

Made To Be Enforced

"Every motor vehicle must have de-vices in good working order which shall be at all times in constant operation to prevent excessive or unusual noises, annoying smoke and the escape of gas, steam or oil, as well as the falling out of the residue from fuel, and all exhaust pipes carrying exhaust gases from the ensinc shall be directed parallel to the ground and slightly upward. Devices known as "Muffler cut-outs" shall pot he used within the limits of any incorporated city and county, or city and town, or any public highway where the territory contiguous thereto is closely built up."-Extract from state vehicle law.
