### Residents ask for help after slide imperils road

m W HILE RESIDENTS up and down the Big Sur coast have struggled to maintain access to their neighborhoods after a summer of wildfires and a winter of mudslides, one neighborhood is now at risk of getting cut off.

Located 3.8 miles east of Highway 1 along Palo Colorado Road, Upper Rocky Creek Road is a private dirt route that winds its way for several miles up into the mountains where dozens of people live.

Built in the 1930s as a logging road, it was badly damaged by a slide last winter - in part because the wood used to shore up the hillside burned in the fire. Now, a section of the road clings precariously to the hillside.

The repairs will cost an estimated \$600,000. Coming up with that much money isn't going to be easy for the residents — especially since many of them are still reeling from the devastation of the Soberanes Fire. Sixteen of the 57 homes destroyed in the blaze were located in the neighborhood.

While Big Sur has more than its share of affluent residents, those who live in Upper Rocky Creek are ordinary folks with modest means, one resident told The

"We're working class people," Iris

Johnson explained. "There are no millionaires here." Johnson said the road's survival is essential for residents who live there. "It's our only way in and out," she said.

Because it is in such poor shape, residents have had a difficult time rebuilding their homes. "We can't bring

### Knapp Hardware suddenly closes

■ Landlord posts eviction notice

KNAPP HARDWARE has been a fixture in Carmel for more than 70 years — and a repeated Golden Pine Cone award recipient — so customers were shocked this week to find that the shop at Mission and Eighth was closed for business and an eviction notice had been taped to the front door.

Knapp has long been a go-to place in town for contractors, handymen, do-it-yourselfers and those looking for odds and ends. But the store was closed, a notice from the Monterey County Sheriff's Office indicated that Knapp's, owned by KAPACC Pacific Ltd., was evicted from the property on July 13, and the building was returned to its landlord, the Barnet Segal Charitable Trust.

A Monterey County Superior Court case number was also listed on the document, but a search of the court's website indicated the number was invalid.

It's unclear if or when the hardware store — the only one of its kind in downtown Carmel — will reopen, but a peek inside the shop Tuesday revealed sparse inventory. Phone calls were not answered and the store's voicemail box was

### Panetta bill to expand business opportunities for vets

### ■ Weighs in on Trump's tweet about transgender troops

MILITARY VETERANS who own small businesses and have government contracts will benefit from a U.S. House of Representatives bill co-authored by Democratic Congressman Jimmy Panetta, according to the politician.

On Monday, the House of Representatives approved H.R. 2781, requiring the Department of Veterans Affairs to ensure that veteran-owned businesses are better represented in contracts awarded by the Government Services Administration. The bill also applies to veterans who have service-related

Panetta, a United States Navy Reserve officer who served in Afghanistan, said the bill — which is officially called the "Ensuring Veteran Enterprise Participation in Strategic Sourcing Act" — is a solution that's fair to veteran entrepre-

"Throughout the United States, there are many quality veteran and service-disabled veteran-owned businesses that sell office and janitorial supplies or provide building maintenance services," Panetta said on the House floor Monday. "Those businesses and the government would mutually benefit if the businesses seeking federal contracts were given a fair chance to compete."

The legislation directs Veterans Affairs to verify that the GSA is connecting with small businesses owned by veterans before they make a final decision on a contract for goods and

### Venom unleashed by talk of coastal oil drilling

THE VERDICT is in: People really, really, really, really don't want offshore oil rigs in Monterey Bay or any other protected marine areas in the United States.

Wednesday marked the end of a month-long period for

people to comment on President Donald Trump's April 28 executive order which calls for a review of "all designations and expansions of" national marine sanctuaries, including the Monterey Bay National Marine Sanctuary, to determine the possibility of energy exploration in those areas.

In the executive order, entitled the "America-First Offshore Energy Strategy," Trump contends that increased domestic energy production on federal lands and waters "strengthens the nation's security and reduces reliance on imported energy."

Moreover, "low energy prices, driven by an increased American energy supply, will benefit American families and help reinvigorate American manufacturing and job growth," he said in the order, which compels the Secretary of Commerce, Wilbur Ross, to not expand any of the nation's 13 marine sanctuaries.

But the more than 65,000 people who submitted comments on regulations.gov — the website that accepted public comments for the executive

### **County says winery** parties need permits

### ■ Events 'not part of running a vineyard'

IT WAS advertised as a rather mundane hearing about the definition of "viticulture," but Wednesday's meeting of the Monterey County Planning Commission turned into a wideranging public denunciation of commercial events at a Carmel Valley vineyard, with the result that the commission voted in favor of requiring permits for things like weddings and tours not only at that vineyard, but other grape-growing and winemaking operations in residential parts of the county.

