NEWS OF Facebook mogul Sean Parker's snags with Monterey County and the California Coastal Commission over his June 1 wedding in Big Sur is all over the Internet now, but he's doing a pretty good job of keeping details of the celebration under wraps.

Monterey County planning department officials told The Pine Cone last week that agency and the coastal commission were investigating whether construction on Ventana Campgrounds in preparation for the wedding requires building and other permits.

The elaborate June 1 wedding, at Ventana's 40 -acre campground, is slated to feature a temporary movie-set-like backdrop that includes waterfalls, bridges, ruins and ponds, according to the New York Post. The wedding is estimated to cost $\$ 10$ million.

While the wedding of Parker to Alexandra Lenas, who gave birth to their first child January 6 , is all the buzz around town, those actually working on the ceremony are keeping mum.

American International Transportation Services, Inc. in Monterey was hired to shuttle guests to and from the wedding in limousines and other vehicles. At the request of Parker, its drivers are even slated to be fitted with special costumes for the wedding, a source told The Pine Cone.

## New bridge at Rocky Creek



A HUGE rockslide that carried away a big section of Highway 1 in Big Sur, and tied up traffic for more than two years, took a big step toward finally being repaired last week when an expensive new viaduct opened at Rocky Creek. While the inland lane is still closed, and the entire project won't be completed until October, motorists are now being routed along the new outside lane. The project site, which is located 12 miles from Carmel, has been restricted to one-way traffic since March 2011, when a 50 -foot section of pavement collapsed between the landmark Rocky Creek and Bixby bridges. To rebuild the outside lane, the project's contractor, Golden State Bridge To rebuild the outside lane, the project's contractor, Golden State Bridge
Inc., dug deep footings and constructed 600 feet of low bridge on top of the damaged pavement. When finished, the project is expected to have cost $\$ 11$ million.

## Dog training center in C.V. could be open by July

Still needs county approval

Move over Carmel Beach, the Cypress Inn and Garland Regional Park - there's a new dog-friendly amenity coming to town.

Located just across the road from Quail Lodge in Carmel Valley, the 45 -acre Carmel Canine Sports Center hopes to celebrate its grand opening Sunday, July 14. The venture, though, still needs to be approved by Monterey County.

It shouldn't have too much trouble, though. The owner of the
business is a county planning commissioner.
Martha Diehl and two partners - her husband, Ken Ecklund and Ernie Mill - recently signed a 10 -year lease to rent the property, which is owned by the Walter family and has been used as farmland since the 1940s.
At the center, she plans to offer training and agility facilities, a "safe and stress-free" place to let dogs walk or run off their leashes, and a social hub for their owners to meet, Diehl told The Pine Cone. A pond - which includes a "shallow end" for puppies - will offer pooches a place for a refreshing dip on a sunny summer day. The property would also be the site of special

Avid knitter leaves behind a huge collection of yarn

By all accounts, Linda Jacobs was well liked. During her 40-year career at Alpha Stationers on Forest Avenue, she had many loyal clients.

On January 21, however, Jacobs - Alpha's store manager and buyer - passed away after losing a three-year fight with ovarian cancer, saddening her friends and dozens of customers.

But the longtime P.G. resident left behind something to remember her by. Jacobs, a highly accomplished knitter, had - over decades - amassed thousands of balls of high quality yarn and dozens of hand-knit sweaters.
"She was a master knitter," Alpha Stationers owner and Jacobs' close friend Doug De Young told The Pine Cone. "As a result, she accumulated this huge collection of yarn."

De Young found so much yarn in Jacobs' Sunset Drive house that he arranged with parishioners of St. Mary's by-the-Sea Episcopal Church to sort through the material. Also found was

100 sweaters Jacobs intricately hand knitted and 30 more that she never had a chance to finish.
"Essentially, there is a yarn store's worth of yarn," said Ann Pettit, who knew Jacobs and is one of several St. Mary's

# Herald selling printing plant and relocating

In A move that didn't surprise longtime employees, the Monterey County Herald announced this week the newspaper is laying off more workers, getting rid of its printing press, selling its Ryan Ranch office building and moving its remaining operations to an undisclosed site.

In an email message to Herald employees Wednesday, Herald publisher Gary Omernick said the changes will result in the paper being printed somewhere in the San Francisco Bay Area.
"There is an industry-wide effort to relocate newspaper operations into facilities that better suit our needs, and this is part of our ongoing digital strategy," according to Omernick, in a press release printed in the Herald Thursday. Nationwide, newspapers have seen sharp declines in revenue and readership and have been forced to make significant cutbacks.

While they knew something was up, most employees didn't know exactly what the newspaper's latest move to save money would be until they received Omernick's email message at the end of Wednesday's work day. Press workers were also called saying they would be laid off in about a month.
"All of (press) production got laid off yesterday," according to an employee, who said workers were notified they would be out of a job by the end of June.

## A steep decline

Omernick said there's no timetable for the move, and tried to put a good face on things by claiming the changes will allow the Herald's "content, advertising and business operations to relocate into office space with easy access for employees and customers."

The publisher also stressed the changes would "not affect the content or delivery of the newspaper" and that moving print operations "will improve color quality and color capacity."
"Our focus remains meeting the needs of our audience and our customers," Omernick said.
The Herald will begin "staging down production" in

## Police UNION WINS

## SUIT OVER PENSION CUTS

A Judge Friday ruled in favor of a Pacific Grove police union over a lawsuit it filed in November 2010 alleging the city violated labor laws when it capped the contributions to police officers' pensions.

