PUC commissioners get earful from water activists

FROM FRUSTRATION over the cost of removing the San Clemente Dam, to outrage about a new desal plant for the Monterey Peninsula, the panel that oversees California's utilities got an earful from water activists at Sunset Center Wednesday.

At the first Public Utilities Commission hearing held in Carmel, the five-member commission listened to more than 30 speakers on numerous PUC-related topics. Most of the comments were centered around the Peninsula's water supply problems, and the majority of those who spoke directed their criticism toward California American Water — which activists blame for the water problems on the Peninsula.

advocate making Cal Am a public entity.

"The people in my community have spoken to me, and we want Cal Am out," Millman told the PUC. "Unfortunately,

Airport settles CEQA suit over safety project

City legal bills pile up

But officials won't say what they're for

SINCE JANUARY, Carmel taxpayers have shelled out \$112,727.93 for legal services at city hall, but city administrator Jason Stilwell says he doesn't have to give the public any details about what the lawyers worked on. In many cases, even the general nature of the legal work is kept hidden.

And the city's legal bills are likely to grow, since Stilwell signed a new contract with yet another outside firm last week to help the city procure water rights offered by former Mayor Clint Eastwood from the old Odello artichoke fields.

For years, The Pine Cone has routinely reported details of the city's expenditures, including its legal bills, and received quick responses from city officials about how the taxpayers' money was spent. But the attitude at city hall has changed dramatically. Under the current administration, it takes weeks to receive responses to many requests, and some requests aren't addressed at all or are answered with docu-

Tree smashes Prius on Highway 68 — but at least it wasn't a Bentley



Several speakers directed the commission's attention to the proposed public takeover of Cal Am — an effort that's been long sought by a small group of government-ownership advocates, but which has never taken off.

Ron Weitzman, who in 2005 sponsored a failed ballot measure aimed at a takeover, reiterated his desire to have Cal Am bought out by the government, a move he contends would save hundreds of millions of dollars for ratepayers.

"Whenever a private water utility like Cal Am completes a water supply project on a straight-through, competitionfree path," Weitzman told PUC commissioners, "you should require the utility, immediately upon completion of the project, to offer it for sale to a local public agency at cost plus 10 percent."

Peninsula resident John Millman said he's spoken to "hundreds" of ratepayers who say they, like he and Weitzman,

A LEGAL dispute over the environmental impacts of a runway construction project that will make the Monterey Peninsula Airport much safer has been settled, officials said this week.

Airport general manager Tom Greer said the settlement includes paying almost \$1 million to attorneys Zan Henson and Richard Rosenthal, who brought the lawsuit, and their consultants. The airport also spent about \$200,000 defending the suit, Greer said.

In July, Monterey County Superior Court Judge Lydia Villarreal sided with a group called the Highway 68 Coalition over its contention that the airport district did not analyze alternatives, traffic issues and other potential environmental effects of the runway project, as required by the California Environmental Quality Act.

DURING THE morning commute on one of the Peninsula's busiest days of the year – and when every third car on Highway 68 has a six-digit price tag and a pristine paint job – a huge Monterey pine crashed across the highway near Community Hospital of the Monterey Peninsula. It didn't land on a Ferrari or a Rolls-Royce, however; a black Toyota Prius took the fall.

Firefighters, police and highway workers were dispatched to the stretch of highway – which connects Pebble Beach, Pacific Grove and Carmel – around 9 a.m. Wednesday to find the tree, which had snapped six feet above its base, blocking the roadway. The only car to sustain damage was the Prius, which happened to be in the wrong place at the wrong time, and emergency responders soon reported no one had been injured.

Meanwhile, as crews cut the heavy tree to clear the road and remove the crushed car, traffic on Highway 68 was diverted through Skyline Forest. The highway was reopened later that morning, just in time for the Little Car Show.

"Teddy will steal a ball at the beach just to get others in play," she says. "He has no boundaries.


Heritage society embarks on centennial projects

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
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Event center approved for landmark bank building

As LONG as the owners don't change the look of the former bank at Dolores and Seventh, and refrain from hosting events lasting longer than a week, they can proceed with their plan to turn the embattled property into a venue for weddings, meetings, conferences, shows and classes, the Carmel City Council voted 3-0 last Tuesday night.

Mayor Jason Burnett was absent, and councilman Ken Talmage had to step down due to conflict of interest as he lives nearby, so the three remaining council members combed through the use permit, environmental study and water allocation for the proposal, which calls for accommodating up to 194 people at a time during operating hours from 8 a.m. to 10 p.m. Valet parking using the north lot at Sunset Center would offset the need for many more onsite parking spaces, since there isn't room for any.

Designed by Walter Burde in 1971, the former bank was the subject of lengthy and convoluted debate for a decade while designer John Mandurrago sought approval to tear it down and replace it with condos, retail space and under-



The former bank at Dolores and Seventh will finally be put back into use, this time as an event center. ground parking. The fight ended up in Monterey County Superior Court, where he lost, and the city decided the modern-style building is "architecturally significant" and should be protected.

"Because of the community effort to save this building,

the exterior should be preserved," councilwoman Victoria Beach said. Senior planner Marc Wiener said the proposal includes removing the old bank vault, which juts out at the





 $T_{\rm WO}$ YEARS after co-producing a musical comedy, "Once Upon A Mattress," at the Forest Theater, a pair of local theater groups are headed to small claims court.

The Forest Theater Guild claims the Monterey Peninsula College Drama Department owes it \$2,991.50 for production costs and \$4,880 for ticket sales. And the guild also accused the defendant of stealing costumes valued at \$858 from a dry cleaners, according to court papers.

Listed as defendants in the case are Gary Bolen, the director of the drama department, and the Monterey Peninsula Community Theater Company Charity Trust. Bolen directed "Once Upon A Mattress," while Rebecca Barrymore, the director of the guild, served as the producer of the musical.

The guild charges that "during the course of the production of the play, Mr. Bolen displayed unprofessional behavior in both his improper verbal abuse" of the guild's staff, "along with physical displays of anger towards [Barrymore] and destruction of signage in front of patrons of the theater."

Reputation harmed?

Bolen is also accused of slandering the guild to the press by writing a letter to the editor of the Monterey County Herald "taking credit for the entire production" of the play.

The guild claims Bolen "sent communications to staff and members of the arts community restricting their contact with [guild staff]," and created "an atmosphere of distrust and negativity throughout settlement negotiations and into current day dealings with [the college] and other arts entities and grantors in the region," "affecting our reputation and ability to operate successfully in the non-profit community."

Daughter of woman hit and killed by car sues driver, PGUSD

THE DAUGHTER of a woman who was killed in December 2012 when she was hit by a car while crossing Pine Avenue has filed a wrongful death lawsuit against the driver and the Pacific Grove Unified School District.

In a lawsuit filed Aug. 7, Heidi Payan alleges driver Denise Hedlind was negligent when she struck and killed her mother, Kathleen Dearing, 70, as Dearing walked mid-block across Pine Avenue on Dec. 18, 2012

The suit also contends PGUSD was negligent because Hedlind, a music teacher with the district, "was in the course and scope of her employment" when the collision happened. The suit does not provide any details to explain why taxpayers, via the school district, were responsible for the accident.

"Payan has been deprived of a kind and loving mother and of her loving care, comfort, companionship" and financial and emotional support, according to the lawsuit filed in Monterey County Superior Court by Payan's attorneys, Spencer Pahlke and Andrew Swartz.

Hedlind, 55, was driving a 2008 Honda Civic east on Pine at about 6 p.m. when she struck Dearing on the four-lane road between 18th and 19th streets. Dearing, of Seaside, died of her injuries about seven hours later. She was not in a crosswalk when hit.

The lawsuit claims Hedlind was driving "carelessly, negligently and/or recklessly" at the time of the collision, even though Hedlind was not cited by police for either of those offenses.

As a result of her mother's death, Payan has sustained economic losses in funeral, burial and other expenses, according to the lawsuit, which seeks an unspecified amount in damages exceeding \$25,000. The suit also

seeks the reimbursement of medical expenses incurred when physicians treated Dearing for her injuries.

Don Murphy, an eyewitness to the accident, told a Pine Cone reporter afterward that the driver was very upset while being interviewed by the police. And Pacific Grove Police Cmdr. John Miller said that he and emergency responders were surprised to learn Dearing had died since she was conscious and talking after the accident. The California Highway Patrol assisted in the investigation.

Messages left by a Pine Cone reporter with school district superintendent Ralph Porras and Hedlind were not returned.

The case is set for a Feb. 11, 2014, hearing in a Monterey courtroom.

