Neighbors sound off on Carmel Valley dog park, LUAC chair wants EIR

IF THE sentiment expressed at a June 3 hearing at St. Philip's Church was any indication, the path to opening an ambitious dog-training business in Carmel Valley will be a difficult one for its owners.

More than 150 people packed the church. Not only were many residents vocal in their opposition to the proposed Carmel Canine Sports Center, but Carmel Valley Land Use Advisory Committee chair Jan Brennan suggested an environmental impact report be done to examine its impacts. The pricey study has doomed or indefinitely delayed many ventures

The LUAC opted not to vote on whether to recommend approval or denial of the project. Instead, it continued the hearing to a later date.

Great idea, wrong neighborhood?

Monterey County planning commissioner Martha Diehl and two partners — her husband, Ken Ecklund, and Ernie Mill — are seeking permission to open the business on 45 acres at 8100 Valley Greens Drive. Located just across the street from Quail Lodge, the center would offer training and agility facilities, a "safe and stress-free" place to let dogs

CHS grad dies chasing Oklahoma tornadoes

'IF YOU had told me that I was going to risk my life chasing tornadoes, I never would have believed you!" Carl Young, 1986 Carmel High School graduate, told his friend and former classmate, Pacific Grove Police Sgt. Jeff Fenton, during a conversation on Facebook several months ago. "In true honesty, it is about the science, some degree of public service, the challenge, and a flurry of excitement when we intercept one of these forces of nature! Witnessing a tornado is downright AWESOME!"

Young, along with colleagues Tim and Paul Samaras, died while pursuing tornadoes during the May 31 outbreak in Oklahoma that killed more than a dozen people and injured more than 100. Young and Tim Samaras — who created TWISTEX, the Tactical Weather Instrumented Sampling of Tornadoes Experiment, and invented the cutting-edge technology that allowed him to gather unprecedented data about

COASTAL COMMISSION CRITICIZED FOR HANDS-OFF APPROACH TO MOGUL'S WEDDING

■ Big fine levied, but work wasn't halted

THE FAMOUSLY strict California Coastal Commission is getting a flood of criticism after allowing Internet tycoon Sean Parker's \$10 million wedding to proceed in Big Sur last weekend.

Parker, 34, married Alexandra Lenas June 1 in an elaborate ceremony at the Ventana Inn campgrounds in Big Sur. The set for the wedding — which took three months to build — featured stone ruins, waterfalls, bridges and castle walls. But Parker and Ventana Inn never obtained permits for the construction.

And while coastal commission staff members were

aware of the wedding and its elaborate preparations a month before it happened, they didn't red tag it. And two days after the ceremony, the commission issued a glossy press release announcing it reached a "settlement" with Parker for \$2.5

Venture capitalist buys Butterfly House for \$16.5M

ONE OF Carmel's most recognizable homes — named the "Butterfly House" for its distinctive curved roof — sold last week to venture capitalist Kevin Comolli for \$16.5 million

Located at 26320 Scenic Road, the three-bedroom, four-bath residence was designed and built in the early 1950s by architect Frank Wynkoop.

Perched on a rocky outcropping overlooking Point Lobos and Carmel Bay, the 3,041-square-foot home had been listed for \$19.2 million by Carmel Realty, which described it as "one of only five true oceanfront properties in Carmel."

The construction of the house, which was completed in

1952, caused quite a stir. Some believed it would fall into the ocean. Acquiring the steel columns and beams it needed during the Korean War also proved to be a challenge. Wynkoop eventually received a letter from President Dwight D. Eisenhower permitting him to use the steel. But he only owned his dream home for a brief time before money woes forced him to sell it.

Steven Kahn and his family owned it for more than half a century before Joe Walter bought the house in 2008. Before Walter purchased it for \$9.3 million, then Vice President Dick Cheney was rumored to be its buyer.

Walter hired Wynkoop's sons, Thor and Jay, to renovate

Eastwood donation, BSLT plan promise flood and water shortage relief

THE DANGER of flooding to homes and businesses along the north side of the Carmel River, and of an economic disaster for the entire Monterey Peninsula from the looming state-imposed water cutback, will be alleviated by a project spearheaded by the Big Sur Land Trust which hinges on a major donation from former Carmel Mayor Clint Eastwood.

Eastwood said this week he'll give more than 80 acres of the old Odello artichoke fields on the east side of Highway 1 to the Big Sur Land Trust so they can be used to channel flood waters safely to the Pacific Ocean. And a big portion of the potable water that's been historically used on the property for agriculture will be made available to Cal Am and private property owners in Carmel and Carmel Valley, Eastwood said.

"I've lived here full-time since the 1960s, and I always enjoyed looking at the fields and the open space on this property, and I just want to keep it the same," Eastwood told The Pine Cone during a tour of the prop-

erty Tuesday.

At one time approved for more than 80 houses, the highly scenic land lies between Palo Corona Ranch and the Carmel River. In 1995, Eastwood and his former wife, Maggie, bought it from the Odello family, which had farmed the land for years and obtained development approvals from Monterey County in the 1960s. Two years later, the Eastwoods donated about 50 acres where the subdivision had been approved to the land trust. And now, Eastwood wants to give it the rest.

"I bought it to keep the houses from being built," Eastwood said. "And now the goal is to give the rest to the Big Sur Land Trust, and they'll keep it out of development."

More than 190 acre-feet of water has been used every year on the land for grazing and row crops, he added. Of that, 60 will stay on the property so the BSLT can keep some of the land either in farming or grazing. Another 45 acre-feet will be no longer be pumped, so it





Council OKs law on music in bars, restaurants

■ But it's still not final

F OREGOING A presentation on the ordinance because they are already so familiar with it, having heard and discussed it at three previous meetings, the Carmel City Council late Tuesday approved the law allowing live entertainment where alcohol is sold and served.

Coming at the end of a five-plus-hour meeting June 4, the ordinance would make it legal for restaurant and bar operators to host live music, given that they get a permit and keep the noise levels below 55 decibels at the property line.

