into sleep and snores like a bass guitar.

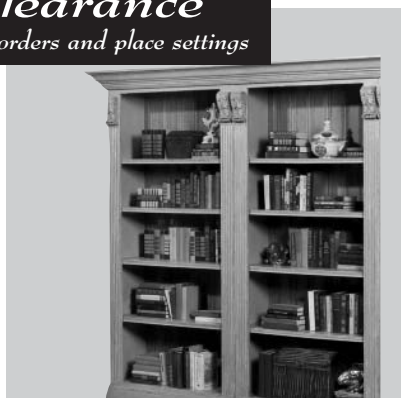
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CHS basketball team finds its touch, wrestler digs deep for win

WITH ITS shooters lighting up the scoreboard, the Carmel High boys' basketball team coasted to its 12th straight win Feb. 7, defeating Marina High at home, 71-38. The offensive output represented a season-high for the Padres.

"We're starting to shoot the ball better and it really showed in last night's game," coach **Rich Frank** told The Pine Cone Wednesday. "We've relied on defense so far this season."

Pacing Carmel High was **Hank Rudolph** with 19 points. **Devin Pearson** scored 18 points, while **Mike Alrole**, the team's leading rebounder, added another 10 points. Pearson, meanwhile, excelled on defense.

In their previous game, the boys coasted to an easy 53-27 win over Gonzales High.

Pearson led Carmel High with 13 points, while Rudolph added 12 points.

The boys are now 11-0 in the league play and 13-8 overall. They play again Monday at

home against King City High. The game starts at 7 p.m.

The Carmel High girls basketball team, meanwhile, had its streak of 30 straight wins in league play snapped by Santa Catalina Feb. 7, 44-30.

Playing on the road, the Padres were led by **Emma Fuzie**, who scored 10 points and hauled down 11 rebounds. Carmel High was playing without its leading scorer, **Sarah Anderson**.

In their previous game, the girls rallied in the fourth quarter to down Gonzales High 43-33.

Playing at home, the Padres were led by **Mackenzie Dooner**, who scored 18 points, grabbed 13 rebounds and blocked a pair of shots. **Savanna Hoffman** added 14 points, 8 rebounds, and 2 assists.

After jumping out to a 13-4 lead in the first quarter, Carmel High was outplayed in

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LAWSUIT: WATER DISTRICT VIOLATES ANTI-TAX INITIATIVE BY CHARGING FEES

THE PEBBLE Beach couple who filed a lawsuit against the Monterey Peninsula Water Management District over its complex regulations limiting water use at homes have revised their suit to include an allegation that the district's "connection fees" violate a tax-limiting initiative voters approved 16 years ago.

In August 2011, Richard and Sharlene Thum filed a far-reaching lawsuit in Monterey County Superior Court that challenges the water district's everyday practices and how it does business.

In their amended suit, the Thums contend that the water district's "connection fees" violate Proposition 218, a ballot measure passed in 1996 that limits the ways local governments can create or increase taxes and fees. The water district imposes a connection fee for every new water connection and any-

time a homeowner adds a fixture, such as a sink or toilet, to a home.

The Thums claim the connection charges are unconstitutional "taxes or fees" in violation of Prop. 218, which passed 56.5 percent to 43.4 percent.

The couple contend the water district isn't authorized to charge its customers the connection fees because Prop. 218 states that special districts like the MPWMD can't levy taxes that go toward "general" purposes.

For instance, the Thums assert that the water district's connection fees were originally imposed as a "down payment" toward a "general," "unspecified and unapproved" water supply project for the Monterey Peninsula and that the fees the district collects are not related to specific services the district provides.

Furthermore, the Thums contend the water district's connection fees are unlawful because the district hasn't sought voter

approval for the charges, which Prop. 218 requires.

"The connection charge is unlawful because it is a general tax or a special tax, and was not submitted to the voters for their approval," according to the lawsuit.

The couple hired attorney Margaret Thum, Richard Thum's sister, to file the suit.

When voters passed Proposition 13 in 1978, it constrained local governments' ability to generate property tax — their financial lifeblood. To circumvent the limitations that Prop. 13 created, local governments relied on

other revenue-enhancing tools, such as assessments, property-related fees and small general purpose taxes to finance services.

But a tax-weary electorate rejected the extra fees by approving Prop. 218, which states that taxes and most charges on property owners must be subject to voter approval. Proposition 218 also sought to "curb perceived abuses" in the use of assessments and property-related fees, specifically the use of those revenue tools to pay for governmental

A 63-YEAR-OLD homeless woman who lives in the woods above the Unitarian Universalist Church on Aguajito Road has found a friend in the church's sexton.

Caretaker James Bas met Charleen Thomas, who goes by the nickname of Charlie, when she came down to fetch water from the tap on the church's grounds. After hearing her tragic riches-to-rags history and learning a growing lump behind her knee was causing her so much pain she couldn't make the walk to her camp, he took her to the Carmel Mission Inn last week and embarked on a campaign to help her.

"Charleen is a conscientious, kind and friendly lady who keeps her camp neat and tidy, and takes excellent care of her small dog, Beanie. She is seeking a safe and accessible place to pitch her new tent when she buys it," he said in a letter on her behalf. "Having met Charlie a few months ago, I have grown to appreciate her strong spirit and caring heart. I hope that by writing this letter, I can help her find someone who has a safe place for her to pitch her tent until her situation improves."

"It's scary for me," Thomas told The Pine Cone Monday. "I was a very rich lady."

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Troublemaking trio nabbed for burglaries

TWO TEENAGERS and a 21-year-old decided to embark on a burglary spree Jan. 30, but ended up in Monterey County Jail after they made a series of errors and cops from two agencies happened to compare notes, according to sheriff's Cmdr. Lisa Nash.

The three men first tried to break into the Stevenson lower school campus on Dolores Street in Carmel by prying open the door to the third-grade classroom, but as soon as they stepped foot across the threshold, an alarm sounded, and they fled, Nash recounted.

The first sheriff's deputy on the scene, Bryan Hoskins, saw the badly damaged door and radioed for backup from Carmel Police Department. Officer Greg Johnson was nearby, preparing to run the plate number of a parked blue Mustang that he found suspicious, but he abandoned the effort to help Hoskins search the premises.

By then, another deputy had arrived to help make sure no one was in the school and search nearby neighborhoods. They also combed the scene for fingerprints and other evidence, and asked a Stevenson official to determine if anything had been stolen, according to Nash.

Nothing was missing, and with no further leads, the officers went on to other duties.

Later that day, Hoskins arrested three kids in a blue Mustang on Highway 1 for allegedly breaking into a travel trailer in Big Sur and stealing a laptop computer, according to Nash.

"Someone had seen two suspicious males leaving in a blue Mustang" after the trailer was burglarized, Nash said. Hoskins spotted the vehicle near Monastery Beach and searched it. He found the stolen laptop and arrested the occupants: 21-year-old Axel Holman of San Gregorio, and Elias Cerritos and Brendan Kinney, both 18-year-olds from San Francisco.

After hearing of the arrest, Johnson mentioned he had been checking out a blue Mustang parked near the Carmel school when he was summoned to assist Hoskins with the possible break-in at the school, according to Nash. Upon further questioning at the jail, two of the men decided to talk.

Easy pickings?

"They said they thought Monterey County was a place that they could break into some school pretty easily," Nash said. They discovered Stevenson School by searching on the Internet and figured it must have some good stuff to steal. So they drove to Carmel and parked around the corner, scoped out which door they would try to pry, and then hid in the bushes until they were sure no one would see them, according to Nash. After one of them failed to break through the heavy door on his own, he asked for help from one of the others, and they got the door open but triggered the alarm when they tried to go in.

They also revealed that after they tried to break into Stevenson, "they slept in the car for a while, went to the Carmel Safeway to get food, and thought about going home but didn't, since they had already driven to Monterey County but hadn't stolen anything," she said.

The trio then hung out at Point Lobos before driving down the coast to Palo Colorado Road where they happened upon what they thought was "some national park." While exploring, they came across the travel trailer, and after seeing no one was around, they decided to break in.

"They had forgotten their burglary tools, so they picked up a rock and broke one of the windows, reached in and unlocked the door," she said. Inside, they found the laptop, a case, a hard drive and a couple of other items, which they stole.

Nash credited their arrests to "really good coordination of police work," between the sheriff's office and Carmel P.D.

"I like when things come together like that," she said.

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P.G. man dies in Highway 68 wreck

BRIAN HENDERSON, a 24-year-old Pacific Grove resident, died when he drove his car off Highway 68 near the SFB Morse Gate sometime during the early morning hours of Sunday, according to the California Highway Patrol.

Emergency crews from Pebble Beach found Henderson's 2002 Honda on its roof about 30 feet below the roadway, with the dead man inside. They were alerted to the wreck just after 2 p.m. Feb. 5, Cal Fire spokesman Jonathan Pangburn said, but authorities believe the wreck occurred hours

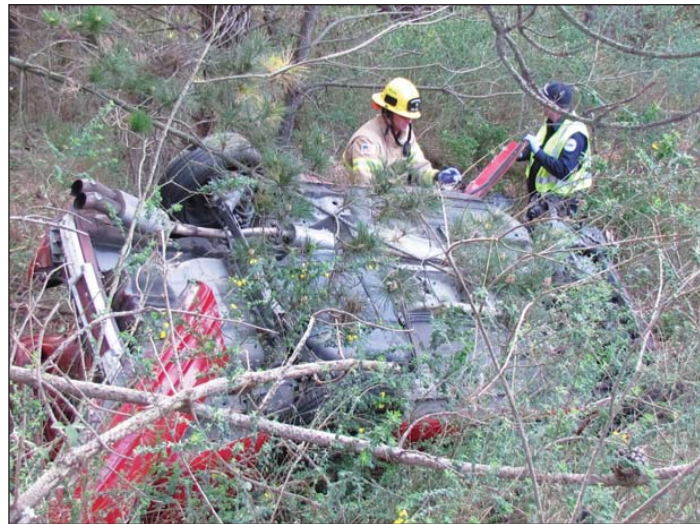
earlier.

According to the California Highway Patrol, Henderson was driving westbound when he drifted across the eastbound lane and hit a dirt embankment and a tree before rolling down the hillside. The CHP reported Henderson had "sustained major trauma to the head."

Pangburn said Pebble Beach firefighters helped extricate the victim from the wreckage, but he had few details.

CHP public information officer Bob Lehman said many of the circumstances of the wreck, including whether Henderson was drunk or on drugs, remain unknown.

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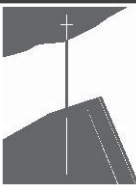

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Big Sur controlled burn escapes

A FIRE on Big Sur's South Coast burned between 4 and 5 acres last Tuesday before firefighters were able to extinguish it.

"It was a controlled burn that got away, possibly because of the wind," explained Martha Karstens, the chief of the Big Sur Volunteer Fire Brigade. "The flames were 20- to 30-foot high."

The Feb. 7 fire was located on the west side of Highway 1, near Gorda Mountain and about 67 miles south of Carmel. Thankfully, it didn't occur on the east side of the scenic route, where it could have spread into the backcountry and been difficult to contain.

The fire brigade received word of the fire at about 11 a.m. It was put out by late afternoon.

In addition to Big Sur volunteers, firefighters from the U.S. Forest Service, Cal-Fire's Cambria station and the City of Cayucas responded to the incident.

Karstens reminded residents and visitors that the fire risk is high — despite the fact that we're in the middle of our traditional rainy season. "The conditions are very dry," she added.

‘VISUALLY INTRUSIVE’ and “starkly institutional” are Congressman Sam Farr’s words to describe six 24-foot-tall light poles and a chain link fence at an oceanfront federal fisheries lab in Pacific Grove, which for two years has drawn the ire of neighbors, and more recently, Farr himself.

In a Feb. 2 letter to Jane Lubchenko, the head of the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration — which operates the facility — U.S. Rep. Sam Farr targeted six towering light poles that have solar panels attached to the tops, and a fence that was installed around the building.

In his one-page note, Farr first tackles the issue of the lights, noting that when NOAA installed them in its parking lot in 2010, the agency neglected to consult with the City of Pacific Grove and the California Coastal Commission, both of which have complained about the lights.

“Their size makes them visually intrusive, both during the day and at night, when they stand out in an otherwise low light environment,” Farr wrote to Lubchenko.

A private property owner in the same neighborhood as the NOAA facility — an environmentally protected coastal zone — would not be permitted to install even one of the light poles, let alone a half-dozen.

But because NOAA is a federal agency and owns the property the lab sits on, it has authority to make almost any alteration to the facility with little check from P.G. officials or the otherwise omnipotent coastal

commission.

NOAA told the coastal commission the lights and fence were necessary for security reasons, including the threat of mountain lions and terrorists.

Farr also goes after the fence.

“In addition, the new chain link fencing is particularly unsightly,” Farr wrote in his letter, which was also forwarded to Pacific Grove officials. “As you can see from the enclosed photographs, it is starkly institutional and fails to blend in with the environment.”

Human jawbone pending ID by coroner

THE MONTEREY County Coroner’s Office is working to identify the source of bones found at the north end of Carmel Beach that were turned over to the sheriff’s office Feb. 3, according to sheriff’s Cmdr. Lisa Nash. But investigators have yet to determine the identity of the person whose jawbone was unearthed.

“It was found over at the Pebble Beach end,” she said. “They are hoping for dental records,” but she could not obtain any additional information from the coroner’s office this week.

The NOAA lab, which is near the Pacific Grove Lighthouse, is also known for another conspicuous feature; a brightly painted mural depicting sea life that surrounds the top of the building, although Farr made no mention of the painting in his letter.

But Farr noted that residents have expressed their frustration because of the changes at the NOAA facility, and he shared his own opinion.

“I am myself chagrined at the lack of sensitivity to esthetics in this otherwise beautiful setting,” he wrote. “These concerns not

only emphasize the building esthetics but also light pollution along the coast.”

Farr closed the note by urging NOAA to remove the fence and “modify the lighting to a height and style that will be compatible with the unique environment of the site.”

After a coastal commission staffer in San Francisco in 2010 found that NOAA installed the lights in its parking lot for the “safety and security” of its staff, he determined the lights could stay, despite being put in without notice to the agency, which strictly regulates development in the coastal zone.



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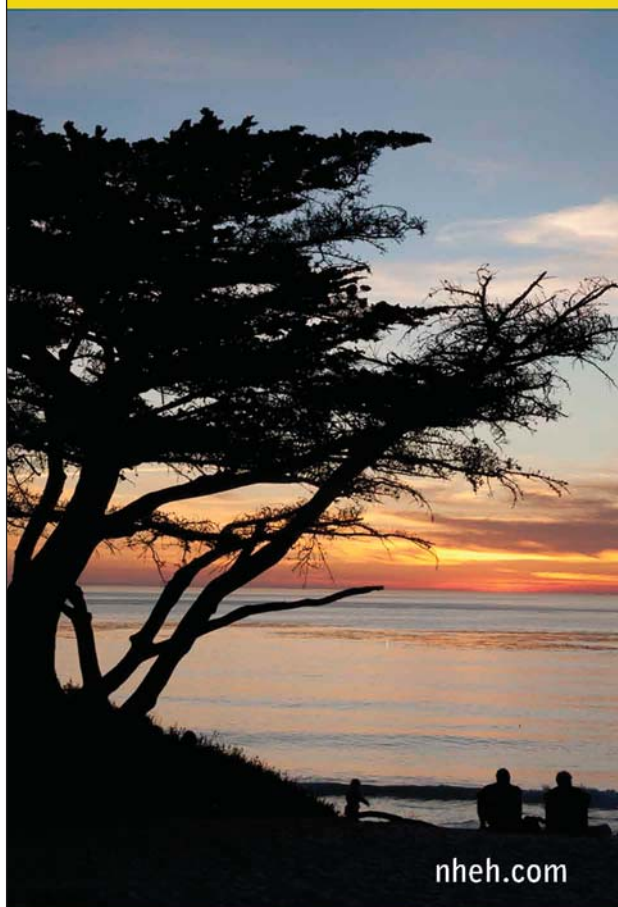

stay for as long as they desire (McKay says to receive the full benefit, one should complete at least three cycles). A massage can be added for an additional \$60.

"This isn't a spa in the true sense of the word," said Binneboese. "There are no beauty treatments. This is something unique. The experience releases endorphins and you will never feel better. It's a powerful experience."

That experience is worlds away from what was created by Peter Paxton, who founded CVAC in 1968 at the height of the American tennis boom. He called the facility the Carmel Valley Racquet Club, and it became a hot spot for the global tennis set, including celebrities such as Merv Griffin and Dinah Shore and big-name pros such as Stan Smith, the two-time Grand Slam singles champion who worked out frequently at the club.

Paxton's tennis-centric club came on the heels of John Gardiner's Tennis Ranch, founded by its namesake in 1957. The Carmel Valley resort became a secluded getaway for Hollywood glitterati, politicians and touring pros.

The popularity of tennis in this country began to decline in the mid-1980s. Gardiner sold his property just before his death in 2000, and the ranch closed in 2009. Last month, ironically, McKay purchased the Gardiner Resort for \$2.5 million and plans to make it his family home.

CVAC still appeals to tennis fans, with its 10 well maintained, tournament-ready courts, half of them lighted for night play. It offers a wide array of tennis programs, leagues and lessons, and runs an active Junior Tennis Academy to help ignite interest in a new generation. Recently, the United States Tennis Association voted CVAC Outstanding Facility of the Year.

But tennis no longer defines this facility. It's now a community, a social club, a wellness center and a refuge.

"In our society we don't take enough time to nourish our lives," said Binneboese, the former hotel manager at nearby Quail Lodge Resort, who said he has lost 60 pounds since arriving at CVAC in 2010. "Our goal here is to get people to just slow down and focus on themselves for a while."

