# Dog missing for two years found in C.V. ditch

■ 20-year-old 'Happy' adopted after Orinda couple sees newspaper ad

ABOUT HALF-PAST midnight on an early morning in May, retired teacher Beth Lawn heard a soft but persistent bark somewhere outside of her Carmel Valley condominium.

Lawn — a dog lover whose home is adjacent to the C.V. Community Youth Center — walked outside to try to find the dog, which sounded in distress.

"I went out in pajamas and bare feet," she told

It was too dark to see anything, so Lawn went back in, fetched a flashlight and followed the bark to the edge of Tularcitos Elementary School, where she saw what looked like a pile of sticks nestled snuggly

# Cops search city worker's house and seize his computers

■ Police refuse to talk, citing 'personnel matter'

CARMEL POLICE officers, as well as Chief Mike Calhoun and administrative services director Susan Paul, walked into the Carmel Valley home of the city's IT manager, Steve McInchak, and his wife last Wednesday evening to serve a search warrant seeking evidence in a possible criminal case against the longtime city employee.

McInchak and full-time computer tech Rose Franzen are also on paid administrative leave from the city, pending internal investigations.

According to dispatch records, the search warrant was served the evening of Wednesday, June 5, and it took police almost three hours to

# Taxpayers sue water district over user fee

A GROUP that waged a long battle to force a public vote on a fee the water district began tacking onto Monterey Peninsula property tax bills late last year has filed a lawsuit

On Thursday, the Monterey Peninsula Taxpayers Association filed suit against the Monterey Peninsula Water Management District over a Sept. 17, 2012, decision by the district's board of directors not to schedule an election after a petition containing the names of 4,100 water customers opposed to the water charge was submitted.

With director Dave Potter dissenting, the board declared the petition invalid and not subject to a public vote, and the fee — which opponents say is actually a tax — went into

"What we are trying to do is have the water district follow the law, particularly, state elections code," taxpayers association board member Rick Heuer told The Pine Cone.

The group's lawsuit argues the water district board had only two options when presented the petition, and declaring the petition invalid wasn't one of them.

"One option was to rescind the charge," Heuer said. "Or they could have put it on the ballot to allow voters to decide."

Water district general manager Dave Stoldt told The Pine Cone that the taxpayers association's position, and the complaint, aren't reflective of what most water customers on the Peninsula want.

"People have come to realize the water supply situation is so serious," Stoldt said. "The water district is playing an important role, and that's where this money goes."

The fee is expected to raise about \$3.5 million each year for water supply projects, such as a recycled water component in which the district would fund 75 percent.

"If the fee were to go away," [the recycled water project] would go away," Stoldt said.

Stoldt estimates that defending the lawsuit will cost more

# Leukemia takes life of young actress

passed away Sunday after battling putting on singing and dancing shows for leukemia was remembered by her friends as a strong and spirited young woman who always seemed to have a smile on

Late last year, actress Camila de la Llata, 23, was diagnosed with acute myeloid leukemia, a blood and bone marrow cancer. Though her friends said she fought the disease courageously for months, she died June 9 in a Seattle-area hospital.

Bri Slama first met Camila at Santa Catalina, where both were students. The two also attended California State University Fullerton, where they majored in theater arts

"When I think of her, I think of her wild hair," Slama told The Pine Cone Tuesday. "That symbolized who she was. She was the life of the party, and even among theater people, she stood out."

The women — who shared the same birthday one year apart — also worked as A TALENTED local actress who actors at the Monterey Bay Aquarium,

Last New Years' Eve, Slama said she and Camila spent the night at the "Twist and Shout" performance at the Golden Bough Playhouse in Carmel. Slama said it didn't even seem as if her friend was sick, because she sang and danced during the show, smiling the entire time.

"She was just a sunshine, even when she was sick," Slama said. "She was never down. Never."

While Camila had taken a hiatus from CSU Fullerton and moved back to the Peninsula, she had been enrolled in her senior year at the Southern California university when she found out she had leukemia.

"The diagnosis came just about a week before she was set to move back to

# **Council adopts** record-setting budget

AKING ADVANTAGE of an expected new \$2 million in revenues from the sales tax increase voters approved last November, the Carmel City Council on Tuesday adopted an unprecedented \$18.2 million budget that calls for more capital projects and new jobs.

"The next several years will require focus on maintaining the community's quality of life, reconstituting the eroded services to meet policy plan outcomes, and repairing and maintaining the city's neglected roads, buildings and infrastructure," city administrator Jason Stilwell said in his budget presentation June 11.

He said the 2013/2014 spending plan aims to fulfill the

"Everything we did was an homage to nature, to the natural redwood environment which I call 'God's cathedral," he wrote, expressing disappointment at the disapproving coverage his elaborate wedding has drawn.



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
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# On guard

but until we're both trained, we're both a little guarded."

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

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# Yarn left by Pacific Grove woman nets church \$18K

HUNDREDS OF knitters took to St. Mary's by-the-Sea Episcopal Church last weekend to sort through a huge stash of yarn left by a longtime Pacific Grove resident who passed

On sale were hundreds of skeins of yarn and more than 100 hand-knit sweaters that belonged to Linda Jacobs, who died Jan. 21 from ovarian cancer. Her friends donated the yarn — which Jacobs collected over decades — to St. Mary's by-the-Sea Episcopal Church in P.G.

"We had more than 100 people waiting in line when we opened the doors," said Ann Pettit, a St. Mary's parishioner who was instrumental in organizing the June 8 sale.

Word of mouth, signs outside the church and an article in The Pine Cone helped spread the word about the sale. In total, the one-day yarn sale resulted in more than \$12,000, with an additional \$6,000 in sales from a presale to church members in the weeks before. "We probably did 300 transactions in three hours," Pettit said.

Because of the large number of customers at the sale and the capacity of the room where the yarn was displayed, the church allowed 25 people in at a time.

"They each got a half an hour," Pettit said.

One knitter who was number 300 in line told The Pine Cone the sale was well organized.

More than a dozen church volunteers helped, including two people at each check stand.

Church parishioner Brita Bruemmer has already made good use of the material she bought at a presale in May before the yarn was on sale to the public.

"She already finished [making] a sweater in it," Pettit said. "She came last Sunday in the sweater she made."


While most of the customers were women, Pettit said a few men showed up for the sale.

Some of the funds will go to various ministries at the church, while another portion will help pay for a new columbarium on church grounds.

There's still a good amount of yarn remaining, and Pettit said a Vermont-based clearinghouse is expected to pick up the rest and give the church 40 percent of the sales.

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# Council: 'Don't worry about parking'

# Overturns commission's denial of house demolition

THE OWNERS of a lot at Torres and Fifth with a duplex in front and a dilapidated house behind it received permission last Tuesday to demolish and rebuild the cottage without adding off-street parking. The planning commission denied their permit in April, but after debating how to accommodate cars on the property — and concluding large trees and the building in front make doing so practically impossible — the council unanimously decided Peter Kimball and Kathy Campbell should be allowed to pro-

Kimball and Campbell proposed replacing the old 700-square-foot, two-bedroom house with an 1,143-square-foot two-bedroom home, according to senior planner Marc Wiener's June 4 report for the council. With a house and two apartments on the lot, the city's zoning code requires five off-street parking spaces, but there are none. It wasn't an issue until the owners applied for permission to replace the rear cottage. The planning commission lacked the four-fifths vote to approve the project.

"The commissioners who voted against the project were concerned that the proposed expansion of the dwelling would increase parking demand on a site that does not contain any off-street parking," he said.

The only area that could conceivably accommodate off-street parking is the northwest corner, but that would require cutting down two city-owned oaks. As recommended by the city, Kimball and Campbell asked the forest and beach commission for permission to remove those trees in order to install a driveway and parking pad, but that request



# Lawsuit settled in vicious dog attack case

SUSAN LOVE, the Carmel woman attacked by her neighbor's three Catahoula hounds in 2011, settled her lawsuit against their owner, Josh Kelsey, out of court on the eve of the case going to trial.

