PETS ARE KEY TO REALTOR'S JETSETTING LIFESTYLE

CRAIG ANAPOL'S friends tease him that he runs an escort business. And in a way, he does.

Anapol owns PetsJets, a business that transports pets via commercial airplane when their owners - for whatever reason — can't.

"Pets and flying are my passions," Anapol, a broker with Alain Pinel Realtors in Carmel, told The Pine Cone. "So I combined the two and created PetsJets.'

Anapol, who worked in sales and marketing for Delta Airlines for more than two decades, wanted to offer a personalized service where pet owners - who also have the option of sending their pets as cargo - had peace of mind their animals were in good hands.

"There continue to be many incidents where pets are lost, injured, traumatized or killed when sent via cargo," explained Anapol.

He launched PetsJets four years ago in memory of his late black Labrador retriever, Jackson.

'From Joplin to Jakarta'

The way it works is simple. With his small, 19by-11-by-11-inch pet carrier in tow, Anapol picks up a client's pet — usually a dog or cat — and takes it to the airport. When he goes through security, he requests that it be done in a private room so the animal doesn't run away.

After boarding the plane, he places the animal carrier under the seat in front of him - the space also used for passengers' bags. He's never had a problem with any of the animals he's escorted and said they rarely make a peep during flight.

"I respect that the people with pets are sensitive to making sure their pets travel as safely and comfortably as possible," he said. "They are family."

Anapol's clients have myriad reasons for hiring him. One instance — which happened to be his longest trip for PetsJets - involved picking up a toy poodle from a breeder in Missouri to its buyer in Indonesia.

"I went from Joplin to Jakarta, Indonesia," he

Supes approve panel to oversee desal project

HE MONTEREY County Board of Supervisors last week approved a plan to give the public more oversight of a \$370 million desalination plant proposed by California American Water.

At a special meeting Sept. 28, supervisors approved the formation a "governance" committee for the desal project composed of one representative from the Monterey Peninsula Regional Water Authority, a representative from the Monterey Peninsula Water Management District and another member appointed by the county.

"I think it is quite remarkable, given the fighting this community has seen over water," Burnett said, "that we reached a decision on governance and financing that was unanimously supported by the six mayors, the seven members of the water management district and the five county supervisors.

Police say union picketer assaulted La Playa guest

Union says incident never happened

m A}$ HOTEL guest called police to report being hassled by a union protestor outside La Playa Friday evening, and officers identified a Monterey resident as the suspect, but a union official claimed the man lied about the altercation.

Thomas Lloyd-Butler told The Pine Cone he arrived from San Francisco around 6 p.m. Sept. 28 to meet his sister and their elderly parents. Outside the hotel, they encountered about 70 union protestors — who remain incensed La Playa's new operators have not rehired all of the staff fired by the previous owners when the property closed almost a year ago.

"It was really in your face and over the top," Lloyd-Butler said, explaining that the crowd stood in the way of his sister and elderly parents, who have mobility problems, as they tried to enter the hotel. "It was extremely disorienting for my mother, who has dementia."

Lloyd-Butler also said protestors tried to prevent him from getting out of his car, and, when he did, from removing his luggage.

Committee wants more happenings in Devendorf, weekly event at Sunset

HE CITY council unanimously voted Tuesday night to recommend that the Carmel Community Activities & Cultural Commission facilitate more outdoor events in town and find a manager to run a weekly market at Sunset Center.

The recommendations came from the committee run by councilwoman Victoria Beach that aroused opposition from downtown merchants this summer because it was discussing a farmers market that would close some of the town's main streets, but the suggestions offered this week included no street closures. Instead, they focused on streamlining the process for proposed events in Devendorf Park and holding a weekly culinary-oriented gathering in the north parking lot at Sunset Center. In both cases, the events would be on Thursdays.

She described the suggestions for her fellow council

ing on the back porch of a Pacific Grove church for the past few weeks was sexually assaulted around 4 a.m. Oct. 3, according to PGPD Cmdr. John Nyunt, who said police have information about a transient who may have committed the crime, though nobody has been arrested.

"We got a call about 9:30 a.m. that there was some type of assault that occurred, and the victim was at Community Hospital," he told The Pine Cone. "About an hour went by, and I was informed by the patrol officer that the victim had been sexually assaulted."

The victim also told officer Meghan Bliss that the attack had occurred at St. Mary's church on 12th Street, and Nyunt went down to investigate, summoning a forensic technician from the Monterey County Sheriff's Office to collect evidence, which they found.

Concerned it could compromise his investigation and the ability to track down and arrest the woman's alleged attacker, Nyunt would reveal few details of the incident, other than to say she appeared to be the victim of sexual assault

BLACH CONSTRUCTION the contractor handling the \$5 million seismic retrofit of the Carmel Mission Basilica - raised a giant crane beside the building this week to install protective framing over the exposed roof.

Last month, workers began removing and stacking the clay barrel tiles on the roof of the 220year-old building, which is one of the most historically significant structures in the state. With the roof and tops of the thick walls exposed, they will strengthen the Basilica's roof trusses and knee braces, as well as bore holes down

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

Ruby's Rescue

 $T_{\mbox{HEY}}$ HEARD a scratching sound followed by a kind of mewing, suggesting a kitten might be under their car. What they found were four tiny puppies; sisters, it seemed, maybe 6 weeks old, who had found their way into the garage.





They drove through the neighborhood, looking for the puppies' owner or something that would explain where they'd come from. And they found it about a mile from home. A mature dog, the mother, by all appearances, had been hit by a car and left by the side of the road.