Law Judge Maribeth Bushey declined to reinstate the 8.325 percent fee that has been added to Peninsula water bills since 1983. The fee accounts for 46 percent of the water district's \$10 million annual budget and helps pay staff salaries and Carmel River mitigation work.

"If you want your user fee back the way it was, you need to go to [Monterey County] Superior Court, where you are, and get that order, and then this agency will expect Cal

Am to comply with it," Bushey said. Without the fee, the water district has been receiving funds from Cal Am to pay for mitigation work on the river to offset environmental damage from pumping millions of gallons of water a year for Monterey Peninsula residents.

But water district general manager Dave Stoldt told Bushey the Cal Am money only covers a small portion of its work.

"The cost is approximately \$3.5 million each year," Stoldt said. "A funding agreement with Cal Am at \$1.6 million was agreed to as an interim measure, but it is woefully inadequate."

He warned Bushey of dire consequences

if the district wasn't able to begin collecting the fee from the Peninsula's water customers soon.

"We don't have time to go through the courts at this point," Stoldt said. "This is a budgetary item for the district. We'll have to lay off 25 to 30 percent of our workforce. The mitigation program on the river will be suspended."

To make up for the shortfall between the Cal Am funding and the cost of doing the work on the river, Stoldt said district officials have been dipping into district reserves and drawing revenue from property taxes

and other sources.

But, he said, the district was "basically wiping out [its] safety net at this point."

The CPUC has issued several decisions against the water district, which, along with Cal Am and the Department of Ratepayer Advocates, has made failed attempts to get the fee reinstated. The CPUC most recently denied the request in March 2011.

Stoldt told The Pine Cone last week that if Bushey rejected the water district's fee request, the district might look at alternatives, including a plan where the county assessor could collect the fee on tax rolls.

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Henry Miller library steps out on its own

THREE DECADES after receiving it as a gift from one of its namesake's closest friends, the Big Sur Land Trust has donated the Henry Miller Memorial Library to the nonprofit group that has operated it since 1998.

"As of today, we are the owners of the library," Magnus Toren announced Jan. 6. Toren has served as the library's executive director since 1994.

Located 28 miles south of Carmel, the library is situated on a half-acre property on Highway 1. More a bookstore dedicated to the works of Henry Miller and his contemporaries than a library, it also hosts a variety of events in its redwood-shaded garden, including concerts, weddings, writing workshops, fashion shows, vinyl record swaps, art exhibits, poetry slams and a popular summertime short film festival.

After Miller died in 1981, the library was founded by Emil White, who served as a caretaker and personal secretary for the controversial writer when he arrived in Big Sur in 1944. After establishing himself as a successful painter and publisher, White purchased the property where the library now stands from Caltrans and built the home that now functions as the library. The same year that he opened the library, White donated the property to the Big Sur Land Trust.

The transition of ownership was welcomed by the library's

board.

"The library is ready to assume full stewardship for the future of Emil White's dream of being a cultural center for the arts in Big Sur," said Maria Teutsch, the president of the library's board of directors.

The transition, though, is coming at a critical time for the library. Toren was notified in November that the library needs to upgrade its restroom facilities and make the building more accessible for disabled visitors if it continues to host events.

"Failure to comply will result in us indefinitely discontinuing programs and events," Toren explained.

The scrutiny from county officials has understandably made it difficult for the library to book this summer's schedule. "We're holding off on booking events," Toren explained. "We're not confirming anything yet."

Meanwhile, Toren is working with county officials to understand precisely what needs to be done to bring the library's facilities up to code. "We plan to file for a permit this week," he said.

Toren estimates that the upgrades could cost as much as \$150,000. He said a series of fundraising concerts will likely be staged in the area once it's been determined how much the work will cost. "We need to raise a lot of money to continue functioning as we have in the past," he added.

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Local theater luminary who 'lived her values out loud' dies at 89

AFTER DEDICATING a half century of her life to the local theater scene and establishing an extraordinary legacy as a performer, playwright and teacher, Marcia Hovick passed away Jan. 31 at the age of 89.

A native of Tulsa, Okla., and a graduate of Mills College, Hovick moved to Monterey with her husband, Jack, and the couple's four children in 1956. After working on- and off-stage with the Golden Bough Circle Theatre, she founded the Children's Experimental Theatre in 1960 with the aim of using the dramatic arts to teach youngsters confidence, self-worth and teamwork.

"She gave those kids the spine to stand up, show up, learn their lines and get over the terror of speaking in front of a crowd," said her son, Nick Hovick. "She trained 5,000 to 6,000 kids over 50 years."

The life skills that Hovick taught had a profound impact on students.

"She didn't teach ego and she's didn't teach self-promotion," her son said. "She taught unity. I know a number of people who probably would have ended up in juvenile hall or prison without her words of guidance."

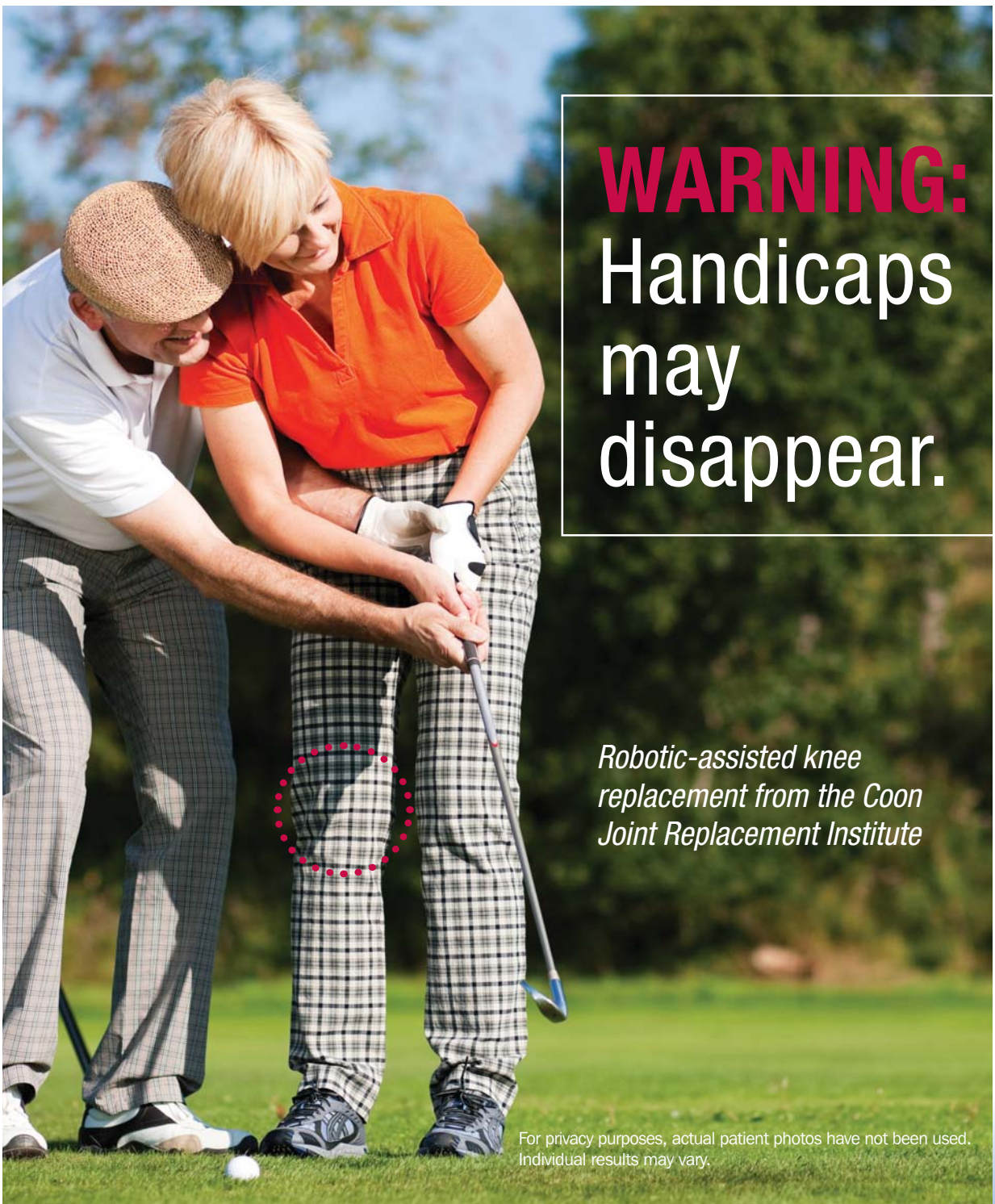
In addition to her work with the CET,

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Chanterelle Fest in the making, Valentines any which way, and Edgar's at sunset

THE BIG Sur Chanterelle Festival is returning to its local roots and mission, according to volunteer organizer Jack Ellwanger, who discussed the Feb. 24-25 event, including its new focus on Syrah and pared down field of participating chefs, during a preview at the Ventana Inn Tuesday.

"We wanted to refocus the event on the community," he said, including donating proceeds to the Big Sur Health Center's wellness program and the inclusion of just a dozen Big Sur area chefs for the main event — the Grand Tasting and cook-off set for Saturday — rather than inviting a larger group of competitors from around the Monterey Peninsula. Jim Dodge of the Monterey Bay Aquarium's Cooking for Solutions will be among those judging the entries, and chef/caterer/TV personality Wendy Brodie is in charge of the cook-off, according to Ellwanger.

Also new this year is the event's showcasing of Syrah during the Art & Syrah event in the gallery at Ventana Inn, which is hosting many of the festival's events. On Tuesday, Bill Parsons, owner of Parsonage in Carmel Valley, shared his 2009 Estate Syrah and 2009 Estate Reserve Rocco Syrah as he discussed how the varietal pairs well with chanterelles, despite their more frequent association with Pinot Noir.

"There's an earthy quality to Syrah that shows up at mid-palate," said Parsons, who described the grape that originated in France's Rhone region as "Pinot Noir on steroids." That

eartheness complements the flavor and texture of wild mushrooms abundant on the Big Sur Coast after wintertime rains.

"A lot of people add Syrah to Pinot Noir to give it backbone," he commented. Several producers of Syrah in areas ranging from the Templeton Gap in the Paso Robles region, to the Arroyo Seco and Santa Lucia Highlands appellations in Monterey County, are set to share their wines during the festival. Syrah specifically reflects the terroir of the landscapes in which it grows, according to Ellwanger.

He also said he and others decided to take over the Chanterelle Fest, which had been organized by Toby Rowland-Jones, and began their work in earnest after the New Year, managing to get Ventana Inn on board and securing the Big Sur Lodge in Pfeiffer Big Sur State Park for the Grand Tasting.

The festival will begin with a kickoff party in the Restaurant at Ventana (on the outside terraces if the weather is good) on Friday, Feb. 24, from 6:30 to 10:30 p.m., followed by a full day of events Saturday, Feb. 25.

Mycologists will lead interested participants on a Wild Mushroom Walk along park trails and host a talk in the conference center from 9:30 a.m. to 12:30 p.m.

The Grand Tasting and cook-off will take place in the lodge from 1 to 3 p.m., and Big Sur chef Mark Marron, who brought dried chanterelles, chanterelle-infused vodka, chanterelle salt and a basket of fresh chanterelles he said he collected in about five minutes on his way to the preview, said he's heard from some of the chefs who will be competing. While he would not divulge their secret plans, he said the prospects were strong.

From 3 to 6 p.m., the Gallery at Ventana will host the free Art & Syrah event from 3 to 6 p.m., and the Awards Dinner will follow in the restaurant, where chef Truman Jones will preside over a five-course menu he named, "A Fungus is Among Us." Wines will be paired with each course, and the winners of the cook-off will receive their awards that evening.

A peek at the menu revealed a *cantharellus cibarius* salad of raw, pickled and cooked chanterelles, along with celery, radish, lemon and ricotta, followed by a second course of Soup and Sammy: cream of chanterelle soup with a grilled truffle, Brie and chive sandwich. The third course will fea-

ture Central Coast halibut with chanterelle crust, farro risotto, root vegetables and Parmesan sauce, and the main dish will be all-natural Angus beef with chanterelle bread pudding, shallot marmalade, spinach and sauce Bordelaise. The sweet finish will be a Chanterelle Bombe with maple Anglaise, caramel mousse and praline ice cream.

With the exception of Art & Syrah, which is free, tickets for individual events range from \$20 for the kickoff party, to \$150 for the awards dinner, but admission to everything can be had for \$200 — a \$50 savings. For tickets, go to bigsurchanterelle.eventbrite.com.

■ P.B. V-Day

The restaurants at the Pebble Beach resorts have special plans in mind for Valentine's Day, with the culinary teams at Roy's and Peppoli in Spanish Bay, and the Stillwater Bar and

Grill in the Lodge at Pebble Beach, stepping up their efforts.

At Roy's, options for starters, main courses and dessert are extensive for the \$85-per-person prix fixe. 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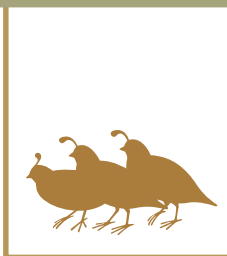

they were good about it," Eastwood said. "I have to give them credit."

Filmed three weeks ago at the LA Colosseum, and directed by David Gordon Green, the commercial was an instant hit, and has ranked in numerous polls as a favorite of the massive audience that watched the New York Giants defeat the New England Patriots 21-17. Since then, it has been viewed on YouTube more than 8 million times, a Chrysler spokesman said.

But the day after the Super Bowl, conservative political commentators attacked the ad, claiming it was intended as an endorsement of Barack Obama, and was inappropriately made with taxpayer bailout money Chrysler received from the federal government. "Frankly, I was appalled by it," said Karl Rove on Fox News.

"Those comments were surprising to me, because the people who are supposed to be the smart ones didn't seem to get what we did as much as the general public," Eastwood said. "They got it right away."

Obama and politics didn't have anything to do with the Chrysler ad, he said, and "if I thought it was for any politician or the benefit of any particular politician I would not have done it."

Instead, Eastwood's purpose was to express his feeling that "the country has been in the doldrums for some time, and it's gotten to the point where nobody seems to be running it. Nobody knows what the left hand or the right hand is doing."

With the people who are supposed to be in charge unable to act, "the rest of the country's going to have to do it for themselves," he said. "The Chrysler ad wasn't intended for

any ideologues. It was intended for the people."

Meanwhile, Eastwood said filming for his next directorial project, a remake of "A Star is Born," wouldn't begin until late summer or early fall to give the film's star, Beyoncé, plenty of time with her new baby.

During the interim, Eastwood will take another starring role, playing an aging baseball scout in "Trouble With the

Curve," costarring Amy Adams and directed by Eastwood's longtime producer, Rob Lorentz.

"I'll be playing another hardass guy, not exactly like the one I played in Gran Torino, but not unlike him either," he said.

And why isn't he directing the baseball film? "I've got to ease up a bit. My golf game is suffering," he said.

services rather than property-related services.

The water district assesses residential connection fees on the number of water-using fixtures and landscaping on the property, multiplied by a fixture unit value, which is then multiplied by a dollar amount per fixture unit.

According to the district, its connection fees “are related to [a] project’s estimated water usage and the need to finance new water supply projects.”

85-square-foot remodel

The Thums’ differences with the water district started in 2009 after they decided to convert an 85-square-foot closet to a bathroom in a vacation house they purchased on Coral Drive in Del Monte Forest.

The district gave them a water permit to install the extra

bathroom, and after it was finished, district officials inspected the house to finalize the permit process.

During the walk-through, a district official not only checked the bathroom, but looked through the entire house, finding two handheld faucets the district said hadn’t been counted during its last inspection of the house in 2007, before the Thums bought it.

The home’s previous owner told the district he hadn’t made any changes to the water fixtures after the district’s 2007 inspection, the Thums contend in their suit. Despite that, the water district’s staff determined the two fixtures required a water permit and that the Thums would have to pay a fee.

The Thums appealed the district’s decision, but it was upheld by its board of directors.

The Thums maintain that the only reason the water district counts fixtures is to limit water use. But they claim the district’s “restriction of household water” use directly contradicts a state law that forbids the water district to limit water

use for domestic purposes.

While the law that established the water district allows it to collect water connection fees when “providing or making available water services, or when selling, leasing or otherwise disposing of water that is a product of the district’s works or operations,” the district didn’t provide any additional water when it issued the permit for the Thums’ handheld faucets, according to their suit.

The Thums paid a connection fee of about \$850 to the district.

They want a judge to order the district not to restrict the household use of water, remove the deed restriction imposed on their house, refund their connection fees and set aside its method of counting residential fixtures. They also want the district to “cease unlawfully entering residences.”

The search of the Thums’ home “went beyond the scope of the bathroom” and was performed with “involuntary consent, resulting in an unreasonable, and therefore unconstitutional, government search,” according to their lawsuit.

The wrestling team is now gearing up for the league championships next Thursday at Pacific Grove High.



