

'Changing of the guard' as new mayor, council members take office

'BEING MAYOR is like owning a boat: The two happiest days are the day you buy the boat and the day you sell the boat," outgoing mayor Jason Burnett commented just a few minutes before Steve Dallas was sworn in as the city's 34th mayor on Tuesday. "I'm happy to be taking some of the weight off of these shoulders and passing it along to you."

The council held a special meeting April 27 to swear in Dallas and incoming council members Jan Reimers and Bobby Richards, who took over from councilwoman Victoria Beach, who did not run for reelection, and councilman Ken Talmage, who lost the mayor's race to Dallas.

Before the transition took place, the council voted to certify the election results, which had Dallas prevailing over Talmage by 753 votes to 600, Reimers with 793 votes, and Richards with 672. Overall voter

turnout was around 55 percent.

Burnett also took the opportunity to thank Talmage for his years of service as councilman, including three years as his vice mayor.

"You've long been a key element of the institutional memory that we've had on the council," Burnett said. "That sense of history has been invaluable."

He mentioned Talmage's "brilliant financial mind," and thanked him for his work on refinancing the Sunset Center bonds and the CalPERS debt, and for getting Measure D, the city's sales tax increase, passed a few years ago.

"He's been a generalist," Burnett continued. "He's been on the city council not to advance any one agenda, but the broad agenda of what's best for Carmel-by-the-Sea."

Burnett and city attorney Don Freeman also noted that Talmage's role

DEAL WILL TURN GOLF COURSE INTO PARKLAND, HELP STAVE OFF LOOMING WATER CUTBACKS

WHEN A big land transaction in Carmel Valley closes escrow next month, the East Course at Rancho Cañada will become parkland — and the 300 acre-feet of water it once used annually will no longer be pumped from the Carmel River.

The Trust for Public Land announced it will buy the 140acre golf course property on Carmel Valley Road, between Carmel Middle School and the Hacienda Carmel retirement community. The large parcel, which includes much of Rancho Cañada's east golf course, belongs to the Hatton family, which has leased the land to the golf club since it was founded by Nick Lombardo in the late 1960s.

Because so much water will be saved, former Carmel Mayor Jason Burnett told The Pine Cone he's hopeful the State Water Resources Control Board will add five years to the deadline on its order to pump less water from the river which would buy crucial time for local officials to develop an alternative water project, including a desalination plant. Without the extension, officials say Monterey Peninsula

businesses and residents could face drastic water cutbacks.

The sale of the property likely spells the end of golf at Rancho Cañada. In February, the latest version of Clint Eastwood's Rancho Cañada housing project was unveiled, and if it is approved, it would replace the golf club's West Course. The golf club's lease runs out at the end of next year.

Besides the sale of the Hatton property, conservation groups are in talks to buy an adjoining 50-acre piece of land owned by the Lombardo family, confirmed attorney Tony Lombardo, Nick's son and Rancho Cañada's CEO. Lombardo said the parties are also discussing a buyout of the golf club's lease.

Buyers still raising money

While the Trust for Public Land is buying the property, the group's long-term plan is to transfer it to the Monterey Peninsula Regional Park District. The San Francisco-based land trust and the local park district are two of four partners who are working together to make the deal a reality. The coalition also includes the Santa Lucia Conservancy and Trout Unlimited.

The sale price of the property hasn't been revealed, but a real estate brochure had it listed at \$10 million, and later reduced to just under \$9 million. To help pay for the land, a fundraising effort is underway.

Dave Sutton of the Trust for Public Land told The Pine Cone that his group typically won't buy a property unless its

Mayors decide they still need Burnett's help

I HE MAYORS of the Monterey Peninsula's six cities have asked former Carmel Mayor Jason Burnett to remain part of their water group as it works toward a solution to the Peninsula's water shortage.

At a meeting Tuesday night, the mayors asked Burnett to became a "liaison and advisor" with the group after his successor recommended his ongoing involvement.

Mayor Steve Dallas, who defeated former Carmel City Councilman Ken Talmage for the seat on April 12, pointed to Burnett's contribution to the group — officially called the Monterey Peninsula Regional Water Authority — as the reason he should stay onboard.

"Jason's leadership on the issues surrounding a safe, longterm, sustainable water supply for the region is the very reason we have [made] such positive progress," he wrote to the board and its president, Pacific Grove Mayor Bill Kampe, in an April 25 email.

On Tuesday night, the mayors agreed unanimously that Burnett should continue working with the group. Burnett recused himself from the meeting because of the mayors'

THE MONTEREY County District Attorney's Office will not pursue charges against a candidate for 5th District Supervisor, Mary Adams, after a supporter of incumbent Supervisor Dave Potter issued a complaint alleging her campaign signs were misleading to voters and could violate state election laws.

Last week, Dan Mitchell, the president of the Monterey County Deputy Sheriffs' Association, which endorsed Potter, filed a complaint alleging that the slogan "Mary Adams, A Supervisor On Our Side," on Adams' campaign signs and bumper stickers could lead voters to believe she is the incumbent supervisor.


"I wouldn't want voters to think they are voting for the

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

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

Elephant seal uses beach as way station

A FEMALE elephant seal stopped to take a break on Carmel Beach Monday, but experts from the Marine Mammal Center weren't worried about her health and urged her to return to the sea, according to animal control officer Cindi Mitchell.

"Due to the traffic of people and dogs, the safety of animals and people was looked at, and the Marine Mammal Center allowed its volunteers to encourage the female elephant seal back into the water," Mitchell said.

She estimated the elephant seal was about 7 feet long and slightly underweight, but she said it seemed otherwise fine.

By the late 1800s, elephant seals had been hunted almost to extinction for the oil from their blubber, and the Mexican government banned hunting of the sea mammals in 1922 after a small colony was found on an island. The U.S. government followed suit a few years later, and elephant seals received further protection under the Marine Mammal Protection Act of 1972. They are protected by state law, and once elephant seals establish a new haul-out site – as they did in Año Nuevo in the 1950s – the area becomes off-limits to people.


Cherry Center honors student-poets

Belle couple has high hopes for marketplace at Seventh & Dolores

THE OWNERS of the successful Carmel Belle restaurant in the Doud Arcade are hoping the city council will give them a chance to try out something new in the event space at Seventh Avenue and Dolores Street.