They had no idea why the puppies had come to them or even what they were until a neighbor identified them, with their distinctive "cracked glass" eyes and mottled coat, as Catahoula hounds or "leopard dogs," bred originally in Louisiana, to herd cattle.

The couple already had two dogs, so they put up all four orphans for adoption. Within days, each had been placed in what seemed like loving homes. Yet a year later, the couple received a call from a woman who said she had changed her mind, and she asked if they would take back the dog.

That same afternoon, they collected Ruby, a scrawny, cowering puppy who panicked if she saw a broom and winced at the sound of loud voices.

For months, they massaged Ruby and spoke to her in soft voices. They took her for two walks a day, socialized her with other people and other dogs, and let her sleep in their bed. Then one day, they took Ruby to the beach. She ran across the sand without stopping at the shore, and began swimming with an expression of joy they had not seen.

Soon after, the couple bought a new house with a pool just for Ruby, for those days when she can't get to the beach.


"The Salinas shelters are so small. They even run out of food and necessities, like blankets and towels," she said.


Over the past three years, Party for the Paws has raised \$25,000, all of which has gone to the two city and county shelters, and the two local rescue programs.

An interesting addition to Party for the Paws is the opportunity for attendees to bring home a new furry friend. While "foster owners" may bring their rescue dogs to be considered for adoption, Sonne asks that pups not up for adoption stay at home. In past years, "we had so many people that brought their dogs, and no one knew which were adoptable!"

Speaking to the role of programs like AFRP and Peace of Mind, Sonne explained that they "step in and save as many dogs and cats as they can," but "they need people to reach out and foster animals to help save more lives." While Sonne asks the public to always consider adoption and fostering, she puts it simply: "If you can't adopt, can't foster, do something. Volunteer, donate, anything!"

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CITY COUNCIL HONORS HAZDOVAC, ITS LONGEST-SERVING MEMBER

T'S OFFICIAL: Paula Hazdovac's 18 years on the Carmel City Council were the most by any council member since the town was incorporated in 1916.

Mayor Jason Burnett made the announcement Tuesday, when he praised Hazdovac for her deep Carmel roots, institutional knowledge and vast work on the council, from which she resigned in August. He then handed the microphone to former mayor Sue McCloud, who spent 14 years alongside Hazdovac at the council dais.

"I valued the times you served as vice mayor — your input often refocused the route to best achieve council's goals, proving that two heads are better than one," she said as Hazdovac's husband, Terry Russey; mother, Lilian Hazdovac; and others sat in the audience.

McCloud mentioned her long family history — as she was raised by parents who were also born and raised here — and her "knowledge of the business district through its ups and downs," as owner, along with her sister, Pat, of a store, Two Sisters Designs. And her experience in small-town retail goes back even further.

"We first met when you worked in my mother's business over 30 years ago," McCloud recalled. "When you consider that TOT, sales and real estate taxes produce over 70 percent of Carmel's revenues, it is indeed valuable to have at least one member of council be a working member of the business district."

She concluded by saying that if Hazdovac had received a \$50 stipend for every council meeting she attended, taxpayers would owe her some \$22,000, not including her hours of service on ad hoc committees and representing the city on

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other boards, agencies, commissions and volunteer efforts.

"So I dare say that bargain-basement figure of \$22,000 could easily be doubled. And if it was represented by a more realistic figure of, say, \$150 per hour, the time you have donated to the city over the past 18 years is probably worth over \$200,000," she said. "In other words, Paula, you are priceless!"

Before he paid homage to Hazdovac, former councilman Gerard Rose recognized many in the audience who have also contributed their time and effort to public service.

He remembered first getting to know Hazdovac when she approached him a dozen years ago to ask him to run for council. She told him that she didn't want anyone to see them talking, "so we found this obscure restaurant, in which only about half the people in there knew Paula."

He said the notes they passed during meetings throughout Rose's decade as a councilman usually involved her telling him, "Boy, that was a stupid thing you just said," and he described her as "the epitome of common sense."

"When you and I disagreed, which was not uncommon, I always had to give myself a reality check when I went home and say, 'You know, if I disagreed with Paula, I was probably wrong," he said. "And Paula seemed to have a second sense for what makes sense, and for that, all of you owe Paula a debt of gratitude."

Former councilwoman Karen Sharp called Hazdovac her mentor and complimented her "human kindness."

She also commended her well known ability to focus the council's deliberations. "She'd say, 'Let's cut to the chase, come on, let's move on,' and she did, and we would — and we were so grateful to have her," she said.

When it was her turn to speak, Hazdovac said, "Even through the ups and downs, it's been a pleasure."

And, as she always has, she praised city workers.

"We sit up here and make all the decisions, but staff really does all the work," she said. "They really deserve most, if not all of the credit."

She observed that, for her, serving on the council was never a thankless job. "For me, it's a very, very special thing to have been able to serve the community that I love so much in the capacity of a council member," she said.


Finally, Hazdovac urged residents, business people, staff and everyone else to be kind to the council, since it has to contend with a number of serious and challenging issues.

"It's a hard job," she said. "We all do it because we love it, but it is tough, so cut them some slack."

INITIATIVE OFFERED TO ROLL BACK PENSIONS

THE ROW over Pacific Grove's steep pension costs could be headed to the ballot box.

On Monday, a group of Pacific Grove residents launched a referendum to undo the city's 2002 pension plan for police officers and firefighters that a city committee determined in August may have been adopted illegally.

