

#### ACLU: 'Serious concerns' about state flag apparel ban

THE CHAIR of the American Civil Liberties Union of Northern California said the organization has "serious concerns" about a dress code that bars thousands of local students from wearing clothing or accessories with the California flag, and it's considering challenging the policy.

The Monterey Peninsula Unified School District's dress code prohibits students as young as kindergarteners from wearing clothing or having anything with the state's flag, - things the district says are associated with Hispanic gangs.

But Pacific Grove attorney and ACLU Northern California board chair Michelle Welsh told The Pine Cone that ACLU attorneys are reviewing the school district's farreaching dress code to determine whether or not to contest it.

"Certainly [the] ACLU has serious concerns about this dress-code policy and its effect on students' First Amendment rights to freedom of expression," Welsh told The

The MPUSD dress-code also bans students from wearing

apparel or having anything depicting specific California cities or geographic areas — even a Monterey or Carmel shirt, for instance.

"It leaves little choice about what to wear and few alternatives for messages, even patriotic ones," according to Welsh, who is also chair of the volunteer legal committee for the Monterey County Chapter of the ACLU and an attorney for a local teachers union.

Other districts, such as Salinas Union High School District, have similar dress codes that officials argue help limit the number of gang-related incidents, although the amount of gang activity within MPUSD schools by opposing Norteño and Sureño gangs is minimal.

There are 19 elementary, middle and high schools within MPUSD, which also operates a number of adult-school programs. Assistant superintendent Kevin McClelland said the district doesn't keep track of the number of students reprimanded for dress-code violations each year.

"Overall, most violations of the dress-code policy are

#### Quail Lodge residents decry plan to eliminate ponds

AFTER MEETING with representatives of Quail Lodge this week, residents expressed dismay over a plan to remove 10 small lakes and ponds adjacent to the resort's golf course.

The meeting was attended by about 40 people who live in neighborhoods near the lakes and ponds.

Residents said they were told by representatives of Quail



Lodge that the aim of the project is to save water. Several were openly critical of the plan, which is part of a golf course redesign.

"I'm very disappointed," said Max Schanderl, who has owned a home in the neighborhood since 2009. "We bought here because our home is overlooking one of the lakes. We've become accustomed to enjoying the wildlife and watching

the migratory birds. In the evening, the sunset reflects off of the lakes. I'm concerned about property values as well."

Homeowner Marjorie Siemsen also bought her house because of its proximity to one of the lakes.

"All of my neighbors are dissatisfied," Siemsen said. "It doesn't seem right. I'm worried about the value of our home. It's very disturbing."

Helga Malmstedt called the news of the plan "very sad" — and she wondered what the late Ed Haber, who founded the golf course a half century ago — would have thought of it. "Ed loved the water and the ambiance it created," Malmstedt

Like many of her neighbors, Malmstedt bought her home, at least in part, because it was situated next to one of the lakes.

"I bought my house strictly because of its location," she insisted. "I don't even play golf."

#### Authors Fest moves to Stevenson after contract dispute with Sunset

A STALEMATE over his contract with Sunset Center has led Carmel Authors & Ideas Festival founder Jim McGillen to move his event to Stevenson School in Pebble Beach, with some events also to be held at Santa Catalina School in Monterey. The renamed Pebble Beach Authors & Ideas Festival will be held Sept. 27-29 and again draw three dozen compelling and famous authors and speakers to offer lectures and roundtable discussions for students, teachers and the general public.

'It's too bad," commented Carmel Mayor Jason Burnett. "All sorts of people worked to figure out a way, but ultimately, it wasn't a good fit, and it sounds like he's very happy with Stevenson. I sincerely hope that's a great success, because it is a great thing to have in the community.'

Burnett said he is "confident" that officials with Sunset Cultural Center Inc., the nonprofit which operates the theater, "did what they could to try to make it work."

McGillen, however, said the center's leadership is incapable of making decisions, that price increases pushed him out — even as he continues to hold the ticket price at \$550 for the entire festival and limit the number sold to a couple hundred — and that the board is dysfunctional.

The fact that the fest easily found a new home after McGillen contacted people he knew at the schools, and that he's more than satisfied with the outcome, "don't negate the

#### New planning director boasts broad background

WITH AN advanced degree in geology and the experience of overseeing planning in the newly incorporated City of Goleta — among other accomplishments — Rob Mullane started work as the city's new community planning and build-

> ing director Monday, filling a job that had been vacant for a decade.

"Carmel has world renown for its charm and good planning," he told The Pine Cone Tuesday, so when he saw the job was available, he jumped at the chance to run the planning department in a city he had visited a half-dozen times over the years. And the job, which includes overseeing all aspects of planning and building, as well as working with the city council and outside agencies, presented "a good opportunity to come in and provide a leadership



role, and work in a rebuilding environment."

A native of Connecticut, Mullane studied geology at Duke University in North Carolina and then obtained a master's in the same field of study at the University of Hawaii. That program's emphasis on coastal-zone management led him into planning, and he ended up spending several more years in the Hawaiian islands — including isolated, outlying islands, as well as the big ones — focusing on resource management, water issues, erosion, beach repair and other aspects of development in coastal regions.

"Some were high islands, like the volcanic islands, and others were atolls with maximum heights of like 10 feet," he said. "But they were all very concerned about sea-level rise and freshwater depletion, because they have very limited freshwater supplies and burgeoning populations."

He loved Hawaii, but found traveling to the East Coast

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#### York School grad makes film about Laotian bomb tragedy

WHILE THE Vietnam War ended nearly 40 years ago, the conflict continues to impact people in Laos, who each year fall victim to unexploded bombs that are scattered across its countryside.

Recent York School graduate Thu-An Pham examines the issue in her documentary film, "Laos: An Untold Story," which screens Thursday, Sept. 5, at Canterbury Woods Auditorium in Pacific Grove.

"This inspiring young woman traveled to Laos and produced an informative and uplifting film spotlighting the programs seeking to mitigate this life-threatening problem," explained Marley Knoles, a spokeswoman for Canterbury Woods. "She will speak about this cause she has embraced and the process of making a documentary film."

Knoles called Pham, "a shining example of what today's youth can accomplish."

