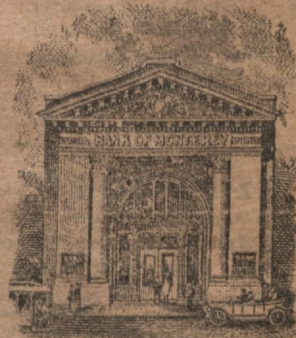

Literary Masters**

Walter Butler O'Connell, A. M. will give a dramatic reading under the patronage of the Carmel Club of Arts and Crafts, on Friday evening, June 16, at Arts and Crafts Hall.

Mr. O'Connell is a graduate of the Jesuit University of Spokane, Washington. The nature of his work brings him before universities, colleges, clubs and educational bodies, as he specializes on the literary masters. He has been coached by such well known pulpit orators as Fr. Thos. Meagher, S. J., noted missionary; Fr. Barrett, and the Most Rev. Archbishop Hanna of San Francisco. He also received special dramatic training under Mrs. N. P. Glann of the California Club, who is a graduate of the Anna Morgan School of Oratory of Chicago.
