Eastwood says his convention appearance was 'mission accomplished'



AFTER A week as topic No. 1 in American politics, former Carmel Mayor Clint Eastwood said the outpouring of criticism from left-wing reporters and liberal politicians after his appearance at the Republican National Convention last

Thursday night, followed by an avalanche of support on Twitter and in the blogosphere, is all the proof anybody needs that his 12-minute discourse achieved exactly what he

"President Obama is the greatest hoax ever perpetrated on the American people," Eastwood told The Pine Cone this

week. "Romney and Ryan would do a much better job running the country, and that's what everybody needs to know. I may have irritated a lot of the lefties, but I was aiming for people in the middle."



For five days after he thrilled or horrified the nation by talking to an empty chair representing Obama on the night Mitt Romney accepted the Republican nomination for president, Eastwood remained silent while pundits and critics debated whether his remarks, and the rambling way he made them, had helped or hurt Romney's chances of winning in November.

But in a wide-ranging interview with The Pine Cone Tuesday, he said he had conveyed the messages he wanted to convey, and that the spontaneous nature of his presentation was intentional, too.

"I had three points I wanted to make," Eastwood said. "That not everybody in Hollywood is on the left, that Obama has broken a lot of the promises he made when he took office, and that the people should feel free to get rid of any politician who's not doing a good job. But I didn't make up my mind exactly what I was going to say until I said it."

Eastwood's appearance at the conven-

Head-on Highway 1 crash injures five in Big Sur

 \mathbf{F} IVE PEOPLE were hospitalized Sept. 2 when a motorist tried unsuccessfully to pass a string of cars along Highway 1 near Soberanes Point and collided head-on with a truck driven by a Big Sur resident.

The woman — Karin Cumming, 66 — suffered a broken back and other injuries.

Harshad Mohammed of San Jose, 27, was driving a 2012 Mercedes GL450 northbound on Highway 1 Sunday at about 8:30 p.m. when he tried to make the pass. The stretch of Highway 1 Mohammed was traveling on — located about eight miles south of Carmel — is one of the few segments of the scenic route that allows drivers to pass legally, as long as they

But before he could complete the pass, Mohammed's Mercedes crashed into a 2003 Toyota Tacoma driven by Cumming, according to California Highway Patrol spokesman Robert Lehman.

Cumming's daughter, Michelle, meanwhile, provided The Pine Cone with her mother's recollection of the accident. "My mom came around Soberanes Point and was coming down the hill when she saw a whole line of cars in the northbound lane,"

Much ado over latest version of Ft. Ord's future

A TOWN hall meeting presided over by Mayor Jason Burnett and 5th District County Supervisor Dave Potter in city hall Tuesday was intended to raise issues about Fort Ord's reuse specific to Carmel but mostly served as a venue for residents from the broader Peninsula — including Marina politicians to vent their concerns about development on the old Army

The most important point for Carmel, Burnett said after the meeting, is the recent designation of Fort Ord as a National Monument, as it will benefit his city and all Peninsula jurisdictions by drawing more visitors. He also said the 15-year-old base reuse plan that outlines how the former base — which is roughly 45 times the size of the city of Carmel — should be

Cop's stab wound may have been self-inflicted

■ Or maybe one of '30 to 40' girlfriends did it

WITHIN DAYS of a Seaside police officer's report that he had been stabbed outside his Pacific Grove home shortly after 2 a.m. July 31 by a Hispanic male who fled in a silver Honda, questions about his story began circulating. Chatter increased after word spread the Monterey County District Attorney's Office had served a search warrant at Justin Gill's Forest Avenue home.

While D.A. investigator Ryan McGuirk told The Pine Cone a few weeks ago that his office routinely serves search warrants on crime victims, the extensive "statement of probable cause" submitted to the court Aug. 3 by DA investigator John Coletti and made public this week shows that officers investigating the alleged stabbing had immediate questions about the veracity of Gill's story.

The information was sufficient for Monterey County Superior Court Judge Pamela Butler to authorize the warrant Aug. 7

According to Coletti, Gill, 29, told conflicting stories about the stabbing, was evasive about possible enemies who might want to harm him — including former girlfriends or their angry spouses — and was uncooperative with P.G. police attempting to investigate the incident. In addition, evidence, such as blood found throughout the home, seemed to contradict his description of events.



Council workshop to ponder Rio Park

■ Meeting next day will focus on refinancing, board appointments, zoning

AN INFORMAL workshop Monday evening will focus on plans for Rio Park, a stretch of land near the Carmel Mission that the city hasn't been able to use for much more than a storage yard since purchasing it years ago, Mayor Jason Burnett announced this week.

"I want people to come with their general ideas and any

concerns they have, but we don't have a plan yet," he said. "We're just at the early stages of listening and kicking off this

He also wants to ensure neighbors know the city is considering what to do with the land, and that constituents understand the money used for planning and implementing anything is already sitting in a reserve account specifically dedicated for Rio Park.

"In these financial times, we wouldn't otherwise be able to do this. We're not just taking money from the general fund," he said. "The decision was made by the council that we might as well get started, because that money is just sitting and losing value, and we might as well put that to use now."

The reserve account contains about \$140,000, according to Burnett, and the council allocated \$40,000 to begin planning, and maybe even do some site work, this fiscal year.

The Carmel City Council Workshop will be held from 5:30 to 6:30 p.m. Sept. 10 in the chambers at city hall.


On Tuesday, Sept. 11, starting at 4:30 p.m., the council will hold its regular monthly meeting, which will include the awarding of construction contracts for the San Antonio Trail Installation Project, a beach boardwalk and platform, road improvements and tree pruning. The contracts will be OK'd without discussion unless a council member or someone from the audience requests otherwise.