Monterey County Superior Court Judge Thomas Wills ruled that the pension plan, which was adopted by the city council after voters approved a similar measure, is unconstitutional, a point the police union had argued in its lawsuit.

The council's ordinance had capped the city's contribution to an employee's pension plan at 10 percent of workers' salaries. The city had contributed 19 percent for police officers into the CalPERS retirement plan.
"We are happy that the judge agreed with our stance on the illegality of Measure R," Pacific Grove Police Officers Association president Jeff Fenton told The Pine Cone Monday. "We look forward to being able to set this aside and move forward."

The PGPOA's 26 -page lawsuit, which named city manager Tom Frutchey and the 2010 city council,

## SPECIALISTS IN HOUSEKEEPING



Mysterious box helps supply important data about Carmel River

A CURIOUS steel box the size of a large microwave on a bridge in Carmel Valley's Garland Regional Park often attracts the attention of passersby.

Though it seems out of place, the "graphic recorder box" is in the perfect location. The device, at the Don Juan Bridge, constantly measures the Carmel River's depth, which provides valuable Carmel River data to the Monterey Peninsula Water Management District.
"The common question is, 'what is it used for and why is it necessary,"' Greg James, a hydrologist with the water district told The Pine Cone.

Placed there in 1992, the device helps monitor the amount of water is being taken from the river, and helps warns when it's flooding.

The gauge operates on solar power and works with the help of a float within a corrugated, cigar-like metal probe about 5 inches long that descends into the river. The float rises and falls with changes in river level. A transmission cable connects the probe to the graphic recorder, which draws a continuous trace of river-level changes.

The device is one of 15 the water district has positioned in the Carmel River. Unique about the Garland Park gauge is that it's located in a section of the river that has never gone dry, James said.

It's also the only gauge featuring a plexiglas front and in a conspicuous location, unlike the others that are housed in steel boxes.

James checks the gauge periodically, and uses the information to calculate the river's width and the relationship between its depth and rate of flow.

The device - which the State Water Resources Control Board since 2002 has required the water district to operate and maintain - is also used to stop California American Water from pumping from wells in the upper Carmel River when the river flow at the Garland Park bridge is too low.

And checking the data from the gauge is easy since telecommunications technology allows James or others to access it remotely using a computer
"I look at the flows a couple of times a week and post them on our website," he said.

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## Hiker seriously injured climbing rocks at waterfall near Gorda

A SERIOUSLY injured hiker was airlifted to a hospital May 15 after he tried to climb steep rocks adjacent to the Salmon Creek waterfall in Big Sur.

A seasonal firefighter based out of Cambria, Tyler Davis told The Pine Cone he and a fellow firefighter carried a young man from the base of the falls to an ambulance about a quarter-mile away.
"He appeared to be climbing the rocks near the waterfall," Davis explained. "He fell down a rock face and landed between two rocks."

Davis said the injured man was driven four miles south to Ragged Point, where he was transported by helicopter about 25 miles to a medical facility in Templeton.

Accompanied by her husband, another hiker, Debbie Tassell, helped lead rescuers to the injured man, whom she knew only as Joe.
"We were finishing up our hike when we crossed paths with the hiker's mom in a panic," Tassell wrote on an Internet blog. "She told us what had happened, and we went to find him as she drove back to Ragged Point to get cell service and call 911 . My husband and two other hikers stayed with him, and kept him alert and comfortable."

Tassell said Joe ended up with a broken left wrist, a broken hip, a dislocated and broken knee, two broken tibias, two broken fibias and two broken ankles.

Located about 70 miles south of Carmel and just north of the San Luis Obispo county line, the roughly 100 -foot waterfall is visible from Highway 1. A well marked - and hence, popular - trailhead makes access relatively easy, but dangerous.
"Be careful," warned John Rogers, who works at the front desk of nearby Gorda Springs Resort. "People have died falling off of there."

The incident happened at about $11 \mathrm{a} . \mathrm{m}$. Also responding

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to the scene were members of the Big Sur Volunteer Fire Brigade and Cambria Ambulance, who arrived first, Davis said.

Good Samaritan saves fisherman
A man who was fishing off rocks near Rocky Point restaurant fell into the ocean May 12, but was saved by a bystander.
"A Good Samaritan jumped in the water and pulled him to

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the shore," reported Sgt. Joe Moses of the Monterey County Sheriff's Search and Rescue team. "We set up a rope system to bring him up and airlift him to a hospital in San Jose

The incident happened at about $10 \mathrm{a} . \mathrm{m}$. Also responding were members of the California Highway Patrol and Cal Fire, as well as an AMR ambulance.

alleged the city violated labor laws when it capped the contributions and gave voters and the council the right to regulate retirement benefits without consulting the police union beforehand.

The complaint was filed by Sacramento attorney Christopher Miller on behalf of more than two dozen officers and other police employees. The P.G. Police Management Association, also a plaintiff in the suit, represented the police chief and its commanders.

