## Small Army, But a Bis

## Navy

In reply to a Carmel citizen, who wrote to Congressman E. A. Hayes, asking information as to his attitude in the matter of national military and naval preparedness, the following practical work, as is evidenced by the article here presented. It is original, and the result of much individual observation. The descriptions are from notes taken either in Carmel or in the immediate neighborhood, hence they have local value.

## Third Installment

A dainty green Lutescent Warbler has come to m; win, dow to eat suet nearly every day for six weeks. Me seems to bo very fond of it. When he has has a few times, I think it is because he has partaken too freely of the suet on the day before.
He is bright olive-green abore, veiled on top of head and cdge of primaries with gray. Unde. parts are bright yellowish-green streaked ou chest with dull brownish olive, barely discernable with ylaskes when the bird is near. He has "onderful yellowish eye - rings. When still a light line is notice able just below the forded wiugs, which have no bars.
The brightest, most conspicuous Warbler it has been my for tume to see is the beautiful' "y ellow whirli. gig, " scientifically know a as Dendroica Tomonsendi. I see Liim of. tew, fluttering and apparently turning somersaults in the terminal head of a pine tree luranch, which seems to be a favorito and satis. factory feeding, place.
The season's markings for the two sexes and for those of thie young are so different and so complicated that they are extremely confusing. The winter male, the bird oftenest notieed, has its black head-piece a little obscured with olive green; the oblong cheek patch is black, somewhat obscured with olive green ; the throat al:1 chest are yellow, with black markings ; the back is olive green, with blackish marks ; the tail is blackish with white spots at end of lateral feathers: the wings are blackish with two white bars, He is an exciting fluttering bunch of black, yellow aud white.
The female is similar to the male, but color everywhere restricted and velled to softness and sometimes to obscurity.
The young are similar to the adults. but इellow much paler, and some of the adult Townsend Warblers' most characteristic markings are obsolete in the young birds.
