Hazdovac resigns after 18 years on city council

■ Carrie Theis picked to succeed her

THE CITY council unanimously voted Wednesday night to appoint Carrie Theis, owner of the Hofsas House hotel and recent appointee to the Carmel Activities & Cultural Commission, to replace Paula Hazdovac on the council. Hazdovac, who served an unprecedented 18 years in office, tendered her resignation in a letter to Mayor Jason Burnett Friday. Her departure from the council takes effect Sept. 7, but she did not attend the Aug. 15 meeting regarding her

Commission OKs 9/11 memorial design, location

AFTER REDESIGNING a proposed memorial honoring the victims of the Sept. 11, 2001, terrorist attacks to reflect the wishes of the planning commission, a group led by resident CarrieAnn received support last week for plans to mount a piece of World Trade Center steel on a granite boulder and place it in Devendorf Park. The Carmel City Council will have final say over the proposal.

In June, CarrieAnn (her full name) presented drawings of a pedestal of Carmel stone shaped like the Twin Towers that would hold the steel, which she obtained from officials in New York City and had transported by firefighters via fire stations and police departments across the country. The steel arrived in April and is being kept at the firehouse.

P.G. City Council weighs repealing pension plan for cops, firefighters

THE PACIFIC Grove City Council voted Wednesday night to look into the possibility of repealing a big pension increase that was awarded to the city's police officers and firefighters a decade ago — an increase that has been blamed, in part, for the city's crushing debt.

The council's decision was based on a report released this week indicating that the 2002 pension hike for police and firefighters may have been granted "illegally," because a public hearing wasn't held and crucial financial information on how much the boost would cost the city was not disclosed.

The council voted unanimously to consult with its attorneys and officials with the California Public Employees Retirement System to find out what steps it should take — which could include trying to nix the 2002 CalPERS contract.

"We're asking CalPERS, 'OK, we found [the pension increase] was done illegally, so what are the ramifications [of repealing the increase], and what are our options?" city

P.G. City Council weighs | Mission to get shrink-wrapped during retrofit

Having Raised \$5 million in donations and grants — including the final \$2 million in just eight months — a nonprofit announced this week that seismic retrofitting of the Carmel Mission Basilica will begin in late August and will take about six months


The work will include an innovative means of keeping the fog and rain out of the exposed roof: The contractor will erect a shrink-wrapped structure above it, according to Vic Grabrian, president and CEO of the Carmel Mission Foundation.

The church belongs to the Diocese of Monterey, which is letting the foundation undertake the work to protect what is perhaps the most historic building in California

Deacon Warren Hoy, a Mission parishioner and spokesman for the diocese, said the group made the restoration possible, and without its help, the Basilica would have had to close when a new state law requiring unreinforced masonry buildings be retrofitted takes effect.

The foundation undertook the fundraising effort and retrofit "for the sole purpose of keeping the Basilica standing," he said. "We really would be unable to go on without the help of the foundation."

Shoring up the unreinforced masonry building calls for removing the clay-barrel tiles that were installed during the Mission's second re-roofing in 1936. (The Mission was founded in 1771, and the Basilica was completed in 1793 but fell into disrepair in the late 1800s.) Crews will take off the wood planks underlying the tile — but not the ceiling over the Basilica — and will drill holes down

in the water, usually waiting and watching other dogs go in first. But he can't resist the chew toy his family throws in, so he dashes in after it, leaving his fear on the shore.



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
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Mayors choose consultant to review water proposals

A CARLSBAD consulting firm has been selected to analyze three desalination projects to determine which one is the best water-supply solution for the Monterey Peninsula.

The six mayors that make up the Monterey Peninsula Regional Water Authority voted Aug. 9 to pay Separation Processes, Inc., to provide an unbiased assessment of proposals by California American Water, developer Nader Agha and businessman Brent Constantz.

SPI will include in its analysis cost comparisons, identification of project differences, financing options and scheduling. The firm will analyze the data supplied by each desal proponent to try to achieve an "apples-to-apples" examination.

"The comparison of projects will document key differences in approach, including the use of state-of-the-art versus novel or unproven technologies," according to a letter from the firm's president, Gerry Filteau, to Monterey Peninsula Water Management District general manager Dave Stoldt, who is also chair of the mayors' group's technical advisory committee.


While SPI said its strengths include planning, engineering and cost analysis of desal plants, Filteau acknowledged the company doesn't have the capability to perform some "non-engineering disciplines" such as permitting and environmental assessments. Instead, the firm offered to hire subconsultants for those services.


The review will consist of about 400 hours of work and will be completed in about four weeks. SPI, which also has an office in Tempe, Ariz., has requested \$2,000 for travel costs for three meetings on top of the \$60,000 for its work. The results will be presented to the mayors for their consideration

On Aug. 1, the mayors rejected a \$58,000 bid from BASE Water Resources Consulting & Management because of CEO Ken Ortega's alleged involvement in a corruption scandal while he was employed with the City of Oxnard.

Cal Am has proposed a \$370 million water project that includes a desal plant in Marina, water storage facilities and a treated wastewater project. Agha has promised that his plan

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

Council has reservations but OKs higher garbage bills

THE TRASH collection company that serves residents and businesses in town finally received approval of a rate increase from the Carmel City Council last week — the first since 2008 — but its request for a cost-of-living raise fell flat.

Council members did not argue about the proposed 0.77 percent increase resulting from higher fees at the Marina landfill, considering the city's contract with Waste Management stipulates, "The collector shall receive periodic pass-through rate adjustments to cover the increased cost of dump fees at the Monterey Regional Waste Management District site."

According to city administrator Jason Stilwell's report to the council Aug. 7, the 0.77 percent rate increase resulted from disposal fees rising from \$46.25 to \$47 per ton as of Jan. 1, 2011, and from \$47 to \$48.25 per ton as of Jan. 1 of this year. The waste hauler last received pay hike from the city in 2008, and the typical residential bill for garbage collection is \$76.35 per quarter.

"It should be retroactive for 2011, and we should pay for 2012, according to the terms of the contract," councilman Ken Talmage said. "We need to make up what we did not pay."

Mayor Jason Burnett agreed the city should keep its word

and approve the rate increase for dumping fees, retroactive to

The rest of the council unanimously voted in favor of the adjustment, which will bump the typical residential quarterly garbage bill to just over \$77, according to assistant city administrator Heidi Burch.

Compliance checklist, no COLA

In his report, Stilwell had recommended the council OK a rate increase of 5.85 percent, which included the 0.77 percent for dumping fees and a 5.08 percent hike based on a percentage of the Consumer Price Index, which tracks inflation. He reported the company had originally requested an overall rate hike of 10.48 percent, "but through negotiations acknowledges the amount recommended by staff."

But council members balked at giving the waste hauler a raise based on inflation, and they questioned the company's performance on a scorecard that included 32 contract issues, such as picking up and returning residential carts to and from off-street enclosures, emptying the trash bins along Scenic Road, replacing garbage cans, recycling trees, and providing and servicing porta-potties.

Talmage suggested anyone with points to make on the checklist submit them to Stilwell in writing for discussion at a future meeting, rather than undertake the time-consuming process of listing them orally that night.

At Burnett's prompting, Talmage briefly mentioned a few of his concerns, such as overflowing trash cans on Scenic Road on a Sunday morning in June while the city was hosting the Run in the Name of Love.

Councilwoman Victoria Beach wondered how much the city is paying for the premium service of having residential trash bins taken from their off-street storage spaces, rather than having garbage collected by the side of the road, as occurs in most cities.

"I would like to know how much it costs, and how to fix it or get rid of it," she said, since many renters and homeowners don't know they don't have to roll their bins out to the curb for pickup on garbage days. Beach also had issues with "the nuances of the

issues with "the nuances of the way the contract is currently stated."

Burnett agreed with a point made by planning commissioner Steve Dallas, who wondered how the city knows when the garbage company fields complaints.

"Do we know how many complaints are being received and how they are being addressed?" Burnett asked.

Talmage also suggested querying members of the chamber of commerce, the Carmel Innkeepers Association and the Carmel Residents Association for their opinions on Waste Management's services. He called the checklist "fabulous," but said, "This is the beginning, not the end, of this process."

Dallas also commented that it seemed wrong to grant a COLA increase to a large company when the city's own employees are not receiving similar raises, and Talmage said he disagrees in principle with COLA increases, considering the CPI is based on data from Silicon Valley and not the Monterey Peninsula.

"I find it very difficult to vote for a cost-of-living increase," he said. "But if we want a whole lot more [in services], we should be willing to pay more."

The council unanimously agreed not to give a COLA raise and to discuss contract compliance sometime in the future.

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Due to the nature of the sale, Layout and Design services will not be available on Saturday August 18th.

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Husband and wife plead guilty to contractor fraud, other charges

A MONTEREY couple who prosecutors said operated a home-improvement, paint and window-installation business pleaded guilty to a host of criminal charges, including working without contractor's licenses.

Daniel Kenneth Furness, 60, pleaded guilty Aug. 3 to six felony charges and three misdemeanors, while his wife, Collen Ann Gsell, 57, pleaded guilty to nine misdemeanor charges, according to Monterey County Deputy District Attorney Robert J. Lauchlan, Jr.

Between 2002 and 2011, Furness and Gsell operated Window Design and Fresh

Paint, furnishing and installing windows and doors, painting houses and advertising for home improvement work without licenses, in violation of the California Business and Professions Code.