The backers of Measure R argued the measure was necessary to help control skyrocketing pension costs, which have strained city resources.
"The city has spent over $\$ 100,000$ defending the police law suit and the city will probably pay more than that for the police attorneys," said resident John Moore, who contributed to the initiative. "But that is peanuts compared to the millions it will cost in future pension by losing a case that could not be lost."

Initiative proponents file suit
Meanwhile, the authors of the latest ballot initiative to cut pension costs in Pacific Grove filed a lawsuit this week to force the city council to put it to voters.

In legal documents filed May 21 in Monterey County Superior Court, residents Sally Aberg, Dan Davis and Frances Grate ask a judge to compel the city to set an election to let voters to decide whether to enact an ordinance that would void a generous 2002 pension plan for police and firefighters.

The group contends the council violated the California Elections Code when it voted May 15 to have a judge review the initiative to determine its legality instead of enacting it or putting it on the ballot.

This suit, which names the City of Pacific Grove, its clerk and the city council as defendants, argues the council only had two choices and the one it selected last week wasn't a legal one.
"It's a certified initiative," Davis told The Pine Cone Tuesday. "The council had only two options - put it on the ballot or enact it.'

It also notes that city attorney David Laredo did not object to the measure until after the group had collected enough signatures to put it on a ballot.
"We filed our intent to circulate the petition," Davis said. "At that point, the city attorney, if he thought it was an ille-
gal initiative, could have gone to a judge and declared it illegal. He didn't do that.'

On Oct. 1, 2012, the group notified the city of its intent to circulate the petition. On Oct. 12, the backers received a title and summary of the initiative (dated Oct. 5) from Laredo and it was published in a newspaper on Nov. 2.

The group collected 1,195 signatures that were certified by the Monterey County Elections Office April 18.
"Now after we have gone and collected all these signatures and done all of this work, they are saying it's illegal?" Davis questioned.
The initiative asks voters to void a 2002 plan that boosted the CalPERS pension plan for public safety workers to " 3 percent at 50 ," allowing employees at least 50 years old to retire with pay equal to 3 percent of their highest year's compensation for every year they worked, to a maximum of 90 percent of their highest pay level.

The 2002 council's decision to adopt the plan was unlawful because a public hearing was never held and crucial financial information on how much the increase would actually cost the city was not disclosed to the council and the public, according to Aberg, Davis and Grate.

## mid-June and will complete the transition by

 the end of that month, Omernick said.One former Herald employee described Omernick's message as "sugarcoated" and described it as another example of a what
happens when a local publication gets taken over by a large, out-of-town corporation.
"What we are seeing is another step in the continuing dismantling of a once pretty good newspaper," the former employee told The Pine Cone.

In November 2011, the Herald laid off employees in the ad production department and outsourced that work to India, where it is

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now done. Over the last decade, and espe cially since the economy nosedived in 2006, the paper has eliminated jobs in management, the newsroom and the advertising department and imposed furloughs on remaining employees. The print circulation has declined by almost half, bylined stories on the front page are frequently written by unpaid interns, freelance columnists have been told they'd have to start working for nothing, and the front page - formerly offlimits to advertising - routinely carries large ads.

## 'Saw it coming a long time ago'

Another former Herald employee, who didn't want to be named because he didn't want to jeopardize any possible future employment there, said the paper's move "follows the trend" in downsizing.
"Nobody is ever surprised by anything that happens anymore," the former worker said. "It's more like, 'What's going to happen next?'"

Several other Herald workers also told The Pine Cone that Omernick's announcement is not stunning.

One of them is former Herald printer and graphic artist Larry Ellis, who worked at the newspaper for 52 years before being laid off last year when it outsourced his work to lower-paid workers in India
"I saw it coming a long time ago," he told The Pine Cone Thursday

Ellis, 71, said about a half-dozen people work in the press room. He figures the paper will have its printing done at the San Jose Mercury News, which also has put its large building up for sale.

## 'Way too much space'

Another employee said the Herald's fewer than 100 workers, in a building that not too long ago housed more than 200, don't begin to fill the large Ryan Ranch complex which mostly does not have open windows or a working air conditioning system, and becomes sweltering on warmer days
"If you've walked through the building lately, there are big open areas and open desks," he said. "So obviously there is way too much space for the people working there."

While the worker said he didn't believe quality of the Herald's journalism would suffer with the reorganization, he said it's possible deadlines for reporters would be earlier with the printing no longer in house.

Lewis Leader, who worked at the Herald as a reporter and editor for 18 years, and later at the LA Times as a regional editor, told The Pine Cone that an employee he
poke to last night was still trying to make sense of the announcement
"This is a sad day," Leader said. "I remember the great excitement and optimism when the Herald completed its move from downtown Monterey to Ryan Ranch in 1990""
Some have suggested that the Scotts Valley-based Santa Cruz Sentinel and the Herald - both owned by MediaNews and managed by a company called Digital First Media - could merge, while another said it would be logistically too difficult for employees for both newspapers.
In an April interview with John Paton, CEO of Digital First Media, Paton said he didn't think news organizations were dying but that newspapers "are going to stop running in print."
"Newspapers in print are clearly going away," Paton told journalist Matthew Ingram. "I think you're an idiot if you think that's not happening."

But he said print advertising at the company has fallen dramatically, and revenue from online operations hasn't come close to making up the difference.