During the Vietnam War, Vietcong forces on their way to fight United States and South Vietnamese forces travelled through Laos — a neutral country in the conflict — seeking a safe route to the south. In an effort to stop the hostile traffic, the U.S. dropped an estimated 2 million tons of bombs on Laos between 1964 and 1973. Some of those bombs, along with other ordnance from the conflict, failed to explode and are still dangerous. Over the years, more than 20,000 people have been killed or maimed as a result.

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


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
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#### 'Burners' light up Burning Man with other-worldly art bus

THIS WEEK in the Black Rock Desert of western Nevada, more than 65,000 "Burners" are gathering to celebrate life and art at Burning Man. The annual event, now

in its 27th year, is difficult even for regular participants to describe. One could perhaps say that Burning Man is sort of a future-tribal, Dali-esque, post-apocalyptic flaming-art social experiment that is very much like Mad Max meets Dr. Seuss ... meets the Star Wars

cantina scene  $\dots$  during Fourth of July  $\dots$  on Halloween  $\dots$  at Woodstock  $\dots$  on the moon.

The experience for the participants (and everyone at Burning Man is a participant) is meaning-saturated, constantly changing and impacts all the senses. For many, if not most, it is profoundly meaningful in deeply personal and unexpected ways that are transformative, even life changing. Freedom of artistic and personal expression creates an environment of social and spiritual liberation unlike anything else on the planet.

#### 'Self-contained and self-sufficient'

The week before Labor Day every year, Black Rock City arises from nothing but a dusty plane on public BLM land: An ancient dry lake, which Burning Man calls the "playa," transformed into a fully functioning city with everything, from a Department of Mutant Vehicles, to a local postal service.

Once the Department of Public Works creates the infrastructure over a three-week period in early August, ticket holders arrive in their tens of thousands to come "home" to their favorite city on earth and create a self-contained and self-sufficient culture.

After a week, participants convoy back to

the "default world" and the Playa Restoration Crew removes all signs of the event from the lakebed as part of a leave-notrace policy (one of the Ten Principles that Black Rock citizens abide by).

The ephemeral nature of everything in our lives is reflected in the temporary existence of Black Rock City and all of its amazing, epic-scale, engineering-inspired art. Not only do monumental fixed structures grace the playa — like the Man and the Temple — but also many other magnificent, multi-story installations and whimsical creations of all sizes can be found inside the enormous arc of the city.

But the art is moving, too: Art cars in an unbelievable variety of shapes and sizes roam the playa with sound systems pounding while passengers dance onboard reveling in the sights of the city. Regular vehicles are not allowed to drive on the playa except to enter and park in the city, and not just anything will qualify as an art car. Every vehicle must undergo a thorough inspection by the Department of Mutant Vehicles for both safety and creativity.

This year a team of close friends from Big



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
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#### Eugene A. (Gene) Conley

#### Rug store sues MST over bus stop

m THE}$  OWNERS of a Monterey rug shop have filed a lawsuit against Monterey-Salinas Transit over a multimillion-dollar construction project on Lighthouse Avenue last year that frustrated businesses and snarled traffic for weeks.

Parnian Rug Gallery proprietors Mario Torabbagi and Mori Torabbeigi allege they were never notified that MST was going to install a bus shelter in front of their 599 Lighthouse Ave. store when they signed a lease for the business.

The 11-foot wide shelter blocks "visual access to a substantial part" of their building and impairs a window display, according to the lawsuit filed Aug. 9 in Monterey County Superior Court. The rug shop is asking a judge to order MST to move the shelter.

Monterey-Salinas Transit spokesman Hunter Harvath declined to comment on the lawsuit, saying the company's attorney is reviewing the complaint.


In June 2012, Torabbagi and Torabbeigi signed a multi-year lease to open up their rug store in the former Rabobank building at the corner of Lighthouse and Hoffman avenues. Shortly thereafter, they hired architects and contractors to make structural changes for the store, including installing a large plate glass window facing Lighthouse intended to display their imported rugs.

But in October 2012, a month after the renovation at the rug store commenced, 'without any prior notice" from MST or the City of Monterey, crews began tearing up the sidewalk to install a bus shelter in front of their store — part of a larger \$5 million MST bus stop and rebranding effort, which included wrapping numerous busses with jazzthemed displays. Money for the improve-

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

#### Commission wants to keep wood trashcans, with a few hi-tech exceptions

OF THE many idiosyncratic details that make Carmel a place like no other, its custom-built wooden garbage cans, adorned with brands of squirrels and trees, are among the most recognizable. But at \$370 apiece, they're expensive, and because city workers cut the lumber, paint the hardware and assemble the cans, they're time consuming, too.

Last week, the planning commission pondered whether to replace the long used cans with more efficient, less expensive waste bins, and contemplated means of encouraging more downtown visitors to recycle. While many garbage cans in the business district never get full, people looking for somewhere to recycle cans or bottles are usually out of luck.

At the Aug. 21 meeting, city forester Mike Branson disthese problems and possible remedies. Commissioners decided busy locations like the beach and parks should get high-tech bins that compress trash and automatically report when they're full, while most of the city

would retain the traditional redwood cans, and that some of the redwood containers should be designated for recyclables and marked with blue metal bands.

He detailed several options for replacing the town's trashcans, including BigBellies — solar-powered compactors that alert the waste hauler when they're full, reducing unnecessary trips to empty them — and square bins that could be vinyl wrapped with a faux wood pattern and the city's squirrel or tree emblem. He also suggested reducing the number of wood-sided cans, of which there are 116 in the business district and another 74 in the city's parks, to get rid of the least used units.

Waste Management surveyed the city's cans and found that only 3 percent are usually full, while more than half are empty most of the time.

"We have a lot of cans," Branson said. "But maybe we have too many cans, in all honesty."

Any location where a BigBelly is installed would see four or five nearby cans removed, he added.

"Whatever happens on the sidewalks of Carmel must represent our character," commented resident Barbara Livingston.

#### 'Not a big fan'

Not unexpectedly, commissioners panned the plasticwrapped cans and recommended only a handful of Big Bellies, which cost about \$3,500 each, be located less than conspicuously in high-traffic locations like the beach and downtown parks. (A Big Belly test unit is already in place in

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

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
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#### Cooking fire heavily damages home in Carmel Highlands

m A}$  FIRE that started on the stove in a Spindrift Road home last Thursday evening caused an estimated quarter-million dollars in damage to the two-story residence but was confined to the kitchen, according to Cal Fire Battalion Chief Jude Acosta.

