Council weighs emergency ban on beach fires

WITH THE mayor saying he wouldn't want to live on Scenic Road because the smoke from beach fires could be harmful to his young son, and a councilman threatening to resign if his fellow council members didn't take action to immediately ban or limit beach fires, the issue of fires on Carmel Beach rose to a fever pitch this week, and the council convened Thursday night to consider banning them altogether — at least temporarily.

"I will not take responsibility for further environmental damage to Carmel's premier asset — its beach," councilman Ken Talmage said. "Nor will I be responsible for contributing to the increasing health concerns of our residents."

After fielding an increasing number of complaints about wood smoke drifting over the beach bluffs and charcoal marring the beach's famous white sands,

the forest and beach commission, and then the city council, took the steps this spring to limit beach fires by developing a plan calling for 26 fire rings and other restrictions. But a resident appealed the plan to the California Coastal

Commission, which isn't set to consider the issue until later

WATER COPS POSING AS RESTAURANT CUSTOMERS

RESTAURANT OWNERS, beware: Water spies could be among your customers.

In an effort to make sure restaurants are not wasting even small amounts of water, Monterey Peninsula Water Management District employees are posing as customers to catch restaurants in the act of offering or serving customers water before they request it.

The investigations begin when somebody rats out a place where they recently ate.

"When someone says, 'I was at the Blank and Blank Grill and they were serving water without the customer asking,' we do try to confirm that," water district general manager Dave Stoldt told The Pine Cone this week.

The water district's mission is simple. Unidentified district employees sit down, look over the menu and wait to see if they're served water without asking for it. If the restaurant violates the rule, they're busted. Fines range from \$100 to

Four Peninsula restaurants that were recently issued "first offense courtesy notices," or warnings, for improperly serving water should expect to draw interest from the district's new espionage program.

"We will probably show up at each of those restaurants at some point in time, and sit down and order a meal," Stoldt said.

Those businesses are Il Fornaio in Carmel, Lalla Grill in Del Monte Shopping Center, TusCa Ristorante at the Hyatt in Monterey, and First Awakenings in Pacific Grove, all of which were warned to stop serving water unsolicited.

"Presently our policy is to only issue a fine if a district employee verifies the offense," Stoldt said. "A first offense courtesy notice can result from any person reporting it to us."

■ Hostile workplace claim settled for \$125K; Hanson angrily retires

COMPLAINTS FROM a police dispatcher who said she endured harassment, discrimination and mistreatment at the Carmel Police Department were settled Monday — without her even filing a lawsuit — when the city council agreed to pay Deborah Hidalgo \$125,000.

Meanwhile, after being warned that strong language he used while on the job might be construed as harassment of a fellow employee who happened to hear the comments, John Hanson abruptly retired Tuesday, saying he was worried that continuing to work for the city would cause him to "have a heart attack and die."

Hidalgo — who handled parking enforcement from 1987 to 1992 and then returned to work as a dispatcher in 2005 –

Pumpkin smashing to become sanctioned event

EMBRACING A long-running Halloween tradition that used to be considered akin to vandalism, the Carmel City Council voted Tuesday to authorize the closure of the town's main street for a pumpkin-rolling contest as part of the city's birthday celebration Oct. 31.

"The activity of rolling pumpkins down Ocean Avenue at night during the weeks surrounding Halloween has been a long-standing, albeit unauthorized, tradition in Carmel," library and community activities director Janet Bombard explained to the council Aug. 4. "Community activities staff is requesting permission to incorporate the activity into the annual City Birthday Party and Parade, allowing residents the opportunity to safely and legally roll a pumpkin down Ocean Avenue."

Not only would it be fun, it would add a new ele-

Cities — and traffic — gearing up for Concours Week

WITH CONCOURS Week ever growing in activity and popularity, city officials have engaged in lengthy discussion about how best to handle congestion in Carmel, while other cities are also notifying residents of upcoming traffic jams and street closures. In town, parking restrictions and other measures — including free shuttles between the Mission and downtown for area workers — are being taken to try to reduce traffic jams and ensure safe passage for emergency vehicles on the already narrow streets.

Carmel Police Cmdr. Paul Tomasi warned residents to plan ahead, especially if they have medical needs or other special considerations, for the tie-ups that are bound to occur during the Concours on the Avenue Tuesday, Aug. 11, and the Pebble Beach Concours Tour d'Elegance Thursday, Aug. 13. Both events involve closing several blocks of Ocean Avenue, and the Concours on the Avenue also includes side streets on the north and south sides of the main drag.

"During both of these events, Ocean Avenue and surrounding streets will be closed to through traffic, and the city encourages residents and visitors to use Carpenter Street and Rio Road to access and exit the city," he said.

To help keep traffic flowing, parking will be temporarily banned in areas that have become "choke points" during past years. "Of most concern have been the islands along Junipero," Tomasi said. "These will be roped off and posted as No Parking."

Also, Mountain View from Junipero to Torres will be closed Tuesday through Thursday, and Torres, Santa Rita and Guadalupe streets between Ocean and Sixth avenues will be closed for part of the day Tuesday and

Furthermore, downtown workers and others can park for free in designated lots at the Carmel Mission and ride a shuttle to Sunset Center at San Carlos and Ninth on those days between 8 a.m. and 6 p.m.







■ Ban likely to become permanent

FORMER MAYOR Sue McCloud said they should consult an expert on the use and effects of artificial turf before deciding they don't like it, but forest and beach commissioner Karen Ferlito said she was worried that installation of fake grass could lead to the starvation of trees that might no longer be watered because the lawn isn't. After hearing ideas like those on the suddenly front-burner topic of fake lawns, the Carmel City Council unanimously voted Tuesday to extend an existing 45-day moratorium on "artificial grass and other similar synthetic turf or foliage materials" in town for a total of at least a year.

"The purpose of the moratorium is to provide staff with the necessary time to study the issue and make recommendations" whether to allow fake lawns in Carmel, or ban them permanently, senior planner Marc Wiener said in his Aug. 4 report for the council.

COUNCIL EXTENDS MORATORIUM ON FAKE GRASS FOR A YEAR

He also noted the city's residential design guidelines "encourage maintaining the forested character of the community through the use of natural landscaping," and discourage grass lawns visible from the public right of way.

"Synthetic turf or artificial grass is inconsistent with the design guidelines in that it presents the appearance of a lawn and is a synthetic material that is not natural landscaping," Wiener said.

In addition to recommending the city discuss the issues with a representative of the Synthetic Turf Council in order to get the facts, McCloud told the council a request she made for public records indicated the planning department received three requests for artificial turf in 2014, and five more during the first six months of this year. Three of those








New farmers hired to run market

m THE}$ CITY council this week hired a Turlock farm to oversee the downtown farmers market held on Sixth Avenue on Thursdays, replacing the group that's run it since 2013. According to the contract, Peter Cipponeri Farms LLC will operate the market for a year, being responsible for selecting vendors, marketing the market, and covering all expenses.

Last November, the Carmel City Council decided to request proposals from prospective market operators, but it only received two, while the city's purchasing policy requires at least three proposals to be considered. As a result, the council rejected the bids and asked an ad hoc committee of council members Carrie Theis and Steve Dallas to revise the market guidelines, which were so restrictive that they discouraged potential operators from applying.

They and cultural commission chair Donna Jett sought advice from Catherine Barr, executive director of the Monterey Bay Certified Farmers Market group, regarding how they should revise the guidelines.

"She's been doing farmers markets for years, and she basically took a look at our guidelines and said some of them were not in keeping with what other farmers markets were doing, and were more difficult to work with," Theis said at the Aug. 4 meeting.

Library and community activities director Janet Bombard explained that Barr advised against requiring farmers to be local and organic, since those restrictions affect the variety of produce available to customers.

"Basically, you don't want to limit the farmers — you don't want to limit the market," she said, adding that some people prefer conventional produce over organic. "The basic premise of the farmers market is offering a wide variety of produce and products that are going to meet everybody's needs and

While the committee and Jett were in

consultation with Barr, a third potential operator, Cipponeri, submitted a proposal, according to the report Bombard presented to the council.

'We were approached by a new person with a full proposal, including marketing, on a yearly basis, and thought it would breathe a little more life into it," Theis told the council.

After having city administrator Doug Schmitz and city attorney Don Freeman look at the proposal, the committee decided to go with the new operator.

"We felt that it was time for a change," Theis said.

At Tuesday's meeting, Bombard recommended the council OK a contract with the new operator and give 30 days' notice to Jerry Lami of the West Coast Farmers Market Association, the market's manager.

Councilwoman Victoria Beach worried that if the contract didn't emphasize the importance of having organic produce at the market, shoppers would lose that option.

"I'd hate to lose that element, because we've always had both," she said.

But Mayor Jason Burnett said the people who patronize the market would dictate what

"If we are right that the community wants to have organic, then the market will provide that," he said.

He also noted that, in its first year, Cipponeri Farms predicts it will lose money, which suggests it will work hard to determine what people want in their market and how to make it profitable in subsequent years. According to the proposal, it will cost \$57,320 to operate the market, while income from stall fees will be \$31,200.

"They're going to listen very carefully to what the community and the council want during that period of time, in the hopes we'll extend the contract," Burnett said.

Councilman Ken Talmage wanted assurance the market will not include crafts of any

Divided council makes no changes to Forest Theater renovation plan

AFTER SPENDING several hours over the course of two meetings discussing possible alternatives for a required handicapaccessible parking space at the Forest Theater — including ferrying disabled people from their cars in the lower parking lot to the theater — Carmel City Council members voted 3-2 Tuesday to proceed with the plans they approved in February. Council members Victoria Beach and Ken Talmage wanted to spend another \$50,000 to explore other alternatives, while Mayor Jason Burnett and council members Carrie Theis and Steve Dallas believed the options had been adequately vetted, and they should proceed as planned. The only change was to add dirt to soften the areas near retaining walls.

"The risk of letting a small fraction delay the overall project and continuing to have this discussion is a very real risk," Burnett said before voting at the Aug. 4 meeting.

Architect Chris Wasney, whose Palo Alto firm was hired a year ago to undertake the renovation project that would get the Forest Theater reopened as quickly as possible after it was red-tagged in April 2014 due to health and safety hazards, presented three different design schemes for the parking space and driveway leading up to the theater.

Renderings of other options

While he favored his firm's original design, which calls for an elevated driveway and parking space with retaining walls — a plan that would allow the preservation of several large pines behind the stage area and avoid a series of switchback ramps — Wasney also described and showed 3-D renderings of the other two options, which have the spaces lower on the property and would retain the existing driveway.