"Documents which Furness or Gsell signed, and which were filed with public offices," according to Lauchlan, "were false because they alleged that Furness had no criminal record and had not received citations from the Contractors State License Board."

Furness and Gsell used contractor license numbers issued to other people and charged their customers excessive down payments, according to the district attorney's office.

Coastal commission approves restricted parking near Aquarium

TO STOP employees and volunteers from taking up most of the parking spaces near the Monterey Bay Aquarium, the California Coastal Commission last week approved a proposal from the City of Pacific Grove to designate 31 parking spaces near the Aquarium for two-hour parking only.

At the Aug. 10 meeting in Santa Cruz, the commission agreed to set the two-hour limit on Sloat Avenue and Ocean View Boulevard between First Street and Dewey Avenue from 9 a.m. to 6 p.m. Residential permit holders, however, will be allowed to park in those areas all day, every day.

A survey conducted by the city indicating that parking on Ocean View is "disproportionately" used by Cannery Row employees, "and most specifically by Monterey Bay Aquarium staff, volunteers, and docents,"

which "affects the public's ability to visit the coastal zone by inappropriately tying up the parking spaces," according to a coastal commission report.

Fifteen spaces on Sloat Avenue and 16 on Ocean View would be affected by the new restrictions. Currently, those parking areas have no time restrictions.

Time-restricting parking will protect residents from "parking conflicts" and allow the public to visit P.G.'s shoreline or local attractions "while deterring the longterm use of the spaces by employees of the Aquarium," according to the commission's report.

After the meeting in Santa Cruz, P.G. City Manager Tom Frutchey wrote in his weekly summary that coastal commissioner Mark Stone "pointed out that P.G. is a poster city for coastal access in the state, that the city's

HIGHWAY 1 CLIMBING LANE TO BE EXTENDED TO RIO ROAD

T HE MONTEREY County Department of Public Works applied for a permit July 25 to extend the Highway 1 climbing lane from the Carmel Valley Road intersection to about 600 yards south of Rio Road.

Completed in 2001, the climbing lane alleviated the congestion that plagued roads around the mouth of Carmel Valley every afternoon.

"The climbing lane works beautifully for eliminating the bottleneck that once existed," Fifth District Supervisor Dave Potter told The Pine Cone.

The climbing lane was so successful, it eliminated public demand for a new road and led to the final demise of the Hatton Canyon freeway. The canyon is now part of the state parks system and has been improved with a paved hiking and biking trail.

According to Potter, the advantages of extending it to Rio Road are two fold. First, the lane will do even more to ease traffic congestion, in particular coming out of Big Sur.

"If you take a look at the way traffic circulates in the Carmel area, it's really packed in the two-lane sections," explained Potter, who said extending the climbing lane will

enable "twice as many people to get through the Rio Road and Highway 1 intersection on the same signal change."

Also, the climbing lane will make it easier for emergency personnel to get through traffic.

"We have concerns about the ability of fire and ambulance vehicles" to reach their destinations without delay, Potter said.

The cost of the project is \$3.8 million, which Potter considers a bargain. "It's a very affordable fix," he added. "It's a big bang for the buck."

County spokesperson Maia Carroll told The Pine Cone that the money — which will come from state transportation improvement funds and developer fees, won't be available until 2014. As a result, construction won't begin until then.

The project would require 3,400 cubic yards of cut and 2,600 cubic yards of fill, and removing one double-trunked coast live oak and five cottonwoods.

The item is on the agenda for the next Carmel Valley Land Use Advisory Committee meeting, which is scheduled for Monday, Aug. 20, at St. Phillips Lutheran Church at 8065 Carmel Valley Road. The meeting starts at 6:30 p.m.

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

replacement.

After deciding not to hold a special election in March 2013 to select a candidate to finish the term, which expires in April 2014, council members debated whether to appoint her replacement that night or open the position to the public, interview applicants and vote on an appointment at a future meeting, as they did when they chose Steve Hillyard to fill Burnett's council seat.

During that process, Burnett and Hazdovac interviewed 10 candidates and ultimately recommended two: Hillyard and Theis. Councilman Ken Talmage also suggested a third contender, Michael LePage, who ended up being appointed to the planning commission.

Talmage said LePage sent an email to the council this week saying he was no longer interested in being appointed to it. "We need to make it look more fun up here," councilwoman Victoria Beach responded. "We're getting rejection letters."

Carmel Chamber of Commerce CEO Monta Potter suggested the council move ahead with appointing Theis, though she did not refer to her by name.

"I think it would be great to replace Paula, a female business owner, with a female business owner, and replace her with someone who is up to speed and has been coming to council meetings," she said.

Former Mayor Jean Grace said, "I think I know who Monta is talking about, and I agree.'

Citing the time and effort so recently spent on fielding council candidates, Talmage wanted to move forward with Theis' appointment, too.

"We had two extraordinarily good candidates," he said, referring to Hillyard and Theis. "I don't see that anything has changed, and I would go ahead and take action tonight.'

Burnett also praised Theis for being "up to speed on the issues," being willing to sit through often long council meetings, and being able to provide a Carmel-by-the-Sea business owner's perspective.

"I think that Carrie, in all those respects, is going to be very hard to beat," Burnett said, though he was also open to the idea of reviewing applications and recommending a candidate for appointment at a future meeting.

But Hillyard wanted the process reopened to all applicants. "If there's someone out there who thinks they can add to this council, we should give them the option," he said.

That stymied Burnett.

"I don't think we should do something where one of the four of us thinks this is not being handled correctly," he said.

But Grace stood up and told the council it's OK to dis-

"I always had to remember that we live in a democratic republic, and sometimes there is dissension," she said. "Over the years, you're going to have to deal with something on which you don't agree ... I realize this is a terribly important issue, but it's not a crime if you don't get consensus."

Ultimately, the council unanimously voted to accept Hazdovac's resignation and appoint Theis, who will take her

seat at the dais at the Sept. 11 council meeting.

After the meeting, Hazdovac, who also thought the position should be open to all applicants, said, "Carrie is an excellent choice, even though I may not agree with the process. Her credentials are outstanding, and I am very happy for her and the city."

■ New chapter for Hazdovac

Citing increasing demands on her time due to family and the thriving business she owns with her sister, Pat, Hazdovac sent a short letter to Burnett Aug. 10 stating her plans to step down.

"This decision was not made lightly, and I have enjoyed the opportunity to serve the City of Carmel-by-the-Sea for the last 18 years," she wrote. "It is with deep gratitude that I thank the voters for electing me. I also wish to thank our dedicated and hardworking city staff for their professional support over the years."


Burnett told The Pine Cone he tried to talk Hazdovac out of resigning, to no avail. He said he'll miss her institutional knowledge, her history, her directness and her perspective, even though they didn't always agree on the issues.

"Paula was a very good council member," he observed. "She has a sense of what has worked in the past and what hasn't, and she helped us avoid the mistakes of the past. I really valued her insights and advice."

Hazdovac said she's been considering resigning for a while, given increasing demands of caring for her disabled aunt and tending to her growing business, which moved from a tiny alcove of a shop to a larger and more prominent location at Ocean and Monte Verde three years ago.

"If there were five of me, I still don't think I could get it

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

SIERRA CLUB LOSES ANOTHER LAWSUIT OVER SAND CITY 'ECORESORT'

■ Environmental group says it won't appeal any more

THREE APPELLATE court judges this week ruled against the Sierra Club and in favor of a developer who has long sought to build a \$300 million oceanfront resort in Sand City.

In a 43-page decision released Wednesday, justices with the 6th District Court of Appeal in San Jose ruled against the Sierra Club, which filed suit over a water permit the Monterey Peninsula Water Management District granted to National Security Guaranty, the developer behind the proposed Monterey Bay Shores Ecoresort.

The Sierra Club claimed the water district failed to examine the environmental impacts the permit would have on the Carmel River and its steelhead fish population. The permit would allow the resort to use up to 90 acre-feet of water per year for its 161 hotel rooms, condominiums, restaurant, spa and conference facilities.

The resort would be located located across Highway 1 from Seaside High School. Stopping it from being built has

been a priority for local environmentalists, but the judges said their latest claim had no merit.

"As we have already explained," according to the ruling by justices Franklin Elia and Eugene Premo and presiding justice Conrad Rushing, "the parties and the district acted to insure that there would be no potential adverse environmental impacts on the river associated with this permit application."

Sierra Club attorney Larry Silver told The Pine Cone the group would not appeal the case to the Supreme Court. SNG President Ed Ghandour, who has tried for nearly 20 years to build the resort, was pleased with the decision.

"I would say that this, thankfully, is the final attempt to undermine SNG's water rights and the water distribution permit for Monterey Bay Shores Resort," he told The Pine Cone after the judges issued their decision.

While the Sierra Club also argued that the water district failed to take into account the findings of the 2009 cease and desist order imposed on Cal Am that limits the company from pumping from the Carmel River, the judges said "the record reflects the contrary," since the district relied on the cease and desist order as evidence in support of its findings.

"We hold that the district did not abuse its discretion and that the trial court properly denied the writ petition," accord-

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ing to the ruling.

In April 2011, Monterey County Superior Court Judge Roger Randall rejected the Sierra Club lawsuit, prompting the organization to take the case to the appeals court.

Ghandour has a long-established legal right to 149 acrefeet of water for the resort but would only use about 90 acrefeet, equivalent to roughly 29 million gallons per year. He said the ecoresort would use state-of-the-art technology, including wind and solar power, to conserve resources. The project would also involve a sand-dune restoration project.

