At last Friday night's mass meeting the citizens in no uncertain terms demanded for Carmel from the Monterey County Water Works a supply of water sufficient for firefighting and for household use.

After a vigorous ringing of the fire-alarm bell summonsing the people to the meeting, Perry Newberry started pro-ceedings with a straightforward address on the rights of the community to ask and de-mand improved and greater water service.

At the conclusion of the address, the following resolution was offered and adoped by the assembled citizens, and a com-mittee appointed to present it to the water company:

We, the citizens of Carmel, in mass meeting assembled, do hereby request the Monterey County Water Works to provide for the town of Carmel at an early date an adequate supply of water office at once.