"The resident attempted to extinguish the fire with an extinguisher," Acosta said, but the man's effort failed, so he dialed 911. "They tried to put it out and then called us."

The first firefighters to arrive "found light smoke coming from the eaves," he said, and then pulled two fire hoses into the house from the front to attack the blaze, which they confined to the kitchen. By then, the occupants — a father, two daughters and a grandson, according to Acosta — were safely out-

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"Once we got inside, we found there were heavy smoke and fire in the kitchen and dining area," he said. "It was a little challenging, because it was in the back, and there was heavy smoke in the structure."

It took 14 minutes for crews from the Carmel Highlands and Rio Road fire stations to knock down the flames, after which firefighters turned on heavy fans to push the smoke out of the home and deployed a thermal imaging camera to ensure the heat and fire had not spread to the walls or upstairs.

"It didn't go in the attic, or anything," Acosta said. Instead, the blaze was confined to the kitchen, with the remainder of the twostory, roughly 3,000-square-foot home left intact. Nonetheless, he estimated the damage at \$250,000 to the structure and contents. Firefighters then cleaned up what they could and salvaged as many furnishings and other items as possible, but "there was extensive smoke and heat damage," he said.

Cal Fire investigator Cliff Williams said the amount of damage in the kitchen prevented him from determining what the resident was cooking at the time or how it got out of control.

"The stovetop was completely burned, and then the cabinets came crashing down on the stove, so it was hard to tell," he said, adding that he opted not to ask the occupants what, exactly, had happened.

"The family was really devastated, so we just left them alone," he explained.

Fire crews remained on scene from about 6:30 p.m. until 10.

"They did a great job," Acosta said. "And the home's still there. So that's good."

#### City seeks input on website needs

IN A perfect world, what should the City of Carmel-by-the-Sea's website and computer network be able to do? Notify residents of impending roadwork? Allow store owners to renew their business licenses online? Provide staff reports for people interested in knowing what the city council is discussing?

Whether those things or others, the city council hopes to develop an IT wish list with feedback from residents, business owners and anyone else interested in the topic during a workshop set for Monday, Sept. 9, from 5:30 to 6:30 p.m. in city hall.

"We still have a typewriter in city hall. We're not even in the 20th century, let alone the 21st century," Mayor Jason Burnett said Thursday. "There are all sorts of documents that should be online that are not online. It creates work internally and frustration externally, because that kind of information should be available."

But being so badly in need of an overhaul means city officials and the public have the opportunity to design a much better system. "We're starting with a blank slate," he said.

For the city's administrative purposes, the system should better interface between finance, human resources and other departments to ensure fewer errors in accounting — a vulnerability pinpointed by the city's auditor, according to Burnett.

Externally, he wants people to be able to undertake as many tasks and obtain as much information as possible.

"Let's make it easy on people. If they want to renew a business license, why can't they do that online?" he asked. Constituents should be able to file complaints, such as about potholes or code violations, and then track their progress, as well as provide feedback on their resolution.

"Then we can make sure we're meeting expectations," he said. "And if we're not, we take corrective action."

As for the city council's lengthy meeting packets — the August issue hit a record 610 pages — people should be able to access the reports they want to read without having to scroll through hundreds of pages.

"There should be a quicker way for people to zero in on the items they are interested in," he said. "It's not complicated — we just need to do it."

Ideally, the city's computer network and website will be "a system for facilitating the sort of customer-oriented organization that we want to have."

Burnett said he believes members of the public will be able to contribute significantly to how that system is defined and what its capabilities should be, and he's hoping they'll attend the Sept. 9 discussion to share their ideas.

'Really, it's wide open. It will be a bluesky brainstorming session," he said. "If people have something they've thought of or heard about or seen elsewhere, let's get it on the table. We may not have the budget for it or be able to give everyone what they want, but let's at least get it out there."

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# From Barbies to eBay, youngster learns about money, work

TEUTA YENGST was simply trying to teach her 9-year-old daughter a valuable lesson in economics, but she appears to have created an Internet entrepreneur.

Unlike most of her fourth-grade classmates at Carmel River School, Kea Yengst spends as much time selling toys as she does playing with them.

Kea became an eBay seller shortly after she accidentally damaged an expensive piece of her parents' furniture. While Mom was off at yoga class and Dad was working in the garage, she decided to paint her fingernails. Using her Mom's nail polish, she did the job but decided she didn't like the color. So she opened a bottle of her mom's nail polish

remover — and spilled it on a table.

"The table is made of beautiful lacquered cherry wood," Teuta said. "The nail polish remover ate through the lacquer and ruined it within minutes. Kea tried to clean it up but made a bigger mess."

Instead of getting mad, Kea's parents decided to teach her a lesson in the cost and value of things. "We worked and earned the money that paid for the table," Teuta explained. And now Kea would do the same.

#### An eBay expert

With the same sense of initiative that inspired Kea to paint her nails, she set out to become a successful eBay seller — and raise the \$750 required to fix the table. Cleaning out her closet, she began listing Barbie dolls, Lego toys, clothes and other items under the eBay ID, "carmelkid1517." Mom and Dad chipped in some old stuff as well. Some things were auctioned off, while others were posted as BINs, which in eBayspeak means Buy-It-Now.

Within two months, Kea had paid off the \$750. But she was having so much fun, she decided to keep listing items. She's also teaching an adult neighbor how to become an eBay seller.

While her parents have helped her with the online enterprise, Kea does most the work herself. "She researches what competitors are selling something for, takes the pictures, writes the descriptions, packages the items and goes down to the post office," Teuta said. "She's a bit of celebrity there."

Understandably, her mom is proud of what Kea has accomplished. "She was so determined to raise the money," Teuta added. "After raising \$750, she said, 'Now I want to get to \$1,000.' She had a great summer. She learned things many adults don't know."





#### High-tech crosswalk makes students safer

NEW TECHNOLOGY will make crossing the street in front of the Pacific Grove Middle School much safer for students, city officials said.