He described the alternatives as "pretty

much a nightmare," because they would require switchbacks of ramps with hand rails, as well as the removal of significant trees in an area that's already fairly thin of the towering pines that characterize the site.

Wasney explained that for every foot of elevation the parking space is moved lower on the property, another 12 feet of ramp or 20 feet of path has to be added.

He also noted that none of the designs would avoid retaining walls, which some people have objected to on principle.

"Our professional opinion is that the scheme that's permitted is a superior scheme in terms of its aesthetics and its performance and its tree protection and its ease of navigation," he said.

Lots of questions

Councilwoman Victoria Beach wondered if the alternatives he described were the best Wasney could offer, and he said they were — though he also offered that any architect would be happy to keep working until his client told him to stop.

After fielding other detail-related questions from council members, the meeting was opened to the public, and Pacific Repertory Theatre executive director Stephen Moorer said he favored a design for handicap parking that would retain the existing driveway and designate one spot much farther up on the site, past the concession stand and box office, and another lower on the site.

His plan was accompanied by a letter from architect Richard McCann that said Moorer's idea was a good one and even added a compliment for Moorer: "As usual, I note you missed your calling. With your intuitive understanding of space and flow, you should have been a theatre architect."

homeowners' association," according to the lawsuit filed for them by Walnut Creek attorney Konstantine Demiris. Murphy and Greene "have been treated differently than any other [residents] in the architectural review process involving their fencing project."

Attorney Adrian T. Lambie, who represents Sleepy Hollow, said he couldn't comment because he hasn't reviewed the complaint.

The lawsuit says that on Sept. 12, 2013, Murphy and Greene submitted an application to build a driveway gate and 5-foot ornamental iron fence. In the exclusive community, such plans must be OK'd by the homeowners' association.

A member of the association's architectural review committee rejected the fence, saying the design was a "wide variance from the guidelines" outlined in the homeowners' rules and was "not congruent" with the style of their home, according to the suit.

But "nothing in the association's governing documents or guidelines requires a member's fence to be congruent with the style of a member's home," the 26-page lawsuit says.


Furthermore, because the association didn't take action within 30 days, which is required by the homeowners' association's rules, the project should have been deemed to be "in full compliance," the suit says.

Murphy and Greene also say another Sleepy Hollow property owner built a new house without submitting plans to the HOA, which also approved another homeowner's fence after theirs was rejected.

"By law, an HOA cannot pick and choose when to enforce [its rules] or be overly nit-picky and hard-lined on one member or a group of members over others, as has clearly been the case with the HOA's disparate treatment of plaintiffs," the

Murphy and Greene want a judge to issue an order allowing them to build the ornamental fence.

Despite suggesting that race was a factor in the HOA's decision to deny their project, Murphy and Greene don't allege civil rights violations or discrimination in the suit. Their attorney did not respond to a message seeking comment about the discrimination allegations.



Council OKs Homecrafters move

Holiday

marketplace

will be 'more

vibrant' with

a new home

DESPITE PREDICTIONS it would create parking problems, the Carmel City Council voted 4-1 Tuesday to authorize the relocation of the long-running Homecrafters Marketplace to the north lot at Sunset Center. Held the Saturday before Thanksgiving, the craft fair has taken place

in the main and south lots at the center, but after vendors placed in the lower lot near the offices complained that shoppers weren't finding them, library and community activities director Janet Cubbage proposed hosting the event in the larger north lot, instead, and the community activities and cultural commission agreed, recommending the council authorize the change.

"We feel it would be a more vibrant and contained marketplace," she told the council at the Aug. 4 meeting. "The north lot would allow it to grow."

According to her report for the council, "Each year, vendors located in the lower lot ask to move their booths into the main lot, as many of them feel that fewer customers come to the lower lot." Furthermore, the north lot will accommodate more booths, increasing the number from 72 to 85.

She also said the Carmel Host Lions would have more space for their food trailer and could expand their seating area.

Finally, the relocation would end the conflict with the symphony, which has to unload equipment from trucks in the main lot that same afternoon

"It would make a lot of sense, logistically, and that's why we're asking for it," she

But resident Richard Kreitman thought it was a bad idea, predicting blocking off those 122 parking spaces all day would cause

"You shouldn't give up the north lot on busy days," he said.

PacRep Theatre executive director Stephen Moorer wondered why that location would be good for the Homecrafters fair when it wasn't good for the farmers market.

"One of the biggest complaints about the farmers market was that it's dirty, it's

sunken," he said. "In the upper area, it's light, there are trees, and it's a much more welcoming place."

Councilman Ken Talmage suggested the problem of confused shoppers be solved with better signs, not moving the market, but councilwoman Carrie Theis doubted using the north lot for that one day would really cause much difficulty.

"The Saturday Thanksgiving, from a business perspective, is pretty quiet," she said. "In terms of displacing some of the employees, I don't think that's going to be as

before

much of an issue, because it's not as busy." She described the flow of the market in the main and lower lots as "disjointed."

"Sunset Center is trying to balance between the needs of the city with Homecrafters and their performance schedule," she said. "I think it was a good idea."

Councilwoman Victoria Beach said she was willing to try it one time, as was Mayor Jason Burnett.

"And the community activities and cultural commission looked at this, and I always try to give quite a bit of deference to our boards and commissions," he said. "Yes, it will result in a net loss of some parking spaces, but since it's not a busier weekend, it's worth trying this out."

If it doesn't work, he noted, the city can always revert to the previous setup. The council agreed, voting 4-1 to authorize the move, with Talmage dissenting.



BIXBY BRIDGE TRAFFIC TURNS OLD COAST ROAD INTO PARKING LOT

The site of countless car commercials and photo-ops, Big Sur's extraordinary Bixby Bridge is drawing so many visitors this summer that traffic routinely backs up along Highway 1 as motorists struggle to find places to park so they can enjoy the view and take pictures.

A resident who lives along Old Coast Road — which meets the scenic highway just north of the bridge — told The Pine Cone the situation has gotten so bad that it's become a safety risk.

"It's very dangerous," Bill Nye said. "People park haphazardly, and they are often forced to back out onto the highway. It just gets worse and worse."

On weekends, a section of the Old Coast Road is often

transformed into a parking lot, blocking access to about 20 homes. "There have been times when you couldn't get the cars of people who live here on the road, much less an emergency vehicle," Nye continued. "There's no control of park-

Nye said three signs have been posted along the Old Coast Road informing motorists that they must parallel-park along it. But he's concerned many visitors don't understand English well enough to get the message — or they're simply ignoring the signs. Instead, he'd like to see some barriers placed along the dirt road to make it clear that's it's not a parking lot.

Besides blocking the Old Coast Road, motorists have often been seen stopping in the middle of the highway to take photos — and some even walk out on the bridge in the middle of traffic to do the same.

Nye urged county and state officials to address the situation at Bixby Bridge. "Everybody needs to help," he added.

Supervisor Dave Potter — who has met with Nye agreed it needs to be dealt with.

"It's becoming a bit of an attractive nuisance," Potter said of the bridge. "We've talked to the sheriff, the highway patrol and public works about it. I suggested putting in some kind of impediment to parking, like boulders or barricades. We've got to find a way to keep people from blocking the road."

Potter compared the parking dilemma at Bixby Bridge to that at Point Lobos Reserve, where dozens park along Highway 1 to access the popular park, but in doing so, they often block the bicycle lane and create a traffic hazard as they cross from one side of the pavement to the other.

"The situation at Bixby Bridge is indicative of a greater problem," Potter added. "There is also illegal camping and people using the side of the road as a restroom. We've never seen this many people come to Big Sur before. We can't stop them from coming, but we can't compromise public safety."

Bixby Bridge was completed in 1932 for less than \$200,000. Retrofitted in 1998 for \$20 million, it stands more than 280 feet high. The bridge has been featured in films like "The Sandpiper" and "Play Misty For Me," and it even has its own United States postal stamp.

CHP chimes in

As bad as the situation at Bixby Bridge has become, California Highway Patrol Officer Miroslav Peli said it isn't as dangerous as the traffic problems at Julie Pfeiffer Burns State Park and Pfeiffer Beach.

'Julie Pfeiffer Burns is No. 1," Peli said. "We've had more fatalities and accidents there. The parking in the roadway is horrendous, and there's two blind curves. Nobody should be able to park on the west side of the highway" across from the park's entrance.

Last week, The Pine Cone looked at the problems caused by too many people driving along narrow and winding Sycamore Canyon Road to get to Pfeiffer Beach. Just two weeks ago, firefighters and an ambulance were delayed by traffic when they responded to an emergency at the beach. Peli said the intersection of Sycamore Canyon Road and Highway 1 has been the site of a number of traffic accidents.

"Pfeiffer Beach is No. 2," Peli said. "It's bad, but it's low speed. Everybody's crawling through the canyon because it's

Prison guard says he was fired for complaining about problems at Soledad

SNAKE HANDLING, sexual harassment, bigotry and illegal boxing matches involving inmates are among the allegations outlined in a new lawsuit filed by a former Monterey County prison guard against the state's correctional system.

Gilbert Santiago, Jr., a former correctional officer at the Correctional Training Facility in Soledad, alleges in a July 28 lawsuit that he was discriminated against and suffered retaliation after blowing the whistle on boxing matches between inmates that he says were "organized" by prison guards to

"encourage gambling and violence."

He was also unfairly targeted by other guards because he is Hispanic, according to the lawsuit filed in Monterey County Superior Court.

In the 10-page complaint filed against the state's Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation, Santiago seeks more than \$850,000 in damages for breach of contract, wrongful termination, employment discrimination, emotional distress and other alleged

Department of Corrections spokesman Bill Sessa confirmed Santiago's former employment at the Soledad prison but said

the state agency has a policy of not commenting on litigation.

Santiago, who began working at the facility in June 2005, said his problems started in July 2013, when he was given an "adverse action" writeup by his employer after he encountered a snake on prison grounds. Santiago, who said he was trained to call animal control instead of personally removing animals from the yard, said he was reprimanded for not picking up the snake and removing it like his coworkers did.

The prison's "use of an adverse action rather than an instructional letter or other lesser criticism violated the public policy and defendant's own training procedure of graduated, progressive discipline," the suit

Santiago was also disciplined in August 2013 after complaining that the prison yard's lights caused too much glare, and also in September of that year when he reported that a coworker had "drawn a racist or bigoted cartoon" in a prison log book "regarding [Santiago's] Hispanic ethnicity and ancestry," the lawsuit alleges.

