BIG SUR BLAZE DESTROYS GARRAPATA HOUSE

KNOWN BY its neighbors as the "Long House," a home located in Garrapata Canyon burned to the ground Wednesday after overhead power lines were blown into each other, sending sparks raining down on a pile of flammable

Mid-Coast Volunteer Fire Brigade Chief Cheryl Goetz told The Pine Cone that her agency was notified of the fire

just before 3 p.m. Tuesday. She and two other Mid-Coast volunteers responded to the blaze, where they were soon met by a Cal-Fire crew from the Carmel Highlands and volunteer firefighters from Big Sur. Unfortunately, the firefighters could do nothing to save the house, which was already engulfed in flames. The occupants of the home — Susie Barnett, Jeffrey Downs and several dogs — escaped with no

While the house was destroyed, firefighters were able to contain an adjacent brush fire, which scorched about a quarter-acre and could have easily spread through the area's steep terrain, which is covered with dense vegetation. "We were lucky," Goetz said.

Aiding the firefighters were neighbors, who wasted no time moving into action.

"They grabbed garden hoses to help fight the vegetation fire and keep it from spreading," Goetz reported.

She also said resident Matt Borek played a key role in suppressing the fire by pumping water from a creek. "He did a great job helping us out," she said.

It is unclear how much of an effect high winds or the previous night's light rain — had on the fire. Goetz said there were 20 mph gusts of wind in the canyon at the time of the incident, but "the house was located back in an area protected from the wind."

The fire served as a reminder of the risks that exist in rural neighborhoods throughout Big Sur and Carmel Valley. To better protect homes, Goetz suggested that residents be well prepared to help put out a

Preservationists want P.B. 'mid-century treasure' saved

A HOUSE in Pebble Beach designed by one of the world's most influential modern architects is at the center of an effort to prevent it from being demolished.

Known as the Connell House, the 4,124-square-foot home at 1170 Signal Hill Road in Pebble Beach is the creation of celebrated architect Richard Neutra.

The owner of the 1958 house — software CEO Massy Mehdipour — has asked the county planning department for permission to raze the building and construct a 11,933square-foot, three-story home in its place.

But Mehdipour's plans are being fought by a group of people who contend the home shouldn't be demolished.

Among them are Neutra's sons, Raymond and Dion Neutra, who argue the house is an important example of modernist architecture and exemplifies their father's approach to design.

"It would be a great tragedy if the only authentic example of a house designed by Richard Neutra standing in Monterey County were to be demolished," according to Dion Neutra,

But this year, judges were also asked if they were lesbian, gay, bisexual or transgender, questions required by Senate Bill 182 authored by State Sen. Ellen Corbett, a Democrat from San Leandro, and sponsored by gay rights group Equality California. Gov. Arnold Schwarzenegger signed the bill in 2011.

"We sponsored the bill because ultimately, we believe that the courts are the most effective when they represent the diversity of the communities they serve," Rebekah Orr, spokeswoman for San Francisco-based Equality California told The Pine Cone Tuesday.

Of the 1,678 judges surveyed about their sexual orientation and gender identity, 969 (57.7 percent) identified themselves as heterosexual, 19 said they're lesbian, 17 picked "gay" and nobody said he was bisexual.

Burnett has big campaign cash lead

IN COLLECTING funds to help pay for their runs for office in the April 10 election, mayoral candidate Jason Burnett has far surpassed challenger Rich Pepe, while the only incumbent running for council, Ken Talmage, has outpaced challengers Victoria Beach, Bob Profeta and Tom Leverone. The candidates filed their first set of financial statements at city hall last week.

Burnett's considerable war chest includes \$19,616 in contributions collected in 2011 after he announced his intention to run for mayor, in addition to \$8,102 in cash raised between Jan. 1 and Feb. 25 this year.

His most generous supporters included Gordon and Ronda Eubanks of Pebble Beach, who each gave \$2,000. Edwina Bent of Monterey, Jane Dunaway of Carmel, Wade Randlett of San Francisco, Joanne Storkan of P.B. and Stanley Meresmen of Carmel each contributed \$1,000.

Other notable supporters included Julie Packard, his aunt and executive director of the Monterey Bay Aquarium, who donated \$750, as well as restaurateur Firok Shield (\$500), former councilwoman Barbara Livingston (\$200), former Mayor Charlotte Townsend (\$100), former Pacific Grove Mayor Dan Cort (\$500), former councilman David Maradei (\$200), attorney Skip Lloyd (\$250), former Assemblyman and current Santa Cruz County treasurer Fred Keeley (\$100), Monterey County Supervisor Jane Parker (\$500), architect Safwat Malek (\$500), Talmage (\$250), former Nielsen Bros. Market owner Merv Sutton (\$100), gallery owner Bill Karges (\$500), CRA member Roberta Miller (\$500), Robert

Council asks architect to tweak beach bathrooms



A design for permanent beach bathrooms has them lowered into the ground for a low profile, but some worry that could expose them to high surf.

THE YEARS-LONG effort to construct permanent bathrooms in place of the porta-potties at the south end of Carmel Beach took another step forward Tuesday night — maybe. City council members asked architect Rob Carver, who was hired in 2009 to design the facilities, to make them smaller to help reduce costs and address various concerns.

