

# Native bones unearthed at Carmel Point work site

#### ■ 'Descendant' asks for reburial site

JUST THREE months after a public hearing in Salinas highlighted the possibility that development in an archaeologically significant area like Carmel Point can damage ancient burial sites, construction on 17th Avenue unearthed bones belonging to a Native American, the Monterey County Sheriff's Office reported.

The bones were located July 23. The exact location hasn't been divulged.

Louise Miranda Ramirez, tribal chairwoman of the Ohlone Costanoan Esselen Nation, confirmed the discovery. While Ramirez said she couldn't give out the location of the find, she did say it was not one of three properties discussed at a Monterey County Supervisors hearing April 23. At that meeting, a number of residents and activists expressed concern that proposals to build basements at Carmel Point risked dredging up

# City shuts down lemonade stand

m I}$ N A town famous for its rules — chain restaurants are illegal; galleries, jewelry and souvenir shops are strictly limited, and twinkle lights are banned in the business district except during the holidays — it might not be surprising that the code enforcement officer shut down a business this week because its owners didn't have a license to operate.

Except the business was a lemonade stand, and the operators were two 7-year-olds and two 10-year-olds.

"Sunday or Monday, the grandkids were over here," builder Chris Tescher, who lives with his wife on Carmelo Street near Ocean Avenue, told The Pine Cone Thursday. With the unusually glorious weather, "they came up with the idea of having a lemonade stand."

So they set up a little table near Ocean Avenue about 40 feet from the Teschers' house and called a couple of friends to

# Brush clearance taken to new level in Pebble Beach

#### ■ Firebreaks more extensive than usual

FIRE PREPARADNESS has been ramped up statewide in response to last year's devastating fire in Paradise that killed dozens of people and burned thousands of buildings - and that includes right here on the Monterey Peninsula, where the Pebble Beach Company has been clearing large amounts of dead wood and vegetation along some of its roads and near four entry gates.

To reduce the risk of wildfires, crews are nearing the end of a project to clear dead trees and brush — which would provide dangerous fuel for a wildfire — at the Highway 1, Pacific Grove, Country Club and S.F.B. Morse gates. It's a project that's unprecedented in its scope for this sensitive area.

"They've created firebreaks from 30 to 100 feet, depending on the location," Pebble Beach Community Services District general manager Mike Niccum told The Pine Cone this week.

#### Clearing the undergrowth

Firebreaks are spaces within forested areas where fuel has been cleared to slow the spread of wildfire. Thinning out dead vegetation helps ensure that fires reaching the roadway would be slow-moving and confined to the ground, with minimal

At the S.F.B. Morse Gate, which is accessed from Highway 68 just outside Pacific Grove, crews cleared the brush right down to the ground on both sides of the road to the first stop sign. The most conspicuous work, though, is at the Country Club Gate off Congress Avenue, where they cleared large

# Plover, 30 grams and all, almost ready to go free

A SNOWY plover rescued on a local beach while it was in the process of hatching is doing well and is expected to be released back into the wild in a few weeks, a spokeswoman for the SPCA for Monterey County said this week.

The small egg was found unattended on Salinas River State Beach on July 14 and taken to the SPCA.

"He was pipping [had started hatching] when the egg arrived, and after incubation and care, he hatched a day later," SPCA spokeswoman Beth Brookhouser told The Pine Cone.

She said the tiny shorebird which weighed a mere 5 grams about the same as a nickel — when hatched, spent his first day out of his shell "getting his sea legs and fluffing up."



Weighing about the same as a nickel when it was brought to them for help, this snowy plover chick is being cared for by the SPCA.

The bird now weighs a whopping 30 grams and has moved outside at the SPCA's Wildlife Rescue & Rehabilitation Center off Highway 68 to gain the speed and skills he needs to survive in the wild.

"He is not the first snowy plover the SPCA has cared for, but he is the first one that we have hatched out from an egg," Brookhouser said. "We are so happy we were able to help

**M**ILA DIDN'T stand a chance. Born with a life-threatening liver condition, she had the misfortune of moving from one caretaker to the next - none of them with the wherewithal to help her.

Ultimately, the tiny Yorkshire terrier turned up at Save A Yorkie Rescue, an East Coast nonprofit dedicated to the toy-sized terriers. Volunteers got the seriously ill little dog to a veterinary hospital, and the rescue organization funded the \$10,000 surgery she needed.

MiLa's person wasn't looking to add a third dog to her menagerie. Yet, while cruising the rescue site from her Pittsburgh, Pa., home, she saw a picture of the frail little thing and read her story.

"I wanted MiLa but felt I couldn't commit," her person said. "But the more I looked at her photos, the more I realized it wasn't if I should get her, but when.' After waiting months for her recovery, I ended up with a darling dog, and a dear friend in the woman who was fostering her."

While MiLa bonded quickly to her person, she's even more attached to her person's husband.

"She thinks the sun rises and sets around him," she said. "MiLa's his little pal."

MiLa's first flight was to come to Carmel, where her people rent an apartment in town and spend up to three months each year. She's never been to Carmel Beach, but she's spent plenty of time strolling Scenic Road and greeting everyone she meets, with her bold



bark and big-dog personality.

"She's the sweetest, most gregarious dog, but I don't know what she'd do at the beach," her person said. "She could run like a bat outta hell or bury herself in the sand. Now that she's healthy and loving life, she's up for anything."


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


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


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


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# **Broken main creates beach pond**

A HUGE water leak pouring from a broken 6-inch main in the area of Casanova and Fourth the morning of Aug. 3 dumped an estimated 144,000 gallons of water onto Carmel Beach near the Fourth Avenue stairs before California American Water Co. crews managed to shut it down and repair the break, according to Cal Am Central California manager Catherine Stedman.

A customer reported the break around 7 a.m. Water was gushing from underneath a segment of Fourth Avenue that PG&E tore up to lay a new gas main and repaved in late May. The leak broke through the soil and plants next to the asphalt edge on the south side of the road above the drainage ditch that runs all the way to the beach. Stedman estimated the

flow rate at 250 to 300 gallons per minute.

"We were there within the hour and had it shut down within a couple of hours after that," she said.

Stedman said Cal Am crews could not pinpoint the cause of the rupture in the 6-inch steel main, which was constructed in 1922.

'It could have been the age of the main, or pressure fluctuations in our system, or tree roots," she said. "We cannot say with certain-

Crews repaired the break with a large full-circle steel clamp that covered the broken segment of pipe, according to Stedman.

Several days later, water remained pooled on the beach below the drainage pipe, and this week, a broken city sign and dismantled fencing were still piled up at the corner and blocked off by city barricades.

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

# The gavel falls

Verdicts, pleas and sentencings announced by Monterey County District Attorney Jeannine Pacioni

June 21 — Monterey County Superior Court Judge Rafael Vazquez sentenced Madison Perez Nott, 20, a resident of Watsonville, to eight years in prison for committing a lewd act on a child under the age of 14 years.

In 2018, Nott was the head coach for an all-female Salinas softball team for minors. Jane Doe was a player on the team coached by Nott and was under 14 years old at the time. Jane Doe reported that she had a sexual relationship with Nott during the fall softball season, from September through November 2018.

The sexually inappropriate contact with Doe occurred when Nott met with Doe after practice or after team-building events. During an interview with Detective Yolanda Rocha, Nott admitted to engaging in multiple sexual acts with Jane Doe.

During the sentencing hearing, Judge Vazquez noted that parents trust coaches to watch over and protect their children, and Nott took advantage of her position of trust as Jane Doe's softball coach. Judge Vazquez also stated that Nott "priori-

tized her sexual desires above the well being of one of the children that was placed in her care," and as a result, caused harm to Doe's "psychological and emotional well-being." In addition to the prison sentence, Nott is required to register as a sex offender for life.

Judge Vazquez also ordered Nott not to have

any contact with Jane Doe for a period of 10 years, the maximum term under the law.

July 1 — Judge Andrew G. Liu sentenced Arnulfo Bravo, 34, to 4 years 8 months in prison after Bravo was found guilty by a Monterey County jury in April of assault with a deadly weapon on a peace officer, evading a peace officer, and filing a false report of a vehicle theft.

On August 21, 2017, Salinas Police Officer Sutton attempted to pull over Bravo's vehicle for failing to stop at a stop sign. Bravo failed to yield and instead sped up. Bravo ran through multiple stop signs and red lights, reached speeds of 70 mph in residential neighborhoods and even sped past a school bus whose red lights were flashing indicating children were present. Officer Sutton eventually terminated the pursuit because it became too dangerous.

Salinas Police Officer Mitchell located Bravo shortly thereafter. Bravo turned into an apartment complex and Officer Mitchell positioned his vehicle in the driveway and exited his vehicle with his gun drawn.

Bravo then turned his vehicle around and drove straight at Officer Mitchell, forcing him to jump back in his car and close the door to avoid being hit. Bravo escaped.

Bravo later tried to report his vehicle as stolen, but when Officer Mitchell arrived to take the report he immediately recognized Bravo and arrested him.

# Commission votes to not let another controversial skincare store open

m IT WASN'T so much what Royal Bee is selling out of its Dolores Street storefront that got the shop in trouble with the planning commission Wednesday, but how.

Similar to three skincare shops on Ocean Avenue, the shop has employees standing in the doorway calling out to passersby and handing out samples, and because those aggressive sales tactics in general have generated so many complaints, the city now regulates what it calls cosmetic stores. Since Royal Bee sells lotions and the like, it needs a special permit, planning director Marc Wiener explained at the Aug. 14 meeting, and commissioners voted 3-1 not to give it one.

Royal Bee opened in May, but when a code enforcement officer discovered the store was

selling skincare products, the planning department directed owner Erez Chen to apply for the proper permit. "We gave them a deadline, then we extended the deadline," Wiener said. "Once the use permit wasn't applied for, we scheduled a revocation hearing, and that got their attention."

#### 'Peddling near doorway'

Chen subsequently applied for the permit, which is issued on a discretionary basis to businesses that can have an adverse impact on the city or surrounding businesses, like bars, restaurants, liquor stores and tasting rooms. The city council recently added cosmetic stores to that list "because of the adverse impact of peddling near the doorway and on the adjacent sidewalk," Wiener said.

'We have three other cosmetics stores

that have been doing this over the last several years, and have received numerous complaints from residents, visitors, and customers that shop in those stores regarding this activity," he said.

At Royal Bee, employees have handed out honey straws and other items, and Wiener said they were repeatedly told to stop. "It hasn't ceased," he said, showing an Aug. 8 photo taken by the city's code enforcement officer of a worker who "stepped out to solicit someone to come into the store and shop."

Wiener recommended the commission deny Royal Bee's permit, which would require the business to either eliminate all the skincare products from its merchandise or close altogether. The only way the commission could approve the permit was if it complied with seven specific findings, and he determined it would miss the mark on four. According to Wiener, approval would set a precedent "for approval of similar uses, whose incremental effect will be detrimental to the city." Allowing a business to peddle from the doorway and sidewalk would also "make excessive demands" on the city's code enforcement department, and the sales tactics are harmful to public welfare because they disrupt pedestrian flow. Finally, he said, the shop would have "an adverse impact on the welfare of neighboring properties and business uses."

He gave an example. The owner of Heart Beat at Monte Verde and Ocean closed her business there "because shoppers and pedestrians were avoiding that area altogether because of the aggressive soliciting at the doorway," of the skincare shop next door, he said.

#### 'Don't kill the bee'

Attorney Steven Andrade argued the business does not need a special permit to operate and shouldn't be judged for the misdeeds of others. He said Royal Bee hadn't broken any rules, though he did not address the photo Wiener presented.

'What we don't want to happen is for you

to sentence Royal Bee to death for crimes it has not even yet committed and might never commit," he said.