He said he was disciplined yet again in November 2013 for "reading newspapers" on duty, and was also ordered to wear a "full dress uniform" when coworkers were allowed to wear shorts and "other cooler attire" during warm weather.

"Said requirement to wear warmer clothes resulted in the belittling of [Santiago] by defendant and discomfort to [Santiago,]" according to the legal complaint.


After his employer allegedly gave him fewer hours in which to work, Santiago said he was "forced into retirement as a constructive firing" in September 2014, and that he accepted the arrangement "only as a matter of mitigation of damages.'

In October 2013, the former correctional officer said that a coworker sexually harassed him by "using terms of endearment that were sexually suggestive and by requesting romantic dates." The suit doesn't say if the coworker was a man or woman.

Major sewer-replacement project in Pacific Grove almost complete

THE EXTENSIVE work to Pacific Grove's sewer system that's been going on for about six months and recently tied up practically every part of downtown is nearly finished, according to a city official.

Work crews since February have been replacing much of the clay pipe that has carried the city's sewage for nearly a century. City public works superintendent Daniel Gho said the \$1 million job, which also includes work on the city's manholes, is almost complete.

"I would say the majority of the work will be done in the next week or two," Gho told The Pine Cone Tuesday.

The antiquated pipes, some of which Gho said could be more than 70 years old, have been replaced with much stronger and longer-lasting PVC pipes, which are also larger than their clay predecessors.

"Some are 6-inch pipes that we are increasing to 8-inch pipes, and some are 8-

inches and we're replacing them to 10 inches, Gho said. "They are really strong and should last for 100 years, at least."

Compared to clay, larger diameter PVC pipes are also lighter weight and reduce the risk of clogging.

"With an old clay line," Gho said, things like baby wipes "get hung up on roots that have intruded into a 6-inch pipe. With an 8-inch pipe, there are two more inches of diameter, plus the inside of the pipe is smooth so sewage and debris keep on going."

The recent drought has caused more root intrusion into the old clay pipes because tree roots naturally travel where there's water.


Gho said that work crews with contractor Monterey Peninsula Engineering have also been spot-repairing old pipes that haven't yet been earmarked for replacement.

While the project over the past several months has forced drivers to make detours in neighborhoods and downtown, Gho said the

technology, movies, luxury cars, and for his endless sweet tooth... Layer's Death by Chocolate cake was his favorite!



■ Bones found in artichoke field have quite a story to tell

WHILE THE Monterey Bay's first humans didn't have the luxury of choosing among more than 100 local restaurants that offer dozens of different cuisines, their diet may have featured a delicacy unseen on any contemporary menu mammoth.

An archaeologist who works for California State Parks, Mark Hylkema will share insights about the massive mammals when he presents a talk, "Mammoth in the Artichokes," Saturday, Aug. 8, at the Pacific Grove Museum of Natural History. The event starts at 3 p.m.

In 2011, an artichoke farmer was grading his land in Castroville with heavy equipment when he saw a bone he thought might be significant. Since then, the property which has not been publicly identified — has fascinated archaeologists.

Besides the first bone, which belonged to a Columbian mammoth, archaeologists have also discovered bones from a mastodon and at least three other prehistoric species of mam-

While it's unknown when the mammoth roamed the future artichoke fields of North Monterey County, Hylkema told The Pine Cone some interesting details about the animal. It was a male, it was about 45 when it died, and — thanks to a sample found at the site — its hair was about the same color as an Irish setter, Hylkema said. But unfortunately, due to the dampness of the soil in which it was found, experts were unable to carbon date its age, he added.

What was their diet?


Researchers want to know if the early humans along the Central California coast ate mammoths, which they clearly did in other parts of the world. "It's very possible the bones here are connected to human activity, but we haven't found any evidence of that yet," he explained.

Based on the discovery the Arlington Springs Man on Santa Rosa Island, archaeologists believe humans have been in California for at least 13,000 years. Mammoths are thought to have gone extinct between 18,000 and 11,000 years ago, Hylkema said.

Early humans are often blamed for driving mammoths and other large mammals to extinction. But Hylkema isn't so

"I have a theory," the archeologist said. "I think where people go, bacteria goes. The early humans also brought domestic dogs with them. And they also carried bacteria. I think that's probably what killed the mammoths."

It's questions like these that make archaeology so interesting for Hylkema and his colleagues. "Bones are part of the landscape, and that landscape has stories to tell," he added.



Fight over Carmel Belle gets messy as landlord files for eviction

THE LANDLORD for Carmel Belle began the process of evicting the owners of the Doud Arcade restaurant Thursday, a week after the restaurant owners filed suit against him, an attorney for the landlord told The Pine Cone.

On July 27, Carmel Belle owners Chloe and Jay Dolata filed suit against landlord TSD Carmel Properties and its president, John Plastini, for breach of contract and other allegations related to their operation of the well known restaurant on San Carlos Street. Plastini, the son-in-law of the late Doud Arcade founder, Toland S. Doud, has managed the property since 1989.

On Thursday, though, Jeannette Witten, an attorney who represents the family that owns the Doud Arcade, said she was planning to file an "unlawful detainer" action in Monterey County Superior Court against the Dolatas for vio-

lating their lease by "routinely" closing the restaurant before 7 p.m.

Plastini "has worked with the Dolatas through a number of lease issues," Witten said. "All of the issues surrounding the Dolatas stem from them not adhering to the terms of their lease and failing to see how their behavior can cause harm to their neighbors and co-tenants."

Witten also rejected the Dolatas' lawsuit, which accuses Plastini "of hounding, following, spying upon, watching and obsessively focusing his attention" on Carmel Belle, "and harassing and interrogating" its staff "seemingly for the purpose of seeking out petty and immaterial issues." They contend the behavior has interfered with their ability to operate the restaurant.

Witten said Carmel Belle's lawsuit is rife with "fabrications and slanderous statements," and she said the Doud family has a reputation for being "patient, kind and generous"

andlords.

"John Plastini bends over backward to ensure the success of the Doud Arcade tenants," Witten added. "I've heard the Doud family members say many times that the group of business owners in the Doud Arcade are like family to them, and that is how they are treated."

Witten said Carmel Belle's lawsuit was filed "strategical-

ly," because the Dolatas "knew their behavior was marching them toward eviction," and that the complaint was an attempt to achieve leverage in the unlawful detainer the Douds filed Thursday.

Witten said Carmel Belle's early closures, which she said

Witten said Carmel Belle's early closures, which she said were as early as 2:50 p.m. this week, "kill the foot traffic and have been hurting the other small-business owners in the Doud Arcade."

Andy Swartz, the attorney for the Dolatas, could not be reached for comment Thursday afternoon.

originally made her complaint when she filed it with the California Department of Fair Employment and Housing in December 2013.

In that complaint, she said she suffered a hostile work environment and retaliation while working for Carmel.

"I was subjected to demeaning comments regarding women and gender harassment in the form of swearing, foul language, and officers laughing at a video regarding the officers' response to a hanging, all creating a hostile work environment," she said.

And when she told her superiors about the "unlawful behavior," as well as discrimination in the form of giving male workers better shifts, Hidalgo claimed, memos regarding counseling and discipline were put in her file, and she was assigned additional work, refused requests to attend medical appointments, wasn't allowed to use the restroom or take meal breaks while working in dispatch, and wasn't given day shifts. She said that in July 2013, her paychecks were cut

off, and then she lost her medical, dental and vision benefits at the end of August.

In the claim filed with the fair employment department, she also wrote, "Toxic environment unhealthy mentally unable to continue doing my job there with the way the staff lets employees act toward citizens, employees etc. Stress

And in a subsequent complaint she filed May 22 of this year, Hidalgo said she was denied the right to return to work, based on "her disability or perceived disability," after she obtained a doctor's release in June 2014.

"Her employer demanded as a condition of returning from medical leave that she undergo a psychiatric fitness for duty examination which was not job related or required by any business necessity," according to the claim. "She was also denied reasonable accommodation, and her employer did not engage in an interactive process in good faith."

Finally, she was given a notice of termination Feb. 25, "based on her disability and alleged job abandonment." Hidalgo said she believed those actions were all retaliatory.

On Tuesday, city attorney Don Freeman announced the claims she filed with the state, as well as with the U.S. Equal Employment Opportunity Commission, had been settled, with Hidalgo and attorney Michelle Welsh receiving \$125,000.

In the settlement, the city "denied all charges made by Hidalgo," and the payout means she gives up her right to file any more claims or lawsuits against the city.

No one from the police department wanted to comment on

the settlement, but city administrator Doug Schmitz said he was pleased to see it resolved.

"One year ago, there were five personnel cases that the city was addressing. The city council has been steadfast in its direction to [city attorney] Don Freeman and me to get these matters resolved and behind the organization," Schmitz said

With three previous employees rehired and the case involving the late IT manager Steve McInchak settled, he said, "the conclusion of this matter provides the opportunity for us to move forward and focus on other issues."

Hanson walks out

But days before he said that, John Hanson, the former building official who sued the city after he was wrongfully fired in the summer of 2013 and got his job back late last year, suddenly quit this week. Because he'd been employed by the city so long, he qualifies for a pension, so his departure is officially a "retirement."

A project manager in public works, Hanson was out on medical leave, having undergone three different surgeries on his ankle, and just returned to work Monday.

The catalyst for his departure was a conversation that same day. In an office while talking with coworkers, Hanson made some pointed comments about the way city is run, and was later told that his remarks might have constituted legal harassment of a new city employee who heard them. The comments weren't directed toward the new employee or about her, but they nonetheless raised concern.

"I'm not a wallflower, and we're talking about the city," including gripes about it, he said. In part, Hanson was frustrated by the fact he hadn't been told what his work schedule was or to whom he was supposed to report.

The next morning, Hanson said, Carmel Police Cmdr. Paul Tomasi advised him, "I have to warn you that you possibly have a harassment case against you."

"I haven't been there 24 hours!" Hanson said. "Why would you send a police officer to come talk to me? And he's telling me I'm possibly going to be accused of harassment!" Hanson said he apologized to the employee, and she told

him she never said anything about harassment but merely noted he had been upset. Angry over the whole affair, and openly critical of the

police chief, commander, public works director and others in the city, Hanson went to Schmitz' office to talk to him.