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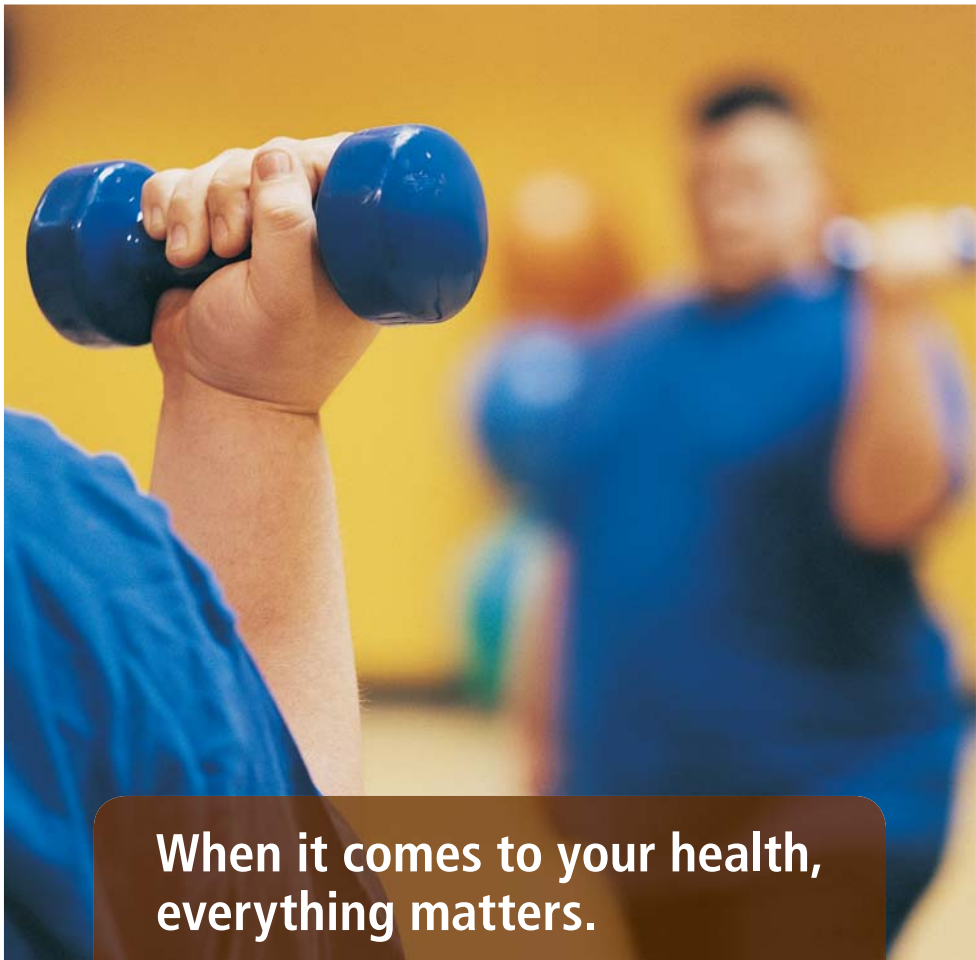

The Unitarian Universalist Church will host funeral services for Hovick Saturday, Feb. 11, at 1:30 p.m.

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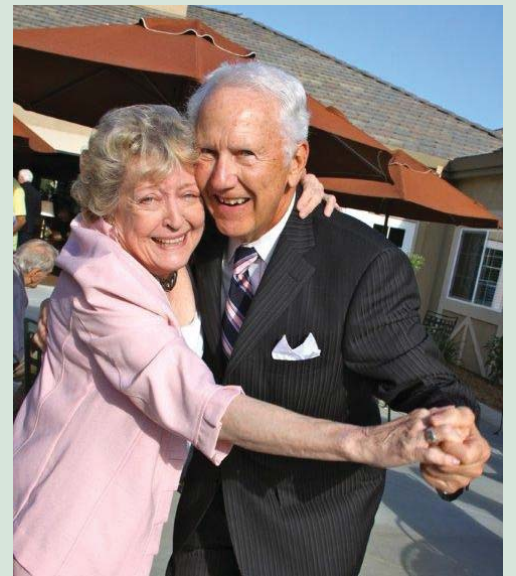

In the early part of the 20th century, deeds in California usually contained "restrictive covenants" that prevented property owners from selling to someone who wasn't white. These covenants were created privately — not by the government — and weren't overturned by the U.S. Supreme Court until 1948. Today, even though they have no legal force and are ignored by buyers, sellers and title companies, they still exist in millions of property deeds.

"The restrictions were clearly intended to discriminate against Asiatics, African Americans, people born in the Turkish Empire, and all descendants of those mentioned," according to Garcia's letter, which was also signed by P.G. city manager, Tom Frutchey.

Garcia, who in January announced she was running for county supervisor, told The Pine Cone the idea for an apology letter goes back a few years, when she and former P.G. city councilwoman, Lisa Bennett, had discussed it.

"It's something that had been in the back of my mind for a long time," Garcia said.

She acknowledged that Pacific Grove didn't create the restrictive covenants.

"The city didn't write the language," she said. "I don't know if the city would have had any authority to intervene

and say 'stop putting this language in grant deeds,' but the bottom line is nothing was ever done."

Seaside, Salinas, Del Rey Oaks and Carmel Valley are a few of the local jurisdictions where restrictive covenants exist, Garcia said. "This was when discrimination was at its highest and people were allowed to not sell homes to people of color, not even allowing them to rent," she said.

She said she hopes her apology "creates a path where other cities will initiate similar apologies."

Garcia had planned to read the letter to the Feb. 1 Pacific

Grove City Council meeting, when NAACP Monterey County chapter president Mel Mason was to attend. When Mason said he couldn't make the council meeting, Garcia decided to read it at last weekend's NAACP banquet, which featured a keynote address by National NAACP president and CEO Benjamin Jealous, who grew up in the Monterey Peninsula and graduated from York School in 1990.

year. Weller said the striking staff includes housekeepers, bellmen, receptionists and maintenance workers, and he said Pine Inn housekeepers earn less than \$25,000 a year.

"The hotels' wealthy owner, Richard Gunner, has not said he cannot afford to pay for family healthcare coverage, only that he does not want to," Weller said in the statement. Gunner also owns property in Santa Barbara and Fresno.

But Pine Inn manager John Lloyd said the hotel has held 10 negotiating sessions with union representatives, most recently on Jan. 19, and another is planned for Feb. 23 with the assistance of the U.S. Federal Mediation & Conciliation Service.

"The principal outstanding and remaining issue between the union and the hotels is the issue of employee medical, dental and vision coverage," he said. "The union is seeking to continue the present coverage that provides

medical, dental and vision benefits to employees and their families, with the hotels being responsible for the entire cost, and no matching contributions from the covered staff."

Gunner, however, is seeking some financial participation on behalf of the workers, as is customary in most of the private sector.

He also pointed out no other Carmel hotel pays for all of the medical, dental and vision coverage for families of employees, and some don't even offer those benefits to their workers, let alone spouses and children.

However, free health care remains a point of contention, and union workers unanimously voted in Seaside Jan. 26 to authorize a strike. Organized hotel employees last walked off the job in 1982, when work stoppages at 22 area hotels and restaurants spanned 17 days following a 75 percent vote in favor of striking. Their union, which represents 1,200 workers at two dozen Monterey Bay Area hotels, restaurants, cafeterias and golf courses, was established in 1937.

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Editorial

The nastiness begins

AS YOU'LL be able to see from our letters to the editor this week, the campaign for Carmel's mayor is well under way. For the most part, the letters we printed are perfectly fine, though they're basically devoid of content about the city's issues. That could be because the public isn't yet aware of any clear policy differences between Jason Burnett and Rich Pepe. But because of several letters we didn't print, we're afraid it could be because some people can't wait to start slinging mud at Pepe for having the audacity to challenge Burnett.

We received two letters that accused Pepe of various nefarious deeds and character flaws. You might even say the letters amounted to character assassination. And when we asked the letter-writers to substantiate their claims — we don't print nasty criticisms without something to back them up — they both backed down.

Jason Burnett has made it clear that he welcomes Pepe's challenge, because he thinks only a competitive election gives voters a chance to really measure what the candidates stand for.

We couldn't agree more. So please keep the sarcasm, bitterness and vituperation to a minimum.

Overruling the people

Here at The Pine Cone, we support gay marriage. But we think it should be instituted through the democratic process, not imposed from above by a handful of judges. And that's exactly what happened this week when a three-judge panel of the U.S. Ninth Circuit ruled that Prop. 8 violated the U.S. Constitution. And what's really surprising is that the federal judges based their decision on an earlier ruling by the California Supreme Court Prop. 8 was specifically enacted to repeal.

In other words, because one small group of state judges decided same-sex couples have a constitutional right to marry, according to the federal courts the issue was thereby removed from the hands of the people forevermore.

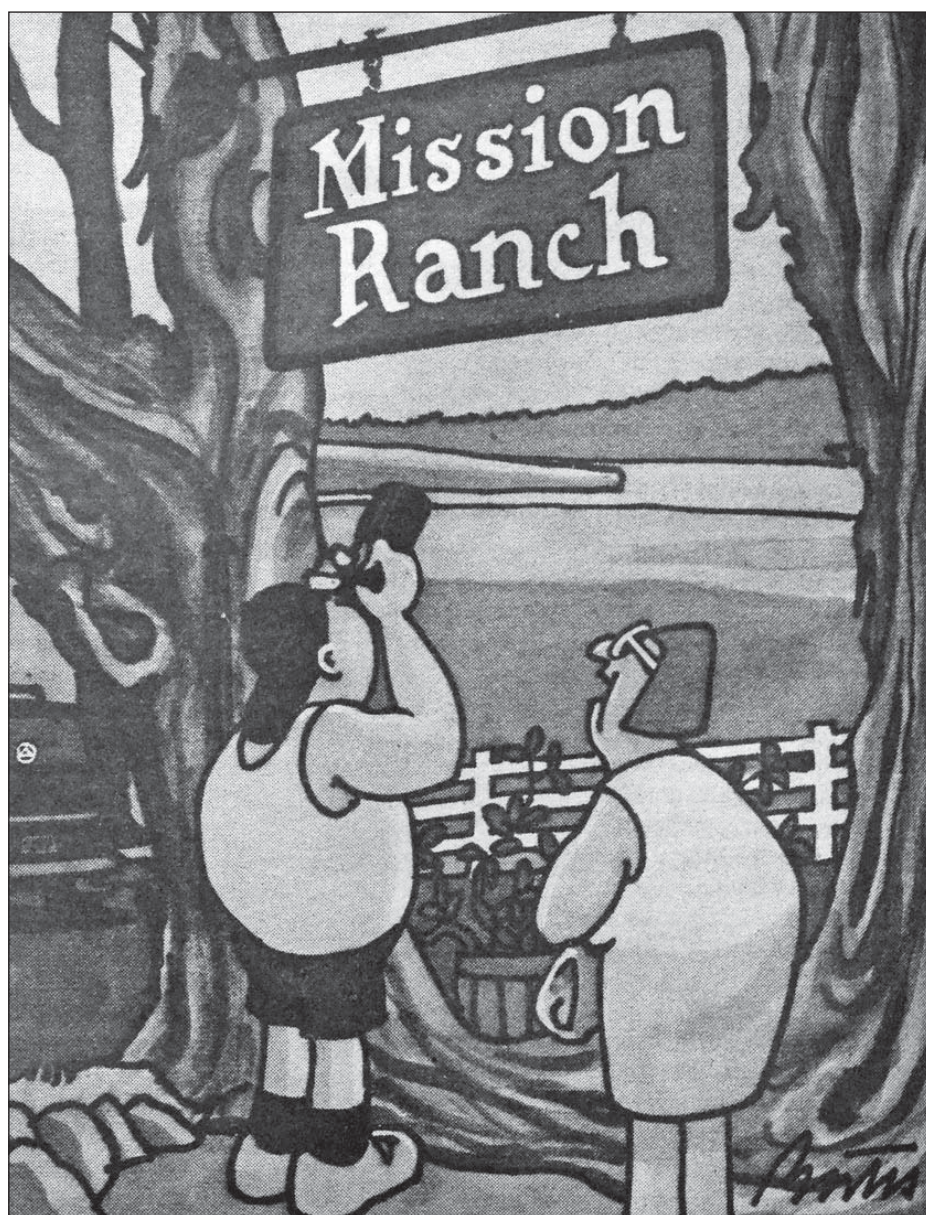
In June 2008, the California Supreme Court issued its decision that gay marriage was a right under the state's constitution. Just five months later, the people overturned that decision by passing Prop. 8 — a decision which the state supreme court later upheld.

This week, the federal court acknowledged that Prop. 8 might be constitutional if the state supreme court had never created the right to gay marriage in the first place. But since it did — even for only a few months — that right became enshrined in state law to an extent that the people must not be permitted remove it, the federal appeals court said. What's even more ridiculous is that, without the earlier state supreme court decision, Prop. 8 would never have been proposed. Can you spell Catch 22?

Imagine the outcry if the peoples' vote had been *for* gay marriage, and the courts had made a similar series of twisted rulings to ban it. By now, the courthouse would have been burned to the ground.

Judges should not create new rights the people have expressly said they don't want. Public opinion on gay marriage is changing, and it wouldn't have been long before the people approved it via a ballot measure or through their representatives in the state Legislature. The courts should have stayed out of it.

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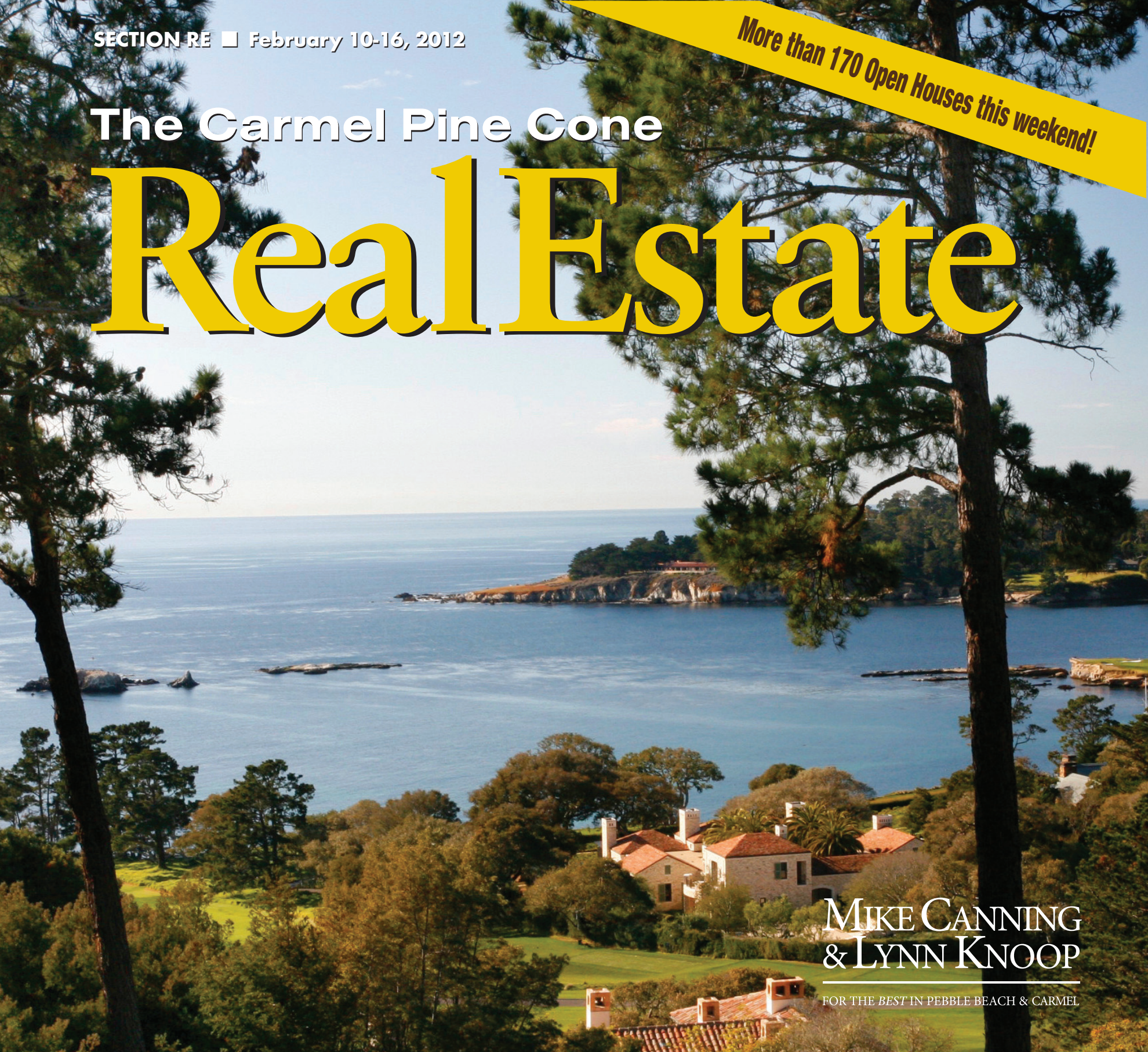

Well, perhaps "flit" is not quite the right verb for her activities, because she is described as a "dumpy little woman" who walked the beaches and let her long brown hair dangle to her shoulders. Instinctively we don't like her much, but we admire her independence and her success in competing with the macho men fronted by George Sterling and Jack London. In a time (1900-1915) when women were supposed to be seen and not heard, she was a worthy successor to Eve, Cleopatra, Queen Victoria, Carrie Chapman Catt, Florence Nightingale and Carrie Nation. And possibly an inspiration to Gloria Steinem, Eleanor Roosevelt and Jane Fonda. She came to Carmel in 1905, already the author of a successful book, *The Land of Little Rain*. In Carmel, she finished her first novel, *Isidro*, polishing its phrases in a tree house behind her home, which she called a "wick-i-up." She battled Sterling and London on even terms, hit home runs in the Abalone league, and wrote 35 verses for "The Abalone Song." Late in 1907, after less than 2 intense years in Carmel, she became convinced that she was terminally ill and moved to Italy to die. That didn't come off. She recovered and drifted back to Carmel through England and New York, arriving in 1913. She was always a storm center and departed finally in 1924 to Santa Fe where she ended her days.

But she said her fortune dwindled due to disabilities like Crohn's Disease and back pain, along with legal wrangling over the estate left by her husband, who died of an overdose in Ben Lomond just over seven years ago. According to Bas, Thomas was originally suspected in his death but later cleared, and she has been battling with attorneys to receive her inheritance.