At issue was the 20-acre Hilltop Ranch, just east of Carmel Valley Village, which has a small vineyard but also has become what one neighbor called, "an amazing party venue," where crowds and music have led to numerous complaints about traffic, fire danger, and especially noise.

"What makes Carmel Valley so scenic is that it's such a narrow valley, unlike Napa or Sonoma, but that also means the sound carries," said the neighbor, Frank Hennessey. He said events at Hilltop Ranch, which is owned by Richard Lumpkin, may have started small but have grown in recent years into a "wedding-type thing" that's pretty much gotten

"She's a quiet, loving dog," said a staff member, "and people can't help but pet her."

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
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
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### Stevenson says scam artist seeking donations for football program

SOMEONE POSING as a representative of Stevenson School in Pebble Beach is calling alumni and parents and fraudulently requesting donations for its football program, according to a Stevenson spokeswoman.

In a July 21 email message to the Stevenson community, director of communications Elena Mueller said that the person soliciting donations has nothing to do with the Forest Lake Road boarding school.

"Please be advised that this caller, using an 888 area code, is not associated with either the school or the football program," Mueller said in the message.

Stevenson notified the Federal Trade Commission about the fraud. The commission is the federal agency responsible for investigating fraud in the marketplace.

Mueller said Stevenson does not use call centers or vendors to raise funds on its behalf, but she would not say when the fraudulent phone calls occurred, if anybody had fallen victim to the hoax and whether this is the first time someone has illegally sought donations in Stevenson's name.

"The information in the email that was sent out summarizes where we're at with the situation," Mueller told The Pine Cone.

Federal Trade Commission spokesman Frank Dorman said that while he is not familiar with the Stevenson case, he urged caution when donating money over the phone to someone purporting to be from a

"Our advice is to check things out as much as you can before acting," Dorman, who is based in Washington D.C., told The Pine Cone. "In the case of a caller claiming to be from a school, say you'll 'think it over,' and then call the school to see if it's legitimate."

Stevenson recommends that if someone receives a call or email "of a suspicious nature," contact the FTC at (877) 382-4357 and reference case No. 86435459.

### You can help stuff the bus at CVAC



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

# The gavel falls

Verdicts, pleas and sentencings announced by Monterey County District Attorney Dean Flippo

**June 9** — Robert Bagwell, age 45, entered a plea of no contest to possession of ammunition by a felon.

On January 12, Bagwell was causing a disturbance in his neighborhood. Neighbors had seen Bagwell with a sword and were concerned. Officers from the Soledad Police Department were familiar with Bagwell from prior similar cases and responded. Officers located ammunition and a meth pipe on Bagwell. Bagwell is prohibited from possessing guns or ammunition due to prior felony convictions.

Bagwell was immediately sentenced to eight months in the California Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation by Monterey County Superior Court Judge Andrew Liu.

Bagwell had been previously sentenced on February 22 to six years and eight months in the California Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation for possessing numerous guns and large quantities of ammunition in 2015. Bagwell was out on bail for the 2015 crimes when he committed the current offense. The eight months Bagwell received in the current case will be served consecutively to the previous six-year, eight-month sentence.

June 9 — Paulo Barcenas, 37, a resident of

Salinas, entered guilty pleas for his role in the beating, kidnapping and death of Ronnie Cronn Jr. and for shooting at members of the Monterey County Sheriff's SWAT team.

Monterey County Sheriff's SWAT team.
Ronnie Cronn Jr. went missing in May
2016. The circumstances surrounding the death

of Cronn Jr. include him being beaten and taken to another location where he was killed. His body was then disposed of in a remote area of the county. Parts of his body were recovered in a remote area of Chualar in September 2016.

On October 15, 2016, Barcenas, who was wanted for his role in the death of Cronn Jr., barricaded himself inside the Casa Verde Inn in Monterey.

When members of the SWAT team attempted to serve a search warrant on his room, Barcenas refused to exit and a standoff ensued. Despite requests that he surrender, Barcenas chose to shoot at the deputies as they attempted to enter the room.

Ultimately, the SWAT team deployed a robot to enter the hotel room. Barcenas fired his weapon again towards the SWAT team. The stand-off lasted several hours, and eventually Barcenas was shot once in the chest by a SWAT team member. Barcenas was hospitalized for about two months before being transferred to the Monterey County Jail. No law enforcement personnel or bystanders were injured during the multi-hour ordeal.