"My blood pressure went up. I thought I was going to have a heart attack and die," he said. "It's not worth it to me, so I

Hanson has no love left for the city that he once considered his home — and which presented him the Key to the City upon his return from a National Guard tour of duty in Iraq, named him Employee of the Year and gave him other similar accolades during his quarter-century of employment.

"I'm tempted to give those all back," he said. "This place is horrible. I will probably never return to the city."

Schmitz, meanwhile, said Hanson will be missed by his coworkers and friends at city hall.

"I am happy for John. These past few years have been difficult for him with his termination and then ankle surgeries," he said. "He will be missed by his fellow city employees and by the community, and we wish him the very best in his retirement. He was always willing to take on new projects, and his 'can do' attitude is a tribute to the type of person that he is."

Only one Peninsula restaurant, Mission Ranch in Carmel, has been issued a monetary fine. On July 14, Stoldt said Mission Ranch was given a \$100 ticket for a second offense.

"The patron [who witnessed the violation] was a water district employee, so it was pretty easy," Stoldt said, adding that the employee just happened to be dining at the restaurant and was not undercover at the time.

However, Stoldt said that district operatives did go back to Mission Ranch early this week to make sure the restaurant was in compliance.

"To Mission Ranch's credit," Stoldt said, "not only did they not try to serve water, they didn't ask if we wanted any."

Stoldt said he was unaware of any other water district in the state that is using such tactics, and the agency's water conservation manager, Stephanie Locke, said only a handful of the state's 411 water suppliers are issuing citations to

"While we don't like the public-shaming idea," Stoldt said, "it helps us get the story out that fines are being written and that certain restaurants are on notice."

Fines for wasting water on the Peninsula don't only affect restaurants, but the general public, too.

They apply "to all water waste, not just water service in a restaurant," Stoldt said. "For example, unfixed sprinkler heads, water in the street, hose watering on the wrong days/times, washing sidewalks, and irrigating within 48 hours of rain.'

The district also says it would like to ramp up its undercover operation.

"We would like to be more active," Locke said. "Particularly, if drought continues, we will really need to get the message out to the community."

Farr's aide replaces photo lost in fire

AFTER LOSING most of her belongings in the Pfeiffer Fire in 2013, Big Sur Volunteer Fire Chief Martha Karstens has slowly been reassembling the photographs that document her life. And thanks to the efforts of Congressman Sam Farr's office, Karstens again has a photo she thought was lost forever.

A year and a half after the blaze that destroyed 34 homes — including Karstens' and scorched more than 900 acres, Farr aide Alec Arago managed to find a copy of a photo of Karstens posing with then-First Lady Hillary Clinton. The image was taken in 1998, when President Bill Clinton, his family and members of his staff visited the Monterey Peninsula.

Karstens had volunteered to be a driver in the caravan of cars that transported the president and others to the Monterey Bay Aquarium and other local destinations. Like other drivers, she was told she would have an opportunity to pose for a picture with the president, but when that didn't work out, she settled for a photo with Mrs. Clinton, who is now running for president.

Like so many other things in her house, Karstens thought the picture of her and the first lady was gone forever. So you can imagine her surprise upon receiving a copy of the image from Arago.

"He has able to track down the photo after all these years," Karstens told The Pine Cone. "He doggedly kept pursuing it. I am delighted. Bless you, Alec."

While Karstens lost many keepsakes in the fire — hers was the first home to burn in the blaze — she saved a priceless collection of photos her father, Jim Ziegler, had taken in Carmel Valley in the mid-20th century. By a sheer stroke of luck, Karstens donated many of her father's images to the Carmel Valley History Center a short time before the fire. Taken over several decades, the images capture Carmel Valley's cowboy culture.

Karstens said she hopes others will be inspired by her example and do more to save or preserve their own photos. "Just look at all the homes that have been lost to fire," said Karstens. "Did the people who lived in those homes document everything they had? Did they make copies of their photos?"

The Carmel Youth Center and the Mission Trail Lions Club will be running the four 12-passenger vans, which will circulate about every 10 minutes, according to Tomasi. "We will have to see how long, based on loading and unloading, but with it being a short route, we think we can maintain about a 10-minute interval," he said.

City administrator Doug Schmitz said Friday the city is undertaking other measures to make the week run as smoothly as possible, including ordering extra dumpsters and portable restrooms to accommodate the anticipated crowds, arranging to have the downtown streets swept every morning, and having the sidewalks from Junipero to Monte Verde between Fifth and Eighth avenues power washed with non-potable water from the city's tank during the several days prior to Concours Week.

Plans for garbage service during the week were also being hammered out.

Furthermore, city officials decided to ban the use of drones during the two events, "due to safety concerns."

Monterey street closures

"Anyone who lives, works, visits or goes to school in Monterey should be prepared for traffic delays and detours during Car Week," Monterey officials warned this week. "Downtown Monterey, Lighthouse Avenue, Foam Street and Cannery Row will experience higher-than-normal traffic as car carriers make their way through the city and auto enthusiasts from around the world converge on the area for car auctions and auto shows."

City officials recommended people who have to be in and around Monterey to take alternative routes, park outside the center of town and walk, and use the free MST trolley between downtown and Cannery Row.

Closures scheduled for the week include:

- one lane of Del Monte Avenue between Washington and Alvarado streets Aug. 8-17 from 7 a.m. to 9 p.m.;
- the driveway entrance to the Portola Hotel Aug. 13-15; and
- Cannery Row between Hoffman and Drake Aug. 12-15 from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m., and the entire length of Cannery Row Aug. 14 from 2 to 10 p.m.

MCCVB traffic overview

parking near Pine."





In the meantime, beach fires have continued unabated, and summer weather has drawn thousands of people to the shore, where many of them have settled in beside fires in the sand during the evenings. As a result, more complaints have poured in to the city regarding the fires and smoke, and a letter calling for an immediate moratorium was signed by 157 people — including four former mayors and three sitting members of the forest and beach commission — was delivered to the city Monday.

"Lack of action suggests the city endorses the continued defacing of our beach and beach bluff and endorses subjecting residents and visitors to these high levels of harmful smoke particles," the letter read. "An urgency ordinance would give relief until the pilot can be tried, and new levels tested. Then we could make adjustments as needed."

The signers also asked, "What can be more important in terms of urgency than the health of our citizens and visitors from the threat they face today due to the smoke from unrestricted beach fires?'

While council members discussed the issue at length during their Aug. 3 meeting on a comprehensive study of the shoreline that included beach fires, they couldn't take any action that night, so they scheduled a hearing for late afternoon Aug. 6.

At the standing-room-only meeting, new public works director Rob Mullane presented three different potential urgency ordinances that would have a ban take place immediately: a prohibition of all fires except propane fires and charcoal grills, a ban on fires Friday through Sundays or holidays, or the immediate implementation of the pilot plan. He also noted a fourth option: requiring the fires to be built much farther from the Scenic Road bluffs than the 25 feet called for in

the current ordinance (a rule that is rarely followed, as it is). The moratorium would be in effect for 45 days, unless extended again by the council next month, in which case it would be in place for a year.

City attorney Don Freeman suggested the weekend ban, and Richard Stedman from the Monterey Bay Air Pollution Control District said that would effectively reduce the most problematic nights.

In preparation for their Thursday meeting, council members asked for data on the people building fires at the beach, as well as air-quality readings from a monitor placed on private property on Scenic Road in June.

According to information collected by security guards working weekends at the beach, 397 fires were counted in June, and 509 were counted in July. Many of those visitors live in the county, but not in Carmel, Talmage noted.





ment to the city's birthday party — and could even result in "a possible reduction in the number of people who roll pumpkins down Ocean Avenue during the weeks surrounding

To ensure no one is inadvertently taken out by a runaway winter squash or otherwise harmed, city workers will set up a closed pumpkin-rolling course.

Therefore, Ocean Avenue will be shut down from 9 a.m. to 6:30 p.m. between Santa Rita and Junipero, as will Santa Fe between Ocean and Mountain View, and Torres between Sixth and Mountain View.

Unlike the casual practice of rolling a pumpkin down Ocean in the darkness of night to see how far it will get - or which car it will smash against — the city-sanctioned affair will have all the trappings of an official competition. The street will be lined with hay bales and fencing to prevent pumpkins from veering off course and keep spectators out of their way.

'Staff estimates the event will need approximately 140 6-foot barrier fencing panels for the perimeter of the course, and approximately 250 hay bales inside the fencing for the rolling lane," Bombard said in her report.

Participants will need a permit to roll their pumpkins, and they'll get their special cards hole-punched when they select their squash from a truckload parked at Ocean and Santa Fe. "Pumpkins will be limited in size to no bigger than a basketball and no more than 10 pounds," according to the rules.

Some of the pumpkins will roll to a halt or break apart along the way, but the "winners" that make it all the way to the end will land in a decorated "debris box" at the foot

"City staff will be stationed at the top of the hill to maintain safety, and control the number of pumpkins rolled at one time," Bombard said. "The debris box will be decorated and may feature a large Jack-o-lantern and other targets for pumpkin rollers to aim at. Plywood wings will be positioned in front of the debris box to help guide the pumpkins into the box. Water barricades will be placed behind the wings as additional supports."

The actual contest will run from 2:30 to 4:30 p.m., with the street cleaned up and reopened by 6:30.

At Tuesday's meeting, resident Richard Kreitman asked if it was smart to close the city's main street for the whole day on Halloween, which falls on a Saturday this year. "It's not against pumpkin rolling, it's if there's another place to roll them," he said.


"It's true we're closing part of Ocean; however, part of the plan is to have a really robust detour and signage plan in place," as well as traffic control, Bombard responded. Furthermore, residents and businesses in the area were notified, and the community activities and cultural commission voted in favor of the event and street closures.

This has gone through both staff review and CACC review, as has been noted, and is bringing back a Carmel-by-the-Sea tradition," Mayor Jason Burnett said. "We're planning to try it out this year. We'll see how it goes, and the council will have the opportunity to make a decision about future years."

With that, the council unanimously voted to approve the pumpkin rolling and required street closures.

Councilman Steve Dallas, who grew up here and has been a big proponent of making the competition official, said after the meeting that he's excited to see the tradition sanctioned.

"It'll be fun!" he said.



Speakers generally fell into two different camps: those wanting to delay further in hopes of coming up with another design, and those who wanted to proceed with the approved plans.

"I believe there is some permutation of the theme that would be more acceptable and consistent with a 'light touch," resident Gil Lucero commented.

But forest and beach commissioner Karen Ferlito expressed fatigue with the whole process.