Andrade also argued that the owner had done everything he was supposed to do and wasn't told by the planning department that Royal Bee needed a different permit than the one it obtained.

"This is not a business that is going out in the street and accosting people and wiping mascara and rouge on their face," he continued. "What they are doing is standing in the threshold, not in the street, and only offering people passing by the opportunity to taste a honey sample."

#### No complaints

The store manager, who did not provide his name, said no one has complained about the employees handing out samples or talking to people as they pass by. He also said skincare stores are being unfairly singled out, arguing that people who sell jewelry or paintings or anything else in town are allowed to be outside their businesses speaking to people.

"We have neighbors as well who ruin our business, who are drinking beer and smoking outside of the door, and we are not complaining," he added. "And there are people who harass my employees and harassed my mom when she came to town."

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# After six decades, family sells shopping center for \$13.55 million

m FOR}$  THE first time since it was completed in 1960, the Carmel Rancho II shopping center has a new owner.

Located on Carmel Rancho Boulevard next to Lucky supermarket — the shopping center was sold by the Beeman Family Trust to Vincent and Grace Chin of San Francisco for \$13.55 million. Escrow closed June 13.

The 44.676-square-foot retail complex at the mouth of Carmel Valley is home to a variety of tenants, including BevMo, In-Shape Fitness Center, Bagel Bakery, Tru-Cuts, Mike's Pizza, the Raw Connection pet store, and other shops and businesses.

#### Sold apartment building

According to Michael Schoeder of Cushman & Wakefield, which represented the seller in the deal, the buyers sold an apartment building in San Francisco to pay for the shop-

He said the couple plans to "do some cosmetic renovation," along with "improving visibility," making "area upgrades," and adding "more pedestrian-friendly amenities."

"This is an irreplaceable investment that

comes along for sale in the Carmel area once every 25 years," Schoeder said. "This 60-year- old center has delivered to its owners a highly stable and high-quality income

It's also unlikely the center will face significant competition in the near future, because there's little room to build more retail space nearby — and there would likely be considerable local opposition to it. "One of the key draws to this center as an investment opportunity for the buyer was also that, for a variety of reasons, our market has significant barriers of entry which could limit potential competition," he said.

Schoeder said the shopping center was built by the Bucquet family, who started construction on the site in 1959 and opened it the

"I really respect the family and their legacy," he said. "We are very proud to be part of selling this 60-year legacy property."

Josh Jones of Cushman & Wakefield said the shopping center's location was a big selling point. "The property is an iconic location within the Carmel/Pebble Beach retail submarket, the premier retail submarket on the Monterey Peninsula," he added.

# No Car Week shenanigans, please

ALONG WITH their counterparts in Carmel who announced last week that they would not tolerate any drag racing or other violations in town, police officers in Monterey this week pledged to strictly enforce the rules of the road — especially those that tend to be broken by drivers who can't resist showing off the speed and power of their sports

"Last year during car week, the we saw an increase in speed-related violations, equipment violations and truck-route violations,"

Monterey police Lt. Michael Bruno said. "In response, we have increased staffing and will vigorously enforce the law."

'Individuals caught engaging in exhibition of speed, speed contests and/or reckless driving may be arrested, and their vehicles will be impounded for 30 days," Bruno warned, while people who have modified exhausts will be sent to the California State Referee for corrective action, and truck drivers found off route will be fined \$260. The truck route is available on the city's website.





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# Stuntz Foundation hits \$100k, delivers half to Cambodian surgical center

AFTER THE death of Carmel resident Braxton Stuntz who was just 18 when an accident took his life at Garrapata Beach in January — supporters raised \$100,000 for some of the charitable causes that were the young man's passion, and three of his friends took \$50,000 to a children's surgical center in Cambodia last month on his behalf.

The recent Stevenson School grad's father, surgeon Mike Stuntz, told The Pine Cone that he and teenagers Imogene Johnson, Giovanni Rito and Carson Berti traveled to Cambodia — via a quick round-the-world trip that had them touching down in Helsinki, Hong Kong and Bangkok — to present a check to the Children's Surgical Centre the father-son duo had visited a couple of times.

And on Tuesday, the GoFundMe campaign to raise money for the new Braxton Stuntz Foundation met its \$100,000 goal, thanks to a final \$650 gift from Carmel Highlands resident Marc Davidian, who wrote, "Kelly and I think of your sweet, kind and generous boy often."

The selection of the Children's Surgery Centre wasn't random. The organization, which trains Cambodian surgeons and delivers free care to the poor in Phnom Penh, was started by Jim Gollogly, father of Monterey Spine & Joint orthopedic surgeon Sohrab Gollogly. Braxton, who died after falling through a blowhole at Garrapata Beach while showing the area to some friends from college, had also wanted to be a surgeon, and he and his father twice traveled to Cambodia together on medical missions.

#### 'Spend it well'

"The trip for me was hard and emotional, because the two times before were with him," Stuntz said.

The mission this time was to deliver \$50,000 to the center's general fund, making the money available for surgical procedures, supplies, staff salaries and other operational costs. He said he considered stipulating how the money should be used but decided against it.

"This was my third time there, and I'm confident they are going to spend it well," he said. "They do a lot of surgeries and a lot of good."

During the trip, which was 11 days from takeoff to touchdown, the teens learned a lot and saw many aspects of Cambodia, including its poverty, crime and "bad things that happen to people," Stuntz said. They observed surgeries at the center and bought gifts for the children who were recovering. They also attended a July 4 party at the U.S. Embassy.

Stuntz said the trip with his son's childhood friends was poignant on many levels for all of them. "All three of them are visibly shaken from the experience of losing him, and each in their own way has been having struggles in getting through it," he said. "I could see that they got a lot out of the trip, not only getting over his death, but growing. That was certainly my impression - for all three of them, it was part of their healing process."

Stuntz said they also spread some of Braxton's ashes there, since it was so close to his heart.

#### School next

Back home, Stuntz is considering what other worthy efforts to support with the foundation's funds, as well as ways to keep it growing. His efforts to improve cell service and emergency response along the remote Big Sur Coast, especially since it's now so crowded with tourists, is ongoing, and he's researching building a school in rural Cambodia.

The money will also help provide supplies for "Braxton's Bags," the Christmastime campaign the teen started, unbeknownst to his parents, in which he would buy food and supplies for the homeless.

"In holiday seasons past, Braxton made packages of useful items and personally handed them out," Stuntz posted on the GoFundMe site Tuesday evening. "We only found this out from his friends after he died."

That effort, maybe more than any other, epitomizes the foundation's motto, "helping others with quiet strength," and Stuntz said he and others "will be looking for volunteers to help carry on his charity."

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
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# CHS auto shop class draws crowd

Brewer has worked in the business for nearly three decades and said even at his school, he sees "pretty healthy" interest in automotive technology, with 30 kids in his classes last year and slightly more this year.

#### More girls, too

The students range from those who are "hardcore and super passionate because they grew up around motors," to those who don't really know much about cars but are interested in learning more about how they work. More of them are female, too.

"Those girls could turn a wrench," he said of last year's group. "We had competitions, like putting on snow chains, and they smoked

the other groups, because they took their time and read the directions, and were kind of meticulous about it."

#### The electric era

He's also seeing more "tech-savvy, computer-science types, too," thanks to gains in the industry and market by manufacturers like Tesla, and in his coursework, he tries to bridge the gap between conventional internal-combustion-engine cars and new electric

The students will soon have the chance to build an electric vehicle from the wheels, up, thanks to Brewer's initiative. At an auto teachers' conference earlier this year, he learned about a new effort to teach kids by having them build an entire car. "I got to network and talk to a lot of people. It was eye opening and at the same point reinforced the feeling there is a shortage of techs out there," he said. "I heard about this electric-vehicle package deal, where you can get your feet wet in that kind of tech.'

He brought the information home and applied for a grant from FOCUS, a nonprofit

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

Big Sur property owners sue over cabin

TWO BIG Sur landowners have filed a lawsuit against a woman they say for years has been living on their 5-acre property in a small cabin that lacks running water and sew-

er and electrical hookups. In a civil complaint filed July 26, Inga Dorosz and David Sleeth say they've owned 5 acres of mountainous and unfenced land at 74625 Highway 1, a few miles north of the San Luiso Obispo County line, since 2013. In the northeastern corner of their property is a "small one-room cabin-type structure" the two artists say is occupied by Elaine Chase-Peltier, who owns the land next door.

When Dorosz and Sleeth bought their land, they believed the cabin was on Chase-Peltier's property, but when they had a survey done in May 2015, it showed that the cabin was located entirely on their own property, within a "few feet of the lot line." They contend that Chase-Peltier "is fully aware that she is living on" Dorosz and Sleeth's "property and admits that the cabin was built on the wrong side of the property line."

While Dorosz and Sleeth say they offered her a proposal in September 2018 that would have allowed her to live in the cabin for a "specified period of time," she was "not responsive.'

Chase-Peltier does not pay rent and has "never paid any taxes or assessments on the cabin," the suit says.

The couple claim the cabin has "precluded" them from benefiting from the "quiet use and enjoyment of their property." They could also have trouble selling the land.

"Plaintiffs are unable to sell or offer marketable title to their property due to the cabin, and are burdened with the myriad of risks associated with having the undocumented structure on their property," according to the lawsuit, filed in Monterey County Superior Court by Los Angeles attorney Tony Tootell.

The property owners also claim that Chase-Peltier has failed to maintain the cabin or land around it "in a way that complies with fire safety guidelines," and that the structure poses an environmental threat because it has no sewer system. Dorosz and Sleeth are seeking a court judgment to evict her.

# Monastery's new road opens, donations still needed to pay for it

WORK HAS been completed on an access road at New Camaldoli Hermitage in Big Sur to replace one that failed.

"We are pleased to announce after several months of construction our new entrance road is open," Jill Gisselere, an employee of the hermitage, reported this week.

The new road will be blessed this fall by Father Cyprian, the prior of the hermitage.

Last October — with heavy rains expect-

ed during the upcoming winter and spring - monastery officials announced they would have to replace their existing access road, which was badly damaged in early 2017 by heavy rains.

#### **Avoiding landslides**

The new road was planned to travel uphill in a more northerly direction than the old road, moving it farther away from nearby Paul's Slide, where an extensive erosion control project is underway. The new road

— which climbs about 1.300 feet over two miles - now connects with the old road shortly before reaching the monastery.


Hermitage officials had expected the construction to cost about \$1.2 million, but conceded the work - which was done by the Don Chapin Company - exceeded its budget.

While those at the monastery are thrilled with the completion of the new road, they still need to raise more money to pay for it.

"We are so grateful for ev-

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# It's high-tech, stealthy and bristles with weapons — and has a very odd name

IT'S FUTURISTIC, agile and lethal, and represents the next generation of battle tanks. Its name: The Carmel. You won't find this on sale at city hall, though.

The Israel Ministry of Defense early this month unveiled new armored fighting vehicle technology, called the Carmel Program, that will employ artificial intelligence to create the tank of tomorrow. The stealthy armored vehicles will drive themselves and allow crews to see in every direction.

In Israel, of course, Carmel is the name of a mountain range near Haifa which has a long political and religious history and is mentioned numerous times in the Bible. Thanks to explorer Sebastian Vizcaino, in 1602 the area around present day Carmel-by-the-Sea was named for the mountain as a tribute to the role three Carmelite friars played in the success of

But for today's Israeli military, which relies on technological superiority to keep the tiny country safe, the Carmel will

be the "combat vehicle of the future" including numerous "autonomous capabilities," according to an Aug. 4 article published in news magazine, Israel Defense. "It will be compact, agile, effective, survivable, maintainable, and affordable and will be operated by only two combat soldiers.'

Israel's current front line tank, the Merkava, requires four crew members.

The Carmel vehicle proposed by an Israeli defense company "combines a panoramic display, individual control screens, and a control stick similar to a gaming console," according to the Middle East Forum website.

