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OCCUPY GROUP PROTESTS PINE CONE'S EDITORIAL ON 'STARVATION' IN COUNTY

CARRYING PICKET signs, a small group of Occupy Monterey protestors showed up at The Carmel Pine Cone office Monday to object to an editorial penned by the newspaper's owner.

The Occupy members, who notified The Pine Cone beforehand of their visit, were upset over a Feb. 17 editorial entitled, "Stuff and Nonsense," by publisher Paul Miller, which cast doubt on the extent of hunger and starvation among the county's poor.

"We were very disappointed by the editorial in which The Pine Cone seemed to mock the fact there are hungry people in our county," Occupy member Alan Haffa of Monterey told a Pine Cone reporter.

Haffa and five other Occupy members then met

Cities allege poor science and unnecessary costs in proposed stormwater runoff rules

A SET of rules designed to keep any pollutants from running into the ocean — and which basically classify storm water as wastewater — is scheduled for adoption at a State Water Resources Control Board meeting in Sacramento March 20. But Monterey Peninsula cities are condemning the measures as illogical, poorly written and extremely costly.

"Our objection is to a new definition of rainwater being 'waste,'" explained Pacific Grove environmental programs manager Sarah Hardgrave.

The proposal to be adopted this month includes provisions for granting exceptions to state laws prohibiting any runoff, trash and pollutants from entering the waters

Short-term rentals turn out to be good for P.G.

A DECISION the Pacific Grove City Council made a little more than two years ago regarding short-term rentals is turning out to be anything but short-sighted.

In January 2010, the council unanimously approved an ordinance reversing the city's ban on short-term rentals, allowing landlords to rent their single-family homes for less than 30 days at a time as long as they obtained a license and paid a 10 percent transient occupancy tax.

Besides generating extra revenue, the tax would help regulate rentals and help pay for a code enforcement officer. Even though the city is without a code enforcement officer, the tax has proved fruitful, amounting to \$217,000 in 2011, higher than the projected total of \$200,000.

of 34 designated "areas of special biological significance" along the California Coast. More than two dozen agencies, including the cities of Carmel and Pacific Grove, Monterey County and the Pebble Beach Co., have applied for exceptions to the rules, and the SWRCB plans to adopt the criteria for such exceptions at the hearing in Sacramento. But obtaining an exception would mean meeting onerous conditions.

The stormwater proposal is "basically a very strange regulatory approach — that we would somehow be able to stop the water from running down the streets into Monterey Bay," said Hardgrave. "In our particular setting, it's not feasible. We're on a hill, and we're on a slab of bedrock, so we have been objecting to this requirement since this all started in 2004, and so have the cities of Monterey, Carmel, the Pebble Beach Company and the county."

The principle requirements in the proposal include a complete ban on dry-weather runoff into the ocean and ensuring water that flows to the sea during rainstorms does not alter "natural water quality."

But planning officials allege the requirements are

Forum: Candidates agree on most city issues

AT A voter forum Wednesday evening so crowded that people lined the walls and dozens were barred from entering the room because it was over capacity, two candidates for mayor and four people vying for two city council seats tried their best to differentiate themselves from each other but often ended up agreeing on pressing matters facing Carmel residents and business owners.

Mayoral candidates Jason Burnett, who is running from a safe city

council seat, and restaurateur Rich Pepe sought to demonstrate the depth of their ties to the community, with Burnett saying he's chosen to raise his family here, and Pepe describing his arrival on the Peninsula in his 20s with "\$600 in a suitcase" and little else.

"No amount of money can buy the experience I've had in this city," Pepe said, while Burnett described the progress gained during his two years on the council: "We have a city hall we can all be proud of."

Downtown parking, pension costs and keeping the beach clean

Pepe repeatedly emphasized that he has been a Carmel businessman for decades and has no plans to leave the area, implying Burnett is using the mayor's position as a stepping stone to higher office.

Of the council candidates, Ken Talmage is the only incumbent seeking reelection. At Wednesday night's forum at Sunset Center, hosted by the Carmel Residents Association and moderated by Monterey County District Attorney Dean Flippo, Talmage reiterated his experience, especially with budgets and finances, and said his focus is the longterm vitality of the city.

Salary survey reveals cops, firefighters receive top pay

OF THE Top 10 highest paid city employees in 2011, nine work for the police or fire department, according to a salary survey produced by the city following a public records request. Salaries and benefits consume the bulk of the city's \$13 million annual budget, and its most expensive divisions are the police and fire departments.

One person, Sgt. Paul Tomasi, broke the \$200,000 barrier, earning a total \$202,293.25 in salary and benefits. The total included \$46,764.27 in overtime, \$5,209.08 in compensation for working on holidays, vision/dental and medical benefits totalling \$13,547.64, and \$35,503.78 in contributions to the California Public Employees Retirement Program on his behalf.

The second highest paid person on the city payroll, and the highest paid in the fire department, was Capt. Mitch Kastros, who retired at the end of 2011. Last year, he received total compensation of \$194,466.80, including \$42,298.01 in overtime, \$4,584.36 in holiday pay, \$11,370.60 for medical and vision/dental coverage, and \$35,497.35 in contributions toward his retirement.

Following them were fire Capt. Ian Watts, with \$189,187.42, including \$33,230.29 in overtime, \$4,584.36 in holiday pay, \$15,206.76 for

Realtor group vows to battle water district over fee

A REALTORS' group this week vowed to fight the Monterey Peninsula Water Management District over its efforts to tack a contentious user fee onto homeowners' property tax bills.


In a 7-0 vote, the water district's board of directors on Feb. 23 approved a recommendation from its staff to pay for a \$50,000 study to determine how to charge water customers the fee, which had been set at 8.325 percent of their water bills. The "most secure" and preferred method, according to the water district, is to place the fee on property taxes.