Portable toilets have been in place at Santa Lucia and Scenic Road since 1996. and the Local Coastal Program adopted by the city and the coastal commission in 2004 calls for their replacement with permanent facilities.

As drawn by Carver, the concrete and stone building would be sunken four feet

The Mischief of Mazik



Bergstrom's civil trial postponed

THE CIVIL trial that was set to begin next week against the Carmel physician who was convicted of forcibly sodomizing a woman has been delayed at the request of his attorney.

In summer 2009, Carl Bergstrom was convicted by a Monterey County jury of sodomizing a woman in his Carmel home and was sentenced to seven years in prison. The victim, Jane Doe 1, then filed a lawsuit against Bergstrom seeking \$5 million in

While Bergstrom's civil trial was set for March 12, it was continued until July 23 at the request of his new attorney, Richard Rosen.

Rosen told the court he wants Bergstrom's criminal case resolved before the civil trial — which is expected to last 15 days — begins.

In October 2009, Bergstrom, 55, appealed his criminal conviction, and in October 2011, a panel of three appellate judges overturned it because of erroneous jury instruc-

Bergstrom, though, remains in jail, and a Monterey County judge in February declined to lower his \$750,000 bail.

While a 2-1 majority of the Sixth District Court of Appeal found fault with an instruction about the legal meaning of the word "consent" given to the jury by Monterey County Superior Court Judge Russell Scott, all three appellate judges also made it clear they thought Bergstrom was likely guilty.

In the civil suit, Doe alleges that in April 2009, Bergstrom slipped her a date-rape drug before he sodomized her. She eventually escaped his home and called 911 using a cell phone. Because of the attack, Doe's suit contends she has suffered physical, mental and emotional trauma, as well as shame and humiliation.

In documents filed last year from Avenal State Prison, where Bergstom had been serving his sentence before his conviction was overturned and he was transferred to Monterey County Jail, the doctor said he could no longer afford to retain a lawyer for his civil case.

Doe's attorney, Hugo Gerstl, has raised doubts about Bergstrom's claims of indigence and said in court documents that Bergstrom had been making \$900,000 per

Dogs stage 'run by' attack

HERE'S A look at some of the significant calls logged by the Carmel-by-the-Sea Police Department and the Monterey County Sheriff's Office last week. This week's log was compiled by Mary Schley.



State releases list of tax delinquents

A CARMEL art gallery is among several local businesses that owe more than \$100,000 in back taxes, according to a list released last week by the state Board of Equalization.

On March 2, the board released its updated Top 500 list of sales and use tax delinquencies, which amount to \$555.7 million for the first quarter of 2012. This year, the board expanded its list from 250 to 500 debtors, who can be viewed on the board of equalization's website.

There are only a few Monterey Peninsula businesses on the list, including Simic Galleries in Carmel, which owes \$661,858, according to the board. The BOE first attached a tax lien to the gallery, which is on San Carlos between Fifth And Sixth, on Feb. 9, 2010, according to the state.

Monterey Information Technologies on Garden Road owes \$1,392,285; Scott Motors on Del Monte Boulevard in Marina owes \$657,706; and Dealer Direct Automotive Sales & Leasing on Abbott Place in Salinas owes \$1,683,022.

The state's three top debtors are California Target Enterprises in Downey, which owes more than \$18 million; C&JD USA in Oakland, which owes more than \$16 million; and P&M Service Stations in Garden Grove, which is behind more than \$11 million.

The board is required by law to post the information every quarter, but it removes amounts delinquent taxpayers are addressing through payment arrangement, bankruptcy, litigation or appeal. Each taxpayer is notified 30 days before the information is posted.

Board spokesman Jaime Garza said the state works with taxpayers who fall far behind in their payments.

"The BOE does offer installment payment agreements in which the BOE and the taxpayer find an agreeable amount to be paid each month to satisfy the liability," Garza told The Pine Cone.

Although taxpayers can request that any full or partial payments they've made to the state be placed on the board's list, not one of the taxpayers on the Top 500 list requested the information be posted.


Some of the delinquent accounts on the Top 500 list date as far back as the early 1990s, and Garza said that's because the BOE doesn't set a specific time frame to pay back the amount owed.


The state is seeing tax liabilities go up.

"BOE has seen an increase in the total amount owed by California businesses over the past years," Garza said.

Since the program began, the BOE has received a total of \$5.3 million from 40 tax-payers who resolved their debts. Of those, 27 were paid off through installment agreements and 13 by making payment in full, according to the state.



Council takes steps to fix Flanders EIR

 ${
m Following}$ AN appellate court ruling in January that the city's Flanders Mansion EIR didn't fully address one small point, the city council on Tuesday voted to hire consul-

Before council members voted on the contracts, which were included on the March 6 consent calendar for adoption without discussion, Flanders Foundation President Melanie Billig asked them to hear her comments.

They agreed to listen then, rather than to put the matter at the end of the meeting as is customary in such situations, because Billig said she was caring for her mother, who had just come home from the hospital.