Foundation makes awards

THE CLARK Foundation — founded 60 years ago by education pioneers Willis and Ethel Clark, who started the California Test Bureau in 1926 and sold it to McGraw Hill in 1965 — awarded \$15,000 in fellowships to students in June. LaShunda Nugent of Seaside won a \$10,000 Investment in Community fellowship, and Billy Coleman of Salinas received a \$5,000 fellowship. The Investment in Community Fellowship is awarded annually to graduate students who were born, raised or live on the Monterey Peninsula, and who "intend to be of service to the local community after completing their graduate degrees."

Nugent is pursuing a master's degree in teaching elementary education at USC, while Coleman is seeking his MBA at California State University Monterey Bay.

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Council OKs three new jobs

THE CARMEL City Council last week added three new jobs to the payroll, while putting off voting on a fourth so it could be tweaked. The approved positions are finance manager, human resources manager and project manager, while a deputy city clerk job will be considered again in September.

The Carmel Pine Cone

The job descriptions, requirements and salary ranges were included on the council's consent calendar at the Aug. 6 meeting and set to be adopted under a single resolution, but the item was pulled so the clerk job could be removed from the group, while the other three could be approved.

"The positions will provide professional technical and management expertise in functions related to financial and human resources management, elections, records management and council meeting support, and management of complex public works contracts," administrative services director Susan Paul wrote in her report for the council. "The adoption of the resolution amending the position classification and salary plan will allow the city to move forward with recruiting for these key personnel."

All four jobs were authorized in the \$18 million 2013/2014 annual budget, and Paul reported the finance manager job has been provided by a part-time contractor since 2011, while a temp is working as deputy city clerk, helping to create an electronic filing system and undertaking other organizational tasks at city hall. Jane Miller, who sued the city for sexual harassment, was its last human resources director and left several years ago, while the project manager job is new and intended to oversee work funded by the 1 percent sales tax increase voters approved last year.

■ The finance manager "plans, organizes and coordinates the day-to-day operations and services of the city's finances, which includes general accounting, auditing, budgeting, cash management, purchasing, payroll processing, business licenses," and coordinates with other departments and agencies. The job pays between \$100,200 and \$125,448 per year.

■ The human resources manager "plans, manages and coordinates a variety of activities in the human resources division, including recruitment, selection, employee and labor relations, classification, compensation, employee development, employee engagement, performance management, benefits administration, succession planning and workers compensation," and pays \$63,960 to \$80,088 per year.

■ And the project manager "performs advanced level project management for a variety of complex city projects; plans, organizes, interprets and directs capital improvement projects; oversees the performance of complex, advanced level engineering and project management for a variety of complex projects;" and interacts with other agencies and departments, handles outside funding, and prepares technical reports. Its salary range is \$71,928 to \$90,072.

According the job descriptions, none of the jobs specifically requires an academic degree. Rather, each demands "any combination of education and experience that has provided the knowledge, skills and ability necessary," which could include a bachelor's degree, work experience and other qualifications.

City administrator Jason Stilwell explained that while the project manager is an entirely new position, the others are updates of jobs that haven't been filled for a while, and in her report, Paul explained their approval "will enable the city administrator to bring onboard expert staff as regular employees to perform the various duties, responsibilities and activities as described in the job description."

The council unanimously approved the salaries, descriptions and requirements.

Stilwell can immediately begin recruiting for the positions.

C.V. eucalyptus grove here to stay

WHILE SOME consider the towering eucalyptus trees at the intersection of Carmel Valley and Boronda roads a local treasure, others argue they're unsightly and dangerous. But just about everybody agrees they need maintenance.

In an effort to address safety concerns as well as the trees' health, Monterey County public works director Robert Murdoch told The Pine Cone last week that his agency hopes to trim several of the trees this fall.

"We'd like to do the work before the wet season arrives," Murdoch said. "We don't want to be trimming when there's wind and rain."

Murdoch discussed the project with residents July 25 in a meeting at All Saints' Day School. He said public works is focusing its efforts on six trees that front Carmel Valley Road. The first task will be removing dead limbs from the trees, as well as reducing the height of two trees by 20 to 30 feet.


The safety risk the trees pose to nearby homes and passing motorists is very real. The trees are notorious for dropping heavy limbs, and, just last month, a eucalyptus in Marin County crashed down on Highway 101, causing major damage to two vehicles.

The public works department once proposed removing 23 trees to create greater visibility for motorists. Recently the agency proposed taking down two trees, but because the trees were listed in the National Register of Historic Places in 2008, they can't easily be removed.

According to Carmel Valley historian Elizabeth Barratt, the trees were planted between 1878 and 1881 by Kinzea Clinkinbeard, the brother-in-law of Oakland Mayor Nathan Spaulding, who co-owned the 6,625-acre Rancho los Laureles. Imported in large numbers in the late 19th century, the trees were mistakenly believed to be a good source of wood for the construction industry. Today, the tallest of the trees stands more than 140 feet.

Along with her husband, Richard, Barratt applied for the trees' protected status. She said the trees represent a vital link to Carmel Valley's past. "The row, in its country-like setting, preserves an example of the rural character that once prevailed throughout Carmel Valley," she wrote in a blog on the subject.

Nov. 5 election draws few candidates

Only two Peninsula races will be competitive

THE NOVEMBER election will feature many school and special districts around the county — but only two races in the Monterey Peninsula drew enough candidates to appear on the ballot, according to the Monterey County Elections department.

There will be competition for two seats on the Monterey Peninsula Water Management District, with Brenda Lewis competing against Dean Provence for Division 1 (Seaside), and Judi Lehman opposing Bill Thayer for Division 2 (Sand City/Del Rey Oaks).

But, according to the elections department, candidates who will automatically be sworn into office because they have no opposition are:

■ Incumbent Harvey Kuffney of Carmel for a four-year term on the Monterey County board of education in Trustee Area 1;

■ incumbent John Ellison and appointed

incumbent Mark Stilwell for four-year terms on the Carmel Unified School District board of education;

■ incumbents Bill Phillips and John Thiebeau, and technology manager John Paff for four-year terms on the Pacific Grove Unified School District board;

■ incumbent Jeffrey Froke and retired financial executive Peter McKee for fouryear terms on the Pebble Beach Community Services District board;

■ incumbents Bob Eaton and Rodney Lambert for four-year terms on the Cachagua Fire District board;

■ incumbents David Bates and Donel Geisen for four-year terms on the Cypress Fire Protection District board;

■ incumbents Diane Douglas and Paul Ingram, and business owner Karolyn Stone, for four-year terms on the Carmel Valley Recreation & Park District board;

■ incumbent Ken White for another four years and appointed incumbent Suzanne Paboojian for a two-year seat on the Carmel Area Wastewater District; and

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


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Cal Am requires commercial customers to fill out water survey

 $R_{\rm ESTAURANT}$ OWNERS and other businesses on the Monterey Peninsula will soon see their rates skyrocket if they don't fill out a survey about their water usage.

While California American Water currently charges its 3,800 commercial customers based on a monthly allotment formula, it will soon base rates on those customers' efforts to conserve water.

And to get a better understanding of how its commercial customers use their H₂O, Cal Am is requiring business owners fill out a brief survey specifying how much water they use and whether or not they're doing all they can to conserve.

Cal Am has proposed charging customers based on "best management practices," meaning business owners who maximize their water savings through low-flow fixtures and other means could be rewarded with lower rates. The only way they can find out if businesses are doing that is through a survey.

Cal Am spokeswoman Catherine Bowie said that successful restaurant owners who have installed low-flow sinks, toilets, waterconserving dishwashers and other devices at their business, often exceed their allotment,

anyway, and end up paying more for water.

"They said, 'you are penalizing people for being successful," Bowie explained. "And 'why don't you implement a system where you charge lower rates for those who have done all the [water conservation] measures and charge higher rates for those businesses that haven't."

Bowie said it's crucial commercial customers complete the survey, because, if they don't, they'll pay even more for water.

"If you don't fill out the survey, then you automatically go into the highest [rate] category," she explained. "If you're are not sure [how you use your water], then we put you in a lower tier and then help you work on it. The key is to fill out the survey.'

Those who neglect filling it out will be charged two-and-a-half times the amount of the lowest rates, Bowie said. Cal Am must receive the completed survey by Sept. 25.

Cal Am figures the change in calculating its commercial rates will result in a more fair and comprehensive assessment of the water usage demands of commercial customers, while also incentivizing conservation.

Commercial customers could see the new rates on their bills within a few months.

CHOMP hires docs, opens rehab center

Responding to a growing demand for doctors on the Peninsula, Community Hospital of the Monterey Peninsula has hired seven new physicians at its primary care centers in Carmel and Marina. The hospital is also opening a new physical rehabilitation center.

Six of the doctors will work at Community Hospital's Peninsula Primary Care clinic in the Crossroads and the Peninsula Wellness Center in Marina, according hospital spokeswoman Brenda Moore.