Jay and Chloe Dolata want to operate a marketplace featuring gourmet prepared foods, cheeses, olive oil and other essentials, and eventually, wine. They are presenting the idea May 3, when the Carmel City Council is set to consider letting them operate the market for a six-month trial, as well as to decide whether a mezzanine can be added to the interior of the building to provide more seating for people who want to sit and relax with a glass of wine or a sandwich.

"We're just really excited. The feedback we've been getting from the community so far has been really supportive, and I personally feel our town needs something like this," Jay Dolata said Tuesday. "It's not necessarily a youthful energy, but a modern energy. Not everybody has time to sit down for lunch.'

Similar to upscale markets like New York's Dean + Deluca and the Oakville Grocery in the Napa Valley, the Seventh & Dolores market would have a counter for hot and cold prepared foods, baked goods, an espresso bar, juices and other items. Customers would take a number and then be helped when it's their turn, so they could browse while waiting.

If you're in a hurry

"We'll also have iPad order systems, with a concierge on the floor, so if people are just grabbing a bottle of olive oil or wine, they can check out without having to take a number," Dolata explained. "What's different about this [compared to a restaurant] is it's all prepared — nothing is made to order."

Therefore, people will have somewhere to pick up fresh, high-quality food to enjoy in town when they have only a limited amount of time or want something to take home for dinner, he said. Most of the food will be made in the building's large kitchen, though some items will probably come from Carmel Belle, which is located just around the corner.

"And we plan on working with lots of other businesses in town, too," he said. "We've already approached some people who are interested," including Rich Pepe, who could sell his pasta sauces there, and Scott Lund, who would offer his Lula's Chocolates.

Carmel Belle's baking operation will probably move to the center's kitchen, which is larger and can better accommodate it.

"That will allow us to do a lot more, just because we have more space," Dolata said, including breads, flatbreads and more pastries. "Our baker is very excited to move in here."

The counter, as well as the shelves used to display various products from local purveyors and other downtown stores,

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






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Measure X developer easily outguns opponent in campaign spending

THE DEVELOPER behind Measure X spent more than \$100,000 to convince voters to support it in the months before the April 19 election, according to campaign finance statements filed with city hall.

From Jan. 1 to April 6, Domaine Pacific Grove, LLC, which proposes to build a luxury hotel on the American Tin Cannery site, gave \$101,500 to the Measure X campaign, which asked voters to approve a zoning change to allow a hotel to be built there.

The ballot measure was approved, 59 percent to 41 percent.

The Yes on X campaign used \$83,389.72 during in the run-up to the election on advertising, postage, design, and other expenses. The bulk of its expenditures, though, was more than \$40,000 for public relations services, most of it to Armanasco Public Relations in Monterey. The campaign also spent \$69,629 in 2015 toward the measure.

The No on Measure X campaign, paid for by union Unite Here Local 483, which represents about 1,300 hospitality workers in the Monterey Peninsula, spent less than its rival. According to statements for the period from Jan. 1 to April 2, Unite Here's expenses totaled \$16,686.59, and included more than \$12,000 from the Unite Here corporate

Porsche to be featured at P.G. rally

THE ROTARY Club of Pacific Grove announced the featured marque in this year's Concours Auto Rally will be Porsche, and registration is now open for the Aug. 19 event. Rotary president-elect Tom Greer said drivers of classic, sports, and vintage cars of all types are welcome to participate. Registration for the drive is \$85 per vehicle.

The auto rally raises funds for youth programs and other local projects and will start headquarters in New York City, and nearly \$3,000 from the union's Pacific Grove branch.

Among the payments it made were \$3,426.25 for postage and \$3,813.05 to Urban Art Photography in Sacramento. It also owed \$8,462.80 to Print Logistics in Sacramento, according to its statements.

The union also did a postcard blitz to P.G. residents in the final weeks before the election, but expenses for that part of the campaign will probably show up on subsequent filings.

Carl Alasko, owner of Pacific Grove restaurant Il Vecchio, filed paperwork with the city to form a committee to oppose Measure X. Alasko mailed anti-Measure X fliers to Pacific Grove residents, but the March 21 filing does not indicate how much was spent on the mailers.

While Alasko's restaurant backs up to the site of the proposed hotel — and his business would likely get a boost from the hotel — the restaurateur has said he is worried the development will create "permanent gridlock" on David and Lighthouse avenues.

Meanwhile, Monterey County Registrar of Voters Claudio Valenzuela, said the elections office is counting the last of the provisional and vote-by-mail ballots, and that the results will be certified on Friday, April 29.

at midday, with the vehicles staged on Lighthouse Avenue. Afterward, drivers will cruise along 17 Mile Drive through Pebble Beach and then return to Chautauqua Hall in downtown Pacific Grove for a BBQ dinner prepared by Grove Market.

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Lapdog causes car tip over

A CARMEL resident slowly drove his car off the road and rolled it onto its side, shutting down San Carlos Street at Camino del Monte for a few hours Tuesday afternoon, after one of his dogs climbed onto his lap and distracted him.

Thomas Jones, 64, said he became distracted when the pooch took its perch, letting his car drift up onto the grassy hillside, where it collided with a tree and a sign. But he was going slowly enough — 10 to 15 mph, according to police at the scene — that the car didn't land on its roof, but instead came to rest on the driver's side. Firefighters and police helped free the man, and while one of his diminutive dogs stayed with him, the other fled. Fortunately, animal control officer Cindi Mitchell spotted the long-haired brown-and-black dog a few blocks away and was able to calm him enough to get a leash on him and return him to Jones, who was relieved to have the dog back. Jones said he'd only come to own the pup a couple of weeks prior, due to the passing of the previous owner.

On Wednesday, Cmdr. Paul Tomasi said Jones would not be cited for the crash, which caused no injuries or significant property damage, but the department has requested his driving skills be reevaluated by the DMV.

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Laguna Seca to host first races of the year

TS FUTURE is still up in the air, as Monterey County is seeking proposals from entities interested in running Mazda Raceway Laguna Seca, but one thing's for certain: the races must go on. This weekend marks the start of the 60th season of racing at the historic track, when the Continental Monterey Grand Prix comes to town.

The April 29-to-May 1 event features a jam-packed schedule, with several different classes of cars and drivers competing on the track.

