Beauty Unsurpassed

Norman Sloane, for several years forest ranger of Monterey National Forest, who spent several years in the Canadian Rockies and the Alps in Switzerland, pursuing his studies, has declared that in all his travels he saw no place which equalled the wonderful variety or beautiful scenery in the Big Sur section, which is reached via Carmel-by-the-Sea.

Other beauty spots may have larger waterfalls, taller trees, or higher mountains, but the infinite variety of the Sur section is lacking. In the Sur there are precipitous bluffs overlooking the mighty Pacific, rugged mountains, productive valleys, colorful meadowlands, rivers and creeks, and best of all, an almost virgin forest of redwoods, which tower two hundred feet, pines and Santa Lucia firs, to be found in this section only.

The rivers of the section teem with trout. More than a million trout have been planted in these streams in the past four years through the efforts of Supervisor Roberts. Besides this, striped bass, surf fish and rock cod are to be caught from the rocks along the ocean, besides abalone, mussels and crabs.

Just now the roads are in fine condition. All the steep grades have been reduced and bridges span the gorges. In all, \$26,000 has been expended during the past year for roads and trails in this wonderful country.

Those intending to visit the Big Sur section should arrange to stop a few days in Carmel coming and going.

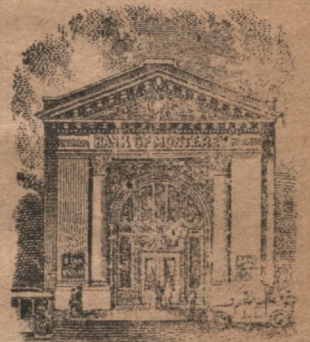
It is reported that on Monday and yesterday the limit has been taken by many, and the usual fish stories are current.

Definition of a Friend

He understands. You do not have to be careful. You can abuse him, neglect him, berate him. Best of all, you can keep still with him. It makes no matter. He likes you. He is like fire, that purifies all you do. He is like water, that cleanses all you say. He is like wine that warms you to the bone. He understands. You can weep with him, laugh with him, sin with him, pray with him. Through and underneath it all he sees, knows and loves—You. A friend, I repeat, is one with whom you dare to be yourself.—Hemet News.

Meaning of Values

By values the painter understands the accurate relation of one tinted plane in his picture to all others. That is, any part of the entire picture area must be true to the character and local color of whatever object it represents, and its strength of gradation toward light or dark must be determined by the remainder of the picture. A sheet of water must look like water, be rendered light, and yet not as light as the sky. An intervening field, no doubt, will be darker than either water or sky, but it will still be light in comparison to a row of trees, for instance.

In photography, which is expressed in monochrome, the variation of tints is even more subtle than in any color interpretation, says Kodakery.

In a painting two planes of different color may be almost alike in strength (which often becomes noticeable only when reproduced in black and white) and yet the differentiation of the two colors makes them stand out against each other. In the picture "Margaret," painted by Rosenthal, we notice a certain confusing sameness of values in the hand holding the chain and in the texture of the chair and medallion. The chair may be a gilded one and the medallion may have a similar tinge of pale gold. Still, there would be enough differentiation in the two yellows to separate them.

In a monochrome the dark touches and highlights had to show a finer variation. For that reason the photographer should be very careful in combining objects. He should study how different colors

and textures change in the transformation to monochrome, or he will never be sure of the result. Of this consists what is technically called values. Refinement and delicacy of tone, and the truthful appearance of objects depend largely on an accurate rendering of values.