The hotel was approved by Sand City in 1998. After agreeing in 1986 that the property could be used for development, the California Coastal Commission refused to grant a permit for the hotel several times — decisions Ghandour also successfully challenged in court.

In February 2010, Ghandour filed a \$200 million lawsuit against the coastal commission. In June, a San Francisco Superior Court judge heard arguments in the case and is expected to issue a ruling by the middle of October.

through the 5-foot-thick walls to insert steel bars and grout in order to reinforce them. Workers will then tie the roof trusses and update the electrical components before replacing the roof timbers and tiles.

The total project will cost \$5 million, and so far, about \$1 million has been spent on studies, plans and drawings, permits and other "soft costs," according to Grabrian.

That the work is beginning this month is a testament to the foundation's fortitude and people's desire to keep the historic Mission intact, according to Grabrian. By last December, the group had just hit the \$3 million-mark, so proponents had to raise another \$2 million quickly, or put the work off another year.

But waiting until 2013 meant construction costs could rise, and the foundation might lose some of its grant money that was set to expire. Grabrian said he also disliked the idea of sustaining the unsafeness of unreinforced masonry any longer than necessary.

"The sooner we get the seismic retrofit completed, the better," he said. "The question is not if there will be another earthquake, but when."

The board decided to go for it, and Grabrian asked the contractor, Blach Construction Co. of Santa Clara, for the latest date the construction could begin this year. With an innovative means of keeping moisture out of the roof, early August was

"They came up with a different scheme of protecting the tile and the roof when the roof is off," Grabrian explained. "Instead of using the tarps they were going to put on and take off every day, they are going to put a temporary structure above the basilica and shrink-wrap it. This will keep the moisture from the rain and fog out of it."

And by the end of July, the foundation had raised the remaining \$2 million.

"Now we've got the contract basically

signed with the contractor to take the roof off," he said Monday.

Blach crews were moving into one of the buildings on the Mission property this week and later this month will begin putting up scaffolding, according to Grabrian.

"The first tiles should be coming off the Basilica around the middle of September," he said. "They are going to stack them on platforms built even with the roof instead of taking them all the way to the ground," which will also save time and reduce breakage, so as many as possible can be reused.

Then the temporary protective structure will be built and wrapped in plastic, and crews will begin working on the trusses and braces, and drilling the holes for the reinforcements.

Grabrian also reported 3D laser scanning technology typically used to document and preserve World Heritage sites is assisting in the planning and execution of the retrofit. In the hands of the contractor, the same technology is used to obtain exact measurements.

"They precut a lot of the pieces, because they can use the lasers in places they couldn't get to, otherwise" he explained. "It has millimeter accuracy and can generate actual dimensions for the parts."

The work should be done by late January or early February, if all goes according to

But wait, there's more

While Grabrian is proud of the foundation's fundraising accomplishments, its work is far from done, as the final phase of the Mission Basilica restoration will cost another \$2.2 million.

And if proponents can collect those funds soon, the remaining work — including plumbing and mechanical upgrades "could be completed while the scaffold is up and the contractor is still here," he said. "So we're still here with our hand out.'

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

councilman Dan Miller told The Pine Cone.

The predicament stems from an April 2002 city council decision to raise the CalPERS plan for Pacific Grove's public safety employees to "3 percent at 50" — meaning workers at least 50 years old can retire with pay equal to 3 percent of their highest year's compensation for every year they worked, to a maximum of 90 percent of their highest pay level. The plan had been at 2 percent at 50.

But the 2002 council approved the increase via the consent agenda, which is usually reserved for non-controversial and routine items and that do not require a public hearing. Furthermore, the city's staff at the time — led by city manager Ross Hubbard — did not reveal the fiscal impacts of pension increase, which current estimates put at tens of millions of dollars

"Of course, none of these costs were shown or known to the public in 2002, although they were known to the city manager," according to a report released this week by a council subcommittee composed of Miller, Mayor Carmelita Garcia and councilman Ken Cuneo that was tasked with looking into the 10-year-old CalPERS deal.

The 2002 staff report for the consent item made available to the city council and the public stated the fiscal impact to the city would be about \$51,500, which was only the cost of amending the contract, not the cost of the pension increase itself, which is said to cost the city at least \$800,000 per year.

The subcommittee report references a 2009 opinion by city attorney David Laredo on the 2002 CalPERS contract, in which Laredo said it's possible the ordinance that set forth the pension increase could be voided on grounds the council did not comply with the law when it approved it.

"The reality of the situation is everybody would like to get out of [CalPERS]," Miller told The Pine Cone. "We might be one of the few cities that may be able to."

The CalPERS subcommittee was formed following complaints by P.G. residents John Moore and Dan Davis who have long argued that the 2002 deal for police officers and firefighters was approved illegally and should be repealed.

Looking back at the 2002 meeting, Miller, who was not on the council then but was a regular gadfly at council meetings and has long been critical of how the city spends its money, said there were no indications the CalPERS contract would cost the city so much money.


"If the agenda report had said exactly how much it was going to cost," Miller told The Pine Cone Wednesday before the meeting, "I would obviously have stepped up and said 'excuse me, how are we going to pay for this?"

Councilman Robert Huitt, who was also on the council in 2002 and voted for the pension increase, took responsibility for his part — even though few blame the council itself for the decision, contending city's staff simply did not give the council the fiscal details of the amended contract.

"You could easily argue it was council's failure to pay attention to what the [legal] requirements were," Huitt said.

However, Huitt said even if he knew in 2002 how much the revised CalPERS contract would cost the city, he's not sure he would have voted against it. It was a different economic climate in California then and many cities were giving cops and firefighters sweetheart pension deals.

"It wasn't a particularly controversial decision at that time because [most cities were] doing it," Huitt said of retirement increases. "And the stock market was great and the city's obligations were zero. Looking back on it, it's easy to say that the only reason we did that is because we didn't have all the information. The simple truth is I don't know."

Rio Road Starbucks meets with water agency, seeks baristas

STARBUCKS PLANS to open a coffee shop where the Black Bear Diner once existed at 3650 Rio Road. But first, the Monterey County Water Resources Agency needs to approve plans for a remodel because the building lies in a 100-year flood plain.

According to Monterey County spokesperson Maia Carroll, the MCWRA needs to determine if the remodeling work Starbucks plans to undertake constitutes a "substantial improvement" of the 4,000-square-foot building that might contribute to flood risk.

"The agency is currently working with the applicant to make that determination. It's too early to say what [Starbucks] will have to do. The water resources agency hasn't seen the project yet."

Starbucks submitted an application in February to remodel the former Black Bear Diner. The project includes reconstructing part of the building's roof.

In May, Starbucks submitted an application for the design approval of two non-illuminated signs — a 5-foot-in-diameter circular sign and a 1-foot-by-16-foot rectangular sign.

According to Starbucks' website, the Rio Road Starbucks is accepting applications for baristas and shift supervisors.

The building, which is owned by Carmel Property Co., was constructed in 1971. The Black Bear diner closed in 2008 after five years at the location.

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
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


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

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Even best friends have to say goodbye after 240,000 miles

 $M_{\rm Y}$ WIFE and I said goodbye to our 1996 Ford Taurus the other day. It had 244,824 miles on it. Original engine. Original transmission.

It wasn't sexy or sporty, and it didn't stand out in a crowd. It averaged about 22 miles per gallon. It went from zero to 60 in ... I have no idea.

It had a cassette player and an AM-FM radio but no CD player. The air conditioner and the heater still worked.

It was a silver four-door sedan with a big trunk and clothcovered seats that still looked new. The body was virtually intact with a few minor scrapes and scratches. It had classic styling and attractive looks.

It was a basic, unpretentious way of getting from here to there and back. And (almost) always reliable. The water pump broke one night as I was driving on Highway 1 near Marina, and it used to overheat on a winding and hilly road at the mouth of Carmel Valley — so I stopped visiting the friends who lived at the top.

We never gave it a name, which some people do for their cars. It wouldn't have come if we had called, anyway.

My wife and I bought it in 2000 in Perrysburg, Ohio, a suburb of Toledo. I had already moved back to California to start a new job, and my family remained behind to finish the school year. But we needed a car. While I was back on a brief visit, my wife and I went to a dealer recommended by a coworker. We spotted the Taurus almost immediately and drove it a couple of times. We liked it, and we needed to buy something quickly. It had about 58,000 miles, and we paid a bit over \$8,000. My new employer shipped it west. The car ended up lasting far longer than my new job.

We liked the Taurus so much, we even bought a sibling for it, an older Taurus station wagon, which it outlived.

The sedan seemed immune to time and events. We got it late in Bill Clinton's presidency, drove it through George W. Bush's two terms, and kept in on the road over the first three years of Barack Obama's White House stay.

Like the hero of the classic children's story, "The Little Engine That Could," the Taurus sedan just kept on chugging. It ignored earthquakes, swine flu, floods, fires, global warming, nuclear contamination, tropical storms and tsunamis.

It wasn't even fazed when numerous other makes and models were recalled for repairs.

And still it looked great, like The Picture of Dorian Gray without indulgences or a veiled portrait.

I taught my daughter to drive in it, mostly on quiet weekend mornings in the deserted parking lots or on the almostalways-empty streets at Fort Ord after the Army had depart-

As the years passed, we drove it less, its prime role supplanted by a couple of other vehicles we bought.

I would occasionally see the same make and model around the Peninsula. I felt a kinship with those drivers. A number of years ago, in a gas station, a man driving a nearly identical version asked me if I was going for the "Taurus Moonshot."