Residents Dan Davis and John Moore have long contended that an April 2002 city council decision to boost the CalPERS plan for P.G.'s public safety employees to "3 percent at 50" was adopted unlawfully because a public hearing wasn't held and crucial financial information on how much the increase would cost the city was not disclosed.

"What you cannot do is let the violation of the public's rights go unaddressed," Davis told The Pine Cone.

The 3 percent at 50 plan means public safety workers at least 50 years old can retire with pay equal to 3 percent of their highest year's compensation for every year they worked, to a maximum of 90 percent of their highest pay level. The plan had been at 2 percent at 50.

A report drawn up by a subcommittee composed of city councilmen Dan Miller and Ken Cuneo and Mayor Carmelita Garcia determined the pension increase to police and fire officials may have been illegal. The council has said it would review the report before deciding what to do, if anything, with the pension plan.

At issue is a report made available to the city council and the public before the 2002 meeting which stated the fiscal impact to the city of the pension change would be only \$51,500. However, that cost was merely the price tag for amending the pension contract, not the cost of the pension increase itself, which is said to have cost the city at least \$800,000 per year.

"The public was deprived of its legal right to see the cost of the pension plan," Davis said. "They never had the information, and their rights were infringed."

The initiative also indicates that in early 2009, via a public records request, an unidentified P.G. resident found a financial analysis from Dec. 17, 2001, about the then-proposed pension increase that detailed the cost implications to the city in adopting the plan but which was kept under wraps.

"This report had never been made public," according to the three-page initiative filed Monday. The "report clearly showed that the 'future annual costs' of this 'contract amendment' was estimated to exceed \$805,000 (23.7 percent of salary costs) one year after adoption."

The failure to reveal the future annual costs of the pension plan was a "clear violation of state law," according to the initiative.

Miller agrees. "In my opinion, the act was illegal and needs to be rescinded," he said. "If this is not done with the current council in place, the next council may not do it."

Davis said his group will await a summary from P.G. attorney David Laredo before it begins gathering signatures from at least 10 percent of Pacific Grove's voters. A date for an election in the spring or fall 2013 will be set after the county elections office certifies the petition.

P.G. tries again to stop Canterbury Woods from expanding

THE PACIFIC Grove City Council Wednesday night decided to prohibit Canterbury Woods, which operates a 144unit senior home on Sinex Avenue, from expanding its operations to any more single-family homes, including three it recently acquired.

The city's staff recommended the council pass the ordinance after Canterbury Woods purchased the homes — two on Spazier Avenue and one on 19th Street — which it hopes to use for clients.

The ban will "prevent the continued expansion of uses that may be harming the residential character," of Pacific Grove's neighborhoods, according to the a report issued to council members.

The approval of "additional use permits, building permits, or other entitlements would result in a current and immediate threat to the public safety, health or welfare," the report goes on to say.

But Canterbury Woods executive director Norma Brambilla said she believes the proposed use of the new homes is "in step" with a court ruling last year over a similar issue in which Canterbury Woods prevailed. She said it's too early to determine how the new homes will be used consid-

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GRANT SOUGHT FOR RESTROOM PROJECT

Fire department adds backup ladder truck

THE MONTEREY fire department, which provides firefighting and rescue services for the City of Carmel, has added another ladder truck to its arsenal, Chief Andrew Miller said last week.

The used truck, a 1998 model made by American LaFrance with a ladder that can reach 105 feet (or about ten stories) was purchased from the City of Santa Clara for \$75,000, Miller said. The truck has the same capabilities as the department's existing ladder truck.

"The price was quite a bargain, considering its excellent condition and low mileage," Miller said. In comparison, a new ladder truck of the same size and specifications would cost \$700,000 to \$900,000.

Having a reserve ladder truck will "ensure that there are no disruptions in our ladder truck capability" when the existing rig is undergoing service or is on another call, or during a major conflagration requiring more than one ladder truck, he said.

Besides putting water on a fire from above and evacuating people from windows or rooftops, both trucks include "all-hazard, all-risk specialized technical rescue capabilities" useful in urban search and rescue, freeing people trapped in cars and even rescuing workers from collapsed trenches.

Besides Carmel, the Monterey Fire Department handles firefighting and rescues in Pacific Grove, Sand City, the Presidio of Monterey, the Naval Postgraduate School and La Mesa Village. Miller said the new truck should be in service in about a month.

Two ladder trucks are better than one, according to Monterey Fire . Department, which bought this backup rig from the City of Santa

Clara for \$75,000.

THE CITY will ask federal and state taxpayers to help fund the construction of permanent bathrooms on Scenic Road at Santa Lucia Avenue, the council decided without discussion Tuesday. The council authorized city administrator Jason Stilwell to apply for \$250,000 in grant funds: half to pay for the drawings, engineering and part of the construction, and the other half to cover the balance of building costs.

The long-discussed and debated bathroom project, which has been in the works for a decade, would meet the city's general plan mandate to "provide adequate facilities at the beach that serve the needs of the public, mitigate damage to the environment and respect the character of the surrounding neighborhoods," city administrator Jason Stilwell wrote in his Oct. 2 report to the council.


He also pointed out the general plan and

the city's local coastal program, adopted in 2004, call for placing permanent bathrooms at the south end of beach and reported architect Rob Carver is working on plans that should be reviewed by the planning commission next month.

He recommended the council authorize him to apply for a federal grant from the Land and Water Conservation Fund Grantin-Aid program, which would be matched with a state grant aimed at "acquiring lands and developing facilities for public outdoor recreation purposes."

