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Del Piero stands by '95 vote for water cutback

Green Party, LandWatch founder back him for county supervisor

NEARLY 17 years ago, the State Water Resources Control Board issued a monumental decision, Order 95-10, compelling the Monterey Peninsula's water company, California American Water, to drastically cut its pumping from the Carmel River.

Since then, Peninsula residents have spent tens of millions of dollars toward building an alternative water supply project, only to be rewarded with a host of failed proposals. Hundreds of millions of dollars are yet to be spent to comply with 95-10.

At the center of the historic order was Monterey

Dave Potter

County Supervisor candidate Marc Del Piero, who served on the state water board in 1995 and voted in favor of the cutback order. He's running against incumbent 5th District Supervisor Dave Potter and Pacific Grove Mayor Carmelita Garcia.

In an interview this week, Del Piero, a water-rights attorney and bankruptcy trustee, stood by his support of the historic mandate - a godsend to environmentalists but a nightmare to others.

"Looking at 95-10 through a lens in 2012," Del Piero told The Pine Cone, "demonstrates that the public agencies and the California American Water company have been sadly lacking in satisfying their obligations to ensure the residents of the Monterey Peninsula have adequate water resources."

The state order was sparked by lawsuits filed against Cal Am by the Carmel River Steelhead Association, the

local Sierra Club chapter and others, contending the company's diversions were damaging the riparian vegetation and the steelhead fish and red-legged frog. Cal Am — they insisted, and the state water board concurred — also didn't have the legal right to pump so much water from the river.

The impact of the 1995 cutback order was felt immediately when the Monterey Peninsula Water Management District issued a permit moratorium that required vacant lots to be left unbuilt and prevented businesses from expanding and homeowners from adding bathrooms and even bar sinks. But things could get a lot worse: In October 2009, the state water board issued a cease and desist order against Cal Am, setting a timeline for the private company to stop diverting half the water it pumps from the river by the end of

All's well with retriever after Big Sur hiking ordeal

TTOOK a heroic effort by a group of backpackers May 6 to bring a large dog back to civilization after it was injured along the Pine Ridge Trail in Big Sur.

The previous day, Leeroy - a good-natured, 3-year-old male golden retriever from Emeryville - had accompanied his owner, Edward Gaba, and three other 20-something hikers -Lily, Liz and Jeff, who didn't want their last names used — on an overnight trip up the Big Sur River Gorge. But a short distance before they reached their destination, Sykes Camp, Leeroy collapsed and was unable to continue. He had to be carried into the camp.

Gaba and his friends had hoped that after a night of rest,

Leeroy would be OK to make the return trip.

But when the retriever didn't rise to the challenge the following morning, they were forced to try to carry him 12 miles back to Pfeiffer Big Sur State Park, where they had parked their vehicle.

An average adult male golden retriever weighs between 65 and 75 pounds. Leeroy weighs at least that much.

Utilizing fallen branches and an assortment of backpacking equipment, the group built a gurney to try to carry Leeroy, but it fell apart. Other methods were more successful, including a "fireman's carry," with the men taking turns with the exhausting and plodding task of carrying Leeroy on

P.B. plan sails through coastal commission

THE PEBBLE Beach Company and the California Coastal Commission resolved a decades-old controversy when they came to terms this week over development plans in Del Monte Forest.

In a landmark decision Wednesday, coastal commissioners voted unanimously to support land use amendments that would allow the Pebble Beach Co. to pursue its final buildout of the forest — without the new golf course the company sought for many years.

"I believe this is a historic agreement that both protects the coastal resources in Del Monte Forest," coastal commission executive director Charles Lester said at the meeting in San Rafael, "and provides for significant development for the Pebble Beach Company into the future."

The plan sets aside 635 acres as protected habitat, while

PLANNING COMMISSION chairman Steven Hillyard was unanimously appointed to fill former councilman Mayor Jason Burnett's seat on the city council Tuesday.

Ten people applied for the appointment, and Burnett and councilwoman Paula Hazdovac interviewed all the candidates and deliberated on two separate occasions before reducing the field to two recommendations: Hillyard and Carmel Innkeepers Association head Carrie Theis.

"It really was incredible, the applications and people who came forward, so it was a tough decision" Hazdovac said.

During each 30-minute interview, they asked the candidate to explain why they wanted to join the council, discuss their past experience with city government and volunteer groups, and express their opinions on issues facing the community. The field included Kristy Downing, Carolyn Hardy, Tom Leverone, Rich Pepe, Bob Profeta, Michael LePage, Harrison Shields, Linda Wilde, Theis and Hillyard.

In their report to the council and the public, Burnett and Hazdovac wrote, "Of all the candidates, two present themselves as having a particularly strong ability to complement the expertise of the existing city council, to contribute to the four goals [community character, long-term vitality, organizational effectiveness and fiscal stability] adopted by the city

 ${f S}_{{\sf ADIE}}$ LIKELY had two years to live when they adopted her, but they were willing to love the elderly black Labrador retriever till death did they part. Particularly if they also could adopt Noodle, a sassy little yellow Lab puppy.

Sadie lived long enough to raise Noodle, who matured into a divine dog and became the love of his family's lives. Yet the seasons turned, the kids grew up, and Noodle got old, finally succumbing to cancer last December. His family was inconsolable.

Meanwhile, a 2-year-old yellow Lab was out for a romp when she was hit by a passing car and left to die,



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battered and broken on the side of the road. Except she didn't die.

The police picked her up. A veterinarian performed emergency surgery for a fraction of the cost, paid for by donations through Golden Gate Labrador Retriever Rescue, a regional nonprofit dog-adoption organization. A volunteer fostered the dog's recovery for six weeks. That's when Noodle's family called, looking for a way to heal their own hurt.

They didn't know if this damaged dog was too much to take on or just what they needed. Then they saw "eyes that would break your heart and a coat the color of melted butter."

Butter Bean has three metal plates and rods in her hip, and sometimes suffers grand mal epileptic seizures. She has never barked, never spoken, never whined. But she is sweet and secure. She knows where the cookies are in Carmel, and she knows her family needs her as much as she needs them.

"We were trying very hard to get through our loss after Noodle died," says the family, "and we decided the only thing to do was contact Lab Rescue. This was our first experience with the organization, but you can bet it won't be our last."

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9/11 STEEL EARNS SPACE IN DEVENDORF PARK, MEMORIAL DESIGNS SOUGHT

THE PIECE of World Trade Center steel that made its way across the nation to Carmel via fire stations last month will be installed in Devendorf Park as a 9/11 memorial, the city council decided May 1. How it will be displayed — and whether sculptors will compete for the chance to design the base for the 85-pound, 15-by-12-inch piece of metal — have yet to be determined.

Resident CarrieAnn (her full name) took on the task of procuring the steel and getting it to town. In contemplating where it might be publicly installed, she dismissed Scenic Road ("Scenic needs to be scenic and the beauty left untouched"), the fire station due to lack of space and the courtyard in front of Carmel P.D. because it's not that welcoming to the public.

"While most of us feel the police department is a place people would go to seek help, no offense, but it may be a little intimidating to go there to find 'Resolve & Remembrance," she said, referring to the name she has given the memorial.

Devendorf Park, on the other hand, seemed a perfect home, considering it already contains other war memorials.

Several people, some of them war veterans, spoke in favor of the memorial and its the idea of placing it in the park.

John Hanson, who works in the city's building department and has served multiple tours with the Army National Guard, said, "To have this memorial speaks volumes about this community. We should never forget about the sacrifices people have made."

Councilwoman Victoria Beach observed that the piece of metal "is not just an object."