Love filed suit on March 13, 2012, in Monterey County Superior Court, for damages in the attack, which occurred when she was walking her puppy in her neighborhood and encountered the three dogs, which had escaped from Kelsey's yard. Love had to drop her dog to defend herself in the attack, and the puppy was killed, while Love's arm was badly wounded. Afterward, all three dogs of the dogs who attacked were euthanized.

"After extensive testimony from the victim, Mr. Kelsey, various sheriff's and animal control officers, a prior bite victim, and neighbors, his insurer decided to resolve the matter to avoid trial," according to the Dunnion Law Firm. Had the case gone to trial, Love could have sought punitive damages,

according to a May 24 court ruling.

"I'm so glad this whole thing is over," Love told The Pine Cone Thursday. "This has been going on for so long."

Love, who promised not to talk about the outcome when she accepted the settlement, said she has been reminded daily of the horror of the attack and still experiences jolts of fear when she encounters loose dogs. Her scarred arm reminds her of the terror of the day, as well.

"I don't think there is any amount of money that could compensate for the terror I went through," said Love, who is director of the June 16 Run in the Name of Love.

In the particularly dog-obsessed community of Carmel, Love also wanted to remind people whose pets are running loose to be mindful that the people they approach might be afraid. "The dog owner says, 'Don't worry, my dog won't hurt you!' but that person has no idea what the other person

was denied in March.

With no other options after the planning commission's denial in April, the owners filed an appeal to the council, which Wiener recommended granting, since the project complies with city codes and exempting the parking requirements can be justified.

Further, he said, "the project helps maintain the housing stock in Carmel," which city policies encourage.

"They are longtime residents and bought this property back in 1970," architect Peter Davis said of his clients. While they have lived off and on in the lower level of the duplex, they rented out the upstairs unit. "And in the back portion, an ugly man had rented that old house for the last 20 years."

That tenant insisted everything was fine in the house and that they should leave it alone, but when he finally moved out, they "found it was in really bad shape," Davis said. They concluded the best option was to demolish it and construct a new home that would meet all the codes and be more livable.

"They don't want to put any parking there at all — they would much rather have that garden and patio for everybody to use," he added, referring to a bit of open space on the lot. "They couldn't care less about the parking."

Council members wrestled with how to make the project accommodate cars but found no reasonable solutions.

"There's nothing we could do," councilwoman Victoria Beach observed. "If the whole site were demolished, they could reestablish an area for parking, but there's absolutely no other way to bring it into parking conformance."

Even Carmel Residents Association President Barbara Livingston urged the council to grant the appeal.

"You're not making the parking situation worse — it's always been nil," she said. "I think there's a case where you could make findings allowing them to proceed."

Councilwoman Carrie Theis remarked that the applicants had endured multiple hearings by the time they got to the June 4 meeting.

"The city has put them through plenty," she said. "The parking doesn't seem to be an issue to them, so I think we can make a very good case that their building is not making the situation worse."

In fact, she argued against requiring it.

"Frankly, I think adding a spot is going to be a detriment to the property," she said.

The remainder of the council agreed, unanimously voting to grant the appeal and overturn the planning commission's denial

complete the task. While CPD's log of calls provided to The Pine Cone for its weekly sheriff's log did not include the search, a case opened at the same time, 5:17 p.m., refers to California Penal Code section 502(c)(2): unauthorized use of a computer, at Vista Lobos, where McInchak's office is located. It contained no other information.

Although the case is criminal in nature, Carmel Police Cmdr. Paul Tomasi and detective Rachelle Lightfoot said they could not say anything about the allegations that brought police to ask a judge to sign a search warrant and seize evidence from the house.

Were the initial allegations and search related to a suspect who is not a city employee, at least the basic information about the possible violations and search would be disclosed. But since McInchak works for the City of Carmel, and not for one of the private businesses in town, the officers said they could not talk about it.

"I've been advised that that is a personnel issue, and I can't discuss it," Lightfoot said. "And it is still under investigation."

"It gets dicey, but it's still a personnel matter, and by law we can't disclose personnel issues," Tomasi said.

The city also could have had an outside agency investigate, in order to avoid any potential conflicts, but opted not to.

"We could, but we didn't," Tomasi said. He also said Calhoun was present when the search warrant was served "due to the nature of it." "It involves a city employee, so of course he's going to be there," he said.

## Keeping the lid on

City administrator Jason Stilwell said he could not comment on any ongoing investigation or personnel issue.

"I will, however, take this opportunity to reinforce that the City of Carmel-by-the-Sea is a professional organization with policies in place and enforced to protect the public, employees, residents and visitors," he said.

"We have zero tolerance for harassment in the workplace, violence in the workplace, misconduct or misuse of public funds."

Pine Cone publisher Paul Miller was unimpressed by the reasoning offered for keeping mum. "This is the worst kind of coverup by city officials," he said. "To hide crimes, or even potential crimes, from the public for such a lame reason is unacceptable. Government employees should be treated the same as anybody else, and the police must be independent from the political considerations at city hall."

## Who's minding the store

An email to Susan Paul asking who was handling IT matters in the absence of McInchak and Franzen, as well as who is investigating whatever issue precipitated their being put on paid administrative leave, has gone unanswered. The same is true for building official John Hanson, who is also on paid administrative leave.

While Paul did not respond, planning staff confirmed City of Monterey employees are assisting Carmel with its building services in Hanson's absence. A sign at the desk warns of longer turnaround times for building plan check (30 days) and rechecks (two weeks). In the past, a two-week turnaround was in effect for those — though they often occurred much faster — as well as planning reviews and fire plan checks, which also now have a 30-day turnaround. In reality, according to city workers, the waits are not that

Since her arrival at the city, Paul — who worked for Santa Barbara County, as did Stilwell — has been examining contracts and scrutinizing the workforce. She was present when Linda Macdonald, who worked in the children's library, was fired in March, around the same time assistant city clerk Molly Laughlin disappeared from city hall.

During her tenure as assistant county chief executive officer and human resources director for Santa Barbara County, Paul was one of the defendants named in a hostileworkplace and wrongful-termination lawsuit in which a former employee sued the county and was awarded \$431,000 by a jury.



Service Level Sustainability Plan the council developed in June 2012 that "identified a range of services not provided due to lack of funding" in five target areas: services, road maintenance, capital maintenance, debt management and reserves.

In the spending plan, 36 percent, or \$6,183,726, is designated for public safety, and another 16 percent (\$2,417,878) for services, such as public works and forestry. The city administrator's office budget is \$5,084,193 and includes programs and services like marketing, the \$650,000 Sunset Center subsidy and debt service.

The new jobs include a data analyst, capital projects manager and firefighter para-

## Big project list

Meanwhile, the proposed capital improvement plan for the year details \$2.8 million in projects, among them \$95,000 for a new truck for road painting and signs, \$104,000 for police radios, \$584,000 in road repairs and \$200,000 for Forest Theater renovations. \$312,500 worth of projects — the trashcans and a storm drain - were unfunded in the capital projects list.

Councilman Ken Talmage noted the increase of \$3.75 million in spending over last year and said he wanted to put more of that money in reserves.

We have an operating budget policy that says there should be a 5 percent revenue buffer, and that would be \$800,000, and there is no buffer in this budget," he said. "I almost feel like someone who's had a windfall, and we're going to spend every dime, and I'm not sure that is wise."

He argued it would be smarter to use some of that money to restore the \$3.6 million taken from reserves during the past several years.

"We don't know when it's going to rain, but we know it's going to rain," Talmage said. "We should be adding to reserves."