The California Department of Parks and Recreation is responsible for administering the federal program statewide, establishing the rules and considering local jurisdictions' applications, and the bathroom project "is consistent with most recent California Outdoor Recreation Plan."

The council gave Stilwell the OK to proceed when it voted to approve the consent agenda at Tuesday's meeting.





ering the council's decision.

"We are not prepared to say at this point that we will not continue to [use] the houses in the manner we had planned," Brambilla told The Pine Cone.

This is not the first time Canterbury Woods has squared off with the city over providing services outside its main buildings. In 2009, a city hearing officer found that Canterbury Woods was violating zoning laws by using three other homes — also on Spazier and 19th Street — to provide services to seniors.

The decision prompted Canterbury Woods to file a civil lawsuit against the city. In April 2011, a judge ruled in favor of Canterbury Woods, saying its use of offcampus homes was a residential use, not a commercial use, as the city had argued.

The new ordinance does not affect those three homes.

The city believes the use of the new homes could cause "increased traffic, diminished availability of parking and increased presence of strangers in the neighborhood" — even though Canterbury Woods contends those issues could be prevalent no matter who occupied those homes.

A few nearby residents wrote to the coun-

cil urging it to stop Canterbury Woods from using the homes. The nonprofit Episcopal Senior Communities owns the senior facility.

"The city should be very concerned as [Episcopal Senior Communities], being a nonprofit, will not have to pay property tax on anything they purchase in the [residential] zone," according to a Sept. 17 letter written by Caroline Sanders, who lives on Spazier, with her husband, Clive.

Though it's not required to, Brambilla said Canterbury Woods has repeatedly offered to pay the city a portion of property and school taxes.

In a Sept. 20 letter to the city, Episcopal Senior Communities' attorney William C. Tobin objected to the ordinance, remarking that city staff "seems to ask the city to thumb its nose at the [2011 court] judgment."

Tobin also refuted Pacific Grove's contention that there would be increased traffic and parking problems because of the homes, saying "every traffic study regarding the impacts of occupancy of dwellings by senior populations indicates reduced traffic."

Councilman Alan Cohen voted against the ordinance, while councilman Robert Huitt recused himself from the vote because the firm he is employed with has done work for Canterbury Woods. The council declined to pass an urgency ordinance, which would have not required a second reading by council members, who are supposed to vote on it again at the Oct. 17 meeting.



Pat's family is extremely grateful to her loving caregivers, especially Lela, Ileini, Lani and Pinga.



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Quartet of watercolorists take different paths to creativity

THE WORK of four talented local artists — Wilda Northrop, Alicia Meheen, Miguel Dominguez and Roianne Hart will be displayed when the Carmel Art Association unveils an exhibit, "Spotlight on Watercolor," Saturday, Oct. 6.

The exhibit showcases four very different approaches to the same medium, Northrup explained. "We're watercolorists, but we're not going in the same direction."

Northrup's work in the exhibit is a collection "of subjects I've wanted to paint for a while," she said, including scenes from the L.A. neighborhood where she grew up, as well as "a few felines." Meheen's display celebrates the wide open spaces of the West ---which she paints when she travels with her husband in an RV — as well as the scenic wonders of Monterey County. Dominguez uses a dry-brush technique to capture the changing of the seasons, while Hart's exhibit focuses on the female form.

October's Gallery Showcase, meanwhile, features a show of acrylic semi-abstract landscapes by Fred Carvell and a display of abstracted oil paintings by Heidi Hybl that capture the mood of her surroundings in Big Sur, where she lives.

"The summer fog creeps in and out of Palo Colorado Canyon and Rocky Creek," Hybl explained. "This ethereal landscape changes throughout the day and night. These paintings are inspired by this landscape."

Hollywood-by-the-Sea: Festival transforms downtown with films and art

NEARLY ONE hundred feature-length films, short films and documentaries will be screened at a variety of downtown venues Oct. 11-14 when the Carmel Art and Film Festival returns for its fourth year.

"We've got great films this year, and some wonderful documentaries," Tom Burns, the festival's co-founder and executive director, told The Pine Cone. "And I'm particularly impressed with the quality of student films we've received."

Starting Thursday at noon — and continuing over the next four days — five different venues — Sunset Center, the Golden Bough Playhouse, the Carmel Youth Center, the Carmel High School Performing Arts Center and Carmel Beach — will host screenings of films.

Burns singled out several films which he said deserve special attention, including "The Sessions," "A Royal Affair," "Amour," and "Et si on vivait tous ensemble?"

In "The Sessions," John Hawkes plays a man confined to an iron lung, while Helen Hunt plays a professional sex surrogate.

"It's got all the Oscar buzz right now," Burns said.

Set in the 18th century, "A Royal Affair" has drawn praise for its portrayal of a forbidden romance between the queen of Denmark and a court physician. Mikkel Følsgaard won Best Actor for his part in the film at this year's Berlin Film Festival.

A French film, "Amour" explores the challenges faced by an elderly couple when one of them suffers a health crisis. The movie took home the highest prize — the Palme d'Or — at this year's Cannes Film Festival.

"Et si on vivait tous ensemble?" (which means, "And if we all lived together?") is a French-German comedy that marks the return of Jane Fonda to French cinema.

In addition to its extensive schedule of films, the festival features a variety of events, including a Filmmakers Reception at Sunset Center (Thursday at 6 p.m.); a concert by two musical acts — ShyBoy and Griffin House — at the Golden Bough Playhouse (Friday at 7 p.m.); an After-Party at the Carmel Women's Club (Friday at 9 p.m.); a "Women in Film" panel discussion at Sunset Center (Saturday at 2 p.m.); and a Filmmakers Beach Dinner on Carmel Beach (Saturday at 5 p.m.).