"The person who gave me my first job died that day in that building," she said. "This is the most important historical thing that has happened in my life, so I very much welcome this here and think that's the appropriate place."

Councilman Ken Talmage agreed Devendorf Park is the proper location but worried the sculpture competition would commercialize the memorial.

"I'm very concerned about competition among all these artists," he said. "I think it needs to be as simple as possible."

Mayor Jason Burnett said the memorial and everything associated with it should be "somber, private, serious, understated, discrete and simple."

Talmage agreed and said the contest didn't pass muster, and Burnett suggested the city take over the process of


design, planning and installation.

CarrieAnn also announced she is holding a writing contest for high-school students to help get them involved in the memorial and become more knowledgeable of the past.

She said it would involve prose and poetry, and announced the topic: "Reflect on how the terrorist attacks of

Sept. 11, 2001, impacted at least one of the following: you personally, a family member or friend, within your Monterey Bay community or the nation as a whole."

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

LeVett files lawsuit over blocked ocean, golf course view

BUSINESSMAN DENNY LeVett has filed a lawsuit against his Pebble Beach neighbors alleging they planted tall trees to prevent him from enjoying the ocean view from his new home.

LeVett filed a lawsuit in Monterey County Superior Court April 23 contending that neighbors Steven and Stephanie Ames, who live on Sonado Road, planted six to eight "fast-growing" trees to block his view.

The couple "have maliciously maintained these trees for the dominant purpose of annoying" LeVett, according to his lawsuit, which adds the trees do not offer any additional privacy to the couple's home.

LeVett's Viscaino Road house was built to "take advantage of the ocean view and part of the Pebble Beach Golf Course," according to his suit.

But LeVett said he didn't have much time to enjoy the vista. Just after his home was built in August 2011, the Ameses planted the trees directly in line with his view of the ocean and Pebble Beach's world-class golf greens.

The trees, which are taller than 10 feet, constitute a "spite fence" and will soon completely obscure his view, according to LeVett, who is asking a judge to order the Ameses to trim or remove them. The trees are not only an annoyance, but will also decrease his property value, according to LeVett.

The lawsuit also cites a deed restriction imposed by the Del Monte Properties Company requiring property owners to refrain from planting trees that obstruct the view from adjacent property.

The deed also states that if trees do get too tall, the property owner whose views are impeded is allowed to have the trees trimmed or cut.

However, the Ameses have "refused to either trim the trees or allow [LeVett] to do

so," according to the suit filed for LeVett by Anthony Lombardo & Associates, Inc. attorney Linda N. Sunde.

"Continued violation by defendants interferes with [LeVett's] quiet enjoyment" of his property, he argues.

LeVett is seeking more than \$25,000 in damages, including punitive damages.

The Pine Cone couldn't reach the Ameses for comment. Two phone numbers listed on the Internet for the couple are disconnected.

According to California law, a spite fence is a fence, tree or other structure more than 10 feet tall that is planted or constructed between lots for the purpose of annoying another property owner.

In April, a Carmel man settled a lawsuit he filed against his neighbors arguing, in part, that they built a spite fence consisting of tall trees to block his ocean view.

P.G. Council rejects admissions tax

THE IDEA of imposing a tax on every ticket-paying visitor to the Monterey Bay Aquarium didn't get far with Pacific Grove City Council members, who rejected the proposal last week.

At the May 2 meeting, council members voted unanimously to nix a plan to charge the aquarium an admissions tax, one of several measures the council was offered as a way of raising revenue.

The tax would have also applied to all types of events in Pacific Grove, including school sporting events, such as football and baseball games, movies, student performances and even coffeehouse concerts.

Hank Armstrong, the aquarium's vice president of communications, said the aquarium was satisfied with the decision. Only 20 percent of the aquarium sits on Pacific Grove property.

"We were pleased the council came to the conclusion it did," Armstrong told The Pine Cone Monday. "Most of the council clearly agreed it makes much more sense for the aquarium and the city to keep working together for each other's benefit, as we have been doing for a long time."

Others who spoke out against the idea of taxing the aquarium included the Pacific Grove Chamber of Commerce, the Monterey Peninsula Taxpayers' Association and the Monterey County Hospitality Association.

Aquarium officials and others argued Pacific Grove already benefits highly from the aquarium. Aquarium visitors stay in the city's hotels and inns and spend their money in shops and restaurants. Patrons also pay the biggest chunk of the city's parking revenue.

Councilman Robert Huitt said the fee wasn't the responsibility of the council to impose.

"If we are going to explore any kind of taxes," Huitt said, "they should go to the ballot."

Councilman Alan Cohen said the aquarium has been a "better neighbor" than he thought they would.

"I'm not willing to tax them, because they are a benefit to this city," Cohen said.

Council members also voted to continue to operate the P.G. Community Center Preschool and summer Adventure Day Camp, programs it could have contracted to concessionaires.

The preschool, according to the city's acting budget and finance director Anthony McFarlane, breaks even, with about \$42,000 in revenue and the same amount in expenditures.

Several mothers of preschool students addressed council members, urging them to continue to operate the preschool and day camp.

The council also voted to fix the kids' swimming pool at Lovers Point so it can be reopened this summer. The 42-year-old pool needs a number of upgrades expected to cost about \$60,000.

Baby otter makes big screen debut

A MOVIE portraying the true story of a sea otter pup that washed up on the beach along the Big Sur coast opens in a Monterey theater this week.

"Otter 501" tells the true story of an otter pup who became separated from her mother and washed ashore in June 2010 on a beach along the Big Sur coast.

The family film, a production by the Monterey-based Sea Studios Foundation, combines elements of the classic wildlife documentary with a fictionalized drama about an adventuresome young woman and the threatened Southern sea otter.

"Otter 501" debuts Friday, May 11 at 6:30 p.m. at the New Osio Cinemas at 350 Alvarado St. in Monterey. The movie will be at the theater all week.



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
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
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Caltrans wants \$1 million for damage to bridge in fatal tourist bus crash

THE CALIFORNIA Department of Transportation is seeking more than \$1 million from the owner and operator of a tour bus that damaged a bridge in a 2009 bus accident in Soledad that killed four French tourists and the 69-year-old driver.

Caltrans is suing Weeks Enterprises, which owns tour bus operator Orion Pacific, and the French tour company, Capitales Tours S.A, according to a claim filed April 24 in Monterey County Superior Court. The suit also seeks damages from the estate of dead driver, John Egnew.

Egnew was driving 34 French tourists as part of a 14-day sightseeing tour through California on April 28, 2009, at about 3:20 p.m. when he lost control of the bus on Highway 101 and crashed into the guardrail, according to the California Highway Patrol. Numerous other passengers were injured.

The bus flipped, and Egnew and two other passengers were thrown from the vehicle. The bus had been traveling southbound on 101 after visiting Monterey and Carmel.

The lawsuit alleges the defendants were responsible for damage to the bridge and guardrail, which cost more than \$1 million to repair, according to Caltrans.

"Mr. Egnew's negligence was the sole cause of the damage to bridge and guardrail," the suit says. "Accordingly, Orion Pacific and the Estate of John Egnew are liable for the cost of repair."

The French tour company, Capitales Tours, had an obligation to ensure that the company it hired to transport the tourists employed a driver with a good driving record and "sufficient skills and stamina to drive" the entire 2,000-mile trip, according to the Caltrans lawsuit.

Egnew had been in a serious previous accident in 2005 while driving an Orion Pacific bus. In that incident, Egnew struck a 71-year-old woman in a Las Vegas crosswalk.