Huh? He explained that if your Taurus reaches 240,000 miles, the distance between the earth and its moon, it qualifies for a "Taurus Moonshot." Strictly unofficial. I was bemused, and as the car had about 215,000 miles on it, the achievement appeared unlikely.

Three years ago, while heading north on U.S. 101 after I had umpired a junior varsity baseball game in Soledad, the car passed the milestone and earned the honor.

I was ready to get rid of the Taurus a couple of years ago, certain that it would fail the smog test and would be too costly to repair. But it passed, virtually pleading with us to keep it. So we did.

We still drove it occasionally until a few months ago, when the "service engine" light became a permanent feature, and, sadly, I no longer considered it trustworthy.

My mechanic gave me the grim news. It would doubtlessly need a new and expensive catalytic converter if it failed the next smog test, which, based on his expert advice, was likely. He didn't know even if one for that make and model would be available. Clearly, our Taurus had come to the end of the

We canceled the insurance, didn't renew the registration, and parked it in the front yard, where it became a catch-all for the detritus of the pine tree under which it rested. The battery

I called a charity that collects cars. The appointment was set for two days later.

On the day inbetween, my wife and spent the better part of an hour washing it and cleaning it out, sort of like some cultures do to a body before burial.

When the flatbed truck dispatched by the charity pulled up, we weren't anxious to let it go. Cleaned of twigs and leaves, it looked great again, for the first time in months.

The tow-truck driver must have sensed our reluctance. We talked for quite a bit. And then it was time.

He charged the battery, gently drove the Taurus onto the back of his truck, and secured it with chains for a trip to somewhere in the Bay Area. That hurt. As my wife and I wistfully watched, our Taurus disappeared.

The charity said that we could take a \$500 tax exemption. It could even end up back on the road. I hope that happens. Perhaps, one day, I will spot our Taurus sedan again.

And if I do, I hope it recognizes me.

Photo exhibit at CAA offers window to the group's past

WHEN VISTORS walk inside the Carmel Art Association over the next two weeks, they'll be greeted by a series of black and white portraits that pay tribute to the people who created one of the Monterey Peninsula's most enduring — and dynamic — nonprofit groups.

"We call it our 'History and Legacy Wall," explained Sally Aberg of the CAA.

The display features about 40 striking photographs captured between the turn of the 20th century and the late 1960s. "Most of the photos were taken in the 1920s and 1930s," Aberg noted.

The CAA was formed Aug. 8, 1927, when 19 Carmel artists met at the home of painters Josephine Culbertson and Ida Johnson with the aim of creating a group "for the advancement of art and cooperation among artists, and to maintain a permanent art gallery to advance the knowledge of and interest in art as well as fellowship between local artists and the public at large."

"No one in the room that day could have foreseen the influence that this informal alliance would have - nor the dramatic impact this organization's members would have on the whole of American art," Aberg said.

Included in the exhibit are some of Carmel's most accomplished and influential early artists, such as Armin Hansen, Eugenia Charlton Fortune, Paul Dougherty, August Gay, Percy Gray, Henrietta Shore, Francis McComas and John O'Shea. These local artists — as well as many others made important contributions to a variety of mid-century movements in the art world, including the California Decorative Style, California Impressionism, the Early California Colorists, California Plein Air, Tonalism, academic portraiture, and Modernism. "Since the Carmel Art Association's birth, it has attracted many of the most influencial names in California's art history," Aberg explained.

Coming from a variety of public and private collections, the original photographs were scanned — and in some cases restored through the magic of Photoshop by Aberg's husband and CAA member, Jeffrey Becom.

The exhibit of historical photographs is part of a monthlong celebration of the CAA's 85th anniversary.

Located on the west side of Dolores between Fifth and Sixth, the CAA is open every day from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. Call (831) 624-6176 or visit www.carmelart.org.



A composer's wines, a market's lessons, and a fair's feast

THE ONGOING quest for delicious dry rosé yielded another find last week at the Silvestri Vineyards tasting room in Carmel Valley Village. Located in the row of new tasting venues that includes Holman Ranch, Dawn's Dream, Parsonage, Chesebro and Cima Collina, the venue showcases wines made from film composer Alan Silvestri's small estate east of the Village. A few of them, including the juicy, well balanced and nicely acidic rosé, a 50/50 blend of Syrah and Barbera, can only be found for sale there.

Silvestri, who lives in the Carmel Highlands and is a twotime Oscar nominee, composed musical scores for "Forrest Gump," "The Avengers," "Captain America," "Cast Away," and dozens of other major productions. His first television score was for "CHiPs," and director Robert Zemeckis gave him his break in film by hiring him to write the music for "Romancing the Stone."

Winemaking is a much more recent venture, with his small vineyard producing its first vintage in 2003. While most of the vines are Chardonnay, Pinot Noir and Syrah, Silvestri also grows a little bit of Pinot Blanc and Barbera. The tasting room carries the winery's inaugural 2010 Pinot Blanc — another wine that can only be purchased there — and will soon offer the first vintage of Barbera, too. All the wines are estate grown and produced, meaning Silvestri does not purchase grapes from any other growers.

Winemaker Mark Chesebro (who also makes a lovely rosé under his own namesake label) deftly capitalizes on the rich, fruity characters of the Barbera and Syrah to create a wine

with a crisp acidity and character that make it easy to match with many different dishes. It sells for \$20 per bottle.

Silvestri's tasting room is located at 19 E. Carmel Valley Road in the Village and is open Thursday through Sunday from noon to 6 p.m.






18, for painter Duane Alt.

■ Guild needs help

For the past four decades, the Forest Theater Guild has staged plays and screened films at Carmel's historic outdoor theater. But the nonprofit theater group has been hit hard by the economy. As a result, executive director Rebecca Barrymore is asking the public for support.

"It's been a very tough year," Barrymore told The Pine Cone. "Attendance is down. We really need help right now."

The nonprofit theater company has been treading water since at least 2009, partly the result, Barrymore explained, of a fundraising effort gone haywire. "When I came aboard [that year], the guild was pretty much bankrupt," she said.

Yet somehow, Barrymore has been able

to cobble together enough funding over the past four years to stage two ambitious productions a season at a cost of \$50,000 each.

In response to the guild's financial woes, Barrymore has worked hard to secure grants to make up the shortfall. "But grants are getting harder to obtain," she noted. "It's getting more competitive."

To help match a \$5,000 grant from the Harden Foundation, the guild has launched a fundraising push this month. Barrymore is offering an enticement to the donor who makes the biggest contribution. "The winner gets two front row seats to 40 performances and 25 different films," she explained.

And even if you make just a small contribution to the guild's coffers, you still have a chance to win something big.

all done," she told The Pine Cone.

Hazdovac recalled some of the highlights of her tenure, beginning with former Mayor Clint Eastwood's endorsement of her the first time she ran, and former Oakland Raiders coach John Madden's ordering her to stand up for herself following some nasty Letters to the Editor in the newspaper.

Then an owner of Em Le's, Madden "came to the store and yelled at me, 'Are you the one running for council? You need to defend yourself!" she recalled. Later, he would bring restaurant guests next door to her shop and tell them he had voted for her.

"He did not!" she laughed. "He wasn't even registered to vote here then."

With so many years in office, Hazdovac said she must have worked with 17 or 18 different council members. She felt the group that occupied the dais from 2000 to 2010, with

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Sue McCloud as mayor, was the most efficient and effective.

August 17, 2012

"That was when we would pick one or two things a year and get them done," she said, such as the Local Coastal Program that was finally adopted in 2004 and returned control over development to the city, and the bonds to fund the renovation of Sunset Center.

"And when [former city administrator] Rich Guillen was hired, we charged him with reorganizing staff, and he did," she said. "It wasn't popular move, but it really saved us," during the recession that followed.

She enjoyed having a hand in creating more events, such as the 4th of July celebration in Devendorf Park, and "the small things," like keeping the twinkly lights sparkling in the Ocean Avenue median all year.

"Other cities are edgy and a little exciting," she said. "We have a lot of competition, and we need to keep up with it."

She wishes the council had been able to finally resolve parking congestion downtown and put the issue of Flanders Mansion to rest.

"I'm sorry that couldn't have come to a head, one way or another," she said.

A particularly surreal moment occurred when Hazdovac learned after a tour of inspection that her father, Paul, had died. She had heard the sirens earlier, while standing on the stairs at city hall, and remembered the peculiar feeling that washed over her. Later, then-city administrator Jere Kersnar delivered the sad news. The experience is indelibly imprinted on her mind.

But the largest milestone of her council career happened on election night in 2002.

"I met my husband, Terry," she said. "So that's the best thing, and the luckiest thing."

They fist talked at the post-election party at the Cypress Inn, to which then-councilman Gerard Rose had invited him.

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
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"I was introduced to Terry, but it was so crazy that we didn't talk much," she said. But they did later, "and the rest is

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A monopoly on sympathy?

Every Body knows that the U.S. unemployment rate has been above 8 percent for the last three years, which translates to about 12 million officially unemployed — and that only includes people eligible to work who are trying to find jobs. Millions more have simply given up looking or figured out a way to go on disability.

Imagine the shock those people must have felt when they saw the legions of illegal immigrants lining up Wednesday in various cities, thanks to President Obama's decision to grant them legal status, to start the process of taking jobs in this country. As we have said before, the problem with illegal immigration from Mexico is that there's way too much of it. And while estimates of the number of people affected by Obama's order has ranged from 1 million to 2 million, it was still a shock to see the crowds.