During previous hearings, the council approved the ordinance with no expiration date for the live music permits, but after a few residents and city attorney Don Freeman worried doing so would negatively affect the city's ability to control how venues use the privilege, Mayor Jason Burnett suggested the permits expire after 10 years, unless renewed by the planning department.

Carmel Residents Association President Barbara Livingston urged the council to reimpose the three-year limit that was part of the law when it was first passed in 2005, or at least compromise and impose a five-year limit.

'The very best for Carmel'

"I think you're making a mistake to put the review process out 10 years," she said. "I really would like you to keep it at three, but if not, consider five."

She said the periodic review would allow the city to "get rid of scofflaws" who violate the sound provisions.

"There is something about Carmel-by-the-Sea that is so special it deserves your attention," she said. "I just want you to do the very best for Carmel."

While the city's planning staff has reported few complaints over existing permits, which were first allowed starting in 2005, Livingston said that's simply because people don't call the police when they are bothered by loud music at a restaurant.

Still, "the vast number of businesses will behave well," Burnett predicted.

The council unanimously voted to adopt the ordinance with the 10-year permit limit. The ordinance will have to receive its final approval in July, which would put it into effect in August.

Dozens apply for city job

THE CITY should have a new planning and building director next month, Carmel city administrator Jason Stilwell told the council June 4.

The job, which entails overseeing the planning and building departments and their employees, working with the council and outside agencies on laws and other city issues, and myriad other responsibilities, has a salary range of \$127,320

to \$154,752 per year. Following recruiting efforts and advertising for the position, a total of 76 people from throughout the state applied for the job by the May 5 deadline. "We focused the recruitment on people who understand CEQA and the Coastal Act," Stilwell added.

The hiring process will also include panel interviews with community members, planners from other agencies, and employees. "Interviews are scheduled for next week," he said. "We anticipate having the new director on board in July, so that's moving forward nicely."





Police tracked down a conspicuously dressed woman in town May 14 after a bakery employee reported she had twice

stolen money out of the tip iar - and was caught committing the thefts on surveillance video — according to Carmel Police officer Chris Johnson. Several days later, Kathryn Curnutt, 37 and a resident of the Pacific Northwest, pleaded guilty to theft and burglary.

"The clerks noticed when they were cashing out that there were some tips that were missing," Johnson said of the employees at Cafe Carmel on the north side of Ocean Avenue west of Mission Street. "One of the local regulars had put in a tip that wasn't there.'

As a result, they contacted their boss, who then scrutinized video from the surveillance system to see if it would provide any clues to the thief's identity.

"On the video, they were able to see Kathryn two separate times, within a couple of minutes of each other, take money from the tip jar, so the manager told the staff that if she came in the next day, they should call the police," he said. When Curnutt walked in May 14, workers

confronted her, according to Johnson. "She

ended up stealing money again when the staff asked her to leave and then turned around," he said. "And staff turned back around and saw her as she was stealing it." Curnutt then left, crossed the street and wandered a few blocks west to the Carmel

Coffee House, where police found and questioned her, according to Johnson.

there was no one else dressed anything like her in Carmel," he said, from Curnutt's "glittery makeup," to her "big fur coat with lacy Victorian-style dress and a lot of jewelry."

"She was easy to find," he said.

In addition, a clerk from Hedi's shoes next door to the bakery told police the same woman had walked in and tried on a pair of shoes, and then tried to walk out wearing them. When the salesperson confronted her, she returned the footwear and

■ Woman sentenced to jail, probation and can't own pets

FORTY-FIVE cats that were removed from a Seaside home last summer after being found living in deplorable conditions are up for adoption, a spokeswoman for the SPCA for Monterey County said.

On July 24, 2012, SPCA humane officers found and seized 51 cats and took away 113 dead kittens in two homes in Seaside occupied by Maggie Johnson and her daughter, Donna Johnson. All of the cats, which didn't have adequate food and water, needed some degree of medical attention and several cats died after being rescued.

"So far, none of the cats have been adopted," Dawn Fenton, the SPCA's community outreach manager, told The Pine Cone this week, "but we are confident that we will find them loving homes.'

The SPCA kept the cats until the Donna Johnson's criminal case was resolved. She was charged with several counts of animal cruelty and neglect, and on April 17 was sentenced to 20 days in jail and three years' probation during which time she was ordered by a judge not to own any pets or stay in a home with pets for more than eight hours at a time, according to the SPCA. She was also ordered to attend coun-

Because of the cats' poor living conditions, many of the felines were extremely under-socialized and need homes with understanding and compassionate owners, Fenton said. And about a dozen feral cats found in the Seaside home are also up for adoption but are best suited to a "loving barn home.'


The hoarding case received international news attention because of the large number of dead and living cats, and the squalid conditions in which they were found.

SPCA humane officers used knives to slice open furniture and mattresses since the Johnsons didn't know how many cats lived there. Urine and feces were in every room the cats

Workers seized 51 cats from the house on Noche Buena Street in Seaside occupied by Maggie Johnson, and recovered the carcasses of 113 dead kittens on that property and from a nearby apartment that Donna Johnson rented. Ten dead kittens were found in the apartment, while the remainder of the dead and living felines were discovered at the

The SPCA had gone to the homes after Seaside police served search warrants after a property manager reported finding dead kittens.

SPCA officers also found 44 animal cremation urns at the apartment. Each wooden box had the name of a dead pet and a birth date.

Council decides to put off action on anti-party law

CARMEL POLICE and administrators at the Carmel Unified School District collaborated on a proposed law to punish adults who hold parties in their homes and allow kids to drink, but after Cmdr. Paul Tomasi presented the draft law the the city council June 4, council members decided to put off enacting it until it could be tweaked to address their concerns and a similar county ordinance is considered later this

Tomasi said the law would "hold noncommercial hosts over the age of 18 responsible for hosting parties where there is underage drinking.'



"This ordinance will be used as a tool to assist in the protection of minors," he said. "It targets those who provide a venue at which underage drinking occurs."