Omernick reiterated the company's focus on the Internet in his email to employees saying, "Monetizing real estate and right-sizing office space to fit our digitally focused strategy is something [Digital First Media] is doing - and has done - across the organi zation."

However, from a reader's perspective, the Herald has done little to improve its website, which is bogged down with irritating pop-up advertisements.
Editorial errors, such as name mis spellings, are usually left unchanged on the site, which is often filled with links to generc news stories that are not pertinent to Monterey County.

## On the leading edge?

One Herald employee said the idea of replacing dollars the Herald has earned in print with digital advertising cash doesn't make a lot of sense.
"They think they are somehow on the leading edge of digital news," he said. "But in order to make that work you have to have an established name. It works for the Wall Street Journal and the New York Times, but these guys [the Herald] doesn't have a national reputation, and there is no reason for anyone to depend on them.'

While Omernick directed questions about the Herald's changes to New York-based Digital First Media spokesman Jonathan Cooper, Cooper did not return several phone and email messages left by The Pine Cone.

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## Stranded and Dangerous

April and May are pupping seasons for sea lions, elephant seals and harbor seals along the Monterey Bay coastline. Walking the rec trail through Pacific Grove over the next few weeks will essentially ensure a glimpse of a shiny, silver, caterpillar-shaped harbor seal newborn pup, about the size of a healthy adult cocker spaniel. Pretty cute.

However, as nature would have it, some of these babies won't make it, whether due to genetic issues, mom issues, or an infectious agent (virus, bacteria, parasite). A walk on one of our beaches might lead to an encounter with a stranded dead pup or adult seal. Very sad when that happens.

At the annual International Association of Aquatic Animal Medicine conference, held in Sausalito a few weeks ago, I attended a lecture on the dangers that lurk within some of the stranded marine mammals along the California coast, particularly where we live, that pose a threat to people handling these ill-fated sick or dead animals. The lecturer listed some scary zoonotic diseases that can manifest in these cases.

Zoonotic diseases are ones that can spread between and among people and animals, including through vectors such as ticks or rodents.
In the case of marine mammals on our shores, human contact might lead to some very serious infections that you do not want: Brucellosis, Leptospirosis, pandemic H1N1 influenza virus, Toxoplasmosis, Giardia, Cryptosporidia and more. These are nasty bacteria, viruses, and parasites that can infect through contact with animal fluids on human skin, mucous membranes (eyes, mouth), or by inhalation. The lecturer made her point by showing pictures of hapless children smiling at the camera while standing on a dead whale, sitting on a beached dolphin, leaning up against a sea lion carcass, or worse, touching almost dead marine mammals.

So what can the average beachgoer here do to protect himself? Respecting the Marine Mammal Protection Act is step one. This law prohibits coming within 500 feet of any marine mammal, including stranded ones, dead or alive. Apart from not breaking the law, it is also completely unwise for anyone to handle, touch, try to rescue, or contact the body fluids of any marine mammal that is sick enough to be dying or dead on the shore.

This may sounds alarmist, but you shouldn't discount it: Of 43 marine mammal workers in the
stranding industry that the Center for Disease Control bloodtested for exposure to marine Brucella bacteria (which can lead to abortions, brain and bone infections, pneumonia, and worse in humans), 19 , or almost half of them, had to undergo post-exposure prophylaxis by using two different harsh antibiotics for three weeks. The National Marine Fisheries Service has been screening coastal species of cetaceans since 2011, and sadly, Pacific bottlenose dolphins commonly tested positive for marine Brucella.

Because our town is so dog-friendly, perhaps you need to be reminded to keep your dog from sniffing or contacting beached marine mammals.

I remember seeing a pair of Viszlas on Carmel beach who were having a vigorous sea lion carcass snack - hopefully without their owner's blessing. No doubt they subsequently ended up in the veterinary emergency room with vomiting and diarrhea from what we veterinarians fondly call "dietary indiscretion." Or worse, they could have contracted Leptospirosis and ended up in kidney failure from infection with the leptospire bacteria that more than 80 percent of stranded California sea lions are treated for (unsuccessfully) at the Marine Mammal Center in Sausalito. Beach dogs should get vaccinated against Leptospirosis annually.

So is it likely that a Carmel beach walk that includes an encounter with a stranded marine mammal will turn out to be a hazardous affair? If common sense and proper protocols

are followed, everything should be okay. We are fortunate in our town to have a network of marine mammal stranding professionals, and they are the people who should be dealing with beached seals, sea lions, dolphins or whales.
So give them a call and steer clear. Leash your dogs and as always, wash your hands!

"The iPhone is now my best friend," said Short, who graduated from Carmel High School in 2000. "It gives me the freedom to take pictures on my own. I can do everything myself and email them to people. It's so easy,"

With her black Lab, Devo, sprawled out of the floor of her pint-sized downtown gallery, Short offered The Pine Cone a peek of the show - and a demonstration of her shooting technique. Cupping the camera in her hands, she touched a "button" on the phone's screen with the tip of her tongue, snapping a photo.
"Don't touch my phone," she cautioned before flashing a smile. "It has germs all over it."

She looked at the display



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with a sense of pride. "I was afraid I wasn't going to be able to fill the gallery," she said.

While the exhibit marks a milestone for Short, she's not quite ready to contemplate her next creative project. "I'm just taking it one day at a time," she added.