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Hope Center food pantry loses lease, seeks new digs

■ Landlord cites parking and other problems as reasons to not renew

THE ONLY food pantry on the Monterey Peninsula that also feeds pets got the unsettling news it will soon be losing its lease.

Organizers with the Hope Center, a Monterey nonprofit that provides supplemental groceries and supplies to about 300 people each month, were told by their landlord last Monday he won't be renewing the nonprofit's lease at its 10th Street location when it expires in July.

Hope Center executive director Kim Lemaire told The Pine Cone she and other center directors were stunned by the news.

"The landlord said that our operation is causing traffic and that other neighbors and some tenants in our complex are complaining about it," Lemaire said.

Though Lemaire said parking is a problem on the congested street and that some recipients occasionally show up to the center to accept food on the wrong day of the week, she said only one neighbor, a nearby business owner, complained to her about it.



Had the grassroots nonprofit known other people had concerns Lemaire said she would have been happy to address them.

"If we were able to tell people about the problems," Lemaire said, "I know that because [the clients] needed food, they would have done anything to not upset the neighborhood."

Lemaire said she and other members of the center's board of directors are especially surprised by the complaints considering the Hope Center, unlike other businesses on and around 10th Street, is open a total of four hours per month.

"I would love to know why four hours is disturbing their businesses," she said.

'They need the help'

On the first and third Thursdays of the month, the Hope Center distributes food, baby food, toiletries, and other supplies to families. It also donates food and other supplies for pets, something other food pantries don't offer.

The center has been at the 10th Street location for less than a year after relocating from another building in the city.


Despite the challenge of finding a new, affordable place to distribute goods, Lemaire said the Hope Center will continue to provide food until July. She hopes there won't be an interruption in service during the transition from the old place to the new one.

"They are on fixed incomes, and they have pets," Lemaire said of the center's clients. "They need the groceries; they need the help. They are so kind, and they are so respectful, and I worry about them, because we already moved once."

Lemaire said she and other center organizers are hoping to find a space in Monterey, since there are no other food pantries in the city.

A safe location near a bus stop would be ideal since many clients travel by bus to pick up supplies. "It's hard to move," she said. "Hopefully it will be an easy

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Commission favors voluntary effort to do away with plastic shopping bags

FOLLOWING AN hour of testimony, mostly from merchants who said charging customers for shopping bags would be bad for business, the Carmel Planning Commission unanimously voted Wednesday to recommend the city council work with the chamber of commerce to implement a voluntary ban on plastic bags.

Planning and building services manager Sean Conroy presented a draft ordinance banning plastic bags in retail stores and markets (but not restaurants) and requiring merchants to charge for paper bags. The idea of charging a dime or a quarter for paper shopping bags took root as a way to deter shoppers from taking the paper bags, and therefore to avoid lawsuits by plastic-bag producers who have argued that shifting shoppers to paper would hurt the environment.

While some environmental advocates and others encouraged the city to proceed with the ordinance, store owners worried the charge would drive customers away.

"My job is to sell candy, not guilt — that's a bad thing to sell in a candy store," said Cottage of Sweets owner Lanny Rose, who has been the proprietor since 1980. He added that the grassroots movement driving the ban is "not my grass and not my roots."

Rose objected to the idea of demanding money from customers in exchange for bags they expect to receive automatically, especially considering many downtown shoppers are tourists who might not think to or want to bring shopping bags with them.

In opposing the ban, Rose said, "I'm at risk of looking like I hate turtles, that I hate sea otters, that I hate wildlife. I really don't."

Businessman Paul Laub said the ban and fee would amount to an unfunded mandate.

"We need programs to keep our city alive," he said, not to be forced to say, "Hey, you want a bag? Give me a dime.' Talk about low class. The customer has just spent \$100 or \$200, and you want a dime?

Connie Ockert, who owns Khaki's in Carmel Plaza with her husband, Jim, recounted her recent experience buying makeup at Nordstrom in San Jose.

"She asked if I wanted a bag, and I said, 'Of course I want a bag,' and she said, 'I have to charge you a dime," Ockert said, adding that she was appalled. "It's negative. The last thing I want is our sales help to have to explain the dime to every person."

Bruno's owner Fermin Sanchez, Todd Tice of The Club, landlord Jody LeTowt and Augustina's owner Tracy Odle, among others, opposed the fee, too.

"You are taking a step to jeopardize the

income of Carmel, the taxes of Carmel," Odle said. "Fifty percent of my customers would laugh at me, throw the merchandise on the counter and walk out."

Odle said that after operating since 1987, "I don't know if I want to have my stores here anymore, it's getting so difficult.'

Carmel Chamber of Commerce CEO Monta Potter suggested the city find a way around the charge, and restaurant owner Rich Pepe proposed a voluntary program.

"I think requiring the charge for paper bags is very, very negative also, and if the only reason for doing that is getting around some possible legal ramifications, then maybe my idea as an alternative could be considered," he said. "I would venture to say that nine out of 10 stores would go for it."

Torrey said if the bag fees went toward the overall improvement of Carmel, rather than into merchants' coffers, it could be a better sell.

Building designer John Mandurrago wondered how anyone would enforce it. "The city is going to have to hire a bag policeman, and then we're going to have to figure out a retirement plan for this person?" he asked.

Program's defenders

But EcoCarmel owner Kristi Reimers said she has been using a similar program since she opened her green store almost two years ago, and very few customers have taken issue with it.

"Most people don't take them, and if they do, we charge the 25 cents. If someone doesn't take a bag, we give them a 25 cent token they can donate to one of three environmental charities," she explained. "People love the program — it's a really positive experience for them."

Photographer Robert Knight, who has had a gallery in town for a decade and lives here with his family, generally favored the ban and wondered if the ordinance could be tweaked to make sense for small businesses.

"There are 100 billion plastic bags that are making their way into the ocean every year, and they don't biodegrade - it's 1,000 years," McKnight said. "And it's a problem for people, for animals and for the beauty of our beach."

He suggested merchants could put their logos on reusable bags to use as a marketing tool. Reimers speculated the cost of reusable bags might be reduced if several businesses went in on an order together.

Laura Kasa, executive director of Save Our Shores in Santa Cruz, said the 10-cent fee is necessary to avoid lawsuits filed by the

allowing the company to build a new 44,000-square-foot hotel near Spyglass Hill Golf Course, 60 new rooms at the Inn at Spanish Bay, 80 new rooms at the Lodge at Pebble Beach, 90 new residential homes, and other facilities.

The plan also allows for an expanded golf driving range, renovations to the equestrian center, public trail, shoreline access and roadway improvements and reconfiguration of the Highway 1 gate.

Pebble Beach Co. co-owner Peter Ueberroth told commissioners the project, which will be built in phases over many years, will create hundreds of jobs.

"It's probably a great example of the public sector and private sector coming together," Ueberroth said.

Douglas acknowledged

The meeting and commissioners' subsequent decision turned out to also be kind of a tribute to late coastal commission executive director Peter Douglas, who died April 1 after a long battle with cancer.



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Ueberroth, 74, spent about several minutes candidly telling commissioners about his relationship with Douglas, which he said developed into a close friendship that began not long after the coastal commission's 2007 denial of the plan when it included a golf course.

"At that time, I reached out to a man named Peter Douglas. I had met him on occasion, but just to say, 'Hello,' never a real conversation," Ueberroth said. "I made a friendship. And I told him that we knew we had made mistakes. And it started a discussion."

After "many dinners" and hiking trips in Del Monte Forest together, Ueberroth said he and Douglas became close. The two agreed to meet to specifically discuss the project and how it could work for the coastal commission and the Pebble Beach company.

"He said 'we will work together to see if there is a plan that works for everybody," Ueberroth said.

