#### Your chance to see something you never heard of

■ Amid all the Rolls-Royces, Bentleys and Aston Martins, don't miss the Winton

WHAT ON earth is a Winton?" Even if you're an auto aficionado, you could be forgiven for not knowing the answer.

The Winton Motor Carriage Company manufactured cars for fewer than 30 years, from 1897 to 1924, in Cleveland, Ohio. Only a few examples have survived, but at next week's Pebble Beach Concours d'Elegance, the company's handiwork will be on display, right there with dozens of more highly acclaimed classic automobiles.

Winton was the largest producer of gas-powered autos in the United States in the late 19th and early 20th centuries, with a whopping 100 sold in 1899. However, it didn't make that many of them overall — especially when compared with some of its later, better known competitors, like Cadillac and Studebaker.

Only known example

Stewart Laidlaw of Connecticut restored the only known existing 1910 model for the Myron Schuster family of Redding. Schuster, a celebrated car collector, died in 2018, but his son, Lenny, will show the Winton at the Concours d'Elegance. It was acquired from the famous Bothwell collection in Los Angeles. Laidlaw said the car was "in a minimum of

"I'd seen the car all my life," said the former resident

of Murphys in California's Gold Country. "We used to go see Bothwell's collection." Laidlaw set about bringing the Schusters' Winton back to its former glory. "It had low mile-

#### COUNCIL BACKS OFF IMMEDIATE BEACH WOOD-FIRE BAN

 $\Gamma$ ACED WITH the prospect of having to fight with the California Coastal Commission over beach fires for a change that will expire in a year anyway, the city council Tuesday night decided not to try a temporary ban on wood fires. The council was poised to adopt an ordinance to put the one-year prohibition in place but decided not to.

Therefore, the status quo - wood fires allowed in up to a dozen city-supplied fire pits on the sand south of 10th Avenue from spring to fall between the hours of 4 and 10 p.m. — will remain until what the city calls its "beach fire pilot program" expires in November 2020. The temporary program, which put an end to the decades-old and very popular tradition of building beach fires directly on the sand, reduced the amount of debris left on the beach and smoke in the air, and was enacted after vehement protests from residents about damage to the coastal environment.

#### Higher sales tax planned

THE ADDITIONAL 1 percent sales tax voters approved in 2012 — which brings in an extra \$3 million a year the city spends on debt, pension liability and public projects — is set to expire in 2023. Council members said Tuesday that they not only want to extend the increase, they want to raise it to 1.5 percent and keep that higher rate in place for another 20 years. If approved by voters, the increase would bring the sales tax in Carmel to 9.25 percent.

#### **Uncertain timing**

It's unknown whether the new tax would start a couple of months after the March 2020 election — assuming voters OK it — or if it would kick in after the current tax ends, city administrator Chip Rerig explained after the meeting. He said staff is also researching whether the 20-year clock would start ticking upon voter approval, or when the current tax expires.

adopted permanent beach fire rules, which will also have to be approved by the coastal commission.

#### Put the fight aside, for now

At this week's meeting, several members of the public spoke about beach fires, with some defending the tradition and others arguing that a 95 percent reduction in the number of fires isn't enough because even a minuscule amount of smoke in the air is dangerous.

Carmel Residents Association President Barbara Livingston said that while her group opposes wood fires, it would

#### Adams cools tempers, owner promises 'fresh start' on Mid-Valley Center

IN STARK contrast to last month's contentious land use advisory committee meeting on the renovation of Mid-Valley Center, this week's workshop on the topic at the Palo Corona Regional Park headquarters was downright civil.

Moderated by Monterey County 5th District Supervisor Mary Adams, the Aug. 6 gathering gave locals a chance to ask questions and voice their concerns about the renovation of the shopping center, which was bought by developer Russ Stanley in June 2018 for \$11.5 million.

Stanley's plans to spruce up the shopping center ran into a buzzsaw at a July 15 county land use advisory committee hearing, where locals weren't shy about loudly criticizing them. In particular, many were upset about painting that's already been done, and rumors that Stanley planned not to renew the leases of several businesses, including a popular car repair shop.

At this week's gathering, Adams was flanked by Monterey County planning official Brandon Swanson, Carmel Valley Association president Pris Walton, project architect Henry Ruhnke, and Stanley.

#### 'This is a fresh start'

From the start, Adams made it clear she wasn't picking a winner in the dispute.

"I'm not on one side or the other," she explained. "My neutrality is absolutely critical."

Stanley, meanwhile, apologized to the crowd of about 200 people for the way the makeover was introduced.
"This is a fresh start," Stanley said. "I want to apologize

for the way we did this last time - we should have solicited more feedback."

Ruhnke elaborated on what Stanley said.

"We want to take many steps back and reach out to the public," Ruhnke said. "Our goal is to come back in a month

#### Pole surveillance cameras: One down, five to go

IN WHAT might be the most slowly progressing city project ever, the first of six utility poles was equipped last week with cameras to be used by the police department for surveillance. While the cameras are capturing images of every car and license plate that passes through the intersection of Carpenter and Ocean, public works director Bob Harary said, the schedule for installation of the remaining cameras is "unknowable," due to PG&E, which is allowing the city to attach the equipment to its poles.

The city council approved the concept of installing two cameras on each of a half-dozen poles along the perimeter of town in December 2017 and allocated funds for the project in subsequent months — money that has been allocated again and again as budget years have come and gone. In July 2018,







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#### City to embark on climate change study

WHILE A few speakers urged the city council on Tuesday to hire an expert on climate change to study its potential impacts on Carmel and determine what actions the city can take to address them, others backed the idea of forming a committee comprising two council members, two city employees and a few members of the public to take on the is-

Public works director Bob Harary listed 11 federal, state and local studies written over the past eight years "that identify climate

change impacts and resilience strategies to be used in the Monterey Peninsula region," but none specifically address Carmel, he noted in his Aug. 6 report.

"In order to take action, we will need this city-specific information to identify, prioritize and fund" whatever measures must be taken to offset impacts of climate change here, he said. Therefore, the "Climate Change and Resilience Plan" would have two components — a section on impacts applicable to Carmel, and a section on what the city can do to adapt to climate change and actions it can take to help mitigate it.

In this year's budget, the city council decided to spend \$55,000 on a climate change study, and Harary listed four different ways to approach it:

- Hire a consultant, which will be quick but expensive and involve little feedback from city officials and the public;
- have city employees do the work and hold public workshops, which would involve the most public input and be a "challenging growth opportunity for staff' but would take city workers' time away from other projects and put people who lack technical expertise in charge;
- form a council committee, which would be the least expensive but would require resources because council members are not experts in climate change, either;
- have a "hybrid working group" of two council members, two city employees and two to four community members "who have technical expertise and/or great interest in the subject."


That fourth option would provide a "balanced approach,"



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trates, the sandy bluffs along Carmel Beach are already vulnerable to erosion during major storms – and it's a problem that will only get much worse if sea levels rise significantly.



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

#### The gavel falls

Verdicts, pleas and sentencings announced by Monterey County District Attorney Jeannine Pacioni

May 30 — Angel Vasquez, 20, a resident of Madera, pled guilty to eight counts of unlawful sexual intercourse with a minor, one count of oral copulation with a minor, and one count of violating a court order. There was a total of seven minor victims.

Between 2017 and 2018, Vasquez engaged in sexual intercourse with seven minor females who were between 14 years old and 17 years old, when Vasquez was between 18 and 19 years of age. Vasquez impregnated four of the minors, however three minors had miscarriages. Furthermore, after Judge Mark E. Hood ordered Vasquez not to have any contact with the seven minors, Vazquez continued to contact three minors.

Vasquez faces up to four years and four months in prison. In addition, he will be required to register as a sex offender.

June 20 — Louis Gutierrez, a 39-year-old resident of Salinas, pled guilty to assault with a gang enhancement, which means the crime was committed on behalf of the Norteño criminal street gang. Gutierrez also admitted two prior strike convictions for attempted murder and assault with a semiautomatic firearm. The co-defendant, 22-year-old Richard Diaz, pled no contest to felony assault on April 26.

On Aug. 7, 2018, the group Motivating Individual Leadership for Public Achievement organized an event called "National Night Out for Safety and Liberation" at a local skate park. Gutierrez, a known Norteño gang member affiliated with the Fremont Street subset, served as

an event coordinator while on active parole for attempted murder.

Gutierrez approached a 14-year-old sitting on his bicycle and said, "You want to take a walk with me? I'll beat you down in slacks G." Gutierrez then made a motion towards the victim as if to hit him, causing the victim to flinch, raise his arms to protect himself and call Gutierrez a "bitch." Gutierrez then walked away just as his co-defendant ran up to the victim and began to attack him stating, "You don't call the big homie a bitch, homie." Diaz struck the minor victim numerous times in the head and face with closed fists, eventually knocking the victim off his bike and onto the ground. While the attack was taking place, Gutierrez was heard telling the crowd, "Let em, let em."

Diaz continued to attack the victim until Gutierrez stopped it by saying, "Alright you're good, you're good." Diaz stopped striking the victim, walked away and told the victim, "You better f\*\*king recognize where the f\*\*k you're at, homie."

The entire attack was captured on Snapchat video by onlookers and submitted to the Salinas Police Department.

Gutierrez will be sentenced on Sept. 18 by the Honorable Pamela L. Butler to two years in the California Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation for aiding and abetting the assault with a gang enhancement. The three-strikes law doubled the one-year term for this crime. Diaz, who has no prior felony record, was sentenced to three years on felony probation.



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#### Transient caught with wine bottles, cash register

A HOMELESS man found hiding in the bushes near the beach with empty wine bottles and a stolen cash register Friday afternoon admitted to burglarizing the Tree House restaurant and stealing from Carmel Belle, according to Carmel Police Cmdr. Luke Powell.

Kyle Christel, a 31-year-old transient from Hayward, had been in the Tree House, located on San Carlos south of Seventh, several times before his arrest, starting on July 31, when he stole a bottle of wine. "Christel was arrested for that theft and then returned to the business the following day and refused to leave," he said.

So, when the restaurant owner arrived at work the afternoon of Aug. 2 and discovered a burglary had occurred sometime during the night, and the cash register and several bottles of wine were missing, he immediately suspected Christel.

#### Usual suspect

The police officers on duty that day, Ricardo Mendoza and Cpl. Michael Bruno, knew Christel and started searching for him, according to Powell. Shortly before 1 p.m., they found him hiding in the brush just south of the Del Mar parking lot at the foot of Ocean Avenue near the beach.

"On the ground, around Christel, officers noticed multiple

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empty bottles of wine and a cash register concealed deeper in the bushes," he said.

They handcuffed him, advising him he was being detained but was not under arrest, but "Christel immediately admitted to taking the cash register from the Tree House Café," Powell said. After they read him his Miranda rights, Christel admitted again that he had stolen the cash register and wine found in his campsite from the Tree House, and told officers he'd also taken wine from a restaurant in the Doud Arcade, also located

"Officers later determined the second location to be Carmel Belle, which was unaware of the theft until officers informed them," Powell said.

Christel was taken to Monterey County Jail, where he was booked on two counts of felony commercial burglary. He has since been released from jail.


"Bring the family to the farm for an outdoor movie on our giant screen," reads an invitation to the event.

The food stand is located at 7250 Carmel Valley Road, about three miles east of Highway 1.




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#### Caltrans says 'No' to vendors at Bixby Bridge and Big Sur turnouts

RECENT ATTEMPTS by vendors to sell their wares next to landmark Bixby Bridge have some wondering if such business activity is allowed there by California's new sidewalk vending law.

But Caltrans pushed back against the practice this week.

"Highway system 'Vista Points' and 'Safety Roadside Rest Areas' are not considered public sidewalks," Caltrans official Corby Kilmer said. "This has been determined previously in many court cases, and as far as I know, the new SB946 legislation has not changed that. Both federal highway regulations and the California State Streets and Highway Code prohibit any commercial activity within the state highway right of way."

According to Kilmer, the only commercial activity allowed at such sites is vending machines, which are "strictly regulated" by the

Kilmer encouraged Caltrans personnel to report vendors who try to set up shop in turnouts. "If unpermitted [illegal] activity of any kind is taking place at the vista points or elsewhere in the highway right of way, Caltrans maintenance staff can and should ask them to leave," Kilmer said. "And if it becomes a problem, staff can call the California Highway Patrol for assistance with enforcement."