(Neither Thomas nor Bas would say anything more about the case, claiming that publicity about it could prejudice its

outcome.)

"I became homeless about a year ago," said Thomas, who lived in Carmel for several years and has a P.O. box at the post office on Via Nona Marie. She said she rented a place in town for three years but lost it about a year ago, which led her to take up residence in a homeless encampment in the Jacks Peak area, despite owning stock, a storage space full of antiques and other possessions. Thomas also had use of her truck until a DUI conviction last September meant she could no longer drive, and Bas said it's now parked at a friend's house.

"I'm homeless — it's very painful to say," Thomas said. "I need a place to live — someplace I can live in a tent — but I can't go up the mountains anymore, not until they fix my leg."

After that, Thomas hopes to find a job and resolve her legal issues, according to Bas.

"She recently liquidated \$8,000 of her rapidly dwindling stock assets, of which only \$13,000 still remain and must last her until a pending legal arbitration is completed (hopefully in her favor) in the next few months, or her leg heals enough for her to be able to work again," he wrote in his letter. "She may have to sell all of the antique furnishings she still has in storage if she runs out of money before she can get another place to live."

Bas hopes someone who lives near the mouth of the valley will let Thomas pitch her tent in a location where she can get to the post office, her broker's office and her doctor's office without too much trouble or pain.

"I have no reason, from what I know for the past several months, to doubt her story," he said, adding that he's visited the camp, seen her legal documents and witnessed her doing "the best she can to hold onto and maintain things."

He checked her into the Carmel Mission Inn at her request last week, after the knee pain drove her to ask him for a ride

to an appointment, and she worried the painful lump, which has grown from the size of a dime to the size of a golf ball over the past several months, would prevent her from getting back up the mountain. He said he provided his credit card to guarantee the room, but she is paying for her stay with cash.

"She's been dwindling away her finances as she's trying to deal with things, and she's providing support to some of the other homeless people, too," Bas said, including the holiday dinner she purchased for her campmates last December. "I've been looking for a level place for her to pitch her tent."

He hasn't asked church leadership about letting her stay there, since the property lacks a lot of flat space, the institution is in flux due to the minister's plans to resign in June, "and the church is not inclined to have a tent pitched out there in plain view on church property."

Thomas is seeking treatment for her knee — which was set to be subjected to an MRI this week — and a place to put her tent, so she can avoid paying rent while living off her savings until her legal fight is resolved or she can find a job.

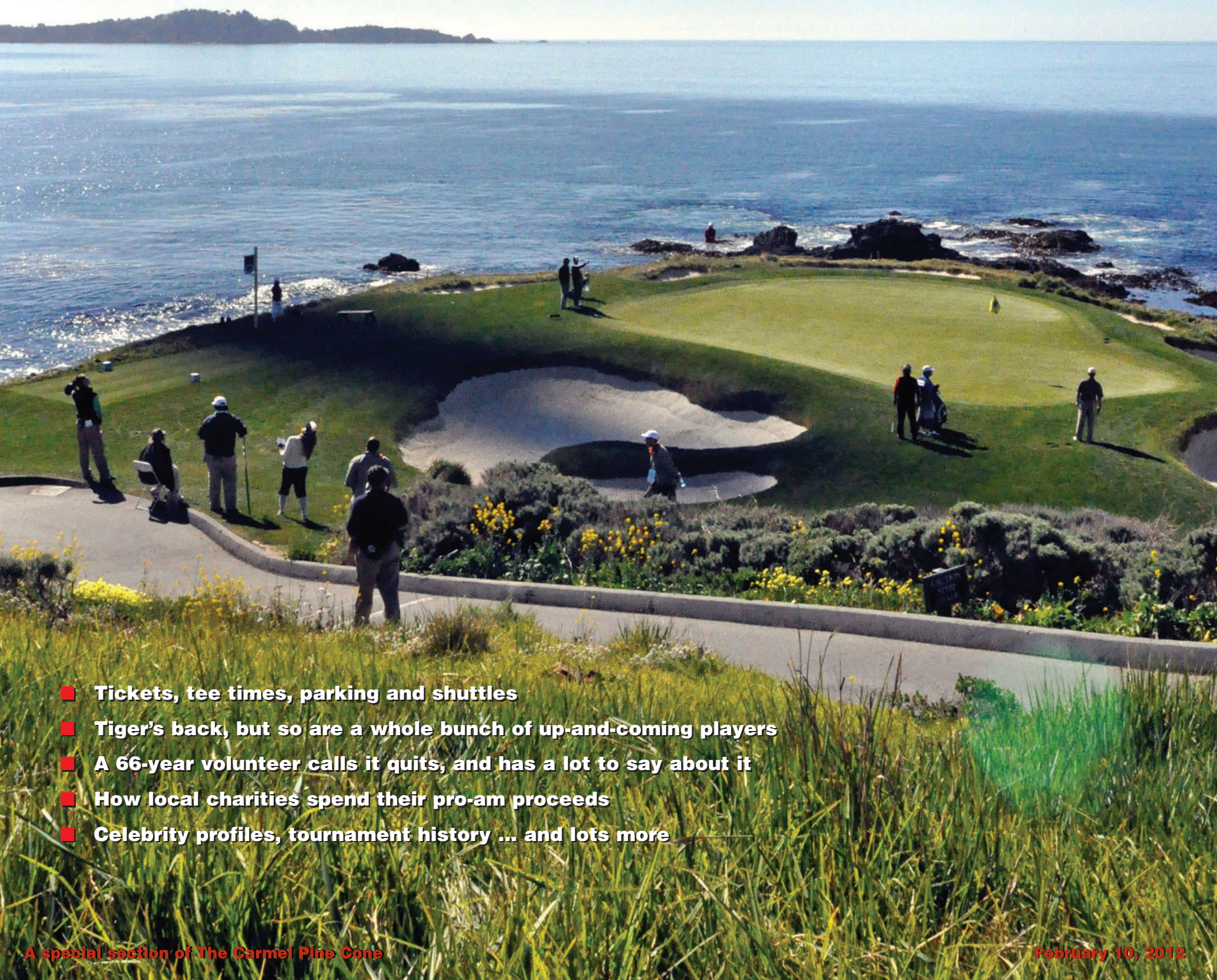

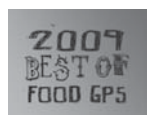

Parity on the PGA Tour grows, giving more pros a chance to win

TWELVE YEARS into his fluctuating pro career, D.A. Points had a season full of firsts in 2011. He won his first PGA Tour event and his first pro-am. And he became the fourth player in the past quarter century to win his first PGA Tour event at the AT&T Pebble Beach National Pro-Am.

But Points' success was also part of the PGA Tour's expanding parity. He was the third of 14 players, four shy of the record, who last season claimed their first career PGA Tour titles.

"There's so much knowledge available to everybody," said Points, who will defend his pro title and his pro-am title with Bill Murray beginning Feb. 9 in the tournament's 64th edition. "Sports psychologists, swing instructors. Twenty years ago, there was a very small group of people who knew what they were talking about and could share it with a pro and make them better."

Points, 35, turned pro in 1999 and first played in the AT&T in 2004. Prior to his two-shot title last year with a final-round 5-under 67 at Pebble Beach, Points had little AT&T success. He's played in the event five times, finishing 14th in 2008 and missing the cut three times.

These days, even when he's in high school, a promising young golfer "has everything, the best help, the best equipment," said Points during the tournament's recent media day at Monterey Peninsula Country Club. "So by the time he's 20 or 21, he's way ahead of where I was at 20 or 21, and I was ahead of the guys who came before me."

A record six PGA Tour rookies were victorious last season, with the remaining titlists including exuberant youngsters, unheralded journeymen and one

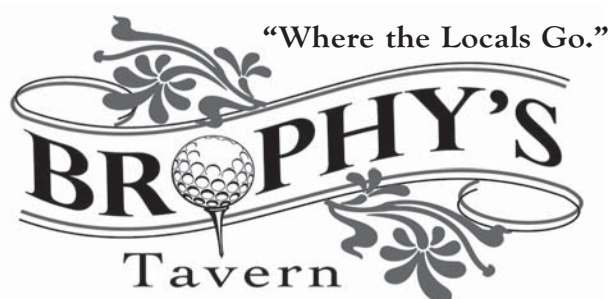
PGA Tour veteran who, just prior to winning at age 40 was about to quit the game.

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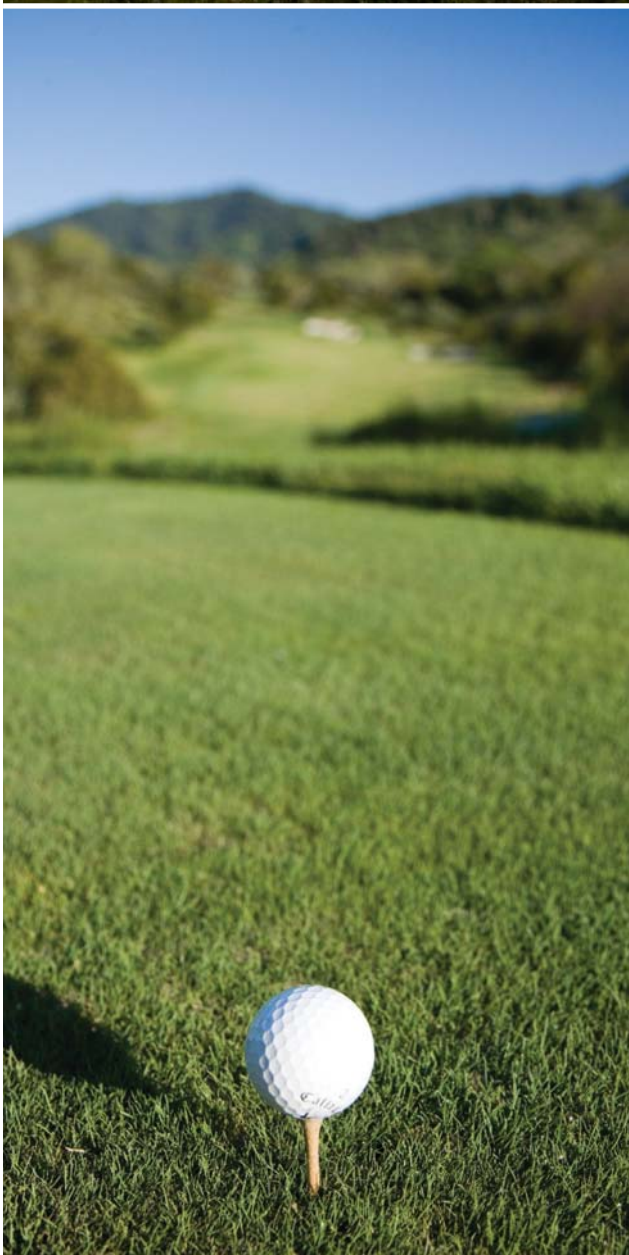


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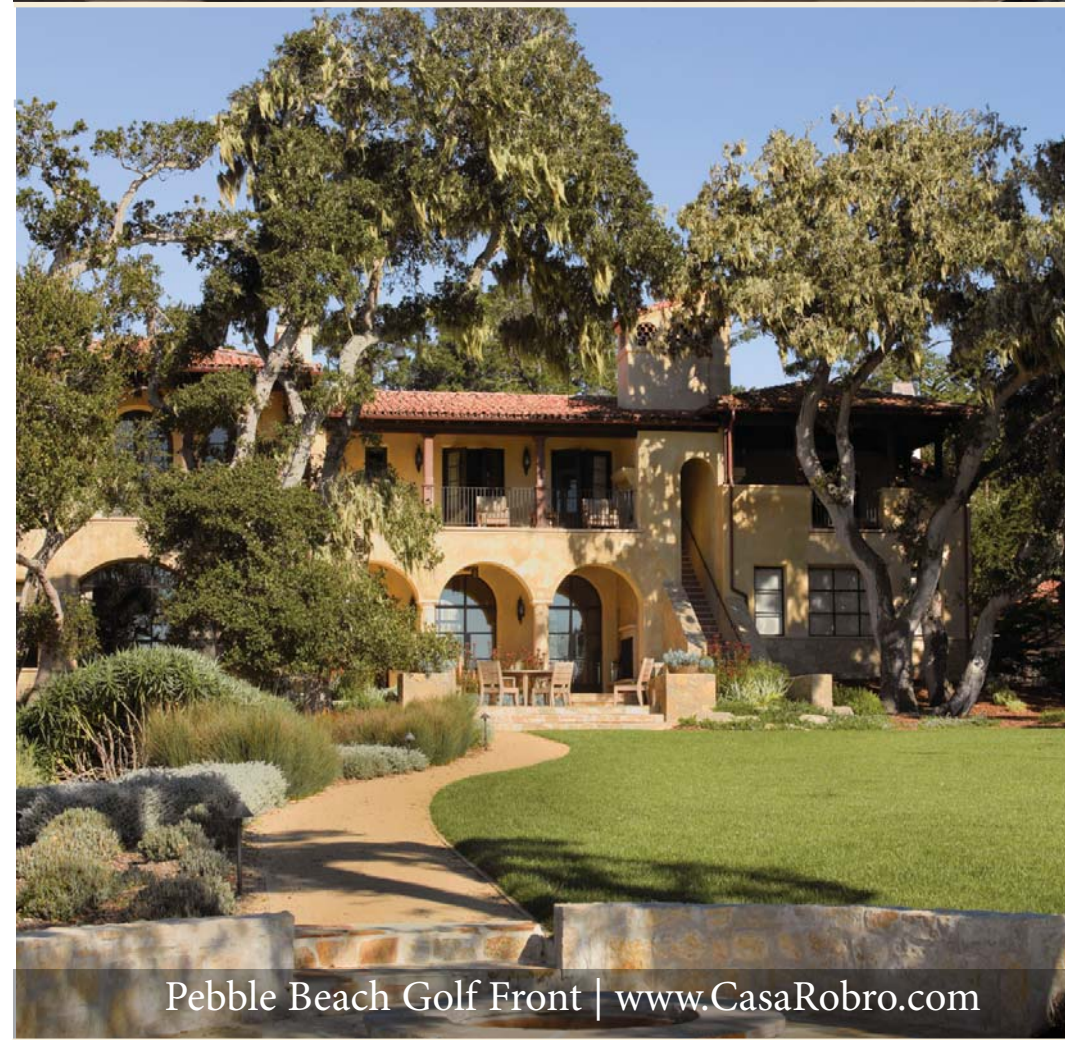

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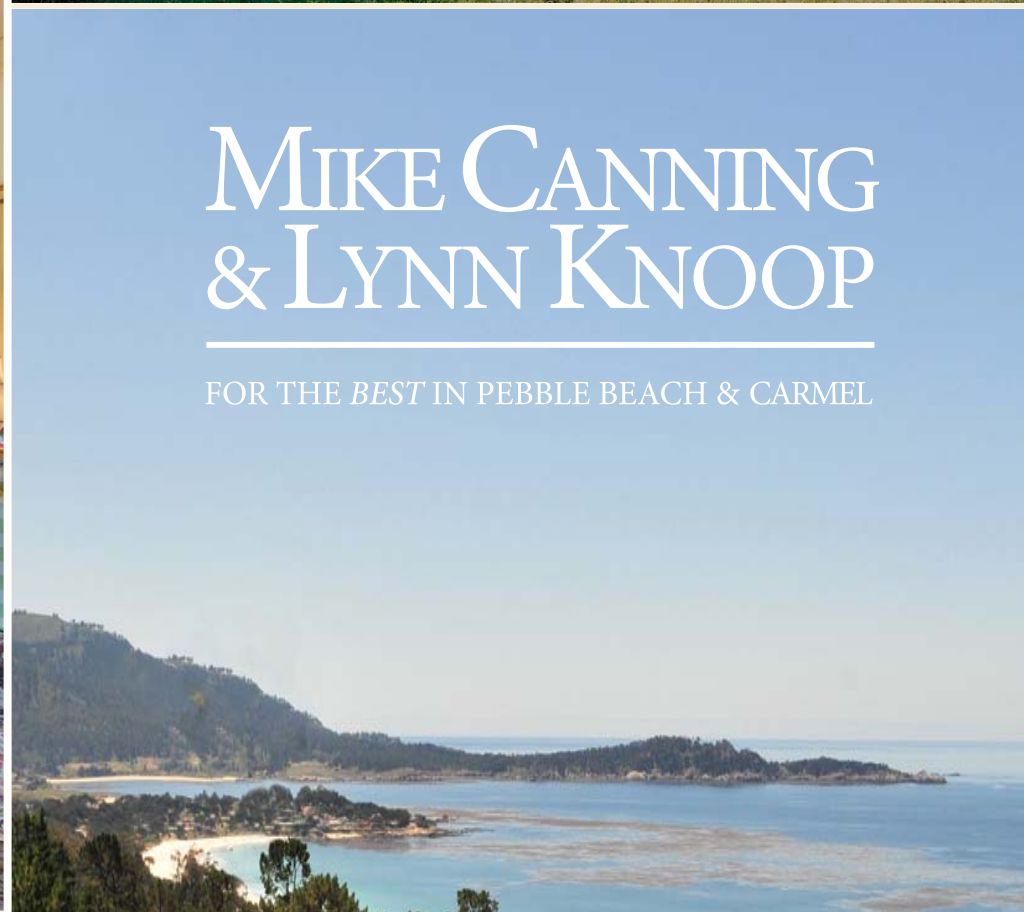

Championship) and Kevin Na (Justin Timberlake Shriners Open) claimed their first PGA Tour titles last season.

During the 2002 season, a record 18 players won for the first time. But last year's tally continued a two-year PGA Tour trend in which 23 players have been victorious for the first time.