A new crosswalk at Forest and Spazier avenues will be illuminated to warn drivers of pedestrians — who are often students going to and from the middle school.

"There will be lights in the pavement," Mike Zimmer, the city's public works director, told The Pine Cone Monday. "When students walk by a sensor, the lights will flash."

The project is the start of a 10-year "Safe Routes to Schools" project that includes wheelchair ramps at intersections to provide better access for disabled students and others.

A ramp will be included in the new crosswalk, while another one is slated for Sinex and Forest.

The lighted crosswalk, Zimmer said, will cost about \$15,000 and be paid by the city and Pacific Grove Unified School District. Overall, various other safety projects in the Safe Routes plan will cost the city about

\$60,000 per year over 10 years.

Though there is a similarly lighted crosswalk on Sunset near Pacific Grove High School, Zimmer said the middle school crosswalk will be better.

"The one we are putting on Forest is a much more visible illumination than the high school," he said of the crosswalk, to be completed by the end of September. "It's newer technology."

#### A sad legacy

New drop-off and pickup areas also have been established at Fountain and Sinex avenues to make it safer and help alleviate congestion on Forest Avenue, which can be especially precarious in the morning and afternoon.

On Sept. 2, 2008, father Joel Woods was picking up his son, Jacob, in front of the Middle School, when he was fatally struck by a BMW SUV driven by Deborah King, who was under the influence of prescription drugs at the time.

The city also plans to fix the broken street lamps in front of the middle school, which could include employing solar panels.

turtles, frogs and salamanders. Even though the property is private and the lake manmade, he worries the project will adversely affect the environment. "I think there should be an environmental impact report," he said.

According to Suezaki, the lakes and ponds are now just a shadow of what they once were, because they no longer receive enough water.

If the plan to remove them comes to fruition, Suezaki will be sad to see the lakes and ponds disappear.

"I live on Lake Place," he said. "I guess we'll have to rename the street."

Representing Quail Lodge and its golf course, attorney Anthony Lombardo defended the decision to the remove the lakes and ponds. "It's the responsible thing to do both economically and environmentally," Lombardo said.

The attorney said the Monterey Peninsula's chronic water shortage makes it impossible to maintain the ponds.

"The entire community has a knife to its throat over water use," he said. "We can ill afford to waste water."

Lombardo also said the ponds emit foul odors and attract coots, which are considered a nuisance by golfers and those who manage the golf course. "The coots poop all over everything," he said.

In addition to removing the ponds, Lombardo said the golf course makeover includes rebuilding tees, relocating a green and altering the course's topography to "make it more of a modern course."

Perhaps most significantly, Quail Lodge intends to install

"a new, state-of-the-art irrigation system" that will save water, he said. The ponds will be landscaped with droughttolerant vegetation and ground cover. Lombardo said Quail Lodge is working on getting a grad-

Lombardo said Quail Lodge is working on getting a grading permit and hoping to break ground on the project sometime in the next two months.

The project is part of a larger \$28 million makeover of Quail Lodge and its golf club by its owner, Hong Kong and Shanghai Hotels Ltd.



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

#### Chapter Five

In 1999, PERS represented to the state legislature that a 50% increase in pension benefits for safety unions would not result in increased costs. It based its opinion on its investment prowess.

But by 2002, the tech bubble broke, and PERS began suffering significant investment losses. Its response was to persuade the legislature to authorize the largest rate increase in PERS history. The method used was to have each employer (city, county, et al.) set up a "side fund" in the amount of its pension deficit and to pay it off at 7.75% interest and principal over 26 years. Payment was back loaded but still substantial. Prior to "side funds," employers paid nothing to reduce the deficits.

PERS announced its intention to create "side funds" in late 2001, prior to the PG adoption of the 50% pension increase for safety on June 5, 2002, but did not include any reference to it in the mandatory actuary report (the report that the PG city manager concealed from the council). It was an additional cost per year of over a million dollars, commencing in 2004.

In summary, when the 2002 PG city council adopted the 50% pension increase for safety: (1) it was told that the cost per year was \$51,500, when the hidden actuary report indicated that it was over \$800,000 per year; (2) it was not told that the benefit extended to time previously served by PG safety officers (one chief received 24 years of free credit); and, (3) it was not told that in just two years there would be an additional cost exceeding a million dollars per year.

By 2005, PG was and is totally under water financially. It now has a new unfunded deficit of about \$45 million, and pays about \$1.6 million a year for pension bonds. Over 20% of its budget is used to pay for pensions -- 8% to 10% is the norm. PERS has announced a 50% rate increase in the next few years.

The \$45 million pension deficit grows at the investment rate of 7.50% per year, or \$3.75 million per year compounded. PG operates by firing employees, slashing services, ignoring road maintenance, and failing to provide sinking funds for equipment (replacement of a new fire truck, for example). Its beautiful golf course is in a state of shocking unplayability. Evidently PG cannot afford to water it.

The response of the union-led city manager and management staff is to promote plans to increase revenue in an attempt to squeeze a few more years out of PG. Staff needs to raise revenues by \$3.75 million per year to hold the pension deficit to \$65 million dollars, including pension bonds. It may even have the gall to propose new taxes.

Next, in two weeks, the pension bond/million dollar police raise ploy.

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

from Maui to visit his family more and more difficult, so he settled on California as the midway point and ended up in Santa Barbara in 2000. There, he continued his planning career and said he recalled meeting Jason Stilwell, who was assistant county administrator for Santa Barbara County before becoming city administrator here two years

"I knew of him and our paths may have crossed, but we didn't work together in any extended capacity," Mullane said.

He moved to the Santa Ynez Valley, and after the City of Goleta was incorporated, Mullane went to become its first planner in 2003. "It was exciting — a new city starting at ground level," he said. "I was employee No. 13, and that was my first exposure to city planning."

In its infancy, Goleta had no planning commission, so Mullane worked closely with the city council to draft the general plan without the help of outside consultants, which is unusual.

"I had a really diverse range of responsibilities there," he said. A major undertaking during his first two years included settling a long contentious proposal to develop a coastal area that included a major monarch butterfly habitat, native grasslands, beach, tidal pools and coastline.

After four years in Goleta, Mullane joined Rincon Consultants and spent some time in the private sector, though much of the firm's work was for government agencies. Another four-and-a-half years passed, and in March 2012, he became community development director for the City of Ojai, a small resort town with an agricultural community southeast of Santa Barbara.