The styles, speeds and skills run the gamut, from the always entertaining Mazda Miata MX-5s that are basically road cars — and which are driven by guys with day jobs — to the high-tech prototypes piloted by professionals like veteran Christian Fittipaldi. All told, the checkered flag will

drop nine times over the course of the weekend, with some of the classes having two races instead of just one.

The weekend features the nation's top road-racing series, the IMSA WeatherTech SportsCar Championship. The series has several different classes of racers, depending on the technology of the car and the skill of the driver, and Saturday's action will include two-driver teams in the Grand Sport and Street Tuner classes battling on track together for individual titles. On Sunday, professional drivers in the very fast Prototype and GT Le Mans classes will be driving on the track at the same time, offering a lot of passing and speed. The pro-am drivers in the Prototype Challenge and GT Daytona classes will do the same during their race later in the day.

Two all-Porsche races will be held, too, as will a pair of races for Lamborghinis.




Counting practice and qualifying sessions, the track will be hot a total of 32 different times throughout the weekend. In other words, cars and drivers will be on race circuit almost constantly. Off the track, displays and vendors will be abundant, as will all the hustle and bustle in the paddock, as mechanics and drivers prepare for their turns on the track.

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

THE JUNIOR League of Monterey County is helping to organize a Community Health Carnival at Pacific Grove Middle School, 835 Forest Ave., Saturday, April 30, from 11 a.m. to 2 p.m. Intended to appeal to all ages, the free event will feature cooking demonstrations, hands-on gardening, physical activities, free health screenings and live music.

The Pacific Grove Unified School District and Community Hospital of the Monterey Peninsula are collaborating on the event, which is part of the Kids Eat Right initiative that supports efforts to end childhood obesity. The Junior League also has a community garden project aimed at achieving the same goal, and it supported the installation of a student garden at PGMS last year.

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Wet weather boosts steelhead

THANKS TO an abundance of rain this winter, things are looking up for the Carmel River's beleaguered steelhead.

The Monterey Peninsula Water Management District reported this week that more than 300 steelhead entered the river to spawn from January through March — evidence that the population is on the rebound after years of drought.

"This is great news," said Kevan Urquhart, a fisheries biologist for the MPWMD. "We have been working diligently to improve the habitat for these endangered fish over the years, but thanks to an assist from Mother Nature, the 2016 fish run is the best we have seen in a while."

To put the news in perspective, the agency said the number of returning steelhead this year is far greater than the number recorded in 1992 — the year a major four-year drought ended — when only 15 adults reached the San Clemente Dam.

MPWMD General Manager Dave Stoldt praised his agency's staff for its help with the steelhead population — and he expressed relief that the drought appears to be over, at least for now. "The rain finally came and the fish are finally moving," he said.

and the refrigeration units, would be moveable, so the building can be used to host events, as originally intended.

The small building toward the back of the property will function as a community room and could be used to host talks by guest chefs, cookbook writers and other experts. "I'd love to have chef Justin Cogley from Aubergine do something on mushroom foraging or Brad Briske from La Balena talk about how to make pasta," he said. "We could really showcase what we have to offer here, and collaborate with other restaurants. The camaraderie here is just amazing."

Dolata noted that the planning commission a few months ago gave the idea a tentative thumbs up, so the city council is the next step. "This is where they're going to approve the six-month operating permit," he said. "It's like a trial period, so they have a better understanding of how to fit us into the city's ordinances. So far, we've had a lot of great support, so it's just figuring out how to do it."


Dolata said he and his wife have been receiving a lot of supportive comments from the community and their customers at Carmel Belle.

"There's a place for all types of business, and I think it's about diversifying what we have to offer," Dolata said. "The economy is changing, and we get a lot of day trippers from the city who have limited time and want to squeeze everything in."

And because the market would have parking and would be convenient, and will eventually offer delivery, he said, "We're here to serve the residents, for sure."

Duane Jardine Matterson May 28, 1919 – April 20, 2016

Duane Jardine Matterson died at his Pacific Grove home on April 20, 2016 after a short period of declining health. An only child, he was born May 28, 1919 in Seattle,



Washington to Hazel Jardine and Roy C. Matterson. Shortly thereafter the family moved to Victoria, British Columbia where his father worked for the U.S. Immigration Service. At the age of 10, he and his family moved back to Seattle. Duane graduated from the University of Washington in 1942. He entered the United States Army and served in the South Pacific and the Philippine Islands during World War II as a 1st Lieutenant.

When the war ended he began studying ceramic art at California College of Arts & Crafts in Oakland. He later attended Alfred University in New

York where he earned a master's degree in ceramic arts. He married Joan Newman of Carmel and in 1948 they moved to Monterey, joining what might now be referred to as a bohemian community of free spirits on Huckleberry Hill. (Upper New Monterey) He and Joan founded the Huckleberry Hill Pottery, later renamed the Matterson Family Pottery. He continued to make stoneware pottery throughout his life until back problems interfered.

Duane became a teacher in 1958, teaching elementary grades first in Corral de Tierra and later in Marina and Monterey schools. Upon retirement, he plunged enthusiastically into a variety of volunteer activities. An original docent at the Monterey Bay Aquarium, he received his 30-year pin in 2014. He worked on numerous trail building and service trips for the Sierra Club, the Forest Service and Rails to Trails; in particular, the Iron Goat Trail on the site of the Burlington Northern Santa Fe line over Steven's Pass in Northern Washington.

In the 1980's Duane worked with the Monterey History and Art Association restoring the original Monterey angels created by Erica Franke. He fell in love with them and with Franke's permission created about 50 of his own. He was a volunteer for the Pacific Grove Library, Friends of the Monarchs, the Bach Festival and other similar groups. The Gentrain Program at Monterey Peninsula College was a large part of his life in later years.

In 1976 he married Betty Sawyer and together they enjoyed numerous travels around the world. Duane loved life and lived it with gusto. He was an adventurous and creative cook, a prolific reader, an unconventional gardener and an avid trombone player. He liked to write, especially letters to friends and usually with a clipping he thought would be enjoyed.

Duane was predeceased by his wife, Joan, the mother of his children, and a son, Thomas. He is survived by his wife Betty, daughter Sarah (Michael Lojkovic), sons Daniel (Sharon Colton), Seth and Benjamin (Karene); stepsons Laurence Sawyer (Phyllis) and Eric Sawyer (Marit); grandsons Ken, Chase and Russell Matterson and Forrest and Wesley Sawyer.