#### Multiple weapons

According to Jewish Business News, "from a Carmel, it will be possible to fire at the same time with various weapons: missiles, including anti-aircraft missiles, 30 mm diameter shells and bullets from a heavy machine gun."

The vehicle also will have "special and classified camouflage capabilities that will make it very difficult for the enemy to see it — even with the use of binoculars and night vision equipment, radar and electronic warfare," the publication said.

Israel's three major defense industries recently presented prototypes for the Carmel, which is not yet a new vehicle but rather what the defense ministry says is breakthrough combat technology that will be installed in current and future Israeli


A demonstration of the prototypes Aug. 4 was attended by Israel Defense Ministry officials and representatives from the U.S. Army, according to news sources.

The Carmel Program was launched three years ago to develop technology to upgrade Israel's combat vehicles to produce "an agile, effective, innovative, compact, easy-to-maneuver vehicle with relatively low costs," while "maintaining operational superiority via technological superiority," the Middle East forum said.

"Defense ministry officials said foreign countries have expressed interest in purchasing some of the technologies developed under the program," the Times of Israel reported.

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
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
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
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# P.G. Chamber uses TV advert to lure businesses

Ammar touts the costly renovation of the Holman Building, the former department store which now has 25 luxury condominiums — some of which have sold for more than \$2

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# Major change at Stevenson School

What started out as a theoretical discussion has developed into a major project that will hit the Carmel and Pebble Beach campuses of Stevenson School this fall, changing long-developed lifestyles for students and teachers alike.

The change is a new schedule that will keep high school students in classrooms for 70 minutes at a time, with breaks as long as 50 minutes in between.

Kevin Hicks, head of Stevenson School and a 1985 graduate of the school, said he is optimistic about the impact the transition will make on the community.

"The schedule will give students more time between classes, which research shows helps them digest, integrate, retain and apply what they're learning," Hicks said.

#### Fewer classes, too

In addition to the longer classes, students at the school's Pebble Beach campus will have a maximum of four classes per day, and those classes will be on an every-other-day rotation. A class that's held on Monday, for example, won't convene again until Wednesday.

While the new schedule seems drastic, students and faculty say they think it will make learning easier and less stressful.

Alina Rubin, who will be a senior when school starts August 28, acknowledged that the change "will be a hard adjustment for the students, coming from the 40-minute classes

we had last year, but I think in the long term it will be better for us and make us more productive."

Teachers were deeply involved in the discussion about the new schedule, facilitated by Molly Bozzo, head of the lower and middle Division, and Dan Griffiths, head of the Upper Division, in addition to working with Challenge Success and Independent School Management, two firms that encourage schools to move away from "test-score focused environments" and to implement a "broad definition of success."

While the less rushed schedule sounds appealing, students must now try to focus their attention spans to adjust to the 70-minute class periods, which sound daunting.

There might be some ups and downs this fall, but students and teachers say they are looking forward to the new environment. And Hicks says the schedule changes are based on more than just the time that's on the clock.

"Schools' daily schedules are expressions of what they value," Hicks said. "At Stevenson, we value meaningful work, authentic human engagement and a joyful learning environment, and we expect that our students' and teachers' lives will be less stressful without compromising our high standards."

Overall, the transition is looking good, and Stevenson is prepared for the start of school when students come flooding in this week to try to navigate the new way of life.

Lucy Lynch will be a senior at Stevenson School this fall.

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

# NELSON FOREMAN July 22, 1939 - July 10, 2019

Per square mile, Oklahoma has more tornadoes than any other place in the world ... so, of course, it was considered simply a natural account. course, it was considered simply a natural occurrence when another spirited gust arrived on July 22, 1939. Thrilled with their own lively twister, Guy and Ollie Foreman finally had a son to follow after their two daughters, and Nelson Foreman took his rightful place as the twinkle in his father's eye and the hope in his mother's heart.

Fortuitously situated, Middleberg, Oklahoma, where Nelson was born, was a stop on the Oklahoma Central Railroad and provided an easy exit opportunity for the Foreman's to pack it up and migrate to Salinas, California in 1944 when Nelson was five years old. Life in California offered fresh opportunities, and Nelson excelled in sports, showing considerable promise as a baseball pitcher. His father, a bona fide Giants fan, who insisted his daughters have jobs in high school, assured Nelson that if he was a good enough ball player he would never need to worry about working. The irony of that advice, not lost on any of us who knew Nelson well, was that Nelson once he started working as a young man — never stopped working. Ever. Right up until the day he died, he worked.

Nelson was a prominent member of the Carmel and Carmel Valley business communities, and was



respected for his business acumen, his irrepressible wit, and his no-nonsense approach to life. Carving out his reputation as a shrewd and successful businessman with an unparalleled work ethic, he first purchased The Wine Cellar on Ocean Avenue in Carmel in the early 1970s. He then acquired The Hatchcover in Carmel from 1977 to 1983. His life then took a sharp left turn in 1983 to Livermore, California, where he purchased Downtown Ollie's (named after his mother) before finally returning home to Carmel Valley in 1985 to purchase The Running Iron Restaurant and Stirrup Cup Pizza.

If Nelson liked you, you knew it. If he loved you, he gave you a nickname. He would tease and

If Nelson liked you, you knew it. If he loved you, he gave you a nickname. He would tease and taunt, but only with those he cared about and always only with the intention of getting a good laugh. As life philosophies go, Nelson's credo was "living well is the best revenge." And live well he did! With beautiful homes in Carmel Valley and New Orleans, there was not much that was out of Nelson's reach.

Devoted to his wife, Jenn, for the past 44 years, the two of them were an unrivaled team that raised kids, ran successful restaurants, traveled, and were always there for each other. They were home to one another. Now that Nelson is gone, those that love him are left to build pockets of stillness into their lives to remember who he was, what he stood for, and how hard he worked for what he stood for. He was a busy man with many people making demands on him for most of his life. And he did his best to meet every one of those demands.

Nelson lived in color, but his perspective was often in black and white, and that fact at times required that he be given "redemptive assistance" from his family and closest friends for a slight that was certainly unintended.

Nelson is survived by his wife Jenn; his sister Treva Black (Joe); his son Lance Foreman (Heather); his daughters Leeza Foreman and Jessica Bohlman (Jon); his step daughters Tawni Corona (Don) and Timi Scardina; 9 grandchildren and many nieces and nephews.

The bird will be released in the same general area where he was found, she said.

In decline for several years, according to state parks, western snowy plovers were listed as threatened in 1993 by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Services under the federal Endangered Species Act.

The birds use several Monterey Bay beaches from Sand City to the Pajaro River mouth as breeding grounds. When a plover parent is disturbed, it will often abandon its nest, leaving the eggs behind.

State parks for several years has carried out monitoring, education and enforcement of regulations to promote recovery of the little shorebirds. It prohibits dogs on state beaches, and signs on the beach warn people to stay away from the birds and their nests.

# No sales tax Dear Editor,

Carmel's mayor is indeed clueless regarding economics. If you need more tax revenue, you increase sales. You do not do this by raising customer costs, i.e., the sales tax. What you would do, if you had an understanding of economics, is lower the sales tax. This is illustrated in our past, as the United States once had an income tax rate of over 90 percent. When it was lowered by approximately 30 percent, the revenue to the treasury increased.

I propose lowering the sales tax in Carmel to the absolute lowest in the state. Instead of the tourists "window shopping," they would actually purchase. Friends in Carmel's jewelry sector tell me that they are supported by locals and that the tourists seldom purchase. Instead, they usually just look and end up buying from their local jeweler or on the internet.

But revenue would markedly increase if costs were cut, as in the outlet store business plan. The overwhelming number of business failures over the last many years illustrates the fact that the crushing overhead in Carmel does not permit high enough margins for the merchants to survive. The only answer is an actual increase in revenue, and raising the sales tax is exactly opposite of what is needed.

tion of our village," she said. "The planning director has made a very strong case for denial." She also noted that people complain only about the skincare sellers aggressively soliciting, not anyone from any other type of business in town.

Wiener confirmed that no one is allowed to sell products beyond the thresholds of their stores, except restaurants that have outdoor seating.

#### 'Carnival barking'

Planning commissioners debated the best course to take, and all focused on the sales tactics more than the products themselves.

"What I find to be most offensive is what I'll call 'carnival barking,'" commissioner Julie Wendt said. "It's basically standing in doorways and trying to entice somebody to come into your shop. No other shops in Carmel do that except cosmetic stores."

Wendt also said she was disinclined toward approving another skincare store, as was commissioner Christopher Bolton.

"There's nothing wrong with your product — it's the marketing strategy," commented chairman Michael LePage. "We've had a lot of complaints."


Just on his way to city hall, LePage said, he has to walk past two similar businesses with employees calling out from the doorways. "I go out on the edge of the curb and get my don't-talk-to-me face on, and I walk around it," he explained. "And that's not good."

Commissioner Gail Lehman wanted to put off voting on the permit to give the owner more time to think about what to do, including whether he could afford to stay in business if he wasn't allowed to sell skincare products. But the vote to deny Royal Bee's permit passed 3-1, with Lehman dissenting. Commissioner Stephanie Locke was absent.



come help sell lemonade, which Tescher bought for them at the grocery store.

"They made these little signs," he said. "It was like a Rockwell painting."

With the warm weather and a good location on their side, the kids quickly drew customers willing to pay \$1 a cup for

lemonade, sometimes even more, and soon accumulated "a bowl full of dollars," Tescher said.

"People were just charmed by the whole thing," he said. "When you see a little kid out there selling, how could you

But enforcers of the rules are good at resisting the charm of even the cutest miscreants.

"My wife was out there with them, and she came in and said the code enforcement officer came by and said, 'You can't have lemonade stands in town," Tescher recounted. The code enforcement officer, Bo Grunde, "was very nice," but nonetheless told the kids to finish selling what they had and close

It didn't take long. In about 40 minutes, they had wrapped up the illegal business and returned to the house to count their money and play video games.

Theirs was apparently not the first stand to be shuttered for lacking the appropriate permits, according to planning director Marc Wiener. On June 20, Grunde shut down some kids who had set up a table and were selling drinks on public land at the busy corner of Ocean and San Antonio.

"That was clearly in a public area, and there's a heightened sensitivity about it because of the sidewalk vending law that was passed," he said. "And we've received calls from a number of individuals who are interested in selling on the sidewalks." But not many of those calls have come from people who aren't old enough to drive, vote or watch scary movies.

Nonetheless, Wiener said, the code doesn't care whether you're 80 or 8. If you're operating a business without a permit, it's illegal.

Though, he admitted, "I would think if it's in front of someone's house, it's not a problem — it's just when they're doing it in a public space."

#### No fun allowed

In a Letter to the Editor, Tescher likened coming across a lemonade stand in town to seeing a unicorn, saying that in 60 years of living here, he could count on one hand how many times he's seen kids outside selling cold beverages.

"I know it wasn't in the commercial zone where it belonged, and they didn't have a license, to say nothing of architectural approval by the planning commission," he said. "And I admit it did not conform to the seismic codes required by the building department."

In all seriousness, he pointed out, the stand was an example of kids learning how "to earn some money by their effort and imagination," and he said everyone who stopped by was supportive and complimented them on their creativity.

Tescher repeated his observation that Grunde "was extremely nice" but also hoped he was "perhaps a little embarrassed."

"But what does this say about Carmel?" he asked "That fun is not permitted?"

There is no word on whether the city will attempt to collect the taxes it's owed on the lemonade sales.



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#### Eugene 'Gene' Rosenberg

June 16, 1930 - July 14, 2019

Father and stepfather, grandfather, husband, brother-in-law, uncle, avid A's and Warriors (formerly Red Sox and Celtics) fan and should-have-been ballad singer Eugene "Gene" Rosenberg passed away on July 14, 2019, at his home in Carmel Valley. He was 89.