Public hearings will include further discussion of ways to refinance some of the city's retirement fund debt, ratification of board and commission appointments, and amendments to the zoning code and local coastal implementation plan for new rules on single-family homes, two-unit residential projects and mixed-use projects in the commercial zones. 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Murderer sentenced to 26 years to life

SUNNY NGUYEN, the 28-year-old Seaside resident who stabbed and beat his ex-girlfriend's mother to death in her 17 Mile Drive home on Nov. 21, 2010, while his young children were in another room, was sentenced last week by Monterey County Superior Court Judge Mark Hook to 26 years

County prosecutor Gary Thelander said Hood addressed Nguyen, who had claimed the murder was a crime of passion, at the Aug. 30 sentencing, saying, "[You] went through the kitchen and looked through every drawer, passing knife after knife, until you found the biggest, most lethal knife you could to execute the victim."

The sentencing followed a jury's July 31 conviction of Nguyen for the first-degree, premeditated murder of 46-year-old Judith Salazar, grandmother of his two children. Police discovered Salazar dead on the floor of her home, and Nguyen lying nearby with wounds of his own, after a cab driver reported the man had not emerged from the house to pay his fare.

'Nguyen took a cab to Salazar's home on 17 Mile Drive in Pacific Grove and killed her with a large kitchen knife after having unsuccessfully attempted to beat her to death with a heavy sauce pan," Thelander reported.

During the trial, it was reported a family member had told Nguyen to stay away from the woman's house, but he went anyway, and Salazar let him inside. In court testimony, Nguyen admitted that when they began arguing, she asked him to leave, and when he was locked out, he became enraged and found a way back in.

Nguyen's two small children — an 8month-old boy and a 2-year-old girl — were in the house at the time of the attack but were in another room and remained unharmed. Salazar suffered "multiple blunt force trauma injuries to her head, broken ribs and multiple stab wounds." A forensic pathologist testified she had died either from a stab

wound to the heart or lacerations to her neck. Nguyen was flown by helicopter to a trauma center for treatment of his stab wounds and lacerations, but was later moved to Monterey County Jail, where he has remained in cus-

At the Aug. 30 sentencing, Thelander said, Salazar's brother-in-law told the court, "The loss is to so many, and the blame goes to a man she believed, regardless of circumstances, would protect his own young family. But he brutally took, in his children's presence, the future of their grandmother; with that same cruel unforgivable act, he threw away his fatherhood."

Remorse = responsibility

Thelander also reported Jesse Roger, the victim's ex-husband, said her teaching career had 20 years to go, telling the court, "Think of all the children she can no longer help. Sunny has changed the life of thousands of people by his acts."

Defense attorney Richard Rosen read into the record Nguyen's letter claiming he feels remorse for the murder, but Thelander said, "The judge responded that being remorseful is linked to taking responsibility," and "expressed directly to Nguyen that it was difficult to believe his claims of remorse after listening to his 'well prepared and well rehearsed testimony' designed to convince the jury that the act was done in the heat of passion without the intent, reflection or premeditation required to support a murder con-

But the court found Nguyen's testimony "was not credible, citing in particular his claim that he picked up a pot and a knife at the same time.

That claim was inconsistent with the physical evidence, as well as common sense, according to Thelander, and Hood was "persuaded that when Nguyen was unable to kill the victim with the pot, he went back to the kitchen to switch weapons."

Nguyen will be assigned to a state prison by the department of corrections.

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A COLLABORATIVE effort between firefighting agencies and residents of Big Sur's South Coast aims to bet-

ter protect some of Monterey County's most remote homes from wildfires. Work gets under way this fall to remove overgrown vege-

tation in communities along Willow Creek, South Coast Ridge and Plaskett Ridge roads, as well as Gorda Mountain, Nocarubi and the New Camaldoli Hermitage. In exchange for a matching "in-kind" contribution of

labor, the U.S. Forest Service is offering South Coast residents a \$178,633 taxpayer-funded grant to remove fire-prone vegetation. Many matching grants require recipients to raise an equal amount of money instead of labor.

While removing stubborn vegetation from steep hillsides is tough work, South Coast resident and Big Sur volunteer firefighter John Handy said it's a necessary task.

"Look at the devastation these fires create," Handy said.

"The damage to communities can be immense. We have to get organized and make our communities safer."

SOUTH COAST RESIDENTS LAUNCH ASSAULT ON FIRE-PRONE CHAPARRAL


One of best ways to improve safety in rural communities is making roads and driveways accessible to firefighting

"We're trying to improve the ingress and egress of roads so it's safe to evacuate residents, and firefighters can get in," said Dick Ravitch, a Big Sur resident who serves as vice president of the Fire Safe Council for Monterey County.

In addition to making rural communities more accessible to firefighters, the project will help homeowners comply with a law — California Resources Code section 4291 that requires 100 feet of "defensible space" around struc-

While the U.S. Forest Service is supplying the project's funding, the Fire Safe Council and the Big Sur Volunteer Fire Brigade are offering a variety of administrative support. Cal Fire, meanwhile, is also lending a hand.

"Cal Fire has helped enormously with the project,"



In 2008, a huge fire burned almost 200,000 acres and destroyed 24 homes, turning trees into torches. To help prevent this happening again, state law requires 100 feet of clear space around every dwelling, and Big Sur residents have begun a new effort to comply.

Ravitch added. "They're doing a lot of mapping, and they're overseeing all the environmental and archaeological compli-

The South Coast business community is helping with the project as well — Treebones Resort, the New Camaldoli Hermitage and Gorda Springs Resort are donating varying combinations of equipment, food, lodging and labor.

The work is expected to be completed in June when the next fire season begins. When the project is finished, an estimated 176 acres of land will be cleared.

According to Handy, fewer than 100 families live on the South Coast, which locals call the part of Big Sur that lies south of Esalen Institute. "They're spread out all over the place," Handy said.

A similar effort to clear brush in the Big Sur Valley area was completed in March. The project was funded by a \$436,000 grant of taxpayers' funds from Forest Service.

her daughter explained. "[Mohammed] pulled out to pass and my mom said, 'Oh my God.' She hit her brakes and hoped he'd get back into the northbound lane, but he had nowhere to go, and he slammed his car into her vehicle. There's a 50-foot skid mark from his car in the soundbound lane.'

In addition to suffering a broken back, Cumming broke her right foot.

"Her foot needs surgery," her daughter explained. "She's bruised and battered."