"There has been a little bit of turnover," Moore told The Pine Cone. "But mainly we are seeing demand for physicians, as we anticipated.'

Psychiatrist Eugene Young Lee, neurologist Stella B. Legarda, and internist Harry Nervino have joined the Carmel clinic off of Highway 1 and Rio Road. Family medicine doctors Luanne Carlson, Lellivi Carmen, and Evangelina Martinez work at the hospital's wellness center on Imjin Parkway in Marina.

Additionally, Jihad Jaffer, a specialist in physical medicine/rehabilitation, is joining the primary care office in Carmel and will also be the medical director of the new Inpatient Rehabilitation Unit at Community Hospital that will open in mid September, Moore said.

The unit will treat patients with neurological issues, such as those who have had strokes or other traumatic brain injuries, as well as those with certain types of broken bones, burns, bilateral joint replacements, osteoarthritis, spinal cord dysfunction, or congenital deformities.

"It's a 13-bed unit for people who need an intensive rehabilitation program," Moore explained. "We haven't had this type of [facility] on the Peninsula before, so people had to go out of the area to get that kind of therapy.'

The average length of stay is approximately two weeks, during which patients participate in an intensive schedule of rehabilitation services, three hours a day, five days a week.

The primary care center in Carmel was opened in 2009 while the Marina facility was opened in 2011. Both have helped to ease the shortage of primary care doctors.

The shortage, community hospital said, is particularly acute for patients over 65 and on Medicare because some doctors won't accept the coverage due to low government reimbursement rates, Moore said. Both clinics accept Medicare.



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

Attempted murder suspect caught

POLICE ARRESTED an 18-year-old Seaside man in Carmel Tuesday night for attempted murder after officers with the Peninsula Regional Violence & Narcotics Team asked Carmel P.D. to be on the lookout for him.

Christian Venegaz Cruz was allegedly involved in an Aug. 3 shooting in Seaside, and while officers were serving a search warrant at his home in that city, they learned he was in Carmel, CPD Cmdr. Paul Tomasi told The Pine Cone Thursday.

"They were at his house and found out through his mom that he was in Carmel-bythe-Sea," he said. Carmel police officer Jeff Watkins, who is assigned part-time to PRVNT, was with the team and sent a photo of Cruz to the department with the request that he be detained if anyone saw him.

Officer Ken Shen recognized Cruz on Ocean Avenue near Monte Verde Street at around 8 p.m. Aug. 13 and stopped him, according to Tomasi. After questioning Cruz and learning the man's identity, he took him to the station.

A PRVNT officer took Cruz to Monterey County Jail, where he was booked on charges of attempted murder. "This is the second high-profile arrest made by the task force in Carmel-by-the-Sea in the past six months. The previous arrest was a narcotics arrest of a suspect who was dealing drugs out of a local tavern," Tomasi noted, referring to the known narcotics dealer who was arrested at Ody's Tavern on San Carlos Street in April.

ORLANDO PEREZ, a police officer in Ohio for seven years before moving 10 months ago to California with his wife, who works for the Department of Defense, is Pacific Grove Police Department's newest sergeant. He was sworn in Aug. 7.

According to Cmdr. John Miller, Perez graduated from the police academy in Sandusky, Ohio. While working for Lorain P.D., he gained experience in patrol and investigations, worked as a field training officer, and was a member of the street crimes unit, SWAT and the U.S. Marshals Task Force.


He also served in the U.S. Army in North America, Italy and Puerto Rico in military intelligence and counter-intelligence before being honorably discharged as a sergeant.

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
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


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Steve Gally

Legendary guitar maker comes to town


W HEN PAUL Reed Smith handcrafted his first guitar, it was done as a challenge to his college music professor. He passed with flying colors.

"I got an A and decided to pursue my dream of making guitars for a living," Smith, 57, wrote on his website.

Years later, Smith would be the proprietor of Paul Reed Smith Guitars, a Stevensville, Md., company that produces some of the world's finest instruments.

Tuesday, Aug. 20, from 5 p.m. to 7 p.m., Smith will be at vintage guitar store Rumble Seat Music on Dolores Street to discuss not only the history of his company, but what sets it apart from others.

"He will go through the history of Paul Reed Smith Guitars," Rumble Seat manager Bijan Oskouie told The Pine Cone, "and

explain how they manufacture guitars and how that process has evolved."

The company makes instruments ranging in price from about \$600 for an SE model to nearly \$12,000 for a PRS Private Stock Modern Eagle that features Brazilian rosewood. It also produces a variety of quality guitar accessories from instrument cables to guitar straps.

But before becoming successful, Smith acknowledged, his early venture into guitar making was slow going — and there was plenty of trial and error.

"There were a lot of late-night brainstorms," he said. "I was lucky if I finished a guitar a month. Once a guitar was completed, I'd play it at a gig — field testing in the purest sense."


Smith will also offer a Q&A session at the Rumble Seat Music appearance, which is free and open to the public. The guitar store

will have PRS guitars and amplifiers available try out and/or purchase.

"Before he came around," Oskouie said of Smith, "it was basically just (guitar companies) Fender and Gibson. Now that he's established himself, he's up there."

Established in its own right, Rumble Seat Music, which also has stores in Ithaca, N.Y., and Albuquerque, N.M., opened up its Carmel shop in February.

The high-end shop carries Fender, Gibson, PRS, Rickenbacker and Gretsch and other brands. Owner Eliot Michael encourages his customers to play any guitar in the store, even its priciest vintage axes.



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
Comedian makes pit stop at Sunset Center

C.V. painter looks back at early racing daredevils

TO CELEBRATE classic car week, Gallerie Amsterdam is offering an exhibit of work by Carmel Valley painter Ed Greco, who breathes new life into vintage race cars.

Titled "The Elusive Mystique of the Automobile," the show will be on display through Aug. 20, with a reception for the artist Saturday, Aug. 17, from 2 to 4 p.m.

"This exhibit will take you back in time," said Sheri Barnes, director of the gallery. "Ed paints historic race cars like Alfas and Bugattis as they tear through a 1,000 miles of Italian countryside on dirt and cobblestone roads - from Brescia in Lombardy, to Rome, and back again."

In one of his new pieces, Greco captures legendary driver Tazio Nuvalari as he blazes past spectators in an Italian village during the 1930 Millie Miglia race. Nuvalari famously won the race by turning his lights off at night and sneaking past the race's leader near the finish line. "These guys were daredevils," Barnes declared.

Greco uses his skills as an artist to pay tribute to Nuvalari and his contemporaries — and showcase the distinctive race cars they drove.

"Ed doesn't just paint historic race cars, he makes them move," Barnes added. "He tells their stories - and the stories of their drivers. His knowledge and experience as a top



AFTER A quarter century of baking thousands of loaves of challah, hamantaschen, knishes and other traditional Jewish treats, the women in the kitchen at the annual Jewish Food Festival in Carmel Valley, this year set for Sunday, Aug. 25, know a thing or two about creating delicious food — all from scratch — for a lot of people.

"We've got a great team," said Diana Rosenthal, a 25-year Jewish Food Festival veteran baker whose day job is in the truancy abatement unit of the Monterey County District Attorney's Office.

Five people share the job of supervising the baking at various volunteers' homes and overseeing the preparation of food at the festival, using the full onsite kitchen in the temple and the mobile kitchen unit provided by the American Red Cross. "This is going to be our 26th year, and I think we've got it down to a very good procedure," she said. "One of the best places to be during the festival is in the kitchen it's a lot of fun."

Rosenthal, whose involvement began with baking challah at home for the inaugural event 26 years ago, has been in charge of running the kitchen on festival day for the last 15. Home bakers have prepared 65 loaves of challah, 3,000 pieces of rugelach, 1,500 hamantaschen, more than 1,000 pieces of strudel and 20 large pans of kugel for this year's event, according to Rosenthal.

"Everything that will be sold in our bakery booth is homemade," she said, adding that she developed the recipe for the noodle kugel, which is one of her favorite items. "We have people using their family recipes."

Add to that the hundreds of pounds of meat that go into the corned beef and brisket sandwiches, "and the latke people turning out latkes like crazy," and no one will go home hungry.

And that's saying a lot, considering the festival now draws close to 3,000 people.

"But we have a beautiful site, and the last couple of years, we configured it so there's plenty of room for people," she said. "The food booths are interspersed with the crafts people — it has a village feel to it — and there's a wonderful slate of entertainment that goes on the entire time."

Get cheesy

Fortunate cheese lovers anticipate their deliveries from the Cheese Shop, where owner Kent Torrey selects a few special items each month that perhaps his subscribers haven't tasted before. The Cheese of the Month Club ships on the first Monday of the month, and \$39.95 (plus shipping) covers

generous portions of three new cheeses, along with descriptions of their heritage, flavors, uses and wine pairings.