Barcenas will receive a sentence of 51 years and four months in prison. Judge Andrew G. Liu presided over the case.

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### AMBULANCE BEHIND YOU IN THE ROUNDABOUT? PULL OVER!

NOTE TO drivers who use the new roundabout at highways 1 and 68: When an emergency vehicle is behind you in the roundabout and on the way to a scene, don't pull over to the left or suddenly stop. That'll just mess things up.

Because some motorists are apparently unsure about what to do if a fire truck or ambulance is in the roundabout at the same time they are, firefighters with Monterey Fire explained Monday how users of the circular intersection should react when emergency responders are behind them.

Just like any road, "when you see an emergency vehicle approaching, you should always pull over to the right when it's safe to do so," Monterey Fire Chief Gaudenz Panholzer explained Monday.

If there isn't adequate space to pull to the right, Panholzer said drivers should continue through the roundabout until they can safely get out of the way. He also explained what not to do.

"You should not stop immediately and you should not pull over to the left," he said. "We see that a lot ... people just want to get out of the way and they think they have room to pull over to the left."

The press event — in which the Monterey Fire department drove journalists around the roundabout in a 57-foot-long ladder truck for questions and photographs - was held in response to queries that the Transportation

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### Trail at Molera is back in business, along with increasing parts of Big Sur

WHILE MOST of Big Sur's wild lands remain closed due to fire and storm damage, a path leading to the beach at Andrew Molera State Park reopened to the public this

Located just a half hour's drive south of Carmel, the once-busy park has been closed since winter storms caused widespread flooding, damaging trails and a parking lot, and rerouting the Big Sur River through the park's campground.

But now, Andrew Molera's Creamery Meadow Trail has reopened, providing local and visitors with a path to get to the park's popular sandy beach. The route is on level ground and is less than a mile long. A seasonal foot bridge provides a way to cross the river without getting your feet wet.

Nepenthe restaurant general manager Kirk Gafill hiked the trail this week and provided a report.

"The beach is so beautiful right now," Gafill said. "The river's mouth is huge, and there's a large lagoon with a couple islands."

Recent photos posted on social media show beachgoers splashing around in the

Gafill said the park's partial reopening marks another milestone in Big Sur's recovery from the Soberanes Fire — and helps counter the impression that there is little to do in Big Sur with so many trails closed. "It's critical, especially for the businesses in Big Sur Valley," he explained.

And if all goes according to plan, more trails within the park will soon open — some perhaps as early as this weekend.

On the south side of the Pfeiffer Creek Bridge project, business is steadily picking up, even though visitors can only get there by hiking across a mile-long trail or driving along the narrow and winding NacimientoFergusson Road.

There are about 300 to 400 people a day coming over the trail," Gafill reported. "We're serving 250 to 300 people a day, as opposed to the 30 or 40 people we served each day before the trail opened."

#### Not many by car


Gafill said the new shuttle system, which is operating on both sides of the bridge project, is working like a charm.

"It's been running at capacity," he said. "It has worked out great on both ends.'

While most of those who are visiting Nepenthe are getting there by walking around the bridge project, a few are making the long haul by car along Nacimiento-Fergusson Road and Highway 1.

"The impacts of the road opening at Paul's Slide are somewhat less than I antici-

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


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

order — didn't exactly share Trump's enthusiasm. They were "outraged," "appalled," "horrified," and "dismayed." And those were just the polite comments.

"Oh, for f\*\*k's sake, leave our marine life alone," Gabrielle Lee wrote July 17. "Most people in California want renewable energy — keep your oil out of our state and let us drive our electric cars in peace."

"I'm F\*\*\*ING horrified by + PISSED at your asinine attacks mounted against some of our nation's greatest treasures," said Thomas Kirk on July 24.

Continuing with the theme, Michaela Delavan said, "Leave the marine monuments alone, you bastards, unless you're adding more. Do you have no f\*\*\*ing respect for our future??"

John Walker said he was "horrified" by the Trump administration's "continuing attacks" against the nation's "greatest treasures." And then he pulled out the heavy artillery.

"This NAZI pres and his NAZIlican administration needs to be tried and incarcerated," Walker said.

#### 'Take residency in Russia'

Cheryl Lilley said she was appalled to read that the Monterey Bay National Marine Sanctuary was on Trump's "hit list" and "are to be destroyed by opening them to line the pockets" of his "wealthy pals" in big oil.

"I look forward to voting you out of office in four years," Lilley wrote.

