On Thursday, March 24, the electors of Carmel School District (Carmel Valley) will vote on the question of issuing bonds of the \$2000 for erecting and furnishing a new building.

County Assessor Geo. Goold has begun the work of obtaining valuations and making assessments on real and personal property. B. E. Cahoon has been assigned to work in Carmel.

Those in charge of the Boys' and Young Men's clubs wish to thank those who so continuously show their interest and who appreciate their privilege of assisting in the good work.

That a large portion of Carmel residents are interested in bird study was evidenced by the number who attended the lecture of Prof. H. C. Bryant. The local Audubon society is to be congratulated for its efforts along this line.

Deputy Fish and Game Commissioner Phil Oyer of this district is in receipt of notice of his appointment as supervisor of the commercial fisheries of Monterey and Santa Cruz.

The obliging J. Montague, for several years station agent at Monterey, has been succeeded by R. L. Jones of Lompoc. Montague takes charge of the San Mateo office.

Carmel's local and long-distance telephone service is on a par with the best. At the local headquarters in Carmel at Pine Inn, one may telephone to New York and other Eastern points. This will be a great convenience to visiting business men and tourists.

Splendid Paper Read Before the Carmel Audubon Society

The Audubon Society of Carmel, which is a branch of the State Audubon Society, is endeavoring to do some helpful, practical work, as is evidenced by the article here presented.

It is original, and the result of much individual observation. The descriptions are from notes taken either in Carmel or in the immediate neighborhood, hence they have local value.

The introduction must of necessity be more or less technical and savor strongly of Chapman, Wheelock and Bailey, our most reliable Western Ornithologists.

Third Installment

A dainty green Lutescent Warbler has come to my window to eat suet nearly every day for six weeks. He seems to be very fond of it. When he has missed visiting us for a day, as he has a few times, I think it is because he has partaken too freely of the suet on the day before.

He is bright olive-green above, veiled on top of head and edge of primaries with gray. Under parts are bright yellowish-green streaked on chest with dull brownish olive, barely discernable with glasses when the bird is near. He has wonderful yellowish eye-rings. When still a light line is noticeable just below the folded wings, which have no bars.

The brightest, most conspicuous Warbler it has been my fortune to see is the beautiful "yellow whirlingig," scientifically known as *Dendroica Townsendi*. I see him often, fluttering and apparently turning somersaults in the terminal head of a pine tree branch, which seems to be a favorite and satisfactory feeding place.

The season's markings for the two sexes and for those of the young are so different and so complicated that they are extremely confusing. The winter male, the bird oftenest noticed, has its black head-piece a little obscured with olive green; the oblong cheek-patch is black, somewhat obscured with olive green; the throat and chest are yellow, with black markings; the back is olive green, with blackish marks; the tail is blackish with white spots at end of lateral feathers; the wings are blackish with two white bars. He is an exciting fluttering bunch of black, yellow and white.

The female is similar to the male, but color everywhere restricted and veiled to softness and sometimes to obscurity.

The young are similar to the adults, but yellow much paler, and some of the adult Townsend Warblers' most characteristic markings are obsolete in the young birds.

Last Fall, when over in the Pebble Beach grounds, I thought I was being treated to another sight of a flock of Myrtle and Audubon Warblers, until I came close enough to hear a tinkling

Your letter of the 15th instant is duly at hand and noted.

In reply thereto I have to say that I am not in favor of a large increase in the standing army, which, in my opinion, would be unnecessary and a positive detriment to the country. Our people have no thought of making war on anybody, and therefore need no standing army. I do feel, however, that we need a navy of sufficient strength to protect our coasts, though by no means of the "preparedness" advocated by the President.

The males seemed very bright and showy when I contrasted them with the plain olive brown coated females, whose heads were washed with greenish-yellow and whose under parts were a dingy yellowish-white.

It was a bright sunny day, and the well-groomed bodies fairly glistened and shimmered with greenish-yellow as they flitted from one patch of weeds to another, feeding and calling to each other in their cherry voices.

I studied them for some time, then rushed home and soon learned that they were the Pacific Yellow-Throats, one of our best known and much appreciated seed-eating Wood Warblers.