This month, for instance, features Tickler — a pasteurized cow's milk cheese made by Taw Valley creamery in North Tawton, in the heart of Devon, England. "Use of the milk from the dairy farms of this lovely British region give Tickler a rich, unctuous texture with sweet and tangy notes that have developed over the 18 months of aging," according to Torrey's writeup.

The second cheese, Tumbleweed, is a raw cow's milk cheese from 5 Spoke Creamery in Port Chester, N.Y., that combines the styles of the classic French cheese, Cantal, and an aged English Cheddar. "The true flavor/character of this cheese comes from its semi-hard texture that is a result of the eight to nine months' aging in the caves," he writes. "Tumbleweed is delicately fruity, with a unique curdy texture that makes it pair well with fruit-forward whites that have great crisp finishes."

The final Cheese of the Month selection for August is Maasdammer, a Dutch twist on the Swiss Emmenthal. Made with pasteurized skimmed cow's milk, the cheese is "supple bodied, with a sweet, somewhat nutty flavor that becomes more pronounced with age," and is "perfect" for grilled cheese, traditional Reuben and tri-tip sandwiches.

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

Often taking a conservative stance on political issues, Carolla sounds off on a wide range of state and national topics from gay marriage and illegal immigration, to Obamacare and charter schools. When informed of the Monterey Peninsula Unified School District's recent decision to prohibit students from wearing bear flag t-shirts, Carolla couldn't resist chiming in the subject.



ments that have all meaningful information redacted.

Invoices for legal services, for example, are provided without any information about what the work was for.

In addition to its \$7,500-per-month contract with city attorney Don Freeman, the city has been employing the services of several outside law firms, including Liebert Cassidy Whitmore, and Kennedy, Archer & Giffen. An attorney from the former now responds to records requests from The Pine Cone that for years had been handled by a city employee.

While the city will not reveal what the fees specifically paid for,

according to check registers included in the city council's monthly meeting packets, during the first six months of the year, the Liebert firm was paid \$13,582.10, and Kennedy, Archer & Giffen received \$31,525.83. In addition, Brian Finegan was paid \$20,320 in June.

Perry & Freeman (city attorney Don Freeman's firm) was paid \$46,150 for the first six months of the year.

Soon, the firm of Brownstein Hyatt Farber Schreck will be receiving checks from Carmel taxpayers, as well. Specializing in water issues, the company will represent the city, at rates up to \$1,025 per hour, as it seeks the water rights offered by Eastwood.

According to the agreement, the Brownstein firm will help the city "obtain orders from the State Water Resources Control Board and the California Public Utilities Commission to authorize a portion of the water rights to be used by California American Water Co. to service new and expanded water use within Carmel."

One of the firm's attorneys, Russell McGlothlin, wrote in a July 31 letter to Stilwell, "We cannot predict with certainty the amount of fees and costs that may be incurred," and "our hourly rates are based upon experience, reputation and ability of the professional performing the required service.'

The terms and conditions show rates between \$100 and \$1,025 per hour, with legal assistants and paralegals at the lower end, and lawyers and partners at the higher end. McGlothlin said he would discount his hourly rate of \$455 to \$425 for his work on behalf of the city.

But when those pricey bills come in, the city apparently intends to keep them secret, except for the totals.

The Highway 68 Coalition maintained that an access road for the lengthened runway would open up land on the north side of the airport to development - a contention airport officials adamantly denied.

This week, though, airport officials said they have settled the lawsuit with the Highway 68 Coalition. Among the terms is an agreement by the airport to reduce the length of the runway safety project by 8 feet, while meeting federal rules for safe landing distance.

'With a settlement agreement approved, the district [will fulfill] 100 percent [of the] runway safety area as required by the FAA,' the airport district said. "We gave up a little runway length but maintained the all-important 7,000 feet of runway."

Airport officials will also eliminate the disputed vehicle service road that was previously proposed to be an access point to Highway 68. Instead, the 10-foot wide, paved service road — which will be used for maintenance — will connect to an existing road within the airport's boundaries.

"The project modifications will result in a smaller volume of cut-and-fill activities than required by the project as studied in the EIR," according to the agreement.


Trying to meet federal rules

The \$40 million-plus runway safety improvement project, as mandated by the Federal Aviation Administration, includes retaining walls at the east and west ends of the runway to support absorbing concrete beds intended to slow and stop out-of-control aircraft from careening off the runway, and also to provide extra touch-down space for planes that land short.

The settlement agreement also prohibits the Highway 68 Coalition from pursuing litigation over the issue again, although the group can seek enforcement of the terms and conditions outlined in the settlement.

Villarreal's decision last month was the second time she's ruled in favor of the Highway 68 Coalition.

Construction on the project could begin as early as February 2014, and officials expect it to be finished by December 2015, which is just in time to meet the FAA's deadline.

Clean-Up Drive Launched On High School Petition

Carmel's "clean-up" drive toward a 90 per cent signature of the petition to secede from Monterey Union high school district in order to establish a high school in Carmel was launched this week by Charles K. Van Riper, general chairman. Van Riper and Captain Shelburn Robison, chief of the executive committee circulating the petition, joined in urging citizens of Sunset school district to sign the petition "90 per cent strong."

"We have every right to feel confident that we can obtain a 90 per cent signature on the basis of the present response," Van Riper declared early this week with 800 signatures or more than half of the required two-thirds brought in by the precinct chairman.

"There is no reason, however, to stop with a mere twothirds of the voters. We must go on beyond that because every vote over a majority will help to carry the entire high school district," he insisted.

That cooperation would be forthcoming from the county superintendent of schools, James G. Force, was expressed by force in an interview with the Pine Cone early this week. The superintendent said he thought this community should have its own high school and that he would act favorably when the matter came before him.

City Tax Rate Is Set At \$1.25

The tax rate for the coming year was set by the council Wednesday evening at \$1.25, representing an advance of nine cents. The general fund is \$1, or ten cents higher than for the current year, but this is offset to the extent of one cent by a cut in the bond rate of six cents, the 1936 bond redemption and interest rate being reduced from four to three cents. The library fund remained the same at 19 cents, as the council felt unwilling to jeopardize library services by cutting a cent off this figure.

It was pointed out by Mayor Heron that, in spite of the higher tax rate this year, Carmel enjoys a comparatively low tax rate, especially when the low assessment figures are taken into consideration.

Carmel property assessment runs about one-third, rather than the more usual one-half, of the estimated property value.

Carmel Cited: 18 Years Without A Pedestrian Death

Carmel this week was presented a "Pedestrian Safety Citation" award by the American Automobile Association in recognition of the city's astounding record of 18 years without a single pedestrian traffic fatality.

The citation, recognizing the city for its accomplishments in the AAA nationwide pedestrian program, was presented to the council by Bruce V. Lord, district manager of the California State Automobile Association.

In commenting on the award, Lord said, "The encouraging reduction in pedestrian deaths (in recent years) can be directly attributed to the excellent record made by Carmel and other cities."

Carmel River Lagoon closed because of contamination


"No swimming" signs have been posted by the Monterey Health Department at Carmel River Lagoon as the drought continues to take its toll on the peninsula's environment. The lagoon and portions of the river areas around Garland Park and Esquiline Bridge have been posted due to an unhealthful level of bacteria in the water. Because of low rainfall and runoff for the past two years, the river and lagoon have not run out to sea since the spring of 1987. The water has stagnated and collected waste, which has generated high bacteria counts.


The presence of the bacteria, called fecal coliform, indicates that there may be other forms of bacteria increasing in the trapped and stagnating water. Wong said the health department is unsure whether the bacteria are the result of human or animal waste.

The Carmel Valley aquifer, the main source of the peninsula's water, has not yet been affected by the stagnation and collection of waste because the ground acts as a natural filter. However, the Monterey Health Department in the past had concerns over the seepage from septic tanks in the Carmel Valley Village area.

The past two years, rainfall has been about 54 to 55 percent of normal and runoff this year was 14 percent of normal.

report by an actuary describing the actuarial impact of the new increase, including the estimated cost per year, as a mandatory condition for adopting a pension increase. In PG, the city manager withheld that report from the council.

The concealed report of the actuary described the danger to PG by relying on the artificial adoption cost of only \$51,500. And, it specifically advised the council to look at the cost for the second year which, based on actual value, was over \$800,000 per year and the true estimated annual cost for the new pension benefit.

The critical actuary report was not discovered until mid-2009. Thereafter, six of the 2002 council reviewed the report and indicated that had they known the true cost, they never would have approved the pension increase for the simple reason that there was not any money to pay for it. After the 2003-04 payment of \$880,000 for the new pension benefit, PG was broke, and based on certification of that fact by the City and all of the unions, PERS granted it a deferral of a \$600,000 payment.

