Super Bowl coach is last-minute add to Pro-Am


"He draws crowds, he's a wonderful guy, and he loves the

game," John said of Harbaugh, whose handicap is a 12. He is playing alongside Jason Day, a pro out of Australia, and the other half of the foursome is pro Matt Bettencourt and San Francisco Giants pitcher Matt Cain.

"It's a little Bay Area battle on the golf course," John said.

Also late to join the amateur field was John Westwood, pro Lee Westwood's father, and the two were paired for the tournament, which began with practice rounds Monday

Thums will take water district suit to appeals court

THE COUPLE who filed suit over the Monterey Peninsula Water Management District's water conservation rules but lost in trial court have decided to appeal their case.

The lawyer for Pebble Beach residents Richard and Sharlene Thum said her clients have a better chance of winning their case in the 6th District Court of Appeal in San Jose.

"We have received an outpouring of verbal support from local residents, who have strongly requested that we appeal

Residents asked to register cell phones for emergency notifications

In AN area vulnerable to floods, fires, earthquakes and other disasters, knowing what's going on where, and knowing it as soon as possible, is imperative to residents' and workers' health and safety, so the Carmel Police Department is collaborating with the American Red Cross Monterey Bay Chapter on a campaign encouraging people to register their contact information in order to receive emergency notifications, according to CPD Cmdr. Paul Tomasi.

Public safety officials in the county and Monterey Peninsula cities are asking residents to provide their perti-

the case," attorney Margaret Thum, Richard's sister, told The Pine Cone Tuesday. "It is clear from these unsolicited responses that our case is vitally important not only us, but also to the community at large.

Following a November 2012 trial, Monterey County Superior Court Judge Lydia Villarreal ruled against the Thums, who had argued the district illegally restricted water use, unlawfully charged them connection fees and violated their rights to privacy.

The decision to appeal, Margaret Thum said, was made after Villarreal rejected the couple's numerous objections to her ruling, including the contention Villarreal didn't adequately address the points outlined in their lawsuit.

"On appeal, we will be able to present our case to a threejudge panel in San Jose," Thum said. "Like all other litigants who appeal, we believe this scenario will afford us a better opportunity to present our arguments that, with all due respect, we believe were overlooked by the local court."

The Thums began their fight with the water district four years ago after they converted an 85-square-foot closet to a bathroom. The water district gave them permission to install the bathroom before a district worker inspected their house to finalize the permit process.

During the inspection, though, the water district employee not only checked the bathroom but looked through the whole house, finding two handheld showerheads the district said had been installed without its permission.

Although the Thums said that the home's previous owner denied making any changes to the fixtures after the water district's last inspection in 2007, the district said it was unaware of them.

The Thums contended in their lawsuit that the water dis-

A CARMEL resident who wants the town to be quiet and a restaurateur who wants it to have a bit more nightlife are battling over plans for a racy party in the rooftop bar at a downtown restaurant.

At Tuesday's council meeting, Carolyn Hardy asked the council to protect her First Amendment right to free speech about what she feels is best for the town, but city attorney Don Freeman advised the mayor and council to stay out of a fight that could end up in court.

The brouhaha began after Hardy sent an email to the mayor, council and city administrator Jason Stilwell Jan. 30 alerting them to a Feb. 7 event Rich Pepe planned for his Vesuvio restaurant at Mission and Sixth featuring Justin Timberlake's 901 Tequila.

Dynamite helping reopen Partington Ridge Road

As PROGRESS continues on the repair of Partington Ridge Road in Big Sur — and residents prepare to use the road much sooner than expected — a new YouTube video offers an fascinating look at the work required to complete the job

Partington Ridge, where an estimated 50 people live, was transformed into an island Dec. 24, 2012, when its main vehicle access road was buried by a massive rock slide.

The video — titled "Partington Rock 'n' Roll" — dramatically illustrates how explosives are used to clear tons of debris from steep terrain and provides a rare example of what must have been a common sight along the coast between 1921 and 1937 when Highway 1 was being constructed.

The video was posted on YouTube by Partington Ridge resident Magnus Toren.

"I had my camera mounted on a stick, because we were not allowed to be anywhere near the dynamiting," explained Toren, the executive director of the Henry Miller Library. "I

Council OKs another \$48K for Scenic restrooms, which may actually be built

WITH HIS design for the new public restrooms at the south end of Carmel Beach finally approved last November after three years of hearings and revisions, architect Rob Carver received authorization from the city council Tuesday to proceed with the detailed construction drawings that constitute the next step in the project.

Council members unanimously voted to spend another \$48,500 on the documents and engineering of the building, which will replace the porta-potties that have been located on the bluff at Scenic Road and Santa Lucia for close to 30

The low-profile concrete and stone structure will include two handicap-accessible bathrooms with sinks, a janitor's closet, a green roof, a water fountain and a wall to screen the building from the beach.

In a Jan. 14 letter to the city, Carver estimated the second phase of the project, including preparing construction docu-

ments and working through the bidding process, would cost \$38,500, plus funds for the structural engineer (\$2,220), the archaeologist (\$300), the soils engineer (\$1,500) and the mechanical, electrical and plumbing engineers (\$5,640).

The city has already spent \$49,871 on the first phase of planning and design.

Reserves or new \$\$\$?

In his Feb. 5 report for the council, associate planner Marc Wiener said the money should come from the city's capital project reserves account.

But councilman Ken Talmage, who pulled the item from the council's consent agenda in order to discuss it, said money from the recently approved sales tax increase should pay for it.

"We have about \$500,000 from Measure D funds coming in. I think that rather than taking it from reserves, this is the kind of thing Measure D is meant to fund," he observed, adding, "We've had the porta-potties down there for 27 years."

Talmage also wondered if the council could go ahead and vote to allocate the .116 acre-feet of water the bathrooms will need from the


city's .224 acre-feet reserved for municipal projects, but Wiener said that action would require a resolution that has yet to be drafted. A nearby Cal Am meter that's already active will serve the bathrooms.

Cindy Lloyd took advantage of the discussion to compliment the city and the design.

"The planning commission, the council, and above all, Rob Carver, can take tremendous congratulations for coming up with a plan that meets the purpose, that involved a lot of public input, and that changed the WC in 'water closet' to 'world class," Lloyd said.

Councilwoman Victoria Beach and Mayor Jason Burnett also complimented Carver for his willingness to change his plans over the years to address concerns expressed by neighbors, public officials and others.

The council unanimously voted to approve the new contract with Carver, and to direct city staff to seek grant money to help pay for the project, as well as to prepare the documents to allocate the water.

Kindergarten to move back to River School

m T}$ HE KINDERGARTEN program that was moved to a Carmel Valley campus in 2011 to free up space at crowded River School will return to its previous home before the start of the next school year, according to Heath Rocha, director of special education, student services and child education for the Carmel Unified School District.

Rocha and River School principal Jay Marden told the CUSD board of education Wednesday night of their plans to bring kindergarteners back to River School, now that the number of students has dropped at the school and the bondfunded construction of new buildings there is complete.

Before the meeting, Marden explained that enrollment at River School, which had been high enough to threaten the state-mandated student-teacher ratios and necessitated changes like relocating the kindergarteners and amending the rules for transfer students, has since dropped.

"As many as 10 straight years, we had increasing enrollment, and this year, we had a decrease of 30 to 40 kids," Marden said. "Next year, we're looking at a reduction probably in the neighborhood of 40 kids. That's a significant number, and we can very comfortably take kindergarten back."

Neither Marden nor Rocha had a concrete explanation for the declines, other than speculating one of the factors could be economic, as rents are cheaper in Carmel Valley, where Tularcitos Elementary School is experiencing a bit of an upswing in enrollment, than they are in town.

The new construction at River, including more classroom space, also provides some flexibility in accommodating any

Council upholds approval of LeVett spec house

m A}$ NEIGHBOR'S appeal late Tuesday night of a home being built behind her house failed to gain traction with the city council, which voted 3-0 to uphold the Carmel Planning Commission's approval of developer Denny LeVett's project at Lincoln and Fifth.

Jacqueline Simonelli had unsuccessfully appealed an earlier design last June for the property, and after LeVett received permission to relocate a tree from the center of the large lot and subsequently redesigned the home, she tried again to stop it, arguing it would invade her privacy, block out the sun and erode her property rights to the point of constituting a taking.

But according to associate planner Marc Wiener, the new design is even less intrusive than the original, and he recommended denying Simonelli's appeal. While designer John Mandurrago drew both plans for the two-story house to be relatively simple, with shingle siding and wood roofs, Wiener said the new design includes moving the garage 10 feet off the property line and shifting the second story farther from Simonelli's property, which lies to the west.

In her appeal, however, she contended the house is too massive and would block out the



Housecleaner guilty of stealing, melting down elderly client's jewelry

A WOMAN who stole heirloom jewelry from a client and had it melted down for cash was found guilty of grand theft by a jury in Salinas last week.

Mylonna Rawlinson, 47, of Monterey, was convicted of the crime Jan. 31 in a Salinas courtroom, Monterey County District Attorney Sam Nong said. She faces six years in prison when sentenced March 5.

In August 2011, the victim, Virginia Allen, 78, of Seaside, hired Rawlinson to clean her house once a week.

However, the next month, Allen discovered some of her family heirlooms — including her gold wedding ring, her grandmother's wedding band, a 1952 high school class ring and a 1955 nursing school pin — were missing from her home.

After Allen's daughter confronted Rawlinson, she confessed to stealing the jewelry and selling them to a Monterey jeweler who melted down the gold items.

Several days later, Rawlinson offered to pay Allen the money she got for selling the jewelry in exchange for not seeking prosecution, but Allen refused.

"The victim rejected the offer, because the jewelry was irreplaceable and priceless to her," according to Nong. "The heirlooms are still missing and are assumed to have been destroyed."

Nong told The Pine Cone that Rawlinson — who did not testify at her trial — told police she never confessed to Allen to taking her jewelry.

"I believe she was hoping the jury would not believe the victim," Nong said.

The case went to trial, Nong said, because Rawlinson had been charged with many prior theft crimes and a residential burglary previously that the district attorney's office and Rawlinson "couldn't come to an agreed upon sentence"

The trial was presided by Monterey County Superior Court Judge Mark E. Hood.

Rawlinson, according to Nong, has been convicted in numerous other criminal cases, including crimes involving forgery, grand theft, petty theft and first-degree residential burglary.

Collins: Lie detector shows 'no deception'

FORMER COUNTY water agency director Steve Collins told the truth when he said two county officials urged him to work as a consultant on the regional water project and advised him that doing so wouldn't be a conflict of interest with his official duties.

That's the opinion of a polygraph examiner who gave Collins a lie detector test in July 2011 — a test Collins has long maintained he passed but the detailed results of which were made public last week.

According to the polygraph test — conducted by San Jose polygraph examiner

Darryl Pang during two days in July 2011 — Collins was truthful in eight crucial questions related to his role in the defunct regional desalination project. Collins paid Pang \$400 for the test.

"I resolve that Stephen Phillip Collins reacted truthfully in his polygraph examinations," according to a five-page report Pang wrote after testing Collins. Pang, a retired Milpitas Police Department captain, received polygraph training by the FBI and a San Diego school.