Despite her mother's injuries, her daughter said she was very lucky.

"The airbag worked perfectly," she said. "I could kiss


Mohammed and the three passengers who were traveling with him suffered only minor injuries. All patients were treated at Community Hospital. While the incident is still under investigation — and

Mohammed could still be cited for his role in it — Lehman said the CHP has determined that drugs or alcohol did not play a part in the accident.

Cumming, who has lived in Big Sur for nearly three decades, once owned Polaris Gallery, which was located first at Post Ranch Inn, and later in The Barnyard shopping cen-

In addition to the CHP, the Mid-Coast Volunteer Fire Brigade responded to the incident. According to Cumming's daughter, a motorcycle-riding couple directed traffic until deputies and volunteers arrived.

GUNSMITHING IS in Ray Parga's blood.

His dad, Joe, was a sergeant and an armorer in charge of weapons at Pacific Grove Police Department. "And as a kid," said Parga, now 42 and owner of del Valle Gunsmithing in Marina, "I took my cap guns apart all the time."

Parga, who runs his shop with the help of a couple of dedicated employees, has numerous private customers but is also responsible for servicing, repairing and maintaining firearms for several Monterey Peninsula agencies, including the PGPD and the Presidio of Monterey P.D.

The work can be routine, like repairing shotguns that have been bounced around in patrols cars and cleaning firearms that have been used for frequent training, but it can also be intense.

"The Presidio police have over 100 handguns, 50 rifles and a bunch of shotguns," he said. "Working on all of them takes about a week, and it's once a year."

He also services weapons for Salinas P.D. and a few other agencies, and has gotten out-of-state commissions, like the FBI agent in Dallas who sent in his rifle with the order he "make it look like it's been used."

"The scope on it runs about \$3,000," he said. "So I was a little nervous."

But when the weapon was finished, he was happy with the result, and its accuracy.

Customizing firearms is among his favorite tasks, and a project he took on for Del Rey Oaks Police Chief Ron Langford made him so proud the gun he made — a Colt Custom Government 45 — adorns his business card.

"It was funny, I went into the station one morning, and Chief handed me the Colt and said, 'Make it cool,' to which I said, 'OK,'" he recalled.

The work included adding new sights, installing an Army-style grip safety, making alterations to distribute recoil over a broader area, and stippling the front of the grip to create texture.

"Stippling is a process where are series of punches of different sizes and shaped are struck against the grip in order to raise burrs and roughen the gripping surface," he explained. "It can be laid out as a particular pattern or it can be a totally random pattern. On Langford's Colt, I think I used a total of nine punches."

He also made the gun more accurate and easier to load, and applied a Teflonbased finish that holds up well in humid weather.

Langford asked Parga to etch his shop's initials and the chief's name on it.

But the grip is perhaps the most eye-catching aspect of the weapon, showing an axe-wielding Grim Reaper and the words, "The Site."

Learning to shoot

Parga, of course, also enjoys shooting competitively (awards compete for wall space alongside work orders in his shop), and he has considered offering one-on-one teaching, though his workload tends to interfere. An FBI-certified instructor, he's a big proponent of Gunsite, the school in Arizona launched by the late Jeff Cooper, who is recognized internationally as one of the foremost experts on handgun shooting.

Resources for people interested in learning how to shoot or keep up their skills

are sparse here. The county operates a public range at Laguna Seca, and a few private clubs have their own facilities, such as White Rock in Carmel Valley. Parga taught a civilian class with Bob Ingersoll, CEO of Operational Skills Group, in San Jose last October, "but it's always hard to find a range," he said.

As for his own taste in firearms, he's drawn to "the Old West stuff" and weapons made at the turn of the century, when craftsmen went to work in shirts and ties, and computer-aided design and manufacturing were things of the far distant future.

Finding gems


He also sells a wide range of weapons and ammunition at his Marina shop. Occasionally, heirs bring in collections about which they know little, and he helps them get the most possible cash for their goods.

"Sometimes people bring stuff that's worth a lot, and they don't think it's worth anything," he said. His regular customers often stop by to check out the inventory and see what's new — and what they should add to their wish lists.

Raised in P.G., Parga spent most of his weekends in high school at the firing range and was set to pursue his passion by attending Lassen Community College's gun school. Instead, he landed a job at the municipal golf course, putting him on a 15-year sidetrack that ended when he was "booted out" due to a back injury.

That was perhaps fortuitous, since it led him back to the trade he had intended in the first place. In 1996, he took on a couple of jobs for Jaime del Valle, who owned a small gun shop above the Carmel Valley Market in the Village and had known Parga since he was a teenager. Del Valle, who has since moved on to other trades but remains a local presence as a battalion chief at Cachagua Fire and a reserve officer at Del Rey Oaks, had major accomplishments under his belt, including custom-building guns for the Prince of Dubai and other international royalty.

"He asked me if I wanted a spot at the bench," Parga recalled, and he began with basic cleaning and servicing, taking firearms apart and working through each piece with the appropriate solvents and materials, before moving on to the more elaborate work of pistol smithing.

Del Valle kept his protege busy until he got tired of running the business, including locking everything up with cables nightly since the landlord wouldn't allow him to install bars on the windows.

"He said he was going to close the shop unless I wanted to buy it, so I cashed in one of my retirement accounts, bought the shop and re-outfitted it with what I needed," Parga said, including the hand tools he preferred for working on weapons. Del Valle left him the

miller for machining parts, and he maintained a steady trade for five years until finally outgrowing the 500-square-foot Village location.

Parga learned about a vacant storefront on Reindollar in Marina from a fellow Del Rey Oaks reserve police officer who owns a heating and sheet metal business nearby. "It used to be a recording studio then a

"It used to be a recording studio, then a comic book shop, then a beauty salon," he recalled, and the owner told Parga he could do whatever he needed to make the space work to bring it up to the state's standards for a gun shop, including bars on the windows and other reinforcements.

The huge safe "took four or five people to move in here when it was empty," Parga remembered.

He opened the new del Valle Gunsmithing in Marina in July 2009.