Gene was born in Worcester, Massachusetts in 1930, to the late Louis and Rachael (Sinovitz) Rosenberg. He graduated with First Honors from Classical High School and was Phi Beta Kappa at Dartmouth College

(Class of 1952). He attended Harvard Law School (Class of 1955), served two years in the United States Army, and then began his legal career at Maher, McCann and Talcott in Worcester. Gene and his thenwife Susan (Sharfman) moved to San Francisco in 1960. Gene loved the vibrancy of the Bay Area and happily made it his home for the next forty years.

During a long career as a plaintiffs' lawyer, Gene was a compassionate and impactful advocate for his injured clients. His career included stints with storied San Francisco attorneys Melvin Belli and Marvin Lewis, and partnerships with Maurice "Morrie" Nelson and in the firm Stern, Stotter, Rosenberg & O'Brien. Gene found some of his most fulfilling years in solo practice from 1975 to 2000. After closing his solo practice he served as Of Counsel with the firm Aaron & Wilson until his retirement.

In 1981, Gene married Patricia "Pat" Miles. Gene and Pat lived in Montclair, California for many years before moving to Carmel Valley in 2002. In retirement, Gene and Pat enjoyed daily walks with their beloved dog Sadie, cultural offerings in the Monterey area, and socializing with friends. They traveled often, and Gene took particular delight in the time he was able to spend with his grandchildren on the East Coast.

Gene was best known for his wit, his intellect, his charisma, and his optimistic approach to life. He enjoyed food, movies, music, reading, tennis, swimming, fly fishing and river rafting. He nurtured his relationships, keeping in touch with friends and family by sending them cards, letters, and a steady stream of carefully curated articles and cartoons. Gene was an excellent writer who loved a good rant. He wrote untold numbers of Letters to the Editor, dozens of which were published in the Monterey Herald and the San Francisco Chronicle. Those who were fortunate enough to know him will recall his beautiful blue eyes; his penchant to serenade virtually anyone, at any time, with a show tune or popular song from the Big Band era; and – above all – his infectious laugh that was unlike any other, and, once heard, could never be forgotten or duplicated, much like Gene himself.

Survivors include his daughter Judith Rosenberg of Portland, Oregon; his son Daniel (Colette) Rosenberg and their three children, Louis, Nathaniel and Eva of Silver Spring, Maryland; his stepdaughter Corrinne (Mark) Atkinson of Waldport, Oregon; and his former wife Susan Sharfman of Richmond, California. Gene was preceded in death by his three brothers, Harvey, Edward and Joseph, his daughter Elizabeth and his wife Patricia. Gene received the best of care in his final years. The family is grateful to his doctors and their staffs, his professional caregivers, and most especially to his niece Debra Raybold for her companionship and support.

A memorial event will be held in the San Francisco Bay Area on a date in 2020 to be determined. 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that raises money to fund Carmel school district programs and teaching materials, to get the kit for his auto shop. FOCUS gave him \$32,000 to purchase the package, which includes the car's frame, teaching curriculum, and all the components. The district will pay for instruction workbooks and other necessary materials not covered by the grant.

He's still crunching numbers and isn't sure when his students will get started on the project, but no matter when that is, the experience will be highly valuable. "Not a lot of schools offer this kind of program," he said. "It will give them a better chance at landing a technical job."

The building process can be compressed into a semester "if you have really innovative students," or spread over the course of a year, and by the end, the kids will have constructed a fully functioning electric car. "It should be street legal by the time it's done," he said.

#### The basics, plus

In the meantime, Brewer's classes focus not just on the basics, but on theory, too, and throughout the year, students will learn how to balance tires, replace brakes and do full vehicle inspections and services. He also allows the kids to initiate projects.

"One student was doing a full restoration on his International Scout," last year, he said.

The highlight of last school year, though, was Carmel High's efforts at the Monterey Peninsula College 10th annual High School Automotive Skills Challenge held in April. "I told the class we were going to field three teams, and that we were just going to go in there and have a great time, that there was no pressure," he said. He fielded three two-student teams, one with seniors, another with just sophomores, and a junior-sophomore team.

Carmel High was one of six local high schools to compete. Skills tests focused on vehicle maintenance inspections, automotive parts identification, electrical diagnostics and wheel rotation, and competitors also took an Automotive Service Excellence certification exam. The kids learned about automotive technology education and careers during a panel discussion that included representatives from Cal Fire, Pacific Motor Service, Cypress Coast Subaru, Tesla and Victory Toyota, and checked out a show of classic cars.

"At the end of this competition, my sophomore team won first place in the team category," but the cumulative scores of the three CHS teams weren't high enough to take the overall title, which went to North Monterey County High.

MPC's dean of career technical education said the "good-natured competition" not only helps the college con-

Brewer understands the value of those experiences. A self-described "tinkerer" from an early age, he had planned to become a pharmacist but quickly realized the field didn't suit him. A dozen units shy of obtaining his bachelor's degree, he quit college to focus on becoming a mechanic.

"I was always wrenching and fixing stuff, and that's how I paid for college, and I really enjoyed it," he said. "I get joy out of helping people."

He was living in the Central Valley and went to work for Peterbilt but lost his management job there during the 2008 recession. Brewer knew he could fall back on his skills as a mechanic and decided to relocate with his family to the coast.

"There are mechanics needed everywhere," he explained. "So if you want to live by the beach, you just a do a little research, and you'll find a dozen jobs near the beach."

He became a fleet mechanic for Monterey Peninsula Unified School District, a job he held for six years before seeing a similar opportunity at Carmel Unified. He wrenched on CUSD buses for four years and then decided to get his teaching credential.

"I thought for the next phase, I would like to teach technical college," he said. When he learned Carmel High's longtime auto shop teacher would be retiring, Brewer wasn't quite ready for the job, but he jumped at the chance, anyway.

"It was an opportunity," he said. "Growth comes with change."

Brewer said he's learning alongside his students in many ways, and that he can relate to them, too.

"You can make a good living turning a wrench," he said. "And once people find out you're a mechanic, you're going to make a lot of friends."

amounts of dead wood for about 100 feet on both sides of Congress Road.

"At the Highway 1 gate, if you come down Pescadero Canyon, you'll see we cleared the road on both sides to get a fire break all the way down to the golf course," Niccum said.

He said that while the budget for fuel reduction work is typically between \$200,000 and \$250,000 annually, the company increased the budget to \$500,000. The work is being done by the Pebble Beach Community Services District in partnership with P.B. Co., Del Monte Forest Conservancy, Cal Fire and the Open Space Advisory Committee.

Not only will removing the large quantity of dead trees cut down on the amount of fuel, Niccum said, it will also clear the ground and promote new Monterey pine growth. That's important since during a Feb. 13 storm that battered the Monterey Peninsula, an estimated 800 trees came down in Del Monte Forest.

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"There was so much dead wood that there were places where you couldn't see the ground," he said.

In the Pebble Beach Community Services District's newsletter to residents, Mark Mancini, fire prevention battalion chief with Cal Fire, explained the science behind cleaning out the forest.

"Regrowth happens in cycles, and our work is paying off as we see healthy stands of trees and sunlight penetrating to the forest floor," he said of work that had already been completed. "This decreases the destructive potential of wildfires, while also encouraging a more diverse ecosystem."

#### Just tall enough

In other areas of Del Monte Forest where poison oak and other undesirable vegetation is abundant, such as near the Carmel Gate, the company is using a herd of 300 goats to help clear it.

The goats can "stand on their hind legs and get just about to the elevation" that has to be cleared, Niccum said.

The fuel-reduction work follows the Pebble Beach Community Services District's update in April to its fire defense plan, which addresses the threat of wildfires within Del Monte Forest by "identifying and prioritizing" strategies to offer the greatest fire protection. The document is reviewed and updated every other year by the Pebble Beach Fire Department.

"The first line of defense for every property owner in Pebble Beach is to maintain their property in accordance with state and local fire standards for defensible space and building materials," the plan says.

For instance, where homes border undeveloped forest, "fuel reduction zones shall be established extending 100 to 150 feet in ground measurement immediately below such structures as determined by the fire chief," according to the plan.

The program will help prevent a repeat of the 1987 Huckleberry Hill Fire, which burned 31 houses in Del Monte Forest after being ignited by an illegal campfire near the SFB Morse Botanical Reserve.

"They were probably disturbed when the house was built," she speculated. "Someone decided to leave them there."

Ramirez said the confidentiality of such sites is vital because many have been looted or vandalized in the past, including a site near Asilomar State Beach in Pacific Grove.

The remains that were found are now in the possession of an archeologist, Ramirez said. Once he is done with his work, they will be given to her for burial. But she said there's no place on the existing property to safely rebury them, so now she's trying to find a site nearby.

"We always try to rebury as close as possible" to the location where remains were found. "I can't send them over to Monterey," she explained.

According to county official Brandon Swanson, when the

burial was discovered, the work on site was stopped by the county, the sheriff's office was notified, and an archaeologist was consulted. "When the remains were determined to be Native American, the Native American Heritage Commission was informed so the most likely descendant could be notified," Swanson said.

Ramirez said she's been designated as the "most likely descendant," and as a result, she will take possession of the remains once the archaeologist's work is completed.

Aside from her concerns about reburying the bones, Ramirez pleaded with county officials not to let homes be built with basements at Carmel Point.

She also urged people to consider how they might feel if the remains of one of their ancestors was disturbed. "The area is sacred," she added. "Avoidance is the best thing for all of

According to experts, Carmel Point is an area with "well documented archaeological resources," and it's possible Native Americans lived there as far back as 9,000 years ago.

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# Editorial

# The score's 95-5? Let's compromise!

WE CERTAINLY agree with the sentiment Mayor Dave Potter expressed at the council meeting last week, that "compromise is the art of good government." In many cases, compromise is an essential part of the democratic process.

But in some cases, a compromise is unnecessary, or can be harmful to the public interest — even in the government arena. The Bill of Rights, for example, includes a whole bunch of things that aren't subject to compromise. Don't want free speech? Too bad, you lose.

Likewise, there's no reason for the majority to compromise when opposition on a particular issue comes from a tiny minority, no matter how vehement it is. The idea of open borders would be an example of such an issue. Only a few Americans favor such a thing, so there's no reason to compromise about it — or even discuss it.

Another time when it's pointless to talk about compromise is when one side has already achieved a great victory in a dispute about this or that, with only a few tiny details remaining to be resolved. An issue like that is the future of wood fires on Carmel Beach.

Perhaps you recall those long ago days of 2015, and for a century before, when beach fires were a very popular tradition in Carmel. Many are the residents and visitors who cherished this custom and regarded a fire on the beach as an essential part of any warm evening on the Monterey Peninsula. Truly, such experiences were a vital part of the local culture.

But the fires became so popular they were a nuisance, and when a handful of residents raised a vocal protest at the city council and backed it up with data about air quality, the council really had no choice but to put limits on the fires, which they did. In 2016, the city council strictly limited wood fires on the beach to no more than a dozen city-provided cauldrons that kept the blazes off the sand and helped control smoke.


This program was the end of the traditional beach fire in Carmel. The opposition people had a resounding victory, and in the days since the limits went into effect, the number of fires has fallen to practically zero, and so have the smoke and the soot.

But even a few small fires are too many for the anti-smoke zealots, who continue to demand a total ban on them. They've already achieved a 95 percent (or more) victory, but they want 100 percent. It's only a handful of people who are vociferous about it, but they won't let it drop. Meanwhile, the much greater numbers of people who would like to continue to enjoy a cozy evening on the beach once in a while are being drowned out.

It was in this context that Potter called for a compromise, which implies that both sides are being intransigent. But when one side is behind 95-5, they're hardly being unreasonable if they refuse to be left with nothing. When it comes to the beach, a compromise would have been to cut the number of fires by half.