But the Monterey County Association of Realtors last week launched a campaign against the district's efforts to add the fee to property tax bills, contending it should be collected another way.

MCAR government and community affairs director Kevin Stone told The Pine Cone the group will make sure Peninsula ratepayers are aware of the district's intentions and will do everything it can to make sure the fee isn't enacted.

"We have only just begun," Stone said Monday. "This is far from over."



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SHE ACTUALLY didn't want her, or any other

Having just lost Stella Cleopatra, her beloved Rhodesian ridgeback, whose ashes were buried beneath the magnolia tree in the back yard, she just became sorrowful when she thought of anoth-

Then the neighbor brought home an 11-weekold Rhodie and promptly found himself overwhelmed by the task of training a willful puppy. For her, it was love at first sight, yet she also thought the pup was the toughest, most stubborn dog she had ever met.

"I used to think I could teach any dog anything at any time," she said. "But this was a doggie from 'down South.' Still, I just kept working with her, being consistent, hoping she'd learn. And something magical happened when she was 2 years old. Today, people ask why she's so calm."

She named her Magnolia May, a nod to Stella's final resting place, and because Magnolia sounds southern, which meant she needed a middle name.

Bred to hunt lions in Rhodesia (now Zimbabwe) Rhodies are strong, muscular and fast. Their sleek, glossy coat has two whorls of hair at the shoulders which taper to the hips, creating a ridge. Protective like a Doberman, Rhodies are a little more stealthy, like the secret service; on alert, but silent. THE FORMER general manager of the Monterey Peninsula Water Management District and California American Water has proposed leading a team of retired engineering experts to assist a mayors' group in developing a replacement water supply project for the Monterey Peninsula.

In a Feb. 17 letter to the Monterey Peninsula Regional Water Authority, former Cal Am and water district chief Dave Berger offers to provide technical expertise to the group. Berger also outlined his proposal at the mayors' group's Feb. 25 meeting.


"Team members would volunteer their expertise by providing interim technical management support to your board through May 1," Berger wrote to Monterey Mayor Chuck Della Sala, president of the mayors joint powers authority.

Former Monterey city engineer Bill Reichmuth and former Pacific Grove city engineer Steve Leiker have tentatively committed to joining the technical management team and can start working around mid-March, according to the letter, while Berger is available to begin working "immediately." Former Sand City city manager Kelly Morgan would also be a part of the team, according to Berger.

While the group would initially volunteer their time, future compensation, "if any," would be contingent on the team's performance and effectiveness and the "JPA's potential future ability to pay," Berger said.

The JPA would reimburse the engineering team's out-of-pocket expenses monthly, and invoices submitted to the JPA would include hours worked — but not billed — so "the

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

CONVICTED ARSONIST ARRESTED FOR SETTING CAMPGROUND BLAZE

A 62-YEAR-OLD man on probation for arson used gasoline to start a large fire at Plaskett Creek Campground Feb. 17, according to Monterey County Sheriff's Cmdr. Lisa Nash.

Deputies arrested Charles Holden, a Los Angeles resident, and took him to Monterey County Jail on charges of violating probation and recklessly starting a

Holden arrived at the Big Sur campground at around 4 a.m. Feb. 17, and a few hours after his arrival, a camp employee noticed a "large and uncontrolled fire at his camp space," Nash said. "So she went over with a fire extinguisher and put it out."

The fire caused no damage, she added.

Holden, who was not at the campsite when the employee got there, had apparently poured gasoline on the ground to start the fire. A gas can was nearby.

"He also started a fire in one of the bathrooms near his campsite," by burning toilet paper on the floor, Nash said. While the floor

was charred, that blaze did not cause any significant damage, either.


Deputies inspected the campsite and discovered "the fire pit had been unused, but the ground around the fire pit was all charred," Nash said. An empty liquor bottle was found nearby.

They spotted Holden sitting in a car with his ex-wife not far from his campsite, and after he reluctantly agreed to get out of the vehicle, he told them he had started the fires because he was cold, according to Nash. She said he claimed he had used the fire pit and didn't know why the flames had spread to the ground.

"He said he was not an arson registrant, but that's what he turned out to be," she said. (People convicted of arson are required to register with law enforcement.)

"And he said he wasn't on parole or probation, which he turned out to be. And he said he was sober, but there were some indications he wasn't."

Nash reported Holden had been convicted of setting fires to buildings and vegetation in L.A. County in 2008 and 2009.

THE WELLS Fargo Bank executive who led deputies on a high-speed chase down Carmel Valley Road before being wrestled to the ground and handcuffed beside his car on Highway 1 last December pleaded guilty to two misdemeanors in Monterey County Superior Court Tuesday.

"He just threw himself on our mercy, basically," prosecutor Steve Somers said of 52-year-old Kevin Scott Stapleton, who was arrested the night of Dec. 23, 2011, after being stopped by Monterey County Sheriff's Deputy Joseph Crivello on suspicion of DUI.

Crivello had seen Stapleton's black Mercedes traveling at 10 mph over the posted speed limit and weaving in and out of its lane, and after he stopped the driver and concluded he was indeed drunk, he called for the California Highway Patrol to take Stapleton into custody, as is customary in the unincorporated areas of Monterey County.

But Stapleton took off in his car, hitting speeds of 85 mph before Crivello and deputy Shawn Moran finally got him stopped again on Highway 1, according to police reports at the time. They wrestled him to the ground and handcuffed him, and then turned him over to the CHP officer who by then had arrived at the scene.

He immediately began apologizing, according to Somers. "His wife is suffering from MS and just got diagnosed with cancer in the days before this happened, and the guy just lost it," he explained. "We accepted what he was saying as true. People have bad moments, and he clearly had a bad moment."