"I'm lucky, because I get to do something I like to do anyway," he said. "And I get paid for it"

DOC RICKETTS REMEMBERED AND RENDERED ON FILM

PINE CONE intern Lily Patterson met two weeks ago with 93-year-old Frank Wright, who was a close friend of Ed "Doc" Ricketts, the famous Monterey marine biologist who died in 1948. Wright was recently interviewed for the upcoming documentary film, "For Ed Ricketts."

I RAN up the rickety steps of the lab and paused in front of the door. I wasn't quite sure what to expect upon my arrival. Maybe a full film set, with glaring lights, makeup artists and racks of clothing? Or would I find a few offbeat Bohemians, united by their desire to tell an historic story and a passion for marine biology?

Neither proved true, but I wasn't about to be disappointed.

Walking inside Ed Ricketts' lab at 800 Cannery Row, I encountered a group of extremely personable individuals, all of whom I was immediately introduced to by filmmaker P.J. Palmer, who is directing the documentary, "For Ed Ricketts." Among those present were the interviewee of the day, the cheerful film crew and their three cameras, and a smattering of visitors who (like me) had come to watch the process of the documentary unfold.

The wood-paneled room was filled with vintage posters, drawings, and stacks of books and records, an appropriately eclectic set for a documentary about Ed Ricketts, renowned equally for his work in marine biology as for his constant companionship and inspiration to John Steinbeck. Despite being in the epicenter of everything Ricketts, the crowd's real focus was on a man sitting on a plastic chair in a dusty corner.

His name was Frank Wright. Not Frank Lloyd Wright, mind you, although he did mention that the post office had confused their mail on more than one occasion. More importantly than sharing his name with a legendary architect, Wright was one of Ricketts' oldest Peninsula friends, the pair having been introduced over a pint of Burgermeister in 1942 during an Army stint at the Presidio. Along with this being the day of his film debut, it was Wright's 93rd birth-


Over the next hour of his filmed interview, Wright proved to be quite the resource for Palmer and his team. He recalled that the lab was a "magnet for fun" on the "wreck" that Cannery Row was in Ricketts' time. With his dry sense of humor and sharp memory, Wright recounted tales of life-changing abalone dinners ("It was a little bit of heaven"), and evenings filled with classical music, mentioning that his friend "loved the Gregorian chant, Beethoven, Scarlatti." Deep into the interview, Wright divulged many previously unknown stories, from the time Ricketts' furnace exploded, to the identity of a creature that once had lurked within the lab. His favorite story, however, was the one about why Steinbeck gave Ricketts the nickname, "Doc." I'll leave these tales for the documentary to

Along with recounting his more comical memories, Wright became sentimental when recalling Ricketts' more endearing character attributes. Despite being "a very intense and brilliant guy," Wright explained that Ricketts was "soft spoken and had lots of friends," his closest being Steinbeck. "I would say to know Ed was to like him or to love him. Everyone liked him. I never knew anyone who didn't."

After the interview, we moved into the adjoining room. With twinkling lights overhead, we sang happy birthday to Frank Wright, eating chocolate-cherry cake while admiring the lab's ocean view.

Standing on the outdoor porch, Wright pointed out the tanks and other apparatuses

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



updated to capitalize on the designation as much as possible.

Burnett, the newest member of the Fort Ord Reuse Authority board, said he found the meeting helpful in hearing people's concerns. He pointed out the regular FORA board meetings are not only more formal — discouraging the backand-forth exchanges typical of town hall meetings — but are

held on Friday evenings in Marina, not the most conducive for attendance by Carmel residents.

FORA executive officer Michael Houlemard and a couple of other staffers were also at the standing-room-only meeting, which initially focused on the base reuse plan that was drafted in 1997 and is undergoing an overhaul. The plan envisioned installing a population of 37,000 to make up for the Army's departure, creating 18,000 jobs to replace military employment, providing 11,000 homes (6,160 of them new), building 3 million square feet of commercial space, and cre-

ating "balanced development ensuring economic and educational opportunities with environmental preservation."

So far, the former base is home to 12,500 people, has provided 3,700 jobs, and includes 4,000 replacement homes (391 new) and 660,000 square feet of commercial space, including the big-box shopping center at the Marina end of the base.

"The military left us with 5,700 buildings," Houlemard said. "There are still 4,500 that need to be removed," because they can't be rehabilitated.

The anchor of the reuse is California State University Monterey Bay, and other educational organizations, such as the Monterey College of Law, have built there, too. Community Hospital of the Monterey Peninsula opened its expansive health and wellness center near the shopping center, and other plans are in the works.

Potter provided a little historical perspective.

When FORA was first formed in 1994, proposed uses for the base included a federal prison and a Disneyland North amusement park. "We decided those weren't a real good idea, but perhaps an academic institution base as the core," he said.

Former Carmel City Councilwoman and Carmel Residents Association President Barbara Livingston was the first to speak her mind about FORA, on which she served as an alternate years ago.

"It was very disappointing for me to see the changes that had been made by the cities and the county and the FORA to the plan that Sam Farr and Leon Panetta had envisioned," she said, claiming that, "they didn't want any development seen from Highway 1." A shopping center and an upscale housing development are easily seen from the road.

Several attendees, some speaking more than once, followed Livingston with their concerns, which included the brouhaha a traffic ticket Houlemard received in Carmel, FORA's spending, Potter's position on Monterey Downs (he denied having one), whether acreage would be preserved for the Esselen Nation as reportedly promised, the rights of recreational users to hike and bike on roads and trails, the troubles and perils of cleaning up contaminated land and unexploded ordnance, and the housing development at East Garrison, which one speaker described as a "popup ghetto."

Potter said permits were issued for East Garrison, and a developer purchased the rights to build it. Construction should begin in February 2013, with homes on the market four months later.

Houlemard said \$30 million has been spent on cleanup efforts at the base, which had been used by the military since it was a site for calvary exercises in the 19th century.

"Reclaiming military bases is the most difficult thing this government is trying to do," he said, because "almost none were built to code," and many of the buildings contain lead-based paint inside and out, asbestos, leaking solvents, termites and other hazards.