Short's digital camera odyssey takes another step forward June 23 when she teaches her first iPhone workshop at Garland Regional Park. The event is featured in the Monterey Regional Park District's "Let's Go Outdoors" catalog. A second workshop is scheduled July 21.

events and competitions.
"There's nothing quite like it," Diehl said. "We've taken bits and pieces of other [facilities and parks] and put them together."

Using a business model like a tennis or golf club, the center is offering memberships options that range from a $\$ 300$ annual fee with monthly payments of $\$ 68$ to 10 -year memberships with a one-time $\$ 10,000$ charge. So far, 35 annual memberships have been sold, while two 10 -year deals have been signed.

Originally, Diehl had hoped to make the canine sports center a nonprofit, but wasn't able to get it off the ground, so she decided to launch it as a profit-making business. While Diehl, a former captain in the merchant marines, lacks formal business experience, she's confident the venture is viable from a financial standpoint.
"I've never owned a business before," conceded Diehl, who lives with her husband and three border collies on the

Big Sur Coast. "We could lose our shirts. But we did ou homework and looked for the appropriate property. The present site is the nicest place you could imagine. The timing was perfect." They signed the lease April 15.

The proposal is still working its way through the county planning process. Two Pine Cone readers have suggested Diehl has or will receive favoritism because of her role as planning commissioner.

One asked why Diehl would sign a 10-year lease without any guarantees her project would be approved. "We couldn't go to the county before we signed the lease," she countered.

Another reader argued the project deserves more scrutiny. But Diehl insisted she will be subject to the same oversight as anybody else.

While some people have expressed concerns about the center, Diehl said the vast majority have offered have offered positive feedback.
"Our first order of business was to talk to the neighbors, which we've diligently pursued," she said. "We have a lot of
ocal support.
Diehl said the property - which will feature an assort ment of fenced-in areas - is bordered mostly by a golf course and farmland, and very little infrastructure will need to be built.
"We're not asking for much," she explained. "The owner retains an option to turn it back into farmland after 10 years. Everything we build will have to be easy to move.

This week, Diehl and her partners were busy planting grass seed and irrigating the property. She said the water use isn't an issue. The property has its own wells into the Carmel River aquifer and has been using them for two lettuce crops a year, she explained.
Diehl, who will be the facility's general manager, said she believes the center is a great fit for Carmel Valley.
"I've been dreaming that this is something the neighbor hood can welcome and be proud of," she added. "I think we can benefit the community. I'm betting there are enough people in the area who see this the way I do.'

## Water district will spend 8 percent more next year

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The monterey Peninsula Water Management District's 2013/2014 budget increased by a little more than $\$ 1$ million over last year's budget, according to a report released this week.
"It's a balanced budget," water district general manager Dave Stoldt said.


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The biggest expense in the $\$ 15,319,714$ budget will be for projects to store more water underground, which is an important part of the effort to reduce pumping from the Carmel River during the summer and may also be used to hold excess water from the proposed desal plant, water officials say. Altogether, the various groundwater replenishment and aquifer storage projects will cost about $\$ 6.6$ million.

Another big outlay will be for the district's 26 employees and some retirees, who will receive a total of $\$ 3,249,150$, including $\$ 2,149,700$ in salary, $\$ 500,600$ for insurance and $\$ 450,000$ in retirement expenses.
Other significant expensed including $\$ 500,000$ for plan ning an alternate desal project, $\$ 400,000$ for auditing landscape irrigation by Monterey Peninsula residents, $\$ 168,300$ to operate the Sleepy Hollow fish rearing facility and other fish rescue activities, $\$ 78,900$ for monitoring the Carmel River lagoon, $\$ 150,000$ to install low-flow water fixtures in schools and $\$ 750,000$ for the district's water conservation rebates.

The cost of hiring attorneys is budgeted at $\$ 400,000$, the same amount as last year, although Stoldt said it appears that number will likely be more in the range of $\$ 350,000$. The money goes to water district attorney David Laredo and varous outside counsel
Revenue for the district includes an estimated $\$ 4.8$ million added to local property tax bills, $\$ 5.8$ million from Cal Am (which the company adds to water bills), $\$ 1.3$ million in grants (from state and federal taxpayers) and $\$ 1.5$ million borrowed from Rabobank. Only a tiny portion, $\$ 175,000$, is expected to come from letting people make new connections for water service, and just $\$ 231,000$ from issuing permits.

she was prohibited from talking about the services her company was providing for the party because she signed a confidentiality agreement.
"I signed a non disclosure [form] so I can't talk about," Fisher said Wednesday.

Jan de Luz, who owns a high-end interior decorator showroom of the same name in Carmel Valley that sold Parker items for the wedding, said he didn't sign such an agreement, which are common in celebrity weddings.
"I didn't sign it," he told The Pine Cone, "but I don't want to talk about it."

Monterey attorney Aengus Jeffers, who is reportedly working for Parker, wouldn't confirm or deny he is associated with the wedding, much less provide any information about its permit problems.

While coastal commission enforcement program supervisor Nancy Cave told The Pine Cone her office is investigating Ventana Inn for possible violations, she declined to provide specifics as to the nature of the investigation or whether it will be wrapped up before Parker's nuptials.
Ventana Inn's general manager also isn't talking.