Somers said the Monterey County District Attorney's Office and Superior Court Judge Mark Hood agreed to Stapleton's guilty pleas to evading a police

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officer in a manner dangerous to life or property, and to DUI, and agreed to reduce them to misdemeanors, because it's unlikely he will reoffend.

"We cut him a break on this one, but it won't happen again," he said. "If somebody had been hurt, it would have been a whole different situation."

In court Feb. 28, Hood sentenced Stapleton to at least 30 days in jail and probation, along with other fines and require-



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CUSD ponders another bond measure

m T}$ HE CARMEL Unified School District board of education decided Wednesday night to determine whether popular support exists to pass another bond to pay for new buildings and other improvements at its campuses. A very rough preliminary list put the total at just under \$18 million, but CUSD superintendent Marvin Biasotti said Thursday that list will undergo significant refinement during meetings with officials at each school.

Voters in the district, which includes Carmel, Carmel Valley, Big Sur and Pebble Beach, approved bonds in 2000 and 2005 that helped pay for minor and major projects, from driveway and parking lot paving, to new classroom wings and the \$10 million performing arts center at Carmel High.

Biasotti said the board approved "moving forward with doing some exploratory polling of the community to gauge the level of support for a bond," after discussing the idea Feb. 29.

Financial consultant Brad Senden, who assisted the district with its earlier bond measures, will be paid \$17,500 for polling 400 voters in the district starting in mid-

"A random sampling of voters allows us to get a better understanding of the people we're not in touch with every day — the people who don't have children in our schools," Biasotti said.

During the preceding month, "we will be vetting the list of projects that we really just brainstormed at this point," he said, including items like a \$3 million "practice gym," a \$1.1 million culinary arts facility, \$3 million for energy conservation, \$1.14 million for artificial turf on the CHS football field, \$1.7 million in upgrades to the CHS stadium and \$500,000 for video surveillance.

"Now we want to go out and talk with schools to see if the projects we think are the most important are the ones that increase significant value to the programs and to the experience of our students," he said. Administrators will also attempt to develop rough estimates for the work.

During the meeting, members of the public cautioned the district to consider the eco-

P.G. may open door to fast food

WHETHER YOU like your meals prepared lightning fast or not, you'll have a chance to tell Pacific Grove officials next week what you think of their idea to ease restrictions on fast-food eateries in the city.

In an effort to stimulate growth and offer a "diverse range of restaurant options," the city is considering changing the zoning code in the downtown and Forest Hill areas to allow fast-food and other types of businesses to operate.

Before the city's planning commission makes a final decision on specific zoning amendments, it's holding a meeting March 8 at 6 p.m. at city hall to allow the public to weigh in on the idea.

The idea of loosening the city's restrictions on fast food and allowing franchises to set up shop has drawn passionate opposition from a few residents who believe it will hurt the character of the sleepy town.

However, city manager Tom Frutchey and other officials believe allowing fast-food joints and other businesses could promote economic growth for financially struggling Pacific Grove.

"If a broader range of restaurant options is able to stimulate more nighttime and weekend activity by both residents and visitors in one or our commercial areas," according to a Nov. 2, 2011, report by Frutchey, "this may encourage other businesses to stay open during these times, thereby increasing traffic and raising revenues generally."

Unless the city provides "new opportunities for success," he wrote, "the current challenges in the hotel industry and in retail are likely to continue for at least several years into the future" and the city's economic health will continue to suffer.

Permitting fast-food eateries would also provide more options for visitors staying in Pacific Grove inns and hotels, the city believes.

However, franchises would have to be consistent with the downtown's "historic ambience," Frutchey contends.

And quick eats isn't all Pacific Grove is interested in attracting.

The city is also exploring the idea of allowing businesses such as wine bars with wine tasting, brew pubs that offer food service and optional live music, yogurt shops and establishments that will bring more people to the city's downtown shopping district and other areas at night.

A separate public meeting on that issue will be held March 22 at 6 p.m. at city hall, 300 Forest Ave.

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

The board's approval last week sets in motion a timeline that will result in implementation of the fee this summer unless 50 percent of property owners or tenants in the California American Water service area object in writing to the collection method.

Water district general manager Dave Stoldt praised the board's decision, saying directors showed "strong leadership on moving forward on water supply."

"As for those opposing the collection mechanism," Stoldt said. "I respect their strong opinions and right to express

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them. But I have a water utility to run and will use the tools lawfully provided in order to move the district forward."

The user fee, which accounts for nearly \$4 million of the district's roughly \$10 million annual budget, helps pay for Carmel River environmental mitigation work and employee salaries.

Without it the district will have to drastically reduce the work it does on the river and could be forced to lay off 30 percent of its workforce, according to Stoldt. The water district has more than two dozen employees.

Stoldt also told The Pine Cone the consultant's study is expected to cost "much less than \$50,000."

Stone, who was joined by dozens of other MCAR members at last week's board meeting, called for "transparency" at the water district.

"If you want to transfer the fee or capture the fee in another way, do so," Stone said. "But to not allow the public, in our opinion, to have a say is really quite troublesome. If you are doing the work of the public, let the public have a say.'

At the packed meeting, those opposed to the collection mechanism far outnumbered those in favor of it. But several supporters of the water district's environmental work on the river said the efforts should continue.

For 30 years, Peninsula ratepayers had been paying the user fee via their California American Water bills. But in July 2009, the fee was removed after Public Utilities Commission iudge Maribeth Bushey told Cal Am to find another way to fund the water district's work.

Since then, Cal Am has been lending the money to the water board so it doesn't run out.