"We've hired a very competent architect who's done everything possible to save trees and give us what we need to get the theater opened," she said. "I'm getting tired of it and would like to see it get finished sooner rather than later. We're never going to have a perfect project, but I think we have a pretty good one, if we just get it done."

Resident Carolyn Hardy, who was a member of a community group that analyzed the project, said the council should respect the planning commission's decision last week to recommend the city council stay committed to the design it already approved.

"Your planning commission thoughtfully analyzed and debated and talked about every possible way to address this, and came up with the recommendation that you stay the course," she said, with only modifications to

soften some of the areas next to the retaining walls by using more fill dirt.

Walt deFaria of the Forest Theater Foundation said the nonprofit simply wants to see the theater reopened as soon as possible — and then work on the master plan to address all the issues farther down the road.

"The plan you have, I think it's agreed, is not perfect, in so many different ways," he said. "It does not solve all the different problems that are there, but it does get it open."

"I would love for you to take that extra step and make sure you get it right," countered resident Vinz Koller.

Councilwoman Carrie Theis said the entire site is complicated, and the city has already put a lot of time and money into the

"It's got trees, it's got grades, it has hills, it's historic. It's hugely complicated, and I have to respect what the architect has done and the time he's put into it," she said. Beach and councilman Ken Talmage

argued for paying the architect another \$50,000 to design more alternative plans.

'Given a little more time, I think, we're almost there," Beach said of the design.

Beach made a motion to extend the contract and pay another \$50,000 for design

But councilman Dallas made a substitute motion to proceed with the project already approved, and after some further discussion the council voted 3-2 in favor of Dallas'



Santiago also claims that after he was injured on the job, his employer did not give him worker's compensation or disability benefits and forced him to return to work even though he was only given a brief time to recover.

The lawsuit doesn't offer details regarding Santiago's allegations of prison guard-sanctioned boxing matches between inmates, but says the state prison system had an "illegal scheme of skimping on safety (specifically, for example, glare from lights and illegal boxing matches and gambling)."

The case is set for a December hearing.

type, as some others do.

Cipponeri's proposal states it will accept vendors selling fruits and vegetables, nuts, breads, meats, cheeses, eggs, flowers and locally prepared hot foods, but not those offering crafts, cottage foods, "overly processed and/or fried foods," nationally distributed packaged foods, meat and dairy products treated with growth hormones, and items not grown or processed by the vendor.

"Is that enough protection?" Talmage asked. "I don't want to see handmade cutting boards with pink frogs on them."

Theis assured him it was.

Pacific Repertory Theatre executive director Stephen Moorer said his was one of the rejected proposals, and he thought it was unfair to grant the contract to Cipponeri without allowing him to submit again.

"It doesn't seem fair ... that we weren't allowed to apply under the new guidelines," he said.

Representing the farm, which has been in the same family for four generations, Peter Cipponeri said the business formed an LLC so it could operate farmers markets in the state

"We've been selling fruit at the Carmel farmers market since its inception," he said. "We're looking forward to bringing a lot more organic produce to the farmers market."

He said his farm's connections with other growers in the state will benefit the Carmel market.

"We want to continue to bring the freshest produce possible to people in Carmel-by-the-Sea," he said.

According to the proposal, Cipponeri will create a brand for the market, build a website for it, collaborate with local businesses, and will handle signs and advertising.

He will also offer Market Bucks to encourage people to shop there.

The company has a set of rules governing all of its markets, including prohibitions on loud music and product hawking, and price collusion.

The council unanimously approved the contract with Cipponeri.

applicants wanted to replace grass lawns with artificial turf.

"I don't think that's a 'significant upturn," she said, referring to the characterization made by some regarding the number of applications for fake lawns and the subsequent need for a moratorium. "I do think there are people who are very conscientious about wanting to save water."

She said she thought artificial turf should be permitted if it's not visible to the public.

Ferlito, meanwhile, worried about what would happen when people no longer have to irrigate their lawns.

"If the tree or trees that they have in their yards have gotten used to water over the years, and then they all of a sudden install artificial turf so they turn the water off, that, too, can be very detrimental to a tree that's been raised with water," she said.

She also said "many people" have illegally installed artificial turf on their properties, and she urged the council to keep its temporary ban on fake lawns.

"I think you're doing the prudent thing in taking the time for planning," she said, "rather then just permitting, and then being sorry for it."

Without further discussion, the council unanimously voted to extend the moratorium. Under state law, before it comes to an end in June 2016, the council will have the opportunity to impose the emergency ban for an additional year. After listening to evidence and preparing findings to comply with state environmental law, they can also ban the stuff permanently, if they want to.


work has gone smoothly. The city scheduled most of the work around the Peninsula's special events, he said.

"We have had [the city's] crews managing the project, and they've done a wonderful job making sure residents aren't impacted and that their needs are met," he said.

However, the completion of this project doesn't mark the end of the city's sewer work. In the fall, the city will solicit bids from contractors for work on Pacific Grove's storm water system. That work will be focused in the area around the city's Community Center, which is on Junipero Avenue.

comes primarily from residents of Monterey County who have limited or no access in their own communities to beach fires," he said, because beach fires have been banned or severely restricted on their own beaches. "An estimated 10 percent of the fires on our beach are by Carmel-by-the-Sea residents."

And air-quality data indicated a few spikes in particulate matter smaller than 2.5 microns — the size small enough to get through a person's lungs and cause illness and even death — well beyond what are considered safe levels for sensitive groups, like children and people with health issues.

Fourth of July weekend was the highest, with an hourly average Saturday night that exceeded 150 micrograms per cubic meter, while safe levels are below 40. Smaller spikes appeared on other weekends, with one just in excess of 100 and one around 90.

The beach-fire issue has generated a lot of passion on both sides, generating dozens of impassioned emails — 90 percent of which favored some sort of ban, Mullane said and drawing a large crowd to Thursday's meeting. Some have said that if the city doesn't deal with the problem, the federal government will take control of the beach.

'Some people will always want wood fires on Carmel's beach and will argue that beach fires are a tradition," Talmage said. But the crowds now far exceed what they've been in the past. "The status quo is not defensible."

Pt. Lobos plan's faults **Dear Editor**

The proposals for Point Lobos Ranch, in general, are inconsistent with the purposes for which the land was acquired: to maintain a mountain lion preserve and protect the land from development (other than possibly recreational hiking).

A life with cars: Please, allow him to illustrate

YOU'VE PROBABLY seen the works of El Greco. You've also seen at least one work by local artist Ed Greco, although you may not know it. Every year starting in mid-June, ubiquitous commercials and ads tout one of the county's biggest events, the California Rodeo Salinas. Greco created the logo with the cowboy holding his saddle. It's been around for more than 40 years.

Greco discovered his love of art while growing up in San Jose. His sense of humor

goes back that far, too. He remembered an art class in the Catholic elementary school he attended. There were predictable pictures of praying hands and rosaries, but Greco went in another direction. He said, "I had a guy in a pith hel-

met coming toward you in a canoe on the Amazon. There were alligators coming up out of the water everywhere!'

The nuns did not approve. The told him that they "needed something more uplifting."

Undaunted, Greco sold his first illustrations while he was in high school, and also made money painting custom signs for people. He never intended to make a living as an artist, however, and graduated from Santa Clara University's school of business.

Greco's family had a summer home here and they enjoyed their visits. Not long after graduation, he heard about an opening in a marketing agency and moved to the Monterey Peninsula. That was 50 years ago.

He soon started his own firm, which went through various incarnations with different partners over the years. He often used his talent to create illustrations for brochures and other materials. Greco's clientele included defense contractors like Northrop Grumman, banks and small businesses.

'Marketing is marketing," he said. "It's the same steps whether it's a huge milliondollar client or Joe's barbershop." He said he liked interviewing clients and coming up with "big picture" ideas for them.

Though he's still energetic at 71, Greco's mostly retired now. He and Nikki, his wife of 45 years, live near Quail Lodge. They have three adult daughters, and it was one of them who suggested he use his newfound free time to focus on his artwork.

Greco's also a self-described "car guy." In college, he and his buddies would go to road races on the weekends, and he has memories of the Pebble Beach Concours going back to the 1950s. His own collection includes a 1955 Jaguar XK140, a Ferrari and a Porsche, all of which he enjoys driving.

The intersection of his love of cars and art can be seen at the third annual Carmel Mission Classic on Wednesday from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m., when he'll be exhibiting around 20 of his automotive-themed works.

Greco got involved with the Classic last year. He's a member of the parish and was asked if he would show his paintings. He agreed, and also offered to create a special poster that could be auctioned off at the event, which raises money for the Knights of Columbus' charitable work.

Greco's a big fan of Norman Rockwell

and it shows in this year's poster. A monk in Franciscan garb is shown looking up as he paints a picture of a car in front of the Mission. The style is unmistakably Rockwell's, right down to the bemused expression on the monk's face. The lettering at the top is a nod to the Saturday Evening

"I like it when there's a little story in an illustration," he said. Like Rockwell, he often slips in whimsical details. He showed a painting he did of a vintage race car in the pits. The driver is depicted from behind, standing aside as the crew services his car. It's clear he's enjoying a drink, and you might assume it's water. But if you look at the table on his right, you'll see the wine bot-


Greco's work isn't limited to cars. He's done landscapes and seascapes. He also has many paintings of cowboys of the old West another favorite subject of his.

He recently completed an installation in the Mora Chapel at the Mission. It's titled, "In His Own Words: Excerpts from Father Serra's Diaries and Letters." The centerpiece of the 4.5-foot-by-18-foot work is a large painting of Father Serra.

The padre, who will be canonized this fall, is seen striding across a field of golden grass in a white robe, with a sun hat partially obscuring his face. On the left side, excerpts of his writings are arranged with Greco's illustrations. A map of the nine missions Serra founded completes the mural on the right side.

The same chapel is home to Mora's pencil drawings of six of those nine missions, and Greco was invited to add the three that were missing. "I think I'm in pretty good company," he said with a smile.



■ 50 Years Ago — August 12, 1965

Boy Rides Bicycle Across the United States

On Saturday, a 1965 Carmel High School graduate and student body president arrived at Mackinac Island, Michigan, after covering 2,800 miles in 26 days on a bicycle. The young bicyclist was Tom Hudson Jr., son of Monterey County Supervisor Thomson Jay Hudson and his wife, Jane. Last spring, Tom heard a Moral Re-Armament presentation at Carmel High. It made him want to go to the MRA Mackinac Island demonstration this summer to meet the youth there and "see what we can do for America."