Just last weekend, a vendor set up a display of tie-died T-shirts along the shoulder across from the Bixby Bridge turnout. One local who spoke with the vendors said they claimed what they were doing was allowed under the state's sidewalk vending law.

#### Parks off-limits

If they can't use turnouts, "sidewalk" vendors would seem to have few options for operating in Big Sur. Federal properties, like Pfeiffer Beach and Sand Dollar Beach, are not covered by the state's sidewalk vending law, which went to into effect Jan. 1. The law also exempts state parks from being required to accommodate vendors.

The vending controversy is just a small part of ongoing problem at Bixby Bridge, where traffic routinely snarls as motorists slow down or stop to take photographs. In response, the turnout next to the bridge was defaced with anti-tourism graffiti last month.

In the turnout next to Bixby Bridge, recent anti-tourism graffiti is painted over. Not only does traffic snarl daily at the site, but vendors are selling their wares there. This week, Caltrans made it clear such vending is not legal.

WITH THE Concours on the Avenue closing downtown streets Tuesday, the Pebble Beach Tour d'Elegance doing the same on Thursday, and a smaller event taking up a few blocks on Wednesday, driving and parking in the city will be unusually tough next week.

To help smooth things the week of Aug. 12-18, especially on the big event days, extra officers will be on patrol, parking will be restricted, and shuttles will be running between Larson Field on Rio Road and the center of town from 8 a.m. to 8 p.m. Aug. 13 and Aug. 15.

Streets to be closed for the largest event in the city, Concours on the Avenue, include Ocean between Junipero and

### Firefighters team up with friendly weather to douse Mill Fire

NINE DAYS after a wildfire broke out along Nacimiento-Fergusson Road in Big Sur and gave locals a scare, firefighters have it about 95 percent contained.

"The fire was unstaffed last night," reported the United States Forest Service, which is leading the effort to battle the blaze. "Only a few interior smokes have been observed. Today, a helicopter dropped water on hot spots."

The fire scorched about 310 acres, but it has barely spread in recent days — in part due to the efforts of firefighters, and in part due to low wind and moderate humidity.

To stop the fire from spreading, firefighters focused on keeping the flames on the north side of Nacimiento Fergusson Road, and preventing them from moving into the Mill Creek and Kirk Creek watersheds.

"This is a real success story," Lynn Olsen of the forest service told The Pine Cone Aug. 8. "The weather has helped, and it was handled well. It's not out, but it's contained."

With the fire close to being extinguished, the United States Forest Service has reassigned most of the firefighters who initially responded to it.

"We're down to about 100 people and equipment," Olden reported. "That number will be further reduced today and tomorrow."

The fire started shortly before sunrise July 30. While its cause hasn't yet been determined, it sparked in an area where illegal campfires are common. Due to its proximity to Mill Creek, it's been named the Mill Fire.

While the fire appears nearly extinguished, Olsen urged people to stay vigilant about threat of wildfire, which will only increase in Big Sur until it rains. "Because we had a wet winter, our critical fire time is pushed back a bit," she added.

Monte Verde, as well as Mission, San Carlos, Dolores and Lincoln between Sixth and Seventh. Devendorf Park will be used for displays, too, and all of the couple-hundred cars on display will line up on San Carlos Street south of Ocean starting early Tuesday to enter the exhibit areas.

On Wednesday, the Prancing Ponies car show will shut down Dolores Street from Ocean to Fifth, and Sixth Avenue between San Carlos and Lincoln streets from morning until late afternoon.

#### Tour the cars

And on Thursday, Ocean Avenue will closed both directions between Junipero and Monte Verde for the Pebble Beach Tour d'Elegance, which rolls into town around 11:30 a.m. from the south via Junipero. Drivers leave 100 or so highly desirable collector cars parked on Ocean for a couple of hours while they, their guests and city dignitaries picnic in Deven-

dorf Park, allowing the public to view the rare and unusual machines for free before the tour resumes in the afternoon and returns to Pebble Beach.

Parking enforcement won't be the only thing that's stepped up during the week. "The police department will strictly enforce vehicle code violations, including street racing, exhibition of speed, side shows and other minor vehicle code violations that endanger the public," Cmdr. Luke Powell said this week

People interested in taking the city shuttles should use Highway 1 to get to Rio Road and park at Larson Field, adjacent to the Carmel Mission, and drivers who want to come into town should enter via Carpenter Street or from Rio Road, not from Ocean Avenue, according to Powell.

In addition, the city prohibits the use of drones anywhere in town during Concours Week, which concludes with the Pebble Beach Concours d'Elegance Aug. 18.

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■ City eyes more restrictions

THOSE WHO have leaf blowers on their list of things to despise will be pleased to know that the Pacific Grove City Council is considering a ban on the gasoline-powered versions.

After reviewing a report by city staff on the current leaf-blower ordinance Wednesday, the city council recommended coming up with a new ordinance that prohibits gas-powered leaf blowers but permits the electric variety.

"It was recognized by all council members that the current ordinance requiring sound level measurements was unenforceable due to practical reasons," Mayor Bill Peake told The Pine Cone Thursday morning.

The city's municipal code states that it is "unlawful for any person to operate within 50 feet of the real property line of adjacent public or private property a gasoline or other fuel-powered combustion engine leaf blower or any leaf blower that is capable of producing continuous airborne sound that exceeds 56 decibels measured at 50 feet in any direction."

But city employees and police officers are not equipped with decibel meters to measure

sound levels, so the ordinance is difficult to enforce.

It also does not specifically mention electric leaf blowers, which are typically much quieter than the gasoline versions.

The city gets about one leaf-blower complaint a month.

In his report to the council, environmental programs manager Milas Smith said it can be time consuming and costly for cities to enforce leaf-blower ordinances, and that bans on the devices can have financial impacts on gardeners and landscapers.

#### Hurt the gardeners?

The council considered getting feedback from gardeners on the cost to convert to electric blowers and allowing workers a lengthy period, up to 24 months, for instance, to switch over. A possible rebate program to mitigate the cost was also discussed.

City staff "will return with additional information and a draft ordinance at a later council meeting," Peake said.

Councilwoman Jenny McAdams said Smith also plans to look at cities that have banned all leaf blowers and those that have banned just gas blowers to gauge their successes and challenges, and report back to the

Annoying — but effective — leaf blowers under scrutiny in Pacific Grove

While council members were concerned about dust, noise and greenhouse gas emissions from the devices, only three citizens spoke out, including former city councilman Rudy Fischer, who recommended the city not impose a ban. Lisa Ciani said blowers are bad for the environment, and Connie Masotti recommended a ban.

Soon after leaf blowers were introduced in the 1970s, Carmel-by-the-Sea was the first city in California to ban them because of the

By 2000, 20 California cities had prohibited blowers; sometimes only within residential neighborhoods, but usually targeting the gasoline-powered type. Eighty cities now have ordinances restricting either usage, noise lev-

While blowers are also knocked for the

dust they kick up, a 2006 study showed that emission impacts from dust suspended by leaf blowers are low and dissipate within six minutes after use.

The city's own public works department uses gas-powered blowers for road work, and the golf course also uses them for landscape maintenance.

Though electric blowers are much quieter, any type of the device is a trigger for some people, including one Pacific Grove woman who several years ago slapped a gardener for using a blower and cursed out two of her neighbors for using them, police told The Pine Cone at the time.

A 1996 experiment by the City of Tarzana showed that gardeners equipped with leaf blowers spent 23 minutes maintaining a yard compared to 34 minutes by those who maintain the same yard with a rake and broom.

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#### Chamber president is first to buy water

THE CITY of Pacific Grove this week sold its first "surplus" water, and the satisfied buyer is the chamber of commerce president, who is planning to use the H2O for a small house he's building next to his home on Sunset Drive.

In May, the P.G. City Council OK'd the sale of water credits for residential and commercial use within the city. While a quarter million dollars will get you the right to use an acre-foot (about 326,000 gallons) per year, the amount of water needed for an average home is much less than that. Of course, even after paying the steep up-front fee, purchasers still have to pay monthly bills after they start using the water.

Chamber President Moe Ammar said he paid \$10,150 for an entitlement to use enough water for an 800-square-foot, two-bedroom, one-and-a-half-bath granny unit on his property. Ammar's son and daughter-in-law, who were married July 26, will live in the new home, which will also be equipped with a clothes washer and dishwasher.

"I will be building this house for close to \$300 per square foot, and it's a brand-new house," said Ammar, who purchased the water Tuesday. "That's compared to the lowestselling house that sold most recently for \$733 per square foot."

Ammar got a 30 percent discount on the water, a promotion the city is offering until Dec. 31, 2020.

The water is available because of the city's Local Water Project, a treatment facility near the municipal golf links that processes sewage from homes and businesses to provide non-potable water for irrigation of the public golf course and cemetery. The water district established an ordinance three years ago allowing the water entitlements.

#### **Existing meters only**

Ammar is encouraging other property owners who can use the water to take advan-

"The story here is how easy the city made it to buy the water and how reasonable it is," Ammar said. "You don't need a completely approved project" to be eligible to buy water. "All you have to do is submit your plans."

Homeowners can use the water entitlements to add a shower or toilet, or install a sink in a garage, for instance. The water cost

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






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#### Background checks, limits on rifles, would 'save lives,' Panetta says

DEMOCRATIC CONGRESSMAN Jimmy Panetta this week demanded that the U.S. Senate pass federal bills requiring background checks for firearms and a ban on assault weapons after shooters in Gilroy, El Paso and Dayton killed and injured dozens of people.

Panetta made numerous comments on social media in the past week in response to the shootings, including calling for Senate Majority Leader Mitch McConnell to hold votes on two background checks bills OK'd by the House of Representatives in February.

"This inaction must stop," Panetta said on Facebook. "We know background checks save lives. Every day, background checks stop more than 170 felons and 50 domestic abusers from getting guns."

He also said the country is "well past the turning point when it comes to doing something on gun violence," and that it "starts with the Senate voting on background checks."

Panetta joined members of the Congressional Gun Violence Prevention Task Force and 213 Democrats Wednesday to insist that the Republican-led Senate — which has not yet considered the bills — go back into session to hold a vote on the legislation, which, in part, would prohibit the transfer of firearms between private parties unless a licensed gun dealer, manufacturer or importer takes possession of the firearm to conduct a background check.

The Carmel Valley congressman noted that it's been 160 days since House members passed the legislation and said, "if the Senate can't even do their damn jobs and hold votes on these background checks bills, we must hold them account-

On Thursday, McConnell expressed a willingness, according to the New York Times, to consider a measure expanding background checks for all gun purchasers.

President Donald Trump said he's open to extensive background checks, but also said there's no "political appetite" for banning semi-automatic rifles.

Panetta, who served with the U.S. Navy Reserves as an intelligence analyst in Afghanistan, also called for the Senate to pass the Assault Weapons Ban of 2019, a bill introduced by Sen. Dianne Feinstein earlier this year. (The types of rifles used in the recent mass shootings are already illegal to purchase in California.)

"Having served our country in a war zone, I know the lethality of rapid-fire, military-style weapons," he said.

The bill would make it a crime to import, sell, manufacture, transfer or own a semiautomatic assault weapon or large capacity magazine. The bill allows people who already own such assault weapons to keep them but not sell or transfer them. Congress, according to Panetta, must "possess the will to help prevent these horrific events," and said he would continue to "fight to create change in Congress when it comes to reducing gun violence."

While Panetta spoke freely on social media, he did not respond to questions from The Pine Cone about the bills.

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


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#### Council OKs preservation contract, tax break for Frank Lloyd Wright house

CHUCK HENDERSON and his family, longtime owners of the distinctive Frank Lloyd Wright-designed house built on the rocks above the south end of Carmel Beach, will get a tax break in exchange for their commitment to protect and rehabilitate the house formally named Cabin on the Rocks for at least the next decade, the city council decided Tuesday evening.

Commissioned by Della Walker, Henderson's great-grandmother, from the famous architect in 1948 and completed in 1952, the home is on the local, state and national historic registers, and in June, the city's historic resources board voted to recommend the city council approve Henderson's proposal.