The ordinance would give police the power to enter a home when a rowdy party is occurring and would impose escalating fines for convicted party hosts, from \$500 for a first offense, to an amount equal to the cost of emergency response to the party — including police and fire officials for a third offense.

"It's designed to send a message to adults that hosting parties that involve underage drinking is no longer socially acceptable," he said.

Council members worried, however, that the law would unfairly saddle adults hanging out with their younger friends with misdemeanor charges — which could affect their ability to travel overseas, according to city attorney Don Freeman - and observed that it wouldn't mitigate the more problematic issue of teenagers holding parties and drinking when their parents are out of town.

"This doesn't really address that," councilwoman Carrie Theis confirmed.

Council member Ken Talmage asked how many incidents in the city in the past five years would have been affected by the proposed law.

"I don't know of any, honestly," Tomasi said. "As far as parents hosting parties in Carmel-by-the-Sea? None."

Councilman Steve Hillyard expressed concern someone in his late teens or early 20s could end up with a misdemeanor on his record if he got caught having a few beers with his underage friends.

"The language here is overly broad," he said, referring to

the law's holding responsible "any person having control of any premises."

"That could include an 18-year-old or 19-year-old," Hillyard continued. "I don't think our residents would like us to make misdemeanants of their kids when they're just being kids."

CUSD administrator Heath Rocha, a proponent of the law, pointed out that teenage drinking rates locally are higher than anywhere else in the state. Specifically, he said, 41 percent of juniors at Carmel High admit to binge drinking, defined as five or more drinks in two hours.

"The intent is to get very drunk and to pass out," he said. "We know they do it at homes. We're not a community where they're out driving into a field.'

He wanted the law broadened to include adults who could be reasonably expected to know a party with underage drinking would take place when they are out of town, and to impose higher fines. Carmel Residents Association President Barbara

Livingston said her board supports the ordinance, and Rose Moreno, an analyst for the County of Monterey, said she is working on a similar law to be proposed to the board of supervisors for adoption later this summer.

"We're trying to curb underage binge drinking and curb access to the alcohol," she said. "Parents say it's OK to have a party here, and it goes from three to 150," and with that come sexual assault and other crimes.

City attorney Don Freeman advised the council to try to have its ordinance mirror the county's, and members directed Tomasi to work with the county to refine the draft. They also asked for assurance it would target adults responsible for underage drinking, rather than result in convictions for relatively minor offenses, and to see if it could include situations where teens throw parties when the parents are out of town, since adults are legally responsible for their minor children.





walk or run off their leashes, and a social hub for their owners to meet.

But numerous residents told LUAC members they're worried about how the business will affect their residential neighborhood. In particular, they cited concerns about of traffic, noise, lighting and special events.

Luci Willman zeroed in on the noise she said the center would create. "I'm dreading what's going to happen to the quiet we enjoy," Willman said.

Ann Mahoney wondered if the local roads can handle the traffic the business would generate. The center would attract recreational vehicles for its special events.

"How do we get 70 RVs on and off Carmel Valley Road?" Mahoney asked. "What kind of traffic impact will it have?"

Real estate agent Pat Matuszewski suggested the center would sink real estate values in the neighborhood, thereby reducing the amount of money the county receives from property taxes. She urged officials to proceed with caution before approving the project. "Once the genie is out of the bottle, there is no way to put it back in," Matuszewski warned.

A man named Charles —his last name wasn't audible — complimented the owners for their vision but questioned the location of the business. "It's a great idea in the wrong neighborhood," he said.

'Fantastic design,' 'good use for land'

While they appeared to be outnumbered, a vocal minority supported the project. Roberta Troxell, who described herself as "active in dog sports," told the committee she is looking forward to using its facilities. Without the center, "I would have to travel 100 miles to participate in a herding event," Troxell explained.

Colleen Sweet believes the center will make good use of the property.

"I've watched it sit fallow and become a breeding ground for destructive rodents and coyotes," said Sweet, who also praised Diehl and her partners. "They've been very open to our concerns and bent over backward" trying to accommodate them.

A man who described himself as a contractor called the project, "a fantastic design for animals and pet owners." He also addressed concerns about the noise and traffic the business would generate.

"We have many events — the concours [week] especially — that bring far more vehicles into our area," observed the man, who told the audience he raises therapy dogs. "Talk about noise and traffic abuse, talk about the concours."

Attorneys share concerns

Two of Monterey County's most prominent land use attorneys - who often find themselves on opposing sides of cases raised issues with the project.

Representing the Quail Lodge, attorney Anthony Lombardo said its management is concerned about anything that would "detract" from the resort's "ambience" particularly after its recent \$28 million makeover. Lombardo listed modular buildings, RV parking, RV generators, flood lighting, loud speakers and event parking as possible worries. "There are 100 rooms directly across the street" from the proposed center, Lombardo said.

While the project has been characterized

as preserving the longtime agricultural use of the property, attorney Michael Stamp questioned that assessment. "They're eliminating agricultural use instead of preserving it," Stamp said.

The attorney also took aim at grading work that's begun on the property. But senior planner John Ford responded by saying the work — with the exception of an electrical project "that crossed over the line" - complies with the traditional use of the land and doesn't require a permit.

Project not a 'done deal'

Tom Dellarmo and others have suggested the project hasn't received the scrutiny from the county it deserves, inferring that Diehl's role as planning commissioner must be playing a part. Some have called it "done deal."

'Something stinks here," Dellarmo told the audience. "Nothing gets done quickly" in Carmel Valley, he said.

But Christine Williams, a frequent participant in local government meetings who hasn't taken a public stance on the center, insisted nothing improper has occurred — and the project is far from being approved.

"This is how the process works," Williams explained. "It's a slow process. This is just the beginning."

Ford concurred with Williams. He also said the comments the county receives from the public will "not only shape our understanding, but also shape how we analyze the project in terms of environmental and design analysis."

'We did what we were told'

The Carmel Pine Cone

Three weeks ago, Diehl told The Pine Cone she and her partners were hoping to celebrate the center's grand opening Sunday, July 14. At the June 3 hearing, though, she said that event has been postponed because of the controversy it has generated.