Collins is facing felony conflict of inter-





■ 98 years ago - Feb. 3, 1916

Carmel — How It Was Named

When Sebastian Visciano, the Spanish navigator, in December 1602, was skirting the California coast looking for a harbor in which to locate a colony as a haven to which the Philippine galleons could run for shelter from pirates, he landed in Monterey Bay. With him were three friars of the Carmelite order. Visciano immediately began to make rough surveys of the territory in order to furnish a map of the harbor with his report to

the King of Spain. The Carmelite friars took advantage of the delay to ascend the hills back of the landing place in order to examine the country in the interior. When they reached the top of the hill they were amazed by the similarity of the topography of the country to that surrounding the sacred Carmel Monastery from whence they came. Mount Carmel in the Holy Land had been duplicated in this far western country. Because of this resemblance, they prevailed on Visciano to name the river traversing the plain, Carmelo River, and the mountain in the background, Mount Carmel.



Golf Course

The Carmel golf course is situated south of the village and follows the ocean front from the end of the beach to the mouth of the Carmel river.

It is a ten-hole course which for scenic beauty and interesting natural hazard cannot be surpassed. Philip Wilson, the manager, laid out the course, and his claim is that this course, excepting the old turf, contains better golfing possibilities than any in Scotland.

■ 75 years ago - Feb. 11, 1938

Old Zoning Act Invalid

After two months of research City Attorney William L. Hudson declared at the meeting of the city council Wednesday evening that he is "prepared to state unqualifiedly" that certain portions of Carmel's zoning ordinance, as passed in 1929, amended in 1930 and in 1936, are unconstitutional.

The fly in the ointment, according to Hudson, is that portion of Ordinance No. 170, which in effect discriminates against hotels and restaurants selling liquor in favor of those that do not, by placing these establishments in the same category with other regulated businesses. He proposes to repeal No. 170 entirely and to substitute for it the new ordinance which will requiring permission of the council, before any hotel or restaurant may be established.

Sudden Death of Patrick H. Hudgins Shocks Carmel Friends

All Carmel was shocked Tuesday morning by the death of Captain Patrick H.

Hudgins, victim of a sudden heart attack. He was at his home on San Antonio at the time and had been seen by friends only a short time before, apparently in average health, though his heart condition had for some years required a careful regime.

Capt. Hudgins was born in Virginia on Jan. 15, 1887, and had lived in Carmel for five years. In 1916 he became second lieutenant of the 1st Squadron of the Virginia National Guard. When the national guard was later incorporated into the army with the outbreak of the war, Hudgins became 1st lieutenant and later captain. In this rank he served until 1920, and afterwards in the regular army until July, 1928, when he was retired for physical disability sustained in line of duty. He was prominent in the activities of the American Legion post here.

■ 50 years ago - Feb. 7, 1963

Serra Medal

Congressman Burt Talcott and Senator Thomas Kuchel today introduced bills in the House and Senate authorizing the Treasury Department to strike commemorative medals in honor of the 250th Anniversary of the birth of Father Junipero Serra on 24 November. The bill authorizes the use of U.S. Mint facilities to make the coins, but cost of production will be borne by the Padre Junipero Serra 250th Anniversary Association.

■ 25 years ago - Feb. 11, 1988

Six in contest for mayor

would not seek a second two-year term, there were only three residents signed up for the position. But during the five-day filing extension, which ended Tuesday at 5 p.m., three more candidates threw their hats into the ring.

Carmel residents Rachel and David Goldbloom are scared.



Neighbors complain about cell tower moved to Pacific Grove cemetery

THE AT&T cellular phone tower in Pacific Grove that prompted legal action by the city has been moved to a place where officials hoped there would be few complaints — the cemetery.

And while it's true the dead don't seem to care about the tower, some of the living are

"I strongly protest the AT&T cell tower, which is located directly in front of my apartment by 70 yards," a woman told the P.G. City Council Wednesday night.

The resident, who said she was in her 80s, told the council she has pacemaker and a long list of health problems and is worried the tower's radio waves will aggravate them.

"I do not need more invasion upon my health issues," she told the council.

She suggested the city hire an engineer to "assess the safety" of the tower, a comment that drew applause from about a half-dozen people in the audience.

Another woman at Wednesday's council

meeting contended that placing the tower at El Carmelo Cemetery — which is supposed to be a "temporary" location — was in direct violation of its 1945 deed restrictions. The tower, at the east side of the cemetery, is a stone's throw away from some of its oldest grave sites.

"How can a cell phone tower be erected on public property without land-use hearings and public input?" she asked.

The statements were made during the public comment period of Wednesday's meeting, and council members did not respond.

The tower had been parked at the Pacific Grove adult school per a contract between the Pacific Grove Unified School District and AT&T. But in mid-January, the contract between AT&T and PGUSD expired, and the company was set to remove it.

Fearing that police and paramedics wouldn't be able to respond to emergency calls made via cell phones, the city sought an injunction to force the school district and AT&T to keep the cell tower operating.

"City residents and visitors rely on the regular and emergency phone coverage provided by the cell site," according to the city's

Complaints regarding the AT&T device causing medical issues are not new. A few residents cursed the tower when it was at the adult school.

By allowing the cell tower to be at the cemetery, the city resolved the issue with AT&T before a judge had to rule on its request for an injunction.

turned the camera on and quickly scurried up the ridge. Afterward, with anticipation, I harvested the footage. It came out pretty well." the video, go http://www.youtube.com/watch?v=5CbMU AAA23w).

The work on the road also appears to be going quickly. According to Toren, residents could be driving their vehicles through the area as early as next week.

"The bench that held up the road is strong enough to use," he said. "It's not going to be a huge engineering project. We don't know what the final bill will be, but it will likely be much less than we feared."

Because the road is on private property, the people who live on it are paying for the work.

And Toren cautioned that wet weather could create a setback. "There's a temporary nature to roads in Big Sur," he added. "Every engineering solution along Highway 1 is fraught with insecurity."

Even when the road becomes passable, its use will likely be limited in the near future and be subject to closure at any time.

CAR BACKS INTO OCEAN AVENUE ART GALLERY

FOR THE second time in as many weeks, a driver mistakenly hit the gas instead of the brakes, sending his car careening over the sidewalk and into an Ocean Avenue building. On Jan. 24, a motorist drove his Lexus up the front steps of a room at the Normandy Inn, and on Tuesday, a driver attempting to parallel park backed his Lexus into the front of Mountainsong Galleries.

Gallery owner Jonathan Mountainsong was standing in the courtyard with his back to the street, prettying the area in front of his shop and preparing to add water to the fountain at its center, when he turned and saw the Lexus backing over the curb.

"It knocked down the tree and looked like it was going to stop, and then I saw the rear wheels spinning really fast. He must have had his foot on the brake and the gas at the same time," Mountainsong told The Pine Cone about an hour after the 11:15 a.m. collision Feb. 5.

The car then shot backward "like a bullet," and Mountainsong briefly froze before throwing himself out of the way. He said neighboring store owner Detlef Bittner described his leap as "huge."

After the sedan came to a stop, the engine was still racing, and Mountainsong said he repeatedly asked the driver, identified by police as 77-year-old Frederick Tober of Delaware, to shut off the car. Finally, Tober's female passenger reached

over turned the key.

"He was just sitting there. I thought he had had a heart attack; he was non-responsive," he said, but the man was fine, just perhaps temporarily dumbstruck.

Mountainsong escaped injury, too.

"I hadn't even had my coffee yet — that was the hard part," he said. "Thank goodness I ran track and field."

But his gallery faired less well. The car "totally destroyed" the landscaping, low fencing and potted plants, including a large urn with flowers, before hitting the gallery itself. While none of the display windows broke, he said, "There's this pretty big hole in the building."

The only apparent casualty in the gallery's extensive art collection is the \$7,000 bronze sculpture that sits by the front door.

"There's a bronze dog we have at the front door that looks



COUNTY WARNS OF FLU EPIDEMIC

MAYOR JASON Burnett warned attendees of Tuesday's Carmel City Council meeting that the county is experiencing a significant flu outbreak, and he suggested people take extra care to protect themselves.

"There's widespread flu activity in Monterey County, and the health director is strongly encouraging people to get the flu shot if you've not already gotten the flu shot — they say it's the best way to prevent infection with the flu," Burnett said. "Not only does it help you, but it helps the community at large by providing community immunity."

Burnett said thousands of sick people have crowded hospital emergency rooms in the past few days.

According to a notice from Monterey County Health director Ray Bullick, flu cases are up 22 percent from this time last year, leading to nearly 2,000 emergency room visits between Feb. 1 and Feb. 4. Bullick reported the most common type is influenza A (H3), "although the 2009 pandemic A (H1N1) strain and influenza B have both been detected."

Fortunately, he said, "The current influenza vaccine is an excellent match for these strains of influenza." The elderly, very young kids, pregnant women, people with chronic conditions like asthma and heart disease, and residents of long-term care facilities are particularly vulnerable.

Bullick on Friday also asked doctors "to accommodate as many patients as they can in their clinics," in order to relieve congestion in hospital ERs by staying open longer and taking walk-ins and same-day appointments while deferring cases that are less urgent.

He recommended everyone older than 6 months get a flu shot and pointed people to http://flushot.healthmap.org to find a

provider. Further, people should cover their noses and mouths when they cough, wash their hands with soap and water before eating, avoid close contact with people who are sick, and avoid touching their eyes, noses and mouths

And those who contract the flu should stay home until they are symptom free for at least 24 hours, according to Bullick.

"Not everyone with the flu may need to see a medical provider. However, if you get sick and are at high risk for complications or you are concerned about your illness, call your healthcare provider for advice," he said. "Emergency department visits should be reserved for those with potentially lifethreatening illnesses (for example, difficulty breathing, chest pain, coughing up blood)."





Where dancing was once banned, there's a whole lotta shakin' goin' on

THE NINETEENTH century meets the 21st century when Pacific Grove's historic Chautaugua Hall hosts a performance Friday, Feb. 8, by an electronic dance band, Tropo.

Presented by Dance Jam Pacific Grove — the same folks who stage "dance jams" every Friday night at Chautauqua Hall — the show by Tropo commemorates the dance group's 10th anniversary.

There's a certain irony to Chautauqua Hall's emergence as a hub for dance-related events: Not long after the hall opened in 1881, dancing was banned by the city's famously strict founders, who also prohibited smoking and "carousing." The sale of alcohol in the town was illegal until 1969.

Based in San Luis Obispo, Tropo is a quintet led by composer and producer Tyson Leonard, who brings together layers and loops of violin solos, hypnotic beats, electronic vocal effects, bass oscillations and steel pedal guitar to create according to its members — "a vibe at once tribal and urban."

"They're amazing," said Jessica Wheeler of Dance Jam Pacific Grove. "They're super-rockin' and they're very creative. They play off the energy of the audience. "

In addition to the performance by Tropo, the event which is called "Cirque de Pacific Grove" -

acrobatic circus arts by Shira Yaziv and Nuria Bowart, hula hooping by Jocelyn Gordon and "aerial dancing" by Paige Wyatt. Wheeler offered a description of aerial dancing.

"Paige is going to be dancing on a rope," she explained. "It's like climbing and dancing and falling to music."


Boepple will open the evening with a rendition of Mozart's Sonata in C Major, K. 330.



Juicy peaches, Singles Night, hipster hotel, Valentines and honey bees

ANDY MARIANI has one of those infectious grins that lights up a room. And he's a really good public speaker. But, most of all, he grows excellent peaches ... and plums ... and nectarines ... and cherries ... and pluots. Mariani, in fact, cultivates dozens of different types of stone fruit at his Andy's Orchard in Morgan Hill, including historic heirlooms and experimental hybrids that explode with color and flavor. His collection is one of the largest on the West Coast.