In Chicago, for example, according to the Chicago Tribune, the line to start applying for legal status "filled the Navy Pier boardwalk, stretched out in a line along Illinois Street that turned onto the lakefront bike path and continued all the way to Wacker Drive" — a distance of nearly a mile.

It was a scene that was repeated in many cities, from Los Angeles, to Elizabeth, N.J. Also drawing crowds were Mexican consulates, where the young illegal immigrants, most of them citizens of Mexico, could get the passports and other forms of I.D. they would need to get permission to work here.

"In Houston, lines for the Mexican consulate stretched into downtown streets, causing traffic jams," the Los Angeles Times reported.

For these multitudes, the opportunity to get a job in this country is something to be celebrated, of course, and the news media coverage of their liberation day has been uniformly upbeat.

But what about unemployed citizens? For them, the sudden expansion of the workforce by as many as 2 million is terrible news. And the effect is bound to be worst for people in lower-income brackets who work in blue-collar jobs. Already the unemployment rate for people without a college education is one-third higher than for those who have one. The flood of newly minted legal workers from Mexico is bound to make things even worse.

So behind all those happy faces you saw on the news this week, there were millions more whose frustration must have been immense. Don't they deserve our concern, too?

Workers should be rehired Dear Editor,

"What's the beef?" That's the question, not "Where's the beef?" (which was a question asked of my father by chefs at La Playa in past years.) My father, Sam Karas, managed Luce Meats, then Luce-Carmel Meats, and finally Carmel Meats, wholesale meat companies doing business with La Playa over the years, though not recently.

The "beef" now is the concern about the rehiring of employees at the refurbished La Playa. Employees who have worked at La Playa before the closing and remodeling were not given worker security and the promise of rehiring when the property was sold. These workers were dedicated and valued employees.

The recent article in The Pine Cone about La Playa stated that the personnel records had been sealed by the previous

owners. However, the new owners, Classic Hotels and Resorts, were able to get the names of the workers who had been employed there before the hotel sold, as they sent them applications. That they hired so few of the ex-workers, many who had been there for a number of years, doesn't speak well for the new owners.

As a resident of the Peninsula who has dined at La Playa numerous times over the years with family members, I ask that the union be reinstated and that ex-workers be given priority in the additional hirings to be done. It's hard to know what to do about those positions already filled.

A columnist's brush with death leads to revelations about local health care

beyond the realm

f I'VE NEVER been one for hospitals. But then, I'm also bored by the mechanic's shop, preferring to engage with automobiles only when they are fully operable.

The primary mission of a hospital is to care for the ailing, a mission that often suffers under the weight of corporate greed, nightmare bureaucracies, turf wars and petty politics.

If you've lived in Monterey County long enough, as I have, you likely have your

own war stories about the care you've received at the Big Three.

So when I was unable to find relief under the excruciating pressure of chest pain Sunday morning, the choice

of hospital was a significant question mark. We quickly settled on Salinas Valley Memorial Hospital, despite its very public public-relations problems of late.

In recent years, SVMH has become the poster child for administrative abuses in health care, developing a statewide reputation for executives who feathered their own nests and arranged sweetheart deals with cronies, who dabbled regularly in nepotism and who fostered wretched relations with

Along the way and despite itself, the hospital has developed a sterling reputation for cardiac care. It was because of that reputation — but mostly due to Salinas Valley's proximity to my house and my desperation to get help, both stat and ASAP — that we decided to enter its ER Sunday morning.

Digressing momentarily, I confess that I am able to write this despite my own foolishness. Like the car owner who blithely drives past the mechanic's shop despite the nagging clang under the hood, I ignored the warning signs of my own pending breakdown for at least a week: the crushing pressure to my chest, exacerbated horribly during my morning runs.

> And it was only until the warnings became absolutely intolerable that I finally determined I might not get through the day without medical intervention.

My LAD coronary artery maker" — was 90 percent blocked.

My heart stopped functioning briefly on the gurney, but I made it out alive, due to Dr. Wendell Yee's quick action, an angioplasty and a stent.

Fortunately for me, luck, fate, prayers, love, divine intervention and medical competence trumped my stupidity.

It is the blessing of medical competence I prefer to focus on today. I owe the SVMH staff and its labor unions that much.

Because when administrators can embarrass their institu-

A word from the mayor —

How the decision to pick Theis was made

WHEN COUNCIL MEMBER Paula Hazdovac called me on Friday to share her decision to step down from the city council, I tried to talk her out of it. She has served for 18 years with three different mayors and is among the longest serving public servants in Carmel's history. Paula brought a good sense of that history, of what has worked and what hasn't, and an institutional memory that was particularly valuable to me as a new mayor. She is a small-business owner in

town and so has insights into the pulse of our downtown that can only come from talking with customers every day. Unfortunately I couldn't talk Paula out of her decision. Her last day on the council will be Sept. 7.

Stepping down from the council was something Paula had considered for some time and reflects her need to spend more time with her family. I respect her decision, thank her for her many years of service, and wish her the best.

We immediately went to work to fill the vacancy, calling a special council meeting for

Wednesday. The council has a packed agenda calendar over the coming months, and we can't afford to be firing on anything less than all cylinders.

The first question was whether we call a special election for March 5, 2013. Doing so would mean we wouldn't have a full council for more than half a year and would ask voters to elect someone to a term with just over a year left. This option was quickly rejected by the city council.

Instead, we focused on whether we should repeat the search process we had run just a couple of months ago when we filled the seat I vacated when you elected me as your mayor. In that process, we received 10 outstanding applications. Paula Hazdovac and I interviewed everyone and recommended both Carrie Theis and Steve Hillyard for the full council's consideration. We ultimately appointed Hillyard.


Rather than go through another search, we recognized our recent search had, in fact, produced two excellent candidates. The city council was unanimous in appointing Theis to Hazdovac's seat.

Why did the council take such decisive action?

First, and most importantly, we had the ideal candidate in Carrie Theis. She, like Paula Hazdovac, is both a resident and a Carmel-by-the-Sea business owner, and has long family ties to the community. She has attended city council meetings and so is up to speed on the issues. She has shown leadership in town and across the county as president of the Carmel Innkeepers Association and as a recent board member of the Monterey County Hospitality Association. Carrie recently led the effort to create the Hospitality Improvement District, convincing almost 90 percent of the inns to help promote Carmel-by-the-Sea. She has always comported herself with professionalism and respect for the diversity of views in the

Second, we knew the likely outcome of any process would be Carrie Theis. Why take the time away from other work, raise expectations of other candidates and risk creating unnecessary controversy? Carrie is the right person with the right experience and perspective to complement the rest of the council.

I hope you will join the city council in thanking Paula Hazdovac for her 18 years of public service and join us in welcoming our newest council member, Carrie Theis.







Great Lives

CASBA AJAN — the successful hotelier and restaurateur — got a rough start. He was born in Transylvania (which was then part of Hungary) in 1942. When he was born, the country was occupied by the Nazis, and as a boy of 3, he remembers his family seeking to escape the advance of Soviet troops. They finally made their way to Ontario, where

he received his early education and his Canadian citizenship.

When he was ready for college, Csaba traveled by Greyhound bus through the southwestern United States, checking out colleges. He

selected San Diego State, in part because of all the beautiful girls. He earned a masters in business and went into restaurant and hotel management. On the way, he also tried to become a Navy flyer but was told, "No," because he was Canadian. "It was a crushing rejection," he dead-panned. "Years of psychoanalysis and therapy followed."

Csaba's specialty was marketing. He was very good at it and applied his talents most ably at several world-class hotels in the San Diego area. On a wandering vacation through the Monterey Peninsula, he met with Tom Oliver at the Pebble Beach Co. and expressed an interest in relocating to our area. A few months later, Oliver advised Csaba that Ed Haber was starting a new resort in Carmel Valley. Csaba was hired to run Quail Lodge, which earned a five-star rating in its second year. Then there was a stint managing the Peabody Hotel near Beale Street in Memphis, and some shuffling around top

properties in California and Arizona before he was back at Ouail.

In 1995, "I went from being crazy to totally insane, from the hotel business to the restaurant business." With his friend and partner, Tony Salameh, Csaba opened PortaBella and Merlot Bistro, at Ocean and Lincoln, two restaurants that

have earned national acclaim. There are 45 employees on the payroll who are of 13 different ethnicities, speaking close to that many languages, including Tagalog, Spanish, Russian and French.

That's the quickie profes-

sional wrapup, but the man is so much larger. A cross of Rossano Brazzi and Maurice Chevalier, Csaba Ajan exudes class in an effortless manner that immediately warms you with friendship, appreciation, and esteem. His style is a marriage of intellect, wit, humility, and grace. My goodness, they should teach that starting in the early grades.


We sat at a table toward the back of PortaBella, after the lunch hour, for a 45-minute interview that pushed two hours. No complaints. He is a marvelous raconteur, and with all of his experience, he could tell stories forever. His European savoir-faire is miles deep, but he was also quietly aware of the reservations for that evening, and how the back dining room was being arranged.

He spoke of living through the horror of the World War II with a light air — dropping such phrases as "the Nazi glamour days" with only a soupçon of wryness — that didn't

make light of the circumstances. He went on to reference the political forces that moved European borders as the result of wars, and to discuss the various cultures with their histories

and the languages. An unhurried lunch with this man would infuse one with more knowledge of Europe than a year of college studies.