Built in the 1920s, Flanders Mansion sits on the edge of Mission Trail Nature Preserve and is accessed via a narrow driveway from Hatton Road. The city purchased the home in 1972 but has never found a viable use for it, largely due to neighborhood opposition to any activity that would draw more traffic to the area.

After saying her foundation had tried without success for 12 years to get the city to cooperate on an effort "to rehabilitate the mansion and the grounds at foundation expense, as well as to maintain the property as part of the park without city expense," she observed that the two lawsuits she filed against the city over the attempts to sell Flanders have cost taxpayers more than \$1 million.

"Again, tonight the council will vote to continue to pursue the EIR process and further economic analysis, all of which costs more public money," she said, as will the process of declaring the mansion surplus and holding another public vote on its sale. (The first vote in November 2009, in which residents decisively favored selling the mansion, was invalidated by the court.)

"How much does the council really think that it will get for the property? This is a very slow real estate market, and the city has not maintained Flanders, inside or out," she continued. "Yet, it looks upon it as a cash cow."

She further argued selling the historic mansion would

"irreparably damage this park, and for so little gain." Former city councilwoman Barbara Livingston also con-

demned the council's pursuit of the sale.

"I continue to feel that this is the worst possible decision the council could make," she said. "How tragic you couldn't think of a use for this magnificent home."

The contracts

Following their comments, the council decided without discussion to approve two contracts: One with Sedway Consulting, which will be paid \$5,000 to update the economic analysis of selling versus leasing the mansion, and the other with Denise Duffy & Associates, which will receive \$20,500 to fix the parts of the EIR the court found lacking.

In her proposal letter, Lynn Sedway said she would work

in collaboration with Denise Duffy, and her review would include updating comparative market values to reflect the current real estate climate.

'The court was comfortable with most of the analysis set forth but has requested an analysis of an additional alternative, namely that of the property encompassing a smaller lot size of about .75 acres," she said in her proposal. "Based on our conversation, I propose to accomplish this request by both updating market comparable values to account for the current market and analyzing the impact, if any, of a smaller amount of land associated with the property."

She said she would charge a "discounted hourly rate of \$300" and estimated she could complete the work for less than \$5,000.

In her letter, Duffy said her firm would work only on the part of the EIR that needs to be revised. DD&A issued its first draft EIR on the proposed sale of Flanders Mansion in April 2005, and

following the Flanders Foundation's first successful lawsuit against the city over the matter, issued a revised EIR in January 2009.

But that study was also successfully challenged in court by the foundation on the grounds that the EIR did not adequately respond to comments received during the public review period — namely, Skip Lloyd's suggestion that the study evaluate the possibility of selling the mansion on a smaller parcel of land.

As a result, the court ruled that part of the EIR must be revised.

"Public comment on the recirculated sections will be limited to only those sections circulated for public review. Specifically, the additional work consists of revising the alternatives analysis to evaluate a reduced parcel alternative, preparing public notices, attending necessary public hearings, and preparing the final EIR that includes responses received on the recirculated sections of the EIR," Duffy

She estimated the work would take at least three months and cost \$20,500.

Finally, the council voted to decertify the EIR and all the other approvals related to the proposed sale of Flanders, including the public vote in its favor.

"The Monterey County Superior Court has directed the city to decertify the environmental impact report and remedy errors in the environmental review process and documents," city administrator Jason Stilwell explained.

Overcorrection leaves car in precarious position

A DRIVER'S hasty swerve to avoid another car on narrow Rancho San Carlos Road last Monday landed her car upside-down on a bridge railing.

California Highway Patrol public information officer Bob Lehman said 30-year-old Maryland resident Kristina Foster was driving a 2011 Ford Fusion southbound on Rancho San Carlos Road just south of Carmel Valley Road when she "steered to get out of the way of an oncoming vehicle and lost control," shortly after 11 a.m. Feb. 27.

He believes Foster managed to get herself out of the car, despite its being roof-side-down on the railing, but she was later taken to Community Hospital of the Monterey Peninsula for evaluation and treatment after complaining of

A tow truck removed the Ford from the bridge, which suffered only scratches, Lehman reported.

Foster was not cited for the accident.

who is also an architect.

In a Jan. 23 letter to Monterey County planner Delinda Robinson, Raymond Neutra called the home "a pure example of the Southern California School of architecture in this Northern California community."

Group supports preservation

The drive to preserve the house has also drawn interest from local architects, designers and historians, including Monterey Bay Modernism, a group that launched a petition campaign to deny the proposed demolition of the home. More than 300 people have signed it.

Associate architect and MBM spokeswoman Karen Lesney said the group believes there is enough space on the site to build the new home while retaining the Neutra house. The home sits on more than two acres.

"We aren't saying, 'Don't build anything,'" Lesney told The Pine Cone. "But at least be respectful of what you have there"

Sand City-based modernist architect Jerry Lomax, 84, who himself has been called "a master of mid-century architecture," told The Pine Cone the Neutra house needs renovating but that it should "certainly should be preserved."

"I've been getting people to sign [the petition] and have been getting more support to keep it," said Lomax, who designed the West End Mixed Use building in Sand City, "because it is now the only Neutra house on Central Coast."