Soon after, Douglas got Lester and district director Dan Carl involved. The discussion resulted in two years and more than 50 meetings with Pebble Beach Co. CEO Bill Perocchi and general counsel and executive vice president Mark Stilwell.

Ueberroth would frequently checked in with Douglas to see if the company and commission staff were still "on track" toward a resolution.

"After a couple of years, he said, 'We are at the right place," Ueberroth said. "And I reached over and shook his hand."

'Close friends'

But even after coming to terms on the Pebble Beach project, the two men talked about working together on another venture

"We had planned a trip to Cuba to help the Cubans talk about their coast, which is a disaster," Ueberroth said. "And we planned a lot of other things."

But Douglas' health went downhill before the plans could come to fruition. And Ueberroth said he was probably the last person — of those in attendance at Wednesday's meeting to see Douglas before his death.

"He called me and I went out and spent time in the Palm Springs area, I think, two days before he passed on," he said. "He had kind of a rebirth and energy ... a lot of good humor."

Ueberroth went on to say "He is in a good place and he's probably fixing the next destination for the rest of us," a comment that drew soft laughter from commissioners.

Monterey County Fifth District Supervisor Dave Potter also paid tribute to Douglas for his work on the P.B. Co. project, saying the formerly contentious plan now has broad community consensus.

"This is a significant amount of work," Potter said, "and in my 26 years as an appointed or elected official, I have never seen the kind of dedication and effort that went into the proposal that is before us today."

Carmel-by-the-Sea Mayor Jason Burnett also addressed commissioners, promoting the plan.

"Today's project will set aside basically as much open space as our entire town," Burnett said.

Burnett choked up when he started to talk about Douglas, a good friend of his who supported his bid for the city council. After Wednesday's meeting, Burnett praised Douglas' and Ueberroth's collaboration on the project.

"It was very nice that it was a unanimous decision," he told The Pine Cone. "The range of people who came forward and testified in favor of the project is testament to the work that both Peters did over the years."

Help for low-income visitors

Also part of the deal, the Pebble Beach Company agreed to pay \$1.8 million for in lieu fees that will go to helping low income visitors to the Monterey Peninsula so they can stay in hostels or campgrounds.

Lester recognized the Pebble Beach Co. for "reaching out" to the coastal commission with an "open mind" to come up with a compromise.

Among the factors that led to an agreement was the company's decision to abandon its pursuit of an 18-hole golf course and plans to move the equestrian center to Sawmill Gulch.

"Sometimes I say a particular [staff] recommendation is a judgement call, but this is not one of those cases, in my opinion," Lester said.

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Caltrans workers nabbed for alleged overtime abuse

FIVE CURRENT and former Caltrans workers were arrested May 7 and charged with theft of state property, over-time fraud and conspiracy.

Taken into custody were Danny Millsap, Robert Eskridge, Kevin Liddiard, Angelina Galvan and Philip Taylor. All are current Caltrans employees except Taylor, who is retired. The five arrested are each being held in Monterey County Jail on \$1 million bail.

The suspects all worked at Willow Springs Maintenance Station, which is located on Highway 1 just north of Gorda, about 60 miles south of Carmel.

According to California Highway Patrol spokesperson Fran Clader, the five are being accused of fraudulently billing the agency for \$100,000 worth of overtime. She also said six large highway signs were stolen.

"In November 2011, Caltrans management became aware that four employees and one former employee were allegedly falsifying documents to increase their overtime salary and also committing theft of Caltrans property," a CHP press release reads.

When asked why the bail was set so high, Clader would only say it was the court's decision.

The arrests shocked Big Sur residents who knew the workers.



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More than one resident urged the public not to judge the five who were arrested until more information comes out.

"They are innocent until proven guilty," Handy said. "These are our neighbors and community members."

their backs.

Lily, meanwhile, hiked on ahead to see if she could summon help. When she got back to the trailhead, she dialed 911, but a dispatcher told her a rescue effort could be launched for a human, but not for a pet.

Meanwhile, the men carrying the dog encountered three backpackers — Andy, Christian and John — who offered to help. Visiting from Australia, Andy had a seemingly endless reserve of energy, while Christian appeared strong enough to move a refrigerator.

When the group finally reached the trail-

head at about 3:30 p.m., Leeroy was slung over Gaba's weary shoulders. As he gently lowered the golden retriever to the ground, the dog stood on wobbly legs for a moment before plopping down on the pavement at his owner's feet in a big, furry heap of tail-wagging appreciation.

While the Golden Retriever appeared to be OK, his ordeal serves as a cautionary reminder to people who bring their pets into the backcountry.

"The SPCA always recommends safety first when it comes to pets," said Beth Brookhauser, a spokeswoman for the Monterey County SPCA. "Just like people need conditioning before a long hike or run, pets need conditioning, too. One of my dogs is a bit older, and while she would love to go on a long hike with us, we know her body simply can't handle it. So we plan easier, shorter adventures for her. Always take your pet's health and conditioning into account before embarking on a long hike."

Brookhauser urged people to call her organization if a pet runs into trouble.

"Keep in mind that if you do run into a problem, like a serious injury, a lost pet, or your pet becomes stuck in a dangerous situation, you can call us," she added. "The SPCA is here to help."

More Big Sur misadventures

While Gaba and his friends were making their grueling trek out of the Big Sur River gorge, another group of hikers ran into trouble at Julia Pfeiffer Burns State Park. Like many before them, the hikers ignored warning signs and made a dangerous — and illegal — descent down the park's cliffs to the beach below. According to Sgt. Joe Moses of the Monterey County Sheriff's Search and Rescue Team, members of the Big Sur Volunteer Fire Brigade helped bring them to safety. They were also cited for their off-trail misadventure.

Shortly after Gaba and his friends made it back to their vehicle, the search and rescue team responded to a report of a hiker who had injured her ankle near Redwood Camp, which is located about three miles past Sykes Camp along the Pine Ridge Trail.

A helicopter was dispatched to Big Sur, where a landing zone was located near Redwood Camp. A rescue worker assisted the woman into the helicopter — which only had room for one passenger in addition to its pilot — and walked out the following day with the woman's hiking partner after spending the night at Redwood camp.

Meanwhile, a hiker discovered that it's easier to go up the Rocky Ridge Trail in Big Sur's Garrapata State Park than come down it.

Nancy Guthrie was walking shortly after noon April 28 when she slipped and fell and injured her leg. As a result, she needed help

getting down off the mountain.

"You're not going to get down that trail with an injured leg," said Moses said.

Emergency workers from Cal Fire, MCSO Search and Rescue, and the Carmel Highlands Fire Protection District walked in to assist the downed hiker. A California Highway Patrol helicopter landed near the victim and transported her to Highway 1, where an ambulance took her to a the Community Hospital of the Monterey Peninsula. "It was pretty simple as far as rescues are concerned," Moses explained.

The popular hiking trail — which is located about

nine miles south of Carmel — winds its way up Rocky Ridge for about 2.5 miles before reaching a vista that offers sweeping views of the Monterey Peninsula, the Big Sur backcountry and the distant Gabilan mountain range. Reaching the top, though, requires a considerable effort. According to hiking guide author Jeffrey Schaffer, the trail averages a thigh-burning 19 percent grade. According to Moses, the injured hiker was on the steepest part of the trail when she fell.

For many local fitness buffs, the Rocky Ridge Trail functions as an outdoor stair master because it is so steep.

"We actually use it for rescue training and fitness tests," Moses added. "We need people on our team who can hike."

Chemistry Council. She also said it's an effective deterrent. A month after the ordinance took effect, she said, 80 percent of Safeway shoppers began bringing their own bags.