We know Potter was just being helpful, but when it comes to beach fires, the only question remaining isn't which side will win, but whether one side will be left with anything at all.

# Creativity requires work — and other lessons learned along the way

ONE WORD: Commitment." That's and Silber became intrigued by the process of how photographer Marc Silber describes the key to creative success. "If you don't commit,

it doesn't matter how many classes or workshops you take. It's like tennis — you can take lessons, but you have to play during the week to get good. If you commit yourself to an art form and work on it, you will get better at it," he promised.

His most recent book, "Create: Tools from Seriously Talented People to Unleash Your Creative Life," is built around that theme. He wrote it so that anyone could tap into their creativity, given the willingness to put in the effort, the right tools and the proper mindset.

Interviews with success-

ful people from all walks of life back up his premise. That may sound like anathema if your vision of the artist's life involves a lot

developing and printing photographs.

His first camera was a Kodak Brownie,

but by junior high school, he graduated to a Minolta. By age 12, he said, he'd become a "serious photographer." 
John Muir's writings called to Silber at about that same time. He took his first solo backpacking trip at 13,



Brandt's father, Bob, designed the family home in 1956 with renowned architect Jerome Cerny, and the residence was featured in numerous public "house walks" in the city of Northbrook, Ill.

"My mom was artistic and crafty - she did a little bit of everything - and she was always directing my attention toward things, pushing me to further my knowledge, which was fine because I really liked to learn," she said. "Boredom wasn't allowed at our house.'

# John Catlin, the city's blacksmith mayor and an expert on habeas corpus

FRANCIS WHITAKER of The Forge in the Forest is perhaps the best known of Carmel's blacksmiths, but he did not start The Forge in the Forest.

Little has been written about the blacksmiths of the village, who were an essential part of daily life in the early days, but as

cars began to replace horses, became less important.

In "My Life as an Artist Blacksmith," published in 1995, four years before he died, Whitaker wrote: "John Catlin was a retired lawyer from Sacramento who lived in Carmel and had a small blacksmith shop in his garage."

Catlin, then 56, was not really retired when he moved to town. A directory shows him as an attorney with a home at the

corner of Sixth and Junipero. Thomas Prescott was listed as Carmel's blacksmith. Prescott lived in Monterey but worked at Sixth and Junipero, assumedly out of Catlin's shop.

Whitaker's narrative continued: "I went to Catlin's and told him of my background and he let me come back to help him on some of his larger projects. After my first year, Catlin decided to build a larger shop to accommodate the increase in my business ... he called it Forge in the Forest."

A 1928 ad for The Forge in the Forest shows the "larger shop" was at Fifth and Junipero with "John Catlin, Forgemaster"

I have enjoyed getting familiar with Catlin through his 1924 journal. In his entry for August 3, 1924, Catlin wrote: "On this day in 1922, I became a resident of Carmel, a village that I have known more or less intimately since it was founded. Aye, the locality has been a favorite spot of mine all my life and years before anyone ever conceived the idea of founding a settlement on this shore, saving the early foundation of the mission. I came here with my mother when I was no more

than 6 years old."


When he was young, Catlin seemed to have the world as his oyster. He was born near Sacramento, the son of judge and Senator Amos P. Catlin, who as a young New York attorney came west for the gold rush in 1849. In 1852, the elder Catlin was elected to the state Senate and authored the bill that made Sacramento the state capital. He later served in the state Assembly and in 1890 was elected as a Sacramento County Superior Court judge.

#### Searching for gold

John, the second son, attended UC Berkeley in the late 1880s, and was soon practicing law in Sacramento. An 1892 article noted, "Attorney John C. Catlin is earning quite a reputation for himself as an expert on habeas corpus." At just 21, his brilliant mind was getting wrongly accused individuals out of prison. His reputation as an excellent defense attorney only

grew. He married in 1895 and had a daughter. When his father stepped down as judge in 1897, they became partners, anticipating

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that John's younger brother, Harry, would join them when he finished at Hastings Law School. It didn't happen.

Amos Catlin died in 1900, John left the practice and his family to look for gold in Alaska, and Harry, despite passing the bar, became a journalist in San Francisco. John Catlin later joked that even in Alaska "there

was more gold to be had by straightening out the legal tangles of the sourdoughs than by panning for it." He returned to California in 1906 and settled in San Francisco shortly before the earthquake. He then partnered with his brother as Catlin and Catlin, Attorneys-at-Law. When his wife died that year, he arranged for her mother to raise their daughter.

Catlin often went toe-to-toe with federal prosecutors and became known for protecting Chinese rights and defending them against everything from deportation to transporting a wife for illegal purposes. In two of his high-profile cases of 1915, he won the right of an English widow and her daughter to remain in the country after her husband died, and also won, on appeal, the right of a Japanese entertainer to return after touring outside the country.

Catlin's brother Harry died in July 1916 during an appendectomy. The loss seemed to take the wind out of Catlin's sails. The city directory of 1920 showed he was still an attorney in San Francisco, but after 1918, he did not appear again in the San Francisco press until July 1926 when a story about the production of "Hamlet" at Carmel's Forest Theater said the cast included "John Catlin, former San Francisco attorney, now a Carmel blacksmith.'

#### Trouble getting paid

A 1928 article, based on an interview, said "ill health forced Catlin to give up his legal practice. He found health and happiness in roaming the coast mountain range on foot and horseback, but this could not last forever as he had lost most of his money as well as his health.'

Initially, Catlin was not known in Carmel for his remarkable legal background. He arrived broke and got a room and a job in the stables of the Carmel Riding School at Junipero and Ocean. On July 9, 1924, Catlin wrote: "It is remarkable in this village how insistent people are to whom I am indebted and who know that I have no money on hand with which to pay them and how careless about paying me are my own debtors, albeit they know that I need the money sorely.'

Whitaker indicated, "Catlin had done smithing on his grandfather's ranch when he was growing up and wanted to take it up again." It was while watching the blacksmiths work on shoes for the horses at the stable that his interest in working the anvil and fire was renewed.

In writing of Catlin in 1928, Oakland Tribune columnist wrote: "Like the hero of [Longfellow's] poem, he is a mighty man. Despite his advanced years he is a splendid specimen of manhood, possessed of the strength of a horse and has the carriage of an athlete." Next week we will delve more deeply into Catlin's life in Carmel, a place that he loved and where he became mayor in 1932.

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

# Road trip for the ages: Four caddies play the 'Holy Land' of golf

During the eight days they spent playing some of the greatest golf courses in Scotland — where, according to lore, golf was invented in the 15th century — four veteran Pebble Beach caddies were reverently aware that they were walking on hallowed ground. But they were repeatedly reminded that

they weren't in heaven.

"The first thing our Scottish caddies always said to us was, 'What are you doing here?' They all wondered why we would leave Pebble Beach to come there," said Mike Geertsen, who experienced a dream-of-a-lifetime golf vacation in June

alongside fellow caddies Marcos Jimenez, Chris Hoogstad, and Raymond Kim.

The question was playfully sincere, even if everybody already knew the answer: While Pebble Beach has been nicknamed "the Mecca of golf," the links at St. Andrews are celebrated as golf's Holy Land.

"I remember walking up the 18th Fairway on the Old Course, thinking to myself that I couldn't believe we were actually there," said Kim, who picked up the tab for everybody as a 50th birthday present to himself. "All of a sudden, Chris just stopped in his tracks and gave me this huge, spontaneous hug. It was a very emotional moment — the culmination of everything — and I'm going to remember it for the rest of my life."

The sentiment was echoed by the other members of the foursome, who soaked up the history of their dramatic surroundings for all eight days, and particularly on the second-to-last day on the iconic Old Course.

#### 'Wispy rough'

"All of our caddies at St. Andrews knew the history of the golf course," said Jimenez, who, like Kim and Geertsen, has caddied for more than 20 years at Pebble, while Hoogstad has worked there 10. "My caddie showed me the bunker [on the 14th hole, nicknamed "Hell Bunker"] where Jack Nicklaus got stuck during the 1995 British Open and took five swings to get out, and the one where during the 1921 British Open, Bobby Jones got stuck on No. 11, tore up his scorecard, and stomped off the course."

The contrast between Monterey golf and Scotland golf is significant, the caddies said, and the sand traps are a major reason. "We're not used to hitting out of bunkers where you can't see over your head," said the 43-year-old Geert-

sen, a 9 handicap.

Other differences:

Scotland's ominous-looking rough is actually wispy—
much easier to escape than the rough on Monterey Peninsula

- Greens on the Scottish courses are enormous one on St. Andrews' Old Course stretches 100 yards whereas Pebble Beach greens are commonly referred to as "postage stamps.
- And despite Scotland's infamous wet weather, the ball just keeps on rolling.

"The first drive I hit on the range there probably ran 60 yards. At Pebble, your ball might roll up to 20," said Kim, a 16 handicap and the shortest hitter in the foursome. "Some holes over there are 460 yards, which wasn't hard for me, because the fairways are very hard. There were times when I'd get 80 yards of run."

The 33-year-old Hoogstad, an 8 handicap and the longest hitter in the group, was launching 400-yarders.


They also adjusted to quirks like traveling in Scotland's


left-hand lane on the roadways (they felt blessed to have a local driver), and Scottish breakfasts, which invariably include beans, plus local meat dishes such as black pudding (ground-up animal organs) and haggis (sheep's stomach).

"Hard pass," was Hoogstad's review of haggis.

Kim and Geertsen paired up to compete against the team of Jimenez and Hoogstad in each of the eight rounds, the first of which was played in chilly weather at picturesque Castle Stuart, on the banks of Moray Firth. The second day was spent

at iconic Royal Dornoch Golf Club - founded in 1616, ranked No. 3 among international courses (outside the U.S.) by Golf Digest in 2007 — in frigid, 30-mph winds.

"Our caddies on both days were absolutely great," said Jimenez, whose 6 index made him the most consistent player of the four. "My caddie at Dornoch was a 21-year-old who had been caddying since she was 12. You can't start at Pebble until you're 18, but in Scotland, caddying is part of the fabric of their families. It's entwined with everything. In fact, most of them are also members at the clubs where they work."

Their round on Day Three was played at

The Nairn Golf Club, where every hole has a sea view, and the forecast called for a 92 percent chance of rain.

"When you see all of your caddies stop what they're doing and start putting their rain gear on, you don't have to ask ... you know something's up," Geertsen said.

"We looked out at Moray Firth and it looked like a black wall coming at us," Hoogstad remembered. "And then, for whatever reason, that weather just stayed about a halfmile out. We got incredibly lucky."

#### A familiar face

Day four took them eastward to Cruden Bay Golf Club, designed in 1899 by Scottish legend Tom Morris, who died just before his 87th birthday after falling down a flight of stairs in the clubhouse of the New Golf Club in St. Andrews.

> "Up to that point, I'd had a great caddie experience at every course." said Jimenez, 43, a self-described "hippie" who wears his hair in dreadlocks. "And then I met stuffy Harold, who was 79 years old, and had worked at Cruden Bay for 63 years. I don't think Harold really knew what to think of me. "He didn't think I saw it, but

Harold spit on my ball on the first hole ... then he did it again on No. 4," he said. "I never said anything to him — he was who he was. And it didn't ruin my experience, but I did think it was a bit ... unusual."

The fifth day took the group to Kingsbarns Golf Links, a course the Scots often compare to Pebble Beach.

"Wonderful ... unbelievable ... but it's not Pebble Beach. Pebble is Pebble," Jimenez declared. "But every hole at Kingsbarns has something different about it: elevated tee shots ... doglegs everywhere ... it's truly a great golf course."

Day Six — Father's Day — took

them to St. Andrews' Jubilee Course, which was built in 1897 "for ladies and beginners," and was renovated into a championship layout 101 years later.