We met on the day of the historic Supreme Court's decision on Obamacare, and in discussing the ruling, Csaba first mentioned for Chief Justice Earl Warren, noting that he had been appointed by Eisenhower as a conservative choice but became a liberal favorite. Could this be happening with John Roberts? Or, as Csaba put it, "not to be a

poodle to George W's appointment legacy." Then the conversation reprised the great minds of our Founding Fathers. The scope of this man's knowledge is daunting.

So, no, he is not the conservative you might have thought from his profession and his record of achievement. In fact, he opines freely about such issues as marijuana – which he never smoked but he would legalize in a snap of the fingers.

"It ought to be sold in the same circumstances as a sixpack of beer," he said.

Despite his rejection by the Navy, Csaba never actually had to seek psychiatric therapy — a psychological triumph he attributes to his hobby of monkeying around with "motorcycles and English bad cars." Today he still has a couple of Triumphs; a 1956 TR3, and a TR6 that he bought new, which has all of 50,000 miles on it.

And what is this charming man's current living situation? He said he resides in Monterey, and added, "Basically, I'm a private person, except when I talk nonsense."

tion as thoroughly as they did at SVMH, competent and passionate employees are unfairly tarnished with the broad brush

To be honest, I had unfair doubts about Salinas Valley, what with its bad PR and the messes hatched by its leadership in recent years.

I had forgotten that, like most big institutions, the idiocies of management can be overcome by the passions, the skill and the care of its rank-and-file employees.

I am reminded that Salinas Valley's own employees blew the whistle on Sam Downing, its former administrator, and his entourage.

Those employees sustained the slings and arrows of management's snotty innuendo. They endured the sort of cynical disparagement typical of fat-cat executives who want the world to believe their employees can't possibly know what they're talking about.

As it turns out — as it usually turns out — the employees were right and management was wrong. Downing and his cronies soaked district ratepayers and undercut a terrific staff with their outrageous spending and salaries.

Because hospital employees cared enough to press the issue, it was revealed that Downing received nearly \$4 million in supplemental benefits on top of a regular annual pension of \$150,000 when he retired last year — even as he pushed for reductions in the hospital's staff.

That information spurred a state audit and uncovered other atrocious retirement packages for public officials around the state. And the Fair Political Practices Commission is investigating other shenanigans involving Downing and the Salinas Valley board.

Employees with passion — those focused on a hospital's life-saving mission and not its money-grubbing expedience — will do the right thing.

They stepped forward because they understood the importance of the institution outweighs the dread of their minders.

They put their necks on the line because they recognized the threat to their mission.

The passion and the professionalism of the entire nursing staff in the ER and the heart center was certainly evident in my care. I thank them.

to supply water to the Peninsula via a Moss Landing desal plant will cost just \$129 million, while Constantz has proposed a "deepwater desal" operation, also in Moss Landing.

SPI's analysis needs to be completed in time for a Sept. 18 California Public Utilities Commission meeting in which the mayors' will present the results of the study.

The Carlsbad company has previously evaluated desal proposals by Cal Am, Sand City and Pajaro/Sunny Mesa, and has done other work in Australia, Oceanside and Orange County.

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


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Ned Callihan

Long time Big Sur resident, Ned Callihan, passed away on June 28. He came to Big Sur by way of visiting a fellow classmate from the school of architecture at Tulane, who had settled in San Francisco. After a brief visit to Esalen, he returned to his home in Cincinnati, where he was practicing as an architect and city planner, and began the transition to living in California. He settled in Big Sur where he continued to pursue a new path, eventually becoming a bodyworker, first in deep tissue and later practicing craniosacral therapy and, in addition, heading up Room 23, the alternative bodywork center at Esalen. He was also involved in architectural projects at Esalen, and eventually pursued a full time practice in architecture on the Coast. But commissioners said they wanted a simpler display, perhaps just a stone on which the steel could be mounted. They also disliked the idea of any sort of plaque, instead suggesting a simple inscription with

only the date of the attacks. At the Aug. 8 meeting, they got what they wanted. CarrieAnn presented two possible boulders, and associate planner Marc Wiener suggested the smaller, which measures about 40 inches long, 34 inches wide and 32 inches high and is tan colored. The steel would be mounted slightly suspended, as if it were floating, as commissioner Don Goodhue had requested at the June meeting.

CarrieAnn proposed three locations in Devendorf Park, and commissioners gravitated toward a spot near the koi pond close to the Sixth Avenue side of the park.

She also assured commissioners she is obtaining letters verifying the steel's authen-

Resident Monte Miller said the memorial should be located somewhere easy for people to see, and designer John Mandurrago, representing the Kiwanis Club of Carmelby-the-Sea, said he and all of its other members were proud to work on the memorial

with CarrieAnn.

"All of us embrace this project and are proud to contribute funds," he said. "This is a great project for Carmel to embrace and have in this beautiful park in perpetuity."

Robin Falkenberg, past president of American Legion Post 512, agreed Devendorf Park is an ideal location, calling it a "blessing" to have a spot where the victims of 9/11 can be honored.

Commissioner Keith Paterson suggested the back of the steel be etched with its origin and history so there is never any potential of people not understanding its significance.

"I know we all know that this steel comes from the Twin Towers, but in years to come, that might not be quite as evident, and I'd like to think that for future generations, we could put something in writing somewhere behind the thing, perhaps — so that if taken apart, that would be notice where it came from," he said. "I would hate for it to be forgotten where it came from."

CarrieAnn agreed.

Commissioner Michael LePage thanked her for her efforts, and especially because she "listened to all the comments and came back with something that is in the context of what we already have in the park."

Commissioners unanimously voted to recommend the council approve the steel displayed on the smaller boulder near the koi pond at the northeast corner of the park. The council is set to consider the proposal at its

October meeting.

In the meantime, CarrieAnn is planning to have the steel moved to the Local History Room at the Harrison Memorial Library's park branch, across the street from Devendorf, where it will remain until next

A ceremony on Sept. 11 at 8:30 a.m. will

mark the move to the library, she said.

"It will be a beautiful and somber moment for all to attend," she said after the planning commission meeting.

The steel will stay in the library until the Devendorf Park memorial is unveiled on Sept. 11, 2013.

¬HE PRINCELY state of Rajkot, writes automotive journalist Gautum Sen, dates back to 1612, when a branch of the Jadeja clan from the state of Nawanagar split to create the state and the city of Rajkot, in what is present day Gujarat. With an area of just 720 square kilometers, the rulers of Rajkot were essentially wealthy landowners — taluqdars — and not fullfledged rajas, and so were known as *thakoresahebs*.

Such stories read like episodes from online adventure games of magic and myth, unfolding in battles won and lost in the forests and jungles, canyons and mountains of some far-away land. But this is not a computer game; it is India, a place where names were long and unusual, where power was gained and lost and, along with it, wealth. Over time, clansmen became rajas and maharajas kings and great kings — who built resplendent palaces and amassed exceptional automobile collections.

In 1934, Thakoresaheb Dharmendrasinhji Jadeja, who became the ruler of Rajkot in 1930, ordered a Rolls-Royce Phantom II, chassis 188PY, with cabriolet bodywork by Thrupp & Maberly. Known as the "Star of India," "this saffron orange and polished aluminum car is a testament to the finest melding of prewar design and the distinctive and flamboyant tastes of Indian royalty," notes

Once India gained independence in 1947, the magnificence of the maharajas began to disappear





The tour, which began Tuesday, Aug. 7, departed Seattle and traversed the Cascade Mountains, climbed Mount Hood and rimmed Crater Lake before driving down into California to cross the Golden Gate Bridge and catch the coastal highway to reach the Peninsula in time for the 62nd annual Pebble Beach Concours d'Elegance.


Mercer is a featured marque in this year's classic car convivium.

"I'll be perfectly satisfied if the Mercer makes it, and the car's still running when we get there," says Crowell. "It's noisy and goes pretty quickly but feels like it's going 10 times faster than it is. There's really no car to it. It has no doors, no windows, no top, and only a 4-inch-high windshield. It's a pretty tight fit. It won't be uncomfortable for me, because I'll be smiling so much. But it is going to be very hot and very cold. I'll have to check in with my passenger along the way."

Some would say the road to the Raceabout began in 1881, with the birth of Washington



Reunion pays tribute to American racing's most important man

NEVER intended to a be a driver — I only drove 10 years, and I always knew I wanted to build my own car," Carroll Shelby told The Pine Cone in a 2004 interview. "It's a very difficult business, but I'm successful enough that I haven't had to apply for food stamps, yet."

So said the man who left a greater impression and did more for automobile racing in the United States than perhaps any other. Shelby, who died in May at the age of 89, created an American racing icon — the Cobra — and in an the interview about

the pending auction of the first ever built, he commented, "The Cobra has to be my favorite, because that's what I'm known for."

Before his death, the Cobra had already been selected as the featured marque at this weekend's Rolex Monterey Motorsports Reunion and other Concours Week events. This year marks the Cobra's 50th anniversary, and officials at Mazda Raceway Laguna Seca have said the Aug. 17-19 races will showcase the largest gathering of original Cobras in one location, as well as a dedicated race of 45 authentic CSX 2000/3000 competition cars.

Shelby's career was varied — it even included a stint as a chicken farmer and the successful launch of a chili company he eventually sold to Kraft — but a unifying thread wove through much of the Texas native's work: fast machines. He served as a flight instructor and test pilot during his five years with the Army Air Corps during World War II before going on to race cars, and then to build them

"I got out of the Air Force and tried to go to

NE OF the most prolific of all automotive fine artists, 94-year-old Art Fitzpatrick makes his final appearance this year at the Automotive Fine Arts Society exhibit at the Pebble Beach Concours d'Elegance. The 27th annual one-day event will be staged Sunday, Aug. 19, on the 18th Fairway at Pebble Beach Golf Links.