Overall, people acknowledged the base reuse plan will have to be updated to reflect the current economic conditions and demands for housing on the Monterey Peninsula, among other factors. The process, which requires environmental review, will take at least two years, according to Houlemard.

Ft. Ord National Monument

After the meeting, Burnett told The Pine Cone the revised plan will also have to capitalize upon Fort Ord's status as a National Monument.

"Back when the base reuse plan was put in place, the concept of a National Monument was not part of it, and now that it's a reality, the plan needs to be adjusted," he said.

The document should include provisions for making the entry corridors to the monument attractive to tourists — especially the entrance on Highway 1.

"The designation is a game changer," he said, because people travel from all over the world to visit such sites.

"We have a real opportunity to boost Peninsula hospitality," he said. "It's an issue that matters to Carmel but also to all the cities on the Peninsula. It benefits all of us."

Burnett said several people at the meeting mentioned the need to "do the planning ourself" to take advantage of the federal government's "gift."

"Being that Gill has been evasive and reluctant to fully cooperate with law enforcement, I believe there are at least three possible scenarios that could have occurred that night: 1) Gill was stabbed as he reported; 2) Gill was stabbed by someone he knows and does not want to say what happened because it might damage his career; 3) Gill injured himself," Coletti wrote.

When he arrived to investigate the stabbing, which involved a single wound above Gill's left nipple, PGPD Sgt. Jeff Fenton met him walking out of the front door of his home dressed in pajama bottoms and wearing a head-mounted flashlight. His chest was bandaged, and he wore a holstered Glock handgun and his SPD badge on his hip. Fenton took the gun, which had blood on it, for safekeeping, and later, as Gill was walking to the ambulance gurney, he also gave Fenton a .357 revolver he'd been carrying in his front pocket "the whole time."

Gill reportedly told Fenton he'd heard knocking on the back door of his house shortly after 2 a.m., answered it and was stabbed by the unknown Hispanic male.

According to the statement, he later told PGPD officer Terry Baggett he heard noises "that did not sound right," grabbed his gun, went to investigate and was immediately stabbed when he opened the door.

Then he reportedly told PGPD officer Jeff Haas that he heard noises like doors being slammed, went to the back door to investigate, and opened it to see the suspect at the bottom of the porch steps. He said the man reached up with a single thrust and stabbed him in the chest.

All three officers reported Gill was very calm, which is not at all consistent with the typical demeanor of someone who has been violently attacked. Haas said he thought he smelled alcohol on Gill, too.

Further, Coletti wondered why Gill — a member of Seaside's SWAT team and trained as a sniper — did not react differently to the attack.

"I know that SWAT officers are professionally trained in police tactics and know how to apply their training when confronting possible threats," he wrote. "It is difficult to understand why Gill did not apply any of his training when he exited his house to investigate the noise."

Coletti questioned his account of where the assailant was standing. If the attacker were down a few steps or at the base of the five stairs leading to the porch, the investigator surmised it would be "difficult" to "impossible" to believe that a man described as being 5 foot 8 could have stabbed the 6foot-1-inch-tall Gill in the upper chest.

In the warrant, Coletti described the physical evidence observed and collected by DOJ senior criminalist Scott Armstrong, including a knife with blood on it in a desk drawer, and blood stains in a bathroom, kitchen, foyer, dining room, bedroom and on the carpet inside the front and back doors — but not on the back porch, steps or sidewalk.

Most of the blood, including many droplets that had fallen straight from Gill onto the floor, was found in the bathroom, some mixed with water. Three bloody footprints led from the bathroom, but none led to

Whodunit?

In the probable cause statement, Coletti also described Gill's conversation with another DA investigator regarding possible enemies and raised questions about his demeanor and answers.

"Gill said he has enemies but does not know anyone who would go so far as to stab him. Gill said he does not have a good repu-

tation with women. Gill has slept with other police officers' wives and has had affairs with married women," he wrote. "During the course of the year, Gill said he might date 30 to 40 women."

He reportedly told the investigator, "I don't know if we need to delve deeper into the enemy question, but there's people out there who aren't happy with me." Coletti said Gill "was evasive, vague and provided conflicting information" when it came to answering questions about his threat vulnerability and enemies who might do him physical harm.

As a result of the interviews, investigations and evidence, Coletti argued that the judge should allow investigators to also seize Gill's computer and other electronic devices, since they could include copies of any email or other contact with possible suspects, files and correspondence, email account records, his cell phone and call records, and a saliva sample for DNA testing to determine if the blood found on the knife in the drawer was

This week, assistant district attorney Terry Spitz had no comment on the case and would not say whether the warrant yielded the evidence investigators sought.

"We really don't have a statement," he said. "I cannot comment on the investigation at all — it's still under way, still wide open and we don't have a particular suspect in

Local producer, Hollywood star make film based on Faulkner novel

WITH CARMEL resident Lee Caplin serving as producer — and Hollywood star James Franco juggling the roles of director and actor — filming began last week in Mississippi for a screen version of William Faulkner's "As I Lay Dying."

While the filming just got started, Caplin and Franco have been talking about making the film for some time.

"I got a call from his manager about it six

years ago," Caplin explained, who has lived in Carmel off and on since 1994. An admirer of Faulkner's work, Franco's

manager contacted Caplin because he is the exclusive representative of Faulkner's estate. 'He was my next door neighbor in

Charlottesville, Va., when I was little," said Caplin of Faulkner, who died in 1962. Ranked by critics as one of the best nov-

els of the 20th century, "As I Lay Dying" tells the story of the matriarch of a poor Southern family whose dying wish is to be buried in her hometown.

"There are so many misfortunes in the story," offered Caplin, who is chairman of Picture Entertainment Corporation. "It's almost a black comedy. It can make you laugh, and it can make you cry."

According to Caplin, turning "As I Lay Dying" into a movie will not be an easy task, in part because the story is told from the perspective of multiple characters.