Their round of golf there was followed by a memorable evening at a local bar called Ziggy's, where they encountered an all-female birthday party with 12 inebriated revelers, including a guest of honor who danced on the tables, and repeatedly ascended the stage to perform with the gypsy singer until management finally turned off her microphone.

#### Light until late

Afterward, with the Scottish sun still shining at 10 p.m., Geertsen and Jimenez spied a familiar face coming toward them on a bicycle — longtime Pebble Beach caddie Graham Cowan, now working the links at St. Andrews.

"We're thousands of miles from home and we meet up with somebody we know ... small world," Jimenez said. "Graham took us to Dunvegan, the famous bar where everybody must go when they visit St. Andrews, and turned out to be a nice place to watch the final round of the U.S. Open from Pebble




Add a Richard McDonald sculpture and you're practically at Pebble Beach. Not really, but the path to the First Hole at the Old Course at St. Andrews in Scotland is a symbolic stroll into golfing history.

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The Old Course the following day lived up to all expectations, and netted a treasure trove of scrapbook photos for the group. Kim shot some of the best golf of his life on the front nine, where he was 1 over par. An enduring memory for Geertsen will be playing every shot between the tee and green from the blacktop on No. 17, St. Andrews' infamous "road hole," where the pavement is in play. "My caddie told me he'd never seen anybody do that before," he said.

Their final round, on Day Eight, was another 18 at Kingsbarns, followed by an emotional farewell stroll at St. Andrews'

"We ended the evening with a walk along 17, and stopped to take a final picture at 11 p.m. on the famous Swilcan Bridge, the place we always see on TV," Kim said. "I think it

Meanwhile, their teams competition couldn't have been sweeter. The Kim and Geertsen pairing won three times, the Jimenez-Hoogstad team won three, and two matches — including the finale — ended in a tie.

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
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# Forest Theater provides stage for PacRep's 'Beauty and the Beast'

ONE OF the most beloved of all fairy tales — and a timeless reminder that beauty is only skin deep — a musical adaptation of "Beauty and the Beast" opens Saturday, Aug. 17, at the Outdoor Forest Theater.

This marks the fifth time since 1996 that PacRep has presented the musical on local stages — and the first time since 2012. "It's proved to be one of the popular family musicals we've ever done," director Stephen Moorer said.

The musical, produced by Disney for Broadway, is based on the classic French story of a beautiful young woman who befriends a tormented beast.

#### Veterans on the stage

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


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# Steve Earle honors mentor with New Record, shares songs at Golden State

The success of Earle's first full-length record, "Guitar



In general, Kobza, who started his tiny winery five years

ago as a side project, opts for a lower-alcohol, lighter style that pairs well with food.

During the tasting at the Annex, they'll be offered for sale with a 10 percent discount.

And on Aug. 30 from 11:30 a.m. to 2 p.m., Miguel Lepe will be the next guest winemaker at The Annex's Brown Bag Lunch Series, which kicked off last month with Nicole Walsh of Ser Wines. Lepe, who made wine for the late Peter Figge

and continues to help widow Amy Little Figge with the venture, is also busy with his own Lepe Cellars label. 



Brandt painted as a child, and rode the train alone from suburbia into the city during her tender years, to take classes at the Art Institute of Chicago. She became more enamored with art as a student at New Trier West (acclaimed as one of the top schools in the country), where she was further inspired by a memorable teacher.

"Her name was Mrs. Kaiser, and she taught us how to paint," she said. "She moved to Nairobi, and when I was about 16 she sent me a necklace made from African beads. I've been interested in anything African ever since, because my favorite person was living there."

Brandt sold most of the artwork she created as a high school student, studied afterward at the renowned Kansas City Art Institute, then set out to experience life, landing near Charleston, S.C., where she painted during the day and got paid for performing her own songs in the evenings.

"It was a time when singer-songwriters like Carole King and James Taylor were popular, and you'd find a singer at any hotel," said Brandt, who plays guitar and drums, and sings. "I wrote most of my own music, and really enjoyed performing it. I still do."

She moved on to Colorado, settling in the Rocky Mountains, where she spent the next 10 years.

"Colorado, for me, was a cultural disaster," she said. "I came from Chicago, where there was so much culture, and wound up in Dillon, a mountain town where the culture at the time was about taking drugs, drinking alcohol, skiing and having no responsibility. I tried to be a loser, but it didn't work for me. One day I just realized that I could have earned two master's degrees during the time I lived here."

### Mom was awesome

The breakup of a relationship accelerated her move to California, where her parents and two siblings, sister Starr and brother Barry, were living.

"I was feeling blue and just felt like I wanted to be with my family," she said.

Brandt was close to her father, Bob Brandt, who died in 2007, and her mother, Sally, who passed away three years later. The Brandts moved to Carmel Valley from Illinois in 1976, and were philanthropically generous to the Monterey History and Art Association and the Perry-Downer House & Costume Gallery.

"The first bead show I ever had was at the Carmel Valley Library, and to me it was a very big deal. I was really nervous about it and didn't sleep much the night before," Brandt remembered. "I got there, and set everything up, and nobody came; nobody knew about it; nobody cared. But my mom showed up and she bought a piece, which was a really sweet thing to do. My parents were very wonderful people."

In addition to her jewelry, Brandt continues to paint, mainly plein air (outdoors) in oils and pastels.

"Lately I've been having fun painting at Mission Ranch," she said. "The fields, the sheep, the water, the clouds ... where else can you get a vista like that?"

ademically excellent education for a year at a private prep school in northern Vermont, where several family friends took their kids to escape the drug scene.

In his senior year, back in California, Silber wanted to have what he called the "Jack Kerouac experience" — drop out and hit the road. "My parents said, 'no," he recalled.

He was deterred, but only briefly. Soon, he determined

what classes he needed to graduate — just one, in social studies — and convinced the high school to let him take a trip to Mexico with one of the teachers to earn credit for it. He and a small group of students went there to build a medical dispensary in the Sierra Madre mountains.

As he recounted in "Create," "I learned that I had to work much, much harder for this taste of freedom. In high school, I was loafing along, 90 percent asleep. In Mexico, it was raw manual labor from dawn to dusk ...." It was a lesson that stuck with him. "It was a lot of hard work," he said, but he was also able to take some really intimate portraits because people grew to trust him while he was there.

Although he attended the San Francisco Art Institute (Annie Liebovitz was a classmate), as an adult he went to work for years in the business world, ultimately building a management

consulting firm. But his art kept calling to him, and he sold his interest in his consulting firm to his partners and went back to it — learning about creating pictures in the digital age in the

His highly successful business includes not just taking pictures, but teaching others the art and craft of doing it themselves. He loves to help people reach their goals, starting with a job teaching mountaineering for the National Outdoor Leadership School when he was 19.

Silber also has a popular YouTube show called "Advancing Your Photography," which shares a title with one of his books. He also authored "The Secrets to Creating Amazing Photos."

### **Unexpected creativity**

His wife, Janice, is his "art director." "I take the photos and she finds the right frame and the right spot on the wall," Silber said. And his lifelong love affair with the outdoors has become part of their love affair, as well. "We do a lot of hiking. She's a trooper," he said. They share a home in town, near

With "Create," Silber said, he wants people who know they're creative to find renewed energy, and people who think they don't have an artistic bone in their bodies to re-kindle the spark that he believes everyone is born with. "Creativity isn't just in art or music. It can be part of life as a whole. It comes up in unexpected places, like being an entrepreneur or using social media to get your name out," he said.

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

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

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


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# When Detroit meant cars, and cars meant Detroit, I had some sweet rides

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### **Scenic Views**

When I arrived in 1956, Detroit was not yet Motown, but it was the Motor City. Its population was just under 2 million, and there were about 300,000 manufacturing jobs to be had. In the 1950s, one-sixth of all the jobs in the country had something to do with making cars, and more than 58 million cars a year were produced and sold

by American manufacturers. Given the population of the country at end of that decade (179,323,175), that's almost one new vehicle for every three living persons.

During the 1950s, U.S. auto production was greater than that of Great Britain, France, Japan, Sweden and all other nations put together. And it goes without saying that the big American companies, Ford and GM, posted healthy profits year after year.

There was a breakout of chrome on cars as an increasingly opulent society flourished in the United States. Stylists used ideas from both planes and trains to design many of the automobiles. One of my college roommates had a 1957 Chevy Impala with black with silver fins and a red leather interior. To use a '50s phrase, it was the living end.

If you lived in the Detroit back then, chances are you knew someone who worked at GM, Chrysler, or Ford's. Yes, it was GM or Chrysler, but always Ford's with the possessive apostrophe.

As the years went by, I owned a parking-lot-full of

American cars. My 1966 Mustang was one sweet ride. If the word cool hadn't already been in our lexicon, that car would have inspired it. And my 1967 fire-engine-red Pontiac Catalina looked like it was going 90 mph when it was parked in the driveway.

### Costly mistake

But later, in what was probably the epitome of poor timing, I bought a 1973 Plymouth station wagon with a 440 cubic inch engine weeks before the OPEC oil embargo caused the price of gasoline to quadruple in six months. That car burned a couple of gallons just sitting in the drive-

Two un-cool cars turned out to be favorites of mine, in spite of being plebian and shunned by most of the automotive literati. The first was a 1979 Oldsmobile station wagon with a diesel engine. Automobile experts said everything

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was wrong with it, from a poorly designed fuel system to a low compression engine. I bought it anyway because it got great mileage for a big car.

We called it "The Tank" because it was so heavy and slow. But it took us to Disneyland, Washington D.C., the Carolinas, and all over Michigan, Indiana, and Ohio.

Gas stations didn't carry diesel, so on long trips we fueled up at truck stops. I pulled up to the pumps along side humongous 18-wheelers, a mouse among elephants.

We learned that Pilot and Flying J were two of the best places to stop because they offered loyalty points. And how my kids loved to ogle the array of products!

They'd wander down aisles piled high with merchandise unavailable at any Esso or Mobil station. There were Browning knives, fish finders, CB equipment, 250-channel police scanners, metal detectors, watches, cameras and the world's largest assortment of beef jerky.

The restaurants offered hearty food and plenty of it. We never tried the laundry service or the reasonably priced showers that included a fresh towel, washcloth, bathmat and soap. But they were there if we needed them.

My son learned to drive in The Tank. When he got his license, I let him drive his sister to school, confident that The Tank could take a punch and give better than it

### Not what he thought

My second un-cool car was a 1992 Oldsmobile Silhouette minivan with a sharply sloping front, like a Dust Buster on wheels. It gained fame in the movie "Get Shorty." John Travolta's character, Chili Palmer has this exchange with a car rental agent.

Chili Palmer: What is that? Agent: It's an Oldsmobile Silhouette. Chili Palmer: I ordered a Cadillac.

Agent: Oh, well, you got the Cadillac

By the end of the movie all the principal characters were driving Silhouettes.

It's Concours Week and the cars keep coming. My favorite day is the Concours on Ocean Avenue, when I get to spend hours admiring 1950s Chevys, Fords and Plymouths — the best of Detroit when Detroit was at its best.

# He'll be looking for his old prints but probably won't find them

OR THREE straight days each spring, the selection committee of the Pebble Beach Concours d'Elegance meets to review each and every automobile application for the upcoming automotive beauty pageant.

Led by Concours Chairman Sandra Button, 15 committee members sit facing each other and a big screen, on which images of each car are projected for discussion and decision making.

Midway through the first day of the review, an image of a 1937 Rolls-Royce Phantom III filled the screen. Committee member Al McEwan said, "I'd

know that car anywhere."

Where cars are concerned, McEwan has a photographic memory. At times, only he is able to identify a car, sometimes just by the steering wheel. This time, he knew the whole car.