Ultimately, however, the council unanimously decided to reduce its contribution to reserves by \$65,000 to help pay for additional capital work and fulfill some financial requests from outside agencies. But council members did decide to discuss their reserves policy in the future.

Trusting Stilwell and the other department heads to draft reasonable budgets for their departments, the council didn't question the majority of the major expenses for the year, instead focusing on some of the smaller requests made by outside agencies. They decided the budget should include \$40,000 for the Carmel Chamber of Commerce, \$10,000 for the city's hundredth birthday celebration, \$8,500 for the Carmel Heritage Society, \$1,000 for the United Way's 211 program and \$500 for the Monterey County Film Commission. The council's decisions added \$20,000 to the operating budget.

## Talmage hates tennis courts

On the capital projects list, the council allocated \$30,000 to replace trash cans in town, and \$125,000 more for the Scenic Road restroom project. Members also shifted funds by waiting to see if a donor would provide \$10,000 to help redo the patio at Sunset

Talmage said he thought some of the money to help pay for the restrooms and trashcans should come by axing the \$55,000 allocated to repair the Forest Hill Park tennis courts, which are considered a liability. He argued it would be wrong to spend money on the courts while forgoing the bathrooms and trashcans.

"It's a function of priorities," he said. "It's

something 2 million people use, as opposed to something 2,000 people use."

But padlocking the tennis courts would make them an eyesore, councilwoman Victoria Beach countered.

Mayor Jason Burnett pointed out the city is undertaking an extensive amount of roadwork, and while those projects are important, cutting money from their budget would be a good idea.

"We are doing a huge amount - more than in the past — and there's a limit to what you can do without it becoming a big inconvenience," he said. "There's actually some logic behind moving with the road projects at a measured pace over a 10-year period rather than front loading too much of it."

He suggested covering the additional money for the trashcans and Scenic Road restrooms, as well as the \$20,000 added to the operating budget, by removing \$100,000 from the road project budget and reducing allocations to reserves by \$65,000.

At the end of the June 11 meeting, which ran about five hours, council members unanimously voted in favor of the resolutions enacting the 2013/2014 budget, which details \$18,281,292 in total revenues and \$18,264,817 in expenses. Afterward, Burnett told The Pine Cone

the budget reflects the priorities set by the council and the promises the city made to voters when officials asked them to approve Measure D, the 1 percent sales tax increase that started in April and will continue for a 10-year period.

"It's a balanced, responsible budget," he

# Man says he was robbed on beach

m A}$  22-YEAR-OLD man awakened from a four-hour nap on Carmel Beach last Thursday afternoon to three Hispanic men in their 20s holding him at knifepoint as they robbed him of \$100 in cash and prescription drugs, he told Carmel police the next morning, according to detective Rachelle Lightfoot. He said he had fallen asleep on the beach at around 1 p.m. Thursday, June 6, and woke up at 5 p.m. when the three men descended upon him.

"He said he could identify them" if he

saw them again, Lightfoot said. "He did tell us where he thought we could find them, so we're following up on those leads, but a lot of them are dead ends."

Lightfoot said the man filed the police report so he could get a new prescription for his Suboxone — a drug used in the treatment

He also told Sgt. Luke Powell, who took the report, about the missing cash. "And when we did some investigation, we found out about the guitar that might possibly be missing," Lightfoot added. "He forgot to tell us about the guitar."





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Fullerton," Slama said. PacRep stage manager Julie Phillips met Camila while working on "High School Musical" at Santa Catalina in 2007.

"The thing that everyone will tell you is that Camila was a thousand lifetimes in one," Phillips said. "She was the most social person I've met, and always had a smile."

Shortly after Camila's death, her mother, Robin, who lives in Carmel, and father, Gabriel de la Llata, wrote a moving message on Facebook. "While our hearts ache that we lost our girl," the message said, "we are grateful that Camila lived a very happy life, a very successful life by any measure.'

In November 2012, Phillips helped organize "Camila's Cure Benefit Concert" at Golden Bough to help fund her medical treatment. Even when Camila was quite ill and was undergoing difficult treatment, Phillips and others said she never showed signs of it. "As bald as she was, she was absolutely stunning," Phillips said.

Camila was being treated at a Seattle hospital, where she received an umbilical cord blood transplant, an alternative to a bone marrow transplant. Her strength and determination were exemplified in a June 4 Facebook post by her father, who stated that, while she was feeling bad "pretty much all over," Camila was walking one mile per day in the hospital. "She's doing better than expected so far," the post said. "Her doctor is very proud of her."

But days after the message, Camila's health turned and her organs began to fail.

"We all assumed she was doing well," Phillips said, "which is why her passing was such a shock."

To honor Camila, Slama and Phillips urged others to take the test to be a bone marrow donor, something, they say, Camila also would have wanted. (Go www.marrow.org for more information.) "All you have to do it get your cheek swabbed with a Q-Tip," Slama said about the test.

PacRep executive director Stephen

Moorer, a friend of Camila's who directed her in several productions, including "High School Musical," said Camila was not only a strong actor, but was a highly accomplished singer and dancer, too.

'She was a true triple threat," Moorer said. "She was the whole package."

In 2011, Camila showcased her funny side, performing in Forest Theater production "Once Upon a Mattress," where she had the lead role of Princess Winnifred the Woebegone.

In the 2010 Monterey Peninsula College production of "Rent," she played exotic dancer Mimi Marquez and sang "No Day but Today," a portion of which goes: "There's only now, there's only here, give in to love, Or live in fear."

"Camila lived in the moment," Slama said. "And I think she definitely lived by that

The wedding tableaux included stone walls, a rustic bridge, an intricate stone dance floor, a Celtic cross, fauxstone busts of he and Lenas, and other features. The problem was, all that construction was done without a permit from the California Coastal Commission — which, after the wedding had taken place, tentatively agreed to a \$2.5 million "settlement" from Parker, Facebook's founding president and cofounder of Napster.

Meanwhile, coastal commissioners are set to decide whether to finalize the settlement money at the agency's June 14 meeting in Long Beach, Sarah Christie, the commission's

legislative director, told The Pine Cone Thursday.

While some of the coverage of the expensive wedding referred to it as "extravagant," Parker refuted that, saying the adjective wasn't appropriate.

"None of the usual tasteless crap that rich people do at their weddings was present here - no ice sculptures, no caviar, no pop stars hired to sing their hit songs, etc," he wrote.

Parker said he merely built the "basic minimum features to make the campground safe and viable for a wedding."

He also said media reports that the wedding cost as much as \$10 million, were "WAY off base." Parker said he spent about \$4.5 million prepping the site, including removing black asphalt paving that was there "before we ever laid eyes on the campground."

Parker said he and Lenas spent two years hiking California redwood groves to find the perfect spot for their nuptials. In the end, though, the conservation group Save the Redwoods League actually suggested he get married at Ventana, since it is private, not public land.

"Finding a forest with some old growth redwood trees that can accommodate 300 people is no easy task," he wrote.

In fact, the environmental group consulted informally on the wedding project from day one, sending its director of science to the Ventana site "to educate our naturalist regarding a plan for work that would be minimally environmentally disruptive to the local redwood and riparian habitats," according to Parker.

Though a Save the Redwoods League spokeswoman was out of the office this week and therefore couldn't confirm the information, Parker noted that he's "previously been a major donor" to the group.

Furthermore, Parker said one of the goals of his philanthropic foundation is conservation, and to that end, he's started a program of "conservation buying."

"I locate private land that needs to be protected, buy it with my own funds," he told The Atlantic, "and then donate it to someone like state parks or nonprofits to maintain it for the public benefit."

And while it's unclear if Parker has purchased any local land to be set aside for public use, there's talk he's trying to buy a home somewhere in Big Sur.