Parker, who also co-founded file-sharing website Napster and several other websites, wrote on Facebook in April that he hired Lord of the Rings costume designer Ngila Dickson to design custom-made outfits for the wedding's 300 guests.
He said the outfits would have some "Victorian flair and whimsy" and would be based on "modern suits and dresses."
But Parker denied early media reports that he was having a "theme wedding," shooting that down in April on Twitter saying it was not a theme wedding and there would be "no swords or chain mail."

## One for the ages

IF YOU are a reader of The Monterey County Herald, you're surely familiar with the breathless coverage the paper's given to one of our community's inevitable water-shortage phenomena - namely, that people with leaks in their houses or yards have gotten huge bills because of all the water that has flowed through their meters.

The colossal bills, which in many instances have been thousands of dollars for a single month, are a result of the huge prices charged for water used over your "limit" - costs that were imposed because of environmental restrictions on our water supply, and the 35 -year failure of the water district and other officials to develop a new source.

Back in the days when water was cheap, leaks happened just as much as they do now, of course, but they weren't controversial, because the resulting bills weren't very big. Now, truly shocking water bills are showing up in quite a few mailboxes. People who get them rightfully complain, and sometimes they do so to the media.

At the Herald, they've seized on the complaints to flog one of their favorite villains, California American Water, which is in the unfortunate position of having to send the big bills, but is not causing them; the government and environmentalists are. However, because Cal Am is a profit-seeking corporation, according to the Herald, it is ipso facto evil, and therefore must be at fault.

Name any sizable local business covered by the Herald, and you'll find someone who feels wronged by the newspaper's simpleminded "business is bad" philosophy Whether they're negotiating with unions, trying to build new facilities, struggling with cutbacks, fending off lawsuits, selling to new owners, or just carrying on the normal course of business and running into unexpected controversies, these companies have learned that they can all count on the Herald to take the other side.
However, over the last 10 years, the worst corporate citizen in this community hasn't been investigated by the Herald at all, and, has actually been the beneficiary of glowing coverage there. What business is that? The Herald itself.

We all know that newspapers are going through tough times. Certainly, some of the cutbacks the Herald has experienced have been necessary and inevitable. But do they have to lie about them so much?
This week, the paper's owners and management put out one of the most bizarre press releases of all time when they announced that they would sell the newspaper's big offices at Ryan Ranch, move printing operations to somewhere in the San Francisco Bay area, downsize the local staff (again), and consolidate news and advertising functions in a smaller building somewhere.

This is yet another piece of dreadful news for the Herald's employees, who've already had to endure so much. It's also the end of an important era in the local news business, where the Herald formerly played a leading role, but is now pretty much a laughingstock.
But according to Herald publisher Gary Omernick, none of that is happening
"Our industry has changed since moving to Ryan Ranch and we now find ourself in an oversized facility," he said.

Translation: "We've cut back so much, the few employees we have remaining are rattling around in here.'
"The move to a modern printing facility will improve color quality and color capacity," Omernick offered.

Has anyone told him that his big boss is telling Wall Street that "print is dead, and anybody who doesn't think so is an idiot"?

While there is no timetable for the move, "the change will allow the Herald's content, advertising and business operations to relocate into office space with easy access for employees and customers," he then said.
Did he have to twist himself into a pretzel to come up with that one?
"These changes will not affect the content or delivery of the newspaper," he continued.

Yes, but if that's true, it's only because both have already gone downhill so much.
"Our focus remains meeting the needs of our audience and our customers," Omernick said next.

Translation: Our corporate owners are squeezing us so much, we really don't have a choice.

But renting your home doesn't have to be a four-letter word. It is not the cause of the problem. What is terrible is when absentee
owners rent their homes without concern for the community, whether long or short term. To all those who think short-term rentals are the problem, I'd like to quote the immortal words of Pogo: "We have met the enemy and he is us."

There is no disagreement between Ken's point of view and mine on the problems, only on the solutions. I'm sure many of the folks who blame short term rentals for the problems in Big Sur have had long term tenants who disrespect their property, the community, and the environment.

The issue is not length of visit, the issue is how do we craft a set of procedures to assure the fabric of our community is maintained. Since there are absolutely no restric tions on long-term renters, except the eviction process, we actually have the potential to make our community safer, more secure and more environmentally sensitive, by a set of under-30-day-rental rules that address the concerns of our residents.

According www．distraction．gov，a driver is 23 times more likely to become involved in an accident if driving while tex－ ting．Pew Research found that 40 percent of American teens say they have been in a car when the driver used a cell phone in a way that put peo－ ple in danger．Sending or receiving a text takes a dri－ ver＇s eyes from the road for an average of 4.6 seconds the equivalent，at 55 mph ，of driving the length of an entire football field blind．Research by Carnegie Mellon University found that driving while using a cell phone reduces the amount of brain activity associated with driving by 37 percent．

## The best at everything, including running his own business

Anthony costanza is old-school Monterey. Born and raised there, he attended Thomas O. Larkin Grammar School, Walter Colton Middle School, and graduated from Monterey High. "I took one class at MPC, but dropped out.


Anthony Costanza Music appreciation was too hard."
That's a good joke, since he owns Duplication Connection and the Franklin Street Studio - businesses which have done recording and copying for some of the top people in the music industry.