Over a 10-year period starting in 2020, Henderson said he plans to replace the roof, living room upholstery and north side windows, shore up the north side bluffs and repair the stone steps to the beach, install a new boiler, and put in an automatic gate to discourage the trespassers that have become a problem, among other improvements.

All the work has to be done in conformance with the Secretary of Interior's Standards for Rehabilitation of Historic Properties, and according to his estimates, the maintenance and repairs will cost \$1,112,533. The contract has a minimum term of 10 years, and one year is added to the term on each annual anniversary date to extend the agreement up to 20 years, unless Henderson or the council terminates it.

#### 'A golden opportunity'

At the Aug. 6 meeting, Henderson was brief with his com-

"I am the lucky family member who gets to look after this house," the Burlingame resident said. "We've been, hopefully, good stewards for a long time, and this will help us do that into future generations, as well. I appreciate your consideration and your support in the past for all the work we've had to do."

Resident Carl Iverson said the city is lucky the home has such good owners, who also make it available to tours organized by the Carmel Heritage Society and other local charities. "It is a golden opportunity for us to approve this," he said.

Mayor Dave Potter said he's been "a big Mills Act supporter for many years," because the contracts are very restrictive regarding what changes can be made, thus helping to preserve important cultural resources for the community while providing financial incentives for their owners to reinvest in their properties.

While councilman Jeff Baron said he appreciates Henderson's efforts, he wondered if the contract could be terminated if the Frank Lloyd Wright house were sold. Mills Act contracts run with the land, so they remain in place regardless

of changes in ownership, senior planner Marnie Waffle said, but Baron didn't want the city and county to miss out on what

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
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#### P.G. council still evaluating city manager's performance

THE PACIFIC Grove City Council this week held its fifth closed session to discuss the city manager's employment.

The council met Wednesday night to continue Ben Harvey's performance evaluation. Harvey began working for the city in early 2016 and replaced Tom Frutchey.

In a letter Monday to Harvey, members of the city council and others, resident Luke Coletti claimed Harvey works at city hall only three-and-a-half days per week.

"The city manager must be here five days a week — no exceptions," Coletti wrote. "If his personal life means he needs to work elsewhere, then so be it. There are plenty of qualified managers available who are willing to show up for work."

Harvey, who has said he regularly visits his children in Southern California, did not respond to a Pine Cone inquiry about how many hours he typically works at city hall each week.

However, on July 30, Harvey told The Pine Cone that he has not requested a "reduced work week of four days, or of any other length" as part of his employment negotia-

Harvey in 2017 earned \$232,692.75 in total pay and benefits, according to website Transparent California.

The city council in December 2017 voted to give Harvey a \$4,000-per-month "housing and transportation" reimbursement plan so he could fly to Long Beach on the weekends to see his children, and a \$500-per-month car allowance.

City attorney David Laredo said the multiple performance evaluation sessions included sessions when not all the council members

'Taken together — and without revealing confidential information — there have been few closed sessions that allowed substantive discussion," Laredo said.

### Mexican restaurant must pay \$5K for violating asbestos abatement law

A POPULAR Mexican restaurant on Cannery Row settled a Monterey County lawsuit this week that alleged it failed to adhere to asbestos regulations when it remodeled part of the eatery early this year.

The Monterey County District Attorney's Office said in a July 31 lawsuit that FM Restaurants Holdco Inc., which owns El Torito at 600 Cannery Row in Monterey, did not comply with asbestos inspection and noticing requirements during demolition and renovation of the restaurant in January.

FM Restaurants "failed to provide" the Monterey Bay Unified Air Pollution Control District "with written notification at least 10 days prior to conducting demolition activities in a facility, in violation" of the agency's rules, the lawsuit says.

The district attorney's office complaint alleged nuisance, waste and negligence on the part of El Torito's parent company and said it "engaged in certain unlawful, unfair and fraudulent practices in violation of" state law.

The complaint, filed by deputy district attorney Dije Ndreu, requested civil penalties of up to \$10,000 for each violation of

the county and federal regulations, and up to \$2,500 for violation of state asbestos laws. It also asked for the cost of investigating and prosecuting the case.

However, Monterey County Superior Court Judge Susan J. Matcham Tuesday approved a settlement that includes the restaurant paying a total of \$5,480 in penalties and court fees.

#### Already removed

Ndreu said El Torito was remodeling the kitchen area when the violations occurred, but that the restaurant was closed at the time.

"There was no asbestos found when the kitchen was tested after the fact; however, many of the affected building materials had already been removed and disposed of offsite prior to that testing, so it is unknown whether those materials contained asbestos," Ndreu said.

Pollution control district officer Richard Stedman told The Pine Cone that the City of Monterey notified the district when it discovered that El Torito had done work that went "well beyond the scope" of what the restaurant "originally identified in the permitting process."

#### COMMUNITY ACTIVITIES **COMMISSION WANTS** HELP ON SCOUT HOUSE

IF THE long-closed Scout House is renovated and reopened to the public, how should it be used? That's what the community activities commission hopes to learn through online surveys and workshops, according to a discussion at its Aug. 6 meeting.

The building at Mission and Eighth was constructed by M.J. Murphy in 1931 for use by the Boy Scouts and was added to the city's historic inventory in 2002. Closed more than 15 years ago due to fears of lawsuits over ADA access, the Scout House had a little work done on the driveway and parking area three years ago but has otherwise seen little love from the city.

But in June, the city council decided to put the "Scout House Use and Renovation Design" project on its list of capital improvements for the 2019-2020 fiscal year. The goal is to "determine the future use of Scout House to inform its renovation," community activities director Ashlee Wright said. "Once the intended uses are identified, an architect will be hired to assess the current facility, design upgrades, ensure the design meets the current building code and ADA requirements, and prepare construction documents suitable for bidding the work as a public works project."

Wright suggested using community surveys to learn what people think, similar to what she and the commission did for the farmers market several months ago.

"We had over 200 responses, which in my experience is really good turnout for a survey," she said. "And we should consider having a workshop or two, to ask people what they

Wright said workshops could be held in the fall, and the commission could consider the feedback and then report to the city council about how community members think Scout House should be renovated and used.

though it would take longer, he said, adding that the committee could also hire a consultant to help.

Council members Carrie Theis and Jeff Baron volunteered or, more realistically, "got drafted," Mayor Dave Potter said — to serve on the committee. Baron said he and Theis would identify community members who might participate and would seek consensus from the whole council on their

He also said the action component is critical. "I appreciate that we are a small community and the actions we might take might have a limited effect on the global onrush of climate change, but I think it's important," he said.

"Just like we took the lead with respect to banning plastics, I think it's important that our community make a little bit of a statement."

Councilwoman Jan Reimers said her neighbor, a meteorologist, suggested two people affiliated with NOAA who might help, and she suggested contacting them. During budget discussions, Reimers opposed spending the \$55,000 on the study, and she noted taxpayers have already paid for the information and knowledge the NOAA scientists might share.

Residents Karen Ferlito, Barbara Livingston and others said the city should spend the money on a consultant. "It's a climate emergency," Ferlito said. "I urge you to move in the most responsible way and get the most expert opinion you

Baron disagreed. "I am not in favor of simply hiring a consultant and spending \$55,000 and having something come out at the end of the pipeline," he said. "That seems like a black

He agreed with Reimer's suggestion of talking to some experts, though. He also observed that the State of California "has done a huge amount of research in this area already."

"There are volumes and volumes of data," he said. The trick is figuring out how that research relates to Carmel and

using it to determine how to move forward.

Theis said she, Baron and the rest of the committee will use that information and will probably spend some of the money on a consultant "with the expertise to help us do that."

"We want to get the ball rolling, to get staff on board to help us to do this, and have workshops to get public feedback," she said. "We want the public to understand we are taking this very seriously."

Councilman Bobby Richards said the city might be able to get grant money to help with planning and taking action, too, and Mayor Dave Potter said he agrees with the committee idea because "the community knows what's best."

In addition, he said, having an action element is important, because studies that lack that just end up on the shelf. "Action speaks louder than words," he said.

The council unanimously decided to form the committee as discussed, and city administrator Chip Rerig said environmental compliance manager Agnes Martelet would be the lead staffer in the group.

age, and it was a good, solid car," he said.

Its original black exterior with red and gold striping had been covered over with yellow paint, and the upholstery had seen better days. Laidlaw repainted the Winton and was able to get the blackberry leather for the interior using the original order from Conneaut Leather in Ohio. "They used the same rollers" used to produce the upholstery the first time around, marveled Laidlaw.

Other than that, he added, "There isn't a piece of the car that isn't original." He said the 1910 model had a Winton-patented starter that used compressed air, making it possible for someone who didn't have a chauffeur to start the vehicle without strenuous cranking.

That was just one of many firsts from the Winton line.

Alexander Winton, a Scottish immigrant, made bicycles before he started hand-building his namesake cars in 1897. The first models had what were then zippy 10-horsepower engines (less than modern riding lawn mowers) and reached speeds of more than 30 mph around a Cleveland horse track. It was also the first car to have a dedicated dealership, located in Reading, Pa. That necessitated the invention of the first auto hauler — also a Winton.

That means that the next time you're cruising down the freeway at 70 mph behind one of those beasts stacked high with new cars, mentally playing out scenes in which one of the vehicles falls off in front of you, you can thank the folks at Winton.

#### Frontier women

In 1903, a Winton became the first car to cross the United States. As chronicled in detail by Ken Burns in an episode of his "American Lives" series, a wealthy doctor named Horatio Nelson Jackson set off on the journey on a \$50 bet. Despite the lack of roads connecting California to significant points east (and frequent need of a block and tackle to pull the car out of mud and sand), he completed the expedition. Strangely, according to Burns' documentary, although Jackson spent thousands of dollars of his own money to complete the grand road trip, he never collected on the wager.

Meanwhile, Laidlaw said, the San Francisco Woman's Touring Society had become a home for "wealthy women with big expensive cars that they drove themselves." One member, Mrs. J.H. McAlpine of the Gilroy area, was a former owner of the Schusters' Winton.

"The women were frontier women, and they were attracted to the new frontier of driving," Laidlaw explained. Most of the cars during that period stayed in New England or the upper Midwest, where they were manufactured and could be serviced easily.

In 1910, Laidlaw said, there were only two cars being made in California, both in the Los Angeles area. For all intents and purposes, getting a car to Northern California via rail from Ohio wasn't much different than having one shipped up from L.A.

The state also lagged behind the East and the Midwest because the newfangled machines were so uncommon that very few women — or men — knew how to operate them. "It was

a big thing to learn," Laidlaw said. "It was a lot different than driving horse-drawn buggies."

McAlpine gave the car to a Los Angeles museum and it came into the Bothwell collection. But in trying to work backward from there, Laidlaw found the trail vanished like a

\$250,000 per acre-foot and the minimum amount is one one-hundredth of an acre-foot.

There are restrictions on how the water can be used. For instance, it can only be used to develop on lots that have existing meters and where there are no changes in zoning or use.

Pacific Grove stands to make a mint off the sale of the water — revenue that will help replace the income it will lose when short-term rentals in neighborhoods become prohibited

According to an April report by the Monterey Peninsula Water Management District, Pacific Grove had 47.6 acre-feet of water entitlements, with 11.5 acre-feet of it reserved for affordable housing.

"The city could possibly make a total of \$6,298,250 if all the water is purchased before the end of 2020, which includes the 30 percent discount," associate planner Laurel O'Halloran told The Pine Cone this week.

In her Aug. 6 report, budgets and contracts director Sharon Friedrichsen said the council could either ask voters to extend the 1 percent tax for another 10 years or a longer amount of time, or increase it to as much as 1.875 percent. State law restricts local sales taxes to 2 percent, and sales tax charged here already includes the 1 percent city tax, .375 percent for transportation projects (Measure X) and .125 percent for public transit (Measure Q), all in addition to the state sales tax rate of 7.5 percent.

"Based upon the city's financial needs," including rising pension costs, capital projects and deferred maintenance, Friedrichsen recommended a 1.5 percent city sales tax, which would bring in \$4.5 million annually for the general fund. She said those needs constitute the "fiscal emergency" that allows the city to put a general tax measure on the ballot prior to its regular election in November 2020.