Parker went on in the letter to say his construction crews took big precautions, including using fabric liners to protect the earth.

"We went to crazy lengths to ensure that nothing in the forest was harmed during the construction process," he said, adding that "contrary to media reports, no redwood trees were harmed by the wedding or construction. (At least none that I'm aware of.)"

But in the coastal commission's lengthy report, staff members said the development could have caused lasting damage to the sensitive forest area. They said construction workers failed to install erosion control measures and development up against redwood trees threatens to impede redwood propaga-

The agency is requiring Parker to protect native habitat during the teardown process, which Christie said would commence sometime after the June 14 coastal commission meeting. A restoration plan for the wedding site, the commission said, must be prepared by an ecologist.

Most of the structures for the wedding, such as chickenwire-filled stone work, were built off site and reassembled on the topsoil of the campground so they could be removed easily, according to Parker.

"There is no mortar inside them, so they will just come apart like Legos and get carried off," he maintained.

When his construction crews first got to the campground site, it was not "exactly in pristine shape" and his goal was to "leave the property in much better condition than when I found it.'

As for the permits he should have obtained for the wedding, Parker said his representatives told him that "it was the responsibility of the property owner, not the hotel guest, to obtain any necessary permits."

between a chain-link fence and retaining wall — a gap about 10 inches wide and three feet deep. But the pile of sticks was actually a dog, her fur so covered in dreadlocks it didn't really look like an animal.

"I just had to get her out of there," Lawn said. "I reached down and grabbed her by the scruff of the neck. Bless her heart, she never said a word, and she didn't bite." Lawn carried the dog home and, until 3 a.m., clipped her dirty fur. "The mats were so bad I couldn't get my scissors through," she said.

The next thing to do was track down the dog's owner. Based on the microchip embedded in Happy, a worker with the Monterey County animal shelter gave Lawn the name of the dog's owner — who happened to be a neighbor of Lawn's who died in 2011. Happy went missing shortly after the woman passed away, and family members assumed a bobcat or other wild animal had gotten her. The shelter declared Happy dead in August 2011.

Happy's haggard appearance was consistent for a dog that hadn't been bathed for two years. But was it possible for an old dog to live on her own in Carmel Valley for so long? If so, how did she survive? What did she eat? Where did she sleep at night? Lawn wanted to know but will probably never find out.

"She has a secret, and she's not talking," Lawn said. "That's the mystery."

To make the tale even more intriguing, Lawn remembers seeing the dog as a puppy.

"My daughter and I rode horses on Boronda and she would be outside with her owner," Lawn recounted.

She then contacted Happy's family to tell them about the rescue of Happy, whom they said was about 20 — an astonishing age for a dog, but a number that seemed correct, given the time period Lawn lived on

Though Happy's family was amazed the dog was found alive, they couldn't care for her. "They are not in a position now to take her back into their home," Peace of Mind Animal Rescue executive director Carie Broecker told The Pine Cone.

After Peace of Mind paid for some of Happy's vet bills, Lawn took in Happy and has cared for her since. The dog gets along well with her two other smaller pooches, and she sleeps next to Lawn's bed every night. Emaciated when found, Happy is eating well and has gained weight.

"She is the mellowest, sweetest dog,"

Lawn said. "She's a love."


One of the rough wood planks that kept Happy captive until Lawn rescued her still has a good chunk of the dog's fur stuck to it.

As Lawn and Peace of Mind were desperately trying to find a permanent home for Happy — including placing an ad in The Pine Cone notifying readers the dog was up for adoption — visitors happened to pick up a copy of last week's paper.

"A wonderful couple from Orinda are adopting her," Broecker said. "And it is because they were in Carmel for a week and saw her ad in The Pine Cone."

# Show unites works of family devastated by fatal wreck

m T}$ HE ARTWORK of Mark Bava, who was killed, along with his brother and sister-in-law, in a car crash on Highway 101 last October, will be featured in a show called "Continuare" - which means, "to continue on," in Italian — at the Carmel Art Institute.

Opening June 14 in the gallery at the Barnyard shopping center, the exhibition features the paintings and bronze sculptures of Bava, photographs taken by his brother, Chris, and pieces by their surviving family members: their mother, Lilliana Bava-Braico, and Mark's partner, Audrey Lynne Cook.

"The show celebrates the diverse body of art produced by the members of this remarkable family and the creative spirit of Lilliana's deceased sons, Mark and Chris, who, along with Chris's wife, Cat, were killed when a car hit their parked Jeep in the early morning hours on Highway101 in San Jose," according to publicist Roberta Lawrence. Mark Bava, 58, was pronounced dead at the scene, while his brother and sister-in-law later died at the hospital. Cook and the 28-year-old female driver of the Honda that hit the Jeep were treated for minor injuries and later released.

The driver was charged with a misde-

Their mother ran a gallery on Dolores Street for decades before moving with

Chris to Los Angeles, where she began working on her abstract expressionist pieces in a new studio. Mark also relocated to Southern California, helping with the family-owned restaurant and club, and staging festivals in Los Angeles and San Francisco, before returning to Carmel and to his sculpting — in 2004.

According to Lawrence, Cook described Mark's sculptural style as "infusing a reliclike persona to his pieces, as if they had just been dug up at an archeological site.'

Lilliana's paintings will be exhibited in the show, which she said has "given me a mission," along with bronze sculptures and paintings by Mark — including "Fallen Angel," reportedly "one of his last pieces which, eerily, he had brought to the foundry earlier the day of the crash."

Cook's paintings, bronze and marble sculptures are also being exhibited, as are Chris' "evocative black and white portraits of the residents of Zona Norte, disenfranchised deportees of Tijuana, whom Chris had befriended, and whose joys and struggles he chronicled through the lens of his Nikon." Director Charles Shaw is featuring the photos in his upcoming documentary, "Exile Nation: The Plastic People."

An opening reception will be held from 5 to 8 p.m. June 14, and "Continuare" will run through June 30. Gallery hours are 11 a.m. to 4 p.m. Tuesday through Saturday.

# DOWNTOWN MARKET DEBUT, FAREWELL TO PESSAGNO, AND SO MUCH TO DO

JERRY LAMI has been pounding the Carmel pavement this week, recruiting restaurants, markets and shops to participate in the weekly farmers market debuting in the north lot at Sunset Center Thursday, June 20, from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. Lami, executive director of the Redwood City-based West Coast Farmers Market Association, has opened 10 farmers markets and said this week he is well on his way to selling all available spots in the Carmel-by-the-Sea market. "Yesterday, I added eight more vendors," he told The Pine Cone Wednesday, as he worked to woo farmers, wineries, restaurants and other food purveyors to occupy the market's 60 tents.

The subject of protracted and vociferous debate, especially when it was proposed for Ocean Avenue, the farmers market — which proponents called the Carmel Artisan Food Experience — was ultimately approved by the city for the cultural center's north lot at Mission and Eighth. Lami said many business owners were surprised by the approval but are now eager to participate.

"The general consensus was, 'It's never going to happen,' and I said, 'It's already approved,' and the next question was, 'Do you want to be a part of it?" he said. Some people said they'll wait and see, but the spots are about 75 percent full at this point.

"There's some excitement, and the fact that if they wait too long, they'll be left out has a lot to do with helping people make up their minds," he said.

So far, some 20 local farmers plan on selling their produce there, and Nielsen Bros. Market has signed on to serve barbecue. A representative of Carmel Cutlery will provide onsite sharpening services, and Carmel Bakery might peddle baked treats.

"I met with Trio and am trying to recruit them for their olive oils and balsamic vinegars," Lami said, and a cut-flower seller will be there, as will a sheep's milk cheese maker. He's also working on getting local fishermen, wineries and other purveyors involved.

La Balena restaurant will offer prepared foods to eat there or take home, according to Lami. "They're awesome, and other restaurants are still getting back to us."