Lauren Liddle said she is tired of Trump's malicious plans to "destroy our planet for the sake of self-interest" and oil.

"You money-hungry, selfish, greedy idiots," Liddle said.

And yes, the topic of Russia was also

"Do yourself, the country and the world a favor and resign while there is still a world to live in," remarked Clarence Kubitski from Florida. "Or take residency in our biggest enemy — Russia. You and your entire family will fit in nicely."

There are also more tempered comments on the site, including from former California Assemblyman Fred Keeley, who pointed to the advantages of the Monterey Bay National Marine Sanctuary.

"Tens of thousands of jobs ranging from humble service work to world-changing research rely on the sanctuary designation," Keeley said, also noting this year's 25th anniversary of the establishment the sanctuary. "Coastal communities embrace the sanctuary designation and the benefits that have accrued therefrom."

#### Livelihoods at risk?

Daniel Nadsady urged the feds to maintain protection for all the nation's protected marine sanctuaries and monuments, especially those on the West Coast.

"As a member and supporter of the Monterey Bay Aquarium, I am appalled that this administration would even consider scaling back the marine monuments that now exist," Nadsady said.

Allegra Dimperio said allowing for oil rigs would "destroy the ecosystem of the entire Monterey Bay" and put people's livelihoods and health at risk.

"This is not just limited to small business owners who rent kayaks or hourly workers in the restaurants along Cannery Row that rely on local fish, but it would impact hotel owners all along the bay as well," Dimperio said.

Although Justin Vandever said he supports energy independence, he said it "should come by investing in other sources of green energy such as land-based wind and solar — not offshore oil and gas."

Amy Anderson from Monterey said it was "heartbreaking" that the president would consider opening up the coast to drilling or mineral exploration.

"Our Marine Sanctuaries all throughout California are home to fragile wildlife (like the California sea otter) that would otherwise be extinct," she said. "Please do not harm our bay."

Changing the designation of the

Monterey Bay National Marine Sanctuary, or any other marine sanctuary, will undoubtedly spark legal challenges. On Thursday, California Attorney General Xavier Becerra weighed in, saying that while the

state's marine sanctuaries contain some of the "most significant ecosystems in the world," the fossil fuel resources underneath those areas "are minuscule or entirely speculative"

### Youth center needs Concours volunteers

THE CARMEL Youth Center is seeking volunteers to help drive shuttles during Concours on the Avenue and the Tour d'Elegance, and to work in concession stands during the Pebble Beach Concours d'Elegance. In exchange for their hours of free work, volunteers will receive free passes to the Concours — an event where tickets this year will be priced at \$375 apiece.

Just as it does for the AT&T Pebble Beach Pro-Am, the youth center organizes most of the volunteers who sell food and drinks at the Concours, this year set for Sunday, Aug. 20. In return, the Pebble Beach Co. donates a portion of the proceeds from those sales to the youth center.

Most of the volunteer positions at the Concours involve basic food handling, while some of them involve assisting cashiers or serving beverages. Other helpers move products to where they are welcome, and more hands are always needed for setup Saturday and for breakdown Sunday evening after the event ends. The City of Pacific Grove has maintained El Carmelo Cemetery for nearly two centuries. The oldest section of the cemetery features wooden markers and upright monuments. The area where the work is being done is a section with engraved markers that are flush with the grass.

Despite the intrusive work - which includes yellow caution tape around the perimeter of much

of the area where the work is being done -Gho said the city has not received any complaints from family members or other visitors to the cemetery.


"They're going to be the yin to the princesses' yang," said Joni. She noted that the idea to let guys be part of the pageant's royalty has been kicked around for the last 10 years.

The celebration officially ends on Sunday, with a closing ceremony back at Chautauqua Hall, complete with ice cream. For more information, go to www.feast-of-





### Seniors pick up tips for safe driving

IF YOU'RE old enough to remember the driving misadventures of Mr. Magoo in the 1950s TV show, you're probably also old enough to benefit from "Age Well, Drive Smart," a free seminar that attracted two dozen aging drivers to the Monterey headquarters of AAA Auto Insurance on July 19 to learn how to be safer on our roadways.

The two-hour event was co-sponsored by the Department of Motor Vehicles, Monterey-Salinas Transit, Central Coast Senior Services, and other groups each person participated received a certificate for discounts on auto

The doughnut-munching, coffee-sipping crowd chatted happily until CHP Officer Oscar Loza broke the mood with full-screen images of a head-on collision that took the life of a Watsonville college student

several months ago, turning two vehicles into hulks of twisted metal.