"Ninety percent of people were taking the plastic before the ban," she said.

Ashley Blacow, Pacific policy and communications coordinator for Oceana, was also in favor, and she encouraged merchants to use reusable bags promote themselves.

"If they are already spending an amount of money on vacation, I'm sure they wouldn't mind spending \$1 or \$2 on a reusable bag," she said of visitors to town.

Also favoring getting rid of plastic bags but concerned about the fee, the planning commission — reduced to three members due to the departure of Victoria Beach and Steven Hillyard to the city council — embraced the idea of a voluntary program.

"If we did try to impose charges for bags, it would be next to impossible for the city to monitor this and regulate it," commissioner Keith Paterson observed.

"The merchants in our community are really smart," commented commissioner Steve Dallas. "I think the merchants should be able to do it voluntarily, and I think 99 percent of them will do it."

"We all agree plastic bags need to go," added commissioner Jan Reimers, and the commission unanimously voted to recommend the council work with the chamber on a voluntary program that would eliminate the use of plastic bags.

Seymour Carter, even resigned in protest.

Another popular workshop leader - Esalen co-founder Dick Price's widow Chris Price — told the board that she will not schedule any future workshops because Esalen's "new culture does not seem to incorporate the work that I have been part of these many years. It's time for me to move on," she wrote in an email to The Pine Cone.

In a letter to Esalen's board of directors, faculty support coordinator Jerilyn Hesse expressed the sentiment of numerous former staff members.

"Many people I have spoken to are upset at the 'what,' but everyone I have spoken to is disturbed and angered at the 'how," Hesse explained. "We are told that valuable staff members who have been with the institute for many, many years and have contributed so much are being terminated due to reorganization and not for just cause. Yet they are terminated without notice and effective immediately."

After the three managers were fired, a group of current staff and work scholars began a daily "Circle of Honor" at Esalen to pay tribute to the managers and Lustig.

Hesse reported that shortly after the terminations, 33 people attended an "official" meeting to hear management's side of the story. Forty-five people went to another meeting in protest, while 77 people gathered for the daily "Circle of Honor" that same afternoon.

According to Wheeler, 15 key staff members have been laid off since 2004 as part of the current reorganization. Since change seems to be endemic to Esalen, why was everybody so shocked and upset when Kleinsmith, Erickson and Cryns lost their jobs?

"If you are living at Esalen, you are living with loss," Wheeler explained. "Change is inevitable at Esalen."

'Conscious capitalism'

While some complaints on esaleaks.org focus on the charge that Esalen's board of directors and upper management are trying to make it less of an egalitarian community and more of a resort, others say its board of directors is out of touch with its culture and that its human resources department is heavy-handed and wields too much power. And some say the board's practice of bringing in upper management from outside the Esalen community creates a divide between its leaders and the rest of its staff and work scholars.

For an example of how Esalen is being transformed from an ambitious social experiment into a profitable corporatestyle resort, Esaleaks contributors point to the recent addition of Chip Conley — the founder of the Joie de Vivre hotel chain — to its board of directors. Wheeler, though, said he believes Conley is a perfect fit for Esalen.

"He's taught leadership and communication skills at Esalen for years," he explained. "He wrote a book applying the ideas of [humanistic psychologist] Abraham Maslow one of the founding geniuses of Esalen - to managing a business.'

For many years, Esalen's management has strived to reconcile Esalen's business practices with its lofty ideals. In response, its board of directors has embraced the idea of "conscious capitalism," which seeks to affirm free market principles, while "continuing to advance the quality of life for billions of people."

Conley is one of conscious capitalism's leading proponents. Along with top executives from Google, Whole Foods, Starbucks and Trader Joe's, he attended a conference on the subject at Esalen in February.

So can Esalen's residential community co-exist with a greater emphasis on making money and taking care of its guests?

'Service is a part of personal growth," Wheeler responded. "I don't see them as being opposed to each other."

Maintaining its core principles

Critics say they believe three of the pillars of Esalen's foundation since its founding in 1962 - its work scholar program, its commitment to humanistic psychology and its innovative Gazebo outdoor education program for young children — are being phased out in the name of progress.

Wheeler insisted the work scholar program — and the res-



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
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idential community it supports — aren't going anywhere.

"I think it's the best program we have," he suggested.

As for the notion that humanistic psychology is being deemphasized, Wheeler said it's only a matter of perception.

"Gestalt is the basis of just about everything that's happening at Esalen," said Wheeler, who has written a dozen books about the subject.

So in Wheeler's view, there are fewer "Gestalt" workshops now in the Esalen catalog, but more workshops than ever that incorporate the principles of Gestalt.

As for the Gazebo outdoor education program, Wheeler said it's days could be numbered — but only because of there are fewer children in Big Sur than there were a generation ago. "The Gazebo's enrollment has shrunk because the demographic has shrunk," Wheeler explained.

Esalen by the numbers

With so much media attention focused on the excesses of corporate salaries and public pensions, the budgets of many nonprofits are now being scrutinized. So it's not surprising that Esaleaks shines a spotlight on Esalen's finances - and



2016. Unless a water project is developed, the cease and desist order could have calamitous effects on the Peninsula's economy, and especially its tourism industry, on which so many jobs depend, according to the hospitality industry.

95-10 necessary?

Del Piero was appointed to the state water board by Republican Gov. Pete Wilson and was widely seen at the time as a business-friendly public official, especially in light of his voting record during his three terms as county supervisor in the 1980s, when he voted in favor of large developments at Carmel Valley Ranch and in Pebble Beach.

But Green Party Monterey County endorsed Del Piero in his bid to return to the board of supervisors and lauds the candidate's vote for 95-10, a decision the organization's spokesman, George Riley, told The Pine Cone was ultimately a good thing for the Peninsula.

"The fact that he was partly responsible for the [cease and desist order] was not a problem to us," according to Riley, "because this community has a hard time getting its act together."

Potter questioned Del Piero's sudden decision to get involved in Peninsula politics after years of being out of them, and his contention he'll help solve its perennial water issues.

"If you recognized the problem," Potter told The Pine

Cone, "where have you been for 17 years with a solution?"

Del Piero boasts on his website his triumphs while on the state water board, but he makes no mention of his support of 95-10. Some speculate why, especially since Del Piero's mantra for his campaign has been "transparency and accountability."

"In the world of full disclosure," Potter said, "he was the architect of 95-10."

Del Piero said he isn't hiding anything and said there were other water board milestones — such as the 1994 Mono Lake ruling — that were more significant than the Carmel River order. "I wish I could tell you it was the most important" decision, he said of 95-10. "It was not. We dealt with a huge number of issues statewide."

Carmel-by-the-Sea Mayor Jason Burnett is endorsing Potter, who he said "has served our community well — a community with incredibly diverse interests."

A letter to the Monterey County Herald from Carmel resident Alexandra James this week questioned Del Piero's motives given his past voting record that favored development projects in Pebble Beach, Las Palmas and at Carmel Valley Ranch. In another letter, Carmel resident Margaret Robbins called Del Piero "a Salinas-favored development candidate."

But LandWatch Monterey County founder Mike DeLapa, a former Potter supporter, said he's become "increasingly distressed" by Potter's "lack of leadership and support for good public policy." He wrote an online letter outlining his new support for Del Piero.

In 1995, there was a widespread belief that if the Cal Am was stopped from taking most of its water from the Carmel River, it would force the building of the New Los Padres Dam, which would have supplied water for development on the Peninsula. Potter said Del Piero backed 95-10 because he thought it would help get a new dam built on the upper Carmel River — an idea that also gained traction with environmentalists who wanted to protect the river's habitat.