"They hadn't had a full-time community development director for a long time," he said. "It was a small staff and a fairly small city with a lot of the same issues" as Carmel, including a heavy reliance on tourism dollars, fairly built-out residential and commercial areas, and emphases on historic and cultural preservation.

"It was a really involved citizenry," he said.

He was content to remain there until he learned about the Carmel job opening and figured it presented an opportunity too good to pass up. His resume was one of 79 submitted by applicants, and Mullane was among the six finalists interviewed by panels of community members and professionals at Sunset Center in June.

"The interview process at that level is really a two-way street — you're getting a sense for the community and its needs, as well as they are getting a good sense of you," he said. "The whole process was really professional and very educational, and it was a good opportunity to learn quite a bit about the community before I was even a finalist."

The panels selected three top candidates

and identified their favorite, and Stilwell interviewed all three, after which Mullane went on to meet the staff in the community planning and building department and all the other city directors. Stilwell announced his hiring at the Aug. 6 city council meeting.

Staying in mid-valley while deciding where to live, Mullane said this week he's getting acquainted with his new home, city employees and the decision makers on the various boards and commissions.

"I know there are a lot of great ideas out there, and they're excited to have a director in place," he said. "So my role is to reflect their desires and provide some of my own insight and ideas, but it takes time to get the lay of the land — my bearings — and a sense for the opportunities for improving things."


#### From Buddy to daddy: Poelle takes on new role

WITH THE curtain closing at the Golden Bough Theatre Sunday, Sept. 1, on a month-long run of PacRep's latest rock 'n' roll tribute concert, "Buddy Holly and Friends," **Travis Poelle** reflects on a decade of portraying a pop music legend — and looks forward to the joys of fatherhood.

"I've played Buddy Holly songs longer than he did," Poelle told The Pine Cone. "From his first release, until the day he died, Buddy was only on the music scene for about 18 1960s musical icons. In addition to his role as Holly, Poelle plays Roy Orbison, Art Garfunkel and John Phillips of the Mamas and the Papas. Poelle also performs as a member of the Rolling Stones, the Who and the Turtles.

"We try to spice the show up every year," he said. "I think we really succeeded this year."

While Poelle has enjoyed his latest run of playing Holly and other luminaries, two other pursuits are awaiting him—painting and being a parent.

His grandfather's words proved prophetic — in 2003, he landed the role of Holly in the first of many PacRep concerts paying homage to the early days of rock 'n' roll. Ten years later, Poelle still cherishes the opportunity to get on stage and perform classics like "Peggy Sue," "That'll be the Day" and "Not Fade Away."

"It's a privilege every time I get up there and put on his glasses," he said.

While he's played Holly in a wide variety of venues, there are few places he'd rather perform than in Carmel. He and his family stay in a Pebble Beach guest house that belongs to friends.

"It's so fun coming here and seeing the same people returning every year," explained Poelle, who lives most of the year in New York City. "I see grandparents bringing their grandkids. It's great to see a new generation dancing in the aisles and getting hooked on the old music."

Unlike previous incarnations of PacRep's tribute concert, the current show has been expanded to include portrayals of Bob Dylan, the Rolling Stones, Janis Joplin and other late An accomplished watercolorist whose work is currently on display in the Golden Bough lobby, Poelle would rather stay home and paint than tour as an actor or musician — in large part because it offers him a chance to be close to his wife, Barbara, and his 1-year-old daughter, Charlotte. "This is the best role I've ever played," he said.

"Buddy Holly and Friends" plays Friday, Saturday and Sunday. Friday and Saturday performances start at 7:30 p.m., while Sunday matinees begin at 2 p.m.

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



ments came from U.S. taxpayers.

Upset over the size and location of the bus shelter, the rug shop owners and their landlord, Jeff Congdon, met with MST officials, according to the lawsuit filed by Pebble Beach attorney Gary Fontana.

"As a result of those meetings," Torabbagi and Torabbeigi allege that "MST agreed to change the proposed location of the bus shelter and move it east along Lighthouse to a point where it would only impair visual access to 591 Lighthouse" (an adjacent space they leased) but not 599" Lighthouse, where the rug shop is located.

#### **Better location offered**

Among the documents accompanying the lawsuit is an Oct. 17, 2012, email from Harvath to Congdon offering him the chance to choose a "preferred location" for the shelter

Prior to MST's concession to move the shelter, though, the landlord agreed to rescind the rug shop owners' lease because of the shelter and its potential impact on their sales. But when MST officials said they would relocate it, the shop owners decided to

continue leasing the space and spent more than \$50,000 in exterior renovations to the building, including the plate glass window, in November 2012.

A month later, the lawsuit alleges, MST changed course and positioned the shelter in front of window display anyway, prompting the two store owners to protest. Monterey-Salinas Transit officials responded by contending the shelter was only "temporary" and that it would be removed after Christmas 2012 if the shop owners felt it was a problem for their business, according to the lawsuit.

In late December 2012, "MST did remove the temporary structure for a short period of time," but it was reinstalled in the same location despite objections by Torabbagi and Torabbeigi.

And while members of the public and several MST board members raised questions about the way MST had handled the situation, the transit agency's board provided "none of the relief requested," the suit alleges.

Torabbagi and Torabbeigi also want a judge to set aside the rejection in May by the MST board of directors to move the shelter, and reimburse them for legal expenses.

Ironically, MST used a rendering of the bus shelter in front of the rug store building in marketing materials distributed to the media.

fact there are major problems at Sunset Center," he said.

"We offered a fair contract, much as we offer similar presenters, in the hopes of continuing our relationship with the festival," countered SCC board chairman Dave Parker. "Several interested and generous community members were even involved in the effort to get the contract ratified, but in the end, the festival opted for a change of venue."

And, Parker said, McGillen didn't seem to have any complaints about the theater and the rest of the facility.

"From the end-user point of view, nothing beats Carmel and nothing beats Sunset Center for that sort of event," Burnett commented.

For his part, McGillen admitted he can be difficult to work with. "A former partner used to say, 'McGillen's a well balanced Irishman — he's got a chip on each shoulder," he said. But he also observed that for the past six years, especially when Jim Price was chairman, the agreement and arrangements with Sunset Center worked well.