That accident did not involve an aging driver, but served to jolt the audience toward a better understanding of the risks we take each time we get behind the wheel. Loza said drivers 65 and older are 16 percent more likely to cause an accident than those in the 25-64 demographic.

His presentation also had a recurring theme: "Sometimes we aren't aware that our driving has become unsafe due to aging," Loza cautioned. "Changes in our judgment, changes in our memories, our vision, and our hearing can often be hard to recognize."

That's when family, friends, or a physician are advised to have "the talk" and suggest that it might be time to give up the car keys. If not, intervention might become necessary by the CHP or the DMV.

Indeed, the DMV now has a senior ombudsman, Rosemary Robles, whose job, she said, "is to assist senior drivers in maintaining their driving privileges as long as they are safe to keep them."

Senior drivers are required to take a written test every five years to validate their competence. Robles said the agency provides information to help seniors prepare for

door ride services also are available.

Deteriorating vision, hearing, strength, depth perception, motor skills, flexibility, memory and cognitive abilities might contribute to diminished driving skills as we age. But Loza also cautioned against factors that cause accidents in all age groups, including fatigue and distractions (including cell phone use and eating while driving), and driving while impaired by alcohol or drugs, prescription or otherwise.



employee, said he was surprised to find out the store was shuttered.

"I can't explain the way I feel because it was such a good business," Decker told The Pine Cone Tuesday afternoon. "Just to get keys made, people will have to go to the Crossroads.'


Decker, who worked at Knapp for a total of about four years, and quit his most recent stint there about a year-and-ahalf-ago, said the shop allowed locals to buy certain hardware items without having to go to a big box store.

"It just saddens me that Carmel doesn't have a hardware store now," Decker said, who said having a hardware shop in town is an essential business like a pharmacy.

Another customer told The Pine Cone that store's inventory had been thin for about a year.

According to May 2016 paperwork filed with the Secretary of State, Colin K. Jackson is the CEO of KAPACC Pacific Ltd., while Alec R. Murphy is its chief financial officer, secretary and acting manager of the hardware store. The state agency indicates KAPACC Pacific's status with the

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Franchise Tax Board is "suspended."

Decker said that Murphy had been running the store before it closed and that Jackson hadn't been noticeably involved in the shop for some time. The Pine Cone could not reach either man for comment.

#### Inventory can be sold

Citing state law, the eviction notice says that the property on the premises has been turned over to the landlord. If a tenant — in this case KAPACC — doesn't pay within 15 days any costs incurred by the landlord to store the shop's inventory and other property, the landlord can sell the property and keep the pro-

In addition to winning several Golden Pine Cones, the Carmel Residents Association three years ago announced it was awarding Knapp Hardware a certificate of appreciation. The CRA said in its June 2014 newsletter that the store "entered a new era of ownership when purchased by Karen and Colin Jackson in 2012."


"Customers heartily agree with their claim of 'supplying the needs of residents so they don't have to go over the hill," the CRA said of the store.

In light of Knapp's closure, Decker said that contractors and others he's spoken to are now going to Ace Hardware in the Crossroads and Home Depot in Seaside.

"There are lots of questions, because contractors relied on [Knapp]," Decker said. "Now it's gone."

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

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veteran-owned businesses since it only applies to those who contract with the government.

Panetta told The Pine Cone Wednesday that Florida Republican Congressman Neal Dunn, a surgeon who served in the U.S. Army, brought the bill to him. The two struck up a friendship after meeting at an orientation for new representatives

"This is the kind of [bipartisan] relationships that need to be fostered in Washington D.C., Panetta said.

#### Transgender troops

Also on Wednesday, Panetta commented on President Donald Trump's sudden announcement that transgender people would no longer be allowed to serve in the military because of the "tremendous medical costs and disruption."

Panetta not only called Trump's comments "disparaging and discriminatory," he also criticized the president for making the proclamation via Twitter, saying it is a way of "governing by edict."

Some Republican lawmakers, including Rep. Vicky Hartzler of Missouri, had proposed overturning an Obama Administration provision allowing transgender troops to undergo sex change surgery and hormone treatment at the expense of taxpayers.

However, Panetta defended the Obama policy, saying that he believed people seeking sex change surgery should have a right to such care at taxpayers' expense if they are in the military. "When you have people who wear the uniform and are ready to serve, they should have the medical treatment they deserve," he said.

It is unknown how many transgender people serve in the armed forces.



pated," Gafill explained. "About 50 cars a day are coming through."