Mariani headlined the annual meeting of the California Rare Fruit Growers held at Bernardus Lodge Saturday, when he shared a little of his extensive knowledge of the orchards his family has farmed for years.

During the talk, Mariani described the basic differences between commercial and heirloom peaches. While heirloom fruits tend to be smaller, oblong in shape, yellow or speckled, and more juicy and flavorful, with a small beak at one end, commercial varieties are larger, uniformly round, red in color and neutral in flavor, with no beak (which can bruise other fruit when packed into crates). Mariani explained commercial growers bred the peaches to "replace the pimple with a

dimple," and to be more deeply colored to hide their greenness when picked. They also have firmer flesh to withstand cross-country shipping.

But heirlooms, as well as newer hybrid varieties created to maximize flavor, juiciness and

color, serve as reminders of "why people like fruit in the first place," he said, before telling the story of the Baby Crawford — an heirloom peach he is credited with saving. UC Davis was studying the Baby Crawford, hoping it would be ideal for drying. But it wasn't, and almost disappeared from cultivation, until Mariani, appreciating its intense flavor, began growing it in his orchard. The Slow Food movement took note and gave the peach a place in its Ark of Taste — an heirloom preservation effort — even though the Baby Crawford hasn't been around that long.

"It tastes like yesterday," he said, "even though it's not that old."

Throughout the summer and fall, Mariani hosts tours at his orchard, and he often lectures and writes, and his fruits are sold in dried form during the off season at www.andysor-chard.com.

The CRFG meeting also featured Big Sur farmer Peter Eichorn, who keeps bees and teaches others how to at his Country Flat Farm in Palo Colorado, and Gene Lester, who's well known for his extensive citrus collection.

While Lester discussed various diseases that afflict citrus trees and how to treat or avoid them, Eichorn spoke about apiaries and the challenges of bee keeping — an activity he first ventured into at the

age of 6, when tried to help his dad with the task and ended up getting stung.

"Everybody wants to know about sex and honeybees," he declared, before explaining the queen will mate with seven to 41 different drones from various hives, ensuring genetic diversity, a strong hive, and, ultimately, better honey.

"In two to three minutes, she can mate with all the drones she needs," he said, adding that she deliberately flies high to draw the strongest males.

Eichorn also discussed the difficulty of amateur beekeeping, which often leads to dead bees, and suggested hiring a professional. Otherwise, people who just want really good

Cal Am considering mayors' changes to water project

A SPOKESWOMAN for California American Water said the company is receptive to a list of recommendations by Monterey Peninsula mayors intended to make the company's proposed desalination plant in Marina more attractive to ratepayers.

On Jan. 31, the six mayors said they would endorse Cal Am's project if it accepted some financing via low-interest public funds, offered more public oversight, addressed technical concerns and made numerous other changes.

Cal Am spokeswoman Catherine Bowie said company officials are considering the mayors' recommendations.

'We support the mayors' efforts to improve our project and share their goal of developing the most feasible, lowest cost, lowest risk and most environmentally beneficial water project," Bowie told The Pine Cone.

The mayors said they would back Cal Am's project if the company, among other things, agreed to the formation of an oversight committee, sought lower electricity rates for the project and accepted significant public funding so the project would be eligible for lower interest rates.

A public contribution of \$100 million would save about \$124 million in interest over life of the desal project and would reduce ratepayers' bills, but would also mean a loss for Cal Am shareholders.

Cal Am officials are still evaluating exactly what the recommendations will mean to the water project, but when Cal Am finds "areas of disagreement," it "will work to find commonality where possible," Bowie said.

The water company, according to the mayors group, should also promptly address concerns pertaining to the company's proposed intake wells for the desal plant, including proceeding with test wells as soon as possible and considering other types of intake wells if the wells the company has proposed prove infeasible.

"We appreciate the document's acknowledgement of the need to pursue slant wells as a preferred intake technology given the permitting requirements in California," Bowie said.

The other two proposed desal plants, both in Moss Landing, would use ocean open intakes to their collect source water. Such intakes are frowned upon by the California Coastal Commission.

Meanwhile, the size of Cal Am's desalination plant will be the focus of a public meeting Tuesday, Feb. 12, 6 p.m., at the offices of the Monterey Peninsula Water Management District, 5 Harris Court, Building G, in Ryan Ranch.










Hardy also provided a photo of "a full stable of Racev women" from Promotions' Facebook page. The company promotes events, mostly motorsports related.

"You might mistake them for sluts and whores in their black thigh-high boots, little black dresses abundantly overflowing with chest and hiked up to their *bleep* which also reveal thigh tattoos," she wrote. "Let's see, the only thing missing so far



Hardy then called out the city for working with Pepe, who unsuccessfully ran for mayor last April and is a member of the mayor's committee tasked with bringing more events, people and money to downtown Carmel.

"Embrace and encourage the loser of the last election whom the voters resoundingly rejected and give him as much platform as possible to set him up for continual public attention and another run for Mayor of Carmel. Forget that you are judged by the company you keep. Encourage him to 'work side by side' with the mayor at every opportunity, rather than keep him at arm's length. Since Pepe is notorious for perpetually pushing the envelope, continue to give him a long leash," she wrote.

Hardy also described Pepe's Carmel-by-the-Glass wine event in Devendorf Park last December that included live models and helped raise money for the Carmel Mission Foundation as "the lingerie fashion show in the park." And she went on to condemn the "babes with hooters atop his restaurant lounge to attract the men that are here for the AT&T next week."

contents were defamatory and libelous, and that she could be sued.

"Although libel per se is actionable without proof of special damages, your defamation has inflicted actual and demonstrable damages to our client," she wrote. Witten also said Racey Promotions had been advised of Hardy's characterization of its employees as "sluts and whores."

Witten demanded an apology from Hardy by Feb. 5, after which she said Pepe would "pursue all available legal remedies, including monetary damages, injunctive relief, and an order that you pay court costs and attorney's fees."

In response, Hardy's attorney, Michael Stamp, countered that Witten provided no evidence of libel or defamation.

"You present no reason for Mrs. Hardy to voluntarily give up her First Amendment rights and her rights under California law," he wrote. "Mrs. Hardy is not deterred by

Stamp also stated that Pepe is a public figure who has "voluntarily injected himself into controversy in Carmel and

Under federal and state law, it is much more difficult for a public figure to win a libel suit than a person who keeps to

"You should keep in mind that opinions and ideas are not statements of fact, and that there are no false ideas under the First Amendment and California law," he continued. "Parody and pointed or colorful political speech are as protected as any other type of speech.'

He characterized Pepe's threatened litigation as a SLAPP case — Strategic Lawsuits Against Public Participation and concluded, "Ms. Hardy was exercising her constitutional right of free speech when she sent her comments to the city council. There is little doubt that your threat is meritless.'

At the Feb. 5 council meeting, during the public comment period, Hardy told the council she wanted to "make public this threat against me," and said criticism, whether justified or not, is protected speech.



est charges related to the collapsed regional water project. Prosecutors allege he took on the role as consultant to the project even as he served as a board member of the county water agency, which had some authority over it

While the results of the lie detector test are not admissible in court, Collins said they show he was being truthful when he said other officials knew of his dual role, and even encouraged him to take the consulting job.

According to Pang, Collins didn't lie when he was asked the following questions:

- Did you offer to resign as a director of the Monterey County Water Resources Agency before becoming a consultant for the regional project? Answer: Yes.
- Were you told by general manager Curtis Weeks that members of the board of supervisors said there was no possibility of a conflict of interest if you agreed to consult for the regional project? Answer: Yes.
- Were you told by deputy counsel Irv Grant that outside counsel had prepared a written opinion that you did not have a conflict of interest if you became a consultant to provide oversight for the regional project? Answer: Yes.
- Was your offer to resign as a director of Monterey County Water Resources Agency rejected by members of the board of supervisors? Answer: Yes.
- Were you aware that members of the Board of Supervisors approved your employment as a paid consultant? Answer: Yes.
- Did you originally agree to be a consultant to provide oversight for the regional project because you were asked to do so by supervisor Lou Calcagno of the Monterey County Board of Supervisors in January 2010? Answer: Yes.
- In January 2010, did supervisor Dave Potter of Monterey County Board of Supervisors ask you to become a consultant to provide oversight for the regional project?

Answer: Yes

■ In January 2010, were you told by general manager Curtis Weeks of the water resources agency that you would be paid as a consultant to provide oversight for the regional project? Answer: Yes

Those who receive a score of +3 to +9 are being "truthful," according to Pang. Of the eight questions, Collins scored one +9, three +8s, two +7s, and two +5s.

"I think the results speak for themselves," Collins told The Pine Cone this week.

A score from +2 to -2 indicates the results are "inconclusive," while -3 to -9 scores indicate "deception" on the part of the test subject, according to Pang.

Collins was also asked questions unrelated to the criminal allegations against him as a way of measuring his general physical response to those queriers.

The test recorded Collins' breathing, and relative changes in his blood pressure and pulse rate, according to Pang's report. It also detected his body's "subtle and gross movements" during questioning.

"They have a device on your head, one around your finger and one around your chest," Collins said. "They also look at your eye variations."

Unrelated to the conflict of interest charges, Collins was also ordered by a judge to stand trial on dozens of charges he over billed Ocean Mist Farms while he worked as consultant for the Castroville artichoke grower.

When asked by The Pine Cone if he would submit to a polygraph test related to the allegations against him at Ocean Mist, Collins said "In a heartbeat. Absolutely."

While polygraph examinations are used by the FBI, CIA and some police departments, their accuracy has long been debated.

In 2002, the National Academies' National Research Council reported the federal government "should not rely on polygraph examinations for screening prospective or current employees to identify spies or other national-security risks because the test results are too inaccurate when used this way."

It also found that polygraph testing is less

accurate for "employee screening" than "investigating specific incidents."

Collins gets new attorney

On Wednesday, a judge appointed private defense attorney Michael N. Burt from San Francisco — working for the Monterey County Public defender's Office and paid by the county's taxpayers — to represent Collins in his criminal case.

Public Defender James Egar on Wednesday cited a conflict of interest as the reason an attorney in his office isn't representing Collins, who is unable to afford his own attorney.

"The reason for the conflict is protected by the attorney-client privilege, and my office is not required not to divulge it unless required by the court under very unusual and infrequent circumstances," Egar told The Pine Cone.

Egar called Burt an experienced attorney who has "handled many complex and high visibility cases."

future spikes in enrollment.

Marden said the logistics of relocating the kindergarten program to River School include planning for transportation, teachers and staff, and the facility itself.

"There are various things to consider," he said. "It's certainly not a simple exercise."

Having the younger kids on campus will be better for everyone, since it makes it easier for them to make the transition into first grade, according to Marden, and they can

take advantage of the library, science labs and other resources.

"As much as they have had a high-quality education the last couple of years, I think there's a benefit to having them onsite," he said.

Rocha said kindergarten parents will receive notification of the impending move soon, while the actual relocation will take place over the summer, and Marden said River School staff will handle registration. Marden encouraged anyone with questions about the program or process to contact the

Tober's Lexus ran over a small city-planted tree and Mountainsong's garden, leaving dirt, plant matter, shards of glass and broken bits of the large urn.