"James has picked what is probably the most challenging of Faukner's works to make into a film," Caplin suggested. "He's taking

Yet Caplin said he believes Franco is the right man for the job. "I'm very close to him," said Caplin of the actor and director. "He has the passion and the understanding of the material. We've talked about it for hours."

In "As I Lay Dying," Franco will play the role of Darl, one of family matriarch Addie Bundren's five children.

While Caplin and Franco had hoped to film the movie in Oxford, Miss. — where Faulkner lived for much of his life — they had to settle for the town of Raleigh, Miss.

Oxford, it turns out, is the home of the


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Reggae royalty comes to Sunset Center, Soul Train stops at Plaza

Paella lessons al fresco, chili smackdown, and a BBQ with a mission

ESTEBAN CHEF Tom Snyder will lead fans of Spanish cuisine through the labor intensive but satisfying process of making paella, using a 3-foot-diameter pan in the outdoor courtyard of his restaurant in the Casa Munras Hotel in Monterey Saturday,

The iconic dish comes in many iterations, depending on the region of Spain, such as the tomato sofrito-based versions in Barcelona and the squid-ink-based paella negra, which hails from Valencia. Seaside areas capitalize on seafood, while mountain areas feature goat, rabbit and other game.

"We'll do paella del mar, the one with the prawns and mussels and clams," over saffron-infused short-grain Spanish rice, he said. "There are a couple different versions we do here, but that's the one people think of." (That version is also Valencian.)

During the upcoming session of Paella on the Patio, which will run from 1 to 3 p.m., Snyder will discuss how to make the dish and get the guests involved in its preparation.

'So, we're going to have people chopping and talking about paella, and I'll be doing a little lecture about it," he said.

Meanwhile, they'll enjoy the Basque finger foods known as "pinxtos" that are common in tapas bars and sip on Sangria, beer, wine and Spain's sparkling wine, Cava. They'll then dig into generous portions of the finished product, of course, followed by "something sweet to finish your afternoon with us."

"It should be fun," Snyder said. "We've done one before to see how it worked, and we had just seven or eight for that one, but now we want to expand on it," to about 20 or 30 guests. And plans are already in the works for another session in the fall, though Snyder said no firm date has been set.

tion came after a personal request from Romney in August, soon after Eastwood endorsed the former Massachusetts governor at a fundraiser in Sun Valley, Idaho. But it was finalized only in the last week before the convention, along with an agreement to build suspense by keeping it secret until the last moment.

Meanwhile, Romney's campaign aides asked for details about what Eastwood would say to the convention.

"They vett most of the people, but I told them, 'You can't do that with me, because I don't know what I'm going to say," Eastwood recalled.

And while the Hollywood superstar has plenty of experience being adored by crowds, he said he hasn't given a lot of speeches and admitted that, "I really don't know how to." He also hates using a teleprompter, so it was settled in his mind that when he spoke to the 10,000 people in the convention hall, and the millions more watching on television, he would do it extemporaneously.

"It was supposed to be a contrast with all the scripted speeches, because I'm Joe Citizen," Eastwood said. "I'm a movie maker, but I have the same feelings as the average guy out there."

September 7, 2012

Eastwood is a liberal on social issues such as gay marriage and abortion, but he has strongly conservative opinions about the colossal national debt that has accumulated while Obama has been president, his failure to get unemployment below 6 percent, and a host of other economic issues.

"Even people on the liberal side are starting to worry about going off a fiscal cliff," Eastwood said.

Last minute decisions

But what — exactly — would he say to the Republican delegates about the \$16 trillion national debt and 8.3 percent unemployment rate?

Friends and associates weren't as much help as he had hoped.

"Everybody had advice for me, except the janitor," Eastwood said.

Early Thursday morning, when Eastwood left San Jose Airport on a private jet headed for Florida, he was still making up his mind. And even with his appearance just a few hours away, all Eastwood could tell Romney's campaign manager, Matt Rhoades and his aides, was "to reassure them that everything I would say would be nice about

Mitt Romney."

It was only after a quick nap in his hotel room a few blocks from the convention site, Eastwood said, that he mapped out his remarks — starting with his observation about politics in Hollywood, then challenging the president about the failure of his economic policies, and wrapping up by telling the public "they don't have to worship politicians, like they were royalty or something."

But even then, with just an hour before he appeared on stage, it still hadn't occurred to Eastwood to use an empty chair as a stand-in for the president.

"I got to the convention site just 15 or 20 minutes before I was scheduled to go on," he said. "That was fine, because everything was very well organized."

After a quick trip through airport-style security, he was taken to a Green Room, where Archbishop Dolan of New York sought him out to say hello. Then he was taken backstage to wait for his cue. And that was when inspiration struck.

"There was a stool there, and some fella kept asking me if I wanted to sit down," Eastwood said. "When I saw the stool sitting there, it gave me the idea. I'll just put the stool out there and I'll talk to Mr. Obama and ask him why he didn't keep all of the promises he made to everybody.'

He asked a stagehand to take it out to the lectern while he was being announced.

"The guy said, 'You mean you want it at the podium?' and I said, 'No, just put it right there next to it."

Then, with the theme song from "The Good, the Bad and the Ugly" as a musical introduction, and a huge picture of him as Josey Wales as the backdrop, Eastwood walked out to tremendous applause.

"The audience was super enthusiastic, and it's always great when they're with you instead of against you," he said.

'Enjoying themselves'

Speaking without any notes, Eastwood recalled the good feelings the whole nation had when Obama was elected, but said they had been dashed as the economy stayed in the doldrums despite massive stimulus spending. He decried the "stupid idea" of closing the detention center at Guantanamo Bay and putting terrorists on trial in New York City, joked about Vice President Joe Biden's intellect and quizzed empty-chair Obama about what he says to people about his failed economic policies. He pretended Obama told Romney to do something "physically impossible" to himself, said it's time to elect a "stellar businessman" as president instead of a lawyer, and, as a final point, told the people, "You own this country."

When an elected official doesn't "do the job, we've got to let 'em go," he said, and the crowd ate it up.

"They really seemed to be enjoying themselves," Eastwood said.

