Boots

In a dispatch to the Daily Telegraph, London, G. Ward Price, writing from General Headquarters, Salonika, gives the following amusing description of "the perfect bootblack:"

"Boot-cleaning, one of the milder recreations that Salonika offers, ranks among the national industries." And he explans that to sit sipping some favorite beverage and having his boots cleaned at the same time is the Greek's ideal Well Fur- of a pleasant afternoon. "The 'lustros,' as Greek shoeblacks are musically called," he continues "though usually of tender age, is a true artist, and is by no means content with the dull burnish that satisfies the English boot-boy. He first meticulously 4 - room scrapes your boot clean of the smallest fragment of mud, then wipes it carefully, so as to have a perfectly clean background to work on. After that he applies the by dabbing the blacking, not blacking-brush into the tin, but with a variety of little metal implements and sponges. When he ish you imagine that your shine is sible only by the welding togethover, but it has really only begun, for the 'lustros' now goes on to bring out the high lights by smearing your boot with a colorless cream, which he brushes again to great brilliance, and finishes off by two or three minutes' friction with a velvet cloth. He completes his work by painting the edge of sole and heel with a sert of varnish.

"If you attempt during all this time to withdraw your foot before he is satisfied with the effect produced the 'lustros' knocks imperiously with the back of his brush. Successful 'lutroi' even have a little nickel-plated bell which they ring to call your attention when they are ready for the other foot, as it is the etiquette of the profession never to speak to a client after first attracting his attention by hammering upon their little wooden boxes. For all this you pay the 'lustros' 10 leptas, or one penny, and walk away with a selfconscious feeling that your feet are glittering."

The man who said this was a Scandinavian, who had been in the United States a few years. While the country from which he came is not directly involved in the European war, it might have been easy to suppose that he would have an individual leaning, one way or the other, as between the embattling nations. Most people who have recently come from Europe very naturally entertain their preferences, nor can they be blamed for doing so. Indeed, it is highly praiseworthy in every man that he retain certain fond sentiments with relation to the land of his birth.

At the present time, when Europe is disturbed by a great crisis, the United States is not only un der obligation, but also under necessity to observe the strictest neutrality. It must be impartial as between the nations at war, and it can only be neutral and impartial save in the measure that its people are so. Those newly come among us should remember that they are now American citizens; that their first duty to the American nation, in this situaton, is to refrain from performing any act or encouraging any sentiment upon the part of all or any particular class of its people which could be construed as favorable or unfavorable to either the one or the other of the warring factions. The Scandinavian waiter is right. To be an American citizen a man must forget, so far as his prejudices are concerned, where he came from.

To Tolstoi he credits not only ethical impulse, but also light on mastery of the art of statement. Webster and Lincoln he selects as the greatest of American orators. Eloquence of the heart is most effective and wins the greatest popular rewards. At the same time effective oratory and logic are allied; and Mr. Bryan is in sistent that average audiences like nothing better than simply but surely developed argument from carefully defined premises. As a past master in addressing average audiences Mr. Bryan speaks here with authority.