#### Not too fancy

No one on the committee was surprised, but they didn't expect to learn he had a personal connection to this particular Rolls-Royce.


McEwan grew up in Agawam, Mass. His junior and senior high schools shared a building near the bridge that connected Agawam to Springfield. On the other side of that bridge sat a small café, not a fancy place, McEwan recalled, but with stools and a counter and fairly fast food.

Frequently parked outside that café was the Rolls-Royce he recognized during the slideshow. McEwan believed the café and the car were owned by a man from Springfield where, during the 1920s and '30s, the luxury automobile manufacturer had established a plant to help respond to U.S. demand for the marque.

After school, McEwan would walk over to the café just to get a look at the car and lean against the long, lean automobile, adopting a posture of own-





# Wine and a hot Ford roadster — what more could a love story need?

IKE SO many car stories — at least here in the U.S. of A. — this one is **d**a love story.

Quint Meland was born in South Dakota but grew up a California boy during his teens. He liked cars and said he was a "car guy," but not the kind that usually gets invited to the Concours. He explained that while he once owned a Cobra and a few other speedy cars, he wasn't really a collector — he just liked to go fast.

#### For the love of a woman

He's being a bit modest. In the 1950s, he purchased a 1931 Ford Model A and built it out into a race car. He competed — and won — in it for a few years, but then sold it, all for the love of a woman.

He adored his high school sweetheart, Shirley, and he said he sold the roadster for \$1,500 in 1961 to fund their honeymoon. They were married for 55 years, until she died of cancer in 2016.

During that time, Meland served six years as on active-duty as a Marine pilot, including time in Vietnam, and later served in the Marine Corps Reserves for more than 20 years. He also flew for TWA for 31 years.

"Shirley was very forgiving, very patient and very tolerant," during his absences, Meland said. In 1978, while he was training at what was then Alameda Naval Air

Station, he heard about a big car show at the Oakland Coliseum. He didn't know it was the renowned Grand National Roadster Show — he just wanted to go look at the cars.


While he was there, one of the first autos he saw was a 1932 Ford roadster that was built by a fellow named Phil Cool, who is now the winemaker for Coyote Crest in Healdsburg. "Now that's a hot rod," Meland recalled saying when he saw it.

The bright orange car stole the show, was named, "American's Most Beautiful Roadster," and even landed on the July 1978 cover of Hot Rod magazine.

The stunner of a race car became part of a collection belonging to the late Gil Nickel, who owned Far Niente winery in the Napa Valley. In addition to restoring a late-19th-century chateau for his winery, Nickel was known as a race-car enthusiast and owned numerous vintage automobiles, including Lotuses, Ferraris and a Bentley, among others.

For reasons that are unclear, Nickel decided to sell the Phil Cool '32 roadster, as the car was known, and listed it in one of those auto shopper magazines you sometimes see at the grocery store. Twenty years after he'd seen it for the first time, Meland recognized the roadster and contacted Nickel.

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

# Niki Lauda's winning Ferrari to cross the auction block at Gooding & Co.


Formula 1 driver Niki Lauda — and the mourning among motorsports fans worldwide that followed — the auction of his world-championship-winning Ferrari is one of the most compelling events of Car Week. Gooding & Co., which will auction the car at Pebble Beach Aug. 16-17, describes the 1975 Ferrari 312T as "one of the most significant and iconic F1 racing cars ever offered for public sale."

Born in 1949 in Vienna, Austria, into a wealthy paper-manufacturing family that disapproved of his

desire to race, Lauda started his professional career behind the wheel of a Mini in 1968 and later borrowed against his life insurance to buy his way on to a Formula 2 team in 1971. He moved to Formula 1 — the top racing series in the world — in 1972, driving for two different teams before joining the prestigious Scuderia Ferrari team in 1974.

#### Lauda's magic touch

He finished the season in fourth place, largely due to mechanical failures in the car he was driving then, the Ferrari 312B3, according to Gooding. Frustrated, he "was determined and more focused than ever to avoid a repeat of his previous year's re-




sults." Therefore, "he was extremely hands-on with the development of the 312T and comprehensively tested the car during the off-season in an effort to bring Ferrari back to its winning ways."


The "T" in the car's name refers to the transverse mounting of its gearbox ahead of the rear axle, which helped the 500-horsepower racecar handle corners better. In its maiden season, with Lauda behind the wheel, the Ferrari 312T took first in the 1975 BRDC International Trophy at Silverstone in England, and then won the French Grand Prix, took second in the Dutch Grand Prix, and finished third at the German Grand Prix. His providing input during the car's design and his






Serving as a backdrop for the Mustang is the Santa Fe Depot in San Diego.

## Remembering that endless summer and the best car I never owned

YOU HAD me at honk. Or toot toot, or beep beep, or whatever sweet sounds you spurted when I depressed that button in the middle of the steering wheel. Sometimes you had two doors, other times four. Once your gearbox had a long handle that emanated straight out of the floor.

The handle had a round knob at the top. Once, your starter button was on the floor and had to be engaged by stepping on it. And you knew how to accessorize with items such as elec-

tronic sunroofs, turbo-charged engines, A/C and even heated leather seats

Most times you were very practical. You hauled groceries and children, a proper suburban vehicle, you were utilitarian before there were SUVs. Once you were a 1966 Mustang, not practical, but saucy sweet, easy to be with, an eye-catcher. Twice you were born in the forties with "tothe-moon-and back" odometer readings when I got you. You survived "as needed" maintenance and rock salt that scarred your skin like automotive eczema. But you were always there

and ready when I needed you to get me from point A to point B.

#### North and south

And then ... and then there was that magic year when you were a 4,500-pound, 18-foot-long, sleek, stylish, sexy sea green 1958 Buick Super convertible. I didn't own you. That was all right. You were mine for that entire glorious summer when our world existed of the white sandy beaches of Lake Erie, sometimes on the American shore, sometimes on the Canadian.

It was the summer of 1958. Officially, there were five boys in my family. Unofficially there were six. The sixth was my older brother's friend Bill. Bill was orphaned as a teen and lived a few blocks away from us with his elderly Aunt Nettie. His mom had told Nettie not to worry about Bill as long as he was with the Gervases. So that's where he hung out.

That was the year my brother moved to Detroit so Bill slid down the family scale to me. We became best friends even though he was three years older.

Bill had money from an inheritance, which gave him the wherewithal to buy the Buick Convertible. He also had a heavy foot. He

almost lost his driver's license from getting speeding tickets on the New York Thruway. So I became his designated driver on weekends.

Oh, the pity of it! Young and single, an easy summer job that gave me weekends off, and the keys to a sleek Buick convertible. It had a white leather interior, very wide white sidewall tires with spoke rims, a steering wheel bigger than a ship's helm and a chrome inner ring that touched off a trumpet-like horn where ever one depressed it.

Bill and I liked jazz, so we haunted the black and tan saloons where it was very cool to co-mingle the races for the shared joy of listening to good music. No matter where we went, we always made "last call" at Cole's, a collegiate hangout on Elmwood and Forest.

#### The glorious days


But it was the days, the glorious days when we would sail on the sun, and ride the wind with the top down, and park on the hard sandy beaches of Lake Erie.

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
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# Before Champagne and Lemons, you'll find something right in between

T MAY be hard to believe, but the 25th edition of the Pacific Grove Concours Auto Rally will Ltake to the Last Hometown's streets Friday, Aug. 16, two days before its much older brother, the Pebble Beach Concours d'Elegance, showcases the crème de la crème of the automotive world. It's also the day before Seaside tries to hide its "city limit" signs during the Concours d'Lemons.

The Pacific Grove rally, sponsored by that city's Rotary club, is somewhere in between — less cream and Dom Perignon and much more coffee and Coca-Cola. That's according to David Laws, a spokesperson for the group. "We like to keep it a lighthearted, fun social event," he said.

To that end, entries are just \$95 and are accepted on a first-come, first-serve basis (last-minute entries incur a \$25 late fee). Laws said that the event can handle around 200 cars and almost always fills up completely by showtime.

"Last year, we could have squeezed in maybe one or two more cars, but the year before, there were six or seven disappointed drivers," he noted.

Laws said that many of the participants are part of other Car Week events, while others are local or

just have friends in Pacific Grove they like to visit.

"People come from as far away as New Hampshire, Texas and North Dakota," he said. Qualifications to exhibit a car are "pretty liberal," he added.

"There's a restored dump truck from Granite Rock they send every year, and plenty of cars from the 1920s and '30s," he said. "There are a lot of muscle cars of the 1950s and '60s, too, like Corvettes and Camaros. We've had Rolls-Royces and even a couple of Teslas."

Not to mention those three-wheeled coffee-vend-

EHIND THE extravaganza that is the world class Pebble Beach Concours d'Elegance every August are thousands of children in Monterey County who benefit from the event 365 days a year.

The Concours partners with the Pebble Beach Company Foundation to distribute funds from the premier automobile event, which has raised more than \$27 million since it started in 1950. And we're not talking just a handful of charities; proceeds from the Concours benefits more than 80 of the county's "best youth-focused nonprofit educational programs."

Some nonprofits benefit directly from Foundation grants and drawings (two of them are mentioned in this article), while other groups volunteer their time and effort in exchange for donations or use Concours tents to host their own fundraisers.

#### **■** Kinship Center

One of the many youth-centered organizations that benefit greatly from the Concours



ing contraptions. It's too bad they unlike the rally's drivers — can't run on caffeine.

This year, as in the first year of the rally in 1995, the P.G. event will celebrate the Shelby Cobra. The biggest difference between 2019 and 1995 will be that the late Carroll Shelby was in attendance for the inaugural event.

Registration starts at noon, with cars gathering on Lighthouse Avenue from then until 4:30 p.m. "Drivers will stand around and swap stories. It's a big love fest," Laws said.

Viewing the autos is free — it's money raised from registrations that goes to the Rotary's various charities. The event has raised more than \$300,000 to aid homeless people and county youth. Among other things, Laws told The Pine Cone, the club has given money to the Boy Scouts, sponsored an annual track meet with competitors from more than 20 county schools, and given donations for the Monterey Museum of Art's kids' programs and other summer activi-

The group also awards scholarships to local students and distributes dictionaries to third graders at several

"It's fun to see them have their first

dictionaries," Laws said.

He explained that some of the students — perhaps a future Pine Cone reporter among them — start poring over the books when they receive them, presumably fascinated by all the new words they find.

#### BBQ dinner

According to the event schedule, at 4:45 p.m. comes the all-important drivers meeting with law enforcement. Laws explained that this is when vital instructions like, "Don't rev your engine," and warnings about stopping and then peeling out are given. Basically, they amount to, "Don't show off," he said.

"The highway patrol loves coming

to this, and it's a great part of the tour to have them along. It's one of the times people are really happy to see them," he added.

With their noble CHP motorcycle escorts leading the way, drivers will take off on a route that will lead them around Lovers Point and south on Sunset past Asilomar. They'll turn into the Pacific Grove Gate to the Del Monte Forest, and travel to Cypress Point, turning around on Madre Drive for the return trip to downtown P.G.

After they return, many of the participants will partake of a BBO dinner at Chautauqua Hall, put on by Charlie Higuera of Grove Market.

"He's a good guy and takes good care of us," said Laws.

> There's another incentive for drivers and their passengers to sign up for the feast: According to the registration form, only those who register for dinner will be able to receive awards for their vehicles.

> Or, you can just show up and wander among the cars of yesteryear — and some special ones from today — to soak up a fun bit of Car Week atmosphere without spending a dime.

caregiver homes; and assisted with 215 legal guardianships for guardians raising their relative children," Shilstone said.

Kinship Center's Family Ties Program supports grandparents and other family members who have taken on the primary parenting role for children whose parents can't care for them. It also offers counseling, individual case management, respite services, caregiver and child recreational activities and emergency financial support for families' basic needs.