Lorna Ardis Greer was born in Milwaukee, Wisconsin. She is survived by her daughter, two grandchildren, and two great-grandchildren.



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LOOKING BACK PROUDLY ON THE FACT THAT HE WAS A REAL BOZO

UNICORNS AND leprechauns are imaginary, children, but Bozo the Clown really existed.

In fact, quite a few Bozos once walked the earth, and one of them lives at Del Mesa Carmel. Gerry Sher, 86, wore those size-22 shoes at grand openings, amusement parks, children's hospitals and convalescent homes in the San Francisco Bay area in 1964, when he was one of 16 Bozos entertaining in the United States.

For Sher, it was only one chapter in an eclectic life.

"Some kids laughed and loved me. Some were afraid," he said. "Once in a while, a kid would kick me, and I'd say, 'Ohhh, now that's fun! Let me kick you!"

Not a fair contest, the kid would quickly surmise.

After working his way through Leland Powers School of Radio and Theater as a "carnie" on the Boston Belle, a tourist boat that sailed daily during the summer from Boston to Provincetown, a friend coaxed Sher to accept a radio job in Corinth, Miss., near the Alabama and Tennessee borders. He became part of the Dixie Network, providing color commentary on high school football and baseball broadcasts, spinning records as a DJ, and reading the community news as "Gerry Lawrence."

"It was the Deep South, and I was a Yankee, for sure, but the people there accepted me pretty well," he said.

They talked funny down there ... and so did Sher. He recalls answering the phone one day after reading the community bulletin board, and hearing a honey-dripping female voice on the other end of the line.

Mr. Lawrence?" she said. "Say it!"

"I beg your pardon?" he responded. "Say it!"

"Uh ... say what?" "Awwg-zill-ree," she cooed. "Auxiliary?"

"Ohhh, God," the woman sighed. "That is gorgeous!"

A short vacation to Florida and a walk on the beach changed Sher's life at age 23, when he recognized a Boston acquaintance sitting next to a young woman on a blanket. As he approached, the man jumped to his feet and jogged into the surf.

"I introduced myself to the girl, explained that I knew her friend, and asked if I could sit down," Sher recounted.


"We talked for nine hours that day — a Tuesday — made a date to see each other again on Wednesday, and got engaged on Friday."


He took Brooklyn native Arlene Weinraub as his wife two-and-a-half months later in New York.

Ride a horse, ride a bike, or just come watch a horse-drawn cannon

IF YOU'VE ever been caught referring to an in-law as "that old warhorse," you might want to avoid suggesting the sixth annual Fort Ord Warhorse Day as a Mother's Day weekend treat. For everyone else, on Saturday, May 7, from 11 a.m. to 2 p.m., the City of Marina and Marina Equestrian Association are sponsoring the event, showcasing the role of horses and cavalrymen in numerous conflicts throughout the country's history.



The students receive 60 percent of the proceeds from the sale of the work, while the balance is donated to the arts council's Professional Artists in the Schools program.



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Introducing Ratel, getting ready for Winemakers' Celebration, and cruising the Rhine with wine

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T ALL started because Bryan Laschiver was broke and wanted to give something homemade and special to his friends and family for Christmas. While his first foray into making hard cider missed the holiday and missed the mark — it was the start of a journey that, seven years later, has produced Ratel, a cider fermented from several varieties of apples and hops. This month, Laschiver introduced his Ratel Cider to the

community, and he's now working on getting it placed in local restaurants and stores.

"I didn't have enough knowledge or time, and I made a really terrible cider," Laschiver, a Monterey resident who also works at a downtown Carmel jewelry store, said about his initial effort. "But I'm one of those people who, when something doesn't go my way, I take it as a challenge."

He dove into learning the art of cider making, reading books and online forums every night.

"Then I started making some good cider, and I loved it so much," he said.

So did his friends, who encouraged him to start selling it.

With that goal, he began tweaking his recipe to come up with something that would have high-quality ingredients and broad appeal. He settled on a combination of tart, sweet and bitter apples to give the cider the balance he wanted, and he introduced hops — which are used for making beer — for their floral and slightly bitter notes.

"You get the right amounts of the right kinds of apples, then crush them, take the juice and ferment it," he explained. After fermentation, the juice is separated from the skins and everything else into another vessel in a practice called "racking," and there, it undergoes the secondary fermentation that gives cider its light fizz.

> "I've probably done more than 70 or 80 different blends and ratios, with different hops — I've put a lot of R&D into it," he said.

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And now, Laschiver said, he's finally found it.

"We found a good balance of tart and hops, and it almost suggests some residual sugar, but there isn't any," he said. In other words, while the cider contains no sugar that would make it sweet, it's still fruity. Typical of hard cider, its alcohol content is just over 7 percent.

The finished product is available in 22ounce bottles for \$12 to \$14, as well as on draft in some local restaurants. It's already available at Melville Tavern, where he debuted it a couple of weeks ago — and promptly sold a week's worth of supply in one night. In town, Carmel Belle, The Tuck Box, Barmel and Andre's Bouchée carry it.

Ratel should also be on the shelves at Cost Plus World Market by next week. "I gave a sample to one of the young guys who works in the wine department there, and he fell in love with it and gave it to the store

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manager," he said. The head of the chain's California stores wanted it for the entire state, but Laschiver said his production is at least a year away from being able to supply demand on that level.


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"I couldn't be happier with the product and the feedback," he said. "It's really well made, it's local, it's got a lot of character, and it appeals to beer, wine and cider people."



Latest Madeleine wines

Winemaker Damien Georis (who has also been busy importing select Belgian beers, including the new Bertinchamps Triple, which is now being offered at the Rio Grill in the Crossroads shopping center) announced his new releases of two Madeleine wines. Madeleine is Georis' own label and focuses predominantly on his favorite French varietals.

"The first is a new label I am particularly excited about: a Cabernet Sauvignon-based blend called 'Left Bank' in honor of the wines produced on the left bank of the Garonne River in Bordeaux, where I started my career in wine," he said. "There, Cabernet Sauvignon thrives, dominating the 'assemblages' that commonly also feature smaller amounts of Merlot, Cabernet Franc, Malbec and Petit Verdot."