The house is named after Arthur and Kathleen Connell, who commissioned Neutra to design it. Neutra's legacy was immortalized long before his death in 1970 when he was featured on the cover of the Aug. 15, 1949, edition of Time Magazine.

After the Connells owned the home, it was sold to another couple in 1985 before Mehdipour purchased it in 2004. Mehdipour, the founder of Menlo Park company Skire, did not return a phone message left by The Pine Cone Wednesday, and neither did her attorney.

Is it historic?

Complicating matters are disparate opinions from two historic property experts — both hired by Mehdipour.

The first consultant, Santa Cruz-based Anthony Kirk, who performed an analysis in July 2011 for the California Department of Parks and Recreation, said the house appears to be historic according to criteria outlined in the state's Register of Historical Resources.

Kirk concluded in his July 2011 report given to the county planning department,

that it is "significant as an important and relatively early example of modern architecture in Pebble Beach by a leading American architect."

who found there were flaws in Kirk's analysis and determined the home is not historically important.

Supporting Kirk, however, is a conclusion by the Monterey County Historic Resources Review Board which

After Kirk's findings, the owner hired another consultant,

Supporting Kirk, however, is a conclusion by the Monterey County Historic Resources Review Board, which in August 2011 concurred with Kirk and said an environmental impact report should be required before demolition of the home is considered.

"The consensus of the board is that the Connell House is historically significant for modernism on the Monterey Peninsula and should not be demolished," HRRB member and architect John Scourkes told The Pine Cone.

Neutra expert agrees

Architectural historian and author Barbara Lamprecht, who wrote "Richard Neutra – Complete Works" and "Neutra – Selected Projects," and who is completing a Ph.D on Neutra's work at the University of Liverpool, said she believes the house would be considered a historic resource under the California Environmental Quality Act.

"As one of the first-generation modern architects who influenced Bay Area Modernism," Lamprecht wrote in a Feb. 1 letter to the county planning department, "Pebble Beach is fortunate in boasting an accomplished work by master architect Richard Neutra."

The two-level Art Connell House, according to Lamprecht, "exemplifies Neutra's signature trademarks in its

careful asymmetric composition of volumes and opposing opaque (stucco) and transparent (glass) planes. Roof planes of disparate sizes, adding visual interest, extend over those areas where protection from the sun is important."

Application snags

Monterey County planning services manager Laura Lawrence said since December 2010, the owner has submitted several applications to the county for demolition of the house, but planners have deemed them incomplete.

If and when planners receive a complete application, the county could require a costly environmental review before any work is done on the property.

"If we do not think that the evidence is clear one way or the other" whether the house is historically significant, Lawrence said, "then, yes, we would require an EIR."

Pacific Grove resident Sally Aberg, who has an interest in local historic architecture, said the house should be preserved to or sold to "someone who would cherish" it.

"To demolish such treasures is neither progress nor

admirable change — just short-sightedness," she said. "The dramatic view would remain, but a treasure would be lost forever."

Neutra, who was born in Vienna in 1892 before moving to


Los Angeles in the mid-1920s, was highly influential on postwar modern architecture, designing dozens of houses and other buildings in California and other states.

Similar efforts to preserve Neutra's works and other mid-20th century buildings have been waged in other parts of the state and country, including Beverly Hills and Los Altos.

This Pebble Beach house, designed by famed architect Richard Neutra, is the focus of an effort by local architects and others to prevent the homeowner, a software company CEO, from razing it in favor of a much large house.

RUN TO JACK'S FOR



CHUNKS OF charred wood and other debris from fires on popular Carmel Beach can leave much of the white sand dingy and dirty. His mesh basket, shaped like a wok, has four handles and is placed in a pit in the sand and then partially buried. Its dimensions allow for a city-legal fire of 3 feet by 3 feet, and when the revelers are done toasting marshmallows or sipping wine and warming their toes, they simply douse the blaze with water, lift the basket and carry it, along with its burned contents, up to the trashcans on Scenic Road.

The method could help reduce the workload of city employees and volunteers who clean the beach by hand. Each

year, the city spends about \$10,000 on those efforts, and while possible solutions, including the mechanized beach rake with which the city unsuccessfully experimented, have been long discussed, no real cure has emerged, other than to ban fires entirely.

But much popular support exists for continuing to allow fires on the sand south of 10th Avenue, as long as beach goers follow rules dictating they be a certain distance from the bluffs and near enough the surf line so the waves will eventually wash them away. Many visitors, however, don't know the rules or choose to ignore them, hence the problems of dinginess and debris.

City forester Mike Branson introduced Leverone's concept at the March 6 council meeting.

"The idea is to make the user part of the solution," he said. "If you're going to have a fire, maybe you can be part of the solution in cleaning it up."

The forest and beach commission endorsed the basket and asked the council and public for feedback. Leverone provided a lot of detail on his creation and its implementation, as well as suggestions for how it could be used. The baskets could be rented to beach visitors or loaned for a deposit.

Lindsey Hanna, who has lived near the beach and been burning fires there with his family for decades, strenuously objected to having to use any such instrument, instead opting for next-day cleanup by hand.