Day passes — good for all films screened

before 5 p.m. — are \$50. A \$195 pass will provide access to all films and some events as well. FOR A custom cocktail mixed by a true connoisseur, head down to Terry's at the Cypress Inn and grab a seat any evening when Will Larkin is tending bar. A great-great grandson of Thomas Oliver Larkin (after whom Larkin Street in Monterey is named), he is one of those who grew up here, left to seek his way in the world and then couldn't resist the urge to return, so he did, full of experience and creativity.

During recent years, the restaurant and bar in the historic inn owned by Denny LeVett and Doris Day have upgraded their cuisine and gone retro with their cocktails, though that leaves plenty of room for creativity. Larkin, meanwhile, honed his skills as food and beverage director of Auberge du Soleil in Napa for three years, among other stints, and came to work at Terry's about eight months ago.

Last week, for instance, he mixed up what might have been the finest Manhattan, ever, as well as Corpse Reviver No. 2 with just the right amount of Absinthe, and an Owen Westman (Bourbon & Branch, San Francisco) creation called The Laphroaig Project containing the namesake Scotch, all the while discoursing on the history and makeup of certain liqueurs, like his favorite bitters (Fee Brothers, aged in whiskey barrels and hard to get ahold of) and Chartreuse (which contains some 150 botanicals and has been made since 1605). He also shared some tidbits about Terry's, like the fact it has good-quality well liquors at "some of the cheapest prices in town," and a 4-to-6:30 p.m. happy hour that offers everything for 15 percent off. Oh, and the Cypress Inn is one of the few places that has Firestone Walker brewery's Wookey Jack black rye ale on tap.

Complementing all those fine cocktails is a versatile

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menu, which can be enjoyed at the bar if you're less inclined to sit at one of the restaurant's comfortable tables. Larkin recommended the Lamb Lollipops (pan seared and tender with mint-pistachio pesto and a side of sweet potato fries, \$17), Clams Meuniere (sautéed with shallots, parsley, leeks and garlic butter, with garlic fries, \$14), classic Monterey Bay sand dabs (breaded and grilled, served with tarragon sauce and fingerling potatoes, \$18), oysters on the half-shell with lemon-shallot mignonette and horseradish sauce for \$12 per half-dozen, and the watercress and apple salad for \$8. Not one of his suggestions went awry, as each was delicious, though the lamb and the clams were particularly good.

And this month, Terry's is celebrating the Oct. 10-14 Carmel Art & Film Festival by launching Fedora Thursdays beginning Oct. 11, featuring the favorite cocktails of Day's leading men. James Cagney's affection for whiskey inspired the bar's Old-Fashioned, Sazerac and Plenty O'Toole. 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

Both restaurants are located in Carmel Valley: Will's in the Village and Baja Cantina near Quail Lodge.





- which encompasses rape and a number of other violent sex crimes -- and had sustained injuries, though they were not severe

She was given a Sexual Assault Response Team examination at the hospital and released Wednesday night to the church's senior warden, Bruce Obbink, who found her a motel room for the night and had also taken her to CHOMP that morning.

"I was going down to church on Wednesday and saw her walking up the street," Obbink said Thursday. Knowing she had been spending most nights the past few weeks on the back porch of Edwards Hall at St. Mary's, he asked if she had been outside all night and then inquired where she was going.

"And she said, 'I need to go the hospital, because I've been raped," he said.

Nyunt said police are investigating whether the woman was assaulted by one or more individuals.

"We have other homeless individuals that congregate there because of charity given by the church," he said, adding that people involved with those efforts are cooperating with the investigation.

Nyunt wanted to assure residents the attack was "an isolated incident," and that most complaints involving homeless people involve little more than panhandling and loitering. 'We have not had a significant problem with this," he said.

Shelters needed

Obbink said the real problem is a lack of safe places for transient women to stay. As he and other church members attempted during the past few weeks to find somewhere for the 23-year-old homeless woman to sleep, he discovered the possibilities are few and the waiting lists are long.

"Where do homeless women go?" he asked. "They can't go out and sleep in the park where the guys do — that's real trouble.'

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
The few shelters on the Monterey Peninsula and in Salinas have two- or three-month waits for beds, he said.

"We have all sorts of services at our church for food and clothing, and we help people with gas money and bus tickets, but it's difficult to have a rooming situation on your back porch," he said.

"And when winter comes, good heavens. In this community, there needs to be a major effort to figure out some way to help homeless women. I think that would be a really great project for a service group."

"And there were two guys who touched me and kind of hassled me," he said. "I looked at them and said, 'Back off,' and they pretty much did."

But he still felt threatened and called police, who responded moments later.

"A guest reported being unable to exit his vehicle and being touched by two protestors," confirmed Carmel Police Sgt. Mel Mukai, who identified one of the protesters as 22year-old Max Green of Monterey. While Green was not arrested, CPD has asked the district attorney to charge him with battery.

Mukai said, "It really didn't involve any punching or striking that you would normally associate battery with. I think it was more of a fear factor."

And UNITE HERE Local 483 projects coordinator Mark Weller denied the altercation occurred at all.

'Not true. We find no evidence to such allegations. We've found no witnesses that saw any contact and nothing at all on the video and photographs taken of the event," he told The Pine Cone. "He's making it up."

(In June, when police said union protesters broke in to La Playa and vandalized hotel property, Weller also said the break-in never happened.)