In the next chapter, in two weeks, another move by PERS that threw more fuel on the PG financial decline.

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our elected politicians right now, they are fearful of Cal Am and what Cal Am will do to their political careers, if not their professional careers."

In July, 15 agencies, including Cal Am, signed a settlement agreement outlining the terms of Cal Am's proposed \$400 million water project, which includes water storage and recycled water components and a desalination plant in North Marina. Among those that endorsed the agreement were the Sierra Club, LandWatch Monterey County and the Division of Ratepayer Advocates - groups that in the past have been highly critical of Cal Am.

Carmel Valley resident Tom Macdonald encouraged the PUC to consider forcing Cal Am to issue refunds to ratepayers for the cost of removing Carmel Valley's San Clemente Dam, a project estimated to cost \$83 million.

Gunnar Norberg fought for the city's identity

Carmelites mourned the passing of former mayor Gunnar Norberg this week, a man who had dedicated the last 30 years of his life toward keeping Carmel's village-like atmosphere intact.

Norberg, 81, was transferred by ambulance to Community Hospital of the Monterey Peninsula from his Carmel home late Tuesday afternoon, where he died at 4:40 a.m. Wednesday of natural causes. Norberg is survived by his wife, Wies; son Eric Norberg of Portland, Ore.; daughter Karin Norberg-Mittie of Clovis; a stepson David Christianson, who is serving in the U.S. Navy in the East Bay; and grandson Kim Mittie.

First elected to the city council in 1958, Norberg lost a reelection bid in 1962, but was again elected in 1966 and '70.

"That's exactly what would be appropriate here for the costs of that dam, which was just totally ignored and allowed to silt out over 20 years," Macdonald said.

Daniel Turner, who called the PUC "Cal Am's enablers," chastised commissioners for allowing the water company to charge its customers for the removal of the dam. He said ratepayers shouldn't have to "pay a penny" for the tear down.

"We are going to get rid of Cal Am and get rid of you," Turner said, "so get out of the way if you can't lend a hand, because times, they are a-changing."

But not everybody had bad words about Cal Am. Lorin Letendre, president of the Carmel River Watershed Conservancy, said the PUC should reject "delaying tactics"

"The State Water Resources Control Board deadline is looming," Letendre said, "so we all need to keep this project moving along with all due haste. Your regulatory role is critical to the progress of this project."

He served as mayor from 1976-1980. While serving on the council and as mayor, Norberg did not always receive the support of his peers for ideas such as fighting increased square footage for hotels and establishing a distance of 500 feet between similar tourist-oriented shops. Up until the time of his death, the former mayor was in strict opposition to the Hatton Canyon Freeway project, which many fear will permanently alter the image of the Carmel area. He also opposed any building at the mouth of the valley.

Those that knew him may not have always supported his sometimes-radical views, but all believed that the Canadianborn Norberg's heart was in the right place. Up until two years ago, Norberg could still be counted on to make his views known during the Carmel City Council m eetings, and still contributed an occasional column to The Pine Cone called the Conscience of Carmel. "He was Mr. Carmel, in a sense," said Mike Brown, who served on the city council with Norberg from 1974-80. "He was so dedicated to Carmel. His whole heart went into what he felt was in the


"I think that really underscores the significance of what we were able to accomplish — in bringing so many parties together and saying 'enough is enough, we have to stop fighting and have to say, 'Yes,' to something," Burnett told The Pine Cone Thursday.

Hours before Wednesday's public hearing, Burnett, Monterey Peninsula Water Management District general manager Dave Stoldt, water activist George Riley and several others met in a private roundtable discussion with the PUC commissioners over the water project.

"It was a phenomenal opportunity to have a small group discussion over the course of the day," Burnett said. "I think we will be in good hands as our particular application moves through the process."

Cal Am spokeswoman Catherine Bowie said the disparate opinions expressed Wednesday are a necessary component of the public hearing process.

"Public participation hearings are not only an important opportunity for the public utility commissioners to hear from their constituents," she told The Pine Cone, "it's also a chance for utilities to hear from their customers, which we find extremely valuable."

Is there anything on earth that causes so many problems and is the object of so much condemnation as the automobile?


No.

The most obvious reasons for the faithfulness of car owners is that their cars give them two things they deeply cherish: Freedom and privacy.



The guild declined an offer to settle the case for \$945, court papers say.

Bolen responded to the allegations by saying they are "frivolous, untrue, and in many respects, unintelligible."

Career path: Tropical illnesses to rabies to bio-terrorism

KEN BERNARD grew up in San Leandro and attended a blue-collar high school where only 50 of the 500 in his graduating class went on to college. He attended UC Berkeley for undergrad and then UC Davis Medical School. When did he decide he wanted to be a doctor? "I had a Jewish mother. I didn't have much choice."

He started off intending to be a doctor of tropical medicine, majoring in tropical studies at Cal and spending some of his undergraduate time in Brazil. And after med school he

went to the London School of Hygiene and Tropical Medicine. Why the interest in tropical illnesses? "It was full of interesting characters and interesting diseases that you don't see very often."

His plan was to be single in London, buy a Morgan sports car, and figure out the rest of life while he was going to school, but, "Right before I left, I met my wife while working in an emergency room in Walnut Creek, so we ended up getting married. She had three kids. So instead of buying a Morgan, I took my family to London to go to school." Having

Barratt said the trees have long been a flashpoint for debate in the valley.

In fact, she was surprised only nine people showed up for the July 25 meeting, a sharp contrast to gatherings of years past on the subject, which she said were attended by as many as 80 or 100 people. She said the three school-aged children made tropical medicine a less likely focus.

was, investigate how it happened, supervise the diagnosis and treatment of the patient, and other such things."

With rabies, isn't it usually only one case, rather than an outbreak? "Right," he said with a laugh. "So it was really cool because I didn't have to run around much."

But it was at this time, around 1982, that a perplexing case came his way: A Peace Corps volunteer died of rabies in Africa. What was strange was that she had been immunized. Ken's critical investigation revealed that the value of immunization varied greatly, depending on where the shot was administered. Getting a shot while in the United States, instead of in Africa, where the body's immune system was already under pressure, would make the immunization more effective. And probably not just for rabies, Ken said.

Next he went to work for the Peace Corps because they said, "Hey, it would be handy to have an epidemiologist from CDC on staff." He got to stay in Atlanta, and "spent half of my time traveling around the world looking into various outbreaks and epidemics among Peace Corps volunteers, which was fun. My wife was a nurse practitioner who dealt with older people, and the Peace Corps was at that time having a lot more older volunteers, so the two of us would do a road show.

After the Peace Corps, he worked in President Bill Clinton's administration for HHS Secretary Donna Shalala, stationed at the U.S. Mission to the United Nations in Geneva dealing with World Health Organization affairs. He next went to the White House, working at the National Security Council on health and security issues. Clinton "got really concerned about the potential for a biologic event or bio-terrorism. So I got somewhat involved then in that."


Ken worked with people like Richard Holbrook and Al Gore, but then with Clinton's time running out, Shalala thought he could use some Capitol Hill experience and connected Ken with Sen. Bill Frist, a doctor himself.

He wasn't there long when 9/11 happened, and the anthrax attacks, so Ken decided he wanted to be back at HHS, where his experience in the area of bio-terrorism could be better applied. He spent three years as special assistant to President George W. Bush in charge of national biodefense programs. And in the course of his federal government work, he was given the rank of rear admiral for the authority that it gave him to get other government officials to listen to him.

Ken left Washington in 2005 and worked with a friend who was the director general of the World Health Organization and seeking the top slot at the United Nations. But the friend died suddenly. "Ban Ki-Moon would have probably gotten it anyway, but it was a fun couple of years where we basically just did high politics."

Ken "retired" and moved to Monterey in 2007 where he lives today. He still does a lot of consulting, and visiting his children in Stockholm and Zurich.

"Even going to visit those places, which are really nice, after a week or two it's like, 'I need to walk on Carmel Beach again and pet the dogs."

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Author wants to give away a thousand copies of his book

RANDY REINSTEDT has done more than his share to raise the awareness of how important the Monterey Peninsula is to California's history. Reinstedt, well known for his books about ghosts, pirates, shipwrecks, and gold mines, is also the author of one of the most read, and most readable, history books about local history.

His book "More than Memories — a History and Happenings of the Monterey Peninsula," published in 1985, became extremely popular among area readers. In 2001, The Pine Cone said: "It has been a book that has almost been loved to death by fourth grade students and their parents drawn into the web of fascinating historical facts of Monterey and its environs."