"This thing's a monster!" he exclaimed. "It's an absolute

Skip Lloyd, who has repeatedly complained about charcoal on the beach, commended Leverone for his creativity and willingness to take action. He encouraged the city to hold a workshop on the topic.

"Even now, in the middle of winter, there were five fires going simultaneously," during a recent evening visit, he said, adding that last July 4, there were 125 ablaze.


"I recommend a really good workshop be put together to study the whole problem," he said.

Jenkins (\$750) and former councilman Dick

Ely (\$100).

Offsetting those were \$10,804.83 in expenses, including \$386.10 to Scheid Vineyards, \$240.33 to Cima Collina and \$646.50 to Galante for wine to serve at his events; \$1,135.82 to a Montana-based printer for campaign literature; \$900 for website design; \$2,759 for campaign consultants; and other costs.

People on his payroll included his assistant, Danielle Ticoulat-Bowers, who was paid \$1,041.66, and CPA H. Carlin, who received \$200.

He reported one outstanding bill of \$250 from a Washington, D.C.-based vendor providing a phone bank database.

■ Rich Pepe

Pepe, meanwhile, reported collecting \$100 in contributions in 2011 and \$4,174 this year. Pepe's major supporters for the period of Jan. 1 to Feb. 25 included Sandra Silvestri, who gave \$500, and Rick Antle and Jacqueline Campett-Jones, each of whom contributed \$1,000. Silvestri, wife of prominent Hollywood composer Alan Silvestri, lives in the Carmel Highlands, Antle lives in Salinas and is of Tanimura & Antle fame, and Jones has a post office box in Carmel.

Pepe also received \$300 from realtor Cheryl Savage of Carmel, \$200 from Nicholas Colasanti of Capitola, and \$300 from Robin and Erik Eldsmo of Monterey.

Pepe's cash payments for the period totaled \$3,343.10, including \$1,261.95 for yard signs, \$969.20 for print advertising and \$643.50 for video and digital imaging.

He reported another \$8,165.57 in unpaid bills for print ads, photography, graphic design and postage, and logged a payment of \$2,800 for Michelle Saar as his campaign worker. He loaned himself \$100 and forgave himself the debt.

Unlike the majority of the other candidates, Pepe largely used independent Carmel-based businesses for his campaign services, as well as a couple from Monterey, with none from outside the Peninsula.

■ Ken Talmage

Talmage reported raising \$9,208 between Jan. 1 and Feb. 25, with nothing carried over from 2011.

His main contributors, each of whom gave \$1,000, were Jason Burnett, Sarah Chang, Stanley Merersmen and himself. Charles Downer gave \$500, and several other supporters wrote checks for \$250 and \$100 to his campaign.

Notable supporters of Talmage's reelection bid include former councilman Dick Ely and Chris Fitz.

Talmage's expenses totaled \$4,752, including \$780 to Robert Talbott Vineyards for wine, \$795 to Costco and \$225 to Bruno's for his kickoff party refreshments, \$1,071 for literature and campaign materials, and other payments for postage and fundraising. He paid all of his bills for the period.

■ Victoria Beach

Beach raised \$5,719 in cash contributions, with supporters donating between \$100 and \$300 to her campaign. The most sizable checks, \$300, came from Chris Fitz and Roberta Miller, with \$250 donations from Chicago architect Ian Jacobs, Carmel attorney Mahmoud Abouzeid, Jr., and Burnett's wife, Melissa.

County supervisor Jane Parker and dentist Hugo Ferlito each contributed \$150, and Dick Ely gave \$100, as did several Carmel Residents Association members and likeminded residents: Clayton and Linda Anderson, Carolyn Hardy and Richard Flower.

During the same period, Beach paid out

\$5,616.36 for various expenses, including \$600 for her kickoff at Sunset Center, more than \$2,200 for website development, and \$1,187.50 for campaign consulting. She also paid for literature and other printed pieces.

She and Burnett are using the same campaign consultants, Boots Road Group LLC out of Monterey, and accountant Holly Carlin.

■ Bob Profeta

Profeta collected \$3,976 in cash from his supporters between Jan. 1 and Feb. 25, including \$500 apiece from himself and his wife, Judie, and Tennessee consultant Frgo Korn.

He received \$250 contributions from Carmel attorney Alan Carlson and investor Deborah Reitz. Other supporters included Drive Carmel owner and Sunset Center board member Mary Gifford and Carrigg's of Carmel owner Mary Ann Carrigg, who contributed \$200 and \$100, respectively.

Profeta made cash payments of \$3,858,

including \$950 for website design, \$592.86 for yard signs and \$1,942.32 for mailers and postage. His outstanding invoices totaling \$2,789 are for print advertising, campaign literature and other related paraphernalia.

■ Tom Leverone

Leverone, finally, raised \$1,711 in contributions and loaned himself \$1,500.

He listed three checks received during the Jan. 1-to-Feb. 25 reporting period, with his most substantial donation of \$1,000 coming from Pebble Beach resident Jack Van Valkenberg. Gary and Kathy Bang gave his campaign \$100, and Pebble Beach attorneys Stacey and Daniel Schrader also donated \$100.