Gafill noted that Google Maps still shows the highway north of Paul's Slide as closed, which could partly explain why more visitors aren't traveling north of the site. Another reason is the lengthy drive that awaits motorists if they take Nacimiento-Fergusson Road. A day trip from the heart of Silicon Valley to Nepenthe would likely require 9 to 10 hours of driving — and overnight accommodations are still limited.

While the economic benefits of reopening the scenic route at Paul's Slide have been modest, Gafill said the psychological benefits for residents who have been stranded on "The Island" have been significant.

"For the first time in awhile, we have 24-7 access to come and go by vehicle," he added. "Just knowing you can do that is really important."

#### Customer satisfactions soars

At the Henry Miller Library, which is located just a short walk south of Nepenthe, visitors have started to trickle in. The library is open Thursday through Sunday. "It's been pretty slow on Thursday and Friday, but last Saturday we did



\$500 in sales," executive director Magnus Toren reported.

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

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



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### Monterey beach closed after sewage spill

PINE CONE STAFF REPORT

SEWAGE THAT spilled from a restaurant's sewer line and into the ocean forced the closure of McAbee Beach in Monterey on Tuesday, according to the Monterey County Environmental Health Bureau.

At about 10:40 a.m. on July 25, the City of Monterey reported that sewage had spilled into the bay after an unidentified restaurant had break in its sewer line.

Environmental Health officials told The Pine Cone that the agency took samples of the water Thursday and were expecting results July 28.

'The beach will remain closed until samples indicate that the water is again safe for contact according to state guidelines," the agency said in a press release this week. Contact with the contaminated water could cause gastroenteritis and other water-borne illnesses.

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

out of hand.

Another neighbor of the ranch, Jorie Clark, who said her property is right next door, described her problems with its events in some detail.

"On a typical Saturday or Sunday, the buses and the cars start rolling in about 12 o'clock," she said. "First you hear a little bit of romantic music, but then later it's 'presenting the maid of honor,' and pretty soon it becomes huge, loud rock music, and clapping and cheering. And there are literally hundreds of people.'

"Having commercial events in a serene, low-density residential zone is not fair to residents," agreed Carol Shadwell, who said she had a condo in the valley. "Sound degrades people's experience of being alive, so I don't think we should allow it in the name of revenue and entertainment."

And it's not just the crowds and the revelry, said Julia Bacha, who lives on Paso Hondo, but the "leaf blowers, caterers and all the activity that goes into staging one of these

"On party days [at Hilltop Ranch], it is not possible to sit outside and enjoy any solitude," she continued.

"The blight is creeping into a very rural setting, and we need to be aware what that will do long-term," said Kim Williams, who lives on Southbank Road.

And Tony Lombardo, who represents Carmel Valley Road resident Dean Hatfield in his effort to curtail events at Hilltop Ranch, said his client had become "an unwilling participant in all the revelry that occurs up there."

#### No limits?

Lombardo asked the planning commission to overturn two recent decisions made by county planning director Carl Holm that gave Hilltop Ranch permission to host "marketing events" as an "ancillary use" to a commercial vineyard — a decision Lombardo said didn't apply "any limits to what Hilltop Ranch could do" and opened the door to events and parties that "have nothing to do with the vineyard and are commercial in nature."

Molly Erickson, representing the Carmel Valley

Association, also asked the commission to tighten the leash on parties and other events at wineries, calling them "a huge issue affecting thousands of properties in the valley.'

John Bridges, an attorney who represented Hilltop Ranch, tried to limit the scope of the hearing and told commissioners a permit for larger gatherings at wineries was in the pipeline and would be the commission's opportunity to tackle that

Meanwhile, Holm defended his ruling that, under existing county policies, wineries were free to host "marketing type events," calling the decision "routine" and asking the planning commission to uphold it.

But, like all such administrative rulings, he also told the commission it was free to "modify or reverse" the decision. Which the commission proceeded to do.

"The bottom line is that the planning director's interpretation rests on the idea that large-scale, onsite marketing events are part of running a vineyard," said planning commissioner Keith Vandevere. "But I don't think that's the case." He said only a small number of vineyards in the county

offer such events. "And it's certainly not something people consider normal to having a vineyard in their neighborhood," Vandevere continued. After he made a motion to require permits for events at

vineyards in residential districts, the commission approved it unanimously. The planning commission also voted to refund the \$3,000 fee the Carmel Valley Association had paid to get the commission to consider the matter.