"The wonderful cars, beautiful setting and interesting people have made the Pebble Beach Concours d'Elegance one of my favorite events," Fitzpatrick said. 

The foundation also works with the Concours to oversee the Phil Hill Scholarships, established in 2009 in memory of the Formula 1 World Drivers Champion, who won Best of Show at the Concours on two occasions and served among its judges for a record 39 years. The scholarships benefit students in college automotive restoration programs.

And by purchasing \$100 raffle tickets this year, Pebble Beach Concours attendees have a chance to win a Rolex watch, diamond earrings, a new Mercedes SUV, a Mini Cooper and a trip to England. The proceeds benefit the charities that are holding the raffles.

United Way Monterey County is one of 1,300 United Way offices in the United States that provides a host of charitable services for those in need.


From feeding the poor, to offering prescription drug discounts, the organization estimates that 1 in 3 Monterey County residents benefits from a United Way-funded agency.

on the community is tremendous. Through its fundraising efforts, nearly 30,000 hot meals have been served, 1,200 disabled people received support, and nearly 15,000 children participated in after school programs.

Some of the important services UWMC offers include its 211 program, which allows callers who dial the number to receive important information about health and human services; its "Earn it! Keep it! Save it!" program, which, provides free tax preparation services to low-income individuals and families throughout Monterey County; and FamilyWize, which offers free prescription drug discount cards.

■ Voices for Children

Leeza's future didn't look too bright. She'd been placed in foster care by the court for reasons she'd rather forget and found herself well behind her classmates — especially in reading. In fact, when she was 6, she couldn't read a single word. But the story has a happy ending: a Court Appointed Special Advocate from Voices for Children came into her life and worked with her every week to help her catch up. Now, a few years later, she's proud to have been named Student of the Month at her school and has been able to return to live with some extended family members. "We see some pretty amazing things," said Siobhan Green, who has been Voices for Children's executive director for a decade. They are just one of the charities that benefit annually from the Pebble Beach Concours d'Elegance.

Green is passionate about her work. "Over the last 10 years, we've saved at least a thousand chil-

dren," she said, noting that in 2011, the group worked with 151 neglected, abused or abandoned children who were declared dependents of the court. The organization assigns each child his or her own CASA, whose job it is to advocate for the child's well-being.

According to Green, it takes a special person to do the job — someone consistent, reliable and compassionate. Each candidate must also pass a background check and complete 40 hours of training. "Last year, we had 138 active advocates," Green said, "I could use 198." Sadly, Green has seen babies as young as 7 months old, although they normally deal with children between 3 and 18 years old. She describes them as "great kids who have had lousy shakes so far. They've had painful experiences where they should have had happy, fun ones. They need someone to be consistent, nurturing and kind with them."

Green worries about what happens to the children who "age out" of the system at 18. Right now, they can voluntarily request to remain in extended foster care for a year to transition to work or college. She'd like to see the laws change so that they could receive services until they're 21 years old.

Green shared the story of a former client who now volunteers with Voices for Children: "She never would have graduated from high school, but now she's attending community college. She's hard-working and focused."

The organization is grateful for the help it has received from Concours, which has totalled more than \$80,000. "We've been one of their charities for eight years. We hope as much as people take in the beautiful cars, they also take stock in themselves and the community and think about those who are in need." Green said.


Across the Peninsula at the headquarters of the Boys & Girls Clubs of Monterey County, CEO Donna Ferraro concurred. "We really appreciate the support of the Concours. We're fortunate to work in collaboration and partnership with them," she said. The group receives about \$50,000 annually from the organization that stages the Pebble Beach concours.

With help from that money, it runs two youth centers, one in Seaside and one in Salinas, along with some satellite after-school sites, serving 800 children daily. When Ferraro first started working with the clubs in 1991 as resource development director, they had nowhere near the reach they do today. "I think we had about 35 kids a day in a little church," she said, marveling at how much the clubs and their programs have grown.

One focus of the organization is literacy, with Ferraro noting that "70 percent of third-graders in Monterey County are below grade level in reading." In addition to literacy tutoring, the Boys & Girls Clubs of Monterey County has a math program for fourth graders. "It's not just homework help anymore," Ferraro said. Her goal is to see every child graduate from high school and then go on to college or a career.

In addition to academic success, the group focuses on encouraging healthy lifestyles and good character and leadership. Of course, the kids also get to have fun, not to mention something to eat. During the recent summer program designed to give youth a place to go when school is out, Ferraro estimated they served more than 70,000 meals and snacks at four sites, including both youth centers, and El Sausal and Harden Middle Schools in Salinas. "I'm proud of the fact that we've been able to deepen our impact and broaden our reach," Ferraro proclaimed.

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

2003, grew up around luxury automobiles. One of the first steam cars to come into India in 1903, a Miesse Turner, belonged to his grandfather, the Maharaja of Barwani, a title succeeded by his father.

"What got me to write about the history of automobiles in India," says Singh, "are the fairytale stories that appeared in the American and European automobile magazines in the late 1960s, about these fancy cars of the Maharajas. Many articles were written about how ridiculous the Maharajas were with their special, ordered cars. I was prompted to write by this feeling that the automotive world was misinformed about Indian culture, heritage and religious customs."

The maharaja cars, says Singh, are classified into four main categories: ceremonial, hunting, grand touring or sports, and cars made to shield royal Indian women from view. All were known for their exceptional coachwork, in keeping with the opulence of the maharajas. While the Star of India is widely recognized as one of the most beautiful cars of the maharajas, the Swan is equally renowned as one of the most bizarre.

"The Swan is a completely crazy car, created by a man who must have been bonkers," says Sen, who wrote, "The Maharajas & Their Magnificent Motor Cars," published in 2011. "Actually shaped like an enormous swan, this was one of the few cars not commissioned by a maharaja. The swan in Indian mythology is an extremely potent animal. But this was ordered by Robert Nicholl Matthewson, an eccentric Scot who lived in a part of Calcutta called Swan Park."

The car, for all its elegance, was banned for its eccentricity on the streets of Calcutta. In addition to hand-carved feathers, silver and gold-leaf fish and foliage, and custom hardware, it had amber lights glowing in its eyes, and its beak opened to spray steam to clean the street ahead. It also

released whitewash through a valve in the back.

"The Swan car," says Sen, "was eventually ought by a maharaja. Built in 1910 on a Brooke chassis, an English brand not well known, this type of car was not very expensive, a mid-priced car. But on this particular car, the maharaja spent as much as he would have for some six Rolls Royces. He even went on to commission a miniature version, a cygnet for his kids."

Guests of the Concours can anticipate just over a dozen maharaja cars, ranging from strange to stunning. One of Sen's favorites, on which he has devoted an entire book, is the Rolls-Royce Phantom I 17EX, an experimental one-off which was bought by the Maharaja of Kashmir. This car, once the pride of Spyker Cars CEO Victor Muller, is now owned by Alexander Schaufler from Vienna, Austria.

"The Phantom I 17EX," says Sen, "was one of

four extraordinary cars designed by Rolls-Royce in the 1920s that has a most distinguished history. It was the last of a series of lightweight experimental sports cars from the makers of the world's best motor cars."

Among the royalty en route to Pebble Beach is the Maharana of

Udaipur Arvind Singh Mewar, whose lineage dates back a millennium and a half. Mewar, says Sen, is a largerthan-life embodiment of princely India. Personifying what Sen considers the dignity, the hauteur and the mannerisms of a true maharaja, Mewar also is a quintessential car guy, having opened one of India's first classic and vintage car museums in February 2000.

"Among just 21 cars and trucks in the museum," says Sen, "all are special. Almost all are single-owner cars that belonged to the family of the maharana, cars that were acquired by his ancestors, the preceding maharanas, and then kept in the family for subsequent decades."

While many maharajas once had hundreds of cars, Mewar still does. The automobile he brings to the Concours is a Rolls-Royce his grandfather purchased some 70 years ago, which he has meticulously restored. And this likely is why he took time to offer a blessing over the automobile and a promise that it would return home, before it was shipped to California.


The cars of the maharajas bear witness to the automobiles built for India, and hold the history of the people for whom they were built. These opulent vehicles, many of which are making their maiden voyage out of India, will create an international gathering at the Pebble Beach Concours d'Elegance.

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
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

Augustus Roebling II, grandson of the man who designed the Brooklyn Bridge, and son of the man who built it. A college athlete and socialite fascinated by the automotive industry, Roebling backed up his interest with a degree in engineering and went to work for the Walter Automotive Company of New York. After the company relocated to New Jersey in 1908, Roebling II teamed up with chief engineer Etienne Planche to create the Roebling-Planche racing

The New York Times called it the fastest automobile in the world.

When the Walter Company went into financial distress a year later, the Roebling and Kusar families, both wealthy New Jersey names, bought the company at auction and named it Mercer Automotive Company after it in which it was established. Roebling took the helm. Once Planche left to work for Louis Chevrolet, he was replaced fortuitously by Finley Robertson Porter, who was able to turn Roebling's design into a car that would work on both racetrack and road. The result was the Mercer 35-R Raceabout.

In November 1910, driving the Raceabout, Roebling won second place at the International Light Car Race, for the Savannah Challenge Trophy. Raceabout production and

success on the racing circuit continued. In April 1912, however, while returning to the United States following a European driving tour, Roebling — a first-class passenger on the RMS Titanic — helped women and children into their lifeboats and went down with the ship. He was 31.