Water district director Bob Brower said the fee is necessary for the district to pursue several water projects for the Peninsula. "In order for us to solve the water issues, we need the funding," Brower told The Pine Cone.

Director Jeanne Byrne, who said the board was "completely taken off guard" by opposition to the consent agenda item last week, defended the collection of the fee. "The proposal to investigate shifting the user fee billing to the tax bill is simply a way to replace the previous billed fees," Byrne

Byrne said there's also the possibility of charging the fee

on a separate bill, but it would cost more.

Though it wouldn't be practical to add fees to property tax bills based on water use, Stoldt said the district has an idea how the user fee would be collected.

The water district's consultant will review each parcel and determine its type of use and potential water usage or demand indicated by meter size, which Stoldt said could be done using county assessor's parcel data.

'Then, each parcel within a similar category of use pays a similar allocation of the costs," Stoldt explained. "A file of payments required for each parcel is prepared and then sent to the assessor where it is combined into their database. So there will be a great range of variability between types of parcels."

The City of San Jose, Stoldt said, uses a similar system for wastewater collection and has three residential categories and 63 commercial and industrial categories.

We have not yet discussed with the consultant how best to stratify the district's data," Stoldt said.

On June 12, the district will hold a public hearing on the user fee issue, the same day that directors will conduct a second reading of the proposed user fee ordinance.

If the ordinance isn't contested by at least half of property owners and tenants, it will go into effect July 1

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
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

healthcare coverage and \$35,449.53 for retirement; and police officer Chris Johnson, who received \$188,511.55, including \$48,431.72 in overtime, \$4,532.69 in holiday pay, \$13,547.64 for health care and \$31,627.02 in retirement.

Rounding out the Top 5 was former city administrator Rich Guillen, who retired at the end of March last year following the \$600,000 settlement of a sexual harassment lawsuit filed by former human resources manager Jane Miller. According to the salary survey, Guillen was paid \$185,394.87. His base salary was \$118,750, and he received \$1,225 for his car, \$30,039.42 in cash payouts for unused vacation and sick time, \$12,029.16 for vision/dental and medical insurance, and \$21,269.81 for his retirement.

Police Chief Mike Calhoun, who took over the position on an "acting" basis after George Rawson retired in late 2010, received total pay of \$179,011.38, with a base salary of \$118,886.40, and medical and vision/dental benefits totaling \$14,300.04. Out of everyone on the city payroll, Calhoun received the largest CalPERS contribution: \$40,588.86.

Sgt. Mel Mukai (total compensation \$175,626.57), Cpl. Steve Rana (\$174,365.09) and fire Capt. Bruce Meyer (\$170,704.27) rounded out the Top 10 income earners among city employees last year.

Among high-level officials not working in public safety, assistant city administrator/city clerk Heidi Burch received total compensation of \$163,337.64, including \$1,800 for her car, \$7,322.40 in payout for vacation time, \$7,038.96 in healthcare coverage, and \$22,664.18 toward her retirement, while public works superintendent Stu Ross received \$148,584.79, which included \$15,206.76 for health care and \$20,221.90 for retirement.

Information services/network manager Steve McInchak got \$134,290.04, with \$3,837.60 for vacation leave, \$12,029.16 for health benefits and \$18,198.80 for retirement, and city forester Mike Branson was paid \$133,183.45, which included \$1,509.24 for dental/vision coverage and \$20,015.73 toward his retirement.

Next on the list, planning and building services manager Sean Conrov received \$125,911.81, including \$3,311.20 for unused vacation leave, \$16,062.96 for vision/dental and medical coverage, and \$15,701.25 for retirement.

Library director Janet Cubbage was paid \$116,156.97, with \$6,431.52 of the total going for health care and \$16,856.97 going toward her retirement, while facilities maintenance manager Bernard Martino received \$111,755.74, which included \$1,733.20 in vacation payout, \$834 for vision/dental coverage and \$16,691.07 for retire-

City attorney Don Freeman took home a flat \$90,000 for his work; temporary city administrator John Goss, who replaced Guillen, was paid \$79,300; and new city administrator Jason Stilwell, who started work at the end of September 2011, received \$51,514.08, including \$875 for his car, \$2,677.16 for healthcare benefits, and \$7,614.20 for CalPERS for his three months' work.

The survey also includes three of the city council members — Paula Hazdovac, Karen Sharp and Ken Talmage who received their annual \$1,800 stipend and healthcare benefits totaling \$14,256 for the women and \$12,483.96 for Talmage. Mayor Sue McCloud received a \$2,400 stipend and \$453.60 for dental/vision care.

The award CHOMP received recognizes that the hospital has achieved specific measures in using evidence-based practices in treating stroke patients.



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




A Carmel High first —

Bold move with seconds left earns wrestler CCS crown

In A dramatic upset finish, Kodiak Sauer stunned No. 1-seeded Ryan Sarmiento of Palma School Feb. 25 to become Carmel High School's first Central Coast Section wrestling champion.

The No. 3-seeded wrestler in the 182pound weight class, Sauer faced off against Sarmiento in the CCS finals, which were hosted by Independence High in San Jose.

The Carmel High senior had lost all three of his previous matches against Sarmiento. With just 40 seconds left on the clock in last week's contest — and down 1-0 — Sauer again appeared headed for defeat. But thanks to a bold move and perfect timing, Sauer shocked onlookers and captured the regional

title.

"Our strategy going into the third period was to work for a reversal — which is worth 2 points — instead of just an escape — which is only worth a point," said **Russ Shugars**, the Carmel High wrestling coach. "Kodiak was confident that he could get away from Ryan, but if he got the 1-point escape too early, there was a good chance Ryan would take us down for the win."

But with time running out late in the period, Sauer decided to simply settle for simply an escape to keep his chances alive.