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





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Here's what happens when your rent-a-car is run over by a tank

YOU KNOW the feeling when you're signing on the dotted line at the rental car counter: They want you to buy a lot of extra insurance, and you're always asking yourself, "Should I?"

The prices are sky high, of course, but the freedom from worry is nice. After all, at the end of a relaxing vacation or a stressful business trip, who wants to get into a big dispute with Hertz or Avis over a door ding or a chipped windshield? Those are the kinds of things you usually worry about when you're trying to make up your mind if you want to pay \$25 a day for a "collision damage waiver."

But sometimes worse things happen with rental cars ... much worse. And the mother of all rent-a-car mishaps happened to me when I was bureau chief for NBC News in Israel during the 1982 Lebanon War. A brand new Volvo we rented from Hertz was flattened by an Israeli tank on its way into combat. Nobody was hurt, but the "accident" ending up costing the network \$30,000.

When you're covering a war, you usually do it by attaching yourself to one side or the other, and since the generals want to keep an eye on you and control what you know, they provide you with transportation and escorts. Usually, they won't let you anywhere near the front lines unless they have you on a short leash.

And even the reporters, who of course prefer to operate outside government control, find some advantages in being what is now called "embedded." Mainly, that the soldiers you're with help keep you from getting shot.

So for most newsmen covering modern wars, transportation isn't an issue. You report to a military base somewhere and put yourself in the care of a public information officer who accompanies you to wherever he's allowed to let you go, makes sure you're fed and have a place to sleep, and leaves time for you to file your stories. All kind of unpredictable things can get in the way, but that's the way it usually works in combat situations, and has since at least World War I.

Whose car to use?

But none of the usual arrangements applied when Israel invaded Lebanon in June 1982. The purpose of the invasion was to stop the Palestine Liberation Organization, which vowed to replace Israel with a Palestinian nation, from shelling Israeli towns near the border, and since the PLO units were more like terrorists than a regular army, they quickly retreated to Beirut when they saw the highly sophisticated Israeli military coming their way. The Israeli advance was so rapid, everybody was taken by surprise — and that included the press office that was supposed to take control of news coverage, and especially American television coverage, of the war. We received no notice from the Israeli military press office about arrangements for press access, or limitations on what we would be allowed to do.

Meanwhile, the camera crews who worked for the NBC Tel Aviv bureau were all Israelis, and they'd all served in the Israeli army. This meant not only that they would be right at home around military units as they advanced into Lebanon, they would surely be welcomed with open arms by front line soldiers, who might very well be their former comrades, if not their neighbors (Israel is a very small country).

So my cameramen - Peter Sela, Rafi Kornfeld, Yossi Greenberg and Yossi Mulla - were chomping at the bit to head into the combat areas as soon as possible. But how would they get there? The Israeli military was offering no guidance.

When they worked inside Israel, the crews usually used their own cars and were reimbursed for mileage. But none of them wanted to take their own car into a war zone.

"Why don't we use rental cars?" producer Jim Maceda suggested during a meeting in my office.

After a brief discussion to the effect that, "There's no way the rental company will allow it," we decided to rent four cars from Hertz without saying what they were to be used for. We booked the cars, and the camera crews picked them up, and they turned out to be four, practically identical brand-new Volvo sedans. Perfect!

Since the border was so close, the crews began their daily routine of driving into Lebanon, sometimes on their own and sometimes with Maceda or an on-air correspondent such as Martin Fletcher or Bob Kur. In the early evening, they would return to the bureau, where everybody's coverage would be turned into a piece for "NBC Nightly News," and then also

used for a "Today Show" spot the next afternoon. And that's how it went, day in and day out for several weeks. Nobody was getting any time off, but we got plenty of scoops, and our coverage was winning a lot of plaudits from our bosses in New York.

A metal pancake

There were some significant mishaps, however. A few days after the war started, the censor started camping in our office, screening all our footage and forbidding us to use anything that might reflect poorly on Israeli's motives or tactics. We managed to evade those rules a few significant times.

And then there was the Volvo. One day in southern Lebanon, just on the other side of the border from the Galilee, Yossi Greenberg stopped his car along a narrow road because he saw smoke coming from a village on the other side of a small hill. The road had no shoulder, but he wanted to scope out what was happening in the village, so he left the vehicle in the road, took his camera equipment and the keys with him, and hiked up the hill to shoot some video.

No more than five minutes later, an Israeli tank column came down the road, on its way deeper into Lebanon. They had orders not to stop, and there was no way around the car that Greenberg had left behind, so the tank commander, and all the tanks behind him, proceeded to drive right over the poor Volvo, which was flattened into a metal pancake.

Greenberg heard the noise and hurried back to the car, but there was nothing he could do. He shot some video of the wreckage, hitchhiked a ride back into Israel, made his way to the bureau, and came to my office to tell me what had happened. He also presented me with the mangled license plate.

We reported the "accident" to Hertz and to Jerry Lamprecht, the NBC News foreign editor in N.Y. And then we rented another car - no questions asked - and proceeded to continue covering Lebanon just the way we had been.

Since I was in charge of the bureau, I was worried there might be some kind of repercussions. But weeks went by and I didn't hear a thing. One day the bureau's accountant casually told me the outcome.

"Because Hertz and NBC are both owned by RCA, some guy in the RCA Building went to another guy and handed him a check for \$30,000," the bureau's accountant, Elliot Ginsberg, told me.

And that was that. It turned out a TV news crew can rent a car and have it destroyed in a war, and the stockholders of their company end up paying the bill.

The Volvo smashing incident was 31 years ago. Still, I think about it every time some guy wearing a Hertz or Avis uniform says, "And will you be wanting the collision damage waiver?"



For the Passeys, classic cars are all in the family

In THIS, his 40th year judging cars at the Pebble Beach Concours d'Elegance, Jack Passey thinks back to his childhood when his parents claimed he became a car nut as soon as he could use scissors to cut pictures of cars from magazines. He was just 6 or maybe 7 when he sat on the front porch with his uncle and named the make and model of each car as it went by.

Jack was 17 when he bought his

first car, a 1927 Essex. Since then, he has owned 92 Lincolns — 55 at one time — mostly because he likes the way they're built. He currently drives a late-model Lincoln Navigator, but that's just by chance.

Jack's son, Bill Passey, who grew up touring and attending automobile shows with his father, has judged at the Pebble Beach Concours for 15 years. Yet the heir apparent seems to be granddaughter Emily Passey. At 16, she has a brand-new driver's license, just in time to navigate the greens as she drives her grandfather's distinctive 1932 Lincoln KB V-12 Dietrich Convertible Sedan onto the 18th Fairway at the 2013 Concours d'Elegance.

"Now that Emily has her license," says Bill, "I want to get her into old cars and give her the opportunity to drive, as I had, to keep her interested. I'm confident she'll be able to drive the Lincoln and understand how everything works, so she can explain it to the judges."

The plan came about when Jack

and Bill were talking about the Concours d'Elegance and how wonderful it would be to show the Lincoln this year. They decided to invite Emily to show the car as a kind of coming of age and a way to get her involved, so she might develop a lasting appreciation for classic cars and the family connection. The size and stature of the car make it a heckuva place to start.

"This massive Lincoln is a custom

Concours Week every year — not just celebrities who love collecting, showing and driving cars, like Jay Leno, but the men who ruled the sport of racing.





Among those is Sir Stirling Moss, considered one of the greatest to ever get behind the wheel and a regular attendee of the Peninsula's car events, even driving during the Rolex Monterey

Motorsports Reunion as recently as 2009 a few weeks shy of his 80th birthday.

Born in 1929, Moss began his professional racing career in 1948 at the age of 18, racing a little open-cockpit Cooper 500. During an onstage interview at last year's Quail Motorsports Gathering, Moss — who was knighted in 2000 and is married to Lady Susie Moss recalled what it was like to be a driver during that era, trying to get a full-time job racing cars.

"You had to negotiate with the organizers, and they'd say, 'We'll give you X number of cars, and then you turn up there and race," he said. Competing in 50 races a year, he learned a trick: "You wave to the crowd and then they start waving back, and the organizers think you're more popular than you actually are."

Seated onstage with an interviewer at the Quail last August, Moss talked about being enthralled and attracted by the risks of the sport.

"If something's dangerous, I want to have a go at it — the important ingredient actually was the danger part," he said. "I'd go into races

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
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CONCOURS WEEK Postwar classic inspires painter and Concours poster art

O ADORN the commemorative poster of this year's Pebble Beach Concours d'Elegance, painter Ken Eberts turned to one of the most elegant of all postwar luxury automobiles, the Lincoln Continental Mark II.

"The car epitomizes what the Concours is all about," Eberts told The Pine Cone.