#### What to ask?

Council members will also have to figure out what the 75-word ballot question should ask. Friedrichsen recommended including "a reference to general city services to allow flexibility in the use of the funds, as well as to ensure that the measure is considered to be a general tax." A general tax requires just over 50 percent voter approval to pass, while a special tax for a specific purpose requires

approval by two-thirds of the voters. She recommended an independent audit of the tax and spending, and said the council could also create a citizen oversight committee, as some communities have done.

According to Friedrichsen's timeline, at its Oct. 8 meeting, the city council will have to adopt a resolution calling for a special election, including findings declaring a fiscal emergency and asking the county to administer the election and consolidate it with the March 3, 2020, presidential primary. Council members will also have to OK an ordinance imposing the tax, with its final adoption on the agenda at the Nov. 5 meeting. The last day to file a ballot measure is Dec. 6.

The council supported increasing the tax to 1.5 percent and having it run for two decades, and was not interested in forming a citizen oversight committee but wants an independent audit.

#### 'If it doesn't fly'

"My thought is that going to 1.5 percent would probably be the direction we should go, at least on this first go-round, and if it doesn't fly, then we'll that find out," councilwoman Jan Reimers said. "And I would go for 20 years."

Council members said the ballot measure should indicate the tax would be spent broadly on pension debt, deferred maintenance, parks and open space, and the like. Councilman Bobby Richards recommended mentioning emergency preparedness and fuel reduction.

He also said it might be helpful to remind voters they would be approving a tax that

is entirely within the city's control, not the state's. The state receives most of the base sales tax charged on purchases, but nothing from voter-approved local sales taxes.

Councilwoman Carrie Theis said she thinks voters will recognize how prudently the city has spent its Measure D money so far. "The city has proved that we've taken this tax money seriously, and we have applied it to

where we promised," she said. "I think the citizens agree with that, and they realize we're in a budget crunch here, and I think they would agree with the 1.5 percent."

Mayor Dave Potter said he couldn't see going beyond 20 years and that he would like to hear from the public, which will have a chance to comment on the tax issue again at the council's September meeting.

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

the council also authorized a \$110,000 contract with a company called Surveillance Grid to provide, install and maintain the cameras.

The Carmel Pine Cone

According to a presentation given by Police Chief Paul Tomasi to the council in December 2017, cameras will be mounted along heavily trafficked routes to capture the image and license plate of every car heading into and out of town. The video will be monitored and recorded at the police station, where it will be kept for up to 180 days, enabling investigators to go back through the footage to identify potential suspects after a crime oc-

curs. A license-plate reader will log the plate numbers of passing cars, but the numbers won't be automatically run through any databases, and the system will not have facial-recognition capabilities.

City officials said the slow pace is due to the fact the plan calls for installing cameras on power poles in the city and on county land and requires multiple approvals from PG&E and service contracts with the cable company, all of which "took much longer than originally anticipated."

And it's unknown when the other cameras will go up.

"As soon as we get a schedule from PG&E, we could provide the installation schedule for the five additional locations," Harary said Tuesday.



The city finally installed the first of the cameras to be mounted on a half-dozen power poles around the perimeter of town last week, though it's unknown when the others will finally be mounted, according to the public works department.



and respond to every comment."

Stanley also assured locals that luring more visitors isn't his intent. "I'm not trying to make this a tourist mecca," he said.

Before taking questions from the public, Adams asked the audience if they supported or opposed community events, an outdoor park and more outdoor dining and seating areas at the shopping center. Most opposed all three, some declared their ambivalence, but few offered any support.

Several speakers asked when the shopping center's recent paint job would be removed. The site was red-tagged over the work. But Swanson said because the site was red-tagged, he couldn't respond to the question, and he urged residents to be patient during the process.

"We will address that in a short time," he explained. "Once the case is closed, we can talk about it."

Residents also asked if the shopping center is "historic" — an official designation that would move any changes more difficult to approve. It was designed in the mid-1960s by late architect Olof Dahlstrand, who also drew up plans for Carmel Plaza. But again, Swanson said it was too early to answer the question.

"We don't know yet," he said. "A Phase 1 historical assessment is taking place. If it is historical, we will move on to Phase 2 and the historical review board will get involved."

#### Will they stay or will they go?

Although Adams urged residents to limit their questions to the shopping center's design, some persisted in raising questions about tenants — and their future at the center. At the last hearing, many people turned out in support of the center's auto repair shop, and Stanley has since renewed the business's lease for a year.

But Stanley said it's too early to talk about the future of tenants.

"Until this process is complete, I'm not making any long-term decisions," he said. "I need to make some financial determinations."

Stanley insisted he wants to create "something unique and special" at Mid-Valley Center, and he asked locals to give him a chance. "We should be helping each other," he suggested.

One woman said Stanley should be offering tenants leases as long as 10 years "if he is truly acting in good faith." But Adams responded by saying Stanley "is in an impossible situation to answer the question."

Another resident called the Safeway at Mid-Valley "the most rundown on the Peninsula," and wondered what could be done "to change that."

"I met with them and asked if they would do a remodel," Stanley reported. "They said it wasn't in their budget. I would love for you to tell Safeway to get its act together — putting some pressure on them would be fabulous."

Residents also voiced their concerns about landscaping — which Ruhnke called "a work in progress" — and commented on parking, lighting and drainage.

Adams, meanwhile, spoke out against vandalism that was done to the shopping center's sign and made it clear she didn't like it.

"We all owe you an apology for the graffiti," she said after turning to Stanley. "To put something hateful in spray paint is not the way this should be going."

At the end of meeting, Stanley thanked the crowd for its civility, while Adams urged both sides to continue talking. "We all want the same thing," she added. "We want to see a great center — we can all work together to make that happen."

Swanson, meanwhile, noted that there will be another land use advisory committee meeting on the Mid-Valley makeover, and possibly a hearing before the Monterey County Planning Commission.

The public can also expect another workshop on the topic in the near future. "The owner and architect anticipate taking the community input into account and returning in a month for another presentation," Walton reported after this week's gathering.

support the council if it decided not to ban them now.

"Let the pilot program play itself out and let this all come to conclusion next year, when we do go to the coastal commission," she said. "It would save a lot of staff time and money, and it would sure save a lot of rancor."

Councilwoman Jan Reimers, who has long favored allowing only propane-fueled beach fires, said she was also fine with stepping back in the near term to avoid having to go to the coastal commission this year and again next year.

Mayor Dave Potter, a former member of the coastal commission, agreed with not involving the commission before the temporary rules end next year.

"I think we could use the time between now and when the pilot program expires to have a reasonable discussion," Potter said. "I would prefer the community, both pro and con, come together. Compromise is the art of good government."

But council members Carrie Theis and Jeff

Baron said the rules imposed by the pilot program are already a compromise, since they drastically cut beach fires but didn't eliminate them altogether.

Baron argued for simply making those rules permanent and avoiding prolonging an already played-out conversation.

"We've been having the discussion for years, and the place we are right now, which is the 12 fire pits as space allows, was the compromise," he said. He doubted giving the community six, nine or 12 months would yield anything fruitful.

"I don't find that to be a realistic plan," Baron said.

"Let's stop. I'm loathe to go through all this again next year. It just seems like we're going to have a repeat, it's going to take up four months of our time again, it's very distracting, it takes all the oxygen out of the room, and we have other things we need to get to. I would prefer to dispose of this issue."

Reimers disagreed, saying, "we still have room for improvement."

With that, the council voted 4-1, with Baron dissenting, to put off the fire issue for a year, at which point the mayor reiterated his belief that the public, not the council, will solve the problem.

#### United Way distributing federal tax money

The EFSP was created in 1983 to assist local social service agencies that help people with economic emergencies. Food banks and

other organizations can get help buying and transporting food, paying for equipment and consumable supplies, and covering expenses and transportation for mass shelter and mass feeding. Grants can also be used for building repairs, utilities, facility improvements, and rent/mortgage assistance.

#### Which time in history was the perfect time?

THE VILLAGE of Carmel-by-the-Sea is greatly loved not only by the people who live here and many of the people who reside in neighboring communities, it's also a favorite of millions of people who have visited. With its quaint architecture, quiet streets, tasteful shops, stunning natural beauty, unique history and artistic and cultural traditions, we wouldn't be surprised if many people described Carmel as "perfect" — or practically so.

But as we have pointed out before, all of them are wrong, according to no less a figure than John Steinbeck who, in his 1960 book, "Travels with Charley," declared that the town he remembered from his youth had been ruined by overdevelopment and greed.

"Carmel, begun by starveling writers and unwanted painters, is now a community of the well-to-do and the retired," Steinbeck wrote. "If Carmel's founders should return, they could not afford to live there, but it wouldn't go that far. They would be instantly picked up as suspicious characters and deported over the city line."

That was almost 60 years ago. It's hard to imagine how much Steinbeck would hate the deeply moneyed town that exists today.

Carmel was founded in the 1880s as a speculative real estate venture and has been somewhat different every decade from that day to this. Question: If Person A thought the town was perfect in the early 1900s but had been ruined in 1960; Person B loved it in 1960 but is miserable about all the changes that have been made by 2019; Person C is devoted to the village of today and strives mightily against the efforts of anyone who has the temerity to try to change it, and Persons D through Z will adore it at various points in the future and bitterly oppose any attempt to alter it as they get older, which of them is right?

The answer, of course, is all of them. In the context of architecture and historic preservation, "right" has a definition that changes depending on who's using the word — and is really just an opinion.

Which means that, while it's perfectly fine to argue for your own point of view when it comes to development issues, you also shouldn't be arrogant about the "correctness" of what you happen to like. In the future, after all, there's a good chance you'll be condemned for liking it. Later generations are always smarter than the ones that came before them.

Case in point: The Frank Lloyd Wright house on Scenic Road, which the consensus of today says must be preserved, would be fought tooth and nail if it were on the next planning commission agenda.


And that brings us to the Mid-Valley Center. The man who owns it, Russ Stanley, has every right to pursue a remodel scheme that suits his fancy, and there's nothing wrong with him doing so with profit in mind. The shopkeepers also have a perfectly valid right to argue for their own self-interest. And, most of all, the people who live around the shopping center are certainly entitled to ask that changes to the center be done, or not done, according to their preference.

But what nobody has a right to do is hysterically condemn anybody who disagrees with them. The way many people acted at the LUAC meeting three weeks ago was shameful, and they should be embarrassed. When it comes to paint colors, building styles and choice of shops, no time in history has been the "right" time, and no individual — past, present or future — is all knowing. Pretending otherwise is just dumb.

We thank Mr. Stanley for investing here, and we wish him success as he works with the community to develop a plan that as many people as possible like. We also thank supervisor Mary Adams for fostering a reasonable discussion at the meeting Monday night.

Everybody else should remain calm. In a beautiful part of the world such as ours, change should come slowly, but it will always come. And Mid-Valley Center is just a shopping center.

"It's amazing we never got grounded," Freedman said. "The attention we attracted as we cruised the coast was pretty great, but we also were too conspicuous. By the time we got home, our parents always knew where we'd been."

When Freedman's older sister got married, she passed the car to Freedman. And when she left to study journalism at the University of Florida, her father, deciding the car was just too noticeable, sold it.

"I was devastated," Freedman said. "The

last we heard, many years later, our Mustang was in Indiana. The owner found an old gas ticket tucked inside, and called our mom to ask about the car. We asked if we could buy it back, but he said

Freedman soon became a car girl, too.

The southwest corner of Michigan, where Freedman's father purveyed produce, was and is still part of the Fruit Belt around the Great Lakes, and her dad was known as the Strawberry King. The Blossomtime Festival was established in Michigan during the spring of 1906, in celebration of the season when fruit trees adorned the landscape with colorful flowers. In 1924, a floral parade was added to the festival, complete with a Blossomtime Queen and her court.

After college, Freedman moved to Atlanta because in those days, it was a small city on the edge of becoming a very exciting place. Finding a job wasn't easy, but the Atlanta Journal-Constitution hired her as an account executive in the advertising department.

She was unsurprisingly adept at establishing accounts with car dealerships.