Madeleine Left Bank 2013 incorporates all five Bordeaux varietals grown in a small vineyard in Upper Carmel Valley, and Georis said the result is "a full-bodied, fruit-forward yet earthy wine, with a lingering and ripe tannic balance." He made 200 cases of this wine, and it sells for \$36 per bottle. (A 20 percent discount is being offered on purchases of a case or more of Left Bank.)

The other is the new vintage of Madeleine L'Arsouille Chenin Blanc, "named for those with joie de vivre who may like to drink a little more than usual every once in a while, to celebrate life.'

"This cuvée never carried its name so perfectly as with this new vintage, which is light, bright, well balanced and easy drinking," Georis said. The grapes for this wine were grown in South Monterey County, and it was

barrel fermented and aged for 10 months in neutral French oak. Georis made 150 cases of the Chenin Blanc, which sells for \$20 per bottle.

raised three children (Lisa DeLorme of Danville, Michael Sher of San Francisco, and Nancy Malone of Marin), initially settling in Boston, where Sher landed a dream job in the record industry.

"Our company represented a lot of big stars from the day, and part of my job was to take those artists to the radio and TV stations for interviews," said Sher, who escorted such luminaries as the Everly Brothers, the Pat Boone, Steve McGuire Sisters, Lawrence, Roy Orbison, and Andy Williams to their appointments.

"I nearly got killed at a department-store appearance with the McGuire Sisters," he recollected. "There were 5,000 people waiting when we got out of the limo. The police tried to form a corridor for us to get to the door, but the crowd came forward and pushed us against a plate-glass window. I could feel the glass bending and was yelling, 'Push them back! Push them back!' The cops finally linked arms and moved the people away so we could get through, but I was panicked. I really thought we were going to die."

'Suit him up'

The company eventually transferred him to San Francisco, where his intense East Coast work ethic didn't mesh well with the laid-back California lifestyle. He attempted to crack the whip on a staff of 14 sales people, who threatened to quit en masse. Sher was fired.

"Suddenly I was unemployed, and in shock, with a house payment, and a new car, and three children, including a 2-month-old baby," he said. "That's when I revived Mr. Tickles.'

Mr. Tickles, a clown persona he had created years earlier for daughter Nancy's fourth birthday, made paid appearances at furniture stores, car dealerships, amusement parks and private birthday parties.

Then an old friend, Boston Bozo Frank Avruch, connected Sher with Larry Harmon, who played Bozo the Clown on TV in Los Angeles and owned all Bozo rights nationwide.

"My body type was exactly like his, and I

had clowning experience, but he said, 'OK, but can you do the laugh?" Sher recounted. "I went, 'Hee hee ho ho ho! Hi there, Butchie boy!'and he yelled, 'Oh, my god, listen to this guy! Listen to this guy! Suit him up!' So they took my measurements, and I became Bozo for Northern California."

His year-long, \$500 per appearance stint as Bozo ended when he was hired as the fulltime public relations director at Playland at the Beach, a famous San Francisco amusement park. Three years later, he returned to radio, this time in sales and management, spending the rest of his career with KYA, KGO and KABL. He retired in 1991.

After his wife, Arlene, lost a five-year battle with cancer in 2004, he became reacquainted with one of her longtime friends, a psychotherapist and artist, Mary Munsterman, who married him six years ago.

They relocated from Sonoma to Carmel a year ago, fulfilling a longtime dream to live on the Monterey Peninsula.

"It's wonderful. We just love living at Del Mesa," said Sher, a devoted member of the community's lawn bowling program and also the founder of a "poetry and conversation" group there. "I've had a long, interesting life, with a lot of ups and downs, but Mary and I are very, very happy today."

as the city representative on the Association for Monterey Bay Area Governments board helped turn that organization around.

"I can say that if it weren't for Ken's leadership, that particular agency would not be in existence today," Freeman said.

Burnett remarked that Talmage was always "calm, cool and collected" throughout their many hours of working together. "I will always remember your ability to bridge differences and avoid controversies," he said.

When it was his turn to talk, Talmage remarked that in an era of controversy and strife at the federal and state level, people turn to their local governments to get things done.

"That flows back and forth over history, but in this era, it's local government that people turn to," he said. "There are a lot of people in this room who have differences of opinions on issues, but let's remember we love this community. We share ideas, we share values, we share a passion for this unique place."

Former city councilwoman Barbara Livingston said she and the Carmel Residents Association wanted to thank Burnett, Talmage and Beach — who was not at the meeting "for their dedicated service to the people of our village."

"Their personal investment in time, thought and energy

can never be fully appreciated," she said.

And PacRep Theatre executive director Stephen Moorer brought in a Jack London impersonator to poetically articulate his thanks to the council.

"I dug up a famous artist from Carmel's past," Moorer said. "I'd like to welcome Jack London to the microphone."

The show ended with his rendition of the "Abalone Song," in which he had the audience sing along. ("Oh some drink rain/and some champagne/or brandy by the pony," he chanted. "But I think I'll try/a dash of rye/and a hunk of abalone.")

'Against all enemies'

Following the festivities and accolades, Dallas and the new council members each took the Oath of Office, swearing to defend the United States and California constitutions "against all enemies, foreign and domestic," and to "well and faithfully discharge the duties upon which I am about to enter."

They thanked the community for trusting them to lead the city over the next several years and thanked their families for their support and the sacrifices they will make.

"On behalf of myself and this new council, I ask for your understanding and support as we strive to do our best for Carmel-by-the-Sea," Dallas said. "My hope is that this community will come together in the spirit of cooperation and engage with council members. By participating in your government and sharing your ideas, together we can work toward the best solutions as we tackle the tough issues."

New council to discuss budget, transportation tax, empty seat

A NEARLY brand-new Carmel City Council, with a recently elected mayor and two freshmen council members - and a third newbie on the way - won't waste any time getting down to business, with significant issues on the agendas of a special meeting May 2 and its regular meeting May 3.

Monday's meeting will begin with a closed session at 4:30 p.m. to discuss a personal-injury lawsuit filed by Jennifer Da Silva against the city following her arrest for public intoxication in August 2013. (The charge was ultimately dismissed by the Monterey County District Attorney's Office.)