Anna C. LaMothe, age 97, slipped peacefully away on January 5, 2013, at



Cottage Hospital in Santa Barbara. A California native, Anna Cathrine was born in Salinas when her family lived in Spreckles and was raised in the Hawaiian Islands, where her grandmother and mother had been born, and where her father worked as an agricultural chemist. She attended Sacred Hearts Academy in Honolulu and then returned to California for further education at San Francisco School of Fine Arts. 

nent information to Alert Monterey County, a system that delivers recorded emergency notifications to residents and businesses via the 911 database.

trict's regulations are not in compliance with state law and even violate the U.S. Constitution's prohibition of unreasonable searches.

The water district, however, contends the state granted the district the authority to restrict water use in homes, and wide discretion how to do it, when it was created in 1977. During the trial, the water district's attorney cited the Peninsula's longstanding water shortage, which he called an "unprecedented water emergency," as reasons for the district's prac-

The Thums had hoped a judge would compel the water district to not restrict the household use of water, remove the deed restriction on their house, refund their connection fees and set aside its method of counting residential fixtures.

Though Villarreal in her ruling contended the Thums 'agreed to an inspection of their residence," a point argued by the water district, the Thums called the judge's character-

> ization an "erroneous conclusion" and said there was no evidence they consented to have their entire home inspected.



Avoiding high taxes isn't just for golfers

PHIL MICKELSON was right on the money when he said the other day he might have to leave California because of its new upper-income tax bracket of 13.3 percent.

When you add in the top federal rate of 39.6 percent, plus all the Social Security, Medicare, self-employment and disability taxes Mickelson has to pay — and considering that his golf winnings and endorsement fees are all ordinary income — the guy's overall tax rate has probably surpassed 60 percent.

If he moved to Florida, Texas, Washington or one of the other zero-incometax states, his overall tax rate would fall to less than 50 percent, and the difference would surely be many millions of dollars a year for a guy like Mickelson.

Of course, he was instantly criticized by some commentators for being selfish, greedy, whatever. Since that discussion — like President Barack Obama's obsession with calling for "fair" taxes on the rich — involves a personal value judgment, we'll leave it up to you to decide whether there's such a thing as a moral obligation to pay the highest tax rate that might apply to you.

But it is worth considering the economic policy implications of Mickelson's statement. And one thing is for sure: If Mickelson decided to move to a jurisdiction with lower taxes, he'd be following in some well worn footsteps.

In the early 1960s, British income tax rates were sky high, leading to a mass exodus of upper-income people from that country.

The Beatles didn't just write about the phenomenon in their 1966 hit, "Taxman" ("Let me tell you how it will be ... there's one for you, 19 for me"), they did something about it — they all left the country. So did many other successful British musicians, including Phil Collins, Elton John, Sting, Freddy Mercury, Rod Stewart and all the members of the Rolling Stones. Likewise actors such as Sean Connery and Michael Caine.

Meanwhile, U.S. companies with worldwide operations have become very adept at moving their profits to low-tax countries and their expenses to high-tax ones. The list includes GE, Pfizer, Merck, Johnson & Johnson, Microsoft, Cisco Systems and many others.

Nowadays, even for companies that operate strictly inside the United States, it's very common for them to set up shop in states with low tax burdens. Any CEO would tell you he'd rather open a new manufacturing plant in Texas or Arizona than in California.

Two years ago, when NBC superstar LeBron James signed with the Miami Heat for \$17 million a year, instead of a rumored offer of \$19 million a year from the Knicks, it was widely reported that he took the lower offer because he'd have paid so much more in taxes if he lived in New York.


One of the interesting things about people and companies who derive income from many sources is that they usually have to pay taxes every place they earn it. A professional baseball player, for example, may have to file 10 or 15 state tax returns every year — one for each state where he played a game. If he lived in California, he could take a credit for the taxes paid to other jurisdictions, but since California has the highest rate, he'd still owe taxes here on everything he earned everywhere.

And that's why so few golfers at this year's AT&T Pebble Beach National Pro-Am live in California. (It sure isn't because we have lousy weather and bad golf courses.) In fact, as you can see from the tables that appear on page 17 RE, of the top 50 lifetime PGA money-earners playing in this year's Pro-Am, more than half live in Nevada, Florida, Texas or Arkansas — all states with no personal income tax. Only four (and that includes Mickelson) live in California. And among the all-time top 50 money winners on the PGA Tour, besides Mickelson, just one lives in The Golden State.

So, despite Obama's populist rhetoric, it's indisputably true that high tax rates can actually reduce government tax revenues, and that they definitely discourage initiative and hard work. For some people, it's a matter of not putting in extra hours or taking risks because the rewards aren't high enough. For others, it's a matter of getting out of Dodge.

Or, as Tiger Woods said when he was asked about Mickelson's threat to leave California because of its tax rates, "I moved out of here back in 1996 for that reason."

LOWV 'nonpartisan but not impartial' Dear Editor,

A recent Pine Cone article stated that, "the League [of Women Voters of the Monterey Peninsula] purports to be a non-partisan group but has actually been active in lobbying for left-wing causes."

Partisan is defined as support of political parties or candidates while impartial means not favoring one position more than another. We are neither partisan or impartial. The League of Women Voters, a nonpartisan political organization, encourages informed and active participation in government, works to increase understanding of major public policy issues, and influences public policy through education and advocacy. The League advocates on public policy issues

after a process of study and consensus to reach positions. These positions can be found on our website.

Our recent letter to the CPUC supports a water project which provides only replacement water to meet the requirements of Order 95-10. New water demand numbers recently released by CalAm would accommodate development on over 2,400 lots of record. Meeting regulatory needs first has been a consistent position of State Legislation, the California Public Utilities Commission, and proponents of recent water supply projects.

Assembly Bill 1182 required the CPUC to prepare a study for a water supply project to replace water for illegal extractions from the Carmel River. The subsequent study (Plan B) similarly called for replacement water only. The Coastal Water Project and the now defunct Regional Desalination Project were all based on replacement water to meet regulatory requirements only.

The League believes that providing water for growth will complicate the environmental review process and open up additional avenues for challenge to the environmental impact report. The need for mitigation measures to accommodate these lots will further complicate the environmental review process and result in delays for the project which is already one year behind schedule.

Check your elevation Dear Editor,

I've been a State Farm agent in Carmel for the past 38 years, and have serviced flood insurance during that time with the National Flood Insurance Program, as well. Flood insurance through the NFIP is the only game in town, and lenders require that people get flood insurance if they live in mapped flood plains, which change from time to time.

The time has come for the change in this area. The maps were redrawn in April 2009, and people with flood insurance

were told in 2010 they had 2 years to get an elevation certificate to show they were higher than normal or their premiums could go way up. This year people are going to see bills that could be twice as much or more than just last year, because the old grandfathered rates are stopping this year.

Elevation certificates are provided by surveyors, but are not inexpensive. The savings on flood insurance could be enough to get one, though, because the flood insurance will likely be required forever.

While flood insurance is required for many homeowners, most don't know how to minimize the cost or maximize their potential claim payment. It is important that homeowners contact their agent or broker now for details, because as we found in our floods in early 1995, after the fact is often way too late.

In reading of the extensive use of drugs and alcohol by students of Carmel High School, it is obvious that weddings, marriages and births have not fostered a healthy or contented student body. Said marriages are only producing another generation of discontents. The reality is that these students are looking at a reality that they do not want to face. They would rather be lost in a fog of the Peninsula that is not meteorological.

These are the issues that deserve special sections in The Pine Cone. The Peninsula is a fragile, frail, and vulnerable entity which may, or might, yet still be saved from extinction. Weddings and marriages have already long since gone the way of broken fossils that may be washed up on the sands of Carmel Beach.

Mastering your craft, and then sharing your enthusiasm

LAYNE LITTLEPAGE walks with the grace of a Vanessa Redgrave. She should. She's been "trodding the boards" for a number of years, on stage as an actress and a singer.

She grew up in Pacific Grove. "My mom's family were early settlers, and so my parents moved there. I grew up in a little Victorian cottage with a big yard and a barn. It was a very idyllic childhood in small-town Pacific Grove."

She got the acting bug early. "At age 3, I was always getting up on boxes and singing and things like that, and I was in plays in high school, and I really fell in love with acting, and that's what I decided I wanted to do." She was also doing a lot of writing in high school, and she played the violin.

Layne went to college at San Francisco State because it "was the top college for acting on the West Coast." She followed that with graduate studies at Wayne State University in Detroit. "They have a repertory theater connected with the university,

and in that time, I really discovered that I wanted to sing classical music." She had loved opera from her early teen years and had been studying voice throughout college because of theater and musicals and other activities.

So she moved to New York. "I studied with some really fine teachers who were connected with Julliard and Mannes School and Manhattan School of Music and the Metropolitan Opera. So it was a very exciting time." She lived mostly on the Upper West Side, which has always attracted the artiste types, but for five years, she also lived near the United Nations

"It wasn't a neighborhood that I particularly liked very

much, because things were always getting shut down [for diplomatic security] and bomb threats," she said.

Nevertheless, she loved New York. "The possibilities were limitless. Every place I looked was like something I'd seen in a movie. So it was like I was in a movie about New York."

In addition to singing and acting with theatrical companies — she did some off-Broadway and some touring — she also had two novels published.

"One was called 'Murder by the Sea' and it was set in Carmel. The other was called 'Wonkers,' and it was sort of a comic novel," Layne said. "So I ended up writing five novels and maybe three to four screenplays. One was optioned, but nothing ever came of it. My screenwriting career is over. But

I might write another book again."

When she returned to the Peninsula in the mid-1990s, her performing career expanded in a surprising way when she did a show about Beatrice

Lillie. "I did the show about her at a local college, and then I ended up taking it to New York, San Francisco, Palm Springs, the Edinburgh Festival and the Spoleto Festival in Charleston [S.C.]. I had a ton of fun doing it."

Layne understands that the audience for Bea Lillie is necessarily dwindling, so "I also do one-person musical shows. I usually base them around a composer or theme. I do those locally and I have done some in other various places around the country."

She has given private voice instruction since she returned from The Big Apple, and has been teaching voice at Santa Catalina school for the past decade. "Sometimes I also work with the students on their diction, on presentation and things like that, but primarily it's teaching people how to sing, which I find fascinating."

She says anyone can learn to sing, but that true musical

talent is something you're born with. She adds, "It's surprising how many really talented people there are. I've got a lot of really talented students."

In case you didn't know, singing — like so much else — requires a great deal of practice, if you want to sing well. "If I'm singing something classical and it's high, I do a lot of work on that because we don't use those muscles very often. Basically, they're beautified screams, and we don't scream very often."

While Layne misses New

York, she loves it here. "It's a very special place. It's unlike any other place, really. Pacific Grove is a little village, Monterey has the adobes and the history, Carmel is the art colony, Carmel Valley is a whole different thing. There are different cultures, different looks to the place. There are different climates, as well. It's a gorgeous place. It's one of the most beautiful places on earth. It's always felt like home. Even as a little kid, I wanted to live here." And she does.

Body shop owner remembered for kindness, honesty

A LIFELONG Monterey Peninsula resident who was best known as the owner of Pete's Auto Body in Pacific Grove, Pete Drakos unexpectedly passed away Feb. 3. He was 54. The cause of his death has yet to be determined.

The news of his passing saddened local residents. At Pete's Auto Body — located at 214 Fountain Ave. — an impromptu memorial sprang up this week as many of his friends brought flowers and left notes on the wall outside the repair shop.

A familiar face in Pacific Grove, Drakos attended Robert Down School and Pacific Grove Middle School before graduating from Pacific Grove High School in 1976. At the time of his death, he was living in the same house he grew up in.