Leverone made \$2,501.63 in cash payments for expenses that included \$1,500 for Monterey campaign consultant Tony Seton and \$550 to Bernardus for wine poured during his kickoff party. His sole outstanding bill of \$585.35 is due to Terry's Lounge for his kickoff party.

the fire," she explained.

Owned by Barnett, the house is located off Garrapatos Road, which is accessed from Palo Colorado Road. To reach the home, firefighters had to travel more than a mile on a winding dirt road, which was no small challenge for fire engines and a water tender to navigate. "The roads here are crazy and narrow," Goetz added.

All that remains of the residence is "a couple of adobe walls," a neighbor reported. CalFire investigator Catey Trenner identified power lines as the cause.

The American Red Cross, meanwhile, is doing what it can to help Barnett and Downs.

Sharon Tong, a spokesperson for the Monterey Bay chapter of the American Red Cross, told The Pine Cone that Barnett is staying with her son and is scheduled to meet with local Red Cross officials. Downs has already received assistance from the group. "He got out with just his clothes on his back and his dogs," Tong reported. "We were able to provide him with shelter as well as money for food and clothing."

Tong reminded residents that services offered by the Red Cross are free and made

possible "by the generous donations of local residents and businesses."

below ground level and would contain one bathroom for men and another for women, an outdoor shower, a foot rinse and pet wash area, a low-pitched landscaped roof, five skylights, two solar collectors for hot water and an ADA-compliant path from the Scenic walkway to the restrooms. It would also contain a janitor's storage room.

The forest and beach commission, planning commission and council have all discussed the plans and provided feedback, and at the March 6 council meeting, after some residents demanded another workshop to talk about the bathrooms, Carver received even more input.

Former assistant city administrator Greg D'Ambrosio reminded the council that the point at Santa Lucia Avenue and Scenic Road was badly eroded during El Niño storms in 1982-83, and he wondered about the wisdom of putting a permanent bathroom in an area within reach of storm-driven waves.

Barbara Livingston said she thought a single, unisex stall would be enough to take care of public needs at that location, though councilman Jason Burnett later observed that two out of the three porta-potties there now are often in use simultaneously.

Skip Lloyd called for another workshop for more public participation, so residents could work with Carver to establish the parameters of the project. He also wanted flagging and story poles erected so people would understand the scale of the proposed bathrooms.

A letter submitted by Skip and Cindy Lloyd, along with D'Ambrosio, outlined extensive concerns, including the fact the bathroom would not be easily identifiable as such due to its low profile, yet at the same time, the scale of the building and its ADA access ramp would be too large. They also worried it would use too much water and be expensive to maintain.

In a Feb. 22 email to the planning commission, Livingston commented, "The existing site with a restroom snuggled into the existing mature cypress trees is ideal. It would be folly to excavate for lower profile."

She also said its low profile "invites nefarious activities and opportunity for winter storm damage."

Further, she said it should be built out of wood, and construction "should be utilitarian, simple, functional."

Mayor Sue McCloud said the proposed outdoor shower should be eliminated in order to reduce water demand, but councilwoman Paula Hazdovac only wanted it moved closer to the foot rinsing and dog washing area. Meanwhile, Burnett said plumbing for the shower should be put in, even if the city doesn't immediately have water to make it operational.

Councilwoman Karen Sharp suggested adding a baby-changing area and making the two stalls unisex.

Councilman Ken Talmage, meanwhile, urged Carver to reduce the size of the building as much as possible, in order to cut the building costs from an estimated \$300,000.

"The less expensive, the more likely we'll be able to find the money to build it," he said. "We don't need skylights, we don't need a shower, we don't need a lot of the bells and whistles — we just need a basic betheroom."

Carver pointed out that, since the adjacent sewer main is nine feet underground, the facility will not need a sewer pump, thus eliminating the need for a mechanical room, which would cut down the size and costs. He has made other changes to reduce it by about 25 percent overall and also said screened windows facing the sea would suffice for illumination and ventilation instead if skylights. He estimated the reduced building costs would be about \$250,000.


Burnett said he was concerned about the excavation and low level of the floor, especially since global warming could bring higher surf and more storms.

Planning and building services manager Sean Conroy said the building could be raised a foot and also said staff would look into the danger posed by nearby earthquake faults, which are about 1,000 feet from the site.

After the discussion ended and Carver left, Lloyd stood up and asked what would happen next.

"He's going to redo the design with what we talked about tonight," McCloud answered.

One judge in Alameda County identified himself as transgender.

But a solid 40 percent of those on the bench, or 672 of the state's 1,678 judges, refused to answer the questions, indicating many judges feel that the state should butt out of their personal lives. (In Monterey County, 16 judges identified themselves as heterosexual, while two didn't respond.)

Despite a large gap in information from those who serve on the bench that could otherwise present a clearer demographic picture, Equality California is hopeful that, as judges become more accustomed to the questions, more of them will provide answers.

"This initial release of this information is really a benchmark," Orr said. "I anticipate as time goes on, we will have more voluntary disclosure."