La Balena already uses local produce, and Lami pointed out its owners and chef Brad Briske will be able to make more useful contacts at the market while new customers discover their food.

"All those good things are happening at the same time," he said.

Lami also reported logistical issues, like parking in the lot for the monthly permit holders, have been resolved. "Everything is being taken into consideration, and they're going to be taken care of," he said.

While Lami has received some negative feedback and predictions the market won't succeed, he said he's "run into a brick wall" while launching almost all of his other markets, which grew to be successful, so he knows how to handle the naysayers.

"A farmers market is a social event, an opportunity for neighbors to get together," he said. "There are a lot of positives that will come from this."

# ■ Farewell to Pessagno

Steve Pessagno, founding partner of the Santa Lucia Highlands winery that bears his name, died in his sleep Saturday after suffering "from a number of health issues over the past few years," according to the winery. (His beloved black Lab, Keno, died just a few weeks earlier.)

A winemaker for three decades, Pessagno, a trained engineer, was at the forefront of the local viticultural industry and made it part of his mission to promote Monterey County wines. He also engaged in numerous other activities and took part in wine, hunting and fundraising groups.

In June's Wine & Vines, Pessagno shared his insight and knowledge in a column that offered advice to other winemakers through several anecdotes, including pointing out that having to work on the bottling line almost assures any kid in a winemaking family will try hard to get into college — and therefore land a better job. "Having your own bottling line is a necessary 'evil,' which is a very kind and restrained four-letter word to describe it," he wrote.

At the column's conclusion, he observed, "Thirty years have gone by quickly, and the wine business is still as rewarding, romantic, intellectually challenging and new as it was in my first year. What other job on the planet affords you good friends, great times and places to go, access to some of the world's finest wines and food? It's also a great venue to raise your children. When I retire ... wait ... I'll never retire, this is way too much fun!"

Pessagno's absence is palpable, but in the

wake of his passing, the winery team announced it is "committed to producing the excellent high-quality wines that Steve established as part of his legacy." The Pessagno label has enjoyed substantial growth in the past two years, and those who remain reported they are planning on "building and growing the Pessagno Winery and continuing the legacy Steve has created for many years to come."

Services are being planned by the family.

# Agency surveys transportation strategies

IF YOU'VE ever wanted to offer an opinion on the future of growth and transportation in Monterey County, now's the time.

As part of a program called Moving Forward Monterey Bay, the Association of Monterey Bay Area Governments is seeking input from residents in Monterey, San Benito and Santa Cruz counties on what the priorities should be for future highway and street improvements.

'We are getting feedback from the public on how they want our three-county region to grow and what transportation priorities are important to them," AMBAG principal planner Heather Adamson told The Pine Cone.

AMBAG projects that by 2035, Monterey, San Benito and Santa Cruz counties will see an increase of more than 150,000 people, 40,000 housing units, and nearly 65,000 jobs.

And while almost none of that growth will happen in the Monterey Peninsula, there will still be increased traffic here from tourism and commuting.

"One of greatest challenges will be finding ways to ensure that our ability to move around the Monterey Bay region keeps pace with our population and workforce needs," according to the agency.

Following a series of workshops in May, the agency is also asking residents to fill out a brief online survey ahead of another round of workshops in July, in which agency officials will explore transportation and growth scenarios based on feedback from the first

Stakeholders in May offered their preferences and vision of the region through 2035, with the focus on "a sustainable pattern of regional growth that helps to decrease transportation-related greenhouse gas emissions and accommodates housing and employment

Apart from seeking input on travel times, development patterns and transportation priorities, the online survey asks participants to select three quality-of-life "priorities, giving options including "improved road safety," "additional employment opportunities," and "reduced commute times."

Carmel City Councilman Ken Talmage said participating in the AMBAG discussion "is a tremendous opportunity for the community to tell us how and where we should make investments to improve mobility, and thereby our quality of life."

In September, AMBAG's board of directors will select a preferred land-use and transportation scenario that will become the basis of the Moving Forward Monterey Bay plan and related EIR, which are expected to be released in February 2014 for public review and adopted in June 2014.



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# Animal worms that can hurt you

Even if you think raccoons are cute, you don't want

them using your yard for a latrine. Seriously.

WHEN I was 6, I had appendicitis and ended up losing my appendix, but it was not routine: My appendix (a small pouch off the small intestine) was filled with pinworms! That is just gross. Pinworms come from eggs shed in the drop-

pings of rodents (mice, rats, squirrels, chipmunks, gophers) in our environment. Dirt in our yards, sandboxes, outdoor parks and play areas can contain these sticky eggs, and so little kids who don't wash their hands during or after play will swallow the eggs after touching their faces and lips, or in my case, sucking their thumbs. The worms hatch out and migrate through the intestinal tract and can settle in places like the appendix. Seriously gross.

You can imagine my mother after the discovery. All five of us were dewormed routinely and

still are 40 years later if we make a trip home. But when I asked my pediatrician about routine dewormings in my child (not a thumb-sucker), he was perplexed and said it just wasn't done. Was I seeing any worms in my toddler's end products?

This realm of parasites and transmission to humans is where veterinarians have an edge. Most fecal parasites are microscopic. You don't see them. And some worm eggs shed by animals that find their way into human mouths and are swallowed go well beyond the scare factor of pinworms in an appendix. In our area, the worst of them is the raccoon roundworm (*Baylisascaris*).

You cannot have a trashcan in Carmel and escape an occasional visit from one of the local raccoon bandits. One is trying to raid mine right now! They are all over the hill, and I consider them the most dangerous of our fellow animal residents.

Raccoons belong to a special animal group (*Procyonids*), along with kinkajous, with dog- and catlike features and habits. They can carry and transmit rabies and distemper (another article). They are the definitive or final hosts of a very robust species of roundworm that can persist intact in the soil for several years,

mostly indestructible.

Leaving Monterey a few years ago on a commuter flight, I sat next to a mother from Pacific Grove with a young boy who had come down with strange, irreversible neurologic signs that were finally determined to be due to the insidious raccoon roundworm.

Raccoons deposit their feces in a latrine, or a selected area, in their habitat. Common places are the "Y" branches of a tree, under houses, in attics, specific locations in a yard, or the base of a bush. Rainfall will spread the fecal matter into your vard's soil. Enter children playing or digging by the latrines, and the eggs are inhaled or swallowed as microscopic invaders. They hatch into larvae that freak out in the human host and begin migrating through the lung or gut wall into other tissues, trying to get out. True "Aliens" style. Absolutely gross.

Trouble sets in when the damaging migration is through important


organs, such as the brain or spinal cord, which causes serious or fatal larva migrans disease in humans. The young Pacific Grove boy was in a wheelchair for life. Diagnosis is very tough. Treatment is ineffective once the damage has been done. In captive wildlife species kept in zoos, the worm is devastation and always death, often in African species that are endangered.

In humans, sudden onset of neurologic signs does not initially lead to a diagnosis of raccoon roundworm. An MRI may not find the tiny larvae, only their permanent, scarred tract through nerve tissues. A clever doctor has to put two and two together. Or the hospitals should keep a veterinary consultant on staff!

Take some precautions for sure. Make sure you and your kids digging in the yard wear protective garden gloves. Don't allow dirt play at the base of trees or bushes. Everyone should wash their hands before touching their face or eating. If raccoons are over-represented in your yard, a latrine site might be there. Time to call a pest control specialist, because special respiratory gear must be worn to reduce egg inhalation risks.


So should children (and adults) at risk be routinely dewormed around here? It depends on play habits and exposure to raccoon latrine areas (not always a known). I think it should be a part of childhood preventive care, because the deworming treatment is very safe. The disease is really not. I know what my mom thinks!