Tiger Woods' loss of his No. 1 world ranking and his PGA Tour winless streak dating to September 2009 also helped create opportunities for golfers to emerge at the top of leader boards.

Although the field will be finalized just prior to tournament week, and replacements and alternates are sometimes added prior to early week practice rounds, Points will be joined by 2011 first-time winners Jacobson, Frazar, Molder and Kirk.

Points acknowledges the role Woods' downfall played in giving other players a chance to win. But he also gives credit to the rising pedigrees of international players like Rory Mclroy of Northern Ireland and Schwartzel, a South African.

Last June, Mclroy, at 22, became the youngest golfer since Bobby Jones in 1923 to win the U.S. Open. Schwartzel finished with four birdies to claim the Masters last April at age 26.

"To some degree, Tiger not winning is certainly a factor," said Points, who was ranked 167th in the world when

he claimed the AT&T. "But I also think guys are getting older and, if they falter a little bit, they don't have as much leeway."

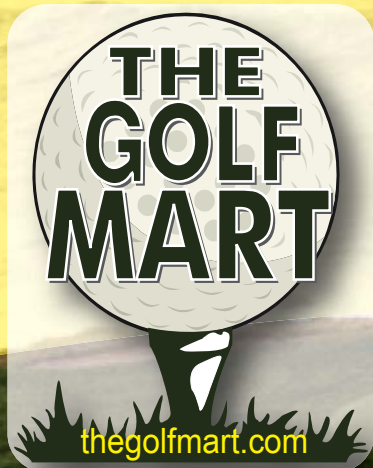
Points also observed that "Tiger, at one point, said he won without out his 'A game.' And he can probably still do that, but it will be a lot less frequent than it was. He used to win maybe twice a year without his 'A game.' And now he may not win on those weeks."

Frazar, who recently turned age 40, was the exception to the younger play-

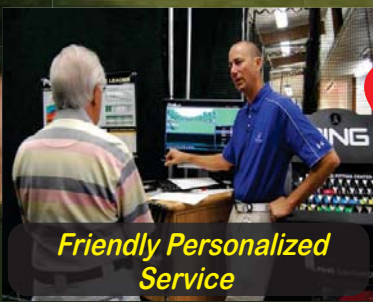
D.A. Points' victory at the Pebble Beach Pro-Am last year was his first on the PGA Tour.

Pro-Am supports Big Sur clinic, kids with dreams and CALSTAR

A FIREFIGHTER injured on the job finds medical care through the Big Sur Health Center. A student with no previous hope of attending college uses the Dare to Dream Fund to earn a scholarship. The California Shock Trauma Air Rescue helicopter transports an accident victim to the hands of critical-care medical personnel.

These real-life occurrences have all made headlines, with the nonprofits behind them appropriately applauded. But all three found financial assistance from the Monterey Peninsula Foundation's disbursement of charitable funds generated through the AT&T Pebble Beach National Pro-Am.

From the time Bing Crosby brought his fun-filled tournament to Pebble Beach, the main thrust of the event has been to blend golf and philanthropy. In 65 years, it generated more than \$85 million for nonprofits in and around Monterey County, focusing on the areas of arts and culture, community and environment, education, health and human services, and youth.

Charitable organizations apply to the foundation annually for grants, outlining their goals and their expected impact on the community.

In Big Sur, few organizations impact that community more than the Big Sur Health Center, since 1979 the remote region's only health care facility.

The notorious Basin Complex fire in 2008 scorched the wilderness, razed homes and forced residents to flee. But the third largest wildfire in the history of the state did not claim lives, or destroy the spirit of residents, thanks in no small part to the Big Sur Health Center.

During the fire, the center set up and managed medical clinics at two strategic base camps and ended up providing care to more than 1,300 firefighters. Health center staff members helped coordinate strategic planning during the evacuation. They also provided health care guidance, assisted with prescription needs, and offered free and discounted services to anyone financially affected by the fires.

It's that type of community service that earned the nonprofit a \$20,000 grant last year from the Monterey Peninsula Foundation.

"I'm so proud of the work we do in providing med-

ical care to a wide variety of people — employees, tourists and residents, regardless of their ability to pay," said Mary Ann Vasconcellos, vice president of the Big Sur Health Center board. "Our financial challenges require us to raise 50 cents on the dollar, so it's critical that we are recognized by these wonderful programs, such as the Monterey Peninsula Foundation. We are so grateful."

Gratitude is a common theme among the hundreds of deserving groups, many who simply couldn't survive financially without the aid of such grants and donations.

Dawn Verdick's Dare to Dream, a nonprofit platform that brings together organizations to support the educational goals of local students, received \$84,000 last year. Verdick's tech-inspired program has empowered hundreds of students to navigate the often-challenging path to college.

"We're building a model around technology that brings communities together to leverage our resources," she said, pointing to her group's iConnect

Local arts groups benefit every time a golfer takes a swing

THE APPEARANCE of Tiger Woods at this weekend's AT&T Pebble Beach National Pro-Am for the first time in a decade means ticket sales for the world class golf event have been through the roof.

Joining Woods are dozens of other professional golfers at the storied tournament, not to mention celebrity players such as Bill Murray, Don Cheadle, Chris O'Donnell and Josh Duhamel, who are all big draws for those who don't even play golf.

Whether you go to the pro-am to see the pros, spot celebs or both, there are numerous worthy nonprofit organizations that rely on revenue generated

After seven decades at the pro-am, he's seen it all and then some

IT WAS 1947, and Bing Crosby, Monterey Peninsula Herald editor Ted Durein and businessman Dan Searle were getting ready to launch the

first Crosby Pro-Am at Pebble Beach. According to longtime volunteer Dick Searle — Dan's son — Bing told the locals, "If you can make a deal with Sam Morse to use his golf courses, and we'll have a golf tournament."

They did, the tournament began, and cars lined up at the Pebble Beach gate. The younger Searle remembers being told "to go up there and sell tickets." Little did he know he was starting a volunteer career that would span 66 tournaments. Searle, a World War II veteran, professional electrician and licensed pilot who serves on the Monterey Peninsula Airport board of directors, is chairman of communications and scoring for the tournament.

But after such a long run, this tournament will be his last.

Retiring isn't without its rewards, though. Searle jokes that when the staff heard he was going to give an interview to *The Pine Cone*, they offered to send someone with him to make sure he didn't say anything unprintable. He talks for a while and then perks up with an epiphany: "They can't fire me; I already resigned!"

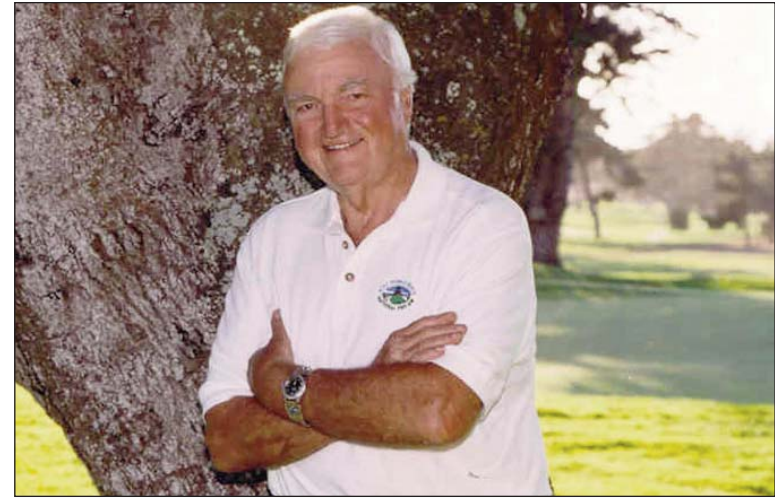
When the tournament started, Searle says, the technology was primitive, and so were the conditions.

"You just kept a [cardboard] scorecard," he recalled.

Early technology consisted of hand-cranked phones. "Pacific Bell was the phone company — a lot of stringing wire around," he said. To avoid all that wiring, they tried citizens' band radios.

But, "CBs didn't work because you'd pick up all the truck drivers on the freeway," Searle said.

Motorola brought in the first walkie-talkie radios, and hole reporters were assigned to use them to report scores. Today the score-

keepers use the ShotLink electronic scoring system to keep scores updated in real time. But even technology has its price.

"I've seen everything. One year, the wind blew all of our equipment out into the ocean," Searle said.

But his glass is always half full. Referring to a recent stay in Community Hospital of the Monterey Peninsula, he commented on the beautiful surroundings and excellent food. After he was discharged, a physical therapist came to visit, concerned about his lack of equilibrium.

He chuckles. "The therapist didn't want me to walk on the grass" — as if that were going to stop him from helping set up signs and equipment.

"I went all day long today and didn't fall down," he recalls. "I've had a lot of luck and good horseshoes in my life."

He attributes his more than 6,000 hours of safe flying in his 1965 Cessna 182 in part to a gift from Bing Crosby: "In 1947, for Christmas, Bing gave me a little St. Christopher key ring. I've always treasured it and still have it."

social media center. "Getting ready for college isn't easy. Many high schools only have two counselors for hundreds of kids."

Dare to Dream's poster child could very well be Cynthia Gonzalez, a 2010 graduate from North Salinas High School who used the program to earn a full-ride scholarship to UCLA.

"Here was an organization that not only asked me what I needed help with in the realm of higher education, but made me know that I could positively impact and help those like myself," said Gonzalez.

Her involvement with the Dare to Dream community made a difference in her life and in the lives of many of her peers who are now attending college. What's more, Gonzalez is helping run a micro-scholarship fund, giving kids the funds necessary to make collegiate dreams a reality.

"Dare to Dream helped me realize that helping my community matters and gives me a sense of purpose," she said.

The Monterey Peninsula Foundation helps its community in another way, through Birdies for Charity, a supplemental fundraising program that also operates through the AT&T tournament. Nonprofits solicit participation in a pledge drive, based on the total number of birdies made by professionals during the tournament. The Monterey Peninsula Foundation administers the program and covers all associated costs, including pledge forms, prizes and collecting donations. All of collected pledges go directly to the soliciting charity, with an additional 15 percent match.

Charities have collectively raised more than \$725,000 in the program's four-year history. One beneficiary is CALSTAR, the nonprofit, regional air ambulance service based in several cities, including

Salinas.

"Many foundations encourage fiscal sustainability, but few take an active role in helping nonprofits achieve their fundraising goals," said Mike Nichols, director of development and outreach for CAL-

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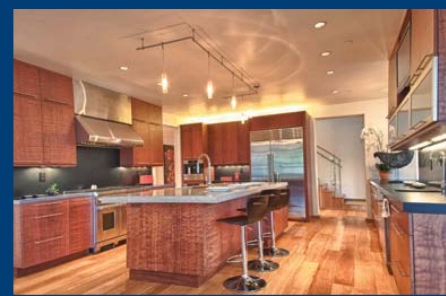
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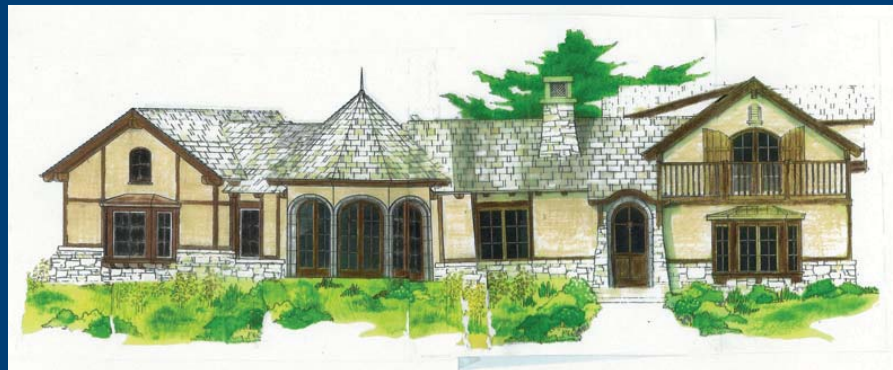


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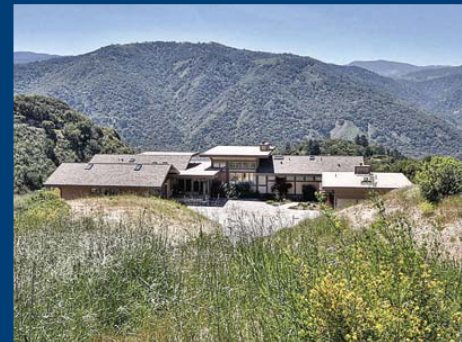

THE HISTORY

The Pebble Beach Pro-Am actually got its start in 1937, when Bing Crosby invited a group of friends to get together for a round of golf and a “clambake” at Rancho Santa Fe in Southern California. That gathering of Hollywood celebrities and golf greats gave birth to the first National Pro-Amateur Golf Championship, sponsored by Bing Crosby, with Sam Snead taking the top prize of \$500.

For five years, the tournament was played at Rancho Santa Fe before being discontinued during the war years. Meanwhile, 1946 was shaping up to be a bleak year for the Monterey Peninsula. Postwar Monterey was frantically scraping for income, the chief source having been packed into sardine tins for just about the last time. Cannery Row was heading into a long decline, Carmel wasn't a worldwide tourist attraction, Pebble Beach had yet to be classified as the finest course in the world, and nobody had heard of a young, would-be actor named Clint Eastwood.

At this time, a young newspaper reporter, Ted Durein, came up with the idea of attracting more tourists by bringing a major special event to the area. A good sporting event, once a year, perhaps garnished with celebri-

ties, could anchor a drifting economy. Slowly an idea began to take shape, along with a worldwide household name: Crosby.

Durein solicited local merchants to see if they would pool money for a tournament purse — they would. Bravely, Durein wrote to Bing Crosby himself with the idea. That was in January of 1946. February and March passed. Nothing. April, May, still nothing. Then, in June, a letter from Bing's brother, Larry, arrived. Yes, Bing was interested. What's the offer? Durein didn't have one.

The deal is struck

He quickly rushed to see if Samuel F.B. Morse (president of Del Monte Properties, now known as Pebble Beach Company) would let the Pebble Beach golf course host the Crosby. Morse agreed. Ted met with Larry Crosby and the deal was struck.

Bing then decided he wanted the tournament spread out over three courses: Pebble Beach, Cypress Point and the Monterey Peninsula Country Club's Dunes Course. The PGA Tour, the controlling body of the professional golfers' tournament, said this wasn't possible. Bing asked, “Why not? It's done in England.” The PGA Tour consented and the Crosby Pro-Am broke new ground in American golf and was played for the first time on the Monterey Peninsula in January 1947.

Since then, the annual tournament at Pebble Beach has been a staple of the PGA Tour calendar. The tournament purse has increased from \$500 for first prize in 1937 to a first prize of \$1,152,000 this year. The monies for charity each year have continued to set new records as well, with total contributions hitting \$85 million.

Bing Crosby died in 1977. His wife and children continued to host the Crosby Pro-Am until 1986, when AT&T took over sponsorship of the event. The event was played at Pebble Beach, Poppy Hills and Spyglass, until MPCC's Shore Course replaced Poppy Hills in 2010. Over the last 20 years, the event has provided some of the most dramatic moments in golf, including Hale Irwin's fantastically lucky tee shot in 1984, and Tiger Woods' amazing comeback in 2000.

It has also endured some of the worst weather ever for a major sporting event. Twice, after particularly cold and rainy spells, tournament organizers have talked about moving the Pro-Am. But most years, there have been glorious, only-in-California conditions for the Pebble Beach Pro-Am. And the memories have been golden, too.

1993

Winner: **Brett Ogle**
68-68-69-71 (276)

Gregarious Australian Brett Ogle captured his first PGA Tour victory at Pebble Beach with a three-shot triumph in the AT&T Pro-Am, despite four bogeys in six holes during the final round. With a steady rain falling through much of the day, Ogle birdied three of the last six holes to fend off challengers Billy Ray Brown and Greg Twigs. Ogle's first-place finish was worth \$225,000. Tom Watson had the

low round on the final day, with birdies on 10, 11, 18, 6, 7 and 9. Payne Stewart and Jim Morris won the Pro-Am title, after Mark McGwire knocked his team out of contention with a bogey on 18.

1994

Winner: **Johnny Miller**
68-72-67-74 (281)

Defying the calendar, 46-year-old Johnny Miller captured the AT&T Pro-Am, and even he had trouble believing it. “I play two tournaments a year . . . this is magic,” he said. The win was Miller's third title in three different decades at the Pebble Beach charity event — he had previously won in 1974 and 1987. Jeff Maggert, Corey Pavin, Kirk Triplett and Tom Watson all finished just one stroke behind Miller, who sank a one-foot putt for par on 18 to avoid a possible five-way playoff. It rained nearly all day during the final round and, with a gale blowing from the south, Miller got to the green in two on 17 to preserve his lead while Watson was bogeying 14, 16 and 17. Miller's first-place finish was worth \$225,000. Pro-Am winners were Dudley Hart and 18-year-old amateur Robert Floyd.

1995

Winner: **Peter Jacobsen**
67-73-66-65 (271)

With the best final round by a winner, Peter Jacobsen captured the \$252,000 winner's purse despite starting play at Pebble Beach on Sunday at

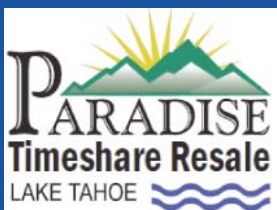

He loves that the AT&T Pro-Am is the “only tournament where amateurs play all four days — if they score well. It makes the game more colorful.”

Searle’s memories include last year’s pro-am champion, Bill Murray, taking time out to visit a dying fan in hospice.

“All by himself, no entourage, [Murray] drove up there in his car to see her. That’s the kind of guy he is,” Searle says.

He’s a fan of Arnold Palmer, too. He recounts watching Palmer prepare to swing, when “a little kid being chased by his mom runs up. Arnold picks him up, kisses him and then hits the ball six feet from the pin.”