Its placement program does just that: It facilitates placements and adoptions. Its staffers recruit and train families to take on the caregiving role for foster children and ensure that placements are successful.

The funds from the Concours help "us train prospective adoptive and foster parents, as well as child welfare professionals," Shilstone said. "We have trained more than 8,000 social workers, therapists and mental health clinicians with our nationally recognized adoption and permanency curriculum."

Kinship Center's child and family development clinics offer mental health support for children and families.

"Families can participate in playgroups and caregiver support groups,

and can access individualized mental health services, occupational therapy, animal-assisted therapy, and other therapeutic services," Shilstone said.

During Car Week, Kinship Center is selling tickets for a chance to win a 2020 Infiniti QX50 SUV (donated by Infiniti USA) valued at nearly \$47,000. Promotional materials for the drawing appropriately state, "Win this car and change a child's life."

Those who buy tickets will be glad to know that 100 percent of the proceeds from sales benefit Kinship Center. Ticket information is available on the center's Facebook page or at kinshipcenter.org.

For the past two decades, the partnership with the Concours d'Elegance "has been crucial in funding our programs and services that help local children and families," Jeff Davi, a realtor and the chair of Kinship Center's leadership board, said in a statement.

#### ■ Boys & Girls Clubs of Monterey County

Another Monterey County organization that has long provided valuable services to children is the Boys & Girls Clubs of Monterey County. The nonprofit, which has been in the county since 1968, operates two clubhouses that serve an average of 500 children a day.

Children and teens who go to the clubhouses in Seaside and Monterey

have access to a variety of different services and programs including daily homework help, health and fitness, visual and performing arts and character and leadership development.

"Our clubhouses, staff and programs come together to create stability, consistency and a sense of physical and emotional safety for our members," the Boys & Girls Clubs said. "Our youth development professionals serve each day as positive role models who provide ongoing caring relationships with our youth."

About 3,000 students every year in Monterey County don't graduate from high school on time, and half drop out, according to the Boys & Girls Clubs of Monterey County. The nonprofit has an academic success initiative with a goal of keeping students on track in their education.



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

ership. It felt good to a ninth-grade boy.

The same sleek automobile McEwan hadn't seen since he was a kid — except in photos — is now owned by Lord Anthony Bamford of England. It will roll onto the show field to take its place in the 69th Pebble Beach Concours d'Elegance.

"Lord Bamford's cars are restored by a couple of the best shops in England," McEwan said. "This Rolls-Royce will be beautifully and very well done. I think the car colors I saw in the photo that accompanied the entry are original, the same ivory, with dark blue fenders. Since it's under restoration, I can't say for sure, but I imagine it will have original colors."

#### A box of clippings

When the provenance of an automobile includes multiple owners over time, all kinds of iterations are possible. Research reveals that the chassis of the Rolls-Royce, ordered June 1, 1939, by Margaret Dunlap, left England on June 24, via U.S. shipper/distributor J.S. Inskip, Inc., of New York.

"A year later, in 1940, Mrs. Dunlap wanted a different body on her car, which wasn't an unusual thing," McEwan said, "since a chassis far outlives the body which, in this case, was built by Inskip, Inc. and was delivered to Mrs. Dunlap."

In late 1946, the car was sold by Inskip, Inc. to Walker J. Noonan of Boston and, one year thence, to L.W. Bickford of Springfield. In 1951, the Rolls-Royce went to Frederick Palmer of East Haddam, Conn. This trajectory coincides with McEwan's encounter with the car during school.

One might imagine that 1937 Rolls-Royce is what ignited McEwan's lifelong passion and invest-

ment in the world of vintage automobiles. Yet his interest in classic cars predated high school.

When McEwan was in kindergarten, students were given magazines to study. He pored over the pages, tearing out those with automobile ads. Over time, these images accumulated in a cardboard box, which eventually was stored in the cellar of his family home.

"When I was in college, my mom threw out my automobile clippings," he said. "Although I got past it, she never got over my disappointment. Something in me, at the age of 5, got interested in vintage automobiles. It's an enduring interest that grew by itself within me."

Throughout his youth, McEwan attended classic car events, just to observe and absorb the automobiles and everything about them. He bought his first vintage car in 1956 during college, a 1930 V-16 Cadillac, for \$300 — much more money than his \$3 budget could afford.

"I was trying to stay awake in an economics class, when I realized the professor had brought up the subject of vintage cars a little too often for me to be indifferent to it. When I approached him about it after class," Mc-Ewan said, "you'd think he'd found his long-lost son."

The professor drove Mc-Ewan to see the Cadillac. Enchanted by it, McEwan borrowed \$300 to buy the car, which they towed on the end of a rope to his Pi Kappa Alpha fraternity house.

Upon his 1959 graduation, with a degree in aeronautical engineering from Rensselaer

Polytechnic Institute in New York — the oldest technological research university in the country — McEwan, who'd never been farther west than New York, accepted a job with The Boeing Company in Seattle. He traded his Cadillac and some dollars for a 1931 Rolls-Royce from Schenectady.

#### Down the Rolls-Royce road

The summer of 1960, he and his parents drove the Rolls-Royce from Agawam to Seattle, at an average of 540 miles a day.

"Today, I'm still very heavily involved in vintage automobiles from the '20s and '30s, and have a collection of my own," McEwan said. "My first Rolls-Royce in 1959 got me going down the Rolls-Royce road. I sold my last one in 2011. I'm still emotionally connected to the 1937 Rolls-Royce Phantom III. Is it the first car I'd go out and buy if it were

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

"We negotiated for a week," Meland recalled. "I couldn't pay the asking price, but I could promise him the car would stay in California and be well taken care of." They finally agreed on a purchase price, and Shirley — not Quint — became the car's proud owner in 1998. Quint noted that it came with "two cases of fabulous Far Niente wine," as well.

The couple became caretakers of the classic Ford, which won many additional awards.

The Melands showed it at the Grand National Roadster Show in Pomona. There, as part of a commemoration of the 75th anniversary of Ford's 1932 models, it was billed as one of the manufacturer's 75 most significant autos from that

Significantly, Meland said, "The car's never been restored from the time it was made into a hot rod. We touched nothing on it." He added that Shirley was the car's main driver, although he allowed that he has "loved driving it around," too.

#### Greatest honor ever

He's thrilled to be invited to Concours. "Being invited to Pebble Beach is the greatest honor any car anywhere ever gets," he said. "This is a once-in-a-lifetime event for me."

One of the highlights for Meland will be the Tour d'Elegance, but he wasn't planning to be alone on the 70-mile drive: The rumble seat were set to be occupied by his and Shirley's three children, Deborah, Kimberly and Michael.

"We're all going to cruise down to Big Sur and back," he said before the Tours. Somehow, it seems like Shirley will be there, too. After all, as far as Quint is concerned, it's still her car.

"Out-of-school time - after school and summer — is the most critical and overlooked opportunity to help youth reach their full potential and have a great future," according to the group.

In what it calls "expanded learning," the Boys & Girls Clubs offers academic programs and learning opportunities that "complement and reinforce what kids learn in school."

Its Engineering Everywhere program offers curriculum for middle-school-aged students in after-school and camp programs. The program challenges kids to tackle "real-world, personally meaningful, and globally relevant engineering problems." Each unit includes six to 10 activities and takes 45 to 60 minutes to finish.

The clubs' reading enrichment program, KidzLit, is designed to build literacy skills and increase young people's desire to read. Volunteers and staff use a five-part process in which children hear books read aloud or read them on their own.

A description of the program says it helps develop core values of "helpfulness, fairness, personal responsibility, and respect for others."

#### Surrealist and Pop

The organization's Art Club, which is open to members of all ages, allows kids to learn about different periods in art. (Club members are currently working on the Surrealist and Pop Art periods.) Kids practice art styles by artists in the periods they're learning about and their work is displayed at the clubhouses.

To continue to offer its long list of services, the Boys & Girls Clubs of Monterey County is selling tickets for a chance to win a 2019 Mercedes-Benz A220 4MATIC sedan, valued at \$34,500. And like Kinship Center, all the proceeds from ticket sales benefit the organization.

"I want to go out to the field," he said, "to see if my fingerprints are still on the car."

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


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

skilled driving led to his winning the F1 World Championship that year, a first for the marque since 1964.

Lauda went on to win the Formula 1 championship title again in 1977, after recovering from a harrowing wreck on the Nürburgring in Germany in 1976 in which his car burst into flames, and he inhaled noxious gases before being pulled from the wreck. Lauda was so badly burned that he lost his eyelids, part of an ear and large portions of his scalp. He lapsed into a coma and was administered last rights by a priest, only to recover and return to racing after missing just two events. Lauda nearly won the championship that year but bowed out of the season's final race in Japan due to safety concerns amid heavy rains, allowing British driver James Hunt to win the title by a single point. The 1976 season and their rivalry is chronicled in the 2013 Ron Howard film, "Rush." Lauda left the Ferrari team toward the end of the 1977 season, after winning the championship.

He retired from racing in September 1979 but was wooed back to the sport three years later, when McLaren offered him what was then the most lucrative contract in the history of Formula 1 racing. He won the championship for McLaren in 1984 and retired, for real this time, the following year. He advised racing teams, was a TV sports commentator and founded two airlines, Lauda Air and NIKI, both of which he later sold. Lauda died in May at the age of 70.

"Niki Lauda is one of the true legends of Formula 1. He ushered in a new era of driver that looked at his job clinically, and was a very shrewd tactician both in and out of the car," said Hans Wurl, the spe-

cialist for Gooding & Co. who is handling the sale of the 312T. "For all of his talent and successes, his time in Formula 1 is marked with great moments of bravery and fortitude, and his influence on driver safety cannot be overstated. His unfortunate passing this year is a big loss for the racing community."

#### The story of his car

Being able to offer such a special and storied racecar driven by an exceptional man is a privilege for Gooding & Co. and is due to the auction house's "long and meaningful relationship" with the seller, Wurl said. "The car had been discussed as a potential consignment over the course of the last few years," he said. "We are always honored when a collector entrusts us with the sale of one of their prized possessions, and sometimes these decisions take time and careful consideration."

The 312T was retired from racing after the 1976 season, and several years later, noted French col-

lector Jacques Setton purchased it. He owned the 312T for nearly two decades before selling it to John Bosch of the Netherlands, who in turn sold it to its current owner, an American collector whose identity is being protected by Gooding, in 2008.

The current owner had the car fully restored, according to Wurl. "The restoration was managed by the consignor's own staff, who dealt with disassembly and reassembly, as well as research," he said. "The most talented marque experts available were utilized." Dennison International, the Washington State-based shop headed by Butch Dennison that's well known for expertise in Ferraris, among other marques, rebuilt the mechanical components, while Byers Custom and Restoration, also in Washington, handled the bodywork and livery.

"Everyone involved in the restoration of the 312T operates at the highest level of their craft, and the results are truly stunning," Wurl said. The restoration was so thoroughly and beautifully done that the car took third place in its class in the 2017 Pebble Beach Concours d'Elegance.

Wurl said the car has not been raced since its glory days with Ferrari and Lauda. "When disassembled by the consignor, the car was found to be in remarkably original condition, and showed signs of decades of static storage," he said. "Since restoration, the Ferrari has been driven in two private test sessions, including one in June of this year where it performed beautifully."

The Gooding & Co. Pebble Beach auctions take place Aug. 16-17, and admission is \$100 for two with a catalog, or \$40 for one. For more information, visit www.goodingco.com.


#### Precious memories

"While Lotus founder Colin Chapman's mantra was to 'add lightness,' I delighted in taking an engine's basic architecture and adding a sense of external combustion."

A sculptor whose inventive pieces capture cars in motion, Pietruska is looking forward to the longer exhibit and new site. He also thanked the owners of New Masters Gallery for making it possible.