After learning last year that his three-year contract wouldn't be renewed as it was the last time around, McGillen said he tried to work with the leadership and the new board, to no avail. During that time, he reached out to Rich Patterson at Santa Catalina and Joe Wandke at Stevenson to see if they might be interested in hosting his festival.

The two schools are perfect venues for his event, and their managers, as well as those of the Pebble Beach Co., have been far easier to work with, he said, adding that it only took about 20 minutes of negotiation with P.B. Co. brass to obtain permission to use "Pebble Beach" in the name of his event. (The name, "Pebble Beach," is copyrighted.)

"If it had been Carmel, it would have taken six months,"

Catalina will host 2,000 students from all over Monterey County on Thursday of the festival, and 900 students will participate at Stevenson on Friday. Many of the adult-oriented events at the P.B. campus will be held in the amphitheater

and the school's Keck Auditorium. McGillen said the costs of holding his festival at the two campuses are about what they were at Sunset in past years.

Meanwhile, Parker said he doesn't anticipate the loss of the festival will much affect the center's budget or income for the city, since it's a busy time of year and a time slot that can be filled with other events that draw people to town.

"We have some exciting ideas that are under consideration for another event that would use SCC's facilities as well as other venues throughout the community that would bring many out-of-town visitors to Carmel, but we have a lot more work and research to do before discussing this in more detail," he said. "As for revenues to the city, I think the effect will be minimal, because to the extent that attendees are from out of town, they will still need hotel rooms and restaurants, and Carmel offers the best of each."

Burnett said SCC and the board — which includes former

Mayor Ken White and recently appointed former Mayor Sue McCloud, among others — are making progress toward meeting the provisions of the new contract with the city, and his overarching concern is that the center's potential be maximized.

"Like any organization, we all have areas where we're strong and areas where we have improvements to make, and that's why we have such a focus on defining where we want to be and asking them to define where they want to be, and then measuring," he said. "It's a very large investment and one of the crown jewels, one of the key assets in town, and my job is to make sure that we're getting the most out of that and see where we're heading."

"The contract ink hasn't quite even dried yet, but so far, so good," Parker agreed. "It is a new, lengthier and more detailed contract than we had in the past, but we feel it is entirely a workable one."

two decades for Toyota before joining Ford six years ago to help turn the struggling company around.

"Jimmy Car Car was my nickname when I was a kid. I'm from the Michigan area, and my family's a longtime Ford family," he said. "They speak to me now."

His run at the Reunion was his first race in Old Bertha, which he bought from a Southern California man who wanted to make sure the car was properly raced — and by a driver with local ties.

'Mac was really famous, because not only was he a great driver, he was a great guy," Farley said. "The guy who owned it wasn't a really aggressive driver, so he called me and said, 'Frankly, I'd rather have someone like you drive the car. It deserves to be up front. Plus, you live in Carmel."

So, he obtained the car around Easter time and did nothing more than put new tires on it, and at Laguna, he brought Old Bertha past the checkered flag in second place behind Bruce Canepa, who was driving a 1963 Corvette Grand Sport.

"I was tentative at the start, because I didn't want to hurt the car," Farley said. "Bruce is very fast around that track — I'm sure like Mac was — and following him, I learned a couple of tricks. Certainly I want to try to get the car ready for next year, so I can win."

Old Bertha is not his first racecar, or even his first Cobra. He drove a smaller-engined, lighter 289, which had also been owned by a friend who died of cancer - and who had asked Farley to take it on the track because he never managed to do so. Further, at Ford, he is in charge of the Cobra line and other vehicles that bear the name of the late, famous racer and his friend, Carroll Shelby.

"My previous car was lighter and was a factory team racecar, and was a really well known Cobra," he said. "But I would much rather have Mac's car. I enjoyed the race, and I really enjoyed getting Mac's car out there."

Farley described racing as "my only hobby, other than being a dad and working

He also has great affection for Carmel, and his wife, Lia, and three children spend summers here.

"As a car person, I thought L.A. and Detroit would be perfect, but actually, the Monterey Peninsula is the No. 1 place to be if you love cars," he said, but not just because of the epic car shows every summer.

'You have access to Laguna Seca and access to some of the most beautiful driving roads in the world, even if you're just going to the grocery store," Farley said.





Sur collaborated to create a magnificent new art car: the sailing ship Anostraca, named after a crustacean that lives in playa dust also known as the fairy shrimp; the larvae can lay dormant for three years until there is enough rain for them to hatch. Chelsea Davey spotted it in the classified ads and fellow Big Sur native Kodiak Greenwood and best friend Warren Hacker then purchased it.

The Anostraca was an old school bus that had recently gone up for sale; after purchase, it was seen for a while across the street from the Henry Miller Library earlier this year, awaiting its resurrection into something completely different

"When I found this thing on craigslist, I had no idea what we were getting ourselves into," said Davey. "And then the timeframe we had to do it in meant that we almost needed a miracle to make it happen."

#### Reclaimed wood

The concept was to completely transform the vehicle into a wooden sailing ship complete with flaming mast, whale rib bones, LED lighting, a sound system, a bar and many organic and beautiful detail treatments with capacity for more than 70 passengers. Of particular importance was sourcing the materials locally and recycling whatever could be found into a stunning art ship — a principle perhaps best exemplified by the wooden panels, which were originally part of the skating rink on Del Monte Avenue that had been a Peninsula local icon for many

Building the ship took

Greenwood and his friends three weeks at NIMBY in Oakland, an industrial yard where similar projects are developed and assembled. Impeccable attention was given to the nautical details, including the captain's wheel, rails and LED sails. Brendon O'Halloran assisted with the structural assembly of the ship build.

"One of the design troubles we had was coming up with a system where the wooden panels could be easily attached and removed," he said. "Being invited to help was an honor. I was not planning on coming to Burning Man, but after working on the ship felt totally compelled to be aboard for the maiden voyage. For a while I was actually depressed that they would set sail without me!"

Hacker, who was an integral part of the build team, added, "We always wanted to drive around the playa with our Big Sur friends. It was really fun building the Anostraca, but it

was a big learning process for us; we had to do it on a wing and a prayer, pulling all-nighters on three consecutive weekends in Oakland, because we couldn't find a place in Big Sur to do it."