He counted the bandleader and comic Phil Harris among his friends, along with actor Jack Lemmon.

“Jack would be hitting balls into the ocean, and I’d go talk to him. We became friends,” Searle says.

During the 2007 tournament, he received an award named after his friend: The Jack Lemmon Ambassador of Golf.

Searle has been honored for his service on other occasions. He is a member of the AT&T Pro-Am Forty Year Club. In 2003, he was named Volunteer of the Year for the PGA Tour.

It’s the results that count

When asked why he has volunteered for so long, Searle says, “I see the results on the Monterey Peninsula. We get to hear about all the grants we give out.”

Searle and his poodle, Winnie, will probably be found in Canary Cottage where, he is happy to say, his office will be this year.

“Winnie flies with me, sleeps with me and lives with me,” he says. “The girls in the office made a badge for Winnie that says, ‘Crowd Control.’”

About to say goodbye to the golf tournament he’s served so well, Searle says, “I’ll miss all the people that I met, and the people that I work with.”

And then he modestly adds, “The only people who are going to remember me are people who worked with me.”

What will he do next year when the tournament comes around? “I’ll probably watch it on TV,” he says with a wistful look.

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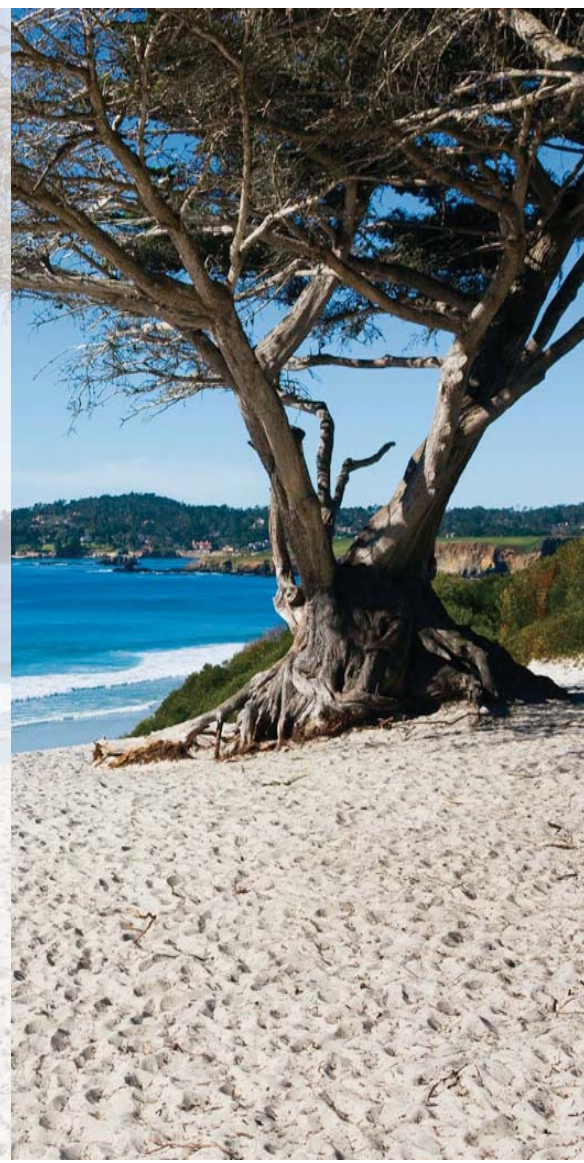
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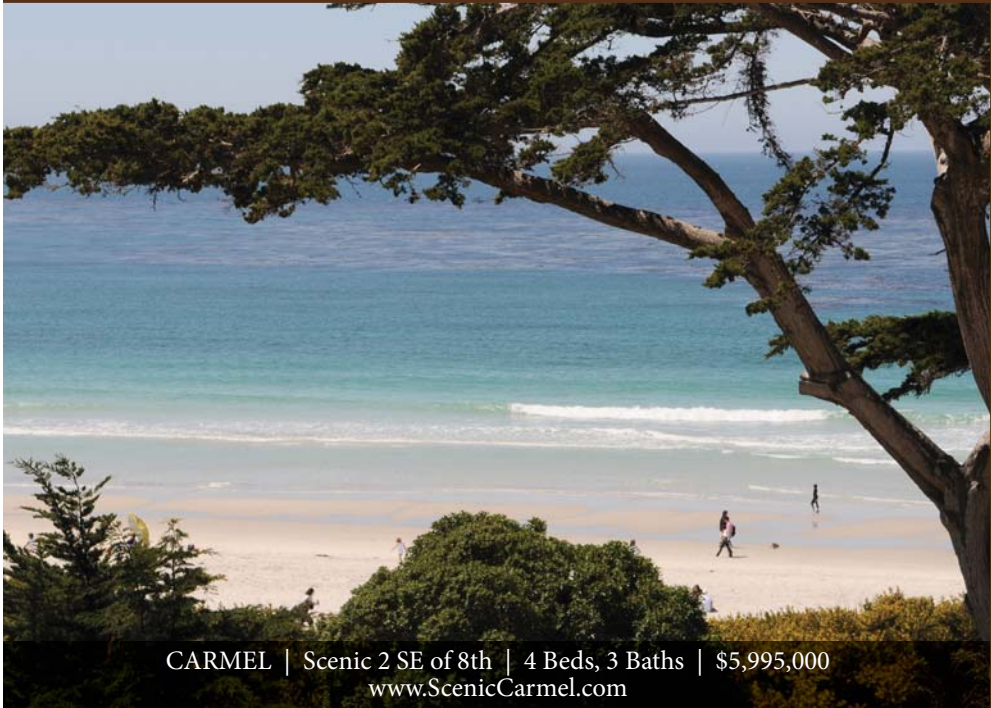
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Plenty of celebrities you know, and some you'd definitely like to ...

CAMERAS MAY be banned during the tournament, and autograph-seeking is discouraged except when players have finished their rounds, but the AT&T Pebble Beach National Pro-Am is nevertheless one of the best opportunities to get close to your favorite star.

Whether you're a movie buff, love primetime drama, idolize professional athletes, get weak-kneed for rock stars, or thrill at the sight of gazillionaire businessmen, the fairways of Pebble Beach, Monterey Peninsula Country Club and Spyglass Hill are the place to be this weekend.

Here's a rundown of the celebrities who have

promised to play. We've also included one who won't play: Clint Eastwood who, as chairman of the foundation that sponsors the pro-am, is sure to be spotted around the links.

■ Anthony Anderson

Best known today for his roles in films such as "Transformers" and "The Departed," Anthony Anderson also starred in his own sitcom, "About the Andersons," and had featured roles on "Law & Order" and "The Shield," as well as on the comedy program, "The Bernie Mac Show."

■ Harris Barton

An offensive lineman for the San Francisco 49ers during some of the team's best years, including the 1989, 1990 and 1995 Super Bowl-winning seasons, Harris Barton was also Rookie of the Year in his first NFL season.

■ Bill Belichick

It's hard to believe, but according to AT&T Pebble Beach Pro-Am officials, Bill Belichick will be playing this year, just a few days after losing Super Bowl XLVI to the New York Giants in a heartbreaker.

While the 21-17 loss was tough, it hardly tarnishes his amazing coaching career, which includes taking his team to the Super Bowl five times in 12 years and winning three.

Before the Belichick-Tom Brady era, the New England Patriots had never won the Super Bowl. For the last decade, they have dominated it.

■ Chris Berman

Six times selected National Sportscaster of the Year, Chris Berman has also won 10 Emmys and this year was his 27th as host of the ESPN Sunday NFL studio show and his 23rd as a baseball announcer for the cable network. A longtime aficionado of rock 'n' roll, Berman has appeared onstage singing with Huey Lewis and the News many times. In addition, he sang twice with Eddie Money, appeared in a video with Hootie and the Blowfish, and was joined by Glenn Frey of the Eagles for a special "Hotel California" Super Bowl edition of "The Swami."

Berman has played himself in 11 motion pictures and on several television shows. He has also appeared on "Late Night with David Letterman," "The Tonight Show with Jay Leno" and "Jimmy Kimmel Live."

In 2009, Berman received one of the most distinguished honors in the entertainment industry when he was selected to receive a star on the Hollywood Walk of Fame.

■ Lucas Black

The star of the former CBC series, "American Gothic," Lucas Black has appeared in the films, "Sling Blade," "Friday Night Lights," "Legion," "Get Low," and "All the Pretty Horses."

■ Michael Bolton

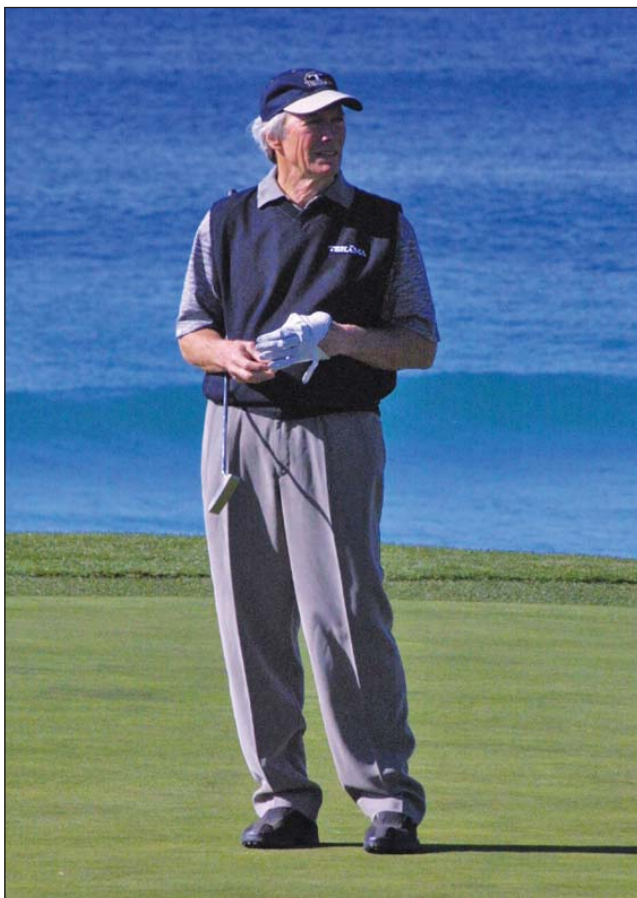
One of the world's top-selling vocalists and song writers, Michael Bolton has sold more than 45 million albums during his career and has won two Grammys for Best Male Vocalist and six American Music Awards. He has also achieved a string of No. 1 hits (including more than 100 songs he has written for other world-renowned artists, such as Conway Twitty, Barbra Streisand, Kiss, Kenny Rogers, Kenny G, Peabo Bryson and Patti LaBelle).

In 1993, he established the Michael Bolton Foundation (now the Michael Bolton Charities) to assist women and children at risk from the effects of poverty and emotional, physical and sexual abuse.

Last year, he also appeared on "Dancing With the Stars," but he was eliminated quickly because, while he can sing beautifully, he can't dance at all.

■ Matt Cain

A right-handed starting pitcher for the San Francisco Giants, Matt Cain made his major league debut in 2005 when he was just 20 years old. His best season was 2009, when he compiled a 14-8 record. He also won two games during the 2010 postseason, including pitching 7 and 2/3 scoreless innings during Game 2 of the 2010 World Series against the Texas Rangers.

■ Don Cheadle

An actor who has mastered some of the most frightening roles on the silver screen, Don Cheadle was nominated for a Best Actor Academy Award in 2005 for "Hotel Rwanda." He first became well known for playing the district attorney on the television series "Picket Fences." Since then, he has appeared in "Rosewood," "The Family Man," "Boogie Nights," "Out of Sight," "Traffic," and "Ocean's Eleven." He also starred in, and was one of the producers of "Crash," which won the 2006 Academy Award for Best Picture. Currently, he stars in the Showtime comedy, "House of Lies."

■ Eric Close

From 2002 to 2009, Eric Close starred in the CBS hit, "Without a Trace," as FBI agent Martin Fitzgerald. He had a brief stint in daytime when he played Sawyer Walker on NBC's daytime drama, "Santa Barbara," and then had many guest appearances on television, landing leading roles on such shows as "McKenna," "Now and Again," and the Steven Spielberg-produced miniseries, "Taken." He is a star of the CBS comedy-drama series, "Chaos," which is about rogue CIA agents.

■ Jeffrey Donovan

An extensive acting resume includes Jeffrey Donovan's dramatic portrayal last year of Robert F. Kennedy in Clint Eastwood's "J.

Edgar." He also appeared in Eastwood's "Changeling," "Hitch," with Will Smith and Kevin James, and "Come Early Morning," with Ashley Judd. On television, he had a supporting role in "Crossing Jordan," and currently stars in "Burn Notice" on USA Networks.

■ Tom Dreesen

A comedian who has played Vegas, Reno and Atlantic City with the likes of Liza Minelli and Sammy Davis, Jr., and who spent a decade as Frank Sinatra's opening act, Tom Dreesen has also appeared in many network television shows, including more than 50 appearances on the "Tonight Show" and guest roles on TV shows such as "Columbo," "Gabriel's Fire," "Murder She Wrote" and "Touched By An Angel." To show his versatility, he once recorded a comedy album, "That White Boy's Crazy," before an all-black audience. According to Dreesen, he never strayed too far from his old neighborhood, and to show appreciation, the city of Harvey, Ill., named a street after him, Dreesen Street, on Aug. 22, 1992.

■ Clyde Drexler

A 10-time NBA All-Star and member of the NBA Hall of Fame, Clyde Drexler also won an Olympic Gold Medal in 1992 and an NBA Championship in 1995 with the Houston Rockets. He played most of his career for the Portland Trailblazers.

■ Josh Duhamel

Married to the singer Fergie, and the star of three "Transformers" films, Josh Duhamel was a fashion model and first achieved acting success in 1999 as Leo du Pres on ABC's, "All My Children," and later as the chief of security, Danny McCoy, on NBC's, "Las Vegas." He was also the official

pace car driver for the 2009 Indianapolis 500 driving a 2010 Chevrolet Camaro.

■ Clint Eastwood

Mayor of Carmel-by-the-Sea from 1986 to 1988, chairman of the board of directors of the AT&T Pebble Beach Pro Am's sponsoring organization and supporter of numerous local charitable and conservation causes, the indefatigable Clint Eastwood is a familiar face on the Monterey Peninsula. Winner of Best Director and Best Actor Oscars for "Unforgiven" (1992), and Best Actor and Best Picture Oscars for "Million Dollar Baby" (2004), Eastwood has appeared in, produced and/or directed more than 50 motion pictures. His latest movie, "J. Edgar," starred Leonardo DiCaprio. Eastwood made quite a splash last Sunday with his Super Bowl commercial for Chrysler, is currently preparing to direct a remake of "A Star is Born," starring Beyonce, and will also portray an ailing baseball scout in the film, "Trouble With the Curve," directed by his longtime producer, Rob Lorenz. In 2000, Eastwood was honored by President Bill Clinton with the Kennedy Center Medal for his lifetime achievements in the arts. He lives in Pebble Beach with his wife, Dina, and daughter, Morgan.

■ Herman Edwards

A former resident of Seaside and a high school football player in Monterey, Herman Edwards had a stellar NFL career, mostly with the Philadelphia Eagles, and made one of the most memorable plays in league history on Nov. 19, 1978, when he returned "The Fumble" by the New York Giants quarterback Joe Pisarcik. He was head coach of the New York Jets and Kansas City Chiefs, and currently is a studio analyst for ESPN.

■ Jackie Flynn

One of the funniest comedians to come out of Boston, Mass., Jackie Flynn was discovered on stage by the Farrelly brothers, who have since cast him in back-to-back roles in "King Pin," "There's Something About Mary," "Me, Myself And Irene," "Shallow Hal" and "Stuck On You," where he played opposite pop-diva Cher. Fans of the hit show, "The King Of Queens," will recognize Jackie from his many appearances on that show, as well as his role along side the likes of Burt Reynolds, NFL coach Jimmy Johnson and Jerome Bettis as one of the "Men Of The Square Table" in the Miller Lite "Man Law" commercials.

■ Kenny G

Legendary saxophonist and the best-selling instrumentalist in the world, Kenny G has been a constant presence on the Billboard charts for more than 15 years. His career as a saxophonist began at 17 when he backed up Barry White in a concert in Seattle, Kenny G's hometown. When he signed his first recording contract in 1982, a new era in instrumental music was born.

■ Andy Garcia

Born in Cuba in 1956, Garcia's family fled to Miami Beach after Castro came to power. He studied acting in Florida before heading to Los Angeles, where his first role was as a gang member on the first episode of "Hill Street Blues." Garcia later starred in "The Untouchables," "The Godfather, Part III," "Desperate Measures" and "Ocean's Eleven," and its sequels.

■ Jim Harbaugh

NFL coach of the year for the 2011, Jim Harbaugh's hiring earlier in the year as coach of the San Francisco 49ers from Stanford University seemed to promise a new era for the once-great team. But few expected the results to be so quick and so spectacular: The 49ers finished with a 13-3 record and made it all the way to the NFC Championship, where they lost to the New York Giants in a memorable overtime game. A former NFL quarterback, Harbaugh played for the Chicago Bears, Indianapolis Colts, Baltimore Ravens and San Diego Chargers. His older brother, John, is head coach of the Baltimore Ravens.

■ Oliver Hudson

The son of Goldie Hawn and brother of Kate Hudson, Oliver Hudson is the star of the CBS Series "Rules Of Engagement" with David Spade. He also appeared in "My Guide to Becoming a Rock Star" and "The Mountain" and had supporting roles in the films, "New Best Friend" and "The 'Out-of-Towners.'" Hudson played in the 2005 World Series of Poker Main Event but went broke on the very first hand, losing to 2003 runner-up Sam Farha (who had a better Full House).