Anthony is a bear of man, someone you would presume would have been a lineman on the high school football team. But he didn't play sports at Monterey High. "No. My father died when I was 11, and I had to support the family."
How did he do that? "I was working for the Monterey Peninsula Herald, because in those days it was in downtown Monterey on Jefferson Street, and I grew up on Van Buren. I started out as a paperboy at 8 . I can't talk about that too much because that's illegal. You are not allowed to have a paper route until 10 ."

Despite his tender age, he made a great impression on the newspaper's management, and at the ripe old age of 15 he got a promotion.
"They called me a fly boy, which meant that I was taking papers off the press, grabbing 25 copies and giving ' em to the tie boy. Then I was a tie boy, which meant I was wrapping wire around the papers so they could go out to the carriers. Everybody got 50 or 100 papers, and I had to tie 'em up."

Continuing his move up the printing ladder, he was made an apprentice in the press room, which meant he got handed all the dirty jobs: changing inks, washing the rollers and oiling the machinery. And then he reached the top, in a position called "journeyman pressman," which made him responsible for preparing the plates and making sure the newspapers were being printed properly.

But then life stepped in. "I crushed a disk in my back and figured out I didn't want to do any more heavy lifting, so I became a restaurateur." He opened a sandwich shop at Del Monte and Figeroa. That lasted
and it cost me 75 -grand to get into CDs because of all th new equipment, and then another 50 -grand to get into DVDs. Thank god the media hasn't changed for a while because I am still making it all back.' a couple of years.
"Then I went from there directly to Don Anthony's House of Rock, which was the craziest bar Monterey ever had.
If you'd knock on the door,
there were naked women at the
bar," he said. Those scandalous days were short-lived, however, because Bank of America wanted to build on the site.
"I knew when I signed the lease that Bank of America wanted it, but we figured there were seven years on the lease," he recalled. "The bank wanted it after a year and a half."

So after Don Anthony's was forced to close, Costanza kept moving around.
"I opened up a bar for three months called C.C. Herkimer \& Company. My partner snorted up the bar. He is dead now." There was then a hiatus that we can't discuss at this time, but in 1980, "I needed to get back in the workforce, so started pumping gas. Then I became a courier, working for United Courier, picking up the bank bags all over."

That lasted a month. "And then I moved up to Santa Clara and I went to sound school, the California Professional Music Business Academy, and I didn't learn anything. I was there about two weeks, and the bosses pulled me into the office and said, "We need someone to run the plant and you are the best by far." They wanted me to run the school and I told them no. Because I knew that the school wasn't going to make it, so I didn't want to be part of it. It was being run wrong. I thought it was too late to turn around."

Then Anthony went into sales. First it was electronics for a company that became Western Appliance - "I was their best salesman for a long time." - and then for Royal Foods where he sold produce for six months. He even sold vacuum cleaners for awhile, but hated it.

Finally, he took a job for a music duplication company, where he says he boosted sales by more than 250 percent in his first month. But he clashed with the owner and went out on his own, opening the Duplication Connection in 1985.
"I had a bank of 50 cassette decks. And then cassettes died

He weighed 95 lbs . and required several months of rehabilitation in a Paris hospital before returning to Ogdensburg and his beloved Margie and their two children Sherry and Bill, Jr. (two more children Tamia and Paul would later be born to the couple.) He entered Clarkson College in Potsdam, New York, on the G.I Bill where he managed to graduate in 3 years with high marks and a B.A. in Business. In December of 1949 he was hired by the Internal Revenue Service where he worked as an agent. In 1952 he transferred to the Department of U.S. Customs, quickly rising through the ranks, and was promoted to the directorship of the Port Authority of Rochester, New York, where he completed a distinguished career in Federal Service. He retired after 30 years to be with Margie when she was diagnosed with breast cancer. For the next 17 years Bill devoted himself to his wife and, during periods of remission in her illness, they enjoyed swimming, cross country skiing, trips to the local library, gardening and the friendship of their neighbors. They traveled extensively in their beloved Adirondack Mountains, visiting their childhood homes, family and friends. They took many trips to California, Texas, Massachusetts and Colorado to see children and grandchildren and had three memorable trips to Europe and the British Isles. Margie ultimately succumbed to breast cancer in 1994 and Bill remained in their home in Rochester, New York, becoming a surrogate grandfather, friend and wise counselor to many families in his neighborhood and nieces and nephews near and far. Don was born January 16, 1930 in Pasadena, CA to Wilko Gruver and Frederika McGee Scanlon. He followed in his father's footsteps in choosing a career as a medical doctor and graduated from Stanford University School of Medicine in 1955. He went on to do his internship and residency in San Francisco. From 1957 to 1960, Don served as a medic on an army base in Nürnberg, Germany. He moved to the Monterey Peninsula in 1961 with his wife, Ruth Minor Scanlon, and five daughters. Don bought his home in Carmel shortly thereafter and resided in this same home for the last 52 years.

Don was an adventurer and outdoor sports enthusiast. He lead Sierra Club hikes and took his wife and daughters, extended family and friends on hikes locally and in the Sierra Nevada Mountains. He was a pilot and flew his Cessna from Monterey to Mammoth Lakes, CA on weekends where he built a cabin with the help of his nephews and brothers-in-law. Don was an avid photographer of flowers, landscapes and people. He inspired many with his enthusiasm for being in nature. On one special adventure in the early 1970s, he hiked to the base of Mount Everest.