Along with other members of the Automotive Fine Arts Society, the painter will display his work all day Sunday, Aug,. 18, on the 18th Fairway at Pebble Beach Golf Links.



With its chrome glittering in the moonlight on Ebert's canvas, the Mark II in the painting depicts a 1956 model custom built for the wife of Henry Ford II, Ann.

In its day, the Lincoln was the most luxurious automobile on the road, comparable to a Rolls Royce or a Duesenberg. A virtual Who's Who of Hollywood's elite owned one, including Frank Sinatra, Elizabeth Taylor and Cecile B. DeMille.

"The car is sculpted with subtlety and beautifully proportioned," explained Eberts, the president of the exclusive AFAS and one of six artists who co-founded the group in 1984. "It exudes class. It makes the perfect poster car."

One of the most respected of all automotive fine artists, Eberts has twice won Best of Show at the Pebble Beach art exhibit, which has been staged annually since 1986. In 2003, he was named Ford Motor Company's official Centennial Artist, earning a commission to create 13 originals paintings that illustrated the car manufacturer's commemorative calendar. And in 2005, he achieved the distinction of becoming the first automotive artist to win Meguiar's prestigious Treasure of the Hobby Award.

Eberts is happy to return each summer to Pebble Beach, where the 18th Fairway offers a dramatic backdrop for his paintings.

"The Concours is the perfect place to showcase our art," he added. "With the vibrant greens meeting the beautiful shoreline, it's a captivating setting. We're honored to be part of this special experience again."

Among the AFAS members joining Eberts at this year's Concours exhibit will be Jay Koka, Dennis Brown and Charles Maher. Each painter not only unveils a selection of new work, but puts his own individual stamp on a creative genre that pays trib-

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

Let's get out and walk — because you can't see everything from the car

URING CONCOURS Week it's easy to forget that there's another way to see the beautiful Monterey Peninsula. After all, if you could see the Lone Cypress from a Lamborghini, why wouldn't you? Cruising the streets of Carmel in an Aston Martin clearly has appeal. Still, there are some things that are best experienced on foot. When you're ready to put it in "park," here are my suggestions.


Garland Ranch Regional Park is the oldest park in the Monterey Peninsula Regional Park District. Located about 10 miles out Carmel Valley Road, the 3,464-acre park has more than 50 miles of trails, ranging from grassy, friendly and flat, to challenging and hilly with rewarding views. Take some water, sunscreen and a hat — it can get pretty hot out there. Enter the park via the trail on the west end of the parking lot for an easy walk to the Visitors' Center. The center is being remodeled and expanded; it has a temporary home in a modular building, and portapotties have replaced the indoor restrooms for the duration.

Garland is dog friendly, and as long as the dogs are under immediate voice and visual control, they don't have to be leashed. The park also welcomes equestrians and bicyclists, as long as they stick to the trails designated for their use. There's no charge to enter the park, but donations are welcome.

Pick up a map and start eastward from the center on the Lupine Loop. Frequent trail markers make it easy to find your way. The loop is a relatively flat 1.5-mile stroll, but I like to turn off onto the Waterfall Trail. While you won't see the waterfall this time of year, the shady trail leads up a series of steps and switchbacks and meets the Mesa Trail at La Mesa — a large meadow with a pond and nice valley views. It's a great spot for a break and a picnic; there's a fountain, benches, a hitching post and a porta-potty. From here, you can explore Garzas Canyon and make the steep climb up Snively's Ridge, or you can head down the Mesa Trail to Fern Trail and back to Lupine Loop for a total hike of about three miles.

If Garland Ranch is like your cool grandparents' country farm, Point Lobos State Reserve is more like visiting a fussy science teacher ... there's plenty of cool stuff to see, but you have to follow the rules: No pets, no climbing on the rocks, no fishing, bicycles must stay on paved roads, and picnicking's only allowed in designated areas. Now for the cool stuff: In addition to the portion of the park on land, there are more than five

square miles of underwater park for divers (reservations required). The Whalers Cabin built by Chinese fishermen in the 1850s is now a cultural history museum, with a whaling station museum right next door. From rock formations, to views of Pebble Beach, every section of the trails offers something to "Ooh" and "Ahh" over.


Wildlife includes deer, otters, sea lions (which gave the park its name), and a wide variety of birds. A pair of binoculars is helpful.

If you drive into the Pt. Lobos Reserve, you'll wait in line and pay a \$10 entry fee. While that's certainly reasonable, if you park along the highway and walk in, you'll be asked for a \$1 donation (maps are \$2 more) and in a few minutes, you'll be at the water's edge. (Note: don't leave valuables in your car.) Turn right on Carmelo Meadow Trail just after the entrance station; in just a quarter mile, you'll be at Whalers Cove. Turn left on Granite Point Trail to Whalers Cabin, and then head uphill to North Shore Trail. Along here are moderately rolling hills, stairs, roots, and rocky outcroppings and beautiful views of

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

Lincoln Motor Company – the epitome of elegance

T THE Pebble Beach Concours d'Elegance, the day almost always starts with fog shrouding the 18th Fairway, hiding the ocean, and coating the carefully prepared cars on display with dew. But by the afternoon, the mist usually gives way to the sun, and the sea and chrome start to sparkle, producing an unforgettable picture of automotive grace and elegance.

This year, whatever the conditions, a 1956 Continental MKII will add more than its share of that elegance to the 63rd annual Pebble Beach Concours d'Elegance.

The featured marque, Lincoln, will be represented in four classes of coach-built cars, with a focus on one-off, custom-bodied cars, includ-Prewar Lincoln Custom ing Coachwork V8, Prewar Lincoln Custom Coachwork V12, Lincoln Custom Coachwork Postwar, and Lincoln-Zephyr and Continental classes. Among those, the 1956 Continental MKII is especially noteworthy. It was ordered in black by Henry Ford II for his wife, Anne. The automobile, fitted with a Hartz cloth convertible top and styled with a gray wool broadcloth interior with red piping and black leather trim, was the epitome of elegance while one of the nation's preeminent automotive families used it.

But the car eventually went to Anne Ford's secretary, who drove it for 10 years before it was sold various times over the years, ultimately falling into disrepair. In 2005, Jim Schmidt of Ocala, Fla., purchased the car, now owned by his son, Rick, complete with its original personalized owner's manual and plaque, engraved with Anne Ford's name.

The car, impeccably restored by Lloyd's Auto Restorations out of Bartow, Fla., will be accompanied by Anne's son, Edsel Ford II, grandson of Edsel Ford, who is credited with bringing the Lincoln Continental onto the market circa 1940.

When Henry Leland, who had run the Cadillac division of General Motors, and his son Wilfred established their automobile company in August 1917, Henry named it after President Abraham Lincoln, whom he had supported in the 1864 election. The Lincoln Motor Company, also known as "Lincoln," established itself by assembling Liberty Aerospace aircraft engines with cylinders provided by Ford Motor Company, under government contracts during World War I. After the war, The Lincoln Motor Company turned its attention toward luxury automobiles. And, in 1922, Ford Motor Company purchased the company. Edsel Ford is remembered for taking a marque known for its superior mechanics,


and introducing the superb styling and elegant coachwork for which Lincoln is still recognized. In 1938, he commissioned chief stylist Bob Gregorie to build him a custom car to be delivered to Florida for use during his 1939 vacation. The enthusiastic response from his friends motivated Edsel to put the early Lincoln Continental into production.

For decades, Lincoln, as a marque, was considered the American Rolls-Royce, and the preferred car of presidents and others who rode in style, among them Frank Sinatra, Cecil B. DeMille, Elvis Presley, Nelson Rockefeller and Henry Kissinger. The luxury car was produced by the Lincoln Division of Ford Motor Company from 1939 to 1948 and again, once it was re-established, from 1956 to 2002.


It is the 1956 Continental MKII that Ken Eberts, automotive artist and president of the Automotive Fine Arts Society, chose to feature in his original painting, which has become the commemorative poster art for the 2013 Concours d'Elegance.

"I chose the 1956 Continental MKII, because elegance is what the Concours is all about," Eberts said. "At a time in car design when chrome and garish designs reigned, the Continental was clean, subtly sculptured and beautifully proportioned. It just exuded class." Also excited about the featured marque is Jack Passey, veteran vintage and classic-era judge of 40 years, who has owned 92 Lincolns over the years, and as many as 55 at one time. Passey, who will focus on the 1921 to 1939 era, and the Zephyr class from 1936 to the early 1940s, has brought his own share of Lincolns to the show field.

This year, he will bring a 1932 Lincoln KB V-12 Dietrich Convertible Sedan and his granddaughter, Emily Passey, will present the car, representing the third generation of Passeys devoted to classic cars. And, in particular, the Lincoln.

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




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

where I'd be absolutely scared to death."