The study also showed that half of Monterey County's 18 judges are women, placing it in a tie with Contra Costa County for the highest percentage of women serving on the bench.

Two judges in Monterey County said they are Asian, two identified themselves as "Hispanic or Latino," 13 are white and one indicated he is more than one race. Only one judge identified himself as being more than two races.

Throughout the state, 68.9 percent of judges are men, while 31.1 percent are women. White men still make up the majority of judges in California with 72.3 percent, or 1,212. Only 96 judges are black or African American, and 137 are Hispanic or Latino, according to the study.



A decade of Wild Thyme and other milestones, a moving sale, and the king of crab

WHEN TERRY Teplitzky decided to set up a commercial kitchen in Marina a decade ago, he intended it to be home base for Michael's Catering, then located in Watsonville. But when people started asking if he would operate a restaurant there, he heeded their requests and opened a deli—something he had long wanted to do.

Wild Thyme Deli & Cafe quickly evolved. Thinking his customers would mostly want takeout, he hadn't bought any tables or chairs. But when they started asking where they could sit to enjoy their savory sandwiches, salads and snacks, he rushed to

a local home and garden store and returned with five little bistro sets of a table and two chairs each. Those quickly filled, and people wanted more.

Today, the Reservation Road eatery has indoor and outdoor seating to accommodate 50, and his kitchen turns out specialty sandwiches, as well as those made to order, along with signature salads, deli salads, individual quiches and miniature meatloaves, lasagna and other dishes for an easy lunch or dinner.

Among the most popular items, with good reason, is the Smoked Chicken Panino with basil pesto, red onions, tomatoes, smoked mozzarella and chipotle mayonnaise on a grilled roll. Crisp on the outside and

moist on the inside, the sandwich is flavorful and satisfying, with a trace of heat. Another is the classic Rueben, with corned beef or pastrami (or a combo), Swiss cheese, sauerkraut and Russian dressing on grilled lite rye. (Though delicious, this sandwich should be consumed quickly, before the bottom piece of bread becomes soggy.)

No sweets are baked in house at the moment, but Teplitzky plans to change that. In the meantime, trusted suppliers, including Santa Cruz-based Pacific Cookie Co., provide the baked goods.

"We're starting to do more things inhouse," he said, such as the sauerkraut on the Rueben, which he hopes will soon feature house-made corned beef, too.

He also wants to expand Wild Thyme's catering arm, which is a little more casual and less expensive than Michael's, and offer other services, too.

This week, Teplitzky announced the deli will host Family Fridays March 23, April 20 and May 18. From 5:30 to 7:30 p.m., a family of four can sit down to feast on meals like Wild Thyme rotisserie chicken, roasted potatoes, onions and carrots, mixed green salad

and dessert; meatloaf with mashed potatoes and gravy, three-bean salad and dessert; and vegetable paella, mixed-green salad and dessert. The cost is \$50 total.

And throughout the year, he's celebrating Wild Thyme's 10th anniversary with special promotions each month, including donating a portion of his catering proceeds to charity, offering to-go dinner for two for \$10 between 4 and 6 p.m. on the 10th of each month (except June), and selling coffee daily in July for 10 cents between 10 and 11 a.m.







They are befriended by a group of young women, who are soon taken captive by slave traders. As the women are carted off to a slave market, the pirates vow to rescue them.





Tax filers uncover SSN fraud

A HANDFUL of Monterey Peninsula residents recently discovered fraudulent tax returns have been filed using their Social Security Numbers.

They learned the news when they tried to file their own returns and were advised by the IRS that 1040s had already been submitted using their SSNs, Monterey County Sheriff's spokeswoman Donna Galletti confirmed this week.

Four victims reported the fraud to the sheriff's office: Two Carmel residents and a Pebble Beach man, whose number had been used to file a fraudulent return in Tennessee.

In January, the IRS worked with the U.S. Justice Department Tax Division and local U.S. Attorneys offices to target 105 suspects in 23 states. The sweep resulted in 939 criminal charges included in 69 indictments.

"The reason we're seeing this is because people are filing their taxes right now," Galletti said. "It looks like people were going and just filing fraudulent returns."

To minimize the risk of identity and SSN theft, the IRS recommends people not carry their Social Security cards, or any documents containing the number, with them, and to only provide the number when it's required. People should also take pains to protect their financial information, obtain credit reports annually, secure personal information in their homes, frequently change computer and Internet passwords, and never provide personal information over the phone, through the mail or online unless the recipient can be verified.

Paying for other people's sins

IT MAY be hard to believe, but almost half of California drains into San Francisco Bay.

From Mt. Shasta in the north, to the Grapevine in the south, and from Donner Summit in the east, to the cities of Oakland, San Jose and San Francisco in the west, the bay is downhill from tens of millions of acres of everything from wild forests to dense cities, and when rain falls on them, San Francisco Bay is where

Consider what that means: Within the boundaries of San Francisco Bay's impressive watershed live more than 10 million people who drive at least 15 million cars, occupy about 6 million homes and apartments, and work in countless office buildings, restaurants, schools, stores, hospitals, factories and other assorted man-made structures. They drive on thousands of miles of paved roads, keep several large airports very busy, farm millions of acres of cropland, and tend to too many lawns and gardens to count.