Don practiced internal medicine with a specialty in Cardiology and had a private practice on Lincoln and Seventh in Carmel for many years. He was Chief of staff at CHOMP from 1975-1976

In 1976, a bicycle accident left Don quadriplegic. That is when his second life began. He embarked in a new direction in his medical career as Director of Cardiology Services from 1976-2001. In 1980, he married Marjorie Thornburg . In those days, he could often be seen charging along scenic drive enjoying the sea breeze and beauty of Carmel beach. Don was a bit of a daredevil in his wheelchair heading off down the dirt pathways of the mission trails and steep roadways of Carmel, occasionally rescued by kind passerbys. He still spent time in the cabin he built in Mammoth Lakes and adapted his camera so he could continue photographing nature and family. Don and Marge traveled in America and abroad. Ever the optimist with enthusiasm for life, Don's love of nature and learning never wavered. He received the Laureate Award from the College of Physicians in
 1991. He worked as Continuing Medical Education Director from 2001 until 2005 when he retired. His last years were spent in the company of his devoted friends and family. Don's interests turned to the study of Shakespeare, Jane Austin, Robinson Jeffers and Sudoku among other things. His ability to stay active, positive and hopeful in the face of physical challenges was truly inspiring. His family and friends will miss him and his joyful determination to live a full life.

Don is survived by his four daughters, Jenn Vahdati of Berkeley CA, Sari Scanlon of Albion CA, Katie Scanlon of Morgan Hill CA, and Sioban Scanlon of San Anselmo CA; his sister, Sarah Scanlon Signer of Pacific Grove CA and seven grandchildren. He was preceded in death by his daughters, Susie and Nancy.

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## Safe at home - unless you just happen to be me

Every man's home may be his castle, but as we know from medieval times, castles can be dangerous places. The statistics on accidents in the home are staggering - twenty thousand deaths a year, seven million disabling injuries, and twenty million hospital visits. Falls, poisoning, and fires are the top three causes of home injuries.

ened in the plastic container. Hmm. Probably can soften it in hot water, but that would take

Ten or fifteen seconds in the microwave should make it flow again. So I zap it. I am distracted by Sergio Garcia hitting a great approach shot. How much time has passed? Can't be more than 20 seconds. I remove the glue container and twist the cap off. It explodes!
The glue covers my thumb and the area between my thumb and index finger, as well as the index finger and second finger on my left hand. Some has splattered on my

Television commercials advise us to drink responsibly. That caveat applies to me when using certain products. Warning labels are written with me in mind.

Picture the legal department of a large firm figuring how to protect the corporation against damages from the misuse of its product.
"I think we've got it covered," says the chief attorney. "Except for that writer-person in Carmel."

The story of my close call with becoming a statistic needs to be told backwards. "Never put polyurethane glue in a microwave," it reads in big red letters on the company's website. Now back up fifteen or twenty minutes.

I am a bundle of energy, multitasking my way through the morning by cleaning my bathtub, watching a golf tournament on television, and baking a pie.

The device I use on the bathtub has a telescoping handle with a sponge on the end. Suddenly half of the sponge comes loose and begins flapping at the end of the handle. Surely it can be glued back in place, I reason.

The polyurethane glue I have has hard-
face. A lot of it is on the left lens of my eyeglasses.
Strangely, there's a phrase that comes to my mind when I am faced with imminent danger: Roy Schneider in the movie, "Jaws," saying: "I think we need a bigger boat."
Polyurethane glue on your skin is one thing. Hot polyurethane glue is quite another. This is what napalm must feel like.

I quickly hold my hand under cold water. But wait. If this stuff hardens on my glasses I'll never get it off. So I hold the lens under hot water and scrape the glue with my finger nail.

Surprisingly, enough comes off so that I can see better. Hand back under cold water. DING! The oven timer goes off. The pie is done.

The sink is close enough to the oven so I can reach in with my right hand (wearing an oven mitt, I'm a klutz, not a super klutz) and remove the pie while keeping my left hand under cold water. How am I going to get this stuff off my skin? I go to my computer and Google the name of the glue product. That's when I see the warning about the glue and microwaves. Then I realize two of my fingers are stuck to the " $w$ " and "a" keys on the key-

board. Another wild thought. I see myself driving to the Emergency Room. A policeman stops me. With a keyboard glued to my fingers there is no way I can convince him I'm not texting while driving.

Then I remember I have a gelatinized burn dressing that immediately stops the burning process, cools the burn, eases the pain, and protects against contamination. Pain relief came quickly. I needed to keep the dressing on my hand, so I decided to watch the golf tournament.
On my TV set a blue screen was flashing the words: "no signal."

Now for some good news. A technician fixed the TV problem over the phone. The pie was delicious. There was no blistering on
my hands from the hot glue. Gently applying a pumice stone to my skin removed the glue within two days. People have stopped asking if I've had a chemical peel on my face. Steve Green, at Optique America on Lincoln near Sixth, got all the glue off my glasses without removing the protective coating. The bath tub sponger? There was a puddle of glue on the kitchen counter. I soaked it up with the loose sponge, adhering it back in place. It's working fine.

The bath tub is clean, but I'm having a grab bar installed to help me get in and out of it without falling ... considering my history, I can't be too careful.