In 1953, Mercedes took notice of Moss, and the factory's racing boss, Algred Neubauer, talked to Moss' manager, Ken Gregory, about his driving potential. Neubauer wanted to see what Moss could do in a faster car than he was racing at the time and suggested getting him in a Maserati. Despite the mechanical failings of the car, he often qualified well and could manage to pass the two best Formula 1 drivers at the time, including the man who would become his teammate at Mercedes in 1955 — famed Argentine Juan Manuel Fangio.

"Mercedes is an incredible company," Moss told the guests at the Quail last year. "Anything you wanted, they would do. I'm sure if you said you wanted to try square wheels, they'd say, 'We tried it in 1928, and they vibrated too much.' To have a company with resources like Mercedes behind you was enormous."

Even the member of the pit crew in charge of cleaning the accumulated grease and road grime off Moss' goggled face during races proffered not just a rag, but soap and warm water, as well, even at tracks in remote locations where procuring such items wasn't exactly easy.

Among the most talked-about races of Moss' career was the 1955 Mille Miglia, in which he averaged 98 mph in a Mercedes-Benz 300 SLR in the 1,000-mile race and finished an hour ahead of the second-place driver in 10 hours, 7 minutes and 48 seconds.

"They were remarkable cars — it has to be the greatest sports racing car ever built," he said, remembering the fast journey through the narrow, "semi-closed" roads of Italy.

"I say 'semi-closed,' because there were still

delivery trucks using them," he said. "The roads were narrow, and the drivers didn't look in their mirrors very much. It's not like an ordinary race."

The crowds presented a challenge, too, as they leaned in toward the roadway to watch the speeding cars pass.

"So you're sort of driving into a kind of a cone of people," he said. "And I would wiggle the steering wheel a little...." That wiggle, of course, would send a particularly strong message: "Get the hell out of the way."

Moss credited his navigator, journalist Denis Jenkinson, with his success in the Mille Miglia.

"I can't help but think I would have been much slower without him," he said. "I would be going uphill at 170 mph and not know what was on the other side," but Jenkinson would use hand signals to indicate what he should anticipate, whether a turn or a bump or some other feature of the road that could trip him up.

"He was my guide dog," he said.

Jenkinson had accumulated his pace notes during practice laps the duo had driven during the month prior to the race, when they sought not to learn every aspect of the course — just the parts that were dangerous. During the actual competition, reading the notes occasionally prompted nausea in his copilot.

"He got sick a few times. Luckily, he did it the other way, not my way," Moss said. "And he wore glasses. If he'd lost his glasses, I don't know what we would have done!"

Between 1954, his first year in a Formula 1 car, and 1962 — when a near-fatal crash at Goodwood left him in a coma for a month and partially paralyzed for six, ending his professional driving career — he competed in 318 races, finished in 225, and won 134.

"I'm very lucky. The only way it would have been better is if I hadn't been forced to retire at 32 years old," he said during the interview. Since he stopped driving professionally, he's traveled around the world, attending events and talking to fans, and has consulted on racing endeavors and launched his own line of merchandise. Lady Susie — whose "mind is like a filing cabinet" — accompanies him much of the time.

"To at my age to be able to come to places like this around the world and meet people is wonderful," Moss said. "The drivers are paid quite a bit of money, now, and I don't know if many of them would want to go out and do what I do, but it's a fabulous life.

I love motor racing ... I'm an international prostitute, in a way — you pay and I come."



Carmel Bay.

After three-quarters of a mile on North Shore, pick up Old Veteran Trail to the Information Station, where knowledgeable docents can provide a wealth of information on everything from trail conditions to native wildlife. From here, you can continue along the perimeter for views of the Pacific Ocean, hidden coves and pristine beaches. A hike of the reserve's full perimeter is about 6 miles, and you'll rarely find trails that are this rewarding for relatively little effort. After you've visited the incomparable China Cove, if you're finished for the day, a short walk along the paved road will take you to Lace Lichen Trail, which leads back to the main entrance. Its namesake green lichen hangs gracefully from trees, making the half-mile trail seem almost magical.

No matter what you choose, the many nearby seaside and inland walks are worth the effort — just make sure you lock the Bentley and turn off the headlights.

Dietrich design, one of 20 that were built," says Jack. "I have two others, both 1930, and each one of 50. The '32 is the biggest engine and the most deluxe car they built. They made it only for two years, mostly because of the economic situation of the country.

"Emily's dad, Bill, and his sister, Lisa, grew up with cars, and so has Emily. She wasn't a total car nut until her dad let her drive around the family property — 30 acres — in a little VW dune buggy. She got her own car last week, a Mazda Tribute. It's a cute little car, kind of like my Lincoln Navigator that shrunk."

Jack and Bill have been coaching Emily about the history of the car, so she is prepared to discuss it during the Concours. They also are actively engaged in teaching her how to drive it. Although Emily is fairly tall, they've put pillows on the seat to make sure she can see over the custom Dietrich low-V windshield and long hood.

Emily was 10 weeks old the first time she attended the Pebble Beach Concours. And she's been going ever since. Her favorite part of the event is getting up early to get out onto the field with her parents and grandparents to study the cars before the crowds come in.

"Although I still have to learn how

to drive the Lincoln," says Emily, "I think I was more nervous getting my driver's license. Even though I had driven for a few years on the family property and a lot with my permit, there are so many ways you can automatically fail if you don't do things correctly. With the Lincoln, I'm really excited to have the opportunity to show one of my grandpa's cars."

For starters, her grandfather says Ray Dietrich had a great flair for design. In fact, almost every super custom Dietrich, he says, would fetch more than a million dollars today. His designs, says Jack, were so spectacular, with long hoods, Vshaped windshields, and a spectacular fender line. "The real champions," Jack says, "are the 1932 to 1934 designs, when Ray did his greatest work."

The first time Jack saw the 1932 Lincoln KB V-12 Dietrich Convertible Sedan, it was dark blue with black fenders. It is now a soft putty color. Instantly enamored of the automobile, he was given the chance to buy it for \$125,000. But he didn't have the money.

Several years after the late Otis Chandler, publisher of the Los Angeles Times, had purchased the car, Jack became renowned for bringing together, among others, Chandler's exceptional classic car collection. In turn, Otis gave him the chance to buy the Lincoln.

"When Otis' health started to fail," says Jack, "he called me and said, 'I know you love this car. I'm going to pass it on to you. I paid \$225,000 for the car, and I'll give it to you for \$175,000 by giving you credit for the cars you've been buying for me, until it's all yours.' One of the reasons I was a judge so long

Wonder and magic

Bringing together realism and impressionism, Jay Koka has created a distinctive style that has won him many admirers.

"I've always tried to refine my art by exploring different styles and techniques," Koka said. "By mixing elements of realistic detailing and impressionism, I seek to convey the sense of wonder and magic that great automobiles, both new and classic, emanate."

Carmel's Ocean Avenue provides the setting for one of Koka's most recent works, "Cherry Ice Cream." The piece, which features a Mercedes-Benz SLR Stirling Moss, was inspired by a real-life encounter. "It was inspired by an evening walk down Ocean Avenue to dinner," Koka recalled. "The car initially caught my attention, but then I noticed all the people with cameras milling around and the wonderful warm light spilling onto the sidewalk from the stores and the car headlights on the road."

Displayed in the window of the art gallery in the background are several of Koka's paintings.

Another new painting by Koka, titled "Graffiti," places a red 2014 Corvette C7 next to a wall decorated by enterprising graffiti artists.

"The incredible new C7 is making news and generating lots of interest throughout the world," he added. "I enjoy contrasting an automobile where every minute aspect of design is endlessly revised and refined with the exuberance and spontaneity of street art."

A fresh look at classic cars

Using acrylics and a hyper-realistic painting

style, Dennis Brown premieres three new pieces at this year's exhibit.

"Moving On" captures a vibrant red Alfa Romeo P3 in motion, while "Dreaming" showcases a baby blue 1950 GM concept car. With its abundant chrome shimmering in the sunlight, "Precision in Art" offers a detailed look at the legendary straight-8 Duesenberg engine.

An art instructor at Mount San Antonio College in Walnut (Los Angeles County), and a contributing artist for Road & Track, Brown specializing in painting vintage classics and race cars.

"The majority of my paintings begin as outlines in ink that I develop by filling in their interior spaces with transparent acrylics," Brown explained. "I find that once the architectural lines of a car are filled in, the rest of the creative process flows easily, stemming from the natural lines and curves of a fine auto."

Brown's work offers the viewer a fresh look at a familiar subject. "The front ends of the cars I paint are typically rendered in a brighter and more defined fashion than the parts that will be seen as background, adding perspective and detail," he added.

Power and grandeur