While Diehl didn't address every concern raised by the audience, she insisted the noise level at the center won't adversely affect the neighborhood, comparing it to the noise generated by a golf course.

To minimize noise, she said facilities have been sited as far from the property boundaries as possible.

Diehl also announced there will be no lighting for events, dispelling another fear people have raised. "We were told [by the county] that isn't happening, so we removed the request," she said.

While some have been critical of the grading work that has occurred, Diehl maintained that she and her partners have done nothing wrong. "We did what we were told," she added.

Will an EIR be required?

Of all the comments made at the hearing, the words of Brennan carried perhaps the greatest weight. If an EIR is required, as she suggested, the project's path to completion will become considerably more expensive and time-consuming — if not infeasible.

"I think alternatives to this project need to be carefully considered, and that can only occur through an EIR," Brennan said.



the storms — had starred together on Discovery Channel's "Storm Chasers." Paul Samaras, a photographer and videographer, was Tim's son.

Fenton and Young were among a handful of friends at Carmel High who had eaten lunch together almost daily, some of them since junior high, he said.

"That group was some of the more intelligent people in the school. We weren't all brains," he said, exempting himself from the title, "but a lot of us had been friends all the way through elementary school and middle school."

Like many of that group of friends, which also included motorcycle mechanic Jeff Collard, they lost touch after graduation. But the two reconnected at their 20th CHS reunion and through Facebook.

"And then next thing you know, there he is on the TV, and

you're going, 'Hey, I know that guy!'" Fenton said. "And I had just watched that show a couple of times before he was on one of the featured teams, so I was just getting into it as he started."

During those interim years, Young had gone to college and worked in Hollywood. His first tornado encounter occurred in 2000, when he headed to the East Coast, according to the Discovery Channel.

"He decided to take off on a two-month storm chasing adventure in the Great Plains hoping to catch a glimpse of a few tornadoes but ending up with over a dozen twister encounters. Experiencing the raw force of nature in Nebraska was unlike any pyrotechnic display on a high-tech Hollywood set."

The experiences drove his desire to earn a master's degree in atmospheric science from the University of Nevada Reno, and at a meteorological conference, he met Samaras, who "encouraged him to collect meteorological data from inside tornadoes as the principal focus of his thesis research."



Carl Young

Beginning 2003, up until last the chased tornadoes each spring, "and together, their **TWISTEX** team has tracked down over 125 tornadoes," according to the Discovery Channel.

Collard remembered Young as being "extremely smart" and said, "It's just mindblowing that he's gone."

He recalled Young as being fairly conservative in high school, friendly to many and straight laced.

"He drove a black Dodge Dart when the rest of us had '68 Camaros," he said. "He was very funny, very kind. He was one of those people who just didn't have a bad word for any-

After high school, Young headed to Berkeley, and he and Collard lost touch until the late 1990s, when they happened to run into each other at a Depeche Mode concert in Oakland.

The last time Collard heard from Young — whose mother and stepfather live in Carmel Valley, and whose younger brother is also local — about nine months ago, Collard learned about his friend's latest ambitions.

"I didn't realize he was into meteorology. He said he was storm chasing and following his dream, and how excited he was for the whole project," he said. "He was catching me up on his life."

"He truly enjoyed what he was doing," Fenton said. "Obviously, he didn't go into it blindly. You get your master's in meteorology, you know what you're doing.'



can stay in the river. And the rest — about 85 acre-feet - will be contracted to Cal Am to supplement the Monterey Peninsula's legal supply during the looming crunch, and then made available to private property owners who need it for additions to homes, infill development and business expansions.

Approval from the State Water Resources Control Board will be needed for the water deal before the transfer of the land to the BSLT can be completed, said Alan Williams, a longtime Eastwood business associate.

"We already have licensing of the water, and now we'll be able to ask for permission to move some of it," Williams said.

Local officials welcomed the prospect of an enhancement of the local water supply however small — pending completion of a new water supply project for the Monterey Peninsula, especially since that new water project, whatever form it takes, still has a long way to go before it's approved, much

"Having more water for lots of record, having more water to enable restaurants to add a few seats, to allow people to add a bathroom if they want, to be able to have an apartment upstairs in the commercial core ... there are all sorts of wonderful things this community would love to have, and we're being held back because of a lack of water," said Carmel Mayor Jason Burnett. He said the Carmel City Council would be doing its "due diligence" to determine how best to use some of Eastwood's water, if it becomes available.

Getting the water, Burnett said, would "put the decision-making power over land uses back where it belongs, in the hands of the elected representatives of the people of Carmel."

"Desal and all that are all good, but maybe nothing's going to get built in our lifetime," Eastwood said. "Eighty-five acre-feet can do a lot of good."

But even more enthusiastic support for the land trust's flood control project is coming from business owners and residents along the river — especially those who remember the floods during the 1990s.

"The single most important step for protecting the Mission Fields and Crossroads areas from future flooding is to allow more flood water to flow south of the river, instead of flooding the developed north bank," said Larry Levine, who chairs a county advisory committee on flood prevention in Carmel Valley.

"The county has to get on the stick and get this done," said Margaret Robbins, who lives near the river, and whose home nearly flooded in 1995 and 1998. "The Crossroads shopping center has 50 stores that need protection, Arroyo Carmel and Riverwood have almost 200 units that need protection, and Mission Fields has almost 300 units."

She said \$14 million in grant money is available to get the work done, but a big chunk of that is going to expire at the end of the summer unless action is taken.

At a meeting of the Monterey County Board of Supervisors capital improvement projects subcommittee Monday, it was agreed that the county should be the lead agency for the flood-control work, and the board itself will probably agree, according to 5th District Supervisor Dave Potter.

"The floods in 1998 were devastating," Potter said. "This is a great, great project."

Opening up the land Eastwood plans to donate is one part of the work anticipated by the Big Sur Land Trust, which has secured the \$14 million funding, according to executive director Bill Leahy. More will be needed. however.