"Kodiak realized that he had to escape now and force an overtime period," Shugars explained. "In a flurry of motion, Kodiak was able to knock his opponent off balance, get the reversal and catch him on his back." By exposing his opponent's back to the mat for a brief moment, Sauer scored 4 "near fall" points and held off Sarmiento for the victory.

"Kodiak was now winning 4-1 with only seconds remaining," Shugars explained. "Because he scored so late in the match, Sarmiento had no opportunity to respond and had to settle for second place."

According to Shugars, Sauer's big win was a testament to his hard work.

"An event that stands out about Kodiak happened in his freshman year and rookie wrestling season," he recalled. "We were doing a track workout that involved half-mile

sprints with a rest in between. After the first interval Kodiak began to throw up during the rest period. Between each interval he would be on his hands and knees losing his lunch, and right before it was time to start the next one he would wipe his face in the grass and get up and run his heart out."

Sauer's hard work finally paid off last week.

"That kind of determination and nevergive-up attitude that he brought to practice every day culminated in a CCS championship in his senior year," he added.

While some believed in 2010 that reversing the ban — originally enacted by the council in 1997 - would mean loud parties and neighborhood shenanigans, the city said that hasn't been the

"We have 117 registered homes and to date there are no complaints on file" from neighbors, Cathy Krysyna, the city's interim administrative services manager, told The Pine Cone.

10 percent tax

City councilman Dan Miller, who came up with the idea to reverse the ban on short-term rentals — and even used the plan as part of his 2008 campaign for city council — said he also hasn't heard of any problems. In fact, it's exceeded expectations.

"It has raised a lot of revenue," Miller said. "In fact, more then the usually optimistic [former deputy city manager] Jim Becklenberg had projected."

Before the ban was lifted, the city found it difficult to enforce the law against short-term rentals even if they could identify a landlord who violated it. Enforcement required extensive administrative efforts

Visitors who stay in Pacific Grove hotels and inns pay the same 10 percent transient occupancy tax. If landlords don't register their units, they face stiff fines, including forfeiting past rent made while the tax was in place.

A PACIFIC Grove High School junior will soon get a crash course in what it's like to be a cadet at the United States Military Academy at West Point.

Dean J. Randall, 16, was selected to be one of 1,000 exceptional high school juniors to attend Summer Leaders Seminar at the prestigious military college 50 miles north of New York City. West Point's one-week seminar is "designed to help

juniors with their college-selection process, while giving them an idea of the importance of leadership and sound decision making in their education, careers, and lives, in general," according to the school.

Randall will also experience cadet training by living in cadet barracks, eating in the West Point mess hall and attending academic, leadership, athletic and military workshops.

The experience will bode well for the P.G. High student, who is planning on applying to West Point, the United States Naval Academy or Cal Maritime in Vallejo, according to his mother, Leilani Randall.

"This opportunity will allow him to get a perspective of what it will be like attending any of the federal service academies, and being so far away from home," she told The Pine

Leadership seems to come naturally for Randall, who is working on his Eagle Scout Project for the Pacific Grove Adult School with Troop 90, and has been class president, vice president and rally commissioner for P.G. High. He also worked as a day care assistant and served as a science camp counselor.

"Dean plays football and lacrosse for Pacific Grove," His mother said. "He has always been an avid outdoorsman. Besides the leadership [roles], Dean has consistently gotten above 3.8 for his [grade point average]."

Cal Am donates \$20K to Boys & Girls Clubs

Over the past few months, Peninsula water provider California American Water donated more than \$20,000 in water-saving fixtures and services to the nonprofit, including replacement of the facility's toilets with 1-gallon-per-flush models, and installation of waterless urinals, low-flow sink aerators and a weather-based irrigation controller to reduce the club's outdoor water use.

Cal Am estimates the clubs will save more than 250,000 gallons of water per year — and thousands of dollars on their water bill — because of the retrofit.

It began when Boys & Girls Clubs of Monterey County President and CEO Donna Ferarro said the nonprofit contacted Cal Am to see if it could save money on its monthly water bill. Cal Am then performed a water audit of the facil-

"After the water audit," Ferarro said, "we realized we had not replaced our toilets sinks or anything for 16 years."

That's when Cal Am stepped in and offered to help the organization save money on its bill.

Niagara Conservation donated all the toilets, and A&R Plumbing and RB Construction additionally donated time, labor and equipment to reduce the cost of the project, accord-

"This project not only helps reduce water use in our community," according to Cal Am general manager Eric Sabolsice, "it sets an example of the type of savings that can be achieved through use of efficient, water-saving technolo-

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
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C.V. ARTIST BRINGS A TOUCH OF HUMOR TO JAZZ

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Cal and the McCalls, politics and food, and plenty of parties

HAVING BEEN at his profession for a while, now, Bernardus chef Cal Stamenov knows a thing or two about throwing parties. It's that knowhow — along with his creativity and attention to detail in the kitchen that has landed him one of the biggest catering jobs during August's world-famous Concours Week.

While overseeing the restaurants at the Carmel Valley resort during an extremely busy week and arranging top-notch food and wine for various venues at Mazda Raceway Laguna Seca during the weekend's vintage races, Stamenov will also be in charge of feeding some 3,000 people at the McCall's Motorworks Revival that Wednesday night. Bernardus has long been affiliated with the event, donating and pouring some 110 cases of wine there each year, but this is the first time Stamenov and his pastry chef, Ben Spungin, have been hired to feed everyone,

Although the Aug. 15 event is months away, making it difficult to pinpoint exactly what seafood, produce and other critical ingredients will be available in sufficient quantities, Stamenov and party organizers Gordon and Molly McCall met this week to develop a menu and timeline for the event, which runs from 5 to 10 p.m. on the tarmac and in the hangar of the Monterey Jet Center. Light bites will be featured earlier in the evening, followed by "dinner" from 6 to 8:45, and then dessert. Other typical latenight comfort foods will appear from around 8 p.m. onward, too, ensuring guests get enough to eat, and everything remains fresh.