Tom reports he had few incidents on his journey to Michigan. He carried his sleeping bag and tarpaulin on his bicycle, and slept by the roadside en route, mostly in parks.

"One day," he says, "I got a ticket for going 72 miles an hour in a 70-mile zone"— and he has a ticket to prove it. However, he admits he was going downhill at the time.

He had to buy a new bicycle in Denver because he had worn out his old one. He says he never had to go into lowest gear, even in the mountains, and that he inspected colleges and universities along his route.

Statues Destroyed

Some statues, worth \$5,786, were destroyed at a Brazilian art gallery on Sixth Street west of Dolores during the weekend. Facet of Brazil reported the damage to police Aug. 5. When the manager closed the gallery Aug. 3, the sculptures, which include replicas of gazelles and women made out of marble and granite-like substances, were in normal condition, the police report says.

By Sunday, the report continues, arms and other body parts were broken off the statues. No sign of entry has yet been determined. Police plan to continue their investigation.







The new Surf N Sand, Fifi's does Rhones, and Bistro Beaujolais is back

WE WANTED to make this place worth coming to, again," Ryan Sanchez said of his Surf N Sand store, which is undergoing the finishing touches on a major overhaul. "We're trying to get people back to this corner."

That corner is Junipero and Sixth, the property that includes Bruno's Market in the front and Surf N Sand in the back. While Bruno's has been in the family for nearly 35

years, since Sanchez' grandfather purchased it in 1981, Surf N Sand — then a pharmacy and sundry store — came into the fold in 2003.

Since then, it's had a few incarnations. When Sanchez took over 12 years ago, he transferred the prescriptions to Safeway and replaced the VHS rentals with DVDs (much to the confusion of many of those who patronized it, so he ended up selling and installing DVD players, too, to introduce locals to the "new" technology). Surf N Sand also became a go-to liquor store, with high volume and competitive pricing, and in 2008, he obtained a permit to host wine-tasting.

The store was doing well until a few years ago, when he stepped away from the day-to-day operations to do other work and focus on being a new dad. The stock slowly dwindled, and customers went elsewhere.

But that's all changing, now.

"It was hurting from all the time away from it," Sanchez said. "I've been working on a little makeover, to rebrand it and offer competitive pricing, and to be creative."

The result is a serious, dedicated liquor store carrying a wide selection of domestic and international wines — including some hard-to-find bottles, several different Champagnes, large formats like magnums and double magnums, and half bottles (perfect for picnics and those evenings when you only want a glass or two) — Bourbons, Scotches, other whiskies, tequilas (including Sanchez' own high-quality brand, El Jefe), gins, vodkas, sakes, Ports, and other hard liquors and mixers.

"And craft beers are such a big thing, now," he added. "Now we have a large enough selection that we can promote it as being the largest craft-beer store in town."

He's also focusing on dispelling the idea that, because the store is in Carmel, everything is more expensive. Taking a cue from BevMo's prices, Sanchez is pricing his products competitively in hopes of drawing back customers who have drifted to the big-box store.

Sanchez also said his time away from the store, when he was working for other entrepreneurs, taught him a lot about how to make his business successful, and he's directing that



energy to both Surf N Sand and Bruno's.

"I'm bringing a lot of experience, what I learned from my grandfather, on my own and from entrepreneurs," he said. "I'm trying to polish this and make these two stores a lot better than what they once were."

And, recognizing the value of superlative customer service, he's putting his sales staff through a craft-beer program and weekly wine seminars.

When everything's up and running, hopefully by September, the store will also begin hosting beer tasting on Wednesdays and winetasting on Thursdays.

And that's just the beginning of this new chapter, according to Sanchez, with more events and creative ideas to come.



■ Beaujolais is back

Not the wine, the restaurant.

Firok Shield, who also owns Da Giovanni on Lincoln Street and Bistro Giovanni on San Carlos Street, was finally able to reopen his restaurant in Carmel Plaza after it suffered significant damage in early May when hot-water heaters on the floor above failed on two occasions, flooding the restaurant not once, but twice.

The cost is \$30 for adults and \$10 for kids, with toddlers 2 and under free. Entry includes two drink tickets, the meal "and all the swim you can do." Tickets are available at the Carmel Valley Community Youth Center, 25 Ford Road in the Village.

■ Tudor opens shop

He couldn't get a license for winetasting, but Dan Tudor didn't let that stop him from opening a shop in "an intimate space inspired by wine cellar caves" in the Court of the Fountains, located on Mission Street behind Anton & Michel restaurant. The shop will offer everything except his small-batch wines, according to senior planner Marc Wiener.

"Tudor Wines was approved for a retail shop in the kiosk, which is a permitted use under the city's municipal code," he said. "The store will sell wine-related retail items with a small percentage of apparel. No wine will be sold from the shop."

Tudor, who specializes in small-batch Pinot Noir, comes from a family whose history of grape-growing goes back hundreds of years, to the village of Velo Grablje in Croatia. The Tudors began farming in California in the early 1900s and continue to operate one of the largest table-grape vineyards in the country, while Dan Tudor's foray into winemaking took place at Tepusquet Vineyards in the Santa Maria Valley in the early 1980s. In 1997, he launched Tudor Wines with his cousin, Christian, and their inaugural vintage of Tudor Santa Lucia Highlands Pinot Noir was 2000.

In spring 2014, Tudor embarked on the process of opening a tasting room in Carmel. But he ran up against a city guideline preferring wines grown and made in Monterey County, while his were being produced at a winery in Paso Robles, though they contained grapes grown in the Santa Lucia Highlands. After making changes to his operations and his licensing to meet the city's guidelines, Tudor was poised to receive approval, as recommended by Wiener, but the city council denied his permit in May of this year, citing a city policy that called for new tasting rooms to be located north of Ocean Avenue.

Now, without the winetasting component, Tudor is forging ahead and opening a "cozy

retail store [that] features all Tudor branded wine-related items, from corkscrews and logo glasses, to wine bags, gift trays, wine hats, shirts and fleece tops, high-end brand items, and even 3-liter bottles." Starting Friday, Aug. 7, the store will be open seven days a week, from 11:30 a.m. to 8 p.m.

His actual wines, meanwhile, can be found right next door at Anton & Michel, which offers a flight for tasting, as well as Tudor Wines by the glass and by the bottle. Andre's Bouchée just up the street also has the wine by the glass and by the bottle, and The Cheese Shop in Carmel Plaza sells it, as well.



One of the enduring games played by residents of Carmel is "Why, I could have bought that place for "X" dollars back in 19xx!" Hardly anyone who's been here for more than 15 years has failed to play this game. But the all time loser was a Frenchman named Honore Escolle who did, in fact, sell the square block on which CARMEL PLAZA now sits for \$10 in 1893. Honore had come from France in 1852 at the age of 15. He started a bakery and general store in Monterey, but his real passion was ranching and cattle, He bought the wooded hills at what is now the north end of Carmel, but his cows were outflanked by the deer, so he sold it. We don't know that his sale of the site of CARMEL PLAZA, then 27 lots and now 50 thriving shops, was a distress sale, but by then Honore was in his late fifties, had 14 children, and may have felt some pressure. Let's see, the real estate commission would have been 60¢ then, maybe \$600,000 now..."Why! We could have bought..." Written in 1987 & 1988, and previously published in The Pine Cone





"Flaps Up!" carries the subtitle, "Prose, Poetry and Pictures. The first sections of the book are about personalities and places in and around Carmel - everything from Robinson Jeffers to Pfeiffer Beach. Then there is a poignant shift with two pictures of Courtney around a short poem entitled "Alzheimer's." This is where Brunn begins a journey into the wilderness of Alzheimer's. The pictures capture Courtney's beauty.

Former Carmel resident, Victoria Smiser, (nee Hutchison) now living in San Francisco, describes Courtney as: "Tall, elegant, way beyond glamorous, sensational taste, funny, a little Murphy Brown long before Murphy

The poem captures something we know

but which is beyond our grasp unless we've been there:

I'm here You, too. Me gone. Not you.

So very vulnerable ...

Vulnerable. Of the 5.3 million Americans

with Alzheimer's, an estimated 5.1 million people are age 65 and older. It is the only cause of death in the top 10 illnesses in America that cannot be prevented, cured, or slowed. Howard Brunn takes these cold, antiseptic facts and tenderly turns them into warm subjective thoughts and memories.

In "Unconditional Love," he writes that even Alzheimer's can have its carryover

blessings of "memories that glow with gladness and a healthy heart"

Here is another touching poem that is untitled:

When you find me you will know who I am Because I am you and you are who I am

Brunn explains it this way: "Courtney and I can't be separated. But now she can never know who I am."

Courtney is in stage five of Alzheimer's. She can no longer converse or speak coherently, although she occasionally says words or phrases.

"She talks her own language," Brunn says.

He began noticing symptoms more than five years ago. There were mild changes in her memory and thinking ability.

"The real first stage in Alzheimer's is denial," Brunn says. "You just don't want to admit something so bad is happening to someone you love. She was never aware she had problems. Things just hit head on. We never had long discussions. The problems just took over."

Brunn is seeing that Courtney is getting the best care available. She is currently at Carmel Villa, a facility fully licensed to care for individuals with Alzheimer's disease and other forms of dementia. He visits her every day. Sometimes twice a day.

"She hasn't known who I am for a long time. I know she is aware of my presence," he says.

How does Brunn handle everything?

"I've learned how to compartmentalize. You just can't carry this around all the time."

Howard Brunn wrote "Flaps Up!" as an obvious tribute to Courtney. He also wants to personalize this dreaded disease that affects so many. And, he wants to raise money for Alzheimer's research. The book is available at Carmel Bay Company on Ocean at Lincoln.

Brunn's association with the store's owner, Barney Scollan, goes back more than 40 years. You can also receive the book by contacting Brunn directly. He will send you a copy, and inside will be an addressed, stamped envelope for

We do have comparative numbers for Del Rey Oaks, Marina, Pacific Grove, Pebble Beach and Seaside. Adding these together we find there were 19 fewer active listings from last year.

That does not appear to be a dramatic difference but

gives an indication of what has been going on in the overall market.

■ Leading Indicators — Gross Dollar Volume and Unit Sales

During the second quarter, both the gross dollar volume of real estate sales and the number of sales throughout the Monterey Peninsula declined from last year.