"When someone raises an issue that has a much broader public benefit to it, a fee waiver is appropriate," said

### Bardis 2-0 despite neighbor's opposition

 ${f J}$  UST TWO weeks after losing her bid to stop her neighbor from expanding his driveway, Pebble Beach resident Tracy Alford lost another battle in front of the Monterey County Board of Supervisors this week — this time over the same neighbor's new fence.

The vote was 3 to 1, with supervisors Mary Adams, John Phillips and Simon Salinas voting to OK the new fence, and supervisor Jane Parker voting against it. Supervisor Luis Alejo was absent.

Chris and Sara Bardis, who live at 1525 Riata Road, had already replaced an old stucco wall with a wooden fence, after receiving the OK from the county planning staff last May. But Alford asked the board to force them to remove it, or at least to go through additional review, according to their attorney, Tony Lombardo, who called the effort, "the most absurd thing I've ever seen."

'No one can see the fence," he said. "It affects no one." But Alford's attorney, John Bridges, insisted his client's effort had merit, and accused county staff of being "bamboozled" when it approved the fence.

Bridges said the Bardises' plan called for building a replacement wall of the same length at the same location. "It is absolutely not in the same location or of the same length,"

But Bridges said his chief concern with the project is that the Bardis' never obtained a coastal development permit, which he said should be required because the wall encroaches on slopes greater than 30 percent.

Meanwhile, Bridges said this week that the driveway permit has been appealed to the coastal commission.

in equipment," resident Pam Peck explained.

Peck said her neighborhood has faced one challenge after another since the Soberanes Fire ignited last July. Even after the blaze was extinguished, residents faced months of difficulties as a result of serious storm damage to Palo Colorado

"It's been really hard on us," Peck said. "We've been through so much. But this little community is working to get through this."

Despite the challenges, most of the residents plan to stay in the neighborhood, and many of those whose homes were destroyed are trying to rebuild. "It's interesting to see how many who lost their homes are dedicated to staying here," Peck added.

To fix the road, multiple tiers of retaining walls will need to be built, with dozens of supports drilled deep enough to penetrate into granite base rock. A crane will be needed to hoist long steel beams and lower them into the holes.

Because the road is private, taxpayers aren't responsible for the repairs. The fundraising effort has received a boost, however, from the Coast Property Owners Association, which has pledged to pay for a significant portion of the bill.

If the money to do the work is raised, construction would likely begin sometime next year. The job will need to be completed before the winter's rains arrive.

The residents of Upper Rocky Creek are asking the public for help to raise the funds needed to fix the road. They've set up a website — www.upperrockycreek.com — that provides a link to a page where donations can be made.



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

Best known for his blockbuster 1976 album, "Silk Degrees," singer-songwriter and guitarist **Boz Scaggs** takes the stage at the Golden State Theatre Aug. 2.


Before he went into the details for this year's event, Parkins mentioned the generosity of Quail Lodge, which included the club in its annual party for residents and mem-



### Sticking it to California

PRESIDENT DONALD Trump's effort to reopen the California coastline to oil exploration is understandably drawing outrage from residents and officials.

But even if you consider all the anger, the hyperbole — and even the Nazi references — to be justified, you'd still have to admit that most of the commenters left a big hole in their arguments when they failed to acknowledge the drilling rig in the room: Where is California's oil supposed to come from?

Even under the most optimistic outlook for the state's alternative energy future, petroleum is still going to be needed in very large quantities in this carladen state for many years to come. The pumps at the corner gas station don't fill themselves. And not only does the oil that eventually ends up there have to be pumped out of the ground somewhere, it has to be refined and transported — all very messy jobs.

We think the odds of oil rigs appearing off the Carmel coast are so small, they aren't really worth worrying about. But that doesn't mean they shouldn't be opposed; after all, it's never too early to stop a bad idea. Still, if you really want to help reduce the pollution that invariably comes from the production and consumption of oil, you have to acknowledge your own role in that pollution every time you fill up your tank — not to mention your selfishness, if you don't care where oil comes from as long as it's nowhere near you.

Meanwhile, Trump's oil drilling initiative can also be seen as just another effort to stick it to this very blue state. And if he can't really open up the coast to oil drilling, just wait for him to set his sights on eliminating the federal deduction for state and local taxes. If you have a steady income or own real estate, the loss of that deduction is something you'll really be pissed about.