Looking to increase advertising, she decided to host mini car shows at regional shopping malls. That's when she learned that the man she was dating, Doug Freedman, loved collector cars, particularly Jaguars and Fer-

"Genie didn't realize, during our first few dates, that everything she touched inside my car was making me crazy because she left fingerprints," her husband said of his Jaguar XJ 12L. "She had no idea I was going straight home and wiping everything off. Once she knew, she began to understand the car side of

The Freedmans married in 1984 and were already hosts of two annual Ferrari events just outside of Atlanta when they made their fortuitous trip to the Monterey Peninsula. After picking Ocean Avenue as their spot, they

She had spent 22 years as a planner in Sonoma, Monterey and Marin counties, the last 10 in San Rafael, working 50 to 60 hours most weeks as planning director and acting community development director.

"I figured out at that point that I probably had attended at least 2,500 public meetings during my career, and it just wasn't as much fun as it used to be," she said.

#### **Stunning variety**

So she retired, moved back to the Monterey Peninsula with her husband, and began reacquainting herself with a long-lost passion,

"I had dabbled over the years, but I'd never had the time," said Delimont, who raised two daughters, largely as a single mom, while pursuing her professional career. "My art

skills had deteriorated by the time I retired (in 2000), so I went to Monterey Peninsula College and started all over again."

She took multiple classes in drawing, painting and printmaking, found her niche as a landscape painter, and immersed herself in her art. Two years ago, she was juried into the prestigious Carmel Art Association, which will showcase her work this month with her

> first-ever solo show, entitled "Western Skies and Waterways." The opening reception is scheduled for 5 to 7 p.m. Saturday, Aug. 10, at the gallery (Dolores Street between Fifth and Sixth avenues).

Delimont will also be featured at a Meet the Artist reception on Aug. 24 from 2 to 3:30

"We came back to Monterey because we were in love with the area," said Delimont, whose husband of 30 years, Bob Neuberg, grew up on the Peninsula and operated a public relations firm here. "The lifestyle is so much quieter than the Bay Area, and it's just so beautiful here — stunning.

"The wonderful thing for a landscape painter in Monterey County is the variety," she said. "I love painting marshes in Elkhorn Slough. I can find the fall colors in Carmel

Valley. There are vineyards and redwoods. Big Sur is so dramatic. I don't have to travel very far to find a breathtaking landscape. I feel very fortunate."

Delimont specializes in placid waterways, fleecy clouds, fog and mist so wet that it can cool a room. She is enamored with the lush greenery of the Central Coast, and big skies, like those she finds in Santa Fe, where a sister lives. All will be on display throughout August at the CAA show.

#### Big picture

"I feel a very deep, emotional connection to the places I paint, and I try to express those feelings in my paintings. It's very satisfying when I'm able to do that," said Delimont. "I work a lot from photos I've taken and cropped and edited, but I don't work off a single photo: I'll take ideas from several and try to convey the

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


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#### The real story of how Carmel become an artists' and writers' colony

SAN FRANCISCO'S Bohemian Club, founded in 1872 by artists, writers and musicians, also accepted business and professional people who enjoyed a life with an open mind. One such member was attorney Frank H. Powers, the man who, with J.F. Devendorf, launched Carmel Development Co. in 1902.

To help his company succeed, Powers enticed his associates at the Bohemian Club to sample the joys of life in Carmel-bythe-Sea. High on the list for recruitment was playwright and poet George Sterling, whose persona drew creative minds the way a bright light attracts moths.

Sterling, a native of Sag Harbor on Long Island, was just 25 in November 1895 when he joined his Uncle Frank C. Havens as two of the seven directors of a newly formed partnership, the Realty Syndicate, to develop real estate in San Francisco. The following February, he married the charming Carrie Rand. The pair lived in Oakland, and he would take the ferry across the bay each day to work at his office on Sansome Street.

#### Successful but passionate

Over the next 10 years, Sterling's name was on millions of dollars' worth of real estate transactions on both sides of San Francisco Bay. In 1903, he and his cousins, Wickham and Harold Havens, formed another new company, The Piedmont Building Association.

While he was successful in business, Sterling's passion was writing — especially poetry. Some of his early poetry caught the attention of Ambrose Bierce, a successful writer and influential columnist for the San Francisco Examiner. Bierce published some of Sterling's early poetry in his columns, and in December 1903, lined him up with a publisher for a small book of poetry titled, "The Testimony of the Suns and Other Poems." It was highly acclaimed. Bierce called it "nothing but the most

notable utterance that has been heard in our Western World since the great heart of Poe was broken against the adamance of his country's inattention."

Asked by a reporter if his poetry interfered with his business, Sterling replied, "No, hang it! Business interferes with my poetry.

#### **History Beat**

Most of it is done on the way to the office." However, he quickly added. "If I didn't have this position, perhaps I'd be starving poetic, but painful."

Carmel caught Sterling's interest. He in turn brought it to the attention of Mary Austin, who rented a place here in 1904 and found inspiration for her novel "Isidro," a story set largely in Spanish Monterey of the early 1800s — a change for Austin, who was known for her stories of the Southern California desert, most notably "The Land of Little Rain" (1903). As Austin's "Isidro" went to press, Sterling decided it was time that he focus on writing and that he, too, would seek inspiration in Carmel.

In March 1905, he bought an acre southeast of the original village site, and that summer built a house that stood east of today's Torres Street, just south of 10th. In October 1905, he described his new home in a letter to Bierce. "The house is on a knoll at the edge of a pine forest, half a mile from the town of Carmel," Sterling wrote. "It affords a really magnificent view of the Carmel valley and river, and of the wild and desolate mountains beyond

atmosphere of the location, the feeling of being there."

Delimont remembers being attracted to art as a child, thanks in part to an artist aunt who came bearing art supplies. But she also enjoyed accompanying her father, a master electrician, to his job sites.

"I'd see these buildings that were under construction, and I always found it interesting," she said. "I actually learned to read blueprints as a kid, and by the time I graduated from Montgomery High in Santa Rosa, I was interested in architecture, the environment and public service."

She attended Santa Rosa Junior College for two years, got married, then put education aside when she found herself raising two girls as a single mom.

"I went back to school about 10 years after high school to get a degree from Sonoma State in environmental studies and planning. I wanted to find a better-paying job to support my kids, and there were a lot of opportunities in that field at the time," said Delimont, who was hired to help develop an environmental review process for Sonoma County. She also wrote environmental impact reports and assessments for a private firm.

"I liked the work," she said. "We recognized at the time that Sonoma County was going to get hit with massive growth, and there was a real effort among the staff to preserve what we loved about the area — the agricultural areas, the scenic beauty, the open space. "I worked with a lot of very dedicated people over the years, and it was very rewarding."

In 1988, Delimont came to Monterey County as a supervising planner for the coastal commission, before heading north again two years later to finish her career with a decade at the San Rafael job.

Her quest to become an artist began in 2000, when she returned to Monterey. Her progress came in increments.

"I had a studio for a while on Cannery Row that was open to the public, and after a couple of years I was able to become part of the Open Studio Tour," she said. "It was really exciting to be able to present my work and get some feedback from the community. That first Open Studio Tour was the first time I ever sold something, which was a confidence booster."

#### **Breakthrough moment**

Delimont showed her work in Carmel at Gallery North, and several of her paintings also were displayed at Yosemite Museum and Triton Museum. But being invited to join the Carmel Art Association in 2017 was her breakthrough moment.

"I think that was when I finally felt like I could say, 'Wow, I really am a professional artist," she said. "I'm very proud to be a part of that gallery. It's such a wonderful, supportive environment."

Delimont creates her richly textured paintings in a bright studio, splashed with natural lighting, in back of her Monterey home, and said she's continuing to grow and evolve.

"As an artist, I'm always exploring, trying different materials, experimenting with new techniques," said the artist, who currently favors oil paints and pastels. "I'll learn one medium, and experiment with that, and those skills will carry over to another one, which is exciting. It's always a growth experience."

decided to start an event that would feature the much loved and beautiful cars manufactured between 1940 and 1973 that showed up on dream dates and drag strips, but weren't always welcome in elite automotive beauty pageants.

Every year, about a month before Concours on the Avenue, the Freedmans return to Carmel to set up shop at the Cypress Inn, their home and office for an extended period before and after the event.

"It's a very busy time, getting ready for the big day, and it's a very busy time after-

ward," she said. "The day of the event is like balloons being released to the sky. And within hours, we're planning for the next year."

While their goal is to give folks a chance to feature their favorite collector cars, and to create a venue where the community can come take a look, an additional mission is to raise funds for the Carmel Foundation, which Freedman called a "truly amazing organiza-

"We are grateful for what they give to Carmel, and for all their volunteer support during Concours on the Avenue," she added. "And, we're grateful to be part of this community."

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

#### Division I water polo takes a heap of talent — but mountains of effort

in a water polo match is stuff you might not want to read about in a family newspaper. What happens inside the mind at the highest

When he graduated in 2018, Will Morgan was probably the best water polo player ever to dip a toe into the pool at Stevenson School in Pebble Beach, according to 20-year coach Jim Fannin. Many former Pirates have moved on to play in college, at either the varsity or elite club level, but only one - Morgan was recruited to play at UCLA, winner of three NCAA Division I national championships in the past five years.

#### Shark bait

Morgan's credentials as a high school player were multiple: Sophomore of the Year in 2015-16, followed by back-to-back seasons on the All-Monterey Bay League team. As a senior, he was co-winner of the Most Valuable Player Award in the MBL's Gabilan Division after a season in which he led three counties in scoring with 117 goals — 47 more than his nearest competitor.

But the talent pool at UCLA might be the deepest in America, and Morgan understood immediately that he was a little fish in a big,

WHAT HAPPENS beneath the surface shark-infested pond. And if the physical challenges seemed daunting, Morgan soon realized that the tougher part of becoming an elite college player would be the mental aspects of the Division I game.

"Adam Wright is a great coach, and what he preaches the most is how important an athlete's mindset is at this level of sports — that the way you think affects how you play much more than training, or athleticism, or any of the purely physical aspects," he said. "Adam believes that a player's mental toughness is the major factor that determines whether vou'll be able to contribute to the team. He really works to make us psychologically impenetrable."

#### 'Redshirt year'

If that sounds like an intimidating atmosphere for an incoming freshman, it's very much by design. A player who doesn't fit the UCLA mold both physically and mentally isn't going to last. And the former Stevenson standout realized early that he wasn't going to be the most athletically gifted player on the squad — not even close.

"I wasn't coming from one of the big water polo schools, and knew I wasn't one of

the guys they thought would make an immediate impact on the team as a freshman. They saw me as a guy with an upside, somebody who might develop into a player," he said.

That kind of player invariably is asked to take a "redshirt year" — a season during which he does everything the varsity players do — lift weights, swim thousands of yards, practice with the team, attend meetings ... everything except play in the games. The goals for a "redshirt" are to use the year to build strength, stamina, skill, knowledge, and mental toughness, adjust to the highly accelerated speed of the Division I college game and develop into a varsity player for the following season. A "redshirt year" doesn't count toward a player's four years of eligibility as an NCAA athlete, meaning Morgan returns this year (his sophomore year as a UCLA Economics major) as a freshman athlete.

"Last summer, as soon as I arrived, Adam took the whole team on a three-week training trip to Eastern Europe — Croatia, Montenegro, Hungary and Greece," Morgan said. "I remember being super-nervous when I jumped into the water that first day with a bunch of guys I had heard of before, guys I had watched play at the college level.

"I think I felt pretty starstruck for the first couple of weeks, but I gradually began to notice that they all had certain flaws - none of them were superheroes," he said. "Two weeks into that trip, I started to feel confident that I could become a big contributor on this team if I really worked hard at improving."

#### Weights at sunrise

A big part of that epiphany, Morgan said, was his decision to embrace his coach's obsession with instilling mental toughness. He made it his mission to learn from every mistake, and listen carefully each time Wright, or associate head coach Jason Falitz, targeted him for a verbal beatdown.

"Whenever you screw up, you're going to get yelled at, and sometimes it can get pretty negative — college coaches are going to be pretty hard on you. That's a given," he said. "But I realize Adam's mindset is geared toward constant improvement, so I'm making mental notes the whole time — it's all about learning to be a better player."