But Del Piero insists he and the other state water board members were merely following the law when they approved the Carmel River cutback order. "It was a decision based on the evidence presented to the state board that was not refuted during the course of the evidentiary hearings," he said.

Furthermore, Del Piero said 95-10 has had many benefits for the Peninsula.

"It did a number of things," he said. "It articulated whose water rights Cal Am was taking, and it specified that Cal Am had no legal entitlement to the water it was pumping. And it rendered a final determination as to the water rights of many of the property owners in Carmel Valley."

Strange bedfellows

Del Piero — twice appointed to the state water board by Republican Governor Pete Wilson — has made other unlikely allies in his current campaign for supervisor, including DeLapa, water activist Janet Brennan and members of the left-leaning League of Women Voters of the Monterey Peninsula.

Chris Fitz, a former LandWatch director, is playing a big role in the Del Piero campaign, which has also gained an endorsement from the Young Professional Republicans of the Central Coast, but has yet to receive the same endorsement from the Monterey County Republican Party, an organization he once served as vice chair. A Pebble Beach resident, Del Piero is unconcerned how

A recore beach resident, Der Piero is unconcerned how support from his liberal supporters will appear to other voters in the 5th District.

"What I'm receiving is some humbling support across the political spectrum," he said. "A number of people who are real strong environmentalists have indicated strong support for my campaign."

in particular — the salaries it pays some of its leaders.

Esaleaks offers a PDF download of Esalen's tax returns from 2002 to 2009. And while the documents show that top employees receive generous compensation, their salaries do not appear out of line with those offered by a number of successful nonprofit groups in Monterey County.

According to Esalen's 2010 tax return, Wheeler made \$87,000 as Esalen's president. Other top-paid employees include CEO and CFO Tricia McEntee (\$128,000), and executive director of programming Nancy Lunney-Wheeler



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(\$85,000).

Surprisingly, the top salaries represent a significant drop from the previous year's tax return, which lists five employees making more than \$100,000.

Less common, but legal according to state law as long as the majority of its members are unpaid, is Esalen's practice of paying some of its board members. The 2010 tax form indicated that Wheeler, Lunney-Wheeler, Lustig and co-founder Michael Murphy were compensated for at least part of the work they did. Murphy, meanwhile, received \$390,000 for leasing his family's property to Esalen.

The 2010 tax return also confirms Esalen's success: the nonprofit organization reported more than \$13 million in revenue. That number includes more than \$1.3 million in contributions and grants.

An olive branch

In a letter sent to community members May 8, the board straddled the fine line between offering an olive branch and taking the stand that the recent personnel changes were necessary.

"We are taking to heart what we hear because it troubles us deeply to hear the pain that recent actions have caused." the letter reads. "These decisions were taken to strengthen the Esalen we all love, not to weaken it or change it into a more 'corporate' direction."

Another letter — which a longtime community member said was signed "the majority of Esalen's staff and long-term work-scholars" - was released May 9 to The Pine Cone. The signatures were not made available. The letter was previously sent to the board — also without the signatures.

The second letter's authors bring up several issues they say "must be meaningfully addressed" if Esalen is to live up to its ideals. "We cannot hold a position in realizing human potential or conscious business if we cannot uphold our own values," the letter read.

To begin with, the letter's authors would like to see an act of contrition. "We believe a letter of apology from those collaborative in the action of April 18 is appropriate," the letter said.

Also, they want the community's lone representative on Esalen's board of directors to have the right to vote "to show a commitment to the community."


And finally, they would like to see Kleinsmith, Erickson and Cryns offered other positions at Esalen.

"We have full confidence that all involved in this current dilemma hold a mutual care and love of Esalen," the letter's authors sign off with. "We believe that better dialogue and collaboration between management and the community will resolve these issues."

A qualified apology

LAST WEEK, we described the Monterey Peninsula Water Management District's scheme for calculating user fees — those controversial fees it wants to add to everybody's property tax bills- as something "ridiculous" and so complicated "no one in his right mind would even conceive of it." We said that because the fees are based not on how much water anybody uses, which would be logical, but on arcane criteria such as how many lanes a bowling alley has, how many dentists work in an office and the size of the pipe that delivers water to your home.

But we were wrong — not about the ridiculous part, which the fees still are. But about the fact that no one in his right mind would impose them in such a twisted way. It turns out that sewer districts all over the state use weirdly complicated tables to assess sewer fees on places such as office buildings, movie theaters and schools. Of course, sewage isn't metered, so those districts don't have any choice but to make crude estimates of how much sewage a building or a home is likely to generate.

Water, on the other hand, is doled out in carefully measured quantities, which would make it quite simple for the water district, if it is to impose a fee, to allocate it based on a straightforward criterion: How much you pay depends on how much you use.

Similarly, it could limit water use by making an allocation for each person, with a bit extra for landscaping. Instead, the water district tells you how many toilets you can have, and whether your shower can have one of those hand-held gizmos in addition to the showerhead mounted on the wall. And it demands access to your house to count your "water fixtures" instead of just looking at the number on your meter. Rube Goldberg would be proud.

But thinking about the Byzantine nature of the Monterey Peninsula's water regulations and the dire state of its water supply, we are also reminded that the situation is not really the water board's fault. If it amends its ways and works toward a water solution, instead of trying to impede progress toward a water supply in the name of controlling growth, as it did for so long, nobody will be happier than us. But even a water board with the courage of Joan of Arc, the stamina of a marathon runner, the insight of Steve Jobs and the wealth of Mark Zuckerberg would have a hard time succeeding. Because the monstrosity of state law is still in the way.

Perhaps if the water board succeeds in imposing its user fee, the smartest thing would be to use it to help elect a representative to the California Assembly

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War reporting isn't just about making the generals happy

 $W_{\rm E}$ ALL have folks we would like to emulate.

If you're an up-and-coming politician, you want to be the next Ronald Reagan or the second coming of Bill Clinton. If you're a young baseball player, you spend countless hours adjusting your cup and perfecting your expectoration technique like your favorite big-leaguer. If you're an apprentice hod car-

rier, you want to someday be like the legendary Henry "Muscles" Burly,

I'm a journalist, so my heroes tend to be other nebbish pencil-pushers who somehow get famous for doing their jobs.

And Ed Kennedy is my number-one hero.

Kennedy was the veteran war correspondent who thwarted military censors to deliver news of the Nazi surrender.

He witnessed the surrender with 16 other veteran war correspondents in Reims, France, on May 7, 1945. He and the other journalists/witnesses were all ordered by their military minders to withhold news of the surrender for 36 hours so that the

lating a military order — even a military command issued as a mere political expedi-





ent - he knew he could face military prosecution.

But he did it anyway because it was the right thing to do. He did his duty as a journalist. He gave the world an extra day of happiness.

In Kennedy's view, the decision was a nobrainer. How many soldiers and citizens might die, thinking the war was still going on, in a 36-hour period following surrender if the news was not released? Kennedy was never happy with military censorship - he railed against it at every opportunity - but he had been willing to follow orders when it was proven that troop safety or military strategy was at risk. He was not willing to abide political expedience.

In the end, Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower exonerated Ed Kennedy. But his furious colleagues whined and complained relentlessly. The Associated Press sold him down the river and the surrender story was his last dispatch for AP. He was blackballed by the major news agencies.

The Associated Press finally did the right thing last week, 67 years later, apologizing to Kennedy's family for the galling way the news agency handled the controversy.