### Not just the usual blah blah



British-born sandra Burnham began studying ballet at age 4 and, by 16, was considered a fully trained classical dancer. However, after spending a season dancing with the Royal Ballet's "Ballet for All" program, she'd grown too tall, at 5 feet

"My life turned completely upside down," said Burnham. "We rehearsed during the day, and danced two shows a night, until 2 a.m., seven nights a week. It was really strenuous, but I absolutely loved it. It was a

rich, wonderful life and so exciting to be on stage at the Lido, which was very famous."

And then, one day, she stopped. Burnham was invited to work as a high-fashion photographic and runway model in Paris for Vogue, which was looking for models who

it really accelerated."

Plamondon's instructors at the school were an all-star team that included Richard Diebenkorn, James Weeks, Gordon Cook, and Jack Jefferson — all celebrated California artists. Pierre Bonnard, a 19thcentury post-impressionist, and still-life artist Georgio Morandi were also influences.

"The first painting I ever sold was at a show the institute held every year at the San Francisco Museum of Art," he said. "It was a large abstract, and the director of the San Francisco Opera bought it for \$200, or maybe it was \$300. I recall feeling very encouraged that somebody would pay good money for my work."

Plamondon remembers the four years he spent at San Francisco Art Institute as the best of his life — a nonstop party and a time of important growth.

"I lived at a place called the Parker

Residence Club, a five-story wooden building that somehow had survived the 1906 San Francisco Earthquake," he said. "It had become a colony of artists, writers and musicians, and I lived in a two-room apartment with a great girlfriend. It was wonderful."

#### 'Spellbinding'

Plamondon- earned his Bachelor of Fine Arts degree in 1967, worked at Nepenthe Restaurant that summer (often hitchhiking from Carmel to Big Sur), and enjoyed the "Summer of Love" in Haight-Ashbury in '67. He had surgery for a congenital heart defect in '71, endured a lengthy rehabilitation, and he worked odd jobs until '73.

"I sold an occasional painting, but felt like I had hit another dead end and began to think about graduate school," he said. "I applied at Boston University, where, by coincidence, Jim Weeks, one of my former instructors at San Francisco Art Institute happened to be teaching. He saw my application, called me up, and said, 'You're accepted get out here!'

At Boston University, the 33-year-old Plamondon studied under painter/printmaker Phil Guston, who he says impacted him on an emotional and psychological level.

"His knowledge and interpretation of art history were spellbinding," he said. "I had never met anybody like him in my life, and never have since."

Plamondon's art sales took off after graduate school when he was invited to show at Boston's famous Alpha Gallery, where his first one-man show sold out. In 1985, when he was showing at Chase Gallery in Boston, his paintings brought \$55,000 in income.

"I was making enough money at the time that I could actually lock my door in Boston in the summer and move to Cape Cod for four months," he said. "It was wonderful."

His intricate still-life paintings — often renderings of cups, pottery, rugs - have been showcased in 15 solo exhibitions and nearly three dozen group shows over the years. His work has been collected privately by author Danielle Steel and opera superstar Beverly Sills, among others.

Now happily living back here near Forest Hill Park, Plamondon continues to work consistently in his home studio.

"I paint at night. I paint every night, and if I didn't, I'd probably be in a mental institution," Plamondon laughed. "It's the reason I get out of bed every day, and if a day goes by when I don't paint, I feel really weird and incomplete."

history. Burnham, who had polished her typing skills in the secretarial school her mother had insisted upon as a back-up plan to ballet, became a production assistant on the longrunning show, "To Tell the Truth."

"I continued taking dancing classes," said Burnham. "I wasn't about to give up dance, but it was wonderful to do something so completely different."

Two years later, she returned to England to pursue her secret ambition of opening her own ballet school. She established the Pegler Burnham School, named for herself and her son, ballet master Philip Pegler, in a small Yorkshire town.

"People in the countryside didn't understand one could create a career in ballet," said Burnham. "We started the school with just six students. A newspaper article ran about the school, and before we knew it, we had 100 students. We started with pure, classical ballet and later added modern dance. We had the school for 27 years."

### Making a home

Renowned for the high caliber of her students, Burnham was approached by the Royal Academy of Dance in London, to become an international ballet examiner. Reportedly one of the world's most influential dance education organizations, the academy sets global standards for classical ballet, teacher training and continuing professional development in dance.

Burnham has been traveling the world to examine certified dance academies for 27 years, to ensure that they continue to meet the Royal Academy's standards.

Four years ago, after years of vacationing with her husband, Howard Burnham, in her parents' old haunt of Pacific Grove, the couple made it their home. Having contacted

Cousins: co-conspirators in childish mischief; co-celebrants at weddings and births; co-mourners at funerals; companions for life.

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