Originally, he was told he could speak for six or seven minutes, and right before he went on, he was asked to keep it to five, but he said, "When people are applauding so much, it takes you 10 minutes to say five minutes' worth.'

Also, there were no signals or cues of any kind, so "when you're out there, it's kind of hard to tell how much time is going by."

He also said he was aware he hesitated and stumbled a bit, but said "that's what happens when you don't have a writtenout speech.'

As he wrapped up his remarks, he was aware his presentation was "very unorthodox," but that was his intent from the beginning, even if some people weren't on board.

"They've got this crazy actor who's 82 years old up there in a suit," he said. "I was a mayor, and they're probably thinking I know how to give a speech, but even when I was mayor I never gave speeches. I gave talks."

Backstage, it was all congratulations and glad-handing, he said. And then he returned to the Green Room, where he listened to speeches by Marco Rubio and Mitt Romney. It wasn't possible for him to watch the media coverage of his presentation.

But the country was listening as the television reporters and commentators covering his speech reacted to it. And they hated it.

"I have to say, as a fan, a movie fan, this was exceedingly strange. It just seemed like a very strange, unscripted moment," said a shocked Andrea Mitchell on NBC.

"That was the weirdest thing I've ever seen at a political convention in my entire life," said Rachel Maddow on MSNBC, barely concealing the condescension in her voice.

Bob Schieffer of CBS said it was "a big mistake to put




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Clint Eastwood on before Mitt Romney."

On the Washington Post website, reporter Chris Cillizza wrote that "awkward' may be the kindest term we can think of" to describe Eastwood's speech.

"He hemmed. He hawed. He mumbled. He rambled," Cillizza wrote.

And on CNN, Piers Morgan said Eastwood was "going bonkers" on the stage and said his presentation "looked like complete chaos." He pressured his guests with questions like, "Weren't you in pain while he was up there?"

But Eastwood wasn't aware of any of it, and after the speeches were over, Romney and his running mate, Paul Ryan, came backstage to thank him.

"They were very enthusiastic, and we were all laughing," Eastwood said.

When he went outside to his car, a large crowd cheered and chanted lines from his speech.

An overnight rebellion

Back at his hotel, Eastwood had a room service dinner and went to bed. The next morning, he got up early and went straight to the airport, still unaware that his appearance was the No. 1 political topic in the nation.

"I read the Tampa newspaper, and every article said something negative about the convention, but there wasn't much about me," Eastwood said.

He had no idea that overnight, a rebellion had erupted online against the media's condemnation of him, with thou-

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
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Two more images from Twitter paying tribute to Clint Eastwood's remarks before the Republican National Convention Aug. 30.

sands of bloggers, Twitterers and commentators calling him, "a genius," "1,000 times more brilliant than the media," and saying he's "only gotten better with age."

They also started posting their own versions of Eastwood's empty chair in droves ("eastwooding"), and, on YouTube, replays of his remarks at the convention were being viewed millions of times.

Even into his 80s, Eastwood has an unprecedented record of success in Hollywood, and is still making two movies a year. He's currently starring in "Trouble with the Curve," and is about to direct a remake of "A Star is Born" — things he obviously couldn't do if he were a befuddled senior citizen. To locals who know him, the idea that he is uninformed or senile is laughable.

Nevertheless, the bitter criticism has continued.

On Tuesday, Democratic Senator Tom Harkin of Iowa, called Eastwood "the perfect icon of the Republican tea party: an angry old white man spewing incoherent nonsense.'

Eastwood said people, including reporters, who were shocked by his remarks "are obviously on the left," and he maintained that, while many Americans didn't like the way he handled his convention appearance, millions more have something else on their minds.

"A lot of people are realizing they had the wool pulled over their eyes by Obama," Eastwood said.

Oxford, it turns out, is the home of the University of Mississippi. And during football season, lodging is difficult to find and afford. "There are no deals during football season," Caplin observed.

Caplin was back home in Carmel this

week while Franco — who attended last fall's Carmel Art and Film Festival — took a four-day break from filming to attend the Venice Film Festival. The filming resumes Sept. 7 and will continue for two weeks.

While Caplin wouldn't say precisely how much the film will cost to make, he conceded its budget is "less than \$10 million."

"James makes close to that much for himself [when he makes a big budget movie],"


Caplin noted. "He really sacrificed his salary for the sake of making this film."

In addition to filming "As I Lay Dying," Caplin told The Pine Cone that he's working to bring other Faulkner stories to the Silver Screen. He's teaming up with "Deadwood" producer David Milch to create an HBO mini-series based on Faulkner's "Light in August." And he's also in talks with actor Morgan Freeman about another Faulknerrelated project.

After "As I Lay Dying" is completed. Caplin said he hopes to make Carmel his full-time home. It was Caplin's wife, noted pianist Gita Karasik, who introduced him husband to Carmel's charms. A gifted instrumentalist who played at the Carmel Bach Festival as a teenager, Karasik was the first American pianist to perform in China after the Cultural Revolution.



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
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
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







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What is media 'objectivity'?

T HE REACTION of supposedly disinterested television reporters and commentators to Clint Eastwood's remarks to the Republican National Convention last Thursday night told a story all by itself. Nevermind characters such as Rachel Maddow. She's a left-wing shill and admits it — it's her profit-oriented business model. But NBC News, CBS News and CNN purport to be objective, and the disdain, if not contempt, their broadcasters showed for Eastwood was unmistakable.

First of all, let's put aside the idea that Eastwood is senile. The man is 82 years old but still produces work than runs rings around anything that Bob Schieffer or Piers Morgan has ever done, or will ever do. He is a cinematic genius, and while his memory may have dimmed a bit and his hair thinned (whose hasn't?), the qualities that turned him into one of the most celebrated people in the world are still there. Making Hollywood movies is a torturously complicated and risky business, folks, and Eastwood does it (present tense) as well as anybody. For people to mock him for his age is just pure prejudice.

Secondly, it's important to remember what "objectivity" means in the journalistic sense. The concept does not require that equal weight be given to both sides on every issue; some issues only have one side with any credibility.