Accelerated growth can be painful on multiple fronts. Mor-

gan's first academic year at UCLA ended June 15, and that's when the team began preparing in earnest for the 2019 season, with weightlifting every day at sunrise, followed by double practices during the day, all the way through July 17.

The NCAA mandates a two-week rest period for all athletes, a vacation that ended August 1.

"That's the start of 'Hell Month' — four weeks when the NCAA places no limits to the number of hours we can be in the pool. And that's brutal," he said.

#### 'Hell Month'

During "Hell Month," Morgan and his teammates lift weights each day from 5:45 to 7:15 a.m. and then head to the pool for an early practice from 8 to 11:30 a.m.

"The morning practice is all about heavy conditioning weight belts, snorkels, lots of swimming, lots of drills," he said. "When you're swimming your 8,000th yard in practice, you're never thinking, 'Wow, this is fun."

After a lunch break, the Bruins are back in the pool at 2 p.m. to play water polo until 5:30, sometimes 6:30 p.m.

Morgan said he's typically in bed by 9 p.m. during "Hell Meek," and is rarely still awake at 9:15.

But the benefits are measurable. His body fat percentage in the fall of 2018, when Morgan weighed 175-180 pounds, was at 15 percent. This year, at 185 pounds, he's at nine percent.

Morgan attributes part of that to a vastly improved training diet consisting almost entirely of foods high in protein and healthy carbohydrates: chicken or ground turkey, rice, and vegetables. He has virtually eliminated all sugar from his diet during training periods and the season.

"I plan the menu for the entire week on Sunday, eat pretty much the same thing every day, count all of my calories, and keep track of my nutrients. I know exactly what I'm taking in every day, which just eliminates another variable," he said. "It eliminates one of the uncertainties you're going to have if you're not eating very consistently and feeling sluggish or tired during practice."

Vastly improved stamina is a major difference Morgan has noticed from his days at Stevenson, thanks not only to the better diet, but the extra yards of swimming he typically puts in after regular practices have ended. And stamina translates into more consistency during competition.

"Adjusting to the speed of the college game was very difficult at first. You realize right away how much faster everything is happening, and how much faster your brain and body have to react," he said. "It's difficult to make decisions quickly when you're tired, when you just don't have any oxygen left in your tank, but that part is so much better for me now. I definitely feel like I've adjusted to the speed of the college game."

Despite the workload, the intensity, the pressure, and the bruising physicality of Division I athletics, and the challenge of maintaining a solid grade point average, Morgan (who had a 3.9 GPA at Stevenson) insists he's still having fun. The wallto-wall adrenaline rush of competing against the best college water polo players in the U.S. is indescribable, he says.

"Honestly, I'm loving it," said Morgan, who expects to see varsity pool time this year as an attacker for the nation's thirdranked team. "Playing Division I water polo is probably the hardest thing I've ever done, but I'm enjoying it, 100 percent."

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

Held in the hangar at the Monterey Jet Center and out on the tarmac, the party draws several thousand people, and Mc-Call has learned the hard way how tough it can be to ensure they all get as much as they want and need to eat and drink, while sticking to a budget.

"We had a serious food shortage 10 years ago and have really tried to elevate it every year since," he said.

In addition to Moody and the Pasadera crew, McCall said

Sterling's move to Carmel soon helped attract other writers and artists, and the January 14, 1906, San Francisco Call newspaper included a nearly full-page story by Ida L. Brooks, "Among the Artists, Writers and Poets at Carmel-by-the-Sea."

While Powers and Devendorf initially sought teachers and professors — left-brain thinkers, like themselves – to establish a sophisticated community, the right-brain artists and writers were the ones that implanted their style on early Carmel.

Which is not to say there weren't teachers. In her article, Brooks states: "On one street in Carmel, called Camino Real, are the homes of so many college professors, and the lots of so many more intending soon to build, that the street is commonly known as 'Professor Street.'" Stanford was well represented with Vice President Stillman and three professors having homes already, and President David Starr Jordan expecting to build soon. Four instructors at the University of California were also planning to build.

The Brooks article, however, focused on the artists and writers and, in addition to Sterling and Austin, she included artist Chris Jorgensen, who was then constructing La Playa as his home; artist Sydney Yard, who mastered tonalism in his landscapes; photographer Arnold Genthe; classical musi-

cian Mabel Gray Lachmund who trained in Europe and was skilled at both piano and voice, and several others, including, of course, Mrs. Frank Powers, who was also an artist of note.

"Frank H. Powers," Brooks wrote, "has large holdings in and around Carmel-by-the-Sea, and he and his wife are exceedingly anxious to make the village beautiful, to preserve its historic interest and to make of it a center for people of artistic temperament."

#### Flourishing colony

Just a few months after Brooks' article was published, the great San Francisco earthquake and fire devastated the city in April. Most historians credit that event with the influx of artists and writers to Carmel. Whether it was the earthquake or the Sterling effect, the January 1906 article shows that Carmel was already on its way to becoming a flourishing artists' colony before the tragic event.

A short decade later, by a vote of 113 to 86, on October 26, 1916, the residents of the Powers-Devendorf development voted to incorporate as the city of Carmel-by-the-Sea. The new city was headed by a five-member board of trustees with Alfred Parker Fraser serving as the first president. Fraser was a graduate of Stanford (1896) and Harvard Law (1898) and became the city's judge and justice of the peace in the 1920s.

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# How my 17th summer led me to a lifelong love affair with books

THE ANNUAL book sale to raise money for the Harrison Memorial Library — which takes place Saturday — always takes me back to the summer I spent as a library page at the Crane Branch Library in Buffalo, N.Y.

The year was 1953. Summer jobs were hard to find. The steel workers at the Bethlehem plant in Lackawanna were on strike and the breweries and supermarkets weren't hiring. My mother, a local pol, pulled a few strings with her cronies and got me an interview at Crane Library, which was within walking distance from home.

There I met the diminutive Mrs. Rita Dekoff, the librarian who became an inspirational influence on the rest of my life. Mrs. Dekoff stood a tad over 5 feet tall, could barely see over the card catalog (remember those?) but had a commanding presence that left no doubt she was in charge.

After a few minutes into my interview I was sure she wanted to hire me, but she sensed hesitancy on my part to accept the job if offered.

"What's your problem, kiddo?" she asked. "I think you're perfect for the library but I'm getting the idea you don't want to work here." I told her I was uncertain because I knew the only reason she was considering me was that she got a call from someone above her who owed my mother a favor. She appreciated my being forthright.

"Yes, that's why I'm talking to you," she said. "But if I didn't think you were capable or if I didn't like you, you'd never work here. I'm the librarian. I get to say who works for

me." Then she looked me straight in the eye and said: "Now tell me why you don't want the job."

"Because it's not a job that guys do!" I blurted out.

She almost fell out of her chair laughing. "Oh, honey," she said. "That's the very reason you should take the job. Have you seen the good-looking girls who work here?" The light bulb that went off in my head needed only a moment to

show me the way out of the darkness. I took the job.

The first assignment Mrs. Dekoff gave me was re-shelving books in their proper places. Fiction had to go alphabetically by author, and non-fiction books were arranged in their catalogued order according to the Dewey Decimal System. I put the books on the shelves with the spines facing upward so a more experienced page could check my work, which proved to be the way I was checked out by the young ladies who were supervising me. Fortunately, I knew my alphabet and had mastered our numbering system by using my fingers and toes, so I caught on quickly.

Through casual conversation, Mrs. Dekoff discovered

that my reading habits needed direction and she was just the person to guide me. She started me with "Cell 2455 Death Row" by convicted robber, kidnapper and rapist Caryl Chessman. I had never heard of Chessman or his struggle to be spared the death penalty at San Quentin, even though his case garnered worldwide attention. He spent 12 years on death row and received eight stays of execution before he went to the gas chamber in May 1960.

#### How to think

That led to a lengthy discussion of the death penalty. She introduced me to John Marquand, from whom I learned satire; John O'Hara taught me that big stories can come from small towns and that fictional dialogue can ring true. In James Gould Cozzens' "By Love Possessed," I saw how a lifetime of propriety could be unraveled in the space of 49 hours. Each reading was followed by a discussion of the book until I realized that this little lady with the big brain was teaching me how to read, analyze, and think.

To this day, I am in awe that I can borrow, at no charge, books from a collection that far surpasses all the knowledge in The Library of Ashurbanipal in Seventh-century B.C. Nineveh, or the famed Library at Alexandria.

I am comfortable in libraries. I like the feeling that my own thoughts are mingled with those of thousands of philos-

# If life gave you lemons, now's the time to show them with pride

BUMPER crop of clunkers, junkers and jalopies is rattling ominously toward the Monterey Peninsula, spewing exhaust, dragging mufflers, and dripping oil en route to the 2019 Concours d'Lemons, a beauty pageant for appearance-impaired cars scheduled Aug. 17, 8 a.m. to 1 p.m., on the otherwise well kept lawn of Seaside City Hall.

The event — equal parts horrific and humorous — is appropriately free of charge, and therefore worth twice the admission price to anyone

with affection for "automobiles" that bring down property values in the dodgiest neighborhoods.

Alan Galbraith, 53, dreamed up Concours d'Lemons in 2009 mostly out of spite, as a goose in the pantaloons to what some see as the insufferably pompous Concours d'Elegance, the célébration de l'excès that invades the Monterey Peninsula each year as the centerpiece of Monterey

"I've actually been coming to Pebble Beach (for the Concours d'Elegance) since the 1980s," Galbraith said. "And being the snarky [expletive] I am, I always told myself, 'The year I decide I want to get kicked out of here, I'm going to sneak a Pinto onto the green at Pebble Beach."

#### An oil stain

The first Concours d'Lemons attracted 40 cars — 30 more than Galbraith was expecting — and got rave reviews from the press and nostalgic people who were conceived in the back seats of AMC Matadors.

"So, it began as the joke I always wanted to pull at Pebble Beach — a show for crappy cars, basically an oil stain on Monterey Car Week," Galbraith said.

From that humble beginning

sprouted the monstrosity "celebrating the oddball, mundane and truly awful of the automotive world" that now has spread like an infernal rash to include events in Amelia Island, Fla.; Millville, N.J.; Detroit; Concord, Calif.; and Australia, with a sister show (not bearing the d'Lemons brand name) in England.

Participants range from hardcore collectors of patently unattractive and unusual cars, to those who spend all year shopping on eBay and Craigs list for just the right piece of junk. Galbraith said some people have been

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


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

# Hitting the road in a French postwar putt-putt and a souped-up VW bus

■ A retro journey to the Concours on the Avenue

MONG THE dozens of beautiful, interesting, valuable and pampered cars parked on Ocean Avenue and side streets during the annual Concours on the Avenue Aug. 13 will be a few that are exceptional not because they sold for millions of dollars at auction or were raced by famous people, but because their owners drove their rare

specimens here from the far reaches of the United States.

Minnesota residents Tom Warth and Tim Parker are pairing up to cross the country in a tiny and definitely-not-fast 1965 Citroen 2CV, also called a Deux Chevaux (which means "two horses"), while Scooter Gabel and his yellow Lab, Bob, are traveling from Florida to Carmel in a 1960 VW bus he rebuilt with Porsche Speedster parts and subsequently named Buster.

"I just can't get over that they want to do this," and to be in the Concours on the Avenue, said Doug Freedman, who founded the car show with his wife, Genie, a dozen years ago. "Concours on the Avenue is something that people want to team up with, and they're not trying to present their egos, they're just trying to present their piece of the world, and it's fantastic that they choose our event to do that."

#### From fast to slowest

Warth, who owned a publishing company he later sold to the San Francisco Chronicle and started a nonprofit called Books for Africa, and Parker, the car expert and author who also writes every single information card displayed on Concours on the Avenue cars, first drove a show car to the event together in 2012.

They made the trip in an original AC Cobra 289 sportscar, which was fitting because the late Carroll Shelby was being honored that year for the 50th anniversary of the car. This time around, they are making the 2,200mile, three-day trip in a vehicle of a different stripe. The Citroen 2CV debuted in 1948 and was intended to get farmers off their horses and into

> motor vehicles. The first model's engine was a mere 375 cc and maxed out at 40 mph, with 9 horsepower. The model Warth and Parker are driving has a larger engine and can run at higher speeds - though not much higher.