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# Clean energy is still the key

THE MAN in charge of day-to-day decision making at the Monterey County Herald — John Paton of New York City — is frequently quoted to the effect that "print is dead," and he's vigorously trying to re-focus the Herald and the hundreds of other newspapers he supervises on their websites and away from their paper versions. The Herald's upcoming move to a San Jose printing plant is a major step in that direction.

Whether that strategy will be viable remains to be seen. Print used to be highly profitable, but as it has declined, digital revenues haven't come close to replacing it, and the Herald's workforce has taken the brunt of the losses. For example, when the printing operation moves, everybody in the press room will lose their job. So, while Paton may have identified the disease, it's by no means certain he has found the cure.

On the other hand, while a lot has been lost as the Herald has downsized, getting rid of print editions will definitely have at least one benefit for the newspapers who do so: It will put an end to their blatant hypocrisy on environmental issues, such as global warming. Practically every day they've boldly supported this or that environmental cause, even as they continued to cut down trees by the millions.

Yes, folks, newspapers are (surprise!) printed on paper, and the millions of copies that have rolled off the nation's presses every day have come at a high price to its forests. The publisher of the New York Times might as well have a chainsaw in his hand while he offers up one of his editorials demanding increased protection for trees.

But if newspapers will actually become green by no longer being newspapers, there are many other people who face a similar question: How much should they be willing curtail their own income and/or lifestyle to protect the environment?

As we reported a few years ago, a young man from Pebble Beach decided to learn more about his country by driving across it. To demonstrate his concern for the environment, however, he made the trip in an RV that ran on used vegetable oil. But if he were really concerned about Saving The Planet, wouldn't he have just stayed home?

Similarly, when the California Coastal Commission was considering a Pebble Beach Co. plan for a new golf course, the question frequently arose: Why cut down a small forest just so rich people can play golf?

More questions: If Al Gore believes what he says in "An Inconvenient Truth," why does he use so much electricity at his numerous homes? For that matter, how can he justify having more than one home? Can a conscientious person ever drive a car or fly in airplane for pleasure purposes (such as going on vacation)? Shouldn't all sporting events henceforth take place in the daytime? Etc., etc.

The problem is that, just as eliminating print editions at newspapers means laying a lot of people off, if no one ever played golf or went on vacation, the resort, airline and hotel industries would collapse. Etc., etc.

Thus, the central issue in the debate over global warming is how the human race can curtail its production of  ${\rm CO_2}$  without disrupting the global economy and causing a lot of human suffering.

The answer is to develop clean sources of energy which will still permit the people of the developed world to enjoy their good health and lavish lifestyles, even as the residents of the developing world try to partake of the benefits of modern civilization.

Curbing greenhouse gases by requiring people to reduce their productivity or consumption will be met with howls of protest. But as soon as it becomes cheaper to fill up a car with a clean fuel than a dirty one, everyone will do it.

They shared a passion for the newspaper's mission to print the news, to raise hell and to engender enough interest among readers to lure advertisers. Labor and management did-

In Guild circles, Cain is remembered for bringing "gold standard" contracts to a relatively small community newspaper. They were contracts that allowed employees to raise families and to reside in the community in which they worked without Section 8

Cain remained the local union chief for decades, and continued to work on behalf of employees at The Herald long after he was no longer employed there, long after a series of corporate ownership groups took over.

The new owners brought with them a base attitude that employees are driven only by demon motivations to deprive them their

That attitude grew ever baser with every new corporate ownership group with a voracious beast to feed, the beast being the significant new debt they incurred when purchasing the newspaper.

As the revolving door spun new intrusions of corporate ownership groups in and out of The Herald during the past 25 years, the ever-growing legion of corporate vice presidents who lived far from Monterey were shocked — shocked! — by the "legacy' employee costs they had inherited. Destroying good contracts became their life's mission.

Piece by piece, and over a period of years, the gold standard turned to iron pyrite.

But Cain plugged along. For more than 40 years. Fighting the good fight on behalf of an ever-dwindling number of employees. He was a humble and surprisingly quiet sort of union boss, a bow-tie wearing fellow not given to fiery oratory except while badgering managers, and he was discerning and reasonable about the myriad terminations and grievances that came his way.

More than anything, he was the link to generations of employees, past and present, who today remain passionate in defense of The Herald and its legacy.

Russ Cain was a Herald Hero.

# Sometimes a vanity plate has an interesting story to tell

Jack Pappadeas — Jack, not John, and no middle name — was born in our nation's capital. It wasn't political. His family lived in adjacent Bethesda, Md. At the time, his father and his uncles worked at his grandfather's Try Me Bottling Company. His father also worked for an advertiser and then a car dealership before opening a pair of restaurants in Georgetown. The first restaurant was Pappy's. Jack explained: "All the Pappadeas' nicknames growing up were

Pappy." Next door was The Keg, which was beer and pizza. And live music. Jack remembers, "He brought in people like the Shirelles and James Brown."

When he was turning 15, his father took Jack and his sister and, with six other relatives, went to Greece for the summer of 1964.

When he got back, Jack started high school, and about a week later, his father announced, "Pack up. We're moving to Fort Lauderdale."

"I was working at the Sheraton on the beach in Fort Lauderdale. I started off as just a busboy, back when they didn't pay taxes on tips to the government. They taught me things. I did room service. I would wait on tables."

In 1970, with Vietnam in full sway, Jack faced the draft. "My dad dragged me down to all the recruiting stations." They were looking for the best deal. "And so I ended up in the Air Force. I went to Lackland Air Force Base in Texas for basic training for six weeks." Then he was sent to tech school. "I was in the computer arena back when they had the big tape drives and card readers."

The powers that be must have seen something in Jack, because while thousands of his

comrades were dispatched to Vietnam, Jack ended up assigned to the National Security Agency in Fort Meade, Md.

"I was working in the basement in the computer section, but I wouldn't know a secret if

it hit me. You know, everything is coded," he said. "Guys like me, we were just mounting the tape drives and pulling off the paper. So I was in the military during Vietnam, but I never went anywhere."

Out of the military, Jack continued his computer work for the University of Maryland in Baltimore. A couple of years later, he got his real estate license. "I worked for Century 21. Had the gold jacket and all that. The first year, I did a million dollars in sales. And that's a big deal when your average sale was \$35,000 for a three-bedroom, two-bath house."

He stayed in real estate until the mid-1980s, when he decided to tend bars instead. He met a lot of interesting people — and not just the customers. "I got to know this girl that worked as a waitress, and a couple years, later she got a job as a flight attendant for private jets." We'll pick up that thread in a moment.

"In 1990, on a dare, I answered an ad for extras to work on a John Waters movie called 'Cry Baby,' For the next four years I worked on about 14 other movies. I did it mainly because I liked to watch the process. They would corral all the extras in a holding area until needed. I would get to know one of the assistant directors and ask if I could stand on the side and watch filming."

Then in 1996, with the flight attendant friend, Jack was given the opportunity to set up catering for pri-

vate jets. He started in the D.C.-Baltimore area, and over the next decade established similar facilities in Dallas, Chicago, Boston, and Denver. There were other temporary venues, timed for the holidays, including Martha's Vineyard, Palm Beach, and Miami.

"Probably the busiest, and where we really learned how to do this business, was the inaugural of President George Bush in 2001. Most of our people, on average, worked at least a 24-hour shift, non-stop. I went close to 40 hours non-stop making deliveries. Driving to BWI airport, I was hallucinating sometimes. I swear to God, I would see things on the road that weren't there."

It was in June 2006 that Jack found himself headed here to establish a catering facility at Monterey airport. His bosses had

talked Kurt Grasing into setting up an affiliate program. Jack drove to Carmel, met Kurt, and got the operation off the ground in a trice.

When the company called him again, to tell him to go to Long Beach, Jack looked around and decided he'd had enough. He knew there was no place better than where he was in Carmel.