The open session is scheduled to begin at 5:30 p.m., when the council will consider a resolution approving the Transportation Monterey Agency for County's "Transportation Safety & Investment Plan," which would increase the sales tax in order to pay for various regional and local road projects. So far, the crux of the discussion in Carmel has been whether the tax would be fair to the city, which would end up con-

tributing significantly more in tax dollars than it would get back in the form of road improvements that have a direct positive impact on its residents.

The council will also receive the provisional budget for the 2016/2017 fiscal year - a first in several respects, as it will be new city administrator Chip Rerig's first budget for the City of Carmel, and council members Jan Reimers' and Bobby Richards' first crack at one. (Mayor Steve Dallas has voted on two budgets, and councilwoman Carrie Theis has approved three.)

In addition to reports on fire and ambulance responses, forestry, the monthly check register, code enforcement and Public Records Act requests, items on the agenda that won't be discussed unless someone specifically requests it include a \$95,476 contract with Staples Construction Company to reconstruct the Mountain View entrance to Mission Trail park, and a \$48,000 contract with Fiesta Parade Floats for float construction services, presumably for the city's centennial parade in October.

On Tuesday, when the council convenes again at 4:30 p.m., one of its first items of



business will be to appoint a mayor pro tem. (Considering no one else has any experience being on the council, Theis is the likely choice.)

The group will then discuss options for how to fill the vacancy made on the council when Dallas was elected mayor. The council could open the position up to the public and seek applications, or it could appoint someone without accepting applications. According to the Government Code, the vacancy must be filled or a special election called for within 60 days of the date the seat opened.

Next, the council will take on the issues of the use of the Forest Theater, including whether the indoor theater should be shared or just occupied by one tenant, and what pro-

consideration of his involvement.

In Dallas' letter - which was also sent to newly elected Carmel City Council Members Jan Reimers and Bobby Richards, and city administrator Chip Rerig - Dallas encourages the mayors' water board to retain Burnett "to the fullest extent he is available."

Burnett told The Pine Cone Monday that he doesn't want to be paid, and said the "satisfaction of finishing something we started" is enough of a reason to continue advising the group.

"I'm happy to help as the water authority wants," he said.

After deciding not to seek a third term, Burnett supported Councilman Ken Talmage over Dallas, saying Talmage's thorough knowledge of Peninsula water issues qualified him for the job and make the transition seamless.

In a Wednesday email informing water

"To the extent he is able and willing, and as requested by the water authority board, Jason will assist [board] President Bill Kampe and will remain engaged in the activities of the MPRWA for the foreseeable future," Cullem said.

When The Pine Cone interviewed Burnett in early April about the possibility of him having some role with the group after his mayoral term ends, he said it would be up to the other members to decide if they wanted him to stay on.

"I have a huge interest in seeing this through, both on a personal level, and of course because it matters to the community," he said.

Kampe and Del Rey Oaks Mayor Jerry Edelen told The Pine Cone in early April that they also supported Burnett having some sort of advisory role with the group

When the tourists invade

YOU GOTTA feel sorry for French Catholics.

Almost 900 years ago, they decided to build themselves a new church in Paris to serve as the center of faith in the bustling city, and they ended up doing a pretty good job with it. The rose windows are nice, and so are the gargoyles and flying buttresses. People seem to like it, and perhaps you've even heard of it. They call it Notre Dame.

Today, millions of people from around the world visit the Cathedral of Notre-Dame every year, lining up outside, noisily traipsing through the front door, disrupting religious services, asking where the bathrooms are, wanting to buy souvenirs and generally being obnoxious — which gives rise to a question: What obligation does the church have to all those people? All it wanted was a place for worship, but it ended up with a monumental tourist attraction.

We bring this up because a similar phenomenon is happening in Big Sur, where hordes of visitors are suddenly disrupting the solitude, clogging the highway, soiling the landscape and generally making life miserable for locals. Of course, unlike Notre Dame, Big Sur's beautiful scenery was made by Mother Nature, but humans who live in the area still feel like they should be able to enjoy it once in a while, not to mention get home from work or pick up something at the supermarket, without having to wait in endless lines of slowly moving cars. And the problem is only going to get worse. As incomes rise around the globe, which they have done dramatically in some parts of the world over the last 25 years, more and more people are able to travel. And whether they're in Beijing or Warsaw, the first thing many of them want to do is see California, which means the overcrowding in Big Sur is probably only going to get worse.

But what to do about it?

The first, and most basic question, is whether to accommodate them or discourage them. Accommodating them would mean building restrooms, adding campgrounds, and providing everything else humans need when they're on vacation — not a good option when the whole point of Big Sur is its wild beauty.

But discouraging them isn't very practical, either, because only radical steps, such as imposing high tolls or requiring admission tickets, would work.

At Notre Dame, they could just lock the doors, but what do you do with a public highway?

No matter how improbable a solution may seem, we urge local and state public officials to begin considering even the strangest ideas. After all, the day of the self-driving car is almost here, which inevitably will lead to cars being scheduled into slots to drive during the busiest periods, making the highways much more efficient and eliminating rush-hour gridlock.

And if in 2030 you have to make an appointment to drive on 101 in San Jose between 6 a.m. and 9 a.m., why not also make a reservation to cruise through \mathbf{D}_{i}

A classic tale of reading, writing and recipes

N ALMOST every house, you might see the light from a big flat-screen television flickering through the curtains. But instead of a TV inside Beth Penney's Pacific Grove home, a similarly sized wall features a builtin case filled with books. And she's read them all.

Penney, a writer, editor and educator, has served as chair of the English department at

Monterey Peninsula College for more than a decade during her 25-year tenure at the college. Her late mother, the noted local writer and teacher, Raylyn Moore, taught in the same department for 32 years. Besides being colleagues,

25 years ago the mother-daughter literary duo established the Monterey Peninsula chapter of the Dickens Fellowship. Founded in London in 1902, the organization endeavors to "knit together in a common bond of friendship, lovers of the great master of humor and pathos, Charles Dickens; to spread the love of humanity, and to campaign against those social evils that most concerned Dickens," principally urban crime, child abuse, poverty and exploitation.

The local chapter of the Dickens Fellowship meets once a month and explores different works by the author.

"My mother introduced me to Victorian literature," Penney said. "I always say my favorite Dickens is the book I'm reading at the time. I have read all of his books at least six times and never run out of things to talk about. I notice new things with every new read."