The ship had to be completely assembled, tested and disassembled, and then the bus was driven to Black Rock City, while the wooden siding, mast and other components were brought in by U-Haul truck.

"In Big Sur people take wood for granted because it is everywhere, but here everyone is blown away to see a full-sized wooden ship on the playa," he said.

A Big Sur crew of a few dozen friends has indeed pulled off a miracle in the desert: The Anostraca, the "playa fairy," has emerged from the dust and set sail on a sea of dreams. Soon, once again, there will be nothing left on the playa except dust, wind and dreams ... until next year.

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#### Settlement Reached in Lawsuit Over Airport Safety Project

The Monterey Peninsula Airport District (Airport District) and the Highway 68 Coalition have agreed to settle the legal action between them. At the Airport District Board meeting on August 14, the Board acted to accept the settlement of litigation pending since 2011 over the Runway Safety Area Improvement Project. The project was never intended to expand commercial airline use at the airport.

The Coalition and the Airport District Board agreed to modifications to the Runway Safety Area project including eliminating the wider proposed roadway with connection to Highway 68. It agreed to an 8-foot reduction in the runway plateau, resulting in the removal of one tier of retaining walls along Highway 68, with a corresponding reduction in adjacent grading and dirt fill needed for the plateau extension

The previously proposed east vehicle service road will be reduced in scale to generally 10-feet wide, paved, and will connect to an existing road within the Airport. The District also agreed to set aside two areas within the project footprint as provisional open areas and to consider vegetative screening of the project from Highway 68 with input from the Coalition.

The joint efforts of the Airport District, the Coalition, and their respective attorneys and consultants have shaped an agreement for a modified project that meets all FAA requirements for the federally mandated Runway Safety Area while maintaining the scenic values along Highway 68, a state-designated scenic highway. The parties acknowledge that the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) must agree to the project as modified, with construction beginning as soon as February 2014. The Airport District indicated it is hopeful this settlement will ensure the project is completed within the FAA's deadline of December 31, 2015.

The Highway 68 Coalition is a non-profit volunteer organization whose mission includes protecting the safety and the designated California State Scenic Highway status of Highway 68.

The Monterey Regional Airport offers a convenient and hassle-free experience on its more than 40 flights in and out of the Airport daily. The outdoor pool, made possible by a \$1 million donation from an anonymous benefactor, will be completed Sunday or Monday, and will give a boost to the school's aquatic sports teams, Jeff Clark, Stevenson's vice president for external relations, told The Pine Cone.

"We have really strong swim and water polo teams and enjoy great competition with Carmel," Clark said. "And this pool brings us into complete regulation in terms of depth, length and width of the water polo track, which was important for us."

The old pool, built in 1964, had never been renovated. Construction crews this week were putting the final touches on the new one, which had already been filled with water to allow the plaster to cure prop-

The L-shaped pool is only marginally larger than the previous one, but it meets the requirement for official water polo matches. Clark said the swim and water polo teams are looking forward to using it.

"They are pretty excited, to say the least," he said. "We were fortunate to have a generous donor step forward to allow us

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
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#### **Editorial**

#### A tempest in a Prius

 $T_{\rm HE\ TRUISM}$  holds that when someone else slips on a banana peel, it's comedy, but when you do, it's tragedy.

A corollary to the principle, we have now learned, is that when you slip on a banana peel and someone else laughs, you may feel that their response is not only an unforgivable insult to you, but to bananas and to all mankind.

How else to explain the hysterical reaction to our front-page joke two weeks ago, "Tree smashes Prius on Highway 68 — but at least it wasn't a Bentley"? The woman whose car was hit, her husband, people who listen to her radio show and even people who are just miscellaneous Prius owners reacted with the kind of obscenity-laden vitriol you'd expect them to reserve for something that actually mattered.

According to them, by printing that headline, and making light of the whole episode, we were acting insensitively, offensively, repugnantly, obnoxiously, reprehensibly, etc., etc. etc.

That's the essence of numerous emails and letters to the editor we received, and some of which we printed last week. One letter writer, who occupies a responsible position with a respected Monterey Peninsula institution and should, therefore, know better, even compared us to Sen. Joseph McCarthy, whose campaign of smears against alleged Communists in the 1950s has made him one of the most hated figures of 20th century American history. Our joke was that bad?

Come on, people. Have a brain.

First of all, the woman driving the car wasn't hurt. If she had been, we wouldn't have made light of her misfortune. The proof of this is that we have covered hundreds of incidents where people were injured over the years and never made fun of any of them.

Of course, the woman was scared out of her wits and upset about the damage to her

car, but those things are not that serious. Furthermore, journalists do not write their stories, headlines or captions to suit the people who are involved in newsworthy events; they write them for the general public. Thus, by longstanding principles of journalism, the fact that the driver of the Prius and her family and friends may have objected to our headline is not relevant to whether it should have run. We apologize for offending them, but we don't regret printing the story.



What we were thinking when we saw the photo of the tree leaning on the Prius was that it was really ironic for such a thing to happen during Concours Week. Around here, as locals well know, old Monterey pines fall regularly — karate chopping houses, flattening parked cars, ripping out power lines and sometimes even hurting people. But they almost always do so during winter storms, when they're pushed over by strong winds. While all trees succumb to gravity sooner or later, and the Monterey Peninsula's are no exception, it is unusual for one to suddenly teeter over on a summer day. And for a tree to fall right across a busy local highway just at the time when that highway and other local roads are crawling with thousands of rare cars was truly remarkable. That is one of the things our joke meant.

And the other was to indirectly poke fun at the people who drive such unusual and valuable cars. We love Concours Week, of course, but its excesses are something any-body might legitimately joke about. Mother Nature, you see, can drop a tree on a Bugatti or a Pierce Arrow whenever she wants. TAMMY JONES was brought up in Denver, and when she was 18, she joined the Army.

"I was a little sick of school and wanting something different and just to get away," she said. "Then once I got in the military, I started thinking, 'When I am going to get out of

She describes herself as a "pretty independent person" and "maybe a little on the stubborn side," which aren't exactly qualities that make a good soldier.