Although Stamenov developed and initially oversaw the successful efforts to provide abundant food during the highly regarded Quail Motorsports Gathering held at Quail Lodge the Friday of Concours Week, the airport party presents its own challenges, with people not sitting down at tables for a single meal the way they do over lunch at the upscale Q.

"The best part of doing these events is everybody wants quality, and as long as you bring that quality, everybody seems to be happy," he said. "I think people like vegetables and salads and easy-to-eat food - and I'll definitely do my best to keep the lines

Stamenov has planned six buffet areas for most of the food, as well as eight separate stations stocked with antipasti, focaccia, cured meats and other edibles. The team will set up three onsite kitchens to supply them.

Aesthetics are also important to Stamenov, a fact to which anyone who has dined in his restaurants can attest, and he plans to bring that touch to the McCall party, too — even if people will be using plastic cutlery and plates.

The draft menu includes items like portobello mushroom fries with basil dip, Argentinian empanadas, baked pork buns, albacore tuna with black pepper and a cumin crust, lamb-and-currant-stuffed grape leaves, braised beef and hummus on mini pita bread, cous cous salad with vegetables and feta, heirloom tomato salad, grilled salmon, artisan sausage with roasted potatoes, Asian shrimp salad, Memphis BBQ, small tacos at a handmade tortilla station, and Spungin's signature sweets, like fruit tarts, individual puddings and cupcakes, chocolates, Parisian macarons and caramel corn.

Considering guests at the event typically consume not just 110 cases of wine, but 90 cases of Champagne and 60 cases of beer, Gordon McCall said it's important "to bury the event with food," too.

After having multiple restaurants participate, and never feeling the food was quite up to snuff, the McCalls decided to bring in a single caterer for the first time last year. They learned some important lessons from that experience, including the challenging logistics of delivering hors d'oeuvres and main-course dishes to the milling crowds. Soon after the gates closed on the 2011 event, they approached Bernardus to see if the crew there would take on the complicated task of feeding so many people - and fulfilling the expectations of those who are paying \$295 each to be there.

"This is the dream team for us," McCall said. "The thing with Bernardus — it's got a little magic to it." It also helps that owner Ben Pon, a consummate car guy himself with a long history of driving and racing, always attends the party.

"Cal is one of those guys who seems to make everything so easy," said McCall. "He's genuine and loves what he does."

■ Food and politics

Carmel mayoral candidate Jason Burnett and renowned author Eric Schlosser ("Fast Food Nation"), who also lives in town, hosted a gathering at Carmel Belle restaurant last week during which they espoused their philosophies on food and politics.

Burnett, who spent part of his childhood in Carmel Valley, told dozens of his supporters that he had run a restaurant a decade ago

and is growing kale and other produce in a rooftop garden on his recently remodeled home.

"Carmel is uniquely positioned to embrace the food movement, and in particular the local food movement," he said Feb. 22.

He said the town's restaurants do a good job of capitalizing on the abundance of Monterey County produce "your doctor would encourage you to eat more of," and he said he hopes as mayor to further support and draw public attention to those efforts.

Schlosser recalled his first visits to Carmel as a boy 45 years ago, and then living in Big Sur 15 or 20 years later, where he meet his wife.

"We moved back here almost nine years ago thinking we would stay here a year, and we've extended that," he said. "This is a really, really special and extraordinarily beautiful place."

Because of care and attention, Carmel perseveres while other beautiful and special places throughout the country don't "feel that special and beautiful anymore," he observed.

"The reason I wrote about food isn't because I care about food in isolation," he said. "It's because it's a metaphor for so many other things. What we need here is a sense of community that's bigger than just Carmel and includes the rest of the county."

Schlosser said he supports Burnett because he feels that as mayor, Burnett will help Carmel "continue not being just a beautiful place to live, but a place with a really gentle, cre-

Burnett said he hopes to hold food-oriented events downtown, perhaps with rotating block closures, to encourage mingling and community building.

"Napa County has done a good job of talking the talk, but we are better at walking the walk," he said.

nomic climate when deciding when to put the matter on the ballot, but no one stridently objected. One speaker, Biasotti

said, remarked that CUSD facilities are already of much higher quality than those at other public schools.

Biasotti pointed out the district funded much of the improvements promised during the last bond drive with money from the general fund after construction costs skyrocketed.


"We made good on our word, even though circumstances

worked against us," he said. "And that opportunity is no longer available to us."

Planning commissioner Victoria Beach and real-estate company owner Robert Profeta talked about their desires to preserve and protect the character of the town, and forest and

beach commissioner Tom Leverone mentioned his ability to help solve problems, including issues that regularly come before the forest and beach commission.

Profeta pointed out he is the only person running for council who is not already part of the city government — and would therefore bring a different perspective — while Beach said her three years on the planning commission give her valuable insight.

The usual issues

Questions broached the typical city issues: finding ways to increase revenues, how to contend with a monumental retirement liability, budget priorities, keeping the beach clean, parking congestion, the decades-old water shortage

All agreed "all options need to be on the table," when it comes to developing ways to generate more revenues, including paid parking, and raising hotel or sales taxes. Pepe said he would like to "encourage new and interesting stores to come to work with us in town," while Burnett mentioned some of the negative effects on cash flow, including the money that has to be paid to the California Public Employees Retirement System.

"We will have a healthy debate about which projects should be funded and the revenue sources," Talmage said,

while Beach, who described herself as "a fiscal hawk," suggested making visitors pay for more of the city services.