'We are working with Monterey County

to identify the remaining funding needed, secure the funding and a set a time frame to break ground," Leahy said.

Lots to do

Why will the work be so costly?

Eastwood has already moved, at his own expense, a huge amount of fill and debris that was dumped on the Odello property in the 1930s during construction of a hotel in downtown Monterey. The fill, known as "the blister," impeded the flow of floodwaters across the Odello land. Eastwood also notched the levee along the south side of the river to direct some high water onto his land.

The latest project involves removing a one-half mile section of the levee, which would open the floodgates from the river to the undeveloped land immediately to the south. It also calls for removal of the berm that carries Highway 1 across the Odello/Eastwood land, replacing it with a causeway so water can flow freely on its way to the ocean. And the BSLT plans to create a network of trails connecting the north side of the river to the land Eastwood is donating, and then to Palo Corona Ranch and beyond.

"We are frustrated at the slow progress in actually getting any work started, but we are also appreciative of all the agencies, organizations and funders who are so supporting of the project," Levine said.

"Besides making some water available, the project would also have huge environmental benefits for the community and for the river," Burnett said. "It's going to be a win-win-win."

"The land trust is working with the Eastwoods on structuring the project to allow us to move forward," Leahy said. "Permitting has not yet begun."

Summertime wines, food tours honored, and Hello Sunshine

JUST IN time for the Carmel Valley heat - and Saturday's 9th Annual Art & Wine celebration — Chesebro has released three new wines that are crisp, refreshing and bright: a rosé, a Sauvignon Blanc and an Albariño. During the art and wine event, which showcases multiple artists and wineries throughout Carmel Valley Village, Chesebro will be pouring those wines in its lineup, allowing people seeking tasty and affordable summer wines to give them a try.

Tasting room manager Alyssa Ramp, also an artist whose works hang in the winery's

said she anticipates the crowds will be eager

sents aromas of white peach and tropical fruit alongside the more traditional citrus notes of the varietal. The added layers of depth and ripeness are due to the fact this wine is made from the clone of Sauvignon Blanc called musque that's grown at Cedar Lane. Those characteristics also allow the grapes to be picked earlier, when their sugar content is lower, producing good acidity and not too much alcohol. Chesebro made 305 cases and is selling the wine for \$18 per bot-

The third new kid on the block, Albariño,

is a Spanish varietal also grown in Arroyo Seco. With hints of summer stone fruits and a slight herbaceous quality, the wine has fuller body and richer mouthfeel than many Albariños, which can be quite stark. Ramp said

Albariño is particularly close to Will Chesebro's heart, as he spent time bicycle riding in Spain (he has been a member of the U.S. Paralympic cycling team since 2011). The winery made 187 cases and is selling it for \$18 per bottle.

Other wines on hand at Chesebro include 2010 Vermentino from Cedar Lane, 2009 Pinot Noir from Arroyo Seco, the 2009 Las Arenas blend of Grenache and Syrah from Cedar Lane and Arroyo Seco, and 2006 Syrah from the Chesebros' own CM Ranch in Carmel Valley.

When the family bought CM Ranch, located about 12 miles southeast of Carmel Valley Village, "they intended to produce cheese, but that was farming all year," Ramp explained. Wine, on the other hand, allows for at least a little time off to offset the inten-



■ 98 years ago — June 2, 1915

A Desirable Change

Through the efforts of Mrs. Eva K. de Sabla there is about to be consummated a plan to convey one and one-half acres of land to the Carmel Mission, according to an announcement recently made. The approach to the ancient church, built under the direction of Father Junipero Serra, is at present quite roundabout, and the adobe ruins fronting the structure are located on private property. The conveyance will involve a change in the road which passes the church, and would make possible a number of improvements in the vicinity of the mission calculated to greatly enhance the appearance of this historic edifice.

■ 75 years ago — June 10, 1938

Hatton Joins Sanitary District

The petition of the Hatton Fields property owners was filed this week with the Carmel sanitary district board and has received full backing of that board, Hugh Comstock reported this week, following a meeting last Friday at which it became known that the residents of the Hatton Fields area were keenly in favor of joining the district.

June 7, 2013

The area involved is that from Ocean Avenue northward between Paradise Park, a strip of property adjoining Carpenter street on the east side of the highway, and including the Community Hospital.

■ 50 years ago — June 6, 1963

A Point of Some Confusion

Last Tuesday, a stormy meeting at Holiday Inn, to which several of the 17 persons in attendance claimed they were not invited, proved at least one thing: the old Carmel spirit hasn't expired, it's just moved out to Carmel Point. The dispute over which way the traffic is - or isn't - to go on Scenic Drive between Valley Way and the State Beach parking lot at the end of Carmelo Street has become the subject of impassioned, gloriously confused maneuvering, manifestos and many gestures by impas-

sioned Italian fingers stirring among the plots and alarums.

The storm brewed up a few weeks ago when Harold Arnot quietly presented a petition to the Board of Supervisors asking that one-way traffic be installed on the section of Scenic which runs in front of his house. The petition, according to Arnot, had been prepared by a neighbor, Mrs. Annette Thorne, who had to go to Europe.

It did not take long for the barometer to fall and the storm to move in. [Of Seventeenth Avenue, John] Walsh accused Arnot not only of bad manners in failing to speak with the people on Seventeenth and Valley Way before going to the Board of Supervisors, but he also implied that it was a deliberate circumvention. But an agreement was finally reached, to which Arnot begrudgingly acceded when his efforts to persuade the dissident majority to allow a one-month trial of his program failed. The agreement was to do nothing about the matter until a discussion was had with County Road Commission Bruce McClain.

We Won't Lose The Del Monte **But Will The SP Regain It?**

The Southern Pacific apparently is not going to get away with it; at least, not officially. The Public Utilities Commission has accused the company of deliberately contriving an atmosphere of shabbiness and inefficiency in its passenger service, with the hope that it can "walk away" from passenger activity altogether, after driving off the customers. This it tried to do with the famous Del Monte Special, before asking the Commission for permission to abandon the train because it was not used by enough passengers and it was losing money.