Gross dollar volume was down by almost \$45 million, or

10 percent, and the number of closed transactions declined by 85 deals or 20 percent.

Second quarter report: Shrinking inventory catching up with market

Normally, those declines would signal a weakening market, but it's not the case this time. Now, there simply are fewer choices for buyers. The Market Barometer, which measures the percentage of listings in escrow, is strong and also reflects the shrinking inventory.

Only Carmel Highlands had a meager barometer reading during the quarter of 8 percent. All of the other markets are above our good-market minimum of 20 percent headed by super strong readings of 71 percent in Seaside and 65 percent in Marina, with solid 41 percent readings in Monterey and Pacific Grove.

The high-end markets of Carmel-by-the-Sea, Pebble Beach and the Carmel Area all have readings in the 20 to 24

Prices

Median sales prices were up in seven of the 10 markets surveyed; however, the quarterly database is so thin we do not take the ups and downs too seriously. We have more faith in the annual comparison as true indicators.

We suggest, however, that the Distribution of Sales Chart has a lot to tell us. We leave it up to you to play with the many combinations available. One number we find interesting is that 125 sales out of the 326 closed deals during the quarter were over one million dollars, a full 37 percent of the closed transactions on the Monterey Peninsula.

Concours on the Avenue promises all sorts of surprises — and it's free

ARS GENERALLY not seen at other Concours Week events — from the 1950s surfer's perfect Woody and the diminutive three-wheeled micro car, to pristine muscle cars and well loved vehicles that have survived decades with the same family — are the focal point at the annual Carmel-by-the-Sea Concours on the Avenue set for Tuesday, Aug. 11. Add to those other captivating pieces of automotive history, the beloved Ferraris and Porsches, and drive-ins of race cars from Laguna Seca, and you understand just how event founders Doug and Genie Freedman meet their mission of providing "sophistication with a dash of fun."

Entering its ninth year, having raised more than \$260,000 for the Carmel Foundation, the daylong event has show cars of almost every era displayed for a judged concours in downtown Carmel.

"It's fantastic, and it's been a great partnership for a long time, now," said Doug Freedman.

That partnership predates the Concours on the Avenue by quite some time, as the Freedmans for years hosted parties for their fellow Ferrari Club enthusiasts. From that experience grew the idea of presenting an event in town on a day that was typically slow during Concours Week, which this year

begins with the Pre-Reunion races at Mazda Raceway Laguna Seca Aug. 8-9 and concludes with the Pebble Beach Concours d'Elegance Aug.

"I'm so thankful we've been part of so many smiles on so many faces," he said. "We've made so many friends that we didn't have. And we've connected the dots. We said from before Day 1 that we have the opportunity to connect the dots between the two weekends."

The Freedmans' event is unique for several reasons: It includes cars not found at other judged displays. It has some frivolity, in the form of mini cars and other "mechanized fun." It features a lot of local entries with interesting stories, and the owners are standing by, happy to talk to spectators. And it's free.

'An engaging mix'

"I feel really good about where we've arrived in terms of our engaging mix of vehicles," Freedman said, adding that the show has 211 entries this year. "It's an event that's all over the map, from post-World War II, right through '73 for mutlimarques, and Ferraris and Porsches through '89."

Categories for "multi-marques," which span 1940 to 1973, include American Luxury, American Sport, Continental and European Sport, American Family Favorites, Hot Rod, Muscle Car, Historic Race, Italian Sport, Micro Car, Motorcycle, British Sport, British and European Luxury, and British, European and Japanese Family Favorites. Porsche has several classes of its own, for cars built 1948 and 1989, as does Ferrari,





So often, it's the little things in life that make people happy

'T REALLY does put smiles on people's faces," said volunteer Charles Davis of the Little Car Show. The cars aren't "jawdropping," like a pristine Dusenberg or Ferrari, said Davis, but there's just something about them that warms people's hearts.

The sixth annual show will be held on Wednesday, August 12, from noon to 5 p.m. in downtown Pacific Grove, and this year it's going to be "The Little Car Show +." The "plus" is the addition of a new class — Orphan Cars of the

Marina Motorsports, the nonprofit that puts on

the show, decided to add the category because it's another segment of collectible cars that's often overlooked, but that brings back happy memories for spectators.

Davis explained that "orphan" means the car's manufacturer no longer exists. Cars can be any size and examples would be Crosley, Nash and Hudson. The orphan autos will be exhibited in a special section, on their own city block.

As in previous years, electric cars are also welcome to participate, regardless of size.

The show's mainstay, of course, will continue to be classic little cars, defined as those 40 years or older, with an engine displacement of less than 1,601 cubic centimeters. In other words, small.

That limit was set for the Little Car Show so that Porsche 356s, with their 1,600 cc engines, could participate.

The 356s are significant because they were Porsche's first production vehicles. Other popular little cars include the classic Fiat 500L and the Honda S500.

Local exhibitors include Pierre Bain of Fandango, who will show his Citroen 2CV and John Aliotti from Victorian Corner, who owns a 1959 Morris mini woody station wagon. Buck and Eugenia Jones of Pacific Grove will bring their 1955 Porsche.

The Batmobile, Mercuries, Cher and the Concours — through the master's eyes

HEN GEORGE Barris was born in the mid-1920s, Henry Ford's Model Ts were still rolling off the assembly line. And as Ford famously said, you could have one in any color as long as it was black.

It would be years before an array of options to personalize cars would be available to most people, but George and his late brother, Sam, wouldn't have to wait.

They helped out in the family restaurant, and in his spare time, George developed a passion for assembling model cars and airplanes. He won design and construction competitions.

The family was grateful for the boys' help and knew George's talent for tinkering, so they gave the brothers a 1925 Buick that needed some TLC. Not content merely to make it roadworthy, the brothers straightened the body, added accessories, and painted it orange with blue

It was the beginning of a beautiful partnership.

They hung out at other people's body shops and learned all they could. By the 1940s, George had opened a place of his own in Los Angeles, and Sam joined him after being discharged from the Navy at the end of World War II.

The war's end brought a resurgence of interest in custom cars and hot rods. George and Sam hit their stride just in time to take advantage of the rising demand. When Bob Hirohata brought in his 1951 Mercury to have it customized, the brothers admired its sleek curves.

George said the 1951 design was considerably different from that of its predecessors. "There was so much to change to make the look the customer wanted," in the earlier mod-

In this case, George said, "We wanted to make the whole design follow the flow of the fenders." Among other things, they added tunnel headlights and replaced the square grill with one that was rounded off.

Hirohata showed the car at the 1952 Motorama, where it attracted a lot of attention. And Barris said he hopes that, more than 60 years later, it will bring a thrill to guests who see it — and other custom Mercuries — on the grass at Pebble Beach on Sunday, Aug. 16.

It's not Barris' first time showing cars at Pebble Beach. In one of the more unusual exhibits the Concours has seen over the years, he brought some of the many cars he designed for television and movies.

Although he built the Monkee Mobile, the Munsters' car (with a special seat in the rear for little Eddie), and cars seen in "The Beverly Hillbillies," he's probably best known as the creator of the Batmobile for the original "Batman" series, starring Adam West.

"It pleases everybody," Barris said of the car. Clearly, he's still delighted by it himself.





Phil Hill Scholarship recipient restores a Moon Motorcar for the Cd'E

August 7, 2015

HEN THE 1917 Moon 645 Cloverleaf Roadster rolls onto the 18th Fairway at the Pebble Beach Concours d'Elegance, Jared Coho, 23, can take pride in knowing that he and his family made it happen — along with a little help from Phil Hill.

When racecar driver Hill succumbed to Parkinson's disease, just 11 days after the 2008 Concours, in honor and recognition of Hill's con-

tributions to the world of classic cars and motorsports, officials established the Pebble Beach Phil Hill Scholarships. And thus, they helped turn a legendary life in motorsports into a legacy.

Funded by proceeds from the Concours d'Elegance among them, a contribution by Hill's widow, Alma, and son Derek Hill - and administered by the Pebble Beach Company Foundation, these scholarships have since been distributed to several youths interested in pursuing the kinds of things that inspired Hill: anything and everything automotive or mechanical. One of those recipients was Coho.

The first time Hill got behind the wheel of a car, he

was 9 years old. Allegedly, he made it all the way around the block. Ten years later, in 1946, he went the distance to win his first race during a sports car rally through the San Fernando Valley. He later won three out of seven seasons at the Pebble Beach Road Race, three first finishes at Le Mans, as well as wins at both the Italian and the Belgian grand prix. In 1961, he became the first American to win the pinnacle of motorsports competitions: the Formula 1 World Drivers' Championship.

Coho never met Hill, but he met his son, Derek,

at McPherson College in Kansas, where Coho was pursuing a Bachelor of Science degree in Automotive Restoration Technology — the only such accredited four-year college program in the country. The younger Hill was attending a dinner, hosted by the College Automotive Restoration Students club at McPherson, for the first three recipients of the Phil Hill Scholarship: Kalila Haddad, Casey Maxon and Coho.

Gates of history open for a few nostalgic laps around Pebble Beach

HIS YEAR, you don't need a DeLorean to travel back in time, but you do need a Ferrari — and not just any old Ferrari will do.

Only about a dozen lucky owners of Ferraris driven in the original road races in Del Monte Forest will go for a cruise on the 1950 course starting at 10 a.m. Friday, Aug. 14.

Kandace Hawkinson, Concours' director of marketing and media relations, said that of course, the cars wouldn't be racing. "They'll be doing parade laps," she said. The event is open to the public.

The historic event, dubbed "Ferraris Retrace Pebble Beach Road Race Course," will take drivers and spectators back to an era more than 60 years in the past.

During the competition's first year, cars reached speeds of over 100 mph as they completed 50 laps on the 1.8-mile course. Phil Hill won the 1950 race, driving his Jaguar XK120 M. The course was lengthened to 2.1 miles in 1951, and the race became one of the first eight in the Sports Car Club of America's new National Sports Car Championship season.

Ferraris driven by Hill, Sterling Edwards, and Carroll Shelby took four of the seven Del Monte trophies awarded to winners of the race in the Forest, with Hill winning in both 1953 and 1955.

The roads were much as they are today. Turns were tight, and the relatively narrow lanes were lined with trees. At some points, drivers had to slow down to less than 30 mph to make the turns.

Parts of the course were unpaved, and spectator protection consisted of strategically placed hay bales the first year. Snow fencing was added in later seasons. According to Hawkinson, 15,000

spectators showed up in 1950, and the number rose to 30,000 as the event's popularity grew. The

Pine Cone's 1953 preview of the event urged spectators to use all four gates into the Forest to reduce traffic backups.