So he found vari-

ous work at area restaurants and hotels. Then in September 2010, he met Rich Medel, the publisher of 65 Degrees who offered him a job in sales.

Jack told him he had no experience in selling magazine space, but Medel said, "Yeah, I know. But every time I see you, you're always talking about a place and you never say anything bad. When you see other people, you say. 'Oh, try this place, try that place.'"

And that's how Jack started working with him.

Jack lives in Carmel and drives a classic black Mercedes sports car with a license plate that reads "MRY JACK."

"People say, 'Monterey Jack?' and I say, 'Yeah, I'm the big cheese.""

# Fire prevention committee reports

The Citizens' Committee, which has been engaged in the effort to secure funds for fire protection, held a meeting last Wednesday evening, at which it was decided to purchase a 40-gallon Stempel chemical fire engine. The engine will be sent direct from St. Louis to Monterey, and from thence hauled to Carmel, and should be here around the 18th of this month. It is practically certain that the town will have the use of two engines, as Mr. C.O. Goold intends to procure an engine for the protection of his new garage, and has offered the use of it to the people of the community.

The committee has under consideration the purchase or erection of a suitable building to house the engine. As soon as the building is erected and the engine placed therein, keys for public use will be placed at convenient business places, besides which all members of the volunteer engine crews will carry keys to the engine house.

# June building amounts to more than \$20,000 to eclipse last month total

Carmel's building boom got under way with the advent of June and during the first fortnight of the month more than \$20,000 in new construction has been started, eclipsing by about 10 per cent the total of new building for the month of May. The May permits amounted to \$18,220.

The leading permit of the month issued by Building Inspector Birney Adams was for the Church of Christ, Scientist, on Monte Verde between Fifth and Sixth, permitted under a special ordinance change by the city council last month, and providing for an addition to the church. The estimated cost of this work was placed at \$6,525.

## Guatemala court to try Gonzales

Transcribed evidence will be heard in a

Guatemala court when Eduardo Gonzales, formerly of Carmel Valley, faces trial for the death of his wife, Maria Villa Real Gonzales, whose body was discovered last year buried in a shallow grave on a valley ranch.

Gonzales disappeared from his Los Ranchitos home in the valley in September 1934, and suspicions of foul play when the whereabouts of his wife remained unexplained were confirmed with the discovery of her body by a workingman digging a septic tank.

Gonzales was speedily trailed to his native land, Guatemala, his arrest followed, and extradition was granted March 14. On May 5, the extradition order was revoked and Gonzales remanded to trial for murder in the courts of Guatemala, owing to inability of the federal government to guarantee immunity of Gonzales insofar as the death penalty is concerned.

## The high cost of sewage disposal

"There certainly is no controversy between the Monterey County Health Department and the Carmel Sanitary District over sewage facilities on the proposed Crawford subdivision." So stated District Chairman Harold Arnot yesterday regarding rumors of dispute and resentment about a proposed assessment against thirteen parcels of property in the vicinity for the purposes of installing a sanitary sewer. Arnot, who succeeded Stephen Sassoon on the Board when Sassoon was elected to the School Board and shortly thereafter moved out of the sanitary district boundaries, explained that the general plan under discussion is to install pumps and feeder lines to the main sewage line, so that septic tanks can be abandoned, and new ones can be forestalled.

The reason for resentment among some of the property owners is the astonishingly high cost of the project. Granite construction Co. recently submitted the sole bid, \$44,500, which was 35% higher than the District's engineers had estimated it would be. The District must now decide whether to add more of its own funds to the cost — which might run as high as \$10,000 additionally

— cancel the project altogether, or seek new, lower bids.

# An architectural masterpiece that was love at first sight

JACK Foster Jr., and his wife, Patricia, drove to Carmel one summer weekend in 1979 to attend a wedding, and they left as homeowners.

It's a familiar refrain: A couple falls in love with the Monterey Peninsula's alluring beauty, and the wheels start to turn. For the Fosters, it took one look at a charmingly eccentric house perched precariously on the edge of a cliff along Yankee Point to spur them to buy — on the spot.

"We were absolutely not thinking of purchasing a house, but we had an emotional response when we saw it," said Foster, 84, who earned distinction in the late 1950s (along with his brothers and namesake father) for turning the raw, barren land of Brewer's Island into the Bay Area planned community of Foster City.

Yes, Foster built his own city, and the wildly successful real estate developer could afford to live anywhere in world. But there was just something about the symmetry and poetry on that cliff at Yankee Point.

"I'd never seen a house that relates to the ocean better," Foster said last week from his office in Foster City. "The house speaks for itself — the relationship and the way it actually looks down into the tide."

Built in 1969 by Frank Lloyd Wright protégé Mark Mills (1921-2007), the home stands a mere 12 feet from the edge of the cliff (not possible today, given modern codes). Its vaulted structure can be interpreted as the body of a giant snail clinging to the slope; the home never rises more than 14 feet from ground level.

Mills made his mark building homes in Carmel and throughout the Peninsula, following a four-year apprenticeship during the 1940s at Taliesin West, Wright's winter home and architectural think tank in Scottsdale,

In 1960 he took a job building a futuristic home on Yankee Point for local artist June Haas. She wanted to live and work by the sea, well sheltered from the elements in a structure that had a "sculptural feeling." Haas dreamed of a house of whitewashed plaster, like those on the island of Santorini, and she spoke to Mills about "Greek vernacular" and round corners.

Haas requested plenty of natural light, and views of the rugged terrain, tide pools, sunsets and the open ocean. Mills' solution was a cruciform plan of intersecting barrel vaults and large bay windows.

Another request was that at least one view focus on a tide pool below, so Mills angled the sitting room downward and gave it a large window. The view, like the house itself, stops visitors in their tracks.

Haas wanted the exterior to resemble a masonry structure, but Mills ruled out using stone. Instead, the architect used a more economical technique of spraying gunite 3 inches thick over elastomeric webbing. The shell was then coated with a preservative mixture containing rough-ground walnut shells for texture, providing unique and effective insulation.

After completion of the home, famed photographer Ansel Adams wrote Mills expressing his admiration for the masterpiece.

# Central Coast Property Care: Keeping the lights on, even when nobody's home

FTER 25 years of escaping the summer heat at their Southern California home to vacation in the cool climate of Carmel, Meredith and Mark Piper purchased a vacation home in the community by the sea. But the obligations of absentee home ownership effectively brought an end to their vacations.

Instead of sipping something by the fire, strolling the shore, dining on their deck or spending a day on the green, they were fixing leaky faucets, clearing cobwebs, awaiting deliveries or rejuvenating the garden.

Their experience wasn't uncommon. Among those who buy a house in Carmel, many do not live here. In fact, nearly 30 percent of houses in Carmel are vacant most of the time, says the town's planning and building department. And when these second-home owners visit, they end up making repairs instead of enjoying themselves.

"It's amazing how many things need attention in a second home," says one owner, who didn't want her name in The Pine Cone, to protect her vacant home. "We bought new patio furniture but weren't there to receive it. And when we were there, we spent the whole time fixing things and playing catchup. The dead giveaway that we weren't always there was our trash cans sitting out front. What was supposed to be a getaway, a place to slow down, was getting away from us."

When a brochure introducing Central Coast Property Care came to the woman's attention, she placed a call to owner Steve Bellavance to see if he might care for their home when they weren't there and have it ready for their enjoyment upon their arrival.

CCPC is designed with private home management in mind. Believing he had identified a niche opportunity in secondhome care, Bellavance, who established the company a year ago, actually encountered a mass market in need of personal property protection and service.

"I offer concierge-style services, along with individual, specific support," says Bellavance, who hails from a background in business management. "Each property has its own unique needs that keep its owners from enjoying their time there. It may be making sure the outside heater ignites, taking out rubbish, watering plants or dropping by often enough to make sure all is well and to give the appearance of someone in residence."