Drakos' son, Dallon Stang — a graduate student at UCLA — was visiting his father at the time of his passing. The two were particularly close — in fact, the office at the body shop was filled with a "wall of fame" chronicling Stang's youth

"He was my biggest fan, but I was also his biggest fan," Stang told The Pine Cone. "I strive to live my life based on the example he set for me. Most people who knew Pete from the shop knew him as a kind and honest businessman. He was pretty much the same at home, but to a greater extent. He was the nicest guy I knew."

According to Stang, his father was a very generous man, sponsoring youth baseball and soccer teams, and donating to a slew of local and not-so-local nonprofit groups. "He supported just about every charity," he said.

One of Drakos' closest friends, Brett Staples, said he "was never judgmental" and "treated everyone the same way." "He made me a better person," recalled Staples, who asked Drakos to be the best man at his wedding.

Staples said Drakos was a big baseball and football fan, and he always rooted for the Oakland A's and the Oakland Raiders. He enjoyed music, and his tastes ran from surf rock to the Grateful Dead.

And as everyone who knew him could attest, Drakos couldn't resist fixing up an old clunker. "Cars had a habit of following him home," said his son with a smile.

As a businessman, Drakos had a stellar reputation for

honesty and quality work. At www.yelp.com, Pete's Auto Body has a perfect five-star rating. "All I can say is Pete is the man," one post reads.

At Pete's Auto Body, comments left at the makeshift memorial expressed the thoughts and feelings of the people Drakos touched.

"You always waved and smiled as you walked by every day," one post reads. "Fountain Avenue will not be the same."

Drakos leaves behind his wife, Andrea, who he had known since high school and married in 2000. Also surviving Drakos' passing are his son, three daughters — Amber Fisher, Holly Lebaron and Melissa Alvarez — five grand-children, and a half-brother, Dave Deacon. He also leaves behind two Chihauhaus, Ziggy and Gracie. The family said it was too early to know what would happen to the auto body business.

The Church of Latter Day Saints will be the site of a memorial service for Drakos Saturday, Feb. 12, at 11 a.m. The church is located at 1 Knoll Dr. in Monterey.

Drakos' family suggests that any donations made in his name be sent to the Animal Friends Rescue Project.

But Weiner pointed out that the proposed second story is 22 feet from her property line, "which significantly exceeds the minimum side-yard setback of three feet." Considering LeVett's lot is 50 feet wide, "a 22-foot setback from the side property line is substantial." He also noted that at 21.5 feet tall, the house is 2.5 feet lower than the allowed maximum, and the 450-square-foot second story constitutes "only 25 percent" of the house's overall floor area.

Simonelli argued the second-story balcony, with its French doors, would invade her privacy, while Wiener said adequate measures, such as a solid railing, plantings and an 8-foot-tall fence along the western property line, would diminish any privacy impacts.

Simonelli also alleged the city's approval of LeVett's plans would diminish her property value and therefore violate her constitutional rights, and she threatened to sue if the council did not vote in her favor.

When it was his turn to defend the project, builder Chris Tescher pointed out the considerable distances between the proposed house and Simonelli's, and noted the city rules call for a balance between property owners' rights.

"It is hard for me to understand how anyone can argue that this design is blocking light and air from anyone," he said. "We have made a reasonable effort to mitigate any

Simonelli, whose family has owned the house at Monte Verde and Fifth for 80 years, also disparaged Tescher and LeVett for building what she suspects is a spec house, but Tescher said the laws governing design and development in town are the same for everyone, regardless of whether a property owner plans to live in the home, rent it out or sell it.

Another neighbor, Tim Comstock, could not attend the meeting but also objected to the plans, submitting a letter that was read at the meeting, while a third neighbor, former councilman Gerard Rose, reportedly has no issues with the project.

Drawing names

Due to potential conflict of interest, three council members had to recuse themselves, but to maintain a quorum they drew names to see which one of them would join the two who didn't have a conflict in voting on Simonelli's appeal. Ultimately, Mayor Jason Burnett and councilman Ken Talmage left the room, with councilwoman Carrie Theis remaining alongside Victoria Beach and Steve Hillvard at the dais.

None could find aspects of the project that violate the Carmel Municipal Code or the city's residential design guidelines.

"I looked through these guidelines that have been cited — light, air, solar access and the idea of a direct view down into somebody's property — but it's hard to imagine getting it farther away from the lot line," said Beach, who served on the planning commission and was a professor of architecture at Harvard. "I don't think the guidelines mean someone should have to eliminate the possibility of a second story." In fact, she observed, second stories are often favorable in terms of design and efficient use of space.

Theis said she believed Tescher "has taken the appellant's view into account," and she noted a "22-foot setback is pretty generous in this town," where most lots measure 40 feet wide and 100 feet deep.

"I don't see how this violates any of the design guidelines, myself," she said.

Hillyard agreed, and the council unanimously voted to deny Simonelli's appeal and uphold the planning commission's approval.

parking is available on the CSUMB campus at the former Fort Ord, about 10 miles north of Pebble Beach on Highway 1, with frequent shuttle buses to deliver spectators to the competition courses, where other shuttle buses will also take them between courses.

Handicapped parking is available throughout the practice and tournament rounds inside Pebble Beach.





ARK O'MEARA known for his fluid swing, victories on five continents and genial personality — and for being the best player not in the World Golf Hall of Fame. Especially on the Pebble Beach Golf Links, O'Meara's legend is

Amid the many sub-plots, the most prominent storyline of this week's AT&T Pebble Beach National Pro-Am will be whether defending champion Phil Mickelson can match O'Meara's five career wins.

Dating to his first win in 1985, the last year the event was called the Bing Crosby National Pro-Am, O'Meara's success, in wins and consistency, is

In addition to winning the tournament in 1989, 1990, 1992 and 1997, O'Meara has had five other top-10 finishes in the AT&T during his nearly 35-year tenure at Pebble Beach. He also won the State Amateur (1979), and AT&T Pro-Am team title (1984) with J.P. Diesel, an oil industry executive, at Pebble Beach.

Now age 56, and a regular on the Champions Tour (the circuit for players at least age 50), O'Meara last competed in the AT&T in 2010, when he missed the cut.

But O'Meara's 1997 AT&T title was the best example of consistency. It also came at the expense of Tiger Woods, his close friend. Woods birdied 18 of the last 36 holes and finished with rounds of 63 and 64. But after a lessthan-stellar opening 36 holes, O'Meara's four consecutive rounds of 67 beat Woods' strong finish.

At the time, the O'Meara/Woods match-up was ideal. They were neighbors in an exclusive neighborhood out-

side Orlando, Fla. (the state that famously attracts a lot of successful athletes because it has no income tax), and they had played a lot of golf togeth-

Their competition was friendly, but it was also fierce.

At his winning press conference in 1997, O'Meara recalled a conversation between the two players.

"Tiger says to me, 'I just love competition. All I want to do is win. Wouldn't it be great to go head-to-head sometime?" O'Meara said. "I told him, 'You may blow it by me by 50

Behind the greens: What it takes to present a PGA tournament

HEN SFB Morse surveyed the golden granite coast of the Monterey Peninsula, he judged it an ideal setting for golf courses and luxury homes for the glitterati and the golfers he would lure to Pebble Beach.

Nearly a hundred years later, it's hard to imagine that Morse could have anticipated the skyboxes and executive tents of the AT&T Pebble Beach National Pro-Am golf tournament, constructed like a small cityscape around the manicured greens he opened in February 1919. Or that the setting would lure more than 160,000 spectators in a single week.

It's also hard to believe all that infrastructure is temporary. The suites and bleachers, the fencing and flooring, the tents and the trailers — all of them will disappear when it's over, as quickly, it seems, as they went up.

But the army of staff and volunteers, plus professional and amateur golfers, knows that what goes on "behind the greens" to stage a golf tournament of this caliber is neither easy nor quick.

Actually, 2,500 volunteers and 14 staff members will help execute the exceptional event, which takes place over seven days, across three Pebble Beach golf courses: Pebble Beach Golf Links, Spyglass Hill Golf Course and

Monterey Peninsula Country Club Shore Course. Some have been working all year, while others arrived this week to usher spectators parked at California State University Monterey Bay onto 200 buses or lead them to the links in time to watch last year's champion Phil Mickelson tee off.

The tournament, which has raised more than \$100 million for charity since its inception in 1937, garnered \$10 million just last year. Yet it wasn't always so profitable or complicated.

Some 76 years ago, singer-actorsometime dancer and one heckuva golfer, Bing Crosby founded the "Crosby Clambake" in Rancho Santa Fe by asking a few friends to have a clambake, play golf and raise money for charity. Ten years later, he moved the tournament to Pebble Beach, where a year-round effort produces what has become a major event.

"People probably don't have a concept of what it takes to stage an event of this magnitude," says Cathy Corey, senior director of marketing and public relations for the Monterey Peninsula Foundation, which presents the AT&T to raise funds for charity. "Our operation is a multi-million-dollar build-out to house the tournament. And because Pebble Beach is a world-class resort, we don't have a large window of time in which to get it done. Other PGA events, hosted at golf courses which aren't resorts, are able



to start building two months out. We work round the clock to establish the infrastructure and build the structures of this event."

Some arrangements are made a year in advance. Vendors are confirmed the previous summer. Eligible golfers start committing to the tournament in December but have until the Friday before the event to confirm their participation.

A glimpse of this year's professional line-up includes Phil Mickelson, Lee Westwood, Dustin Johnson, Webb Simpson, Jim Furyk, Brandt

THE VOLUNTEERS

Thousands of volunteers help generate millions of \$\$\$ for charity

HE CHOICE was between a suburb of Chicago and Carmel-by-the-Sea. after a trip to California and a coastal drive, they realized the answer was obvious. The coastline, the climate, the clear light and the golf courses had won them over.

In 1972, Dr. Glenn Hudgens and his wife, M.C. Hudgens, moved to Carmel, where he established his family medical practice and a regular routine of playing golf. A year later, he combined his passions and joined the volunteer corps of what was called The Crosby golf tournament in Pebble Beach. Forty years later, he is still the volunteer medical director for what is now the AT&T Pebble Beach National Pro-Am, which has earned him membership in the tournament's celebrated 40-Year Club.

"As medical director, Dr. Hudgens oversees all the volunteer doctors and nurses out on the three golf courses and in the first aid trailers," says volunteer coordinator Susanne Overton. "Whether someone needs a Band-Aid or an ambulance, he's on it. Glenn is very easy going and dependable, and he has been a loyal, hard-working volunteer. He also is very well known and respected in the community."

Dr. Hudgens is one of 2,500 volunteers who turn out each year to support and enjoy one of the more prestigious and entertaining events on the PGA Tour — and one that has a very impressive record of raising money for local charities.

"I think everyone recognizes that none of the professional golf tournaments could be conducted without volunteers," says Dr. Hudgens. "Further, you couldn't pull off a tournament financially without volunteers, and if you could, there would be nothing left for charity. Just the salaries of the doctors and nurses who volunteer their time and expertise would be too expensive. And Community Hospital of the Monterey Peninsula donates all the medical supplies."

Some volunteers report for duty on

tournament days at 6 a.m. and don't leave until after 6 p.m., while others get to the course in time for the first tee off at 8 a.m. And some work for weeks to help with advance preparations. For many, the attraction and the reward for volunteering their time is the chance to watch exceptional golf in a spectacular setting, and catch a glimpse of favorite celebrities and professional golfers at play. Others don't get anywhere near the golf course, such as those working a dozen miles from the action at the California State University Monterey Bay parking lot to organize and assist thousands of eager spectators waiting for a ride into Pebble Beach. For them, the payoff is

knowing they are helping to execute a world-class event and raise millions of dollars for charity.