He further claimed hotel employees, not Lloyd-Butler, called the police.

"Apparently 'police attention' is La Playa Carmel management's way of saving money and shifting the costs of monitoring the protests onto Carmel taxpayers," he said allegations he also made during the public comment period of this week's city council meeting. "The hotel usually hires private security guards, but this time it looks like they just called in the police."

He said the 12th protest since the July reopening was, "as always, a non-violent, lawful exercise of First Amendment rights," and he said the group of some 70 protestors included Monterey County Supervisor Jane Parker, Santa Cruz County Supervisor and Assembly candidate Mark Stone, Seaside City Councilman Steve Bloomer and former Carmel Councilwoman Barbara Brooks. Eight of the protestors were former La Playa employees.

At the council meeting, Weller praised public officials and community members for "standing shoulder to shoulder and heart to heart" with the protestors.

"The former employees are outraged that only three employees have been rehired," he said at the Oct. 2 meeting. "Seven-hundred-fifty people have come to walk the picket lines or show support for the employees."

He pledged the union and its supporters "will continue to fight for justice," for the workers, and he announced a boycott would be staged later this month.

Matt Crow, CEO of the company that bought La Playa from the Cope family a year ago and remodeled it before reopening the historic hotel in July, called the Sept. 28 protest "disappointing."

"We respect the union's right to free speech, but we draw the line at criminal behavior. Last week, the protestors shoved an employee, harassed guests and frightened an elderly woman suffering from dementia, pinned guests' car doors shut, blocked our loading area and assaulted an arriving guest, resulting finally in an arrest," he said.

desal proposal is joined by two other desal proposals in Moss Landing.

If the Cal Am project is publicly financed, the interest rate on the debt would be much lower than a private company could obtain, Burnett explained. "And that can make a big difference in water bills we all pay."

Lloyd-Butler, a repeat La Playa customer who was making his first return visit since the reopening, said he was unfamiliar with the particular labor issues at the hotel.

'They can get their message across, but they shouldn't do so in a way which is disruptive to people who are trying to do their business," he said. He commended La Playa staff for remaining calm that evening and helping him and his parents, who were in town from Ventura to visit a 91-year-old cousin get settled.

"People don't come to Carmel to be victimized," Crow commented. "In the future, I hope that the police will step in to enforce the law earlier so the union doesn't get out of hand. Our neighbors, employees and guests are part of this community and deserve to be protected."

Meanwhile, a consultant the mayors hired to analyze Cal Am's project and the two Moss Landing projects in order to determine which project would be the most cost-effective and be built the quickest is expected to release its findings by the end of October.

Cal Am's water plan also includes underground water storage and turning wastewater into drinking water.

Once the consultant's findings are issued, the mayors will determine which of the three water projects they intend to support before the Public Utilities Commission.



wrong information should be strung up. We trust you to report truth. You failed.



through the structure to insert more than 300 steel rods that will help reinforce the building against earthquakes.

Paid for with donations and grants raised by the nonprofit Carmel Mission Foundation, the retrofit will ensure the Basilica can remain open to the public when a new state law governing unreinforced masonry buildings takes effect in 2017.

Crews used the crane to lower sections of steel framing that others fixed into place over the exposed roof. The structure will hold an innovative plastic protective membrane during construction, protecting the ceiling from the elements and enabling work to continue through the winter, according to foundation president Vic Grabrian.

He reported more than 3,000 parishioners and other supporters helped raise the \$5 million for the project in record



time. Supplementing their gifts were grants from public and private foundations, including a \$650,000 Save America's Treasures matching grant administered by the National Parks Service.

"In addition to the seismic retrofit work, a \$2.2 million project to repair the Basilica's walls, towers and dome, plus infrastructure upgrades, will be launched concurrently," he reported, "provided a significant portion of these funds can be raised in the very near future."

Doing so would allow the foundation to take advantage of the scaffolding and other construction-related infrastructure already in place for the seismic retrofit, thereby lowering the costs of the work. His foundation, which was formed in 2008, is independent of the Diocese of Monterey and has the sole purpose of funding "the restoration and maintenance of the historic Carmel Mission structures, art and artifacts, ensuring their preservation into perpetuity."

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

Editorial

The deficit explained

WHEN YOU take out a mortgage, you are borrowing from your future self so you can have a house now. And because you'll get old and not be able to work someday, it's important to pay that mortgage off while you still have a decent income.

But what if your future self lived forever and would never stop making money? Would there be any reason for you to get rid of your mortgage if you could comfortably pay the interest and keep doing so indefinitely?

The answer is, "No." If you lived forever, there would be no reason to pay off, or even reduce, your debt, as long as the interest wasn't too much to handle. Paying interest on borrowed money is the same as buying the use of it over a certain period of time, and if that time becomes indefinite, the cost of borrowing becomes more like a current expense than a long-term obligation.

It's a concept that is purely theoretical among us mortals but is highly relevant to understanding the importance of the federal debt, which is now \$16 trillion and rising by about \$40,000 a second. That money is owed by The People of the United States — a collective body that never dies. And because The People live forever, there is no reason for them not to owe a lot of money, and they can just as well keep doing so forever. Yes, friends, you don't have to pay off the National Debt. You don't have to, and neither do your heirs. Even when one piece of the debt becomes due, or a creditor demands to be repaid, you can always just borrow an equal amount from somebody else. As long as the return (interest rate) is acceptable to the lender, there's always someone willing to lend.

However, that's also where the catch arises. As long as the National Debt is out there, you (and your progeny) have to pay the interest on it. And that's where the truly frightening consequences of the colossal U.S. debt arise.