> "I decided to do this, because I owned an AC Cobra, which I drove out when Carroll Shelby had his anniversary, and now I have the slowest car

# After 16 years of pleasing collectors, Automobilia expands to three days

ITH THE continued success of his sale featuring all original and genuine automotive memorabilia, Carmel Valley resident Tony Singer decided to extend his 17th Annual Automobilia Monterey from two days to three.

Featuring dozens of vendors from all over the world set up in the ballroom at the Embassy Suites in Seaside, the event is a bonanza for collectors while also raising money for the Monterey Rape Crisis Center, its longtime beneficiary.

"The main motivation was that frankly, there's

so much going on Tuesday and Wednesday, and I felt as though there was a whole segment of people who were, in effect, missing out," he said. Principally, the drivers, owners and fans who arrive on the Monterey Peninsula in time for the Pre-Reunion races at WeatherTech Raceway Laguna Seca and other events that weekend, including the car show on Alvarado Street and the new Pasadera Concours, both on Aug. 9 this year, didn't have much to do on Monday.

"And the people, other than the locals, who are here to attend Concours on the Avenue on Tuesday have to get here on Monday, and they had nothing to do," he added. "And I didn't want to expand into the later part of the week, because all you're doing is taking a pie and getting a smaller slice," as the number of events held each day increases as the week progresses.

## 'Why can't I?'

Singer said some of the vendors felt three days was too much of a commitment, but that he retained those who "are able to provide for the attendees things they don't see anywhere else, which is why it's been so successful over 17 years."

Singer, who has been attending the historic races and the Pebble Beach Concours d'Elegance since the 1980s and is from New York, got the idea for

the show from two sellers from England who would always set up a booth at the races.

"I would be the first person at their stand on Thursday morning when they were setting up, because I wanted to see what they had," he said. Singer was always impressed by the pins, photos, grille badges and other collectibles.


"One day, I started to think about moving to California and said something to them," he recalled. "And off the cuff, one of them said to me, 'Why don't you start a show?' I thought about it afterward and thought, 'I don't know, why can't I?'"

So began his search for the right venue — somewhere that would be





# Sure, it's a golf course, but this time it's a different kind of birdie

HEN HE was just 15 years old in Austin, Texas, Jim Govro loved cars, and he had a family that felt the same way. "Working on cars was in the Govro family blood line. Daddy had always done his own repair work, my older brother, Don, always had fast cars, and of course I wanted to do whatever my big brother was doing." That's from a detailed, first-person written account of building his car, Tweety Bird, which will be part of the Historic Hot Rod "Cover Cars" class Aug. 18 at the Pebble Beach Concours d'Elegance.

As it happened, in 1950, Govro's dad was a mechanic with two rented bays at a local Texaco sta-

tion. He was working hard to provide for a family of five, and there wasn't a lot of money to be had for a car, unless Govro earned it himself.

## A \$4 body

Still, he was able to purchase a body and frame from a 1929 roadster for \$4, and the quest to build a fast car — like Don's — was set into motion. It stalled temporarily as Govro searched for a 1932 frame for the '29 body, to get just the look he wanted — the one he'd imagined as he spent his high school days doodling images of it in his notebooks.

When a high school classmate found a '32 frame for Govro, it was already attached to a '32 body. And the owner wanted \$20 for the whole kit and

caboodle. This was during a time when, in a good week, Govro made \$4 working at his dad's shop. A high school friend, Doug Phillips, offered to buy it for him, however, and after he had paid back \$15 of the price, Phillips called it even. At that point, Govro had two stripped-out cars parked in a vacant lot next to the Texaco station.


Decades later, he remembers not only Phillips' generosity, but most of the details of every significant part acquisition he made for his prized possession. He decided to stick with the '32 body and frame, and for the next several years, he bought and scrounged for parts — and his friends were always on the lookout, too.

"It happened at a snail's pace," he remembered

wryly. The first time he ever rode in it, it was with Phillips towing him around the block, just so Govro could pretend to



a valve job, he towed the roadster to the high school to use the valve-grinding machine there. And when someone casually asked whether Govro had the title to the car, the transmission shop owner (who sold the '32 frame and body to Phillips) spent

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

# Years of meticulous labor — all for the sake of a Studebaker

T'S NOT about what the car is worth or how much it cost to restore it. It's about the car itself. When Bob Belling bought his 1934 Studebaker — called the "Year Ahead" President Land Cruiser — he didn't do so with the intention of showing it at the Pebble Beach Concours d'Elegance. He looked at the dilapidated vehicle, saw the elegance it had once exuded, and believed it could do so again.

The "Year Ahead" moniker referred to mid-year styling changes, Belling said. In 1934, a new body, the Land Cruiser, was released and offered on the largest model, The President, one of only 201 ever made, as well as the Dictator — later called the Diplomat — and the Commander.

Belling, who resides in Columbia, Conn., bought the car in 2007 in his native upstate New York from a friend who'd purchased the Studebaker plus two parts-cars, but didn't have the time or talent to do a restoration. As soon as the car was loaded onto his trailer, it fell apart.

Still, Belling saw its promise and potential.

#### Not cool

This wasn't the first time he was seduced by a Studebaker. His father drove Studebakers, as did his grandfather, who had worked for Pierce-Arrow while Studebaker owned the firm. At 15, not before he could drive but before he had a license, Belling bought his first Studebaker, a 1953 Commander

"Back then, if you didn't drive a Mustang or a

Corvette, you weren't cool," he said. "But the '53 Coupe was one of the prettiest cars ever made. Whether or not I was cool, the car was."

Nearly 54 years later, Belling still has his first car. Since then, he has collected 11 more Studebakers, and he's restored them all. In fact, for nearly a dozen years, he made a living restoring Studebakers. Perhaps this gave him the expertise and the endurance to salvage his '34 President Land Cruiser. Surely other people would have given up.

"I wanted to restore the car to the way it was when it was new, to do it correctly," Belling said. "It no longer had fender skirts, but I found a Volvo roof panel that had the same curve, so I fashioned new fender skirts from that. And a friend has the



Rolex Monterey Motorsports Reunion.

The paddock, which is open to all to wander through, is busy with the preparation of historic cars, some of which are fully restored, while others bear the patina they've accumulated since their early glory days. Racers prepping for their main event the following weekend use this opportunity to test their machines and their skills, and while crowds pack the track during the Reunion, Pre-Reunion days offer up-close and personal looks at the cars, as well as chats with the owners and drivers.








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

# Happy birthday to Bentley: Winning hearts and races for 100 years

Motors Ltd., and the 69th Pebble Beach Concours d'Elegance plans to celebrate the marque with one of the largest collections of the finest Bentleys ever built.

Bentley Motors Ltd. was the passion and pursuit of Walter Bentley, the youngest of nine children born to an upper-class English family in 1888. He went to private school at Clifton College (which offered college prep and high school classes) in the southwest of England. At 16, he left school to become an apprentice engineer with the Great Northern Railway.

But the automobile fascinated him from almost the moment it was invented, and in 1912 he established a company with his brother, Horace, selling French cars which they modified and improved. During World War I, he became an officer in the Royal Naval Air Service, working on airplane engines. After the war, Bentley used his expertise to design a high-quality sporting tour car.

His goal was to "build a good car, a fast car, the best in class."

# It raced poorly

The brothers' auto manufacturing company was established in 1919. Bentley road-tested his first car, a high-tech four-cylinder, 3-liter engine with a sturdy chassis, in January 1920. The first production car was released in the fall of 1921 to great success

As the story goes, when Bentley heard about the beginnings of a 24-hour automobile race through Le Mans in northwest France in 1923, he thought it was ridiculous to expect an automobile to race for that long. They just weren't designed to do that.

Nevertheless, he went out to the course to see one of his namesake autos race — poorly. He de-

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

cided that if this event were going to continue, he needed to design a vehicle that could stand up to its rigors.

A Bentley 3-liter won at Le Mans in 1924, and updated models won again in 1927 and 1928.

The earliest surviving 3 Litre (the name is British, after all) Bentley and, reportedly the first Bentley ever sold, will join nearly 50 others during the marque's centennial celebration at the Concours d'Elegance

#### Bentley boys

A later model, Bentley's 6.5-cylinder Speed Six race car, proved to be the most successful Bentley used in competition. The 1929 car, nicknamed "Old Number 1," which won the race, was driven by Woolf Barnato (heir to a diamond mine fortune) and Sir Henry "Tim" Birkin. It will roll onto the show field accompanied by Old Number 2 and Old Number 3. which were produced from the same winning design. In 1930, Old Number 2 finished Le Mans mere seconds behind Old Number 1.

Birkin, known as a fearless race car driver, tried but failed to win Bentley's support to develop a super-charged auto for the company. Instead, he invested his own money to design and build what became the 4.5 Litre supercharged Birkin Blow-

er Bentley. You can see Birkin's original Blower — which became quite a success on the racetrack — at the Concours, along with several other Birkin-built Blowers.

Peter Hageman, a longtime member of the Concours Selection Committee, said, "Bentley, more than any other marque, captures that feeling of the fighter pilot in flight. The cars and their drivers were big, strong and fast. The cars were good, powerful road cars that performed well in the sporting days of the 1920s and '30s. But they weren't peacocks; they were meant to be used, to be driven."

Perhaps the best thing that ever happened to Bentley Motors Ltd. was the "Bentley Boys." This glamorous group of guys - young, educated and, in most cases wealthy — were racecar drivers who survived World War I through their wits and an undying determination to win.

"The Bentley Boys were these heroic, honest, courageous, stylish young men, who built up the image of gallant gentleman drivers, racing their Bentleys to victory and building the marque's reputation for high performance," said Hageman, who will bring two of his own Bentleys to the show field this year.

Stories like the Bentley-on-Bentley race from "Downton Abbey" are reminiscent of at least one real-life adventure.

In 1930, Barnato made a wager. During a dinner party aboard a yacht

near Cannes, he bet he could drive his Speed Six coupe from Cannes to Calais faster than the then-famous "Blue Train" could get there.

Barnato, with three wins in three starts at Le Mans, was considered by Warren Bentley to be the finest driver of the Bentley Boys.

#### Swoopy coupe

Reportedly, Barnato reached Calais in time to continue on to London before the train pulled into the station in Northern France. No one had taken the bet, and the French Motor Manufacturer's Association sanctioned him for racing on public roads.

"For years, people believed the two-door coupe with a swoopy back, bodied by coachbuilders Gurney Nutting, was the Speed Six in which Barnato went storming through France," Hageman said. "But that car might not have been finished by the time of the race. Barnato, who owned several Bentleys, may have raced the train in his Mulliner-bodied, four-door, Speed Six saloon."

Despite having had great success, Bentley Motors Ltd. was not immune to the effects of the Great Depression. Barnato reportedly gave up most of his fortune to purchase the company's assets and take the helm of Bentley Motors Ltd. Working as Barnato's employee, Bentley continued to design cars, while Barnato continued to race them.

Although Bentley had just introduced its 8 Litre luxury model as a grand car for the super-rich, and Bentley's personal automobile, by 1931, Barnato's resources had dwindled, and the company was sold to archrival Rolls-Royce, which did not want its Phantom II to have to compete with the Bentley 8 Litre.

"There's definitely a romance to the Bentley story, one of excitement, intrigue, great achievement, and disappointment," Hageman said. "It was a romantic period in automobile history, a stylish period, when the cars were elegant, straightforward, honest, dependable, and really fast. So were their drivers."



known to fly to Monterey from the opposite side of the country, buy a rattletrap when they arrive, show it at Concours d'Lemons, abandon it, and fly back home.

"We actually had to make a rule: If you bring a car to our show, you have to take a car with you when you leave," he said. "It doesn't have to be yours, but you're not allowed to leave a car behind anymore. I've been stuck with a few."

This year's Seaside show is expected to feature 150 cars, each worse than the one parked next to it, some waxed and buffed, others looking like dented refugees from a Dust Bowl demolition derby.

"We'll have several Yugos there, which are just godawful cars — the finest in Italian engineering and Yugoslavian craftsmanship," Galbraith boasted. "We'll also have the usual lineup of really weird French cars, and quite a few AMC vehicles, which are actually good cars with a very bad reputation they're just extraordinarily mundane."