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
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# John Gardiner Tennis Ranch enters future as Gardener Ranch

-N MARCH, what was once the John Gardiner Tennis Ranch in Carmel Valley played host to an outdoor wedding, taking a gentle step into its future as Gardener Ranch — a wedding destination. Once part of Samuel F.B. Morse's vast holdings, and later an apricot farm owned by the Godwin family, the property became a celebrated tennis destination under the late John Gardiner's ownership. In January 2012, it was purchased by Scot McKay, owner of Carmel Valley Athletic Club and KRML Radio — and father of the bride, Bridget.

The story of the ranch, however, really begins with Gardiner, who moved to California after World War II and coached football and tennis at Monterey High School. In 1948, Morse hired him as a tennis pro at Pebble Beach. According to his son, Thomas, when Gardiner told Morse of his plans to open the first-of-its-kind tennis resort, Morse promptly fired him. Thomas chuckles, "He hired him back a few days later, and he said, 'John, I'm hiring you back and I'm doubling your salary,

because you're going to need the goddamned money."

The resort opened in 1957 as a fairly rustic property and family enterprise. Thomas Gardiner recalls that, in the beginning, he, his brother and two sisters were "cheap labor" (most-hated job: cleaning the chicken coops). His mother, Barbara, "did the pro shop, reservations, accounting and the menu; my dad did the gardening and wine bar."

By the 1960s and '70s, it was playing host to the rich and famous, including four U.S. Presidents — Nixon, Ford, Reagan and George H.W. Bush. Another politician — U.S. Rep. Sam Farr — reminisced about his first job there as a lifeguard, "with a pay of 59 cents an hour." After he started his political career, Farr said Gardiner would often joke with him, saying, "It was the last honest job you had."

As the ranch's reputation grew, the facilities became more refined. By the 1980s, it was a full-service resort; its recipes had been featured in Sunset magazine, and its hothouses boasted more than 5,000 plants in carefully numbered pots, which were installed in various meticulously planned and charted configurations around the property for guests' enjoyment.

furiously by J.C. Hall, founder of Hallmark Greeting Cards, to add Father's Day to the list of card carrying celebrations on our national calendar. What the heck, why not celebrate? Being a father, like getting old, isn't for sissies, so enjoy the celebration while you can.

Once a year on this official holiday a father gets to be Lord of the Manor with complete control of the TV remote, that electronic scepter signifying his right to rule over the many kingdoms of ESPN.

I remember that being a father was nothing more than an abstraction to me until I heard the words: "The baby just kicked me!" Then as I placed my hand on that rounded belly I felt it, too. The abstraction became a reality which hit

No fair, because motherhood is in the genes, while fatherhood is an acquired skill that may never be mastered by many men. For instance, put a newborn baby in a woman's arms and she immediately knows what to do.

While a newborn in the arms of most men is as insecure as a football carried by Warren Moon. When a woman holds a newborn it stops fidgeting, immediately calms down, and crying is replaced by cooing. Maybe it's the breast thing. Babies naturally recognize the solace there, while men still fumble with them like the aforementioned football player.

I grew up in the era where the most prominent father role models on television were Ward Cleaver on "Leave It to Beaver," and Jim Anderson on "Father Knows Best."


I think Jim Anderson was in the insurance business. He always wore a suit. The closest my





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

CCPC also provides arrival and departure services, whether it is shuttling clients to and from the airport, making sure their car is up and running, restocking the coffee and creamer, or turning on the outside lights. It's all about creating a "welcome home."

"I'm trying to figure out what we did before we hired Steve," says the woman. "If something's broken, he makes a decision and takes care of it — no excuses or extra discussion. It's so nice to come to the house and not be fussing over or fixing every-

thing."

Lorraine and Paul Armstrong spent a year traveling up and down the California coastline looking for their ideal vacation village. Consistently drawn to Carmel, they bought their Valhalla two months ago and were facing the trials of long-distance property management. Until they turned it over to CCPC.

"I found Steve by reading The Pine Cone," says Lorraine. "I told my husband I'd feel a whole lot better if someone were watching the house, checking it out in our absence. Steve looks in on the house on a regular basis; he's very particular and detailed, which gives us confidence."

The Armstrongs even embarked on redecorating their home from afar, with CCPC serving as project manager, recommending vendors and coordinating appointments and deliveries.

"It's as if we're there," Lorraine says. "He's our eyes and ears during this process."

CCPC also provides private home-care services for people who live on their property full time. Senior citizens, busy people or others who lack the ability or the desire to handle the details of property management but want their home properly maintained can arrange for a customized care program.

Bellavance says it's up to his clients to decide the level of service they need. remained unoccupied until McKay purchased it, and he immediately set about its subtle renovation, starting with a return to native landscaping. According to McKay, the move was "costeffective and sustainable" and added to the atmosphere of "Carmel Valley rustic elegance."

The 5,000 potted plants are long gone, and, in a nod to the more natural surroundings, McKay's daughter was wed

between two branch pillars created by Big Sur Spirit Nest artist Jayson Fann. The graceful pillars remain for future weddings and have begun to take root and sprout foliage.

### Clubhouse unchanged

The guest cottages and Gardiner's former house on the ranch have been cleaned up and outfitted with new furniture and appliances, yet maintain a retro look and feel of the 1960s and '70s.


Southwestern accessories found on the property were incorporated throughout, and the clubhouse remains virtually



was then coated with a preservative mixture containing roughground walnut shells for texture, providing unique and effective insulation.

After completion of the home, famed photographer Ansel Adams wrote Mills expressing his admiration for the master-piece.

"It is magnificent in several domains — concept in relation to site, relationship of the round pointed arch, has a certain magic of space which I feel but cannot verbalize upon, and a sense of flow and direction to the elemental fact of the rocks and surf towards which the structure is oriented," wrote Adams.

Over the years, the house has drawn the attention of books and magazines about architecture and unusual structures. Author Janey Bennett is working on a book linking the three waterfront houses Mills built over his career, including Haas' futuristic house on the cliff.

# His first priority

A widow when she worked with Mills to build the home, Haas lived there 10 years before the visiting Fosters saw it that summer day in 1979. Foster and his wife paid \$375,000 for the property and immediately hired famed decorator Michael Taylor to re-design the home.

Best known for creating the "California Look" of interior design (he was named one of Architectural Digest's 20 Greatest Designers of All Time and is on the list of Interior Design Legends), Taylor developed rooms of airiness and light with a prominent use of natural forms, and loved the color white.

"Taylor was doing our condo in San Mateo, so we told him we bought a house and wanted him to decorate that as well," Foster said. "I remember he said, 'You bought a house before I saw it?"

When Taylor did see the property, and its natural beauty, he made the job his first priority. The Fosters arranged a meeting with Mills and Taylor, who got along famously, even after Taylor suggested significant changes, such as replacing the carpet and parquet flooring with stone.

The Fosters spent \$300,000 to redecorate and spent many happy years in the home until Patricia died two years ago.

"I'm approaching 85, and I just don't go down there anymore," said Foster, who gave the home to his children, who then decided to put it on the market four years ago when it was appraised at \$6 million.

John Saar of Sotheby's now lists the home, and the price has dropped to \$2.995 million, down from the \$4 million list price just six months ago. The 2,267-square-foot home sits on a halfacre lot. It has four bedrooms and three bathrooms, along with a one-bedroom, one-bathroom guesthouse.

"It's different than any other listing," Saar said. "People come from all over to see it, like a pilgrimage. I feel more like a tour guide at times."

Saar said architects and designers in particular find the house fascinating and stimulating.

"They love the organic mimicry of the ocean and land," Saar said. "It's a very intriguing place, to say the least."