For example, nobody has to report the story told by a career criminal about his most recent crime with equal weight to the version told by police. Criminals lie even more often than they steal or kill, and a professional reporter will not give a known criminal the benefit of the doubt.

Likewise, nobody has to credibly report the claims of the Holocaust deniers, the people who think the moon landing never happened, or the people who believe aliens are held captive some place in Nevada. All these people are nuts and do not belong on the network news.

However, there are many issues over which millions of well intentioned, educated and ethical Americans vehemently disagree. A few current examples are gay marriage, abortion, affirmative action and whether tax cuts or government spending do a better job stimulating the economy. On all these issues, an objective reporter will strive to give both sides equal weight and respect.

Do the major news outlets in the country do that? Of course they don't. If you read the New York Times or watch the CBS Evening News regularly, you are aware that their "journalists" are adamantly and personally in favor of gay marriage, the right to choose (even in the third trimester), and giving preference to blacks and Hispanics in school admissions and hiring. And they are all certain that raising taxes so the government has more money to spend is the best path to economic recovery (not to mention more "fair").

In fact, on any issue of major public controversy, the only way to get objective reporting from one of these news outlets is if the editors and reporters aren't sure which side wears the white hats and which sides wears the black. A good example of this is Wikileaks founder Julian Assange. The New York Times can't make up its mind whether he's a good guy or a bad guy, and that's why its reporting about him has been pretty fair.

Which brings us back to Clint Eastwood. Was the hostile reaction to him among the major news media a result of the fact that his performance was, in fact, appalling, and that nobody with any credibility could possibly feel otherwise? Of course not. Millions of Americans loved what Eastwood did, and anyone with a drop of fairness in their blood, even if they personally didn't appreciate Eastwood's words or his delivery, could have foreseen that. Therefore, the network anchors, instead of being derisive, had an obligation to say, "That was a bit different, and some people are going to object to it, but plenty of people probably loved it."

Of course, that assumes that they want to be fair. Unfortunately, it has been obvious for a long time that they don't, and nowadays the proof of their bias practically hits you over the head. The hostility of dozens of supposedly non-partisan media figures to Eastwood's appearance stemmed from their admiration for President Obama and fervent desire to see him re-elected. As the election and the polls get closer, any prominent person with the temerity to disagree is going to find out pretty quickly how it feels, as Eastwood did, to be summarily vilified on national TV.

and the People's Choice award at the conclusion of the three-day U.S. Sand Sculpting Challenge in downtown San Diego. The competition is an invitational, with just 10 professionals in the Masters division.

"There were artists from Italy, Holland, Canada and the United States," he said.

Inspired by his daughters' dollhouse, which he came across while cleaning out the garage, and an ongoing series of heart-related pieces he's making, Croft created an anatomically correct heart in which each chamber contained elements of his home.

"Designing is the hardest part. The idea, the concept has to be solid," he said. And when a good idea and skills merge perfectly, "you have a

He also said his subjects have to be personally inspiring and not too specific.

"It has to be something near and dear to my heart," he said. But you also "have to allow creativity and inspiration while you're working, so I never nail down a design too

Croft, 41 — "but you could reverse those

numbers," he said — has been sculpting sand for 15 years. He was ice sculpting in Park City, Utah, when, in 1997, he found himself captivated by a sand sculpture in San Diego. "It blew me away," he recalled. "I knew

that's what I needed to do. I was ice sculpting at the time, but there were so many things about sand that drew me in." For one, it's recyclable. It's also abundant and free.

His first effort was as part of an 80-artist team that built a 20-acre, 9-foot-tall Lost City of Atlantis, also in San Diego. It set a world record. That success launched him on a career that had him traveling all over the world and spawned his television show, as well as the business he owns with Santa Cruz sand artist Kirk Rademaker.

"We do a lot of corporate team building, fairs and special events — we do sand sculptures for everything, from the 100th year anniversary of the U.S. Navy, to private wedding parties," he said. "Contests are our way of getting out and making art."

Croft, who describes himself as "just a high school graduate from Iowa," moved here two years ago with his wife, Carmel native Natalie Taggart-Croft.

"My love of my life brought me to Carmel," he said. And as luck would have it, Carmel has a great beach for building sand

He hasn't competed in the annual contest, though, partly because it wouldn't really be

fair, and partly because he's been out of town when it was held. This year, he's loaning buckets to the River Dads, so he'll at least be there in spir-

"I have three little girls. They love playing in the sand," he added. "My days at the beach are not so relaxing." The temporary nature of

his artwork appeals to him - even if it means knowing a bulldozer is destroying something it took 30 hours to build, as was the case in San Diego this week. "It's something that I

revel in — I absolutely love the fact it goes back," he said. "But if it falls down while I'm working on it, that's another story.'

He also said sand sculpting is a great object lesson for kids, especially when they are going through the "Mine! Mine! Mine!" stage, because sand sculptures are so fleeting. "Does it have more value if it lasts 100 years? Not to me," he said. "Nothing is for-

But "the real thing is to take something so ordinary, that's everywhere, and make something extraordinary out of it," he said. "And people everywhere have played with it.'

Dozens of people will be playing with it at Carmel Beach Sunday, when the annual Great Sand Castle Contest is held on the sand south of 10th Avenue. 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

The road map of life can lead to some unexpected places

LISA BRYAN was born in London during the Battle of Britain. She and her brother were sent safely away from the Nazi bombers in places like Oxford and Wales, and were reunited with their parents only after Hitler's war machine was stopped. Soon, the family shipped over to Canada, which is where Lisa grew up.

Today, as many readers know, she has a charming little studio in the courtyard behind Anton & Michel where she paints her internationally known pictures of animals, landscapes, and the city she loves. A beautiful, statuesque

woman, Lisa is almost as much of a tourist attraction as her art. Her journey to Carmel has been an interest-

ing one. "I came here via Hong Kong 38 years ago," she recounts. She had met her husband-to-be in San Francisco, and they got married in Hawaii, where they resided for four years. Then her developer husband and his partner decided to tap the lucrative market of Asia.