August 17, 2012

The Mercer Automotive Company continued for a few more years, but it was never the same. More than 85 years after the last Raceabout left the factory, it surfaced in Crowell's own story of automotive fascination.

How to pay for school

Crowell, who was raised in Monterey, where he served as student body president at Monterey High School before continuing his education at Monterey Peninsula College, paid for his early education by buying and selling cars. Before transferring to California State University Hayward (now East Bay) and finishing his education with a degree at UC Hastings College of Law, he worked for a Chevron station and drove a school bus.

Crowell recently bought back a 1940 Buick convertible, the same bright yellow as his Raceabout, which he had owned as a teen. His most recent purchase, the Mercer Raceabout, was actually triggered by the Pebble Beach classic car events.

"I went on the Pebble Beach Motoring Classic last year," says Crowell. "It was a phenomenal tour, and I thought I'd get to do it once in a lifetime. But in January, I saw an ad

for a Mercer touring car for sale which mentioned Mercer would be one of the marques at the Pebble Beach Concours this year. I thought maybe I could have another try at the tour. I'd buy it, drive it down, and find someone who would want to buy it."

Before Crowell bought the touring car, he learned about a Raceabout, "America's first sports car," and the last one to leave the Mercer factory before it shut down. The car, privately acquired in 1941, had been owned by the same family for more than 70 years. Crowell, who had owned a Mercer before, knew the Raceabout was the one he wanted.

As soon as he saw the car, Crowell also knew it had led a hard life. The car had been "rode hard and put away wet." It had received maintenance but had never been restored. With less than six months to go before the Concours d'Elegance, he bought the car in Seattle and had it shipped to Adams Custom Engines in Sparks, Nev. There they discovered the car had been constructed with various leftover parts, which they preserved to maintain the authentici-




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

a painting of a 1915 Mercer Raceabout with the Brooklyn Bridge in the background.

"I have a deep personal connection to this piece," Eberts said. "Growing up in New York, I admired that iconic bridge many times. And the

Mercer Raceabout has always been among my favorite cars."

August 17, 2012

In addition to his role as AFAS president, Eberts has established himself as a respected automotive fine artists. He won Best of Show at the AFAS exhibit in 1990 and 1992. In 2003, he was named Ford Motor Company's official Centennial Artist and commissioned to create 13 original paintings that were published in a commemorative calen-

dar. And in 2005, he became the first automotive artist to win Meguiar's "Treasure of the Hobby Award."

A fixture at the annual AFAS art exhibit, Eberts is happy to be back in Pebble Beach.

"It is an opportunity for AFAS members to share our passion for the automobile with others who appreciate the details and history behind the wonderful vehicles being featured in our pieces and on the greens," he added.

The art of the Ferrari

Also returning to Pebble Beach this year is Barry Rowe, who unveils a new series of acrylics on canvas that chronicle the history of Ferrari.

Rowe's display includes striking renderings of a red Ferrari 250 GT SWB Berlinetta parked on the outskirts of a quaint Italian village, and the 1934 Scuderia Ferrari Racing Team in Barcelona relaxing after practice.


A native of England and a member of the AFAS since 1997, Rowe is thrilled to be back in Pebble Beach.



to find out what the subject will be because it determines which artistic approach I will use to tell the story, whatever it may be."

Capturing a moment

Making his Concours debut this year is Austrian artist Klaus Wagger, whose work includes a painting that pays tribute to racing legend Rudolf Caracciola, who was known as the "Regenmeister" — or "Rain Master" — for his ability to drive in wet weather.

"The spray and reflections in the wet surfaces add a dimension of drama," Wagger explained. "This was an intense competitive period in racing history, and Caracciola delivered a magnificent performance against daunting odds. It's a moment worth capturing on canvas."

Putting together the pieces

Employing equal parts realism and impressionist, painter Jay Koka designed this year's Concours poster, which depicts William "Chip" Connor's 1936 Hispano-Suiza J12 parked in front of The Lodge at Pebble Beach.

"This painting was one of my most challenging commissions," Koka explained. "The car is undergoing major restoration and was literally in pieces when I started working on the painting. I had to consult restorer Brian Hoyt and owner Chip Connor to understand the changes that the Hispano-Suiza would undergo. In a sense, the painting existed before the car was complete."



ty of the automobile.

They also learned that Crowell's car, one of possibly two remaining Series 6 Raceabouts, is the only Mercer to receive factory-installed, fourwheel brakes. "All of the other Raceabouts," says Crowell, "went like hell but wouldn't stop." This one, at tour's end, will stop on the 18th Fairway to make its post-restoration debut at the Concours d'Elegance.

"The automobile has a great deal to do with who we are and how we got there," says Crowell. "It gave us the freedom to head down the road to get somewhere else in life. A lot of guys started building cars in their garage. Some started by building the Brooklyn Bridge. I guess I started at a Chevron station in Monterey."

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because I have attention deficit disorder, I guess," he said during the 2004 interview when he was 81. "I loved autos, airplanes and steam locomotives, and I wondered which I would try to make a living out of."

He had a friend who owned a little MG-TC race car, so he decided to give that a try. Shelby discovered he was good at racing cars, achieving several victories. He broke the landspeed record at Bonneville, and Sports Illustrated named Shelby Driver of the Year in 1956 and 1957, putting him on the cover. He took the checkered flag in the 1956 Pebble Beach Road Race in a Ferrari 750 Monza. (The races ended that year, after driver Ernie McAfee crashed his Ferrari into a tree and

During an in-person interview at The Quail — A Motorsports Gathering that featured Shelby and his cars two years ago, he commented on the honor of being SI's cover boy with the humility that was characteristic of him: "Ferraris were the best cars, so we won more races than anybody, and Sports Illustrated had to write about somebody, so they wrote about me."

He soon went overseas, first racing for Aston Martin, and ended up staying there for several years.


"I was in Dallas, Texas, and had three kids, and three years later, I was driving for a factory team in Europe," he said in the 2004 interview with The Pine Cone. "I knew all the time I wanted to build my own car. Driving was never my No. 1 priority, even though I enjoyed it."

He learned a lot about Maserati, Ferrari and Aston Martin, including how the companies worked and how they designed and built their cars.

In 1960, Shelby drove in his last race, piloting a Tipo 61 Maserati Birdcage at Laguna Seca — a track that was close to his heart for his entire life. Illness ended his racing career, and he began to pursue his dream of designing.

The following year, he learned AC Cars in England had lost its source for motors, and Shelby worked out a deal with the company in which he would design a sports car on an AC chassis powered by a Ford V8.

Prone to keeping a pencil and paper next to his bed to record any significant thoughts that came to him during the night, Shelby reportedly awakened one morning to discover the word, "Cobra," scribbled there. Naturally, he named the first sports car he designed accordingly, and in 1962, the first Cobra CSX 2000 was completed for the New York Auto Show. Ford committed to building the car for production, and it entered its first race in 1962 and remained in production until 1967, with smalland big-block motors as options.

"I thought it would have all gone away many, many years ago, and some way, it survived," Shelby said in 2004.

Tributes planned

According to Mazda Raceway Laguna Seca officials, Shelby — who never missed the historic races at the track — had insisted he was coming this year and he had said he was looking forward to reconnecting with old friends, engineers and others who had been involved in the Cobra project over the years.

Tributes to him and his cars include not only the special racing class, but a Shelby Cobra Heritage Display presented by Ford Motor Company, a Cobra Car Show on Pit Lane Saturday for all authentic street and race Cobras, a Cobra Car Corral with hundreds of authentic and replica cars, Carroll Shelby special tribute laps, and a Picnic Q&A with a Shelby American team member.

Another of Shelby's many designs, the GT350 Ford Mustang, will also have a dedicated race this weekend, as well as a corral.

At The Quail in 2010, Shelby recalled the beginning of the Mustang's new life as a sports car to be reckoned with. "Lee Iacocca called me one day and said, 'Shelby, the guys at Ford have struck out at turning this into a sports car," he said of the Mustang, which "came out with a three-speed gearbox and a sixcylinder engine and sold for \$2,395, and was known as 'a secretary's sports car."

Iacocca told Shelby to transform the Mustang "into a real sports car," to which Shelby responded, "You can't make a mule into a racehorse," but Iacocca was unswayed.

"He said, 'I didn't ask you that. I told you to do it,' and I said, 'Well, we'll try."

The first Shelby Mustang GT350

debuted in 1965, and the Mustang project continued until 1969, when sales slowed. His long-term racing agreement ended with Ford the following year, and he went on to design and build high-performance cars for Chrysler based on Dodge products, including the Charger and what would become the Viper.

In 1990, he underwent a transplant, to receive the heart of "a 38year-old gambler from Las Vegas," and in 1991, he launched the Carroll Shelby Children's Foundation to fund heart transplants for indigent kids. He was also inducted into International MotorSports Hall of Fame and the Automotive Hall of Fame, among many other honors.

Shelby remained involved in motorsports and the automotive world until the end of his life, yielding new designs like the Shelby GT and launching a new arm of his company devoted to performance auto parts. He also broadened the mission of his foundation and started a new food company to help support it.

Nonetheless, he claimed others, not him, were the smart ones.

At The Quail, he told the audience, "I still don't know how a car works. And you know what? I don't want to know how, because there's a hell of a lot smarter people who know how to build them out there than me. I just want to spend my time trying to find those people and I want to give credit to those people who made it happen."
