## Origin of the Name California

The origin of California's name is hidden in obscurity. The state blue book accepts as true Edward E. Hale's declaration that "the name of California was given by Cortez, who discovered the peninsula in 1535." What is declared in that same blue book to be the first use of the name occurs in the Spanish romance, "Las Sergas de Esplaniau." This romance was first published in 1510. Therein it is stated: "Know that on the right hand of the Indies there is an island called California very near to the Terrestrial Paradise."

Mr. Hale assumes, and the blue book accepts the assumption, that Cortez and his followers, in 1535, must have been acquainted with the romance, as they sailed by the west side of Mexico they supposed they were precisely at the place indicated, that is, on the right hand of the Indies.

Now comes Professor Charles E. Chapman of the history department of the University of California with the discovery that in the famous old French epic poem, "The Song of Roland," occurs this line: "E cil d'Affrike e cil de Califerne," which is translated thus: "And those of Africa and those of Califerne."

Chapman comments thus:

"What, after all, is the origin of the word? Was there some non-Christian land so called, in the distant past; some Moslem realm under the sway of a 'caliph'? Perhaps we shall learn some day that our beloved state name traces back through Spain to the land and times of Mohammed."

Let the origin of the name be what it will, says a writer in a Los Angeles journal, when California was described as being "very near the Terrestrial Paradise," it is evident that the geographers knew what they were talking about.

## Ritschel's Work Highly Esteemed

For depicting elemental strength in wave action no collection yet seen at the Pratt Institute Art Gallery has even approached that of William Ritschel. And yet, the eleven coast-marines in the assemblage of nineteen canvases on view are in no wise literal transcripts of nature; they are filled with poetic and sympathetic personality inherent in the artist. They might be termed at first blush as "strong," so convincing are they, but they are far more than strong; they grip the imagination while gratifying natural craving for truth.

In the main, the marines are scenes on the California Pacific coast. While the locale differs only slightly in these canvases, the points of view differ widely. They deal with the solid, everlasting rocks along shore and with the everlasting surging, dashing and smashing of inrolling ocean waves, sometimes lapping them with caressing motion and, at other times, deceptively resting under moonlight that dimple the wave-summits.

The way that Mr. Ritschel varies his marines is suggestive of the way Beethoven repeated his themes in his sonatas, conveying delight for his ingenuity on introducing the themes in variations. "The Enchanted Pool, Carmel-by-the-Sea," was an inspiration, with its inset of deep blue in the pool in the foreground, its massed and solid rocks and its glimpse of a great breaker coming in, in the background. Tumult is seen in waves dashing far out, in "Glory of the Morning;" broad with its incoming tide is "Play of the Waves, and surf dashing into a semi-circling rock mass, in "Shadows of the Cliff," "Fogs and Breakers" and "Instealing Fog" elicit admiration for the artist's work.

He plays his decorative rocks about in masterly fashion, as in "Morning Hour." Suavity joins strength in the moonlight effects in "There Shall be Light" and "Golden Path Across the Sea," and fine variations in his theme are seen in "Tidepool," "Storm Swept Cypress," "Breezy Morning," "Monterey Cypress," "The Opal Sea" and "Pine Branch."

The fund being gathered for use in restoring Carmel Mission is being increased from time to time. The latest affair, given in San Francisco on Monday evening, was the play "The Rosary," under the auspices of the Knights of Columbus.

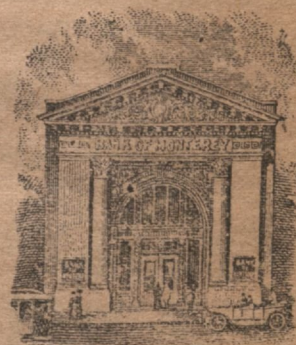
## Color Scheme of Ballots for Coming Election

This rise should have been made months ago, as every kind of paper has gone up in price from 15 to 50 per cent, and a few varieties now cost double what they did two years ago. Ink likewise has made a big jump and everything used in the printing business is higher. Months ago the printers in almost every city in California advanced their prices to meet this new condition of affairs and Hollister is perhaps the only place in the state where no raise has been made.

The increases made by us have been forced upon us by these new conditions, and have been just as small as possible. When you order your next printing job do not expect us to charge the same price that you have been paying in the past, for we must charge a little bit more.

## Industrial Conditions And Enlistments

The average wage in the United States will have to be lower than it now is before the rush of recruits for army and navy service, on either its present or future basis, reach impressive proportions.

Dispatching agents out into the highways and byways of the smaller communities of the country to gather men in, can at best only slightly affect a situation that is fundamentally controlled by long-standing habits and long-held ideals, none of which induce enlistment for duty's sake unless national interests are vitally at stake. During periods of economic stringency the enlistments increase, but just now the number open to this appeal is small indeed.

There appears to be a lack of understanding as to just what the various lists of candidates to be voted for at the Presidential primary stand for. There is but one Democratic list of candidates; they are for Wilson. The Progressive candidates are for Johnson. Republicans have two lists from which to select delegates to the Chicago convention.