That, and a sporty volunteer uniform, plus commemorative gifts.

"While the volunteer uniform varies by committee," says Overton, "everyone wears a tournament jacket in various styles and colors, all with the event logo. And, of course, the marshals and scorers are dressed in traditional knickers and argyle socks."


This year, volunteer appreciation comes in the form of two, week-long tickets to the tournament, as well as a logo wine tote bearing a bottle of wine,

WHAT TO WEAR

Fashion tips from a man who really knows his knickers

OST OF us are not lucky enough to attend the AT&T Pebble Beach National .Pro-Am in person. Fortunately, the TV coverage can be great, too, providing us with views unavailable to those trekking the golf courses. Though nothing compares with being in proximity to Pebble's extraordinary scenic beauty, shots from the circling blimp offer vistas you cannot see from the ground. But if you are hosting or attending a home party to watch the final round, you must remember that a TV golf party is quite different from the Super Bowl party you went to last Sunday. The AT&T is a course of a different color.

Problems can arise over what kind of food to serve — and over what to wear. What to wear? Am I insane? Probably, but a true fan dresses properly for the game or tournament even if watching it on TV. The Super Bowl was easy. Especially this year. Everyone wore a 49ers jersey and jeans. Khakis were OK, but torn jeans said tattooed linebacker with eye black spread over his face like a Chiricahua Apache. Think Ray Lewis. Groundskeepers are synonymous with khakis. Think Rudy.

Golfing attire, on the other hand, requires casual elegance. Not too casual, though. You can't show up at an AT&T party wearing a pig nose the way Washington Redskins fans do at their home games. After all, you are watching a sporting event played at a course with one of the highest greens fees in the country, and another course with one of the most expensive memberships in the country. You can play a round at Spyglass for \$360. That loop will cost you \$495 at Pebble. At Monterey Peninsula Country Club, you're talking the kind of money congressmen like to throw around when it isn't theirs. Forbes Travel for 2008 listed MPCC membership at a cool

hundred and seventy-five thou, plus monthly fees. So naturally you have to dress properly for this event, even if you're not there.

A good rule of thumb is to emulate Davis Love III. No one looks better in a lavender Ralph Lauren polo and white linen slacks than DL3. At all costs, avoid dressing like John Daly. Daly should be riding in a clown car, not a golf cart. Sorry, Phil, I know you are a crowd favorite but your black slacks with white pinstripes are more suitable for a mortician than they are for a golfer. Ricky Fowler, please, please tone it down. Stop dressing like you're a leftover from the Super Bowl halftime show.

Food served at an AT&T party should be as different as Casanova is from Phat Burger. Remember the Super Bowl party? The host could serve nothing that distracted attendees from the game. You couldn't run to the kitchen during commercials because the commercials are as much a part of the game as some ditsy singer screwing up the National Anthem. So you probably had picnic coolers filled with beer and sodas strategically placed around the room with two or three coffee tables laden with standard football fare: pizza ordered in, chips, pretzels, nachos, popcorn in a bag. There may have been chili in the kitchen but you had to serve yourself. And definitely no crudités. Had you craved stuffed celery, broccoli florets, and raw cauliflower, you would have been sent to the another room to watch figure skating on a non-flat screen TV.

You have to change your mindset about food for the AT&T Pro-Am. No picnic coolers, please. Bottled water (not domestic) replaces beer and soda. Golfers and golf viewers need to hydrate. White wine is suitable if it comes from Monterey County. You



AMERAS MAY may be banned during the tournament, and autograph-seeking is discouraged except when players have finished their rounds, but the AT&T Pebble Beach National Pro-Am is nevertheless one of the best opportunities to get close to your favorite star.

Whether you're a movie buff, love primetime drama, idolize professional athletes, get weak-kneed for rock stars, or thrill at the sight of gazillionaire businessmen, the fairways of Pebble Beach, Monterey Peninsula Country Club and Spyglass Hill are the place to be this weekend.

Here's a rundown of the celebrities who have entered the tournament this year. We've also includ-

ed one who won't play: Clint Eastwood who, as chairman of the foundation that sponsors the Pro-Am, is sure to be spotted around the links.

■ Bret Baier

Host of the top-rated prime time Fox News show "Special Report," Bret Baier, 42, is a native of New Jersey who worked for stations in Raleigh, N.C., Beaufort, S.C., and Rockford, Ill., before being hired by Fox News in 1998.

He reported from Atlanta until 2001, when he was made the network's Pentagon correspondent. Later, he was Chief White House Correspondent before taking over as anchor of "Special Report" from Brit Hume in 2009.

Baier's program, "Special Report," which airs weeknights, averages about 2 million viewers a night, compared to 1.1 million for Rachel Maddow and only about 650,000 for Anderson Cooper.

An offensive lineman for the San Francisco 49ers during some of the team's best years, including the 1989, 1990 and 1995 Super Bowl-winning seasons, Harris Barton, 48, was also Rookie of the Year in his first NFL season. England Patriots and the NFL's longest-tenured active coach. Born in Nashville, Tenn., Belichick began his career as an assistant with the Baltimore Colts in 1975. In 1979, he became defensive assistant and special teams coach for the New York Giants, helping the team win Super Bowls in 1987 and 1991. From 1991 to 1999, he was head coach of the Cleveland Browns and an assistant coach for the New York Jets before joining New England in 2000. With Tom Brady as quarterback, Belichick's team defeated the St. Louis Rams 20-17 in Super Bowl XXXVI (2002), the Carolina

Panthers 32-29 in Super Bowl XXXVIII (2004) and the Philadelphia Eagles 24-21 in Super Bowl XXXIX (2005). Since then, he has lost two Super Bowls to the New York Giants in very close games in 2008 and 2012. This year, the Patriots were eliminated from the playoffs when they lost the AFC Conference Championship to the Baltimore Ravens 28-13.

A birdie told us that dozens of charities benefit from the AT&T

OLF BALLS and windows are not the best combination—unless the windows are at St. Philip's Lutheran Church in Monterey and the golf balls are birdies hit at the AT&T Pro-Am. In that case, they're a match made in heaven.

The stained glass windows at St. Philip's are leaking and in need of repair, and St. Philip's is one of the numerous and diverse beneficiaries of the tournament's Birdies for Charities program.

Pastor Laurel Alexander is enthusiastic about St. Philip's participation.

"This is our second year with

Birdies for Charities. I think it's a fabulous program." She hopes to raise enough money through the event to repair the windows in the half-century old church. "Our windows are not very ornate, but fixing them is not inexpensive," she commented.

Birdies for Charities is a matching program that allows supporters of a charity to donate money for each birdie made during the tournament, or just to give a flat amount. The program then adds up to a 20 percent match. Among the nearly 100 participating organizations are groups that serve veterans, animals, seniors, health concerns, children ... the list occupies five pages on the Birdies for Charity web

site.

Julianne Leavy, who heads up a Carmel-based program called Harmony at Home, called Birdies for Charity "wonderful" and said, "people really love that their dollars can go further."

Leavy, a licensed marriage and family therapist, developed a school-based counseling program called "Sticks and Stones" to help children cope with domestic violence. Harmony at Home became an extension of that effort in 2004, adding more services for children and their parents.

Last year, the organization helped more than 1,000 children in Monterey and Salinas through counseling, classes, a bullying prevention program, and a summer camp for girls who have been exposed to violence.

At the other end of the age spectrum, the Carmel Foundation has plans to use the funds it raises from Birdies for Charity for its newest program, Monterey Bay Village. It's not a retirement community, it's "a village of services," according to director Nettie Porter — who was instrumental in bringing Birdies for Charities to the AT&T in 2008.

She said the goal of the Monterey Bay Village program is "to help seniors



stay in their homes as long as possible." It works toward that goal two ways. First, by referring seniors to local vendors and professionals, who will in turn provide services at a discount. And by providing volunteers to help seniors with non-skilled labor according to Porter, "everything from providing transportation to hanging a picture on the wall."

There is an annual membership fee of \$360 for individuals and \$480 for a household, and since it opened in July of 2012, Monterey Bay Village has enrolled 43 members.

The village is part of a national movement, according to Porter.

"There are already 90 villages in the United States, with another 150 in development," she said.

Veterans of all ages are served by Monterey Bay Veterans, another beneficiary of Birdies for Charity. John Whitacre, Executive Director, says the organization is now in its 26th year as a diversion therapy program recognized by the Veterans' Administration.

The charity takes wounded warriors and veterans on sport fishing expeditions on their aptly named fishing vessel, "The Independence." A sister vessel, "The Freedom," takes veterans on diving expedi-

Whitacre told the story of an Army veteran who had been a master diver, but who was injured in battle and lost all four limbs.

"We taught a quadruple amputee to dive again," he said proudly, "You can see video on our website."

The Independence is also used to spread veterans' ashes at sea.

"We can take up to 25 family and friends on the boat," Whitacre noted. "We spread the ashes with full military honors."

Whitacre is passionate about veterans, and about Birdies for Charities. "We are probably one of the smallest non-profit veterans' agencies in our area. Birdies for Charities is a really good program, because adding 20 percent to a donation might help 20 percent more people to get our services. You can't put your money anywhere and have it make 20 per-

Whether you walk the links this weekend or just watch from the comfort of your couch, you can cheer for the golfer who makes the birdie — and all of the charities who benefit from it.

Snedeker, Hunter Mahan, David Duval, Davis Love III, Vijay Singh and Mike Weir. Tiger Woods is skipping the Pebble Beach Pro-Am again this year.

"The pros are all eligible for the tournament through the PGA, and it's exciting to see their names come in," Corey said. "The celebrities register by invitation, and we come up with their names through suggestions. Maybe someone read in People Magazine at a doctor's office that a certain celebrity plays golf, and then they give us a call. Or, our chairman is Clint Eastwood, who has a bit of an 'in' in Hollywood, and when he calls, people pick up the phone. The challenge is that the celebrities have to be really, really good golfers, not just casual players."

Spectators can look for, among others, Wayne Gretzky, Aaron Rodgers, Matt Cain, Justin Verlander, Carson Daly, Josh Duhamel, Andy Garcia, Bill Murray, Chris O'Donnell, Ray Romano, Tony Romo and Andy Roddick. (For celebrity profiles, see page 18 ATT.)

Every year, the event's staff looks for ways to enhance the event. This year, the organization has augmented the grand or main spectator entrance along Peter Hay Hill, and has added an "Experience Monterey" tent to reveal the attractions and events of the Monterey Peninsula.

"The Monterey County Convention and Visitors Bureau has brought in all the major events in a unified display. It's a very big wow," Corey continued. "People come to the AT&T from all over the world. From the Monterey Bay Aquarium to the Sports Car Racing Association of the Monterey Peninsula, guests should know how much we have to offer here."

With 160,000 spectators in town throughout the week, plus the exposure of CBS network television, which will broadcast the tournament around the world, the impact, says Corey, is enormous. It is quite something to put this much effort into an event and have the world show up. The economic impact on the community, says Corey, is about \$68 million a year. The sociocultural impact of such exposure is surely worth even more. Which may be exactly what S.F.B. Morse had in mind.

age 42. Like O'Meara, he's known for his instruction-video perfect swing, and he has among the best "short games" on the PGA Tour.