Tuesday, the Commission sitting in San Francisco handed down a unanimous rejection of the SP's plea. Commissioner William M. Bennett sharply commented, "Southern Pacific's franchise to carry passengers is a government privilege. Applications to abandon that franchise are not to be measured by the sole test of profit."

■ 25 years ago — June 9, 1988

No 'lights, camera, action' for the city of Carmel

"Basically the people of Carmel have said over and over again that they do not want filming in downtown Carmel," said Mayor Jean Grace, adding that there are already about 25,000 cars each day going in and out of town. Grace, speaking to a panel composed of film professionals and several Monterey County Film Commission members last week at the Hyatt Regency, said that parking is just too precious a commodity in the one-mile-square city. While Carmel does have a fee schedule arranged for filming, Lt. Don Fuselier of Carmel Police Department told the panel that the word had gotten out in the film industry that the city discourages such activity. Many film companies ask for a permit to film only 24 hours ahead of time.



The company — which also has an office in Palo Alto — lists Facebook, Spotify, Etsy and Walmart among its many clients.

Comolli joined Accel in 2000. According to his biography on the company's website, he has been active in "international startups, general management and venture capital investing for 26 years."

He is also listed as an active member of the World Economic Forum, a Swiss nonprofit foundation dedicated to "improving the state of the world by engaging business, political, academic and other leaders of society to shape global, regional and industry agendas."

Comolli graduated from Northwestern University in 1982 with a BS in Engineering. He received his MBA in 1987 from Harvard Business School.

A Google search did not turn up any links between Comolli and Carmel, although the reasons why he wanted to buy the house are probably self evident. He did not respond to questions from The Pine Cone about his new home.

Editorial

What's the downside? There isn't one

WE WRESTLED a bit with our front-page story about Clint Eastwood's plan to donate 80 acres to the Big Sur Land Trust so it can be used to lessen the flood danger at the mouth of Carmel Valley, even as he tries to make some of the potable water on the property available to help stave off the state's Draconian water cutback order, and then to be used for infill development in Carmel and Carmel Valley.

We struggled with it because we wanted to make the story balanced, which would mean finding people who don't like what Eastwood's up to and giving them a chance to voice their displeasure. In this community, with its myriad of highly opinionated and energetic activists who never met an issue that didn't get their dander up, surely there'd be somebody who'd find something to complain about.

But then we thought, "Who could possibly be against flood control?" The 1995 and 1998 floods were true disasters, washing out highways and bridges, isolating communities, destroying property, and generally wreaking havoc, especially on the north side of the Carmel River. More floods are coming, of course, and the Eastwood land donation is an essential first step toward opening the way from the south side of the river to the ocean, which would divert stormwater away from the homes and businesses on the north side. Being against that would be like being in favor of a plague. Of course, somebody, somewhere is in favor of plagues, but whoever he is, he's nuts, and in journalism school they don't teach you that balance is required between the forces of sanity and the forces of craziness. So we left the anti-flood-control angle, whatever it is, out of the story.

Likewise the idea of Cal Am taking temporary possession of Eastwood's 85 acre-feet a year so that we don't run afoul of the state's 2016-and-beyond limits on what we're allowed to consume. The Eastwood water isn't much, compared to the Monterey Peninsula's overall consumption of 13,000 acre-feet a year, but even a tiny additional supply, such as what he is offering, could keep us from going over the state's ceiling, which would mean escaping fines and rationing. So, just like flood control, nobody in his right mind could be against having Eastwood's 85 AF added to the ever-shrinking pool of water we are allowed to use, and that angle isn't in the story, either.

But what about the final step in the Eastwood plan? He wants to make some of his water available to people in Carmel and Carmel Valley so they can use it for additions to homes, expansions of restaurants and other small businesses, and building on existing lots of record. Now there's something surely a lot of people will be against!

Actually, no. Over a period of many years, one of this newspaper's reporters has had an assignment to find someone — anyone — who has a respected place in this community and who thinks there should be no new water for anything. As far as we have been able to find, nobody has this belief. Everyone recognizes the need for a small amount of new water to provide for the basic needs of the people of the Monterey Peninsula, including the small-scale types of development envisioned by Eastwood.

When you think about it, this unanimity of opinion about having an adequate water supply only makes sense. Having clean, healthful and inexpensive water available to everyone is a major achievement of modern man, and is every bit as essential to human life and progress as having good schools, plentiful food, efficient transportation, modern medical care, proper law enforcement and many other things. Everybody recognizes that these things are essential, and nobody is against them.

So that's why our front-page story doesn't have a quote from anybody who's against the things Eastwood is proposing: Because nobody is. If anything, everybody agrees they should be done quicker.

'Panic and assumptions based on ignorance' Dear Editor,

Being 34 years old, I realize I'm in the minority demographic in this community. But I am a native of Carmel and plan to remain here for the rest of my life. The future of our area is actually more relevant to me than to most who voice their opinions in this town. Part of what I love about this community is its rural atmosphere. Part of what I dislike about this community is the tendency for stagnation. Somewhere there must be a balance between maintaining the beauty and integrity while accepting positive change.

The Carmel Canine Sports Center is just that: A small business owned by three locals who have a passion for dogs and want to offer the community another healthy outlet for activity. Let me remind people what is being proposed. It's a recreation facility for people and their canines. Not a brothel or a prison (or RV park as some have suggested). It's shocking how the concept of a dog sports facility can evoke such an uproar in typically well mannered people.

To gain perspective — the owners of the property have the opportunity to find a tenant to farm it (which has clearly been challenging), lease it out to CCSC, which proposes to plant grass, grow hay and maintain the farm's organic status as closely as possible, or develop the nine existing residential lots. While there are valid concerns, it's clear that CCSC is willing to address those issues and create a compromise agreeable to both parties. However, it appears that panic and assumptions based on ignorance have caused more of a mob mentality than a rational group of dissenters.