Right now, because of the worldwide economic slowdown, debt is cheap. Market-rate U.S. Treasury Securities are paying only about 3 percent interest a year. And quite a bit of the interest owed by the U.S. Government is held by the government itself, which is charging itself a measly interest rate below 1 percent. But even at those ridiculously low interest rates, the debt has gotten so high that interest payments will soon top \$400 billion a year. And when interest rates go up, as surely they must, that figure will rise dramatically and start eating up most of the federal budget. Meanwhile, the government continues to spend far more than it has, which means the interest expense will go up even if interest rates stay the same (which they won't).

Sooner than you may think, the federal government won't be able to pay interest on its debt. When that happens, the only possible outcomes are default or inflation (or both). You don't want to be around when either one hits in a big way.

Paying off the debt isn't the issue. Stopping it from growing and then reducing it to a manageable level are the necessary goals.

And how to do that? The answer is patently obvious: Reduce government

members at the Oct. 2 meeting and said they should undergo a one-year trial period.

"The first recommendation is something we're calling a 'streamline event window," said Beach, whose committee held 15 meetings with regular attendance of about 50 people since the mayor created it in May. "Our public facilities and parks may be slightly underutilized, and we want to encourage the public to enjoy them."

Therefore, the city should fast-track proposals for events on one Thursday each month in Devendorf Park, as long as they meet certain yet-to-be-set criteria. Now, she said, the lead time to get an event approved is about three months, but the city should try to shorten that as much as possible.

The group — whose members also include restaurateur David Fink, author Eric Schlosser ("Fast Food Nation"), assistant city administrator Heidi Burch and Mayor Jason Burnett, who replaced former councilwoman Paula Hazdovac on the committee - also recommended holding a weekly culinary market on Thursdays in the north parking lot at Sunset Center.

"We want to emphasize Thursdays," Beach explained, because visitors and vacation-home owners might be more willing to stretch a weekend stay to include that extra day if properly enticed.

"For the culinary event, the principles would be quite different than seen anywhere else," she said, including that the cuisine offered be 100 percent organic, that no prepared foods compete with anything offered by restaurants and other



purveyors in the city, and that it would require vendors to tie in with local restaurants and stores to encourage event-goers to explore the rest of the commercial district. The market would have seafood, meats, dairy and other fresh foods.

She said the city wouldn't run the weekly culinary market but would find a manager who would do so and be paid with its profits, not tax dollars. Beach solicited proposals from potential managers a few months ago and recommended the city ask the four finalists to submit formal proposals, but city attorney Don Freeman cautioned her against making it sound like the city would be hiring anyone.

Mary Anne Lloyd complimented Beach for her efforts and said the work would bear fruit. "I'm excited by the possibility of change," she said.

Richard Kreitman, who recently formed the Carmel Restaurant Association, said his group would like to be involved, and restaurant owner Rich Pepe said being part of the committee's discussions and having Beach's leadership "has been a wonderful experience for me and for everyone else." He urged the city to move forward with haste.

Burnett said the community activities and cultural commission is being urged to be more proactive in drawing new events to town, and councilman Steve Hillyard suggested the council vote to forward the committee's recommendations to the commission, to which everyone agreed.

After the meeting, Beach said the commission will receive "some kind of writeup to provide guidance to them," regarding the council's direction. "That's probably a few weeks away, though. I'd guess."

And when Burnett decides the time is right and the events committee has served its purpose, he'll disband it.

"It's not going away tomorrow," he assured Beach.

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Sometimes the guy who offers you a gig really means it

THINK it was Darwin who noted that before there was language, there was music. That's something people who make music know better than anyone else. The rest of us just guess it's true.

Debbie Davis, a self-taught chanteuse who is making a name for herself on the Monterey Peninsula, knows. She's been singing since she was a child, and over the decades has learned its value at a deeper level.

"My music has healed the wounds and removed the fear," she said. "When I am not feeling right, I go to Mission Ranch and sing, or work on my music at home. Before long, my spirits are lifted and I am smiling inside."

A native Californian, Debbie was the youngest of five, raised in Ontario by a single mom; her father left when she

was 2. She was working summers at a young age to buy clothes for school. But singing was a dream she had since she was a little girl. She has sung all of her life. She sang in church and was recognized even then for her great voice.

There was always music in the house. Her brother and sister played instruments, and she often sang with them. "I grew up on country music, but there were always the show tunes, Doris Day, Johnny Mathis, Bobby Darin, Elvis, Fabian. We

said. "It was a full day of traveling, but I broke it up."

A good number of his customers are, in fact, those who have purchased dogs from breeders online and need them hand delivered.

"I had a client who was moving from New York to San Diego," he said. "They were driving, and they didn't want their cat in the car for four hours, let alone four days."

Anapol flew to New York, picked up the cat and flew to San Diego to deliver the feline to its owners.

Sometimes his clients enlist his services because it's simply more convenient for them. One woman hired Anapol to transport her kitty because she didn't want to contend with the anxiety of it all.

"She could have taken the cat herself, but she didn't want to have the stress of flying with the cat," he said. "She flew on one plane and I flew on the other plane."

'Never gets dull'

One of his regular clients, a singer, lives in London and New York City and routinely flies between the two cities. Because the United Kingdom only permits dogs to be flown into the country in the cargo bay - not under the seat Anapol flies into Paris instead.

"I get a rental car and drive to the north of France and take

used to have jam sessions and lots of musicians and just singing and carrying on." She was also a natural performer. "I roller-skated and did dance and figure skating. It was what my mother did to keep us off the streets."