Even with the inherent dangers and large number of spectators, there were no fatalities until Ernie McAfee's accident in 1956 — his car left the course, went airborne and

slammed into a tree, killing him. That led to the end of racing in the Forest and the construction of Laguna Seca raceway on land purchased from the Army.

Anyone can drive almost the entire 1950 racecourse today — though sticking to posted speed limits is wise. Like European courses of the day, it ran clockwise. The start and finish line was on Portola Road, by the equestrian center. From there, the course took a right turn onto

Sombria Lane, and another right on Drake Road.

However, a section of the original course that extended Drake to what is now Forest Lake Road is closed to vehicles. Recently, Hawkinson took a reporter on a short walk along it.

It starts at a gate at Drake and Stevenson and is an uphill stretch of less than 75 yards of pitted, gouged pavement littered with rocks and branches, leading to the right turn onto Forest Lake. From there, dri-

vers would take a hard right onto Stevenson and then a left to the finish line back on Portola.

Hawkinson said they were going to do a little work on the stretch of road to avoid damage to any of the cars.

A highlight of the event, portrayed on this year's Concours d'Elegance poster, is the return of Jim Kimberly's 1949 166 Mille Miglia, the first Ferrari to be raced in Pebble Beach.

Kimberly was an heir to the Kimberly-Clark fortune. In the 20th lap of the 1951 race, he flipped his car over a hay bale.

Not only did he survive, he walked away practically unscathed. According to several accounts, his date for the weekend, Ginger Rogers, ran up and kissed him afterward.

Even in its second year, it seems the Concours drew celebrities.


Returning to the present, Ferraris are one of this year's featured marques at the Pebble Beach Concours d'Elegance. That honor seems fitting, since last year's Best of Show was Jon Shirley's 1954 Ferrari 375 MM Scaglietti Coupe, the first Ferrari ever to win that award. It was also the first postwar car to win Best of Show in nearly 50 years.

For some summer fun where past and present meet, head out to see the Ferraris on the lawn, or on the track this week.



Retired Carmel High principal Karl Pallastrini is also bringing a Porsche — in his case, it's a '59 356 Cabriolet.

Glen and Leslie Wolfson of Carmel will be showing their Isetta, a car of Italian design. Early versions have been described as "Looking like the result of a high speed collision between a refrigerator, a scooter, and an ovulating chicken." But the Wolfsons' candy apple red model is just plain cute.

Cars are judged and there are awards in eight categories, as well as seven trophies presented by political figures and organizations and plaques awarded by local merchants. Recently retired KSBW weatherman Jim Vanderzwaan will be the announcer and present the awards.

For fun and non-profits

Davis said the event's more of what he called a "show and shine" than a cutthroat competition, however.

"You make your car as nice as it can be and just enjoy talking to people about it all day long," he explained. There's even a trophy for "Longest Distance Traveled to the Show."

Davis said the show is unique in that it welcomes vehicles from all manufacturers.

Its genesis — back in 2010 — was an article that board member John Moulton read in Hemmings Classic Cars, a publication geared for collectors, about a small car show back East. "I thought, 'That's cool!" he said. And, it seemed like a natural activity for Concours Week. Pacific Grove loved the idea and they've been there ever since.

Unlike other exhibitions during the Concours extravaganza that hits the Monterey Peninsula each August, marques are designated by country; this year the honor goes to Japan. Davis said the club hopes to see some unusual Hondas and Tovotas.

It comes as no surprise that Japan produces a lot of small cars. There's even a class of micro cars called Kei cars (literally "lightweight"). They're under 660 cc and in Japan, they garner large tax breaks for their owners.

In all, Davis said, they're expecting 100 cars.

Marina Motorsports is an organization dedicated to all things automotive. Established 20 years ago, their mission is "to provide family oriented automotive related activities while benefiting local service clubs, other non-profit organizations and the City of Marina."


In just the last 10 years, they've given away

more than \$150,000 to dozens of organizations, including the Animal Friends Rescue Project, Community Foundation for Monterey County, Hope Center, and Pacific Grove Rotary.

All entry donations and proceeds from shirt, book and video sales from this year's Little Car Show will go to the Pacific Grove Public Library, Pacific Grove Youth Center and the Veterans' Transition Center.

If they haven't reached their 100-car limit, anvone who has a qualifying car can still register online at marinamotorsports.org. The entry fee is, as the website says, a "cheap" \$20.

The event's become really popular. Moulton said they have thousands of spectators every year. This year is shaping up to be another great opportunity to share and celebrate the small stuff.



"The first thing tourists do is pick up the phone [in the car]," he said.

Although it's a superhero's car, it demonstrates one of Barris' guiding principles: "A car's not just transportation from here to work. It's something people want to enjoy." When he customizes a car, it's with the customer's needs and wants in mind.

"My No. 1 satisfaction is pleasing the person I'm doing the car for," he said. "I don't do 'me toos.' I want to do something original."

Making it accessible

Barris thinks showing "the Mercs," as they're known to aficionados, makes at least part of the Concours more accessible to owners of average cars. "Whoever made the decision to have the Mercs is absolutely No. 1," he enthused. "Many people are going to enjoy them. It's a car they can feature themselves in."

He Concours attends d'Elegance every year and thoroughly enjoys it. "Pebble Beach is the thrill of a lifetime," he said. This year he'll be part of a panel discussion moderated by Ken Gross, "Mercury Customs and the Men who Created Them," on Thursday, Aug. 13 at 3 p.m. at Spanish Bay.


It should be a fascinating discussion. Barris has a lot of stories to tell, and not just about the Mercuries. His website, barris.com, is a veritable who's who of celebrities and famous cars. He customized a station wagon for John Wayne and built a white Mustang with an all-white interior for Cher. Dean Martin was a customer, and so was Ruth Buzzi.

He's not shy about naming his favorite celebrity, either. "Elvis was the nicest and kindest person I ever met," he said.

But after all these years, he still has a big soft spot for the Mercs. He thinks the crowds at the Concours d'Elegance will agree and show up en masse to admire the cars. "If you're coming onto the grass with the Mercs, you're going to need new grass," he said.

Coho didn't know exactly what he wanted to do with his degree when he entered college, but part of his recurring scholarship award, as long as he maintained his grade-point average, was guest attendance at the annual Pebble Beach Concours d'Elegance.

It was there on the show field, during his first visit, that Coho confirmed his career path.

"I had never seen anything like the Concours d'Elegance," says Coho. "I was blown away. I got to ride along during the Tour d'Elegance, and later, when I got out on the 18th Fairway I thought, 'I can do this — we can do this — my grandfather, my father, my brother and I."

Coho knew it was risky, but he also knew that if he didn't do it, he'd regret it later. He turned down all postgraduate job offers and, with his family, founded 4 Generations Automotive Restoration in his native Pennsylvania.

Coho's great-grandfather worked Studebaker, at a garage in Altoona, Pa. His grandfather got into the business and restored cars his whole life. Coho's father, Daniel, has made a career out of it, and now Coho and his brother, Chad, are the fourth generation of auto restorers, along with family friend Greg Miles, who joined the team upon Grandpa's passing last year.

Among all his lessons in automotive restoration technology, what Coho carries with him most prominently is the importance of establishing and respecting relationships in the classic car community. It is this principle that led him to the 1917 Moon motorcar, and the opportunity to restore it to Concours condition.

"It was at the Pebble Beach Concours that I met

the owner of the Moon," says Coho. "I asked for his business card, and later met him at other shows. After I graduated, he offered me a job, which I respectfully declined. I wanted to do my own family business. He had me send him my business plan, and helped me with that — I hadn't studied business at McPherson."

The Moon motorcar owner soon invited Coho and his father to view his classic car collection, during which he asked Coho to give him an estimate on restoring his car. His goal was to get it accepted to show at the Concours d'Elegance.

"If you do well at Pebble Beach with my car," he


told Coho, "this could set up your business for the next 10 years."

Coho and his family have been working night and day to get that Moon motorcar ready for its close-up at the Concours.

"I am the type of person, if you give me the opportunity to work hard and better myself," says Coho, "I will take every advantage I can to do so. My family and I eat, sleep and drink cars. Even during a break at the dinner table, we can't stop talking about the Moon, about coming to Pebble Beach, and about what's next and what lies ahead. This is our life, and it's just getting started."





for cars dating from 1947 to 1989.

"Every year is different," he said, predicting the day will offer "a lot of fun."

A new Patina Class features cars that have been well loved — and show it.

"These cars are real warriors, with heavy use," he said. "Rust might show through the paint, they have bangs and dings, and often they've lived with the same family through their entire lives."

Including cars like those reminds people that Concours on the Avenue isn't just for the rich car collector with perfect specimens — it's for enthusiasts on every level, according to Freedman.

Overall, organizers strive to meet the event's goals of providing "sophistication with a dash of fun," while honoring "authenticity, originality, preservation in a welcoming atmosphere."

"That's been our mission statement since Day

This year's show will certainly meet those standards, not only with the cars on display, but with parades of cars driven in from Mazda Raceway Laguna Seca and another undisclosed location, all under escort by the California Highway Patrol. A flock of race-prepped Shelby GT350s will come from the track, while road-going cars of the same model will be driving in from elsewhere.

"There will be great cars, great things with motors, and a few fun things you might attach to things with motors," he said. "But I don't want to give all the secrets away."

Event sponsor Acura will set up "the most sophisticated display, to date," in Devendorf Park, and the awards pavilion will be located in the intersection of Lincoln and Ocean, with awards given on the ramp in the afternoon.

Home during Concours Week

And, as usual, COTA HQ will be at the Cypress Inn — the hotel the Freedmans randomly selected during a visit decades ago and have made their home during Concours Week since.

"I always highlight the whole team at the Cypress Inn, because nobody has a clue how much they do for us and how they help us," he said. "It's a dream — a match made in heaven."

He also singled out the volunteers and Jill Sheffield from The Carmel Foundation, the nonprofit that benefits from the Concours on the Avenue's entry fees. The foundation serves members age 55 and older by providing low-cost housing and meals, events, field trips, classes, medicalequipment loans and a host of other services.

"They do so much for us behind the scenes," he

So far, the event has raised \$260,000 for the foundation, and Freedman hopes to surpass the \$300,000 mark this year.

Concours on the Avenue will take place from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. Tuesday, Aug. 11, in downtown Carmel.