Transforming an agency so it actually starts doing something

YOU SEE his name in the newspaper whenever something's developing with the water crisis. Dave Stoldt has been general

manager of the Monterey Peninsula Management District since July 2011, and by most accounts, he's made a significant difference, at least with the district's operation.

Dave was brought up in the western suburbs of Chicago and went to college at the University of Illinois Champagne-Urbana, where he majored in engineering. "Originally I was doing the engineering in environmental and hydrosystems. I was going to become an environmental attorney. I was going to go to law school. But I hit senior year

in college and I said, 'How many attorneys do you know that you like?' I also got the impression that environmental attorneys didn't make a whole lot of money.'

Dave Stoldt

So, undecided about his future, he did what many young men have done: He went

"I didn't have a plan, so I went to grad school out at UC Berkeley. That's what got me out here in 1980. I worked for a while at everyone's favorite electric utility, PG&E, and then went back to business school at

Dave started an investment banking company with a focus on financing public projects like jails, parking garages, universities, wastewater plants, water supply projects, garbage disposal and such. He worked on the

financing for the Pebble Beach Reclamation Project, which is how he got his introduction to the business of the Monterey Peninsula. He also arranged the financing for the Castroville Seawater Intrusion Project, which delivers recycled water to farmers.

"That was the mid-1990s, when they first began to look hard at dealing with the seawater intrusion problem." Where before they could only grow crops that would survive in high-salinity conditions, now the farmers don't have that limitation.

Then his wife was offered

an excellent job in Boston, so they moved back East, and Dave turned up a new path. "I basically started funding and running early stage start-up companies. Completely different. But it's good training for what I'm doing now, because they were all small-size organizations which required managing people and strategic planning."

He also was elected to the school board three times and appointed to the local land use committee. "So I've always had one foot in the public sector and one foot in the private sector," he said.

Returning to the Peninsula to take the job with the water district was a challenge. "I

started working 70-hour weeks and just immersed myself in it quickly so that I could contribute quickly. But I'm vastly improved now. I'm down below 60 hours a week. This is a challenging place and you have to hit the ground running, so I did," he

For years, the water district always seemed to be stifling progress toward improving the Monterey Peninsula's water supply, instead of improving

said. "At least, I tried."

That's changed now, Stoldt said, but he doesn't take the credit. Some of the board membership has changed. "The directions that folks have taken in the district have been much more oriented to solving the water supply, thinking bigger."

The agency also has a new revenue source, imposed amid controversy, that enables it to advance water projects, such as groundwater replenishment. He says not all the water-supply eggs can go in the desal

"In a perfect world, you'd have diversification of resources, with a lower carbon footprint, less discharge to the bay, lower operating costs, all of the above," he said.

While a desal plant looks likes it's going to be the biggest component of a new water supply, Dave has a dream about a dam.

"If I could go back to 1995, I think we could have funded the dam with what are called certificates of participation instead of revenue bonds, and done that without a vote. And we wouldn't be in this position now. For less than \$150 million back then, you'd have something that requires no major operation and maintenance, would be gravity fed, and provide water of very, very good quality," he offered.

"There's a reason people built dams.

They are very low maintenance and highly efficient. But it's a little different era than we're in right now, and we've got two threatened species on the Carmel River. It's hard to imagine that we could get a dam permit in today's environment," he concluded.

You'd think the job would be an unending string of frustrations, but Dave has the experience and the character to manage the situa-

"I like puzzles and problems. Water on the Peninsula is fraught with complications. In my organization, there are good people, and I like good people. I get to be a change agent for water on the Peninsula, but also for that organization itself."

million and was "collaborating" with him on programs to promote coastal conservation.

"We always dreamed of getting married in Big Sur, one of the most magical places on earth," Parker was quoted as saying in the coastal commission's press release. "We are excited to support these important conservation-related projects for and with the local

However, readers of The Pine Cone, the San Francisco Chronicle and other newspapers are scolding the commission for its accommodating attitude toward Parker and the Ventana Inn - which reached its own settlement with the commission.

"They just gave a free pass to any billionaire that wants to have an event in Big Sur," according to a Pine Cone reader who did not want to be identified because he might have future dealings with the coastal commission. "They basically said, 'Just have the wedding and pay us later."

In a June 6 editorial, the Chronicle attacked the commission for being aware Parker "was breaking the law" before the wedding day while gladly accepting his \$2.5 million after the fact.

'It's all too conveniently cozy," the Chronicle's editorial said. "One can only assume that the same courtesy will be extended to oil barons or Wall Street executives when they want to alter a protected area for the pleasure of their pals.

Among Parker and his wife's 300 guests were Sting — said to have performed at the reception — English actress Emma Watson, Metallica drummer Lars Ulrich and Jane's Addiction singer Perry Farrell.

And, according to the Chronicle, California Attorney General Kamala Harris and Lt. Gov. Gavin Newsom were there.

"Neither Democrat has uttered a discouraging word about Big Sir's wedding at Big Sur," the Chronicle went on. "Hey, what's a little breach of environmental regulation among friends?"

Chronicle readers aren't showing any mercy for the coastal agency, either.

"Although I am a Democrat," according to one Chronicle reader, "I believe that Newsom and Harris are hypocrites."

"There's an old adage," another person wrote. "It is easier to get forgiveness than permission. This is especially true if you are

'No further damage'

But coastal commission legislative director Sarah Christie told The Pine Cone that it wouldn't have made a difference if the commission had stopped the wedding.

'Coastal commission staff viewed the site," Christie said, "and concluded that any potential environmental impacts from the development had already occurred, and would not be made any worse by the wed-

The coastal commission was tipped off to the development by Monterey County planning officials on May 2 after they visited the site the day before. The coastal commission "requested" on May 8 that the work stop, according to a lengthy staff report.

Work on the wedding "initially stopped" on May 9, according to the commission, and recommenced on Wednesday, May 15. Ventana and Parker's people told coastal commission staff they had restarted the work, and commission staff warned them that "they did so at their own risk of being determined to have violated the Coastal Act's permit requirements."