#### Award-winning meatball

Expect an eye-poking display of Mavericks, Gremlins, Pacers, Pintos, Vegas, Beetles, Corvairs and, of course, Things, all vying for not-so-prestigious gestures of appreciation from judges who accept bribes, particularly the alcoholic type.

The Rust Belt American Junk Award is presented each year to a made-in-America bucket of bolts. The Unmitigated Gaul Award and the French Legion of Horror Award go to French cars.

There's also the Rueful Britannia, the Needlessly Complex Italian, the Der Self-Satisfiedkrauttenwagen, the Soul-Sucking Japanese Appliance, the Swedish Meatball, the Carrozzeria Iacocca, the

Ill-Advised Kit Car, and the really big prizes: Worst In Show, Biggest Loser, Most Dangerous, and the coveted WTF??? Award.

"Two years ago, we had a Honda with two front ends. They just chopped off both cars about halfway through the front doors, then welded the pieces together, pointing in opposite directions, with the drive trains intact," Galbraith said. "So it had two steering wheels, and needed two operators, and it could go either direction (without shifting into reverse), or move (sideways) like a crab.

"With two operators, you could stick your arm out the window and do donuts around a 55-gallon drum, keeping your hand on the drum the whole time. The turning radius was that tight," he said.

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

of the 1960s," said Warth. "It is also Citroen's 100th anniversary, so that's fitting, too."

The 2CV is the third Warth has owned, and he's done plenty of driving in those cars — and many others. "I come from England, but I had one in my late teens and drove it around France," he recollected. "Life is not complete without a 2CV."

Considering the Deux Chevaux's lack of power and minimal comforts — writer L.J.K. Setright described it as "the most intelligent application of minimalism ever to succeed as a car," and a car of "remorseless rationality" — Warth and Parker will avoid major freeways on their trip. They'll get early starts and end late to cover the miles in a few days, driving west from Warth's hometown near the Wisconsin state line to head through the mountains, valleys and flatlands of North Dakota, Montana, Idaho and Nevada.

"On the way back, we will go on a southern route," he said.

#### Always loved road trips

Warth first visited the United States in 1960, when he bought a VW Beetle that he subsequently drove from Louisiana to the West Coast, and then took with him back to England. "And then I married my childhood sweetheart and figured America was the land of opportunity, so I came back," he said.

America is also the land of many roads and open spaces, which Warth appreciates. "I love long-distance driving," he said, particularly because heading west, many stretches have few other cars. "It's lovely driving across the plains and across the mountains — it's just beautiful."

Warth took his Cobra from home to the East Coast, to the West Coast twice, and to Texas once before selling it at one of the Pebble Beach auctions. Interestingly, the man who purchased it, Leland Cross, had it restored and is bringing it to the show this year.

Cross has since driven the Cobra to Alaska and is next year taking it to England.

"He says the Cobra is the most traveled car," he said. Cross is driving the Cobra from Wilmington, Del.

#### Scooter and Bob

A lifelong car guy with Southern California roots but who lives in Tampa, Fla., Gabel has professionally raced, restored and built cars for years. He's made it to Concours Week on the Monterey Peninsula a handful of times, but the first time he drove here from "about as far away as you can get" was in 2015, when he and his 10-year-old Lab, Bob, hit the road in a convertible 1959 Porsche 356 Speedster he had built.

"I used to hate to drive places — as an adult, I just wanted to get there as quickly as I could, like most people," he said. But that all changed when he decided to cruise across the country.

"There's a rally that goes on in Portland, Ore., that looked like a lot of fun, and that's just a ridiculous thing to do: To drive from Tampa to Portland in an old, old car in the middle of June with my dog," he said.

After the rally, Gabel and Bob cruised down along the western edge of the United States to Monterey, and after all the fun was had, they shipped the car back and flew home.

"I loved it — it was probably one of the neater things I've done, especially because I got to do it with my dog in a car I had built," he said.

But the experience taught him the trip might


be even better in a VW bus outfitted for camping, considering all the beautiful spots to stop along the way. He knew exactly what he wanted — one of the more unusual 1960s Volkswagen buses with bucket front seats instead of a bench — and finally found it in Colorado.

hours helping him to run it down and get it processed properly.

After three years of hard work and searching and bargaining for parts — along with some hard-earned and expensive lessons in how not to build a roadster — the car was ready for its first road trip. Govro and his friend, Gordon Greer, drove to Oklahoma to visit Greer's grandparents. The pavement surface changed when they crossed from Texas into Oklahoma, with the car bottoming out and cracking the oil pan on what Govro described as more of a "step" than just a bump.

"Ugly as it was, I drove the roadster to Oklahoma, to school, and all over town, with no windshield, no hood, or top, and no hubcaps and no upholstery," he recalled. There were some misadventures, too, like the time Govro was using a grinder on the trunk of the car, and a spark ("or sparks," he allowed) got into the cotton batting under his Naugahyde seats.

"When I opened the garage doors, I was greeted by a very strange odor," he wrote. "That spark had caused the cotton to smolder, but not burn." It consumed all the cotton in the back seat and "created enough heat to cause the Naugahyde to wrinkle like a raisin." It also melted the rear seat to the vinyl rear window.

By 1955, he was ready to give it a new paint job. He wanted a lem-

on yellow, but instead it came out canary-colored. "I got to where I liked it," he said, and he started calling the vehicle "Tweety Bird." The name stuck.

#### **Bringing Tweety home**

Members of his car club painted the name "Tweety Bird" and "Austin, Texas" on the car, along with a picture of the cartoon canary running "as if Sylvester was chasing him." The roadster had already won drag races — legal ones, Govro specified — and later went on to win car shows as well. In 1959, it made the cover of Rodding and Restyling Magazine.

In 1962, married and with his first child on the way, he sold the car to George Walker, a former

schoolmate. Walker later sold it to a man named Andy Rafferty, another Texan. One day, Govro's son, Jimi, overheard someone talking about a car named Tweety at a flea market. When it turned out to be Govro's roadster, "Jimi was the total driving force that finally wore Andy down to where he said he would sell the roadster back to me."

Since then, it's been given plenty of TLC by Govro and others in the restoration business, and it will soon be shining like a bright yellow beacon near the water's edge. Speaking of that, if you see Jim, ask him about the time he and a friend nearly drove off a pier. It's a good story.



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

'35 President Roadster used in 'The Color Purple.' From that I made a mold of the logo and cast it in Connecticut River silt and Elmer's glue for the decorative badge on the fender skirts."

New England Chrome of East Hartford was engaged to plate the badges.

Beginning in 2008, for 10 years, Belling worked to restore the car, doing all the work himself, with the exception of the upholstery. "If you have an older car, you're never really done with it," he said. "I'm still refining the details."

#### Retirement funds

As an example of Belling's attention to detail, the body of the car was metal over ash wood framing, so he cut, dried, and milled native ash trees to fashion the interior framework. It didn't matter that the wood would be covered by fabric. He knew it was there, and it was right.

The upholstery of the car no longer existed. After researching the original wool fabric, Belling hired weaver Mary Eaton of Maine to reproduce it on her hand loom. It was a three-year undertaking.

Then, he looked at the car's color. "I couldn't determine the original paint color, but back before the war," he said, "you could get any color car you wanted. So, I chose the Studebaker color Tulip Cream, and put six coats on the main shell. It's a very appealing color."

Belling had been told the Studebaker engine in pieces at the time — a 250-cubic-inch L-head straight-8, rated for 110 horsepower — in pieces at the time - had once been rebuilt. After verifying this, he reassembled and refinished it. The Borg-Warner three-speed manual transmission needed nothing but a good cleaning and new paint.

Although Belling never expected to see his car featured at the Pebble Beach Concours d'Elegance, he did imagine it. So he sent in his application.

"I'm so pleased Pebble Beach picked my car," he said. "Actually, I'm amazed. This is a once-in-a-lifetime event for me. I'm using my retirement funds to get the car out there to California. I have no idea what the car is worth, and I don't want to add up what I've spent on it. To me, it's priceless."



Underneath that fabric, there's ash wood framing that Bob Belling, the Studebaker's owner, had milled for the restoration. Belling spent 10 years restoring the car, and even hired a weaver from Maine to re-create the wool upholstery by hand on her loom.

secure and indoors, and not attached to a car show — and ended up at the Embassy Suites. He already knew a lot of vendors by then and had no problem convincing them to participate.

The inaugural Automobilia Monterey drew 600 or 700 people, he said, and they "were just knocked out by what they saw."

#### A candy store

Automobilia is basically a candy store for collectors, and Singer's stories of people finding longsought parts for their rare cars or the event posters they always wanted are numerous. Customers who discovered treasures there years ago often mention those victories when they see him now.

"A lot of the time, people have special cars, and they like special things that relate to their cars," he said. "And that's what this show is all about — the memories and the memorabilia that relate to cars. You walk in there, and you've got the whole gamut of collectibles in one room."

Admission is \$20, whether you're attending one, two or all three days, and almost half goes to the Monterey County Rape Crisis Center. A silent auction that most vendors contribute items for also raises money for the charity, and Singer said buyers can either bid or take the "buy it now" option. He estimated the event has raised \$125,000 for the nonprofit since its inception.

Back home, he stripped the bus down to the body and got to work bringing it back to life, using an engine, seats, gauges and other parts left over from the many Porsches he had built.

"It's a 1960 VW bus that is outfitted for camping, and it has late '50s and early '60s Porsche parts all throughout it, so that helps get it down the road a little bit better than it used to," he said. "But not a whole lot better.... This isn't the first long-distance road trip, but it might be the last."

#### Just one mishap

Gabel is hoping the bus will hold together well enough. During a 10-week trip earlier this year, Gabel and Bob traveled more than 10,000 miles with only one real mishap.

"The second day I was on the road, a wheel broke on the Blue Ridge Parkway in the rain," he said. "It was getting close to dark, and that was a little interesting." But car guys tend to know other car guys everywhere, and friends of his with a VW shop nearby let him use their welder to fix it.

"I've had to go back into the engine a few times," he added. "Hopefully we're on the other side of that. We'll find out."

After they arrive in Monterey, where Gabel will also race a fully restored IMSA BMW during the Rolex Monterey Motorsports Reunion at WeatherTech Raceway Laguna Seca, he and Bob will continue their road trip through California to take in more of its beautiful mountain and coastal roads, and visit Yosemite.

"I grew up in Southern California, and that's something we don't have much of here — elevation change and winding roads," he said. "We're a little short of those in Florida."

Gabel acknowledged such experiences aren't too shabby, whether you're a human or a dog.

"Bob is a character," he said, adding that the Lab, who is also a certified service dog, is "better known than I am."


"He's been many places," he said. "His life has been fairly glorious."

#### the MARKET REPORT

The areas of Carmel, Carmel Valley, Pebble Beach, and Carmel Highlands, with all their varied offerings, continue to be popular markets for people seeking a weekend respite as well as a full-time home to enjoy the many attractions of the Monterey Peninsula. The overall market remains healthy as we move through 2019 and looking back, there has been a slight decline in the sales activity while certain areas have experienced record sales and others have largely remained the same or declined a bit. The overall market in the areas mentioned above experienced a decline in the sales volume in the first half of 2019 compared with the same time frame last year, at \$513M and \$618M respectively. The median sales price declined slightly to \$1.365M in the first half of 2019, compared to \$1.447M in the first half of 2018.

The number of sales for this combined region totaled 265 in the first two quarters of 2019, a decrease of 60 sales versus the same period in 2018. The average price per square foot experienced an increase to \$818 in the first half of 2019 versus \$793 over the same period in 2018. Lastly, the



median days on market fell 7 days, to 44, in the first half of 2019 compared to 2018.

Turning our attention to the Carmel market, we found that the sales volume in the first two quarters of 2019 was down a bit compared to the same period in 2018, at just short of \$270M. The median sales price in Carmel in the first two quarters of 2019 was \$1.550M, up from \$1.503M during the same period in 2018. There were 140 sales in Carmel in the first half of 2019, a decrease of 39 sales compared to the same period in 2018. The average price per square foot jumped to \$965 in the first half of 2019, up from \$885 in the first half of 2018. The median days on market remained largely the same, at 44 days in the first two quarters of 2019 versus 45 days over the same duration in 2018.