"Let's just remember there are 4,000 citizens and over 2 million visitors," she said.

"I would like to stop thinking of cutting services," Leverone said, adding that he would be responsible with taxpayers' money. "Let's look at new revenue sources."

Profeta said he didn't think anyone wanted taxes to increase and suggested paid parking could be the way out, though residents should be exempted from it.

While most candidates mentioned public safety as the top budget priority, Leverone said downtown must be revitalized, since it's the money generated there that funds city operations, and deferred maintenance needs attention, too. Beach said she would make more of an effort to preserve the village character and restore what's been lost, while Talmage said the current budget is allocated properly, with heavy emphasis on police and fire, as well as public works and forestry, and regional assets like the library and Sunset Center. Pepe said he would emphasize ways to boost the local economy and said he is a proponent of shared services.

Candidates debated whether there is, in fact, a parking problem in town, but a few said that just the perception there

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
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

is — whether true or not — means a problem exists, since it keeps visitors away. All agreed there should be a way to encourage business owners and their employees to park on the outskirts of town, freeing up valuable downtown spaces for people coming into the city to spend money.

They all agreed that Carmel's iconic beach should be kept as pristine as possible, with Burnett saying more money should be spent on sand replenishment and having more people working to keep it clean.

"We don't want to do way with fires, but we want a clean beach," he said. "We should put our money where our mouth

Pepe said people who use the beach should be better informed of the rules, and enforcement efforts should increase.

Beach said the beach "is so beautiful that it has been a victim of its own success," and solutions should be developed, while Talmage said ramping up enforcement probably isn't the answer. "We need to put some smart minds together and come up with some better answers than we have in the last couple of years," he said.


Profeta suggested somehow charging people who build

fires on the beach, so they would in essence be paying for their cleanup, and Leverone mentioned a tool he invented, a fire basket, that is "a method where each fire, as it's extinguished, is cleaned up by the people who built it." (He will be showing his creation at the March 6 council meeting.)

Mayoral candidates were asked what they could do to reduce the city's legal fees, and both said the answer is to stay

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




was some injustice. You should have a fair process"

No one favored merging the police department with another city's, though Burnett suggested its services could be extended to the city's "sphere of influence," which might help pay for it.

They all agreed more work needs to be done to get people to comply with the city's building design guidelines, codes and other rules. Some suggested the laws could be clarified or made easier to understand, and Leverone said it's important to consider the intent of the authors, not just the letter of the law.

Talmage and Burnett pinpointed the problem with uneven enforcement.

"The way code compliance works now is someone calls up and rats out their neighbor," Talmage said. "That leads to an inconsistent and inexorable process."

Beach said people often unintentionally set bad examples that are then mimicked by their neighbors, who also think they're doing the right thing. She wants more planning staff and code enforcers hired.

Leverone pointed out the city often fails to follow its own rules, such as those outlined in the shoreline management plan, so how can it turn around and enforce rules on the citizens?

Water is the greatest immediate challenge
— Beach called it "an emergency" — the
city faces, but all the candidates mentioned

potential solutions that have been bandied about for years: conservation, groundwater replenishment, aquifer storage and recovery, water reclamation and desalination.

In tackling the huge CalPERS liability, Pepe returned to the idea of raising more money, while Burnett mentioned his role in creating the committee of highly regarded financial advisors who researched the matter and made several recommendations to the city, including hiring new workers at a lower retirement rate — a change that has been implemented and will take effect April 16. He said the next priority should be reducing the \$6 million debt to CalPERS for which the city's being charged 7.75 percent interest per year.

"Yes, you heard me right," Burnett said. "We need to make sure we pay that off. We are spending your money — half a million dollars a year — on interest."

Beach said the city needs to look at the problem creatively in order to solve it, and Talmage cited his work with Burnett on the issue, while Profeta said a brain trust would be needed to tackle the liability and pledged he would study it.

"It's all going to come down to finding more revenues, just like we've been talking about all night," Leverone said.

The next voter forum will be hosted by the Carmel Chamber of Commerce at the Church of the Wayfarer Thursday, March 8, from 6 to 7:30 p.m., and The Carmel Pine Cone will present the final discussion before the April 10 election in Carpenter Hall at Sunset Center Tuesday, March 13, at 7 p.m.

Editorial

Overuling the people, part 2

A FEW weeks ago, we argued that judges should not decree new constitutional rights in the absence of public support for those rights. Boy, did that make some people mad.

This week, we're going to make a similar argument about local government, and this time, we think hardly anybody's going to disagree.

The subject is the Monterey Peninsula Water Management District, which learned after a public vote just 10 years ago that more than 65 percent of the people it's supposed to serve don't think it should exist at all.

Since those days, the logiam in getting a new water supply has only gotten worse, and public frustration over the absence of a reliable water source has increased, so it's almost certain the result would be the same if another vote were taken today.

Meanwhile, the board itself acted if the 2002 vote never happened and has pressed ahead with business as usual, counting toilets, charging substantial fees, doing environmental work along the Carmel River and prohibiting people from building on vacant lots or expanding businesses. The board has also made a small amount of progress toward a new water supply — but even under the best of circumstances, the progress would lead to mere replacement of water from the river without producing a single drop for the limited new uses this community so badly needs. In short, the water board's record is still dismal.

But, while the water board's *raison d'etre* may not be evident to the public, it still spends upwards of \$10 million of the people's money every year. And it wants to keep doing so.

Unfortunately for the board, the California Public Utilities Commission pulled the plug on a major portion of that funding, ruling in 2009 that the water district could no longer attach a fee to local water bills. Since the ruling, California American Water has bridged the funding gap for the water board, but now that funding is in jeopardy as well.