Dustin Johnson, who won the event in 2009 and 2010, Davis Love III, another two-time winner who's playing in the event for the 28th straight year, FedEx Cup winner Brandt Snedeker,

Nick Watney and Hunter Mahan are also entered.

According to Steve John, tournament director, 22 of the 25 players who earned their first or regained their PGA Tour cards for 2013 in the qualifying tournaments or on the Web.com Tour will also be in this year's AT&T field.

Among the newbies is South Korea's Si Woo Kim, age 17. He became the youngest player to earn his PGA Tour card at Q-School and will make his tour debut at the AT&T (with a sponsor's exemption, since he can't officially qualify for the PGA Tour until he turns 18 in June).

The 156-player field will rotate for the first three rounds on Pebble Beach, Spyglass Hill and the Shore Course at Monterey Peninsula Country Club for the first three rounds. The top 60 scores and ties will advance to Sunday's final round at Pebble Beach, where the winner will earn \$1.7 million of the \$6.5 million purse.

In 2005, Mickelson became the first player in the tournament's 72-hole format (it began in 1958) to lead all four rounds. Along the way, the AT&T's only left-handed winner established several records and tied other marks. He shot an opening-round record 62 at Spyglass Hill and set 36-hole (129) and 54-hole (196) scoring records.

Last year, while playing the final round paired with Woods, Mickelson secured his most impressive AT&T title. He rallied from a six-shot deficit entering the final round and claimed a two-shot title over Charlie Wi with an 8-under 64.

"It's certainly the best round and best tournament I had all last year," said Mickelson via a pre-tournament teleconference in mid-January. "In some cold and difficult conditions, I was able to have control of my golf ball, putted extremely well and doing it with somebody I enjoy playing my best with more than just about anybody in Tiger. It was really a fun week.'

(Woods, who claimed his 75th career PGA Tour title on Jan. 28 at the Farmers Insurance Open in San Diego, is not playing in the AT&T this year.)

Mickelson finished second the week after last year's AT&T, in the Northern Trust Open in Los Angeles, and he finished third a month later at the Masters, the first major of the season. But Mickelson didn't play well for most of the rest of the season.

At the U.S. Open last June at the Olympic Club in San Francisco, Mickelson was in contention after three rounds of the country's national championship. But he finished with a 78 and finished 65th.

Mickelson and O'Meara, while still friends, don't see each other often, particularly since they compete on different tours.

"I haven't talked to Mark in some time," said Mickelson. "I see him every year at the Champions dinner and during the Masters week, and we were very close during our years together on Ryder Cup and Presidents Cup teams."

He spoke of O'Meara's "wonderous career," but said he would definitely try to match his five wins in the AT&T.

Combined, Mickelson and O'Meara have won one-third of the past 27 Crosby/AT&T tournaments although their respective prime career years occurred in different eras.


AT&T tournament director Steve John says the PGA Tour is more competitive now.





THE HISTORY

Great scenery and spectacular finishes — what else is there?

PINE CONE STAFF REPORT

he AT&T Pebble Beach National Pro-Am actually got its start in 1937, when Bing Crosby invited a group of friends to get together for a round of golf and a "clambake" at Rancho Santa Fe in Southern California. That gathering of Hollywood celebrities and golf greats gave birth to the first National Pro-Amateur Golf Championship, sponsored by Bing Crosby, with Sam Snead taking the top prize of \$500.

For five years, the tournament was played at Rancho Santa Fe before being discontinued during the war years. Meanwhile, 1946 was shaping up to be a bleak year for the Monterey Peninsula. Postwar Monterey was frantically scraping for income, the chief source having been packed into sardine tins for just about the last time. Cannery Row was heading into a long decline, Carmel wasn't a worldwide tourist attraction, Pebble Beach had yet to be classified as the finest course in the world, and nobody had heard of a young, would-be actor named Clint Eastwood.

At this time, a young newspaper reporter, Ted Durein, came up with the idea of attracting more tourists by bringing a major special event to the area. A good sporting event, once a year, perhaps garnished with celebrities, could anchor a drifting economy. Slowly an idea began to take shape, along with a worldwide household name: Crosby.

Durein solicited local merchants to see if they would pool money for a tournament purse — they would. Bravely, Durein wrote to Bing Crosby himself with the idea. That was in January of 1946. February and March passed. Nothing. April, May, still nothing. Then, in June, a letter from Bing's brother, Larry, arrived. Yes, Bing was interested. What's the offer? Durein didn't have one.

The deal is struck

He quickly rushed to see if Samuel F.B. Morse (president of Del Monte Properties, now known as Pebble Beach Company) would let the Pebble Beach golf course host the Crosby. Morse agreed. Ted met with Larry Crosby, and the deal was struck.

Bing then decided he wanted the tournament spread out over three courses: Pebble Beach, Cypress Point and the Monterey Peninsula Country Club's Dunes Course. The PGA Tour, the controlling body of the professional golfers' tournament, said this wasn't possible. Bing asked, "Why not? It's done in England." The PGA Tour consented and the Crosby Pro-Am broke new ground in American golf and was played for the first time on the Monterey Peninsula in January 1947.

Since then, the annual tournament at Pebble Beach has been a staple of the PGA Tour calendar. The tournament purse has increased from \$500 for first prize in 1937 to a first prize of \$1,170,000 this year. The monies for charity each year have continued to set new records as well, with total contributions hitting more than \$100 million.

Bing Crosby died in 1977. His wife and children continued to host the Crosby Pro-Am until 1986, when AT&T took over sponsorship of the event. The event was played at Pebble Beach, Poppy Hills and Spyglass, until MPCC's Shore Course replaced Poppy Hills in 2010. Over the last 20 vears, the event has provided some of the most dramatic moments in golf, including Hale Irwin's fantastically lucky tee shot in 1984, and Tiger Woods' amazing comeback in 2000.

It has also endured some of the worst weather ever for a major sporting event. Twice, after particularly cold and rainy spells, tournament organizers have talked about moving the Pro-Am. But most years, there have been glorious, only-in-California conditions for the Pebble Beach Pro-Am. And the memories have been golden, too.

1993 Winner: Brett Ogle 68-68-69-71 (276)

Gregarious Australian Brett Ogle captured his first PGA Tour victory at Pebble Beach with a three-shot triumph in the AT&T Pro-Am, despite four bogeys in six holes during the final round. With a steady rain falling through much of the day, Ogle birdied three of the last six holes to fend off challengers Billy Ray Brown and Greg Twigs. Ogle's first-place finish was worth \$225,000. Tom Watson had the low round on the final day, with birdies on 10, 11, 18, 6, 7 and 9. Payne Stewart and Jim Morris won the Pro-Am title, after Mark McGwire knocked his team out of contention with a bogey on 18.

1994 Winner: Johnny Miller 68-72-67-74 (281)

Defying the calendar, 46-year-old Johnny Miller captured the AT&T Pro-Am, and even he had trouble believing it. "I play two tournaments a year ... this is magic," he said. The win was Miller's third title in three different decades at the Pebble Beach charity event - he had previously won in 1974 and 1987. Jeff Maggert, Corey Pavin, Kirk Triplett and Tom Watson all finished just one stroke behind Miller, who sank a one-foot putt for par on 18 to avoid a possible five-way playoff. It rained nearly all day during the final round and, with a gale blowing from the south, Miller got to the green in two on 17 to preserve his lead while Watson was bogeving 14, 16 and 17. Miller's first-place finish was worth \$225,000. Pro-Am winners were Dudley Hart and 18-year-old amateur Robert Floyd.

1995 Winner: **Peter Jacobsen** 67-73-66-65 (271)

ner, Peter Jacobsen captured the \$252,000 winner's purse despite starting play at Pebble Beach on Sunday at just three under. His total score, 271, was the lowest since Mark O'Meara's 273 in 1985, but with clean-and-place rules in effect because of a wet course, Jacobsen said his record score deserved "an asterisk." With a bit of sun finally showing through the clouds, Jacobsen birdied 18 to seal his victory. David Duval, in his first full year on the PGA Tour, finished in second place, two strokes back. Pro-Am winners were Bruce Vaughn and amateur Masahi Yamada.

1996 Winner: **nobody** Tournament canceled due to unplayable conditions

The weather on Sunday was pleasant: low clouds, some sun, no rain. But heavy rains earlier in the week, including a torrential downpour on Saturday, left the courses — especially Spyglass — in unplayable condition, forcing outright cancellation of the AT&T Pro-Am due to weather for the first, and only, time in its history. (Play was suspended from 1942 to 1946 because of World War II.) In particular, one flooded spot on 16 at Spyglass was cited by PGA officials as requiring cancellation of the event. Jeff Maggert was the leader at 136 after 54 holes; he got \$5,000 in consolation money, just like all the other pros in the field.

Winner: Mark O'Meara 67-67-67 (268)

Fighting off an amazing comeback by Tiger Woods — who was in 67th place on Friday and trailed by seven shots Sunday morning — Mark O'Meara won his fifth AT&T Pebble Beach Pro-Am by a single shot over Woods and David Duval. Woods, playing in a foursome one hole ahead of O'Meara, had six birdies in the first 12 holes but bogeyed 13. Two shots down on 18, Woods made a dramatic bid for an eagle on 18. His second shot, from 267 yards out, landed on the front of the green. But he missed a 35-foot putt and had to settle for a birdie. O'Meara's all-time low score at the event was worth \$342,000. Pro-Am champs were Paul Stankowski and Andy Garcia.

Winner: Phil Mickelson 67-68-67 (202)

A torrential downpour on Sunday brought back memories of 1996, when the AT&T Pro-Am was canceled after 54 holes. But in 1998, with California again experiencing record-breaking rains, PGA officials looked for a way to squeeze in a third round at Pebble Beach sometime later in the year. First, they set the final round for March 2. Later, it was rescheduled again to Aug. 17. The winner's check was \$450,000. The Pro-Am portion of the tournament was canceled.

1999 Winner: **Payne Stewart** 69-64-73 (206)

With weather getting seriously in the way for the fourth time in five vears, the 1999 tournament was shortened to just 54 holes, just like it had been the year before. Saturday leader Payne Stewart was declared the winner of the \$504,000 first prize after heavy rains Saturday night and Sunday forced cancellation of the final round. Stewart's final shot on Saturday, a tap-in birdie on 18 at Spyglass, turned out to be the winner over Frank Lickliter, just one shot back. Pro-Am winners were Lickliter and Robert MacDonnell. Later that year, Stewart won the U.S. Open at Pinehurst, S.C. He died in a plane crash Oct. 25, 1999, when carbon monoxide rendered everyone on board his chartered airplane unconscious soon after takeoff from Orlando, Fla. The plane flew on autopilot until it ran out of fuel and crashed in South Dakota, depriving Stewart of the chance to defend his U.S. Open and AT&T Pro-Am titles — both at Pebble Beach — in 2000.

2000 Winner: **Tiger Woods** 68-73-68-64 (273)

Leaving the crowd and the sports-

writers practically speechless, Tiger Woods gave the AT&T Pro-Am a finish unlike any other. Down five shots when play began on Sunday, and even farther behind — seven shots — with just seven holes to play, Woods took complete control of his game and the tournament, capping his comeback with a 97-foot wedge shot on 15 that hit just to the right of the hole, took two bounces and landed in the cup. He nearly did the same on 16 and finished two strokes ahead of Vijay Singh and Matt Gogel to take the first prize of \$720,000. The win was Woods' sixth in a row on the PGA Tour. Pro-Am champs were Skip Kendall and King City businessman David Gill. The tournament was the last Pebble Beach Pro-Am event for golf legend Jack Nicklaus.

