Without a dissenting vote, the electors of Carmelo school district last Friday authorized the board of trustees to issue bonds to the extent of \$2000 to erect and furnish a modern school building.

The structure now in use is one of the oldest in the state, which should have been abandoned years ago.

At the next meeting of the trustees, plans and specifications will be presented and adopted and bids advertised for, and construction will begin as soon as possible.

Meetings will be held every Friday night, and in the near future it is planned to have J. Stitt Wilson address a public meeting at the Manzanita Theatre.

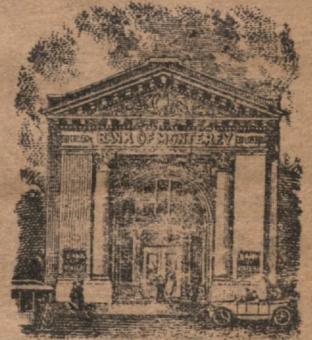

Preparedness the Reason

The real reason for the withdrawal of France from Mexico following the war between the States, is set forth in the current number of a monthly publication, as follows:

Notice to TAXPAYERS

All taxpayers are required by the constitution to annually make and deliver to the Assessor a statement, under oath, setting forth specifically ALL the real, personal, or other class of property, owned by such persons, or in their possession, or under their control, as the same stands of record at 12 o'clock Meridian on the first Monday of March.

The Political Code provides, that all property must be assessed at its "full cash value," and defines "full cash value" as being "the amount at which the property would be taken in payment of a just debt from a solvent debtor."

Unsecured Personal Property

The taxes on all unsecured personal property are due and payable and must be paid at the time the assessment is made.

Exemptions

Any person or association, claiming any property to be exempt from taxation, MUST make the claim and affidavit, for such exemption, every year, in the manner provided by law. This applies to the \$100 allowed on personal property of householders; the \$1000 allowed soldiers, sailors, marines, etc., and property used solely and exclusively for religious worship.

Assessments

Any information desired relating to assessments will be gladly furnished on application, and all objections should be made before the Board of Equalization adjourns, instead of waiting until it is time to pay taxes.

Remember, that if you fail to make a statement you fail to comply with the law and you lay yourself liable to arbitrary assessment, which is expensive to yourself and causes much trouble to others.

Barnes Circus Will Show Soon

Thirty full-grown, jungle-bred man-eating African lions in one bunch is an unusual spectacle—especially so when it is remembered that such a sight may be witnessed for one's entertainment and instruction.

Centuries have passed since the brutal Nero introduced man-eating cats as a form of amusement, and while scenes such as were witnessed in his time may not now be seen, these lions are used in scenes of a decidedly thrilling character.

Thirty of the beasts, headed by Caesar, said to be the finest and fiercest lion specimen in captivity,

are assembled in an act. They are in charge of Herr Louis Roth

The entire herd is turned loose at one time in the steel-barred arena, Herr Roth in their midst. The masterly control exercised by Roth over the animals is quite remarkable. Crowding his way among them, carrying only a small whip, he, with sharp commands, compels every lion to perform some maneuver. Mounting them into a pyramid, with Caesar at the apex, Roth climbs to and straddles the snarling beast's back.

Though of a quiet unassuming disposition, Roth's control over the animals is fairly electrifying, and the onlookers get thrill after thrill.

The very acme of trained lion perfection is represented in this group and their value is placed at \$50,000.

But the lions are only a part of this splendid circus. Many other wonderful attractions are provided.