For a while, life got in the way of what she hoped would be a musical career. She became a mother for the first time at age 16. She traveled throughout the Golden State for reasons of relationships and employment. Twelve years ago, she was laid off from an executive training program at Tahoe and found herself waiting tables in Bakersfield. It wasn't easy, but with the last of her five children out from under her wing, she decided to go to Nashville.

She arrived in the capital of country music on her 47th birthday. "I didn't know anyone, had no job, no place to live." But she landed on her feet, finding a place to stay and a job. She originally had intended to try out Nashville for 30 days. She wound up staying for seven years. She did not perform as she wanted to, but it was an important time in her journey.

So it was that she returned to California and was living with her daughter in Watsonville. One day, her daughter said, "Mom, you've got to go to Carmel." Debbie had "lived all over" but had never been to Carmel, and she asked why. Her daughter responded, "Because I see you there."

It wasn't long afterward that Debbie came to town to attend a chamber mixer. "I drove down Scenic Road and fell in love."

She found a place to live in town and started singing at Mission Ranch. During one session, a fellow with an unmistakable voice of his own came up to her and told her he would like her to sing at the Cypress Inn. She didn't even know who

a train," he said. "I then take a ferry to England and get another rental car to London. It's a long trip."

And because the client has two dogs, he makes an identical trip for the other dog shortly after delivering the first dog. Anapol said he loves the job, and it's never dull. He takes

the opportunity during flights to focus on paperwork for his realty job.

"Everybody books in advance, so it gives me time to optimize my schedule," he said. "I get a lot of work done on the plane."

Anapol escorts mostly small dogs and cats, but on Oct. 12, he's flying with an African grey parrot from San Francisco to New York City.

Larger dog breeds and those whose owners don't want their pets transported under the seat must be placed into an airplane's cargo bay, an area where many pets travel safely but where some have died, including two large dogs in the past two months who perished on separate United Airlines flights.

Anapol doesn't advertise, relying mostly on referrals from clients and breeders and visits to his website, petsjets.com.

"People just Google 'pet transport,' and they find my website," Anapol explained.

Though the price varies depending on the destination, he charges clients a fee of about \$400 for a cross-country trip. The client also pays for Anapol's airfare — which can be coach, business class or first class, at the client's discretion plus the airline's pet charge, which ranges from \$75 to

\$125 for domestic flights and \$200 for international flights.

Denny LeVett was. That's how life happens; maybe especially here.

Debbie always wanted to be accompanied by a great piano

player in a beautiful room where she could dress up and sing her favorite songs. She was thinking maybe a cruise ship lounge, but she did better. She linked up with Gennady Loktionov, and they perform in the living room at the Cypress Inn.

Debbie does private gigs, but you can hear her at Mission Ranch on Mondays Wednesdays and and Fridays, and every other Saturday at the Cypress Inn. She sings a lot of the popular music from her childhood, plus some country and some contemporary songs. "I do the music that is always

going to be around forever. It's classic," she said.

Debbie does a good job of engaging her audience and has gained a following across the country. Sometimes people will come up to her and say, "I came in a stranger and I'm leaving a friend."

Said Debbie, "Now I can do here in Carmel what I was born to do. And I truly live my dream."

"I have no overhead," Anapol said. "My clients buy my [one-way] ticket and I fly back using frequent flier miles."

And because he has a residence in Manhattan — in addition to his Carmel home — Anapol can stay in New York City at no extra charge to his customers, many of whom are also bicoastal.

"It works out great," he said. "A lot of the time the international flights are out of New York. I'll fly there, stop for a day or two, then fly on."

When he can, Anapol chooses red-eye flights, which he's found helps animals to sleep overnight.

"I never tranquilize them," he said.

No mishaps

He asks pet owners to not feed their dogs and cats several hours before the flight. Once on the plane, Anapol will give them ice cubes so they don't get dehydrated.

Surprisingly, the pets he's transported have never had a bathroom mishap. If Anapol senses they need to go, he takes them to the men's room and places them on a pad on top of a baby-changing table.

"I put the dog down and it will pee," he said.

Anapol's pet adventures continue Sunday when he will travel to San Juan, Puerto Rico, to pick up a dog that's too big to fit underneath a seat and see it to its destination in New York.

"I'm going to fly to San Juan to make sure the dog gets on safely, then pick the dog up and give it to the owner," he said. "They just want somebody to be on the plane with it."



"CARMEL LEGENDS"

On the afternoon of February 12, 1935, the great dirigible USS MACON, pride of the U.S. Navy, moved slowly and steadily up the California coast, returning from maneuvers to the great hangar at Moffat field. She was 784 feet long, 133 feet high, looked like a 50-story building floating through the air, and sounded like the switch yards in Omaha, Nebraska. Her chief officer, Lt. Commander Herbert V. Wiley, commanded a crew of 83. She had eight 12-cylinder, 500 HP engines ranged along her sides, and she paid little attention to the massive thunderheads gathering out at sea. Suddenly, at precisely 5:05 P.M., the storm struck with incredible force. The engines beat violently, the crew worked feverishly, but she was like a bull in a tea shop, plunging, bucking, fighting for survival. In 20 minutes she was driven into the sea 3 miles off Big Sur, where she split like a melon and sank. 81 of the crew of 83 were rescued by Navy vessels in the area and by residents of Big Sur. But the Navy's dream of lighter-than-air dreadnaughts died that afternoon at 1820 hours. Written in 1987 & 1988, and previously published in The Pine Cone