2001 Winner: **Davis Love III** 71-69-69-63 (272)

Despite a seven-shot deficit when play started under sparkling, clear skies Sunday morning, Davis Love III put together an amazing round of 63, including five birdies and an eagle on the first six holes. On the front nine, he was an amazing eight under. Another birdie on 15 sealed his victory and the first-place money of \$720,000. Vijay Singh finished just one stroke back; Tiger Woods was eight strokes off the lead. Pro-Am champs were Phil Mickelson and saxophonist Kenny G.

2002Winner: Matt Gogel 66-72-67-69 (274)

With his first PGA Tour victory, Gogel picked up a check for \$720,000 after shooting two under on the back nine during the final round. Two years earlier, Gogel had watched Tiger Woods stage an incredible comeback to take the tournament from him. This year, third-round leader Pat Perez, who was up by four strokes when play started Sunday, withered on the final day, shooting a triple bogey on the 18th Hole, opening the door for Gogel, who showed none of the nervousness of 2000. Tiger Woods shot 282, eight strokes off the lead (for the second year in a row). Pro-Am winners were Brian Claar and Randall Mays.

2003Winner: **Davis Love III** 72-67-67-68 (274)

With nothing but blue skies and mild temperatures throughout the tournament, talk of "Crosby Weather" and of moving the AT&T later in the year a common topic in the storm-tossed 1990s — was completely forgotten. And with Tiger Woods sitting out the Pro-Am after consecutive years finishing eight strokes off the lead, all the attention was on less well known, but equally formidable, PGA stars. Davis Love III salvaged a victory with a birdie on 18 on the final day — holding off Tom Lehman by a single stroke. Love's win — his second in three years — came despite a bogey on 16 in the final round. In the group just ahead, Tom Lehman bogeyed two holes in the front nine but then shot five birdies on the back nine and seemed poised to force a playoff. A missed birdie putt from less than six feet on 18 left him in second place. Love's win, worth \$900,000, came with some extraordinary luck: His tee shot on 12 hit a photographer (not from The Pine Cone) and rolled to within easy putting distance of the pin. The Pro-Am ended in a tie, with pros Phil Tataurangi and Brad Faxon and their amateur partners Chris Heatley and Thomas Ryan ending up with 31-under scores of 257. Both pairings finished with final rounds of 64. Two Pro-Am teams were disqualified during the tournament for signing incorrect scorecards.

Winner: Vijay Singh 67-68-68-69

With four rounds in the 60s, Vijay Singh had little serious competition in the 2004 AT&T Pebble Beach National Pro-Am. His dominating three-stroke victory came with 25 birdies and earned him \$954,000. After 54 sun-drenched holes, it appeared that San Jose State graduate Arron Oberholser (who would win the tournament in 2006) had a chance to beat Singh. In the same group for the final round, they were tied at 13 under when play began Sunday.

On the first three holes, Singh's tee shots were errant: one going into the rough, one missing the fairway and another missing the green by 60 yards. But Singh managed to turn all three into birdies.

Another birdie for Singh on 8, coupled with a double bogey for Oberholser on the same hole, gave Singh an unbeatable six-stroke lead. The winning Pro-Am team was Jerry Kelly and Robert Halmi, Jr.

2005

February 8, 2013

Winner: Phil Mickelson 62-67-67-73 (269)

Phil Mickelson started his week on the Monterey Peninsula being inducted into the California Golf Hall of Fame and finished it breaking records on his way to a four-stroke victory in the 2005 Pebble Beach Pro-Am. Fellow lefty Mike Weir was the run-

In the process, Mickelson became the first wire-to-wire winner since the tournament was lengthened from 54 holes to 72 holes in 1958. He matched the tournament record with a 10under-par 62 in his opening round at Spyglass Hill Golf Course. The amazing performance also set a record for Spyglass. And then, Mickelson set the tournament 36-hole record at 129 with his second-round 67 at Poppy Hills. And he set the tournament 54-hole record at 196 with his third-round 67 at Pebble Beach.

Although a final-round 73, oneover-par at Pebble Beach, left him one shot off the tournament record of 268 set by Mark O'Meara in 1997, it nonetheless was a solid finish, given that Weir's 67 was the only sub-70 round posted in a light rain, with some gusty wind. When the final round began, Mickelson held a seven-shot lead through 54 holes, making Sunday's play little more than a formality. His winnings were \$954,000.

Bill Murray and longtime pro partner Scott Simpson were in the running for the Pro-Am title, but their closing 67 gave them a 258 total, good for fourth. The victory went to Barry McCollam and pro partner Joel Kribel.

2006

Winner: **Arron Oberholser** 65-68-66-72 (271)

Two years after failing to catch Vijay Singh, Arron Oberholser closed the deal on his first PGA Tour victory to the delight of his family and friends from San Jose.

"Growing up, I always watched guys win the golf tournament and just the walk up 18 at Pebble Beach is unlike anything else," said Oberholser, a former San Jose State standout who played numerous amateur events on the Monterey Peninsula. "Even when you're playing here by yourself or with a foursome, it's still an incredible walk. But to walk up knowing that you are the champion ... I wish everybody could feel that way. It's incredible.'

Oberholser shot a final-round 72, even par, on the Pebble Beach Golf Links for a 271, 17-under-par enough for a tournament record-tying five-shot cushion over runner-up Rory Sabbatini, whose 70 gave him a 276. Mike Weir, who came into Sunday tied with Oberholser at 199, crashed early - with a double-bogey at the second hole and bogey on the third - and shot 78 to tie for third with Jonathan Byrd.

The victory, which Oberholser locked up with a dramatic birdie out of the trees on the par-4 15th, was a distinctly different sequel to his final round in 2004, when he went into the final round tied for the lead with Vijay Singh, but then seemed to succumb to the pressure of facing one of the top players in the game.

There was a lot of smiling and good times in 2006, as record crowds enjoyed a sixth straight year with no rain problems. Sunshine pushed temperatures into the high 70s as more than 155,000 fans overall attended the four rounds of competition.

Oberholser, whose first place finish was worth \$972,000, became only the fifth player to earn his first PGA Tour victory at Pebble Beach, joining John Cook (1981), Steve Jones (1988), Brett

Ogle (1993) and Matt Gogel (2002).

Oberholser was also the fifth pro to sweep both the individual and team titles, as he and amateur partner Michael McCallister, the president and CEO of Humana Inc., tied for first in the Pro-Am, at 255, 33-under-par. They shared the championship with pro Hunter Mahan and Alan Heuer, the COO of Mastercard International, who shot 66 in the final round, while Oberholser and McCallister shot 68.

2007 Winner: Phil Mickelson 65-67-70-66 (268)

Taking the tournament by storm, Phil Mickelson won his third Pebble Beach Pro-Am (and \$990,000), finishing the tournament ten under par and tying the record for victory margin with a five-stroke win over runner-up Kevin Sutherland. His final round 66 at Pebble Beach Sunday included six

And speaking of storms, while Bill Murray's group was on the 17th Green at Spyglass on Thursday, a huge Monterey pine toppled on a nearby hillside, barely missing a spectator.

Mickelson and his amateur partner, Harry You, CEO of BearingPoint Consulting, also won the Pro-Am tournament, at 39 under par.

2008 Winner: Steve Lowery

69-71-70-68 (278)

Having played 198 PGA tournaments since 2000 without a victory, Steve Lowery probably wasn't expecting to defeat the legendary Vijay Singh in a sudden death playoff at the end of the 2008 Pebble Beach Pro-Am. Still, he neatly dispatched Singh on the very first playoff hole with a seven-foot birdie putt.

Through most of the opening three rounds, Lowery's name wasn't exactly at the top of the leaderboard. But 10 birdies in 15 holes on Saturday and Sunday propelled him to the top. Singh needed a birdie on the final hole of regulation to force the playoff. "Winning on this course against Vijay is something really special," Lowery said, who picked up a first-place check for

The Pro-Am champions were amateur Bill Walters, owner of Walters Golf in Las Vegas, and pro Frederick Jacobsen, who shot 250 (38 under par) to win by a tournament-record 10

Clear, sunny weather prevailed on the Monterey Peninsula during the tournament, and there were no delays due to weather.

2009

Winner: **Dustin Johnson** 65-69-67 (201)

In a rain-shortened event of 54 holes, 24-years-and-seven-months-old Dustin Johnson became the secondyoungest winner of the AT&T Pebble Beach Pro-Am (Tiger Woods was six months younger when he won the event in 2000).

Johnson opened at Pebble Beach on Thursday with a crisp, 7-under 65, followed with a 69 at Spyglass on Friday, and then birdied all the par-fives at Poppy Hills on Saturday to build a big lead going into what should have been a final round at Pebble Beach on Sunday. The victory was worth \$1,098,000 for Johnson. Mike Weir was the runner-up, winning \$658,800. Retief Goosen finished third.

Johnson, along with his amateur partner, Joe Rice (an attorney from Charleston, S.C.), also took the Pro-

Am title.

2010

Winner: **Dustin Johnson** 64-68-64-74 (270)

After his four-shot victory in 2009's rain-shortened tournament. Dustin Johnson had to work a lot harder to capture the 2010 event, especially in the face of a strong challenge from PGA Tour veteran David Duval, who capped one of his best tournaments in years with a final round 69. Instead of propelling him to victory, the round left Duval tied with J.B. Holmes for runner up, with each taking home \$545,000. Pro-Am winners were Paul Goydos and Hertz executive Robert Stuart. (Goydos was the pro leader with just five holes to play on Sunday, but quadruple bogeved 9).

It was Johnson's tremendous power with his driver that made the difference and brought him his second straight Pebble Beach Pro-Am win ... the first player in 20 years to do it. His showing in the 2010 Pro-Am made Johnson a favorite to win the U.S. Open at the same course a few months later, but he finished the Open in eighth

2011 Winner: **D.A. Points** 63-70-71-67 (271)

With a blistering final round of 67, capped with a 100-yard eagle on 14, D.A. Points captured his first PGA Tour victory — and he did it while partnered with the unpredictable (now there's an understatement for you) Bill Murray.

"It's a dream come true," Points said at the post-victory news conference. "To win at Pebble Beach, and to win with Bill Murray, I don't think I could dream it up."

Rather than be distracted by Murray's clowning, Points obviously enjoyed it. After the eagle, he ran to his partner and performed an awkward chest-bump. On 17, after Murray tossed a young spectator into a bunker, Points jumped in, too. The pair also managed to capture the Pro-Am title, and they announced they would also be paired in the 2012 tournament.


Points' victory worth \$1,134,000.

2012 Winner: Phil Mickelson 70, 65, 70, 64 (269)

Sunday's final round was trumpeted as a "dream duel," with Phil Mickelson and Tiger Woods playing in the same foursome. But the duel turned out to be no contest, with Mickelson bettering Woods by 11 strokes for the day, to close with a stunning 64 and a twoshot victory. Mickelson started the day six shots behind leader Charlie Wi, but had closed to within two after only six holes. Woods shot a three-over 75 on his last day. The win was Mickelson's 40th on the PGA Tour and fourth in the Pebble Beach Pro-Am.

"It feels great to win this tournament," Mickelson said at his post-win news conference. "It's a special place to me, and to have another win here, where my grandfather caddied, feels awesome." And so, surely, did his prize take of \$1,152,000.