Ed Kennedy wasn't always my numberone journalism hero. While still in college, I thought I wanted to be like Prescott Sullivan, the legendary cigar-chomping sportswriter in San Francisco who supposedly provided the inspiration for Oscar Madison in Neil Simon's "The Odd Couple."

Eventually I learned about Kennedy. And Ι realized that I had only gravitated to Sullivan because he looked jaunty in his houndstooth hat.

Several years later, I ended up working at The Herald, the newspaper at which Ed Kennedy ended his career.

He was long gone by the time I arrived. But the creaky hardened vets who still lurched about the newsroom all had their Ed Kennedy stories.

Even the circumstances of his death validated his status as a beloved legend, at least in my mind.

Ed Kennedy was not related to the Kennedys, but he harbored a devout respect for President John F. Kennedy.


According to newsroom lore, Ed Kennedy was, like most of us, in a state of despair over the president's assassination on Nov. 22, 1963. Drowning his sorrow at a local tavern on Nov. 24, the day Jack Ruby killed Lee

Harvey Oswald, Kennedy stepped out of Alfredo's, the across street from the old Herald building, and was struck by a drunk driver. He died of his injuries a

Over time, my admiration for Kennedy became an obsession. I've collected Ed Kennedy ephemera, including copies of "top secret" military documents generated by Kennedy's V-E Day incident. His surviving daughter graciously shared Kennedy's memoir, which had been stashed in her closet for decades and which was finally published on Wednesday. In my spare time, I've even written a screenplay about the incident.

I've never covered a world war as a journalist. I can't boast of cracking a story that provided an excuse for the whole world to celebrate.

But Ed Kennedy has been my inspiration. He is an example for all journalists who toil in communities where local bigshots employ bully tactics to keep stories out of newspapers.

The story — the truth — is always more important than the political expedience of suppression.

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Nuclear cores, high-end real estate and a well loved eatery

MOST PEOPLE on the Monterey Peninsula know of Bob Profeta as Judie's husband; oh, and he's also a realtor. And most recently he was a candidate for the Carmel City Council. What they don't know is that he started off his professional life as an electrical engineer on nuclear power plants. I learned this when I went to interview him on a deliciously warm Friday at his Alain Pinel office on Junipero Street. He sagely suggest we talk outside, and we walked half a block up to The Forge. He and Judie own the building, and when the restaurateurs decided against renewing ... we'll get

to that later. First, the nuclear story.

The man who hired Bob to work for General Electric back in 1966 had a secretary named Judie. Yep, that Judie. After some training, GE sent the newlyweds to India, where Bob would work on construction of the Tarapur Atomic Power Station near Mumbai (then Bombay).

"My job basically was to make sure that the instrumentation in the core to monitor the reaction was properly installed, and also I installed the equipment that moved the rods in and out of the core." There was nothing

basic about that.

They were in India for three years – "Did you know that they give you arsenic to deal with amoebic dysentery?" – and then they were sent to Taiwan for a similar stint. And then to Basque country near Bilbao. Finally, it was back to the states; upstate New York in a place called Oswego, where, Bob said, "I learned how it is to live in deep snow." Then Bob was transferred to San Jose where he trained GE engineers.

After a few years, Bob got a little itchy, and with two other trainers struck out on their own, setting up a small consulting business. They even built their own simulators, "so the operators could get some actual hands-on feel of the particular system."

In the late 80s, the Profetas lived in Morgan Hill where Judie had a real estate office. Bob had his own real estate license and would help her out their on weekends. But Judie always wanted to move to Carmel, so they did. In short order, the real estate company they were working for there sold to a large national firm that didn't fit for Judie, so they arranged to open the Alain Pinel office.

Judie's focus has been on real estate, but, while Bob keeps his hand in, he continues to go around the country to conduct two-week training sessions "to train new technicians and refresh systems engineers."

There's a big problem for nuclear plants today - obsoles-

cence. The plants were designed to operate for 30 or 40 years. "If they meet certain criteria, the NRC is allowing them to continue on," Bob said. But some of them are having trouble getting original replacement parts. Like an electrical relay that cost maybe \$10 forty years ago. The solution is to

replace the worn out relays with new circuit boards. Bob has designed just such a piece and is waiting for a patent approval.

Asked if he still believed in the nuclear industry, he was unequivocal, noting that "they make every effort to ensure that it is safe." As someone who covered Three Mile Island, I expressed some skepticism that the risk is worth it. I asked him about Fukushima; is it actually under control? "I think they're still having some problems, but they have a handle on it," Bob said, quick to point out that it wasn't a reactor problem but a power problem. They couldn't get the electricity



the signature restaurant by the end of July, and a hiring fair will be held at the lodge Monday, May 14, to find the right people to work there.

Company officials have yet to decide on a name and are still in contract negotiations with a chef, but Plott said the concept is set. While the dishes will range widely in style and ethnicity, having been inspired by top chefs and restaurants all over the world, they will have a single unifying characteristic: Fire.

At least part of every hors d'oeuvre, main course, side dish and dessert will be cooked either in the restaurant's wood-burning oven or over its wood-fired grill using any number of different woods, from almond and apple, to mesquite and walnut. A whole fish, for instance, could be quickly roasted to fallingoff-the-bone tender over applewood, while a steak could be fired rare over oak. Different woods burn at different temperatures, and the restaurant's oven will range from 400 degrees to 1,200 degrees. The menu will feature more than 20 items reflecting international flavors and styles, including small pizzas and innovative salads, seafood, poultry and meat.

The open, airy space will feature a Ushaped bar with the oven at its center, a long communal table along a back wall that contains a floor-to-ceiling wine cellar, wood floors, Carrera marble bar tops, table seating in a glassed-in conservatory, and three outdoor fire pits, all capitalizing on the amazing view.

> "This could redefine the Lodge," Plott said.

Hope for the little guys

Home bakers with secret recipes for impressively good cookies and breads, farmers who like to make jam on the side, dairy owners who become interested in producing cheese and others who like to dabble in culinary arts like charcuterie often dream of selling their products to fans via farmers markets and the Internet. But then reality dawns in the form of onerous and expensive government-mandated production requirements.

Laurel Pavesi, who owns a small blueberry farm in Corralitos, CB Hill Farms, and uses some of her fruit to make jam, is all too familiar with the rules that impede her livelihood. She has therefore become a strong advocate of an Assembly Bill offering her and others like her hope.

We only have an acre or two of blueberries in cultivation," she said. "We're very

tiny, and there are a lot like us."

AB 1616, the California Homemade Food Act, authored by Assemblyman Mike Gatto, would exempt cottage-food operations from some labeling and food safety requirements. The bill unanimously passed in the Assembly Committee on Health last month and was referred to the Assembly Committee on Appropriations May 7.

Local Assemblyman Bill Monning supported the bill in the health committee, where he cast one of the 15 votes in its favor. "There is a growing movement toward micro-entrepreneurs who offer a diverse selection of home-based foods to Californians, and they need to be recognized," he wrote. "However, this should be done without abandoning basic food safety requirements that protect the public's health. AB 1616 seeks to strike that balance. and it is for this reason that I supported the bill when it came before me for a vote."

Pavesi described the burden small purveyors face in trying to bring their products to market, as illustrated in a feature by SFoodie: "Here's a very rough estimate of what it costs to sell your food, completely on the level, at a regular farmers' market, assuming you'll need 16 hours at a commercial kitchen to prepare your first batch of legal food for sale: \$1,335 in permits and applications + \$500 in insurance + \$50 a day for the farmers' market fee + \$320 in kitchen rent = \$2,205. And that doesn't including

equipment and materials."

Pavesi also pointed out that the closest commercial kitchen to her farm is located in Aromas, and getting a truck-load of blueberries there during the furious pace of harvest "just isn't feasible."

