Scope of the Stage as Schiller Saw It

"The man who first pronounced religion to be the strongest pillar of the state," wrote Schiller in one of his essays, "unconsciously de fended the stage when he said so, in its noblest aspect: The uncertain nature of political events, ren dering religion a necessity, also de mands the stage as a moral force."

"Where the influence of civil laws ends, that of the stage begins. Where venality and corruption blind and bias judgment and justice, and intimidation perverts its ends, the stage seizes the swowd and scales, and pronounces a terrible verdict on vice. But in this the stage only aids justice. A far wider field is really open to it. There are a thousand vices unnoticed by human justice, but con-There are a thousand vices unnoticed by human justice, but condemned by the stage; so, also, a thousand virtues overlooked by man's laws are honored on the stage. It is thus the handmaiden of religion and philosophy. From these pure sources it draws its high principles and the exhaulted teachings, and presents them in lovely form.

"But the stage does even more than this It is a great school of practical wisdom, a guide for civil ife, and a key to the mind in all the mask from the hypocrite, and betrays the meshes of intrigue. Duplicity and cunning have been forced by it to show their hideous features in the light of day.

"Not only man's mind, but also his intellectual culture has been

Not only man's little, but also bis intellectual culture, has been promoted by the higher drama. The lofty mind and the arde of patriot have often used the stage to

spread enlightenment.
"Considering nations and ages, "Considering nations and ages, the thinker sees the masses enchained by opinion and cut off by adversity from happiness; truth only lights up a few minds, who perhaps have to acquire it by the trials of a lifetime. How can the wise ruler put these within the reach of his nation?

"The thoughtful and the worthier section of the people diffuse the light of wisdom over the masses through the stage. Purer and better principles and motives issue from the stage, and circulate through society; the night of barbarism and superstition vanishes.