Penney also serves on the board of Friends of The Dickens Project, a collaborative research organization focused on Charles Dickens and the Victorian Era. Founded in 1981 and based at UC Santa Cruz, the consortium engages American and international universities in ongoing social commentary.

Penney's interest in classic literature

stems largely from growing up with parents who were passionate about it, in a community quite legendary for its arts and letters.

Born at Community Hospital of the Monterey Peninsula in 1955, when it was still a modest hospital just off of Highway 1 in Carmel, as a little girl, Penney lived behind Carmel High School. Once her parents divorced and her mother, a hippie at

heart, went off in search of a more unstructured lifestyle, Penney and her younger brother and sister moved with their father, Monterey County Herald editor Bill Penney, to the Del Monte Park neighborhood of Pacific Grove.

Although her family moved to Carmel Valley while Penney was a sophomore in high school, she continued to attend Pacific Grove High, from which she graduated in 1973. Today, she is in her fifth year serving as president of the PGHS Alumni Association, which boasts 900 members and hosts an annual reunion.

Penney went on to earn a bachelor's degree in journalism and English, followed by a master's degree in English from Fresno State, before returning to the Peninsula, where she wrote and edited for the Monterey County Herald and The Pine Cone. Although known as a skilled writer, she has always preferred editing to reporting or writing.

"I'm a good writer," she said, "but I was never very good at interviewing. I did interclassical guitarist Christopher view Parkening when he came here years ago, but I haven't been asked to do much more. I would much rather edit.'

For eight years, Penney worked as managing editor for what was Paul Kagan

Associates, now PK Worldmedia, at Clock Tower Place. She also established her own editing service, from which she retired last year, after nearly 40 years.

In 1991, she joined the faculty at MPC where, in addition to her duties as department chair, she teaches four English classes each semester.

"Beth Penney has poured out most of her lifeblood for MPC," said humanities division chair Diane Boynton. "She accomplishes more than most of us can even dream."

Although known well for her precise editing and devotion to teaching, there is more to Penney than the written word. During the biannual dinners she hosts in her home, faculty discover a delectable

Don't know what an EG conference is? Well, it's here.

 $Y_{OU'VE PROBABLY heard of TED}$ Talks. Short for Technology, Entertainment and Design, they are mini-lectures given by people from the United States and abroad who are experts in their fields. They're given at conferences all over the world and attended by people who shell out big bucks to hear them.

The 10th annual EG Conference at Sunset Center - which started on April 28 and continues through April 30 - is kind of like that, which is not surprising, since its founder, Richard Saul Wurman, was a cofounder of the TED series.

While the TED conferences have grown to include thousands of people around the world and have their own radio show and website where you can stream them for free, the EG Conferences' organizers have strived to keep them relatively intimate events - if you can call sharing a room with 700 attendees "intimate."

That number includes the 50 speakers, who range from Adam White, who produced last year's "Big Blue Live," and 90-year-old naturalist Sir David Attenborough, to prolific cookbook author Mark Bittman and fifthgrader Katherine Liu, who is an award-winning pianist.

Dick Cavett and champion figure skater Dick Button will also be presenters, and Bertrand Picard is scheduled to drop by after recently completing the Pacific Ocean leg of his round-the-world solar flight. Speakers will talk for about 20 minutes apiece.

Carmel Chamber CEO Monta Potter said she was excited about the event. "I think it's a huge deal," she said, adding that it is "a good fit."

Conference organizers said they chose the locale because of Sunset Center's "glorious architecture and wonderful people," and because of Carmel's "comfortable yet elegant hotels ... beautiful Point Lobos, and an artful and engaged cultural community."

In case you're wondering, "EG" doesn't really stand for anything, although at various times it has been interpreted as "entertainment gathering" or "exampli gratia," a fancy Latin term that means "signifying exemplary talents in many disciplines.'

Speaking of fancy, the ticket price for this cerebral shindig was \$4,000, and it was advertised by word-of-mouth and invitation only.

The conferences are headed up by Michael Hawley, who is described by the organization as a "polymath who has led a broad and deeply creative career." He has worked in education and engineering with the likes of George Lucas and Steve Jobs. His piano skills are nothing to sneeze at, either — he was co-winner of the Van Cliburn amateur competition in 2002.

Unlike TED, which is a not-for-profit organization, EG is privately held. According to spokesperson Lana McGilvray, "The proceeds all go to fund the many speakers, past speakers, and students who are gracious enough to share their work and



incumbent [supervisor], and that [Adams] is responsible for all the good things Dave Potter has done," Mitchell told The Pine Cone.

According to section 18350 of the state Elections Code, if someone "assumes, pretends, or implies, by his or her statements, conduct or campaign materials, that he or she is the incumbent of a public office when that is not the case," that person can be charged with a misdemeanor.

But on Thursday, Chief Assistant District Attorney Berkley Brannon said Adams would not face charges. The Secretary of State "received the complaint, which was

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reviewed by their attorneys, who determined that the materials, 'Mary Adams, A Supervisor on Our Side,' was not sufficiently clear to constitute a violation of Elections section Code 18350." Brannon told The Pine Cone.

Adams, upon hearing the news Thursday morning from Assistant District Attorney Jeannine Pacioni that she would not face charges, told The Pine Cone, "I must say, I'm kind of relieved."

Adams said that the catchphrase on the signs and stickers was the result of brainstorming by more than 25 community members, and that there was no intent to mislead anybody. "A Supervisor on Our Side' was chosen because all

ing to voters in the 5th District.

Voters know Potter has been in office for 20 years," she said. "Additionally, many are probably aware that I was the president and CEO of United Way" in Monterey County.

Had the Secretary of State decided that a violation of the Elections Code had occurred, it would have called the violation to the attention of the district attorney or to the California Attorney General, Brannon said.

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She said the complaint feels like "bullying" and is insult-

cial interests," Adams told The Pine Cone.

funding is secure. But in this case, Sutton said land trust officials decided it was an "incredibly important project," and they needed to move quickly because others were interested in buying it.

The coalition partners say the land will provide the public with many benefits. Not only could it offer parking and access to Palo Corona park — which is currently only open on a reservation basis due to limited parking and access — but it also could serve as a critical link for a recreation trail that would lead to Monterey and beyond.