AB 1616 would eliminate some of the logistical challenges and costs.

"There may be hope yet for our micro-jammery and others like us on the Monterey Peninsula," Pavesi said. "It would allow us, as small time, almost home gardeners, to take our produce and add value to it and then sell it in local farmers markets or through charity events or through other artisans who have online or other types of market presence."

Some entrepreneurs, most notably Happy Girl Kitchen in Pacific Grove, have gone to the expense and effort to be legal under current laws.

"Happy Girl Kitchen is the smallest certified canner in California, and they have gone to a tremendous effort to make themselves legal," Pavesi said. "People do do it. But there's just this groundswell of people who would really like to offer their stuff."

A thing about pork belly

As someone who enjoys and appreciates really good food, I can scrutinize and criticize with the best of them. That said, I almost never return a dish to the kitchen unless it's full of broken glass or contains someone's severed body part.


So, Monday night at Sticks restaurant in the Inn at Spanish Bay marked a rare, if not unique, occurrence: I sent something back because it was simply inedible. The item was a new pork belly "carnitas" appetizer. Not sure how it could even remotely be considered carnitas, which is typically pork shoulder or butt that has been braised and then fried, but that's beside the point. The point is the pork belly contained no meat; it was a nearly inch-thick rectangle of pure fat that had been seared and placed atop a crisp chip with a few garnishes.

The waitress politely whisked away the dish, and later a gentleman stopped by the table to ask what had been wrong with the item. "It's a fattier cut of meat," he tried to explain. The counter argument: "Yes, but it generally contains some meat, too." (Bacon is made from pork belly.) He asked if it would have been better if it had been "fried more." The answer was definitely not.

He was advised to visit the Rio Grill in the Crossroads at lunchtime and order the Peanut Butter and "Belly" sandwich - a mind-blowing concoction of pork belly (about 60 percent meat to 40 percent fat), peanut butter and olallieberry preserves between pieces of toasted brioche. It's good enough to spark daydreams.

To its credit, Sticks is updating its menu and experiencing the requisite bumps along the way. Until the kitchen gets it worked out, order a signature Bloody Mary (very tasty, as it uses Absolut Peppar) and stick with a trusty standby, like the calamari.

High-tech Le Mans series on track this weekend, Ferraris next

N BACK-TO-BACK races at Mazda Raceway Laguna Seca, some of the fastest cars ever built will battle for the checkered flag during the American Le Mans Series Friday and Saturday, May 11-12. Ten-screen complex to open in Marina

SHEA PROPERTIES and Century Theatres plan to open a state-of-the-art, 10screen, digital cinema in the shopping center at Highway 1 and Imjin Parkway in Marina. 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Daryl Griffith named Woman of the Year

AT THE fifth annual Women Who Care (And the Men Who Love Them) Campaign kickoff luncheon May 6 — which marked the beginning of a fundraising effort to ensure Meals on Wheels can continue to serve hot breakfasts to shut-ins — Pebble Beach Lodge catering manager Daryl Griffith was named Woman of the Year.

She received praise not just for her skills and efforts to "exceed the expectations of every guest by providing a once-in-a-lifetime experience every time," (the company's stated goal), but for her decade of dedication to ensuring MOW's major fundraiser, the Culinary Classique held each November, is beautifully decorated, well organized and comes off without a hitch.

During her acceptance speech, Griffith said she was "touched beyond words," when she learned she would be so honored.

"When they told me I'd be giving a speech, I experienced something akin to panic," she said.

But she delivered her comments smooth-

ly, graciously and with a touch of emotion to the few hundred sharply dressed women and men in the Ferrante Room at the Marriott Sunday.

"We are here today because we care we recognize that our support is vitally needed. The Meals on Wheels staff and volunteers depend on our contributions to ensure that their organization stays healthy and their programs and initiatives allow continued support to our seniors in need," she said. "It goes without saying that in a weak economy, our efforts and our dollars are more important than ever. As the Women Who Care fact sheet states, the number of seniors doubles as quickly as the funding is cut in half. I find that most alarming."

The majority of MOW recipients are women, since they tend to live longer than men, and Griffith said providing daily breakfasts is not just important for physical nourishment, but for psychological health.

"The visit from the kind soul who cares to deliver that food is a large part of the equa-

council, and to likely meet the objective of being appointed unanimously by the city council." They recommended Theis and Hillyard for the job.

The Carmel Pine Cone

Members of the public spoke on behalf of each candidate while avoiding making negative comments about either.

Planning commissioner Keith Paterson, who has served alongside Hillyard for the past couple of years, described him as "an excellent member of the commission" and said he would "be a wonderful addition to the council." Former councilwoman and Carmel Residents Association President Barbara Livingston, former Mayor Ken White and CRA member Roberta Miller also supported Hillyard.

Former Carmel Chamber of Commerce board chairman Thompson Lange, owner of Homescapes Carmel, has collaborated with Theis on economic development, hostelry and other business issues in town for the past several years.

"She has been a pleasure to work with all these years, and the City of Carmel would be lucky to have her," he said. Hotelier Bobby Richards also supported her.

CRA member Monte Miller said the council should reconsider LePage, who narrowly lost to councilman Ken Talmage in the 2008 election. Talmage also said he would have recommended LePage, as well as Theis and Hillyard, for the appointment. Pepe, who challenged Burnett in the mayoral race, said the council should look at anyone who ran in the last election.

"In my opinion, you're missing a very interesting and valuable opportunity if you don't consider those applicants a little more seriously," he said.

Hazdovac said she and Burnett "spent an incredible amount of time on this" and deliberated on two occasions to come up with the finalists. She reiterated her hope their appointment would be by a unanimous vote.

"We don't all have to be the same; we don't all have to agree all the time, but we do have to work together," she said.

"Paula and I wanted to put forward the individuals that we could recommend in a united way," Burnett added.

Councilwoman Victoria Beach discussed both candidates and made a motion to appoint Hillyard, whom Burnett also favored for his legal background and experience on the planning commission.

Hazdovac favored Theis for her diplomacy and love of Carmel, as well as her years of experience operating a business here, but she joined the vote to appoint Hillyard instead, making it unanimous.

Other vacancies need filling

After the vote, the council took a break so Burnett could contact Theis and Hillyard and advise them of the result.

On Wednesday, Hillyard told The Pine Cone he had been watching the meeting online.

"I thought it was a good and complete discussion, and I think everybody's interests were fairly heard," Hillyard said.

"And I was pleased with the outcome, of course."

He was set to be sworn in Thursday and said his first order will be reading the budget and familiarizing himself with the deliberation and approval processes for the spending plan, which will next be discussed at a special council meeting Thursday, May 17.

"I'm bringing what other people have brought — that's, of course, planning commission experience. I've also been on the board of Sunset Center, so I understand what's going on over there," he said. "And I do have a legal degree, which might be helpful in coming up with legal strategies."

He also said he has "a great deal of experience in public policy, and I understand the legislative process."

Hillyard attended his final planning commission meeting Wednesday afternoon, participating only in an item that required four members to vote in its favor in order to pass, and then stepped down, while receiving applause from his fellow commissioners.

With his departure, the commission has only three members, which is still a quorum but cannot hear applications for use permits, which require a four-fifths vote.

Burnett and Hazdovac on Tuesday encouraged all the remaining applicants to participate in the city in other ways, perhaps on a board or commission.

"The deadline for applying for openings on the activities and cultural commission, the forest and beach commission, and the planning commission was extended to Monday, May 14, to allow any applicants who are not chosen as a council member to apply for those commissions," they said.