But rather than cut its programs, the water board has come up with a new idea: Spread the fee around to property owners based on the size of their lots, and attach these amounts to property tax bills. From the water board's point of view, the beauty of this idea is that, despite California's strict prohibitions on new taxes, the property-tax fee can be implemented without a public vote.

And why is that so appealing to the people on the water board? Because they know that if they put the fee to a vote of the people, it would be defeated.

In other words, they are taking the property-tax route precisely because they know their constituents don't want them to.

The Supreme Court shouldn't overrule the express wishes of the people. And neither should two-bit local agencies.




Dear Editor,

I can't help writing back and saying to Pine Cone readers, "just because the paper says it, doesn't mean its true."

I've seen the hungry in Salinas, in farm labor camps dotting the highway through Greenfield to King City.

And most of these hungry people with families are afraid. Afraid especially of camera-carrying journalists and of people who want to meet them. They fly under the radar — and so do the people who try to help them. Maybe that's why you don't know they are there. But they are there.

with Miller on the sidewalk outside The Pine Cone office to discuss the editorial.

The Monterey County Weekly articles, "Hunger Games" and "The Starving Class," published Feb. 16, asserted that farmworkers in Monterey County don't have access to the produce they pick during the day and are "often underfed at night."

Charity needed

Miller's editorial acknowledged that "many people are poor and need financial and other assistance," but said, "the idea that people are hungry, or even starving, in Monterey County, has not been proved.'

"I was reacting to the fact the Weekly said there is a 'starving class' in Monterey County," Miller said. "But if you read their stories, they actually don't provide any evidence that anyone's starving."

That led to a cordial talk between Miller and the Occupy picketers surrounding the definition of "hungry" and "starving."

Haffa said people who distribute assistance to farmworkers and other low-income groups are very familiar with the extent of hunger in Monterey County. And he referenced a 2010 Monterey County Food Bank study he said showed a "significant proportion" of people in the county "are food at — which he said is the same thing as

Miller disagreed with the description.

"Hungry means that you lack sufficient food," Miller said. "And being 'food at risk' is not the same as not having food."

Occupy member Larry Parrish said he contacted "a lot" of charity organizations, such as The Salvation Army, the Food Bank for Monterey County and Shelter Outreach Plus, and all of the groups thought Miller's editorial was "bad."

Upon Miller's request, Haffa said he would introduce Miller to people in the county who are going hungry.

"We will take you to some folks," Haffa

Miller — who said he had covered numerous stories on the topic of hunger and conditions for farmworkers when he was a TV producer for NBC News in the 1980s told the Occupiers it would be important to find out why, despite food stamps, Cal Fresh and other charity programs, people are going hungry in the county.

"I'm perfectly willing to be shown that it's true," Miller said. "And, if it is, I'll be one of the first ones to help."

CPD to hold citizens police academy

impossible to meet, and they are taking pains to articulate their objections and propose more feasible alternatives they hope the SWRCB will consider.

STORMWATER

"If these are passed, we will pretty quickly need to start doing a type of water quality monitoring that we haven't done before," Hardgrave said, adding that it could cost more than \$200,000 annually just for the city to test water as the state might require.

Further, she said, "The state is imposing these requirements without showing there has been actual harm to marine aquatic life or to the recreational use of near-shore waters.'

The fundamental problem, Hardgrave said, is that ASBS legislation dictates that "no discharges shall alter the natural water quality,' and we don't know what that means," she said. In Monterey Bay, for instance, not only does water run down gutters and through storm drains, but it flows from the Salinas River and other channels. Once in the bay, it circulates, making it impossible to identify what might have come from where.

"What's being proposed is some very expensive monitoring," she said. The cities would also have to develop a plan showing "either how we would stop all of the flows or reduce the pollutant loads by 90 percent and have extremely clean water as a result of infrastructure facilities, structural and nonstructural controls."

But in cities like Carmel and Pacific Grove, such facilities would cost millions of dollars, and there is no space to accommodate them, since the towns are already fully developed. Further, the cities don't have the means of funding them, especially since their residents do not pay fees for a storm water program.

'We don't want to see regulations adopted that are not feasible to implement," Hardgrave said, adding that she plans to ask the P.G. City Council March 7 whether she should start working on legislation to address the issue.

Furthermore, the program may violate state law that local governments not be forced to spend a lot of local tax dollars on statewide programs.

San Mateo County is pursuing an unfunded mandate claim for its storm water program, "and we're closely following that,"

Carmel planning and building services manager Sean Conroy agreed the proposed requirements are fundamentally unsound and are not backed by useful science.

A letter submitted to the state by city administrator Jason Stilwell on behalf of Carmel taxpayers comments that the issue needs further study "in order for the SWRCB to develop a fair, practical and effective program to preserve natural water quality in ASBSs to an extent that is reasonably achievable.

"The SWRCB has both a moral and a fiduciary responsibility to the citizens of California to carefully determine what requirements it imposes on them," he wrote. "This is especially critical during these financially troubled times when the costs associated with those requirements will be significant."

The proposed conditions lack technical and scientific support and "would lead to the expenditure of huge sums of money with no assurance that any appreciable change in water quality will be achieved."

He further argued that water testing should be conducted along the entire coastline by the state — and paid for with state tax dollars - rather than "placed on the backs of a few dischargers whose discharges happen to lie within ASBSs."

In a summary of the issue, city planners said the SWRCB "should first demonstrate that there is harm occurring in the ASBS, and then target specific discharges that are causing harm."

The Pebble Beach Co. would also have to meet the new runoff requirement, and is joining the cities in their opposition.

"It's mind-boggling that the state isn't listening to all these jurisdictions," said Mark Stilwell, the company's executive vice of president of real estate.