■ Huey Lewis

A native of New York and a familiar face at the Pebble Beach Pro-Am, Huey Lewis created his breakthrough group, Huey Lewis and the News, in Marin County in 1980. Their first album produced a top-10 hit, "Do You Believe in Love?" and was followed by five other top-20 recordings. Lewis also recorded the theme song, "The Power of Love," for the movie, "Back to the Future."

■ George Lopez

Always willing to engage fans at the AT&T Pebble Beach Pro-Am, the multitasking George Lopez was host of his own late-night talk show on TBS and was also the writer and co-producer of the long-running ABC Wednesday night sitcom, "George Lopez," which was a hit with critics and viewers. Lopez, a resident of Pebble Beach, performs on stage, film and television and has earned kudos for his performance in the HBO Films drama, "Real Women Have Curves." Previously, Lopez was featured in the

acclaimed drama, "Bread and Roses." His numerous television credits include appearances on "The Tonight Show," "Good Morning America," "The View, Live with Regis and Kelly," "The Late Late Show with Craig Kilborn" and "Resurrection Boulevard."

■ Bill Murray

A favorite at the AT&T Pro-Am, Murray is one of America's unique talents. Born in 1950 in Wilmette, Ill., Murray first moved to the nation's center stage when he joined the cast of "Saturday Night Live" in 1977. While still with SNL, Murray made his first hit film, "Meatballs." Soon after, he was transformed into Carl Speckler, assistant greenskeeper, in the classic golf comedy, "Caddyshack." That film was directed by Harold Ramis, who starred with Murray in "Ghostbusters" (1984) and directed Murray again in "Groundhog Day" in 1993. His current projects include "Hyde Park on the Hudson," in which he plays Franklin D. Roosevelt, and "Ghostbusters III," which is still in the development stage.

■ Chris O'Donnell

A native of Winnetka, Ill., Chris O'Donnell is best known for his portrayal of Robin in "Batman Forever" and "Batman and Robin," and for his role in "Scent of a Woman," which earned him a Best

Supporting Actor Oscar nomination. He also got highly favorable reviews for "The Three Musketeers" in 1993. Recently, he appeared in "Vertical Limit," "29 Palms" and "Kinsey." O'Donnell currently plays the role of Callen in the NCIS spin-off, "NCIS: Los Angeles," which premiered in September of 2009.

■ Aaron Rodgers

After playing his college ball at UC Berkeley, Aaron Rodgers was drafted in 2005 by the Green Bay Packers as backup to Brett Favre. In 2008, when the Packers traded the legendary Favre to the New York Jets, proclaiming Rodgers to be their "quarterback of the future," the news was met with widespread astonishment, but Rodgers soon proved everybody wrong, becoming one of the league's best players and winning Super Bowl XLV in 2011. Rodgers is the NFL's all-time career leader in passer rating during both the regular season (104.1), and the post-season (105.5).

■ Ray Romano

Ray Romano was star of the hit CBS comedy, "Everybody Loves Raymond," which finished a nine-year run as prime time's highest-rated comedy

the lowest since Mark O'Meara's 273 in 1985, but with clean-and-place rules in effect because of a wet course, Jacobsen said his record score deserved "an asterisk." With a bit of sun finally showing through the clouds, Jacobsen birdied 18 to seal his victory. David Duval, in his first full year on the PGA Tour, finished in second place, two strokes back. Pro-Am winners were Bruce Vaughn and amateur Masahi Yamada.

1996

Winner: nobody

Tournament canceled due to unplayable conditions

The weather on Sunday was pleasant: low clouds, some sun, no rain. But heavy rains earlier in the week, including a torrential downpour on Saturday, left the courses — especially Spyglass — in unplayable condition, forcing outright cancellation of the AT&T Pro-Am due to weather for the first, and only, time in its history. (Play was suspended from 1942 to 1946 because of

World War II.) In particular, one flooded spot on 16 at Spyglass was cited by PGA officials as requiring cancellation of the event. Jeff Maggert was the leader at 136 after 54 holes; he got \$5,000 in consolation money, just like all the other pros in the field.

1997

Winner: **Mark O'Meara**
67-67-67-67 (268)

Fighting off an amazing comeback by Tiger Woods — who was in 67th place on Friday and trailed by seven

shots Sunday morning — Mark O'Meara won his fifth AT&T Pebble Beach Pro-Am by a single shot over Woods and David Duval. Woods, playing in a foursome one hole ahead of O'Meara, had six birdies in the first 12 holes but bogeyed 13. Two shots down on 18, Woods made a dramatic bid for an eagle on 18. His second shot, from 267 yards out, landed on the front of the green. But he missed a 35-foot putt and had to settle for a birdie. O'Meara's all-time low score at the

Here are several arts nonprofits that make the Carmel and the Monterey Peninsula a culturally richer place.

■ Carmel Bach Festival

Celebrating its 75 anniversary this July, the illustrious Carmel Bach Festival is the city's biggest arts event of the year.

The festival — which celebrates the music and ideas "inspired by the historical and ongoing influence of Johann Sebastian Bach" — is embarking on a new era with the arrival in the spring of executive director Debbie Chinn, who most recently worked for the Philadelphia Orchestra.

When she begins her job in the spring, Chinn will join energetic conductor and musical director Paul Goodwin, a British early music specialist who was ushered in last summer. By all accounts, Goodwin's first season was stellar. And the \$30,000 received from the AT&T Pebble Beach National Pro-Am last year was a big help, since ticket sales at the Bach Fest don't cover all of the organization's overhead.

Besides offering many works by Bach, Goodwin also brought in some-

thing new last summer with the program entitled, "Bach, Jazz, and the Spaces-in-Between," which explored standards by jazz greats, including John Coltrane and Dizzy Gillespie.

This year, Goodwin carries on his inaugural season success with the Festival's 2012 program with the theme "Bach: Spheres of Influence."

Those who have attended the Carmel Bach Festival for years rely on extraordinary performances. But newcomers to the Carmel Bach Festival can expect much more than a bunch of concerts. Organizers best describe the festival this way: "Transcending the traditional boundaries of performance and presentation, the Carmel Bach Festival provides fresh contexts of relevance that enable listeners to experience beauty and wonder, sparking the imagination, stimulating conversation and enriching lives in unpredictable ways."

■ Forest Theater Guild

Founded as the Forest Theater Society by Herbert Heron in 1910, the Forest Theater Guild is a treasured Carmel institution and faithfully carries on the tradition of presenting quality performing arts and to foster growth and appreciation of dramatic arts in the community with a special emphasis on young people.

The guild's productions year after year have been held at the rustic Forest Theater, the oldest outdoor theater the west of the Rockies. The theater has been updated considerably since its first production in 1910 but retains a lot of the rugged charm of the original.

The first play at the theater was attended by 1,000 people who saw "David," written by Constance Skinner and directed by the well known professional coach, Garnet Holme, from the University of California.

Heron and Carmel's Bohemians built the Forest Theater to provide an open-air venue where plays could be produced by "locals, who would also have the fun doing the acting, directing, lighting, costuming and staging," according to Heron's letters.

The Forest Theater Guild continues the tradition and the vision that "community theater is an essential societal value in our current culture and continues to encourage arts for our youth and betterment of our society."

Though theatergoers won't find any frills at the Forest Theater, devotees of the venue's events are just as glad to bring along a blanket, a bottle of wine and some cheese and crackers while they enjoy a performance.

In 2011, the Forest Theater Guild presented "Peter and the Wolf" and "Once Upon a Mattress," both of which featured live orchestras. The live performances the guild will offer this year include "James and the Giant Peach" from May 25 to June 17, and "Cyrano de Bergerac," which opens June 28 and runs until July 22.

Last year, the Forest Theater Guild received a donation of \$15,000 from the foundation which sponsors the AT&T Pro-Am. ■ Pacific Repertory Theatre

The only professional theater on the Monterey Peninsula, PacRep Theatre for more than three decades has presented "bold and daring" interpretations of plays, from comedies and romance, to drama and musicals.

Founded by Carmel resident Stephen Moorer as the GroveMont theater in 1982, the theater company was renamed in 1994 when it moved into the historic Golden Bough Theatre.

In 2001, after an appearance by actors Olympia Dukakis and Louis Zorich in Chekhov's "The Cherry Orchard," PacRep initiated steps to become a professional theater.

Every year, PacRep presents as many as a dozen productions.

The 2012 season started off with a bang with its School of Dramatic Arts presentation of the colorful musical "Hairspray" — which runs until Feb. 19. The season continues March 9 with the opening of Disney's "The Aristocats Kids." "Fiddler on the Roof" and "39 Steps" are also among the productions PacRep will present at the Golden Bough this year.

The company also offers plays at the 540-seat Forest Theater and 120-seat Circle Theatre. Later this year, PacRep will feature Disney's "Beauty and the Beast" and "Much ado About Nothing" at the Forest Theater, and "God of Carnage" and "Three Tall Women" at the Circle Theatre.

Last year, the company received a contribution of \$42,500 from the program.

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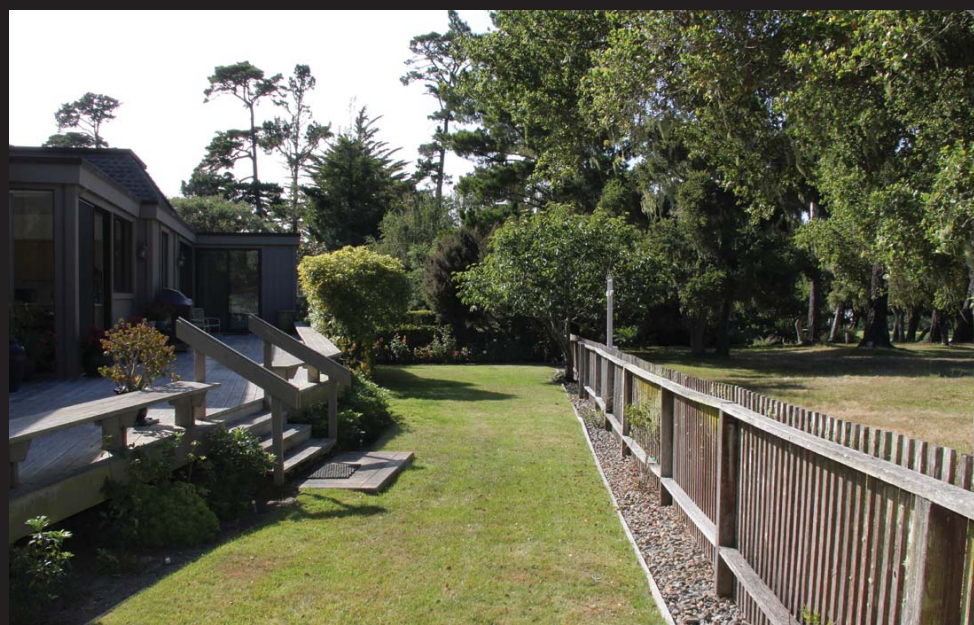

ers infiltrating golf's top ranks last season. Often injured throughout his 15 PGA Tour seasons, Frazar had four runner-up finishes but had played in 354 PGA Tour events without a win.

After hip and shoulder surgeries during the 2010 season, Frazar played last season via a medical exemption. He had missed five straight cuts and then left the PGA Tour for several weeks. He even accepted a job offer in his native Texas and planned to retire after two more events.

But when Frazar returned in June for what he expected would be his career finales, he finished tied for 14th at the HP Byron Nelson Champion and two weeks later won his first title on the third extra hole of the FedEx St. Jude Classic.

And in November, Frazar also won the rain-plagued Callaway Golf Pebble Beach Invitational. A few minutes after his win, as he has done several since with national golf publications,

he freely discussed how the lack of winning had affected his life.

"I doubted everything," said Frazar, who in January finished tied for fifth in the Hyundai Tournament of Champions and tied for second at the Sony Open in Hawaii. "I doubted my own self-worth. I didn't think I could play anymore. It was killing me."

Frazar was ranked 583rd in the world when he claimed his first PGA Tour title, has only finished as high as tied for 25th in the AT&T and will be playing in the event for the 10th time dating to 1999.

Bradley, whose two wins propelled him to sixth on the 2011 season money list, agreed with Points. The PGA Tour still has its enduring stars, from Tiger Woods to Phil Mickelson. But the circuit is also increasingly popular as a result of decreasing player dominance.

"The PGA Tour is so deep, the top players are not dominating like they were, which I think is great," said Bradley, the PGA Tour's rookie of the year. "I think it gives an opportunity for a player like me to win this thing."

Monterey Peninsula Country Club's Shore Course, with its unsurpassed scenery, became part of the Pebble Beach pro-am two years ago.

event was worth \$342,000. Pro-am champs were Paul Stankowski and Andy Garcia.

1998

Winner: **Phil Mickelson**
67-68-67 (202)

A torrential downpour on Sunday brought back memories of 1996, when the AT&T Pro-Am was canceled after 54 holes. But in 1998, with California again experiencing record-breaking rains, PGA officials looked for a way to squeeze in a third round at Pebble Beach sometime later in the year. First, they set the final round for March 2. Later, it was rescheduled again to Aug. 17. The winner's check was \$450,000. The pro-am portion of the tournament was canceled.

1999

Winner: **Payne Stewart**
69-64-73 (206)

With weather getting seriously in the way for the fourth time in five years, the 1999 tournament was shortened to just 54 holes, just like it had been the year before. Saturday leader Payne Stewart was declared the winner of the \$504,000 first prize after heavy rains Saturday night and Sunday forced cancellation of the final round. Stewart's final shot on Saturday, a tap-in birdie on 18 at Spyglass, turned out to be the winner over Frank Lickliter, just one shot back. Pro-am winners were Lickliter and Robert MacDonnell. Later that year, Stewart won the U.S. Open at Pinehurst, S.C. He died in a plane crash Oct. 25, 1999, when carbon monoxide rendered everyone on board his chartered airplane unconscious soon after takeoff from Orlando, Fla. The plane flew on autopilot until it ran out of fuel and crashed in South Dakota, depriving Stewart of the chance to defend his U.S. Open and AT&T Pro-Am titles — both at Pebble Beach — in 2000.

2000

Winner: **Tiger Woods**
68-73-68-64 (273)

Leaving the crowd and the sportswriters practically speechless, Tiger Woods gave the AT&T Pro-Am a finish unlike any other. Down five shots when play began on Sunday, and even farther behind — seven shots — with just seven holes to play, Woods took complete control of his game and the tournament, capping his comeback with a 97-foot wedge shot on 15 that hit just to the right of the hole, took two bounces and landed in the cup. He nearly did the same on 16 and finished two strokes ahead of Vijay Singh and Matt Gogel to take the first prize of \$720,000. The win was Woods' sixth in a row on the PGA Tour. Pro-am champs were Skip Kendall and King City businessman David Gill. The tournament was the last Pebble Beach Pro-Am event for golf legend Jack Nicklaus.

2001

Winner: **Davis Love III**
71-69-69-63 (272)

Despite a seven-shot deficit when play started under sparkling, clear skies Sunday morning, Davis Love III put together an amazing round of 63, including five birdies and an eagle on the first six holes. On the front nine, he was an amazing eight under. Another birdie on 15 sealed his victory and the first-place money of \$720,000. Vijay Singh finished just one stroke back; Tiger Woods was eight strokes off the lead. Pro-am champs were Phil Mickelson and saxophonist Kenny G.

2002

Winner: **Matt Gogel**
66-72-67-69 (274)

With his first PGA Tour victory, Gogel picked up

a check for \$720,000 after shooting two under on the back nine during the final round. Two years earlier, Gogel had watched Tiger Woods stage an incredible comeback to take the tournament from him. This year, third-round leader Pat Perez, who was up by four strokes when play started Sunday, withered on the final day, shooting a triple bogey on the 18th Hole, opening the door for Gogel, who showed none of the nervousness of 2000. Tiger Woods shot 282, eight strokes off the lead (for the second year in a row). Pro-am winners were Brian Claar and Randall Mays.

2003

Winner: **Davis Love III**
72-67-67-68 (274)

With nothing but blue skies and mild temperatures throughout the tournament, talk of "Crosby Weather" and of moving the AT&T later in the year — a common topic in the storm-tossed 1990s — was completely forgotten. And with Tiger Woods sitting out the pro-am after consecutive years finishing eight strokes off the lead, all the attention was on less well known, but equally formidable, PGA stars. Davis Love III salvaged a victory with a birdie on 18 on the final day — holding off Tom Lehman by a single stroke. Love's win — his second in three years — came despite a bogey on 16 in the final round. In the group just ahead, Tom Lehman bogeyed two holes in the front nine but then shot five birdies on the back nine and seemed poised to force a playoff. A missed birdie putt from less than six feet on 18 left him in second place. Love's win, worth \$900,000, came with some extraordinary luck: His tee shot on 12 hit a photographer (not from The Pine Cone) and rolled to within easy putting distance of the pin. The pro-am ended in a tie, with pros Phil Tataurangi and Brad Faxon and their amateur partners Chris Heatley and Thomas Ryan ending up with 31-under scores of 257. Both pairings finished with final rounds of 64. Two Pro-Am teams were disqualified during the tournament for signing incorrect scorecards.

2004

Winner: **Vijay Singh**
67-68-68-69

With four rounds in the 60s, Vijay Singh had little serious competition in the 2004 AT&T Pebble Beach National Pro-Am. His dominating, three-stroke victory came with 25 birdies and earned him \$954,000. After 54 sun-drenched holes, it appeared that San Jose State graduate Arron Oberholser (who would win the tournament in 2006) had a chance to beat Singh. In the same group for the final round, they

were tied at 13 under when play began Sunday. On the first three holes, Singh's tee shots were errant: one going into the rough, one missing the fairway and another missing the green by 60 yards. But Singh managed to turn all three into birdies. Another birdie for Singh on 8, coupled with a double bogey for Oberholser on the same hole, gave Singh an unbeatable six-stroke lead. The winning pro-am team was Jerry Kelly and Robert Halmi, Jr.