Oh, and don't forget the government. Within the San Francisco watershed can be found the capital of the State of California, with its legislative, judicial and executive branches, each comprising numerous elected and appointed officials and the tens of thousands of workers who put their laws and policies into effect.

Yes, the San Francisco Bay watershed is a very busy place.

Not only do all those people and all their activities directly produce a lot of waste water, when it rains over the enormous and bustling area they occupy, the runoff carries with it chemical artifacts from everything they do. Literally, if something is found on land, it's also in the storm drains, streams, rivers, estuaries and bays that drain it. And from the beehive of activity encompassing everything from Bakersfield to Sacramento and from Stockton to Sausalito, that must be a helluva lot of runoff.

One of the aforementioned government agencies found within the area producing all that pollution is the State Water Resources Control Board, which is responsible for protecting the quality of our state's waters, in part by controlling what can end up in runoff. Nobody's allowed to pollute it directly. Lately, the agency has been on a campaign to limit pollution from indirect sources, such as the oil that drips from your car, the fertilizer you put on your garden and everything else humans put on land that wasn't there before.


Provided they're enforced reasonably, these programs are obviously a very good idea. And there should be plenty of work available for the stormwater bureaucrats minding their own people-laden backyard and trying to keep San Francisco Bay from becoming a sewer.

But while the state's water cops have instituted numerous educational and regulatory programs in the vast watershed of San Francisco Bay, they've really cracked down on certain parts of the state. Parts where the runoff problem is worse than it is in Stockton or Santa Clara?

No. For inexplicable reasons, bureaucrats with the SWRCB have selected California's most unpolluting towns for their most Draconian measures. While it's pretty much business as usual in populous and polluting Fresno and Fremont, tiny and pristine Carmel, Pebble Beach and Pacific Grove have been told they cannot let any storm water run into the ocean if it contains even the tiniest amounts of pollutants. Accomplishing this will require spending millions of dollars, and you, dear readers, are going to pay for it.

To say that this policy makes absolutely no sense is a great understatement. Our state government is out of its mind. As usual.

Latest CUSD bond too costly **Dear Editor:**

We attended the Carmel Unified School District board meeting on Feb. 29, where a proposal for putting a third bond on the ballot was presented. Within the proposal was \$2.2 million-plus for artificial turf at the high school and middle school, \$3 million for a practice gymnasium, \$1.5 million for a warehouse/maintenance workshop, \$1.6 million for parking lots and walkways, and other miscellaneous projects for a total of \$18 mil-

There are many things that bothered us about this proposal. We feel after spending more than \$61 million over the past 10 years on buildings and various infrastructures, it is now time to turn our direction back to education and invest in educational programs.

The proposed projects are not projects that would improve safety or educational programs, as did projects completed from the two previous bonds. In this time of economic hardship and uncertainty for many in this community, we feel this is an inappropriate request and/or demand to place on our

Also, as was stated at the board meeting, the district does not have extra money in the general fund, since it was appropriated to finish the last bond that went way over budget. This is the money that funds the day to day operations of the district and should be used for educational purposes such as class size reduction, teacher salaries, and student services.

We feel that the \$17,500 taken out of the general fund to pay for a survey of only 400 random voters out of approximately 17,000 to see if there is support for another bond is money that should have been spent more productively for educational needs. We question how these 400 voters will be selected and how this small fraction of voters can possibly reflect if a bond measure will succeed. We feel this is money wasted.

As was left out of The Pine Cone story last week, Karl Pallastrini was the only board member who questioned the proposed bond projects as to how they were determined and if the sites had input (which we were told they had not). He also questioned the need for a survey which originally was proposed for \$35,000 however was decreased to

A bond should be need-based, and we feel this one is clearly want based. We encourage the community to speak out against this proposed bond in support of turning our focus and CUSD money on educational programs for our students.

CARMEL LEGENDS"

There are certain sacred cows in the history of Carmel who had long been praised for pioneering the artistic reputation of this extraordinary place. Oddly enough, we find it difficult to express much admiration or reverence for them, and we will probably be roundly criticized for lumping them all together as a pretty irresponsible lot. The ring leader was GEORGE STERLING, a dilettante of the early 1900's, poet by his own definition, who guided this group ne'er-do-wells through a series of revelries which would get them jailed today. One of his many buddies was AMBROSE BIERCE, a San Francisco cynic who disappeared, in 1916 or so, in Mexico. Sterling himself committed suicide at the Bohemian Club in 1926. In fact, a number of the so-called Bohemians of Carmel met similarly self-induced ends. It's a puzzlement: they partied, they picnicked, they talked and sang and drank. And they wrote: poems, short stories, plays, novels. Not one of them - STERLING, MARY, AUSTIN, JIMMY HOPPER, even SINCLAIR LEWIS was content to live an uninvolved life. They created, they invented, they revolted, they enjoyed the remarkable gift of nature which came to be called "Carmel-by the-Sea." Disillusioned as most of them came to be, they are the fabric on which this remarkable place is woven. And we'll hear more about them in subsequent legends.