Nevertheless, she was in the military for four years. She

did her basic training at Fort Dix, N.J., then was off to Indianapolis for training in accounting, and then to Fort Ord. Her last year in the military was in Korea where she handled property and funds for American soldiers who were serving

After the Army, Tammy returned to Denver for a year and then came back to the Monterey Peninsula, reuniting with her old boyfriend, who became her husband. She didn't know what work she might find here; she was looking for something in accounting.

"I've always been a numbers person. I can remember when I was real little, I used to make my mom buy me waiter's checks," she recalled. "I would make my own prices and then I would add everything up. So it kind of started at a pretty young age."

She found an administrative assistant position with a

small bond firm. "I knew nothing about investing when I first joined. But I really, really enjoyed it, so I got my broker's license about nine months later."

What does that require? "A lot of studying. I think it's about a six-hour exam that you have to go through. It's pretty extensive. I didn't pass it the first time. I passed it the second time." She laughed, "I will never let that license lapse. I would never take that test again."

The securities business has changed a lot in the 20 years since Tammy got her start, as regulations have

changed and dramatically increased. The rules also vary from boutique shops such as M. L. Stern, where she got her start, to larger corporations like Smith Barney, where she worked for a number of years.

After Smith Barney, Tammy thought she'd try banking, but she didn't like it because there was so much turnover.

"It was really difficult to build any sort of relationship

with your co-workers or your customers," she said.

So Tammy went back to investing, becoming a broker with Charles Schwab. "I'm more relationship-oriented with my clients, and I really enjoy that part of it, and I feel like they are part of my family.'

But it's a family that needs a little instruction sometimes.

"Some brokers just react to whatever their clients are saying. They are trying to appease them rather than trying to educate, but I like to educate my clients," she said.

Tammy's personal life also changed around the time she moved over to Schwab in 2007: She gave birth to a son. Being a broker means starting your workday early, so is it a problem also being a mom?

No, because her husband is a stay-at-home dad.

"We wouldn't have planned it this way, but it works for us, and he does an excellent job. He's much more detailed and he's very regimented, where I'm a little bit more free-flowing. So there's a little bit of a balance there," she said. "He's probably done a better job than I would have in specific areas."


Is she able to leave the office behind when they go on vacation? Not really.

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#### You don't really know Carmel until you've walked it with Gael Gallagher

ONE THING Gael Gallagher doesn't need is a Dale Carnegie course to bring her out of her shell. This outgoing, enthusiastic, passionate tour guide has been conducting tours, both predetermined and customized, for more than 30 years. Gallagher is a historian/naturalist who saturates her clients with lively patter guaranteed to keep them interested while they're tagging along with her.

#### **Scenic Views**

"I'm a visitor who decided to stay," she says. "I came here from Boston in 1970 to visit my brother at Fort Ord and knew this is where I wanted to live." Since that time Gallagher has been a guide at the Monterey Bay Aquarium and served as a docent at Point Lobos and the National Steinbeck Center. Gallagher is a true Steinbeck aficionado. She often quotes verbatim passages of the author's writings during her tours.

"Architecturally and aesthetically, this town pops!" is one of the phrases Gallagher uses to rev up people before beginning one of her Carmel walking tours. Then she spends two hours dazzling them with her depth of knowledge about Carmel.

Recently I joined Gallagher and about 20 of her clients for one of her Carmel walking tours. We started in the courtyard of the Pine Inn where Gallagher told us that in 1906 the north wing of the Carmelo Hotel at the corner of Ocean and Broadway, now Junipero, was dismantled and the main building was rolled on pine logs down the rugged dirt road of Ocean Avenue. With the creative vision of M.J. Murphy it was reborn as the Pine Inn.

Gallagher calls this her "Nooks and Crannies" tour because she keeps us off Ocean Avenue.

"Ocean Avenue is there," she says to us. "You're going to discover its shops and restaurants even if it is your first time in Carmel. You don't need a guide for that."

Then off we went into nooks and crannies I didn't know existed. We strolled through the gardens of the Christian Science Church ending up on the deck overlooking Monte Verde Street. There Gallagher urged everyone to tour Robinson Jeffers' Tor House. She removed her tour guide hat and replaced it with her "acting" hat as she read the famous poet's "The House Dog's Grave," a sad but moving paean written from the dog's point of view: You were never masters, but friends. I was your friend, I loved you well, and was loved. Deep love endures to the end and far past the end.

We traipsed through the Richard MacDonald Gallery on Lincoln and Sixth, where we got up close and personal with the famous sculptor's works, spinning them on their lazy-Susan pedestals. (I didn't know you could do that)

We explored the Tally Ho Inn, learning that the building was purchased in 1945 by cartoonist Jimmy Hatlo, creator of Little Iodine. The Inn has a wonderful English countryside ambiance with exquisite views of the bay.

At city hall, we rested on benches while Gallagher recounted some of Carmel's political history, including the Eastwood years. Here she told the story of evangelist Aimee Semple McPherson and her mysterious "kidnapping."

McPherson turned up in Carmel where she had put into practice the Biblical injunction to love one's neighbor. It was the scandal of the year in 1926. Once again, Gallagher entertained us, this time with the recitation of Pete Seeger's "The Ballad of Aimee McPherson." Now I'll tell you my story in the usual way/About this lady preacher's holiday/If you don't get the moral then you're the gal for me/ Cause they got a lot of cottages down at Carmel-by-the-Sea.

Somehow we managed to get from Monte Verde up to Lincoln, Dolores, San Carlos, and Mission while hardly setting foot on Ocean. We entered shops, restaurants, and galleries where Gallagher knew everyone and we were treated as honored guests. We visited with artist, Robert Knight, outside his studio on Dolores, and spent several moments at the Steven Whyte Gallery, where visitors can view the creative process in action. At Lulu's Silk Art Gallery (another first for me), we learned about the history of Chinese Silk Embroidery, an art that dates back to 800 B.C.


There is much more to tell, but you really should discover "Carmel Walks" in person. Actually, you should discover Gael Gallagher in person.

"This is my office," she says with a broad smile, spreading her arms as if embracing the entire village. "Everything about it is superlative."

Her ongoing coursework in local history, ecology, architecture, marine biology, and other natural sciences keeps her presentations lively, timely, and accurate.