Planners envision the creation of a trail that would connect Palo Corona park with Monterey's Jacks Peak County Park and the recently created Joyce Stevens Monterey Pine Forest Preserve. The partners say the property is strategically located to make that possible. They also endorse the idea of creating an underpass — much like the one at Carmel Valley Road and Highway 1 — to provide safe passage so hikers and bikers can easily and safely cross Carmel Valley Road.

Existing paths for golf carts could be converted into wheelchair accessible trails, and existing bridges could lead hikers across the Carmel River.

Besides its promising future as a hub for hikers, the property is home to an existing golf club house and several outbuildings, which could be used to provide "headquarters, operation centers, public meeting spaces and classrooms" for the park district and conservation-minded nonprofit groups.

Property set to 'go natural'

Because golf will no longer be played on the property, the partners plan to return it to its natural state, said Christy Fischer, the executive director of the Santa Lucia Conservancy.

"We call it 'rewilding," Fischer explained. She said the restoration work is particularly vital because the land is a rare example in California of a riparian habitat with large mature trees like sycamores, cottonwoods and oaks. She said it's also a haven for songbirds, some of which are rare.

"This can become a great example of the most beautiful and biodiverse form of a riparian forest, and it's almost entirely gone from California," she continued.

Fischer said restoring such a forest usually takes a generation. But because hundreds of old growth trees still stand on the property, and the flood plain along the river provides such an ideal habitat for trees, a thriving forest could emerge within a decade, she added.

Less golf, more water

While the State Water Resources Control Board has yet to extend the deadline to cut pumping from the Carmel River, Burnett said he is optimistic it will do that.

"We've listened carefully to what the state water board has asked," said the former mayor, who has played a key role in efforts to develop alternative water projects as president of Monterey Peninsula Regulatory Water Authority. "They specifically called out the irrigation of golf courses as a problem. So we have delivered on their request."

Burnett said two key environmental groups, the Sierra



Club and the Planning and Conservation League, have endorsed the idea of extending the deadline for reducing pumping from the river. Concerns by the two environmental groups helped convince the state water board to issue the cutback order in the first place.

The former mayor said the sale of the Hatton property is cause for celebration because "we have prominent environmental and business groups agreeing on how to balance the needs of the environment and the community."

"In one transaction, we've accomplished multiple wins," added Burnett, whose second term as mayor ended this week. "We're benefitting the river, and we're benefitting the community by providing enough time to develop another water supply, and we're providing access to Palo Corona park, which stands to rival Garland park as a place that is loved and enjoyed by all."

Rafael Payan, general manager of the regional park district, called the acquisition "an extraordinary opportunity."

"This agreement secures a property that is critical in reestablishing continuity of natural habitat and wildlife corridors from Marina to Big Sur and from the Carmel Valley to the Pacific Ocean, while enhancing access to Palo Corona Regional Park, and offering nature-based programs for visitors of all ages, especially children and families."

The Hattons also endorsed plans for the property. The family arrived in Carmel Valley in the late 19th century and established a successful dairy business.

"The land has been in the family and contributing value to the community since the late 1800s," said a representative of the Hatton family, Dryer Branson Bordin. "After receiving multiple offers, the family decided to sell the property to a group that could create an even greater public good."

An official from the Trust for Public Land praised the Hattons for making the deal possible. Local real estate agent Ernie Lostrom noted that some of the offers the sellers received "were substantially higher."

"Protecting this precious land and water for the people of Monterey County and beyond is a fitting way to honor the legacy of the Hatton family, which has owned this property for many generations," said Gina Fromer of the Trust For Public Land. "There is a lot of work still to do to make this happen, but it will be a landmark achievement."

'Everything has its time'

While the golf course was Nick Lombardo's "pride and joy," Tony Lombardo said his father likely would have been supportive of the deal to turn it into parkland, in large part because of the role it could play in solving the Monterey Peninsula's water problems. Nick Lombardo died 11 years ago.

"My father was very much invested in the community," he said. "He would be happy to help the community get over the water crisis."

Lombardo was philosophical about the prospect of golf coming to an end at Rancho Canada. "Everything has its time," he added, noting that the property was once an artichoke field, and might have become a shopping center if the golf club had never existed.

Mayors seek to add year to cutback order delay

THE SIX Monterey Peninsula mayors this week agreed to request that the state water board extend the deadline for Cal Am to sharply reduce pumping from the Carmel River for an additional year, with a vow to limit local water use in the meantime.

The mayors water authority Tuesday approved a request to extend the delay in the river cutback order from four years to five. The extension is necessary, Cal Am and the mayors contend, in light of a state Public Utilities Commission announcement in March that the environmental review for Cal Am's proposed desalination plant in Marina would be delayed one a year.

Under the proposal, Cal Am would reduce river pumping by about 4,800 acre feet (about 1.5 billion gallons) per year, which would meet about 80 percent of the goal set by the State Water Resources Control Board, which imposed the cutback order in 1995.

"This modification request represents a monumental coming together of diverse groups," said former Carmel Mayor Jason Burnett. "We have prominent environmental and business groups agreeing on how to balance the needs of the environment and the community."

A recycled water project dubbed Pure Water Monterey a collaboration between the Monterey Peninsula Water Management District and Monterey Regional Water Pollution Control Agency — would provide about 3,500 acre feet, while another 1,000 acre feet would be a result of Cal Am increasing its diversion of excess Carmel River winter water into Seaside aquifers. Yet another 300 acre feet would be freed up from the east golf course at Rancho Cañada per a deal with the Trust for Public Land (see page 1A), which said this week it will purchase the 140-acre golf course and turn it into parkland.

Two environmental groups, the Sierra Club and the Planning and Conservation League, which had protested efforts by the company to extend the state's cutback order until Cal Am's desal plant started producing water, said this week they will not oppose the one-year extension because of the offsets outlined in the deal.

"We are now excited to see the accelerating progress on alternative water supplies and on this basis, plan to support the request for a time extension" of the cutback order, said Jonas Minton, water policy advisor for the Planning and Conservation League.

The support from the groups is significant since they have strongly advocated over the years that Cal Am's illegal diversions from the Carmel River must stop because of the harm to steelhead trout and red-legged frog populations in the river.

The state water board is expected to set a hearing on the modification of the cutback order this summer.


Beth Penney is a master baker.

"Once you master the basic recipe," she said, "it's a matter of what you can make of it, how you personalize it and make it yours." Which is probably just what she tells her writing students.



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