Massive undertaking

Parker and his a company, Neraida LLC created solely to manage the wedding signed a lease deal with Ventana in January to have exclusive use of the campground for the wedding, according to the coastal commission report.

For three months, dozens of workers graded existing camp sites and roads and built an artificial stone pond, gateways, rock walls artificial ruins of cottages and cas walls, a stone dance floor, and brought in hundreds of potted trees, plants and flowers. Dozens of florists from Los Angeles and elsewhere were brought in for the wedding. Crews also installed port-a-potties, generators, lighting and tents for the reception.

"Staircases were crafted around existing habitat and redwood trees," the report said. "An artificial pond was dug and installed. A stone bridge over the pond was constructed."

The wedding site also featured a large fabricated Celtic cross and busts of Parker and Lenas seemingly sprouting from rocks. Parker's likeness (created with styrofoam and paint but made to look like stone) featured a muscular chest with six-pack abs.

Damage to environment

But the commission contends the development could have lasting damage to the sensitive forest area. Construction workers failed to install erosion control measures,

and development close to redwood trees threatened to impede redwood propagation, according to the commission.

'The unpermitted development has thus impacted the existing redwood forest habitat and has likely caused sedimentation of Post Creek," a tributary of the Big Sur River, the staff report said.

Furthermore, the development is causing 'continuing resource damage," according to

The commission is requiring detailed removal, restoration and contingency plans, which shall be prepared by a restoration ecologist. Crews are expected to begin dismantling the wedding set next week. Parker signed the agreement May 30, two days before his wedding.

"The removal plan shall include measures to protect all native habitat, including redwood and riparian vegetation, during removal activity," according to the commission report.

Problems mitigated

Parker's money, according to the commission, will help pay for a variety of important conservation and public access efforts, which could include public easements, hiking trails, the protection of sensitive habitat in Monterey County and coastal conservation projects. The settlement is dependent upon approval from coastal commissioners, who will weigh in on the issue at their June

Parker must also fund and implement a public education program focused on coastal conservation and/or public access. Within six months, Parker and his company must present to the coastal commission three to five video concepts and a draft video script

for approval. Six months after that, Parker is required to propose a final video concept and script for production. Three months after the commission approves the concept, Parker must present a plan to distribute the video to achieve "100,000 online views", according to the agreement.

In lieu of the video plan, the Facebook mogul has the option of using his tech skills to create an iPhone-based app that offers information about coastal access points to the public. The app would show users dedicated coastal access points and areas in California and their proximity to those

"Mr. Parker is an innovator in digital technology and social networking," Christie said. "He has agreed to work with the commission on a project that will combine those skills with a coastal protection message. The details of the project have not yet been defined, but we are all looking forward to working with his creative team on a con-

WTCC Ventana Investors LLC, which owns Ventana Inn, also reached a settlement deal with the coastal commission.

The hotel will upgrade and maintain trails on its property, provide new signage, upgrade the kiosk and restrooms at the campgrounds and improve campsites to "offer more of a wilderness experience by reducing parking spots directly at camp-

The inn will also have to create a Ventana "Public Access and Campground Experience Guide," detailing the amenities, trails, history, flora, fauna and other information. brochure will be made available to the public, including campground visitors and hotel

Great art that's right in front of your eyes — if you look

IT IS worth the while to see your native village thus sometimes, as if you were a traveler passing through it," wrote Henry David Thoreau. It is not unusual for residents of a community to take for granted the things that help make their town special. What do you see when you walk about Carmel? Are you so familiar with its charm that you forget to

makes it a cenotaph), but his body is depicted lying on the Sarcophagus dressed in traditional Franciscan robe, with stole, crucifix, cord and rosary — the way he requested his body be prepared for burial.

Another famous Mora sculpture is the statue of Father Serra that stands at the busy Camino del Monte intersection where Serra,

Dolores, and Alta streets all come together. There are two red benches on either side of the statue's base. One bench announces that the shrine is dedicated to the "Immortal memory of Padre Junipero Serra - Servant of Christ, Adventurer, Artist and Engineer." Writing on the other bench indicates the shrine has been there for 92 years. During the 45 minutes I sit there no one else comes to join me.

A hop, skip and few minutes from that intersection takes you to courtyard

behind the Little Napoli restaurant at Seventh and Dolores. This quiet courtyard holds my favorite Mora sculpture. It is called "The Greeting." It depicts two Californios, a man and a woman bowing to each other. The man is dressed in a red serape and yellow peasant pants. He holds his sombrero across his chest while he bows to a lovely woman with shiny, blue-black hair. She wears a flowing, cream-colored dress which she hikes up slightly from the ground. The folds of her dress are so real they appear to move as she lifts the hem.

My go-to-guy regarding information about Jo Mora is Peter Hiller, an art teacher at All Saints Episcopal Day School. When

not teaching, he is a freelance museum curator. Hiller doesn't know of any "back story" regarding "The Greeting" sculpture. He does know that for some inexplicable reason there is an unglazed copy of each figure in the Mora archives.

"It's perfectly OK to make up a story," he says. "Maybe they are the same couple doing their first wedding dance, who are then seen riding off after their marriage in Mora's diorama at the Naval Postgraduate School's La Novia Room. I teased Bill Bates that they were breaking Carmel's no music/no dancing rules. He created two cartoons about the notion."

Speaking of Bill Bates, how often do you stop to enjoy the mural he did with Carol Minou at Nielsen's Market? The mural is a stylized map of Carmel with a series of graphics that playfully poke fun at Carmel idiosyncrasies. One graphic shows a clergyman speaking to a resident. "No Agnes," the



clergyman says. "First He created heaven and earth. *Then* He made Carmel." Paper maps of the mural are available inside the market.

Mary Miller Klepich's mural, "California Del Norte via El Camino Real," wraps around three sides of the Doud's Craft Studio building on San Carlos. This colorful, historic mural dates back to 1955. It shows the change of peoples from native Americans through the arrival of the missionaries and the rancheros. It was restored in 2002 by Earl