2005

Winner: **Phil Mickelson**
62-67-67-73 (269)

Phil Mickelson started his week on the Monterey Peninsula being inducted into the California Golf Hall of Fame and finished it breaking records on his way to a four-stroke victory in the 2005 Pebble Beach Pro-Am. Fellow lefty Mike Weir was the runner-up.

In the process, Mickelson became the first wire-to-wire winner since the tournament was lengthened from 54 holes to 72 holes in 1958. He matched the tournament record with a 10-under-par 62 in his opening round at Spyglass Hill Golf Course. The amazing performance also set a record for Spyglass. And then, Mickelson set the tournament 36-hole record at 129 with his second-round 67 at Poppy Hills. And he set the tournament 54-hole record at 196 with his third-round 67 at Pebble Beach.

Although a final-round 73, one-over-par at Pebble Beach, left him one shot off the tournament record of 268 set by Mark O'Meara in 1997, it nonetheless was a solid finish, given that Weir's 67 was the only sub-70 round posted in a light rain, with some gusty wind. When the final round began, Mickelson held a seven-shot lead through 54 holes, making Sunday's play little more than a formality. His winnings were \$954,000.

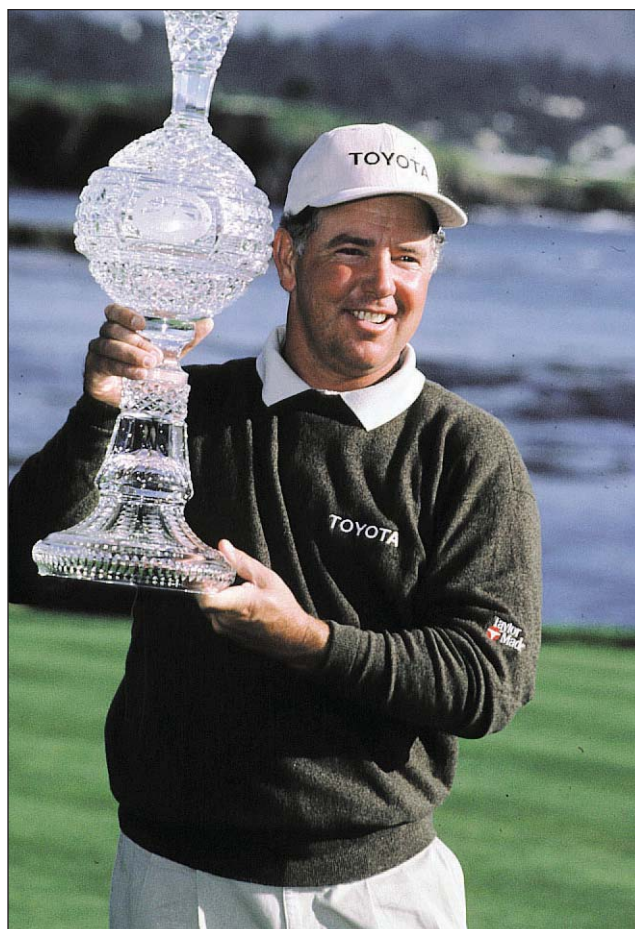
Bill Murray and longtime pro partner Scott Simpson were in the running for the pro-am title, but their closing 67 gave them a 258 total, good for fourth. The victory went to Barry McCollam and pro partner Joel Kribel.

2006

Winner: **Arron Oberholser**
65-68-66-72 (271)

Two years after failing to catch Vijay Singh, Arron Oberholser closed the deal on his first PGA Tour victory to the delight of his family and friends

in 2005 — the same year it won an Emmy for Best Comedy. Born in 1957 in New York City, Romano recently starred in the TNT Comedy-Drama, “Men Of A Certain Age.”

■ Tony Romo

Three-time Pro Bowl quarterback for the Dallas Cowboys, Romo was born in San Diego to a military family. According to his personal bio, his career as an athlete had an inauspicious start: At the age of 8, he received his first set of golf clubs for Christmas. He was so happy Santa had given them to him, he took the clubs out to the yard. When his mother told his dad that “Tony was outside getting ready to hit a ball directed at the neighbor’s house, his dad replied, ‘It’s OK, he’ll miss.’” But he put the ball right through the living room window.

■ Darius Rucker

Famed lead singer of the group, “Hootie and the Blowfish,” which he founded with college roommates at the University of South Carolina, Darius Rucker has since focused on country music, winning the New Artist Award from the Country Music Association in 2009. His most recent album, “Charleston SC 1966,” included two No. 1 singles, “Come Back Song,” and “This.”

■ Nick Saban

Former head coach of the Miami Dolphins, Nick

Saban has enjoyed amazing success as a college head coach, taking LSU to the BCS National Championship in 2003 and Alabama (his current school) to the same title in 2009 and 2011.

■ Bob Stoops

Head football coach at the University of Oklahoma, and with a lifetime coaching record of 139-34, Bob Stoops recently signed a new contract through 2018 that will pay him \$34.5 million over seven years.

■ TobyMac

One of the world’s foremost Christian recording artists, TobyMac has sold more than 10 million albums and charted six No. 1 hits, “Gone,” “Made to Love” and “Lose My Soul.” His live concert album, “Alive and Transported,” was released in 2008 and received the Grammy Award for Best Rock or Rap Gospel Album in 2009.

■ Clay Walker

Singer/guitarist and one of the U.S.A.’s biggest Country and Western stars, Clay Walker began performing professionally at 16 in his native Beaumont, Texas. In the fall of 1993 his first single, “What’s It To You,” went straight to No. 1 on the charts. His biggest selling albums are “Say No More” and “Live Laugh Love.” Walker is considered a modest individual and says he sees himself in the face of each and every fan. “When we make records,” he says, “it’s final. The records will always be the same, but it’s the fans who give life to the music. On stage, you know immediately if you are really reaching people.”

from San Jose.

“Growing up, I always watched guys win the golf tournament and just the walk up 18 at Pebble Beach is unlike anything else,” said Oberholser, a former San Jose State standout who played numerous amateur events on the Monterey Peninsula. “Even when you’re playing here by yourself or with a foursome, it’s still an incredible walk. But to walk up knowing that you are the champion ... I wish every-

body could feel that way. It’s incredible.”

Oberholser shot a final-round 72, even par, on the Pebble Beach Golf Links for a 271, 17-under-par — enough for a tournament record-tying five-shot cushion over runner-up Rory Sabbatini, whose 70 gave him a 276. Mike Weir, who came into Sunday tied with Oberholser at 199, crashed early — with a double-bogey at the second hole and bogey on the third — and shot 78 to tie for third at 277 with Jonathan Byrd.

The victory, which Oberholser locked up with a dramatic birdie out of the trees on the par-4 15th, was a distinctly different sequel to his final round in 2004, when he went into the final round tied for the lead with Vijay Singh, but then seemed to succumb to the pressure of facing one of the top players in the game.

There was a lot of smiling and good times in 2006, as record crowds enjoyed a sixth straight year with no rain problems. Sunshine pushed temperatures into the high 70s as more than 155,000 fans overall attended the four rounds of competition.

Oberholser, whose first place finish was worth \$972,000, became only the fifth player to earn his first PGA Tour victory at Pebble Beach, joining John Cook (1981), Steve Jones (1988), Brett Ogle (1993) and Matt Gogel (2002).

Oberholser was also the fifth pro to sweep both the individual and team titles, as he and amateur partner Michael McCallister, the president and CEO of Humana Inc., tied for first in the pro-am, at 255, 33-under-par. They shared the championship with pro Hunter Mahan and Alan Heuer, the COO of Mastercard International, who shot 66 in the final round, while Oberholser and McCallister shot 68.

2007

Winner: Phil Mickelson
65-67-70-66 (268)

Taking the tournament by storm, Phil Mickelson won his third Pebble Beach pro-am (and \$990,000), finishing the tournament ten under par and tying the record for victory margin with a five-stroke win over runner-up Kevin Sutherland. His final round 66 at Pebble Beach Sunday included six birdies.

And speaking of storms, while Bill Murray’s group was on the 17th Green at Spyglass on Thursday, a huge Monterey pine toppled on a nearby hillside, barely missing a spectator.

Mickelson and his amateur partner, Harry You, CEO of BearingPoint Consulting, also won the pro-am tournament, at 39 under par.

2008

Winner: Steve Lowery
69-71-70-68 (278)

Having played 198 PGA tournaments since 2000 without a victory, Steve Lowery probably wasn’t expecting to defeat the legendary Vijay Singh in a sudden death playoff at the end of the 2008 Pebble Beach Pro-Am. Still, he neatly dispatched Singh on the very first playoff hole with a seven-foot birdie putt.

Through most of the opening three rounds, Lowery’s name wasn’t exactly at the top of the leaderboard. But 10 birdies in 15 holes on Saturday and Sunday propelled him to the top. Singh needed a birdie on the final hole of regulation to force the playoff. “Winning on this course against Vijay is something really special,” Lowery said, who picked up a first-place check for \$1,080,000.

The pro-am champions were amateur Bill Walters, owner of Walters Golf in Las Vegas, and pro Frederick Jacobsen, who shot 250 (38 under par) to win by a tournament-record 10 strokes.

Clear, sunny weather prevailed on the Monterey Peninsula during the tournament, and there were no delays due to weather.

2009

Winner: Dustin Johnson
65-69-67 (201)

In a rain-shortened event of 54 holes, 24-years-and-seven-months-old Dustin Johnson became the second-youngest winner of the AT&T Pebble Beach Pro-Am (Tiger Woods was six months younger when he won the event in 2000).

Johnson opened at Pebble Beach on Thursday with a crisp, 7-under 65, followed with a 69 at Spyglass on Friday, and then birdied all the par-fives at Poppy Hills on Saturday to build a big lead going into what should have been a final round at Pebble Beach on Sunday. The victory was worth \$1,098,000 for Johnson. Mike Weir was the runner-up, winning \$658,800. Retief Goosen finished third.

Johnson, along with his amateur partner, Joe Rice (an attorney from Charleston, S.C.), also took the pro-am title.

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Carmel, Pacific Grove, Monterey chambers offer shuttles

TO SAVE golf fans the trouble of parking almost a dozen miles out of town and then riding buses to the AT&T Pebble Beach National Pro-Am each day — and to give the crowds

a chance to dine and shop in their cities — chambers of commerce in Carmel, Pacific Grove and Monterey offer shuttles to and from the tournament Wednesday through Sunday.

The Carmel Chamber of Commerce and the Carmel Innkeepers Association collaborate on a

shuttle service that runs from 6:30 a.m. to 5:30 p.m., Friday and Saturday, Feb. 10-11; and from 7 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. Sunday, Feb. 12.

The buses leave from Carmel Plaza at Ocean Avenue and Junipero Street and drop riders off in Pebble Beach. Passes are \$20 per person per day. Ticket holders are allowed unlimited rides for the day, and they can leave their cars at the Sunset Center lot on Eighth between Mission and San Carlos, the Carmel Plaza garage on Mission between Ocean and Seventh, and the free Vista Lobos lot at third and Torres, as well as on the street. (Visitors should be aware of time limits on parking downtown, but most streets south of Eighth Avenue and north of Fourth Avenue offer all-day parking.)

The Carmel Chamber of Commerce Visitor Center is located on San Carlos between Fifth and Sixth. Shuttle tickets and tournament any-day tickets may be purchased in advance at the visitor center, by calling (831) 624-2522 or by visiting www.carmelcalifornia.org. During the tournament, spectators can buy passes at the Carmel Plaza bus stop.

In P.G., the shuttles depart every 30 minutes from the Pacific Grove Natural History Museum at 165 Forest Ave. at Central Avenue, and parking is available on the street and in city lots. The buses operate from 6:30 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. Friday, 6:30 a.m. to 6 p.m. Saturday, and 6:30 a.m. to 5 p.m. Sunday.

Tickets are \$20 per day and must be purchased in advance at www.pacificgrove.org/2012-att-pro-am.html. For more information, call (831) 373-3304 or email chamber@pacificgrove.org.

In Monterey, fans can park their cars in the Cannery Row Garage on Foam or the downtown West Garage at Tyler and Franklin and take the Monterey Express Shuttle. Shuttles pick up spectators on Cannery Row at Prescott next to Steinbeck Plaza, and in downtown Monterey in front of the Monterey Conference Center at Calle Principal and Del Monte. Round-trip tickets cost \$15 per person, and the shuttle runs every 30 minutes from 6 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. Friday and Saturday, and 6 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Sunday. 2010

Winner: **Dustin Johnson**

64-68-64-74 (270)

After his four-shot victory in 2009's rain-shortened tournament, Dustin Johnson had to work a lot harder to capture the 2010 event, especially in the face of a strong challenge from PGA Tour veteran David Duval, who capped one of his best tournaments in years with a final round 69. Instead of propelling him to victory, the round left Duval tied with J.B. Holmes for runner up, with each taking home \$545,000. Pro-Am winners were Paul Goydos and Hertz executive Robert Stuart. (Goydos was the pro leader with just five holes to play on Sunday, but quadruple bogeyed 9).

It was Johnson's tremendous power with his driver that made the difference and brought him his second straight Pebble Beach Pro-Am win ... the first player in 20 years to do it. His showing in the 2010 pro-am made Johnson a favorite to win the U.S.

Open at the same course a few months later, but he finished the Open in eighth place.

2011

Winner: **D.A. Points**

63-70-71-67 (271)

With a blistering final round of 67, capped with a 100-yard eagle on 14, D.A. Points captured his first PGA Tour victory — and he did it while partnered with the unpredictable (now there's an understatement for you) Bill Murray.

"It's a dream come true," Points said at the post-victory news conference. "To win at Pebble Beach, and to win with Bill Murray, I don't think I could dream it up."

Rather than be distracted by Murray's clowning, Points obviously enjoyed it. After the eagle, he ran to his partner and performed an awkward chest-bump. On 17, after Murray tossed a young spectator into a bunker, Points jumped in, too. The pair also managed to capture the pro-am title, and they announced they would also be paired in the 2012 tournament.

Points' victory was worth \$1,134,000.

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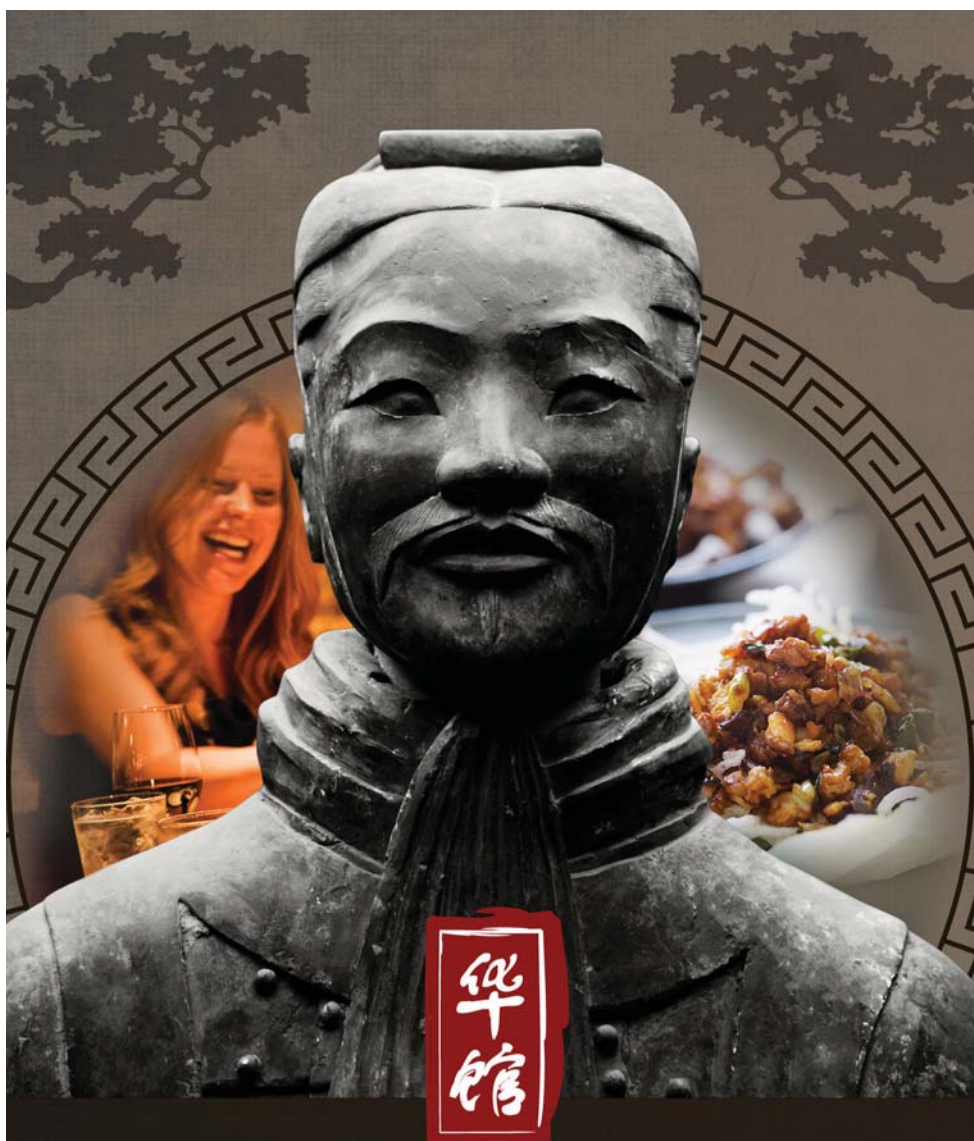
